## EXPLANATIONS

1. The academic year 1947-48, as usual means the period from 1at April 1947. to 31st March, 1948.
2. For definiteness, enrolment has been taken to be that on 31st March, 1948.
3. Endowments, elc., include endowments, subscriptions, contributions, etc., from the public.
4. Certificated Teachers are those who have obtained any form of teacher's certificate other than the one granted on the basis of public examination of a training $c$ illege or a training school.
5. The Statistics about the expenditure and the number of teachers relate only to recogaised institutions and in the results of examinations the statistics of private candidates are included.
6. In calculating the percentage of soholars to population, the estimated population for the year under question has been taken.
7. Secondary Stage in the various Provinces and Centrally Administered Arpas begins diffe ently, but in all cases it ends with the High School course. The following table gives the classes at which it begins: -

#### Abstract

\section*{ASSAM}

During the year under review some portion of this Province was merged with Eastern Pakistan, and hence the present account refers to the post-partition province only. 2. The percentage of total number of scholars to the total population was $8 \cdot 4$, that of the men scholars to male population being $12 \cdot 0$ and of the women scholars to female population $4 \cdot 2$. The total number of educational institutions in the year was 10,703 of whom 9,464 were institutions meant for men and 1,239 for women. There were $6,47,168$ scholars under instruction in schools and colleges, the number of men and women students being $4,93,060$ and $1,54,108$ respectively. Of the women students under instruction, 62,910 were studying in the institutions meant for women and 91,198 in other institutions. 3. During the year under review the total expenditure on education in the Province was Rs. $1,06,55,120$. The government contribution in this was $54 \cdot 0$ percent. of the total expenditure. 4. The total number of teachers in Prinary and Secondary schools on 31st March 1948 was 15,940 . Of these, 14,350 were men teachers and 1,590 women teachers. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers in these schools was 20.7 . 5. The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) was 138. The number of students passing Matriculation or equivalent examinations was 2,504. 6. Some of the mere important educational statistics about the province are given ou the following pages.

## WEST BENGAL

During the year under report the percentage of total number of scholare to the total population rose from 6.3 percent. to 7.9 percent-that of the men scholars to male population rose from $9 \cdot 6$ to $11 \cdot 9$ and that of the women scholars to female population from $2 \cdot 5$ to $3 \cdot 1$.
2. The number of educational institutions increased by 291 to 17,653 . Though there was only a slight increase in the number of institutions, the enrolment in these institutions showed a marked rise. The number of students under instruction increased by $2,22,913$ to $16,82,064$, which shows an increase of $15 \cdot 3$ percent over last year's figures. Of the total number of scholars on rells, $13,80,101$ were men students and $3,01,963$ women students. Of the latter $1,38,088$ were studying in institutions meant for women and $1,63,875$ (about $54 \%$ ) in other institutions.
3. The total expenditure on education in the year increased by Rs. $1,11,87,928$ to Rs. 5,59,41,407. This increase was shared by all sources of income. The goveroment contribution increased from $31 \cdot 8 \%$ t. $35 \cdot 3 \%$.
4. The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary Schools rose by 3,849 tc 53,061 . On percentage basis, the number of trained teachers to total number of teachers fell from $36 \cdot 4$ to $34 \cdot 2$.
5. The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) slightly decreased by 12 to 2,653 . There was some decrease also in the number of students who passed the Matriculation or equivalent examinations, which figure fell fron: 18,901 to 18,757 .

## BIHAR

During the vear under report the percentage of total number of scholars to the total population rose from $3 \cdot 1$ to $3 \cdot 9$-that of men scholars to male population rising from $5 \cdot 5$ to 6.9 and that of female scholars to female population from 0.8 to $1 \cdot 0$.
2. The number of educational institutions rese in this year by 1,061 to 25.139. The number of colleges both for men and women remained the same, but there was a suficient increase in the number of Primary Schools for boys. The figures for students on rolls also rose by $1,44,012$ to $14,78,202$. Of the latter, $12,99,558$ were men students and 1,78,644 women students. This increase in enrolment was mostly in Irts and Science Colleges and in Primary and Secondary Schools. Of the women students under instruction in the Province, 90,733 were studying in institutions mean for women and 87,911 (roughly $50 \%$ ) in other institutions. These figures recorded an increase of 3,894 and 10,318 respectively over the last year's figures.
3. The total expenditure on education this year increased by Rs. $99,79,555$ to Rs. 3.98,91,390. This increase was shared by all sources of income. The total expenditure (Direct and Indirect) from public funds was Rs. 2,32,36,223 of which Rs. $1,03,50,15$ was met from government funds, and the rest from local board funds.
4. The teachers in Primary ant Secondary Schools also increased by 3,086 to 50,969 . and this increase was mistly in the number of men teachers.
5. The out put of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) rose during the yea: from 251 to 916 . The number of students who passed the Matriculation or equivalent examinations, also increased from 11,245 to 14,517 .

During the year under review certain states wete mergea with the $\operatorname{Pr}$ mince of Bombay, But as the statistics about these states are int available, these are not included in the figures for 1947-48.

The percentage of students under instruction to total population of the protiace rose in this year from 9.0 to 11.5 -that of the men Scholars to nale p.pulation rose from $12 \cdot 6$ to $15 \cdot 6$ and that of the women seholars to female popalation from $5 \cdot$ i to 7•1.
2. The total number of educational instituticne also increasel by 2,919 ro zil 910 This increase was cbserved mostly in Primary Schools. The number of senolars on rolls rose by $4,60,954$ to $25,75,859$. Of the latter $18,07,935$ were men students and $7,67,924$ women students. This increase in scholars was shared by all types of institutions, particularly by Primary Schorls. Of the women students under ins. truction in the province, $3,67,902$ were studying in institutions meant for women and $4,00,022$ in other institutions. These figures recorded an increase of 54,818 and $1,31,773$ respectively over the last year's figures.
3. During the year under report the total expenditcre on education went up from Rs. $9,60,10,936$ to Rs. $12,00,00,773$. This increase was shared by all the sources of income. On percentage basis, the goverrment cortribution to the total expenditure increased from $46.5 \mathrm{t}, 50 \cdot 1$.
4. The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary Schools increased by 8,282 to 69,958 . Though as compared with last year's figures there was increase in the number of trained teachers fron, 29,932 to 31,481 , $\mathfrak{y}$ et the percentage of trained teachers to all teachers fell from $48 \cdot 5$ to $45 \cdot 0$.
5. The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) increased by 637 to 4,209 and that of studer ts whe passed the Matriculation or equivalent exanir ations increased by 2,476 to 15,918 .

During the year under report the percentage of the total number of scholars to the total population fell from $3 \cdot 7$ to $3 \cdot 3$-that of men scholars to male population decreased from $5 \cdot 8$ to $5 \cdot 4$, and that of women scholars to female population from 1.5 to $1 \cdot 2$.
2. The total number of educational institutions increased by 612 to 7,420 . This increase was mostly in the number of Primary schools. The total number of scholars on rolls rose by 58,372 to $6,83,820$. Of the latter $5,59,185$ were men stulents and $1,24,635$ women students. This increase was shared mostly by all types of institu. tions but it was sufficiently marked in the Primary, Sccondary and Normal Insti$\mathrm{t}_{\text {ations. }}$ Of the women students under instruction 69,916 were studying in institutions for females and 54,719 in other institutions. The former figure recorded an increase of 1,842 and the latter a decrease of 1,192 respectively over the last year's figures.
3. The total expenditure on education increased by Rs. $1,06,58,854$ to Rs. $3,21,73,261$. This increase in expenditure was met from all sources of income. The government contribution increased from $47 \cdot 2$ to $55 \cdot 2$ percent. of the total expenditure on education.

## MADRAS

During the year under report the States of Banganpalle and Pudukottai were merged with the Province of Madras, and the account given below, therefore, includes statist es of these states.
2. The percentage of students under instruction to total population was $8 \cdot 0$ ( $10 \cdot 4$ in case of men and $5 \cdot 6$ in case of women) as compared with $7 \cdot 6$ ( $9 \cdot 8$ in the case of men and $5 \cdot 5$ in the case of women) last year.
3. The number of educational institutions increased by 881 to 38,923 . This increase was observed mostly in Primary and Secondary Schools. The figures for students on rolls also rose by $2,64,611$ to $42,62,845(27,61,988$ men and $15,09,857$ women) showing an increase of $6 \cdot 6$ percent. over last year's figure. This increase was shared by all types of institutions in general and by Elementary Schools in particular. During the year under report the percentage of total number of scholars to the total population rose from $6 \cdot 1$ to $6 \cdot 4$, that of anen scholars to male population rose from $9 \cdot 2$ to 93 and that of the women scholars to female population from $2 \cdot 8$ to $3 \cdot 3$.
2. The number of educational institutions decreased by 16 to 442 . This was due to decrease in the unrecognised institutions. The number of recognised institutions however, showed an increase from 386 to 394 . Although there was a decrease in the number of institutions, yet the number of scholars on rolls rose by 312 to 39,463 . This increase is accounted for by the increase in women scholars. Of the persons under instruction, 30,030 were men students and 9,433 women students. Among the latter 7,871 were studying in institutions meant for women and 1,562 in other institutions. These figures recorded an increase of 663 and 421 respectively over the last year's figures.
3. The total expenditure on education increased by Rs. $2,57,177$ to $R \mathrm{R} .26,08,588$. This increase was shared by all sources of income. The government contribution iu this increased from $46 \cdot 1 \%$ to $51 \cdot 5 \%$ of the total expenditure on education.
4. The number of teachers in Primary and Secondary Schools increased by 12 to 1,477. On percentage basis, the number of trained teachers to the total number of teachers rose from 67.5 to 69.9 .
5. The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) increased by 7 to 75 , while the number of students passing Matriculation or equivalent examinations fell by 84 to 563 .

During the year under report the percentage of the total number of schoiars to the total population rose from $10 \cdot 6$ to $10 \cdot 7$. While the percentage of men scholars to male population rose from $12 \cdot 3$ to $12 \cdot 9$, that of women scholars to female population fell from 8.5 to 8.0 .
2. The number of educational institutions increased by 9 to 136 . This increase was recorded only in the unrecognised institutions. The number of scholars on rolls also rose from 17,916 to 18,009 . Of the latter, 11,889 were men students and 6,120 women students. Among women students under instruction, 509 were studying in institutions meant for women and 5,611 in other institutions. This recorded a decrease of 32 and 357 respectively from the last year's figures.
3. The total expenditure on education during the year increased by Rs. 34,849 to Rs. $4,90,221$. This increase was shared by all sources of income except endowments etc. But the government contribution to total expenditure on education fell from $46 \cdot 7 \%$ to $\mathbf{4 5} \cdot 0 \%$.

While there was a decrease in the number of women teachers, the number of men teachers rose by 20 to $\mathbf{4 2 2}$. These figures recorded no increase over the previous year's corresponding figures.

During the year under review the percentage of total number of scholars to the total population was $4 \cdot 7$, and that of the men scholars to male population was $7 \cdot 5$ and women scholars to female population $2 \cdot 0$.
2. The total number of educational institutions in this year was only 4. All the three recognised schools were Single Teacher Primary Schools. There were 284 students under instruction which included 225 boys and 59 girls.
3. The total expenditure on education in this year was Rs. 1,600 all of which was met from government funds.
4. All the 3 teachers in the 3 schools were untrained.
