## Report on the Working of the University during the year 1927-28.

The year will pass down to history as a memorable one, being the Silver Jubilee year of the reign of our Gracious Sovereign. The Jubilee was celebrated with eclat and witnessed the universal manifestation of the sentiments of profound loyalty towards His Highness the Maharaja of Mysore, the Chancellor of the University.

Arrangements were made in all the Colleges and the Institutions under the University to celebrate the event in a befitting manner. In the Maharaja's College, Mysore, the Jubilee was celebrated under the presidency of Sir Brajendranath Seal, Vice-Chancellor of the University. To the National Fund raised in commemoration of this happy event, the Central College students and staff contributed a sum of nearly Rs. 1,200. In the Maharani's College the celebrations came off on the 9th August 1927. Lady Todhunter presided over the function and gave away the prizes which included a nice book awarded by her as a special prize to the best message of congratulations to His Highness the Maharaja on the Silver Jubilee.

In commemoration of the Silver Jubilee, three endowments were made to the University, one for the institution of the Jubilee Lectureship, the second for the award of a gold medal for the best Kannada poem, and the third for a prize for a woman student of the University who passes the B.A. examination from the Maharani's College taking highest marks in Sanskrit as an optional subject.

On the 8th August 1927, the day of the Silver Jubilee of His Highness the Maharaja of Mysore, Rajatantrapravina Sir Brajendranath Seal, Vice-Chancellor, laid the Foundation Stone of the New Intermediate College Building at Mysore.

The building for the Intermediate College at Shimoga was completed during the year and made available for use from the 2nd July 1928.

Sanction was accorded to the addition of a south wing to the Intermediate College at Mysore at a cost of Rs. 13,500.

Arrangements were made with the help of the Science Professors of the Central College for equipping the new Colleges at Mysore and Bangalore with apparatus, and all the Colleges with necessary furniture.

The following officers of the University were appointed as Superintendents of these Colleges.—

The year under report was an exceptionally busy one for the University on account of the arrangements by way of staff, buildings, furniture, etc., for the new Intermediate Colleges.

The Council held 19 meetings as against 17 in the previous year.

At the meetings of the University Council held on the 28th January 1928 and the 12th March 1928, the Vice-Chancellor referred to the great losses the University has sustained by the deaths of Professor M. G. Srinivasa Rao and Mushir-ul-Mulk Mr. Mir Hamza Husein and the following resolutions were recorded :—

“The University Council deeply regret the untimely death of Professor M. G. Srinivasa Rao, Head of the Chemistry Department, Central College, and desire to place on record their profound sense of the loss sustained by the University and the Central College, and their high appreciation of the services of Mr. Srinivasa Rao, in various spheres, such as teaching, organisation, athletics and the corporate life of the College generally.”

“The University Council deeply regret the death of Mushir-ul-Mulk Mr. Mir Hamza Husein, Member of the University Council and desire to place on record their profound sense of the great loss sustained by the University and their high appreciation of the services of Mr. Hamza Husein in various spheres, such as Member of the University Council, Fellow of the University and the Chairman of the Board of Studies in Hindustani and Persian.”

4. Registrar : Mr. B. M. Srikantia, M.A., B.L., continued as Registrar of the University.

5. Senate : The Senate which was reconstituted as from 22nd July 1927 met 5 times (2 ordinary, 1 special and two preliminary meetings held in connection with the Annual Convocation and the Special Convocation of 1927.)

The following are some of the most important recommendations made by the Senate :—

- (a) Conferment of the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Science on His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General of India.

- (b) Modification of the Transitory Ordinance 2 (*Vide* page 10 of the Re-organisation Committee Report) relating to the eligibility of candidates for admission into the Junior Intermediate class.
- (c) Appointment of a Committee to suggest in what way the duties and powers of the Board of Audit which are generally described in Ordinance 27 can be more fully and specifically laid down with a view to a definite understanding thereof both by the Board of Audit and by the Heads of Institutions audited.
- (d) Scheme for the M.A. Degree in Persian.
- (e) Modification of the scheme for the Intermediate Examination in Engineering [under Ordinance 91 (e) 1].
- (f) Modification of the scheme of Examination in Electrical Engineering for the B.E. Degree.
- (g) Addition of the detailed syllabus in Dynamics for students taking 'Additional Mathematics' for the Intermediate Examination in Science.
- (h) Adoption of the detailed courses of study in the several subjects for the B.T. Degree Examination.
- (i) The fee for courses of study for the Intermediate Examination and that for admission to the Intermediate Examination.
- (j) Modification of Ordinance 54A relating to the election of a member to the University Council by the Senate.
- (k) Minima for a pass in the Intermediate in Arts and the Intermediate in Science Examinations.
- (l) Recommendation to hold Practical Examination in Science subjects for the Intermediate in Science (leading to Engineering) and the Intermediate in Science (leading to Medicine).
- (m) Revision of the courses of studies, scheme of examinations for the B.E. Degree together with amendments to the Ordinances and the detailed syllabus for the B.E. Degree.
- (n) Recommendation relating to the minima for a pass in the M.A., and M.Sc., Degrees in Mathematics.
- (o) Recommendation to hold the First, Second, Third and Fourth L.M.P. examinations twice a year in April and October.

- (p) Recommendation in regard to the candidates for the M.B.B.S. and L.M.P. examinations who fail being required to produce evidence of further study in the subjects in which they appear at a subsequent examination, a second course in Physics, Inorganic Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Hygiene and Forensic Medicine being Optional.
- (q) Modification of clause (i) of Ordinance III relating to 'Admission to the University' (page 1 of the Re-organisation Committee Report).
- (r) Revision of the courses of study and scheme of examination for the several L.M.P. examinations.
- (s) Recommendation to hold a special Certificate Examination in March 1929, for non-promoted students of First Year B.A. class.
- (t) Revision of the course of study for the M.A. Degree Examination in Sanskrit.

At the meeting of the Senate held on the 5th April 1928, the Vice-Chancellor referred to the great losses the University has sustained by the deaths of Mushir-ul-Mulk Mr. Mir Hamza Husein, Professor M. G. Srinivasa Rao and Mr. B. Krishnappa and resolutions expressing its deep regret at the deaths and conveying its deep condolences to the bereaved families were recorded.

**6. Amendments of the Ordinances:** Ordinances 54A (4) and (5), 54A, 67, (91 [e] 1), and clause (i) of Ordinance III of the Re-organisation Committee Report were amended during the year. (*Vide* Appendix 'A' for details).

**7. Faculties:** The *Faculty of Arts* met twice, once jointly with the Faculty of Science, during the year. The business transacted related to the question of the number of days required for keeping terms at the Intermediate colleges and the question of minima for a pass in the Intermediate in Arts and in Science.

The *Faculty of Science* met twice, and once with the Faculty of Arts during the year. The business was in regard to the—

- (1) Minima for a pass in the M.A., and M.Sc., degree Examinations in Mathematics.
- (2) Consideration of the amendment referred by the Senate regarding minima for a pass in respect of the Intermediate Examination in Science

(General) and the Intermediate Examinations leading to Medicine and Engineering.

- (3) The question of Practical Examination in Natural Science subjects for Intermediate candidates.
- (4) Question of minimum attendance on a two-year basis for the Intermediate Course.

Four meetings of the *Faculty of Medicine* were held during the year. The Faculty considered the following subjects:—

- (1) Whether a candidate who failed in Part I of the M.B.B.S. Examination of the first year can be allowed to appear in private at the next examination.
- (2) Extending the course of study in Medical schools from 4 to 5 years.
- (3) Revision of the present courses of study and the scheme of examination for the several L.M.P. examinations.
- (4) Relaxing the rules so as to permit a candidate who fails in an examination to appear again in private for the same examination during the following year.
- (5) The question of holding the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th L.M.P. Examinations twice a year in April and July.
- (6) The question of allowing failed candidates for M.B.B.S. and L.M.P. examinations to appear again in private, without undergoing a fresh course.
- (7) The question of award of the Armugam Gold medal to the successful candidate who obtains the highest number of marks in Medicine at the Final M.B.B.S. Degree Examination.
- (8) The question of introducing two papers in Theory instead of one as at present in Medicine, Surgery, Anatomy and Physiology.
- (9) Minima for a pass in the I.Sc. examination leading to a course in Medicine.

The *Faculty of Engineering and Technology* met once, to consider the recommendations of the Board of Studies and the College Council regarding the revised syllabuses for the B.E. Degree and the amendment of Ordinance 67.

**8. Boards of Studies:** The several Boards of Studies which were reconstituted as from 1st July 1927 met and considered the subjects as per details furnished in Appendix 'B'.

**9. Lectures:** (a) *Readership Lectures.*—A course of five University Readership Lectures was delivered by Praktnavimarsa Vichakshana Rao Bahadur Mr. R. Narasimhachar, M.A., M.R.A.S., etc., in Mysore, on 'The History of the Kannada Literature'.

10. **Publication Board:** The University Magazine was published as usual.

The University Calendar for 1927-28 and a supplement to Volume I of the Calendar for 1926-27 were published.

The University sanctioned, during the year, subventions to the following:—

(1) Rs. 500 to Mr. S. V. Venkateswara Ayyar, Professor of History, Maharaja's College, Mysore, for the publication of his book "Indian Culture through the Ages, Vol. II".

(2) Rs. 350 to Mr. N. D. Ramanujacharya, *Purrottara Mimamsa Bhushana Vidyanidhi*, for publishing his work entitled "Tattvasuddhi" in Kannada.

The printing of the Second Volume of the University Hand-Book of Kannada was in progress. The Council

sanctioned during the year the preparation of a companion volume of extracts illustrative of the historical portion of the Hand-Book.

With a view to encouraging literary work of an advanced standard in Kannada in such subjects as Literature, Philosophy, Science, History and Economics, the University offered during the year two prizes of Rs. 500 each for the two best books in Kannada, on the following subjects and applications were invited from persons desirous of writing books on any of them : -

- (1) Outlines of Indian Philosophy.
- (2) History of Sanskrit Literature.
- (3) History of Mahomedan Civilisation.
- (4) Elements of Economics.
- (5) Elements of Botany.

The works received in response have been referred to a Committee of judges appointed by the University Council.

In connection with the programme of publication in Kannada to be undertaken by the University during the year 1928-29, the University Council at the meeting held in March 1928 appointed a Special Committee to consider the whole question and adopt a definite policy in the matter. The report of the committee since received is under consideration.

The Half-Yearly Journal of the Departments of Arts and Sciences was published as usual. The following constituted the Editorial Board for the year 1927-28:-

In connection with the Ethnographical Survey of the State, the printing of the Second volume of the Mysore Tribes and Castes was completed. This volume which contains 560 pages and 80 typical illustrations will be ready for publication in October next. Manuscripts of as many as 40 tribes and castes with 80 similar illustrations are in print. It is hoped that this volume will be published early next year.

**11. Principals and Professorial Staff;** Drs. E. P. Metcalfe and S. Subba Rao continued as Principals of the Central and Medical Colleges respectively.

Mr. J. C. Rollo continued to officiate as Principal of the Maharaja's College during the absence of Mr. N. S. Subba Rao on other duty. Mr. N. S. Subba Rao returned to duty as Principal on the 20th February 1928. On his being transferred to officiate as Director of Public Instruction, Mr. Rollo resumed charge of the office of the Principal on the 5th April 1928 and was confirmed as Principal on the 12th June 1928.

On the reversion of Mr. S. A. Ramaswamy Iyer, Principal of the Engineering College, Bangalore, in August 1927, to the Public Works Department, Mr. S. H. Lakshminarasappa, Executive Engineer doing duty as Architect was appointed Principal of the Engineering College with effect from the 11th August 1927.

Mr. M. Hiriyanra, M.A., Professor of Sanskrit, Maharaja's College, was granted furlough for six months from the 6th July 1927 and was permitted to retire from service on the expiry of leave. Mr. D. Srinivasachar, Assistant Professor of Sanskrit, was appointed to act as Professor of Sanskrit during Mr. Hiriyanra's absence on leave and was confirmed as Professor from the 6th January 1928.

Mr. M. Sultan Mohiyuddin, Professor of Education, Maharaja's College, who was appointed Deputy Director of Public Instruction in Mysore, was relieved of his duty in the College on the 1st March 1928.

Dr. G. S. Krishnayya, M.A., PH.D. (Columbia), who was appointed Professor of Education entered upon his duties on the 2nd July 1928.

Owing to the institution of the M.A. course in Kannada, a Professorship of Kannada was sanctioned and Mr. T. S. Venkannaiya, M.A., Assistant Professor in the Central College, Bangalore, was appointed Professor and he joined duty on the 18th of November 1927.

Throughout the year Mr. B. M. Srikantia, M.A., B.L., Registrar, Mysore University, acted as Honorary Professor of Kannada in the M.A. class, and the University are deeply appreciative of the generous and invaluable help rendered by him.

14. **Libraries:** (i) *University Library*.—936 volumes were added to the University Library bringing the total to 16,950 volumes including the books and reports received from the University Office. During the year under report, 26 publications of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace were received in the Library in addition to 204 publications received during 1922-27.

The number of visitors to the Library was 7,685. Literature and Sociology attracted the greater number of visitors.

(ii) *Oriental Library*.—182 printed books and 47 manuscripts were purchased for the Oriental Library bringing the total to 12,867 printed books and 10,214 manuscripts.

262 volumes of the Oriental Library Publications were presented to and exchanged with various Public Institutions, Pandits and distinguished scholars, both within and outside India.

*Sarasvati Vilasa*, a Sanskrit Treatise on Hindu Law was completed and published during the year and the following were in progress :—

*The Poor Students' Section of the Library* at the Maharaja's College which has an annual grant of Rs. 400, now contains 775 volumes.

*The Tutorial System.*—As usual, the members of the staff of the Maharaja's College interviewed frequently the students in their departments and discussed with them their studies and in many cases their personal affairs.

**16. Finances:** According to provisional figures, the income of the University from all sources amounted to Rs. 9,71,567 and expenditure to Rs. 10,90,092 against Rs. 11,19,495 and Rs. 10,28,813 respectively in the previous year. A statement of receipts and expenditure is appended. (*Vide* Appendix D.)

The proposal of the Superintendent of the Maharani's College to start a separate hostel for the College students is under consideration.

A Hostel Union was started in the Engineering College and students encouraged to meet and discuss on various subjects of Engineering interest. The Hostel authorities have been urging for the provision of quarters for the Warden of the hostel.

The health of the Boarders in all the hostels was satisfactory all through the year. The Boarders in the Maharaja's College hostel were inoculated as a precautionary measure against small-pox which was raging severely for some time in the town.

*University Lodge.*—The University Lodge at Mysore accommodated 28 boarders and 9 other students had their meals there.

**22. University Union at Mysore:** The University Union, Mysore, exhibited as usual, great activity in all directions. There were 16 debates on important subjects. Lectures on various subjects were given. In November, Sir Jagadish Chandra Bose, Kt., addressed the Union.

The Union also engaged, as usual, in various other activities, *e.g.*, Parliamentary Debate, Study Circle, Elocution Competitions, Dramatic Activities, Games Competitions and Social gathering.

Professor A. B. Mackintosh, M.A., was President during the year. Mr. S. V. Raganna, as usual, proved a most valuable help to the President. All the members of the Managing Committee displayed great enthusiasm and energy.

Rao Bahadur Mr. M. C. Rangiengar provided a prize for an essay in celebration of the Silver Jubilee of His Highness the Maharaja. Mr. J. C. Rollo presented a gramophone and a set of records, a gift which was greatly appreciated by Union Members.

Under the auspices of the Union the Ranna Memorial Volume was produced. This volume has been dedicated by permission to His Highness the Maharaja. The Union made a grant of Rs. 500 to enable this work to be published. It is to be hoped that the results achieved will justify the means, and that the publication of this work will be of substantial advantage to the Union.

The Union Magazine was published in the month of March. An innovation was made in this respect, as the Magazine was distributed free to all members of the Union.

The dramatic activities of the year were notable.

The Vice-Chancellor presided at the Annual Elocution Competitions, and expressed his appreciation of the rhetorical ability displayed by the prize-winners.

The Union Day Celebrations were held on the 17th and 18th February 1928. The Fancy Dress Competition was, as usual, a great success. Mrs. Perston kindly presented the prizes on the Union Day.

Amin-ul-Mulk Mr. Mirza M. Ismail, B.A., C.I.E., O.B.E., Dewan of Mysore visited the Union.

The Government were pleased to permit the Union to extend its library from the Union funds supplemented by the existing annual grant from the University.

Sir Charles Todhunter, K.O.S.I., Private Secretary to His Highness the Maharaja of Mysore, visited the Union on several occasions and kindly lent literature on the subject of the League of Nations.

23. Athletics: Physical exercises received adequate attention in all the Colleges.

**Maharaja's College.**—The Athletic activities of the College comprised the following outdoor and indoor games:—

Cricket, Football, Hockey, Tennis, Volley-ball, Indian and European Gymnastics, Exercises with Indian Clubs, Dumb-bells, Chest-expanders, etc.

A larger number of freshmen than in the previous year took an active part in out-door games and Gymnastics. In honour of the celebration of the Silver Jubilee of His Highness the Maharaja, competitions in field sports were

conducted on the 6th and 7th August 1927 and prizes and medals were awarded to the winners.

Besides taking part in the tournaments, the College teams played against the Colleges and leading clubs in Bangalore in September and December 1927.

**Central College.**—The games that were most popular with the students of the Central College were Cricket, Hockey and Tennis.

A good plot of ground was selected and marked out for hockey in the District Office Compound.

The demand of the cricket and foot-ball teams, can be satisfied only when the plot of ground behind the Central Jail kindly set apart by Government for the College has been acquired and got ready and steps are being taken to

In connection with the Silver Jubilee celebrations, there was a sports Competition open to all students of the College and the winners were presented with prizes in the shape of cups, medals and useful articles. The College teams travelled to Mysore to play matches against the Maharaja's College in Cricket, Foot-ball, Hockey and Tennis, the Central College teams winning in most of them.

An irreparable loss was sustained by the College in the sad and untimely demise of Professor M. G. Srinivasai Rao who was the sole guiding spirit on the sports field and was working incessantly to popularise sports.

**Engineering College.**—A set of 20 students was sent out for the first time to Madras during the Christmas holidays to play a number of Cricket and Hockey matches against the Madras Colleges.

The College won the Sririni Cricket Shield for the second time in succession.

**Medical College.**—The lady students had their Badminton club.

A number of matches were played against local teams, and the College was successful in many. The College Hockey team had the unique honour of winning the Hockey Cup in the Finals during the last Dasara Tournament for the third time in succession. The want of a good play ground for the use of the College is very keenly felt.

*Maharani's College.*—The Tennis club was very active and popular, being the only form of open-air exercise provided for in the College. But owing to want of funds, no tournament was held during the year.

The total strength of the Rover Scout Troop of the *Central College, Bangalore*, during the year was over sixty. The two main items of activities during the year were training in First Aid and in Musketry.

About fifty members attended a course of ten lectures on "First Aid" delivered by Rao Bahadur Dr. C. B. Rama Rao, M.D., of whom twenty-four sat for the Certificate examination of the St. John Ambulance Association. Eighteen of them passed the Examination and were awarded the certificate.

A course of training in musketry was arranged in December last for a batch of 40 members under the supervision of the Officers of the First Battalion, Mysore Infantry, on the Battalion grounds. Due to the intervention of the University Examinations, the training had to be stopped at the end of January and could be completed only during the vacation during April and May. On this account only sixteen were able to complete the training.

The training in musketry continued to be very popular and is eagerly sought after by a large number of students.

The total number of the Rover Scout Troop of the *Maharaja's College* was 86. On the occasion of the Special Convocation of the University held for conferring the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Science on His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General of India, the Rovers of the College were invited to present a Guard of Honour. About 60 Rovers, all in the new Parade uniform, responded, and the smartness and neatness with which they acquitted themselves elicited appreciation of all and the Vice-Chancellor warmly thanked the troop for the splendid 'turnout.'

The Court of Honour worked in the Jubilee Park, and the District Forest Officer was kind enough to instruct the Rovers in the Elements of Botany and Forestry.

The Rovers did splendid Social Service during the Dasara and also in connection with the Exhibition.

The Troop also participated in the All-India Jamboree which was held in Bombay in the month of December.

The Rover party acquitted itself very well and the Organising Commissioner of Boy Scouts in Mysore, warmly thanked the party for having helped him.

The event of the year was the Budipadaga instruction camp which was held during the Christmas. A course of pioneering and axe-manship was gone through.

**24. Medical Inspection of Students:** The first and final year students of the University were as usual inspected by the Medical Officers appointed for the purpose and their reports were under consideration at the end of the year.

Mr. K. B. Madhava, Professor of Mathematical Economics and Statistics, Maharaja's College, Mysore, to whom was entrusted the work of preparing a Statistical Analysis of the results of Medical Inspections conducted during the years 1924-25 to 1926-27, has submitted his report.

**25. Students' Information Bureau:** The Bureau of this University consisted of the following members:—

The work of the Bureau during the year consisted mainly—

- (a) of the provision of information and advice relating to courses in England and in India to a largely increased number of enquirers, and
- (b) of correspondence with the Secretary to the High Commissioner relating to applications, sent through the Bureau, for admission to English Universities and for exemption from certain examinations.

**26. Registration of Graduates:** There were 119 annual subscribers and 32 life-members at the end of the year.

**27. Inspection of Collegiate Classes:** The Junior Intermediate Classes at the several Collegiate High Schools were inspected by the Professorial staff of the University.

**28. Convocation:** At a special Convocation held on the 29th July 1927, the honorary Degree of Doctor of



Science was conferred on His Excellency The Right Honourable EDWARD FREDERICK LINDLEY WOOD, BARON IRWIN OF KIRBY UNDERDALE, P.C., G.M.S.I., G.M.I.E., Viceroy and Governor-General of India, when His Highness the Chancellor presided.

The Tenth Convocation of the University to confer degrees was held on the 3rd November 1927, when His Highness the Pro-Chancellor presided. Sir J. C. Bose, Kt., C.S.I., C.I.E., M.A., D.Sc., F.R.S., addressed the Graduates.

### 29. Recognition of Degrees and Examinations;

1. The Council of the Institute of Chartered Accountants, London, have decided to accept the Graduate certificate of this University as entitling to exemption from the Preliminary Examination of that Institute.

2. The University of Allahabad have amended the Ordinances of that University in order to recognise the Examinations of this University for the purpose of admission of students of this University to that University.

3. In connection with the recognition of the B.Sc. Degree Examination of this University for purposes of admission to the M.Ed. and other higher degree courses of the Leeds University, the authorities of that University have replied that it is not their practice to draw up a list of Universities whose courses are accepted in lieu of their own and that applications from students of this University will receive sympathetic consideration.

4. The Government of India, Department of Education Health and Lands, approved of the recommendation of the Inter-University Board, that the Associateship and Fellowship of the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore, may be regarded as equivalent to the M.Sc. and D.Sc. degrees respectively of Indian Universities, for purposes of admission to the public services.

30. Archaeology: The receipt and expenditure of the Department during the year under report are Rs. 16,742-14-0 (including the budget grant) and Rs. 16,742-14-0 respectively.

The number of monuments surveyed and photos taken of important views by the Archæological Department was 16 and 43 respectively.

113 records consisting of copper plate grants, sannads and stone inscriptions relating to Vaidumbas, Chalukyas,

Cholas, Kalachuryas, Sevunas, Hoysalas, Vijayanagar Kings, Keladi Chiefs, Gersoppa Chiefs, Mysore Kings and others were collected and published in the Report.

The excavation of Chandravalli site in the Chitaldrug District was taken up during the year under the supervision of Dr. M. H. Krishna Iyengar, Professor, Maharaja's College, and a rich find has been unearthed. A detailed report on the find is under preparation.

Some of the new facts gleaned during the year are :—

1. Confirmation of the rule of Satavahanas and Chutus over Mysore both by Archæological finds unearthed by excavating the Chandravalli site in Chitaldrug and by linguistic test noticed in the Annual Report.

2. The Court language during the reign of the Andhras in Mysore was Prakrit, the remnant of which are the so-called Tadbhava words in the Kannada Vocabulary.

3. War between Keladi and Kalasa chiefs.

Mr. B. M. Srikantia, M.A., B.L., Registrar, Mysore University, was invited by the Parishat to preside at the Conference held at Gulbarga and his deputation therefor was sanctioned.

8. Government sanctioned the deputation of Dr. M. V. Gopaldaswami, B.A., B.Sc., Ph.D., Professor of Psychology, Maharaja's College, Mysore, and his staff for exhibiting and demonstrating the apparatus of the Psychology Laboratory of the College, at the All-India Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition held at Madras, in December 1927.

9. Mr. D. Narasimha Moorthy Rao who was at the time in Madison, Wisconsin, represented the Mysore University at the Inauguration of the New President of the University of Washington, in February 1928.

### 32. General:

1. During the year, the University had the honour of a visit by His Excellency the Governor of Bombay and the following distinguished personages:—

(a) Mahatma Gandhi.

(b) Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya.

The visit of Lady Bose with Sir J. C. Bose to the Maharani's College in October last was made the occasion of 'a social.'

2. Government granted Damodar Das Free Foreign scholarships to Mr. H. V. Venkatasubbiah, M.A., for Banking and Mr. C. Rangachar, B.Sc., for Higher Education.

Government were pleased to enhance the scholarship awarded to Mr. S. L. Malurkar to £300 per annum, as a special case.

The Foreign Loan scholarship granted to Mr. B. T. Narayan to study Bio-Chemistry for the degree of D.Sc. at the University of London was extended for a further period of one year by Government.

3. In pursuance of the Senate's resolution passed at the Meeting in April 1927 to take steps to have a complete

census of Graduates of this University and the occupations which they are now filling prepared, arrangements were made during the year to compile a Directory of the graduates. The Directory is in the press and will be issued shortly.

4. Government sanctioned the proposal of the University to invite the Indian Economic Association to hold its next Conference at Mysore, in January 1929.

5. The following distinctions were gained by the Students of the Central and Maharaja's Colleges :—

- (a) Mr. P. N. Krishnaswami, B.Sc., gained an appointment in the open competition for admission to the Indian Audit and Accounts service.
- (b) Mr. K. Rangaswamy, B.Sc., was awarded a scholarship as a Probationer under the Indian Cotton Committee.
- (c) Mr. T. K. Krishnamurti, B.Sc., was given a Probationership under the Millets Specialist in the Madras Agricultural Department.
- (d) Messrs. N. S. Hiriyanaiya, M.A., and G. N. Nagaraja Rao, B.Sc., passed the Mysore Civil Service Examination.
- (e) Messrs. K. Mahomed Ahmed, B.A., and T. N. Srikantaiya, B.A., were appointed as Revenue Probationers.

6. A system of tuition by visiting Professors was introduced for the first time in the College of Engineering, Bangalore, as it was considered to be the best method of co-ordinating the work of the Engineering departments in the State. Messrs. S. G. Forbes, J. Catterson-Smith, and G. H. Krumbiegal, Dr. E. P. Metcalfe, Messrs. John Bhole, and K. Srinivasa Iyengar kindly consented to deliver a course of lectures on their own special subjects.

7. Dr. M. A. Sampathkumaran, Professor of Botany, Central College, was deputed to South India and Ceylon with Dr. Borgesen of Copenhagen to work 'Marine Algae.'

He was appointed by Government as a member of the Scientific Committee constituted for proper co-ordination of work in connection with the investigation of Spike Disease in Sandalwood.

8. A course of six lectures on 'Anthropology' was given by Dr. M. H. Krishna Iyengar, M.A., D.LIT., to the

students of History, Ethics, and Sociology in the 2nd and 3rd year B.A. classes and the M.A. class.

9. In view of the importance of reviving the work of preparing a catalogue of coins which is of great value in the reconstruction and understanding of Indian (and Mysore) History, Government sanctioned temporarily for a period of three years from 1928-29, the proposals of the University for organising a Numismatic Research office at Mysore with Dr. M. H. Krishna Iyengar, M.A., D.LIT., who has specialised in Numismatics, as officer in charge.

10. On the 6th February 1928, the College day of the Maharani's College, was celebrated. Her Highness the Yuvarani graciously presided over the function which was purely Purdah.

11. During the year, the following students were permitted to work in the Laboratories, etc., of the Colleges under the University :—

12. The High Commissioner for India having suggested for consideration whether in the case of students coming to England for further study, it would be possible to make some arrangements for the formal conferment of a degree in advance of the annual ceremonial of Convocation, the University Council resolved that the annual Convocation may be held in the third or fourth week of August instead of in November. This resolution was approved by His Highness the Chancellor and accordingly arrangements were made to hold this year's Convocation on the 23rd August 1928.

Failure to receive a reply from any such candidate within a fortnight after the requisition is sent shall be construed as unwillingness on the part of such candidate to serve as a member of the University Council."

(ii) In clause (5) thereof, (on the same page in line 1, substitute for the words "by the notice" the words "for receiving the replies."

2. That Ordinance 54A (pages 21-23 Vol. I of Calendar Vol. I. for 1926-27) be deleted and that the following be substituted in its place:—

"Election to the University Council by the Senate from among its Fellows.

54A. The election to the University Council of a member or members by the Senate shall be held at a meeting of the Senate in accordance with Rules 56 to 59 of the Rules of Business of the Senate, the balloting for each vacancy being taken separately when there are more vacancies than one.

Provided that no member shall be declared elected unless he gets 50 per cent of the votes actually recorded at the ballot."

3. That Ordinance 67 (page 29 of Calendar for 1926-27, Vol. I) be amended as under :—

That in Ordinance 67 between 'A' Intermediate Examination in Engineering and 'B' Final Examination in Engineering, the following be added :—

"Candidates who have passed the B.A. or the B.Sc. Degree Examination in Chemistry or Physics or in both shall not be required to attend the lectures, practical classes and examinations in such of these subjects as they have already passed their B.A. or B.Sc. Examination. Such candidates shall be given the same percentage of marks as they secured in the B.A. or the B.Sc. Degree Examination."

4. That the Scheme for the Intermediate Examination in Engineering under Ordinance 91 (e) 1), given on pages 140 and 141 of Calendar for 1926-27, Vol. I, be modified as under :—

In column 4 on page 141 substitute, "3" for "2" against item 5 "Geology-Theory"; and change the duration of the Geology Practical paper from 2 to 1½ hours.

5. That clause (i) of Ordinance III relating to "Admission to the University" on page 1 of the Reorganization Committee Report as passed by the Senate be modified as under :—

Substitute the following for the original :—

"(1) Passed the Mysore S. S. L. C. Examination and been declared eligible by the University for admission to College courses of study."

(iii) *Archæological Office*.—Provision for a 'Monograph' on the Hoysala Architecture has been recommended.

(iv) *University Library*.—'Cross references' have been suggested in the Library Catalogue.

(v) *Central College*:—Levy of fees at *half rates* for attending a portion of the term conflicts with Ordinance 96 and requires justification. Under 'Laboratory and Apparatus', it is usual to include *Chemicals* supplied for daily use and *Specimens* required for practical daily work in the Botany and Zoology departments. These items deserve *Separate* mention. The figures for 1927-28 stand as under:—

'Chemicals' ..	..	Rs. 9,500

(vi) *Medical College*:—A *museum* attached to the College will be a valuable adjunct. The Library and Reading Room require expansion.

(vii) *Central College Hostel*.—The arrears due from Boarders on 30th June 1927 were Rs. 1,153-12-0; on 30th June 1928, they were Rs. 849-8-10. Such 'heavy' arrears should be strictly discouraged by enforcing payment of fines for default.

(viii) *Engineering College Hostel*.—Hostel accommodation is in urgent need of expansion. At least 10 more seats have to be provided immediately.

(x) *Maharaja's College*.—The fees in arrears on the 30th June 1928 aggregated more than Rs. 2,100.

(xii) *Maharaja's College Hostel*.—The arrears lists on the 30th June 1928 amount to Rs. 9,209-5-4, including the 'caution' money of 141 Boarders. There is also a sum of Rs. 5,022-1-3 due from *Old Boarders* who left the hostel during 1927-28. These figures are abnormal.

## II. Detailed Running Audit.

Mr. S. Raghavachar, Assistant Comptroller, and Mr. N. Lakshmana Rao, Local Auditor, have audited the University accounts carefully; their reports were made available to the Board of Audit at the University Office. Many defects in the system of keeping accounts have been pointed out in the reports and suggestions made for improvement.

The Board fully appreciates these suggestions and recommends early action on the lines suggested in the reports,

## III. Duties of the Board of Audit.

Agreeably to the Senate Resolution dated 19th November 1927, the University Council appointed a Committee to go into the question consisting of the following members:—

1. Vice-Chancellor.
2. Mr. M. T. Naraniengar (Chairman, Audit Board).
3. Mr. J. C. Rollo.
4. Deputy Comptroller.
5. Rao Bahadur Mr. M. C. Rangiengar.

The Committee met on the 23rd March 1928 and decided as under:—

(i) In respect to test audit of the accounts (Ordinance 27), the Board will have for purposes of audit "access to all the accounts and other records of

the University" as laid down under Section 19 (2) of the Regulation; and accordingly, it may call for and refer to such "accounts and other records" during and at the time of audit, the term "access" in the Regulation meaning access at the Registrar's office.

(ii) To give effect to the provision "consider ways and means and the financial effects of any important measures in contemplation, and make recommendations when necessary to the Council on all matters relating to the finances of the University," the Chairman of the Board be invited to be present at the Budget meetings of the University Council and take part in the deliberations. The Chairman will consult his colleagues on the Board of Audit and make recommendations at the final Budget meeting of the Council.

(iii) The Board may make reports and recommendations to the Council from time to time under Ordinances 26, 27, regarding the results of the test audit of the accounts.

(iv) The annual report of the Board to the Senate will be confined to special features only of the finances of the last preceding year.

(v) The Chairman will be informed of the action taken on each of the reports of the Board to the Council.

#### IV. Important Measures.

(i) *Intermediate Colleges.*—During 1927-28, the old Entrance classes attached to Government Collegiate High Schools were converted into Junior Intermediate classes.

The strengths of the classes at Tumkur and Shimoga appear to be falling. Precautionary measures to prevent an undue fall are necessary.

The following amounts were spent in connection with the Intermediate Colleges during 1927-28:—

(ii) *M.A. and M.Sc. Courses in Mathematics.*—Only two additional posts of Lecturers—one at the Central College and one at the Maharaja's College—have been added to the Staff.

(iii) *Ethnographic Survey.*—Volume II of Mysore Tribes and Castes has been completed. Manuscripts of Volume III are reported to be ready.

(iv) *Transfer of Medical College to Mysore.*—Detailed plans and estimates are under preparation. A provision of Rs. 75,000 has been sanctioned under this head in the Budget for 1928-29.

## VI. University Endowments and their Investments, etc.

During 1927-28, seven fresh endowments aggregating Rs. 11,412 were actually received by the University bringing the total Capital to Rs. 2,67,045. With the exception of Rs. 12,298, the whole amount is invested in Government Securities, Debentures or Charitable Deposits.
