REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1914

PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

The area and population of the territories to which the report relates are shown in the following table:—

- During the year under report there were a few variations in the constitution and jurisdiction of the Civil Courts in the Presidency. The Subordinate Courts of Dholka and Virangam in the Ahmedabad Judicial District. which were linked together as a temporary measure, were separated from the 6th February 1914. The Subordinate Courts of Kaira and Kapadvanj continued to be linked till the end of the year. Besides, the Subordinate Courts of Ankleshvar and Vagra were linked together under one Subordinate Judge, and the Subordinate Judge thus freed was appointed to work at Broach as Additional Subordinate Judge. The Villages of Ratalao, Meghwa, Tarpura, Badapura, Sardarpura and Khankharpur previously included within the territorial limits of the jurisdiction of the Court of Small Causes at Nadiad, for the purposes of suits of a Small Cause Court nature, were excluded therefrom, and included within the territorial limits of the jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Umreth. Fifty-four villages which had been heretofore included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Sangameswar, in the Ratnágiri District, were excluded therefrom, and included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Chiplun in the same district, and the designation of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Sangmeshwar was changed to that of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Devrukh. The villages of Dhakano, Pingalwadi and Patole previously included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Murbad in the Thana District, were excluded therefrom and included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Kalyan in the same district.
 - 3. The High Court was presided over by the Honourable Sir Basil Scott, Knight, from the 1st January to 7th June and from 8th July to 31st December 1914. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 8th June to 7th July 1914. During this period the Honourable Sir Dinsha D. Davar, Knight, acted as Chief Justice.

Puisne Judges.

- The Honourable Sir Stanley L. Batchelor, Knight, from 1st January to 7th June and from 18th October to 31st December 1914. His Lordship was on furlough from 8th June to 17th October 1914.
- The Honourable Sir Dinsha D. Davar, Knight, from 1st January to 7th June and from 8th July to 31st December 1914. His Lordship acted as Chief Justice from 8th June to 7th July 1914.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Beaman from 1st January to 31st December 1914.

- The Honourable Mr. Justice Heaton from 1st January to 31st December 1914.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Macleod from 1st January to 31st December 1914.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Shah from 1st January to 31st December 1914.
- The Honourable Mr. Justice Hayward officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 8th June to 17th October 1914.
- 4. In the Presidency proper there were on the 31st December 1914-
 - 15 District Judges,
 - 1 Joint Judge,
 - 12 Assistant Judges,
 - 8 Small Cause Court Judges (including those at the Presidency Town) besides the Cantonment Magistrates at Belgaum, Ahmednagar and Ahmedabad and the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Bombay, Poona and Nadiad, who are also invested with Small Cause Court powers.
 - 17 First Class Subordinate Judges (excluding two Inspecting First Class Subordinate Judges who do not exercise judicial powers).
 - 103 Second Class Subordinate Judges (excluding two Inspecting Second Class Subordinate Judges who do not exercise judicial powers).
- 5. Besides the above Judicial Officers, there were during the year under report 6 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising the powers of Subordinate Judges under Regulation XIII of 1830.
- 6. In the Province of Sind, there were, on the 31st December 1914, besides the Judicial Commissioner and 3 Additional Judicial Commissioners,—
 - 4 District Judges (including the Deputy Commissioner, Thar and Parkar, who exercises the powers of a District Judge),
 - 3 Joint Judges,
 - 1 Small Cause Court Judge (besides the Cantonment Magistrate at Karáchi exercising Civil powers, and the Registrar of the Small Cause Court, Karáchi),
 - 3 First Class Subordinate Judges,
 - 13 Second Class Subordinate Judges.
- 7. As regards the working of the Dekkhan Agriculturists' Relief Act, the reports of three of the District Judges will be found summarized below.

The District Judge of Khándesh states that there is no doubt the principles of the Act are understood in the district and very full advantage is taken of its provisions, which must increase litigation. The fact that a debtor can claim an account when brought before the Court, whatever the nature of the instrument evidencing the debt, must be a very strong inducement to refuse payment utill a suit is filed, and the same consideration is likely to influence the creditor in fixing his terms.

The District Judge of Násik observes that the provisions of the Act are widely known to, and fully utilized by, the agriculturists generally and adds that there are no Village Munsiffs appointed in the District.

The District Judge of Surat considers the working of the Act to be satisfactory.

The District of Judges of Ahmednagar, Dhárwar, Kanara, Poona, Ratnágiri and Sátára do not consider it necessary to make any remarks as the proposals made by the Dekkhan Agriculturists' Relief Act Commission are under the consideration of Government.

The District Judges of Ahmedabad, Belgaum, Bijápur, Broach, Sholápur and Thána are silent on the point.

The Annual Statements.

- 8. In accordance with letter No. 1416-1448, dated the 18th September 1905, from the Government of India to the Government of Bombay, this statement is filled up in duplicate—one for Civil and the other for Criminal work—and the statistics for Revenue Courts are excluded from it as also from the other judicial statements.
- 9. The total number of civil cases decided during the year under report was 3,35,938 as against 3,16,033 in the last year, showing an increase of 10,005. The increase in the number of disposals occurs in all kinds of civil cases.
- 10. Of the total number of decided cases 49 per cent. were regular suits, 48.9 per cent. miscellaneous cases, and 2.1 per cent. appeals as against 47.5, 50.3, and 2.2 per cent., respectively, during the year 1913.
- 11. The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have risen from Rs. 49,61,993, to Rs. 50,86,940, and the total charges from Rs. 50,04,513 to Rs. 53,63,167. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042, dated 11th August 1893.
 - 12. The total number of suits instituted in all the Courts was 161,914 as against 153,452 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 8,492. Last year there was an increase of 17,369,
- 13. There was an increase of 13,309 in the number of suits for money as compared with the increase of 12,011 last year. There was also an increase in all other kinds of suits except suits for immoveable property, suits to establish a right of pre-emption, mortgage suits and suits relating to religious and other endowments.
- 14. The percentage of suits for money or moveable property rose from 78.7 to 82.8 and that of suits relating to immoveable property (including mortgage and pre-emption suits) fell from 16.7 to 12.4; the percentage of all other kinds of suits was 4.8 as compared with 4.6 last year.

15. The aggregate value of suits rose from Rs. 4,54,49,833 to Rs. 0,75,05,848. All kinds of suits showed an increase.

- 16. The Courts of the Unpaid Tribunals showed a decrease in the value of suits instituted during the year, while all the rest showed an increase. The increase is most marked in the Superior Courts and the Presidency Small Cause Courts where the value of suits instituted rose from Rs. 1,00,41,502 and Rs. 49,71,321 to Rs. 3,14,75,114 and Rs. 55,63,493 respectively.
- 17. There were 220,169 suits for disposal before all the Courts, out of which 164,628 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 55,541 pending at the end of the year. The corresponding figures for the last year were 206,031, 150,213 and 55,818.

- 19. Of the total number of suits disposed of after contest and on reference to Arbitration, judgment was given for plaintiff in whole or in part, in 84.8 per cent. and for the defendant in 15.2 per cent. of cases.
- 20. The average duration of contested suits fell from 210 to 191 days in the year under report, but of uncontested suits rose from 95 to 101. The corresponding figures for 1911 and 1912, respectively, were 419 and 222 for contested, and 185 and 96 for uncontested suits. In the District Courts the

average duration was 278 days for contested and 119 for uncontested suits as against 209 and 152, respectively, in the preceding year. In the Mofussil Subordinate Courts the average duration was 215 days for contested and 128 days for uncontested suits as against 238 and 118, respectively, in the previous year. In the Superior Courts the average duration was 368 days for contested and 332 days for uncontested suits as against 352 and 408, respectively, in the preceding year. The delay in the disposal is mainly due to the non-service of notices and the effect of Rule 5 of Order IX, which allows the party a year within which to apply for fresh notice.

21. The following table gives some idea of the comparative litigiousness of the several districts in the Presidency:—

22. In addition to the regular suits mentioned above, the Courts disposed of 18,761 miscellaneous cases as against 19,720 during the previous year. The percentage of contested miscellaneous cases to the total of cases of all kinds was 31.1 and the average duration of such cases was 81 days as against 91 days in the preceding year.

^{24.} The First Class Subordinate Judges and Small Cause Court Judges invested with Appellate powers, disposed of 818 appeals as against 1,411 last year.

*25. Of the total number of appeals decided, 1,519 were dismissed under Order XLI, Rule 11, Civil Procedure Code, or for default or were otherwise not prosecuted. The disposal of the remaining 5,157 may be classified as under:—

- 26. The average duration of appeals was 318 days as against 313 last year.
- 27. There was an increase in the institutions and the disposals of miscellaneous appeals, the figures being 370 and 390 as against 373 and 365 respectively, last year. The average duration of these appeals was 145 days as against 129 in the previous years.
 - 28. As regards applications for execution, the following table shows the figures for the year under report as compared with those in 1913:—

- 29. Out of the total number of applications for execution disposed of, 606 were disposed of by transfer. In 32,688 satisfaction was obtained in full, and in 34,712 in part, while 77,026 proved wholly infructuous. The percentages of the last three heads of disposal were 23, 24 and 53 as compared with 22, 23 and 55 in the preceding year.
- 30. The total amount realized in execution came to Rs. 81,11,770 as against Rs. 72,18,734 last year.
- 31. The number of cases in which the judgment-debtor was imprisoned was 860 as against 714 last year, and of those in which immovable property was sold was 2,905 as against 3,240 in the preceding year.
- 32. As against the 860 persons imprisoned in execution of decrees, the number of persons arrested but released without imprisonment was 2,747.
 - 33. The number of applications for declaration of insolvency was 909, out of which 451 were disposed of. Of these 120 were withdrawn, 272 were granted and 59 rejected.

General Remarks.

- 34. The congestion of the civil files was partially dealt with by the appointment of Additional First Class Subordinate Judges at Ahmedabad, Dhulia, Sátára and Sholápur and by the deputation or appointment of Joint or Additional Second Class Subordinate Judges to the following places during the whole or part of the year under report, viz., Ahmedabad, Godhra, Ahmednagar, Sangamner, Ráhuri and Kopargaon, Belgaum, Athni, Bail-Hongal, Gokák, Bijápur, Bágalkot, Broach, Dhárwár, Hubli, Haveri, Honávar, Dhulia, Chálisgaon, Bhusával, Násik, Poona, Haveli, Junnar, Talegaon and Sásval, Chiplun, Rájápur, Devgad, Dápoli, Sátára, Islámpur, Karád, Sholápur, Bársi, Thána and Bhivndi.
- 35. The District or Assistant Judges or Inspecting Subordinate Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmedagar, Belgaum, Bijápur, Broach, Dhárwár, Kánara, Khándesh, Násik, Poona, Ratnágiri, Sátára, Sholápur, Surat and Thána inspected in all 29 Subordinate Judges' Courts during the year under report.

- 36. The District Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmednagar, Bijápur, Broach, Násik, Ratnágiri, Sátára, Sholápur and Thána assembled judicial conferences of the Judges subordinate to them, where points touching the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.
- 37. The record rooms and libraries are reported by all District Judges to be in good order. The destruction of useless records is carried out periodically in accordance with the rules framed by the High Court.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1914.

PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

The Report relates to the Administration of Criminal Justice in all the Courts (including the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates) in the Bombay Presidency Proper and in the Province of Sind.

- 2. The area and population of the above territories are the same as those egiven at page 1.
 - 3. In the Presidency Proper there were on the 31st December 1914 besides the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court:—
 - 15 Sessions Judges,
 - 7 Additional Sessions Judges,
 - 4 Assistant Sessions Judges.
 - 19 District Magistrates,
 - 4 Presidency Magistrates,
 - 283 First Class Magistrates,
 - 254 Second Class Magistrates,
 - 234 Third Class Magistrates,
 - 204 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889.

In addition to the above, the number of Police Patels in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, was 21,500. Out of these, 317 have also been invested with powers under section 15 of the said Act.

- 4. In Sind, on the 31st December 1914, besides the Judicial Commissioner and 3 Additional Judicial Commissioners, there were—

The Annual Statements.

- 6. The total number of Criminal cases disposed of during the year under report was 159,283 as compared with 160,789 in the last year, showing a decrease of 1,506. Of the total number of decided cases, 95.8 per cent. were original cases and 4.2 per cent. were cases in appeal and revision. The percentages for the previous year were 96 and 4.
- 7. The total number of offences reported during the year was 161,502 as compared with 163,994 in the last year showing a decrease of 2,492. The number of cases returned as true was 153,053 or 94.8 per cent. of the total number of offences reported, the rest being cases dismissed under section 203, Criminal Procedure Code, or cases in which the charge was declared to be false.
- 8. Of the total number of cases returned as true about 35.2 per cent. were under the Indian Penal Code, and the rest under the Special and Local Laws. Cases under the Indian Penal Code related chiefly to offences of hurt, criminal force and assault, theft, mischief, criminal trespass and criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance. The principal cases under the Special and Local Laws related to offences under the breaches of Contract Act, Cantonment Act, Cattle Trespass Act, Criminal Procedure Code, Forest Act, Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, Abkari Act, City of Bombay Police Act, District Police Acts, Bombay and District Municipal Acts, Public Conveyance Act and Village Police Act.
- 9. Among the offences returned as true, there was one offence against the State. There was no offence relating to the Army and Navy, or under the Official Secrets Act.

- 15. In the Districts of Surat and Ahmedabad the number of offences increased by 587 and 427 respectively, whereas in the Districts of Kaira, Sukkur, Thána, Násik and Karáchi there was a decrease of 1,312, 1,105, 1,066, 709 and 497 respectively. In the remaining districts there was no marked increase or decrease.
- 16. The number of cases brought to trial during the year was 151,492 and the number of persons involved in them was 234,082 as against 154,520 cases and 210,603 persons in the preceding year.
- 17. Of the 234,082 persons under trial 100,848 or 43.1 per cent. were acquitted or discharged; 124,529 or 53.2 per cent. were convicted; 1,048 or 55 per cent. died, escaped, were transferred to another province or made over to Military Authorities, or their cases were pending on the dormant file, and 7,557 or 3.2 per cent. remained under trial.
- 18. In the last year the percentages were 41'1, 51'4, '4 and 4'1 respectively. Out of 100,848 persons acquitted or discharged 47,778 or about 47'1 per cent. were acquitted under section 315, Criminal Procedure Code, the cases

against them being compounded. There were 9 cases on the dormant file, all before the Courts in Sind.

^{20.} The total number of European British Subjects whose cases were disposed of during the year under report fell from 686 to 667. Of these 205 or 30.7 per cent. were charged with offences under the Indian Penal Code and 462 or 69.3 per cent. under Special and Local Laws. The charges under the Indian Penal Code related chiefly to hurt, criminal force and assault, theft, criminal breach of trust, criminal trespass and criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance.

- 21. Out of the 667 persons whose cases were disposed of 476 were convicted and 191 acquitted or discharged. The cases of 657 persons were disposed of by Magistrates and the cases of 10 persons were disposed of by the High Court. In the case of 183 persons, the deciding Magistrate was a European British subject and in the case of 474 persons he was other than a European British subject. In the case of the 10 persons tried in the High Court, the Judge was a European British subject. Ten accused persons claimed to be tried by a mixed jury under sections 450 and 451 of the Criminal Procedure Code.
 - 22. There were 4,321 miscellaneous cases before the Courts involving 8,178 persons, of whom 26'7 per cent. were discharged, 68'6 were convicted and the cases of 4'7 per cent. were pending.
- 23. There was a material increase in the number of persons involved in proceedings under Chapter XII for possession, under Chapter XX for frivolous and vexatious accusations, and under Chapter XLII for forfeiture of bail or recognizance; and a marked decrease in the number of persons involved in proceedings under Chapter VIII requiring security for good behaviour, under Chapter XXIII for non-attendance of Jurors or Assessors, and under Chapter XLVI, against convicted offenders released under section 562.
- 24. The number of original regular cases disposed of during the year was 150,014 as against 152,262 in the last year. Of these 140,356 were disposed of by Magistrates, 2,416 by Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards, and 1,243 by Courts of Session and Superior Courts.
- 25. Of the total number of persons convicted, 38.7 per cent. were convicted on regular and 61.3 per cent on summary trial. The percentages of the last year were 40.9 and 59.1 respectively.
- 26. The number of youthful offenders dealt with under section 31 of Act VIII of 1837 was 161 as against 209 in the previous year. The number of persons released on probation under section 562 of the Criminal Procedure Code was 1,099 as against 939 in the preceding year.

- 23. In 86,427 cases the amount of fine imposed did not exceed Rs. 10 and in 8,565 cases it was between Rs. 10 and Rs. 50. In 6,453 cases the term of imprisonment did not exceed 15 days and in 10,741 cases it was between 15 days and 6 months.
- 29. The total amount of fines imposed rose from Rs. 0,62,249 to Rs. 6,97,523 and that of fines realized fell from Rs. 5,63,192 to Rs. 5,59,579.
- 30. Out of 919, the total number of whippings inflicted, 705 were in lieu of other punishments (621 being on first conviction and 81 on re-conviction), 7 were in addition to other punishments and 207 were inflicted on juveniles for offences other than those specified in Parts I and II of Statement No. V-A.
- 31. The percentage of whippings on the total number of all punishments was 11.1 as compared with 11.4 in the preceding year. In the majority of cases whipping was inflicted for offences of theft, the number of stripes being most commonly 5 to 10.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL AND CIVIL JUSTICE. IN THE PROVINCE OF SIND IN THE YEAR 1914.

PRELIMINABY REMARKS.

- Mr. M. H. W. Hayward, LL.B. (Cantab.), Bar.-at-Law, I.C.S., from 1st January to 50th May 1914, Mr. C. C. Boyd, I. C. S., from 31st May to 6th June 1914, Mr. C. G. H. Fawcett, I. C. S., from 7th June to 13th September 1914, and Mr. E. M. Pratt, I.C.S., from 14th September to 31st December 1914.
 - 2. The following were the Additional Judicial Commissioners:
- Mr. H. N. Crouch, LL.B. (London), Bar.-at-Law, from 1st January to 31st December 1914.
- Mr. C. C. Boyd, I. C. S., from 1st January to 6th August 1914, Mr. L. C. Crump from 8th August to 14th September 1914, Mr. C. G. H. Fawcett, I. C. A temporary appointment of a 3rd Additional Judicial Commissioner was created for 6 months from 29th October 1914 and Mr. C. G. H. Fawcett, I. C. S., had charge of that office.

- 14. The power of requiring security for good behaviour from bad characters was less freely exercised in the year under report than in the preceding year, the number of cases being 503 as compared with 710 in 1913.
- 15. The number of frivolous and vexatious accusations dealt with summarily under Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code, in the year under report was 130 as against 138 in 1913.

- 16. Applications for orders for maintenance were more in the year under review than in the preceding year. But the orders granted numbered 6 out of 120 applications as against 11 out of 91 applications in the preceding year.
- 17. The number of individual appeals disposed of in the year under report was 2,525, that is 210 more than in the preceding year. Out of these the sentences were left unaltered in 2,011 cases and were reversed or varied in 511. Three were referred to High Court for revision. Sentences were maintained in tact close upon 79 per cent. of appeals.

The Criminal appeals in the Magistrates, Sessions Courts as well as those in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind show an increase of 110, 45 and 49 respectively.

- 18. During the year under report the cases of 353 persons were examined in revision by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction). The Sessions Courts examined the cases of 321 and the District Magistrates of 195 persons. The principal results of this revision were that 14 sentences were enhanced, 56 reduced or otherwise altered and 39 reversed. In the case of 22 persons proceedings were quashed and in the case of 70 persons new trials or further enquiries were ordered.


