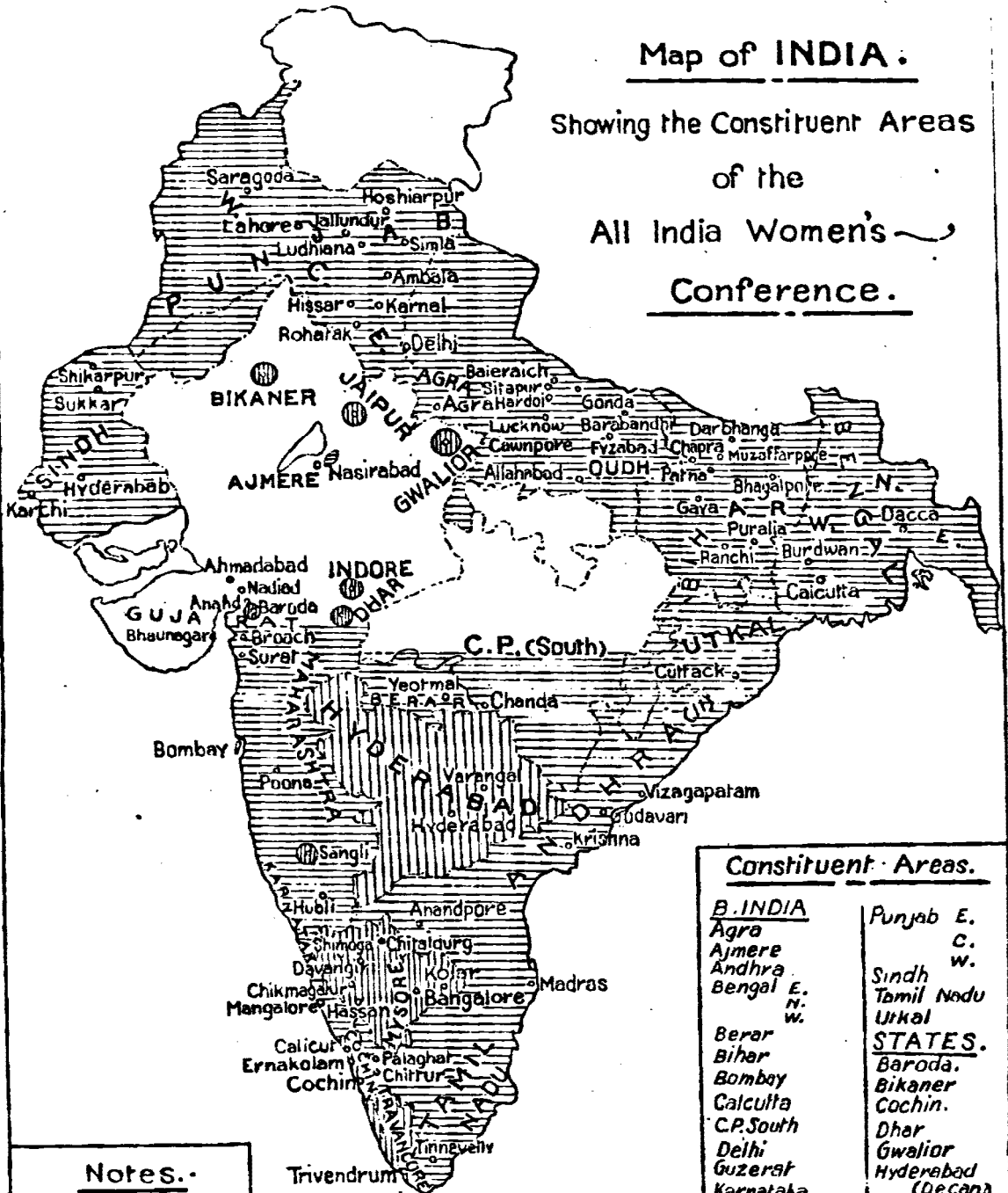



APPENDIX E.

SYNTHESIS OF THE EDUCATIONAL RESOLUTIONS

By the Educational Section Secretary

In the Bombay Session the main tendency of the educational resolutions was clearly indicated as a desire to spread education among the masses of Indian women; and at the same time to ensure that education should be worth having and should be given under suitable physical conditions in the school.

Another clear indication of the reforms in education considered necessary by the women of India was the decision to approach certain universities who, while allowing Domestic Science and the vernacular in their Matriculation examination, do not include these in the later stages of the university course. It was felt that the absence of these subjects in the later stages negated to a large extent any good effect on high school curricula.

The necessity for more training facilities for women teachers was the subject of several resolutions; and the needs of the rural districts for a specialised type of trained teacher were emphasised.

Some of the special difficulties of women students at colleges—especially at mixed and medical colleges—were recognised and resolutions recommending certain arrangements were passed.

The conference also recommended certain lines of action to the All-India Women's Education Fund Association, which was started under its auspices and is now a registered body with Lady Irwin as its president and a large proportion of Conference members on its Governing Body. The Fund Association has taken up at least one of the suggestions, and has appointed a committee to inquire into the possibility of founding an All-India Training College of a special type, including a Home Science Department, and courses for both rural and urban education.

The need for a better status for the Chief Women Inspector of Educational provinces was emphasised, and the suggestion made that she should become a Deputy Directress of Public Instruction.

One of the Resolutions referred to the coming need of school buildings for girls high school to meet the quickly growing demand for this type of education and suggested that companies after the model of the Girls Public Day School Trust should be encouraged.

It was decided that the work of the coming year of the Educational Section should be a continuation of that of last year; i. e. to investigate the condition in India of the education given to children under eight and to issue a report and suggestions; and also to help the Committees in any special problems they had to deal with.

SYNTHESIS OF THE SOCIAL RESOLUTIONS.

By the Social Section Secretary.

Out of the 31 Constituencies 19 Constituencies passed resolutions expressing satisfaction on the passage of the Child Marriage Restraint Act, urging its rigorous enforcement and forming Sarda Committees to prevent and bring to light the breaches of the law as well condemning the agitation against it and urging Indian States to fall into line with British India in respect of this law.

16 Constituencies passed a resolution demanding equal rights of inheritance, Restraint on alienation of property for Hindu as well as Muslim women.

9 Constituencies passed resolutions condemning Pardah, 6 asking for its immediate abolition and 3 for its gradual removal.

5 Constituencies passed resolutions condemning the practice of polygamy 3 demanding its stoppage by law and 2 by social pressure.

4 Constituencies passed resolutions demanding the employment of factory inspectresses, 2 for the non-employment of children under 14, 3 expressed disappointment at the absence of an Indian lady on the Whitley Commission.

3 Constituencies passed resolutions demanding equal rights of adoption

3 Constituencies passed resolution demanding untouchability.

2 passed resolutions urging total abstinence and state prohibition.

2 passed resolutions urging the adoption of Swadeshi cloth by women.

2 passed resolutions urging the Government to nominate women to the Legislative Assembly and Provincial Councils and to nominate them to the Dist. Boards and Education Councils.

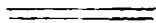
2 passed resolutions urging women to have equal rights of guardianship over their children.

2 Constituencies passed resolutions calling upon women to take up some form of public service.

2 Constituencies demanded equal moral standards for men and women

2 Constituencies demanded equal marriage laws.
