

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1941-42.

1. SEASON.

Northern Division.

The season began with well distributed rainfall over the whole division. The rainfall was generally heavy in July but was insufficient in the latter part of the season. The heavy rains in July damaged the kharif crops while the insufficient rains in the latter part of the season affected the rabi crops. The season however proved to be very favourable for cotton in the Broach District.

Ahmedabad.—The monsoon began in the third week of June with light showers of rain which gave a start to sowing operations. In the first week of July there was good and widespread rain all over the district. In the second week it rained very heavily with the result that the sowing of the crops was retarded. There was then a timely break for three weeks which was followed by fairly good and evenly distributed rain in the second and third weeks of August. In the month of September the rain was inadequate and unevenly distributed while in the month of October there was practically no rain. The rainfall was on the whole above average but being spasmodic and not well distributed in the month of September the rabi crops were not satisfactory. There was a heavy flood in the river Sabarmati in August 1941 which affected adversely to some extent the crops in the riverain villages of the Dholka and Daskroi Talukas and Sanand mahal. Heavy rains caused breaches in the bandhs and tanks which affected the paddy crop in the district. Suspension and remission on these accounts under the suspension and remission rules and also on account of himayat and akasia where paddy crop was unsuccessful were given by the Collector where it was considered necessary. The kharif crops were on the whole satisfactory.

Kaira.—The monsoon commenced in the last week of June and ended in the last week of September. The rainfall was as in the Ahmedabad District, normal and evenly distributed in the beginning but was heavy in the second week of July with the result that the sowing of crops done at the commencement of the rains proved to be a failure and the resowing done in the third week suffered to some extent due to the break in rainfall for three weeks from the middle of July. Owing to the heavy rains all the rivers in the district were often flooded damaging the crops on the riverside lands. There was a heavy flood in the Watrak on the 12th and

13th of August due to abnormal rains in southern Rajputana and caused severe damage to the crops standing on the riverside and lowly lands in the vicinity. Paddy which was transplanted in the second week of August was not successful owing to the shortage of rain in the latter part of the season. The rainfall was heavy but was unevenly distributed. The kharif crops except paddy were however quite successful.

Broach and Panch Mahals.—In the Panch Mahals there was rainfall in the months of July and August only, and it was moreover not evenly distributed. In the western part of the sub-division, paddy was unsuccessful owing to shortage of rains but the other kharif crops were normal. In the eastern part of the sub-division the maize crop was damaged owing to heavy rains in the beginning of the season. The rabi crop also did not thrive owing to the shortage of rain at the close of the monsoon.

In the Broach sub-division the monsoon commenced in the month of June but the rainfall was not sufficient to enable sowing operations being begun. The rainfall in the month of July was very heavy and damaged the crops. The rabi crops also were not quite successful owing to shortage of rains in the end of the season. The season, however, proved to be very favourable for cotton.

The heavy rains in July had caused damage to some buildings in the Jambusar and Wagra Talukas and relief was granted to the sufferers by way of tagai and gratuitous relief.

Surat.—The rainfall was below average and the monsoon was almost confined to the month of July only. The continuous and heavy rainfall in the month of July caused destruction or washing away of the seeds sown at the commencement of the season. The paddy crop failed owing to the uneven rains and Jowari had to be sown in its place but that also did not thrive owing to insufficiency of rains in the latter part of the season. The rivers were in flood in the month of July damaging the crops, cattle and huts in the riverain villages. The sufferers were given gratuitous relief in addition to the usual suspension or remission under the suspension and remission rules.

Thana.—The monsoon commenced timely but the rainfall for the whole season was below average and was unfavourable for sowing. In the first week of July the rains were abnormally heavy which hampered the transplantation of poddy. The rainfall was insufficient in the subsequent months and the paddy was therefore unsuccessful. Remission and suspension were granted under the suspension and remission rules where necessary.

Bombay Suburban District.—The rainfall was below average and unevenly distributed. It was heavy in the beginning and scanty in the latter part of the season. The coastal villages suffered for want of late rains. Suspension or remission where necessary was given under the suspension and remission rules.

The rainfall in each district during the year as compared with the average for the last five years is as under :—

The outturn of kharif crops in the Ahmedabad District ranged from 4 to 8 annas, while in Kaira it ranged from 4 to 10 annas. In Broach and Panch Mahals it was from 4 to 8 annas, in Surat it was from 2 to 7 annas, in Thana it ranged from 3 to 8 annas while in the Bombay Suburban District it was above 6 annas.

Water supply.—Deficiency of water for drinking and domestic purposes was felt in some places in the Division. In the Ahmedabad District the supply was sufficient except in some part of the Gogho mahal and the Bhal tract in the Dhandhuka Taluka. In Kaira the supply was adequate. In Broach and Panch Mahals also it was adequate except in Ankleshwar Taluka where shortage of drinking water was as usual experienced. No inadequacy was experienced in Surat District also except in some part of the Olpad Taluka and the Chikhli and Pardi mahals. In Thana scarcity of water was much felt earlier than usual in the precarious tracts in the junglepatti villages owing to the absence of late rains in the district. In the Bombay Suburban District the supply was adequate.

The following table shows the amounts allotted to the various districts and the expenditure incurred in connection with water supply in precarious tracts :—

The amount of Rs. 2,075 was also spent from the Government of India grant for the repairs to wells at eight places in the Ahmedabad District.

Cattle and fodder.—The supply of fodder was sufficient in the Division. The surplus grass was as usual exported outside to Bombay and to north Gujarat from Palghar, Dahanu and Bulsar Talukas and the Umbergaon Mahal.

Rinderpest, foot and mouth disease and haemorrhagic Septicaemia appeared to some extent in all districts. The number of cattle attacked by the disease and the number of cattle inoculated during the year was as follows :—

In Ahmedabad foot and mouth, haemorrhagic and rinderpest were the principal diseases among cattle. Rinderpest appeared in 175 cases and took a heavy toll of 88 animals. The total number of deaths from the various diseases were however only 110 as against 464 in the previous year. In Kaira also the percentage of death was much lower as compared with the previous year. Ranikhat appeared in 37 cases and caused 32 deaths. In Broach and Panch Mahals there were numerous cases of foot and mouth disease but the number of deaths on that account was very trivial. In Surat also the number of attacks from this disease was equally large but the mortality was comparatively very small. There were however 73 cases of haemorrhagic Septicaemia resulting in 70 deaths. In Thana there were 1,508 deaths from 3,848 attacks. There were 2,329 cases of rinderpest resulting in 1,011 deaths. The aid of the Veterinary Department was availed of promptly as far as possible through inoculation.

Public Health.—Public health was generally good except for the prevalence of epidemic diseases shown in the following table :—

There were 39 cases resulting in 14 deaths from the cerebro-spinal fever as against 24 cases resulting in 8 deaths during the previous year in the Ahmedabad. On account of heavy rains and floods in the district cholera appeared in some of the villages of the Dhoka, Dhandhuka,

Viramgam and Prantij talukas but was effectively checked through prompt measures. Cholera had broken out in Kalol (Baroda Territory) in the vicinity of Ahmedabad but its spread in the city of Ahmedabad was checked by the Municipality which took effective measures to prevent its spread, under the cholera regulations issued under section 2 of the Epidemic Diseases Act, 1897. In Kaira the Municipal Borough had to be declared a threatened area. Cholera did not make much progress. There were very few cases from small-pox during the year and there was only one death.

In Broach and Panch Mahals there were 170 cases from cholera resulting in 83 deaths. These occurred in Broach, Dohad and Jhalod. In Surat there were 97 deaths from cholera as against 154 during the previous year. In Thana the epidemic appeared in the Kalyan and Bhiwandi talukas and took a toll of 121 lives. Small-pox did not spread as in the previous year. There was no epidemic of a severe nature in the Bombay Suburban District.

Central Division.

The monsoon set in regularly in the first week of June except in the East Khandesh, West Khandesh and Satara districts. In the East Khandesh and Satara districts it set in the second and third weeks of June. In West Khandesh it commenced in the second week of July. In July the rainfall was good throughout the division except in the Sholapur district, the eastern part of the Poona district and in a few villages from the ex-Khandala mahal and Man mahal in Satara district. In Peint the downpour was excessive and swept away seedlings, eroded lands, and destroyed bunds in rice lands. The August and September rains were beneficial to the standing kharif crops and for the sowing of rabi crops. In October there was slight rain in the West Khandesh, Nasik, Satara and parts of Poona district. On the whole the season was normal.

Ahmednagr.—The monsoon broke in the third week of June and, though late, it was general throughout the district. Up to the end of July there was good rain sufficient for the growth of the kharif crops already sown. After July there was a long spell which put back the growth of the kharif crops. The rains in August and September though insufficient improved the condition of the kharif crops. This spell was opportune for the sowing of rabi crops. Thereafter there was practically no rain with the result that the yield of kharif crops was below normal and the rabi crops failed especially in light soil.

East Khandesh.—The monsoon commenced regularly from the middle of June. In July there was sufficient rain throughout the district for the growth of the kharif crops. The rainfall in August was insufficient but the situation was improved by the rains in the middle of September. There was no rain from October to December except for some light showers in the beginning of October. There were intermittent showers in January and February. The season was excellent. The final condition of crops was everywhere satisfactory and the yield was much more than normal.

West Khandesh.—The monsoon set in regularly in the second week of July and the rainfall in July was a record. On account of continuous downpour in the second week the sowing operations in Sindkheda, Sakri and Taloda talukas were retarded to some extent, but the short break in the third week improved the situation. During the first week of August the rainfall was generally insufficient but a good soaking rain during the second week improved the general outlook of the season and the condition of the crops continued to be satisfactory. In September the rainfall was general and well distributed except in Nawapur mahal and the condition of the kharif crop was fair. The late October rains failed as only a few cents were recorded during the last week and till the end of December there was no rainfall at all. The season on the whole was satisfactory.

Nasik.—The monsoon opened with a few light showers early in June. In the first week of July it burst heavily in all parts of the district. In Peint mahal the downpour was excessive and swept away seedlings, eroded lands and destroyed the bunds of rice fields. Elsewhere it gave a good start to the crops. The rainfall in August was slight but it was enough to keep the crops in a fair condition. Good rainfall in September proved beneficial to the maturing of kharif crops and also facilitated the sowings of rabi crops. These were further benefited by the October rains which were fair. There was, however, no rain in November and in consequence the Rabi crops did not get as much moisture as needed. On the whole the season was fair in the district except in Peint mahal Sinnar and part of Kalwan talukas.

Poona.—In the western division the monsoon broke in the first week of June. The rainfall was general throughout the whole district in the second week of June. The good rain in July all over the district was beneficial to seedlings. Owing to heavy rain in July the sowing of kharif crops in Khed taluka and the transplantation of paddy in Mawal taluka was retarded. There was sufficient rain in September which helped the growth of the kharif crops. The September rains were also opportune for the rabi sowings. The rainfall in the first week of October was good and the prospects of the rabi crops seemed hopeful but the subsequent drought affected the growth of the rabi crops especially in the eastern part of Khed, Junnar and Haveli talukas and Ambegaon and Mulshi petas and the rabi crops over an extensive area in the eastern division failed.

Satara.—In the last week of June the regular monsoon set in and kharif sowings were completed by the end of the month. The rainfall in July was general throughout the district and very useful to the growth of kharif crops, except in 19 villages in Wai taluka and a few villages in Man mahal. The showers in first week of October proved helpful to the standing kharif crops and for the sowing of the rabi crops. There was however no rainfall after November with the result that the outturn of the rabi crop was not up to expectation. Tasgaon taluka was lucky enough to get good showers early in January and the outturn of rabi crops was excellent. The season was normal.

Sholapur.—The rainfall from June to August was much below normal, particularly in Malsiras and Sangola talukas and practically no kharif crops could be sown. The rainfall in September was considerably above normal and was sufficient for the rabi sowings. There was no rain in October and November except in Sholapur and Barsi talukas with the result that the rabi crops in Malsiras, Karmala Pandharpur, Sangola and Madha talukas withered for want of moisture.

CATTLE AND FODDER.

The condition of cattle was fair in all districts of the Division. Cattle diseases appeared in all districts. The total number of deaths from diseases was 7,092 as against 7,249 in the previous year. The total number of attacks and deaths during the year was as follows :—

The supply of fodder was sufficient in all districts except in a few villages in the eastern part of Khatav taluka and Man mahal and the scarcity affected villages in Khandala peta of Wai taluka, grazing being very poor in this tract owing to paucity of rainfall and the rocky nature of the soil. Tagai for the purchase of fodder in these tracts was granted.

In Sholapur restrictions on the export of fodder and grass prevailed for a part of the year.

WATER SUPPLY.

The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was adequate throughout the Division except in the eastern parts of Purandhar and Haveli talukas and Sirur Peta. Shortage of water for drinking purposes was also felt in a few villages on the Lonand side of Wai taluka and the southern part of Barsi taluka.

PUBLIC HEALTH

The public health was generally good throughout the Division. The following epidemics occurred with the following results:—

Cholera was nowhere of a severe type. The spread of the epidemics was checked by the timely preventive and curative measures adopted by local bodies, local officers and the temporary special medical officers appointed by the Director of Public Health.

Southern Division.

Belgaum.—The regular monsoon commenced on 4th June 1941 as usual and in June and July 1941 the rainfall was well distributed all over the district. The rainfall from August 1941 to March 1942 was less than normal. From November 1941 to March 1942, there was no rainfall at all in Athni, Hukeri and Gokak-talukas, and in the remaining talukas it was insufficient. The showers in April and May 1942 were received throughout the district and were beneficial for the agricultural operations for 1942-43.

The early monsoon was most useful for kharif sowings and the rainfall during the month of July to October 1941 helped their full growth and was also helpful for the rabi sowings. On account of shortage of rain during November 1941 to March 1942, the kharif crops began to wither and rabi crops did not thrive well. Athni taluka suffered badly. On the whole, the season under review was below normal.

Dharwar.—The maximum rainfall registered was 40 inches 11 cents at Hangal, while the minimum was 12 inches 37 cents at Mundargi.

The Mallad talukas had good showers during April and May, and these were helpful in preparing the lands for the sowing of kharif crops.

During this period, Gadag, Navalgund and Ron talukas and particularly Nargund and Mandargi pethas received practically no rain. Whatever was received, helped agriculturists in their preliminary ploughing operations. If these early showers had been followed by regular rainfall in June and July, most of the lands in these talukas would have been under kharif crops. The greater part of the kharif crop sown, however, withered away on account of long breaks till September. The scattered showers towards the end of September, revived the standing crops only partially. There were good showers in October and these helped the wheat and cotton crops in parts of Ron and Navalgund talukas. In Nargund and Mandargi pethas and part of Gadag taluka both these crops failed. Nargund petha was the worst sufferer. In the Mallad tracts all crops did well.

Jowar, rice, wheat and cotton are the principal crops in this district. The large decrease (55,433) of acreage under wheat as compared with that of the previous year, is due to the large tracts in Nargund petha remaining unsown for want of rain. The jowar, rice and cotton acreage however showed some increase (21,346, 3,079 and 60,186 acres respectively).

Bijapur.—The rainfall generally was inadequate, sporadic and unevenly distributed, especially in the northern sub-division of the district. Failure of early rains in this sub-division resulted in poor yield of kharif crops. The unfavourable winds of December and January aggravated the situation, the yield in some villages going below 4 annas: full suspensions of land revenue were therefore ordered and scarcity was declared in 55 villages in Bijapur taluka, 87 in Indri, 93 in Sindgi, 9 in Bagwadi, 23 in Maddabihal and 14 in Badami.

In the southern sub-division rainfall was good in the beginning. The kharif crops thrived owing to fairly satisfactory rains during the kharif season.

The precipitation in August and September was timely and well distributed and helped the cultivators to sow rabi crops throughout the district. Even the unsown kharif area was sown with rabi crops. Barring a few showers in October, rains again ceased after September and both the kharif and rabi seasons were very poor.

Kanara.—Though there was a slight decrease in the rainfall, it was well distributed and the crops were good.

Koleroga of betelnuts made its appearance in the Ankola, Yellapur, Sirsi and Siddapur talukas and in Supa petha and remission of assessment was given in deserving cases. Timely action was taken to check the spread of this pest.

Ratnagiri.—The monsoon set in the first week of June and gave heavy showers for about a week. After a break of two weeks, there was incessant rain in the last week of June and the first week of July. A long break then commenced and scanty rainfall till the first week of September badly affected the standing crops and hampered the work of transplantation with the result that some land had to be left uncultivated in most of the talukas and pethas. The good showers in

the first week of September partially saved the standing crops which were withering. The rainfall in the last three weeks of September and in October, though insufficient in quantity, helped the late crops to come to maturity. After October rains ceased altogether the harvesting of crops was over by November. On the whole, the rainfall in the district was uneven and insufficient in quantity for the purpose of crops, drinking water and irrigation. Owing to the bad season suspension of land revenue to the extent of Rs. 23,142 had to be granted in respect of 73 villages.

Kolaba.—Rains commenced in the first week of June as usual. The monsoon took a normal course except in parts of Alibag and Pen talukas and the whole of Uran mahal. The main crop of paddy in these areas failed altogether and the existence of scarcity had to be declared there. Betelnut, cocoanut, plantain and other garden crops in the Alibag taluka also suffered much as the usual supply of subsoil water on which they depend proved quite inadequate.

WATER SUPPLY.

In Belgaum district, the water supply for drinking purposes, was inadequate except in Hukeri taluka and that for irrigation was inadequate in Athni, Gokak and Chikodi talukas, mainly owing to insufficient rainfall.

In Kolaba district, scarcity of water supply was felt in all scarcity villages and in many others, particularly in kharpat and hilly tracts, in the later stages of summer. Government sanctioned Rs. 8,000 in all for arrangements for the supply of water in Kolaba out of which Rs. 5,000 were for digging wells; and deepening old wells, Rs. 3,000 were also provided for purchasing drums for bringing water.

In Ratnagiri district, water supply in rural area is usually unsatisfactory. Government had sanctioned Rs. 2,000 for the erection of bunds across rivers and nalas; but the grant was not fully utilised.

In other districts, the water supply was sufficient except in places which habitually suffer from shortage in summer.

CATTLE AND FODDER.

The condition of cattle was generally good. Supply of fodder was sufficient except in parts of Navalgund and Gadag talukas and Mundargi and Nargund pethas of Dharwar district; in some parts of Athni taluka in Belgaum district and in Muddebihal taluka of Bijapur district.

EPIDEMICS AND EPIZOOTICS.

Small-pox prevailed in all the districts. Cholera appeared in all the districts except Ratnagiri. Plague also had broken out in Bijapur, Kanara and Dharwar districts. Attacks were incessant throughout the

year in the district of Dharwar. Both preventive and curative measures were promptly undertaken and the epidemic never assumed very serious proportions.

The usual cattle diseases made their appearance, but they were not so severe as to interfere with the agricultural operations. Preventive measures were also taken to check the spread of the diseases.

The accompanying statements show the tagai transactions in the division during the year which ended on 30th September 1942. Recoveries were 11·34 per cent. of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year together with the debits (including writes off and remissions) during the year. Last year the percentage of collection was 15·2.

2. Suspensions were highest, as usual, in Bijapur, viz., Rs. 1,27,871 principal and Rs. 9,689 interest, as against the corresponding figures of Rs. 1,18,116 and Rs. 36,170 for last year. This was due to the normal feature of the district, i.e., bad season in some parts of the district which gave low annewari figures. This resulted in the recovery of only half of the normal instalments being ordered in 273 villages where the annewari was above 4 and below 6 annas. Full suspension was given in 326 villages where the annewari was below 4 annas. Next to Bijapur, in respect of suspended arrears, stands Dharwar, with Rs. 20,877 principal and Rs. 5,694 interest, and Belgaum with Rs. 17,281 and Rs. 73 respectively.

Of the following special schemes, only that at (b) continued working this year :—

- (a) Eradication of hariali by tractor-ploughing in Dharwar,
- (b) "Koleroga" control by spraying operations in Kanara, and
- (c) Improvement of tari and supari garden lands in Siddapur Taluka of the Kanara District.

(a) No loans were advanced during the year on this scheme, which has been postponed by Government for the duration of the war. (G.M., R.D., No. 10070-H/33, dated 8th July 1941.)

(b) The "Koleroga" programme was carried out in the garden tracts of Siddapur, Sirsi and Yellapur Talukas in Kanara District. Only Rs. 949 were advanced during the year on this scheme as the demand for tagai for this purpose was much less than usual owing to the appearance of "Koleroga" only in a mild form this year.

(c) No loans were advanced for this scheme during the year.

3. Unauthorised arrears are heaviest in Bijapur, as usual, amounting to Rs. 1,65,667 principal and Rs. 83,906 interest, as against Rs. 1,63,369 and Rs. 96,391, the corresponding figures for last year. Dharwar comes next with Rs. 43,326 principal and Rs. 13,532 interest, as against Rs. 69,656 and Rs. 18,902 respectively for last year. Out of the unauthorised arrears in this district, Rs. 30,751 remained to be collected on account of gross negligence in issuing demand notices, etc., by the clerk in charge of the tagai compilation work in the Navalgund taluka office. The supervision of this work by the Head Karkun and the Mamlatdar of that taluka was also found to be slack. Regular departmental proceedings were started against the clerk in question and his pay was reduced by Rs. 10 for one year. The Head Karkun and the Mamlatdar have been warned. Besides Navalgund, unauthorised arrears are also heavy in Bankapur, Kalhatgi and Hangal Talukas of the district.

Kanara comes third, where the unauthorised arrears are Rs. 21,231 principal and Rs. 4,417 interest, as against Rs. 24,989 and Rs. 4,646 respectively for the last year. These arrears are heaviest in the Siddapur taluka of the district. Belgaum comes next with Rs. 8,265 principal and Rs. 4,792 interest, as against Rs. 7,621 and Rs. 5,933 respectively for the previous year, which represents 36·4 per cent. of the demand put down for collection. There are no unauthorised arrears in Ratnagiri and those in Kolaba are negligible.

Out of the 3,033 notices, 828, 768 and 449 were from Poona, Nasik and East Khandesh, respectively. In Ahmednagar, West Khandesh and Sholapur, the number was 301, 320 and 216, respectively. In Satara, the number was 151.

There was a decrease in the number of persons proceeded against under Section 148, Land Revenue Code. In Ahmednagar, Sholapur and West Khandesh, the number was 4, 6 and 19, respectively. In East Khandesh, Nasik and Poona, the number was 471, 220 and 279, respectively. There was no case in the Satara district. Except in Satara and Sholapur there was a decrease in the number of cases under Section 154 in all districts. Except in Ahmednagar district there was a decrease in the number of cases under Section 153. There was no case of arrest and imprisonment under Section 157, Land Revenue Code.

Out of 3,544 acres involved in forfeiture in Kanara, 475 acres were sold and 490 acres were entered as Government waste, the remaining area was restored to the original occupants.

15. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

Northern, Central and Southern Divisions.

16. PRICES.

Northern Division.

The staple food in Ahmedabad and Kaira is wheat and Bajri. In the Panch Mahals it is maize, in Broach and Surat it is jowari, while in the Thana and Bombay Suburban Districts it is rice. Prices of these and other grains in all the districts showed a continuous upward trend. The rise was mainly due to war conditions and the shortage of transport facilities. Rice which used to be imported into the province from Burma has totally stopped. The economic condition of the people was on the whole satisfactory owing to the rise in the prices of agricultural products, but with the simultaneous increase in the prices of other daily necessities, the cost of living of agriculturists rose substantially. The speculative increase in the prices of daily necessities was controlled by the Bombay Regulation and Control of Prices Order of 1939. Committees were also appointed to scrutinize prices from time to time and to see that there was no undue profiteering. Special officers were also appointed to check speculative increase where necessary.

Central Division.

The prices of staple foodgrains in each district were as under :—

Ahmednagar.—Due to war conditions the prices of almost all commodities and foodstuffs were on the increase throughout the year. The scarcity of rains and the failure of crops accelerated the rise of prices of foodstuffs to some extent.

East Khandesh.—The prices of Jowari and Bajri were stationary till October 1941. They began to rise from November 1941 owing to the situation and the stopping of extra-provincial export. The average price showed a rise of 25 per cent. for jowar and 24 per cent. for Bajri over the average of the previous year. The prices of cotton ranged from 3 S. 12 Ch. to 6 S. per rupee while those of groundnut ranged from 6 S. to 9 S. 8 Ch. per rupee. The prices were low as compared with the previous year owing to the restricted foreign demand.

West Khandesh.—There was an appreciable rise in prices of all foodstuffs in general due to war. The prices of Jowar, Wheat, Rice, Gul and Sugar in particular had risen considerably.

Nasik.—There was a considerable rise in the prices of all foodstuffs from January 1942.

Poona.—There was a rise in the prices of staple foodgrains from November 1941. The rise in prices was due to the war and also to scarcity in certain parts of the district and for want of sufficient means of communications. The rise to some extent can be attributed to the military camps near Poona. There was a fall in the prices of jaggery and cotton from August 1941 to July 1942 but afterwards there was a rise owing to increased demand.

Satara.—There was rise in prices of Bajri and Jowar and this was due to the continuance of the war and a tendency to hoard grains on the part of the public.

Sholapur.—The prices of Jowar were steady. The prohibition on the export of Jowar had a very salutary effect in conserving stocks for the district and in checking the rise in the prices of Jowar.

Southern Division.

Until December 1941, the prices of principal foodgrains were steady. Since then prices began to rise. The prices of jowar, wheat, turdal and pulses have risen enormously owing to the war situation. Steps have been taken to control the prices of the essential articles.

17. LABOUR AND WAGES.

Northern Division.

The wages of both skilled and unskilled labour showed no appreciable change, except in respect of unskilled labour in Ahmedabad and skilled labour in Surat where there was some rise. Skilled labour had not sufficient work owing to the decline in building and other activities caused by war conditions but the factories and workshops run by Government in some districts provided ample work to them with increased rates of wages. The harvesting of cotton and the ginning industry in Broach provided a large number of labourers from Kathiawar. Thana District being in close proximity to Bombay both skilled and unskilled labourers especially from Thana, Kalyan and Bassein found employment as usual in Bombay at higher wages than they could get locally. The woollen mill at Thana, rice mills at various places in the district, match factories at Thana and Ambernath, salt works at Bhayandar, Rai and Belapur, brick works at Kalyan and Bhiwandi, etc., provided sufficient work for both skilled and unskilled labourers from the district as well as from other parts of the Division.

Central Division.

The supply of labour was plentiful throughout the year and the rates for wages both for skilled and unskilled labourers remained steady in all the districts except in Poona, Nasik and Ahmednagar. On account of the continued Military activities the labouring classes from Poona City, Ahmednagar and Nasik and the surrounding villages found employment throughout the year at higher rates of wages than they would have been able to get locally in ordinary times. As usual the Spinning and Weaving Mills in Khandesh and Sholapur, the sugar factories in Ahmednagar, Nasik and Poona, the gul factories in Ahmednagar and the bidi factories in Nasik continued to absorb a large number of labourers from the countryside.

Southern Division.

The supply of labour was generally equal to the demand in all districts except in Bijapur where, owing to the poor season, test works were started by the District Local Board and the Public Works Department to provide labour for the needy. Labour was also provided to some extent by the grant of tagai in all talukas of the northern sub-division of Bijapur District. Wages were steady except in the urban areas of Dharwar District and in the Kanara and Ratnagiri Districts where there was a slight increase. The wages for skilled labour in Ratnagiri showed a tendency to rise but there was not much scope for the increase as the works requiring skilled labour were not much in progress. In consequence of low wages as against the inflated prices of almost all commodities, the labouring classes were hard hit.

Famine.—There was no famine during the year but the harvest was very poor in some parts of the Panch Mahals and Thana owing to irregular and insufficient rainfall. The area affected in the Panch Mahals was the Dohad Taluka and Jhalod Mahal. The distress was aggravated by the rise in prices. Some scarcity works were opened in the tract in addition to cheap grain shops for which a grant of Rs. 15,500 was sanctioned. In Thana scarcity was declared in 28 villages of Dahanu Taluka, 69 villages of Palghar Taluka and all the villages of Umbergaon Peta. Gratuitous relief in the form of weekly doles was given in the affected area to the extent of Rs. 43,500. Scarcity works were also opened, for which a grant of Rs. 1,94,000 was sanctioned. Cheap grain shops were opened at the cost of Government, from contributions made by the public and also from the permanent Famine Relief Fund of the Province at various places in the affected area. Free kitchens were also opened in Umbergaon Peta at a cost of about Rs. 3,000. Tagai was freely distributed for purchasing seeds, etc., for use in the season of 1942-43.

Subordinate Revenue Service Corruption.—No cases of corruption were brought to notice except a few in the Kaira and Thana Districts which are still under enquiry. Instructions according to the orders of Government issued from time to time were given to subordinate officers.

Progress made in the maintenance and repairs to small irrigation works in charge of the Revenue Department.—A grant of Rs. 20,555 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation works in charge of the Revenue Department in the division during the year 1941-42 and it was distributed as under :—

In Ahmedabad an amount of Rs. 4,155 was spent in the Sanand Mahal and Dholka Taluka. Government also allotted a special grant of Rs. 9,607 for repairs to tanks and bunds in the district damaged by heavy rains and floods in the Sabarmati River. In Kaira the whole amount allotted for the district was utilised and all the works were carried out. In Broach and Panch Mahals the amount was utilised for repairs to tanks in Ankleshwar and Jambusar Talukas. In Surat 68 tanks were repaired at the cost of Rs. 9,900.

Central Division.

Famine.—Scarcity was declared in the Karmala, Madha, Pandharpur, Sangola and Malsiras Talukas of the Sholapur District from 9th February 1942. It extended till after 31st June 1942. As a result of the scarcity the following measures were taken :—

(a) *Gratis relief.*—The maximum number of grain dole recipients was 2,812 up to 25th July 1942 and the total expenditure up to 31st July 1942 was Rs. 12,734.

(b) *Cash doles.*—Cash doles amounting to Rs. 9,732 were given to inferior village servants in the villages under full and half suspensions.

(c) *Scarcity works.*—To provide labour in the affected areas scarcity works were started in all talukas except Malsiras where the P. W. D. work was already in progress, and work was available in the cane plantations. The maximum number of labourers for the period from February to July 1942 was 1,833 on 11th June 1942. The expenditure on the scarcity works was Rs. 31,873.

(d) Tagai loans to the extent of Rs. 47,569 were granted.

(e) The expenditure incurred for supply of water amounted to Rs. 3,723.

(f) An amount of Rs. 2,137 out of the fund at the disposal of the Sholapur District Famine Relief Committee was spent for purchase of clothes, viz., dhotis and sarees for decrepits.

Due to the absence of opportune and sufficient rainfall, the rabi crops particularly in the Southern Division of the Ahmednagar district failed. Government, therefore, by their Resolution No. 5854/39, dated 18th March 1942, declared scarcity in Nagar, Shrigonda, Parnar, Shevgaon talukas and Pathardi, Jamkhed and Karjat mahals. To relieve the situation the following measures were adopted :—

(a) Grain doles to decrepits and inferior village servants in villages under full suspension was given. This relief was extended to villages varying from 12 to 29 under half suspension in Karjat mahal on 17th May 1942.

(b) Twelve scarcity works under the supervision of the District Local Board and one under that of the Public Works Department were started. The number of persons on works and on doles rose to 1,919 and 2,015 respectively in June 1942.

(c) Kadi was purchased out of the amount of the District Famine Relief Trust Fund, Ahmednagar, at different places in the affected areas and was given to the agriculturists in the form of tagai. The amount so advanced was Rs. 12,500.

(d) Measures for the supply of water were taken. Water servers were appointed for scheduled classes in the areas in which genuine complaints were received.

(e) Tagai loans were granted on a liberal scale.

Due to the failure of early rains in the Eastern Division of the Poona district it was hardly possible to raise kharif crops except in parts of Parandhar taluka and Sirur peta. The Eastern Division is predominantly rabi and the agricultural season depends on rabi rains. The rabi crops fared well in the beginning but due to the complete failure of the late rabi rains the crops failed and scarcity prevailed in a wide area in the Eastern Division especially in the non-irrigated tracts and also in the eastern part of the Haveli taluka of the Western Division. The number of villages in each of the affected talukas and mahals where the annewari of crops was four annas or under are given below :—

Though scarcity was not declared various relief measures were taken to alleviate the distress as detailed below :—

(a) The export of fodder was prohibited from February 1942 from the Eastern Division. The ban was only removed in July 1942 when green grass was available as a result of the general rainfall in the district.

(b) Most of the labour from the affected areas had already been absorbed on the extensive Military works. As there was no Military work in Sirur pata one District Local Board test work was started from 15th February 1942. Government undertook to bear 80 per cent. of the total expenditure of the work.

(c) To provide labour for those who had, for any reason to stay at home, grants to the extent of Rs. 15,000 were sanctioned for the execution of petty village water supply works of an urgent nature. A further grant of Rs. 6,000 was also sanctioned for the execution of petty road works in the affected areas.

(d) Gratuitous relief to the extent of Rs. 2,035 up to August 22nd, 1942, was granted to the infirm and decrepit inferior village servants and low paid patils.

(e) An allotment of Rs. 45,000 was placed at the disposal of the Prant Officers for advancing tagai loans.

No formal declaration of scarcity or famine condition was issued in the Satara district. Owing to the failure of rains in the 17 ex-Khandala villages in Wai taluka and 7 villages in Man mahal, suspension of land revenue was granted. To provide relief to the needy persons, a District Local Board test work, viz., repairs to the Khandala-Lonand Road, was started. For this purpose an allotment of Rs. 3,000 was sanctioned by Government. The work was stopped on 15th June 1942 for want of sufficient labourers. The total expenditure on this work was Rs. 1,277. An amount of Rs. 5,200 was sanctioned for gratuitous relief in the above villages. An allotment of Rs. 1,152 was also sanctioned for cash doles to inferior village servants.

(i) CORRUPTION IN SUBORDINATE REVENUE SERVICE.

No cases of corruption in the subordinate service were noticed during the year.

(ii) IMPORTANT EVENTS.

His Excellency the Governor visited Belgaum and Dharwar districts from 27th to 30th August 1941, met the War Committee members and received the deputations on behalf of the Lingayats of the Karnatak and the Muslims.

There was a partial failure of crops in Ratnagiri district due to insufficient rainfall during the year. The Advisers, Revenue and Finance, paid visits to some villages in the Ratnagiri, Sangmeshwar and Chiplun talukas in Ratnagiri district with a view to study the scarcity situation on the spot.

(iii) FAMINE.

There was no famine or scarcity in Belgaum, Kanara and Ratnagiri districts during the year under report.

Dharwar.—Owing to scarcity conditions prevailing in Nargund petha, gratuitous relief was granted to the inferior village servants and an additional circle inspector was appointed for the supervision of the scarcity works. In all, a sum of Rs. 526 was spent. No part of the district was declared a famine-stricken area.

Public Works Department and District Local Board works were started in almost all the scarcity areas in order to provide work. The expenditure under the head "54-A—Famine Relief" during the year was Rs. 29,868. Scarcity conditions continue to prevail up to date and proposals for the continuance of the distribution of doles to destitutes and cash doles to inferior village servants till the end of December 1942 have already been submitted.

Kolaba.—As rainfall was far below normal, scarcity was declared in parts of Alibag and Pon talukas and the whole of Uran mahal. Suspension of land revenue aggregating Rs. 3,46,210 and remission of Rs. 8,230 were granted in the areas affected by scarcity. Tagai was advanced for giving relief to the agriculturists as shown below :—

Public Works Department works were also taken up as a further measure of relief. One head karkun, one circle inspector and a peon were appointed to look after the scarcity works and an amount of Rs. 437-5-0 was expended for this purpose.

Suspension of half the land revenue on garden lands in Alibag taluka was granted by Government.

(iv) REPAIRS TO SMALL IRRIGATION TANKS.

An amount of Rs. 4,453 was spent during the year on repairs carried out by the Revenue Department to small irrigation works in the districts of Dharwar and Kanara.

(v) EMIGRATION AND IMMIGRATION.

There was some emigration from Nargund petha in Dharwar district due to scarcity conditions prevailing in 19 villages. Thirty-seven persons including women and children emigrated to South Africa from Mangaon and Mahad talukas in Kolaba district.

(vi) WORKING OF THE MATHERAN HILL STATION IN KOLABA DISTRICT.

The Mamlatdar of Karjat, subject to the control of the Collector, continued to be in charge of the revenue administration, while the Divisional Forest Officer, Alibag, continued to be in charge of the forest administration of the Hill. The Municipality carried on the work falling within its sphere under the law. St. Paul's Church of Matheran was looked after by the Medical Officer who is a municipal servant.

20. RESIDENTIAL SCHEMES IN BOMBAY SUBURBAN DISTRICT.

Northern Division.

I. An area of 60,178 square yards worth Rs. 1,97,587 was disposed of during the year ending 31st July 1942 for residential and industrial purposes in S. S. Nos. I-Kurla-Kirol—Industrial Area, III-Chembur Garden Suburb, Sectors A and C, VI-Danda Sea Side Estate, VII-Khar Model Suburb, Sectors AB and CD, XVI-Andheri Sector of Sahar, XVII C. S. Tramway, Kurla. The land sold for industrial

purposes at Kurla measured 3,333 square yards. The area disposed of during the years 1939-40 and 1940-41 was 27,974 and 23,988 square yards, respectively. The disposal of the land during the year under report was of more than double the area as compared with the figures for the previous years which is very satisfactory.

II. *Town Planning Schemes.*—(a) The works in the two Town Planning Schemes, Nos. III and VI of Bandra have not been commenced because of the high costs of materials. The Bandra Municipality has requested the Collector for the above reason to allow it to postpone the works due. The matter is under consideration. The Consulting Surveyor to Government has been consulted in the matter.

(b) *Santa Cruz Town Planning Scheme No. V* is still with the Consulting Surveyor to Government awaiting Government orders to proceed with the scheme. The Bandra Municipality has been requested to pass a resolution under section 45A of the Town Planning Act in respect of the Town Planning Scheme and on its receipt, it will be sent to Government for issuing orders for the appointment of an Arbitrator.

(c) *Town Planning Scheme, Bandra.*—The draft scheme was submitted to Government in January 1942 which has since been sanctioned and an Arbitrator has been appointed.

(d) The making of Town Planning Scheme No. IX was sanctioned by Government in January 1941, but the Bandra Municipality has not yet prepared and published the scheme.
