READ AGAIN—

This Administration's Resolution, Local and Municipal Department, No. 29/VIII, dated the 13th January 1919.

RESOLUTION.

The reports of the Commissioners on the working of the Local Self-Government Act in the Central Provinces and the Rural Boards Law in Berar were due on the 15th September; but the report of the Nagpur Division was over 10 weeks late, the delay being due to the late submission of their report by the Balaghat District Council office, the organisation and management of which is reported to be defective. The Berar report was not received till the 29th November, the delay being again attributed to the habitual unpunctuality of the District Boards.

2. There was no change in the number of Councils or Boards or in the sanctioned number of members. In the Nimar and Drug District Councils the official Chairmen were replaced by non-officials, and the official Secretary of the Bhandara District Council was succeeded by an honorary non-official Secretary. The reconstitution of the Local Boards and District Councils of the Nimar, Bhandara and Drug Districts was sanctioned for the period ending the 31st March, 1921, and that of the Balaghat Council and Boards for the period ending the 31st March, 1922.

3. All District Councils in the Central Provinces and District Boards in Berar held the prescribed number of meetings, but ^{Meetings, attendance and elections.} 11 Local Boards failed to do so. Out of a total of 147 meetings held by District Councils and District Boards, 14 proved abortive for want of a quorum, and out of the 660 meetings held by Local Boards 86 proved similarly abortive. The average non-official attendance was below 50 per cent in the case of 17 District Councils and the great majority of Local Boards, the highest percentage reached being 71 in the case of the Balaghat Local Board. The reports from all divisions complain of the poor attendance of non-official members. To a certain extent this may have been due to the peculiar circumstances of the year, and the presence of influenza, plague and cholera epidemics, but the complaint is an ever recurring one, even in prosperous and healthy years. The exhortations made from year to year have proved of little or no avail, and it is not likely that any of the various remedies which have been suggested, such as the grant of travelling allowance to members or the removal of members

RESOLUTION.

The reports of the Commissioners on the working of the Local Self-Government Act in the Central Provinces and the Rural Boards Law in Berar were due on the 15th September; but the report of the Nagpur Division was over 10 weeks late, the delay being due to the late submission of their report by the Balaghat District Council office, the organisation and management of which is reported to be defective. The Berar report was not received till the 29th November, the delay being again attributed to the habitual unpunctuality of the District Boards.

2. There was no change in the number of Councils or Boards or in the sanctioned number of members. In the Nimar and Drug District Councils the official Chairmen were replaced by non-officials, and the official Secretary of the Bhandara District Council was succeeded by an honorary non-official Secretary. The reconstitution of the Local Boards and District Councils of the Nimar, Bhandara and Drug Districts was sanctioned for the period ending the 31st March, 1921, and that of the Balaghat Council and Boards for the period ending the 31st March, 1922.

3. All District Councils in the Central Provinces and District Boards in Berar held the prescribed number of meetings, but ^{Meetings, attendance and elections.} 11 Local Boards failed to do so. Out of a total of 147 meetings held by District Councils and District Boards, 14 proved abortive for want of a quorum, and out of the 660 meetings held by Local Boards 86 proved similarly abortive. The average non-official attendance was below 50 per cent in the case of 17 District Councils and the great majority of Local Boards, the highest percentage reached being 71 in the case of the Balaghat Local Board. The reports from all divisions complain of the poor attendance of non-official members. To a certain extent this may have been due to the peculiar circumstances of the year, and the presence of influenza, plague and cholera epidemics, but the complaint is an ever recurring one, even in prosperous and healthy years. The exhortations made from year to year have proved of little or no avail, and it is not likely that any of the various remedies which have been suggested, such as the grant of travelling allowance to members or the removal of members

for continued failure to attend, will have any real effect. That portion of the population which takes a genuine interest in the management of local affairs has long outgrown the stage of development which finds expression in the present Local Self-Government Act; when the new Bill, which is now before the legislature, has been passed into law and effect has been given to its provisions, it is trusted that a more real and practical interest will be taken in the work of the Councils and Boards by the leading members of the community.

4. Income and expenditure, excluding debt heads, showed increases of Rs. 6,21,530 and Rs. 8,43,553 respectively. The increase in income was shared by all Divisions. In the Jubbulpore and Nerbudda Divisions the increase was due to the profits made by certain of the Councils on the sale of salt, which was undertaken by them in order to protect the people from reckless profiteering, to the receipt of grants from Government for scarcity works and for the payment of war and scarcity allowances to vernacular schoolmasters, and to increased receipts from cattle-pounds and bazar dues. The increase in receipts from pounds was partly due to the opening of new pounds and partly to the influenza epidemic, during which people could not look after their cattle properly. Contributions from Government amounted to $21\frac{3}{4}$ lakhs, or about 43 per cent of the total income of the Councils and Boards. A sum of $12\frac{3}{4}$ lakhs was allotted for education, and $8\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs was given for civil works, excluding school buildings. Of the latter sum nearly 6 lakhs was spent on communications and works transferred by Government to District Councils for maintenance under the Local Fund Engineer Scheme. In the aggregate the actual closing balance was 18 lakhs in excess of the fixed minimum closing balances, this excess being 3 lakhs greater than it was at the close of the preceding year. As usual, the Berar Boards were responsible for most of the excess, and the general cause of the inflation was the inability of the Boards to spend the grants given to them for education and transferred civil works. It has been again suggested that some part of these heavy closing balances should be invested. This course may be justifiable in the case of money ear-marked for a particular work, which for some specific reason cannot be spent at once; but to permit it as a general course would merely aggravate the present evil. It cannot be emphasized too clearly that the Boards' incomes, whether raised by local taxation or accruing from Government grants, are public funds, meant to be utilized for public purposes, and it is the duty of the members to see that well-considered schemes are prepared in advance and that adequate steps are taken for carrying these into effect. With so many pressing needs remaining to be satisfied, it is essential that this matter should receive the most urgent attention.

5. The total expenditure on Education, excluding that on buildings and repairs, which is included in Public Works, rose from Rs. 8,81,000 in the Central Provinces and Rs. 4,11,000 in Berar to Rs. 10,78,000 and Rs. 6,03,000 respectively. Government contributions amounted to Rs. 9,52,000 in the Central Provinces and Rs. 3,27,000 in Berar, as against Rs. 7,70,000 and Rs. 3,09,000 respectively in the previous year. The principal special grants made by Government for education were Rs. 5,09,000 for the maintenance of new Primary Schools, Rs. 43,000 for pension contributions and for raising the pay of schoolmasters, and Rs. 58,000 towards the construction of new, and the extension of existing, buildings of Vernacular Middle and Primary Schools. There was an increase of 105 in the number of Primary Schools and 36 in the number of Middle Schools in the Central Provinces, while in Berar the increases were 21 and 19 respectively. In the Central Provinces the proportion of recurring expenditure on Education to the total income rose from 30 to 32 per cent and that in Berar from 25 to 34 per cent, the proportion for the whole province being 32 per cent.

6. Although many of the Councils and Boards showed considerable activity in the direction of opening new schools, providing suitable buildings and improving the pay and prospects of schoolmasters, education made but little headway during the year. Except in a few places the increase in the number of scholars was not commensurate with the increase in the number of schools, and the attendance was on the whole unsatisfactory. The influenza epidemic and the famine condi-

tions which prevailed in many districts were in some measure to blame for this result ; but the real cause, it is to be feared, lies not in temporary adverse conditions, but in the general apathy of the country-side. As the Commissioner, Nerbudda Division, writes : " Education is still unpopular with agriculturists, who are sceptical of its benefits. They think that it is a sheer waste of the time and energy of their children, and that after the school course they are unfitted for their agricultural pursuits." The number of night schools in Berar has nominally increased from 44 to 55, but there has been a very large falling off in attendance ; some of the schools are not actually working, and others are reported to be badly managed. The question of their continuance is under consideration.

7. Allusion was made in last year's Resolution to the scheme of providing buildings of a cheap and simple type for village schools. The Deputy Commissioner, Nimar, remarks that the scheme has had the desired effect, and that considerable savings resulted from its adoption. In Chhattisgarh and Berar, however, the scheme is not popular. The new style of buildings is reported to be unable to stand the heavy rain of Chhattisgarh ; while in Berar one of the chief advantages of the scheme has been sacrificed by the giving of the work of construction to contractors instead of to local artisans.

8. District Funds subsidised 170 dispensaries, as against 169 in the previous year. The amount of contributions for maintenance increased by Rs. 2,000, while those for buildings and repairs decreased by Rs. 11,000. There was an increase of 6 per cent in expenditure under the head " Medical ". Since the close of the year, a scheme has been formulated under which a beginning will be made with the creation of a Health Service for work in rural areas, combined with a much needed extension of facilities for medical relief. The task must necessarily be a slow one ; funds can only be provided gradually, a staff has to be created and trained, and the rural apathy towards insanitary surroundings has to be overcome by educational methods. But the death-roll of the influenza epidemic has shown the urgency of the problem, and it is hoped that the proposals above referred to will enable a start to be made on the right lines.

9. The expenditure on conservancy was Rs. 18,000 against Rs. 27,000 in the previous year. Nearly all of this was spent in Berar. During the year a special grant of Rs. 50,000 was made from provincial revenues for the improvement of water-supply in rural areas, but only Rs. 32,000 was utilized by local bodies. Rs. 47,000 was spent from this grant and the balances of previous grants on the construction and repairs of wells, but a balance of Rs. 61,000 still remained unspent. The Divisional reports go to indicate that, where contractors cannot be found to undertake the construction of wells, the work is being taken up departmentally, and better results are hoped for next year ; but until local bodies as a whole show more initiative in utilizing the grants given to them, it is useless to consider the question of increasing those grants.

10. The expenditure on Civil Works increased from Rs. 18,19,000 to Rs. 18,69,000. This figure includes Rs. 2,89,000 expended on School buildings as well as expenditure from the sum of Rs. 6,01,000 contributed by Government for the maintenance of roads and buildings transferred from the Public Works Department to District Councils. In the case of 10 District Councils the proportion of lapses to total allotments was more than 20 per cent, the causes being, as before, the insufficiency of the Public Works staff of the Councils and the difficulty of finding efficient contractors for the execution of works. The expenditure on communications was 45 per cent of the total expenditure on Civil Works, against 48 per cent in the previous year. The Divisional Local Fund Engineer's scheme continued to work with varying success. In the Jubbulpore Division the scheme is reported to have worked well, but in the other Divisions of the Central Provinces the scheme is not popular, and the charges are regarded as too heavy for one man to hold. As pointed out in last year's Resolution, the question of the revision of the scheme must await the decision of the larger questions raised by the Public Works Reorganisation Committee. In the meantime, however, proposals for converting the Divisional Local Fund Engineer's scheme in Berar into a District Engineer's scheme are under consideration.

11. The number of pounds rose from 1,501 to 1,538. The income and expenditure increased by 29 and 28 per cent respectively.
 Cattle-pounds. All the pounds were self-supporting except 3 in the Nagpur District, 4 in the Chanda District, and 2 in the Raipur District. During the year the receipts on account of feeding charges of cattle impounded was Rs. 1,63,000 and the expenditure Rs. 1,32,000. Of the latter sum Rs. 52,000 was devoted to the feed of cattle, while the balance represents the cost of pound servants and of feeding stuffs, etc. Taking the Province as a whole there was a surplus of Rs. 31,000, and in view of the fact that fees are only intended to cover expenditure and not to be a source of profit, the accrual of undue surpluses should be looked into by the Councils and Boards concerned.

12. All charges on account of veterinary dispensaries except the pay of Veterinary Assistants are met from District Funds.
 Veterinary. They amounted to Rs. 62,000, as against Rs. 55,000 in the previous year. Some dislocation of work was caused by the epidemic of influenza, but the dispensaries continued to do useful work and their popularity is reported to be steadily increasing.

13. The year under review has been a trying one for the District Councils, which had to assist in coping first with the sudden and widespread outbreak of influenza, and subsequently with high prices and scarcity. The high prices of salt and foodstuffs pressed heavily upon the people, and the District Councils played an important part in meeting the situation by obtaining salt and selling it to the people at reduced rates and by opening cheap grain shops.

14. The new Local Self-Government Bill, which was to have been passed into law at the last meeting of the Legislative Council, has been delayed in consequence of certain recommendations made by the Committee appointed by the Secretary of State to consider the system of local self-government in England, but it is hoped that no further obstacle now exists to the enactment of this very necessary measure.

15. The relations between District officers and the Councils or Boards continued to be satisfactory. The thanks of the Chief Commissioner will be conveyed separately to those gentlemen whose good work has been brought to notice in the reports. The Saugor District Council sustained a heavy loss through the death of Pandit Shankar Rao Subhedar, who was conspicuous for the active interest he took in his duties as Chairman of the Council.
