## Judicial Department Annual Report For the Year 1934

#### PART I-ADMINISTRATION.

Changes in and Leave Movements of the European Staff.

Sir Jacob Barth, C.B.E., Chief Justice, retired on 20th May, after thirty-two years' service. Sir Joseph Sheridan was appointed Chief Justice as from 4th October, arrived in the Colony on 28th October and was sworn in as Chief Justice on 1st November. Mr. Justice Lucie-Smith, O.B.E., V.D., acted as Chief Justice until 27th October and went on leave Mr. Justice Horne was transferred to on 28th November. Mombasa in September and Mr. Justice Webb, K.C., was transferred to Nairobi. Mr. F. C. Gamble, R.M., returned from privilege leave on 16th April and acted as Judge from 20th April to 27th October and again from 9th November till the end of the year. Mr. C. A. G. Lane, R.M., acted as Judge from the beginning of the year to 19th April; and again from 31st August to 9th September and from 30th November to 4th December. Mr. D. Edwards, R.M., went on leave on 10th November. Mr. B. V. Shaw went on leave on 14th April. Mr. G. G. Robinson, Resident Magistrate, returned from leave on 9th July and was posted to Nakuru. Mr. B. V. Shaw, R.M., returned from leave on 25th November, and was posted to Mombasa. Mr. G. L. Howe, Resident Magistrate, was transferred to the Gold Coast and left for England on 8th July. Mr. C. F. G. Doran, Crown Counsel, was appointed Resident Magistrate and returned to the Colony from leave on 28th Octo-He was posted to Mombasa until 29th November and to Nairobi on 30th November. In addition to the two Administrative Officers mentioned in the 1933 Report the following Administrative Officers were seconded for duty as Resident Magistrates during 1934: Mr. H. G. Oldfield; Mr. H. H. Low; and Mr. E. M. Hyde-Clarke. Mr. Murray M. Jack, Registrar of the Supreme Court, went on leave on 21st March and returned on 15th November. Mr. E. J. O'Farrell, Deputy Registrar, acted as Registrar during Mr. Jack's absence, and reverted to his substantive appointment on 19th November. Mr. J. H. Flynn, Administrative Officer, acted as Deputy Registrar at Mombasa from 6th March to 11th December. Mr. W. Lee, shorthand writer, returned from leave on 5th

April. Mr. J. H. Gitsham, shorthand writer, went on leave on 14th April, and was transferred to the Secretariat on probation on his return to the Colony. Mr. A. H. Price, European Process Server, was on leave from 9th April to 5th November, and Mr. G. S. Francis acted temporarily in his place.

#### Changes in the Non-European Staff.

Mr. Noah Manasseh went on leave on 1st September prior to retirement after thirty years' service. Two temporary clerks resigned and two temporary clerks and one process server were engaged during the year.

#### Health.

As in the previous year a total of 41 days was lost by absence owing to sickness among the European staff. Among the Non-European staff a total of 326 days was lost by absence owing to sickness as compared with 180 days in 1933.

#### PART II—ORGANIZATION.

There has been no change in the constitution of the Courts since the Reports for 1931 and 1932.

#### Special Districts.

The Special District Courts of the Northern Frontier and Turkana tried ten cases for murder. Seven persons were convicted and sentenced to death; one was discharged and two were acquitted. Of the seven sentenced to death, six sentences were confirmed by the Supreme Court and in one case a retrial was ordered. The details of the persons sentenced to death are shown in the table of Death Sentences.

#### F-CIVIL APPEALS.

Forty-three civil appeals were filed, of which 15 were dismissed and 14 allowed in whole or in part. The remainder were pending or remitted for trial.

#### G-CRIMINAL APPEALS.

Eighty-five criminal appeals were filed in the Supreme Court, of which 48 were dismissed or withdrawn, 27 were allowed in whole or in part; in 4 cases the sentences were enhanced, and the remainder were pending.

#### H-CRIMINAL REVISION.

Three hundred and eleven cases came before the Court and in 223 cases retrials were ordered or the judgment varied; in 49 cases the sentences were reversed; in 29 cases the sentences remained unaltered and 10 cases were pending.

#### I-Confirmation Cases.

The number of cases in which sentences imposed required confirmation by the Supreme Court under section 11 of the Criminal Procedure Code was 873 involving 1,128 persons and 1,221 convictions as follows:—

#### L-OTHER WORK OF THE SUPREME COURT.

Monthly returns of all civil and criminal cases were received and scrutinized from all Subordinate Courts other than Native Tribunals. The attention of magistrates was drawn to any irregularities arising in the conduct of the cases, and the majority of revision cases arose as the result of the perusal of monthly returns.

#### Rules of Court.

During the year Rules of Court were promulgated relating to (1) Mortgage Suits Consolidation; (2) Advocates' Remuneration and Taxation of Costs (Amendment); (3) Attachment and Sale of Property (Amendment). The Court of Appeal Rules and the Bankruptcy Rules were also amended during the year.

#### Circulars to Magistrates. .

Circulars to Magistrates were issued on the following subjects: (1) Raw Oplum; (2) Warrants of arrest in Civil Cases; (3) Proceedings against serving soldiers; (4) Certificate of Magistrates, section 219 (4) Criminal Procedure Code; (5) Sentences of Detention exceeding six months; (6) Defence, section 197 Criminal Procedure Code; (7) Extra Judicial Statements (e.g. Confessions made not in the course of Judicial proceedings); (8) Detention Camps; (9) Returns under sections 296 and 296a P.C., sections 9 and 10 Stock and Produce

Theft Ordinance, 1933, section 4 Cap. 153 Laws of Kenya, and section 85 Ordinance 51/1930; (10) Sentences of Whipping; (11) Returns under section 14 Cap. 161 Laws of Kenya, section 16 Native Liquor Ordinance No. 36/1930 and section 2 Native Liquor (Amendment) Ordinance 39/1931; (12) Detention Camps, Committal for unexpired portion; (13) The Diseases of Animals Rules, 1931; (14) Contents of Summons or Warrant; (15) Plea; (16) Bail on arrest or remand; (17) Examination of Witnesses; (18) Cross-Examination by the Accused; (19) Fine; (20) Compensation; (21) Exhibits. Nos. 14 to 20 issued as the result of points discussed by the Bushe Commission Report.

#### Travelling.

During the year the following stations were visited by the Judges on Court of Appeal duty or on Supreme Court Circuits: Dar es Salaam, Mombasa, Kampala, Kisii, Kapenguria, once; Kisumu, four times; Eldoret and Nyeri, five times; and Nakuru, six times.

#### Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa.

His Majesty's Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa held three ordinary and four special sessions during the year. The total number of appeals filed was 217, of which Kenya's total was 80—16 civil and 64 criminal. Kenya's proportion of appeals allowed was 5 criminal and 4 civil; appeals dismissed 55 criminal and 7 civil; pending 5 civil and 4 criminal. At Kampala 37 appeals were heard, at Mombasa 55 were heard, at Dar es Salaam 44 were heard, and at Nairobi 67 were heard, 14 appeals were pending at the end of the year.

#### Advocates.

The number of Advocates who renewed their practising certificates or were admitted in 1934 was 72 including Government Law Officers. Seven Native Vakils were licensed to practice in Native Subordinate Courts. Eighteen Commissioners for Oaths and twenty Notaries Public were in practice in 1934

#### Law Examination for Administrative Officers.

Three Law Examinations were held during the year, three candidates presented themselves for examination and two passed.

#### Revenue.

The total revenue collected by the Supreme Court and Resident Magistrates' Courts under various heads for 1934, is shown in the following table, which also shows the total revenue collected in the Courts of the Colony and Protectorate for the previous four years.

#### PART IV-SUBORDINATE COURTS.

#### A-RESIDENT MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

During the year Resident Magistrates operated at Nairobi, Mombasa, Nakuru, Kisumu and Eldoret. The work performed by all the Resident Magistrates' Courts, together with that for the preceding three years, was as follows:—

#### C-NATIVE SUBORDINATE COURTS.

The Native Subordinate Courts in the Coast Province have performed their duties with apparent satisfaction.

#### D-GENERAL CRIMINAL WORK.

A total of 50.465 convictions was recorded in the Subordinate Courts and the following table shows the comparison for the last four years. This figure represents an increase of 6,112 convictions as compared with the previous year. A detailed statement showing race and sex, nature of offences and sentences imposed is attached to this report as an appendix. The figures therein show an increase of 684 convictions of Europeans as compared with 1933, most of the convictions being under the Traffic Ordinance. The total convictions recorded in 1933 against Asiatics amounted 1975, while in 1934 the total aggregated 2,172. As will be seen the greater number of convictions were had under the Traffic Ordinance and the Trades Licensing Ordinance. With regard to natives the total convictions recorded in 1933 was 40,204, while the total for 1934 is 45,435—an increase of 5,231. A perusal of the Schedule and of the following table will show generally the various heads under which charges were brought. Apart from an increase of 668 cases in respect of offences against property, the total increase of 6,112 convictions is in respect of non-venial offences.
