Report of the Local Audit Department for the year ending the 31st March 1929.

RESOLUTION.

- 1. Constitution.—There was no change in the constitution of district councils or local boards or in the number of official chairmen which remained at two.
- Elections.—No general elections were held during the year. These were due in the districts of the Jubbulpore Division, but were postponed to December 1929 on account of the scarcity conditions prevailing in those districts. The elections in the Wardha district, which were completed during the year, were marked by a keen contest between the communal non-Brahmin and non-communal parties. By-elections were held in 15 districts, but out of 32 seats, only eight were contested. Fourteen local board circles of the Saugor, Damoh and Mandla districts continued to be unrepresented as before and steps are being taken to revise these circles. Similar action seems to be necessary in respect of some of the circles in the Raipur, Bilaspur and Drug districts where, out of the five seats which remained vacant at the last general elections for want of candidates, four still remain unfilled and three more have been added to the list during the year. Seven election petitions were made to the Local Government in revision and all of them were rejected. The function of disposing

of such petitions has been transferred to civil courts since October 1928.

- 3. Disposal of business.—All the district councils except one and all the local boards except 20 held the prescribed number of meetings. The Yeotmal District Council held only three meetings, but this was mainly due to the delay involved in the disposal of several election petitions, while the Gondia and Garchiroli Local Boards did not hold the prescribed number of meetings owing to internal disputes. No explanation is given in the district reports regarding the other boards. The total number of meetings held was 797 against 806 in the previous year. Of these, 79 proved abortive for want of quorum as compared with 78 in the previous year. The Local Boards, Murwara, Banda, Betul, Balod Bazar, Drug Northern Zamindaris and Drug Southern Zamindaris had an inordinately large number of abortive meetings. The average percentage of attendance of members of local boards and district councils rose from 48 to 51 and 59 to 61, respectively. The percentage was low in five district councils and 35 local boards, the Local Board, Baloda Bazar, being again the This is attributed to certain members worst offender. having attended very few meetings or none at all. only remedy for this is to remove the defaulting members under section 17 (2) of the Local Self-Government Act. but Government regrets to find that no action in this direction has been so far taken by any district council in spite of repeated advice on this matter in previous resolutions. It has been suggested that local bodies are not likely to take proper action against absentees unless a statutory obligation is cast on them by an amendment of the Act, but Government is reluctant to take any action in this direction and would once again impress on the local bodies concerned that failure to take action against defaulting members reacts unfavourably on the general efficiency of the administration and tends to discredit local selfgovernment in the eyes of the public.
- 4. General financial results.—The year opened with a balance of Rs. 22,08,049, while the total receipts from all sources amounted to Rs. 96,94,912. The expenditure was Rs. 88,93,206, and the closing balance was Rs. 30,09,755. The following table shows how the net expenditure in the various departments of the councils'

The closing balances of several district councils fell below the prescribed minimum and in some cases only exceeded the minimum owing to the inclusion of unspent balances of Government grants. It is essential that these councils should by careful budgeting get the true closing balance raised to above the prescribed minimum as soon as possible.

5. General departments.—Under this head are included "General Administration", "Law and Justice," "Scientific and other Miscellaneous Departments except Veterinary", "the Administration of the Northern India Ferries Act", "the District Council properties, including land and buildings", "Rest-houses", "Sarais" and "Road side trees". On the income side under this head are included "Land Revenue", "Local rates", "Fees", "Fines", "Rents", "Sale of produce and Other Miscellaneous receipts". The income and expenditure under this head rose from Rs. 34,21,064 and Rs. 9,44,695 to Rs. 36,23,050 and Rs. 10,58,641, respectively. There was

a marked increase under the heads "Land Revenue" (Rs. 66,209), "Local rates" (Rs. 1,21,703) and "Miscellaneous" (Rs. 27,956). The increase under "Land Revenue" was due to the fact that the receipts on this account were misclassified last year under "Local rates". The increase in income under "Local rates" was due to several causes, viz., some more markets were declared as public under section 23 of the Local Self-Government Act, the special school rate was recovered in Berar through Government agency for the first time, the assessment of land revenue in the Akola and Buldana districts was revised and the cess in these districts correspondingly increased, the terminal tax on bidi and bidi leaves in the Bhandara district and the ginning and pressing tax in the Nimar district yielded a larger income, while an additional cess under section 49 of the Act was also imposed in the latter district. The increase under "Miscellaneous" is mainly attributable to the grants made by Government to district councils for the payment of contributions to village panchayats. There was, however, a noticeable fall in the total receipts from "Cesses", owing to the fact that a large proportion of cesses in the three northern districts was suspended on account of the crop failure. This seriously affected the financial position of those three district councils with the result that the District Councils of Saugor and Damoh had to be given temporary advances of Rs. 34,000 and R_{\odot} 37,000, respectively, to meet their liabilities. Jubbulpore District Council on the other hand was able to carry on through its having a large surplus balance in deposit. The bulk of the increase in expenditure was under the heads "Superannuation Allowances and Pensions" and "Miscellaneous—Civil Works".

o. Cattle-pounds.—The number of cattle-pounds rose further from 1,774 to 1,778. The receipts rose by Rs. 39,460 to Rs. 8,67,001 and the expenditure by Rs. 4,403 to Rs. 3,65,654, leaving a surplus of Rs. 5,01,347 against Rs. 4,66,290 in the previous year. This increase in the receipts was shared by all divisions except Jubbulpore where the crop in many cases was so poor that it was not worth reaping and the cattle were let in, with the natural result that there were less cases of cattle trespass. It is noteworthy that the increase in the income from pounds has occurred for the first time after several years

of progressive decrease. This is attributable in some districts to the revision of the scale of fines and also to increased vigilance on the part of some of the local bodies. The experiment of having whole-time pound-keepers started by the Yeotmal District Council is reported to have been a success, but Government is not prepared to advocate its extension till it has been given a longer test. There are still indications that in some districts the administration of pounds is not up to the mark. For instance, the Commissioner, Nagpur, reports that the condition of the pounds in the Balaghat district is far from satisfactory and that in Chanda and Bhandara the expenditure is out of proportion to the receipts when compared with the other districts.

Education.—The total expenditure on education, including buildings, was Rs. 34,51,778 of which Rs. 12,95,404 were provided by Government, while fees and miscellaneous receipts covered another Rs. 33,771, leaving Rs. 21,22,603 to be met from the general purposes grant and other resources of the The percentage of the total councils. spent on education was 41.6 against 46.7 in the pre-The number of schools rose by vious vear. to 3,823 and enrolment by 2,842 to 280,137. The average attendance also increased from 193,111 to 201,704. number of indigenous schools aided by the district councils in Berar further decreased from 250 to 100 and the grant given to them amounted to Rs. 6.430 against Rs. 13.325 in the previous year. There is a complaint that the conditions laid down by the Government for grants to such schools are too stringent, but it is difficult to appreciate the force of this objection, since the conditions have been framed with a view to improve the efficiency of such schools and prevent waste of funds through the opening of schools too close to one another. Moreover, Government will always be prepared to consider requests for relaxation of the conditions in deserving cases. Compulsory education was introduced in the Sironcha tahsil of the Chanda district and 33 villages in the Bhandara district. It is satisfactory to note that the process of replacement of untrained teachers by trained ones continued in all the districts except Amraoti, where the number of trained teachers fell from 577 to 528. The reason for this retrogression is not given in the district report. The services of the Deputy Inspectors of Schools were retransferred to

Government as the scheme was found to be working unsatisfactorily and the question regarding the staff to be maintained by the district councils for the purposes of administration and supervision is under the consideration of Government. The district reports display a genuine desire on the part of district councils to improve and extend educational facilities, but with a few exceptions no active steps have been taken by the councils to provide the necessary funds. It is hardly surprising, therefore, that progress in this most important field of activity is disappointingly slow and much leeway remains to be made up. is evident from the reports that the demands for the teaching of English as an optional subject in middle schools continues and there is a danger that primary education may suffer if expenditure on such education is defrayed from the district funds. District councils should therefore bear this point in mind while providing for English education in their schools.

Medical.—The expenditure on medical relief rose from Rs. 3,29,178 to Rs. 3,74,620, of which Rs. 1,16,080 were covered by Government grants. The increase in the expenditure was mainly due to a rise in the number of transferred dispensaries from 75 to 80, the opening of Ayurvedic dispensaries by two district councils, increased contributions to hospitals and the purchase of medicines and instruments. There was a substantial increase in private subscriptions, mainly contributed by the Buldana district for the five cheap plan dispensaries opened there during the year. This type of dispensary for which, unlike the other dispensaries, Government provides only the staff and one-fourth of the recurring expenditure seems to be more in demand in Berar than in the Central Provinces. The number of in-door and out-door patients treated in the transferred dispensaries rose from 2,890 and 601,617 to 3,274 and 709,972, respectively, showing that the increased facilities for medical relief are appreciated. There were nine Ayurvedic dispensaries either subsidized or maintained departmentally at the beginning of the year. Two were opened during the year, while one was closed and four ceased to be subsidized. Even with the steady increase in medical institutions and personnel, only the fringe of the problem of medical relief is being touched and its final solution lies in the growth of an independent body of qualified men who will be prepared to settle down

in the country side and by their sympathy and skill create a belief in the healing art. To this end Government has since the close of the year brought into operation a scheme for subsidizing private practitioners who are prepared to settle in approved rural centres. The scheme, it is pleasing to record, has met with a gratifying response and eleven private practitioners have so far located themselves in different centres. Government has also sanctioned ten scholarships at the Benares University for the study of the indigenous systems of medicine and has recently evolved a scheme under which it is proposed to give grants-in-aid under certain conditions to local bodies up to half the expenditure incurred by them on Ayurvedic and Unani dispensaries manned by qualified practitioners. hoped that the above efforts will, in the course of time, bring about the desired aim of making medical relief available at the very doors of the mass of the population.

9. Public Health.—The expenditure on vaccination fell from Rs. 1,55,421 to Rs. 1,52,565, and that on sanitation from Rs. 26,232 to Rs. 21,797. The number of primary and successful vaccinations was 462,429 and 349,255, against 453,816 and 390,903, respectively, during the preceding year. The fall in the number of successful vaccinations is disappointing and indicates the necessity of greater control on the part of Civil Surgeons and the super-The experiment of entrusting vaccination vising staff. work to selected school masters was continued in Berar and five school masters were sent to Nagpur for being trained in the work. Opinions differ as to the success of the scheme. In Buldana it is reported to be giving satisfactory results, while in Akola it is unequivocally condemned. The experiment will be given a further trial, but, in order to give it the best chance of success, it is essential that teachers of the right type, who will undertake the work as an act of social service rather than for the sake of additional remuneration, should be selected. There are complaints from all over the province that opposition to vaccination in rural areas is becoming more frequent and this is evidently due to the fact that it is now generally realized that Government has no powers of compulsion. Government has therefore under consideration the question of making vaccination compulsory in selected rural areas.

The expenditure on the improvement of water-supply fell from Rs. 64,339 to Rs. 38,877, but this was in large measure due to the fact that Government grants for the purpose which aggregated Rs. 1,08,111 were, in many cases, applied for and received too late to be spent during the year under report. It is satisfactory to note that the Government scheme for the improvement of water-supply in rural areas, whereby it contributes 67 per cent of the total cost, leaving the district councils and the villagers to meet the rest in equal proportions, is leading most of district councils to prepare well considered programmes. Difficulty is reported from the districts in the Jubbulpore Division in persuading the villagers to contribute their small shares (one-sixth) of the expenditure either in money or in kind, but it is hoped that this reluctance will disappear when agricultural conditions improve. In making out the programme, which should be done well in advance for the year's work, the councils should see that the ground has been prepared, so that villagers who are to benefit will realize, and help to pay for, what is being done for them. Proposals for the survey and preparation of a project for improving 18 existing village tanks in the saline tracts in the Akola district have been approved by Government and a sum of Rs. 3,210 has been allotted for the survey.

- 10. Veterinary and stock-breeding.—Veterinary receipts fell from Rs. 5,252 to Rs. 3,527, while the expenditure rose from Rs. 1,03,260 to Rs. 1.04,796. fall in the receipts is mainly due to the failure of all the municipal committees in the Jubbulpore Division except one to pay their contributions for the year. number of veterinary dispensaries rose from 98 to 100 and they are all reported to be working well. The number of cases treated fell from 298,669 to 255,920, but this was set off by an increase in the number of castrations and injections, which rose from 51,428 and 103,863 to 58,211 and 274,070, respectively. These are record figures and indicate that the prejudice against veterinary operations is steadily declining. No district council incurred any expenditure on stock-breeding during the year.
- 11. Civil works.—The total expenditure on civil works fell from Rs. 24,88,100 to Rs. 22,74,236. This was mainly due to the fact that the northern district councils had to curtail expenditure owing to the loss of part

of their usual income from cesses. The total length of provincial roads transferred to district councils for maintenance was 1,961 miles against 1,965 miles in the previous The unspent balance of Government grants for transferred works at the beginning of the year was Grants aggregating Rs. 16,29,173 were Rs. 1,51,866. paid during the year and out of this a sum of Rs. 15.25.846 was spent and Rs. 63,687 refunded to Government, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,91,526 at the close of the year. The only expenditure incurred on fair weather roads was by the Sironcha Independent Local Board and the Amraoti District Council, which spent Rs. 1,146 and Rs. 441, respectively. A resolution moved by Rao Sahib T. S. Korde, recommending that 10 per cent of the total provincial revenues should be reserved for expenditure on fair weather roads, was carried at the August session of the Council in 1929 and the matter is under consideration. Government has already issued a resolution on this subject in 1927, but it is disappointing to find that district councils do not seem to attach much importance to a matter which is one clearly within the scope of their legitimate functions. A case of improper expenditure on communications by a district council is reported from the Nagpur Division. The Wardha District Council spent a sum of nearly Rs. 8,000 on a road without proper administrative approval or estimate. Not only this, but no proper supervision was exercised over the actual construction with the result that it is likely that complete reconstruction of a portion of the road will be necessary. The matter is under examination. The District Councils of Damoh and Seoni were entrusted with the execution of certain road works for the purpose of famine relief and Government is pleased to acknowledge the very useful work done by these bodies and the assistance afforded by the honorary workers supplied by them.

The expenditure on arboriculture was Rs. 11,248 as against Rs. 14,721 in the previous year. In most cases the operations during the year were confined to the maintenance of existing avenues. As no new planting along road sides is being done by private enterprise, it is very necessary that district councils should devote due attention to this important work.

12. Taxation.—Fees and tolls under section 24 of the Local Self-Government Act were newly imposed by

two district councils and one independent local board, an additional cess under section 49 by two district councils and the special school rate under section 50 and the tax on ginning and pressing of cotton under section 51 by one The special school rate was imdistrict council each. posed in three districts in the Central Provinces and yielded an income of only Rs. 5,345. In Berar, on the other hand, the rate was levied in all four districts and produced the substantial amount of Rs. 2,87,344. It thus appears that there is a case for extension of the tax in the Central Provinces, so that non-agriculturists may share with agriculturists the burden of improving educational facilities. There is a tendency amongst district councils in the Central Provinces to fall back on indirect taxation which is usually unsuitable for rural areas as it yields a small income and is expensive to collect. Proposals to impose terminal tax on rail-borne exports were received from seven district councils. Some of these have been returned for revision, while others have been held over pending the final settlement of the general principles which should govern this kind of taxation. The Amraoti, Nagpur and Bhandara District Councils have shown commendable activity in making use of their powers of taxation and other district councils would do well to follow their example.

- 13. Markets.—The number of public markets under section 23 and the villages to which sections 26 to 34 (relating to private markets) have been applied stood at 327 and 117, respectively, at the beginning of the year. Sixty markets were notified as public during the year and one was withdrawn. No new private market was notified. It is disappointing to note that no public markets have been notified in the Hoshangabad district, while the District Councils, Narsinghpur and Betul, have not imposed fees and tolls under section 24 in their public markets though they were notified as far back as 1923 and 1924.
- 14. Legislation, rules and byelaws.—The Government Bill to amend the Local Self-Government Act lapsed as it could not be taken up in two successive meetings of the Legislative Council after being passed by the Select Committee in August 1928. Rao Bahadur N. K. Kelkar's Bill to amend the Act, which was circulated for eliciting

public opinion, has also lapsed owing to his resignation. Seth Thakurdas Goverdhandas's Bill permitting district councils to maintain stud bulls for breeding purposes has been passed into law since the close of the year. most important amendment of the rules was that transferring the disposal of election disputes from Deputy Commissioners to civil courts. The practical working of the account rules has shown that they are defective many respects and an officer from the Accountant General's office has been appointed on special duty to overhaul them. Byelaws have been issued or amended by certain district councils, prominent among them being Nagpur, Jubbulpore, Balaghat, Nimar, Chhindwara and The draft by elaws received from district councils were frequently found to be defective in phraseology and lacking in precision and entailed much labour in putting them into proper form. In order to avoid this, Government has recently supplied the councils with suitable models the wording of which is to be followed except when local circumstances require a change in substance. It is hoped that this will simplify and greatly accelerate the drafting and issue of byelaws. In his local Audit Report for 1928-29 the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts has commented on the failure of a large number of district councils to frame byelaws for the delegation of powers to, and the distribution of functions among, their officebearers, members and servants. Government agrees with him that the framing of byelaws with clear definition of duties and powers is essential for the smooth working of the district councils and that the failure to adopt them causes financial loss to the councils, inasmuch as vague and divided responsibility is the cloak under which many a financial irregularity is hidden.

15. Staff.—Under the orders of 1924 some of the employees of district councils elected to continue under the pension scheme and such pensions are payable by the councils from their own funds. With a few exceptions the district councils have not started a pension fund or kept the monies separately invested. Instances have not been wanting in the past in which district councils have refused to grant pensions to their employees for lack of funds. It is clearly unfair that the employees should suffer for the improvidence of the councils. Prompt steps should therefore be taken by district councils to start a pension fund

and invest it in safe securities with a view to ensuring the prompt payment of pensions.

16. Financial irregularities.—The total number of irregularities and embezzlements fell from 4,833 and 9 to 3,537 and 6, respectively. The local audit report, however, again makes gloomy reading and shows that there has been no marked improvement in the general state of accounts. The four district councils, viz., Balaghat, Jubbulpore, Buldana and Betul, whose accounts were reported in last year's report to be in a bad condition, continued to figure in the same black list during the year under report also.

The question of how to bring about a permanent improvement in the accounts of local bodies is engaging the anxious attention of Government. As a tentative measure, Government has taken disciplinary action against six district councils for their administrative lapses and financial irregularities, by reducing or withholding a part of their general purposes grant for the current year. But the best way to bring about the desired improvement appears to be to empower the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts, as in some other provinces, to order a surcharge on the persons responsible for any irregularity. It is proposed to make a provision to this effect in the Local Self-Government Act when its revision is next taken up. The question of providing facilities for the training of district council employees in accounts work is also under consideration.

17. Village panchayats.—During the year 135 new panchayats were established; the formation of 46 was sanctioned and about 300 applications remained under inquiry. The scheme for a sub-committee of the district council for the organization, instruction and supervision of panchayats has found general acceptance and is already being worked out in eight districts. The Berar Panchayat Board received a grant-in-aid of Rs. 1,000 and by holding two conferences and instructional classes contributed materially to the promotion of the movement. Particular stress is being laid on the panchayat as the foundation of village uplift. During the year much spade work has been done in allaying suspicion and removing misunderstanding, and where the district councils have

made an earnest endeavour to foster the movement, its healthy growth is now assured.

18. General.—One of the regrettable features of the year's working was the strained relations between some of the district councils and their local boards, the latters' chief grievance being that the councils unduly interfered with their affairs and showed partiality. The tension between the Gondia Local Board and the District Council, Bhandara, brought the working of the former to a standstill, and it had to be dissolved after the close of the year.

Government regards this comparatively new development in the situation as very unfortunate and considers it of urgent importance that steps should be taken to apply the remedy if disruption of the district council administration is to be averted. The remedy lies in the hands of the local bodies themselves and consists of the framing of suitable byelaws defining clearly the relations between district councils and local boards. Government hopes that district councils will take up this question without delay and that in framing and administering such byelaws good sense will prevail. It is essential for the smooth working of the administration that the district councils should not interfere in matters delegated to a local board and conversely that local boards should not attempt to arrogate to themselves powers which are reserved for the district councils.

In pursuance of an undertaking given in the Legislative Council, Government has examined the question of defining the relations between district councils and local boards by rules under the Local Self-Government Act, but has been advised that there is no provision in the Act under which such rules can be framed and that the matter can only be dealt with by byelaws framed by the district councils themselves. Government has therefore dropped the question since the close of the year.

In spite of set backs and lapses, however, the year on the whole saw a substantial advance in local self-government. The relations between the councils and Government officers remained generally cordial and it is being increasingly realized that without co-operation progress is not possible. In many of the district councils the officebearers are doing their best to improve the character of the administration in their charge, often fighting against heavy odds. Special mention must be made of the hard and unselfish work done by the office-bearers of some of the district councils in the north in connection with famine operations. To these and to those whose names have been brought to notice in the reports the thanks of Government are due for duties faithfully performed and assistance willingly given.

ORDER—Ordered that a copy of this resolution be submitted to the Government of India in the Department of Education, Health and Lands, that copies be forwarded to the Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners for information and guidance, and that it be translated and circulated (through Deputy Commissioners) for the information and guidance of all district council and local board members. Ordered also that the resolution be published in the supplement to the Central Provinces Gazette.
