2. The distribution in this publication of Provinces, etc., is, on the whole, as it stood during 1948-49.

3. The Volume is divided into three parts. Part I deals with the Provinces and Centrally Administered Areas, Part II with the former Indian States and their Unions, and Part III gives some important miscellaneous statistics like Educational Directorate and Inspectorate, etc., for all the units of the country.

4. I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Provincial and State Governments and other authorities who have supplied the information on which this publication is based.

EXPLANATIONS

1. The academic year 1948-49, as usual means the period from 1st April 1949 to 31st Match, 1949.

2. For definiteness, enrolment has been taken to be that on 31st March, 1949.

3. Endowments, etc., include endowments, subscriptions, contributions, etc., from the public.

4. Certificated Teachers are those who have obtained any form of teacher's certificate other than the one granted on the basis of public examination of a training college or a training school.

5. The Statistics about the expenditure and the number of teachers relate only to recognised institutions.

6. The statistics of the examination results include the results of private candidates also.

7. In calculating the percentage of students to population, the estimated population for the year under question has been taken.

Scheme of Schools Classes, 1948-49.

The following is intended to supplement the chart given on the opposite page :---Bihar.---Up to class V the medium of instruction is the mother-tongue (Hindi, Oriya, Bengali or Urdu) rather than the regional language, and thereafter Hindi becomes the medium of instruction except for non-language subjects.

Bombay .-- The Basic Course runs concurrently with the Primary Course.

C. P. & Bergr. -In Vernacular schools the Primary and Middle stages are known as the Junior and Senior Basic stages respectively.

Madras. --In the Middle stage v pupil has to study 3 languages: (i) Regional language, (ii) Hindi or any other language specified under the second language group, and (iii) English, the last of these commencing in form 11. The Bifurcated Course in the High stage is of three types: (a) Secretarial. (b) Pretechnological, and (c) Aesthetic and Domestic.

East Punjab.—The scheme shown in the diagram is for boys' schools. In girls' schools there are 5 classes in the Primary stage and 3 classes in the Middle stage others remaining unaltered.

U. P.—The former Primary and Middle schools are now known as the Basic and the Junior High schools respectively.

Bilaspur. -- The Primary and Middle stages are known as the Junior and Senior Basic stages respectively.

Delhi.—As in East Punjab, the Middle stage in the case of girls' schools begins with class VI instead of class V in the boys' schools (shown in the chart).

Madhya Bharat.—Students who do not know Hindi have to study English compulsorily from classes VI to VIII.

P.E.P.S.U.--Provision for Infant classes of 6 months' duration exists.

Rajasthan.-Infant classes are of 6 months' duration.


Saurashira.—The Infant classes have been abolished in Government Primary schools. The High stage is known as Higher Secondary stage and classes V, VI and VII are called Upper Primary classes.


Vindhya Pradesh.—The government have under consideration abolition of the distinction between Vernacular and English schools which exists only in some areas.


Hyderabad.—Provision for Kindergarten or Nursery classes of 6 months' duration exists wherever possible. The medium of instruction in Primary and Middle stages is the regional language (Telegu, Kanarcse, Marathi or Hindustani).

Mysore .- The regional languages are Kanada, Urdu or Tamil.

Travancore.—Provision exists for Nursery schools also. Regional languages are Malyalam and Tamil.

ASSAM

During the year under review the percentage of the number of the students to the total population increased from $8 \cdot 4$ to $9 \cdot 4$ of the men students to men population from $12 \cdot 0$ to $13 \cdot 2$ and of women students to women population from $4 \cdot 2$ to $5 \cdot 1$.

The total number of the educational institutions increased by 2,161 to 12,864. Of the latter, 11,278 were meant for men and 1,586 for women. This increase was mostly due to the rise in the number of Primary schools. The total number of students on rolls in these institutions rose by 1,46,898 to 7,94,066 (5,91,572 men and 2,02,494 women). The increase was mostly at the Primary and Secondary stages of instruction. Among the women students, 83,038 were studying in institutions for women and 1,19,456 in other institutions. These figures recorded increases of 20,128 and 28,258 respectively over the previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognised institutions in 1948-49 was Rs. 1,33,47,381 as compared with Rs. 1,06,55,120 during the previous year. This increase was shared by all sources of income. On the percentage basis, government contribution increased from 54.0 per cent to 56.4 per cent.

The total number of teachers in the Primary and Secondary schools on 31st March, 1949, was 18,957 as compared with 15,940 on 31st March, 1948. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers in these schools fell from 20.7 to 17.7.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) increased by 126 to 264. There was, however, a decrease in the number of students passing the Matriculation or equivalent examinations from 2,501 to 2,392.



WEST BENGAL

During the year under report the percentage of the number of students on rolls to the total population was $7 \cdot 9$ which does not record any change over that of the previous year's figure. The percentage of men students to men population decreased from $11 \cdot 9$ to $11 \cdot 6$ while that of women students to women population rose from $3 \cdot 1$ to $3 \cdot 3$

The total number of educational institutions increased by 523 to 18,176. This increase was observed almost in all types of institutions. The number of students in these institutions increased by 1,46,830 to 18,28,894, which shows an increase of 8.7 per cent over previous year's figure. Of the total number of students on rolls 14,79,119 were boys and 3,49,775 girls. The number of students at all stages of instruction shared this increase. Of the women students 1,57,073 were studying in the institutions for women and 1,92,702 in other institutions. These figures recorded increases of 81,985 and 23,827 respectively over last year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognized institutions went up by Rs. 1,33,50,520 to Rs. 6,92,91,927. This increase was shared by all sources of income. Of the total expenditure on education government contribution was 37.6 per cent as against 35.3 per cent during previous year.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools rose by 4,887 to 57,948. Of the latter, 53,897 were men teachers and 4,051 women teachers. On percentage basis, the number of trained teachers to the total number of teachers fell from 34-2 to 33-4.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) decreased by 274 to 2,379. But the number of students passing the Matriculation or equivalent examinations increased by 2,593 to 21,496.

BIHAR

During the year under report the percentage of the number of students to the total population rose from 3.9 (6.9 for men students and 1.0 for women students) to 4.1 (7.2 for men students and 1.0 for women students).

The total number of educational institutions increased by 1,259 to 26,398. Two new colleges—one for Arts and Science and the other for Law—were opened during the year. There was an increase in all types of schools, excepting Technical & Industrial schools which decreased from 50 to 44. The number of students on rolls rose by 1,36,358 to 16,14,560. Of the latter, 14,20,140 were men students and 1,94,420 women students. There was increase in enrolment in all types of institutions. Of the women students, 97,654 were studying in institutions meant for women and 96,766 in other institutions. These figures mark an increase of 6,921 and 8,855respectively over the previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on all the recognised institutions in the State increased by Rs. 59,34,645 to 4,58,26,035. This increase was shared by all sources of income. On the percentage basis, the government contribution increased from $26 \cdot 0$ to $27 \cdot 5$.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools increased by 2,219 to 53,188. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers decreased from 55.8 to 54.8.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) rose by 298 to 1,214. There was, however, a decrease from 14,517 to 12,861 in the number of students who passed the Matriculation examination.

BOMBAY

The percentage of students under instruction to the total population of the State rose in this year from 11.5 to 11.8—that of men students to men population from 15.6 to 15.9 and that of women students to women population from 7.1 to 7.5.

There was a marked increase during the year in the total number of educational institutions—from 26,910 to 34,900 and in enrolment from 25,75,859 to 32,97,273. This increase in the number of institutions and pupils was partly due to the implementation of the schemes of educational expansion and partly to the merger of some states in the province. The merged states accounted for an increase of 3,161 institutions and 2,32,952 pupils. Of the total number of students during the year, 22,93,856 were men students and 10,03,417 women students. Among the women students, 4,29,264 were studying in institutions meant for women and 5,74,153 (57.2 per cent) in other institutions. These figures mark an increase of 61,362 and 1,74,131 respectively over the previous year's figures.

During the year under report the total expenditure on the recognized institutions increased by Rs. 3,75,75,717 to Rs. 15,75,76,490 This increase was shared by all sources of income. On the percentage basis, the government contribution to the total expenditure increased from $50 \cdot 1$ to $54 \cdot 1$.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools increased by 16,745 to 86,703. Of this number, 71,028 were men teachers and 15,675 women teachers. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers decreased from $45 \cdot 0$ to $43 \cdot 1$. This was an inevitable consequence of the fact that a large number of untrained teachers had to be employed because of the introduction of compulsory education. Although there was a decrease in the percentage of trained teachers, the total number of trained teachers, both men and women, actually increased by 5,915 in this year.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) fell from 4,209 to 4,109. There was, however, an increase in the number of students who passed the Matriculation or equivalent examinations from 15,918 to 23,846.



During the year under report the percentage of the total number of stadents to total population of the Province increased from $3 \cdot 3$ to $3 \cdot 9$ —of men students to male population from $5 \cdot 4$ to $6 \cdot 8$ and of women students to female population from $1 \cdot 2$ to $1 \cdot 5$.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 894 to 8,322. This increase was shared by all types of institutions, except the Special schools. The total number of students on rolls rose by 1,23,018 to 8,06,952. Of the latter, 6,51,260 were men students and 1,55,692 women students. The increase in the number of students was mostly in Primary and Secondary stages. There was a decrease in the number of students in the schools for Adults and in Law classes. A little decrease was also recorded in the number of students studying in the B.A. and B.Sc. (Pars & Hons.) classes, Teachers' Training Collegiate stage and in the schools for the Handicapped. Of the women students under instruction, 78,266 were studying in the institutions meant for women and 77,426 in other institutions. These figures mark an increase of 8,122 and 22,707 respectively over the previous year's figures.

The total expanditure on the recognised educational institutions increased by Rs. 90.78.342 to Rs. 4,13,09.928. This increase in expenditure was shared from all sources of income. On the percentage basis, government contribution to the total expenditure increased from 55.3 to 59.6.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Szeondary schools increased by 2,007 to 26,848. On percentage basis, the number of trained teachers to the total number of teachers increased from 55-1 to 56-5.

The output of graduates in Arts & Science (Pass and Hons.) rose by 429 to 1,193. The number of students passing the Matriculation or equivalent examinations also increased by 1,148 to 4,646.

MADRAS

The percentage of students under instruction to the total population was 8-3 (10.9 in case of men and 5.7 in case ot women) as compared with 8-0 (10.4 in case) of men and 5-6 in case of women) during the previous year.

The total number of the educational institutions increased by 406 to 39,329. One significant event of the year was the abolition of distinction between boys' and girls' Primary schools. The total number of students on rolls in all the institutions increased by 1,98,435 to 44,61,280 (29,10,898 men and 15,50,382 women), thus showing an increase of $4\cdot7$ per cent over last year's figures. This increase was shared by almost all types of institutions, the greater being by the Arts and Science colleges and Secondary schools. Of the women students, only 79,561 were studying in institutions meant for women, while 14,70,821 were studying in other institutions.

The total expenditure on recognised institutions increased by Rs. 2,33,65,089 to Rs. 17,16,43,468. This increase was shared by all sources of income. The proportion of expenditure from public and private funds to the total expenditure was 68 per cent and 32 per cent in this year as against 66 per cent and 34 per cent respectively in the provious year.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools rose by 4,572 to 1,48,754. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of school teachers showed a decrease from $92 \cdot 0$ to $91 \cdot 0$.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) rose by 301 to 4,709. The number of students passing Matriculation and equivalent examinations also increased by 12,847 to 67,901.

ORISSA

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population increased from $3 \cdot 6$ in 1947-48 to $3 \cdot 8$ in 1948-49—of men students to men population increased from $5 \cdot 9$ to $6 \cdot 3$ and of women students to women population was $1 \cdot 5$ which did not record any change.

The total number of educational institutions during the year increased by 1,924 to 11,829. Of the latter, 11,532 institutions were for men and 297 for women. The total number of students on rolls in all types of institutions was 5,49,214 (4,39,465 men and 1,09,749 women), thus showing an increase of 83,406 over the previous year's figure. This increase was shared by almost all types of institutions. Of the women students, 16,555 were studying in the institutions meant for women and 93,194 in other institutions. These figures recorded increase of 592 and 10,153 respectively over the previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognised institutions increased by Rs. 35,30,700 to Rs. 1,81,37,635. This increase was met only from government funds and private benefactions. The government contribution increased from $69 \cdot 4$ per cent to $71 \cdot 6$ per cent of the total expenditure on education.

The number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools increased by 1,857 to 19,668. Of the latter, 19,136 were men teachers and 532 women teachers. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers showed a decrease from $54 \cdot 5$ to $53 \cdot 1$.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass & Hons.) increased by 76 to 436. But there was a decrease in the number of persons passing the Matriculation and equivalent examinations from 3,302 to 2,950.



EAST PUNJAB

During the year under review the percentage of the total number of students en rolls to total population rose from 4.2 to 6.0—of men students to men population from 6.3 to 8.9 and of women students to women population from 1.7 to 2.5.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 307 to 5,895. This increase was shared by all types of institutions. The total number of students on rolls rose by 1,50,188 to 7,37,802 (5,95,277 men and 1,42,525 women), giving an increase of 25 5 per cent. over the previous year's figure. This increase was shared almost by all types of institutions. Of the women students, 1,31,921 were studying in institutions meant for women and 10,604 in other institutions. These figures recorded increase of 27, 914 and 3,426, respectively, over last year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions in the Province increased by Rs. 1,18,31,762 to Rs. 3,84,94,950 which shows an increase of $44 \cdot 5$ per cent. over the previous year's figure. This increase was shared by all sources of income. On the percentage basis, government contribution to expenditure on education fell from 55 3 to 47.7.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools increased by 1,712 to 20, 010. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers in these institutions rose from $82 \cdot 5$ to $85 \cdot 6$.

The total number of students who passed B.A. and B.Sc. (Pass and Hons.) examinations during the year was 2,299, which shows an increase of 1,578 over the previous years figure. The number of students passing Matriculation and equivalent examinations also rose from 2,623 to 17,941.

Some of the more important educational statistics of the State are appended on the next few pages.

UNITED PROVINCES*

During the year under report, the percentage of pupils to total population was $4 \circ (7.6 \text{ for men and } 1.3 \text{ for women})$ compared with $4 \cdot 2$ (6.9 for men and 1.2 for women) in the previous year.

The total number of educational institutions in the province increased by 5,119 to 32,893. Of the latter, 3,060 were institutions for men and 2,833 for women. One significant event of the year was that due to the reorganization of Secondary education all the Intermediate colleges and High schools were re-constituted in to Higher Secondary schools. The number of Primary schools showed a marked increase from 21,797 to 26,337. The total number of students on rolls also rose by 3,07,279 to 27,46,225, showing an increase of $12\cdot 6$ per cent. over the previous year's figure. Of the total number of students on rolls, 23,90,092 were men students and 3,56,133 women students. The number of students at the Primary stage alone increased by 2,38,423 to 21,03,414. Of the total number of women students 2,29,530 were studying in institutions for women and 1,26,603 in other institutions. These figures recorded increase of 16,945 and 14,747 respectively over the previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognised institutions in the province increased by Rs. 1,74,23,463 to Rs. 10,79,62,091. This increase was shared by all sources of income. But on the percentage basis, government contribution to the total expenditure fell from 45.9 to 45.1.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools rose from 67,391 to 80,081. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers fell from 65.3 to 37.2.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) increased by 648 to 4,610. The number of students passing the Matriculation and equivalent examinations also increased by 9,995 to 34,366.

During the year under report, the percentage of the students under instruction to the total population as 6.3 (8.9 for men and 3.3 for women) as compared with 6.4 (9.3 for men and 3.3 for women) during the previous year.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 16 to 458. While there was a decrease in the number of institutions for women from 107 to 100, the number of institutions for men rose from 335 to 358. There was also a fall in the number of unrecognized institutions from 48 to 41. The total number of students on rolls went up from 39,463 to 45,568. Of the latter, 34,339 were men students and 11,229 women students. Though there was a decrease in the number of institutions for women, the total number of women students increased from 9,433 to 11,229. Of the women students under instruction, 7,927 were studying in the institutions for women and 3,302 in other institutions. These figures recorded increase of 56 and 1,740, respectively, over the previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognised institutions increased by Rs. 12,63,635 to Rs. 36,15,046. This increase was met mostly from government funds. On the percentage basis government contribution increased from 51.5 to 65.0. There was a decrease in the contribution from the Municipal Board funds and Endowments, etc.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools also rose by 253 to 1,730. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers went up from 69.9 to 73.8.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) decreased by 9 to 66. The number of students passing the Matriculation and equivalent examinations also fell by 49 to 514.



ANDAMAN & NICOBAR ISLANDS

During the year under report, the percentage of the total number of the students to the total population decreased from $4 \cdot 2$ to $4 \cdot 1$. The percentage of men students to men population decreased from $5 \cdot 2$ to $4 \cdot 6$, while that of women students to women population rose from $2 \cdot 5$ to $3 \cdot 1$.

There were 20 educational institutions in the Islands-1 High school, and 19 Primary schools. The number of students on rolls in these schools was 1,620 (1,153 boys and 467 girls) as compared with 1,519 (1,200 boys and 319 girls) in the previous year. As there was no school meant exclusively for girls, all the girls were studying in the institutions for boys.

The total expenditure on education increased by Rs. 15,983 to Rs. 97,033. Of the latter, Rs. 95,029 (*i.e.*, $97 \cdot 7\%$) were spent from government funds and Rs. 2,004 from fees. On the percentage basis, government contribution increased during this year from $97 \cdot 8$ to $97 \cdot 9$.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools fell from 62 (48 men and 14 women) to 58 (44 men and 14 women). The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers was only $17 \cdot 2$ as compared with 43 5 in the previous year.

During the year, 14 students (all boys) passed the Matriculation examination as against 13 students (10 boys and 3 girls) in 1947-48.

BILASPUR

During the year under review the percentage of students on rolls to the total population was $3\cdot 8$ (5·1 for men students and $3\cdot 8$ for women students).

There were in all 35 educational institutions in the State. Of these, 1 was High school, 5 Middle schools, and 26 Primary schools. Four of the Primary schools were raised to the Middle standard during the year. According to Bilaspur Report there was a general awakening among the masses and need was felt for opening more Primary schools. The students on rolls in these institutions was 4,602 (4,365 men and 237 women). Of these, 3,874 were in the Primary stage. Of the women students 180 were studying in institutions for women and 57 in other institutions.

The total expenditure on recognised educational institutions was Rs. 1,17,874. All of this was contributed from government funds.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools was 105 (94 men and 11 women). Of these, only 16 (*i.e.*, $15 \cdot 2$ per cent) were trained.

The total number of students who passed the Matriculation examination during the year was 35.

The more important ecducational statistics about this State are given on the appended pages.

The percentage of the total number of students on rolls to total population of the Area was 12.4 as compared with 10.7 during the previous year. The percentages of men students to the men population and of women students to the women population were 14.7 and 9.9 respectively.

The total number of educational institutions decreased by 4 to 132. This was lue to the decrease in the number of unrecognized institutions which fell from 11 v 7. There was, however, an increase in the total number of pupils from 18,009 to 1.082. Of the latter, 13,195 were men students and 7,887 women students. Among he women students, 801 were studying in institutions for women and 7,086 in other nstitutions. These figures recorded increase of 2,912 and 1,475 respectively over he previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recongnised institutions increased by Rs. 2,94,663 o Rs. 7,84,884. This increase was due to the payment of enhanced rates of dearness llowances and interim relief to the employees and revised scales of pay with arrears iven to government employees in the Education' Department. There was increase a contribution from all sources of income, excepting endowments, etc. On the ercentage basis, government contribution increased from $45 \cdot 0$ to $55 \cdot 4$.

As against 482 teachers in Primary and Secondary schools during the previous ear, there were 543 teachers in 1948-49 including 102 women teachers. The percentge of trained teachers to the total number of teachers fell from 60.4 to 57.1.

The output of Matriculates recorded a decrease from 176 to 130.



DELHI

During the year under report the percentage of the number of students under instruction to total population rose from 7.0 to 8.4—of men students to men population from 8.8 to 10.3 and of women students to women population from 4.5 to 5.8.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 206 to 629. There was an addition during the year of 2 Arts & Science colleges, one Training college, one college for Technology, two for Agriculture, and one for Medicine. Many new Primary and Secondary schools were also opened. The number of Primary schools rose from 248 to 377 and of Secondary schools from 106 to 141. The number of students on rolls in all the institutions combined also went up, there being 1,23,035 students (87,657 men and 35,378 women) during the year as compared with 87,822 (64,252 men and 23,570 women) during the previous year. This increase was shared by all types of institutions. Of the women students under instruction, 33,415 were studying in institutions for women and 1,963 in other institutions. These figures mark an increase of 10,915 and 893 respectively over the previous year's figures.

The total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions increased by Rs. 26,78,773 to Rs. 1,25,32,958. This increase was met from all sources of income. The government contribution decreased from 55.7% to 54.4%.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools rose by 924 to 3,519. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers increased from 89.7 to 90.2.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) showed a decrease from 405 to 345 during the year. But the number of students passing Higher Secondary examination increased by 68 to 842.

HIMACHAL PRADESH*

During the year the total number of educational institutions increased by 31 to 299- the institutions for boys increased by 32 to 287 and those for girls decreased by 1 to 12. There was an increase in all types of recognised institutions, the greatest being in the Primary schools. The more important additions in the institutions were Marts and Science Degree college and 1 Normal and Training school both for boys.

The total number of students on rolls on the 31st March 1949 was 20,881 as against 19,428 on the 31st March of the previous year. All the stages of instruction shared this increase. Of the total enrolment, 1,828 were girl students during this year against 2,051 in the previous year.

The expenditure on the recognised educational institutions also registered a rise of Rs. 97,726 to Rs. 5,92,765. The contributions from Government funds, fees and adowments increased while those from Local Boards, decreased. On percentage basis the contribution from Government funds fell from $87 \cdot 0$ to $79 \cdot 4$.

The total number of teachers in recognised Primary and Secondary schools decreased by 18 to 686. This decrease was confined to women teachers only. The percentage of the trained teachers to the total number of teachers rose from $39\cdot 6$ to $41\cdot 4$.

During the year under report, 137 boys passed the Matriculation examination and 29 boys and 11 girls got teachers' training certificates.

KUTCH

The percentage of the total number of students under instruction during the year to the total population of the Area was 7.2, that of the men students to men population being 11.0 and cf women students to women population 3.8.

There were 810 educational institutions (316 recognised and 494 unrecognised) during the year as compared with 809 (306 recognised and 506 unrecognised) in the previous year. The total number of st idents on rolls increased by 1,724 to 39,146. Of the latter, 28,429 were men students and 10,717 women students. Of the women students under instruction, 9,726 were studying in institutions for women and 991 in other institutions.

The total expenditure on recognised institutions increased by Rs. 2,41,373 to Rs. 7,23,980. Of the latter, $73 \cdot 9$ per cent was met from government funds, $21 \cdot 8$ per cent from endowments, etc., and $5 \cdot 2$ per cent from fees. Apart from this, it is reported that about Rs. 2 lakhs were spent on unrecognised educational institutions.

The number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools was 671. Of these, only 71 were trained; and of the untrained, 109 were certificated. Most of the Primary schools in this Area were single-teacher schools.

The number of students who passed Matriculation examination during the year was 82 (76 men and 6 women).

PANTH PIPLODA

During the year under review the percentage of the total number of scholars to the total population was $4\cdot 9$ —that of men students to men population being $7\cdot 7$ and of women students to women population $2\cdot 1$. These figures did not show any improvement as compared with the previous year.

There were in this State 4 schools in 1948-49—one un recognised and unaided Mission school imparting education up to class VI and 3 single-teacher Primary schools imparting education up to II standard. The 3 Primary schools were managed by government. There were 187 students (1300 boys and 57 girls) in the Mission school and 100 (98 boys and 2 girls) in the other 3 schools. There were thus 287 students (228 boys and 59 girls) during 1947-48.

A sum of R4. 3,455 was spent on the 3 recognised schools as against Rs. 1,600 last year. All of this was met from the government funds. The increase of Rs. 1,855 was mainly on account of the increase in the scales of pay of teachers and on account of the new scheme introduced for supplying milk to the students of the three recognised schools.

All the teachers in the 3 government schools were untrained.

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population increased from $3 \cdot 0$ to $5 \cdot 0$, that of boy students to men population from $5 \cdot 6$ to $9 \cdot 4$ and of girl students to women population from $0 \cdot 1$ to $0 \cdot 2$

During the year under review the State made a progress in the field of education. The number of educational institutions rose by 109 to 231. A majority of these consisted of Primary schools. The important additions in the institutions sere one Intermediate college and one Normal and Training school—both for boys.

The number of students on rolls during the year under report also increased onsiderably, *i.e.*, by 10,107 to 24,514. This increase was alround, but mostly in a the Primary schools. There were 459 girl students in this year as against 125 in the previous one.

The expenditure on the recognised educational institutions during the year acreased by Rs. 2,00,758 to Rs. 4,80,517. A handsome portion of this increase ame from the District Board funds. There was not much increase in the exenditure on institutions meant for girls. Although the contribution of the state overnment increased from Rs. 2,42,139 to Rs. 2,69,027, yet on percentage basis t recorded a fall from 86.6 to 56.0.

The total number of teachers serving in the schools for general education acreased by 340 to 725. This increase was mostly due to increase in the number l men teachers in the Primary schools. The percentage of the trained to the total number of teachers decreased from $80 \cdot 3$ to $30 \cdot 3$.

During the year under report, 123 boys passed the Matriculation examination s against 102 boys in the last year and 51 boys passed the professional diploma/ artificate examinations.



During the year under review the percentage of the total number of students to the total population decreased from $11\cdot 2$ to $10\cdot 6$, of men students to the men population fell from $13\cdot 7$ to $12\cdot 9$ and that of women students to women population from $8\cdot 5$ to $8\cdot 6$.

The total number of educational institutions decreased by 20 to 2,603. This ecrease was observed only in institutions for women whose number fell by 28 to 89. The institutions for men, however, increased by 8 to 2,314. There was no nrecognised institution in the State during the year 1948-49.

The total number of students on roll in these institutions also decreased by 1,481 to 333,504. This decrease was shared by both men and women institutions. Of the total number of students on rolls, 211,574 were men students and 121,930 women students. Of the women pupils, only 50,692 were studying in institutions for women and others in institutions for men.

The total expenditure in recognised educational institutions in the year was Rs. 1,52,20,740 as compared with Rs. 89,82,625 during the year 1947-48, thus showing in increase of 69.4 percent over the previous year's figure. On the percentage basis, overnment contribution to the total expenditure rose from 69.1 to 84.3.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools decreased by 41 to 8,585. This decrease was confined to men teachers only. The percentage f trained teachers to the total number of teachers, however, registered a rise from $4\cdot1$ to $76\cdot6$.

During the year, the output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) lso fell from 205 to 191, while that of Matriculates remained stationary at 1,406.

The State of Baroda merged with the province of Bombay on 1st May 1949. ome of the more important educational statistics about this State are appended on he following pages.

BHOPAL

The precentage of the total number of pupils to the total population rose from 1.5 to 1.6, that of boy pupils to men population rose from 2.4 to 2.7 and that of girl students to women population from 0.4 to 0.5.

During the year under review, the number of educational institutions decreased by 2 to 227. The number of High and Primary schools for boys fell by one each. One of the two Intermediate colleges was raised to Dogree standard. There were 32 schools for the education of girls of the State.

In spite of a decrease in the number of institutions, the total number of pupils inder instruction increased by 1,495 to 13,849. This increase was observed mainly n the number of boy students. All the types of institutions excepting Secondary ichools shared it. Only 37 of the total number of 1,951 girl students under instrucion were studying in schools for boys as against 27 out of 1,721 girls during the previous year.

The total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions, increased by Rs. 87,100 to Rs. 5,77,074. This increase was due to the increase in the contrimtion from government funds; but the same on the percentage basis rose only dightly from $94 \cdot 7$ to $94 \cdot 9$.

The total number of teachers working in Primary and Secondary schools decreased by 81 to 607. This decrease was confined to men teachers only and was observed n all types of schools. The percentage of trained to the total number of teachers also decreased from 29.4 to 27.3.

During the year, 98 boys and 23 girls passed the Matriculation examinations.

Since 1st June, 1949, Bhopal has become a Centrally Administered Areaiome of the more important educational statistics about the State are given on he succeeding pages.

COCHIN

During the year under review the percentage of the total number of students ω the total population of the State rose from 16.4 to 19.1. While the percentage of the men students to men population rose from 19.3 to 26.7, that of women students to women population fell from 13.5 to 11.9.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 2 to 836 (763 for men and 73 for women). All these were recognised institutions. The distinction between the Primary schools for boys and girls was abolished. The Primary and Secondary schools formed about 87 7 percent of the total number of educational institutions.

The number of pupils increased by 58,547 to 308,224. This increase was shared by both boy and girl students. Of the total enrolment, 210,698 (68.4%) were boys and 97,526 (31.6%) girls.

During the year under report, the total expenditure on recognised educational institutions increased by Rs. 14,43,217 to Rs. 1,11,50,450. This increase was shared by all sources of income. Although the contribution of the State government increased from Rs. 64,48,018 in the previous year to Rs. 71,67,664 in the year 1948-49 yet on percentage basis the government contribution decreased from 66.4% to 64.3%.

The total number of teachers working in the schools for general education decreased by 26 to 7,889. This decrease was confined only to men teachers working in Primary schools. The percentage of trained to the total number of teachers increased from $54 \cdot 0$ to $54 \cdot 2$.

During the year the output of graduates (Pass & Hons.) in Arts and Science rose from 220 to 351 and in Professional subjects from 88 to 98. 2,244 boys and 1,195 pirls passed the Matriculation examination in this year as against 1,891 hops and 325 girls in the previous year.

The erstwhile Cochin State was integrated with the former Travancore State m 1st July 1949 to form the Travancore-Cochin Union. Some of the more important tatistics about the Cochin State are given on the following pages.

COOCH BEHAR

The percentage of the total number of students on rolls, to the total population the State rose from $6\cdot3$ to $6\cdot6$, the percentage of the boy students to men population per from $9\cdot5$ to $10\cdot1$ and that of girl students to women population remained periodary at $2\cdot5$.

The total number of institutions which catered to the educational needs of the sate increased by 26 to 762. This was due to the increase in the number of kimary schools for boys. There were in all 56 schools meant for the education fgirls.

The total number of students on roll increased by 2,643 to 47,028. This increase as almost uniformly spread over all types of schools excepting those for Adults. If the total enrolment, 38,870 were boy students and 8,158 girl students. The umber of girls reading in schools for boys in the year was 5,234 as against 538 in the previous year. The percentages of these girls to the total number of rls on rolls in the respective years were $64 \cdot 2$ and $65 \cdot 7$ respectively.

During the year under report, the total expenditure on the recognised educational stitutions increased by Rs. 71,704 to Rs. 8,89,150. Although the income from adowments etc. registered a slight fall, the overall increase was the result of greater atribution from government funds and more income from fees. On the percentage sis, the contribution of the state government to the total expenditure increased om 70.9 to 73.6.

The total number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools increased r207 to 1,383. This increase was shared by both the Primary and the Secondary hools. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers was +9 only as against 23-0 in the year before.

During the year under report, 19 students (18 boys and 1 girl) graduated, while e corresponding figure for the last year was 20 (17 boys and 3 girls). The output of atriculates also recorded a fall from 180 in the year 1947-48 to 162 in the year ider report.

Cooch Behar State was merged in West Bengal on 12th September, 1949. me of the more important educational statistics about the State are given in the lowing pages.

HYDERABAD*

The percentage of the total number of pupils to the total population was $3\cdot 6$, that of men students to men population being $5\cdot 7$ and of women students to women population $1\cdot 4$.

During the year under report there were 8,864 educational institutions, of which 7,743 were for men students and 1,121 for women students. These included 1,067 unrecognised institutions also (1,063 for men and 4 for women). Of the recognised institutions for men about $89 \cdot 9$ percent and of those for women about $91 \cdot 6$ percent were of the Primary standard. Out of every 1,000 recognised institutions, only 2 imparted technical or vocational education.

The total number of students under instruction in those institutions was 6,27,724-5,06,339 men and 1,21,453 women, of which 33,593 men and 443 women were studying in the unrecognised institutions. The percentage of students in Primar and Secondary stage to the total enrolment in the recognised institutions was $76\cdot8$ and $13\cdot4$ respectively.

During the year the total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions in the State amounted to Rs. 3,97,91,645, of which 87, 8% was met from government funds, 1.6 per cent from board funds, 2.5 per cent from fees and 8.1 per cent from endowments etc.

There were 22,464 teachers (18,920 men and 3,544 women) in the recognised Primary and Secondary schools in 1948-49. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers was 29.1 (27.5 in case of men and 31.8 in case of women teachers).

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) was 401 (350 men and 51 women). During this year 247 men and 16 women passed the Professional Degree examinations and 2,695 boys and 277 girls passed the Matriculation examination.



KOLHAPUR

The former Kolhapur State was merged in Bombay on the let of March 1949.

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population rose from $6 \cdot 8$ to $7 \cdot 3$ —the percentage of boy students to men population rose from $10 \cdot 6$ to $11 \cdot 2$ and that of girl students to women population from $3 \cdot 0$ to $3 \cdot 1$.

The total number of educational institutions decreased by 70 to 1,027. This decrease was confined to Primary schools only. In all, there were 112 schools for girls only.

In spite of the closure of a number of schools, the total number of students on roll registered an increase of 8,459 over the previous year's figure raising the enrolment to 88,276 (70,247 men and 18,029 women) during the year. The schools for general education had the greatest share of this increase in enrolment. Of the total number of 18,029 girl students, 5,513 (or 30.5 per cent) were receiving instruction in schools for boys. In the previous year, 17,127 girls were on rolls, of which 8,730 girls (*i.e.* 51.0 per cent) studied in the schools for boys.

The total expenditure on recognised educational institutions during the year fell by Rs. 5,29,170 to Rs. 28,14,074. This decrease was shared by all the sources of income excepting the fees. The percentage of the government's contribution to the total expenditure increased from $56 \cdot 2$ to $63 \cdot 7$.

The total number of teachers in the Secondary and Primary schools increased by 70 to 2,778. This increase was observed only in men teachers. The percentage of trained to total number of teachers was $46 \cdot 1$ as against $43 \cdot 9$ during the last year.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass & Hons.) rose from 106 to 108. The number of students who passed the Matriculation examination also increased by 484 to 569.

MANIPUR

During the year under review the per cent. of the total number of pupils to the lotal population of the state rose from 4.9 to 5.1, of men students to men population from 9.1 to 9.4 and that of women students to women population from 0.5 to 0.6.

The total number of institutions which catered to the educational needs of the State was 309 (279 for men and 30 for women). Of these, 55 (40 for men and 15 for somen) were unrecognised institutions. No new school of any type was opened inring this year.

In spite of the number of schools remaining stationary, the total number of students under instruction increased by 1,837 to 27,680 thus recording an acrease of $7 \cdot 1$ per cent over the previous year's figure. This increase was observed a all types of institutions. The total enrolments of the year under report and the 'ear previous to it respectively included 1,505 and 1,275 girl students.

The total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions rose by Rs. ,88,388 to 5,50,299. The contribution from the local boards, fees and endownents registered a decrease, while that from government funds increased from Rs. ,00,984 to Rs. 5,25,717. On the percentage basis, government contribution to be total expenditure went up from 55.5 to 95.5.

During the year 1948-49, the number of teachers in the recognised Primary and becondary school increased by 56 to 714. There was an increase in both men and romen school teachers. The percentage of trained to the total number of teachers ras 88.8 during this year as compared with 80.9 in the previous year.

MATSYA

The erstwhile Matsya Union came into existence on the 17th of March, 1948, in the integration of the former Alwar, Bharatpur, Dholpur and Karauli States. Subsequently it was merged in the former State of Rajasthan.

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population was $2\cdot 2$ that of the men students to men population being $3\cdot 8$ and of women students to women population $0\cdot 4$.

During the year under report there were 738 institutions in the State. Of these, only 51 schools were for girls. There were 46,835 students under instruction (42,867 boys and 3,968 girls) during the year. Of these, $72 \cdot 8$ per cent. were in the Primary and $17 \cdot 1$ per cent. in the Secondary stage.

The total expenditure on education incurred on recognised educational institutions during the year amounted to Res. 22,05,705. Of this, 19,63,522 were spent on schools for boys and Rs. 2,42,183 on schools for girls. The whole of this expenditure was met from government funds.

During the year under review, 2,134 teachers were working in recognised schools of which only 157 were women teachers. The percentage of trained teachers to the total number of teachers was $49 \cdot 8$.

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass & Hons.) was 43 and that of matriculates 308.

MYSORE

During the year under review the percentage of the total number of pupils to the total population of the State rose from 8.7 to 9.9, of the men students to men population from 12.2 to 13.4 and of women students to women population from 5.0 to 5.1.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 292 to 11,332. This rease was mainly shared by Primary and Secondary schools for both boys and girls. The most important additions in the Professional institutions were : me Law college, one Commercial college, one Teachers' Training school and six Commercial Schools -all for boys. The number of unrecognised institutions wever, registered a substantial fall from 602 in the year 1947-48 to 369 in the year and report. Of the total number of institutions, 704 imparted education exclusively o girls.

The total number of students in the State increased by 77,405 to 7,86,756. Imost all types recognised institutions shared this increase—Primary and Secondary shoels getting the greater portion. Of the total enrolment, 2,32,002 were girls students. The latter figure recorded a rise of 28,753 over the last year's figure. The number of girls studying in institutions for boys was 1,45,230 as against 1,22,695 in the previous year. These figures constituted respectively 60.4 per cent and 62.6 per cent. of the total number of girls on rolls in the respective years.

The total expenditure on education went up by Rs. 42,07,931 to Rs. 2,78,87,411. This increase was shared by institutions for both men and women. The contributions from the Local Boards funds, fees and endowmentsetc. fell considerably whereas that from the government funds recorded a marked increase. On the percentage basis, the contribution from Government funds was $85\cdot 3$ as against $76\cdot 0$ in the year before.

. The total number of teachers working in the recognised Primary and Secondary schools was 24,362, of which 3,370 were women teachers. The percentage of trained to the total number of teachers was 24.7, that for men teachers being 23.1 and for women teachers 34.8.

During the year the number of students passing B.A. and B.Sc. (Pass and Ions.) examinations was 7.78 (650 men and 128 women) and Matriculation Examination 7,286 (6,217 boys and 1,069 girls). 477 boys and 22 girls got Degrees in Frofessional subjects.



The Patiela and East Punjab States Union came into existence on the 20th ast, 1948, with the integration of the former Patiala, Kapurthala, Faridkot, rkotla, Nabha, Jind, Nalagarh and Kalsia States.

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population of the mun increased from 2.3 to 2.9 —that of men students to men population from .8 to 4.8 and of women students to women population from 0.5 to 0.7.

During the year under review, 170 new schools (all for boys) were started. is raised the total number of institutions to 1,067. The total number of institions which imparted education exclusively to girls remained stationary at 104. If the new schools were of and below High standard.

The total number of students increased by 9,116 to 96,059. This increase was ared by both men and women students as also by all the types of institutions cepting the Commercial Coilege. Of the total number of pupils, 10,985 were rels as against 8,399 in the previous year. The most important feature of the regress of education during the year was the opening of Post-Graduate classes in rts-& Science colleges.

The total expenditure on recognised educational institutions increased by s. 6,19,608 to Rs. 36,62,764. The income from endowments fell, but the contribution for government funds and fees increased. The percentage of expenditure from overnment funds increased from $84 \cdot 4$ to $86 \cdot 8$.

The total number of teachers working in Primary and Secondary schools decreased by 28 to 3,338. This decrease was confined to women teachers in Middle schools only. The percentage of trained to total number of teachers, however, increased lightly from 38.4 to 38.7.

During the year, 127 boys passed the B. A. & B.Sc. (Pass and Hons.) and 3,294 wys and 167 girls the Matriculation examinations. 125 boys and 51 girls got Diplomas or Certificates in Professional examinations.

RAJASTHAN*

The former State of Rajasthan was formed on 7th April, 1948, with the integration of 14 Rajputana States of Jaipur, Jodhpur, Bikaner, Jaisalmer, Banswara, Bundi, Dangarpur, Jhalawar, Kishangarh, Kotah, Partabgarh, Shahpura, Tonk and Udaipur. Due to the integration of States the Government of Rajasthan could not find it possible to make available complete educational statistics. Some figures for the erstwhile Bikaner State had therefore to be estimated and included in the consolidated account given here.

The percentage of the total number of pupils to the total population was $2 \cdot 8$ of the men pupils to men population being $4 \cdot 8$ and of women pupils to women population $0 \cdot 5$.

During the year under report, there were 4,896 educational institutions. Of these, 430 institutions imparted education exclusively to the girls. These institutions had 339,900 students under instruction which included 31,716 girl students.

The total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions amounted to Rs. 1,43,22,816. A great portion of this expenditure (i.e. $86 \cdot 5\%$) was met from the government exchequer and the rest was met from fees and endowments. About $5 \cdot 8\%$ of the total expenditure was spent on the institutions for girls.

During the year under review 12,378 teachers were working in the recognised Primary & Secondary schools. Of these, 11,064 were men teachers and 1,314 women teachers. The percentage of the trained to the total number of teachers came to be $31 \cdot 2$.

The output of graduates in Arts & Science (Pass & Hons.) was 284 (268 men and 16 women). 101 men and 1 woman passed the Professional Degree examinations and 2,141 boys and 115 girls passed the Matriculation examination.

RAMPUR

The erstwhile Rampur State was first taken over by the Central Government 2 1st July, 1949, and was subsequently merged in the United Provinces (now Uttar radesh) on the 1st of December, 1949.

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population rose om $2 \cdot 7$ to $3 \cdot 1$. Whereas the percentage of men students to men population rose om $4 \cdot 8$ to $5 \cdot 5$, that of women students to women population fell from $0 \cdot 5$ to $0 \cdot 4$.

During the year under report, 228 institutions catered for the educational needs if the State as against 229 in the previous year. One unrecognised institution was losed during the year. Only 9 schools (1 High & 8 Primary) imparted education aclusively to the girls. One Middle school for boys was raised to the High standard a this year.

The total number of scholars under instruction increased by 1,791 to 16,043. This increase was shared by all types of institutions. The number of girl students ell to the extent of 142, but it was balanced by an effective increase in the number f boy students. Of the total enrolment, 15,035 were boy students and 1,008 irl students. During the year, 163 girls which constituted 16.2% of the total umber of girls on rolls received instruction in schools for boys, whereas in the ear before this number was 180 or 15.7%.

The total expenditure on recognized educational institutions rose by Rs.1,26,127 o Rs. 10, 34, 272. This was mot by government funds and fees only, and the increase ras shared by both these sources. The contribution from government funds to the otal expenditure was $96 \cdot 6\%$ as against $97 \cdot 9\%$ in the previous year.

The total number of teachers serving in recognised schools for general education lecreased by 61 to 524. This decreased was confined to the Primary schools. The rained teachers also recorded a noticeable fall in their number *viz.*, from 420 in the revious year to 250 in the year under report. On percentage basis this fall was rom 71.8 to 47.7.

The ouput of Matriculates in the year under report was 156 (140 boys and 16 jurls) as compared to 111 (101 boys & 10 girls) in the last year.

SANDUR

The percentage of the total number of pupils to the total population fell from e^3 to $4\cdot 2$; that of men students to men population fell from $6\cdot 9$ to $6\cdot 7$ but of romen students to women population remained stationary at $1\cdot 7$.

During the year under review, there were in all 12 schools which catered for the ducational needs of the people. No new school was started during the year. here was no school which imparted education exclusively to the girls.

The total number of pupils under instructions was 838 during this year and 43 in the year before. These figures included respectively 171 and 167 girl students.

The expenditure on education registered a fall. It fell by Rs. 4,788 to Rs. 3,792. The percentage of government contribution to the total expenditure fell rom $96 \cdot 6$ to $94 \cdot 2$.

The total number of teachers working in Primary and Secondary schools dereased by 1 to 34. The only women teacher working in the state during the previous war, also left her job.

Sandur State was merged in Madras on the 1st April, 1949. Some of the aore important educational statistics regarding Sandur are given on the following ages.



SIROHI

The administration of the erstwhile Sirhoi State was first taken over by the Government of Bombay as an agent of the Central Government on 5th January 1949 and subsequently it was divided and merged partly in Rajasthan and partly in Bombay on the 26th of January 1950.

During the year under review, the percentage of the total number of pupils to the total population of the state rose from $2 \cdot 2$ to $2 \cdot 5$; of the boy students to men population increased from $4 \cdot 0$ to $4 \cdot 4$ and that of girl students to women population from $0 \cdot 3$ to $0 \cdot 4$.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 43 to 117. This increase was only in the schools, for boys, 40 new Primary schools and 3 new unrecognised institutions were started. One Middle school for boys was raised to High standard. There were only two institutions which confined themselves exclusively to the education of the girls.

The total number of students under instruction rose by 784 to 6,395. This was due mainly to the increase in Primary school enrolment. Of the total enrolment the number of boy students was 5,892 and that of girl students 503. The correspondog figures for the previous year were 5,230 boys and 381 girls. During he year 1948-49, 263 girls were studying in schools for boys, as against 147 girls in he year bofore. The percentages of these girls to the total number of girls on rolls n the respective years were 52.3 and 38.6 respectively.

The total expenditure on education during the year decreased by Rs. 10,617 to 152, 22, 62, 791. Although the government grants and the income from fees rejistered an increase, the overall decrease was due to a drastic fall in the income rom endowments etc. The percentage of the government contribution to the otal expenditure was $92 \cdot 3$ as against $83 \cdot 9$ in the previous year.

The total number of teachers serving in recognised schools for general educaion rose by 63 to 284. This increase was uniformally shared by all types of chools. The number of women teachers however, remained stationary at 16. The number of trained teachers was extremely low—it being only 2 in the total.

The output of matriculates in the year was 26 (25 boys and 1 girl) as against 37 36 boys and 1 girl) in the preceding year.

TEHRI GARHWAL

The former Tehri Garhwal State was merged in the United Provinces (now ttar Pradesh) on 1st August, 1949.

The percentage of the total number of scholars on rolls to the total pulation of the State rose from $2 \cdot 9$ to $4 \cdot 4$ —that of the men students to men population from $5 \cdot 5$ to $8 \cdot 0$ and of women students to women population from $1 \cdot 1$ to $0 \cdot 4$.

During the year under review, the state made remarkable progress in the field if education. To meet and satisfy the demand of the people for a rapid expansion if education, 210 new educational institutions were started bringing the total to 49. The education of girls also received considerable impetus. The schools for irls increased from 7 in the previous year to 40 in the year under report.

Due to the opening of new schools mentioned above, a greater number of hildren were eventually brought under instruction. The number of students thus acreased by 6,564 to 18,863 (17,960 boys and 903 girls). This increase was shared y both the sexes, but on the percentage basis the rise was observed to be more rominent in the case of girl students (390.8 per cent.) than in the boys (48.2 per ent). Another new aspect of the progress was the admission of 330 girls in the Frimary schools for boys.

Owing to the reorganization of education in the State, during the year under eport, the total expenditure increased from Rs. 2,20,197 in the year 1947-48, to is. 6,04,260 in the year 1948-49. The government, naturally, had to bear comaratively a greater share of the financial responsibility. Its contribution increased is $207 \cdot 3$ per cent. over the previous year's corresponding figure. The income from see also increased, but the income from Endowments etc., recorded a decrease.

The total number of teachers working in Primary and Secondary schools increased y 347 to 764. Of the total, only 49 were women teachers—and all untrained. This as presumably due to lack of education among women of the State. Only 16.8 per ent. of the total number of teachers were trained. In this respect the State was beeved to share with other States the general paucity of trained personnel.

In all 68 students (67 boys and 1 girl) passed the Matriculation examination a this year, as against 25 boys in the year before.

TRAVANCORE

The percentage of the total number of students to the total population of the State increased from $18 \cdot 0$ to $18 \cdot 1$. The percentage of men students to men population increased from $20 \cdot 3$ to $20 \cdot 6$ but that of women students to women population remained stationary at $15 \cdot 6$.

During the year under review, the total number of recognised institutions inreased by 75 to 4,245. But the schools which imparted education exclusively to the girls decreased to 69 from 155 in the previous year. Of the more important idditions to the institutions were one Degree college, three Intermediate colleges and one Teachers' Training school—all for boys.

The total number of pupils went up by 51,950 to 12,38,188. There was an dround increase of scholars in the various types of institutions, the Secondary and Primary schools getting the biggest share. Of the total enrolment, 5,31,171 were girls students showing an increase of 22,795 over the previous year's figure. More than 96 per cent. of the girls under instruction were studying in institutions for boys.

The expenditure on the recognised educational institutions during the year increased by Rs. 30,31,850 to Rs. 1,37,75,409. This increase was shared by all ources of income and more so by the government funds. But on the percentage basis the contribution of the government fell slightly from $74 \cdot 9$ to $73 \cdot 5$.

The number of teachers working in the recognised Primary and Secondary chools increased by 1,058 to 26,663. The percentage of the trained to total number of teachers was $75 \cdot 2$ in the year under report as against $76 \cdot 2$ in the previous year.

The output of graduates (Pass & Hons.) in Arts and Science increased from 506 (460 men and 146 women) in the previous year to 802 (619 men and 183 women) luring the year. The number of students passing Professional Degree examinations ilso went up from 174 (116 men and 58 women) to 258 (200 men and 58 women). 4,340 soys and 2,002 girls passed the Matriculation examination during this year as against 5,435 boys and 2,589 girls in the previous year.

The former Travancore State was integrated with the former Cochin State on 1st July 1949 to form the Travancore Cochin Union. Some more important statistics pertaining to Travancore Area are given on the following pages.

The percentage of students under instructions to the total population was $4\cdot 4$ for men and $1\cdot 2$ for women) as compared with $4\cdot 5$ ($8\cdot 2$ for men and $0\cdot 5$ for en) in the previous year.

The total number of educational institutions increased by 7 to 408, and this due to the opening of 7 new schools for boys (3 Primary, 2 Middle and 2 High ols). Of the total number of institutions, 394 were for men and 14 for women. e was no unrecognised institution in the State.

The total number of students on rolls increased by 1,401 to 25,554. Of the r, 22,184 were men students and 3,370 women students. Of the women students, were studying in institutions for women, while 2,149 (*i.e.* $63 \cdot 8$ per cent.) her institutions.

The total expenditure on education during the year was Rs. 5,00,268.

The number of teachers in Primary and Secondary schools was 1,953. percentage of trained to the total number of teachers was 8.6

The output of graduates in Arts and Science (Pass and Hons.) was 42 (39 men 3 women) during the year. 165 boys and 21 girls passed the Matriculation ination.



VINDHYA PRADESH

The State of Vindhya Pradesh came into existence on the 2nd April 1948 with the integration of 35 erstwhile Central India States. Later, on 1st, January 1950 its administration was taken over by the Central Government.

The percentage of the total number of pupils to the total population was $2\cdot 6$ that of the men to men pupils population being $4\cdot 8$ and of women pupils to women population $0\cdot 3$.

During the year under review the total number of educational institutions was 1,735. Of these, only 90 institutions were meant exclusively for girls. The institutions for boys included 16 unrecognised schools also.

The total number of students under instruction was 99,385, of which 93,579 were boy students and 5,806 girl students. These included 471 hoy and 26 girl students studying in unrecognized schools. Of the total number of girl students, 567 (or 9.8 per cent) were studying in institutions for boys.

The total expenditure on the recognised educational institutions during the year amounted to Rs. 19,88,083. About 99.6 per cent. of this expenditure was met from the government funds and the rest from fees and endowments. The costs of educating pupils in Primary and Secondary schools amounted to Rs. 8.9 and Rs. 24.7 respectively.

During the year under report, 3,872 teachers were working in recognised schools for general education. Of these, only 229 were women teachers. Although there were 2 Normal and Training schools in the State, yet there was a great dearth of trained personnel especially of women teachers. The percentage of trained to the total number of teachers was 25.8 (26.9 per cent. men and 8.7 per cent. women).

414 boys and 18 girls passed the Matriculation examination and 183 hoys got diploma/certificates in Professional examinations.
