REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL  
JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY  
DURING THE YEAR 1927.

---

1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and not to Sind.

2. *Judicial Staff*—(*Statement No. 1*).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1927 and available for Civil Cases consisted of 8 permanent High Court Judges and 2 temporary Additional Judges; 17 District Judges; 8 Assistant Judges (including two under training); a Chief Judge and 5 Judges (including one Additional Judge) of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 103 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also three Inamdars and Jagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE

The Honourable Sir Amberson Barrington Marten, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 31st December 1927.

PUISNE JUDGES

The Honourable Sir Charles Gordon Hill Fawcett, Knight, from 1st January to 15th June and from 24th October to 31st December 1927. His Lordship was on leave from 16th June to 23rd October 1927.

The Honourable Sir L. C. Crump, Knight, from 1st January to 31st December 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. W. Kemp, from 1st January to 15th June and from 15th September to 31st December 1927. His Lordship was on leave from 16th June to 14th September 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice G. D. Madgavkar, from 1st January to 31st December 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Mirza Ali Akbar Khan, from 1st January to 15th June and from 24th October to 31st December 1927. His Lordship was on leave from 16th June to 23rd October 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. P. Blackwell, from 1st January to 31st December 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice S. S. Patkar, from 1st January to 31st December 1927. His Lordship acted as an Additional Judge from 1st to 5th January and acted as a Judge from 6th to 26th January and was appointed a Puisne Judge from the 27th January 1927 in the vacancy caused by the sad death of the late Sir L. A. Shah.

The Honourable Mr. Justice W. T. W. Baker acted as a Judge of the High Court from 1st January to 17th March, from 16th June to 23rd October and as an Additional Judge from 24th October to 31st December 1927. His Lordship was on leave from 18th March to 15th June 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice S. S. Rangnekar acted as a Judge of the High Court from 17th June to 23rd October 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice K. McL. Kemp acted as a Judge of the High Court from 17th to 21st June 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice K. M. Jhaveri acted as a Judge of the High Court from 1st July to 14th September and as an Additional Judge from 15th September to 21st October 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice F. S. Talyarkhan acted as an Additional Judge from 1st January to 10th June 1927.

The Honourable Mr. Justice J. D. Devar acted as an Additional Judge from 6th January to 8th June and from 29th July to 31st December 1927.

## HIGH COURT

### I.—ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

3. *Original Suits for disposal*—(Statement No. 3).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1926, was 2766, including 45 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1927 was 2,673 including 28 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 421 (including one suit received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year. The above totals 2,766, 2,673 and 421 make an aggregate of 5,860 for disposal in 1927 as against 6,387 in 1926.

4. *Original Suits disposed of*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 3,259 including 16 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 2,601 including 58 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 165 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of those 2,601 suits, 1,582 were ripe for hearing and in arrear, an increase of 201 over the previous year. There were 1,301 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is an increase of 11 suits on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided :—

2,083 were disposed of without contest,

1,176 were disposed of with contest.

6. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1926 was 6. The number instituted during the year 1927 was 21 and 1 was restored during the year. Thus the total for disposal in 1927 was 28. Of these 16 were decided and 12 remained pending at the close of the year. All the suits decided were disposed of with contest.

There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

7. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.*—No suit was pending at the end of the year 1926 and none was instituted and disposed of during the year 1927.

8. *Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.*—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1926 was 10 and the number instituted during 1927 was 6 making a total of 16 for disposal in 1927. Of these 10 were decided and 6 remained pending at the close of the year 1927. There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided :—

6 were dismissed or withdrawn,

4 were decreed for plaintiff after contest.

9. *Insolvency Petitions.*—The number of petitions at the end of the year 1926 was 4,325 and the number instituted during the year 1927 was 1,881, making a total of 6,206 for disposal in 1927. Of these, 1800 were decided and 4,406 remained pending at the close of the year 1927. There were 2,563 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year 1927. The above figures are all substantially larger than in any previous year.

Of the cases decided :—

1,764 were determined without contest,

15 were disposed of by suspending the discharge after contest,

21 were dismissed after contest.

10. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—Nine appeals were pending from the previous year and 1 was admitted during the year, making a total of 10 for disposal in the year 1927. This is a decrease of 5 appeals as compared with the year 1926.

Of the above 10 appeals :—

- 1 was allowed to be withdrawn by an order of the Appeal Court,
- 1 was allowed to be withdrawn by an order of the Privy Council,
- 1 was decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the decree of the Appeal Court,
- 1 was decided by the Privy Council who reversed the decree of the Appeal Court and restored that of the lower Court,
- 6 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including two despatched during the year).

11. *References to take accounts, etc.*—The number of references to take accounts, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioned as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on question of title or questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters, pending at the commencement of the year 1927 was 284. Two hundred and nine references were filed in 1927 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts making a total of 493 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1927 was 251.

12. *Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.*—During the year 600 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 19 pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in “*Forma Pauperis*”, 35 petitions under the Indian Companies’ Act, 57 petitions under the Indian Trust Act, 15 references under the Land Acquisition Act and 470 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 1,196, were filed for disposal.

12A. *Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.*—The number of awards filed during the year was 105.

13. *Applications for execution of decrees, etc.*—(Statement No. 13).—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 829 and the number of applications filed during the year was 2,524 making a total of 3,353 for disposal. Of these 371 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 316 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 54 satisfaction was obtained in part and 1,839 were wholly infructuous, making a total of 2,580, and 773 remained at the close of the year 1927.

Number of Dakhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 39. Number of Decrees received from the other Courts for execution during the year 1927 was 97.

14. *Receipts and Expenditure.*—The following statement shows receipts and expenditure of the High Court on the Original Side during the year 1927 :—

## II.—APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

*Appeals from High Court Decrees under Section 15 of the Letters Patent*

17. (*Statement No. 7*).—Fifty appeals from decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were filed during the year and 27 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 77, 34 were decided and 43 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 10 than in 1926. These 34 appeals were decided as under :—

- 2 dismissed or not prosecuted ;
- 23 decrees of the Courts of first instance confirmed ;
- 1 decree of the Court of first instance modified ; and
- 8 decrees of the Courts of first instance reversed.

18. (*Statement No. 8*).—Twenty-three appeals from Orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 28 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 51, 36 were decided and 15 (including one over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of such appeals disposed of was less by seven than in 1926. The disposals of these appeals were as follows :—

- 4 dismissed or not prosecuted ;
- 14 orders of the Courts of first instance confirmed ;
- 1 order of the Court of first instance modified ; and
- 17 orders of the Courts of first instance reversed.

19. (*Statement No. 7*).—On the Appellate Side, 75 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court decrees were filed during the year and 48 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 123, 80 were decided and 43 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was more by 29 than in 1926. The disposals of these appeals were as under :—

- 57 dismissed or not prosecuted ;
- 18 decrees appealed against confirmed ;
- 3 decrees appealed against modified ; and
- 2 decrees appealed against reversed.

The statement in the margin shows the numbers of first and second appeals from decrees and appeals from orders of the Provincial Courts of Original and Appellate Jurisdiction, which came before the High Court and were decided during

the year. The institutions of first and second appeals were more by 127 and 110 respectively than in 1926 and the institutions of appeals from orders were less by seven than in that year. The figure of 581 for new first appeals was a record and that of 1,055 for new second appeals was the highest since the year 1918.

21. *Appeals decided—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—*The disposals of first and second appeals show a decrease of 177 and 19 respectively on the figures of the previous year and the disposals of appeals from orders show no change during the year.

22. *Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—*At the close of the year, 1,124 first appeals, 1,170 second appeals and 73 appeals from orders were pending. The aggregate total of the pending appeals is more by 771 than in 1926. The number of pending first appeals is a record and that of second appeals is the largest since the year 1918.

23. *Comparative statement of civil work of the High Court during the past four years—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—*The following statement shows in detail the civil business which has come before and disposed of by the High Court in its Appellate Jurisdiction during each of the past four years :—

24. *Results of appeals—(Statement No. 7).*—Of the 197 appeals from Original Decrees decided, 47 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 150, the decrees of the lower Courts were confirmed in 104, reversed in 30 and modified in 11; and five cases were remanded.

Of the 679 appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 458 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 221, the decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed in 168, reversed in 39 and modified in nine; and five were remanded.

(*Statement No. 8.*)—of the 68 appeals from Orders decided, 36 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 32, the orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 18, reversed in eight and modified in three; and three were remanded.

During the year under report, one appeal under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, was filed and one was pending at the beginning of the year. Out of the total two cases, one was decided, the order of the lower Court being confirmed. One appeal remained pending at the close of the year.

No references under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed during the year.

References under other Acts filed during the year were as follows:—

- 13 under the Aden Act (Bombay Act II of 1864);
- 5 under the Income Tax Act (Act XI of 1922);
- 1 under the Presidency Small Cause Courts' Act (Act XV of 1882);
- 4 under the Indian Divorce Act (Act IV of 1869); and

25. *Appeals to the Privy Council.*—At the opening of the year, 14 appeals were under preparation for despatch to England and five applications for leave to appeal were pending orders. Ten new applications were filed during the year as against 25 during the previous year. Of the total number of applications for leave to appeal, four were withdrawn, six were rejected, in two the Rule was discharged and in three the Rule was made absolute. No application for leave to appeal remained pending at the close of the year. During the year, 17 appeals were despatched to England.

26. *Results of appeals to the Privy Council.*—During the year, eight appeals from the High Court were decided by the Privy Council and 23 appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year. Out of the eight appeals decided, the decisions of this High Court were confirmed in five and reversed in the remaining three appeals.

#### CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

##### APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

28. *Appeals instituted*—(Statement No. 7).—5,506 appeals were instituted in 1927, showing an increase of 559 as compared with the previous year.

The number of appeals instituted was larger in 10 and smaller in 7 Districts.

\* *Note.*—These contingent charges were paid out of the Sutors Investment Fund Interest Account pursuant to the order of the Honourable the Chief Justice dated the 9th day of April 1923.

There were noticeable increases in Dharwar (131), Kanara (69), Belgaum (53), East Khandesh (87), West Khandesh (72), Thana (59), Broach and Panch Mahals (53) and Ahmedabad (240), and noticeable decrease in Kaira (161). In the remaining Districts the variations were less than 40.

29. *Appeals disposed of*—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—5,317 appeals were disposed of during the year including 208 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers. These two figures are more by 713 and less by 154 respectively than the corresponding figures of the previous year.

There was an increase in the disposals in 8 Districts, the greatest increase being in Belgaum (413), followed by Satara (291), Dharwar (117), Poona (110), Ahmedabad (86), Kanara (69), Surat (68) and West Khandesh (66). On the other hand, there was a decrease in the disposals, in 5 Districts, the greatest being in Sholapur (291), followed by Nasik (52), Ratnagiri (46), East Khandesh (45) and Thana (43). In the remaining 4 Districts, the variations were less than 30.

30. *Appeals pending*—(Statement No. 7).—There were 4,980 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being more by 189 than at the end of 1926.

(Statement No. 14).—The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 1,114 to 1,141.

31. *Results of appeals*—(Statement No. 7).—The results of the decision of the appeals in the lower Courts during the year were as follows:—

In 715 cases, or 13·4 per cent. of the whole, the appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 3,049 cases or 57·3 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 514 or 9·7 per cent. they were modified, in 780 or 14·7 per cent. they were reversed and in the remaining 259 cases or 4·9 per cent. the appeals were remanded.

32. *Miscellaneous appeals*—(Statement No. 8).—Four hundred and forty-four miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 173 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 617,467 were disposed of during the year and 150 remained pending at its close. The number pending was less by 23 than in the previous year.

## CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

### I. *Mofussil Courts.*

33. *Changes in Jurisdiction*.—During the year under report, changes were effected in the jurisdiction of some of the Civil Courts in the Presidency as under:—

(1) With effect from 10th February 1927, the Courts of the Subordinate Judges of Ankleshwar in the Broach and Panch Mahals District and Olpad in the Surat District were presided over by one Subordinate Judge, as per Government Notification, Home Department, No. 9333 dated 24th January 1927.

(2) With effect from the 15th April 1927, the Courts at Amalner and Erandol which were linked by Government Notification, Home Department, No. 1315-C dated the 22nd December 1922 were dislinked as per Government Notification, Home Department, No. 657/2 dated 12th April 1927.

(3) With effect from 21st April 1927, the Town of Anand and the Village of Gamdi in the Anand Taluka of Kaira District ceased to be included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Borsad and were included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Nadiad, as per Government Notification, Home Department, No. 568/2 dated 12th April 1927.

34. *Original suits instituted*—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1927 was 143,813, an increase of 15,874 on the figures of the previous year.

The increase occurred in money suits to the extent of 15·5 per cent. while the decrease was of ·1 per cent. in title and other suits, the number of money suits instituted being 1,18,255 as against 1,02,347 in 1926 and that of title and other suits being 25,558 as against 25,592 in 1926.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits instituted in 1927 amounted to Rs. 4,69,69,809, a decrease of Rs. 22,73,177 on the total for 1926.

35. *Local distribution*—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1927 showed an increase in all the districts except in Ahmednagar, as compared with that of 1926.

The increase was most marked in the districts of East Khandesh (5,813), followed by Kaira (1,583), West Khandesh (1,413) and Ahmednagar (1,316). In the remaining districts, the increase was less than 1,000.

(Statement No. 3).—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in East Khandesh (19,811). In no other district except Poona, Nasik, Ahmedabad and Kaira did the institutions exceed 10,000. Institutions ranged between 5,000 to 10,000 in Ratnagiri, Dharwar, Belgaum, Sholapur, Bijapur, West Khandesh, Ahmednagar, Satara, Thana, Surat and Broach and Panch Mahals. Kolaba showed only 3,325 suits as instituted while the lowest figure 3,319 came to the share of Kanara.

36. *Number of suits disposed of*—(Statement No. 5).—In addition to the 1,43,813 suits instituted during the year and 60,116 suits pending trial from the previous year, 1,736 suits were revived or received on remand or review making a total of 2,05,665 suits for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 1,43,112, an increase of 14,597 on the figure of 1926.

Of the total number of suits disposed of during the year, viz., 1,43,112, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (that is, Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 1,31,068 suits, Small Cause Courts 11,268, District Courts 738 and the remaining 38 suits were decided by Unpaid Tribunals (that is, Inamdars and Jagirdars).

37. *Results of suits decided*—(Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 13,405 or 9·4 per cent. were disposed of without trial; 60,793 or 42·5 per cent. without contest; 68,312 or 47·7 per cent. with contest; and 602 or ·4 per cent. by compromise.

Of the 68,312 suits decided on contest, 60,768 or 89 per cent. resulted in favour of the plaintiffs and 7,544 or 11 per cent. in favour of the defendants.

38. *Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jagirdars*—(Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 38 original suits of which 10 were contested. In 1926, the figures were 40 and 13 respectively.

39. *Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 1,31,068, an increase of 14,375 on the figures of the previous year. The increase is chiefly in the number of cases decided under the ordinary procedure and appears in both contested and uncontested suits. The figures of suits decided under the Small Cause Court procedure show an aggregate increase of 6,714, there being an increase of 1,408 in contested suits and of 5,306 in uncontested suits. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 75,728 and under the small cause procedure, 55,340. Of these 51·9 and 42·3 per cent. respectively were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest both under the ordinary and under the Small Cause Court procedure shows a decrease of 3·1 and 2·9 respectively as compared with that of the previous year.

40. *Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges*—(Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 11,268 suits, an increase of 437 on the total of the previous year's disposals. Of these, 5,624 were decided uncontested and the remaining 5,644 suits were disposed of after contest. The former shows a decrease by 739 while the latter an increase of 1,176 as against those shown in the previous year.

41. *Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges*—(Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 738 original suits of which 524 (141 less than last year) were contested.

42. *Pending Suits*—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 62,553 as against 60,116 in the previous year. So, there was an increase of 2,437 suits.

(Statement No. 14).—Of the pending cases, 5,691 had been pending for more than a year; this shows a decrease of 1,232 over the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, three were in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jagirdars, 5,521 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 130 in the Small Cause Courts and 37 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with last year an increase of 45 in the Courts of the Provincial Small Causes and a decrease of 6, 1,156, and 165 respectively in the other Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Poona (796), followed by Satara (724), Ahmedabad (522), Nasik (498) and Belgaum (418). The remaining districts showed figures below 400. As compared with the figures of the previous year, the number of a year old suits shows an increase of 187, 179 and 12 only in the cases of Satara, Nasik and Poona. East Khandesh shows a better progress than other districts in point of decrease. It shows a decrease of 408 suits. The next in rank stands Dharwar (222), followed by Kanara (192), Belgaum (189), Ahmednagar (172), Ahmedabad (116) and Sholapur (105). The remaining districts show decreases of less than 100.

43. *Execution Proceedings*—(Statement No. 13).—There were 56,601 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year and 1,34,219 were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Court, 1,27,678 applications were disposed of during the year and 63,142 remained pending at its close. The disposals of the applications were as under :—

The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was 77,43,433-13-11.

Debtors were imprisoned in 309 cases, moveable property sold in 884 and immovable property in 3,113.

44. *Miscellaneous Cases*—(Statement No. 6).—The number of miscellaneous institutions rose from 12,036 to 12,970. That of miscellaneous disposals rose from 11,498 to 12,314 and that of pending cases from 4,759 to 5,415. Of the cases disposed of, 1,397 were decided without trial, 3,753 without contest, 1 on reference to arbitration and 7,163 after contest. Of these 7,163 contested cases, 4,704 or 65·7 per cent. were decided in favour of the plaintiffs.

## II. *Bombay Small Cause Court.*

45. (Statements Nos. 3 and 5).—The number of suits instituted, decided and pending, at the close of the year 1927 in the Presidency Small Cause Court were 35,754, 36,892 and 4,653 respectively. The institutions and the disposals show an increase of 480 and 1,755 over the figures of the previous year, while the number of suits pending at the end of the year was less by 1,138.

(Statement No. 4).—There was an increase in the institutions of suits not exceeding Rs. 100 in value whereas a decrease occurred in the case of suits above Rs. 100 but not exceeding Rs. 2,000.

The total value of the litigation again showed a decrease. The figure was Rs. 81,56,270-3-0 as against Rs. 86,34,540-11-0 in the preceding year.

46. *Mode of disposal*—(Statement No. 5).—Of the 36,892 suits disposed of, 761 were decided without trial, 31,382 without contest, 4,678 after contest and 71 upon reference to arbitration.

47. *Execution of decrees*—(Statement No. 12).—Of the 21,370 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 1,871 pending from the previous year), 19,210 were disposed of and 2,160 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter figure, 367 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 7,010 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 11,205 were returned as wholly infructuous, and 995 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 15,82,281-4-11 as compared with Rs. 8,91,396-13-5 in the preceding year.

48. *Coercive processes*—(Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 353 cases and sale of moveables in 789. The former figure shows an increase of 110, while the latter, a decrease of 146, over the figures of the last year.

#### GENERAL.

49. As compared with the figures of 1926, the number of suits instituted and disposed of in Subordinate Judges' Courts in 1927 increased by 15,854 and 14,375 respectively, the number of regular suits disposed of being more by 7,661 and those under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction being more by 6,714. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year, the total number of suits pending show an increase from 55,118 to 57,675 while the number of suits pending over a year show a decrease from 6,677 to 5,521.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts increased by 713. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers disposed of 208 appeals as against 362 in 1926. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts increased from 4,791 to 4,980.

The number of suits instituted on the Original Side of the High Court in 1927 showed a decrease of 318 while the number of those disposed of increased by 267. The number of pending suits decreased from 7,105 to 7,025.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court, the total number of institutions of appeals showed an increase of 223 whereas that of their disposal decreased by 167. The total arrears of appeals on the Appellate Side increased from 1,614 to 2,410.

50. *Inspection*.—The tour of inspection of the District and Subordinate Courts in the Presidency undertaken by the Honourable Mr. Justice Madgavkar from 8th November 1926 ended on 17th March 1927. During the period which fell in the year under report, his Lordship inspected



the District Courts, the First Class Subordinate Courts and the Magisterial Courts at the Sadar Stations in the districts of Poona, Satara, Ratnagiri, Kanara, Dharwar, Belgaum, Bijapur, Sholapur, Ahmednagar, and Nasik.

During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges: Shevgaon and Parner in the Ahmednagar District; Kapadvanj, Kaira, Umreth and Borsad in the Kaira District; Honavar and Sirsi in the Kanara District; Chalisgaon, Bhusawal and Jalgaon First Class Court in the East Khandesh District; Satana in the Nasik District; Khed, Junnar and Saswad in the Poona District; Dapoli, Chiplun, Malwan, Vengurla and Deorukh in the Ratnagiri District; Dahiwadi and Tasgaon in the Satara District; Pandharpur and Sholapur First Class Court in the Sholapur District; Surat First Class Court in the Surat District; and Alibag, Mahad, Pen, Roha, Andheri and Dahanu in the Thana District.

51. *Judicial Conferences.*—The District Judges of Belgaum, East Khandesh and Thana assembled Judicial Conferences of the Judges subordinate to them and points touching on the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.

52. *Receipts and Charges of the High Court.*—For the year 1927 the total receipts of the High Court as shown in paragraphs 14 and 27 were Rs. 19,59,385-13-1 on the Original Side and Rs. 2,14,247-12-4 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 21,73,633-9-5. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 7,08,773-2-9 on the Original Side and Rs. 4,42,403-6-0 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 11,51,176-8-9. The difference between these two aggregates shows a net profit of Rs. 10,22,457-0-8. This profit includes the Probate and Administration Duty (the cost of collecting which is borne by the High Court) but is exclusive of the net profit shown on the working of the office of the Official Assignee, which amounted for the year 1927 to a further sum of Rs. 85,890.

53. *Receipts and Charges of all the Civil and Criminal Courts in the Presidency.*—The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) in the Presidency have risen from Rs. 86,29,433 to Rs. 87,62,282, and the total charges from Rs. 55,71,859 to Rs. 67,49,425. These figures have been supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042 dated 11th August 1893. They show a net profit for this year of Rs. 20,12,857. The apparent drop in profit is due to the fact that charges amounting to Rs. 18,51,962 for expenditure on account of the Courts in the City of Bombay are included in the Accountant General's figures for this year, but were not included in his figures for the two previous years.

54. As regards the general work of the High Court, it may be said to fall into two natural divisions, viz., (a) judicial work and (b) administrative work. As regards (a) a comparison made with the High Court in England shows that the sittings in open Court are now substantially the same in each country, viz., 5 hours per day for 5 days per week.

As regards vacations, those of this High Court (including the Christmas and Easter holidays) are less, *viz.*, 12½ weeks against 16½ weeks in England, but the addition of certain Government public holidays numbering about 18 days in all brings the aggregate vacations and holidays of this High Court to about 15 weeks against the English High Courts 16½ weeks. As regards (b) the administrative work of this High Court is heavy and increasing in burden. It is work which speaking generally has not to be done by High Court Judges in England and it necessitates much time being spent out of ordinary Court hours. Further the necessity of correcting and signing the short-hand notes of oral judgments involves another serious expenditure of time out of Court, which is not experienced in England.

A special feature in the administrative work of the year was the institution by the Chief Justice in October 1927 of an enquiry into the re-organisation of the whole of the Departments and staff of the High Court. This involved very heavy work on the Sub-Committees of Judges engaged, but most of the reports were ready by the end of the year.

55. As regards litigation in the High Court, Statement No. 15 is new and shows the number of institutions and disposals on the Original as well as the Appellate Side from 1908 to 1927, including the number of Judges in each year. This statement shows that a striking feature during the year 1927 was the large increase in the number of new first and second appeals on the Appellate Side (Civil Report, para. 20) : and of Criminal Sessions Cases (Criminal Report, para. 18). A comparison of statistics with other High Courts in India for the year 1927 shows that although this High Court had fewer Judges than any other except perhaps Patna, yet it had the largest number of Original Side suits and of Criminal Sessions Cases of any High Court, and also of new first appeals except one Court which had 16 more. The 10 permanent and additional Judges of this Court are insufficient to cope with the present volume of civil and criminal work. In the result, on the Original Side the arrears of suits ready for hearing have increased by 201 from 1,381 to 1,582 (Civil Report, paragraph 4) : and on the Appellate Side the number of pending first appeals have increased by 384 from 740 to 1,124 ; and of pending second appeals by 376 from 794 to 1,170, making a total increase of 760 first and second appeals (Civil Report, paragraph 20). The present position, therefore, involves serious delay and consequent hardship on a large number of litigants.

**REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL  
JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY  
DURING THE YEAR 1927.**

---

1. *Judicial Staff*—(*Statement No. 1*).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on the 31st December 1927 and available for Criminal Cases consisted of 8 permanent and two temporary High Court Judges; 17 Sessions Judges; 2 Additional Sessions Judges; 4 Assistant Sessions Judges; 352 First Class Magistrates; 377 Second Class Magistrates; 244 Third Class Magistrates; 155 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889; and 268 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above, there were 19,769 Police Patils in the Presidency exercising powers under Section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, of whom 545 were invested with powers under Section 15 of that Act.

There were also 49 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of four in the City of Bombay constituted from 458 Honorary Magistrates.

2. *Offences reported*—(*Statement No. II*).—There were 2,13,350 criminal offences reported during the year an increase of 906 on the figures of 1926. In the Districts of Belgaum, East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik, Thapa, Ahmedabad and Panch Mahals, there was a noticeable increase in the number of offences reported during the year but a noticeable decrease in the Districts of Sholapur, Poona, Surat and in the City of Bombay. Of the total number of offences reported, 51,959 were under the Indian Penal Code and 1,61,391 under Special and Local Laws.

3. *Complaints dismissed* (Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and *Complainants fined* (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—(*Statement No. III*).—The number of complaints dismissed under Section 203 was 6,865 and the number of complainants fined under Section 250 was 491.

4. *Cases found to be true*.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 2,05,286 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 2,01,571. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 28 and 107 respectively on the figures of 1926.

5. *Murders reported as true*.—Out of 754 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 236 were murders of which 158 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1926 were 697,221 and 150.

## ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

## I.—PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

6. *Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. II).*—The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates, was 22,385 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates, 88,479, making a total of 1,10,864. This number is less by 1,619 than that of 1926, when the corresponding figures were 26,367 and 86,116 making a total of 1,12,483. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 100,144 or 2,428 less than that in 1926, whereas cases under the Indian Penal Code rose from 9,911 to 10,720. The decrease under the former head was most marked in offences under the Public Conveyances Act which fell from 10,574 to 7,546; under the City of Bombay Municipal Act, from 12,320 to 9,366; and under the City of Bombay Police Act, from 52,839 to 50,988. The number of offences under the Indian Railways Act fell from 1,055 to 958; under the Bombay Abkari Act from 365 to 226; under the Opium Act from 166 to 88; and under the Bombay Rent Act from 160 to 118. There was a noticeable increase in offences under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act which rose from 21,777 to 27,130. The number of offences under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act rose from 2,075 to 2,201; under the Prevention of Gambling Act from 735 to 946; under the Indian Lepers Act from 29 to 73; under the European Vagrancy Act from 52 to 80 and under the Prostitution Act from 69 to 95. As regards offences under the Indian Penal Code, there was an increase in the offences of Hurt from 1,501 to 1,914; of Criminal Breach of Trust from 642 to 789; of Cheating from 480 to 616; of Criminal Trespass from 390 to 570; and of Criminal Intimidation, Insult and Annoyance from 951 to 1,922. There was a slight increase in respect of offences against the Public Tranquillity which rose from 14 to 31; of Criminal Force and Assault from 1,213 to 1,241; of Kidnapping, Forceful Abduction, Slavery and Forced Labour from 60 to 80; of offences relating to Marriage from 81 to 117 and of Defamation from 121 to 191. On the other hand, there was a decrease in offences affecting the Public Health, Safety, Convenience, Decency and Morals which fell from 207 to 160; of Wrongful Restraint and Wrongful Confinement from 154 to 111; of Theft from 2,383 to 2,263 and of Receiving of Stolen Property from 179 to 159. Excluding those enumerated above, the variations were but very slight in respect of other offences both under the Indian Penal Code and Special and Local Laws. The substantial increase in cases of Criminal Breach of Trust and Cheating, *viz.*, approximately 25 per cent. is to be noted, as these cases generally involve details which make serious demands on the Magistrates' limited time.

(*Statements Nos. 2 and 9.*)—During the year, 1,09,103 regular and 685 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and only 1,761 regular cases were pending at the close of the year.

7. *Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).*—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 1,19,947. Of the persons

tried, 13,814 were acquitted or discharged; 1,03,107 were convicted; 232 were committed to the High Court; 1 died during the trial; 29 were transferred to other provinces; 7 were sent to the Military Authorities and 2,757 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 4,499 were convicted and 10,294 were acquitted. The results of the trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. *Punishments*—(Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 9,922 were punished with imprisonment, 84,756 with fine and 90 with whipping. 6,081 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 73 persons were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga and 1,053 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 4,24,431. The total amount realized was Rs. 3,33,152-0-0 of which Rs. 20,739-11-8 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to these sentences, three complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

## II.—MAGISTRATES INCLUDING VILLAGE OFFICERS AND SANITARY COMMITTEES AND SANITARY BOARDS.

9. *Results of trials*—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these Tribunals was 1,36,862. Of these, the cases of 903 persons were committed or referred to the Sessions and the cases of the remaining 1,35,959 persons were finally disposed of by the various Tribunals. Of the total 1,35,959, 66,071 or 48·6 per cent. were convicted and 69,224 or 50·9 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 54 persons died and 607 escaped during their trials and 3 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates and Village Officers at the close of the year was 9,796 as compared with 9,771 in 1926.

The general results of trials before Magistrates of each class are as follows :—

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 1,477 were for terms not exceeding 15 days ; 5,532 for terms not exceeding 6 months ; 1,143 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 2 for terms above two years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 156 persons ; in 1926, the figure was 195.

The amounts of fines imposed and realized during the year were Rs. 7,62,004-7-4 and Rs. 6,22,560-9-11 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 28,255-2-6 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 488 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 315 last year.

### III.—COURTS OF SESSION.

11. *Results of trials*—(Statement No. 9).—There were 1,958 persons or 149 more than in 1926 under trial. The cases of 1,770 persons were decided while those of 188 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 1,770 persons tried, 929 or 52·5 per cent were convicted ; 788 or 44·5 per cent. were acquitted or discharged ; the cases of 51 persons were referred to the High Court under Sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 2 persons died during trial.

12. *Punishments*—(*Statement No. 12*).—The following sentences were passed by the Courts of Session :—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 27,744 were imposed by Courts of Session as compared with Rs. 53,814 in the preceding year. The total realization amounted to Rs. 14,902-11-9 as compared with Rs. 21,512 in 1926, and the total amount of fines paid as compensation was Rs. 960 as against Rs. 3,236 in 1926.

## APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

### APPELLATE COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

#### *I.—Appeals.*

13. (*Statement No. 2*).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 3,149 as against 2,938 in the preceding year, an increase of 211.

14. *Magistrates' Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,340. Of these, the appeals of 376 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,151 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,527 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 65·3 per cent. Of the remainder, 240 appellants or 10·3 per cent. obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them and 516 or 22 per cent. an annulment. The cases of 57 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1926, the results were not as favourable to the appellants as in that year.

15. *Sessions Courts*—(*Statement No. 10*).—During the year, the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Session was 2,580. The appeals of 872 persons (or 33·8 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 939 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful; 336 obtained an alteration of sentence; 411 were acquitted; the cases of 13 appellants were otherwise disposed of; 8 were transferred and one appellant died during trial.

The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and completely successful were 70·2, 13 and 15·9 per cent. respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 55, 19·7 and 24 per cent. If admitted appeals are only considered, these results were on the whole less favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 43·7 as against 53·3 in 1926.

## II. Superintendence, Reference and Revision.

16. *Magistrates' Courts*—(Statement No. 10).—The cases of 267 accused persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was more by 30 than in 1926. Of the total applications, those of 222 persons were rejected and those of 45 were otherwise disposed of.

17. *Sessions Courts*—(Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 859 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was less by 56 than in 1926. Applications of 685 persons were rejected and those of 174 were otherwise disposed of.

## HIGH COURT.

### I.—ORIGINAL JURISDICTION. (HIGH COURT SESSIONS.)

18. *Commitments to the High Court*—(Statement No. 9).—One hundred and fifty-four cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including one pending at the end of the previous year. Of these, 151 were decided and 3 remained pending at the end of the year. These 151 cases occupied in all 154 days. This may be compared with 105 cases occupying 110 days in 1926. This heavy increase resulted in the time of one High Court Judge being occupied for most of the year over criminal sessions work to the detriment of the disposals of civil work. The figure of 154 days is a record.

Altogether 198 persons were tried of whom 157 were convicted; 40 were acquitted and one died during trial.

19. *Punishments*—(Statement No. 12).—The following sentences were passed:—

The fines imposed and realized during the year amounted to Rs. 1,905 and 1,355 respectively. Out of the amount realized, Rs. 82 were paid as compensation to complainants.

## II.—APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

20. (*Statement No. 10*).—Seventy-nine appeals were pending before the High Court at the opening of the year, from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 651 appeals were preferred and 667 decided leaving 63 pending at its close. The number of appeals preferred and pending are less by 9 and 16 respectively while that of decided cases is more by 25 than in the preceding year.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 521 were from Courts of Session and 101 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates, whereas 29 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

21. *Results of appeals*.—Five hundred and thirty-six appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences were upheld in 463 cases, reversed in 34 and modified in 36. Two appeals were returned for presentation to the proper Courts and one was remanded for retrial.

Ninety-seven appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided and the sentences in all the cases were upheld.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 488 persons were summarily dismissed under Section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, the sentences of 132 appellants were confirmed; those of 41 altered; those of 47 reversed and 3 were otherwise disposed of, *i.e.*, one was ordered to be retried and the remaining two were asked to approach the proper Courts.

In appeals against acquittal orders, sentences were passed by the High Court on 22 persons while in the case of 25 persons the orders of acquittal were confirmed and in the case of 6 persons the proceedings were dropped.

Thirty-four appeals by the Local Government against acquittal orders involving 53 accused persons were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 8 appeals involving 16 accused, the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of all and convicted them. In 14 cases involving 24 accused, the High Court upheld the orders of acquittal and dismissed the appeals. In 10 appeals, the orders of acquittal were set

aside and the 10 accused involved therein were ordered to be retried. In one involving 2 accused, the High Court set aside the order of acquittal and convicted one accused, the appeal against the other being dismissed and in one appeal, the accused was convicted of and sentenced under one charge, the order of acquittal on the remaining charges being upheld.

### III.—SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

22. *References under Section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Two references were pending in the High Court at the beginning of the year and 7 were submitted to it during the year. Of them, 8 were decided during the year. Out of the 8 cases decided, involving 13 accused therein, the High Court convicted 7 accused and the remaining 6 were acquitted. In 6 cases, the High Court agreed with the Sessions Judges and in the remaining 2, it accepted the verdict of the Jury.

23. *References under Section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.*—Twenty-nine references under this Section were submitted to the High Court during the year for confirmation of death sentences and 6 were pending at the opening. Thirty-five cases involving 43 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 26 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 8. Out of the remaining persons, 8 were acquitted and the sentence of death passed on one was commuted to one of 6 years' rigorous imprisonment.

During the year under report, 31 persons were executed in the Presidency.

24. *Revision.*—One hundred and eleven cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under Section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and 26 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 120 were decided during the year and 17 remained pending. The number reported was more by 4 than in 1926. In 21 cases the orders sent up for revision were reversed and in 13 the proceedings were quashed and new trials were ordered. Sentences were reduced or altered in 17 and enhanced in 27 cases; in 37 cases, the High Court declined to interfere and in 4 cases, it quashed all the proceedings; the remaining one case was otherwise disposed of.

Orders were passed under Section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 347 cases, an increase of 86 on the figures of the previous year. Of these, 338 came before the High Court on application and 9 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion.

Of the 338 applications for the issue of Rule, 203 were rejected. Of the 135 Rules issued, 80 were finally discharged, 30 were made absolute in their entirety, in 23 the orders complained of were modified and the remaining two were withdrawn.

In 2 out of the 9 cases taken up by the High Court *Suo Motu* the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 4 the sentences were

enhanced, in 1 it was reduced and in the remaining 2 cases, they were set aside.

25. *Applications for transfer.*—Sixty-three applications under Section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases (56 original and 7 appeals) from one Court or District to another were received during the year and 11 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of these, 70 were decided during the year and 4 remained pending. Twenty-four were summarily rejected and in 10 transfers were granted without the issue of a Rule. In the 36 applications in which Rules were issued, transfers were granted in 18 and refused in 15 while 3 applications were withdrawn.

26. *Miscellaneous applications.*—Fourteen applications for bail, 14 for maintenance, 8 for compensation, 8 for disposal of property, 2 for stay of proceedings, 2 for sanction, and 14 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.

#### GENERAL.
