1. SEASON.

Northern Division.

The season began with promising rainfall over the whole division but the long intervals in July and August-September resulted in the failure of kharif crops almost everywhere. The later rains in September helped the rabi crops but conditions were unsatisfactory in Ahmedabad, Kaira and the Panch Mahals sub-division. In Viramgam and the Panchal tract of Dhandhuka taluka in Ahmedabad district, and Godhra, Dokad and Jhalod of the Panch Mahals sub-division scarcity had to be declared and works were opened to provide employment.

Ahmedabad.-The monsoon began in the second week of June and made a good start on the 9th and 10th but thereafter there was practically no rain till the end of the month. In July there was good rain during the first fortnight but there was then a long break till 20th August. The holding up of the rains affected the sowing operations. From 21st August there was good rain all over the district which continued more or less till the first week of September. After that the rainfall practically ceased. Kharif crops, viz., Jowari, Bajri, and paddy failed for want of early rain. Pachhotar jowari was sown after the late rain but the yield was poor owing to the lack of later falls. The late rains helped cotton and wheat crops but as the total rainfall was much below normal the outturn was not satisfactory. On the whole the season was unsatisfactory for the kharif erops and poor for the rabi crops. The condition of Virangam taluka and the Panchal tract of Dhandhuka taluka was extremely bad owing to the drought. Scarcity was in the first instance declared in Viramgam, Dholka, Dhandhuka talukas and Sanand and Modasa mahals in the month of August but the later rains generally improved conditions except in Viramgam taluka and ar Bk Ca 45-1

the Panchal tract of Dhandhuka taluka where scarcity works had to be opened. Relief had however to be given throughout the district by suspensions and remissions of land revenue and the grant of takavi to the agriculturists.

Kaira.—The monsoon began from the second week of June. The rainfail during the year was below normal throughout the district. There were two long intervals in the months of June and July-August of three and five weeks respectively when there was absolutely no rain. Rain during the last week of August helped the situation when paddy and tobacco were transplanted and jowari for fodder was sown. But the crops did not yield a good return owing to the lack of rain after the third week of September and on the whole the season was not satisfactory.

Broach and Panch Mahals.—The monsoon began in the second week of June. In the Panch Mahals sub-division the total rainfall nearly reached the average but being very untimely the crops had failed and scarcity had to be declared and scarcity works opened in Godhra, Dohad talukas and Jhalod mahal. In Broach, the early rainfail gave promise of a good season but a long interval in August changed the situation. Kharif crops almost failed but the loss was made good by the rabi crops which were considerably improved by the rainfall during the last week of August. During the year, there was a heavy flood in the river Narbada which caused damage in the riparian villates of Broach and Ankleshwar talukas but there was no loss of human life or cattle. Relief was given by Government and charitable persons.

Surat.—The rainfall during the year was below normal but the condition of all the crops except rice was satisfactory. It was insufficient for rice and relief was given in the form of remission of himayat and akasia assessments.

Thana—The monsoon began in the second week of June except in the coastal area where it began later. The rainfall was scanty in Dahaou taluka and Umbergaon mahal in August but in the remaining parts of the district the short interval in August was not felt owing to sufficient rain during the second fortnight of July, except that the transplantation work had to be done little later. The early disappearance of the rainfall during the month of September had however a very bad effect on the outturn of the crops throughout the district. The rainfall during the year was below normal and not well distributed and the season was on the whole not quite satisfactory.

Bombay Suburban District.—The monsoon began in June but the rainfall during the month was insufficient and sowing and transplantation operations had to be delayed till better rainfall in July. In August again there was shortage of rainfall but the rainfall in September made good the deficit and improved the situation. The rainfall during the year was below normal but the season was on the whole satisfactory.

The rainfall in each district during the year as compared with the average of the last five years is shown below :---

The outturn of kharif crops in Ahmedabad was from 1 to 10 annas, while in Kaira it was from 1 to 8 annas. In Broach and Panch Mahals it was from 3 to 10 annas, in Surat it was 3 to 10 annas, in Thana it was from 6 to 9 annas while in the Bombay Suburban District it was from 7 to 8 annas.

Water-supply.—Deficiency of water for drinking and demestic purposes was felt in some places owing to shortage of rainfall. In Ahmedabad Viramgam and Dhandhuka talukas were badly affected. A few bores were sunk to relieve the situation; but this is always risky as the water is often salt. In Kaira the supply was found to be adequate in winter but during summer hardship was felt in some villages. In Broach and Panch Mahals, the supply was adequate except in the scarcity area in the Panch, Mahals. In Surat it was sufficient. In Thana the usual scarcity of water was felt in jungle patti villages. The supply was adequate till the end of March but in the summer scarcity was very keenly felt. In the Bombay Suburban District the supply was barely adequate.

Cattle and fodder.—The supply of fodder was sufficient in Surat, Thana and Bombay Suburban District while in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach and Panch Mahals the deficiency was serious. In Ahmedabad 2,000,000 lbs. of grass had to be imported. The shortage was intensified by the severe famine in the neighbouring States of Kathiawar from whence a considerable number of half-starved cattle strayed or were driven in. In Kaira 400,000 lbs. had to be imported. In the Panch Mahals fodder had to be given out by Government as tagai. Parts of Surat and Thana grew surplus grass and it was supplied mainly to Gujerat and Kathiawar.

Rinderpest, foot and mouth disease and hæmorrhagic septicæmia appeared more or less in all districts.

The number of attacks and the number of cattle inoculated during the year was as follows :---

In Ahmedabad rinderpest and h=morrhagic septicæmia took a heavy toll of 222 and 112 .cattle respectively. The deaths were mainly in the scarcity area. A veterinary dispensary was conducted at Sanand out of the village improvement funds. It was transferred during the year to the District Local Board. In Kaira the percentage of deaths was lower as compared with the attacks and this was due to the timely and precautionary measures taken by the public with the aid of the Veterinary Department; Galsundho and Mobaso or Khervalo however caused many deaths as compared with other diseases. In Broach and Panch Mabals there were 2,947 attacks resulting in 336 deaths. The major portion of deaths with less attacks was in the Panch Mahals where there were 275 fatal cases out of 884 attacks. The main diseases which caused these heavy losses were rinderpest and hæmorrhagic septicæmia. Out of the total of 202 deaths in Surat, 125 were from 136 attacks of hænorrhagic septicæinia. Rinderpest also took a toll of 29 cattle out of 69 which were attacked by that disease. In Thana too the same two diseases caused many casualties. The aid of the Veterinary Department was availed of by all the tulukas except Bassein and Shahpur which were free from cattle diseases. There were no deaths among the inoculated cattle.

Public Health.-Public health was generally good except for the prevalence of epidemic diseases as shown in the following table :--

Cerebro-spinal fever (meningitis) has been effectively controlled in Ahmedabad. There were 41 attacks resulting in 16 deaths as against 52 attacks resulting in 29 deaths during the previous year. Small pox was the main epidemic during the year and it caused 2,101 deaths as against 409 during the last year. Steps were taken to check the epidemic by re-vaccination in the areas affected. Cholera appeared in Bardoli, Chorasi, Pardi and Chikhli talukas, but effective measures to check its spread were taken. The epidemic caused 9 deaths only as against 214 during the last year.

Central Division.

The monsoon set in early in June. The rainfall in that month was sufficient except in parts of Ahmednagar and East Khandesh districts. In July the rainfall was general and sufficient in Ahmednagar, East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik and Satara districts. Absence of rain for a considerable time was felt-in parts of Nasik, Poona and Sholapur districts. This resulted in slight damage to the standing kharif crops. In parts of Ahmednagar, Poona and Sholapur districts anxiety was felt owing to the absence of rains till the end of the first half of August. The rainfall in the second half of August and September was however useful for the standing kharif crops as well as for the sowing of rabi crops in all the districts. In parts of Satara district there was no rain from the second fortnight of September to the end of the third week of October and as a result of this, the area was infested by insects which did considerable damage to the standing crops.' The absence of rain coupled with cold winds in parts of the Sholapur distric; affected the standing rabi crops. In the other districts the condition of crops was normal. The season was on the whole fair.

The situation in each district was as follows :---

Ahmednagar.—The start of the monsoon was timely this 'year. There were good showers in the southern and the eastern parts of the district during the month of June. These rains were not general. There was 'no rain in the hilly portions of Jamkhed peta. The north-western parts of the district comprising Akola, Kopargaon, Rahuri, Sangamner and Parner talukas also received deficient rain. The rains in the month of July were general and sufficient. The last week of July and most of August were almost dry. This prolonged break created anxiety. Kharif crops in the lighter soils showed signs of withering for want of sufficient moisture. The southernmost parts of the district received some rain during the last week of August, but was not sufficient to improve the agricultural situation. Light showers which fell in the second half of September and the first week of October proved useful and prevented actual scarcity conditions developing in Parner and Shrigonda talukas and Karjat and Jamkhed mahals. At the second and third week of October and the beginning of November there was good rainfall which improved the condition of the rabi crops. The season on the whole was fair.

East Khandesh.—The regular monsoon commenced in the middle of June. The fall in June was below normal and insufficient for sowing in Yawal taluka, Bhadgaon and Edlabad petas.

The fall in July was adequate and it enabled the undertaking of sowing operations. From the middle of July to the middle of August there was very little rain causing anxiety which was however relieved by the rains in the last week of August. Abundant rains fell in the month of September and the crops recovered well. Further rains in October and November assured a good season.

West Khandesh.—The monsoon commenced in the first week of June with the result that the agriculturists could undertake preparatory tillage of lands for cultivation.

During the month of July the fall was timely and well distributed in all the talukas of the district. The kharif crops thrived well. There were good rains in the month of August which helped to promote the growth of kharif crops to normal. In September the rainfall was generally sufficient all over the district and the standing kharif crops assured a normal season. The rainfall during the last week of October was beneficial for sowing rabi crops. The season was on the whole good.

Nasik.—The monsoon commenced early in June. The rainfall in June was general and sufficient. From the second half of July to the end of the first half of August there was no rain. As a result of this absence of rain the kharif crops suffered to some extent. The timely rainfall in the second half of August however improved the situation. Owing to deficient rainfall in September the rabi crops could not be sown to the full extent. The fall in October was just sufficient for the growth of the already sown rabi crops. The season was on the whole fair.

Poona.—Western Division.—The monsoon broke out in the second week of June in all the talukas and petas excepting Mawai taluka and Mulshi peta where it set in as usual in the first week of June. There was a break in the rains from the middle of July to the last week of August in all the talukas except in Mawai where owing to absence of rain during this period rice and nagali crops suffered to some extent. The potato crop in the deshi part was also affected. In Haveli taluka the sowing operations were delayed till the end of July on account of scanty rains. However the September and October rains were sufficient and opportune and the crops thrived well except in Haveli taluka where the kharif crops suffered from want of more rain. These crops were therefore prematurely removed and rabi crops were sown. On the whole the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed.

Eastern Division.-The monsoon broke out in the second week of June. It was general and sufficient to undertake kharif sowing except in Purandhar taluka where the sowing operations were postponed till the middle of July owing to scanty rainfall. The rain in the month of August favoured the growth of the kharif crops. In the Bhimthadi taluka the season was encouraging for the kharif crops till late in July, but insufficient rain in the months of August and September affected the kharif and rabi crops. In Sirur and Dhoud petas the sowing operations of the kharif crops were not undertaken till the last week of June and were completed by the middle of July. There were occasional good showers throughout July which were useful for the newly sown kharif crops. The rain from August to October helped the growth of the crops. There was practically no rain in these petas after October and therefore the kharif crops suffered to a great extent. In almost all the villages in Dhond peta there was severe cold which damaged the rabi crops in 34 villages and gave a low yield in 21 villages. In Indapur taluka the rainfall was scanty throughout the year and consequently there was no sowing of cotton, bajri and other kharif crops. The September rains though scanty, were opportune for the rabi crops which were sown extensively in the taluka. The rabi crops were however affected by diseases known as chiktya and khayarya and the yield was therefore on the whole very poor.

Satara.—The regular monsoon set in the last week of June. The sowing operations of kharif crops was commenced in the first week of July and almost finished by the end of that month. The rainfall during the month of July was general. There was a break in the rainfall in the month of August. In the ex-Khandala viliages in Koregaon taluka the rainfall was scanty. In these viliages and in some parts of the Koregaon taluka the crops withered for want of sumeient rains. There was sufficient rainfall during the first fortnight of September and the kharif crops therefore thrived well. There were no rains from the second fortnight of September to the end of the third week of October. The result was that insects locally called "Lodes" made their appearance in the billy parts of Satara, Javli and Patan talukas and Shirala and Mahableshwar mahals. They caused considerable damage to crops in Javli, Patan and Satara talukas. There were good showers in the last week of October and in the first week of November all over the district. They were very useful for kharif and rabi crops. Except in the ex-Khandala villages the general outturn of crops was satisfactory.

Sholapur.—The imonsoon commenced in the first week of June. The rainfall in June was sufficient for the kharif sowing throughout the district. There was however no rain in July and August and as a result of this the kharif crops in most parts of the district withered. The situation threatened to take a serious turn in the first half of September as there were no rains till then. The rainfall in the second half of September however saved the situation. The rains at that time were sufficient for the rabi sowings. The rabi crops fared well till the middle of November. Then followed an unusual dry atmosphere and also cold winds. Consequently the jowar crop suffered to a considerable extent. There were no further late rains and the rabi season turned out to be poor. On the whole, the agricultural position was not satisfactory.

Cattle and Fodder.—The condition of cattle was fair in all the districts. Though diseases such as rinderpest, foot and mouth disease, hæmorrhagic septicæmia, blackquarter and anthrax, etc., prevailed they were not serious enough to affect the agricultural operations. The total number of deaths from disease was 5,128 as against 6,669 in the previous year. The total number of attacks and deaths was as follows :—

The supply of fodder was sufficient in all the districts of the division except in the Sinnar taluka of the Nasik district and in the Khatav taluka and Man peta of the Satara district where the supply was deficient from August to October. Scarcity of fodder was also felt in the ex-Khandala villages in the same district. Tagai was freely granted in the Satara district for the purchase of fodder to those who were in need of it. Water Supply.—The supply of water was generally sufficient for drinking and irrigation purposes except in parts of Nasik district, *viz.*, Pent mahal, dangi parts of Nasik and Dindori talukas and Yeola town.

Public Health.-The public health was on the whole good. The following epidemics prevailed and the toll taken was as under :---

Cholera was nowhere of a severe type. Prompt measures such as anti-cholera inoculations and the free supply of cholera pills and permanganate of potash helped to check the epidemic. Small-pox was also general, but it was not of a severe nature. The greatest number of those who succumbed to the disease was in West Khandesh. Plague took a heavy toll in the Sholapur district and particularly in the Sholapur city and taluka and in the Barsi, Madha and Pandharpur talukas. Special anti-plague measures were adopted with the help of the Public Health Department. 18 medical officers under a Plague Preventive Officer were appointed in Sholapur and Barsi talukas to inoculate persons both in affected and non-affected villages. One special plague duty aval karkun was also appointed in these talukas to render help to the medical officers and to persuade the public to get themselves inoculated. Besides inoculation, rat campaign demonstrations through advertising motor-cars were specially arranged. These intensive measures lasted for a period of about 7 months.

Southern Division.

Belgaum.—There was complete absence of the valuable premonsoon showers. The monsoon set in in the second week of June and was somewhat excessive in the rice tracts. Rabi crops suffered from late sowing owing to inadequate rain in the first half of August and also from drought in November and subsequent unfavourable winds. The total rainfall was however more than normal in all the talukas.

There was an increase in the area under sugarcane, groundnut, safflower and jowar and a decrease in the area under rice and bajri.

The anna valuation was nowhere below seven annas.

Bijapur.—In the northern half of the district though the rainfall figures of June and July appear adequate, distribution was uneven so that kharif crops had a rather poor start. A plague of field-rats did extensive damage with the result that sometimes crops had to be sown two or three times. The pest was kept under with the use of barium carbonate pills and disappeared with the heavy rains in September. The southern talukas had a good monsoon the incidence of which was particularly favourable to the groundnut crop. Rabi crops did better than kharif and the season was generally very good. Only one village was given full suspension and eight half suspension.

Dharwar.—Premonsoon showers were light but useful. The monsoon set in in the second week of June. The rainfall of July and August was short and failed to fill the tanks in all the paddy areas except Kalghatgi. The non-irrigated crops in the malnad tract fared well, and the season was favourable in the transition and desh areas though grass-hoppers did some damage to jowar in parts of Haveri and Ranebennur talukas; wheat suffered slightly from the scanty rain in November and cotton and rabi-jowar in Ron and Gadag talukas and Nargund petha suffered from unfavourable winds in December and January. Half suspension of land revenue was granted in the villages on the borders of Ron taluka and Nargund peta.

Kanara.—The rainfall was good and the season satisfactory. Suspensions were given in one village in Kumta and resuspensions in some villages in Bhatkal and Honavar.

Kolaba.—The monsoon began well but later rains were scanty and unseasonable and the rice crop, especially in salt lands, was unusually poor.

Ratnagiri.—The monsoon began well but a complete break during the last week of July and the first fortnight of August considerably affected the outturn.

Crops were damaged by karpa in 90 villages in Mandangad, Vengurla, Sangmeshwar, Ratnagiri, Rajapur, Malwan and Devgad and in consequence land revenue to the extent of Rs. 9,259-8-7 was remitted.

Water Supply.—This was sufficient except in the places which habitually suffer from water shortage in the hot weather.

Cattle and Folder.—The condition of cattle was good and the supply of fodder adequate.

Public Health.—Public health was good. There were outbreaks of plague and small-pox but they were scotched before they assumed serious propertions. Malaria was even more severe than usual in Kanara and the adjoining malnad areas of Dharwan and Belgaum.

Cattle diseases were widespread but the efforts of the Veterinary Department were effective.

Takavi advances under the Land Improvement Loans Act amounted to Rs. 37,363.

There was a special takavi establishment of 20 clerks for the division during the year.

Central Division.

The amount of Tagai advanced under both the Acts (XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884) during the year was Rs. 2,49,985 as against Rs. 2,01,544 in the previous year. The increase is mainly due to the fact that in Ahmednager, West Khandesh and Sholapur districts, tagai was advanced freely taking into consideration the unsatisfactory condition of the agricultural season in these districts.

The year opened with an outstanding balance of Rs. 13,17,208 (principal Rs. 11,49,938 and interest Rs. 1,67,270). The following table shows the demand, collections, etc. for the year—

Southern Division.

The statements in Appendix II give the year's transactions. The year ended on 30th September 1940. Collections were 23.5 per cent of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year *plus* the debits of the year. Last year the percentage of collection was 12.4. The improvement is due to the season having been a good one.

Suspensions in Bijapur were only Rs. 17,655-12-3 principal and Rs. 784-10-9 interest against Rs. 1,95,832-14-6 principal and Rs. 89.050-3-8 interest last year. In Dharwar they were Rs. 4,871-6-2 principal and Rs. 1,175-9-0 interest against Rs. 21,128-0-2 principal and Rs. 869-1-0 interest last year.

The following special schemes continued during the year :--

(a) Eradication of hariali by tractor ploughing in Dharwar.

(b) 'Koleroga' control by spraying operations in Kanara.

(c) Improvement of tari and supari garden lands in Siddapun taluka.

(a) Rs. 4,655-7-6 were advanced for tractor ploughing in one village in Dharwar taluka and five villages in Navalgund taluks. Rs. 6,614-7-0 were also advanced in Dharwar district for removal of hariali by hand-digging. There is strong local demand for an extension of facilities under this scheme which has unfortunately not yet been met.

(b) The 'Koleroga' control programme was carried out in the garden tracts of Siddapur, Yeliapur, Kumta, Honavar talukas and Bhatkal mahal in Kanara district, fresh advances being Rs. 19,987. The season was unfavourable for spraying owing to heavy and incessant rainfall.

(c) Only Rs. 685 of the special grant of Rs. 3,000 sanctioned for the improvement of the tari and supari garden lands in Siddapur taluka were utilised during the year.

3. Unauthorised arrears are again the heaviest in Bijapur, being Rs. 1,73,170-13-4 principal and Rs. 91,357-9-2 interest. These are chiefly the accumulated debt of previous years of scarcity. Dharwar comes next with Rs. 60,041-7-8 principal and Rs. 19,892-11-9 interest. Collections in district this were hampered by low prices and the restricted use of coercive processes. In Kanara unauthorised arrears were Rs. 31,882-2-0 principal and Rs. 2,712-11-11 interest, and occurred mainly in Siddapur taluka. In Belgaum unauthorised arrears of Rs. 22,885-0-5 principal and Rs. 6,903-15-0 interest amount to just over 50 per cent. of the Unauthorised arrears in Kolaba and Ratnagiri are demand. negligible.

Out of the 6,003 notices issued, 1,831, 1,301 and 1,193 were from Poona, Nasik and East Khandesh, respectively. In Ahmednagar ar Bk Ca 45-5 and Satara the number was 661 and 362, respectively. In Sholapur the number was only 16. There was an increase in the number of persons proceeded against under Section 148 of the Land Revenue Code. 15. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

Northern Division.

In Ahmedabad, trade conditions during the year were on the whole satisfactory.

Kaira district is mainly agricultural. There were the following few industries :—

The flour mills have increased from 85 to 100. 43 creameries and 25 ovens for boiling milk in Anand, Borsad and Nadiad talukas carried business on an extensive scale and were a boon to the poor classes who made a living by selling milk. Out of the 8 oil mills

6 worked during the year. There were 253 pumping plants in Anand and Borsad talukas which considerably helped irrigated crops. The bone crushing factory at Dabhan supplied a large quantity of manure in various parts of the division. There are water works in some villages which supplied drinking water to various tracts.

The chief trade in the Panch Mahals is in grain and timber. Grain from interior villages of the eastern mahals and the surrounding Indian States is taken to Dohad whence it is exported to other parts of the Province. In Godhra taluka trade in timber and fuel is carried on on a large scale. There is also a trade in timtu leaves which lasts for a couple of months. There are no large scale industries in this sub-division except the manganese mine at Shivrajpur and Bamankuva in Halol mahal.

In the Broach sub-division, cotton is the principal article of trade and industry. 129,563 bhars of cotton (as against 122,584 bhars last year) was ginned and pressed into bales. The cotton was exported to Bombay. 75 hand-looms were worked by the backward class during the year and the handloom manufactured cloth was exported to Ahmedabad and Surat. Debej in Wagra taluka continued its sea trade with Bhavnagar as usual.

Surat district is also mainly agricultural. Cotton is the principal money crop. The cotton seed oil mill supplied oil as usual and also manufactured soap-cakes, etc., from it which were exported to various places. The silk and embroidery industry in Surat city employs a large number of people. The industry is meeting with serious foreign competition particularly from Japan. Muslims and a class of Hindus known as Khatris produce rough cloth in handlooms and it is used by the backward classes. At Vedchhi in Valod mahal spinning and weaving is done.

The chief articles of export are grass, firewood, coal, timber, mangoes, rice, cotton and cotton seeds. Grass, firewood, coal and rice are exported to Bombay from Bulsar and Chikhli. Mandvi is famous for its country carts which are strong and durable. Timber from Mandvi forest was exported to other parts of Gujerat by rail. There are four stone quarries in Bulsar taluka. A mining license was granted to Messrs. Killick Nixon and Company in the Mandvi taluka.

The imports and exports by water in Surat Port are increasing. Cotton bales especially are exported to Bhavnagar in increasing quantities and the reason is the cheaper cost of transport.

The chief commodities exported from Thana district are rice, paddy, timber, charcoal, milk, grass, salt, betel-leaves, plantains, vegetables, fish, matches, saris, lugdis, etc. Of these paddy, rice, milk, fish, charcoal, etc., find a market in Bombay and the rest in Gujerat. Timber is chiefly carried by sea to Kathiawar and Gujerat from the three ports, viz., Sawta, Manor and Sanjan. Charcoal is exported from Shahpur, Dahanu and Palghar talukas and Vada mahal. Bhiwandi and Kalyan talukas manufacture bricks on a large scale. These works employ about 5,000 labourers for over 8 months. Vada peta and Bhiwandi taluka produce the finest quality of rice known as Kolamba. Bassein produces vegetables, plantains and betel-leaves.

Salt was exported in large quantities from Bassein taluka an Thana mahal. Fish was exported in large quantities from Bassein Falghar, and Thana.

In the Bombay Suburban district, building activities an quarrying operations were slack owing to the war.

Central Division.

The chief industry of the division is agriculture. Trade is mainly confined to the export of raw materials. The principal articles exported are grain, cotton and oil-seeds.

Jaggery is the most important article of trade in the irrigatetracts of Ahmednagar, Nasik and Poona districts. Cotton and groundnut continued to be the chief products of trade of the Khan desh districts. Their prices continued steadily to rise on account of war. Groundnut seed, turmeric and jaggery are the importanarticles of trade of the Satara district and they are exported on al extensive scale to Bombay and other industrial centres. Onions betel-leaves and eggs were also exported on a large scale.

Sugar factories.—There are four sugar-factories in the Ahmedna gar district. The Belapur Company and the Maharashtra Suga Mills run their business with substantial profits. The Godavan Sugar Mills have started work this year. The Belwandi Suga Farm is also prospering. The sugar factory at Rawalgaon in Nasi district is making progress. The two sugar factories in the Malsira taluka, viz. the Saswad-Mali Sugar Factory at Akluj and th Brihan Maharashtra Sugar Factory at Borgaon, fared well.

Miscellaneous Industries.—A modern factory is being buil at Pachora for the manufacture of vegetable oil products fron groundnuts, etc. There are two tanneries at Sawedi, a suburb o Ahmednagar, which turn out fairly good leather which is in grea demand in Northern India. At the tannery at Bhusawal, hides o goat and sheep are cleaned and dried and sent to Rajanumdree fc further processes. The bidi factories at Nasik and Sinnar supplie bidies locally as far as the Central Provinces and Berar. The Rea Paper Mill at Mundwa and the Rawiwarma Fine Art Litho Pres at Malvali, the Kirlosker Iron Factory and the Iron Industrie Works at Satara Road had a good year.

Southern Division.

The year was normal.

Agriculture is the main industry.

Wheat, cotton, jaggery, chillies, groundnut, betelnut, betel-leaves spices and timber, are the principal articles of export from the Karnatak and rice, salt, fish, salted-fish, mangoes and prepare cashewnuts from the Konkan. Kolaba district does an increasing export business with Bombay in fresh fruit, vegetables, fish, eggs, etc. Large quantities of jowari and bajri were exported from Bijapur to Sholapur district and Hyderabad State where scarcity prevailed.

The Bailhongal regulated cotton market attracted supplies from a wide area and brought prosperity to the town.

There was some slight improvement in the handloom industry. The carpet and kambli industries had a normal year.

The cattle-fair centres in Dharwar did good business. Tanning industry was started at Haveri under Government supervision and a promising start has been made with coir work under the aegis of the All-India Village Improvement Association at Honavar in Kanara.

The produce of the salt works at Sanikatta in Kanara, Shiroda in Ratnagiri and Pen and Uran in Kolaba was normal.

The depression in building activities in Bombay adversely affected the tile factory at Mora in Uran. There was no improvement in the condition of the brick and tile factories in Khanapur.

The mango crop in Ratnagiri was moderate but secured good prices in Bombay and other places.

Sandalwood and ivory-carving was carried on as usual at Kumta and Honavar in Kanara.

Bee-keeping has been newly introduced in Kanara with a Government subsidy.

The power houses at Bhivpuri, Khopoli and Bhira continued to supply electric energy to Bombay City.

16. PRICES.

Northern Division.

Prices of food grains in all districts showed an upward trend. The rise was partly due to war conditions and partly due to shortage of rain during the season. The price of cotton with seed ranged from Rs. 85 to 150 as against Rs. 72 to 90 last year. The economic condition of the people on the whole was satisfactory owing to the rise in prices. The speculative increase in prices was controlled by the Bombay Regulation and Control Prices Order, 1939.

Central Division.

During the year under report prices were higher than those of the previous year. This rise is mainly due to the war conditions prevailing in Europe. The prices of cotton and groundnut were high all along in East Khandesh. In Satara the prices of jaggery and groundnut were low. In Sholapur the prices reached an abnormally high level in December 1939 but from January 1940 onwards there was a drop.

Southern Division.

With the outbreak of war in September prices improved but soon settled down. In the case of the chief export crops of the Karnatak, cotton and groundnut, the growers did very well on the better prices but local merchants suffered as prices fell while the commodities were still in their hands. The prices of all foodstuffs except wheat have remained at a slightly higher level than before the war began. The obvious determination of Government not to countenance profiteering combined with excellent crops kept prices fairly steady in the early days of the war.

Dislocation of the coastal steamer traffic had the effect of lowering the prices of the products of the Konkan such as betelnut and cardamom and of raising the prices of goods imported into the Konkan but an improvement of shipping facilities later in the year saved the whole coastal area from any serious dislocation. On the whole the division came through the year remarkably well.

17. LABOUR AND WAGES.

Northern Division.

The wages of both skilled and unskilled labour showed no appreciable change except in respect of unskilled labour in Ahmedabad and Panch Mahals where there was some fall owing to scarcity and the consequent excess of labourers. In Broach subdivision unskilled local labourers were found insufficient and a large number had to be obtained from Kathiawar for picking cotton and harvesting wheat. A large number of labourers were also employed as usual by the ginning factories. Thana district being in close proximity to Bombay both skilled and unskilled labourers especially from Thana, Kalyan and Bassein as usual found employment in Bombay at higher wages than they could get locally. The woollen mill at Thana, the rice mills in the district, match factories at Thans and Ambernath, salt works at Bhayandar, Rai and Belapur, brick works at Kalyan and Bhiwandi, and the handlooms, etc. at Bhiwandi provided sufficient work for both skilled and unskilled labourers from the district, as well as other parts of the division.

Central Division.

The supply of labour was plentiful throughout the year and the rates of wages both for skilled and unskilled labourers remained steady throughout except in East Khandesh. In East Khandesh there was a drought for about a month, i.e., from the middle of July to the third week of August. This affected agricultural labour to a considerable extent as the agricultural labourers found no employment during that period. This had an effect on their wages also. The condition of the labourers was on the whole good in all the districts. The Government Workshop at Dapuri, the Reay Paper Mills at Mundwa, the Raja Bahadur Motilal Mills at Poona, the Spinning and Weaving Mills at Jalgaon, Amalner, Chalisgaon, Dhulia, Barsi and Sholapur, the Sugar Factories in the Ahmednagar, Nasik, Poona and Sholapur districts, the several ginning and pressing factories in every district except Satara continued to absorb a large number of labourers from the country-side.

Southern Division.

The supply of labour was equal to the demand. Wages were steady except in Kanara and Kolaba where there were slight fluctuations. The condition of the labouring classes was on the whole good and the relations between employers and employed generally satisfactory.

18. SPECIAL MATTERS.

Northern Division.

The chief feature of the season was the scarcity in northern Gujerat. Up to the 23rd of August one of the worst famines in history appeared imminent, but the rain which fell then and subsequently reduced the seriously affected areas to one or two talukas in Ahmedabad and Panch Mahals. Gujerat was lucky as compared with Kathiawar and Rajputana where drought was complete and widespread. In the present year the crops are good but the total rainfall is again deficient and a shortage of water supply is likely to follow this series of dry years if a heavy monsoon does not occur soon.

Famine.—There was no famine during the year but scarcity was declared in some parts of Ahmedabad and in Panch Mahals. In Ahmedabad there was a serious shortage of rain in the second half of July and first half of August, the worst areas affected being Viramgam and the Panchal tract of Dhandhuka. There was a serious shortage of grass. To relieve the distress grass was advanced by Government on joint bond and tagai to the extent of about $2\frac{1}{2}$ lacs of rupees. Concession rates were also allowed to the import of grass by private and charitable institutions. When rains came later in 1939 seed tagai to the extent of about two lacs of rupees was advanced. In March 1940, measures were taken to start scarcity works in the Viramgam taluka where the rainfall was poorest and a special land acquisition officer was appointed for the acquisition of land for the Public Works Department scarcity works. The District Local Board, Ahmedabad, also started excavation works in Viramgam and on the Vinchhia-Banpur road in the Panchal tract. Cheap grain shops were opened in Viramgam taluka by Congress. Gratuitous relief was also given by Government to persons in need in the area. In the summer there was a serious shortage of grass and 1,800,000 lbs. of grass was given as takavi.

Seed takavi to the extent of Rs. 41,382-2-3 was also given in July 1940 as the agriculturists of this area had no resources to buy the seed when the monsoon of the current season began.

Scarcity was declared in the Panch Mahals on account of insufficient rain. The following relief works were started by the Public Works Department and the District Local Board in the various talukas as under :--

The works in Kalol and Halol mahals were closed almost immediately after they had been opened because of insufficient attendance; while in the remaining area they were continued till September 1940. The highest daily average attendance was 16,219 in April. The demand of village people for labour was met as far as possible by relief works.

In addition to the above measures gratuitous relief, grass tagai, seed tagai, tagai for bullocks, and tagai free of interest for digging wells were granted in necessitous cases.

In Kaira, 23 tanks were repaired during the year. In Broach and Panch Mahals minor works in Ankleshwar taluka were done and in Surat 41 tanks were repaired.

Besides this an amount of Rs. 1,10,000 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation works in charge of the Revenue Department through the Public Works Department agency.

Corruption in Subordinate Revenue Service.—Instructions according to the orders of Government from time to time were given to the subordinate officers. Touring officers while on tour impressed upon their subordinates that the supplies they purchase in the villages must be paid for at the prevailing market rates. Anticorruption committees have been formed in each district and cases of corruption brought to notice by them are dealt with promptly and action is taken against the persons found guilty.

Central Division.

(1) *His Excellency's visit.*—His Excellency the Governor of Bombay visited Bhandardara Dam in Akola taluka, Akola, Sangamner, Rahuri and Ahmednagar towns. At Sangamner and Ahmednagar he was welcomed by representative gatherings of towns-people and villagers.

In January 1940 His Excellency visited Dhadgaon in Akrani mahal in West Khandesh, paid visits to Nandurbar, Hatoda, Taloda, Rozawe and Dhanpur villages in the Taloda taluka. His Excellency personally acquainted himself with the condition of the bhils and aboriginal tribes. He showed keen interest in the social and economic condition of the bhils and other aboriginal tribes in the partially excluded areas of the district. A Bhil Darbar was held at Uhadgaon at the time of his visit and this has left a deep impression. He opened a cheap grain bank and a library at Dara, a village in Shahada taluka. He also paid a visit to Dhulia town.

(2) Village improvement.—During the year under report the Sir Frederick Sykes Village Improvement Challenge Shield was awarded to Alhanwadi, a village in the Pathardi mahal, for the excellent work done in the village during 1938.

In West Khandesh Village Improvement Week, Vyayam and Vaccination Weeks were observed. Propaganda was carried on and instructions were given to villagers through the medium of magic lantern lectures on the subject of improvement, sanitation, education and agriculture. The Publicity Van toured in the district as usual visiting important places.

A new scheme of giving medical help to women in villages remote from the headquarters station has been started by the Collector. The scheme is becoming popular and is being taken advantage of.

(3) Famine.—No scarcity or famine was declared in any of the districts during the year. In Ahmednagar district owing to insufficient rains scarcity of fodder was felt in the hot weather in Shrigonda and Parner talukas and Pathardi mahal to some extent. A great quantity of grass was imported from the forest areas. Restrictions were also imposed on the export of fodder through railways. Scarcity works consisting of metal breaking and of construction of the Nirgudi approach road on Domari-Amalner Road in Jamkhed mahal were opened. These provided labour to many people.

Owing to the failure of rains in certain parts of the Eastern division of the Poona district it was apprehended that scarcity would have to be declared in the affected areas of Bhimthadi and Indapur talukas and Dhond and S.rur mahals. On close observation it was found that distress was not acute. Relief in the form of tagai loans was liberally granted to those who applied for it. The application of the Grain and Fodder Control Act to these areas relieved the situation to a considerable extent.

In the 15 ex-Khandala villages of the Satara district a mild type of scarcity prevailed during the year. In order to give relief to the needy persons quasi-test works were opened in these villages by the Public Works Department and the District Local Board. Gratuitous relief was also granted to inferior village servants in these villages. An amount of Rs. 2,000 was sanctioned by Government for this purpose. The Sheriff of Bombay also sent an amount of Rs. 1,500. These grants relieved the distress to a great extent.

In Shelapur district the agricultural season was very poor and certain relief measures were found necessary. Metal breaking or the provincial roads at places selected throughout the district were started by the Public Works Department. Similarly special and original works and village approach road works were started by the District Local Board. Restrictions on the export of fodder and jowar were imposed. An amount of Rs. 653 was spent on giving gratuitous relief to the infirm and decrepit and cash doles to inferior village servants were granted out of the amount of Rs. 2,000 allotted to the district by the Indian Peoples Famine Trust Fund. An amount of Rs. 4,500 was sanctioned by Government for gratuitous relief to inferior village servants of villages in all talukas except Malsiras.

(6) Measures taken to prevent corruption.—Anti-corruption committees have been formed in all districts and cases of corruption brought to notice are promptly dealt with. Cases of corruption—Ahmednagar.—A clerk in Sheogaon Mamlatdar's office and a talati in the Pathardi mahal were dismissed as they were found to be corrupt. A naik in Jamkhed mahal office was reduced to the rank of a peon for similar reason.

West Khandesh.—One talati was dismissed for attempting to take a bribe.

Nasik.—A talati in Yeola taluka was charged for taking extra money for copies of the Record of Rights. The charge was not proved; the talati was fined Rs. 5 for his bad work.

Southern Division.

Important counts.—His Excellency the Viceroy accompanied by His Excellency the Governor of Bombay visited Kolaba district on 11th January 1940 and inspected a small agricultural and cattle exhibition at Khandala near Alibag.

On 6th July 1940, His Excellency the Governor of Bombay visited Belgaum and on 19th July 1940 Gadag, Hubli and Dharwar in furtherance of the Province's War Effort.

Adviser III to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay toured in Karwar, Kumta, Honavar, Sirsi and Yellapur talukas of Kanara district during February and March 1940.

Corruption in the subordinate revenue service—Kanara district.— A talati in Yellapur taluka and a patil in Honavar taluka were dismissed from service, the former for misappropriating Rs. 7-8-0 and the latter for malpractices.

Kolaba district.—Two talatis in Mahad and Panvel talukas and the deputy appointed on behalf of a watandar kulkarni in Pen taluka were convicted under Section 409, Indian Penal Code, for misappropriation of Government monies and all three were dismissed. A talati in Alibag taluka was dismissed from service for fabricating an entry in the Record of Rights and on some other charges; and a police patel in the same taluka was removed from office for misappropriating Government money.

Working of the Matheran Hill Station.—The Revenue duties are performed by the Mamlatdar under the general control of the Collector. One revenue clerk with two peons is stationed at Matheran. He is directly subordinate to the Mamlatdar of Karjat and does all the revenue work, including collection. He also does the clerical work of the Special Honorary Magistrate, who tries cases arising within the municipal area.

The Divisional Forest Officer, Alibag, is responsible for the forest administration. One Forester is posted on the Hill.

St. Paul's Church is looked after by the Medical Officer, Matheran, who is a municipal servant.

The total land revenue collections during the year under report amounted to Rs. 13,888-6-4. Half of the revenue after deducting the establishment charges goes to the Municipality. The forest revenue during the year amounted to Rs. 4,494-3-0. It is also transferred to the Municipality after deducting the establishment charges.

There is a municipality which looks after the work falling within its sphere under the law.

20. RESIDENTIAL SUBURBAN SCHEMES.

I. An area of 27,974 square yards valued at Rs. 1,01,842-4-0 was disposed of during the year for residential purposes in Suburban Schemes Nos. III-Chembur, VII-Khar, XVI-Andheri sector of Shahar and XVII-C. S. Trombay, Kurla. 16,737 square yards out of Suburban Scheme No. XVI-Andheri sector of Shahar were sold to the Police department. 6,823 square yards valued at Rs. 6,523-8-0 were sold for industrial and agricultural purposes out of Suburban Scheme No. I-Kurla-Kirol, No. II-Trombay, N. E. and No. XVII-C. S. Trombay, Kurla. Land measuring 1 acre, 39 gunthas out of Gilbert Hill in Suburban Scheme No. X-Andheri was allotted free of cost to the District Local Board for quarrying purposes. A purchaser in Suburban Scheme No. III-Chembur was allowed to withdraw his offer on refund of the deposit as the cost of building material had risen owing to the war.
