## GOVERNMENT OF THE CENTRAL PROVINCES. LOCAL SELF-GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENT.

#### RESOLUTION.

- Constitution.—Excepting the constitution of the Melghat Independent Local Board in the Amraoti district and the revision of the Dindori and Niwas groups in the Mandla district, and the Patan group in the Jubbulpore district, there was no change in the constitution of district councils or local boards. Disputes between the Bhandara District Council and the Gondia Local Board culminated in the dissolution of the latter. Similar disputes arose between other local boards and councils with the result that the local boards applied to be made independent under section 41 of the Local Self-Government Act. Such disputes generally arise from misapprehension on the part of local bodies regarding their several spheres of activity and mistaken notions about their mutual relations. Government contemplates the issue of a set of model byelaws clearly defining the functions and duties of local boards and district councils, and regulating their relations inter se, in the hope that district councils will frame corresponding by elaws for themselves. Several local bodies represented the desirability of extending their term of office from three to five years, but in the absence of any general demand for a change, Government has abstained from taking action in the matter.
- 2. Elections.—General elections were due in Chanda, Balaghat, Jubbulpore, Saugor, Damoh, Mandla, Raipur and Drug, in all districts of the Nerbudda division and for Sironcha and Melghat Independent Local Boards. These were held more or less punctually, except in the districts of Saugor, Jubbulpore, Mandla and Betul. Inordinate delay was caused in the Saugor, Jubbulpore and Mandla districts owing to the failure of several local board circles to nominate candidates, and

in the Betul district on account of the deliberate delay in preparing the voters' list. The attitude of the public towards local elections is not very encouraging. In the Jubbulpore division out of 115 seats only 34 were contested, and in the Chhattisgarh division 39 out of 70 seats, percentage of voters actually while the in a contest was generally less than 40 per cent. Verv little interest was evinced in the elections for the Sironcha Independent Local Board and in Narsinghpur, while Saugor, Mandla and Jubbulpore were entirely apathetic towards their elections. Out of 115 local board circles in Jubbulpore, Mandla and Damoh districts, 12 eventually remained unrepresented of which 2 have since been amalgamated with other circles. One local board seat in Drug is still vacant in spite of all efforts to fill it. Some ten bye-elections were held during Under the existing procedure election year. formalities occupied nearly six months. Amendments of the rules are under consideration, which will have the effect of accelerating the completion of elections.

Disposal of business.—All district councils and all local boards, except 10, held the prescribed number of meetings. The total number of meetings held was 815 against 797 in the preceding year. Of these 90 proved abortive for want of a quorum as compared with 79 last year; the Sironcha Independent Local Board, the Betul District Council and the Hinganghat, Murwara, Baloda Bazar, Drug and Drug Northern Zamindaris Local Boards had an inordinately large number of abortive meetings. This is partly attributable to the unduly large number of meetings held, and the moral is to reduce the number of meetings to the minimum compatible with the discharge of the business in hand. The average percentage of attendance of members was maintained at 61 in the case of district councils; but it declined from 51 to 46 in the case of local boards. The percentage was low in 3 district councils, 2 independent local boards and 45 local boards, the Baloda Bazar Local Board being again the worst offender. This state of affairs is, as usual, attributed in most bodies to members having attended very few meetings or none at all. As an exception to the general reluctance on the part of local bodies to use their powers to remove defaulters under section 17 (2) of the Local Self-Government Act, it is encouraging to find that at least 3 local boards, viz., Khamgaon, Malkapur and Khandwa, have taken such action. Unfortunately motions to remove absentees from the Drug and Nimar Councils failed for want of the requisite majority. As stated in last year's resolution, Government is reluctant to take action in the direction of amending the Act so as to provide for the automatic vacation of a member's seat for failure to attend meetings; the remedy lies with the local bodies themselves and the above instances evidence a growing sense of responsibility in this matter. It is satisfactory to note that all district councils, save Nagpur, Chanda, Balaghat, Hoshangabad, Narsinghpur, and Buldana, have appointed sub-committees and delegated powers to them. Byelaws framed by the Nagpur District Council are under consideration, and Government hopes that the remaining district councils will follow suit without delay, as the appointment of subcommittees facilitates prompt and effective disposal of A tendency was noticed on the part of officebearers to address Government on important matters in their representative capacity but without a specific resolution of the district council or local board concerned. Instructions were, therefore, issued that all such references should be accompanied by a resolution of the local body.

4. General financial results.—The year opened with a balance of Rs. 29,92,022, while the total receipts from all sources amounted to Rs. 90,28,410. The expenditure was Rs. 94,04,214 and the closing balance Rs. 26,16,218. The following table shows the net expenditure and receipts in the various departments of the councils' administration during the year under report:—

With some exceptions the closing balances of the district councils were in excess of the prescribed minimum, but as a rule they still included unspent balances of Government grants. The budgeting of the councils concerned should be directed towards building up the prescribed balance as soon as possible. The District Councils of Raipur and Chhindwara, spent grants on objects other than those for which they were made. financial condition of the councils in the Jubbulpore division was again seriously affected, particularly in the northern districts, by another crop failure, and the temporary advances given to the Damoh and Saugor Councils had to be converted into free grants to the The Damoh and Seoni extent of the cesses remitted. District Councils incurred an expenditure of Rs. 69,417 and Rs. 21,990, respectively, on account of famine relief. The serious state of the affairs of the Chanda District Council, which had to postpone payment of bills and the wages of its staff, was primarily due to its failure to tap new sources of income.

General Departments.—The income under this head rose from Rs. 36,23,050 to Rs. 37,23,703, while expenditure fell from Rs. 10,58,641 to Rs. 10,14,071. The income from local rates was about Rs. 1,07,700 more than in the previous year, and the receipts under "Stationery and printing" and "Miscellaneous" rose by about Rs. 15,000 and Rs. 21,000, respectively. There was also a slight improvement under "Interest", "Law and Justice", "Contributions other than those from Government", "Pensions", "Rent of buildings and land", "Sale of buildings and land", "Staging bungalow fees" and "Sale proceeds of trees, grass, etc."; but under all other heads there was a falling off, the most marked decreases being in respect of the income from land revenue (Rs. 3,300), exhibitions and fairs (Rs. 3,100), tolls on ferries and roads (Rs. 10,700), which was due to the opening of a new and civil works-miscellaneous traffic, bridge to (Rs. 40,000). The increase under local rates was shared by all districts except Wardha, Chanda, Akola, Buldana and the districts in the Jubbulpore division, and was chiefly due to better receipts from markets, collection of arrears, imposition of additional cess under section 49 of the Local Self-Government Act in two districts and of the tax on bales and bojas in one district and the revision of cesses at the current settlement in the Chhattisgarh division. The fall under this head in the Jubbulpore division is due

to the grant of suspension of cesses with the land revenue. The increase under "Stationery and printing" occurred in the Raipur and Bilaspur districts where the district councils freely used their presses for outside jobs on payment. The increase under "Miscellaneous" is accounted for by increased Government grants for village panchayats and special grants to the Damoh and Seoni Councils for famine relief, which more than counterbalanced the reduction made in the grants to certain councils as a disciplinary The decrease under "Land Revenue" was chiefly due to the suspension of land revenue in Berar on The increase of account of partial failure of crops. expenditure was marked under "Refunds and drawbacks", "General administration", "Miscellaneous" and "Famine relief"; but there was a heavy fall under "Superannuation pensions and gratuities", "Arboriculture" and "Civil works-miscellaneous", the last item alone accounting for Rs. 1,07,372, chiefly as a result of the refund by the District Council, Akola, of Rs. 71,904 on account of the unspent balance of grants for transferred works and the revised classification of expenditure on account of such works which is now shown under deposits.

6. Cattle pounds.—The number of cattle pounds rose further from 1,778 to 1,829 and receipts increased from Rs. 8.67,001 to Rs. 9,23,978. Expenditure also rose from Rs. 3,65,654 to Rs. 3,78,623, leaving a surplus of Rs. 5,45,355 compared with Rs. 5,01,347 in the previous vear. The increase in income was due to the opening of new pounds as well as to the raising of the rates of fines and feeding charges and was shared by all districts except Balaghat, Jubbulpore, Saugor, Mandla, Damoh, Narsinghpur, Bilaspur and Drug. The fall in Balaghat is attributed to defective management, but in the districts of the Jubbulpore division it was due to adverse seasons. In Bilaspur district the fall is attributed to malguzars and cultivators detaining cattle for twenty-four hours under cover of section 10 of the Cattle Trespass Act and presumably coming to terms with the owners instead of impounding the cattle. The Nimar District Council appointed a whole-time pound inspector while the Yeotmal District Council employed both whole-time pound keepers and inspectors. The income of both these councils rose from Rs. 69,932 and Rs. 73,486 to Rs. 80,802 and Rs. 86,720, respectively. The steady rise in the income of the Yeotmal District Council, which is attributed to the appointment of wholetime staff, has justified the experiment, and other district councils with a large number of pounds might do well to try it. It is satisfactory that district councils in Berar have decided to pay 25 per cent of the net receipts from the local pounds to panchayats.

Education.—The total expenditure on education buildings was Rs. 34,81,398, including of which Rs. 12,42,325 was provided by Government while fees and miscellaneous receipts covered another Rs. 39,223, leaving Rs. 21,99,850 to be met from general purposes grants and other resources of the district councils. The percentage of the total income spent on education was 51.3 against 41.6 in the previous year. The number of indigenous schools aided by district councils in Berar further decreased from 100 to 63 and grants paid to them amounted to only Rs. 3,625 against Rs. 6,430 in the previous year. With the increase in the number and efficiency of district council schools a fall in indigenous schools is inevitable. The number of schools increased 3.887 and the enrolment by 10.939 by 64 to to 291,076; the increase was shared more or less by all district councils except Chanda, Damoh and Saugor. Compulsory primary education was extended to 33 new centres in the Bhandara district, but it is not making headway in Sironcha, a particularly backward tract. feeder schools were opened in the Raipur district. Compulsory education was not introduced in any district of the Jubbulpore division. In Berar it was continued in six villages in Amraoti and in 15 in Akola as in the previous year; the former district council however proposes to extend compulsion to 51 new villages in the course of the next year. Schemes for the introduction of compulsory primary education and for the replacement of untrained by trained teachers did not materialise in some districts, e.g., in Bhandara and Mandla, chiefly for want of funds. Proposals in this connection are pending the consideration of Government and the district councils. In some divisions, e.g., Nagpur, a serious lack of accommodation is emphasized. Altogether, the reviews generally are not very encouraging, and it is evident that the leeway in this most important branch of local self-government is not being made up as rapidly as could be wished. Lack of funds to which prominence is given is bound to continue so long as the councils do not make use of their powers of taxation, but it is no less important to overcome the apathy of the rural population and instill the will for education. A more encouraging feature of the year is the increase in

the number of girls' schools and in adult schools, for which the Amraoti District Council merits special commendation. The example of the Nimar District Council in opening two new primary schools for the depressed classes and of the Akola District Council in continuing scholarships to depressed classes students is well worth following.

- Medical.—The total expenditure on medical relief fell from Rs. 3,74,620 to Rs. 3,52,835, of which Rs. 1,16,103 was provided by Government grants. dispensaries were transferred to the councils and very few were started by them on their own initiative. The Akola District Council opened two additional ayurvedic dispensaries and one was opened by the Bilaspur District Council. Allopathic dispensaries were opened one by the Buldana and another by the Nimar District Councils, and the dispensary at Karanja was recently taken over by the Wardha District Council. The Seoni District Council contemplates starting a subsidized dispensary at Korai in place of the mission dispensary which was closed, but difficulty is being experienced in getting a medical practitioner to settle in the village. A similar difficulty has arisen in connection with the opening of a dispensary at The experiment of Lalburra in the Balaghat district. subsidizing private medical practitioners was extended to Nandgaon Kazi and Sirala in the Amraoti district and at Borgaon in the Akola district. The scheme is still in its experimental stage; and it remains to be seen whether it will achieve its purpose of helping to solve the problem of providing medical assistance in the countryside.
- 9. Public health.—The expenditure on vaccination and sanitation fell from Rs. 1,59,565 and Rs. 21,797 to Rs. 1,57,854 and Rs. 20,959, respectively. The number of primary and successful vaccinations was 521,067 and 446,649 against 462,429 and 349,255, respectively, in the previous year. A fall in the number of vaccinations in Seoni is attributed to the absence of people from their homes in search of work, which is hardly a convincing reason, but in Mandla it was due to negligence on the part of the vaccination staff. Vaccination is reported to be satisfactory in all districts of Berar, and good work was done in re-vaccination in the Buldana district, especially by school teachers. The necessity for extending compulsory vaccination to rural areas is emphasized by the Commissioner, Nagpur division. Legislation for this purpose was under consideration.

Expenditure on the improvement of water supply rose from Rs. 38,877 to Rs. 1,35,952. The increase is conspicuous in the Nagpur and Berar divisions and is due to the fact that the balance of grants paid last year was spent during the year under review. No grant was given from provincial revenues to the councils in the Jubbulpore and Nerbudda divisions, which still had balances left out of the grants of previous years. same difficulty continues in the Jubbulpore division in obtaining the small share (of one-sixth) required from villagers for whose benefit works for the improvement of water supply are undertaken. It is regrettable that the people who are to benefit from such works will not share the cost in labour if, through poverty, they cannot help in cash. It is hoped that propaganda in village improvement and self-help will overcome this failing. District councils in Berar only spent about half the grants they had in hand for improving water supply. In view of the scarcity of water in this area, the amount spent cannot but be regarded as inadequate. The situation needs, as the Commissioner emphasizes, a proper survey of local requirements, the preparation in advance of plans and estimates and the enlistment of local support. Before Government grants can be claimed or obtained the conditions required must be satisfied.

- stock-breeding.—Veterinary 10. Veterinary and receipts rose from Rs. 3,527 to Rs. 3,865. The expenditure rose from Rs. 1,04,796 to Rs. 1,09,581. The total number of veterinary dispensaries fell by 1 to 99. The number of cases treated was 407,058 against 255,920 in previous year. The number of castrations and injections also rose from 58,211 and 274,070 to 61,829 and 374,664, respectively. The reports bear witness to an increasing demand in rural areas for the extension of veterinary relief and there are praiseworthy instances of dispensaries built by private enterprise, notably in the Raipur and Nagpur districts. The Berar report mentions the need for buildings in several places, but the provision of staff to meet the general demand is the foremost problem that confronts all councils in their efforts to open new centres. With the exception of the Balaghat District Council which spent Rs. 526, no district council incurred any expenditure on stock-breeding.
- 11. Civil works.—The total expenditure on civil works fell from Rs, 22,74,236 to Rs, 14,37,024. This is

due chiefly to the change in the classification of the cost of transferred works as under "Debt account", but also to the receipt of less grants from Government, while in Jubbulpore division some councils had to curtail their programme of works owing to financial stringency. The total length of provincial roads transferred to district councils for maintenance was 1,914 miles against 1,946 miles in the previous year. The unspent balance of Government grants for transferred works at the beginning of the year was Rs. 1,91,324. Grants aggregating Rs. 13,72,884 were paid during the year, and out of the a sum of Rs. 13,67,256 was spent and Rs. 71,186 refunded, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,25,766 at the close of the year. The only expenditure reported to have been incurred on the improvement of important village roads was by district councils in Berar, notably the Akola District Council which spent Rs. 9,246 on this account. Applications of the Amraoti, Akola and Yeotmal District Councils for grants for the maintenance of village roads had to be rejected by Government owing to financial stringency. The rise in the percentage of cost of establishment and tools and plant, consequent on reduced expenditure, raises an awkward problem for councils, and the complaint was repeated that the percentage received for supervision and other charges on works transferred by, or undertaken for Government, was This and other allied questions are being inadequate. considered.

Expenditure on arboriculture was Rs. 9,053 against Rs. 11,248 in the year preceding, Amraoti alone being responsible for Rs. 4,493. The expenditure was in most cases confined to the maintenance of existing avenues; but the plantation of new avenues for the benefit of the coming generation is a work of public utility and convenience that should not be neglected.

12. Markets.—The total number of public markets regulated under section 23 of the Local Self-Government Act and the villages to which sections 26 to 34 (relating to private markets) have been applied was 444. At the beginning of the year five new markets, viz., one in Amraoti and four in the Melghat, were notified as public, and one private market at Basna in the Raipur district was withdrawn and handed over to the local village panchayat. The income from this important source of

revenue increased, but the reports do not reveal what expenditure, if any, was incurred on improvements. The percentage of expenditure to receipts varies widely from district to district in the Chhattisgarh division, but no reason is assigned for this.

Legislation rules and byelaws.—There was no legislation concerning district councils during the year. The most important amendments to rules framed under the Local Self-Government Act were those relating to (1) the classification of receipts and expenditure on account of transferred works under "Deposits" so as to keep them separate from those relating to district council works, (2) the grant of grain advances to district council employees, and (3) the immediate publication of notifications regarding the election and selection of members and office-bearers of district councils and local boards by the Deputy Commissioner with a view to accelerating election proceedings. There was an important ruling as regards the majority of members' votes requisite for the imposition of taxes under sections 49 and 50, viz., that the twothird majority is only necessary at the final stage of the proposal.

The District Fund Account Rules and Provident Fund Rules were revised and are now being scrutinized by Government. Byelaws on various subjects were framed and amended by eleven district councils. Model byelaws have now been framed on almost all subjects, and district councils would be well advised to follow them, subject to exceptions to suit special local circumstances. This should promote promptness in the scrutiny and publication of byelaws and secure uniformity, which was hitherto lacking. If local bodies will regard the instructions issued by Government for their guidance in dealing with such cases, the number of references which have to be returned to them for revision, which has already diminished considerably, will be reduced to a minimum.

14. Taxation.—The District Councils, Chhindwara, Drug and Saugor, imposed, and the Akola District Council revised, the rates of fees and tolls under section 24 of the Local Self-Government Act, while the District Council, Amraoti, imposed an additional cess under section 49. A proposal of the District Council, Nagpur, to tax motor vehicles plying for hire was not sanctioned as the question

of such taxation was before the Financial Relations Committee. Its proposal to levy a tax on excisable articles was rejected as this is ultra vires. The same council's proposals for an additional cess under section 49 and a special school rate under section 50 were sanctioned after the close of the year. Proposals of six district councils to levy terminal tax were held over pending a decision regarding the general principles to be observed in the imposition of this tax, and almost all the proposals had to be returned for revision. The District Council, Drug, subsequently abandoned their proposal. Proposals were also submitted by the District Councils, Betul and Yeotmal, to impose a special school rate under section 50, and by the District Council, Jubbulpore, to impose a vehicle tax, but they were found to be defective and were returned for revision. The District Council, Bhandara, proposed a novel form of taxation in the shape of a rate by special assessment for raising money for the construction of a village well. proposal was published for inviting objection. The Berar division report regrets the rejection, by the District Councils, Akola and Buldana, of the suggestion to impose the additional cess of nine pies per rupee of land revenue released by Government out of the mahar cess in consequence of the enactment of the Land Revenue Code of These district councils, therefore, failed to follow the commendable example of the Amraoti District Council in increasing their income. The enhanced cess of twentyseven pies in the rupee of the land revenue which is short of the statutory maximum by only three pies was collected by the Amraoti District Council for the first time during The assessment and collection of the the current year. special school rate in the Central Provinces through the present agency is reported to be unsatisfactory. The question of transferring the work of recovery to the revenue authorities as in Berar is under the consideration of Government. During the year the following decisions were made on important subjects:—

(1) That the cess leviable under section 48 is payable on the total assessment of every occupied survey number within the limits of a district council whether it is agricultural or diverted to non-agricultural purposes, but it is not payable on any land lying within municipal limits; and

(2) that Government should not recover arrears of district council dues more than six years old which would be realizable through the civil courts.

There is a general complaint about insufficiency of funds in almost all district councils, but with a few exceptions, the councils look to Government for grants instead of making systematic efforts to augment their revenue by resort to their statutory powers of taxation.

- Staff.—Almost all the district councils have introduced a time-scale of pay. Provident fund schemes have been introduced by all district councils except Rules have been framed to ensure the security and proper maintenance of these funds. It is not clear from the district reports what progress has been made in the direction of establishing a separate pension fund and investing it in safe securities as suggested in the last vear's resolution. The matter is of great importance to the employees concerned, and specific mention of it should be made in the next year's reports. The question of the provincialization of the council's services, the provision of facilities for training accountants in accounts and the compilation of a manual of office procedure and service conditions were under the consideration of Government. As there has been some misapprehension as to the scope of the Local Government's powers of sanction to certain appointments under proviso (iii) to section 45 (1) of the Local Self-Government Act, it was decided that these powers are intended to be used ordinarily to prevent an abuse of a public nature and not to decide between the personal claims of rival candidates.
- 16. Financial irregularities.—The total number of financial irregularities and embezzlements fell from 3,537 and 6 to 2,687 and 5, respectively, but the audit covered a shorter period owing to a change in that audit year introduced in accordance with the recent orders of Government. The accounts of Balaghat, Wardha, Jubbulpore and Amraoti showed signs of improvement, while those of Nagpur, Raipur, Bilaspur and Akola were reported to be bad. In view of certain irregularities noticed in the accounts of the Buldana, Akola and Yeotmal District Councils, Government suspended payment of the grants for general purposes for the year

1930-31 till the receipt of their explanations. The grants payable to the Jubbulpore and Betul District Councils for 1929-30 were reduced by Rs. 4,000 and Rs. 4,500, respectively, as a disciplinary measure for administrative The balance of the grant to the and financial lapses. Jubbulpore District Council and the whole of the Betul District Council's grants were withheld pending receipt of their explanations regarding the irregularities pointed out in the Local Audit Report for 1927-28 but were paid after the close of the year. Twenty-five per cent of the grants to the Raipur and Bilaspur District Councils were also withheld pending receipt of their explanation regarding the operation of their printing presses. grant to the latter was subsequently paid, but the Raipur District Council was deprived of the grant as no satisfactory explanation was received. Directions on the following important matters were issued during the year, viz.:-

- (i) that district councils should consider the desirability of investing their minimum closing balances in the purchase of post office cash certificates up to the prescribed maximum of Rs. 10,000 and the remainder as fixed deposits for suitable periods in banks, so that the money may be available for expenditure at any emergency;
- (ii) that the councils should avoid a rush of expenditure in March, which results in many irregularities, and should strictly observe the principles laid down in article 88 of the Civil Procedure Code, and
- (iii) that the accounts of the district councils as made up to the last day of the financial year should be audited as soon as may be after the close of the year, as required by section 57 of the Local Self-Government Act.

The Examiner, Local Fund Accounts, remarks in his report for 1929-39 that the expert advice of the Audit Department on general financial matters is rarely availed of by a great majority of local bodies and, where financial advice has been given gratuitously, it is more often disregarded than not. Government would observe that audit is an essential matter of business and the Audit Department exists not

merely to criticize but to help with advice and guidance. In view of the difficulty of securing proper disposal of audit objections and of enforcing the principle of personal responsibility, the Local Government contemplates legislation to enact a Local Fund Audit Act, similar to those in force in other provinces. This should go a long way towards regularizing the position of audit officers and should remove the difficulties and misapprehensions connected with audit that have proved a constant source of friction in the administration of local bodies.

- 17. Village panchayats.—During the year 159 new panchayats were established; the formation of 51 was sanctioned and 300 applications remained under inquiry. The total number of panchayats is 424. The Village Panchayat Officer's activities were largely devoted to Nagpur, Narsinghpur, Betul, Jubbulpore, and Bilaspur and the Berar districts where attention was concentrated on bringing district council sub-committees into working order and inspecting and holding rallies of panchayats. The Berar Panchayat Board had to its credit another year's record of useful constructive work. Five panchayat: associations were formed in the Buldana district. The attitude of the district councils towards the formation of panchayats generally has been sympathetic. Altogether progress has been as rapid as is consistent with reasonable supervision and guidance. A comprehensive amending bill drafted in the light of the further experience gained was under the consideration of Government.
- General.—The relations between local boards and their district councils have not always been as happy as they should be and, as a result, local boards have claimed to be made independent. With a view to checking the tendency towards disruption by removing occasions for friction, a model set of byelaws, as mentioned in paragraph 2 above has been framed, clearly defining, as far as possible, suitable spheres of activity for the two bodies. The draft is being circulated to elicit public opinion and it is hoped that the local bodies will give due consideration to the solution of this Up till the close of the year the awkward question. relations between Government officers and most local bodies remained cordial. The attitude of district officers generally has been to interfere as little as possible and yet

to help willingly where assistance was required, and there are indications that this was appreciated. Since the close of the year, it is to be regretted that two district councils (Raipur and Betul) had to be dissolved and finally superseded for failure to discharge their responsibilities. These cases were the exception, and Government recognizes the public service rendered and the good work done by office-bearers as a body in local institutions. The thanks of Government and the public are due to those gentlemen whose names have been brought to notice for the part they have taken in the administration of Local Self-Government.

Order. Ordered that a copy of this resolution be submitted to the Government of India, Department of Education, Health and Lands, that copies be forwarded to the Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners for information and guidance, and that it be translated and circulated (through Deputy Commissioners) for the information and guidance of all district council and local board members. Ordered also that the resolution be published in the supplement to the Central Provinces Gazette.
