## P R E F A C E

Reduction in regional im-balances of educational development is a major objective of the National Policy on Education. To promote this programme, it is necessary to collect statistics of educational development in the different regions of the country periodically and to publish them for information and use by all concerned.

The Ministry of Education publishes annually statistics of educational development in the different States of the Indian Union. But as imbalances of educational development are more pronounced at the district than at the State level, it was decided to collect and publish statistics of educational development in the districts also every five years. Accordingly, such statistics were collected and published, for the first time, for the year 1960-61.

The study is now being repeated for the year 1965-66 and it is proposed to bring out a separate volume on the district educational statistics of every State. It will contain statistics for the year 1965-66 along with comparative data for the year 1960-61. To make inter-district comparisons possible, some important indices such as enrolment ratio, percentage of trained teachers, per capita expenditure on education, etc., will also be included.

In this programme of bringing out 16 volumes for all the States of the Union (Except Nagaland), this volume is the twelfth and is devoted to the educational statistics of districts in Orissa State. It has been based on the data collected from the State Department of Education, Orissa.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the cooperation and help received from the Director of Public Instruction, Orissa, and other educational authorities in the State.

## I : INTRODUCTORY

The Ministry of Education publishes the statistics of education in India usually in their publications 'Education in India, Vol. I and Vol. II'. These publications give the statistics at the national and State levels, but do not provide district-wise statistics.

To fill up this gap, the National Council of Educational Research and Training brought out a volume entitled 'Educational Statistics: District-wise' giving the bench-mark/educational data of various kinds for all districts for the year 1960-61. To make inter-district comparisons possible, some important indices such as enrolment ratios, percentage of trained teachers and per capita expenditure on education were also given. These comparative statistics show a wide range of variation between the districts in every respect.

It has now been decided to hold a similar review of educational development in the districts for the year 1965-66. Such periodic reviews are necessary for several reasons. For instance, they will help to judge the effectiveness of the measures taken to correct regional imbalances at the district level. Secondly, such collection and publication of data on different aspects of education at the district level will help the preparation of educational development plans for all districts so that they can be adopted, as recommended by the Education Commission, as the principal unit for administration, planning and development of school education.

This review will be divided into sixteen volumes - one volume being devoted to the educational statistics of the districts in every State (except Nagaland). The present volume, which is the twelfth in the series, gives the data for each of the districts of Orissa on number of educational institutions, population, teachers, expenditure etc. at all levels of education. It also gives the rates of growth in different sectors from 1960-61 to 1965-66 and some important indices of educational development.

## II: AREA AND POPULATION

The State of Orissa consists of 13 districts. Its total estimated population in 1966 was 192.30 lakh (95.78 lakhs males and 96.52 lakhs females). The population of the State in 1961 was 175.49 lakhs (87.71 lakhs males and 87.78 lakhs females). The rate of growth of population during 1961-66 has been 1.83% per annum. The overall density of population per square mile for the State was 292 in 1961 and 326 in 1966. In

1966, the density of population was less than 200 in two districts, Koraput (165) and Phulbani (132); between 200 and 300 in five districts, Dhenkanal (267), Kalahandi (219), Keonjhar (253), Sambalpur (244) and Sundergarh (219); between 300 and 350 in two districts, Bolangir (343) and Mayurbhanj (328); and more than 350 in four districts, Balasore (619), Cuttack (797), Ganjam (434) and Puri (506). The density of population in India in 1966 was nearly 420 per square mile and in comparison to this, only the four coastal districts of Orissa had a larger density than the all-India average.

The detailed district-wise statistics are given in Table I.

The total population of the State in the age-group 5-11 in 1966 was 24,70,000 (12,16,000 boys and 12,54,000 girls). This shows an increase of 2,56,000 from 1961 to 1966. The children in the age-group 5-11 formed 12.8% of the total population of the State.

The number of children in the age-group 11-14 in 1966 was 13,31,000 (6,52,000 boys and 6,79,000 girls). The children in this age-group increased by 1,47,000 from 1961 to 1966 and formed 6.4% of the total population of the State in 1966.

There were 13,44,000 children in the age-group 14-17 in 1966 (6,60,000 boys and 6,84,000 girls). The children in this age-group increased by 2,64,000 between 1961 and 1966 and formed 7.0% of the total population in 1966.


The youth in the age-group 17-23 in 1966 numbered 20,60,000 (10,40,000 males and 10,20,000 female). The persons in this age-group increased by 1,79,000 between 1961 and 1966 and formed 10.7% of the total population in 1966.

The population in the age-group 6-23 formed 37.5% of the total population in the State in 1966.

The distribution of the population in the different age-groups, district-wise, is given in Table II.

### III: LITERACY

The general literacy rate in Orissa, i.e., the number of literates per thousand of population was 158 in 1951 and 216 in 1961. The literacy rate of males was 135 in 1951 and 173 in 1961 for the State a whole. The corresponding literacy rates for females were only 23 in 1951 and 43 in 1961.



In 1961, the literacy rate was highest in Cuttack (198) and lowest in Koraput (83). In the case of males, the highest literacy rate was in Balasore (232) and lowest in Koraput (68). In the case of females, the highest literacy rate was in Cuttack (70) and the lowest in Kalahandi (14). The details are given in Table No.III.

IV: TOTAL NUMBER OF EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS,  
PUPILS, TEACHERS AND EXPENDITURE

In 1960-61, there were 27,283 educational institutions in Orissa. The total number of such institutions in 1965-66 rose to 31,878. This includes all recognised institutions from the pre-Primary to higher education.

Among the districts, the maximum number of institutions in 1965-66 was in Cuttack (5,814), followed by Ganjam (3,336) and Puri (3,185). The districts of Keonjhar had the smallest number of such institutions (1,246).

The total enrolment in all types of educational institutions in 1960-61 was 16.8 lakhs (12.0 lakhs boys and 4.8 lakhs girls). In 1965-66, it rose to 22.1 lakhs (15.4 lakhs boys and 6.7 lakhs girls). The enrolment in educational institutions has, therefore, increased at a cumulative rate of 5.5% from 1960-61. The rate of growth during the period in the enrolment of boys and was 4.9% and in that of girls, 6.9%.

There is a large variation in the cumulative rate of growth of total enrolment/that of boys and girls among the different districts. The maximum rate of growth was in Balasore district (7.3%) and the minimum was in the Mayurbhanj district (1.6%).

In the total enrolment, the sex ratio was 44 girls for every 100 boys enrolled in 1965-66 as against 40 girls for every 100 boys enrolled in 1960-61. This shows that the position has slightly improved. Among the districts, there were 52 girls enrolled for every 100 boys in Cuttack and Balasore district; 47 girls for every 100 boys enrolled in Puri district; 45 girls for every 100 boys enrolled in Sambalpur district; and 43 girls for every 100 boys enrolled in Sundergarh district. The lowest sex ratio in enrolment was in Kalahandi and Mayurbhanj districts where only 31 and 32 girls respectively were enrolled for every 100 boys. The district-wise details are given in Table IV.I.

The total enrolment in educational institutions as a percentage of the total population in the State was 11.5 in 1965-66 as against only 9.6 in 1960-61. The percentage enrolment to total population was highest in Balasore (14.8) followed by Cuttack (14.3) and Puri (13.1). The lowest percentage enrolment to total population was in Kalahandi (7.4) and Koraput (7.7).

The total number of teachers in all educational institutions in Orissa increased from nearly 52,000 in 1960-61 to 76,000 in 1965-66. This shows a cumulative annual increase of 7.3%. The percentage of women teachers to the total number of teachers was nearly 6.3 in 1965-66, as against 3.9 in 1960-61.

The number of teachers per thousands of population was 3.0 in 1960-61 and it increased to 3.9 in 1965-66. Balasore district had the highest number of teachers per thousand population (4.6) followed by Cuttack (4.5), Phulbani (4.4), Sundergarh (4.4), Dhenkanal (4.3) and Puri (4.3). The lowest number of teachers per thousand population was in Kalahandi (2.6) and Koraput (2.6).

The total direct expenditure on educational institutions increased from 483.3 lakhs in 1960-61 to 1,189.3 lakhs in 1965-66. The direct expenditure has increased at a cumulative rate of growth of 16. The total expenditure per head of population was only Rs.2.8 in 1960-61. It increased to Rs.6.2 in 1965-66.

As is to be expected, there is a large variation in the total direct educational expenditure among the districts. The per capita expenditure was the highest in Puri district (Rs.9.8), followed by Sundergarh (Rs.8.8) and Cuttack (Rs.7.8); and the lowest per capita expenditure was in Kalahandi and Koraput districts (Rs.2.7 and Rs. 2.9 respectively).


The source-wise distribution of total direct expenditure on educational institutions in 1965-66 is given in Table No.IV B. It will be seen from there that 75.3% of the total direct expenditure on all educational institutions in Orissa was met from government funds, 12.7% from fees and 9.8% from other sources and 2.2% from Local Body Funds. In the case of comparatively under-developed districts like Koraput, Phulbani and Kalahandi, more than 85% of the total expenditure was met from Government funds.

#### V. PRE-PRIMARY EDUCATION

There were no separate recognised pre-primary schools in the State in 1965-66 and in 1960-61. However, there were pre-primary classes attached to schools in Cuttack and Puri districts. The enrolment in these classes in Cuttack was 127 in 1960-61 and increased to 252 by 1965-66. In Puri district, the enrolment in such attached classes which was only 29 in 1960-61 increased to 87 by 1965-66.

VI. PRIMARY EDUCATION

The number of primary schools in Orissa has increased from 21,858 to 25,077 during the period under review. The growth in the number of primary schools was highest in Koraput district which was followed by Bolangir, Sundergarh and Phulbani. The growth rate of institutions was the lowest in Ganjam, Dhenkanal and Cuttack. The area served by a primary school has increased from 2.8 sq. miles to 2.4. In a district where the educational facilities are comparatively less developed, the area served by a primary school will be smaller than in another where the facilities for primary education are comparatively meagre. On the basis of this criterion, it can be seen that in Cuttack, Balasore, Ganjam and Puri districts, where the area served by a Primary school is less than 2 sq. miles, the facilities for primary education have developed much more than in districts like Kalahandi and Koraput where the area served by a primary school is more than 4 sq. miles. Similarly, the population served by a primary school has increased from 803 in 1960-61 to 701 in 1965-66. Among the districts, the population served by a primary school in 1965-66 was the highest in Kalahandi (953) followed by Puri (834) and Bolangir (815). The district having the minimum population served by a primary school is Phulbani (496). Table V gives the district-wise position.

The enrolment in classes I - V in the State has increased from 14.1 lakhs to 17.5 lakhs during the period. This shows cumulative growth rate of 4.3% per annum. The growth rate in the enrolment of boys during the period was 3.4% whereas in the case of girls it was 6.1%. The growth in enrolment in classes I - V was highest in Koraput district followed by Balasore and Kalahandi. It was lowest in Mayurbhanj and Phulbani districts.

The percentage of enrolment in classes I - V to the total population in the age-group 6-11 gives index of the facilities created for primary stage of education. In Orissa, the percentage enrolment in classes I - V to the population in the age-group 6-11 has increased from 63.7 in 1960-61 to 70.8 in 1965-66. In the case of boys, this has increased from 89.3 to 94.7 and in the case of girls, from 39.0 to 47.7. In the districts of Balasore, Cuttack and Dhenkanal, the percentage enrolment of boys is more than 100%; it is between 90 to 100 in Ganjam, Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj, Phulbani, Puri and Sambalpur; it is the lowest in Koraput and Kalahandi districts (nearly 75%). As far as enrolment of girls is

concerned, facilities were available for nearly 72% in Balasore followed by 65% in Cuttack. In all other districts, excepting Puri (55%) and Sambalpur (50%), the percentage of enrolment of girls was less than that of boys. Among both the boys and girls together, facilities existed for 53.2% of the population in the age-group 5-14 years in Balasore followed by Cuttack 84.1%. In three districts, namely, Dhenkanal, Puri and Sambalpur, the percentage enrolment was between 70 and 80; and in other districts, it was lower than even 70%. The lowest percentage of enrolment was in Kalahandi (49%) followed by Koraput (53%). It will thus be seen that districts like Balangir, Ganjam, Kalahandi, Keonjhar, Koraput, Mayurbhanj, Phulbani and Sundergarh are very much behind the other districts in the development of primary education, especially for girls.


The district-wise details are given in Table VI.

Table VII gives the enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in Classes I-V in 1965-66 along with the percentage of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes population to the total population and extent of coverage of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in the enrolment in Classes I - V. There were nearly 5.35 lakhs scheduled castes and scheduled tribes children enrolled in classes I - V in Orissa in 1965-66. Of this 3.84 lakhs were boys and 1.51 lakhs were girls. The scheduled castes and scheduled Tribes formed 30.3% of the total enrolment in classes I - V. The corresponding percentages was 33.3 for boys and 26.3 for girls.

There is large variation in the percentage of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes pupils to the total enrolment in Classes I - V among the districts. For both boys and girls taken together, this percentage varies from 15.4% in Cuttack to 58.5% in Sundergarh. This variation will of course depend upon the variation in the percentage of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes population to the population in the different districts. Columns 11, 12 and 13 of the Table give the extent of coverage. Extent of coverage is defined as the percentage of percent Scheduled castes and Scheduled Tribes students enrolled to total enrolment to the percent Scheduled castes and Scheduled Tribes population to total population. These columns show whether the percentage of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes enrolled in Classes I - V is similar to the percentage of enrolment of all the children from total population in Classes I - V. If the extent of coverage is 100% this will show that the percentage enrolment of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes among the total population are the same. For Orissa as a whole the extent of coverage for the boys and girls together was 76.9%. The extent of coverage was 84.3% for boys and for girls 63.1%. Among the districts the



percentage of coverage varies from 69.5 in Dhenkanal to 91.8 in Koraput for both boys and girls together. In the case of boys only in Balasore district the extent of coverage was more than 100%. In the other districts it varied from 73.6% in Dhenkanal district to 96.7% in Koraput. In the case of girls the extent of coverage varied from 55.8% in Cuttack to 81.8 in Phulbani district.

There were 37,300 teachers in primary schools in Orissa in 1960-61 and their number increased to 49,400 by 1965-66. Of these only slightly more than 2% were women in 1960-61. The percentage of women teachers in 1965-66 was 4.6. Of the total number of teachers in 1965-66, 58.8% were trained. Among males 59.9% were trained and among females only 35.6% were trained. The percentage of trained teachers has increased substantially from 1960-61. In the year 1960-61 only 38.5% of teachers were trained and only 38.4% males teachers were trained. However, in the case of women teachers in 1960-61 43.9% were trained. There is large variation among the percentage of trained teachers among the districts. Considering the year 1965-66, the highest percentage of trained teachers was in Ganjam followed by Dhenkanal and Puri. The Kalahandi district had the lowest percentage of trained teachers.

The pupil-teacher ratio in Orissa in 1965-66 in primary schools was 34. Among the districts the pupil-teacher ratio was the lowest in Phulbani followed by Sundergarh and the highest pupil-teacher ratio was in Balasore district. Since the progress of primary education in many of the districts is much below the average, the low pupil-teacher ratio may be due to the non-utilisation of the available facilities in full. The district-wise details are given in Tables VIII and IX.

The direct expenditure on primary schools has increased from Rs.206 lakhs in 1960-61 to Rs.445 lakhs in 1965-66. The cumulative annual growth rate of expenditure was 14.7 percent during the period. The direct expenditure on primary schools as a percentage of the total direct expenditure on education in Orissa has decreased from 42.7 to 37.5 during 1961-66. Among the districts the percentage of expenditure on primary schools to total direct expenditure was highest in Koraput (62.2%) followed by Kalahandi (57.3%) and Phulbani (55.5%) districts and the lowest percentage was in Puri (24.3%) district. As can be seen his percentage is highest in less developed districts than in the others. The direct expenditure per capita on primary schools in Orissa has increased from Rs.1.17 to Rs.2.31 in the last five years. In 65-66 the highest per capita expenditure on primary schools was in Phulbani (Rs.3.1) followed by

Bolangir (Rs.2.7) and Dhenkanal (Rs.2.6) districts and the lowest per capita expenditure on primary school was in Kalahandi (Rs.1.6) followed by Bolangir(Rs.1.8) and Koraput (Rs.1.8) districts.<sup>9</sup> During 1965-66, for the State as a whole the average direct expenditure per student per annum was Rs.26.3. The highest cost per student was in Phulbani (Rs.36.7) followed by Sundergarh (Rs.32.4) and Ganjam (Rs.29.0) districts and the lowest cost was in Balasore district (Rs.23.3). The details are given in Table IX.

#### VII. MIDDLE SCHOOL EDUCATION


The number of middle schools in Orissa has increased from 1,306 to 3,310 during the period. This shows a cumulative growth rate of 17.3% in the number of middle/senior basic schools per annum. The highest increase in the number of middle schools during the period was in Bolangir district followed by Kalahandi, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj districts. In all these districts the number of middle schools nearly tripled during the period. Even in other districts the number of middle schools has at least doubled.

The average area served by a middle school which was 46.1 square miles in 1960-61 decreased to 18.5 square miles during the period. Among the districts, in Bolangir, Ganjam, Kalahandi, Koraput, Phulbani, Jharsuguda and Sundergarh the area served by a middle school is more than the Orissa average in 1965-66. In Cuttack and Balasore the average area served by a middle/Senior basic school was 5.8 and 6.5 square miles respectively whereas in Koraput the average area served was 88.6 miles.

The population served by a middle school has decreased from nearly 13,400 to 5,800. during the period. In 1965-66, the average population served by a middle school is more than the Orissa State as a whole in six districts out of 13.<sup>10</sup> The district-wise details are given in Table X.


The enrolment in Classes VI-VIII in Orissa has increased from 1.08 lakhs to 2.51 during the period. This shows a cumulative growth rate of 16.0% per annum. The growth rate in the enrolment of boys in these classes during the period was 14.7% per annum whereas in the case of girls it was 22.8%. There were 21.7 girls for every 100 boys enrolled taking the State as a whole in 1965-66 as compared to 36.8 at the all-India level. Taking 1960-61 as base, the growth in enrolment in Classes VI-VIII was highest in Bolangir district followed by Kalahandi and Mayurbhanj districts.

The percentage of enrolment in classes VI-VIII to the population in the age-group 11-14 gives an index of the facilities created for middle stage education. In Orissa the percentage of enrolment in

classes VI-VIII to the population in the age-group 11-14 has increased from 9.1% to 18.9% during the period. In case of boys, the percentage has increased from 16.2 to 31.6 and in case of girls from 2.1 to 6.6. As for the variation among the districts in 1965-66, in Cuttack, Puri, Balasore, Dhenkanal and Mayurbhanj the percentage enrolment in these classes was more than the State average. The lowest percentage of enrolment was in Koraput district followed by Kalahandi and Phulbani districts. In the case of boys also, in Balasore, Cuttack, Dhenkanal, Mayurbhanj and Puri districts the percentage enrolment in Classes VI-VIII was more than the State as a whole. The lowest percentage enrolment of boys was in Koraput followed by Kalahandi district. As for girls, percentage enrolment in Balasore, Cuttack, Mayurbhanj, Puri and Sundergarh district was more than the State average. The lowest percentage being in Kalahandi followed by Koraput. Thus it is seen that as far as middle stage education is concerned, the districts of Kalahandi, Koraput and Phulbani are lagging very much behind the other districts in the State. The district-wise details are given in Table XI.

Of the total enrolment in Classes VI-VIII in 1965-66 14.8% boys and 8.1% girls belonged to the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes communities. Both boys and girls together formed 13.6% of the total enrolment in these classes. The extent of coverage in enrolment of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes in Classes VI - VIII was 34.3% only. In the case of boys this percentage was 37.5 and in the case of girls 20.2. Thus it is seen that the middle school education of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes students is very much lagging behind the general population. Among the districts only in Keonjhar, Puri, Kalahandi, Sundergarh, Phulbani, Sambalpur, Dhenkanal, Balasore, Bolangir and Cuttack the extent of coverage was more than that at the State level. Table XII gives the district-wise data.

There were 11,401 teachers in the middle schools in 1965-66. Of these only 8.5% were women. The number of teachers in middle schools as the number of middle schools has increased substantially during the period 1960-61 to 1965-66 in almost all districts. The number of trained teachers formed 28.4% of the total number of teachers in 1965-66. The percentage of trained men teachers was 27.7 and women teachers was 36.2. The corresponding percentages in 1960-61 were 33.9, 32.7 and 52.0 respectively. This shows that the percentage of trained teachers among the total number of teachers has reduced substantially at the State level and also in many of the districts. This is because the facilities for

training of teachers have not kept pace with the expansion in the number of middle schools and the total number of teachers employed.

The pupil teacher ratio in 1965-66 in the middle schools at State level was 19. This ratio has exceeded the State average only in three districts, viz., Cuttack, Ganjam and Puri. In all other districts the pupil-teacher ratio was less than the State average. The districtwise details are given in Table XIII and XIV.

The direct expenditure on middle schools has increased from Rs.63 lakhs to Rs.191 lakhs during the five year period under consideration. The direct expenditure increased at a cumulative rate of growth of 20.4% per annum. Among the districts the direct expenditure has more than tripled in Balasore, Bolangir, Cuttack, Keonjhar, Koraput, Jharsuguda, Sundergarh and Sambalpur districts. The expenditure on middle schools as a percentage of the total direct expenditure on education in Orissa increased from 13.1% to 16% during the period. The corresponding increase in the percentage expenditure is seen in all the districts. The direct expenditure per capita on middle schools which was only Rs.0.4 in 1960-61 has increased to Rs.1.1 by 1965-66 at the State level. Among the districts the per capita expenditure on middle schools was the highest in Sundergarh district (Rs.2.2) followed by Keonjhar district (Rs.1.6). The per capita expenditure was the lowest in Koraput (Rs.0.4), Kalahandi (Rs.0.5) and Ganjam (Rs.0.6). The average direct expenditure per student per annum in middle schools in Orissa in 1965-66 was Rs.88.5. This expenditure was the highest in Phulbani district (Rs.183.3) followed by Keonjhar district (Rs.149.9) and was the lowest in Puri (Rs.71.4) and Cuttack (Rs.71.4) districts. This large variation in per student expenditure in middle schools shows that there is unutilised facilities available in districts like Phulbani and Keonjhar for middle stage education.

TRANSFER RATE FROM PRIMARY  
STAGE TO MIDDLE STAGE

Generally the transfer rate from primary stage to middle stage is calculated as the enrolment in Class VI as a percentage of enrolment in Class V. However, since the classwise enrolment is not available district-wise, the transfer rate here has been calculated with the enrolment in Classes I-V, <sup>in the same year</sup> as a percentage of the enrolment in Classes I-V. At the State level the transfer rate as defined above has increased from 7.6% to 14.8% during the period under consideration for both boys and girls together.

In case of boys the transfer rate has increased from 9.8% to 17.9% and in the case of girls from 11.1% to 7.5%. The districtwise position of transfer rate in 1965-66 is given below:

Among the boys the lowest transfer rate from primary stage to middle stage was in Koraput (6.9%) followed by Kalahandi district (9.5%) and Phulbani district (11.1%). The highest transfer rate was observed in Cuttack (36.7%). Among the girls again the lowest transfer rate was in Kalahandi (3.1%) followed by Phulbani (3.6%) and Koraput (4.0%). The highest transfer rate among girls was in Sundergarh district (10.7%) followed by Mayurbhanj and Cuttack. Taking both boys and girls together the lowest rate was obtained in Koraput district (6.1%) followed by Kalahandi (7.8%) and Phulbani district (8.6%) and the highest transfer rate was observed in Cuttack district (18.1%). At the all-India level the transfer rate was 22.1% for boys; 14.8% for girls and 19.6% for both sexes together in 1962-63. This has increased to 23.6%; 15.6% and 20.8% respectively by 1965-66.

VIII - HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION

The number of high/higher secondary schools in Orissa increased from 452 in 1960-61 to 1028 in 1965-66. This shows a cumulative growth rate of 15.5% per annum. Among the districts the maximum in the number of high/higher secondary schools was in Bolangir followed by Koraput.

The area in square miles served by a high/higher secondary school which was 138.1 in 1960-61 reduced to 84.5 during 1965-66 in the State as a whole. The highest reduction in the area served by high/secondary school was in Koraput district and the lowest reduction was in Cuttack district. The population by high/higher secondary school which was 38825 in 1960-61 reduced to 18706 in 1965-66 at the level. Among the districts the population served by a high/higher secondary school in 1965-66 was about 2000 in Jajpur, 12900 in Cuttack and 15500 in Mayurbhanj. On the other hand in Koraput district a high/secondary school served about 42000 population and in the Malkangiri district about 11000. Table XV gives the districtwise details.

The total enrolment in high/higher secondary schools in 1965-66 was nearly 195000. The enrolment in Classes IX-XI increased at the State level from 43765 to 100956 during the period. This shows a cumulative growth rate of 15.8% per annum. In the case of boys the enrolment in these classes grew at the rate of 15.4% per annum and in the case of girls the growth rate was 19.5% per annum. The sex ratio of enrolment in classes IX-XI which was 9.7 girls for 100 boys in 1960-61 increased to 12.5 girls per 100 boys at the State level. At the all-India level there were 28.8 girls enrolled in these classes for every 100 boys in 1965-66. Among the districts the growth of enrolment was highest in Bolangir followed by Phulbani and Kalahandi. The growth in enrolment was the lowest in Ganjam, Koraput and Sambalpur districts.

The percentage enrolment in classes IX-XI to the population in the age-group 14-17 increased from 4.1% to 7.5% during the period. In the case of boys the percentage enrolment increased from 7.3% to 13.6% and in the case of girls from 0.7% to 1.6%. The percentage enrolment to the corresponding population was highest in Cuttack (12.9%) followed by Puri (10.7%) and Balasore (10.0%) districts. The lowest percentage enrolment was in Koraput (1.9%) and Kalahandi (1.9%) districts. Table XVI gives the district-wise data.

Table XVII gives the enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in classes IX-XI. Of the total enrolment in Classes IX-XI nearly 10200 belong to the scheduled caste and scheduled tribe communities. Of this nearly 9700 were boys and 600 were girls. The percentage of scheduled caste and scheduled tribe students to the total enrolment was 2.2 taking both the sexes together at the State-level. In the case of boys the percentage enrolment to the total was 10.8 and in the case of girls 5.7. The extent of coverage of scheduled caste and scheduled tribe students in the enrolment in classes IX-XI was 24.6% at the State level. In the case of boys the coverage was 27.3% and in the case of girls it was 14.2%. The extent of coverage of both boys and girls together varied from 40.9% in Phulbani district to 16.6% in Ganjam district. This shows that the enrolment of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes students that is much less than of other students in classes IX-XI in all the districts.

Table XVIII gives the district-wise statistics of teachers. The total number of teachers in high/ higher secondary schools increased from 4700 in 1960-61 to 9300 in 1965-66. Of the total number of teachers in 1965-66, 5.5% were women. The number of teachers increased during the period at a cumulative growth rate of 10.7% per annum. Of the total number of teachers in 1965-66, 51% were trained. In the

case of men teachers 49.4% were trained and in the case of women teachers 68% were trained. Comparative position of trained teachers in the two years 1960-61 and 1965-66 remains almost the same excepting the percentage of trained women teachers has decreased. Among the districts, in Koraput nearly 61% of the teachers were trained whereas in Bolangir district only 38.4% teachers were trained.

The pupil-teacher ratio in high/higher secondary schools was 21 in 1965-66 at the State level. The ratio varied from 24 in Puri district to 16 in Kalahandi district.

The total direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools which was nearly Rs.87.9 lakhs in 1960 increased to Rs.230 lakhs by 1965-66. The direct expenditure has increased at a cumulative growth rate of 17.9% per annum. The increase in direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools was highest in Bolangir followed by Phulbani and Kalahandi districts. However, in all the districts the expenditure is more than double. The direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools was 18.2% of the total direct expenditure on education in Orissa in 1960-61. This has increased to 19.3% in 1965-66. The percentage expenditure on high/higher secondary schools was highest in Ganjam (24.1%) followed by Cuttack (23.0%) district. At the same time in Sundergarh district the percentage expenditure on high/higher secondary schools was the least (13.5%) followed by Sambalpur (14.6%).

The per capita expenditure on high/higher secondary schools which was only Rs.0.5 in 1960-61 has increased to Rs.1.2 in 1965-66. Of the 13 districts in Orissa in 7 districts the per capita expenditure on high/higher secondary schools in 1965-66 was less than Re.1/-.

The cost per student in high/higher secondary schools in Orissa was Rs.118/- . The cost per student in Puri was Rs.161.1 in Phulbani to Rs.101.2 in Cuttack. District-wise data on direct expenditure are given in Table VII.

PANSEEP RATE FROM MIDDLE SCHOOL STAGE TO  
HIGH SCHOOL STAGE

Since the class-wise enrolment at the middle stage as well as at the high school stage is not available districtwise, the transfer rate here has been calculated with the enrolment in classes IX-XI as a percentage of enrolment in classes VI-VIII. At the State level the transfer rate has decreased from 47.7% in 1960-61 to 40.1% in 1965-66 taking both boys and girls together. In the case of boys, the transfer rate has increased from 41.9% to 43.5% during the period. At the same time the transfer rate of girls has decreased from 31.4% to 25.0%. The district-wise position of transfer rate in 1965-66 is given below.

Among the boys, the lowest transfer rate from middle stage to high school stage was in Kalahandi district followed by Phulbani and Bolangir districts. The highest transfer rate was observed in Cuttack and Puri districts. The lowest transfer rate among girls was in Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj districts and the best transfer rate was in Ganjam and Cuttack districts. Taking both boys and girls together, the best transfer rate was observed in Kalahandi district and highest transfer rate in Cuttack district. At all-India level the transfer rate was 47.3% in the case of boys, 35.3% in the case of girls and 44.2% in case of both sexes together in 1962-63.

#### IX. TEACHER TRAINING INSTITUTIONS

The total number of Teacher Training Institutions has increased from 92 in 1960-61 to 106 in 1965-66. Of the 106 institutions, 84 were of school standard & were undergraduate colleges and 4 were post-graduate colleges. The total enrolment in the school standard institutions nearly doubled from 700 to 8400 during the period. The enrolment in college standard institutions of teacher training also more than doubled during the same period. In 1965-66 the total enrolment in Teacher Training Institutions was 10226. Table XX-1, gives a districtwise position.

#### X. VOCATIONAL AND TECHNICAL SCHOOLS

The number of vocational and technical schools increased from 62 to 73 during the period. This

excludes the number of teacher training institutions. The total enrolment in these institutions (including that in attached classes to other institutions) increased from 4269 to 4935 during the period at a cumulative annual rate of growth of 2.9%. Taking the teacher training institutions of school standard also into account the enrolment in vocational and technical schools is increased from 8969 to 12335 during the period. This shows a cumulative rate of growth of 7.6% per annum only as compared to the growth rate of 5.8% per annum in the enrolment in classes IX-XI.

The enrolment in Vocational and Technical Schools including teacher training as a percentage of the enrolment in Classes IX-XI was 20.4 in 1960-61. This percentage has reduced to 13.2 by 1965-66. This decrease was due to the reclassification of some institutions which were considered as schools in 1960-61 as under-graduate colleges in 1965-66. Of the total enrolment in Vocational and Technical Schools in 1965-66, 70.3% were boys, whereas in 1960-61 about 91% were boys.

The total direct expenditure on vocational and technical schools, excluding teacher training schools decreased from 22.02 lakhs to 17.90 lakhs during the period. The direct expenditure on these schools, as a percentage of the total direct expenditure on education in the State, decreased from 1.6% to 1.5% during the period.

#### XI. HIGHER EDUCATION

The total number of institutions of higher education, including Universities, increased from one in 1960-61 to 115 by 1965-66. During the period the number of Universities have increased from one to 10. The number of Arts and Science colleges increased from 29 to 62, medical colleges from 3 to 6 engineering colleges from one to 11 and teacher training colleges from 6 to 29 and other colleges for professional and special education from 9 to 11. There is at least one arts and science college in every

district in 1965-66. In Cuttack there were 13 arts and science colleges followed by Puri (II). There was only one college each in Kalahandi, Koraput and Phulbani districts. Teacher Training colleges of undergraduate level were in existence in all the districts excepting Bolangir and Phulbani districts. Table XXI gives the districtwise data.


The total enrolment in institutions for higher education in Orissa in 1965-66 was 36215. Of this 23458 (64.8%) were in Arts and Science Colleges, 5544 (15.3%) in engineering colleges, 2193 (6.1%) in medical colleges, 1853 (5.1%) in teacher training colleges and 2340 (6.5%) in colleges for other professional and special education colleges. The enrolment in institutions of higher education increased more than two and half times during the period.

The increase in enrolment in higher education was highest in Sundergarh and Keonjhar districts followed by Kalahandi. In all the districts the enrolment almost doubled during the period. The enrolment in higher education as a percentage of the population in the age-group 17-23 which was 0.75 for both sexes together in 1960-61 increased to 1.74 by 1965-66. The percentage enrolment to the corresponding population was more than 2% in Palasore, Cuttack, Ganjam, Puri and Sambalpur districts and 1.78% in Sundergarh. In other districts the percentage enrolment was less than 1%, least being in Phulbani district (0.13%). As for boys the percentage enrolment has increased from 1.3 to 3.1 during the period and in the case of girls the percentage enrolment has increased from 0.19 to 0.36.

Of the total enrolment in institutions of higher education 10103 (28.1%) was at the pre-university/Intermediate level, 6947 (19.1%) was at the graduate level in Arts, 5124 (14.3%) was at the graduate level in Science and 1493 (4.2%) at postgraduate and research level. The total enrolment at the higher education stage increased at a cumulative rate of growth of 17.5% per annum during

1961-62. In the case of boys the growth rate was 17.8% and in the case of girls it was 14.6%. The districtwise details are given in Tables XXII and XXIII.

There were 1129 students of scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes studying in classes of higher education in 1965-66 in Orissa. Of this 1050 were boys and 89 were girls. The enrolment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in higher education institutions as compared to the enrolment from the general population was very low. The extent of coverage of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes children of both sexes was 8% at the State level. In the case of boys it was 8.4% and in the case of girls it was only 6%. Only in one district namely Phulbani the extent of coverage was more than 50%. In the case of all other districts the extent of coverage is less than 20% excepting in Bolangir district where it was 27.2%. Table XXIV gives the data districtwise.

Districtwise statistics of teachers in institutions of higher education is given in Table XXV. The number of teachers in institutions of higher education has increased from 1051 to 2629. Of the total number of teachers in 1965-66, 9.6% were women. The highest number of teachers (1471 i.e. 56%) were in Arts and Science Colleges, and 1097 (39.8%) were in colleges for professional education. The pupil teacher ratio in arts and science colleges varied from 5 in Kalahandi to 18 in Cuttack.

The total direct expenditure on institutions of higher education increased from Rs.78.9 lakhs to Rs.209.0 lakhs during 1960-61 to 1965-66. Of the total expenditure in 1965-66, 36.7% was on Arts and Science colleges, 10.8% on medical colleges, 18.3% on Engineering Colleges, 5.7% on teacher training colleges of post-graduate and under-graduate levels and 7.8% on colleges of other professional and special education. The expenditure on Universities and Boards of Education formed 21.2% of the total

ect expenditure on higher education. The expenditure on higher education has grown at a cumulative rate of growth of 19.6% per annum during the period. In 1965-66 the direct expenditure on higher education was 22.6% of the total direct expenditure on education in Orissa, as compared to 16.6% in 1960-61. The percentage expenditure on higher education to total direct expenditure was highest in Puri (48.5%) and lowest in Phulbani (3.3%).

The average direct expenditure per student per annum in 1965-66 in Orissa was Rs.421 in arts and science colleges, Rs.888 in engineering colleges, Rs.1323 in medical colleges and Rs.824 in teacher training colleges. The expenditure per student in Arts and Science colleges varied from Rs.1330 in Phulbani district to Rs.330 in Dhenkanal district. Similarly there was wide variation in the expenditure per student among the districts in colleges of other type of education. District-wise details are given in Table XXVI.
