Note on the Stamp Statements for the year 1920-21.

STATEMENT I.

1. The total receipts under the Stamp and Court-fees Acts during Total Receipts and Charges. the year 1920-21 amounted to Rs. 81,74,976 compared with a sum of Rs. 77,93,491 in the previous year. The entire increase, as will be explained later, was derived from judicial stamps. The expenditure amounted to Rs. 3,53,578 against Rs. 3,15,229 in the year before. The net increase in revenue was a little short of 3½ lakhs.

STATEMENT II.

2. The receipts from the sale of court-fee or judicial stamps show an increase of Rs. 6,22,135 over the figure for the Receipts from the sale of Judicial Stamps. year ending 31st March 1920. Every district reports an increase but those which contribute most to this rise in revenue are Amritsar (Rs. 87,197), Lahore (Rs. 57,311), Gujranwala-cum-Sheikhupura (Rs. 54,012), Ferozepore (Rs. 39,463), Ambala (Rs. 35,764) and Jhang, Lyallpur, Montgomery, Jullundur, Multan and Gujrat with sums of over Rs. 20,000 each. The reasons given in the district reports for this general increase in the sale of judicial stamps are the doubling of the process fee (talbana) in Munsifs' courts, increase of the fees for inspection of records, larger institutions of civil suits due to the return of military men from service overseas and the institution of suits of extraordinarily high value in certain districts. In Montgomery the increase is put down to colony development, in Lahore to stamps of high value having been sold for probate cases, and in Amritsar to an increase in litigation in consequence of breaches of contracts for sales of house property.

The income from sale of plain paper used with court-fee stamps shows an increase of about Rs. 3,500 and follows on the increased sales of court-fee stamps noticed above.

There is a decrease of about Rs. 600 in the miscellaneous receipts (column 5 of statement II). These represent chiefly recoveries on account of pauper suits. The amount outstanding on this account at the end of the year 1920-21 was Rs. 31,282. The amount is still large, particularly in Lahore (Rs. 12,600), Jullundur (Rs. 5,377), Amritsar (Rs. 3,468), and Ludhiana, Hoshiarpur and Attock (over Rs. 1,000 each) and action should be taken to reduce the balances. The attention of the Deputy Commissioners concerned will be drawn to this matter.

STATEMENT III.

3. The receipts from the sale of non-judicial stamps amounted to Receipts from the sale of non-judicial stamps. Rs. 31,28,289 against Rs. 33,71,764 in the previous year, a decrease of Rs. 2,43,475. About five-sixths of the income from non-judicial stamps is derived from the sale of impressed sheets or stamps and the decrease in the year under report mentioned above falls mainly under this head. Most districts indeed report small increases in the sales of impressed stamps, but the falling off in the total for the Province is mainly due to the districts of Lahore and Amritsar reporting decreases of Rs. 1,33,908 and Rs. 2,03,223, respectively, on the previous year's figures. In both these districts the figures for 1919-20 were much inflated by the several transactions for sale of landed property which took place in that year, and the figures for 1920-21 actually represent a return to normal conditions.

In those districts which report appreciable increases the reasons given are—Ferozepore (Rs. 36,888)—a greater number of bonds executed owing to losses in trade transactions; Gujranwala-cum-Sheikhupura (Rs. 28,084) increased mercantile activities requiring the execution of more instruments chargeable with stamp duty, and Hoshiarpur (Rs. 25,685) a larger number of bonds executed for borrowing money to meet demands necessitated by high prices.

An increase of Rs. 6,180 in the sale of *hundis* is mainly due to Amritsar District, where the sale of such instruments increased by about Rs. 8,000 over the year 1919-20.

Under impressed labels or special adhesive stamps the receipts of Rs. 43,752, though showing a decrease of over Rs. 30,000 when compared with the figures for 1919-20, are actually an increase on the figures of years previous to that. The income for 1919-20 was unduly inflated by large sales at Lahore as explained in the report for that year.

Increases of Rs. 24,142 and Rs. 44,075 in the sales, respectively, of foreign bill and share transfer stamps are due almost entirely to large purchases of such stamps at Lahore by the licensed vendor at the National Bank of India for supply to the Bank's branches, and to an increase of about Rs. 19,000 in the sale of foreign bill stamps at Amritsar.

The decrease of Rs. 89,903 appearing under Legal Practitioner's stamps represents a return to the normal figure after the abnormal receipts of the year 1919-20 when the formation of the High Court resulted in the admission on payment of increased fees of former Pleaders of the Chief Court as Vakils of the High Court.

STATEMENT IV.

4. There were 1,846 stamp-vendors in the Province in 1920-21, a decrease of 7 on the previous year. The discount paid to vendors on sales of both judicial and non-judicial stamps and of plain paper increased from Rs. 1,34,329 in 1919-20 to Rs. 1,46,560 in the year under report, and is in accordance with the increased sales of stamps already noticed. The number of inspections of stamp-vendors' registers made by excise officials during the year was 5,747 as compared with 5,850 in the previous year. The number of such inspections made in Shahpur, Montgomery, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan is still small and might be increased with advantage. The practice of identifying purchasers of stamps by means of finger impressions recorded in stamp-vendors' registers is reported to be working satisfactorily in most districts.

STATEMENT V.

5. The total number of insufficiently stamped or unstamped documents dealt with during the year was 4,335 and the amount of duty and penalty realised Rs. 51,438. The corresponding figures for 1919-20 were 4,104 and Rs. 47,368. In Ferozepore the duty and penalty realised in such cases was Rs. 7,581 more than in the previous year, and in Hissar and Gurgaon too larger sums were realised on this account. Courts appear to be paying more attention to this matter. Some districts report that people are now more careful to pay the proper stamp duties on instruments in the first instance.

STATEMENT VI.

Stamp prosecutions. 6. No stamp prosecutions are reported to have taken place during the year.

STATEMENT VII.

7. The number of cases in which enquiries were instituted during the year to test the valuation of estates for purposes of probate duty was 51 against 65 in the year before and the number in which enquiries were completed was 41 as compared with 57 in the year 1919-20. The amount of deficit court-fees realised was Rs. 413. With the enormous rise that has taken place in recent years in the value of landed property there is bound to be a tendency on the part of applicants for probates or letters of administration to under-value estates consisting of immoveable property and Collectors should be careful to see that such cases are correctly valued.

GENERAL.

8. During the year a Committee was appointed under the orders of Proposals for increasing stamp duties. Government to enquire into and submit proposals for increasing the stamp duties and court-fees. The Committee's proposals had not been submitted before the close of the year.

9. The monthly statements of income were, as usual, compared with Comparison of accounts. the Accountant-General's figures and differences reconciled.

The total receipts entered in column 2 of Statement I also include miscellaneous receipts shown in column 5 of Statement II, which represent court-fees realised in cash by way of recoveries on account of pauper suits. But such receipts are included in the Civil Budget Estimate under the sub-head "Court-fees realized in cash" subordinate to the head "XVI-A—Law and Justice—(Courts of Law)."

Note on the Stamp Statements for the year 1921-22.

No remarks are called for except in regard to the remarkable decrease in the sales of Foreign Bill and Share Transfer stamps which fell from Rs. 43,022 and Rs. 54,049, respectively, to Rs. 5,991 and Rs. 7,620 respectively. This decrease is chiefly due to the fact that the National Bank of India made large purchases of these stamps in 1920-21 for supply to their various branches while no such demands were made this year.
