# LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1949-41.

#### I.-SEASON.

#### Morthern Division.

The rains started in the first week of June giving a good start for sowing operations. There were long breaks in July and September which hampered the growth of kharif crops in Kaira. The rainfall in September was inadequate in Ahmedabad and there were no rains in October. The rains in October and November in Broach and Panch Mahals washed off some crops in Wagra taluka which had to be resown. The cyclone of 16th October 1940 adversely affected the crops in the coastal villages of Surat district and in Thana district and relief in the form of tagavi had to be granted.

Ahmedabad.—The rains commenced from the first week of June and gave a good start for sowing operations. There was a break for over a fortnight during the second and third weeks of the month and in the latter part of the month there were opportune and widespread rains all over the district. In July there was a break followed by sufficient rainfall till the end of August. In September the rainfall was inadequate and there was practically no rain in October. The rainfall was sufficient for bajri and jowar crops but proved inadequate for rice which failed in some villages of Dascroi and Viramgam talukas. In Sanand mohal the Kyari lands which were meant to be sown with wheat crop had to be sown with cotton crop owing to shortage of rains. Relief had to be granted by way of suspensions and remissions of land revenue in the affected areas. Remissions of Himayat and Akushia assessments were also granted owing to total and partial failure of rice crop.

Kaira.—The monsoon started in the last week of June and continued up to the middle of October with long periods of drought from 1st to 14th July and from theend of August to 18th September. These droughts hampered the growth of kharif crops. There were scattered showers in November but they could not appreciably help the standing crops. The rainfall, though inadequate, was timely and well distributed. Bajri, jowar and cotton crops fared well but paddy crop in Matar and Mehmedabad talukas and tur, pulses, kodra and wheat crops suffered from inadequacy of rains.

Broach and Panch Mahals.—There were some showers in the district except in the Halol mishal in the first week of June but the monsoon actually started from the fourth week of June. The rainfall in July and August was timely and well distributed and helped the growth of crops. During the first and the last week of September and the first fortnight of October there were no rains throughout the district. The rains in

October and November washed off lang and jower crops which had to be resown in Wagra taluka. In Jambusar and Ankleshwar talukas cotton crop was damaged to some extent. Intense cold and cloudy weather appreciably damaged the cotton and lang crops in Wagra taluka. The crops in Wagra and Broach talukas were also damaged by insect pest.

Surat.—The rainfall was satisfactory and more than that of the preceding year in most of the talukas of the district and the crops fared generally well. The cyclene of 16th October 1940, however, affected adversely the rice crop of Bulsar taluka, Mandvi taluka and Pardi mahal. In Chikhli mahal the paddy crop suffered owing to the excess of rains. The quantity and quality of rice, jowari, and cotton was much affected by uneven distribution of rains and the cyclene of 16th October 1940.

Thana.—The monsoon started in the first week of June but the sowing operations were temporarily retarded in Bassein and Bhiwandi talukas and Thana mahal owing to insufficient rains in the second week of June. The rainfall was scanty in the first and second week of July but the subsequent good showers gave impetus throughout the district to the transplantation operations of Garva creps. The rainfall in the month of August proved quite favourable to the growth of standing crops. The rain was sufficient and well distributed but the happy prospects of a good season were smashed by untimely rain followed by the terrible cyclone in the middle of October with the result that the crops in the coastal villages of Bassein, Palghar, Dahanu talukas and Umbergaen peta were swept away. The rainfall was more than the average for the last 5 years in the district.

Bombay Suburban District.—The monsoon broke out in the first week of June 1940. The rainfall was sufficient and equally distributed throughout the district. The cyclone of 16th October 1940 caused some damage to cocoanut, brab and mango trees.

The rainfall in each district during the year as compared with the average of the last five years is shown below:—

The outturn of crops in Ahmedabad district ranged from 3 to 14 annas, 1 to 11 annas in Kaira, 4 to 12 annas in Broach and Panch Mabals, 4 to

12 annas in Surat, 7 to 12 annas in Thana and in the Bombay Suburban District, the anna-valuation of crops exceeded 10 annas.

Water Supply.—Deficiency of water for drinking and domestic supply was felt in Modasa mahal, Bhal area in Dhandhuka taluka and some parts of Sanand mahal and Viramgam taluka where wells and tanks had dried up during the later part of the season. Owing to three consecutive years of scanty rainfall water level in some wells went very low in many places in the hot season. Shortage of water was also felt for irrigation purposes. The deficiency of water in the Bhal area was made good to some extent by digging katcha wells in beds of tanks. In the Kaira district the supply of drinking water was adequate but that for irrigation was insufficient. In the Broach and Panch Mahals district water supply was sufficient except in a few villages in Godhra taluka where people used to get water by digging pits in tanks and river beds. In the Surat district water supply for drinking purposes and for irrigation was fair. In the Thana district the usual scarcity was felt in jungle parti villages. In the Bombay Suburban District the water supply was adequate.

Cattle and Fodder.—The supply of fodder was sufficient throughout the division.

Rinderpest, food and mouth disease and hemorrhagic septicemia appeared more or less in all districts. The number of attacks and the number of cattle inoculated during the year was as follows:—

Leavy toll of 393 and 71 cattle respectively. In Kaira the heaviest toll of cattle was taken by small pox which was confined to Matar taluka only. The small number of deaths on account of other diseases was due to timely precautionary measures taken by the public with the aid

of the Veterinary Department.

In Broach and Panch Mahals there were 1,901 attacks resulting in 415 deaths. The main diseases which caused this heavy loss were rinderpest, hæmorrhagic septicæmia and other contagious diseases, viz., fuel pox, palcestic Black quarter, etc. In Surat, out of 2,586 cases there were 193 deaths and the greatest toll, i.e., 130 deaths was taken by hæmorrhagic septicæmia. In Thana rinderpest and hæmorrhagic septicæmia took the heaviest toll. The Veterinary Department took prompt measures by way of inoculations to check the spread of cattle diseases.

Public Health.—Public health was generally good except for the prevalence of epidemic diseases as shown in the following table:—

Cerebro-spinal fever (meningitis) has been effectively controlled in Ahmedabad. There were 24 attacks resulting in 8 deaths as against 41 cases resulting in 16 deaths during the previous year. Small-pox was the main epidemic during the year and it took the toll of 258 lives as against 2,101 in the preceding year. Steps were taken to check the epidemic by revaccination in the affected areas. Cholera appeared in Dohad taluka of the Broach and Panch Mahals district, Chorashi, Olpad, Bardoli talukas and Chikhli mahal of Surat district and Kalyan, Bhiwandi and Shahpur talukas and Thana mahal of Thana district but effective measures were taken to check its spread.

#### Contral Division.

The monsoon set in regularly in the first week of June except in East Chandesh, parts of Poons and Satara districts. In East Khandesh it set in by the middle of the month, and in Purandhar and Indapur talukas and in the western part of the Poons district and in Satars district it commenced in the last week of the month. The fall was general and sufficient for the kharif sowings. In July the rain was sufficient throughout except in parts of Nasik where some anxiety was felt for want of sufficient rain. This was however removed by later rains. The rainfall in July and August helped the germination and the growth of the kharif crops. The September rains were beneficial to the standing kharif crops and sufficient for undertaking the rabi sowings. The showers in October and November were generally useful for the growth of the rabi crops. In parts of Satara and Sholapur there was not sufficient rain with the result that the rabi crops in those areas did not thrive well. In December and January there was a violent hail storm in Nagar taluka which damaged the standing crops in a few villages seriously. Untimely and heavy rain in Sangola taluka of the Sholapur district damaged the rabi crops which were below normal. On the whole however the season was good.

Ahmedwagar.—The monsoon started early in June. There were showers all over the district during the month of June. The rainfall was copious and timely. In July the fall was general and sufficient. It was useful for kharif crops. In August and September there were good rains—distributed evenly all over the district. The rainfall in these months helped the standing kharif crops. It was also sufficient for undertaking the sowing of rabi crops. Due to the drizzling rain in November and December the rabi crops did well. In the months of December and January there was a violent hail storm in Nagar taluka which resulted in the standing crops in a few villages being seriously damaged. The hail storm also wrought some damage in Sheogaon and Parner talukas. On the whole, the season was good.

East Khandesh.—The monsoon commenced regularly from the middle of June. The rains in this month being intermittent were insufficient for sowing. In July there was sufficient rain throughout the district. It helped the germination of the kharif crops. With an adequate rainfall in August the crops thrived well. Short and intermittent breaks in the rainfall were helpful to the growth of the crops. There was a break in the rains in the first fortnight of September. Good and opportune rains fell in the second fortnight. There was no rain during the first two weeks of October and throughout the month of November except some showers towards the close of the month which were useful for the germination of the rabi crops. There were a few showers in December and a little rain in January. The season was excellent. The final condition of crops was everywhere satisfactory and the yield was much more than the normal.

West Khundesh.—The monsoon commenced in earnest in the second fortnicht of June all over the district. In the first fortnight of July the rainfall was adequate and well distributed, but in the second fortnight it was scanty in parts of Dhulia, Sakri and Sindkheda talukas. The rainfall in the first fortnight of August was beneficial to the standing kharif crops but the break during the second half of the month created some anxiety for crops in Dhulia taluka. The anxiety was however removed by the rains during the second week of September. In Dhulia taluka the bajri crop was slightly affected by excessive rains. In October the condition of the standing kharif crops was generally good all over the district. The late rains were useful for the rabi crops. In December and January the standing rabi crops were in good condition. In February they were slightly damaged by hail and rain in parts of Shahada taluka. On the whole, the season was satisfactory.

Nasik.—'The monsoon set in throughout the district in the beginning of June. The rainfall was timely, opportune, sufficient and well distributed everywhere in the district except the eastern part of Sinnar and Niphad talukas. It considerably helped the sowing of kharif crops. The germination of seedlings was normally good except in parts of Yeola, Baglan, Naudgaon and Malegaon talukas. There was no rain in July which gave rise to anxiety. This was relieved by general and bountiful rainfall in the middle of August, which caused all the standing crops to thrive well. The rain in September was more than: sufficient and as a result of this the yield of the crops was very good. The rainfall in October proved fruitful to undertake rabi sowings and further rainfall in November improved all the rabi crops. The season was on the whole good.

Poona. In the Western division the monsoon broke rather late in June except in Mawal taluka where it commenced in the beginning of June. By the end of the month there was sufficient rainfall and the kharif sowings were undertaken. The July rains were opportune and helped the growth of the kharif crops. The rains in August, September and October were useful to the standing crops which thrived well except in the eastern part of Haveli taluka where

owing to scanty rainfall the kharif crops did not do well.

In the Eastern division the monsoon set in as usual except in Purandhar and Indepur talukas, where it commenced in the third week of June. In the eastern part of Indapur taluka there was no useful rain with the result that no kharif sowings could be undertaken. In August there was scanty rainfall in Bhimthadi taluka and Sirur peta as a result of which the kharif crops failed to a certain extent. In Purandhar taluka and Dhond peta the rainfall was generally opportune and adequate for the crops. In September and onwards the timely rains assured a good season in Bhimthadi and Indapur talukas and in the beginning the rabi crops appeared to be thriving. The unexpected rainfall in Bhimthadi taluka in January however damaged the kharif crops to a certain extent. In Indapur taluka the rainfall was scanty throughout the season with the result that the out-turn of the rabi crops was affected to an appreciable extent.

Salara.—The monsoon set in from the last week of June and the general sowing operations were retarded in consequence. The rainfall in the month of July was general except in Koregaon and the eastern part of Khatav talukas and Man mahal. By the end of July the kharif crops in all the talukas and mahals were in a satisfactory condition except in parts of Khanapur and Tasgaon talukas and Man mahal where the seedlings were withering for want of moisture. Precipitation in August was confined to light showers particularly in Man mahal, Khatav, Tasgaon, Khanapur and Walwa talukas. It was in the third week of September that the heavy rainfall fell over wide areas and this enabled large rabi sowings. The fall during the month of October helped the standing kharif crops and rabi crops except in parts of Satara, Khanapur, Khatav, Walwa and Tasgaon talukas and the eastern part of Wai taluka. The rainfall in December however restored the condition. The out turn was on the whole fair throughout the district except in Tasgaon and parts of Khanapur talukas and few villages in Man mahal.

Sholapur. The monsoon commenced in the first week of June. The fall in June was opportune and sufficient for the kharif sowings. The rain in July and August was sufficient in all the talukas except in Karmala, Pandharpur and Sangola talukas and as a result of this the kharif crops in jiray at lands of Sangola taluka were lost. The rainfall in September and October was sufficient to undertake the sowing of the rabi crops. The fall in November was not well distributed in parts of Pandharpur and Sangola talukas. The rainfall in November was insufficient for the proper growth of the standing rabi crops in parts of Madha and Sangola talukas. The untimely and heavy rain in January in Sangola taluka damaged the rabi crops which were below normal. Except in parts of Pandharpur and Sangola talukas the season was on the whole fair.

Cattle and Fodder.—The condition of cattle was fair in all districts. Though diseases such as rinderpest, foot and mouth disease, hemorrhagic septicemia, black quarter and anthrax, etc., prevailed, they were not serious enough to affect the agricultural operations. The total number of deaths from diseases was 7,249 as against 5,128 in the previous year. The total number of attacks and deaths was as follows:—

The supply of fodder was sufficient in all districts of the division except in Tasgaon taluka of the Satara district and generally in Sholapur district. In Tasgaon taluka tagai was distributed to agriculturists for the purchase of fodder. In Sholapur restrictions were imposed on the export of grass and fodder.

Water Supply.—The supply of water was generally sufficient for drinking and irrigation purposes except in parts of Ahmednagar, Poona and Sholapur districts. In parts of Parner taluka and Karjat peta and also in Nagar and Sheogaon talukas and the hilly parts of Jamkhed peta of the Ahmednagar district water supply for drinking purposes was insufficient. Water shortage was experienced in the hot weather in some villages of Sangamner, Rahuri and Nagar talukas. Water for irrigation purposes was insufficient in Nagar taluka and Karjat peta where wells had almost run dry in the month of May. Deficiency of water supply was also felt in a few villages in Purandhar taluka and Sirur peta of the Poona district. Water for drinking purposes was insufficient in Pandharpur, Sangola and Karmala talukas.

Public Health.—The public health was on the whole good. The following epidemics prevailed and the toll taken was as under:—

The epidemic of cholers in Ahmednagar district retarded cane crushing operations in the irrigated tracts of Kopargaon taluks to a considerable extent as the labourers on the gurhals were mostly affected. In East

Khandesh the outbreak of cholers was severe in the western part of the district. In West Khandesh it took the largest toll. In Sholapur it prevailed throughout the district and special measures were adopted for inoculation work. A mobile unit of medical and sanitary staff was formed in Pandharpur and Sholapur talukas to check the spread and to bring the epidemic under control. The scheme proved to be auccessful.

Plague prevailed in Sholapur, Barsi and Sangola talukas of the district. In order to check the spread special anti-plague measures were adopted with the help of the Public Health Department.

#### Southern Division.

Belgaum.—The season commenced as usual with the pre-monsoon showers which facilitated the preparation of the soil for sowing. The regular monsoon started in the third week of June. As regards its progress the distribution during June, July and August was satisfactory except in Athni taluka though the aggregate precipitation was somewhat below normal. During the months of September and October there was a distinct deficiency of rain. The situation improved however towards the third week of October and rainfall useful both for the standing kharif crops and the prospective rabi crops was received. The November and December rains which are vital to the rabi season again proved insufficient and the growth of the rabi crops was retarded. Athni continued to suffer from the shortage of rainfall over the district as a whole was below normal.

A marked increase in the areas under jowari and sugarcane was observed. On the other hand there was a marked decrease in the areas under bajri and cotton as compared with the previous year.

Bijapur.—The pre-monsoon showers came as usual. Except in Bagewadi and Muddebihal talukas, the precipitation during June was substantial and well distributed. Deficiency of rain in July affected the germination of the kharif crops sown in response to the June rains. The September rains though below normal, were good except in Muddebihal and were very helpful to the rabi sowings and enabled rabi crops to be sown on areas which are usually kharif. There was a bad break in September and desiccating winds in December and January. Both the kharif and rabi crop, were in consequence below normal and full suspensions had to be given in 35 villages in Bijapur, 18 in Indi, 28 in Sindgi and 18 in Muddebihal talukas. Scarcity was declared in these vill. ges as b, the harif and rabi seasons were bad in Bijapur this year.

Dharwar.—The pre-monsoon showers failed in parts of Gadag and Navalgund talukas and Nargund petha but elsewhere in the district they were helpful in the preparation of the soil for kharif sowings. Regular monsoon commenced in the second week of June and right up to the early days of September the precipitation was timely. The paddy crops in the Malnad tract accordingly fared exceptionally well this year. In Haveri grasshoppers damaged the jowari crop to some extent. As regards rabi the sowings were retarded a bit owing to the late arrival of the rains. Lack of timely rain in the eastern parts led to a reduction of the area under jowar and cotton. A distinct tendency in favour of a switch-over to wheat was shown by the cultivators this year.

Kanara.—The character of the season conformed to the usual pattern for this district: the betel-nut crop in Yellapur, Ankola and Honavar talukas and Supa and Bhatkal pethas suffered a set-back and remissions of land revenue had to be given in respect of the areas under betel-nut. Paddy fared quite well and the season on the whole was satisfactory.

Kolaba.—The rainfall commenced in the first week of June as usual and was on the whole sufficient and well distributed. Paddy which is the chief crop of the district fared well except in a few villages of the Pen taluka. Garden crops such as cocoanut, betel-nut etc. suffered on account of the violent storm in October.

Ratnagiri.—The rainfall in June, July and August was generally well distributed and sufficient; the prospects appeared rather bad as there was a break in the rains for six weeks in September and October. The heavy showers during the latter part of October saved the crops from damage. The season was normal on the whole.

Water supply. It was sufficient except in places which habitually suffer from water shortage in the hot weather.

Cattle and Fodder.—The condition of cattle was good. The supply of fodder was adequate except in some parts of Athni taluka where owing to insufficient rain the fodder crops did not thrive and tagailoans to the extent of Rs. 4,000 had to be given for the purchase of fodder imported from the neighbouring talukas.

Epidemics and Epizootics.—Public health was good. There were outbreaks of plague and small-pox but they were checked before they assumed serious proportions.

There was no change in the malaria situation. It seemed to be on the increase on Supa side.

Cattle diseases made their appearance but nowhere were they so severe as to interfere with agricultural operations.

The statements in Appendix II show the tagai transactions in the division during the year which ended on 30th September 1941. Recoveries were 15.2 per cent. of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year together with the debits during the year. The percentage of collection was 23.5 last year.

2. Suspensions were the highest, as usual, in Bijapur, i.e., Rs. 1,18,116 principal and Rs. 36,170 interest as against Rs. 17,655 principal and Rs. 784 interest last year. The enormous increase in the suspensions during the year under report was due to the bad season in parts of the district which gave low annewari figures in a number of villages. As a consequence only half of the normal instalment was ordered to be recovered in 350 villages where the annewari was between 4 and 6 annas and full suspensions were given in 136 villages where the annewari was below 4 annas. Next to Bijapur, in suspended arrears, stand Belgaum with Rs. 8,681 principal only and Dharwar with Rs. 2,358 principal only.

Of the following special schemes that at (b) only continued working during this year:—

- (a) eradication of hariali by tractor ploughing in Dharwar,
- (b) "Koleroga" control by spraying operations in Kanara, and
- (c) improvement of tari and supari garden lands in Siddapur taluka of the Kanara district.
- (a) No loans were advanced for eradication of hariali by tractor ploughing. Last year loans to the extent of Rs. 4,655 were advanced for the purpose.
- (b) The "Koleroga" control programme was carried out in the garden tracts of Sirsi, Siddapur, Yellapur and Honavar talukas and Bhatkal petha. Fresh advances this year amounted to Rs. 3,810 as against Rs. 19,987 last year. The demand for advances for this purpose was much less than was expected as the season was fairly good and the incidence of koleroga was much less than usual.
- (c) No advance was made for the improvement of tari and supari garden lands in Siddapur taluka though a special grant of Rs. 1,000 was allotted for the purpose. Last year the advances under this item amounted to Rs. 685.

3. Unauthorised arrears are the heaviest in Bijapur as usual, being Rs. 1,63,369 principal and Rs. 96,391 interest Rs. 1,73,170 and Rs. 91,357 respectively last year. These are chiefly the accumulated debts of previous years of scarcity. Dharwar comes next with Rs. 69,656 principal and Rs. 18,902 interest as against Rs. 60,041 and Rs. 19,892 respectively last year. In this district difficulty was experienced in recovering arrears in Navalgund Taluka and Nargund and Mundargi Pethas owing to partial failure of crops and coercive measures had to be taken for effecting recoveries from contumacious defaulters. In Kanara unauthorised arrears were Rs. 24,989 principal and Rs. 4,646 interest as against Rs. 31,882 principal and Rs. 2,712 interest last year. A major portion of these arrears pertains to Siddapur taluka. In many cases it was found that the defaults were not wilful and the defaulters being poor really could not pay. These arrears have been carried over to next year's demand. In Belgaum unauthorised arrears of Rs. 7,621 principal and Rs. 5,933 interest amount to 26.3 per cent. of the demand put down for collection. The unauthorised arrears in Kolaba are negligible and there are no such arrears in Ratnagiri.

#### 16. PRICES.

#### Northern Division.

In Ahmedabad the prices of staple food showed a rising tendency in the beginning of the year but they went down by the close of the year. The prices of pair, jowari, maize and barley declined while those of pulses and rice rose. In Kaira, pair which is the main staple food of the district showed a downward trend. In Broach and Panch Mahals, the prices were high in the beginning but they went down by January 1941 except that rice showed an upward trend. In Surat the prices did not show any appreciable changes except in case of rice which showed an increase. In Thana and Bombay Suburban districts, the price of rice—the main staple food—showed an upward trend due to war conditions and the shortage of Burma rice in the market. The prices of cotton with seed ranged from Rs. 87 to Rs. 145 as against Rs. 85 to 150. The economic condition of the people was on the whole satisfactory.

#### Central Division.

The prices of staple food grains in each district were as under:-

Ahmednagar.—The prices of almost all commodities except jowari and bajri have risen. The steady and low prices of jowari and bajri were due to a good season and the non-export of the grain to other districts.

East Khandesh.—The prices of both jowari and bajri were high during the year as compared with those of the previous year. The prices of the other minor commodities also showed a tendency to rise. However, the prices of cotton and groundnut which are the money crops of the district, were low as compared with those in the previous year. This was due to the outside demand being restricted.

West Khandesh.—On account of the war conditions there was a rise in the prices of wheat, rice, gram and turdal as compared with those in the previous year.

Nasik.—Due to war conditions the prices of the staple food grains were fluctuating day by day. The price of rice has gone high on account of the supply being inadequate due to the non-import of Burma rice.

Poona.—The prices of staple food grains except rice were steady till February 1941. From March onwards there was a drop in the prices of jowari and bajri. In July they rose slightly. Owing to scanty importation of Burma rice the prices of rice gradually increased. There was a marked fall in the prices of jaggery and cotton.

Satara.—The prices of the staple food grains remained practically unchanged except those of jowar which rose slightly in Satara city, Walwa and Javli talukas and Shirala mahal. The prices of jaggery and groundnut ruled low.

Sholapur.—The prices were normal throughout the year. The restrictions on the export of jowar outside the district up to the middle of November 1940 had a good effect in checking the rise in its price.

#### Southern Division.

There was a steady increase in the prices of almost all the articles mainly owing to war conditions. In Belgaum, Bijapur and Dharwar, the prices of the principal food grains—rice and wheat—increased but those of bajri and jowari showed a slight decrease.

The cotton growers of the division benefited from the rise in the cotton prices and there is no reason to believe that profiteering was indulged in.

In Konkan the rise in the price of rice which is the principal food grain was due to war conditions coupled with the shortage of imports from Burma and Mysore. The rise in the price of paddy was particularly marked in Kolaba.

In Kanara the prices of betelnut and pepper showed slight variations: a rise of 25 per cent, in the price of cardamum was observable but (unfortunately) this crop is not grown on a very large scale in the Kanara district and so the benefit to the Kanara cultivator was slight.

#### LABOUR AND WAGES.

#### Northern Division.

The wages of both skilled and unskilled labour showed no appreciable change. In Broach sub-division of the Broach and Panch Mahals district a large number of labourers had to be obtained from Kathiawar and from the locality near the Mahi river and Surat for picking cotton and harvesting wheat and for working in the ginning factories, the local labour being found insufficient. The Thana district being close to Bombay city skilled and unskilled labour especially from Thana, Kalyan and Bassein found employment in Bombay in mills, factories, companies, railway workshops, etc. The woollen mill at Thana, the rice mills in the district, match factories at Thana and Ambernath, salt works at Bhayandar, Rai and Belapur and brick works at Kalyan and Bhiwandi and the handlooms, etc., provided sufficient work for both skilled and unskilled labourers, local as well as from other districts.

#### Central Division.

The supply of labour was plentiful throughout the year and the rates of wages both for skilled and unskilled labourers remained steady in all districts except in Poona. On account of military activities the labouring classes from Poona city and the surrounding villages found employment throughout the year at higher rates of wages than they would have been able to get locally. On account of the attraction for the works of the military department at higher wages some difficulty was experienced in getting adequate labour for agriculture. In Indapur taluka the rates of wages decreased by 20 per cent, on account of the scarcity conditions prevailing in the taluka. In the rest of the division the condition of the labourers was normal. As usual the spinning and weaving mills in Khandesh and Sholapur, the sugar factories in Ahmednagar, Nasik, Poona and Sholapur continued to absorb a large number of labourers from the countryside.

#### Southern Division.

The supply of labour was generally equal to the demand except in parts of Bijapur where, owing to the poor season, labourers did not get adequate employment until test works were started. Wages were steady except in Kanara, Kolaba and Ratnagiri where there were slight fluctuations. The condition of the labouring classes was on the whole good and the relations between employers and employed generally satisfactory.

#### 18. SPECIAL MATTERS.

#### Northern Division.

A very unhappy feature of the year was the terrible cyclone that occurred on 14th October 1940. It took considerable toll of lives of fishermen, uprooted fruit trees on the coastal tracts in Thana, Surat

and Bombay Suburban districts and destroyed the standing rice crop in some parts of Bulsar taluka and Chikhli and Pardi mahals. Relief was given to the distressed agriculturists by way of Government grants and grants from "The Times of India Storm Fund" and liberal tagavi grants.

Corruption in Subordinate Revenue Service.—Instructions according to Government orders from time to time were given to the subordinate officers. Touring officers during their tour impressed upon their subordinates that the supplies they purchased in the villages must be fully paid for at the prevailing market rates. Cases of corruption are dealt with promptly and action is taken against the persons who are found guilty.

Progress made in the maintenance and repairs to minor irrigation tanks in charge of Revenue Department.—A grant of Rs. 15,000 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation in charge of the Revenue Department in this division during the year 1940-41 and it was distributed as under:—

Besides this, an amount of Rs. 19,000 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation works executed through the agency of the Public Works Department.

#### Central Division.

- 1. His Excellency's visit.—His Excellency the Governor of Bombay paid a private visit to Ahmednagar. He visited the Fighting Vehicles' School and saw the Maratha battalions stationed in Ahmednagar and met the military officers. He also paid a flying visit to Dhulia and saw the war efforts in the district.
- \*2. Sinnar Mahar Satyagrahas.—The watandar mahars in Sinnar taluka were being advised by their leaders not to pay the increased judi on mahar inam lands under any circumstances and if necessary to suffer the consequences arising therefrom. Dr. Ambedkar threatened Government with a strike. As a result of this there prevailed unrest in the taluka. As the mahars had not paid the increased judi in respect of some of their lands forfeiture had to be resorted to. The whole question was considered.

The matter has now been decided. Government has come to the conclusion that grounds exist which warrant a detailed examination of the present system of hereditary village servants remunerated largely by service lands, but in its opinion the present time, when there are so many matters of greater urgency calling for immediate decision, is not opportune for such an examination.

The Government las, therefore, decided that the main issue should remain in abeyance for the present, and that all orders involving the enhancement of judi should be suspended. In the meanwhile, the Government will continue, wherever possible, to reduce the number of officiators where these are excessive and to increase the remuneration where it is at present below the prescribed scales either by the grant of waste land or, where this is not available, by extra cash remuneration.

3. Famine.—No famine or scarcity was declared in any of the districts in the division.

Owing to complete failure of rabi crops in 16 villages in Indapur taluka of the Poona district, something approaching scarcity conditions prevailed. As the area affected by the scarcity conditions was small, action under section 30 (3) only of the Famine Relief Code was considered sufficient to alleviate the distress. Gratuitous relief was accordingly given to the infirm and decrepit in the form of grain dole. Inferior village servants and patels were given cash doles with effect from January 1st 1941. The total expenditure incurred on gratuitous relief during the year amounted to Rs. 1,074.

On account of failure of rains in 28 villages in Tasgaon taluka, 4 villages in Walwa taluka and 1 in Man mahal of the Satara district, suspensions of land revenue were granted. The District Local Board test works such as repairs to r ads were opened in Tasgaon taluka to provide relief to the needy persons. A grant of Rs. 5,000 was sanctioned for distribution among poor sufferers as a gift for the purchase of famine fodder in the affected villages. Out of this amount Rs. 4,500 were spent. A sum of Rs. 280 was also spent on cash doles to 57 inferior village servants.

As a result of the poor agricultural season in Sholapur district, certain relief measures were started for giving relief to agriculturists and labourers. They were continued till October 1940. The Public Works Department had undertaken metal breaking works on the Provincial roads departmentally. Similarly the District Local Board had undertaken special and original works and village approach road works. The payment of cash doles to the inferior village servants in affected villages in Pandharpur and Sangola talukas was sanctioned. An amount of Rs. 1,400 was sanctioned for the purpose. Restrictions on the export of fodder and jowari were imposed.

4. Grant of waste land on the impartible tenure.—Waste land was given out for cultivation on the impartible tenure as detailed below:—

- 6. No cases of corruption were noticed in any of the districts.
- 7. Floods.—The Arunavati River had heavy floods at Shirpur in West Khandesh on 12th July 1941. Water entered the town and submerged some of the streets. The height of the water level rose by 6 feet. The grain-pits, one oil mill and bazar shops were flooded and damage to the extent of Rs. 42,000 was caused.

In the beginning of the year there were high floods in the Godavari and the Kadwa rivers in Niphad taluka but as the villagers had previous intimation there was no material damage. At the end of the year however the villages of Gondegaon and Kothure were damaged to some extent.

#### Southern Division.

- (i) Corruption in subordinate revenue service.—No cases of corruption in the subordinate service were noticed during the year.
- (ii) Important events.—His Excellency the Governor of Bombay toured in May 1941 in the Karwar, Ankola and Honavar talukas of the Kanara district and Ratnagiri and Rajapur talukas of the Ratnagiri district. The object of the tour was mainly to hear and study the needs and problems of the agriculturists and secondly to tell them about the present war. His Excellency paid a glowing tribute to the Mahratta troops from the Ratnagiri District and elsewhere who distinguished themselves in many theatres of war.
- Mr. J. A. Madan, C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., Adviser to His Excellency, visited the Alibag taluka of the Kolaba district in March 1941.
- Mr. H. F. Knight, C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., paid a visit to the Panvel taluka of the Kolaba district in April 1941 and saw the works of these Patalganga Valley Development Society and other rural development activities.

A violent storm swept over the Konkan coast on the 16th October 1940 and caused considerable loss of property and life. Many country craft engaged in coastal trade were destroyed. His Excellency the Governor visited Alibag taluka on 28th October 1940 in order to see how the relief measures necessitated by the cyclone were being organized.

- Mr. H. F. Knight, C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., Adviser to His Excellency the Governor, visited Dapoli taluka and Guhagar petha in the Ratnagiri district which were particularly affected by the storm. Immediate relief in the form of donations, clothes doles, free grant of timber to rebuild or repair country craft and tagai loans was given. Monthly pensions to orphans and dependents of the men lost in the storm were given from the Times of India Storm Relief Fund.
- (iii) Famine and scarcity.—There was no famine or scarcity except in parts of the Bijapur district where scarcity was declared from 15th April 1941 (vide G. R., R. D., 1747/39, dated 15th April 1941).

(iv) Repairs to small irrigation tanks.—An amount of Rs. 3,692 was spent during the year on repairs carried out through the agency of the Revenue Department to small irrigation works in the districts of Dharwar and Kanara.

(v) Working of the Matheran Hill Station.—The Mamlatdar of Karjat, subject to the control of the Collector, continued to be in charge of the revenue administration and the Divisional Forest Officer, Alibag, in charge of the forest administration of the hill station. The Municipality carried on the work falling within its sphere under the law. St. Paul's Church of Matheran was looked after by the medical officer who is a municipal servant.

- II. Town Planning Schemes.—(a) The Bandra Town Planning Scheme III which was forwarded to Government for sanction was sanctioned by Government to take effect from 15th December 1940.
- (b) Santa Cruz Town Planning Scheme No. V is still with the Consulting Surveyor to Government awaiting Government orders as to whether to proceed with the scheme. Government has been requested to appoint an Arbitrator for the scheme.
- (c) Bandra Town Planning Scheme No. VI which was submitted to Government for sanction was sanctioned by Government to take effect from 7th May 1941.
- (d) The making of Bandra Town Planning Scheme X having been sanctioned by Government. The Bandra Municipality prepared a draft scheme which has since been received from the Municipality for submission to Government for sanction.
- III. State-aided Building Advance Scheme.—Figures of loans granted, recoveries and arrears during the year ending on 31st July 1941 are given below (in round figures).

The decrease in the amount of the loans advanced during 1940-41 is due to very slack demand for loans presumably because of the urban immoveable property tax and the war.

The recoveries from private individuals, Government servants and co-operative societies have been very good. The substantial increase is due to the sale proceeds of some resumed properties.

The amount of arrears of instalments show a considerable decrease since last year and call for no remarks.
