# AGRICULTURAL CENSUS, 1933

## FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

### INTRODUCTION.

In accordance with the terms of the Statistics Ordinance, 1918 (section 7) the Fourteenth Annual Census of Crops for the period 1st March, 1932, to 28th February, 1933, and Live Stock as on 28th February, 1933, was taken and the report thereon is presented herewith.

The form of this report and of the tables published herewith is in accordance with the procedure adopted in 1931.

In order to remove any misapprehension which may exist in regard to this and other census reports, it may again be mentioned that its main purpose is to present a record of facts. Only exceptionally is it considered that conclusions or expressions of opinion in regard to the economics of and other matters relating to the agricultural industry find a proper place in such a report as that now presented. Such observations are to be found in the Annual Report of the Department.

### GENERAL.

As inaugurated in 1931, the Agricultural Census for 1933 covers the period 1st March, 1932, to 28th February, 1933.

The schedules were despatched on the 31st January, 1933, and returns were required by the 6th March. It has again to be recorded that the completion of the Census was retarded by dilatoriness on the part of a small number of occupiers in sending in completed returns. It is noticeable that certain individuals are persistent offenders in this respect. 1,261 reminders were despatched, including 194 registered letters.

It is, however, gratifying to note that the number of reminders necessary was less than in previous years, and the hope is encouraged that it will continue to be possible to secure returns on a basis of voluntary co-operation, without recourse to the powers provided by law.

The tabulation of the data contained in the completed schedules was carried out by the Statistical Department and it is desired to acknowledge the expeditious manner in which the work was carried out. The last batch of schedules was finally despatched to the Statistician on the 27th May. A number of completed tables were received on the 31st May and the final tabulations on the 12th June.

From information furnished by the Survey and Registration Department the areas of Administrative Provinces and Districts as at 31st December, 1932, are detailed in Appendix I of this report.

### CLIMATE.

The following table, representative of the various scheduled districts, gives the mean rainfall for the year 1932 and the average rainfall over a period of years. It will be seen that the rainfall was in the majority of districts considerably over average.

The climatic conditions throughout the season were generally favourable for crops and pasture, though the "short rains" in some districts were fully a month later than usual. No difficulties were generally experienced in either planting or harvesting seasons and the yields of crops and dairy produce were in consequence higher than average levels.

## OCCUPATION.

The number of occupiers, 2,102, showed a net decrease of five from that of the preceding year. The percentage changes in the five previous years were :—

A certain amount of transition is normal and while some holdings become vacant others appear. Actually, in the year under review, thirty-six farms formerly occupied were abandoned and thirty-one new holdings appeared.

The number of Europeans employed on agricultural holdings was returned as 2,789, a decrease of 33 from the previous year.

## ACREAGE AND DEVELOPMENT.

The total area under occupation by Europeans as at 28th February, 1933, was 5,206,264 acres, an increase of 7,171 acres from the previous year.

The increase in total area occupied is accompanied by a decrease in the area under cultivation and under crops. This is accounted for by an extension of occupation in the dairying districts, chiefly North Nyeri.

The total area under cultivation decreased by 19,569 acres or 3.19 per cent as compared with the preceding year. The area under crops decreased by 8,625 acres or 1.66 per cent. The proportion of cultivated land left fallow decreased somewhat, though it is still higher than in the years previous to 1930. This is to be attributed to damage by locusts, crops which were destroyed before the harvesting stage not appearing in the returns.

The average area cultivated per occupier is 282 acres, a decrease of nine acres as compared with the previous year. This figure does not represent the degree of development of occupied areas, as a considerable proportion of the total area occupied is devoted to the maintenance of live stock. If it be assumed that six acres per head are required for cattle and three acres per head for sheep the development per occupier on account of live stock is 1,085 acres. The total area developed per occupier then becomes 1,367 acres, as compared with 1,339 acres in the preceding year.

The total number of cattle in the possession of Europeans as on 28th February, 1933, was 259,188, an increase of 10,909 or 4.4 per cent over the previous year.

An increase is shown in adult breeding cattle, but on the other hand there was a decrease of 5.2 per cent in the number of heifer calves under one year. This is in part due to higher mortality during the year (*vide* Table 4).

Working oxen showed a slight increase.

#### Sheep.

Little change is recorded in the total number of woolled sheep, though the number of breeding ewes declined by 3,684 or 4.1 per cent. The production of wool declined by 11.3 per cent as compared with the preceding year.

A further increase in the number of native sheep on farms occurred, making an increase of no less than 31 per cent in the last two years.

*Pigs.*

Pigs increased by 6.3 per cent during the year. The increase in the case of breeding sows was more than proportionate, reaching 8.2 per cent.

*Poultry.*

The number of poultry, for the first time for several years, showed a decrease, and now stands at 57,037.

The number of pure-bred cattle showed increases in all classes except cows and heifers over three years. A feature of the returns was an increase in the number of pure-bred Shorthorns and Friesians and a decrease in the number of Ayrshires.

Slaughterings of cattle show a slight decrease as compared with the preceding year. The number of sheep slaughtered represents an increase of 27 per cent on the previous year, while practically no change is recorded in the case of pigs.

Substantial increases in the amounts of whole milk, butter-fat, butter and cheese sold by farmers occurred, while the amounts of cream and of ghee declined from the levels of the previous year.

The weight of wool declined by 92,120 lb. to 721,542 lb.

The number of eggs sold is returned at 88,785 dozen.

#### CROPS (*vide* TABLES 1 and 7).

The area of maize harvested during the year amounted to 164,018 acres, an increase of 3,472 acres over the previous year. The total production amounted to 1,139,616 bags. The yield per acre was 6.94 bags, as against 4.75 bags in the preceding year.

The total number of European maize growers was 896, as against 803 in the preceding year. It should be remarked that the comparison is influenced by the fact that in 1931-32 locust damage reduced the area harvested below that planted and also the number of growers recorded, since in some cases the crop was totally destroyed before the harvesting stage.

514,917 cwt. of maize and 5,626 cwt. of maize meal were exported from Mombasa during the twelve months ending December 31st, 1932, against 1,859,517 cwt. and 20,307 cwt. during the previous twelve months. The approximate values of these exports were £117,677 and £1,456 respectively in 1932, and £419,599 and £5,442 in 1931.

The climatic conditions allowed the maize for export to reach the Coast in average condition, taking the calendar year as a whole, though conditions towards the end of the year were less favourable. The percentage "slightly weevilly" was higher than in the preceding year. Of the portion which failed to pass the grader, the proportion rejected as wet was higher and that rejected as weevilly was lower than in the preceding year. The position as regards dryness and weevil infestation will be seen from the following grading statistics:—

The area of wheat harvested during the year was 30,114 acres, a decrease of 13,054 acres from the preceding year. The total production of grain amounted to 63,498 bags as against 86,862 bags in 1931-32, a decrease of 23,364 or 26·9 per cent. The total production was equivalent to an average yield of 2·11 bags per acre, as compared with 2·01 in 1931-32 and 2·82 in 1930-31. The reduction in production of wheat was largely due to reduction in the acreage planted, which in turn was influenced by the threat of locust attack.

The number of wheat growers was returned at 350, as compared with 273 in the previous year.

The export of wheat flour during the twelve months ending December 31st, 1932, amounted to 30,221 cwt., an increase of 2,139 cwt. over the previous year. The value, however, was declared at £18,777 as against £20,263 in the previous year.

The following table shows that twenty-four wheat mills capable of milling eighty bags of wheat hourly were in operation in the Colony during the year.

121,906 bags of wheat were milled during the year, including a quantity imported to meet the deficiency in local supplies. 41,067 bags of fine flour and 51,314 bags of atta and meal were produced, the loss in milling (bran, pollard, etc.) averaging 24·2 per cent.

BARLEY (*vide* TABLES 1 and 7).

The area of barley harvested was 3,025 acres, an increase of 695 bags over the previous year. The total production of grain amounted to 15,845 bags (150 lb.) as compared with 7,126 bags in the previous year.

OATS (*vide* TABLES 1 and 7).

2,598 acres of oats were harvested and produced a total of 7,688 bags (150 lb.) of grain, representing an increase of 184 acres and 2,122 bags over the previous year. The yield per acre was 2.96 bags, as compared with 2.31 bags in 1931-32.

COFFEE (*vide* TABLES 1 and 8).

The area under coffee increased by 1,513 acres during the year and now stands at 100,387 acres. The major portion of the increase was recorded in Trans Nzoia, with smaller increases in Nakuru, Thika (Fort Hall) and Kisumu-Londiani.

The proportion of coffee over six years old is now 60 per cent, as against 56 per cent in February, 1932, and 52 per cent in February, 1931.

The total quantity of clean coffee produced between March 1st, 1932, and February 28th, 1933, amounted to 303,998 cwt. This represents an increase of 133,907 cwt. or 79 per cent over the preceding year, and constitutes a record for the Colony. The previous highest was 250,919 cwt. in 1930-31.

The production of mbuni was returned as 13,916 cwt., as compared with 10,824 cwt. in the preceding year.

276,041 cwt. of coffee, the produce of Kenya, valued at £1,214,392 was exported during the year ended 31st December, 1932, as compared with 245,991 cwt. valued at £986,988 in 1931. The value of coffee exported in 1932 represented 61.7 per cent of the total agricultural exports from the Colony.

#### TEA (*vide* TABLES 1 and 9).

The area under tea as at 28th February, 1933, was returned as 12,034 acres, an increase of 776 acres or 6.9 per cent over the preceding year. The increase occurred mainly in Kericho district.

The total production of prepared tea amounted to 2,421,056 lb., an increase of 920,807 lb., or 61 per cent over the preceding year's output.

During 1932, 700,224 lb. of tea, valued at £29,262 was exported from the Colony, as compared with 353,696 lb. valued at £16,795 in 1931. In addition, 228,480 lb. valued at £9,663 was transferred from Kenya to Uganda, as compared with 188,048 lb. valued at £9,501 in the preceding year.

20,832 lb. of tea valued at £1,654, was imported into Kenya in 1932. The Colony therefore produced a surplus above home requirements of 928,704 lb. as compared with 400,548 lb. in 1931-32. The total apparent consumption in the Colony (stocks neglected) was 1,513,184 lb. as compared with 1,099,401 lb. in 1931, and 1,025,857 lb. in 1930.

#### SISAL (*vide* TABLES 1 and 10).

The area under sisal as at 28th February, 1933, was returned as 130,834 acres, a decrease of 5,826 acres from the previous year. The area under three years has declined to 37,507 acres from 55,220 acres in February, 1932. It is thus evident that little or no new planting is being carried out.

The production of fibre reached a total of 17,369 tons, as compared with 14,674 tons in the preceding year. This is only 1,489 tons below the record output of 1930-31.

Returns were received in respect of seventy-seven estates, a decrease of nine from the preceding year.

Exports of sisal fibre during 1932 amounted to 15,385 tons, as compared with 15,994 tons during the preceding year.

SUGAR (*vide* TABLE 1).

The area planted with cane by Europeans as at February 28th, 1933, was 12,088 acres, a decrease of 275 acres since the corresponding date in the previous year. The production of crystallized sugar increased slightly to 106,320 cwt.

The amount of sugar exported from the Colony during the twelve months ended December 31st, 1932, decreased to 16,046 cwt. valued at £17,879, from 21,709 cwt. valued at £24,930 during the preceding twelve months.

During 1932, 4,423 cwt. of sugar valued at £4,182 was imported for consumption in Kenya, a decrease of 1,937 cwt. as compared with the preceding year. Exports to Uganda of sugar produced in Kenya declined to 29 cwt. from 2,293 cwt. in 1931.

#### WATTLE (*vide* TABLES 1 and 12).

The area under wattle on European-owned farms increased by 1,305 acres to 14,613 acres. The production of bark during the year ended February 28th, 1933, amounted to 429 tons of dried bark and 1,735 tons of green bark.

During the year 1932 exports of wattle bark, at 236,545 cwt., surpassed the previous highest figure (192,368 cwt. in 1931) by 44,177 cwt. or 23 per cent. The exports of wattle extract also showed an increase, amounting to 9,809 cwt. as compared with 6,073 cwt. in the previous year. The combined value of bark and extract exported was declared at £85,866 as compared with £73,231 in the previous year.

The major portion of the wattle bark exported emanates from native reserves.

#### ESSENTIAL OILS (*vide* TABLE 1).

The area under essential oil plants increased to 1,953 acres from 1,859 acres in the preceding year. Exports of essential oil in 1932 were valued at £9,355 as compared with £8,091 in the previous year.

FRUIT (*vide* TABLES 1 and 13).

The area under fruit was returned as 2,853 acres, an increase of fifty-four acres as compared with the preceding year.

POTATOES (*vide* TABLE 1).

The area planted with potatoes during the year increased to 1,711 acres, from 742 acres in the preceding year.

Exports of potatoes during 1932 amounted to 68,130 cwt. as compared with 49,723 cwt. in 1931. A large part of the export of potatoes is of tubers grown by natives.

A considerable improvement in the quality of potatoes presented for grading at the Coast occurred during 1932, and the proportion graded K1 reached 45 per cent as compared with 8 per cent in 1931.

MISCELLANEOUS CROPS (*vide* TABLE 1).

These include small areas of cassava, castor, edible canna, groundnuts, linseed, millet, pyrethrum, sunflower, tobacco, etc., the total acreage amounting to 7,447 acres.

FODDER CROPS AND ENSILAGE (*vide* TABLE 1).

1,613 acres of lucerne and 2,349 acres of miscellaneous fodder crops were grown, as compared with 1,317 acres and 1,833 acres respectively in 1931-32.

The quantity of ensilage made amounted to 6,588 tons, a considerable increase over the quantity in the previous year.

IMPLEMENTS AND MACHINERY (*vide* TABLE 14).

Little change is recorded in the number of implements and machines of various classes on farms. The number of tractors and tractor ploughs again declined, but so also did the number of ox draught ploughs.

For the first time provision was made in the schedules for returns of hydraulic rams, windmills, pumps, and wire fencing. The returns show that the following are in existence on farms:—

#### NATIVE AGRICULTURE AND LIVE STOCK.

The latest data available are the estimates made for the world agricultural census, relating to the year ending 31st July, 1930, which may be found in the Agricultural Census Report for 1930.

During 1932-33 conditions in the native reserves were generally favourable. Estimates of the value of Agricultural exports of "native" origin are included in the section of this report dealing with Agricultural Exports. It should be observed that native-grown produce is, generally speaking, devoted to local consumption. In the case of certain commodities it releases the produce of European farms for export and may hence be said to figure indirectly in exports.

### CONCLUSION.

The year under review was a very favourable one from the point of view of production. Favourable climatic conditions resulted in heavy crops of coffee and of maize. The output of dairy produce and of tea increased to a considerable extent, and increases were also registered in the case of wattle bark, simsim, cotton and potatoes. The one dark spot in the production statistics is wheat, the output of which failed by a substantial margin to reach the milling requirements of the Colony.

The statistics of occupation indicate a degree of stability in the agriculture of the Colony which could hardly have been expected from the severe effects which have been experienced from the combined action of locusts and low prices. The area under occupation actually increased during the year.

At the same time the area of land under cultivation decreased and it is evident that there has been a shift in the direction of live stock farming. All classes of live stock except poultry increased in numbers.

The statistics of agricultural exports show a decrease of 4·3 per cent in value and 43·9 per cent in tonnage as compared with the preceding year. The figures are influenced by the fact that the exports consisted in large part of the moderate crops of 1931-32. On the other hand the full effect of the fall in prices to their present low levels did not begin to be felt until the end of the year, when a disastrous slump occurred, particularly in the case of coffee and butter, on the overseas markets.
