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PREFACE.

The present fifth edition of the Bombay Code is based partly on the last edition edited and published by the Legislative Department of the Government of India and partly on the last edition of the supplementary volumes (containing Bombay Acts from 1923-1934), edited and published by the Legal Department of the Government of Bombay. It contains, with some exceptions, the unrepealed Bombay Regulations, the Local Acts of the Governor General in Council in force in the Province of Bombay, the Acts passed by the Governor of Bombay in Council, the Bombay Legislative Council and the Bombay Legislature.

2. The exceptions referred to above are—

(a) certain enactments which are now only in force within narrow limits and which were excluded from the last edition of the Code ;

(b) the following Acts, which are of a purely personal character :—

Act XVIII of 1848 (Nawab of Surat).

Act VI of 1893 (Sir Dinshah Manockjee Petit).

Act XIX of 1911 (Sir Cowasjee Jehangir Baronetcy).

Act IV of 1913 (Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Baronetcy).

Act II of 1915 (Sir Sassoon Jacob David Baronetcy).

Act X of 1915 (Sir Jamsetjee Jeejeebhoy Baronetcy).

3. This edition of the Code consists of six volumes, and like the earlier edition is divided into parts according to the class of enactments in each part. Volume I contains Part I, which reproduces unrepealed Bombay Regulations published in the last edition ; and Part II which consists of unrepealed Local Acts of the Governor General in Council, now in force in the Province of Bombay. The other five volumes contain Parts III and IV, which reproduce the Acts passed by the

local Council and the Bombay Legislature, respectively, from 1862 onwards. Volume II consists of the Acts passed during the years 1862 to 1887, Volume III those passed from 1888 to 1897, Volume IV those passed from 1898 to 1922, Volume V those passed from 1923 to 1930 and Volume VI those passed from 1931 to 1937.

4. Since its last publication in 1922 a large number of amending acts and new enactments have been passed by the Bombay Legislative Council. The Government of India (Adaptation of Indian Laws) Order, 1937, passed under section 293 of the Government of India Act, 1935, has made considerable changes in almost all the Acts and Regulations enacted prior to 1st April 1937. In publishing this edition, all Acts purely of an amending nature modifying the main Bombay Acts have been omitted except those which have modified the Acts of the Central Government.

5. In order to facilitate ready reference to all the changes carried out in any Act, a table has been inserted at the commencement of each Act setting out the number and years of all amending and repealing Acts. A chronological table of Acts and a short index are also appended to each of the volumes. The changes made by the Government of India (Adaptation of Indian Laws) Order, 1937, are referred to in the foot-notes as being made by the Adaptation of Indian Laws Order in Council.

All Acts are printed as modified up to 31st December 1937.

BOMBÁY ACT No. IV OF 1862.¹

[THE MARKETS AND FAIRS ACT, 1862.]¹

[24th April, 1862.]

An Act for regulating the establishment of markets and fairs.

WHEREAS the establishment of new markets or fairs in the neighbourhood of places where markets or fairs have been previously established leads to disputes between the owners of the lands on which such new and previously established markets or fairs are held, and such disputes not unfrequently occasion breaches of peace and serious inconvenience to the frequenters of such markets or fairs ; It is enacted as follows :—

1. 2* * * * * No person shall establish a new market or fair without permission, in writing, from the Magistrate of the district.

Preamble.

No new market or fair to be established without permission.

If any person shall attempt to establish a new market or fair without such license, he shall, on conviction by ³[a Magistrate of the first class], be subject to a fine not exceeding two hundred rupees, or, in default of payment, to simple imprisonment for any period not exceeding two ⁴* months.

Penalty for attempt to establish without license.

Person desiring to establish to apply to Magistrate.

2. When any person desires to establish a new market or fair, he shall make application, in writing, to the Magistrate of the district.

Contents of application.

The application shall specify—

the name of the place at which it is proposed to establish such new market or fair ;

the days on which it is to be held ;

the name of the place where the nearest existing market or fair is held, and the days on which it is held ;

the distance, in English miles, between the two places ; and

the reasons of the applicant for desiring to establish a new market or fair.

Procedure on application.

3. On receipt of the application, the Magistrate shall issue a proclamation stating the desire of the applicant to establish a market or fair at the place named by him and the days on which it is proposed to be held and calling upon any person who may have any objection to the establishment of the market or fair to state his objection, in writing, within six weeks from the date of the proclamation.

Publication of proclamation.

The proclamation shall be fixed in a conspicuous place in the village or town in or near to which it is proposed that the new market or fair shall be held, and a copy of the same shall be affixed at the police-station within the jurisdiction of which the village or town is situated, and in the Court of the Magistrate.

Notice to land-owner of neighbouring market.

If it shall appear that any existing market or fair is held within a distance of four miles from the place where it is proposed that the new market or fair shall be established, the Magistrate shall cause a notice, to the effect of the proclamation, to be served upon the owner of the land where such existing market or fair is held.

The proclamation and notice (if any) shall be issued and served at the expense of the applicant.

Order permitting establishment.

4. If, within the time specified in the proclamation and notice (if any), no objection is preferred to the establishment of the proposed market or fair, the Magistrate of the district shall pass an order permitting it to be established.

Inquiry into objection.

If within the time specified any objection is preferred, the Magistrate of the district shall inquire into the objection, and pass such order as may appear proper under the circumstances of the case.

5. [*Markets and fairs established prior to passing of Act.*] *Rep. Act XII of 1876,*

6. Every order passed by a ¹[District Magistrate] under ²[section 4] Appeal shall, within six weeks, be open to appeal to the Commissioner ³* * and the order of the Commissioner shall be final.

7. Every person who shall contravene, disobey, or oppose any order duly made under this Act, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred rupees, or, in default of payment, imprisonment ⁴* * * * for any period not exceeding two ⁴* * months. Penalty for contravening, disobeying, or opposing order.

8. This Act shall not extend to the Islands of Bombay and Colaba. Extent.

9. Nothing in this Act shall be held to apply to assemblages of people collected at, or concerned in, the inauguration of sacred edifices, or collected at or concerned in, any other religious festivals or ceremonies not forming a part of a fair or market. Exemption of religious assemblages.

10. Nothing in this Act shall be held to restrict the general powers of ⁵[the Provincial Government] to control the order of the ¹[District Magistrate] or Commissioner ³* * in regard to markets or fairs. Saving of general powers of Provincial Government.

An Act for the preservation of the Bhagdari and Narwadari Tenures.

WHEREAS it has been found that the permanence of the tenures known ^{Prea} as the bhagdari and narwadari tenures, which have existed from time immemorial in certain parts of the Presidency of Bombay, is endangered by the increasing practice of attachment and sale by civil process of the homesteads and building-sites ("gabhan") appertaining or appendant to the constituted bhags or the recognized sub-divisions of such bhags or shares, in bhagdari or narwadari villages ;

and whereas it is desirable to prevent the alienation, assignment, mortgaging, charging or incumbering of any portion of any bhag or share in any bhagdari or narwadari village other than a recognized sub-division of such bhag or share, or the alienation, assignment, mortgaging, charging or incumbering of any homestead, building-site (gabhan), or premises appurtenant or appendant to any such bhag or share, or recognized sub-division separately or apart from such bhag or share or recognized sub-division ;

[and whereas it is desirable to provide for the restoration of the bhagdari and narwadari tenures in cases where such tenures have ceased to exist ;]

It is therefore enacted as follows :—

No portion of bhag in bhagdari or narwadari village to be liable to seizure, etc. by process of Civil Court. **1.** No portion of a bhag or share in any bhagdari or narwadari village other than a recognized sub-division of such bhag or share shall ^{2*} * * * be liable to seizure, sequestration, attachment or sale by the process of any Civil Court, and no process of such Court shall be enforced so as to cause the dismemberment from any such bhag or share or recognized sub-division thereof, of any homestead, building-site (gabhan) or premises appurtenant or appendant to such bhag or share, or recognized sub-division thereof.

On issue of such process, Collector may move that it be set aside or quashed. **2.** Whenever any process has issued out of any Civil Court for the seizure, sequestration, attachment or sale of any portion of a bhag or share in any bhagdari or narwadari village other than a recognized sub-division of such bhag or share, or for the seizure, sequestration, attachment or sale of any homestead, building-site (gabhan) or premises appurtenant or appendant to such bhag or share, or recognized sub-division thereof, it shall be lawful for the Collector or other chief revenue-officer of the district in which any such bhagdari or narwadari village is situated, although not a litigating party, to move in such Civil Court, that such process shall be set aside or quashed, and that the provisions of this Act be put in force ;

Court to set aside process if case fall within Act. and if such Court be of opinion, on the evidence adduced by the Collector or other chief revenue-officer of the district on such motion, that the case is one falling within this Act, it shall set aside or quash such process, and cause the provisions of this Act to be put in force ; ^{3*} * * * any order which the said Court may make on such motion shall be appealable in the same manner as a decree of the Court in which it is made.

Bar to alienation, etc., of any portion of bhag in bhagdari or narwadari village other than recognized sub-division thereof. **3.** It shall not be lawful to alienate, assign, mortgage or otherwise charge or incumber any portion of any bhag or share in any bhagdari or narwadari village other than a recognized sub-division of such bhag or share, or to alienate, assign, mortgage or otherwise charge or incumber any homestead, building-site (gabhan) or premises appurtenant or appendant to any such bhag or share or recognized sub-division, appurtenant or appendant thereto, apart or separately from any such bhag or share, or recognized sub-division thereof.

Any alienation, assignment, mortgage, charge or incumbrance, contrary to the provisions of this section, shall be null and void ; and it shall be lawful for the Collector or other chief revenue-officer of the district, whenever he shall, upon due inquiry, find that any person or persons is or are in possession of any portion of any bhag or share of any homestead, building-site (gabhan) or premises appurtenant or appendant to such bhag or share in any bhagdari or narwadari village other than a recognized sub-division of such bhag or share, in violation of any of the provisions of this section, summarily to remove him or them from such possession, and to restore the possession to the person or persons whom the Collector shall deem to be entitled thereto ;

Power to remove person in possession of portion of such bhag.

and any suit brought to try the validity of any order or orders which the Collector may make in such matter must be brought within three months after the execution of such order or orders.

Limitation of suit on Collector's order.

4. * * * * * Nothing in this Act contained shall be construed as prohibiting the issue and execution of any such process as aforesaid against any bhag or share, or recognized sub-division of any bhag or share, in any such village as aforesaid, conjointly and in the gross with its homestead, building-site (gabhan) and other proper appurtenances, if the issue and execution of such process be in other respects authorized by law.

Issue and execution of process in other respects authorised by law not barred.

5. * * * * * Nothing in this Act contained shall be construed as prohibiting the alienation, assignment, mortgaging, charging or incumbering any bhag or share, or recognized sub-division of any bhag or share, in any such village as aforesaid, conjointly and in the gross with its homestead, building-site (gabhan) and other proper appurtenances, if such alienation, assignment, mortgage, charge or incumbrance be in other respects warranted by law, the object and intention of this Act being to prevent the dismemberment of bhags or shares, or recognized sub-divisions thereof, in bhagdari or narwadari villages and also to prevent the severance of homesteads, building-sites (gabhan) or other premises, appurtenant or appendant to bhags or shares, or recognized sub-divisions of bhags or shares, from the same or any of them.

Alienation, etc., of bhag or share, as aforesaid, if in other respects warranted by law, not barred.

where such declaration has been made the provisions of this Act shall apply to such land from the date specified in such declaration :

Provided that, where a declaration has been made under this section in respect of any land, the provisions contained in section 1, 2, or 3 shall not apply in respect of any alienation, assignment, mortgage, charge or encumbrance effected within any period during which such land has ceased to be held on the bhagdari or narwadari tenure.

(2) The declaration referred to in sub-section (1) shall be made by notification in the ¹[Official Gazette] and notice of the intention ²[of the Provincial Government] to make such declaration on a specified date shall be published in the ¹[Official Gazette] and in the village in which the land is situated at least two months before such declaration is notified and any suggestions and objections submitted ³[to the Provincial Government] by any persons interested not later than one week before the date so specified shall be duly considered ⁴[by the Provincial Government].

THE AHMEDABAD TALUQDARS ACT, 1862.

BOMBAY ACT No. VI OF 1862.¹[THE AHMEDABAD TALUQDARS ACT, 1862.]¹

[14th October, 1862.]

An Act for the amelioration of the condition of taluqdars in the Ahmedabad Collectorate, and for their relief from debt.

WHEREAS the lands held in the zila of Ahmedabad in the Province of Gujarat under the title of taluqdari estates are now only held on leasehold tenure determinable at the pleasure of Government; and whereas it has been brought to the notice of Government that many of the taluqdars are in embarrassed circumstances and have borrowed money on the security of their landed estates; and whereas such of the said landed estates as are of the taluqdari tenure aforesaid could not and cannot be lawfully charged, encumbered or alienated; and whereas it is expedient to enable the said taluqdars to effect a settlement of their debts and liabilities; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. Whenever it shall appear to the ²[Provincial Government] that any taluqdar in the zila aforesaid is subject either personally or in respect of his landed estates of any description of tenure to debts or liabilities equal to or exceeding five times the average rents, profits and other annual income derived by the taluqdar from his estates aforesaid during the previous five years after deducting thereout the land-tax and other dues of Government, it shall be lawful for the ²[Provincial Government] to make a ³declaration vesting the management of the said estates in an

officer¹ or officers who shall then be appointed by the ²[Provincial Government] in that behalf, and the said declaration shall be published in the ³[Official Gazette].

After declaration, suits in respect of debts or liabilities in first section mentioned, other than debts to Government, to be permanently stayed.

2. From and after the publication of said declaration as aforesaid, all suits or judicial proceedings for or in respect of debts or liabilities in the first section above-mentioned, other than debts due or liabilities incurred to the Crown or Government, pending before or under appeal from any of the Civil Courts in the said Presidency, shall be, and are hereby declared to be, permanently stayed, and no further prosecution thereof shall be permitted and all writs, processes, executions or attachments for or in respect of such debts and liabilities shall forthwith cease and be raised.

Power to remove mortgagee or encumbrancer from possession of estates of taluqdar.

3. From and after the publication of such declaration, the said officer or officers shall have power, without resorting to any Civil Court, to remove from possession of the landed estates of the taluqdar of any description of tenure, or any part thereof, any mortgagee or other encumbrancer who may be in possession of the same, without prejudice to such mortgagee or encumbrancer bringing his claim under sections 8 and 9 before the officer or officers appointed for the management of the said estates.

After declaration, taluqdar not liable to arrest in respect of debts other than debts due to Government.

4. From and after the publication of such declaration as aforesaid, the taluqdar, the subject of such declaration, shall not be liable to arrest, nor shall his personal estates of any description whatsoever be liable to seizure, attachment or sale under any process, decree, judgment or execution of the Civil Court of the Presidency of Bombay for or in respect of any debts or liabilities existing at the time of such declaration, other than debts due or liabilities incurred to the Crown or Government.

During management, estates exempt from civil process in respect of debts and liabilities aforesaid.

5. From and after the publication of such declaration as aforesaid, the landed estates of such taluqdar of any description of tenure and the rents, profits and income thereof shall, during the period of the management thereof by the said officer or officers, be wholly exempt from seizure, attachment or sale under or by virtue of any process, decree, judgment or execution of any Civil Court of the Presidency of Bombay for or in respect of the debts and liabilities aforesaid, other than debts due or liabilities incurred to the Crown or Government.

6. It shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government] to make rules for the purpose of carrying this Act into effect, and from time to time to alter, vary or amend such rules as necessity may arise. Power to make and alter rules.

7. The said officer or officers shall, during the continuance of his or their management of the said estates, receive the whole of the rents, profits and income thereof, and shall defray thereout land-tax and other debts due or liabilities incurred, or hereafter respectively to grow due or to be incurred, to the Crown or Government, and pay to the taluqdar such annual sum only as shall appear to the ¹[Provincial Government] requisite for the decent support of the taluqdar and his family, and any balance remaining after such payment as aforesaid shall be applied in discharge of the expenses of such management as aforesaid and in liquidation or settlement of the debts and liabilities to which at the time of the publication of the said declaration the taluqdar is subject either personally or in respect of his landed estates of any description of tenure, in accordance with the rules alluded to in the last preceding section. Managing officer to receive rents, profits and income; and pay for support of taluqdar and family, expenses of management and settlement of debts and liabilities in accordance with rules.

8. The said officer or officers shall publish in the ²[Official Gazette] a notice in English and Gujarathi, calling upon all persons having claims against the said taluqdars or their said landed estates in respect of any of the debts or liabilities aforesaid, to notify the same in writing to such officer or officers within three ^{3*} months' time from the time of such notice in the Gazette, and the said officer or officers shall, before or contemporaneously with such publications in the Gazette, cause copies of such notice to be exhibited at the mamlatdars' kachahris in the said zila and in such place or places as to such officer or officers shall seem fit and as may be directed by the said rules. Managing officer to publish notice to claimants against taluqdar to notify claims. Publication of copies of notice.

9. Any debt or liability of the taluqdar other than as aforesaid, to which he is subject, either personally or in respect of the said landed estates, existing at the time of the said declaration by the ¹[Provincial Government] not duly notified to the said officer or officers within the time and in the manner in the last preceding sections specified, shall and is hereby declared to be for ever barred : Debt or liability not notified to be barred.

Provided always that, upon proof being given to the satisfaction of such officer or officers of the inability of the claimant to have complied with the provisions of this and the last preceding sections, it shall be lawful for the said officer or officers to entertain and admit such claim within the further period of nine ^{3*} months from the expiration of the above-mentioned period of three months. Upon proof of inability of claimant to comply, claim may be admitted within further period of nine months.

Scheme for settlement of taluqdar's debts and liabilities. 10. The said officer or officers shall as early as possible prepare and submit to the ¹[Provincial Government] a scheme for the settlement of the taluqdar's debts and liabilities, and such scheme, when approved by the ¹[Provincial Government], shall be carried into effect.

Amount of debt fixed in scheme not to be increased. The amount of any debt or liability as fixed in such approved scheme shall not be liable to increase.

Bar of debts disallowed. Any debt or liability disallowed by such officer or officers shall, if such disallowance be approved by Government, be and it is hereby declared to be for ever barred.

Power to authorise raising of fund for settlement of debts and liabilities. 11. It shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government] to empower the officer or officers aforesaid to raise a fund to be applied to the settlement of the debts and liabilities of the taluqdar by assigning the whole or a portion of his landed estates of any description of tenure to be held and enjoyed, for a period or periods not exceeding twenty years from the publication of the declaration aforesaid, by any fit person or persons who may advance money on the security thereof, or by the sale of such outlying portion or portions of the said estates as may appear expedient; but in case of such sale the consent of the taluqdar and of his next heir, if the latter be of age, shall first be obtained.

Debt or liability incurred by taluqdar during management not enforceable against estates. 12. Any debt or liability, except as hereinbefore excepted, which may be incurred by the taluqdar, either personally or in respect to his said landed estates or any part thereof, during the period of such management as aforesaid, shall not be enforceable in any manner whatever, either during or subsequently to such period of management, against his said landed estates or any part thereof, and it shall not be competent for the taluqdar during the said period of management to charge, encumber, sell or alienate his said landed estates or any part thereof, and such charge, encumbrance, sale or alienation shall be null and void.

Incompetency of taluqdar to charge or alienate. 13. It shall be lawful for every officer or officers appointed under this Act to demand and require the production of any writs, decrees, judgments, records, deeds, documents, exhibits, pleadings, books, accounts, letters, petitions, papers or writings filed in any of the suits mentioned in the second section of this Act, or relating to the debts or liabilities of any taluqdar whose landed estates are brought under such management as aforesaid, in the custody or control of any Civil Court, or in the custody or control of any Judges, Judge, Assistant Judge, officer or person connected with such Court, and upon notice being given in writing by such officer or officers to such Civil Court or to any Judges, Judge, Assistant Judge, officer or person connected therewith, such writs, decrees, judgments, records, deeds, documents, exhibits, pleadings,

Civil Courts to give up writs, decrees, papers, etc., when required.

books, accounts, letters, petitions, papers or writings in the said notice mentioned shall be immediately given up to the said officer or officers appointed under this Act, in the manner directed by the said notice, any act, usage or custom to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.

14. It shall be lawful for any officer or officers appointed under this Act to summon witnesses and to take evidence, * * * * * and it shall also be lawful for the said officer or officers to compel the production of books, accounts, papers, deeds or other documents, and to inflict a fine not exceeding rupees one hundred for disobedience to any sanad or order made under this section.

Power to officer to take evidence, and compel production of books, etc.

15. The officer or officers appointed for the management of the landed estates of any taluqdar under this Act shall have, for the purpose of the realization and recovery of the rents, profits and income of such landed estates, the same powers as a Collector possesses under the Regulations or Acts now or hereafter in force for the realization and recovery of land-revenue due to Government.

Powers of managing officer for realizing rents and profits.

16. The management of the landed estates of any taluqdar by such officer or officers as aforesaid shall not extend beyond the period of twenty years, to be calculated from the first publication of such declaration as aforesaid in the ²[Official Gazette], and at the expiration of such management whether before or at the end of such period of twenty years, all debts and liabilities (except as hereinbefore excepted) existing at the time of such declaration, and comprised in such approved scheme as aforesaid, shall be deemed to be for all intents and purposes whatsoever fully discharged and satisfied, and neither the taluqdar nor his heirs nor representatives, nor his, her nor their estates, whether moveable or immoveable, or any part thereof shall be subject in any manner whatsoever to such debts or liabilities (except as hereinbefore excepted) or any part thereof.

Management limited to twenty years and, at its expiration, claims, etc., to be considered settled.

17. It shall be lawful for the ³[Provincial Government] from time to time to appoint new officers to carry this Act into effect, and all such officers shall have the same powers as the officer or officers first appointed.

Power to appoint new officers.

18. Officers appointed under this Act shall have the same powers for enforcing the payment of fines imposed under this Act as are given to Courts by ⁴section 61, Act XXV of 1861.

Powers for enforcing payment of fines.

Suits cognizable by Civil Courts.

19. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Act, it shall be lawful for the Civil Courts to entertain and dispose of suits relating to the succession to, or rights of co-parcenary in, or rights of persons claiming maintenance out of, any landed estate or estates brought under the operation of this Act :

Indemnity to Crown, Government or managing officer.

Provided always that neither the Crown nor Government, nor any officer or officers appointed under this Act, shall be liable to any suit for or in respect of any act or acts done in good faith by such officer or officers.

Proprietorship of taluqdar after termination of management.

20. From and after the expiration of the period of management of the estate of any taluqdar, whether such period extend to, or be less than, twenty years, the taluqdar shall be the absolute proprietor of his said landed estates as regards succession to, and possession, management and transfer of, the same, subject to such land-tax as the ¹[Provincial Government] may be pleased to reserve and all usual remedies for the recovery thereof.

Interpretation-clause.

21. 2* * * * In this Act, 2* * * * unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction, 2* * * * *

An Act to facilitate the adjustment of unsettled claims to exemption from the payment of Government land-revenue, and to regulate the succession to, and transfer of, lands wholly or partially exempt from the payment of such revenue in those parts of the Bombay Presidency which are subject to the operation of Act XI of 1852 of the Legislative Council of India.

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient to provide for the final adjustment, summarily, of unsettled claims to exemption from the payment of land-revenue, and to fix the conditions which shall secure, in certain cases, the recognition of titles to such exemption with respect to succession and transfer in those districts of the Bombay Presidency to which the operation of Act XI of 1852 of the Legislative Council of India extends ; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

1. *Clause 1st.*—When the holders of lands in any of the said districts (except as is excepted in clause second of this section), held either wholly or partially exempt from the payment of Government land-revenue, whose title to exemption has not yet been formally adjudicated, shall have consented to submit to the terms and conditions hereinafter described, in preference to being obliged to prove their title to the

terms and conditions agreed to.

exemption enjoyed by them, it shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government] to finally authorize and guarantee the continuance, in perpetuity, of the said land to the said holders, their heirs and assigns, upon the said terms and subject to the said conditions.

Exceptions.

Clause 2nd.—The excepted cases to which the authority of adjustment and guarantee, vested in the ¹[Provincial Government] by this provision, shall not extend, are the cases of lands held as follows :—

1st, lands held under treaty :

2nd, lands granted or held as jagirs or saranjams, or on similar political tenure.

3rd, lands held for service.

4th, lands already formally adjudicated to be not continuable hereditary.

Such lands (subject to enactments in section 3) to be heritable and transferable property of holders and continued in perpetuity, subject to payment to Provincial Government of nazrana and quit-rent.

2. When the ¹[Provincial Government] shall have finally authorized and guaranteed the continuance, in perpetuity, to the holders, their heirs and assigns, of lands wholly or partially exempt from the ordinary payment of annual land-revenue, whose title to exemption has not already been formally adjudicated and who have dispensed with an inquiry into such title, the said lands shall (subject to the enactments contained in section 3 ²* * .*) be the heritable and transferable property of the said holders, their heirs and assigns, without restriction, as to adoption, collateral succession or transfer; and such lands shall thenceforth be continued, in perpetuity, subject to an annual ³[payment to the Provincial Government]. Such payment shall consist of—

1st, a fixed annual payment as nazrana, in commutation of all claims ⁴[of the Crown] in respect of succession and transfer, and shall be calculated at the rate of one anna for each rupee of assessment;

2nd, of a quit-rent equal to one-fourth of the assessment.

The said assessment shall be ascertainable under the following rules :—

Rules for ascertaining amount of assessment.

Rule 1.—The assessment of lands other than those specified in Rule 2 shall, with respect to lands which have already been assessed by the revenue-survey, now in progress, be the assessment already imposed upon those lands by that revenue-survey, and with respect to lands

which have not yet been assessed by that revenue-survey shall be such assessment as shall be agreed on by the Collector or settling officer and the owner or holder of the lands which shall be final ;

and, in failure of their agreement, it shall be the existing rental of the lands until the revenue-survey now in progress shall have placed a new assessment thereon, after which the assessment so placed by the said revenue-survey shall be understood to be the assessment.

And it shall be lawful for the duly authorized officers ¹[of the Crown] employed in the said revenue-survey to enter upon all lands not heretofore assessed by such revenue-survey for the purpose of fixing and making an assessment thereof, provided no arrangement can be otherwise arrived at by the Collector and the owner or holder, as above provided, to ascertain the fair rental of the lands.

Rule 2.—The assessment of lands of such an exceptional character as not to be assessable under the revenue-survey rules shall be in the discretion of the revenue-officers ¹[of the Crown], which discretion shall be guided, so far as may be, by the rate at which similar land in the same district ²[belonging to the Crown] is let, due regard being had by the said revenue-officers to all equitable considerations affecting such lands.

Shares of the revenues of villages (such as amals) shall be assessed for the purposes of this Act at the value thereof, calculated at the average shown by such accounts of actual realizations by the holders as are forthcoming for the ten years immediately preceding the promulgation of these rules.

Rule 3.—Lands for which a judi, salami or other quit-rent or land-tax under whatever denomination, is already ³[paid to the Provincial Government], instead of being liable to only one-fourth of the assessment, shall in addition to the annual amount of such judi, salami, quit-rent or other tax aforesaid, be liable to a further annual quit-rent, equal to one-fourth of the sum by which the annual or average annual amount of such judi, salami or other quit-rent or tax aforesaid may fall short of the assessment.

Rule 4.—Quit-rent and annual nazrana imposed under this section (section 2) and the rules thereunto annexed shall be fixed in perpetuity, and shall not be liable to increase or decrease on any new assessment, save so far as is above in rule 1 of this section (section 2) provided to

the contrary, in the case of lands which have not been already assessed by the revenue-survey now in progress.

Rule 5.—The whole of the exempt lands found in the possession of each holder shall be continued according to the provisions of this section (section 2) and the rules thereunto annexed, and subject to the enactments contained in section 3.

Adjustment, so far as right of Provincial Government to levy nazrana and quit-rent, binding on holder and rightful owner and assigns.

3. Any adjustment made by the ¹[Provincial Government] with the holder of land held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, in accordance with section 2 * * *² and the rules annexed to the said section, shall, so far as the right of ³[the Provincial Government] to levy the nazrana and the annual quit-rent, mentioned in the said section is concerned, not only be binding upon such holder, his heirs and assigns, but also on the rightful owner, his heirs and assigns, whosoever such rightful owner may be :

Savings of rights and remedies of rightful owner, his heirs and assigns.

Provided always that the said rightful owner, his heirs and assigns, shall not, by this Act or anything therein contained, be deprived of any rights or remedies ⁴* * * * * to which he or they would be entitled against the said holder, his heirs or assigns for the recovery of the said lands or any part thereof if this Act had not been passed ;

and in the event of the rightful owner, his heirs or assigns recovering the said lands or any part thereof, from the said holder, his heirs or assigns, any declaration, guarantee or adjustment made by the ¹[Provincial Government] under, or in accordance with, sections 1 and 2 * * *² and the rules annexed to the said section 2 with respect to the said lands while the same were in the possession of the said holder, shall accrue to the benefit of the said rightful owner, his heirs and assigns.

Such lands, so far as rights of Provincial Government are concerned, to be recognized as heritable and transferable property of actual and legal successors by inheritance and heirs by adoption.

4. Lands held partially or wholly exempt from the payment of land-revenue, and already formally adjudicated to be so continuable hereditarily in perpetuity, may, at the option of the holder, be henceforth recognized, so far as the rights of ³[the Provincial Government] are concerned, as the heritable and also the transferable property, not only of the actual descendants of the person to whose descendants inheritance may have been limited by the terms of the said adjudication, but also of all his legal successors by inheritance, including heirs by collateral successions and heirs by adoption, and their assigns ;

and thereafter the right of [the Provincial Government] or its officers to question the title to possession, or to exemption from the payment of land-revenue, of any holder of the said land already so adjudicated to be heritable in perpetuity on the ground that he does not belong to the family to which title is restricted by the adjudication, is hereby abrogated ;

and, in any case of recognition as in this section aforesaid, lands already adjudicated to be heritable, and to which such recognition applies, are henceforth to be held subject to the payment to [the Provincial Government] of an annual nazrana calculated at the rate of one anna for each rupee of the assessment of the land, ascertainable as provided in the rules of section 2 * * *², which nazrana is to be in addition to the partial assessment (if any) ordered by the terms of the formal adjudication under which the land has already been declared to be continuable :

Lands adjudicated to be heritable to be held subject to payment of additional nazrana.

Provided, however, that the assent of the holder of all lands adjudicated as aforesaid to the acceptance of such recognition and the payment of such nazrana as in this section as aforesaid shall be assumed, unless such holders shall, within three (3) ³* months from the date on which this Act comes into operation, decline to accept such recognition as aforesaid by a notice given in writing to the Collector of the district.

Proviso.

5. *Clause 1st.*—When the amount of the annual nazrana payable for any holding in accordance with section 2 or section 4 * * *² respectively exceeds the sum of ten rupees, it shall be at the option of the holder of the land on account of which the said nazrana is declared payable, if he be not merely a mortgagee, to elect within two ³* months after service of a notice explaining the purport and effect of the rules contained in this section (section 5), which service shall be made in the same manner as is hereinafter provided for the service of the notice described in section 11 * * *² that in lieu of the land being made subject to the payment of such annual nazrana an occasional nazrana shall be payable at each change of possession thereof, or of any part thereof, by inheritance or transfer, the amount of which nazrana shall be—

Provisions in respect of amount of nazrana when it exceeds ten rupees.

Occasional nazrana.

(a) on every succession by inheritance, a nazrana equal to one year's assessment of the wholly or partially exempt lands which are the subject of such succession :

(b) on every transfer of lands wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, a nazrana equal to two years' assessment of the land transferred.

The assessment shall be, in each case, ascertainable under the rules annexed to section 2 * * *² :

Proviso. Provided that, in the event of more than one succession or transfer occurring within twelve months, such occasional nazrana ¹[on] succession or transfer shall not be leviable more than once :

Proviso. Provided also that it shall be at the option of the holder of the land to pay such occasional nazrana in one sum or by annual instalments not exceeding one-fourth of the whole nazrana per annum.

Occasional nazrana from whom to be levied. *Clause 2nd.*—When, at the election of the holder, lands wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue shall have been made liable to occasional nazrana leviable under this section (section 5), instead of to an annual nazrana of one anna in each rupee of the assessment as provided by sections 2 and 4 * * *², the occasional nazrana shall be levied from each person obtaining possession of the land to which it is subject, whether by inheritance or transfer ;

Person obtaining possession to give notice to Collector, etc. and it shall be the duty of that person, within the period of one ³* month after obtaining possession as aforesaid, to give notice in writing thereof to the Collector or other chief revenue-officer of the ⁴* * * district in which the said lands are situate ; and, in default of such notice, the person so obtaining possession shall forfeit, in addition to the nazrana leviable on the occasion, a sum equal to the amount thereof.

Holder of land paying occasional nazrana to give notice to Collector, etc., of transfer. *Clause 3rd.*—It shall also be the duty of the holder of any land made subject under this section to the payment of occasional nazrana instead of to an annual nazrana of one anna in each rupee of the assessment, who shall transfer the same or any part thereof, to give to the Collector or chief revenue-officer of the ⁴* * * district in which the lands so transferred are situate, notice in writing of such transfer, and of the nature and extent thereof, and of the person or persons to whom the same is made, within one ³* month after such transfer has been made ; and, in default of such notice, the person or persons so transferring as aforesaid shall forfeit a sum equal to the amount of the nazrana leviable on the occasion from the person to whom the transfer shall have been made.

Holders asserting right to exemption may claim trial of, and adjudication upon, their title according to Act XI of 1852. **6. Clause 1st.**—When lands are held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, upon the title to which exemption there has not been any formal adjudication, the holders asserting a right to such exemption shall be at liberty, on the conditions hereinafter described, to claim a trial of, and adjudication upon, their title, according to Act XI of 1852, so far as the same is not altered, modified or superseded by, or inconsistent with, the provisions of this Act.

Clause 2nd.—In the event of the title to such exemption being upon such inquiry demanded as last aforesaid duly established, the land shall not be heritable in any other manner, or to any further extent than the same may, on such inquiry as last aforesaid, be adjudged to be heritable; nor shall any adoption be recognised in any Civil Court ^{Effect of exemption being established.} ^{1* * * *} or by any officer of ²[the Crown], as creative of, or continuing, a title to claim from ²[the Crown] any exemption from assessment or any other privilege on account of the said lands; and no nazrana shall be received on account of ³[the Provincial Government] from the holders of such lands.

And whensoever the same lands or any part thereof, either by operation of law, or by devolution, assignment, gift, sale (whether such sale be judicial, public or private), devise, transfer-deed or other instrument, or otherwise howsoever, pass to any person, not an heir by actual descent from the person to whose heirs the lands shall be declared heritable, or in default of such declaration, from the person who may establish his title to exemption as last aforesaid, then the said lands, or such part thereof as may have so passed to any person other than the said actual descendants, shall forthwith become and be liable to payment of annual land-revenue at the full assessment.

Clause 3rd.—In the event, upon such inquiry as aforesaid, of there payment of land-revenue, the lands to which he has failed to establish such title shall forthwith become and be liable to payment of annual revenue at the full assessment. ^{Effect of exemption not being established.}

7. *Clause 1st.*—When the holders of land, held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, demand a trial and adjudication of their title under the provisions of section 6 * * *, they shall be required to furnish satisfactory security for the payment of the assessment of the land, in case of their failure to prove the title to exemption asserted by them; and, in default of their furnishing such satisfactory security, the full assessment of the land which is to be the subject of inquiry shall be levied pending the adjudication. ^{When holders demand trial and adjudication, security to be furnished.}

Clause 2nd.—If the inquiry result in the establishment of the asserted title, the holder, or, in the event of his decease, his heir who succeeds to possession of the said land, shall be entitled to a refund of any assessment levied under the provisions of this section, pending such inquiry as aforesaid and to interest thereon at the rate of five per cent. per annum. ^{Refund of assessment with interest, if holder prove title.}

Full amount of land-revenue to be paid, if holder fail to prove title.

Clause 3rd.—If the result of the inquiry be that the holder fail to prove his title, the full amount of land-revenue assessable on the lands from the date of the holder's demand for trial shall be levied from the said holder and his security, or either, any sums levied pending adjudication as aforesaid being taken in account of the same.

Lands held on behalf of religious or charitable institutions.

8. *Clause 1st.*—Lands held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue on behalf of religious or charitable institutions shall, if already formally adjudicated to be permanently so continuable, be so continued wholly or partially exempt from such payment of land-revenue as aforesaid, according to the terms of the adjudication.

Clause 2nd.—Lands held on behalf of religious or charitable institutions, either wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, shall, if not already formally adjudicated to be permanently so continuable, be declared to be so wholly or partially exempt from such payment of land-revenue as aforesaid; subject, however, to the payment of annual quit-rent equal to one-fourth of the assessment, which shall be ascertainable under the rules annexed to section 2 * * *¹.

Clause 3rd.—It is, however, hereby declared that lands held on behalf of religious or charitable institutions wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, shall not be transferable from such institutions either by assignment, sale (whether such sale be judicial, public or private), gift, devise or otherwise howsoever, and no nazrana shall be leviable on account of such lands.

Clause 4th.—If the holders, managers or trustees of such lands shall refuse to accept the terms provided by clause 2 of this section, and shall demand a trial and adjudication of the title by which the land is held wholly or partially exempt from land-revenue, they shall be entitled to the same, on the conditions described in section 7 and subject to the liabilities provided in section 6 * * *¹.

Power to invest officers with authority of Inam Commissioners and their assistants.

9. It shall be lawful for the ²[Provincial Government] to appoint officers to carry out the inquiries provided for in this Act in the districts in which Act XI of 1852 has the force of law, and to invest any officer so appointed with the authority conferred by the above Act on Inam Commissioners and Assistant Inam Commissioners.

Burden of proof in cases of inquiries under section 6.

10. Whensoever any person, or persons, holding lands wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, upon the title to which exemption there has not been any formal adjudication, shall (whether such alleged title be founded on grant or prescription or on any other ground whatsoever) demand an inquiry under section 6 * * *¹ into

such title, the burden of proof of such title shall, in every instance, lie and be cast exclusively upon the person or persons holding, or claiming to hold, such lands so wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue as aforesaid, notwithstanding any existing usage, law, Regulation, Act or Statute in anywise to the contrary ;

and it shall not be lawful for any Civil Court * * * ^{*1} to place the burden of proof upon ²[the Crown], or upon the officer or officers representing ²[the Crown], of a right to levy the ordinary land-revenue upon the lands the subject of any such inquiry as aforesaid, and it shall in every instance be presumed, until the contrary is distinctly proved, that ²[the Crown] has the right to levy such ordinary land-revenue upon the lands the subject of any such inquiry as aforesaid.

It is, however, hereby further provided that nothing in this section contained shall disentitle ²[the Crown], or its duly authorized officers, to produce and give evidence in rebuttal or disproof of the alleged title to exemption aforesaid, if it seem to ²[the Crown], or its duly authorized officers, desirable or necessary to produce and give such evidence.

11. *Clause 1st.*—It shall be lawful for the Collector of each ³* * * ^{* Collector or other officer may serve notice on holder of lands, asking whether or not he demands an inquiry under section 6.} district, or for any other officer of ²[the Crown] duly authorized in that behalf, whensoever such Collector or such other officer shall have reason to believe that lands are held wholly or partially exempt from payment of land-revenue, and that there has not been any formal adjudication upon the title to such exemption, to serve, or to cause to be served, a notice in writing, upon the holder of such lands, calling upon him to state whether or not he demands an inquiry under section 6 * * * ^{*4} into such alleged title to exemption as aforesaid, instead of accepting and abiding by the terms described in section 2 * * * ^{*5}.

Clause 2nd.—The notice shall be in the prevailing language of the ³* * * ^{* district in which the lands are situate, and shall explain the nature of the alternatives offered on the part of ⁶[the Provincial Government].} Language and form of notice.

Clause 3rd.—It shall be served upon the person holding, or registered in the Government land-registers as holding, the lands wholly or partially exempt from the land-revenue as aforesaid, if he be resident within the limits of the ⁷[district]. ^{On whom to be served.}

Service on non-resident persons.

Clause 4th.—If such persons as last aforesaid be not resident within the ¹[district], the notice shall be served upon any person acting for the aforesaid in respect of the lands.

Service when several persons hold lands jointly.

Clause 5th.—When more persons than one hold jointly lands wholly or partially exempt from land-revenue, service of notice upon any one of them shall in every case be sufficient.

Service when holder known to reside in another district.

Clause 6th.—If the holder be known to reside in another ¹[district] of the Bombay Presidency, and if there be no person acting for him in the ¹[district] in which the lands are situate, the notice shall be sent to the Collector of such other ¹[district] and served or caused to be served by him.

When no person acts for holder and holder cannot be found.

Clause 7th.—If there be not any person acting for the holder, and if he cannot be found, the notice shall be served upon some one of the actual occupants of the land (if any), and a copy of such notice shall be posted in the office of the chief native revenue-officer of the district, and in the chauri or most public place in the village where the lands are situate.

Inquiry when sufficiency of service of notice disputed.

Clause 8th.—In the event of any dispute arising as to the sufficiency of the service of any notice or notices under this section, the matter so in dispute shall be inquired into by the Collector of the district or other officer appointed for the purpose by the ²[Provincial Government], and the decision of the Collector or such other officer as aforesaid shall be final, and not open to appeal or question in any Civil Court ³* * * or elsewhere.

Holder making no answer for two months, deemed to have dispensed with inquiry.

Clause 9th.—If within two ⁴* months after the service of such notice in manner aforesaid, the person holding the lands wholly or partially exempt from revenue as aforesaid, or his legally constituted agent, shall not give an answer in writing to such notice, stating clearly in such answer that he demands an inquiry into the title to such exemption as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have finally dispensed with such inquiry, and the lands, if held as aforesaid by an individual or individuals, shall be dealt with under sections 1 and 2 * ⁵ and the rules annexed to said section 2, and, if held on behalf of religious or charitable institutions, shall be dealt with under clause 2 of section 8 * ⁵.

If no holder or owner discovered, land to be fully assessed.

But, if no holder or owner can be discovered, the land shall be fully assessed to the public revenue, and shall continue to be so assessed unless some person shall, within the law of limitations, appear and prove his title to it.

Clause 10th.—In the event of any dispute arising as to the sufficiency of any such answer as last aforesaid, or as to its meaning, or as to its having been given within the time required by this Act, the matter so in dispute shall be inquired into by the Collector or other officer appointed for the purpose by the ¹[Provincial Government], and the decision of the Collector or such other officer as aforesaid shall be final, and not open to appeal or question in any Civil Court * * *² or elsewhere.

Inquiry when sufficiency of answer to notice disputed.

Clause 11th.—Whensoever an answer in writing is given by any holder or his agent demanding an inquiry under section 6 or clause 4 of section 8 * * * the Collector or other officer to whom such answer has been given shall take the security required in such cases by section 7 * * *³, or, in default of the same being furnished, shall take such steps as shall be necessary for levying the full assessment of the land as required by the said section, and shall refer the holder's claim to the officer appointed by Government for the trial of such matters, who shall, with reasonable regard to the public convenience, and to the convenience of all persons interested or to be engaged in conducting such inquiry, fix a time at which it shall be proceeded with.

After answer demanding inquiry, security to be taken.

Claim to be referred to officer. Time to be fixed.

Clause 12th.—Any claimant demanding an inquiry into his title shall be allowed the benefit or any evidence to be found in the records of the present or any former Government, in custody of such public officer as is authorized by the ⁴[Provincial Government] to have charge or custody of the same, and such public officer shall be bound to search for and to produce the same on application made to him.

Claimant allowed benefit of evidence to be found in Government records in custody of such public officer.

12. [Validation of prior notices, orders and settlements.] Rep. Act XVI of 1895.

13. When any adjustment of a claim or claims to total or partial exemption from land-revenue has been made by the ¹[Provincial Government], or any duly authorized officer ⁵[of the Crown], under the second, fifth and eighth sections * * *⁶, or any appeal from or against the proceedings, orders or acts of the officers ⁵[of the Crown] engaged in making any such adjustment shall be made to the ¹[Provincial Government], or to such officer or officers as may be appointed by the ¹[Provincial Government] to take cognizance of such appeals, and shall not be recognizable by any other authority.

All quit-rents, nazranas, succession duties, transfer duties and forfeitures, payable under this Act, shall be levied in the manner in which ordinary land-revenue is now recoverable, and the claim of ¹[the Provincial Government] to such quit-rents and nazranas, and to all forfeitures provided by this Act, shall have precedence over any other debt, demand or claim whatsoever, whether in respect of mortgage, judgment, decree, execution or attachment or otherwise howsoever, against the lands, or the holder or holders thereof.

WHEREAS it is expedient for the better administration of justice in the territory of Satara that the Collectorate should be brought under the Regulations and Acts of the Presidency of Bombay ;

and whereas certain villages which now belong to Government in Sholapur and the Southern Maratha Country have not yet been made subject to the operation of the general Regulations and Acts affecting the Bombay Presidency ;

1. The villages in the Collectorate of Satara as described in Schedule A * * * shall, from and after the first day of January, 1863, be subject to the Regulations and Acts which are or shall at any time hereafter be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

Villages in Sholapur and in Southern Maratha Country rendered subject to Bombay laws.

2. The villages in the Collectorate of Sholapur and in the Southern Maratha Country described in Schedule B * * * shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be subject to the Regulations and Acts which are or shall at any time hereafter be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

BOMBAY ACT No. V OF 1863.¹[THE GAS COMPANIES ACT, 1863.]¹

[12th May, 1863.]

Repealed in part, by Bom. 3 of 1886.

Amended, by Act 16 of 1895.

Adapted and modified by the Adaptation of Indian Laws Order in Council.

An Act to confer certain powers on the Bombay Gas Company, Limited ; and to enable Government to confer similar powers on other Companies registered and incorporated for the purpose of manufacturing and supplying gas.

WHEREAS a Joint Stock Company has been lately formed for the purpose of introducing gas-works into the Presidency of Bombay, which Company has been completely registered in England under the Joint Stock Companies Acts, 1856 and 1857, with limited liability, and has duly obtained a certificate of incorporation under the name of "The Bombay Gas Company, Limited" : Preamble.

and whereas the said Company is about to erect gas-works in the suburbs of Bombay, and is engaged in the preparation of apparatus and materials for the manufacture and supply of gas, and also in the business of gas-fitters in the Presidency of Bombay :

and whereas it is expedient that powers and facilities should be given to the said Company to enable them to carry out their undertaking of lighting with gas the town and suburbs of Bombay ; which powers and facilities may hereafter be extended to the operations of the said Company in other towns and places within or subject to the Presidency of Bombay, and to other Companies which are or may hereafter be registered and incorporated for the purpose of manufacturing and supplying gas ;

The short title was given by the Bombay Short Titles Act, 1921 (Bom. 2 of 1921).

It is enacted as follows :—

Power to break up streets, etc., under superintendence, and to open drains.

1. In the town and suburbs of Bombay and in any other town or place to which the provisions of this Act may hereafter be extended, by an order or orders or permission of the¹ [Provincial Government], the Bombay Gas Company, Limited, under such superintendence as is hereinafter specified, may open and break up the soil and pavement of the several streets and bridges, and may open and break up any sewers, drains or tunnels within or under such streets and bridges, and lay down and place within the same limits, pipes, conduits, service-pipes and other works, and from time to time repair, alter or remove the same, and also make any sewers that may be necessary for carrying off the washings and waste-liquids which may arise in the making of the gas ; and, for the purposes aforesaid, may remove and use all earth and materials in and under such streets and bridges ;

and the Company may in and on such streets and bridges erect any pillars, lamps and other works, and do all other acts which the said Company shall from time to time deem necessary for supplying gas to the inhabitants of the said town and suburbs of Bombay, or other town or place as aforesaid, doing as little damage as may be in the execution of the powers hereby granted, and making compensation for any damage which may be done in the execution of such powers.

Not to enter on private land without consent.

2. Provided always that nothing herein shall authorize or empower the said Company to lay down or place any pipe or other works into, through or against any building or in any land not dedicated to public use, without the consent of the owners and occupiers thereof, except that the said Company may at any time enter upon and lay or place any new pipe in the place of any existing pipe in any land wherein any pipe hath been already lawfully laid down or placed in pursuance of this Act, and may repair or alter any pipe so laid down.

Notice to be served on persons having control, etc., before breaking up streets or opening drains.

3. Before the said Company proceed to open or break up any street, bridge, sewer, drain or tunnel, they shall give to the municipal commissioners for the town of Bombay, or other persons under whose control or management the same may be, or to their clerk, surveyor or other officer, notice in writing of their intention to open or break up the same, not less than three clear days before beginning such work ; except in cases of emergency arising from defects in any of the pipes or other works, and then so soon as is possible after the beginning of the works, or the necessity for the same shall have arisen.

4. No such street, bridge, sewer, drain, or tunnel shall, except in the cases of emergency aforesaid, be opened or broken up, except under the superintendence of the persons having the control or management thereof, or of their officers, and according to such plan as shall be approved of by such persons, or their officers, or in case of any difference respecting such plan, then according to such plan as shall be determined by a Magistrate; and a Magistrate may, on the application of the persons having the control or management of any such sewer or drain, or their officer, require the said Company to make such temporary or other works as they may think necessary for guarding against any interruption of the drainage during the execution of any works which interfere with any such sewer or drain;

Streets or drains not to be broken up except under superintendence of persons having control of same.

Provided always that, if the persons having such control or management as aforesaid, and their officer, fail to attend at the time fixed for the opening of any such street, bridge, sewer, drain or tunnel, after having had such notice of the said Company's intention as aforesaid, or shall not propose any plan for breaking up or opening the same, or shall refuse or neglect to superintend the operation, the said Company may perform the work specified in such notice without the superintendence of such persons or their officer.

If persons having control, etc., fail to superintend, Company may proceed.

5. When the said Company open or break up the road or pavement of any street or bridge, or any sewer, drain or tunnel, they shall with all convenient speed complete the work for which the same shall be broken up, and fill in the ground, and reinstate and make good the road or pavement, or the sewer, drain or tunnel, so opened or broken up, and carry away the rubbish occasioned thereby; and shall at all times, whilst any such road or pavement shall be so opened or broken up, cause the same to be fenced and guarded, and shall cause a light, sufficient for the warning of passengers, to be set up and maintained against or near such road or pavement where the same shall be open or broken up, every night during which the same shall be continued open or broken up; and shall keep the road or pavement which has been so broken up in good repair for three months after replacing and making good the same.

Streets broken up to be reinstated without delay.

6. If the said Company open or break up any street or bridge, or any sewer, drain or tunnel, without giving such notice as aforesaid, or in a manner different from that which shall have been approved of or determined as aforesaid, or without making such temporary or other works as aforesaid, when so required, except in the cases in which the said Company are hereby authorized to perform such works without any superintendence or notice; or

Penalty for opening or breaking up street without notice, etc.,

if the said Company make any delay in completing any such work, or in filling in the ground, or reinstating and making good the road or pavement, or the sewer, drain or tunnel, so opened or broken up, or in carrying away the rubbish occasioned thereby; or

delay in reinstating streets, etc.,

neglect to fence and light, etc.

if they neglect to cause the place where such road or pavement has been broken up to be fenced, guarded and lighted, or neglect to keep the road or pavement in repair for the space of three months next after the same shall have been made good,

they shall forfeit to the persons having the control or management of the street, bridge, sewer, drain or tunnel in respect of which such default is made, a sum not exceeding fifty rupees for every such offence, and they shall forfeit an additional sum not exceeding fifty rupees for each day during which any such delay as aforesaid shall continue after they shall have received notice thereof.

In case of delay, persons concerned may reinstate and recover expense. Expense how ascertained and recovered.

7. If any such delay or omission as aforesaid take place, the persons having the control or management of the street, bridge, sewer, drain or tunnel in respect of which such delay or omission shall take place may cause the work so delayed or omitted to be executed, and the expense of executing the same shall be repaid to such persons by the said Company; and the amount of such expense shall in case of any dispute about the same be ascertained and recovered in Bombay and in any other town or place subject to the jurisdiction of any of Her Majesty's High Courts of Judicature, in the manner in which expenses are ascertained and recovered ¹[in municipalities under the law for the time being in force] and, in any town or place not within the jurisdiction of any of Her Majesty's High Courts of Judicature, in the same manner as damages are recoverable under this Act.

Power to enter buildings for ascertaining quantity of gas consumed.

8. The clerk, engineer or other officer duly appointed for the purpose by the said Company may at all reasonable times enter any buildings, or place, lighted with gas supplied by the said Company, in order to inspect the meters, fittings and works for regulating the supply of gas, and for the purpose of ascertaining the quantity of gas consumed or supplied;

Penalty for hindering.

and if any person hinder such officer as aforesaid from entering and making such inspection as aforesaid, at any reasonable time, he shall, for every such offence, forfeit to the said Company a sum not exceeding fifty rupees.

Recovery of rents due for gas.

9. If any person supplied with gas, or any person to whom any meter or fitting shall have been let for hire by the said Company, neglect to pay the rent due for the same to the said Company, the said Company may stop the gas from entering the premises of such person by cutting off the service-pipes, or by such means as the said Company shall think fit, and the said Company may recover the rent due from such person, together with the expense of cutting off the gas, by proceeding before a Magistrate, or by action or plaint in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

10. In all cases in which the said Company are authorized to cut off and take away the supply of gas from any house or building or premises under the provisions of this Act, the said Company, their agents or workmen, after giving twenty-four hours' previous notice to the occupier, may enter into any such house, building or premises, between the hours of nine in the forenoon and four in the afternoon, and recover and carry away any pipe, meter, fittings or other works the property of the said Company.

Power to remove pipes when supply of gas discontinued.

11. Any pipe, meter, fitting or other work let for hire by the said Company shall not be subject to distress for rent or revenue, or any rate or tax due upon the premises where the same may be used, nor be taken in execution under any process of any Court whatsoever, or in or under any proceeding in bankruptcy or insolvency, against the person in whose possession or power the same may be.

Meters, etc., not liable to distraint for rent.

12. Every person who shall lay, or cause to be laid, any pipe to communicate with, or who shall derive gas directly or indirectly from, any pipe belonging to the said Company, without their consent, or

Penalty for fraudulently using gas.

who shall fraudulently injure or tamper with any such pipe, meter, fitting or other work as aforesaid, or

who, in case the gas supplied by the said Company is not ascertained by meter, shall use any burner other than such as has been provided or approved of by the said Company, or of larger dimensions than he has contracted to pay for, or shall keep the lights burning for a longer time than he has contracted to pay for, or shall otherwise improperly use or burn the gas, or shall supply any other person with any part of the gas supplied to him by the said Company,

shall, in addition to the amount firstly due to the Company for gas supplied, forfeit to the said Company the sum of fifty rupees for every such offence and also the sum of twenty rupees for every day every such offence shall have been continued or repeated, and the said Company may take off the gas from the house and premises of the person so offending, notwithstanding any contract which may have been previously entered into, and shall not be liable to any action or suit for so doing.

13. Every person who shall wilfully remove, destroy or damage any pipe, pillar, post, plug, lamp, or other work of the said Company for supplying gas, or who shall wilfully extinguish any of the public lamps or lights, or waste or improperly use any of the gas supplied by the said Company, shall for each such offence forfeit to the said Company any sum not exceeding fifty rupees in addition to the amount of the damage done.

Penalty for wilfully damaging pipe.

14. Every person who shall carelessly or accidentally break, throw down or damage any pipe, pillar or lamp belonging to the said Company or under their control shall pay to the Company such sum of money by way of satisfaction, not exceeding the amount of the damage done, as any Magistrate shall think reasonable.

Satisfaction for accidentally damaging pipe.

Penalty for causing water to be corrupted.

15. If the said Company shall at any time cause or suffer to be brought or to flow into any stream, reservoir, aqueduct, pond or place for water, or into any drain communicating therewith, any washing or other substance produced in making or supplying gas, or shall wilfully do any act connected with the making or supplying of gas, whereby the water in any such stream, reservoir, aqueduct, pond or place for water shall be fouled, the said Company shall forfeit for every such offence a sum not exceeding one thousand rupees.

Daily penalty during continuance of offence.

And they shall forfeit an additional sum not exceeding five hundred rupees for each day during which such washing or other substance shall be brought or shall flow, or the act by which such water shall be fouled shall continue after the expiration of twenty-four hours from the time when notice of the offence shall have been served on the said Company by the person into whose water such washing or other substance shall be brought or shall flow, or whose water shall be fouled thereby.

Daily penalty during escape of gas after notice.

16. Whenever any gas shall escape from any pipe laid down or set up by or belonging to the said Company, they shall immediately after receiving notice thereof in writing prevent such gas from escaping, and in case the said Company shall not within twenty-four hours next after service of such notice effectually prevent the gas from escaping, and wholly remove the cause of complaint, they shall, for every such offence, forfeit the sum of fifty rupees for each day during which the gas shall be suffered to escape after the expiration of twenty-four hours from the service of such notice.

Penalty if water be fouled by gas.

17. Whenever any water shall be fouled by the gas of the said Company, they shall forfeit to the person whose water shall be so fouled for every such offence a sum not exceeding five hundred rupees, and a further sum not exceeding one hundred rupees for each day during which the offence shall continue after the expiration of twenty-four hours from the service of notice of such offence.

Power to examine gas pipes to ascertain cause of water being fouled.

18. For the purpose of ascertaining whether such water be fouled by the gas of the said Company, the person to whom the water supposed to be fouled shall belong may dig up the ground and examine the pipes, conduits and works of the said Company: provided that such person before proceeding so to dig and examine shall give twenty-four hours' notice in writing to the said Company of the time at which such digging and examination is intended to take place, and shall give the like notice to the persons having the control or management of the road, pavement or place where such digging is to take place, and they shall be subject to the like obligation of reinstating the said road and pavement, and the same penalties for delay, or any nonfeasance or misfeasance therein, as are hereinbefore provided with respect to roads and pavements broken up by the said Company for the purpose of laying their pipes, and provided further that the officers or other persons acting on behalf of the Company may be present at such digging and examination as aforesaid.

19. If, upon any such examination, it appear that such water has been fouled by any gas belonging to the said Company, the expenses of the digging, examination and repair of the street or place disturbed in any such examination shall be paid by the said Company, but, if upon such examination, it appear that the water has not been fouled by the gas of the said Company, the person causing such examination to be made shall pay all such expenses, and shall also make good to the said Company any injury which may be occasioned to their works by such examination.

Expenses by whom to be borne.

20. The amount of the expenses of every such examination and repair and of any injury done to the said Company shall, in case of any dispute about the same, together with the costs of ascertaining and recovering the same, be ascertained and recovered in the manner prescribed for the ascertainment and recovery of expenses in section 7 * * * * 1.

Expenses how ascertained.

21. Nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the said Company from being liable to an indictment for nuisance, or to any other legal proceedings to which they may be liable, in consequence of making or supplying gas.

Liability to indictment for nuisance.

All services of mesne or other process, and all notices whatsoever, which by law or by the practice of any Court wherein the said Company shall sue or be sued, are required to be made, served or given for any purpose whatsoever to the said Company, shall and may be made, served and given, in addition to all ways and means by which the same may otherwise be legally made, served and given, by leaving the same addressed to the managing agent of the said Company at the office in Bombay of the said Company.

Recovery of
penalties, etc.

24. Any penalties and forfeitures imposed by this Act, and any damages and expenses the recovery of which is not hereinbefore specially provided for, may respectively be recovered to the amount of fifty rupees by summary proceeding before a Magistrate.

Levy by
distress.

25. All penalties, forfeitures, damages and expenses adjudged due under this Act, if the amount be not otherwise paid, may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the party liable to pay the same, and the surplus arising from such goods and chattels, after satisfying such amount and the expenses of the distress and sale, shall be returned on demand to the party whose goods shall have been distrained, or instead of proceeding by distress and sale, or in case of failure to realise by distress the whole or any part of any penalties, forfeitures, damages or expenses imposed or incurred under the provisions of this Act, the person claiming such penalty, forfeiture, damage or expenses may sue the person liable to pay the same in any court of competent jurisdiction.

No distress

26. No distress levied by virtue of this Act shall be deemed unlawful, nor shall any party making the same be deemed a trespasser, on account of any defect or want of form in the summons, conviction, warrant of distress or other proceeding relating thereto, nor shall any such party be deemed a trespasser *ab initio* on account of any irregularity afterwards committed by him, but all persons aggrieved by such irregularity may recover full satisfaction for the special damage in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

Power to
extend Act
to other

27. It shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government], by an order to be published in the ²[Official Gazette], to extend the provisions of this Act to any other town or place within or subject to the Presidency of Bombay, and also to any other Joint Stock Company which may hereafter be formed for the purpose of manufacturing and supplying gas and which may have been completely registered according to law.

An Act for the summary settlement of claims to exemption from the payment of Government land-revenue, and for regulating the terms upon which such exemption shall be recognized in future, in those parts of the Bombay Presidency which are not subject to the operation of Act XI of 1852 of the Council of India.

WHEREAS in districts which are not subject to the operation of Act XI of 1852 it is expedient to provide, with certain exceptions, for the summary settlement of all claims to hold land, wholly or partially exempt from payment of land-revenue, and for regulating the terms on which such exemption shall be recognized in future so as to preclude all doubt in regard to the relative rights of Government and the holders of such lands, and further to make provision for the exceptions aforesaid ; It is hereby enacted :—

1. [Repeal.] *Rep. Act XII of 1873.*

2. *Clause 1st.*—When the holders of lands in any of the said districts (except as is excepted in clause 2 of this section), held either wholly or partially exempt from the payment of Government land-revenue, shall consent to the terms and conditions hereinafter described, in preference to being obliged to prove their title to the exemption enjoyed by them, it shall be lawful for the ²[Provincial Government] to finally authorize and guarantee by sanad the continuance, in perpetuity, of the said land to the said holders, their heirs and assigns, upon the said terms, and subject to the said conditions.

Exceptions. *Clause 2nd.*—The excepted cases to which the authority of adjustment and guarantee vested in the ¹[Provincial Government] by this provision shall not extend are as follows:—

1st—lands held under treaty :

2nd—lands granted or held as saranjam, or on a similar political tenure :

3rd—lands held for service :

4th—lands already formally adjudicated to be not continuable hereditarily.

Future tenure of lands included in exceptions. *Clause 3rd.*—*1st*—Lands held under treaty shall continue to be held according to the terms of such treaty.

2nd—Lands granted or held as saranjam, or on similar political tenure, shall be resumable or continuable in such manner, and on such terms, ²[as the Provincial Government], on political considerations, may, from time to time, see fit to ³determine.

3rd—Lands held for service shall be resumable or continuable under such general rules ²[as the Provincial Government] may think proper, from time to time, to lay down.

4th.—Lands already formally adjudicated to be not continuable hereditarily shall continue to be held according to the decision passed in each case.

Clause 4th.—[*Rep. Act X of 1876.*]

Lands to which Act does not apply.

3. This Act shall not apply to lands which, in villages held on taluqdari, bhagdari, narwadari, khoti or other similar tenure, may have been partially or wholly alienated by the present or former holders of the said villages or by any one of them ; and, in the event of the management of such villages being at any time resumed by ⁴[the Provincial Government], all land so alienated shall revert to ⁵[the Crown for the purposes of the Province] unaffected by the acts of the holders or any of them, so far as the public revenue is concerned, but without prejudice in other respects to the rights of individuals.

6. When the ¹[Provincial Government] shall, under clause 1 of section 2, finally authorize and guarantee the continuance, in perpetuity, to the holders, their heirs and assigns, of land wholly or partially exempt from the ordinary payment of annual land-revenue, the said lands shall (subject to the enactments contained in section 7 * * *²) be the heritable and transferable property of the said holders, their heirs and assigns, without restriction as to adoption, collateral succession or transfer; and such lands shall thenceforth be continued, in perpetuity, subject to a fixed annual ³[payment to the Provincial Government], calculated at the rate of two annas for each rupee of the assessment, which assessment shall be ascertainable under the following rules :

Lands continued under section 2, clause 1, to be heritable and transferable property of holders, subject to fixed annual payment to Provincial Government.

Rule 1.—The assessment of lands other than those specified in rule 2 shall, with respect to lands which have already been assessed by the revenue-survey now in progress, be the assessment already imposed upon those lands by that revenue-survey, and, with respect to lands which have not yet been assessed by that revenue-survey, shall be such assessment as shall be agreed on by the Collector or settling officer and the owner or holder of the lands, which shall be final : and, in failure of their agreement, it shall be the existing rental of the lands until the revenue-survey now in progress shall have placed a new assessment thereon, after which the assessment so placed by the said revenue-survey shall be understood to be the assessment.

Rules for ascertaining amount of assessment.

And it shall be lawful for the duly authorized officers ⁴[of the Crown] employed in the said revenue-survey to enter upon all lands not heretofore assessed by such revenue-survey, for the purpose of fixing and making such assessment thereof.

Rule 2.—The assessment of lands of such an exceptional character as not to be assessable under the revenue-survey rules shall be in the discretion of the Revenue-officers ⁴[of the Crown], which discretion shall be guided, so far as may be, by the rate at which similar land in the same district ⁵[belonging to the Crown] is let, due regard being had by the said Revenue-officers to all equitable considerations affecting such lands.

Shares of the revenues of villages (such as amals) shall be assessed for the purposes of this Act at the value thereof, calculated at the average

shown by such accounts of actual realizations by the holders as are forthcoming for the ten years immediately preceding the promulgation of these rules.

Rule 3.—Lands for which a Judi, salami or other quit-rent or land-tax, under whatever denomination, is already ¹[paid to the Provincial Government] or may be ²[payable to the Provincial Government] under the sections last preceding, instead of being liable to only one-eighth of the assessment, shall, in addition to the annual amount of such judi, salami, quit-rent or other tax aforesaid, be liable to a further annual quit-rent equal to one-eighth of the sum by which the annual or average annual amount of such judi, salami or other quit-rent or tax aforesaid may fall short of the assessment.

Rule 4.—Quit-rent imposed under this section (section 6) shall be fixed in perpetuity, and shall not be liable to increase or decrease on any new assessment, save in so far as is above in rule 1 of this section (section 6) provided to the contrary, in the case of lands which have not been already assessed by the revenue-survey now in progress.

Rule 5.—The whole of the exempt lands found in the possession of each holder, even if in excess of the original alienation, shall be continued according to the provisions of this section (section 6) and the rules thereunto annexed, and subject to the enactments contained in section 7.

Settlement under section 6, as regards right to levy annual quit-rent, binding on rightful owner as well as landholder. **7.** Any settlement made by the ³[Provincial Government] with the holder of land held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue in accordance with section 6 * * * ⁴ and the rules annexed to the said section, shall, so far as the right of ⁵[the Provincial Government] to levy the annual quit-rent mentioned in the said section is concerned, not only be binding upon such holder, his heirs and assigns, but also on the rightful owner, his heirs and assigns, whosoever such rightful owner may be :

Saving of rights and remedies of rightful owner, his Provided always that the said rightful owner, his heirs and assigns, shall not by this Act, or anything therein contained, be deprived of any rights or remedies ⁶* * * * to which he or they would be entitled against the said holder, his heirs or assigns, for the recovery

of the said lands or any part thereof, if this Act had not been passed ; and in the event of the rightful owner, his heirs or assigns, recovering the said lands or any part thereof, from the said holder, his heirs or assigns, any declaration, guarantee or settlement made by the ^{heirs and assigns, against holder, his heirs or assigns.} ¹[Provincial Government] under or in accordance with sections 2 and 6 * * *², and the rules annexed to the said section 6, with respect to the said lands, while the same were in the possession of the said holder, shall accrue to the benefit of the said rightful owner, his heirs and assigns.

8. Whenever a holder of alienated lands, on being called upon, under the rules to be hereinafter enacted, to declare if he consents to the quit-rent described in section 6, shall plead that his title has already been formally adjudicated, then on proof of such adjudication, and provided the case do not fall under case 4 of clause 2, section 2, the said holder shall be exempt both from liability to the said quit-rent and from any further inquiry into title : ^{On proof of adjudication of title, holder exempt from quit-rent and from further inquiry into title.}

Provided, however, that, if the said holder, for the purpose of enlarging the scope of the former adjudication, or for other reason, shall apply to have his holding brought under the settlement described in the second and following sections ^{Proviso.} * * *, he shall be permitted to do so : and the lands shall thenceforth be held with all the privileges conferred by the said settlement, and subject to all its conditions as if no previous adjudication had been made.

9. *Clause 1st.*—In order to ascertain whether a holder of lands, wholly or partially exempt from payment of land-revenue, desires to accept the settlement described in sections 6 and 7 * * *², it shall be lawful for the Collector of each ^{Collector may serve notice on holder calling on him to state whether he is willing to accept settlement or demands formal inquiry into title.} * * * district, or for any other officer duly authorized by him, to serve or to cause to be served a notice in writing upon the holder of such lands, calling upon him to state whether he is willing to accept and abide by the settlement aforesaid, or whether he demands formal inquiry into his title.

Clause 2nd.—The notice shall be in the prevailing language of the ^{Language and form of notice.} * * * district in which the lands are situate, and shall explain the nature of the alternatives offered ⁴[on the part of the Provincial Government].

On whom to be served.

Clause 3rd.—It shall be served upon the person holding, or registered in the Government land-registers as holding, the lands wholly or partially exempt from the land-revenue as aforesaid, if he be resident within the limits of the ¹[district].

Service when persons not resident within district.

Clause 4th.—If such persons as last aforesaid be not resident within the ¹[district], the notice shall be served upon any person acting for the aforesaid in respect of the lands.

Service when several persons hold lands jointly.

Clause 5th.—When more persons than one hold jointly lands wholly or partially exempt from land-revenue, service of notice upon any one of them shall in every case be sufficient.

Service when holder known to reside in other district.

Clause 6th.—If the holder be known to reside in another ¹[district] of the Bombay Presidency, and if there be no person acting for him in the ¹[district] in which the lands are situate, the notice shall be sent to the Collector of such other ¹[district] and served or caused to be served by him.

Service when no person acts for holder who cannot be found.

Clause 7th.—If there be not any person acting for the holder, and if he cannot be found, the notice shall be served upon some one of the actual occupants of the land (if any), and a copy of such notice shall be posted in the office of the Collector and of the chief revenue-officer of the taluqa or other sub-division of the ¹[district], and in the chauri or most public place in the village where the lands are situate.

Holder making no answer for six months, deemed to have dispensed with inquiry.

Clause 8th.—If within six ^{2*} months after the service of such notice in manner aforesaid the person holding the lands wholly or partially exempt from revenue as aforesaid, or his legally constituted agent, shall not give an answer in writing to such notice, stating clearly in such answer that he declines the settlement, and demands an inquiry into the title to such exemption as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have finally dispensed with such inquiry, and the lands shall be dealt with under sections 2 and 6 ^{3*} * * * and the rules annexed to said section 6.

If no holder or owner discovered, land to be fully assessed.

If no holder or owner can be discovered, the land shall be fully assessed to the public revenue, and shall continue to be so assessed unless some person shall, within the period allowed by the law of limitations, appear and prove his title to it.

Clause 9th.—In the event of any dispute arising as to the sufficiency of the service of any notice or notices under this section, or of any such reply as last aforesaid, or as to its meaning, or as to its having been given within the time required by this Act, the matter so in dispute shall be inquired into by the officer appointed under section 12, and the decision of such officer as aforesaid shall be final, and not open to appeal or question in any Civil Court ^{1* * *} or elsewhere.

When sufficiency of service of notice or of reply thereto disputed.

Except that in any case in which the notice has been served by the officer making an inquiry under this section, an appeal against his decision as to the sufficiency of such notice shall lie within thirty days to the ^{2* * *} Commissioner ^{2* * *} whose decision shall be final.

10. *Clause 1st.*—In the event of the holder upon whom notice has been served as last aforesaid claiming inquiry, such inquiry shall be conducted under the rules and according to the principles hereinafter enacted.

Conduct of inquiry, when claimed.

Clause 2nd.—The establishment of a title to exemption shall not preclude the levy of full assessment on all land ascertained to be held in excess of that to which a title is established, and such excess shall forthwith be fully assessed.

Land held in excess of that to which title is established to be fully assessed.

Clause 3rd.—In the event, upon such inquiry as aforesaid, of there being a failure by the holder to establish a title to exemption from payment of land-revenue, the lands to which he has failed to establish such title shall forthwith become and be liable to payment of annual revenue at the full assessment.

Effect of exemption not being established.

11. *Clause 1st.*—When the holders of lands, held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land-revenue, demand a trial and adjudication of their title under the provisions of section 10 ^{3* * *}, they shall be required to deposit forthwith in the Collector's treasury, or the treasury of the taluká in which the lands are situated, a sum equal to one-eighth part of the annual assessment of the land, ascertainable according to rules 1 and 2 of section 6 ^{3* * *} and thereafter to continue to pay annually an eighth of the said assessment as it becomes due from the date of such demand for trial until the date of such adjudication, and to furnish satisfactory security for the payment of the remaining seven-eighths thereof, in case of their failure to prove the title to exemption asserted by them, and, in default of their making such deposits and furnishing such satisfactory security, the full assessment of the land, which is to be the subject of inquiry, shall be levied, pending the adjudication.

When holders demand trial and adjudication, deposits to be made and security given.

Refund of deposits and assessment, with interest, if holder prove title.

Clause 2nd.—If the inquiry result in the establishment of the asserted title, the holder, or, in the event of his decease, his heir who succeeds to possession of the said land, shall be entitled to a refund of all deposits made and assessment levied under the provisions of this section pending such inquiry as aforesaid, and to interest thereon at the rate of five per cent. per annum.

Full amount of land-revenue levied if holder fail to prove title.

Clause 3rd.—If the result of the inquiry be that the holder fail to prove his title, the full amount of land-revenue assessable on the lands from the date of the holder's demand for trial shall be levied from the said holder and his security, or from either of them, any sums deposited or levied pending adjudication as aforesaid being taken in account of the same.

Inquiry by whom to be held.

12. When an inquiry is claimed under the provisions of section 10 * * *¹, such inquiry shall be held before the Collector * * *² or, when specially authorized by³ [the Provincial Government] on that behalf, by any Assistant or Deputy Collector.

Steps to be taken by claimant demanding inquiry.

13. When any claimant shall demand an inquiry as aforesaid, he shall, within two months of notifying his intention to that effect, furnish the deposit and security required in such cases by section 11 * * *¹, and forward to the office of the Collector of the district a written statement, setting forth in detail the grounds on which the claim to exemption is founded, accompanied by copies of the original documents (if any) which he wishes to produce in support of the claim, and a list of such other evidence, whether written or oral, as he may desire to have exhibited; and no further evidence beyond such documents and witnesses as may be specifically named in the said statement or its accompaniments shall be admitted in support of such claim without reason assigned to the satisfaction of the trying authority.

On failure to comply with requirements of clause 1, claim to be disallowed.

Clause 2nd.—If any claimant shall fail, within the time specified, to comply with the requirements of clause 1 of this section, except from unavoidable causes, to be proved to the satisfaction of the Collector of the district, his claim shall be finally disallowed, and his land shall be fully assessed forthwith.

Collector to file papers for trial by himself, or forward them to other officer. Time of trial to be fixed.

Clause 3rd.—On receipt of the said statement and accompaniments, the Collector shall file the papers for trial before himself or forward them for trial to any officer duly authorized under the section last preceding to hold such inquiry; and the trying officer shall, with reasonable regard to the public convenience and that of all persons interested, fix a time at which the trial shall be proceeded with.

Due notice of the date fixed shall be given to the claimant, who shall be invited to appear in person or by duly constituted agent, with all original documents, on the day appointed for hearing.

Notice thereof to claimant.

14. Whensoever any claimant demands inquiry as aforesaid, the burden of proof of title shall, in every instance, lie and be cast exclusively upon the claimant, and it shall not be lawful for any Civil Court * * * to place the burden of proof upon ²[the Crown], or upon the officer or officers representing ²[the Crown], of a right to levy the ordinary land-revenue upon the lands the subject of any such inquiry as aforesaid ;

Burden of proof of title on claimant demanding inquiry.

and it shall in every instance be presumed, until the contrary is distinctly proved, that ²[the Crown] has the right to levy such ordinary land-revenue upon the lands the subject of any such inquiry as aforesaid.

It is, however, hereby further provided that nothing in this section contained shall disentitle ²[the Crown] or its duly authorized officers to produce and give evidence in rebuttal or disproof of the alleged title to exemption aforesaid, if it seem to ²[the Crown] or its duly authorized officers desirable or necessary to produce and give such evidence.

15. Any claimant demanding an inquiry into his title shall be allowed the benefit of any evidence to be found in the records of the present or any former Government, in custody of such public officer as is authorized by the ³[Provincial Government] to have charge of the same, and such public officer shall be bound to search for and to produce the same on application made to him.

Claimant allowed benefit of evidence in Government records in custody of public officer.

16. The trying authority shall not be bound to admit any sanad as evidence in support of a claim to exemption, which shall not bear an endorsement as having been registered by a Collector before the expiration of one year from the date on which ⁴section 42 of Regulation XVII of the Bombay Code of 1827 came into force, i.e., the first September of that year.

Trying authority not bound to admit in evidence certain sanads.

17. *Clause 1st.*—For the conduct of the inquiry, the rules of the ⁵Code of Civil Procedure in regard to the service of summons on, and the attendance and examination of, witnesses, whether called by the claimant or on the part of ²[the Crown], shall be followed, except in so far as may otherwise be specified in this Act ;

Office of Collector and the office of the Collector or other trying authority shall, for the purpose of this inquiry, be constituted a Court of civil judicature as contemplated by the said Code.

Language of record of proceedings. 18. The Collector or other trying authority shall keep a record of his proceedings in the language generally spoken in the zila.

Translation of decision to be given to claimant. He shall also record in English his decision, with a full statement of the grounds on which it is passed; and a translation of such decision and statement shall, at the close of the inquiry, be given to the claimant or party attending on his behalf.

Court-fees Act applied. *Clause 2nd.*—Except in regard to the translation last aforesaid, and to the statement with accompaniments described in section 13, clause 1, the provisions of ¹[the Court-fees Act, 1870²,] shall be held applicable to all petitions or other papers presented by or on behalf of the claimant, and the cost of all stamps so required shall be borne wholly by the said claimant.

Decision in favour of continuance of exemption to be final. 19. *Clause 1st.*—If the decision of the Collector or trying authority be in favour of the continuance of the exemption or any portion thereof, such exemption shall be admitted in terms of the decision, which shall be final.

Appeal by claimant from adverse decision. *Clause 2nd.*—If the decision be against the right of the claimant to the total or partial exemption claimed, the claimant shall be at liberty to appeal to the Zila Court within ninety days from the date of that decision: provided that the annual value of the exemption decided against be rupees fifty or upwards and that proceedings under section 10, clause 3, shall not in any case be stayed pending the result of such appeal.

Refund if appeal succeed. *Clause 3rd.*—If the result of the appeal be in favour of the claim, the amount which may have been levied under section 10, clause 3, shall be refunded.

Forfeiture by claimant producing in appeal new evidence not produced at original trial. *Clause 4th.*—If any evidence, oral or documentary, not produced before the Collector or trying authority, be admitted in appeal without the claimant showing sufficient cause why such evidence was not previously produced, and proving that such cause was assigned to the Collector, or adducing good reason for its not having been so assigned, the said claimant shall forfeit, even if the appeal be successful, all sums which may have been levied from him under section 10.

Court-fees Act applied. *Clause 5th.*—The provisions of ¹[the Court-fees Act, 1870²,] shall be applicable to all proceedings under appeal. VII of 1870.

Clause 6th.—The decision of the Collector or trying authority shall not be liable to be set aside on appeal, on account of want of form or on any other technical ground. Bar to setting aside Collector's decision.

20. Clause 1st.—When exemption is claimed under a sanad or other writing granted by the present or any former Government, or by any of their officers possessing authority to grant the same, exemption shall be admitted in terms of the grant, unless evidence be forthcoming to show that the terms of such grant did not take effect or were subsequently modified, cancelled or revoked by competent authority. When exemption claimed under sanad, etc., may be admitted in terms of grant.

Clause 2nd.—The public officers specified in the 1* Schedule are recognized to have possessed authority under former Governments to grant or revoke sanads or other writings, exempting land either wholly or partially from the payment of land-revenue. Officers recognized as authorized to grant or revoke sanads, etc.

21. Claims to exemption from payment of land-revenue, in virtue of prescription, shall be admitted under the following circumstances:— Admission of claims to exemption in virtue of prescription.

Clause 1st.—When land situated in districts ceded by or conquered from the Peshwa after 1803 is proved to have been held by any person, his heirs or others deriving right from him, wholly or partially exempt from payment of land-revenue, under a tenure recognized by the custom of the country, for sixty years in succession next preceding the date of this Act; or when land situated in any other district is proved to have been held in like manner for thirty years as aforesaid.

Clause 2nd.—Provided, however, that, whenever exemption has been enjoyed under a sanad or other writing, no title by prescription shall be admitted unless the full period required under the last preceding clause shall have lapsed subsequent to the expiry of the title under the sanad or writing aforesaid.

Clause 3rd.—And that in no case shall a title to prescription be admitted in respect to Government lands alienated since the British Government obtained possession of the country, and without its permission.

Clause 4th.—And further, that the exemption during the periods of sixty and thirty years, respectively, as detailed in clause 1 of this section, be proved to have been enjoyed in strict conformity with the conditions of the recognized tenure under which it is claimed.

22. A prescriptive title admitted under the preceding section shall continue to be recognized only in conformity with the conditions of the tenure under which the exemption has been hitherto enjoyed. Conditions on which admitted prescriptive title to continue to be recognized.

Prescriptive title when not admitted. 23. A prescriptive title under section 21 shall not be admitted in respect to any land held for service, or on a tenure implying an obligation of service, whether such service be performed or not.

Sanad, etc., of prescriptive enjoyment not sufficient title in so far as exemption annulled by order issued by present or former Government, etc. 24. *Clause 1st.*—A sanad or other writing under section 20, of prescriptive enjoyment under a recognized tenure as described in section 21, shall not be considered a sufficient title, in so far as the exemption has been wholly or partially annulled by an order issued by the present or any former Government, or by any public officer possessed under a former Government of full and sufficient authority to grant deeds exempting lands from the payment of public revenue, or so far as the land has been assessed under an order, not subsequently recalled, issued by any of the said public officers and such assessment has been realized.

Deed or enjoyment under recognized tenure when not sufficient title. *Clause 2nd.*—Nor shall such a deed or writing, or such enjoyment under a recognized tenure, be considered as a sufficient title, if the land has been subsequently assessed for the period of twelve (12) years like other land of the same description enjoying no exemption, and the assessment has been realized but without prejudice to any suit filed in support of the title to exemption before the completion of the said period.

Title when affected only to extent of assessment made and realized. *Clause 3rd.*—And, where the assessment so levied for twelve (12) years has not been to the extent of that imposed on land of the same description enjoying no exemption, such assessment shall affect the title only to the extent of the assessment so made and realized.

Adoptions when not admitted. 25. Adoptions unrecognized by the present or former Government or by one of their public officers possessed of competent authority shall not be admitted in any cases in which a claim to exemption is founded on a grant limiting succession to lineal descent.

Application of sections 20 to 25. 26. The provisions of sections 20 to 25 shall be of general application in all cases in which inquiry may have to be made, and shall not be confined to cases in which inquiry may have been demanded under section 10 * * *¹.

acts of the officers of ¹[the Crown] engaged in making any such settlement shall be made to the ²[Provincial Government] or to such officer or officers as may be appointed by the ²[Provincial Government] to take cognizance of such appeals, and shall not be cognizable by any other authority.

All quit-rents payable under this Act shall be levied in the manner in which ordinary land-revenue is recoverable, and the claim of ³[the Provincial Government] to such quit-rents shall have precedence over any other debt, demand or claim whatsoever, whether in respect of mortgage, judgment, decree, execution or attachment, or otherwise, howsoever against the lands or the holder or holders thereof. Quit-rents how levied.

31. Whenever it shall be necessary either to measure or to assess any lands in order to give effect to any of the provisions of this Act, it shall be lawful for the Collector or officer duly authorized by him to enter upon the same at any time and from time to time for the purpose of making an assessment or assessments thereof. Power to enter lands to measure or assess same.

All contracts, whether by speaking, writing or otherwise, knowingly made to further or assist the entering into, effecting or carrying out agreements by way of gaming or wagering, and all contracts by way of security or guarantee for the performance of such agreements or contracts, shall be null and void; and no suit shall be allowed in any Court of Justice for recovering any sum of money paid or payable in respect of any such contract or contracts, or any such agreement or agreements as aforesaid.

2. No suit shall be allowed in any Court of Justice for recovering any commission, brokerage, fee or reward in respect of the knowingly effecting or carrying out, or of the knowingly aiding in effecting or in carrying out, or otherwise claimed or claimable in respect of, any such agreement by way of gaming or wagering or any such contract as aforesaid, whether the plaintiff in such suit be or be not a party to such last-mentioned agreement or contract, or for recovering any sum of money knowingly paid or payable on account of any persons by way of commission, brokerage, fee or reward in respect of any such agreement by way of gaming or wagering or contract as aforesaid.

An Act to limit the liability of a son, grandson or heir of a deceased Hindu for the debts of his ancestor, and the liability of the second husband of a Hindu widow for the debts of her deceased husband, and otherwise to amend the law of debtor and creditor.

WHEREAS, according to the law in force, as applied to Hindus by the Preamble. High Court of Judicature at Bombay in the exercise of its ordinary original civil jurisdiction, no son or grandson of a deceased Hindu is liable for the debts of his ancestor merely by reason of his being such son or grandson, and no son, grandson or other heir of a deceased Hindu, who has received assets of the deceased, is merely from that circumstance liable for the debts of his ancestor beyond the amount of the assets received, and no person marrying a Hindu widow is liable in consequence of such marriage for the debts of her former or any prior deceased husband ;

and whereas a different law is applied to Hindus by the Civil Courts which exercise jurisdiction in places beyond the local limits of the ordinary original civil jurisdiction of the said High Court, and it is expedient to amend the law as applied by such other Courts, and to make the law in that respect uniform throughout the Presidency of Bombay ;

and whereas it is also expedient to limit the liability of a Hindu for a family-debt contracted when he was unborn or under twenty-one years of age ;

It is hereby enacted and declared as follows :—

1. No son or grandson of a deceased Hindu shall, merely by reason of his being such son or grandson, be liable to be sued for any of the debts of such deceased Hindu.

Heir to be liable as representative of deceased ancestor only to extent of assets received.

2. No son, grandson or heir of a deceased Hindu, who has by himself or his agent received or taken possession of any property belonging to the deceased, shall be liable personally for any of the debts of the deceased, merely by reason of his having so received or taken possession of any such property; but the liability of such son, grandson or heir, in respect of such debts, shall be as the representative of such deceased Hindu and shall be limited to paying the sum out of and to the extent of the property of the deceased which such son, grandson or heir or any other person, by his order or to his use, has received or taken possession of as aforesaid, and which remains unapplied:

Liability in respect of assets received and not applied.

Provided that, if any part of such property so received or taken possession of as aforesaid shall not have been duly applied by such son, grandson or heir, he shall be liable personally for such debts to the extent of the property not duly applied by him.

4. No person who has married a Hindu widow shall, merely by reason of such marriage, be liable for any of the debts of any prior deceased husband of such widow * * * *¹.

Liability of member of undivided Hindu family for family-debts contracted during his minority.

5. Where a debt is contracted after this Act shall come into operation by one or more members of an undivided Hindu family, under such circumstances as that the same forms the debt of the undivided family, no member of such undivided family, who is unborn or under the age of twenty-one years at the time of the contracting of such debt, shall be liable personally to pay the same, but such member shall only be liable to pay the same out of and to the extent of the property of the undivided Hindu family and of the separate property, if any, belonging to any deceased members of the undivided family who were above the age of twenty-one years at the time of the contracting the same, received or taken possession of by such member or any other person by his order or to his use and remaining unapplied, unless any part of such property so received or taken possession of as aforesaid shall not have been duly applied by such member, in which case he shall be further liable personally for such debt to the extent of the property not duly applied by him.

Saving of liability of surviving

6. Except as provided in section 5 * * *, nothing in this Act contained shall be construed as limiting or affecting the liability of any

An Act for the better sanitary regulation of the city of Bombay.

WHEREAS it is expedient to take measures to check the spread of infectious diseases dangerous to life in the city of Bombay, and especially with reference to vessels arriving at, or being within the limits of, the port of Bombay; It is enacted as follows :—

1. It shall be lawful for ²[the Provincial Government], with a view of providing for the segregation of persons suffering from any infectious disease dangerous to life from time to time to establish, by notification for the purposes hereinafter specified, one or more places to serve as sanitarium for the city of Bombay, and to notify the local limits of such sanitarium.

And it shall be lawful for ²[the Provincial Government] ³* * * to appoint a superintendent of each sanitarium, with such establishment as may be necessary.

2. It shall be lawful for ⁴[the Central Government] to appoint a Health Officer of the port for the purposes of this Act, and the Health Officer of the port shall be an assistant to, and subject to the general control of, the consulting officer of health.

Removal of persons suffering from infectious disease to sanitarium.

3. When it shall appear to the consulting officer of health, or in his absence to the Health Officer of the port, that any person in the city of Bombay, being in the public streets or thoroughfares, or in a place of public resort, such as dharmshalas, temple-enclosures and the like, and without proper lodging or accommodation, or being on board any vessel and without proper lodging or accommodation on shore, is suffering from an infectious disease dangerous to life, and that it is necessary for the safety of the public that he should be removed to a sanitarium,

either of the said officers of health may require such person to proceed to a sanitarium, and the person so required shall be bound to proceed or allow himself to be conveyed to that sanitarium, and shall be bound to remain there till one of the said officers of health certifies that he may go at large without danger to the public.

Penalty.

Any such person refusing or voluntarily neglecting to obey such requisition shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 269 of the ^{XLV} Indian Penal Code. of 1860.

Removal by written order of person refusing to proceed to sanitarium.

4. If any such person shall refuse or voluntarily neglect to proceed to the sanitarium when duly required in the manner described in the last preceding section, the consulting officer of health, or in his absence the Health Officer of the port, may, by a written order in the form given in ²[Schedule A], direct that such person be conveyed to a sanitarium, and such written order, signed by one of the said officers of health, shall be sufficient warrant for the conveyance of such person to the sanitarium.

Magistrate, on certificate of medical officer, to make requisition as in section 3.

5. It shall be lawful for any Magistrate of Police, on the certificate of ³[a medical officer who is a covenanted servant of the Crown], or of any member or licentiate of any college of physicians or surgeons of the United Kingdom or of India, as to the nature of the disease, and on such evidence as may be thought by him sufficient in regard to the other conditions recited in section 3 * * ⁴ to make requisition as in the said section, and any person refusing or voluntarily neglecting to obey such requisition shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 269 of the ^{XLV} Indian Penal Code. of 1860.

Penalty.

Master of vessel to give notice of person suffering on board from infectious disease.

6. When the master or commander of any vessel, being within the limits of the port of Bombay, shall become aware that any person on board his vessel is suffering from any infectious disease dangerous to life, he shall immediately give notice to the Health Officer of the port, and, pending the orders of the Health Officer of the port, he shall either remove such person to a sanitarium, or take other suitable precautions to prevent the spread of the disease.

XLV of 1860. If the master or commander shall wilfully neglect to act as directed in this section, he shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 269 of the ¹ Indian Penal Code. Penalty.

7. It shall be lawful for the consulting officer of health or for the Health Officer of the port at any time to enter into and inspect any vessel being within the limits of the port of Bombay, and to question the master or commander regarding the sanitary condition of the vessel and of the persons on board, and the master or commander shall be bound truthfully to answer such questions. Power to Health Officer to enter vessel and question master or commander.

XLV of 1860. And, if the master or commander shall wilfully give false information to either of the said officers, he shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 177 of the ¹ Indian Penal Code ; and, if he shall refuse to answer questions put to him, he shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 179 of the ¹ Indian Penal Code. Penalty.

8. If it shall appear to the consulting officer of health or the Health Officer of the port that any person on board a vessel within the limits of the port of Bombay is suffering from any infectious disease dangerous to life, he may, ²[by an order in writing in the form given in Schedule B], require the master or commander of the vessel to remove such person, or any other person who shows premonitory symptoms of such disease, to a sanitarium or other place on shore where, in the opinion of the Health Officer, proper lodging and accommodation are available ; and the master or commander shall be bound to obey such requisition and is hereby authorized and empowered to enforce such removal. Master or commander may be required to remove person suffering from infectious disease.

XLV of 1860. And, if the master or commander shall refuse or wilfully neglect to obey such requisition, he shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 269 of the ¹ Indian Penal Code. Penalty.

9. When it shall appear to the Health Officer of the port that, owing to a person suffering from an infectious disease dangerous to life being on board or having recently been on board any vessel within the limits of the port of Bombay, it is expedient that measures should be taken for the disinfection of such vessel, the said Health Officer may, by an order in writing to the master or commander of such vessel, direct all or any part of the vessel to be forthwith fumigated or otherwise cleansed for sanitary purposes, in accordance with rules published on that behalf by ³[the Central Government] under section 11 * * * ; Disinfection of vessels,

It shall be lawful for ²[the Provincial Government] from time to time to make and publish general rules for the proper management and discipline of sanitarium established under this Act, and for the disinfection or destruction of the personal property of persons suffering or who have recently suffered from any infectious disease dangerous to life, ⁴ * * * * *, and from time to time to alter or repeal such rules. ⁵[It shall be lawful for the Central Government from time to time to make and publish general rules for the disinfection and cleansing of vessels on board of which there are, or recently have been, persons suffering, or who have recently suffered, from any infectious disease dangerous to life, and from time to time to alter or repeal such rules.]

Penalty.

Any person who shall disobey ⁶[any rules made under this section] shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 271 of the ⁷Indian Penal Code.

12. It shall be lawful for ¹[the Provincial Government] from time to time to determine by notification what diseases shall, for the purposes of this Act, be held to be infectious diseases dangerous to life :

Power to determine what diseases are infectious.

²[Provided that the Central Government may, if it thinks fit, by notification make separate provision determining what diseases shall for the purposes of the provisions of this Act relating to vessels within the limits of the port of Bombay be held to be infectious diseases dangerous to life].

13. It shall be lawful for ³[the appropriate Government], when necessary, to authorize any one or more persons to exercise all or any of the powers conferred by this Act on the consulting officer of health or on the Health Officer of the port :

Power to authorize any person to exercise powers of Health Officer.

Provided that every such person shall be ⁴[a medical officer who is a covenanted servant of the Crown, or be] a member or licentiate of any college of physicians or surgeons of the United Kingdom or of India, and shall exercise these powers subject to the general control of the consulting officer of health.

14. Whenever it shall appear to ¹[the Provincial Government] that, owing to the expected introduction of any infectious disease dangerous to life, or owing to other exceptional circumstances, the ordinary precautions authorized by this Act are insufficient to prevent the spread of such disease, it shall be lawful for ¹[the Provincial Government], by notification, to make such orders, and from time to time to vary the same, as it shall deem expedient, for the enforcement of sanitary measures with respect to any vessel arriving at, or being within the limits of, the port of Bombay, or in regard to any persons on board any such vessel, or their personal property.

Power to make special orders in special cases.

And any person disobeying such orders or any of them shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 271 of the ⁶Indian Penal Code.

WHEREAS it is expedient to establish regulations for the administration of the Police of the Presidency of Bombay; It is enacted as follows:—

who within the limits or site of any town or village, without sufficient cause, wilfully allows to accumulate any offensive matter in cesspools, dung-heaps or the like, so as to cause annoyance to the neighbouring residents or to passengers; or

who, without sufficient cause, wilfully allows any offensive matter to issue on to any public thoroughfare from any house, factory, stable, privy or the like; or

who deposits the bodies of dead animals, or refuse or filth of any description either in channels which in the rainy season feed any tank or reservoir set apart for drinking, or in other places where to deposit such is offensive to the community; or

Power to depute to District Superintendent authority over village-police-officer.

4. It shall be lawful for the Magistrate of a district, with the sanction of the Commissioner ^{1* *}, to depute to the District Superintendent of Police any authority which may be exercised by the Magistrate of a district for the purposes of police over any village-police-officer.

Village-police in villages under charge of Police-pâtel.

5. (1) The village-police in each village shall be under the charge of such person as the ²[Provincial Government] shall ^{3* *} appoint in writing to be Police-pâtel, and unless the ⁴[Provincial Government] ^{1* *}, owing to the size of the village or other good cause, see fit to separate the appointments, the ²[Provincial Government] shall appoint the person conducting the duties of Revenue-pâtel to be Police-pâtel.

Appointment of Police-pâtel.

(2) In making the appointment, the ⁵[Provincial Government] shall have due regard to the provisions ^{6* * *} in force for regulating the services of hereditary officers, so far as the same may be applicable; but, when the Revenue-pâtel is not appointed Police-pâtel, and more persons than one claim by reason of hereditary right to perform the duties, in rotation or otherwise, it shall be lawful for the ²[Provincial Government] to appoint the most fit from among their number.

Police-pâtels may be appointed for different divisions of town or place.

(3) In any town or place in which the duties cannot be efficiently performed by one Police-pâtel, the ²[Provincial Government] may, ^{7* * * * *} ^{1* *}, appoint a sufficient number of Police-pâtels for the different divisions of the town or place.

Duties of Police-pâtel.

6. The Police-pâtel shall, subject to the orders of the Magistrate of the district, act under the orders of the Magistrate within whose local jurisdiction his village is situated, whom he shall furnish with any returns or information called for, and keep constantly informed as to the state of crime and all matters connected with the village-police, the health and general condition of the community in his village.

He shall also afford all Police-officers every assistance in his power when called upon by them for assistance in the performance of their duty.

He shall further promptly obey and execute all orders and warrants issued to him by a Magistrate or Police-officer, shall collect and communicate to the District-police intelligence affecting the public peace, shall prevent within the limits of his village the commission of offences and public nuisances, and shall detect and bring offenders therein to justice.

7. The Police-patel shall have authority to require all village-servants, Authority over village-servants. in whatever capacity ordinarily employed, to aid him in performing the duties entrusted to him; and it shall be the duty of the village-revenue-accountant, whether hereditary or stipendiary, to frame all written returns and proceedings for the Police-patel.

8. The Police-patel shall dispose of the village-establishment so as to afford the utmost possible security against robbery, breach of the peace and acts injurious to the public and to the village-community, and shall report to the Magistrate to whose jurisdiction he is immediately subordinate all instances of misconduct or neglect committed by any member of the said establishment. Precautions against robbery, etc.

1[9. Any Police-patel or member of a village-establishment liable to be called on for the performance of Police-duties who shall be careless or negligent in the discharge thereof shall be liable to be fined under the order of any Magistrate of the first class to any amount not exceeding the fourth part of the annual emoluments of his office. Penalties for neglect of duty, etc.

If he shall be accused of any violation of duty or breach of rule, or of other misconduct which shall seem to such Magistrate to require a heavier punishment, he may suspend him from office during inquiry into such accusation, and at the close of such inquiry, if the said Magistrate shall consider him guilty of misconduct meriting such punishment, he may suspend him from office for a further period not exceeding six months, or dismiss him: ²[Provided that no person of the rank of patel, if he is an officiator under the provisions of the Bombay Hereditary Offices Act, shall be dismissed under this section without the sanction of ³[the Provincial Government].]

10. If a crime shall have been committed within the limits of the village, and the perpetrator of the crime has escaped or is not known, the Police-patel shall forward immediate information to the Police-officer in charge of the District Police-station within the limits of which his village is situated, and shall himself proceed to investigate the matter, obtaining all procurable evidence relating to it which he shall forward to the said officer.

Inquest in cases of unnatural or sudden death, or corpse found within village.

11. (1) If any unnatural or sudden death occur, or any corpse be found, within the bounds of any village, the Police-patel shall forthwith assemble an inquest, to be composed of two or more intelligent persons belonging to the village or neighbourhood, who shall investigate the causes of death and all the circumstances of the case, and make a written report of the same, which the Police-patel shall cause to be forthwith delivered to the Police-officer in charge of the District Police-station within the limits of which the village is situated.

Punishment for refusing or neglecting to serve on inquest.

(2) Any person who, on being called upon by the Police patel to serve as a member of such inquest, shall without justifiable cause refuse or neglect to do so, shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to punishment not exceeding fifty rupees fine, or, in default of payment, to imprisonment for one month.

Corpse when to be forwarded to nearest Civil Surgeon, etc., for examination.

(3) If the results of the inquest afford reason for supposing that death has been unlawfully occasioned, the Police-patel shall give immediate notice to the officer in charge of the District Police-station within the limits of which his village is situated, and, if the corpse can be forwarded without the risk of putrefaction by the way, shall at once forward it to the nearest Civil Surgeon or other medical officer appointed by ¹[the Provincial Government] to examine corpses under such circumstances, who shall endeavour to ascertain the cause of death.

When burning to be delayed till officer in charge of police-station assents.

Should the Police-patel be unable to forward the corpse without the risk of putrefaction rendering examination useless or dangerous, he shall nevertheless prevent the burning or burying of such corpse until the Police-officer in charge of the District Police-station within the limits of which his village is situated, or one of his subordinates deputed by him or a Magistrate, shall have assented thereto.

Police-patel to apprehend person he believes has committed serious offence.

12. (1) The Police-patel shall apprehend any person within the limits of his village who he may have reason to believe has committed any serious offence, and shall forward such person, together with all articles likely to be useful as evidence, to the Police-officer in charge of the Police-station within the limits of which his village is situated.

Person apprehended to be forwarded to Police-station.

(2) Every person so apprehended shall be forwarded within twenty-four hours to the District Police-station within the limits of which the village is situated.

(1) The Police-patel, in making any inquiry coming within the scope of his duty, not being a case in which it is competent for him to inflict punishment; shall have authority to call and examine witnesses, and record their evidence on solemn affirmation, and to search for concealed articles, taking care that no search be made in a dwelling-house between sunset and sunrise without urgent occasion.

Power to call and examine witnesses, record evidence and search for concealed articles.

(2) He shall also have authority, in carrying out any search or any pursuit of supposed criminals, to enter and act within the limits of other villages, being bound however to give immediate information to the Police-patel thereof, who shall afford him all the assistance in his power, and be immediately responsible for continuing the search and pursuit.

Power to enter limits of other villages.

14. The Police-patel shall have authority to try and, on conviction, to punish ¹[with fine not exceeding two rupees and in default of payment thereof with confinement which may extend to twelve hours or] with confinement in the village-chavdi, for a period not exceeding twenty-four hours, any person charged with committing within the limits of the village petty assault or abuse : provided the charge be laid within ²[two days] of the offence having been committed.

Power to try and punish for petty assault or abuse.

15. (1) It shall be lawful for ³[the] Magistrate of a district to issue a commission to any person exercising the office of a Police-patel, empowering such Police-patel to try any person charged with any of the following offences committed within the limits of the village in which he is Police-patel, that is to say :—

Magistrate may issue a commission to Police-patel to try certain offenders.

mischief or petty theft, when the estimated value of the property stolen, or of damages sustained, does not exceed two rupees ;

resistance or refusal to obey a lawful order issued by such Police-patel personally.

(2) And it shall be lawful for Police-patel so empowered to sentence any person convicted before him of any of the above acts to punishment by fine not exceeding rupees five, or confinement in the village-chavdi for a period not exceeding forty-eight hours, the confinement, in cases of resistance or refusal to obey a lawful order, to be awardable only on a failure to pay a fine.

2. any person who bathes or washes in, or otherwise defiles or causes to be defiled, any public well, tank or reservoir, so as to render it less fit for any purpose for which it is set apart :

3. any person who deposits in forbidden places any dirt, filth or rubbish :

committing nuisance, etc. ;

4. any person who, on any public street, passage or thoroughfare, commits nuisance by easing himself, or who is, from intoxication, riotous, disorderly or incapable of taking care of himself :

accumulating offensive matter in cesspools, etc. ;

5. any person who without sufficient cause wilfully allows to accumulate any offensive matter in cess-pools, dung-heaps or the like, so as to cause annoyance to the neighbouring residents or to passengers, or

allowing offensive matter to issue on thoroughfare ;

who without sufficient cause wilfully allows any offensive matter to issue on to any public thoroughfare from any house, factory, stable, privy or the like, or

depositing dead bodies so as to corrupt water for drinking.

who deposits the bodies of dead animals, or refuse or filth of any description, either in channels which in the rainy season feed any tank or reservoir set apart for drinking, or in other places where to deposit such is offensive to the community.

Provincial Government may lease public ferries by public auction or private contract.

5. It shall be lawful for ¹[the Provincial Government] to lease any public ferry by public auction or private contract, from year to year, or for any longer period not exceeding seven years, on such conditions as ¹[the Provincial Government] deems advisable, in which case a contract setting forth the conditions on which the ferry is to be held shall be executed by the contractor or farmer, and security shall be given by him for its due fulfilment, and any pecuniary forfeiture for breach of contract, inserted in the deed of contract or conditions of sale by public auction, as the case may be, may be enforced in the same manner as a demand for the land-revenue under the law for the time being in force, so far as applicable.

Acts of servant of contractor.

When a public ferry has been duly leased or farmed out, every servant of the lessee, contractor or farmer shall be deemed to be legally bound to do everything necessary for or conducive to the safety of the public which he shall be required to do by any regulation made by the lessee, contractor or farmer, and approved by

An Act to authorize the making and to regulate the working of Street-tramways in Bombay.

WHEREAS the corporation of the Justices of the Peace for the City of Preamble. Bombay, by an agreement, dated the twelfth day of March, 1873, for the considerations therein expressed, granted to William French Stearns and George Alvah Kittredge and their assigns the right to construct and maintain and to use a tramway or tramways in Bombay upon the terms and in the manner mentioned in the said agreement, a copy whereof is set forth in the schedule² * * *, and the said agreement had on the third day of March, 1873, received the sanction of the Governor of Bombay in Council ;

and whereas the said W. F. Stearns and G. A. Kittredge are desirous of being empowered to lay down and maintain the several street-tramways in the said agreement and in this Act particularly described, and also such other tramways between such other places in Bombay, and by such other routes, as may hereafter be approved ;

and whereas the objects of this Act cannot be attained without the authority of the Legislature ; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

Stearns and G. A. Kittredge, their executors, administrators and assigns (hereinafter called the said grantees), may make and maintain in the City of Bombay a tramway or tramways with single or double tracks and with all necessary sidings, turn-outs, connections and tracks to and from their stables on the following routes :—

from a point near the Grant Buildings, Colaba, by Hornby Row and the Cruickshank Road to the Money School, a double track : Provided that this tramway shall not be carried or maintained across the Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railway or any siding which may at any time be constructed from the Cotton Green to the Apollo Bay Reclamation so as to obstruct the said railway or any such siding,

from a point of junction with the above tramway near the junction of Bazar Gate Street and Hornby Row to a point near the Crawford Market, a double track,

from the Money School to a point near Pydhoni Well along the Kalbadevi Road and the Coppermiths' Bazar, Mombadevi, a single track,³[or such double track as may, at any time with the previous consent of the said corporation, be approved by the Municipal Commissioner and be sanctioned⁴ [by the Provincial Government]],

from the said point near Pydhoni Well along the Parel Road to a point near the Byculla Railway-station, a single or double track as may be approved of by the Municipal Commissioner for the said city and sanctioned ²[by the Provincial Government];

and may also make and maintain tramways between such other places in the said city and by such other routes as may hereafter be approved of by the Municipal Commissioner for the said city and sanctioned ²[by the Provincial Government].

" Provided, however, that in case after the expiration of one year from the date when this track shall have been constructed it shall be considered by Government to be necessary or expedient that the same shall be removed, the grantees shall immediately after they shall have received an order from Government in that behalf at their own expense remove the said track and all their plant and materials from the said street and restore and make good the road and pavement and remove all rubbish occasioned by the said track or the removal thereof, and the said grantees shall not be entitled to or claim any compensation in respect of such removal."

Provided also that until the first day of ¹[July] 1917 work at the Company's Workshops at the said Colaba premises shall be restricted to the hours of 8 A.M. to 8-30 P.M. daily, and that, until and subsequent to the closing of those Workshops on or before that date, work carried on in the Company's car-sheds at the said Colaba premises, outside of those hours, shall be restricted to the light and emergent repairs described in the first proviso to this section and shall be subject to such rules and regulations as ²[the Provincial Government] may from time to time deem proper to impose.]

Notice in Official Gazette of new tramway.

4. In the event of any other tramway or tramways on other routes in the said city being from time to time approved by the said Commissioner and sanctioned ³[by the Provincial Government] and undertaken by the said grantees, notice thereof specifying the routes so approved shall thereupon be given in the ⁴[Official Gazette], ⁵* * * * *, and upon the publication of any such notice all the provisions of this Act shall apply to the tramway or tramways in such notice specified, and all works and things connected with or incidental thereto as if the same route or routes had been particularly described in section 3 ⁶* * * .

Extension of provision for housing, storage, maintenance and repairs.

⁷[4A. Any lands hereafter purchased or acquired by the said grantees upon which depots, workshops or other buildings may be erected by them with the approval of the said Commissioner, given with the consent of the said Corporation, and the sanction ⁸[of the Provincial Government] shall be notified in the ⁴[Official Gazette] and shall thereafter be deemed to be included in Schedule II.]

Form in which tramways to be maintained.

5. Every tramway shall be constructed and maintained in such form and manner and upon such gradient and with such gauge and rails as the said Municipal Commissioner shall approve, and shall be laid and maintained in such manner that the uppermost surface of the rail shall be on a level with the immediately adjacent surface of the road, and shall not be opened for public traffic until the same has been inspected and certified to be fit for such traffic by the Municipal Commissioner.

6. The carriages intended to run upon the said rails shall be furnished with a break which can be worked at each end of the carriage, and shall be of a construction approved by the Municipal Commissioner.

Construction of carriages.

No carriage used on any tramway authorized under this Act shall extend beyond the outer edge of the wheels of such carriage more than fourteen inches on each side ¹[without the consent of the said corporation].

7. The grantees may use on their tramways carriages with flange-wheels, or wheels suitable only to run on a grooved rail, and, subject to the provisions of this Act, the grantees shall have the exclusive use of their tramways for carriages with flange-wheels or other wheels suitable only to run on a grooved rail.

Grantees may use tramway carriages with flange-wheels.

8. Nothing in this Act or in any by-law made under this Act shall take away or abridge the right of the public to pass along or across every or any part of any road along or across which any tramway is laid, whether on or off the tramway, with carriages not having flange-wheels or wheels suitable only to run on a grooved rail.

Reservation of right of public to use roads.

9. The carriages of the grantees on the tracks of the said tramways shall, unless with the consent of the said Municipal Commissioner and the sanction ²[of the Provincial Government], be worked with horse-power or other animal-power only, and the ³* * * rate of speed on the said tramway shall ⁴[not exceed such maximum as the Municipal Commissioner, with the previous sanction² [of the Provincial Government], shall from time to time prescribe].

Carriages to be worked with animal power.

10. The grantees from time to time, for the purpose of making, forming, laying down, maintaining and renewing any tramway duly authorized, or any part or parts thereof respectively, may open and break up any road, subject to the following regulations :—

Power to break up streets, etc.

(1) They shall give to the Municipal Commissioner, or to the executive engineer of the said corporation, notice of their intention, specifying the time at which they will begin to do so, and the portion of road proposed to be opened or broken up, such notice to be given seven days at least before the commencement of the work, except in case of emergency arising from defects in any of the rails or other work, and then so soon as is possible after the beginning of the work or the necessity for the same shall have arisen.

(2) They shall not open or break up, or alter, the level of any road except under the superintendence and to the reasonable satisfaction of the Municipal Commissioner or executive engineer, unless the said

Municipal Commissioner or executive engineer refuses or neglects to give such superintendence at the time specified in the notice, or discontinues the same during the work.

(3) They shall not, without the consent of the Municipal Commissioner, open or break up at any one time a greater length than one hundred yards of any road which does not exceed a quarter of a mile in length; and in the case of any road exceeding a quarter of a mile in length the grantees shall leave an interval of at least a quarter of a mile between any two places at which they may open or break up the road, and they shall not open or break up at any such place a greater length than one hundred yards.

Completion works and reinstatement of road.

11. When the grantees have opened or broken up any portion of any road, they shall be under the following further obligations, namely:—

(1) They shall, with all convenient speed, and in all cases within four weeks at the most (unless the Municipal Commissioner otherwise consents in writing), complete the work on account of which they opened or broke up the same, and (subject to the formation, maintenance or renewal of the tramway) fill in the ground, and make good the surface, and to the satisfaction of the Municipal Commissioner restore the portion of the road to as good condition as that in which it was before it was opened or broken up, and clear away all surplus paving or metalling material or rubbish occasioned thereby.

(2) They shall in the meantime cause the place where the road is opened or broken up to be fenced and watched, and to be properly lighted at night.

Repair of part of road where tramway laid.

12. The grantees shall, at their own expense, at all times maintain and keep in good condition and repair, in such manner as the Municipal Commissioner shall direct, and to his satisfaction, so much of any road whereon any tramway belonging to them is laid as lies between the rails of the tramway and (where two tramways are laid by the grantees in any road at a distance of not more than four feet from each other) the portion of the road between the tramways, and in every case so much of the road as extends eighteen inches beyond the rails of and on each side of any such tramway.

And, in consideration of such maintenance of parts of roads and of the yearly rent in the said agreement mentioned to be paid by the grantees, the horses and carriages and other vehicles of the said grantees shall be exempt from municipal taxation.

Penalty for failure by grantees to comply with provisions of Act.

13. If the grantees aforesaid fail to comply in any respect with the provisions of sections 5, 6, 9, 10, 11 and 12 * * *, they shall for every such offence (without prejudice to the enforcement of specific performance of the requirements of this Act or to any other remedy against them), upon complaint of the Municipal Commissioner, be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred rupees, and to a further penalty not

exceeding fifty rupees for each day during which any such failure continues after the first day on which such penalty is incurred.

14. If any unnecessary delay or omission shall take place on the part of the said grantees in complying with any order which may be made on them ¹[by the Provincial Government] for the removal of the said track authorized to be constructed along Sayad Abdul Rahman Street as hereinbefore mentioned, or of any other track the construction of which may have been sanctioned, subject to similar provisions, or otherwise in acting in accordance with the proviso hereinbefore contained regarding that track, or in the performance of any of the works specified in sections 10 and 11 ^{2*} * *, or in filling in the ground or reinstating and making good the road or pavement so opened or broken up, or in carrying away the rubbish occasioned thereby, or if they neglect to cause the place where such road has been broken up to be guarded and lighted, or neglect to maintain or keep in repair the portion of the roads which shall be occupied by their tracks, the Municipal Commissioner may cause the work so delayed or omitted to be executed at the expense of the said grantees, and the certificate in writing of the said Municipal Commissioner as to the expense so incurred shall be conclusive, and the said grantees shall not be at liberty to dispute the same in any Court of law.

15. Nothing in this Act shall be construed to prevent the said Municipal Commissioner or the corporation, or the Bombay Gas Company, Limited, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon them under ³Act V of 1863 of the Governor of Bombay in Council, from taking up any of the roads traversed by the said tramway for the purposes for which he or they may now lawfully take up the same; Provided always that—

(1) they shall cause as little detriment or inconvenience to the grantees as circumstances admit;

(2) before they commence any work whereby the traffic on the tramway will be interrupted, they shall (except in cases of urgency, in which cases no notice shall be necessary) give to the grantees notice of their intention to commence such work, specifying the time at which they will begin to do so, such notice to be given eighteen hours at least before the commencement of the work;

(3) they shall not be liable to pay to the grantees any compensation for injury done to the tramway by the execution of such work, or for loss of traffic occasioned thereby, or for the reasonable exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid.

Grantees may demand fees or charges.

16. The grantees may demand and take for every passenger travelling upon any of the tramways, or any part or parts thereof respectively, or for the carriage of goods by such tramways, such fares or charges as they may fix from time to time :

Provided that the rates of fares, on at least one-half of the carriages available for passengers which shall daily run on the said tracks, shall for any distance not exceeding three miles not exceed three annas, and for any greater distance shall be at the rate of three annas for every three miles or any portion thereof.

Printed list of fares, etc., to be placed in carriages.

17. A printed list in English, Marathi and Gujarati of all the fares and charges authorized by this Act to be taken, and a printed copy in the same languages, of all by-laws in force as hereinafter mentioned, shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place inside each of the carriages used by the grantees upon any of their tramways.

Fares to whom to be paid.

18. The fares and charges by this Act authorized shall be paid to such persons, at such places upon or near to the tramways, and in such manner and under such regulations, as the grantees shall, by notice to be annexed to the list of fares, appoint.

Penalty for obstructing grantees in exercise of power.

19. If any person wilfully obstructs any persons acting under the authority of the grantees in the lawful exercise of their powers in setting out or making, laying down, repairing or renewing a tramway, or injures or destroys any mark made for the purpose of setting out the line of the tramway, he shall for every offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty rupees, and shall also be liable to pay such damages as may be awarded in respect of such injury by any competent Court.

Penalty for interfering with tramways.

20. If any person without lawful excuse (the proof whereof shall lie on him) wilfully does any of the following things, namely :—

interferes with, removes or alters any part of a tramway of the grantees or of the works connected therewith ;

does or causes to be done anything in such a manner as to obstruct any carriage using the tramways ; or

knowingly aids or assists in the doing of such thing ;

he shall for every such offence be liable (in addition to any proceedings by way of criminal charge or otherwise to which he may be subject) to a penalty not exceeding one hundred rupees.

Penalty for avoiding payment of proper fare.

21. If any person travelling or having travelled in any carriage of the grantees avoids or attempts to avoid payment of his fare, or

if any person having paid his fare for a certain distance knowingly and wilfully proceeds in any such carriage beyond such distance and does not pay the additional fare for the additional distance, or attempts to avoid payment thereof, or

if any person knowingly and wilfully refuses or neglects, on arriving at the point to which he has paid his fare, to quit such carriage,

every such person shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten rupees.

22. It shall be lawful for any servant of the grantees, and all persons called in by him for his assistance, to arrest and take to the nearest police-station any person who shall be discovered either in or after committing or attempting to commit any such offence as in the next preceding section mentioned, and whose name and residence is refused by him and is unknown to such servant or person, and the police-officer in charge of the said police-station, on receiving a complaint that an offence under this Act has been committed, shall adopt such legal measures as may be necessary to cause the said person to be taken before a Magistrate with the least possible delay.

Servant of grantees may arrest persons avoiding payment.

23. No person shall be entitled to carry or to require to be carried on any tramway any goods which may be of a dangerous or offensive nature, and if any person sends by any tramway any such goods without distinctly marking their nature on the outside of the package containing the same or otherwise giving notice in writing to the book-keeper or other servant of the grantees with whom the same are left at the time of such sending, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding rupees fifty for every such offence, and it shall be lawful for the grantees to refuse to take any parcel that they may suspect to contain goods of a dangerous or offensive nature, or require the same to be opened to ascertain the fact.

Carriage of dangerous or offensive goods.

24. The Municipal Commissioner may, from time to time, make regulations as to the following matters:—

Regulations by Municipal Commissioner.

the rate of speed to be observed in travelling upon the tramway :

the distances at which carriages using the tramway shall be allowed to follow one after the other :

the stopping of carriages using the tramway :

the hours during which such carriages carrying goods shall run on the tramway :

the traffic on the road in which the tramway is laid.

The grantees may from time to time make regulations—

Regulations by grantees.

for preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage, or in or against any premises belonging to them ;

for regulating the travelling in or upon any carriage belonging to them.

And, for better enforcing the observance of all or any of such regulations, it shall be lawful for such Municipal Commissioner and grantees respectively, subject to confirmation thereof by the [Provincial Government] * * * * *, to make by-laws for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, and from time to time repeal or alter such by-laws, and make new by-laws, provided that such by-laws be not repugnant to the provisions of this Act or of any law for the time being in force in the City of Bombay.

Notice of the making of any by-law under the provisions of this Act] shall be published by the Municipal Commissioner in the ¹[*Official Gazette*].

Penalty

25. Any person offending against any by-law made under the provisions of the next preceding section shall forfeit for every offence any sum not exceeding twenty-five rupees, to be imposed in such by-laws as a penalty for such offence.

Penalties
how
recovered.

26. All fares, penalties, forfeitures and charges under this Act or under any by-law made in pursuance of this Act may be recovered and enforced before a Police Magistrate of Bombay by a summary proceeding; and in default of payment of such fare, penalty, forfeiture or charge, the same may be levied under the warrant of such Magistrate by distress and sale of the goods of such offender, with all such powers for the issuing of such warrant and upon the return thereof as are exercised by a Magistrate of Police under Act XIII of 1856² or any other Act for regulating the Police of the Town of Bombay in force for the time being.

Responsi-
bility of

damages.

27. The grantees shall be answerable for all accidents, damages and injuries happening through their act or default, or through the act or default of any person in their employment, by reason or in consequence of any of their works or carriages, and shall save harmless the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay and their officers and servants from all damages and costs in respect of such accidents, damages and injuries.

Power for

28. Nothing in this Act shall limit the powers of the Municipal Commissioner or the Police to regulate the passage of any traffic along or across any road along or across which any tramways are laid down, and such Municipal Commissioner or Police may exercise their authority as well on as off the tramway, and with respect as well to the traffic of the grantees as to the traffic of other persons.

29. If at any time after the opening of any tramway for traffic the grantees shall discontinue the working of such tramway or any part thereof for the space of six ³* months (such discontinuance not being occasioned by circumstances beyond the control of the grantees, for which purpose the want of sufficient funds shall not be considered a circumstance beyond their control), it shall be lawful for the said Municipal Commissioner without any previous notice to the grantees to remove the tramway or any part of the tramway so discontinued, and the grantees shall pay to the said corporation the cost of such removal and the making good of the streets, roads or bridges consequent on such removal, and the

certificate of the said Municipal Commissioner as to such cost shall be conclusive evidence as between the said corporation and the said grantees.

30. The said Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay shall have Municipal Corporation have right of purchasing tramways after twenty-one years. the right of purchasing the said tramways, with the plant, stores, rolling-stock and everything connected therewith after the expiration of twenty-one years from the twelfth day of March, 1873, upon declaring its intention so to do within six months after the expiration of the said twenty-one years, and shall have a renewed right of purchase at the end of every seven years after the expiration of the said twenty-one years upon similar notice being given ;

the amount to be paid in the event of such purchase shall be the actual *bona fide* value (exclusive of any compensation for goodwill, premium or compulsory sale or other consideration whatsoever) of the tramways, and of the works and materials connected therewith and of the lands and buildings and all other the property of the grantees, such value in case the parties do not agree to be decided by arbitration as provided by the said agreement of the twelfth day of March, 1873 ; and as compensation for the goodwill, premium or compulsory sale and other consideration, the grantees shall be paid an amount equal to twenty-one years' purchase, calculated on the average profits of the previous three years next preceding the purchase, four per cent. per annum on the *bona fide* value mentioned above being first deducted from such profits.

31. At any time the grantees may sell the undertaking to any person, persons, corporation or company (subject nevertheless to the provisions of the said agreement or such of them as shall be then subsisting), and, when any such sale has been made, all the rights, powers, authorities, obligations and liabilities of the grantees under the said agreement and this Act shall be transferred to, vested in and may be exercised by, and shall attach to, the person, persons, corporation or company to whom the same has been sold, in like manner as if such person, persons, corporation or company had been authorized to construct the tramways of the grantees then already constructed and thereafter to be constructed instead of the grantees. Grantees may sell; rights and powers to others.

SCHEDULE I.¹

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT made this Twelfth day of March, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-three, between the JUSTICES OF THE PEACE FOR THE CITY OF BOMBAY, incorporated under Act II of 1865² of the Legislative Council of Bombay, hereinafter called the said Justices, of the one part ; and WILLIAM FRENCH STEARNS and GEORGE ALVAH KITTREDGE, hereinafter called the grantees, of the other part.

Whereas the said Justices have agreed to grant to the said WILLIAM FRENCH STEARNS and GEORGE ALVAH KITTREDGE the right to construct, maintain and use a tramway in Bombay upon the terms and conditions hereinafter contained : NOW THESE PRESENTS WITNESS that, in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, and on the part of the said Justices to be performed, the said grantees, for themselves, their heirs, executors and administrators, do, and each of them for himself, his heirs, executors and administrators doth, covenant with the said Justices and their successors, so far as the covenants and agreements hereinafter contained are, or ought to be, performed by the said grantees and their assigns ; and the said Justices, for and in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, and on the part of the said grantees and their assigns to be performed, do hereby covenant with the said grantees and their assigns, so far as the covenants and agreements hereinafter contained are, or ought to be, performed by the said Justices and their successors, in manner following : THAT IS TO SAY :—

1. The said Justices grant to the said WILLIAM FRENCH STEARNS and GEORGE ALVAH KITTREDGE, and their assigns, the right to construct, maintain and use a tramway or tramways, with single or double tracks, and with all necessary sidings, turn-outs, connections and tracks, to and from the stables of the grantees or their assigns, on the following routes, and between such other places, and by such other routes, as may be hereafter approved of by the Municipal Commissioner for the City of Bombay.

The tramways referred to, and now authorized for immediate construction, are—

From a point near the Grant Buildings, Colaba, to the Money School, A DOUBLE TRACK.

PROVIDED that this tramway will not be carried across the Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railway, or any sidings which it may now be contemplated to construct from the Cotton Green to the Apollo Bay Reclamation, without the express permission of Government.

From a point of junction with the above tramway near the junction of Church-gate Street and Rampart Row to a point near the Crawford Market, A DOUBLE TRACK.

From the Money School to a point near Pydhoni Well, along the Kalbadevi Road and the Coppersmiths' Bazar, Mombadevi, A SINGLE TRACK.

From the Crawford Market along Sayad Abdul Rahman Street to a point of junction with the foregoing tramway near the Pydhoni Well, A SINGLE TRACK : Provided, however, that, in case after the expiration of one year from the date when this track shall have been constructed, it shall be considered by Government to be necessary or expedient that the same shall be removed, the grantees shall, immediately after they shall have received an order from Government in that behalf, at their

own expense remove the said track, and all their plant and materials, from the said street, and restore and make good the road and pavement, and remove all rubbish occasioned by the said track or the removal thereof, and the said grantees shall not be entitled to or claim any compensation in respect of such removal.

And also the following when approved by the Municipal Commissioner :—

From the said point near Pydhoni Well along the Parel Road to a point near the Byculla Railway station.

2. The said tramway shall be constructed and maintained in such form and manner, and upon such gradient and with such gauge, as the Municipal Commissioner may approve; and the cars and carriages intended to run on the said rails shall be such as are approved of by the said Commissioner.

3. The cars and carriages of the grantees or their assigns on the tracks of the said tramway shall, unless with the consent of the said Commissioner, be worked with horse-power, or other animal-power, only; and the said Commissioner shall have power at all times to make such regulations as to the rate of speed and mode of use of the said tracks as the convenience and safety of the public using the streets may require.

4. The said grantees or their assigns shall have power, from time to time, to fix the rates of fares for carrying persons and goods in the cars or carriages to be run on the said tramways, provided that the rates of fares, on at least one-half of the cars or carriages available for passengers which daily run on the said tracks, shall for any distance not over three miles not exceed three annas, and be for any greater distance in the same proportion.

5. The said grantees or their assigns may, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining such tramways, under such superintendence as is hereinafter specified, open and break up the soil and pavement of the several streets and bridges in the town and island of Bombay, and thereon lay sleepers and rails, and from time to time repair, alter or remove the same; and may, for the purposes aforesaid, remove and use all earth and materials in such streets and bridges; and the said grantees and their assigns may, in and on such streets and bridges, do all other acts which they shall from time to time deem necessary for constructing and maintaining street-tramways in the said town and island of Bombay, doing as little damage as may be in the execution of the powers hereby granted, and making compensation for any damage which may be done in the execution of such powers.

6. Before the said grantees or their assigns proceed to open or break up any street or bridge other than those referred to in clause 1, they shall obtain the approval in writing of the said Commissioner to the tracks of the said tramway being laid down on the said street or bridge; and shall give to the said Commissioner, or the executive engineer or other municipal officer, notice in writing of their intention to open or break up the

same, not less than three clear days before beginning such work, except in cases of emergency arising from defects in any of the rails or other work and then so soon as is possible after the beginning of the work or the necessity for the same shall have arisen.

7. No such street or bridge shall, except in the cases of emergency aforesaid, be opened or broken up except under the superintendence of the said Commissioner or of his officer, and according to such plans as shall be approved of by him or them : Provided always that, if the said Commissioner or his officer fail to attend at the time fixed for the opening of any such street or bridge after having had such notice of the said grantees or their assigns' intention as aforesaid, or shall not propose any plan for breaking up or opening the same, or shall refuse or neglect to superintend the operation, the said grantees or their assigns may perform the work specified in such notice without the superintendence of such officer.

8. When the said grantees or their assigns open or break up the road or pavement of any street or bridge, they shall, with all convenient speed, complete the work for which the same shall be broken up, and fill in the ground and make good the road or pavement so opened or broken up, and carry away the rubbish occasioned thereby, and deposit the same for the use of the Commissioner at such place as the executive engineer of the said municipality shall direct ; and shall, at all times whilst any such road or pavement shall be so opened or broken up, cause the same to be guarded, and shall cause a light, sufficient for the warning of passengers, to be set up and maintained against or near such road or pavement where the same shall be open or broken up every night during which the same shall be continued open or broken up.

9. If the said grantees or their assigns open or break up any street or bridge without giving such notice as hereinbefore mentioned, or in a manner different from that which shall have been approved of or determined as aforesaid, except in the cases in which the said grantees or their assigns are hereby authorized to perform such work without any superintendence or notice ; or if the said grantees or their assigns shall make any unnecessary delay in completing any such work, or in filling in the ground, or reinstating and making good, so far as is consistent with the existence of the said tramway, the road or pavement so opened or broken up, or in carrying away the rubbish occasioned thereby ; or if they neglect to cause the place where such road or pavement has been broken up to be guarded and lighted—they shall forfeit to the said Justices a sum not exceeding fifty rupees for every such offence, and they shall forfeit an additional sum not exceeding fifty rupees for each day during which any such delay or neglect as aforesaid shall continue after they shall have received notice thereof.

10. The said grantees or their assigns shall maintain and keep in repair such portion of the streets and bridges in the town and island of Bombay as shall be occupied by their tracks, including therein not only the space between the tracks, but eighteen inches on either side thereof,

and in consideration of such maintenance of streets and bridges, and of the yearly rent hereinafter mentioned to be paid by the grantees, the horses and carriages and other vehicles of the said grantees shall be exempt from municipal taxation.

11. If any unnecessary delay or omission shall take place by the said grantees or their assigns in complying with any order which may be made on them by Government for the removal of the said track proposed to be constructed along Sayad Abdul Rahman Street as hereinbefore mentioned, or otherwise in acting in accordance with the proviso hereinbefore contained regarding that track, or in the performance of any of the works specified in clause 8 of these presents, or in filling in the ground, or reinstating and making good the road or pavement so opened or broken up, or in carrying away the rubbish occasioned thereby; or if they neglect to cause the place, where such road or pavement has been broken up, to be guarded and lighted, or neglect to maintain and keep in repair the portion of the roads or bridges which shall be occupied by their tracks—the said Commissioner may cause the work so delayed or omitted to be executed, and the expense of executing the same shall be repaid to him by the said grantees or their assigns, and the certificate in writing of the Commissioner as to the expense so incurred shall be conclusive, and the said grantees shall not be at liberty to dispute the same.

12. The said grantees or their assigns shall be liable for any loss or injuries that any person may sustain by reason of any defect or want of repair in any of the plant or other property of the said grantees, or of any carelessness, neglect or misconduct of their agents or servants in the management, construction, or use of the said tracks or tramways; and, in case any recovery shall be had against the said Commissioner or the said Justices by reason of such defect, or other matter aforesaid, the said grantees or their assigns shall be liable to pay to the said Commissioner or the said Justices, as the case may be, any sums thus recovered against him or them, together with all costs and reasonable expenditure incurred by the said Commissioner or the said Justices in the defence of any such suit or suits in which such recovery shall be had.

13. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed to prevent the said Commissioner from taking up any of the public streets or roads traversed by the said tramway for the purposes for which he may now lawfully take up the same.

14. If at any time after the opening of any tramway for traffic the grantees shall discontinue the working of such tramway, or any part thereof, for the space of six calendar months (such discontinuance not being occasioned by circumstances beyond the control of the grantees), it shall be lawful for the Commissioner, without any previous notice to the grantees, to remove the tramway, or part of the tramway, so discontinued, and the grantees shall pay to the Commissioner the cost of such removal and of the making good of the street; and the certificate of the Commissioner as to such cost shall be conclusive.

15. The provisions of this agreement shall remain and be in force for a term not less than twenty-one years from the date thereof. The corporation shall have the right of purchasing the said tramways, with the plant, stores, rolling-stock, and everything connected therewith, after the expiration of the said twenty-one years, upon declaring its intention so to do within six months after the expiration of the said twenty-one years, and shall have a renewed right of purchase at the end of every seven years after the expiration of the said twenty-one years upon similar notice being given; the amount to be paid in the event of such purchase shall be actual *bona fide* value, exclusive of any compensation for good-will, premium, compulsory sale or other consideration whatsoever, of the tramways, and of the work and materials connected therewith, and of the lands and buildings and all other property of the grantees, such value, in case the parties do not agree, to be decided by arbitration as hereinafter provided; and for the good-will, premium, compulsory sale, and other consideration of the business of the grantees, an amount equal to twenty-one years' purchase, calculated on the average profits of the previous three years, four per cent. per annum on the above value as paid being first deducted from such profits.

16. The provisions hereinbefore contained shall, so far as applicable, apply to all tramways to be constructed by the said grantees or their assigns by any route or routes to be hereafter fixed by the Commissioner or under clause 1 of these presents, and to the works connected with, or incidental to, such tramways, it being agreed that, in the event of the municipality failing to declare its intention, as above provided, to purchase the property of the said grantees, the terms of this contract shall continue in force.

17. The said grantees or their assigns will, if required by the said Commissioner, before opening and breaking up the soil and pavement of any street or bridge under clause 5 of these presents, deposit with the Bank of Bombay, in the name of the said Commissioner, the sum of rupees 5,000 or, in their option, promissory notes of the Government of India of the nominal value of rupees 5,000, and the same will remain so deposited until the completion by the said grantees or their assigns of the abovementioned lines of tramway herein sanctioned for immediate construction. All interest accruing on the said sum or the said notes shall be credited to the said grantees or their assigns, and, subject as next herein-after mentioned, be paid to them as the same accrues due. The said Commissioner shall be entitled to deduct all fines recovered by him out of the sum so deposited, or the interest accruing on the said sum or notes, or out of the proceeds of sale of a portion of the said notes on completion of the said tramways as specified in clause 1 of this agreement.

18. In consideration of the concession herein granted, the said grantees undertake, on behalf of themselves and their assigns, that they will pay to the Municipal Corporation of Bombay a yearly rent of Rs. 3,000 per mile of double track and Rs. 2,000 per mile of single track, payable half-yearly; the date on which such rent on each line of tramways shall begin to accrue shall be the date on which such line of tramways is opened for public traffic.

19. It is agreed that no sidings, turn-outs or tracks necessary to connect the traffic-lines with the stables, carriage-sheds, factories or other property or properties of the grantees shall be included in the mileage on which rent is to be paid; such sidings, turn-outs and necessary connecting tracks being free of rent.

20. The sleepers, rails, materials, implements and other erections placed and erected by the said grantees on the streets or roads under the powers hereby granted shall be and remain the property of the said grantees, and the said grantees shall have the exclusive use of their tramway or tramways for carriages with flanged wheels, or other wheels suitable only to run on the prescribed rail.

21. The grantees shall have the exclusive right of laying and using tramways within the limits of the Bombay Municipality on the terms herein stated; but, in the event of the grantees refusing to lay down any line which the Municipal Commissioner may consider necessary, he shall be at liberty to grant the right of laying and using such line to any other party.

22. Unless the said grantees shall have commenced the work of laying down the said tramways within twelve months from the date of the execution of these presents, the Municipal Commissioner shall be at liberty to cease and determine this contract, and to enter into arrangements with any other person or persons for the construction of tramways, it being agreed, however, that these presents are subject to the sanction of Government, and that, in the event of their being executed prior to such sanction being given, the said twelve months shall date from the day on which notice of such sanction is given to the said grantees: Provided also that any delay in commencing the work beyond twelve months shall not have been due to any cause beyond the control of the grantees.

23. If any doubt, difference or dispute shall arise between the grantees, their heirs, executors or administrators, and the said Justices or their successors touching the construction of these presents or anything herein contained or touching or concerning any other matter or thing relating to these presents, then, and in every such case, such doubt, difference or dispute shall be referred to the arbitration of three indifferent persons, one to be from time to time chosen by the said grantees, and another by the said Justices, within one calendar month after either of them shall have made to the other a requisition to that effect, and the third to be named by the two persons from time to time first chosen; and the decision of such arbitrators if they agree, or of such umpire if they disagree, shall be final; and in case either party shall neglect or refuse to appoint an arbitrator within the specified time, the arbitrator appointed by the other party shall make a final decision alone.

IN WITNESS whereof the said Municipal Commissioner, for and on behalf of the said Justices, has hereunto set his name and caused the seal of the said Justices to be affixed hereunto, and the said WILLIAM FRENCH STEARNS and GEORGE ALVAH KITTREDGE have hereunto set their hands and seal the day and year hereinbefore written.

GAUGE.—To be 4 feet $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

CARRIAGE.—Similar to those in use in England and America, to be furnished with a break which can be worked at both ends of the carriage, capable of stopping the carriage within its own length.

Nazir of District Court to be keeper of civil jail and to have establishment under him.

10. The nazir of the District Court or of the chief Civil Court at the place where the civil jail is located shall be *ex-officio* keeper of the civil jail, and shall be responsible for the safe custody of the prisoners and for the preservation of cleanliness and good order in the jail and among the prisoners, and shall have such establishment under him as the District Judge, with the sanction of the ¹[Provincial Government], may direct.

Judge to visit civil jail.

11. The Judge or the Assistant Judge of the district in which a civil jail is situated shall visit such civil jail at least once in each month, and shall issue in writing such orders connected with the economy of the jail, the good management, health and accommodation of the prisoners, as he may think fit.

He shall record the date of his visit, and any remarks he may have to make, in a book to be kept for the purpose.

Medical officer to attend jail.

12. A medical officer to be appointed by the ¹[Provincial Government] shall attend the civil jail, and shall be bound to offer such advice to the District Judge, or other officer in charge of the civil jail, as may seem expedient to him with regard to the sanitary state of the jail and of the prisoners.

Remedies administered at expense of Provincial Government.

He shall also administer remedies at the expense of the ²[Provincial Government] to the sick: Provided that nothing contained in this section shall prevent a prisoner in a civil jail from employing at his own expense any medical man he may think fit to consult.

Strangers may be admitted to civil jail.

13. The civil jail shall be opened daily for the admission of those wishing to visit prisoners from 9 a.m. till 3 p.m., and no stranger shall be allowed to remain in the civil jail beyond the above-mentioned hours except by permission of the Judge, the Assistant Judge of the district, or on the recommendation of the medical officer by the permission of the nazir in charge of the jail.

Subsistence of prisoners in civil jails.

14. (1) Prisoners in the civil jail may either make their own arrangements for their subsistence, or may, within the amount of subsistence-money or batta furnished by the party at whose suit they are detained, require the nazir to furnish their food and other necessaries out of the subsistence-money fixed for them by the Court by which they are committed: Provided that excess in the use of intoxicating liquors or drugs be strictly prohibited. A tariff of prices approved by the District Judge on the first day of each month shall be kept in each civil jail and shall be accessible to all the prisoners.

(2) Every civil prisoner unable to provide himself with sufficient clothing and bedding shall be supplied by the nazir with such clothing and

bedding as may be ordered by the Judge or Assistant Judge under the provisions of section 11 of this Act.

When any such prisoner has been committed to prison in execution of a decree in favour of a private person, such person, or his representative, shall be liable to pay to the nazir on demand in writing the cost of the clothing and bedding so supplied to the prisoner; and in default of such payment the prisoner shall be released.

15. Whenever a prisoner shall die in the civil jail, the nazir shall immediately report such death to the nearest Magistrate, who shall thereupon inquire into the cause of such death, and make a written report thereon to the Inspector-General of Prisons, and the corpse of such prisoner shall, after the medical officer appointed under section 12 * *¹ has certified to his death, be made over to his relatives or friends² [if any, be present and willing to take charge of it].

³[If no relatives or friend of a prisoner who has died in prison is present and willing to receive and dispose of his corpse, it shall be buried, burnt or otherwise disposed of.]

⁴[16. If, at the time of a prisoner's death or release, any of the subsistence-money furnished by the party at whose suit such prisoner was detained remains unexpended, notice shall be forthwith given to the party paying the same, and the balance so remaining unexpended shall be returned to such party or his representatives: Provided that he or they claim payment thereof within three months from the date of such notice; failing which such balance shall become the property of⁵ [the Crown for the purposes of the Province].

An Act to amend the Law relating to Hereditary Offices.

WHEREAS it is expedient to declare and amend the law relating to Preamble.
 Hereditary Offices ; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

PART I.**PRELIMINARY.**

1. This Act may be called the Bombay Hereditary Offices Act. Short title.

It extends to the Regulation Districts and to all villages therein,
 whether alienated or otherwise, so far as its provisions shall not conflict
 with the terms, on which any such alienated village may have been
 secured to the holder thereof.

Nothing in this Act shall affect the powers of ¹[the Provincial Government] to deal with any watan or parts of watans, or with the profits thereof respectively under ²Act No. XI of 1852, or Bombay Acts Nos. II and VII of 1863, or any other law at present in force with respect thereto.

2. [Repeal of enactments.] *Rep. Act XII of 1876.*

Application of parts VI, VII, VIII and IX.

3. Parts VI, VII, VIII and IX ³* * * shall not apply to hereditary offices of lower degree than Patel or Kulkarni, nor to watans appertaining to such offices.

Interpretation clause.

4. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context—

“Watan property” means the moveable or immoveable property held, acquired, or assigned for providing remuneration for the performance of the duty appertaining to an hereditary office. It includes a right to levy customary fees or perquisites, in money or in kind, whether at fixed times or otherwise.

It includes cash payments in addition to the original watan property made voluntarily by ¹[the Provincial Government] and subject periodically to modification or withdrawal.

“Hereditary Office” means every office held hereditarily for the performance of duties connected with the administration or collection of the public revenue, or with the village police, or with the settlement of boundaries, or other matters of civil administration. The expression includes such office even where the services originally appertaining to it have ceased to be demanded.

The watan property, if any, and the hereditary office and the rights and privileges attached to them together constitute the watan.

“Watandar” means a person having an hereditary interest in a watan. It includes a person holding watan property acquired by him before the introduction of the British Government into the locality of the watan, or legally acquired subsequent to such introduction, and a person holding such property from him by inheritance. It includes a person adopted by an owner of a watan or part of a watan, subject to the conditions specified in sections 33 to 35 ³* * * .

“Family” includes each of the branches of the family descended from an original watandar : Provided that no sub-division shall be recognized except as hereinafter provided in section 26.

“Head of a family” includes the chief representative of each branch of a family.

“Representative watandar” means a watandar registered by the Collector under section 25¹ * * * as having a right to perform the duties of an hereditary office.

“Officiator” means the person actually performing the duties of an hereditary office for the time being, whether he be a representative watandar or a deputy or a substitute appointed under any of the provisions² [of this Act].

“Guardian” means a relation or other person to whom the care, nurture, or custody of any child falls by natural right or recognized usage, or who has accepted or assumed directly the care, nurture, or custody of any child, or in case of dispute the holder of a certificate of guardianship from a competent court.

PART II.

WATAN PROPERTY AND PROFITS THEREOF.

³[5. (1) Without the sanction of ⁴[the Provincial Government], ⁵[or, Prohibition of alienation of watan and watan rights.] in the case of a mortgage, charge, alienation or lease of not more than thirty years, of the Commissioner] it shall not be competent—

(a) to a watandar to mortgage, charge, alienate or lease, for a period beyond the term of his natural life, any watan, or any part thereof, or any interest therein, to or for the benefit of any person who is not a watandar of the same watan;

(b) to a representative watandar to mortgage, charge, lease or alienate any right with which he is invested, as such, under this Act.

(2) In the case of any watan in respect of which a service commutation settlement has been effected, either under section 15 or before that section came into force, clause (a) of this section shall apply to such watan, unless the right of alienating the watan without the sanction of ⁴[the Provincial Government] is conferred upon the watandars by the terms of such settlement or has been acquired by them under the said terms.]

Collector may institute legal proceedings for the protection of a watan.

6. (1) In any case in which it shall appear to the Collector that the institution of legal proceedings is requisite or desirable with respect to any watan, or the estate, property, funds, or affairs thereof, the Collector shall certify such case in writing under his hand to the ¹* * * Commissioner, together with such statements and particulars as in his opinion may be requisite or proper for the explanation of such case, and thereupon the said ¹* * * Commissioner, if upon consideration of the circumstances he thinks fit, shall authorize the Collector to institute and prosecute in the name of the Collector such legal proceedings as may appear requisite or proper for the protection of the watan, its estates, property, funds, or affairs, by suit or petition in any Civil Court having jurisdiction in the matter. The cost of such proceedings, unless recovered from the opposite party, shall be paid out of the funds of the watan.

Collector may proceed under sections 8 to 11, or 13.

(2) The Collector may, if he thinks fit, proceed as provided in sections 8, 9, 10, 11 or 13 ²* * * in lieu of instituting or prosecuting legal proceedings under this section.

Watan assigned as remuneration not alienable without sanction.

7. Watan property assigned under section 23 ²* * * as remuneration of an officiator, and the profits of watan property so assigned, shall not be alienated or assigned to any person whatever without the sanction of ³[the Provincial Government].

Watan property passed into possession of person other than officiator liable to contribution for remuneration of officiator.

8. Whenever any watan, or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, whether assigned as remuneration of an officiator or not, has or have before the date of this Act coming into force passed by virtue of, or in execution of, a decree or order of any British Court into the ownership or beneficial possession of any person other than the officiator for the time being, or has or have before such date passed otherwise than by virtue of, or in execution of, a decree or order of any British Court into the ownership or beneficial possession of a watandar other than such officiator; or

when any watan, or part or profits thereof, not being assigned as remuneration of an officiator has, after the date of this Act coming into force, passed by virtue of, or in execution of, a decree or order of any British Court or otherwise, into the ownership or beneficial possession of a watandar other than such officiator;

such watan, or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, shall be liable under the orders of the Collector to contribution for the remuneration of such officiator in like manner and to the like extent as if no such decree had been passed or no such transfer had taken place.

9. (1) Whenever any watan or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, whether assigned as remuneration of an officiator or not, has or have, before the date of this Act coming into force, passed otherwise than by virtue of, or in execution of, a decree or order of any British Court, and without the consent of the Collector and transfer of ownership in the Revenue records, into the ownership or beneficial possession of any person not a watandar of the same watan, the Collector may, after recording his reasons in writing, declare such alienation to be null and void, and order that such watan, or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, shall from the date of such order belong to the watandar previously entitled thereto, and may recover and pay to such watandar any profits thereof accordingly.

Collector may declare alienation of watan property to be under certain circumstances null and void.

(2) If such part of a watan be land, it shall be lawful for the Collector, instead of transferring the possession of the land, to demand and recover the full rent ordinarily paid by tenants of land of similar description in the same locality, and the amount so recovered shall be considered as the profits. The decision of the Collector as to what is the full rent shall be final.

Collector may in the case of land recover full rent.

10. When it shall appear to the Collector that by virtue of, or in execution of, a decree or order of any British Court any watan, or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, recorded as such in the Revenue records or registered under this Act, and assigned under section 23¹ * * * as remuneration of an officiator, has or have, after the date² [of this Act] coming into force, passed or may pass without the sanction of³ [the Provincial Government] into the ownership or beneficial possession of any person other than the officiator for the time being; or that any such watan, or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, not so assigned has or have so passed⁴ [or may pass] into the ownership or beneficial possession of any person not a watandar of the same watan, the Court shall, on receipt of a certificate under the hand and seal of the Collector, stating that the property to which the decree or order relates is a watan or part of a watan, or that such property constitutes the profits or part of the profits of a watan, or is assigned as the remuneration of an officiator, and is therefore inalienable, remove any attachment or other process then pending against the said watan, or any part thereof, or any of the profits thereof, and set aside any sale or order of sale or transfer thereof, and shall cancel the decree or order complained of so far as it concerns the said watan, or any part thereof or any of the profits thereof.

Civil Court on receipt of Collector's certificate, to remove attachment on watan property assigned as remuneration of officiator.

Collector shall declare null and void alienation of watan property made after passing of Act.

11. When any alienation of the nature described in section 10 ^{1*} * * shall take place otherwise than by virtue of, or in execution of a decree or order of any British Court, the Collector shall, after recording his reasons in writing, declare such alienation to be null and void, ² * * * * *

Resumption of property to which an order made under section 10 or section 11 applies.

³[11A. The Collector shall either summarily resume possession of all property to which an order of a Court passed on receipt of his certificate under section 10, or his own declaration under section 11, relates, or assess it at the rate prescribed in clause 2 of section 9, as he may think fit, and the said property shall thenceforward revert to the watan.]

Powers of Collector to carry out provisions of sections 8, 9 and 11.

12. It shall be lawful for the Collector whenever it may be necessary, in carrying out the provisions of sections 8, 9 and 11 ^{1*} * *

(a) to summarily evict any person wrongfully in possession of any land, or

(b) to levy any rent due by any person in the manner that may be prescribed in any law for the time being in force for the levy of a revenue demand.

Watan assigned as remuneration not liable to process of Court.

13. Watan property assigned as remuneration of an officiator under section 23 ^{1*} * * and the profits of such watan property are not liable to process of any Civil Court.

On receipt of a certificate under the hand and seal of a Collector to the effect that certain property designated therein is watan property so assigned, the Court shall remove any attachment or other process placed on, or set aside any sale of, or affecting, such property or the profits thereof.

Combination of hereditary offices.

14. (1) It shall be lawful for a Collector for reasons to be stated in writing, to combine two or more watans held for the performance of similar services in the same village or parts of the same village.

(2) [*Validation of prior combinations.*] *Rep. Act XVI of 1895.*

PART III.

COMMUTATION OF WATANS.

15. (1) The Collector may, with the consent of the holder of a watan, given in writing, relieve him and his heirs and successors in perpetuity of their liability to perform service upon such conditions, whether consistent with the provisions of this Act or not, as may be agreed upon by the Collector and such holder. Commutation of service.

(2) [*Validation of prior settlements.*] *Rep. Act. XVI of 1895.*

(3) Every settlement made or confirmed under this section shall be binding upon both ¹[the Provincial Government] and the holder of the watan and his heirs and successors. Settlement on whom to be binding.

(4) The word "holder" for the purposes of this section includes any sole owner or the whole number of joint owners or any person dealt with as representative of the persons beneficially interested or entered as such in the Government records at the time of the settlement. Who is a "holder".

16. Nothing in the last preceding section shall be held to affect any rights of individuals or village communities to exact such service as may be customary from village servants whose watans were originally granted or are now held for the performance of such service, but who have been relieved by ¹[the Provincial Government] of liability to perform such service to the State. Rights of individuals to exact customary service from village servants not affected.

17. When all or any of the property of a watan consists of payments of whatever description, whether in money or kind, made by Jaghirdars, Inamdars, Mehwassis Chiefs, or others owning or occupying immoveable property wholly or partially free from assessment, the Collector may from time to time determine the amount of such payments recoverable; provided that no larger demand shall be made than one equivalent to the amount that would be payable under the scale in force for the time being in the case of Government villages. Assessment of amount of payments in alienated villages.

18. When all or any of the property of a village watan of lower degree than that of Patel or Kulkarni consists of a right to levy in money or kind directly from individuals, it shall be lawful for the Collector, on the application of any person interested, to cause the nature and extent of such right and of the duties to be performed, and the persons, families, or classes liable to make payment and to perform the duties, to be defined in writing by a panchayat of five persons, whereof two shall be appointed by the villagers, two by the watandars, and one, who shall be sar-panch by the Collector. The decision shall be in accordance with the opinion of the majority of the panchayat, provided that in case the villagers or the watandars fail to nominate members within seven days, the Collector Appointment of Panchayat to define rights and duties of certain classes of watandars.

shall appoint such members as may be required to constitute a panchayat of five :

Provided also that, in case the panchayat do not come to a decision within seven days from the appointment of the sar-panch, the Collector may himself pass a decision.

The decision of the panchayat or of the Collector, as above provided, shall be final and binding on all persons or classes whose rights, duties or liabilities have been submitted to such decision.

Mode of fixing amount payable when profits of a watan fluctuate.

19. Whenever, on failure of the panchayat to come to a decision, the Collector, acting under the last preceding section, passes a decision, and it appears that the profits of the watan or part thereof are of fluctuating amount, or are payable in kind, it shall be lawful for the Collector to determine the amount payable and to decide whether the payment shall be made in kind or money.

Validity of settlements made prior to passing of Act.

20. Any settlement of the nature described in sections 17, 18 or 19 * * * made before the date of this Act coming into force, by a Collector or other officer duly authorised by ²[the Provincial Government], shall have the same force as if made under this Act.

Settlements for such period as Provincial Government may direct.

21. Settlements of the nature described in sections 17, 18 and 19 * * * made after this Act comes into force, shall be made for such periods as the ³[Provincial Government] may from time to time direct.

PART IV.

CREATION AND LAPSE OF WATANS.

Creation of new watans.

22. When no watan exists, it shall be lawful for ²[the Provincial Government] to create one, and in so doing to assign, subject to such sanction as may be required by any law, * * * * * for the time being in force, such ⁵[property vested in the Crown for the purposes of the Province] as to ²[the Provincial Government] may seem fit.

Such watan shall be subject to all the provisions of this Act, and the watandars shall exercise the powers and perform the duties conferred and imposed by this Act or any other law for the time being in force.

When a watan, or part of a watan, has lapsed or has been confiscated or otherwise lawfully resumed by ¹[the Provincial Government], or when the right of any particular family to hold a watan does not exist or is not established, it shall be lawful for ¹[the Provincial Government], subject to the sanction mentioned in the first clause of this section, to assign such watan, or part of a watan, to such person or persons as to ¹[the Provincial Government] may seem fit.

PART V.

REMUNERATION OF OFFICIATORS.

23. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of any other law for the time being in force regarding Service Inams, Cash allowances and Pensions, it shall be the duty of the Collector to fix the annual emoluments of officers appointed under the provisions of this Act, and to direct the payment thereof to the officers for the time being. Collector to fix emoluments of officers.

It shall be lawful for the Collector for this purpose to assign watan property, or the profits thereof, towards the emoluments of officers. The existing assignments shall, until altered by competent authority, be taken to have been made under this section. With the sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government] the Collector may, as occasion arises, alter the assignment and may increase or diminish it in value, such increase or diminution being made rateably among the holders in proportion to the profit derived by such holders respectively from the watan. Collector may assign watan property for the purpose.

PART VI.

REPRESENTATIVE WATANDARS.

24. The duties appertaining to any hereditary office shall be performed by the representative watandars or by deputies or substitutes as hereinafter provided, and by no other persons. Duties of office to be performed by representative watandars.

25. It shall be the duty of the Collector to determine, as hereinafter provided, the custom of the watan as to service and what persons shall be recognized as representative watandars for the purpose of this Act, and to register their names. Determination and registration of representative watandars.

26. In determining what heads of families shall be recognized as representative watandars and what is the custom of the watan as to service, the Collector shall inquire into and take into consideration the practice heretofore observed from the earliest period for which there are records or other evidence available: provided that he shall not be bound to recognize appointments or sub-divisions which have been made subsequently to the introduction of ³Act No. XI of 1843, and which he considers to be contrary to the custom of the watan. Previous practice to be considered in determining who are representative watandars.

Registration of head of family as sole representative watandar.

Registration of heads of families as representative watandars.

Registration of head of eldest family as sole representative watandar.

(1) Where the practice of service in successive periods appears to have existed, but is not proved to the satisfaction of the Collector to have existed at the date of the introduction of ²Act No. XI of 1843, or when the practice of selection by the Collector from several families prevails, he shall determine who is the head of the eldest family descended from the original watandar and shall register his name as sole representative watandar.

Registration of heads of separate families as representative watandars.

(2) In cases where such several families are not descended from a common ancestor, the Collector shall register as representative watandars the heads of such families, and establish the practice of service in successive periods.

Registration as representative watandar of head of each family in amalgamated watan.

³⁰. When the practice of service in successive periods has been introduced under the British rule, in consequence of the reduction in the number of ⁴[officiators] or the amalgamation of watans by ⁵[the Provincial Government], the head of each family that formerly officiated shall be separately entered as a representative watandar.

Procedure if heads of families agree as to who are representative watandars.

³¹. But if in any case described in section 29 ⁶* * * the heads of families at any time before the completion of the register prescribed by this Act agree unanimously in writing, or have in writing agreed during the inquiry made in the preparation of the existing registers, as to who are the representative watandars, and as to the order of service, then the register prescribed in this Act shall be prepared in accordance with such agreement.

32. When watan property or profits have been voluntarily relinquished without abandonment of right of service, such right of service shall be dealt with as if the watandars were still in receipt of such emoluments.

Right of service to remain after relinquishment of watan property.

133. In any case in which, before the coming of this Act into force, any registered representative watandar or his widow shall have adopted an heir, notice of the same shall, within twelve months from the coming into force of this Act, be given by or on behalf of such adopted heir to the Collector, who shall register the name of such heir accordingly. But if such adoption shall be shown to have been or shall subsequently be set aside by decree of a competent Court, the Collector shall remove such name from the register.

Notice of adoption if heir has been adopted prior to passing of Act.

134. In any case in which, after the coming of this Act into force, any registered representative watandar or his widow shall adopt an heir, report of such adoption shall within three months be made to the Collector by such watandar or by his widow, or in case of their death then by such adopted heir, or by the guardian of the latter, and the Collector shall register the name of such heir accordingly. But if such adoption shall subsequently be set aside by decree of a competent Court, the Collector shall remove such name from the register.

Notice of adoption when heir is adopted after passing of Act.

35. In any case in which ²[notice or] report of such adoption shall not be made as herein directed, the Collector shall not recognize the same without the production of a certificate of heirship, or of a final decree of a competent Court establishing the validity of such adoption.

Procedure if notice of adoption is not duly given.

³136. When any representative watandar dies it shall be the duty of the patel and village accountant to report the fact to the Collector; and the Collector shall, if satisfied of the truth of the report, and subject to the provisions of section 2 of Bombay Act V of 1886, register the name of the person appearing to be the nearest heir of such watandar as representative watandar in place of the watandar so deceased.

Death of representative watandar to be reported; name of heir to be registered.

Provided that—

(1) in determining who is the nearest heir for the purposes of this section the rule of lineal primogeniture shall be presumed to prevail in the watan family;

(2) in any case where the deceased watandar was not a sole representative watandar, if his nearest heir is not a member of the branch of the family to which the deceased watandar belonged but is another representative watandar of the same watan or is a member of the branch of another

representative watandar of the same watan, the share entered in the register against the name of the deceased watandar shall—

(a) if there is only one remaining representative watandar of the same watan who is descended from the same original watandar as the deceased, pass to that remaining representative watandar,

(b) if there are more than one such remaining representative watandars, be divided among such remaining representative watandars in proportion to their shares

and the register shall be corrected accordingly ;

(3) ¹[if any person shall by production of a decree] of a competent Court, satisfy the Collector that he is entitled to have his name registered as the nearest heir of such deceased watandar in preference to the person whose name the Collector has ordered to be registered, ²[at any time within six years of such order, the Collector shall] subject to the foregoing provisoes, cause the entry in the register to be amended accordingly.]

Guardian of minor watandar to perform duties of minor.

³37. When any head of a family or representative watandar is under the age of eighteen years his guardian may subject to the provisions of section 51 ⁴* * * exercise all powers and perform all duties conferred and imposed by this Act.

PART VII.

PERIODS OF SERVICE.

Representative watandars to serve for life or for fixed periods of five or ten years.

139. In the event of the officiating watandar dying before the expiration of his fixed period of service, his heir shall, subject to the provisions of Part VIII * * * be entitled to officiate for the remainder of that period.

Procedure on death of officiator.

140. (1) In the case of a watan in which the representative watandars are entitled to perform the duties in successive periods, the Collector shall, on the occurrence of the turn of any such representative watandar to perform the duties, issue a notice to the whole body of registered representative watandars calling upon them to appear before him at a certain time and place to elect an officiator, or such number of officiators as may be required by the Collector under the provisions of section 43

Election of officiator in rotation watan.

(2) If not less than three-fourths, including the watandar whose turn it is to officiate, of the representative watandars appear at the appointed time and place and unanimously nominate a fit and proper person or persons, being a watandar or watandars of the same watan, the person or persons so nominated shall be entitled to officiate in the place and for the period of service of the representative watandar whose turn it is to perform the duties.

(3) If the person or persons so nominated be other than the representative watandar whose turn it is to perform the duties, he or they shall for all the purposes of this Act be deemed to be the duly appointed deputy or deputies of the said representative watandar.

141. If in the case of a watan in which the representative watandars are entitled to perform the duties in successive periods, the representative watandars shall not appear at the time and place appointed under the provisions of the last preceding section, or shall fail to nominate an officiator, or the requisite number of officiators, unanimously, then the provisions of this Act as to service by the representative watandar entitled to officiate and as to appointment of deputies shall apply.

Mode of appointment if representative watandars fail to nominate officiator.

PART VIII.

OFFICIATING WATANDARS AND DEPUTIES.

142. Every representative watandar whose duty it is to officiate shall, if a fit and proper person, perform the duties of the hereditary office himself on being so required by the Collector, but may be permitted by the Collector to appoint a deputy.

Representative watandar to perform duties of office.

143. The Collector shall determine the number of officiators required for the proper performance of the duties of any office from time to time, and for this requirement may call upon the representative watandar aforesaid to appoint a sufficient number of fit and proper persons as deputies, or may direct service in successive periods by representative watandars who have hitherto served or are serving contemporaneously.

Collector to determine number of officiators required.

Collector when to refuse service of representative watandar or of deputy nominated by him.

1[245. The Collector shall refuse to accept the service of any representative watandar or of any person nominated by a representative watandar to be his deputy, if such representative watandar or person—

(a) is under eighteen years of age ;

(b) has not passed such educational test, if any, as ²[the Provincial Government] think fit from time to time to prescribe in this behalf ;

(c) has attained sixty years of age, except when such person's appointment or continuance in office is specially permitted by the Collector ;

(d) is in the opinion of the Collector disabled by lunacy or imbecility of mind, or by deafness, blindness, or other permanent infirmity of body ;

(e) has been adjudged by the Collector after a summary inquiry held in accordance with the provisions relating to summary inquiries contained in the ⁴Bombay Land-Revenue Code, 1879, to be of general bad character ;

(g) declines to forsake, whilst officiating, some other employment which is in the opinion of the Collector incompatible with the due discharge of the duties of the office ;

Power to remove officiator or deputy of representative watandar who becomes unfit to officiate.

A deputy appointed by a representative watandar may at any time be removed from office by the Collector at the request of the representative watandar, if, in the opinion of the Collector, there are good grounds for such requests.]

¹[**247.** If a representative watandar whose duty it is to officiate is rejected or removed under section 45 or 46, he may, subject to the provisions of section 49, appoint a deputy :

Procedure when representative watandar is rejected or removed.

Provided that, whenever such representative watandar ceases to be disqualified under section 45, he shall become entitled, if otherwise fit, to serve in person in supersession of any such deputy, or to serve in person or (subject to the provisions of section 42) to appoint a deputy in supersession of any deputy appointed by the Collector.]

Female cannot officiate, but may nominate deputy.

151. No female shall perform in person the duties of any hereditary office; but if a representative watandar, or the guardian of a representative watandar, she may appoint a deputy.

Mamlatdar or Mahalkari to appoint deputy when officiator is suspended.

152. During the suspension of an officiating representative watandar or deputy, and during any vacancy, the duties shall temporarily be performed by a substitute, whether a watandar or not, appointed by the [Mamlatdar or the Mahalkari, as the case may be].

Deputy must ordinarily be a member of the same family as the representative watandar whose duty it is to officiate.

153. Except as is otherwise provided in the last preceding section and in section 56, and, except as the [Provincial Government] shall by a general or special order from time to time otherwise direct, every deputy appointed under this Act shall be a member of the same family to which the representative watandar whose duty it is to officiate belongs, if there be a member of such family fit and willing to officiate [or, in default of such member, a watandar of the same watan who is fit and willing to officiate and who is descended from the same original watandar as the representative watandar whose duty it is to officiate.]

6* * * * *

Term of appointment of deputy.

154. When the Collector appoints a deputy, it shall be for a term not exceeding five years.

When a watandar entitled to officiate appoints a deputy, it shall be for a term not less than five years or for life. The term of appointment of a deputy shall cease and determine on the right of his principal ceasing, or on the death of his principal, and any appointment of a deputy on behalf of a representative watandar under the age of eighteen years shall terminate on the attainment by such representative watandar of that age.

Officiator if absent or ill may appoint a temporary substitute.

155. In the event of temporary absence or illness, an officiator may arrange with any fit person for the temporary conduct of the duties, but shall be liable in the penalties prescribed in sections 57 to 61 * * *.

156. When the hereditary right to perform the duties of an hereditary office as deputies of the original watandar is vested in a family distinct from that of the original watandar, the custom shall be recognized, and the heads of the family entitled to perform the duties shall be registered and treated as representative watandars.

Head of family when to be treated as watandar.

PART IX.

PENALTIES.

157. It shall be lawful for the Collector to suspend any officiator from office during inquiry into alleged misconduct, and to punish any such officiator for misconduct or neglect of duty by suspension from office for a period not exceeding six months, or by fine not exceeding the fourth part of the annual emolument provided for the officiator. The order of the Collector shall be final in such cases, except when the penalty is inflicted on an hereditary district officer.

Punishment of officiators.

158. It shall be lawful for the Collector, with the previous sanction of ²[the Provincial Government], in case of fraud, the wilful framing of incorrect records, habitual neglect of duty, or other grave misconduct on the part of an officiator, to remove him from office ³[or, if he has ceased to officiate, to declare that he is ineligible for re-employment in any hereditary office except with the sanction of ²[the Provincial Government]].

Collector may remove officiator with the sanction of Provincial Government.

160. When any representative watandar or any deputy or substitute appointed by him is convicted by a criminal Court not inferior to a Court of Session of any offence in the discharge of his official duties, or of any of the offences specified in the second schedule or of the abetment of any such offence, and such conviction is not subsequently reversed or quashed, the ⁵[Provincial Government] may, ⁶* * *

Provincial Government may direct the forfeiture of a watan.

(b) if the offence is as is described in Chapter VI of the Indian Penal Code, direct the forfeiture of the whole or of any part of any watan in which he has an interest. Such forfeiture may be either absolute or for such period as the ¹[Provincial Government] thinks fit.]

Forfeiture of life interest of officiator and deputy for misconduct of deputy.

²61. All deputies appointed under this Act shall be subject to the same rules in the performance of the duties of their offices, and to the same penalties, except as otherwise provided, as the representative watandars themselves are subject to when officiating, and in the case specified in section 58 of this Act, it shall be lawful for ³[the Provincial Government] to direct the forfeiture of the life interest in the watan of the representative watandar entitled to officiate, whether the officiator guilty of misconduct be such representative watandar himself or a deputy appointed by him.

PART X.

INFERIOR VILLAGE HEREDITARY OFFICES.

Application of Part X.

Powers granted to Collector.

⁷[64. (1)] The Collector is empowered, subject to the general control of ³[the Provincial Government]—

(a) To register the names of individual watandars as holders of the office, or to register it as held by the whole body of watandars.

(b) To determine, when individual names are so registered, the rights, duties and responsibilities among themselves of the persons so registered, and the mode in which they shall be selected to perform the duties, whether by selection by the Collector or by defined rotation, or by election by the watandars, or otherwise, as may be expedient.

(c) To require, in cases where the registration is made in the name of the whole body of watandars, that they appoint so many fit persons as may be necessary to perform the duties which the Collector may assign to them severally and jointly; such appointment to be made within a reasonable time to be previously fixed and notified to them by the Collector. In default of such appointment being made, the Collector may himself appoint.

(d) To provide for and enforce the joint responsibility of the whole body for the neglect of duty or misconduct of any of their number or their representatives; and in cases where the crime of cattle poisoning is prevalent, with the sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government] to attach, during the pleasure of ¹[the Provincial Government], the watans of the persons whom he may have reason to believe to have been guilty of, or to have connived at, the commission of the crime.

²[(e) To pass orders in regard to the dismissal of persons officiating.]

³[(f) To permit the watandar whose duty it is to officiate, to appoint a deputy for performing the duties of his office.]

PART XI.

THE REGISTER.

Collector
to prepare
and keep
Register.

65. The Collector shall prepare and keep all Registers necessary for the purposes of this Act in the form which ¹[the Provincial Government] may from time to time prescribe. There shall be one Register of lands and allowances in consideration whereof liability to perform service exists and another of lands and allowances in respect of which no such liability exists.

66. In the Register of lands and allowances the holders whereof are exempt from service, the Collector shall specify—

(a) The area of the lands, the survey number and assessment, the quit-rent leviable, and the net revenue alienated by ²[the Crown].

(b) The amount and nature of the cash or other allowances, and the source from which they are payable.

(c) The terms of the settlement under which the exemption is enjoyed.

(d) The names of the parties to such settlement with ²[the Crown] as indicated in the Sanads issued to them.

(e) Such other particulars as ¹[the Provincial Government] may from time to time order to be recorded.

67. In the Register of lands and allowances in consideration whereof liability to serve still exists, the Collector shall specify—

(a) The area of the lands, the names of the occupants, the survey number and assessment, the quit-rent, if any, leviable, and the net revenue alienated by ²[the Crown], the amount and nature of the cash or other allowances, the source from which they are payable, and the land and allowances assigned for the remuneration of officiators.

(b) The names of the heads of families and of the representative watandars.

(c) Whether the service is performed by one representative watandar or otherwise : if by several in successive periods, the order in which they are to succeed each other.

(d) The proportional share of the watan possessed by each head of family which may be expressed in annas or fractions of a rupee.

(e) The number of officiators required to perform the duties.

(f) The nature of the settlement of inferior village watans referred to in Part X ¹* * *

(g) Such other particulars as ²[the Provincial Government] may (from time to time) order to be recorded.

68. The Register kept under this Act shall be corrected or added to on the occasion of any change being made in accordance with the provisions of this Act in the particulars above specified. Register to be corrected.

PART XII.

MISCELLANEOUS.

³69. All watandars of whatever denomination whose liability to serve has not been commuted are legally bound, subject to the provisions of this Act, to render such service as has been customary or as is required by law. Service to be performed by watandars.

All records which have been or may be prepared by any watan- or by any officiator in an hereditary office in pursuance of the duties of the office, or by order of a superior officer or of the present or former Government, are hereby declared to be the ⁵[property of the Crown for the purposes of the Province], and the ⁶[Mamlatdar or the Mahalkari] may enforce their production or the production of any State records in the possession of a watandar or of an officiator, in accordance with the provisions of sections 25 and 26 of the Bombay Land-Revenue Code, 1879.] Watan records the property of the Crown.

71. With regard to hereditary offices not inferior to that of Patel or Kulkarni, it is hereby declared that every head of family shall have the privilege of signing the abstract of village land and revenues or other village papers which it may be customary for him to sign. 72. (1) It shall be lawful for the Collector or other officer conducting an investigation under this Act to take evidence, and in sections 193 and 228 of the Indian Penal Code the words "judicial proceeding" shall be taken to include any proceeding under this Act. XLV o 1860.

(2) Every person who shall have been summoned to give evidence or to produce any document in his possession, by the Collector or other officer conducting an investigation under this Act, shall be legally bound to attend, or to produce such document.

73. (1) Except as hereinafter provided in clause 2 of this section, no order under Part III³ * * * directing commutation of a watan, or under Part V³ * * * assigning the remuneration of officers, or under Part VI³ * * * determining the custom of the watan as to service and what persons should be registered as heads of families or representative watandars, or under Part VII³ * * * determining the periods of service, shall be passed, unless after an investigation recorded in writing and a proper opportunity afforded for the hearing of claims and the production of evidence.

In each such investigation, and in removals from office under section 58³ * * * the Collector or other officer shall record his decision with the reasons therefor in his own handwriting.

(2) Unless the [Provincial Government] shall otherwise direct, decisions passed subsequently to the year 1866 after an investigation recorded in writing, and after a proper opportunity had been afforded for the hearing of claims and the production of evidence, and which are recorded, with the reasons therefor, in the handwriting of a Collector or his Assistant or Deputy, shall be accepted, in so far as they may not be inconsistent with the provisions⁵ [of this Act] in lieu of fresh investigation and decision under this Act for the purpose of framing the register required in section 67⁶ * * *. If any details necessary for the said register have not been recorded in any decision of the nature described above, but are forthcoming from the evidence taken in connection with such decision, they may be supplied from such evidence in lieu of fresh investigation for the completion of the register. Such details as may not be forthcoming shall be obtained by such further investigation as the Collector may deem necessary.

74. The proceedings of the Collector shall be under the general control of the ¹* * * Commissioner ¹* * * and of ²[the Provincial Govern- ment.] Control of Proceedings of Collector.

75. The Collector may ³[save in respect of any matter in which he has delegated his powers to a Mamlatdar or Mahalkari under sub-section (2) of section 64], require any investigation under Part X ⁴* * * * to be made by a Mamlatdar or Mahalkari, but the decision thereon shall be made by the Collector. Mamlatdar may make investigation under Part X.

76. No appeal shall lie from any order made under section 64, clause (e) ⁴* * * before final order, nor from any order registering any fact specified under section 67, clauses (b), (c), (d) and (e) ⁴* * * where the effect of such order is merely to register the same facts as are already recorded in the existing registers kept according to law or under the orders of ²[the Provincial Government.] No appeal to lie save where specially provided.

77. Except as hereinbefore provided, one appeal only shall lie from every decision passed after investigation recorded in writing by a Collector, or by an Assistant Collector, or Deputy Collector ⁵[or from every decision passed by a Mamlatdar or Mahalkari exercising the powers delegated to him under sub-section (2) of section 64] ⁶* * *. Appeals.

Such appeal, if from the decision of an Assistant Collector, or Deputy Collector ⁵[or Mamlatdar, or Mahalkari] ⁶* * * shall lie to the Collector and shall be made within sixty days from the date of the order appealed against.

Such appeal, if from the decision of the Collector, shall lie to the ⁷* * * Commissioner, and shall be made within ninety days from the date of the order appealed against.

In computing the above periods the time required to prepare a copy of the order or decision appealed against shall be excluded.

78. Every petition of appeal shall be accompanied by a copy of the order or decision appealed against: and it shall be competent for the officer before whom the appeal is presented to reject the appeal if on perusal of the petition it appears to him that there is no sufficient ground for questioning the correctness of the decision, or for interfering with the order appealed against. Copy of order to accompany petition of appeal. Appeal may be summarily rejected.

Provincial Government may call for proceedings.

79. ¹[The Provincial Government] may call for and examine the record of the proceedings of any officer for the purpose of satisfying itself as to the legality or propriety of any order passed, and may reverse or modify the order as shall seem fit, or, if it seem necessary, may order a new inquiry.

²[The Provincial Government] may delegate all or any of its powers under this section, except the power to revise an order made by a Collector under section 25, to any Commissioner, and such Commissioner may thereupon exercise such powers within the local limits of his jurisdiction, subject to the revisional powers of ⁴[the Provincial Government] under this section, and to any restrictions that ¹[the Provincial Government] may deem fit to impose.]

Notice how to be served.

80. Service of any notice given under this Act shall be deemed to have been made by the notice being affixed in writing to the wall of the village chavdi or other public place in the village not less than seven days before action is required to be taken by any person thereon.

Recoveries how to be made

81. All recoveries of profits from land, assessments, emoluments or penalties under this Act, may be made as provided by any law for the time being in force relating to the recovery of the land-revenue.

Provincial Government to frame rules.

82. ¹[The Provincial Government] may frame rules not inconsistent with this Act for the guidance of its officers in cases not expressly provided for, and may from time to time modify or revoke any such rules.

Provincial Government to determine duties of hereditary officers.

83. Except as is otherwise provided in section 18 ³* * * ¹[the Provincial Government] shall have power, in cases where doubt exists, to determine what duties appertain to any hereditary office.

Grant of powers to Special Officer.

84. The ⁴[Provincial Government] may from time to time confer on any officer specially selected for the purpose ⁵[or, so far as concerns any alienated village, on the holder or on any of the holders of such village or on any agent of the holder of such village] all or any of the powers and duties which under this Act are required to be performed by a ⁶* * * Commissioner or a Collector, and may authorize the delegation to any Mamlatdar or Mahalkari of the power to fine hereditary village officers in sums not exceeding two rupees.

An Act for enabling Government to levy tolls on public roads and bridges in the Presidency of Bombay.

WHEREAS tolls have been levied in the Presidency of Bombay in accordance with ^{Preamble.} ²Act XV of 1864 since the thirtieth day of July, 1864, but doubts have arisen whether the said Act has been formally extended to the said Presidency ; and whereas it is expedient to remove the said doubts and to consolidate in one Act the provisions for the levy of tolls upon public roads and bridges in the said Presidency ; It is enacted as follows :—

1. ³Act VIII of 1851 is hereby repealed in so far as it affects the Presidency of Bombay. ^{Repeal of Act VIII of 1851.}

2. [Act XV of 1864 deemed to have been extended to Bombay Presidency from 30th July, 1864.] *Rep. Act XVI of 1895.*

3. The ⁴[Provincial Government] may cause such rates of tolls, not exceeding the rates mentioned in the schedule annexed to this Act, to be levied upon any road or bridge which has been or shall hereafter be made or repaired at the expense of ⁵[the Crown] or from funds collected under the provisions of ⁶Bombay Act III of 1869 or other funds levied ^{Rates of tolls to be levied.}

under the authority and subject to the general control ¹[of the Provincial Government], and may place the collection of such tolls under the management of such persons as may appear to ²[it] proper; and all persons employed in the management and collection of such tolls shall be liable to the same responsibilities as would belong to them if employed in the collection of the land-revenue ³* * * * *

Procedure in case of non-payment of tolls. 4. In case of non-payment of any such toll on demand, the officers appointed to collect the same may in the first place seize any part of the burden or load of the carriage or animal on which the toll is chargeable, of sufficient value to defray the toll, or, in the event of the burden or load being insufficient, such carriage or animal;

and, if any toll remains undischarged for twenty-four hours, with the cost arising from such seizure, the case shall be brought before the officer appointed to superintend the collection of the said toll, who may sell the property seized for discharge of the toll and all expenses occasioned by such non-payment, seizure and sale, and cause any balance that may remain to be returned on demand to the owner of the property; and the said officer on receipt of the property shall forthwith issue a notice, that at noon of the next day, exclusive of Sunday or any close holiday, he will sell the property by auction:

Provided that if, at any time before the sale has actually begun, the person whose property has been seized shall tender the amount of all the expenses incurred, and of double the toll payable by him, the said officer shall forthwith release the property seized.

Exemptions from toll. 5. No tolls shall be paid for the passage ⁶* * * * * of Police-officers on duty, or of any person or property in their custody. **Provincial Government may grant other exemptions.** And it shall further be lawful for ⁷[the Provincial Government], by notification in the ⁸[Official Gazette], to grant and define other exemptions from payment of the tolls levied under this Act.

6. All Police-officers shall be bound to assist the toll-collectors, when required, in the execution of this Act, and for that purpose shall have the same power which they have in the exercise of their ordinary police duties. Police-officers bound to assist toll-collectors.

7. Every person, other than the persons appointed to collect the tolls under this Act, who shall levy or demand any toll on any public road or bridge, or for passing through any bazar situated thereon, and also every person who shall unlawfully and extortionately demand or take any other or higher toll than the lawful toll, or under colour of this Act seize or sell any property, knowing such seizure or sale to be unlawful, or in any manner unlawfully extort money or any valuable thing from any person under colour of this Act, shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to imprisonment ^{1*} * * for any term not exceeding six ^{1*} * months, or to fine not exceeding rupees two hundred, any part of which fine may be awarded by the Magistrate to the person aggrieved, but this remedy shall not be deemed to bar or affect his right to have redress by suit in the Civil Court of the district. Penalty on unauthorized person demanding tolls, and for illegal demand.

8. A table of the tolls authorized to be taken at any toll-gate or station, legibly written or printed in English words and figures, and also in those of the vernacular language of the district, to which shall be annexed, written or printed in like manner, a statement of the penalties for refusing to pay the tolls and for taking any unlawful toll, shall be furnished by Government to the collector of tolls, and the same shall by him be kept in a conspicuous place near such gate or station. Table of tolls to be put up at gate or station.

9. Any person entrusted with the management of the collection of tolls under this Act may in his discretion compound for any period, not exceeding one year, with any person for a certain sum to be paid by such person for himself or for any vehicle or animal kept by him, in lieu of the rates of tolls specified in the schedule to this Act. Collectors of tolls may compound for tolls.

²[10. It shall be lawful for the ³[Provincial Government] to lease the levy of tolls at such rates not exceeding the rates mentioned in the schedule annexed to this Act upon any public road or bridge by public auction or private contract from year to year or for a longer period not exceeding seven years on such terms and conditions as the ³[Provincial Government] may deem desirable : Power of Provincial Government to lease the levy of tolls.

Provided that the lessee shall give security for the due fulfilment of such conditions, and that all sums payable under the terms and conditions of the lease shall be recoverable as a demand for the land-revenue under the law for the time being in force so far as applicable.]

**An Act to amend the Law relating to the Land-Revenue
Administration of the City of Bombay.**

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to the assessment Preamble.
and collection of the land-revenue, to provide against encroachments
upon public property, to ensure the preservation of survey-boundary-
marks, and otherwise to improve the existing land-revenue administra-
tion in the City of Bombay ; It is enacted as follows :—

PART I.

PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be cited as “ The Bombay City Land-Revenue Act, Short title,
1876 ”.

It extends only to the City of Bombay.

Extent.

2. So much of Regulation XIX of 1827 as has not been already Regulation

repealed is hereby repealed.

All references made in any Act or Regulation to any part of the said
Regulation XIX of 1827 hereby repealed shall be read as if made to the
corresponding portion of this Act.

And all rules prescribed, appointments made, powers conferred,

and all other rules (if any) now in force and relating to any of the
matters hereinafter dealt with, shall (so far as they are consistent with
this Act) be deemed to have been respectively prescribed, made, conferred,
issued and published hereunder.

And all proceedings now pending, which have been commenced under
any part of the said Regulation XIX of 1827 hereby repealed shall be
deemed to have been commenced under this Act, and shall hereafter be
conducted in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

Interpreta-

3. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context—

¹ [(1) “Collector” or “Collector of Bombay” means the Collector of Land-revenue, Customs and Opium, Bombay, or such officer as ²[the Provincial Government] conformably to law may appoint in this behalf ;]

(2) the words “land-revenue” signify any sum of money legally claimable by ²[the Provincial Government] from any person on account of any land, or interest in or right exercisable over, land held by or vested in him, under whatever designation such sum may be payable ;

(3) the words “survey-boundary-mark” mean, primarily, any iron or other mark set up by the officers who conducted the Bombay City-survey hereinafter described, and include any such new mark that may hereafter be set up by the Collector or under his orders, according to the provisions of this Act ;

³ [(4) “superior holder” means the person having the highest title under ²[the Provincial Government] to any land in the City of Bombay.]

PART II.

THE COLLECTOR OF BOMBAY AND HIS SUBORDINATES.

Chief control in revenue matters. 4. The chief controlling authority in all matters connected with the land revenue is vested in the Collector of Bombay subject to the ⁴[Provincial Government].

Appointment and duties of the Collector of Bombay. 5. The Collector of Bombay shall be appointed by the ⁴[Provincial Government], and shall exercise the powers and discharge the duties conferred and imposed on him by this Act, or by any other law for the time being in force, and, so far as is consistent therewith, all such other powers or duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the ⁴[Provincial Government].

His assistants and establishment how appointed ; 6. The Collector shall have as many assistants and such other establishment subordinate to him as the ⁴[Provincial Government] ⁵* * * * may from time to time sanction, and their appointment shall be made in such manner as the ⁴[Provincial Government] may direct.

The duties of the said assistants and other subordinates of the Collector shall be such as the Collector, subject to the orders of ¹ [the Provincial Government] may from time to time prescribe.

Subject to the previous sanction of ¹ [the Provincial Government], the Collector may delegate any of his powers under this Act, or under any law which the ² [Provincial Legislature] is able to repeal or alter, to any of his assistants or other subordinates, and may at any time cancel such delegation.

7. The Collector shall have power, subject to such rules as may from time to time be prescribed by ¹ [the Provincial Government], to fine, reduce, suspend or dismiss any of his assistants or other subordinates. Punishment for misconduct.

PART III.

ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF LAND-REVENUE.

8. It shall be the duty of the Collector, subject to the orders of ¹ [the Provincial Government], to fix and to levy the assessment for land-revenue. Collector to fix and levy land-revenue.

When there is no right on the part of the superior holder in limitation of the right of ¹ [the Provincial Government] to assess, the assessment shall be fixed at the discretion of the Collector subject to the control of ¹ [the Provincial Government].

When there is a right on the part of the superior holder in limitation of the right of ¹ [the Provincial Government], in consequence of a specific limit to assessment having been established and preserved, the assessment shall not exceed such specific limit.

9. The settlement of the assessment of each portion of land to the land-revenue shall be made with the superior holder of the same. Settlement of assessment with whom to be made.

If the said superior holder be absent and have left no known authorized agent in Bombay, or if there be a dispute as to who is entitled to be considered the superior holder of the land, the settlement may be made with the person actually in possession of the land; and any assessment so fixed shall be binding upon the rightful superior holder of the land.

Any payment made by the person in possession in accordance with the provisions of this Act shall be deemed to have been made on behalf of the superior holder.

Liability for land-revenue.

10. The superior holder of land, or, in his absence, the person actually in possession, shall be liable in person and property for the land-revenue due upon the holding.

¹ [Arrears of land-revenue due on account of land shall, on failure by the persons interested therein to pay the same within the date specified in that behalf in a notice demanding payment posted on or near the land, be a paramount charge on the land and on every part thereof.]

Claims of Provincial Government to have precedence.

11. The claim of ²[the Provincial Government] to any moneys recoverable under the provisions of this Act shall have precedence over any other debt, demand or claim whatsoever, whether in respect of mortgage, judgment, decree, execution, attachment or otherwise howsoever, against any land, or the superior holder thereof.

Collector to direct to whom and when and where revenue to be paid.

12. Subject to such orders as may be passed by the ³[Provincial Government], the Collector shall from time to time give orders and make known the same by notice to be served on all superior holders of land paying revenue, or in their absence, persons in possession, regulating the persons, places and times to whom and within which the revenue payable in respect of any land shall be paid :

⁴ [Provided that where the assessment leviable in any case under the provisions of this Act does not exceed one rupee *per annum*, it shall be lawful for the Collector, subject to the orders of ²[the Provincial Government] to levy, in lieu of such assessment, a single lump sum of such amount as the Collector, subject as aforesaid, deems to be a fair equivalent of the assessment but not in any case exceeding thirty times the assessment.]

Notice of demand may be served after arrears due.

which the arrears accrue due, cause a notice of demand to be served on the superior holder or on the person in possession, or on both.

Every person to whom any such notice is issued shall be chargeable in respect thereof with a fee not exceeding two rupees calculated according to the rates specified on this behalf in the table in Schedule A :

Fees chargeable in respect of notice of demand.

Provided that in no case shall the fee chargeable for any notice exceed the amount of the land-revenue in respect of which the said notice is issued.]

If the superior holder or person in possession, as the case may be, shall, for the space of twenty days after service of written notice of demand of payment, fail to discharge the revenue due, it shall be lawful for the Collector to levy the same by attachment and sale of the land on which the revenue is due or of any other property, moveable or immoveable, of the defaulter.

On default of payment, defaulter's property may be attached and sold.

Such sales shall be by public auction, and shall not take place until at least fifteen days after notice thereof shall have been published in the [Official Gazette].

Sales how held.

If the sale of the defaulter's property shall not produce satisfaction of the demand, it shall be lawful for the Collector to cause him to be apprehended and confined in the civil jail under the rules in force at the Presidency for the confinement of debtors, for which purpose a certificate of demand under the Collector's signature sent with the defaulter shall be the sheriff's sufficient warrant, equally with the usual legal process in ordinary cases of arrest in execution of judgment for debt :

Defaulters may be arrested and confined.

Provided, however, that such imprisonment shall cease at any time upon payment of the sum due, and that it shall in no case exceed one day for each rupee of the said sum.

14. The Collector's decision upon any question arising out of the provisions of sections 8 to 13 * * * shall, unless superseded by the Revenue Judge, be binding upon all persons whom it may concern, and shall be acted upon accordingly ; but the Collector's decision shall be stayed on any such person giving security to the satisfaction of the Collector that he will, within thirty days from the date when such decision was made known to him, institute a suit before the Revenue Judge for the purpose of contesting the legality of the Collector's decision, and will fulfil the decree that may be passed against him, and will pay all costs and interests which may be so decreed ; or that, if he fail to file such suit as above specified, he will, when required, pay the amount demanded.

Collector's decision to be acted on in first instance ; but may be stayed on security being furnished.

Compulsory process to cease on payment under protest, or on instituting suit and furnishing security.

15. All compulsory process against a defaulter shall cease on his paying or tendering the amount demanded of him under protest to the officer executing such process, or

on his instituting a suit before the Revenue Judge to contest the legality of the demand, and furnishing security satisfactory to the Collector or Revenue Judge, that he will, pending the decision of the said suit, neither quit the jurisdiction, nor remove nor transfer any of his property therein, without providing to the satisfaction of the Collector or of the Revenue Judge for the execution of the decree.

Fees in respect of warrant for attachment and sale of defaulter's property. Additional fee.

16. Fees shall be payable according to the table in the Schedule A
 * * * on all warrants issued under the provisions of section 13
 * * * for the attachment and sale of the property of defaulters by the person in respect of whose property such warrants are issued, and an additional fee of four annas per diem shall be paid in like manner in respect of each peon employed, whenever the property distrained is placed in charge of any peon or peons.

PART IV.

THE REVENUE JUDGE.

Revenue Judge. Duties and powers.

17. The Senior Magistrate of Police shall be Revenue Judge.

The Revenue Judge shall decide all suits brought before him against the Collector, or any person on his establishment, on account of land-revenue, or of acts done in their official capacities by the Collector, or any of his assistants or other subordinates.

Suits before Revenue Judge how conducted.

18. All such suits shall be commenced and the trial thereof shall be conducted according to the provisions of the general law of civil procedure for the time being in force in a District Court.

Appeals how and to whom to lie.

An appeal shall lie against a decree passed by the Revenue Judge in any such suit to the High Court on its appellate side, and shall follow the same rules as would be applicable under any law for the time being in force to appeals from the decrees of a District Court in original suits tried by it.

Decrees how executed.

The decree in any such suit, whether it be that of the Revenue Judge or of the appellate authority, shall, if it be against the Collector, be fulfilled by the Collector.

If it be against the plaintiff, it may be enforced by the Collector under section 13 ^{1*} * as an established revenue-demand :

Provided, however, that execution shall in either case be stayed if an appeal be made, and on the plaintiff's furnishing security similar to that described in section 15 ^{1*} * if the appeal be brought by him.

PART V.

THE BOMBAY CITY-SURVEY AND BOUNDARY-MARKS.

19. ²[The latest survey completed under the authority of ³[the Pro-
vincial Government] shall be called "the Bombay City-survey"; and
the demarcation of lands then made, and all the records of the said
survey shall be taken as *prima facie* evidence for all proceedings under
and for all the purposes of this Act :

Bombay

Provided that the Collector may, on the application of the parties interested in such lands, and shall, in pursuance of a decree or order of a competent Court, cause any alteration or correction to be made of any such demarcation of lands, or of any entry in any such record.

20. Every superior holder of land shall be responsible for the maintenance and good repair of the survey-boundary-marks of his holding and for any expenses, not exceeding five rupees for each mark, reasonably incurred on account of the same by the Collector in cases of alteration or removal.

21. It shall be lawful for the Collector or for any of his assistants or other subordinates in that behalf duly authorised by writing under the hand of the said Collector to enter upon any lands for the purpose of inspecting the survey-boundary-marks erected thereon, or of altering, renewing or repairing such marks.

22. In the event of any survey-boundary-mark being destroyed, defaced, injured or removed, it shall be lawful for the Collector to be served on the superior holder, or in his absence the person in possession of any land of which such mark designates the boundary, a requisition in writing signed by the said Collector, calling on such superior holder or person in possession to renew or repair the said mark, at his own expense, within fifteen days from the date of the service of such requisition.

On default, Collector or assistants may enter and renew or repair. Charge for renewal or repair.

23. If the said survey-boundary-mark be not renewed or repaired, within the said period, to the Collector's satisfaction, it shall be lawful for the Collector or any of his assistants or other subordinates, or other person duly authorized as hereinbefore mentioned, to enter upon any land to which the said mark appertains, and to renew or repair it; and for each such mark so renewed or repaired, it shall be lawful for the Collector to charge each superior holder or person in possession, the boundary of whose land is designated by any such mark, such sum, not exceeding rupees ten in the whole, as he may deem fit.

PART VI.

CROWN LANDS AND FORESHORE.

Right of the Crown to lands and foreshore.

24. All unoccupied lands within the City of Bombay, and every unoccupied portion of the foreshore below high-water mark, shall be deemed, and are hereby declared to be, the property of ¹[the Crown for the purposes of the Province], subject always to the rights of way and all other rights of the public legally subsisting.

Such lands and foreshore how disposed of.

25. It shall be lawful for the Collector, with the sanction of ²[the Provincial Government], to dispose of any ³[lands or foreshore vested in the Crown for the purposes of the Province], in such manner and subject to such conditions as he may deem fit.

PART VII.

ENCROACHMENTS.

Power to abate encroachments on land or foreshore vested in the Crown;

26. In the event of any encroachment being made after the passing of this Act on any ³[lands or foreshore vested in the Crown for the purposes of the Province], it shall be lawful for the Collector or his assistants, or other subordinates, duly authorized in this behalf by writing under his hand, to summarily abate or remove any such encroachment;

⁴[and the expense incurred therefor shall be leviable from the person in occupation of the land encroached upon.]

or to prohibit or require abatement of such encroachments under penalty of fine;

¹[Every person who makes, causes, permits or continues any encroachment on any land referred to in a notice so posted, shall be liable at the discretion of the Collector to a fine not exceeding twenty-five rupees for every day during any portion of which the encroachment continues after the date fixed for the notice to take effect.]

But it shall be competent to the Collector, with the previous sanction of ²[the Provincial Government], and if the person making the encroachment so desire, to charge the said person a sum not exceeding five times the value of the land so encroached upon and to fix an assessment not exceeding five times the ordinary annual land-revenue thereupon, and then to cause the said land to be entered in his records in the name of the said person.

or to charge for and assess land, and then enter it in name of encroacher.

³[The person who made such encroachment or who is in occupation of the land so encroached upon shall in any case also be liable to pay assessment at a rate not exceeding five times the ordinary annual land-revenue on the said land from the date when the encroachment was made, occupation of the land for a portion of a year being counted as for a whole year.]

27. For the purposes of the preceding section, the value of land that has been encroached upon shall be fixed by the Collector according to the market value of similar land in the same neighbourhood at the time of such valuation.

Value and land-revenue how calculated.

And the annual revenue of any such land shall be assessed at the same rate as the land-revenue of similar land in the vicinity.

28. In the case of any encroachment made within twenty years before the passing of this Act, the Collector may, with the sanction of ²[the Provincial Government], charge the person who made such encroachment, or who is in occupation of the land so encroached upon, a sum not exceeding double the value of the said land, and fix an assessment not exceeding double the ordinary annual land-revenue thereon, and recover arrears of land-revenue at the same rate from the date when the encroachment was made.

Encroachments made before passing of Act how dealt with.

29. For the purposes of the last preceding section, the amount by which any holding shall have been shown by the Bombay City-survey records to exceed the area of such holding as entered in the Collector's previous records shall *prima facie* be held to be an encroachment.

Encroachments before passing of Act defined.

And the value and land-revenue payable in respect of the same shall be calculated according to the market value of similar land in the neighbourhood, and the land-revenue chargeable in respect of the excess shall be calculated at the same rate at which the rest of the holding has been assessed.

Value and land-revenue payable in respect thereof how calculated.

In case there has been no such holding the assessment shall be made at such rate as the Collector, with the sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government], may fix.

PART VIII.

TRANSFER OF LANDS, ETC.

Notice of transfer of title to lands, etc., to be given to Collector.

30. Whenever the title to any land, house or other immoveable property, subject to the payment of land-revenue to ¹[the Provincial Government], shall be transferred or assigned, the person transferring or assigning the same, and the person to whom the same shall be transferred or assigned, shall respectively cause notice of such transfer or assignment to be given to the Collector.

Notice when to be given.

Such notice shall be given within twenty days after execution of the instrument of transfer or assignment, or after its registration, if it be registered, or after the transfer or assignment is effected, if no instrument is executed.

Transferee by death to give notice within one year.

In the event of the death of any person in whose name the title to any property is entered in the Collector's records, the person to whom such title shall be transferred as heir or otherwise shall cause notice thereof to be given to the Collector within one year from such death.

Form of notice.

31. The notice shall be in the form either of Schedule B or Schedule C ²* * * * as the case may be, and shall state clearly all the particulars required by the said form.

Accompaniments.

It shall be accompanied, whenever the Collector shall deem fit so to require, by the instrument of transfer if any, ³[by a plan to be furnished of the land which is the subject of the transfer or assignment, drawn and attested by ⁴(such officer as the Collector may direct)] and by a certificate that public notice has been given of the transfer or assignment by beat of bataki.

32. Every person neglecting to give the notice required by the two last preceding sections within the time therein specified, shall be liable at the discretion of the Collector to a fine not exceeding ten rupees in case of holdings paying less than one rupee as land-revenue, and in no other case exceeding rupees one hundred. Penalty for neglect to give notice.

33. Every person transferring the title to any land, house, or other immoveable property subject to the payment of land-revenue to ¹[the Provincial Government], without giving the notice required by sections 30 and 31, * * *² shall continue liable to ¹[the Provincial Government] for the payment of all land-revenue accruing due in respect thereof, until he shall have given such notice or until the requisite transfer shall have been effected in the Collector's records. Person transferring title and omitting to give notice to continue liable for revenue.

But nothing contained in this section shall be held to diminish the liability of the land, house or other immoveable property to attachment or sale under the provisions of section 13 * * *².

34. Whenever any dispute or question shall arise with respect to the making or completion of any entry or transfer in the records of the Collector, of or relating to any land, house or other immoveable property subject to the payment of land-revenue to ¹[the Provincial Government], the Collector shall summon all the parties interested in such entry or transfer, and shall call for such evidence, and examine such witnesses, as he shall consider necessary, and shall thereupon decide summarily what entry shall be made in his records in respect of such land, house or other immoveable property. Proceeding in case of dispute as to entry or transfer.

If at any time a certified copy shall be produced to the Collector of an order of a competent Court determining the title to any such land, house or other immoveable property, the Collector shall amend his records in conformity with such order.

35. The registration or transfer of any title in the Collector's records shall not be deemed to operate so as in any way to affect any right, title or interest of ³[the Crown] in the land, house or other immoveable property in respect of which any such transfer is made or registered. Registration or transfer not to affect right of the Crown.

PART IX.

PROCEDURE.

35. The provisions of the Civil Procedure Code in force for the time being with respect to the issue of summonses and commissions, and the Law applied to summonses, etc.

compelling the attendance of witnesses, and for their remuneration, in suits before a District Court, shall apply to all persons summoned to appear before the Collector under the provisions of this Act.

Notices how to be served. ¹[Any notice which the Collector or any of his subordinates is by this Act required or empowered to issue shall be deemed to have been sufficiently served,

- (a) if it is addressed to any person and has been
- (i) delivered to such person, or
 - (ii) delivered at his abode and in his absence to any adult male member or servant of his family, or
 - (iii) sent by post in a letter addressed to him at his last known residence, address or place of business and registered under Chapter VI of the ²Indian Post Office Act, 1898, or VI of 1898.
- (b) if the Collector is in doubt as to the person to whom such notice should be addressed or as to the residence, address or place of business of any person on whom it is desired to serve such notice, and
- (i) causes the notice to be posted in some conspicuous place on or near the land to which it relates, and
 - (ii) publishes the notice either in the ³[Official Gazette] or in such local newspapers as he deems fit or by proclamation on or near such land accompanied with beat of drum.]

PART X.

LEVY OF HOUSE-RENT, FEES, PENALTIES, ETC.

Dues leviable as revenue-demands. 37. All arrears of rent payable by any person in respect of the occupation of any house the property of ⁴[the Crown], and all fees, fines and penalties chargeable under this Act, and all moneys leviable under the provisions of this Act on account of the value of any land, or on account of the alteration, removal, renewal or repair of survey-boundary-

marks, ¹[or on account of the abatement or removal of an encroachment], shall be realized in the same manner as other revenue-demands, under the provisions of section 13 of this Act.

38. It shall be lawful for the Collector of Bombay to levy, in the same way as any arrear of land-revenue due under this Act, any sum certified by the Collector or Assistant or Deputy Collector of any district or collectorate in the Presidency of Bombay to be due and recoverable as an arrear of land-revenue, from any person residing or owning property in the city of Bombay, by whom the same is so certified to be due.

Power to Collector of Bombay to assist other Collectors in realization of dues.

PART XI.

MISCELLANEOUS.

39. It shall be the duty of the Collector to prepare and keep in such form as ²[the Provincial Government] may from time to time sanction a separate register and rent-roll of every description of land according to the nature and terms of the tenure on which such land is held.

Collector to keep registers and rent-rolls.

40. Subject to such rules and the payment of such fees as the ³[Provincial Government] may from time to time prescribe in this behalf, all maps and land-registers, and other records of the Bombay City-survey, and all records concerning the land or the land-revenue, shall be kept in the Collector's office, and shall be open to the inspection of the public at reasonable hours; and certified extracts from such maps, registers and records, or certified copies thereof, shall be given to all persons applying for the same.

Maps, land-registers and records where to be kept; to be open to inspection. Extracts and copies to be given.

41. It shall be lawful for the ³[Provincial Government] from time to time to frame, and from time to time to vary or repeal, rules not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act for the guidance of the Collector and his assistants and other subordinates in the discharge of their duties, or for any other purpose connected with the subject-matter of this Act, not expressly provided for therein.

Power to frame and vary rules for guidance of Collector, etc., and for matters not provided for.

Any of such rules as the ³[Provincial Government] may deem fit may be published, and when published shall, until cancelled or amended by the ³[Provincial Government] have the force of law.

An Act to prohibit the practice of inoculation, and to make the vaccination of children in the City of Bombay compulsory.

WHEREAS it is expedient to prohibit the practice of inoculation, and Pre mble. to make the vaccination of children in the City of Bombay compulsory ;
It is enacted as follows :—

PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be cited as the Bombay Vaccination Act, 1877. Short title.

It extends only to the City of Bombay. Local extent.

It shall come into force on such day² as the ³[Provincial Government] directs by notification in the ⁴[*Official Gazette*], and its operation may at any time be suspended by the ³[Provincial Government] by notification in the said Gazette. Commencement.

2. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject Interpreta-
tion-clause. context—

(1) "parent" includes the father and mother of a legitimate child and the mother of an illegitimate child :

(2) "guardian" means any person to whom the care, nurture or custody of any child falls by law, or by natural right or recognized usage, or who has accepted or assumed the care, nurture or custody

(3) "public vaccinator" means any vaccinator appointed under this Act or any deputy duly authorized to act for such public vaccinator :

(4) "medical practitioner" means any person duly qualified by a diploma, degree or licence to practise in medicine or surgery, or specially licensed by the ¹[Provincial Government] to practise vaccination and grant certificates under the provisions of this Act :

(5) "unprotected child" means a child who has not been protected from small-pox by having had that disease either naturally or by inoculation, or by having been successfully vaccinated, and who has not been certified under the provisions of this Act to be insusceptible to vaccination :

(6) "animal-lymph" means vaccine taken from the calf :

ESTABLISHMENT.

Vaccination-districts.

3. For the purposes ³[of this Act] the ⁴[Commissioner, with the approval of the corporation,] shall divide the City of Bombay into as many districts for the performance of vaccination as he shall from time to time deem fit. Each such district shall be called a "vaccination-district."

Appointment of public vaccinators.

vaccination. Such stations shall be called "public vaccine-stations." Public vaccine-stations. Every such public vaccinator shall be removable from office by the ¹[Commissioner].

The limits of the vaccination-districts made, and the positions of the public vaccine-stations fixed, under the provisions of this section, and the days and hours of the public vaccinator's attendance at each station, shall be published from time to time in such manner as shall be directed in rules to be framed under section 31 ²* * * Notification of districts and stations.

4. Every public vaccinator, unless specially permitted by the ³[Commissioner] to reside elsewhere, shall reside within the district for which he is appointed, and shall cause his name, with the addition of the words "Public Vaccinator for the district of _____", to be posted up in some conspicuous place on or near the outer door of his dwelling-house and of every public vaccine-station in his district. Public vaccinator to live within district.

5. No person shall be appointed a public vaccinator, or act as a deputy for a public vaccinator, who shall not possess a certificate of qualification signed by the ⁴[health officer]. Qualifications of public vaccinator.

6. A Superintendent of Vaccination shall be appointed by ⁵[the corporation] who, subject to the orders of the ³[Commissioner], shall have a general control over all the proceedings of public vaccinators, and shall perform such duties, in addition to those prescribed by this Act, as shall be required by ⁵[the corporation]. Superintendent of Vaccination.

The Superintendent shall have one or more assistants as ⁵[the corporation] may from time to time direct. Assistant Superintendents.

VACCINATION.

7. The parent or guardian of every child born in the City of Bombay shall, within six months after the birth of such child, and Parent or guardian of children born in Bombay.

take it, or cause it to be taken, to a public vaccinator to be vaccinated, or shall, within such period as aforesaid, cause it to be vaccinated by some medical practitioner ;

Public vaccinator bound to vaccinate all children brought to him.

and the public vaccinator to whom such child, or to whom any child under the age of fourteen years, is brought for vaccination, is hereby required, with all reasonable despatch, subject to the conditions herein-after mentioned, to vaccinate such child.

Inspection.

8. At an appointed hour upon the same day in the following week after vaccination shall have been performed by a public vaccinator or a medical practitioner, or on ²[any earlier or later day], if the public vaccinator or medical practitioner so desires, the parent or guardian shall again take the child, or cause it to be taken, to the public vaccinator or to the medical practitioner by whom the operation was performed, that he may inspect it and ascertain the result of the operation.

Re-vaccination.

In the event of the vaccination being unsuccessful, such parent or guardian shall, if the public vaccinator or medical practitioner so direct, cause the child to be forthwith again vaccinated and subsequently inspected as on the previous occasion.

If child be unfit for vaccination, certificate in form A to be given ;

9. If any public vaccinator or medical practitioner shall be of opinion that any child is not in a fit state to be vaccinated, he shall forthwith deliver to the parent or guardian of such child a certificate under his hand according to the form of Schedule A ^{3*} * *, or to the like effect, that the child is then in a state unfit for vaccination.

which shall remain in force for two months, but shall be renewable.

The said certificate shall remain in force for two months only, but shall be renewable for successive periods of two months until a public vaccinator or medical practitioner shall deem the child to be in a fit state for vaccination, when the child shall, with all reasonable despatch, be vaccinated and a certificate of successful vaccination given in the form of Schedule C ^{3*} * *, according to the provisions of section 11 ^{4*} * * if warranted by the result.

At or before the end of each successive period, the parent or guardian shall take, or cause the child to be taken, to some public vaccinator or medical practitioner, who shall then examine the child and give a fresh certificate according to the said form A, so long as he deems requisite under the circumstances of the case.

When successive postponement-certificates to be granted.

10. If any public vaccinator or medical practitioner shall find that a child whom he has three times unsuccessfully vaccinated is insusceptible of successful vaccination, or that a child brought to him for vaccination has already had the small-pox, he shall deliver to the parent or guardian of such child a certificate, under his hand, according to the form of Schedule B ¹* * *, or to the like effect, and the parent or guardian shall thenceforth not be required to cause the child to be vaccinated.

Provision for giving certificates of insusceptibility to successful vaccination.

11. Every public vaccinator or medical practitioner who shall have performed the operation of vaccination upon any child, and shall have ascertained that the same has been successful, shall deliver to the parent or guardian of such child a certificate according to the form of Schedule C ¹* * *, or to the like effect, certifying that the said child has been successfully vaccinated.

Provision for giving certificates of successful vaccination.

12. Except as is hereinafter otherwise provided, the vaccination of a child under the provisions of this Act must, if the parent or guardian of the child so require, be performed with animal-lymph ;

Vaccination to be ordinarily with animal-lymph,

 must procure vaccination. take it, or cause it to be taken, to a public vaccinator to be vaccinated, or shall, within such period as aforesaid, cause it to be vaccinated by some medical practitioner ;

Public vaccinator bound to vaccinate all children brought to him. and the public vaccinator to whom such child, or to whom any child under the age of fourteen years, is brought for vaccination, is hereby required, with all reasonable despatch, subject to the conditions herein-after mentioned, to vaccinate such child.

Inspection. 8. At an appointed hour upon the same day in the following week after vaccination shall have been performed by a public vaccinator or a medical practitioner, or on ²[any earlier or later day], if the public vaccinator or medical practitioner so desires, the parent or guardian shall again take the child, or cause it to be taken, to the public vaccinator or to the medical practitioner by whom the operation was performed, that he may inspect it and ascertain the result of the operation.

Re-vaccination. In the event of the vaccination being unsuccessful, such parent or guardian shall, if the public vaccinator or medical practitioner so direct, cause the child to be forthwith again vaccinated and subsequently inspected as on the previous occasion.

If child be unfit for vaccination, certificate in form A to be given ; 9. If any public vaccinator or medical practitioner shall be of opinion that any child is not in a fit state to be vaccinated, he shall forthwith deliver to the parent or guardian of such child a certificate under his hand according to the form of Schedule A ^{3*} * *, or to the like effect, that the child is then in a state unfit for vaccination.

which shall remain in force for two months, but shall be renewable. The said certificate shall remain in force for two months only, but shall be renewable for successive periods of two months until a public vaccinator or medical practitioner shall deem the child to be in a fit state for vaccination, when the child shall, with all reasonable despatch, be vaccinated and a certificate of successful vaccination given in the form of Schedule C ^{3*} * *, according to the provisions of section 11 ^{4*} * * if warranted by the result.

At or before the end of each successive period, the parent or guardian shall take, or cause the child to be taken, to some public vaccinator or medical practitioner, who shall then examine the child and give a fresh certificate according to the said form A, so long as he deems requisite under the circumstances of the case.

When successive postponement-certificates to be granted.

10. If any public vaccinator or medical practitioner shall find that a child whom he has three times unsuccessfully vaccinated is insusceptible of successful vaccination, or that a child brought to him for vaccination has already had the small-pox, he shall deliver to the parent or guardian of such child a certificate, under his hand, according to the form of Schedule B ¹* * *, or to the like effect, and the parent or guardian shall thenceforth not be required to cause the child to be vaccinated.

Provision for giving certificates of insusceptibility to successful vaccination.

11. Every public vaccinator or medical practitioner who shall have performed the operation of vaccination upon any child, and shall have ascertained that the same has been successful, shall deliver to the parent or guardian of such child a certificate according to the form of Schedule C ¹* * *, or to the like effect, certifying that the said child has been successfully vaccinated.

Provision for giving certificates of successful vaccination.

12. Except as is hereinafter otherwise provided, the vaccination of a child under the provisions of this Act must, if the parent or guardian of the child so require, be performed with animal-lymph ;

Vaccination to be ordinarily with animal-lymph,

but it shall at any time be lawful for the ²[Provincial Government], on its being shown to ³[its] satisfaction that animal-lymph is not procurable, to direct, by notification in the ⁴[Official Gazette]—

No fee for vaccination at public vaccine-station, or for certificates.

13. No fee or remuneration shall be charged by any public vaccinator to the parent or guardian of any child for any such certificate as aforesaid, nor for any vaccination done by him in pursuance of this Act at a public vaccine-station ;

Proviso.

But it shall be lawful for a public vaccinator to accept a fee for vaccinating a child, by request of the parent or guardian, elsewhere than at a public vaccine-station.

REGISTRATION.

Registrar of Births to give notice of requirement of vaccination.

14. On the registration of the birth of any child under the provisions of section 256 of the ²Bombay Municipal Act, 1872, or of any other law for the time being in force, the Registrar shall deliver to the person giving information of such birth a printed notice in the form of Schedule D ³* * *, or to the like effect, and such notice shall have attached thereto the several forms of certificates prescribed by this Act.

Duplicates of all certificates to be transmitted to Registrar.

15. Every public vaccinator or medical practitioner who gives to any parent or guardian a certificate in any of the forms of Schedules A, B and C ³* * *, shall, within twenty-one days after giving the same, transmit a duplicate thereof to the Registrar of Births of the district where the birth of the child on whose account such certificate was given has been registered, or, if that be not known to him, or if the child was born out of the City of Bombay, or his birth has not been registered in the said City, to the Registrar of the district within which the child was vaccinated or presented for vaccination.

Registrar to keep vaccination-notice and certificate book.

16. The Registrar of Births shall keep a book, in such form as may from time to time be prescribed by the ⁴[Commissioner] under section 29 ¹* * *, in which he shall enter minutes of the notices of vaccination given by him as herein required, and shall also register the duplicates of certificates transmitted to him as herein provided.

He shall also prepare and keep a duplicate of the register of births and also duplicate register of births with entries concerning vaccination. required to be kept by him under the provisions of the ¹Bombay Municipal Act, 1872, or of any other law for the time being in force, with such additional columns as shall from time to time be prescribed by the ²[Commissioner] under section 29 ³* * * in which he shall record the date of every duplicate certificate in the form of Schedule B or Schedule C ⁴* * * received by him concerning any child whose birth he has registered, and make an entry to the effect that the child has been vaccinated or is insusceptible of vaccination, as the case may be.

18. He shall also keep a register of postponed vaccinations in the form of Schedule E ⁴* * *, in which he shall record the name of every child concerning whom he receives a duplicate certificate in the form of Schedule A ⁴* * *, together with the date of such duplicate certificate and of each such successive duplicate certificate, if he receives more than one and shall show the number and year of the entry, if any, in the register of births in which such child's birth has been registered. and also register of postponed vaccinations.

19. Every Registrar shall transmit on the first of every month to the Superintendent of Vaccination a return, in such form as may from time to time be prescribed by the ²[Commissioner] under section 29 ³* * *, of all cases in which duplicate certificates have not been duly received by him in pursuance of the provisions of this Act during the last preceding month. Transmission of returns to Superintendent.

PROSECUTIONS AND OFFENCES.

20. Whoever produces, or attempts to produce, in any person, by inoculation with variolous matter or by wilful exposure to variolous matter or to anything impregnated therewith, or who wilfully by any other means produces the disease of small-pox in any person; Penalty for inoculating;

and whoever having been inoculated with small-pox in a place to which this Act does not extend shall afterwards enter the City of Bombay before the expiration of forty days from the date of such inoculation, or without a certificate from a medical practitioner that such person is no longer likely to cause contagion. and for entering City of Bombay after inoculation.

shall be punished with imprisonment ¹* * * for a term which may extend to three months, or to fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, or with both.

Magistrate may make order for vaccination of unprotected child under fourteen years.

21. If the Superintendent of Vaccination shall give information in writing to a Magistrate of Police that he has reason to believe that any child within the City of Bombay, under the age of fourteen years, is an unprotected child, and that he has given notice to the parent or guardian of such child to procure its being vaccinated, and that the said notice has been disregarded, such Magistrate may summon such parent or guardian to appear with the child before him, and, if the Magistrate shall find, after such examination as he shall deem necessary, that the child is an unprotected child, he may make an order directing such child to be vaccinated within a certain time.

Penalty for disobedience of such order.

If at the expiration of such time the child shall not have been vaccinated, or shall not be shown to be then unfit to be vaccinated nor to be insusceptible of vaccination, the person upon whom such order shall have been made shall, unless he can show some reasonable ground for his omission to carry the order into effect, be punished with fine which may extend to fifty rupees :

Proviso for costs to person improperly summoned.

Provided that if the Magistrate shall be of opinion that the person is improperly brought before him, and shall refuse to make an order for the vaccination of the child, he may order the informant to pay to such person such sum of money as he shall consider a fair compensation for his expenses and loss of time in attending before the Magistrate.

Penalty for not producing child.

22. If any parent or guardian intentionally omits to produce a child whom he has been summoned to produce under the last preceding section, he shall be punished with simple imprisonment, within the meaning of the Indian Penal Code, for a term which may extend to six months, ^{XLV} or with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees, or with both. _{of 1860.}

Penalty for neglect to take child to be vaccinated, etc.

23. Whoever, in contravention of this Act,—

- (a) neglects, without reasonable excuse, to take, or cause a child to be taken, to be vaccinated, or after vaccination to be inspected, or
- (b) at any time during the period for which any notification made under section 12 ²* * * is in force, prevents any public vaccinator from taking lymph from any child whom he has vaccinated, or

(c) neglects to fill up and sign and give to the parent or guardian of any child any certificate which such parent or guardian is entitled to receive from him, or to transmit a duplicate of the same to the Registrar of Births,

shall be punished for each such offence with fine which may extend to fifty rupees.

24. Whoever wilfully signs, or makes, or procures the signing or making of, a false certificate, or duplicate certificate, under this Act, shall be punished with imprisonment ^{1* * *} for a term which may extend to six months, or with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees, or with both.

25. If any public vaccinator accepts or obtains, or agrees to accept or attempts to obtain, from any person any fee or remuneration, contrary to the provisions of section 13 ^{2* * *}, he shall be deemed to have committed an offence punishable under section 161 of the Indian Penal Code.

All offences under this Act shall be cognizable by a Magistrate of Police, subject to the provisions of any law for the time being in force for the trial of offences, but no complaint of any such offences shall be entertained unless the prosecution be instituted by order of, or under authority from, ³[the Standing Committee appointed under the provisions of the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1888,] or the Superintendent of Vaccination.

**An Act to consolidate and amend the Abkari-law of the
Presidency of Bombay.**

WHEREAS it is expedient to consolidate and amend the law relating to Preamble.
the import, export, transport, manufacture, sale and possession of liquor
and of intoxicating drugs in the Presidency of Bombay ; It is enacted as
follows :—

I.—PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be cited as the Bombay Abkari Act, 1878.

Short title.

Commence-ment. and it shall come into force in any portion of the said Presidency on such date¹ as ²[the Provincial Government], by notification in the ³[Official Gazette], directs.

Interpreta-tion-clause. 3. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context—

(1) “ Abkari-revenue ” means revenue derived or derivable from any duty, fee, tax, fine ⁴[(other than a fine imposed by a Court of law)] or confiscation imposed or ordered, under the provisions of this Act, or of any other law for the time being in force relating to liquor or intoxicating drugs :

(2) “ Abkari-officer ” means a Commissioner, Collector or any officer or other person lawfully appointed, or invested with powers under section 6 :

(3) “ Commissioner ” ⁵[includes an officer appointed by ²[the Provincial Government] to be a Commissioner for the purposes of this Act] :

(4) “ Collector ” ⁶[includes] any person appointed under section 5 to exercise the powers and perform the duties of a Collector under this Act :

(6) "toddy" means juice drawn from a coconut, brab, date or any kind of palm-tree, whether in its fermented or unfermented state :

¹[(7) "liquor" includes—

(a) spirits of wine, methylated spirits, spirits, wine, toddy, beer and all liquid consisting of or containing alcohol; and "spirits" means any liquor containing alcohol and obtained by distillation, whether it be denatured or not,

(b) any other intoxicating substance which ²[the Provincial Government] may by notification in the ³[Official Gazette] declare to be liquor for the purposes of this Act :]

(8) "country-liquor" includes all liquor produced or manufactured in India :

⁴["foreign liquor" includes all liquor imported into India by sea or land :

provided that ²[the Provincial Government] may by notification in the ³[Official Gazette] declare that any specified description of country-liquor shall for the purposes of this Act be deemed to be foreign liquor :]

(i) the leaves, small stalks and flowering or fruiting tops of the Indian hemp plant (*cannabis sativa L.*), including all forms known as bhang, sidhi, or ganja ;

(1) Where any ³[intoxicant] or hemp has been manufactured or sold or is possessed by any person on account of any other person, and such other person knew or had reason to believe at the time of such manufacture or sale that such manufacture or sale was on his account, or knows or has reason to believe that such possession is on his account, the article shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to have been manufactured or sold by, or to be in the possession of, such other person.

(2) Nothing in sub-section (1) shall absolve any person who manufactures, sells or has possession of an ³[intoxicant] or hemp on account of another person from liability to any punishment under this Act for the unlawful manufacture, sale or possession of such article.]

II.—ESTABLISHMENT AND CONTROL.

4. Subject to the control and direction of the Commissioner and the orders of ⁴[the Provincial Government], the Collectors are charged with the collection of the Abkari-revenue, and with the carrying out of the provisions of this Act.

For the purposes of this Act, the Collector of Bombay shall be subordinate to such Commissioner as ⁴[the Provincial Government] directs.

5. ⁴[The Provincial Government] may, by notification in the ⁵[Official Gazette], appoint any person other than the Collector of Land-revenue to exercise, in any district or place, all the powers and perform all the duties conferred and imposed by this Act on a Collector, subject to such control, if any, in addition to that of the Commissioner and of ⁴[the Provincial Government] as ⁴[the Provincial Government] may from time to time direct.

6. To aid the Collectors in carrying out the provisions of this Act, the ⁶[Provincial Government may], appoint such subordinate officers, with such designations, and assign to them respectively such powers and duties under this Act, as ⁷[it deems] fit.

8. The powers conferred on the Commissioners by ³[section 6] may be delegated by them, in whole or in part, to the Collectors, or to any Collector subordinate to them, and any such delegation may be at any time cancelled by the Commissioners.

Import of
intoxicants.

9. (1) No ⁵[intoxicant] and no hemp shall be imported unless—

(a) ¹[The Provincial Government] has given permission, either general or special, for its import ;

(b) such conditions, if any, as ¹[the Provincial Government] may impose, have been satisfied ; and

(c) the duty, if any, ⁶[payable under Chapter VI] has been paid or a bond has been executed for the payment thereof.

(2) Sub-section (1) shall not apply to any article which has been imported into British India and was liable on such importation to duty under the ⁷Indian Tariff Act, 1894, or the ⁸Sea Customs Act, 1878.

(3) Clauses (a) and (b) of sub-section (1) shall not apply to liquor manufactured in British India and declared by notification under clause (8) of section 3 to be foreign liquor.

10. No ¹[intoxicant] and no hemp shall be exported or transported unless—

(a) the duty, if any, ²[payable under Chapter VI], or

(b) if the article was previously imported, the duty, if any, imposed on its importation under the ³Indian Tariff Act, 1894, or the ⁴Sea Customs Act, 1878,

has been paid, or a bond has been executed for the payment thereof.

11. ⁵[The Provincial Government] may by notification in the ⁶[Official Gazette]

(a) prohibit the import or export of any ¹[intoxicant] or of hemp into or from the Bombay Presidency or any part thereof ;

(b) prohibit the transport of any ¹[intoxicant] or of hemp.

12. No ¹[intoxicant] and no hemp exceeding such quantity as ⁵[the Provincial Government] may prescribe by notification in the ⁶[Official Gazette], either generally for the whole Presidency or specially for any local area, shall be imported, exported, or transported except under a pass issued under the provisions of the next following section :

Provided that—

(i) in the case of duty-paid foreign liquor other than denatured spirit such passes shall be dispensed with, unless ⁵[the Provincial Government] shall by notification in the ⁶[Official Gazette] otherwise direct with respect to any local area ;

(ii) unless ⁵[the Provincial Government] shall otherwise direct, no pass shall be required for the import, transport and export of any ¹[intoxicant] or hemp conveyed under a pass issued by an officer duly authorized in this behalf from any place beyond the limits of the Bombay Presidency to any other place beyond the limits of the said Presidency.

Export and transport of intoxicants.

Power of Provincial Government to prohibit import, export and transport of intoxicants.

Passes necessary for import, export and transport.

Grant of passes for import, export and transport.

13.⁷ Passes for the import, export or transport of ¹[intoxicants] or hemp may be issued by the Collector or by any other Abkari-officer duly empowered in this behalf.

Such passes may be either general for definite periods of time and definite kinds of ¹[intoxicants], or special for specified occasions and particular consignments only.

Every such pass shall specify—

(a) the name of the person authorized to import, export or transport ¹[intoxicants] or hemp ;

(b) the period for which the pass is to be in force ;

(c) the quantity and description of ¹[intoxicants] or hemp for which it is granted ; and

(d) the places from and to which ¹[intoxicants] or hemp are to be imported, exported or transported, and in the case of places more than ten miles apart, the route by which they are to be conveyed.]

²[IV.—CULTIVATION AND MANUFACTURE.]

Licenses required for cultivation and manufacture.

³[14. (1) Save as hereinafter otherwise provided,

(a) no ⁴[intoxicant] shall be manufactured ;

(b) no hemp shall be cultivated or collected ;

(c) no toddy-producing tree shall be tapped ;

(d) no toddy shall be drawn from any tree ;

(e) no foreign liquor shall be bottled ; and

(f) no person shall use, keep or have in his possession any materials, still, utensil, implement or apparatus whatsoever for the purpose of manufacturing any ⁴[intoxicant] other than toddy,

except under the authority and subject to the conditions of a license granted in that behalf by the Collector.

(2) No distillery or brewery shall be constructed or worked except under the authority and subject to the conditions of a license granted in that behalf by the Commissioner under section 15.]

Possession of illicit articles.

(2) When any such limit of quantity has been prescribed for the retail sale of any ¹⁰[intoxicant] or hemp, no quantity in excess of such limit shall be sold by retail to any one person at one time or to any one person in the aggregate on any one day:

provided that the Collector or any Abkari officer duly empowered in this behalf may, subject to any rules that may be made under section 35A, give special orders for the occasional sale by retail of any ¹⁰[intoxicant] or hemp in quantities exceeding such limits.]

(a) under a license granted under section 16, or

(b) to a person licensed to manufacture or sell liquor under this Act.

in the foregoing section may be levied in one or more of the following ways :—

(a) in the case of excisable articles imported in accordance with the provisions of sub-section (1) of section 9—

(i) by payment either in the province of import or in the province or territory of export; or

(ii) by payment upon issue for sale from a warehouse established or licensed under section 15;

(b) in the case of excisable articles exported in accordance with the provisions of section 10, by payment either in the province of export or in the province or territory of import;

(c) in the case of excisable articles transported in accordance with the provisions of section 10—

(i) by payment in the district from which they are transported;

(ii) by payment upon issue for sale from a warehouse established or licensed under section 15;

(d) in the case of spirit or beer manufactured in any distillery, established or any distillery or brewery licensed under section 15—

(i) by a rate charged upon the quantity produced in or issued from the distillery or brewery, as the case may be, or issued from a warehouse established or licensed under section 15: or

(3) Nothing in this section shall authorise the levy by the Provincial Government of any duty which, as between goods manufactured or produced in the Province and similar goods not so manufactured or produced, discriminates in favour of the former, or which, in the case of goods manufactured or produced outside the Province, discriminates between goods manufactured or produced in one locality and similar goods manufactured or produced in another locality.]

VII.—LICENSES, ETC.

¹[30. Every license, permit or pass granted under this Act shall be granted on payment of such fees, if any, and subject to such restrictions, and on such conditions, and shall be in such form and contain such particulars, and may, in case any fee or duty payable by the holder be not duly paid, impose liability for interest thereon at such rate, as ²[the Provincial Government] in the case of licenses and the Commissioner in the case of permits and passes, may direct in rules or orders made either generally or in any particular instance in this behalf, such rules or orders being not inconsistent with this Act.]

Form and conditions of licenses, etc.

31. Every person taking out a license for the manufacture or sale of any ³[⁴[intoxicant] or hemp] under this Act shall execute a counter-part agreement in conformity with the tenor of his license, and shall give such security for the performance of his agreement as the Collector may require.

Counter-part agreement to be executed and security to be given by licensees.

(b) in the event of any breach by the holder of such license, permit or pass or by his servant or by any one acting with his express or implied permission on his behalf, of any of the terms or conditions of such license, permit or pass, or of any license, permit or pass previously held by such holder; or

(c) if the holder thereof, or any person in the employ of such holder or any person acting with his express or implied permission on his behalf is convicted of any offence under this Act or any law for the time being in force relating to Abkari-revenues, or if the holder of the license, permit or pass is convicted of any cognizable and non-bailable offence, or of any offence ^{I of 1930.} ^{IV} [under the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1930, or] ^{of 1889.} ^{XLV} under the Indian Merchandise Marks Act, 1889, or of any offence ^{of 1860.} ^{VIII} punishable under sections 482 to 489 (both inclusive) of the Indian Penal Code, 1860, or of any offence punishable under No. 8 of the ^{of 1878.} schedule to section 167 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878.

(2) When a license, permit or pass held by any person is cancelled under clause (a) or clause (b) of sub-section (1), the authority aforesaid may cancel any other license, permit or pass granted to such person ^{I of 1878.} ^{of} [by, or by the authority of, the Provincial Government] under this Act or under any other law for the time being in force relating to Abkari-revenue or under the Opium Act, 1878.

(3) The holder shall be entitled to no compensation for the cancellation or suspension of his license, permit or pass under this section, nor to refund of any fee paid or deposit made in respect thereof.]

granting the license may attach and take such license under management, and if the profits received from such management after meeting all the expenses of such attachment and management are less than the amount of the arrears for which the license was attached and the amount falling due on such license during the remaining period of such license, the difference shall be recovered from the licensee as if it were a duty or fee leviable under any one of the foregoing provisions of this Act, and in the event of the said profits exceeding the amount so due under the license, the licensee shall not be entitled to receive any of the said profits.]

VIII.—GENERAL PROVISIONS.

33. Every person who manufactures or sells ¹[any ²[intoxicant]] under a license granted under this Act shall be bound—

Certain licensees required to keep measures, etc.

(a) to supply himself with such measures ³[and weights] and with such instruments for testing the strength or quality of liquor as the Collector prescribes, and to keep the same in good condition, and

(b) on the requisition of any Abkari officer duly empowered in this behalf at any time to measure, ⁴[weigh, or test any ²[intoxicant]] in his possession in such manner as the said Abkari officer may require.

34. All duties, taxes, fines and fees leviable under any of the foregoing provisions of this Act or of any license, permit or pass issued under it, and all amounts due from any farmer under this Act, may be recovered from ⁵[any person liable] to pay the same, or from his surety (if any) as if they were arrears of land-revenue.

Recovery of duties, etc.

IX.—POWERS OF ABKARI-OFFICERS.

⁶35. (1) ⁷[The Provincial Government] may make rules for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Act or any other law for the time being in force relating to Abkari-revenue.

(2) In particular and without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing provision, ⁷[the Provincial Government] may make rules—

(a) regulating the delegation of any powers by the Commissioner or by Collectors ;

(b) prescribing the powers and duties of officers of the Abkari Department ;

(c) regulating the import, export or transport of any ¹[intoxicant] or hemp ;

(d) regulating the periods and localities for which licenses for the wholesale or retail vend of any ¹[intoxicant] or hemp may be granted ;

(e) providing for the consulting of public opinion and prescribing the procedure to be followed and the matters to be ascertained before any license for such vend is granted for any locality ;

(f) prohibiting the employment by the license-holder of any person or class of persons to assist him in his business in any capacity whatsoever ;

(g) prescribing the persons or classes of persons to whom any ¹[intoxicant] may or may not be sold ;

(h) for the prevention of drunkenness, gambling or disorderly conduct in or near any licensed premises and the meeting or remaining of persons of bad character on such premises ;

(i) regulating the grant of expenses to persons called on to give information in investigations conducted by Abkari officers, and of compensation to persons charged with offences punishable under this Act and acquitted.

(3) The power to make rules under this section shall be subject to the condition of previous publication :

Provided that any such rules may be made without previous publication if ²[the Provincial Government] consider that they should be brought into force at once.]

(c) prescribing in the case of any ¹[intoxicant] the way in which the duty on such article shall be levied;

(d) prescribing the scale of fees or the manner of fixing the fees payable in respect of any privilege, license, permit or pass or of the storing of any ¹[intoxicant] or hemp;

(e) regulating the time, place and manner of payment of any duty or fee;

(f) prescribing the restrictions under and the conditions on which any license, permit or pass may be granted, including—

(i) the prohibition of the admixture with any ¹[intoxicant] of any substance deemed to be noxious or objectionable;

(ii) the fixing of the strength, price or quantity in excess of or below which any ¹[intoxicant] shall not be sold or supplied, and the quantity in excess of which denatured spirit shall not be possessed, and the prescription of a standard of quality for any ¹[intoxicant];

(iii) the prohibition of sale except for cash;

(iv) the prescription of the days and hours during which any licensed premises may or may not be kept open and provision for the closure of such premises on special occasions;

(v) the prescription of the nature of the premises on which any ¹[intoxicant] may be sold and the notices to be exposed at such premises;

(vi) the prescription of the accounts to be maintained and the returns to be submitted by license-holders;

(vii) the regulation or prohibition of the transfer of licenses;

(g) (i) declaring the process by which spirits shall be denatured in the areas to which this Act extends;

(ii) for causing such spirits to be denatured through the agency or under the supervision of ²[servants of the Crown];

(iii) for ascertaining whether such spirits have been denatured;

(h) providing for the destruction or other disposal of any ¹[intoxicant] deemed to be unfit for use;

(i) regulating the disposal of confiscated articles;

(j) prescribing the occasions on which special orders may be granted under section 17 for the sale by retail of larger quantities of country liquor or intoxicating drugs than are prescribed in any notification issued under the said section, and the conditions on which such sales may be made;

136. Any Commissioner or Collector, or other Abkari-officer duly empowered in this behalf, may—

(a) enter and inspect, at any time by day or by night, ²[any land on which toddy-producing trees are growing, whether such trees are licensed for tapping or not, and] any ³[warehouse,] shop or premises in which any licensed manufacturer or vendor carries on the manufacture or sale of ⁴[any ⁵[intoxicant] or hemp] or draws toddy, or stores ⁶[any ⁵[intoxicant] or hemp] and examine, test, measure or weigh any such person's stock of ⁷[any ⁵[intoxicant] or hemp] or materials; or

(b) enter, at any time by day or by night, any building, vessel, ⁸[vehicle] or enclosed place in which he has reason to believe that ⁹[any ⁵[intoxicant] or hemp] liable to confiscation under this Act is manufactured, kept or concealed or that toddy is drawn, or that any still, utensil, implement or apparatus is used, kept or concealed for the purpose of manufacturing ¹⁰[any ⁵[intoxicant]] contrary to the provisions of this Act; and

(c) in case of resistance, break open any door and remove any other obstacle to his entry into any such shop, premises, building, vessel, ⁸[vehicle] or other place; and

(d) seize ¹¹[any ⁵[intoxicant] or hemp] and any material used in the manufacture thereof, and any still, utensil, implement or apparatus, and any other thing which he has reason to believe to be liable to confiscation under this Act, or under any other law for the time being in force relating to abkari-revenue; and

(e) detain and search and, if he think proper, arrest any person whom he has reason to believe to be guilty of any offence under this or any other law for the time being in force relating to abkari-revenue.

37. Any Commissioner or Collector, or other Abkari-officer duly empowered in this behalf, may—

(a) seize in any open place or in transit, any ¹[²intoxicant], hemp] or any other thing which he has reason to believe to be liable to confiscation under this or any other law for the time being in force relating to Abkari-revenue ;

(b) detain and search any person whom he has reason to believe to be guilty of any offence against this or any other such law and, if such person has any ³[²intoxicant], hemp] or other thing in his possession, arrest him.

38. All searches under the two last preceding sections shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

Provided that, if such person is not resident in British India, the bond shall be secured by a surety or sureties resident in British India.

(3) Should the true name and residence of such person not be ascertained within twenty-four hours from the time of arrest or should he fail to execute the bond or, if so required, to furnish sufficient sureties, he shall forthwith be forwarded to the nearest Magistrate having jurisdiction.]

Officers bound to assist.

¹[39. All village officers, all village servants useful to ²[the Provincial Government] and all officers of the departments of Police, Forest, Customs, Salt and Revenue and of the Bombay, ³[and Karachi] Port Trusts, shall be bound—

(a) to give immediate information to an Abkari-officer of the commission of any offence, and of the intention or preparation to commit any offence, under this Act which may come to their knowledge ;

(b) to take all reasonable measures in their power to prevent the commission of any such offence which they may know or have reason to believe is about to be committed ;

(c) to assist any Abkari officer in carrying out the provisions of this Act.]

Duty of landholders and others to give information.

¹[39A. Every owner or occupier of land and the agent of any such owner or occupier of land on which there shall be any manufacture of any ⁴[intoxicant] not licensed under this Act, or the unlawful cultivation or collection of any plant from which an intoxicating drug can be produced, shall in the absence of reasonable excuse be bound to give notice of the same to a Magistrate or to an officer of the departments of Abkari, Police or Revenue immediately the same shall have come to his knowledge.]

Issue of warrants.

40. Any Commissioner, or Collector, or other Abkari officer duly empowered in this behalf, or a Magistrate, may issue a warrant—

(a) for the arrest of any person whom he has reason to believe to have committed an offence against this or any other law relating to Abkari-revenue for the time being in force, or

(b) for the search, whether by day or by night, of any building, vessel or place in which he has reason to believe that any ⁵[⁴[intoxicant] or hemp] is manufactured or sold, or that any toddy is drawn contrary to the provisions of this Act, or that any ⁵[⁴[intoxicant] or hemp] or other thing liable to confiscation under this or any other

law for the time being in force relating to Abkari-revenue is kept or concealed.

All warrants issued under this section shall be executed in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure, by a Police-officer or by an Abkari-officer duly empowered in this behalf, or, if the officer issuing the warrant deems fit, by any other person.

(h) uses, keeps or has in his possession any materials, still, utensil, implement or apparatus whatsoever for the purpose of manufacturing any ¹[intoxicant] other than toddy, or

shall, on conviction, be punished for each such offence with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months, or with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees, or with both :

45. Whoever, being the holder of a license, permit or pass granted under this Act ¹[or a person in the employ of such holder or acting with his express or implied permission on his behalf]—

(a) fails to produce such license, permit or pass on the demand of any ²[duly empowered officer either of the Abkari Department or of any of the departments named in section 39, if such license, permit or pass is in his possession or control], or

(b) wilfully does, or omits to do, anything in contravention of any rules or orders made under this Act, or

(c) ³[wilfully does, or omits to do, anything] in breach of any of the conditions of ⁴[such license, permit or pass] not otherwise provided for in this Act

any person in his employ or acting with his express or implied permission in his behalf under section 43, 44, 45, 45A or 46 as if he himself had committed the same, unless he shall establish that all due and reasonable precautions were exercised by him to prevent the commission of such offence :

Provided that no person other than the actual offender shall be punished with imprisonment except in default of payment of fine.]

For maliciously giving false information.

48. Whoever maliciously gives false information that any person has committed, or been concerned in, any offence against this Act, with the intent that such person be arrested, or that any building, vessel or other place be searched to the injury or annoyance of such person or of any other person, shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months, or with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees, or with both.

For vexatious search or arrest.

49. Any Abkari or other officer who, without reasonable ground of suspicion, enters or searches, or causes to be searched, any building, vessel or place,

or vexatiously and unnecessarily seizes the property of any person on the pretence of seizing or searching for anything liable to confiscation under this Act,

or vexatiously and unnecessarily detains, searches or arrests any person, shall, for every such offence, be punished with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

Failure of Abkari-officer in duty.

acts in any manner inconsistent with his duty for the purpose of enabling any person to do anything whereby any of the provisions of this Act may be evaded or broken, or the Abkari-revenue defrauded,

and any officer ^{1*} * * named in section 39 invested with local jurisdiction who connives at the commission of any offence against this Act in any place within his jurisdiction,

shall, for every such offence, be punished with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees, or with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months, or with both.

52. Any officer ^{2*} * * named in section 39 who, without lawful excuse, neglects or refuses to ³[give information or to take preventive measures or to give assistance to an Abkari-officer in the manner required by the said section] shall be punished with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

XII.—MISCELLANEOUS.

67. No action shall lie against ¹[the Crown] or against any Abkari-^{Bar o} officer for damages in any Civil Court for any act *bona fide* done or ordered to be done by them in pursuance of this Act, or of any law at the time in force relating to Abkari-revenue ;

(a) if the plaintiff does not prove that, previously to bringing such action, he has presented all such appeals allowed by this Act, or by any other law for the time being in force, as within the aforesaid period of four months it was possible to present ; or,

(b) in the case of an action for damages, if tender of sufficient amends shall have been made before the action was brought, or if after the institution of the action a sufficient sum of money is paid into Court with costs, by or on behalf of the defendant :

Provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the power or jurisdiction of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature or of the Court of Small Causes at Bombay.

CHAPTER I.

PRELIMINARY.

CHAPTER II.

CONSTITUTION AND POWERS OF REVENUE OFFICERS.

Chief controlling authority in revenue matters.

4. The chief controlling authority in all matters connected with the land revenue is vested in the Commissioner, subject to the ¹[Provincial Government].

Extent of territories under the Commissioners.

There shall be one or more Commissioners as the ¹[Provincial Government], ²* * * * may direct; and the ¹[Provincial Government] shall prescribe what territories are to be under the control of each, whether generally or for any specific purpose, and may from time to time alter the limits of such territories, all orders made on this behalf being duly notified.

The territories under a Commissioner to be a division.

The territories under each Commissioner shall form, and be called, a division; ³* * *

Appointments and duties of Commissioners.

5. The Commissioners shall be appointed by the ¹[Provincial Government] and shall exercise the powers and discharge the duties conferred and imposed on a Commissioner under this Act, or under any other law for the time being in force, and so far as is consistent therewith all such other powers, or duties of appeal, superintendence and control within their respective divisions, and over the officers subordinate to them as may from time to time be prescribed by ⁵[the Provincial Government].

Assistants to Commissioners.

6. Each Commissioner shall have such number of assistants as the ¹[Provincial Government] may from time to time sanction, their appointment being made by the ¹[Provincial Government]. Assistants so appointed shall perform such duties as the Commissioners to whom they are respectively subordinate may from time to time direct.

7. Each division, under the control of the Commissioner, shall be divided into such ^{1*} * districts with such limits as may from time to time be prescribed by a duly published order of the ²[Provincial Government].

Division to be divided into districts.

And each such district shall consist of such ^{1*} * talukas, and each taluka shall consist of such ^{1*} * mahals and villages, as may from time to time be prescribed in a duly published order of the ²[Provincial Government].

A district to consist of talukas comprising such mahals and villages as Provincial Government may direct.

3* * * * *

8. The ²[Provincial Government] shall appoint in each district an officer who shall be the Collector ^{4*} * * and who shall be subordinate to the Commissioner of his division and may exercise, throughout his district, all the powers, and discharge all the duties conferred and imposed on a Collector or an Assistant or Deputy Collector by this Act, or any other law for the time being in force, and in all matters not specially provided for by law shall act according to the instructions of ⁵[the Provincial Government].

Collector of the District.

9. The ²[Provincial Government] may appoint to each district so many Assistant Collectors and so many Deputy Collectors as ⁶[it] may deem expedient; the Assistants shall be called "First," "Second," "Supernumerary," etc., as may be expressed in the order of their appointment.

Assistant and Deputy Collector;

All such Assistant and Deputy Collectors and all other officers employed in the land revenue administration of the district shall be subordinate to the Collector.

to be subordinate to the Collector.

10. Subject to the general orders of ⁵[the Provincial Government], a Collector may place any of his assistants or deputies in charge of the revenue administration of one or more of the talukas in his district, or may himself retain charge thereof.

Their duties and powers.

Any Assistant or Deputy Collector thus placed in charge shall, subject to the provisions of Chapter XIII ^{7*} * *, perform all the duties and exercise all the powers conferred upon a Collector ^{8*} * * by this Act or any other law at the time being in force, so far as regards the taluka or talukas in his charge :

Provided that the Collector may, whenever he may deem fit, direct any such Assistant or Deputy not to perform certain duties or exercise certain powers, and may reserve the same to himself or assign them to any other Assistant or Deputy subordinate to him.

To such Assistant or Deputy Collector as it may not be possible or expedient to place in charge of talukas, the Collector shall, under the general orders of ¹[the Provincial Government], assign such particular duties and powers as he may from time to time see fit.

Collector of the district in case of temporary vacancy.

11. If the Collector is disabled from performing his duties, or for any reason vacates his office or leaves his district, or dies, his Assistant of highest rank present in the district shall, unless other provision has been made by ¹[the Provincial Government], succeed temporarily to his office, and shall be held to be the Collector ²* * * under this Act until the Collector resumes charge of his district, or until the ³[Provincial Government] appoints a successor to the former Collector and such successor takes charge of his appointment.

An officer whose principal office is different from that of an Assistant Collector, and who is an Assistant Collector for special purposes only, shall not be deemed to be an Assistant for the purposes of this section.

The Mamlatdar; his appointment.

12. The chief officer entrusted with the local revenue administration of a taluka shall be called a Mamlatdar. He shall be appointed by the ⁴[Provincial Government].

His duties and powers.

His duties and powers shall be such as may be expressly imposed or conferred upon him by this Act, or by any other law for the time being in force, or as may be imposed upon, or delegated to, him by the Collector under the general or special orders of ¹[the Provincial Government].

The Mahalkari; his duties and powers.

13. Whenever it may appear necessary to the ³[Provincial Government], the ⁶[Provincial Government] may ⁷[appoint to a taluka one or

more Mahalkaris] and, subject to the orders of ¹[the Provincial Government] and of the Commissioner, the Collector may ²[assign to a Mahalkari] within his local limits such of the duties and powers of a Mamlatdar as he may from time to time see fit, and may also from time to time direct whether the Mahalkari's immediate superior shall, for the purposes of section 203 ³* * *, be deemed to be the Mamlatdar or the Assistant or Deputy Collector, or the Collector in charge of the taluka.

14. It shall be competent to a Mamlatdar or Mahalkari, subject to such general orders as may from time to time be passed by the Commissioner or by the Collector, to employ any of his subordinates to perform any portion of his ministerial duties: provided that all acts and orders of his subordinates when so employed shall be liable to revision and confirmation by such Mamlatdar or Mahalkari.

Mamlatdar or Mahalkari may depute subordinates to perform certain of his duties.

* * * * *

15. If a Mamlatdar or Mahalkari is disabled from performing his duties, or for any reason vacates his office, or leaves his taluka or mahal, or dies, such subordinate as may be designated by orders to be issued from time to time on this behalf by the Collector, shall succeed temporarily to the said Mamlatdar's or Mahalkari's office, and shall be held to be the Mamlatdar or Mahalkari under this Act until the Mamlatdar or Mahalkari resumes charge of his taluka or mahal, or until such time as a successor is duly appointed and takes charge of his appointment.

Mamlatdar or Mahalkari in case of temporary vacancy.

16. In villages where no hereditary Patel or Village Accountant exists, it shall be lawful for ⁶[the Provincial Government] to appoint a stipendiary Patel or a Village Accountant who shall perform respectively all the duties of hereditary Patels or Village Accountants as hereinafter prescribed in this Act or in any other law for the time being in force, and shall hold their situations under the rules in force with regard to subordinate revenue officers.

Stipendiary Patel and Village Accountant to be appointed where no hereditary Patel or Village Accountant exists.

Saving the rights of holders of alienated villages.

Nothing in this section shall be held to affect any subsisting rights of holders of alienated villages or others in respect of the appointment of Patels and Village Accountants in any alienated or other villages.

Village Accountant to keep such records as he may be required to keep by the Collector; and to prepare public writings.

17. Subject to the general orders of ²[the Provincial Government] and of the Commissioner, the Collector shall prescribe from time to time what registers, accounts, and other records shall be kept by the Village Accountant ³* * *

It shall also be the duty of the Village Accountant to prepare, whenever called upon by the Patel of his village, or by any superior Revenue or Police officer of the taluka or district to do so, all writings connected with the concerns of the village which are required either for the use of ⁴[the Central or the Provincial Government] or the public, such as notices, reports of inquests, and depositions and examinations in criminal matters.

Survey Officers;

18. For the purposes of Chapters VIII, IX and X ⁵* * *, the ⁶[Provincial Government] may appoint such officers as may from time to time appear necessary. Such officers shall be designated "Commissioner of Survey," "Superintendent of Survey," "Survey Settlement Officers," and "Assistant," or otherwise as may seem requisite, and shall be subordinated the one to the other in such order as the ⁶[Provincial Government] may direct.

their duties and powers.

Subject to the orders of the ⁶[Provincial Government] the officers so appointed are vested with the cognizance of all matters connected with survey and settlement, and shall exercise all such powers and perform all such duties as may be prescribed by this or any other law for the time being in force.

Combination of offices.

19. It shall be lawful for the ⁶[Provincial Government] to appoint one and the same person, being otherwise competent according to law, to any two or more of the offices provided for in this chapter or to

confer upon an officer of one denomination all or any of the powers or duties of any other officer or officers within certain local limits or otherwise as may seem expedient.

20. The appointment of all officers mentioned in sections 4 to 13 and 18 and 19 shall be duly notified. Certain officers' appointments to be notified.

Any officer appointed to act temporarily for any such officer shall exercise the same powers and perform the same duties as might be performed or exercised by the officer for whom he is so appointed to act. Acting appointments.

22. The ¹[Provincial Government] shall from time to time by notification prescribe what revenue officers shall use a seal, and what size and description of seal shall be used by each of such officers. Seals.

CHAPTER III.

OF THE SECURITY TO BE FURNISHED BY CERTAIN REVENUE OFFICERS AND THE LIABILITY OF PRINCIPALS AND SURETIES.

23. [Governor in Council to direct what officers shall furnish security, and to what amount]. Omitted by the Adaptation of Indian Laws Order in Council.

24. [Fresh or additional Security.] Omitted by the Adaptation of Indian Laws Order in Council.

25. The Collector or the Superintendent of Survey or any other officer deputed by the Collector or Superintendent of Survey for this purpose shall, in all cases in which he may have a claim on any revenue officer or on any person formerly employed as such in his department or district for public money or papers or other ³[property of the Crown], by writing under his official seal, if he use one, and signature, require the money, or the particular papers or property detained to be delivered either immediately to the person bearing the said writing, or to such person on such date and at such place as the writing may specify. Demands for money, papers etc., to be made known in writing to the person concerned ;

If the officer or other person aforesaid shall not discharge the money, or deliver up the papers or property as directed, he may cause him to be apprehended, and may send him with a warrant, in the form of Schedule C, to be confined in the civil jail till he discharges the sums or delivers up the papers or property demanded from him : who may be arrested and confined in jail if he fail to produce them.

Provided that no person shall be kept in confinement for more than a month.

Provided that no person shall be detained in confinement by virtue of any such warrant for a longer period than one calendar month.

Public moneys may also be recovered as arrears of revenue ;

26. The Collector of his own motion, if the officer or other person is or was serving in his department and district, and upon the application of the Superintendent of Survey, if such officer or person is or was serving in the survey department in his district, may also take proceedings to recover any public moneys due by him in the same manner and subject to the same rules as are laid down in this Act for the recovery of arrears of land revenue from defaulters, and for the purpose of recovering public papers or other property ¹[of the Crown] may issue a search warrant and exercise all such powers with respect thereto as may be lawfully exercised by a Magistrate under the provisions of Chapter VII of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

and search warrant may be issued for recovery of papers or property.

Persons in possession of public moneys, etc., bound to give them up.

It shall be the duty of all persons in possession of such public moneys, papers or other property ¹[of the Crown] to make over the same forthwith to the Collector, and every person knowing where any such property is concealed shall be bound to give information of the same to the Collector.

Surety to be liable in the same manner as principal.

27. The surety or sureties of such officer or other person as is aforesaid, ²* * * * shall be liable to be proceeded against jointly and severally in the same manner as his or their principal is liable to be proceeded against, in case of default, and notwithstanding such principal may be so proceeded against :

Extent of liability.

Provided always that in any case of failure to discharge or make good any sum of money due to ³[the Crown] or to produce any property of ³[the Crown] of ascertained value no greater sum than is sufficient to cover any loss or damage which the ⁴[Provincial Government] may actually sustain by the default of the principal, shall be recovered from the surety or sureties as the amount which may be due from such surety or sureties under the terms of the security bond executed by him or them :

Sureties not liable to imprisonment, if penalty be paid.

And provided also that the said surety or sureties shall in no case be liable to imprisonment in default of producing public papers or property, if he or they pay into the Government treasury the whole or such part of the penalty named in the bond as may be demanded.

28. If an officer or other person as aforesaid or his surety or sureties against whom a demand is made, shall give sufficient security in the form of Schedule D, the Collector shall cause such officer or surety if in custody to be liberated, and countermand the sale of any property that may have been attached, and restore it to the owner.

An officer or surety in jail may, by furnishing certain security, obtain his release.

29. The liability of the surety or sureties shall not be affected by the death of a principal, or by his appointment to a situation different from that which he held when the bond was executed, but shall continue so long as the principal occupies any situation in which security is required
1* * * * and until his bond is cancelled.

Liability of surety not affected by death of principal or by his taking a different appointment.

The heirs of a deceased officer shall be liable by suit in the Civil Court for any claims which ²[the Crown] may have against the deceased, in the same way as they would be for similar claims made by an individual.

Liability of heirs of deceased officer.

30. Any surety, whether under a separate or joint bond, may withdraw from his suretyship at any time on his stating, in writing, to the officer to whom the bond has been given, that he desires so to withdraw ; and his responsibility under the bond shall cease after sixty days from the date on which he gives such writing as to all demands upon his principal concerning moneys, papers or other property for which his principal may become chargeable after the expiration of such period of sixty days, but shall not cease as to any demands for which his principal may have become liable before the expiration of such period, even though the facts establishing such liability may not be discovered till afterwards.

How surety may withdraw from further liability.

CHAPTER V.

OF LAND AND LAND REVENUE.

³[37. (1)] All public roads, lanes and paths, the bridges, ditches, dikes, and fences, on, or beside, the same, the bed of the sea and of harbours and creeks below high-water-mark, and of rivers, streams, nallas, lakes, and tanks, and all canals, and water-courses, and all standing and flowing water, and all lands wherever situated, which are not the property of individuals, or of aggregates of persons legally capable of

All public roads, etc. and all lands which are not the property of others, belong to the Crown.

holding property, and except in so far as any rights of such persons may be established in or over the same, and except as may be otherwise provided in any law for the time being in force are and are hereby declared to be, with all rights in or over the same, or appertaining thereto, the property of ¹[the Crown], and it shall be lawful for the Collector, subject to the orders of the Commissioner, to dispose of them in such manner as he may deem fit, or as may be authorized by general rules sanctioned by ²[the Government concerned], subject always to the rights of way, and all other rights of the public or of individuals legally subsisting.

Explanation.—In this section “high-water-mark” means the highest point reached by ordinary spring-tides at any season of the year.

³[(2) Where any property or any right in or over any property is claimed by or on behalf of ¹[the Crown] or by any person as against ¹[the Crown], it shall be lawful for the Collector or a survey officer, after formal inquiry of which due notice has been given, to pass an order deciding the claim.]

³[(3) Any suit instituted in any Civil Court after the expiration of one year from the date of any order passed ⁴* * * under sub-section (1) or sub-section (2), or, if one or more appeals have been made against such order within the period of limitation, then from the date of any order passed by the final appellate authority, as determined according to section 204, shall be dismissed (although limitation has not been set up as a defence) if the suit is brought to set aside such order or if the relief claimed is inconsistent with such order, provided that in the case of an order under sub-section (2) the plaintiff has had due notice of such order.]

Extinction of rights of public and individuals in or over any public road, lane or path not required for use of public.

37A. (1) Whenever it appears to the ⁶[Provincial Government] that any public road, lane or path which is the property of ⁸[the Crown for the purposes of the Province] or part thereof, is not required for the use of the public, the ⁶[Provincial Government] may, by a notification published

in the ¹[Official Gazette], make a declaration to such effect, stating in such declaration that it is proposed that the rights of the public as well as of all individuals in or over any such road, lane or path, or part thereof, as the case may be, shall be extinguished. On the publication of such notification, the Collector shall, as soon as possible, cause public notice of such declaration to be given at convenient places on, or in the vicinity of, such road, lane or path, or part thereof, as the case may be. Such declaration and notice shall specify, as far as practicable the situation and limits of such road, lane or path, or part thereof, and shall invite objections to the aforesaid proposal.

(2) Any member of the public or any person having any interest or right, in addition to the right of public highway, in or over such road, lane or path, or part thereof, or having any other interest or right which is likely to be adversely affected by the proposal may, within ninety days after the issue of the notification under sub-section (1), state to the Collector in writing his objections to the proposal, the nature of such interest or right and the manner in which it is likely to be adversely affected, and the amount and particulars of his claim to compensation for such interest or right :

Provided that the Collector may allow any person to make such a statement after the period of ninety days after the issue of the notification under sub-section (1) if he is satisfied that such person had sufficient cause for not making it within the said period.

(3) The Collector shall give every person who has made a statement to him under sub-section (2) an opportunity of being heard either in person or by pleader and shall, after hearing all such persons in such manner and after making such further inquiry, if any, as he thinks necessary, determine the amount of compensation, if any, which should, in his opinion, be given in any case in respect of any substantial loss or damage likely to be caused by the proposed extinction of the rights of the public as well as of individuals as aforesaid. The provisions of sections 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of the Land Acquisition Act, 1894, shall, so far as may be, apply to the proceedings held by the Collector for the determination of the amount of compensation under this sub-section :

I of
1894.

Provided that no compensation shall be awarded for the extinction or diminution of the right of public highway over such road, lane or path, or part thereof.

(4) The Collector shall submit to the ²[Provincial Government] the record of the proceedings held by him with a report containing his recommendations on the objections, if any, received by him and stating the amounts of compensation, if any, which, in his opinion, are payable to any persons.

(5) If the ¹[Provincial Government] is satisfied, after considering the record of the proceedings and the report, if any, made under sub-section (4), that the public road, lane or path, or part thereof specified in the notification under sub-section (1) is not required for the use of the public, a declaration shall be published in the ²[Official Gazette] that all rights of the public as well as of individuals in or over such road, lane or path, or part thereof are extinguished; and all such rights shall thereupon be extinguished, and such road, lane or path, or part thereof shall be at the disposal of ³[the Crown] with effect from the date of such declaration.

(6) The decision of the Collector regarding the amount of compensation and the person to whom such compensation, if any, is payable, shall, subject to any modification made by the ¹[Provincial Government], be final; and payments shall be made by the Collector to such persons accordingly.

Lands may be assigned for special purposes, and when assigned shall not be otherwise used without sanction of the Collector.

38. Subject to the general orders of ⁴[the Provincial Government], it shall be lawful for survey officers whilst survey operations are proceeding under Chapter VIII ⁵* * *, and at any other time for the ⁶[Collector], to set apart lands the ⁷[property of the Crown for the purposes of the Province] and not in the lawful occupation of any person or aggregate of persons, in unalienated villages or unalienated portions of villages, for free pasturage for the village cattle, for forest reserves, or for any other public or municipal purpose; and lands assigned specially for any such purpose shall not be otherwise ⁸[used] without the sanction of the ⁶[Collector]; and in the disposal of land under section 37 due regard shall be had to all such special assignments.

Regulation of use of pasturage.

39. The right of grazing on free pasturage-lands shall extend only to the cattle of the village or villages to which such lands belong or have been assigned, and shall be regulated by rules to be from time to time, either generally or in any particular instance, prescribed by the Collector with the sanction of the Commissioner. The Collector's decision in any case of dispute as to the said right of grazing shall be conclusive.

40. In villages, or portions of villages, of which the original survey settlement has been completed before the passing of this Act, the right of ^{Concession of Crown rights to trees in case of settlements completed before the passing of this Act.} ¹[the Crown] to all trees in unalienated land, except trees reserved by ¹[the Crown] or by any survey officer, whether by express order made at, or about the time of such settlement, or under any rule, or general order in force at the time of such settlement, or by notification made and published at, or at any time after, such settlement, shall be deemed to have been conceded to the occupant. But in the case of settlements completed before the passing of ²Bombay Act I of 1865 this provision shall not apply to teak, black-wood or sandal-wood trees. The right of ¹[the Crown] to such trees shall not be deemed to have been conceded, except by clear and express words to that effect.

In the case of villages or portions of villages of which the original survey settlement shall be completed after the passing of this Act, the right of ¹[the Crown] to all trees in unalienated land shall be deemed to be conceded to the occupant of such land except in so far as any such rights may be reserved by ¹[the Crown], or by any survey officer on behalf of ¹[the Crown], either expressly at or about the time of such settlement, or generally by notification made and published at any time previous to the completion of the survey settlement of the district in which such village or portion of a village is situate. ^{Concession of Crown rights to trees in case of settlements completed after the passing of this Act.}

When permission to occupy land has been, or shall hereafter be, granted after the completion of the survey settlement of the village or portion of a village in which such land is situate, the said permission shall be deemed to include the concession of the right of ¹[the Crown] to all trees growing on that land which may not have been, or which shall not hereafter be, expressly reserved at the time of granting such permission, or which may not have been reserved, under any of the foregoing provisions of this section, at or about the time of the original survey settlement of the said village or portion of a village. ^{Concession of Crown rights to trees in case of land taken up after completion of settlement.}

41. The right to all trees specially reserved under the provision of the last preceding section, and to all trees, brushwood, jungle, or other natural product growing on land set apart for forest reserves under section 32 of Bombay Act I of 1865 ²or section 38 of this Act, and to all trees, brushwood, jungle or other natural product, wherever growing, except in so far as the same may be the property of individuals or of aggregates of individuals capable of holding property, vests in ³[the Crown for the purposes of the Province]; and such trees, brushwood, jungle or ^{Trees and forests vesting in the Crown.}

other natural product shall be preserved or disposed of in such manner as ¹[the Provincial Government] may from time to time direct.

Road-side trees.

42. ²[All road-side trees which have been planted and reared by, or under the orders of, or at the expense of, ³[the Crown], and all trees which have been planted and reared at the expense of Local Funds by the side of any road, which vests in ³[the Crown], vest in ³[the Crown].] But in the event of such trees dying, or being blown down, or being cut down by order of the Collector, the timber shall become the property of the holder of the land in which they were growing; and the usufruct, including the loppings of such trees, shall also vest in the said holder; provided that the trees shall not be lopped except under the orders of the Collector.

* * * * *

Recovery of value of trees, etc., unauthor- izedly appropriated.

43. Any person who shall unauthorizably fell and appropriate any tree or any portion thereof or remove ⁵[from his holdings] any other natural product ⁵[whether of the like description or not] which is the property of ³[the Crown], shall be liable to ³[the Crown] for the value thereof, which shall be recoverable from him as an arrear of land revenue, in addition to any penalty to which he may be liable under the provisions of this Act for the occupation of the land or otherwise; and notwithstanding any criminal proceedings which may be instituted against him in respect of his said appropriation of ⁶[Crown] property.

The decision of the Collector as to the value of any such tree, or portion thereof, or other natural product, shall be conclusive.

Regulation of supply of fire-wood and timber for domestic or other purposes.

44. In villages or lands in which the rights of ³[the Crown] to the trees have been reserved under section 40 subject to certain privileges of the villagers or of certain classes or persons to cut fire-wood or timber for domestic or other purposes, and in lands which have been set apart under section 38 for forest reserves subject to such privileges, and in all other cases in which such privileges exist in respect of any alienated land, the exercise of the said privileges shall be regulated by rules to be from time to time, either generally or in any particular instance, prescribed by the Collector or by such other officer as ¹[the Provincial Government] may direct. In any case of dispute as to the mode or time of exercising any such privileges the decision of the Collector or of such other officer shall be conclusive.

45. All land, whether applied to agricultural or other purposes, and wherever situate, is liable to the payment of land revenue to ¹[the Crown] according to the rules hereinafter enacted except such as may be wholly exempted under the provisions of any special contract with ¹[the Crown] or any law for the time being in force.

All land liable to pay revenue unless specially exempted.

But nothing in this Act shall be deemed to affect the power of the Legislature to direct the levy of revenue on all lands under whatever title they may be held whenever and so long as the exigencies of the State may render such levy necessary.

And special exemption may in case of necessity be overruled for a time.

46. All alluvial lands, newly-formed islands, or abandoned river-beds which vest, under any law for the time being in force in any holder of alienated land, shall be subject in respect of liability to the payment of land revenue to the same privileges, conditions, or restrictions as are applicable to the original holding in virtue of which such lands, islands, or river-beds so vest in the said holder, but no revenue shall be leviable in respect of any such lands, islands, or river-beds until or unless the area of the same exceeds half an acre and also exceeds one-tenth of the area of the said original holding.

Liability of alluvial lands to land revenue.

47. Every holder of land paying revenue in respect thereof shall be entitled, subject to such rules as may be from time to time made in this behalf by the ²[Provincial Government], to a decrease of assessment if any portion thereof, not being less than half an acre in extent, ³* * * is lost by diluvion.

Assessment of land revenue in cases of diluvion.

4* * * * *

⁵48. (1) The land revenue leviable on any land under the provisions of this Act shall be assessed, or shall be deemed to have been assessed, as the case may be, with reference to the use of the land—

Manner of assessment and alteration of assessment. Prohibition of use of land for certain purposes.

(a) for the purpose of agriculture,

(b) for the purpose of building, and

(c) for a purpose other than agriculture or building.

(2) Where land assessed for use for any purpose is used for any other purpose, the assessment fixed under the provisions of this Act upon such land shall, notwithstanding that the term for which such assessment may have been fixed has not expired, be liable to be altered and fixed at a different rate by such authority and subject to such rules as the ²[Provincial Government] may prescribe in this behalf.

(3) Where land held free of assessment on condition of being used for any purpose is used at any time for any other purpose, it shall be liable to assessment.

(4) The Collector or a survey officer may, subject to any rules made in this behalf under section 214, prohibit the use for certain purposes of any unalienated land liable to the payment of land revenue, and may summarily evict any holder who uses or attempts to use the same for any such prohibited purpose.]

Commuted assessment of land indirectly taxed to the State, and of land liable to occasional assessment.

49. When it has been customary to levy any special or extra cess, fine, or tax, however designated, from any holder of land, which, though nominally wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land revenue, has by the exaction of such cess, fine, or tax been indirectly taxed to the State,

or when any land ordinarily, or under certain circumstances, wholly or partially exempt from assessment, is subject occasionally, or under particular circumstances, to the payment of assessment, or of any cess or tax however designated,

the said assessment, cess, fine, or tax may be commuted into an annual assessment on the land to be paid under all circumstances, but such commuted assessment shall not exceed such amount as the Commissioner shall deem to be a fair equivalent of the assessment, cess, fine, or tax for which it is substituted and shall not be in excess of the assessment to which the land would be ordinarily subject, if no right to exemption existed in respect thereof.

Superior holder may recover commuted assessment from inferior holder.

50. Whenever any such cess, fine, or tax hitherto payable by an inferior holder shall be made leviable from the superior holder, it shall be lawful for such superior holder to recover from such inferior holder the amount of the commuted assessment fixed in lieu of such cess, fine or tax.

Excess of assessment may be laid on land inadequately assessed held with it.

51. When it has been customary to levy a larger revenue under the name of "*veta*" or any other designation, upon any portion of land than such portion would ordinarily be liable to in consideration of other land being held with it which is wholly or partially exempt from payment of revenue, the excess of revenue payable on the said portion of land may be charged upon the land hitherto held wholly or partially exempt.

Assessment by whom to be fixed.

¹[52. On all lands which are not wholly exempt from the payment of land revenue, ²[and] on which the assessment has not been fixed under the provisions of section 102 or 106, the assessment of the amount to be paid as land revenue shall, subject to rules ^{3*} * made in this behalf under section 214, be fixed at the discretion of the Collector, for such

period as he may, 1* * * * be authorized to prescribe, and the amounts due according to such assessment shall be levied on all such lands :

Provided that in the case of lands partially exempt from land revenue, ^{Proviso.} or the liability of which to payment of land revenue is subject to special conditions or restrictions, respect shall be had in the fixing of the assessment and the levy of the revenue to all rights legally subsisting, according to the nature of the said rights.^{2]}

53. A Register shall be kept by the Collector in such form as may ^{Register of alienated lands.} from time to time be prescribed by the ³[Provincial Government] of all lands, the alienation of which has been established or recognized under the provisions of any law for the time being in force ; and when it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the Collector that any sanad granted in relation to any such alienated lands has been permanently lost or destroyed, he may, subject to the rules and the payment of the fees prescribed by the ³[Provincial Government] under section 213, grant to any person whom he may deem entitled to the same a certified extract from the said Register, which shall be endorsed by the Collector to the effect that it has been issued in lieu of the sanad said to have been lost or destroyed, and shall be deemed to be as valid a proof of title as the said sanad.

54. The settlement of the assessment of each portion of land, or survey number, to the land revenue, shall be made with the person who, ^{Settlement of assessment to be made with the holder directly from Provincial Government.} under section 136, is primarily responsible to ⁴[the Provincial Govern-ment] for the same.

5* * * * *

55. The ³[Provincial Government] may authorize the Collector or the officer in charge of a survey or such other officer as ⁶[it] deems fit to fix such rates as ⁶[it] may from time to time deem fit to sanction, for the use, by land-holders and other persons, of water, the right to which vests in ⁷[the Crown], ⁸[and in respect of which no rate is leviable under the Bombay Irrigation Act, 1879]. Such rates shall be liable to ^{Rates for the use of water.}

revision at such periods as ¹[the Provincial Government] shall from time to time determine, and shall be recoverable as land revenue.

Land revenue to be a paramount charge on the land.

56. Arrears of land revenue due on account of land by any landholder shall be a paramount charge on the holding and every part thereof, failure in payment of which shall make the occupancy or alienated holding together with all rights of the occupant or holder over all trees, crops, buildings and things attached to the land or permanently fastened to anything attached to the land, liable to forfeiture, whereupon the Collector may levy all sums in arrear by sale of the occupancy or alienated holding, ²* * * or may otherwise dispose of such occupancy or alienated holding under rules ³* * * made in this behalf under section 214, ⁴[and such occupancy or alienated holding when disposed of, whether by sale as aforesaid, or by restoration to the defaulter, or by transfer to another person or otherwise howsoever, shall, unless the Collector otherwise directs, be deemed to be freed from all tenures, rights, incumbrances and equities theretofore created in favour of any person other than ⁵[the Crown] in respect of such occupancy or holding].

Forfeited holdings may be taken possession of and otherwise disposed.

57. It shall be lawful for the Collector in the event of the forfeiture of a holding through any default in payment or other failure occasioning such forfeiture under the last section or any law for the time being in force, to take immediate possession of ⁶* * * * such holding, and to dispose of the same by placing it in the possession of the purchaser or other person entitled to hold it according to the provisions of this Act or any other law for the time being in force.

Receipts.

⁷[58. (1) Every revenue officer and every hereditary patel and every hereditary village accountant receiving payment of land revenue shall give a written receipt for the same.

(2) Every superior holder of an alienated village or of an alienated share of a village who is entitled to recover direct from an inferior holder any sum due on account of rent or land revenue shall give to such inferior holder a written receipt for the same.

(3) Every hereditary patel and hereditary accountant who receives, in behalf of a superior holder of an alienated village or of an alienated share

of a village, any rent or land revenue from an inferior holder shall give to such inferior holder a written receipt for the same. Such receipts shall be a full discharge to such inferior holder for such rent or land revenue as against such superior holder. A copy of such receipts shall in every case be sent to the superior holder by such patel or accountant.]

59. Any person convicted of a breach of the provisions of the last preceding section after summary inquiry before the Collector shall be liable to a fine not exceeding three times the amount received for which a receipt was not duly granted, and one-half of the fine may, at the discretion of the Collector, be paid to the informer, if any. Such inquiry may at any time be instituted by the Collector of his own motion without any complaint being preferred to him.

Penalty for failure to grant receipts.

CHAPTER VI.

¹[OF THE GRANT, USE AND RELINQUISHMENT OF UNALIENATED LAND.]

60. Any person desirous of taking up unoccupied land which has not been alienated must, previously to entering upon occupation, obtain the permission in writing of the Mamlatdar or Mahalkari.

Written permission of Mamlatdar or Mahalkari required previous to taking up unoccupied land.

61. ²[Any person who shall unauthorizedly enter upon occupation of any land set apart for any special purpose, or any unoccupied land which has not been alienated, and any person who uses or occupies any such land to the use or occupation of which by reason of any of the provisions of this Act he is not entitled or has ceased to be entitled shall,]

Penalties for unauthorized occupation of land.

if the land which he unauthorizedly occupies forms part of an assessed survey number, pay the assessment of the entire number for the whole period of his ³[unauthorized] occupation, and

if the land so occupied by him has not been assessed, such amount of assessment as would be leviabie for the said period in the same village on the same extent of similar land ⁴[used for] the same purpose ;

and shall also be liable, at the discretion of the Collector, to a fine not exceeding five rupees, or a sum equal to ten times the amount of assessment payable by him for one year, if such sum be in excess of five rupees, if he have taken up the land for purposes of cultivation, and not exceeding such limit as may be fixed in rules ^{1*} * * made in this behalf under section 214, if he have ²[used it for] any non-agricultural purpose.

The Collector's decision as to the amount of assessment payable for the land unauthorizedly occupied shall be conclusive, and in determining its amount occupation for ³[a portion] of a year shall be counted as for a whole year.

The person unauthorizedly occupying any such land may be summarily evicted by the Collector, and any crop ^{4*} * * * raised in the land shall be liable to forfeiture, and any building or other construction ^{4*} * * * erected thereon shall also, if not removed by him after such written notice as the Collector may deem reasonable, be liable to forfeiture, ⁵[or to summary removal.]

Forfeitures under this section shall be adjudged by the Collector, and any property so forfeited shall be disposed of as the Collector may direct ⁶[and the cost of the removal of any encroachment under this section shall be recoverable as an arrear of land-revenue].

Unoccupied land may be granted on conditions.

⁶[62. It shall be lawful for the Collector subject to such rules as may from time to time be made by the ⁷[Provincial Government] in this behalf, to require the payment of a price for unalienated land or to sell the same by auction, and to annex such conditions to the grant as he may deem fit, before permission to occupy is given under section 60. The price (if any) paid for such land shall include the price of the ⁸[Crown] right to all trees not specially reserved under the provisions of section 40, and shall be recoverable as an arrear of land revenue.]

Grant of alluvial land vesting in the Crown.

The price of the land so offered shall not exceed three times the annual assessment thereof.

If the said occupant shall refuse the offer, the Collector may dispose of the land without any restrictions as to the price to be asked.

For the purpose of this section, notwithstanding anything contained in section 3, if the bank or shore has been mortgaged with possession, the mortgagor shall be deemed to be the occupant thereof.]

64. When alluvial land forms on any bank or shore, the occupant, if any, of such bank or shore shall be entitled to the temporary use thereof unless or until the area of the same exceeds ^{1*}[one] acre * * . When the area of the alluvial land exceeds the said extent, it shall be at the disposal of the Collector subject to the provisions of the last preceding section.

Temporary right to alluvial lands of small extent.

4* * * * *

65. An occupant of land ⁵[assessed or held for the purpose of agriculture] is entitled by himself, his servants, tenants, agents, or other legal representatives, to erect farm-buildings, construct wells or tanks, or make any other improvements thereon for the better cultivation of the land, or its more convenient ⁶[use for the purpose aforesaid].

Uses to which occupant of land for purposes of agriculture may put his land.

But, if any occupant ⁷[wishes to use his holding or any part thereof for any other purpose] the Collector's permission shall in the first place be applied for by the ^{8*} occupant.

Procedure if occupant wishes to apply his land to any other purpose.

(b) may, after due inquiry, either grant or refuse the permission applied for :

shall, if the Collector sends a written acknowledgment within seven days from the date of receipt of the application, be reckoned from the date of the acknowledgment, but in any other case it shall be reckoned from the date of receipt of the application.]

Unless the Collector shall in particular instances otherwise direct, no such application shall be recognized except it be made by the ^{1*} occupant.

Fine to be levied for such use in addition to special assessment.

When any such land is thus ²[permitted to be used for any purpose unconnected with agriculture] it shall be lawful for the Collector, subject to the general orders of ³[the Provincial Government], to require the payment of a fine in addition to any new assessment which may be leviable under the provisions of section 48.

Penalty for so using land without permission.

66. If any such land be so ⁴[used] without the permission of the Collector being first obtained, or before the expiry of ⁵[the period prescribed by section 65], the occupant and any tenant, or other person holding under or through him, shall be liable to be summarily evicted by the Collector from the land so ⁴[used] and from the entire field or survey number of which it may form a part, and the ^{6*} occupant shall also be liable to pay, in addition to the new assessment which may be leviable under the provisions of section 48 for the period during which the said land has been so ⁴[used], such fine as the Collector may, subject to the general orders of ³[the Provincial Government], direct.

Tenant responsible to occupant in damages.

Any ^{7*} * * * tenant of any occupant or any other person holding under or through an occupant, who shall without the ^{6*} occupant's consent ⁸[use any such land for] any such purpose, and thereby render the said ^{6*} occupant liable to the penalties aforesaid, shall be responsible to the said ^{6*} occupant in damages.

Permission may be granted on terms.

67. Nothing in the last two preceding sections shall prevent the granting of the permission aforesaid ^{9*} * * * on such terms ¹⁰[or conditions]

as may be ¹[prescribed by the Collector, subject to any rules made in this behalf by the ²[Provincial Government].]

68. An occupant is entitled to the use and occupation of his land for the period, if any, to which his ³[tenure] is limited, or if the period is unlimited, or a survey settlement has been extended to the land, in perpetuity conditionally on the payment of the amounts due on account of the land revenue for the same, according to the provisions of this Act, or of any rules made under this Act, or of any other law, for the time being in force, and on the fulfilment of any other terms ⁴[or conditions] lawfully annexed to his ³[tenure]:

Occupant's rights are conditional.

Proviso.

69. The right of ⁷[the Crown] to mines and mineral products in all unalienated land is and is hereby declared to be expressly reserved:

Reservation of right of the Crown to mines and mineral products.

Provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect any subsisting rights of any occupant of such land in respect of such mines or mineral products.

Proviso.

70. * * * * In any case where ⁹[an occupancy] is not transferable without the previous sanction of the Collector, and such sanction has

not been granted to ¹[a transfer] which has been made or ²[ordered by Civil Court] or on which the Court's decree or order is founded,

(a) such occupancy ³* * shall not be liable to the process of any Court, and such transfer shall be null and void, and

(b) the Court, on receipt of a certificate under the hand and seal of the Collector, to the effect that any such occupancy ³* * is not transferable without his previous sanction and that such sanction has not been granted, shall remove any attachment or other process placed on or set aside any sale of, or affecting, such occupancy ⁴* * * .

Intestate occupancy or holding to be sold.

72. If an occupant who is either a Hindu, a Mahomedan, or a Buddhist dies intestate and without known heirs, the Collector shall dispose of his occupancy by sale, subject to the provisions of this Act or of any other law at the time in force for the sale of forfeited occupancies in realization of the land revenue, and the law at the time in force concerning property left by Hindus, Mahomedans or Buddhists, dying intestate and without known heirs shall not be deemed to apply to the said occupancy but only to the proceeds of such sale after deducting all arrears of land revenue due by the deceased to ⁵[the Crown] and all expenses of the said sale.

Occupancy to be transferable and heritable.

⁶[73. ⁷[An occupancy] shall, subject to the provisions contained in section 56, and to any conditions lawfully annexed to the ⁸[tenure], and save as otherwise prescribed by law, be deemed an heritable and transferable property].

Power to restrict right of transfer.

The occupant may relinquish his land, that is, resign it in favour of ⁵[the Crown], but subject to any rights, tenures, incumbrances or equities lawfully subsisting in favour of any person (other than ⁵[the Crown] or the occupant), by giving notice in writing to the Mamlatdar or Mahalkari before the 31st March in any year or before such other date as may from time to time be prescribed in this behalf by the ⁶[Provincial Government], and such relinquishment shall have effect from the close of the current year :

Provided that no portion of land which is less in extent than a whole survey number or sub-division of a survey number may be relinquished.]

75. [*Relinquishment of lands paying lump-assessment.*] Repealed by Bom. Act IV of 1913, s. 33 (1).

76. The provisions of ⁷[the last section] shall apply as far as may be, to the holders of alienated land : Provided that,

(a) it shall not be lawful to relinquish, as aforesaid, any portion of any land held wholly or partially exempt under the circumstances described in the first paragraph of section 49 until the commuted assessment payable in respect of such portion of land has been determined under the provisions of the said section; and that

(b) if any person relinquish land on which, under the circumstances described in section 51, a larger revenue is levied than would ordinarily be leviable on such land, he shall be deemed to have relinquished also the land held with it which is wholly or partially exempted from payment of revenue.

Right of way to relinquished land.

77. If any person relinquishes land, the way to which lies through other land which he retains, the right of way through the land so retained shall continue to the future holder of the land relinquished.

Saving of operation of section 74 in certain cases.

78. Nothing in ¹[section 74] shall affect—

* * * * *

²* the validity of the terms or conditions of any lease or other express instrument under which land is, or may hereafter be, held from ³[the Crown].

Summary eviction of person unauthoriz- edly occupying land.

⁴[79A. Any person unauthoriz- edly occupying, or, wrongfully in possession of, any land

⁵[(a) to the use of occupation of which by reason of any of the provisions of this Act he is not entitled or has ceased to be entitled, or]

(b) [which] is not transferable without previous sanction under section 73A or by virtue of any condition lawfully ⁷[annexed to the tenure] under the provisions of section 62, 67 or 68,

may be summarily evicted by the Collector.]

To prevent forfeiture of occupancy certain persons other than the occupant may pay the land revenue.

80. In order to prevent the forfeiture of an occupancy under the provisions of section 56 or of any other law for the time being in force, through non-payment by the ⁸* occupant of the land revenue due on account thereof, it shall be lawful for any ⁹[person interested] to pay on behalf of such ⁸* occupant all sums due on account of land revenue, and ¹⁰[the Collector shall on due tender thereof] receive the same. And in any such case the Collector may ¹¹[under section 86] give to the person

who has paid the land revenue as aforesaid ¹[aid for the recovery of any portion of such land revenue] which he may consider to be properly payable by other persons ²* * * :

Collector may assist such persons in recovering the revenue from other parties liable therefor.

Provided that nothing authorized or done under the provisions of this section shall affect the rights of the parties interested as the same may be established in any suit between such parties in a Court of competent jurisdiction. ³Proviso.

81. [When Collector may make co-occupant the registered occupant, instead of selling occupancy to realize land revenue.] Repealed by Bom. Act IV of 1913, s. 38.

82. It shall be lawful for the ³[Provincial Government] by notification in the ⁴[Official Gazette] from time to time ; ⁵Provincial Government empowered

(a) to suspend the operation of section 60 or 74, or of both, within any prescribed local area, either generally, or in respect of cultivators or occupants of a particular class or classes, and to suspend operation of section 60 or 74.

(b) to cancel any such notification.

During the period for which any notification under the above clause (a) is in force within any local area, such rules shall be substituted for the provisions of which the operation is suspended as the Commissioner shall from time to time direct.

CHAPTER VII.

OF SUPERIOR AND INFERIOR HOLDERS.

83. A person placed, as tenant, in possession of land by another, or in that capacity, holding, taking, or retaining possession of land permissively from or by sufferance of another, shall be regarded as holding the same at the rent, or for the services agreed upon between them ; or in the absence of satisfactory evidence of such agreement, at the rent payable or services renderable by the usage of the locality, or, if there be no such agreement or usage, shall be presumed to hold at such rent as, having regard to all of the circumstances of the case, shall be just and reasonable. ⁶Amount of rent payable by tenant.

Duration of tenancy.

And where by reason of the antiquity of a tenancy, no satisfactory evidence of its commencement is forthcoming, and there is not any such evidence of the period of its intended duration, if any, agreed upon between the landlord and tenant, or those under whom they respectively claim title, or any usage of the locality as to duration of such tenancy, it shall, as against the immediate landlord of the tenant, be presumed to be co-extensive with the duration of the tenure of such landlord and of those who derive title under him.

Presumption as to tenure.

And where there is no satisfactory evidence of the capacity in which a person in possession of land in respect of which he renders service or pays rent to the landlord, received, holds or retains possession of the same, it shall be presumed that he is in possession as tenant.

Saving clause.

Nothing contained in this section shall affect the right of the landlord (if he have the same either by virtue of agreement, usage, or otherwise) to enhance the rent payable, or services renderable by the tenant, or to evict the tenant for non-payment of the rent or non-rendition of the services, either respectively originally fixed or duly enhanced as aforesaid.

Annual tenancy terminates on the 31st March.

84. An annual tenancy shall, in the absence of proof to the contrary, be presumed to run from the end of one cultivating season to the end of the next. The cultivating season may be presumed to end on the 31st March.

Three months' notice of termination of tenancy to be given by landlord to tenant, or vice versa.

An annual tenancy shall ¹[in the absence of any special agreement in writing to the contrary] require for its termination a notice given in writing by the landlord to the tenant, or by the tenant to the landlord, at least three months before the end of the year of tenancy at the end of which it is intimated that the tenancy is to cease. Such notice may be in the form of Schedule E, or to the like effect.

Order granting suspensions or remissions to inferior holders.

²[84A. (1) Whenever from any cause the payment of the whole or any part of the land revenue payable to ³[the Provincial Government] by a superior holder in respect of any land is suspended or remitted, the Collector, acting under general or special orders of ³[the Provincial Government], may suspend or remit, as the case may be, the payment to such superior holder of the rent or land revenue of such land by the inferior holder or holders to an amount which—

(a) in the case of land in respect of which full assessment is payable to ³[the Provincial Government], shall not exceed double the amount of the land revenue of which the payment by such superior holder has been suspended or remitted by ³[the Provincial Government], and

(b) in the case of land in respect of which land revenue less than the full assessment is payable to ¹[the Provincial Government], shall not exceed double the amount which, in the opinion of the Collector, would have been suspended or remitted by ¹[the Provincial Government] in favour of the superior holder if the full assessment had been payable to ¹[the Provincial Government] in respect of such land.

(2) In the case of land in respect of which no land revenue is payable to ¹[the Provincial Government] by a superior holder, whenever from any cause the payment of the whole or any part of the land revenue payable to ¹[the Provincial Government] in respect of any other land in the same neighbourhood has been suspended or remitted, the Collector, acting under the general or special orders of ¹[the Provincial Government], may suspend or remit, as the case may be, the payment to such superior holder of the rent or land revenue of the first-mentioned land by the inferior holder or holders to an amount which shall not exceed double the amount which, in the opinion of the Collector, would have been suspended or remitted by ¹[the Provincial Government] in favour of the superior holder if the full assessment had been payable to ¹[the Provincial Government] in respect of such land.

(3) An order passed under sub-section (1) or under sub-section (2) shall not be questioned in any Court.

Such order not to be questioned in any Court.

(4) If the superior holder collects any rent or land revenue of which the payment has been remitted, or before the expiration of the period of suspension collects any rent or land revenue of which the payment has been suspended in favour of an inferior holder or holders, the whole of the land revenue remitted or suspended in favour of such superior holder shall, without prejudice to the rights of the inferior holder or holders to recover the rent or land revenue so collected, become immediately payable by the superior holder.

Consequences following on such order.

(5) No application for assistance under sections 86 and 87 shall be entertained, no suit shall lie, and no decree of a Civil Court shall be executed, for the recovery by a superior holder of any rent or land revenue of which the payment has been remitted, or, during the period of suspension, of any rent or land revenue of which the payment has been suspended in favour of an inferior holder or holders; but, where the payment of rent or land revenue by an inferior holder or holders has been suspended, the period during which the suspension has continued shall be excluded from the period of limitation prescribed for a suit for the recovery of such rent or land revenue.

(6) Nothing in this section shall make it unlawful for the superior holder to take the crop-share fixed by custom or agreement in respect of

Crop-share fixed by custom or agreement.

any land on which rent is payable in whole or in part in the form of a share of the crop.

(7) Explanation—

Meaning of assessment.

In respect of land which has not been assessed under the provisions of Chapter VIII or under any survey settlement confirmed by section 112, the term assessment, for the purposes of this section, includes the rent in land revenue payable by custom or by the usage of the locality.

Sind excluded.

(8) Nothing in this section shall apply to any land situated in the Province of Sind.]

Recovery of superior holders' dues.

¹[85. (1) Every superior holder of an alienated village or of an alienated share of a village, in which there are a hereditary patel and a hereditary village accountant, shall receive his dues on account of rent or land revenue from the inferior holders through such patel and accountant.

(2) Where such patel and accountant fail to recover in behalf of such superior holder any sum due and payable to him on account of rent or land revenue, such superior holder shall, with the previous consent of the Collector, be entitled to recover his dues direct from the inferior holders.

(3) Where any such patel or accountant has recovered any sum in behalf of such superior holder and fails to account to him for the same, the Collector shall, on written application from the superior holder, recover such sum from such patel or accountant as an arrear of land revenue.

(4) Where any such superior holder demands or receives any rent or land revenue from any inferior holder otherwise than through such patel or accountant, he shall, on conviction in a summary inquiry before the Collector, be liable to a fine not exceeding three times the amount of the sum so demanded or received.]

Superior holders entitled to assistance in recovery of dues from inferior holders, etc.

86. Superior holders shall, upon written application to the Collector, be entitled to assistance, by the use of precautionary and other measures, for the recovery of rent or land revenue payable to them by inferior holders, or by co-sharers in their holdings under the same rules, except that contained in section 137, and in the same manner as prescribed in Chapter XI ²* * * for the realization of land revenue by ³[the Provincial Government] :

But application must be made within the revenue year or within the year of tenancy.

Provided that such application be made within the revenue year or within the year of tenancy in which the said rent or land revenue became payable.

87. ¹[(1)] On application being made under section 86 to the Collector, he shall cause a written notice thereof to be served on the inferior holder or co-sharer fixing a day for inquiry into the case.

The Collector how to proceed on such application being made.

¹[(2)] On the day so fixed he shall hold a summary inquiry, and shall pass an order for rendering assistance to the superior holder for the recovery of such amount, if any, of rent or land revenue as appears to him upon the evidence before him to be lawfully due.

¹[(3)] But, if it appears to the Collector that the question at issue between the parties is of a complicated or difficult nature, he may in his discretion either refuse the assistance asked for, or, if the land to which the dispute relates, has been assessed under the provisions of Chapter VIII ^{2*} * * * or any survey settlement confirmed by section 112, grant assistance to the extent only for the assessment so fixed upon the said land.

Assistance may be refused or granted to a limited extent only.

¹[(4)] Nothing in this section shall prevent either party from having recourse to the Civil Courts to recover from the other such amount as he may deem to be still due to him, or to have been levied from him in excess of what was due, as the case may be.

Civil suit not to be barred.

³[(5)] One appeal only shall lie from any order passed under this section.]

88. It shall be lawful for the ⁴[Commissioner] at any time to issue a commission to any holder of alienated lands, conferring upon him all or any of the following powers in respect of the lands specified in such commission (namely) :—

Commissioner may, by commissions, confer certain powers on holders of alienated lands.

(a) to demand security for the payment of the land revenue or rent due to him, and if the same be not furnished, to take such precautions as the Collector is authorized to take under sections 141 to 143 ;

(b) to attach the property of persons making default in the payment of such land revenue or rent, as aforesaid ;

(c) to fix from time to time the times at which, and the instalments in which, the land revenue or rent due to him shall be payable ;

(d) to exercise the powers of a Collector under sections 65 and 66 ;

(e) to receive notices of relinquishment under section 74, and to determine the date up to which such notices shall be received as in that section provided ;

(f) to take measures for the maintenance and repair of boundary marks in the manner provided for survey officers in section 122 :

Provided that the powers contemplated in clauses (e) to (f) shall be conferred only on holders of lands to which a survey settlement has been extended under the provisions of section 216.

Form of such commission.

89. Every such commission shall be in the form of Schedule F, and shall be liable to be withdrawn at the pleasure of ¹[the Commissioner] ; and a commission may, if the ²[Commissioner] see fit, be issued to one or more agents of a holder of alienated lands as well as to the holder in person.

Reference must be made by holder of commission to the Collector in certain cases ;

90. If the holder of any such commission attach a defaulter's property, he shall make an immediate report to the Collector of his having done so. Should the demand on account of which the attachment has been made, appear to the Collector, after such inquiry as he may deem fit to make, to be just, he shall give orders for the sale of the property, and the sale shall be conducted agreeably to the provisions of sections 165 to 186.

But if the holder of the commission is invested, under ³Regulation XIII of 1830, with civil jurisdiction and with power to execute his own or his agent's decrees, the sale shall be conducted by him and not by the Collector and his subordinates.

When compulsory process shall cease.

91. All compulsory process shall cease :

on the defaulter's paying or tendering the amount demanded of him under protest, or

on his furnishing either to the holder of the commission or his agent or agents, or to the Collector, satisfactory security in the form of Schedule D or to similar effect.

Penalty for continuing compulsory process.

And any holder of any such commission as aforesaid, by himself or his agents, proceeding with any compulsory process after payment made, or tendered as aforesaid, or after the furnishing of such security as aforesaid or after tender thereof, shall be liable, on conviction in a summary inquiry before the Collector, to a penalty not exceeding three times the amount of the revenue sought to be recovered by such compulsory process.

92. The power conferred by any such commission shall extend to the enforcement of the payment of the revenue or rent of the current year and of the year next immediately preceding, but not to that of former years.

Power under commission to extend to current and previous year's arrears.

93. The holder of any such commission shall not enforce a demand for revenue or rent in excess of what any inferior holder has paid, previously to the date of such demand, or of what he may have contracted in writing to pay. In the event of a dispute the Collector shall hold a summary inquiry and decide what is just, and the holder of a commission shall not enforce a demand for more than what is so decided to be just.

Holder of commission not to enforce any unusual or excessive demand.

The person against whom any demand shall have been enforced in excess of the amount of which payment is lawfully enforceable shall be entitled to recover, on conviction of the holder of the commission in a summary inquiry before the Collector, three times the amount of any such excessive demand by way of damages, and the sum so due by the holder of the commission shall be leviable from him as an arrear of land revenue.

Penalty for so doing.

94. Nothing in the last section shall be deemed to prevent a holder of alienated land from instituting a suit in any Court of competent jurisdiction for the purpose of establishing his claim to re-assess the lands or resettle the revenue of any inferior holder paying less than the full sum to payment of which he deems him to be justly liable, or from levying the sum ascertained to be due in accordance with the decree in any such suit in the manner hereinbefore mentioned.

But holder of commission may establish his right to enhanced rent in Civil Court.

[94A. (1) The superior holder of an alienated village or of an alienated share of a village, in which there are a hereditary patel and a hereditary village accountant, and to which a survey settlement has been extended under section 216, may by application in writing to the Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the taluka request that the rent or land revenue due to such superior holder may during a period named in the application be recovered as a revenue demand.

Recovery as revenue demand of dues of certain superior holders for specified period.

(2) The Collector may in his discretion sanction the application for a period not exceeding that named by the applicant, and in such case the following provisions shall apply:—

(a) Any rent or land revenue that accrues or has accrued due to the superior holder during the sanctioned period or a period of six years previous thereto shall, to an extent not exceeding the assessment fixed on the land, be recoverable under the orders of the revenue authorities as a revenue demand during the sanctioned period.

(b) Where any proportion of the land revenue that accrues or has accrued due to ¹[the Provincial Government] in respect of unalienated land in the same neighbourhood during the said sanctioned or previous period has been suspended or remitted by proper authority, the Collector may suspend or remit an equal or lesser proportion of the rent or land revenue that accrues or has accrued due to the superior holder during the corresponding period. Any such suspension or remission shall, notwithstanding anything in the ²Bombay Revenue X of Jurisdiction Act, 1876, be binding upon the superior holder in any ^{1876.} subsequent proceedings in any Civil Court between the superior and inferior holders or their legal representatives, and any proceedings pending at the date of such suspension or remission shall abate to the extent of any claim that may be inconsistent therewith; and no Civil Court shall entertain any suit against ³[the Crown] in respect of any such suspension or remission.

(c) Where any such suspension or remission has been granted to an inferior holder, the land revenue (if any) payable by the superior holder shall be suspended or remitted, as the case may be, to a proportionate extent.

(d) The balance of any sum recovered under clause (a) shall be paid to the superior holder after deduction of the costs, if any, of recovery and of any sum lawfully chargeable upon the sum recovered.]

CHAPTER VIII.

⁴[OF SURVEYS, ASSESSMENTS AND SETTLEMENTS OF LAND REVENUE.]

Revenue survey may be introduced by Provincial Government into any part of Presidency.

95. It shall be lawful for the ⁵[Provincial Government], whenever it may seem expedient, to direct the survey of any land in any part of the Presidency, with a view to the settlement of the land revenue, and to the record and preservation of rights connected therewith, or for any other similar purpose and such survey shall be called a revenue survey. Such survey may extend to the lands of any village, town, or city generally, or to such land only as the ⁵[Provincial Government] may direct; and subject to the orders of the ⁵[Provincial Government] it shall be lawful for the officers conducting any such survey to except from the survey settlement any land to which it may not seem expedient that such settlement should be applied.

The control of every such revenue survey shall vest in and be exercised by the ¹[Provincial Government].

Control of revenue survey.

96. It shall be lawful for the survey officer deputed to conduct or take part in any such survey, to require by general notice or by summons, the attendance of holders of lands and of all persons interested therein, in person, or by legally constituted agent duly instructed and able to answer all material questions, and the presence of taluka and village officers, who in their several stations and capacities are legally, or by usage, bound to perform service in virtue of their respective offices and to require from them such assistance in the operations of the survey and such service in connection therewith, as may not be inconsistent with the position of the individual so called on.

Survey Officer may require by general notice or by summons, suitable service from holders of land, etc.

97. It shall be lawful for the survey officer to call upon all holders of land and other persons interested therein to assist in the measurement or classification of the lands to which the survey extends by furnishing flag-holders; and in the event of a necessity for employing hired labour for this or other similar object, incidental to survey operations, it shall be lawful to assess the cost thereof, with all contingent expenses on the lands surveyed, for collection as a revenue demand.

Assistance to be given by holders and others in the measurement or classification of lands.

98. Except as hereinafter provided, no survey number comprising land used for purposes of agriculture only shall be made of less extent than a minimum to be fixed from time to time for the several classes of land in each district by the Commissioner of Survey, with the sanction of ²[the Provincial Government]. A record of the minima so fixed shall be kept in the Mamlatdar's office in each taluka, and shall be open to the inspection of the public at reasonable times.

Survey numbers not to be of less than a certain extent.

These provisions shall not apply to survey numbers which have already been made of less extent than the minima so fixed, or which may be so made under the authority of the Commissioner of Survey given either generally or in any particular instance in this behalf; and any survey number separately recognized in the ³[land records] shall be deemed to have been authorizedly made whatever be its extent.

Exception.

100. Subject to rules ⁴* * * * made in this behalf, under section 214, the officer in charge of a survey shall have authority to fix the assessment for land revenue at his discretion on all lands within the local

operation of an order made under section 95 not wholly exempt from land revenue, and the amounts due according to such assessment shall, subject to the provisions of section 102, be levied on all such lands.

Regard to be had to proviso to section 52.

In fixing such assessment, regard shall be had to the requirements of the proviso to section 52.

Proviso.

But nothing in this section shall be deemed to prevent the survey officer aforesaid from determining and registering the proper full assessment on lands wholly exempt from payment of land revenue or on lands especially excepted under section 95 from the survey settlement, or from dividing all such lands to which the survey extends into survey numbers.

The assessment so made may be on land or on means of irrigation, etc.

101. The power to assess under the preceding section shall, in the case of lands used for purposes of agriculture alone, include power to assess, whether directly on the land, or in the form of a rate or cess upon the means of irrigation in respect of which no rate is ¹[levied] under section 55 ²[or under the Bombay Irrigation Act, 1879], or in any other manner whatsoever that may be sanctioned by ³[the Provincial Government].

Assessment so made not leviable without the sanction of Provincial Government. But may be fixed, with or without modification, by Provincial Government for a term of years.

102. The assessment fixed by the officer in charge of a survey shall not be levied without the sanction of ³[the Provincial Government]. It shall be lawful for the ⁴[Provincial Government] to declare such assessments, with any modifications which ⁵[it] may deem necessary, fixed for a term of years not exceeding thirty in the case of lands used for the purposes of agriculture alone, and not exceeding ninety-nine in the case of all other lands.

Introduction of settlements.

Excess assessment not to be levied in the year in which a survey settlement is introduced;

104. In the year in the course of which a survey settlement, whether original or revised, may be introduced under the last preceding section, the difference between the old and new assessment of all lands on which the latter may be in excess of the former shall be remitted, and the revised assessment shall be levied only from the next following year.

In the year next following that in which any ¹[original or] revised survey settlement has been introduced, any occupant who may be dissatisfied with the increased rate imposed by such new assessment on any of the survey numbers ²[or sub-divisions of survey numbers] held by him shall, on resigning such number ²[or sub-division] in the manner prescribed by ³[section 74] on or before the 31st March, receive a remission of the increase so imposed.

nor in the following year if the number is resigned that year.

105. The fixing of the assessment under the provisions of section 102 shall be strictly limited to the assessment of the ordinary land revenue, and shall not operate as a bar to the levy of any cess which it shall be lawful for the ⁴[Provincial Government] to impose under the provisions of any law for the time being in force for purposes of local improvement, such as schools, village, and district roads, bridges, tanks, wells, accommodation for travellers, and the like, or of any rate for the use of water which may be imposed under the provisions of section 55 ⁵[or of the Bombay Irrigation Act, 1879.]

106. It shall be lawful for the ⁴[Provincial Government] to direct, at any time, a fresh revenue survey or any operation subsidiary thereto, but no enhancement of assessment shall take effect till the expiration of the period previously fixed under the provisions of section 102 :

Provincial Government may direct a fresh survey and revision of assessment.

increase in the value of such land or in the profit of cultivating the same, due to the said improvement, shall not be taken into account in fixing the revised assessment thereof.]

Preparation
of statistical
and fiscal
records.

108. It shall be the duty of the survey officer, on the occasion of making or revising a settlement of land revenue, to prepare a register, to be called "the Settlement Register," showing the area and assessment of each survey number, ¹[with any other particulars that may be prescribed] and other records in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be made on this behalf by ²[the Provincial Government].

109. [Officers to correct clerical and admitted errors in settlement-register; and inquire into and pass orders on applications for mutation of names.] Repealed by Bom. Act IV of 1913, s. 49.

111. In the event of any alienated village or estate coming under the temporary management of ³[servants of the Crown], it shall be lawful for the Collector to let out the lands thereof, at rates determined by means of a survey settlement or at such other fixed rates as he may deem to be reasonable, and ⁴[to grant unoccupied lands on lease] and otherwise to conduct the revenue management thereof under the rules for the management of unalienated lands, so far as such rules may be applicable, and for so long as the said village or estate shall be under the management of ³[servants of the Crown]: provided, however, that any written agreements relating to the land, made by the superior holder of such village or estate, shall not be affected by any proceedings under this section in so far as they shall not operate to the detriment of the lawful claims of ⁵[the Crown] on the land.

Maintenance
of existing
settlements
of land
revenue.

112. Existing survey settlements of land revenue made, approved and confirmed under the authority of the ⁶[Provincial Government] shall be, and are hereby declared to be, in force subject to the provisions of this Act.

Partition.

demand in such proportions as the Collector may think fit from the sharers at whose request the partition is made, or from the persons interested in the partition.]

114. Whenever any one or more co-sharers in a khoti estate, into which a revenue survey has been introduced ¹[or in a talukdari estate], consent to a partition of the said estate, it shall be lawful for the Collector, or for any other officer duly empowered by him in this behalf, ²* * * to divide the said estate into shares according to the respective rights of the co-sharers, and to allot such shares to the co-sharers :

Partition of certain estates by the Collector on application by co-sharers.

Provided that no such partition shall be made, unless—

(a) all the co-sharers are agreed as to the extent of their respective rights in estate, and

(b) the assessment of the share or shares of the sharer or sharers consenting to such partition exceeds one-half of the assessment of the entire estate.

In such cases the expenses of partition shall be recovered ³[as a revenue demand] from all the co-sharers in the estate divided.

(2) The division of survey numbers into sub-divisions and the fixing of the assessment of the sub-divisions shall be carried out and from time to time revised in accordance with rules made by the ¹[Provincial Government] in this behalf :

Provided that the total amount of the assessment of any survey number or sub-division shall not be enhanced during any term for which such assessment may have been fixed under section 102, unless such assessment is liable to alteration under section 48.

(3) The area and assessment of such sub-divisions shall be entered in such land records as the ¹[Provincial Government] may prescribe in this behalf.]

Provisions applicable on relinquishment or forfeiture of a sub-division.

²[117B. CHAPTER IX.

THE SETTLEMENT OF BOUNDARIES AND THE CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF BOUNDARY-MARKS.

Determination of village-boundaries.

118. The boundaries of villages situated in British territory shall be fixed, and all disputes relating thereto shall be determined by survey

officers, or by such other officers as may be nominated by ¹[the Provincial Government] for the purpose, who shall be guided by the following rules :—

Rule 1.—When the patels and other village officers of any two or more adjoining villages, and, in the case of an alienated village the holder thereof or his duly constituted agent, shall voluntarily agree to any given line of boundary as the boundary common to their respective villages, the officer determining the boundary shall require the said parties to execute an agreement to that effect, and shall then mark off the boundary in the manner agreed upon. And any village boundary fixed in this manner shall be held to be finally settled, unless it shall appear to the said officer that the agreement has been obtained by fraud, intimidation, or any other illegal means. Village-boundaries may be settled by agreement.

Rule 2.—If the patels and other village officers, and, in the case of an alienated village, the holder thereof or his duly constituted agent, do not agree to fix the boundaries of their respective villages, in the manner prescribed in the preceding rule, or if it shall appear to the said officer that the agreement has been obtained by fraud, intimidation, or any other illegal means, or if there be any pending dispute, the said officer shall make a survey and plan of the ground in dispute, exhibiting the land claimed by the contending parties, and all particulars relating thereto, and shall hold a formal inquiry into the claims of the said parties, and thereafter make an award in the case. If either of the villages concerned be alienated, an award made by a survey officer shall, unless the officer making it be the Superintendent of Survey, be subject to his confirmation, and an award made by any other officer shall be subject to confirmation by such other officer as ¹[the Provincial Government] may nominate for the purpose. Procedure in case of disagreement or dispute.

119. If, at the time of a survey, the boundary of a field or holding be undisputed, and its correctness be affirmed by the village officers then present, it may be laid down as pointed out by the holder or person in occupation, and, if disputed, or if the said holder or person in occupation be not present, it shall be fixed by the survey officer according to the ²[land records] and according to occupation as ascertained from the village officers and the holders of adjoining lands, or on such other evidence or information as the survey officer may be able to procure. Determination of field boundaries.

If any dispute arise concerning the boundary of a field or holding which has not been surveyed, or if at any time ³[after the completion of a survey] a dispute arise concerning the boundary of any survey number

¹[or sub-division of a survey number], it shall be determined by the Collector, who shall be guided ²[by the land records] if they afford satisfactory evidence of the boundary previously fixed, and if not, by such other evidence as he may be able to procure.

Settlement of boundary disputes by arbitration.

120. If the several parties concerned in a boundary dispute agree to submit the settlement thereof to an arbitration committee, and make application to that effect in writing, the officer whose duty it would otherwise be to determine the boundary shall require the said parties to nominate a committee of not less than three persons, within a specified time, and if within a period to be fixed by the said officer the committee so nominated or a majority of the members thereof arrive at a decision, such decision, when confirmed by the said officer, or if the said officer be a survey officer lower in rank than a Superintendent of Survey, by the Superintendent of Survey, shall be final:

When award may be remitted for reconsideration.

Provided that the said officer, or the Superintendent of Survey, shall have power to remit the award, or any of the matters referred to arbitration, to the reconsideration of the same committee, for any of the causes set forth in ³[paragraph 14 of the Second Schedule to the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908]. V of 1908.

If arbitration fail, survey officer to settle dispute.

If the committee appointed in the manner aforesaid fail to effect a settlement of the dispute within the time specified, it shall be the duty of the officer aforesaid, unless he or, if the said officer is a survey officer lower in rank than a Superintendent of Survey, the Superintendent of Survey see fit to extend the time, to settle the same as otherwise provided in this Act.

Effect of the settlement of a boundary.

⁴[121. (1)] The settlement of a boundary under any of the foregoing provisions of this chapter shall be determinative—

(a) of the proper position of the boundary line or boundary-marks, and

(b) of the rights of the landholders on either side of the boundary fixed in respect of the land adjudged to appertain, or not to appertain, to their respective holdings.

any land which has been adjudged in the settlement of a boundary not to appertain to his holding or to the holding of any person through or under whom he claims.]

122. It shall be lawful for any survey officer, authorized by a Superintendent of Survey, or Settlement officer, to ¹[specify or cause to be constructed, laid out, maintained or repaired] boundary-marks of villages or survey numbers ²[or sub-divisions of survey numbers] whether cultivated or uncultivated, and to assess all charges incurred thereby on the holders or others having an interest therein.

Construction and repair of boundary-marks of survey numbers and villages.

Such officer may require landholders to construct, ³[lay out, maintain] or repair their boundary-marks, by a notification which shall be posted in the chavdi or other public place in the village, to which the lands under survey belong, directing the holders of survey numbers ²[or sub-divisions] to construct, ³[lay out, maintain] or repair, within a specified time, the boundary-marks of their respective survey numbers ²[or sub-divisions] and on their failure to comply with the requisition so made, the survey officer shall then construct ³[lay out] or repair them and assess all charges incurred thereby as hereinbefore provided.

Requisition on landholders to erect or repair boundary-marks.

A general notification, issued in the manner aforesaid, shall be held to be good and sufficient notice to each and every person having any interest in any survey numbers ²[or sub-divisions] within the limits of the lands to which the survey extends.

A general notification to be good and sufficient notice of requisition.

⁴[The boundary-marks shall be of such description, and shall be constructed, laid out, maintained or repaired in such manner and shall be of such dimensions and materials as may, subject to rules ⁵* * made in this behalf under section 214, be determined by the Superintendent of Survey, according to the requirements of soil and climate.]

Description of boundary-marks.

123. Every landholder shall be responsible for the maintenance and good repair of the boundary-marks of his holding, and for any charges reasonably incurred on account of the same by the revenue officers in cases of alteration, removal, or disrepair. It shall be the duty of the village

officers and servants to prevent the destruction or unauthorized alteration of the village boundary-marks.

Collector to have charge of boundary-marks after introduction of the survey settlement.

124. When the survey settlement shall have been introduced into a district, the charge of the boundary-marks shall devolve on the Collector, and it shall be his duty to take measures for their ¹[construction, laying out], maintenance and repair, and for this purpose the powers conferred on survey officers by section 122 shall vest in him.

Penalty for injuring boundary-marks.

125. Any person convicted after a summary inquiry before the Collector, or before a survey officer, Mamlatdar, or Mahalkari, of wilfully erasing, removing or injuring a boundary-mark, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees for each mark so erased, removed, or injured.

One-half of every fine imposed under this section may be awarded by the officer imposing it to the informer, if any, and the other half shall be chargeable with the cost of restoring the mark.

CHAPTER X.

OF LANDS WITHIN THE SITES OF VILLAGES, TOWNS AND CITIES.

Limits of sites of villages, towns and cities how to be fixed.

126. It shall be lawful for the Collector, or for a survey officer, acting under the general or special orders of ²[the Provincial Government], to determine what lands are included within the site of any village, town, or city, and to fix, and from time to time to vary the limits of the same, respect being had to all subsisting rights of landholders.

Act XI of 1852 and Bombay Act II and VII of 1863 how far applicable to lands in such sites.

127. Act XI of 1852 and Bombay Acts II and VII of 1863 shall be deemed to be applicable, and to have always been applicable, in the territories to which they respectively extend, to all lands within the limits of the site of any town or city in which an inquiry into titles has been made under the provisions of Bombay Act IV of 1868³ which have been hitherto ordinarily used for agricultural purposes only; but the provisions of the said Acts shall not be deemed applicable to any other lands within the limits of the site of any such town or city.

128. The existing exemption from payment of land revenue of lands other than lands which have hitherto been ordinarily used for purposes of agriculture only, situate within the sites of towns and cities in which an inquiry into titles has been made under the provisions of Bombay Act IV of 1868,¹ shall be continued—

Existing exemption when to be continued in case of certain lands in towns and cities in which Bombay Act IV of 1868 has been in operation.

First—if such lands are situated in any town or city where there has been in former years a survey which ²[the Provincial Government] recognize for the purpose of this section, and are shown in the maps or other records of such survey as being held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land revenue ;

Second—if such lands have been held wholly or partially exempt from the payment of land revenue for a period of not less than five years before the application of Bombay Act I of 1865,³ or IV of 1868¹ to such town or city ;

Third—if such lands, for whatever period held, have been held wholly or partially exempt from payment of land revenue under a deed of grant or of confirmation issued by an officer whom ²[the Provincial Government] recognize as having been competent to issue such deed.

129. (1) Claims to exemption under the last preceding section shall be determined by the Collector after a summary inquiry, and his decision shall be final.

Right to exemption to be determined by the Collector.

⁴[(2) Any suit instituted in a Civil Court to set aside any order passed by the Collector under sub-section (1), in respect of any land situate within the site of a village, town or city, shall be dismissed (although limitation has not been set up as a defence) if it has not been instituted within one year from the date of the order.]

130. In towns and cities to which section 128 applies, the holders of any lands other than lands which have hitherto been used for purposes of agriculture only, which have been unauthorizedly occupied for a period commencing less than two years before Bombay Act I of 1865³ or IV of 1868¹ was applied to the town or city in which the said lands are situate,

shall be liable to pay ¹[a price for the said lands] in addition to the land revenue assessed thereupon.

The said ²[price] shall be determined according to the provisions of section 62.

Survey of lands in such sites how to be conducted.

131. If the ³[Provincial Government] shall at any time deem it expedient to direct a survey of the lands other than those used ordinarily for the purposes of agriculture only within the site of any village, town, or city, under the provisions of section 95, or a fresh survey thereof under the provisions of section 106, such survey shall be conducted, and all its operations shall be regulated, according to the provisions of Chapters VIII and IX of this Act : Provided that nothing contained in sections 96, 97, 101, ^{4*} 104, or 118 thereof shall be considered applicable to any such survey in any town or city containing more than two thousand inhabitants.

Proviso.

In certain cases a survey-fee to be charged.

132. When a survey is extended under the provisions of the last preceding section to the site of any town or city containing more than two thousand inhabitants, each holder of a building-site shall be liable to the payment of a survey-fee to be assessed by the Collector under such rules as may be prescribed in this behalf from time to time by ⁵[the Provincial Government], provided that the said fee shall in no case exceed ⁶[ten rupees for each building-site or any portion thereof held separately].

The said survey-fee shall be payable within six months from the date of a public notice to be given in this behalf by the Collector after the completion of the survey of the site of the town or city, or of such part thereof as the notice shall refer to.

7* * * * *

Sanad to be granted without extra charge.

133. Every holder of a building-site as aforesaid shall be entitled, after payment of the said survey-fee, to receive from the Collector without extra charge one or more sanads, in the form of Schedule H, ⁸[or to the like effect] specifying by plan and description the extent and conditions of his holding :

Proviso.

Provided that if such holder do not apply for such sanad or sanads at the time of payment of the survey-fee or thereafter within six months from the date of the public notice issued by the Collector under the last

preceding section, the Collector may require him to pay an additional fee not exceeding one rupee for each sanad.

Every such sanad shall be executed on behalf of the ¹[Crown] by such officer as may from time to time be lawfully empowered to execute the same.

134. If any land within the site of any village, town, or city, hitherto ordinarily used for agricultural purposes only, with respect to which a summary settlement has been made between ²[the Crown] and the holder under the provisions of any law for the time being in force, be ³[used for] any other purposes, it shall be liable to payment of one-eighth of the rate fixed for unalienated land used for similar purposes in the same locality, in addition to the quit-rent payable under the terms of such summary settlement. Assessment of lands hitherto used for purpose of agriculture only used for other purposes.

4[CHAPTER X-A.

OF THE RECORD OF RIGHTS.

135A. The ⁵[Provincial Government] may, by notification in the ⁶[Official Gazette], direct that this chapter, or any specified provisions thereof, shall not be in force in any specified local area, or with reference to any lands or any class of villages or lands, or generally. Exemption from provisions of this chapter.

135B. (1) A record of rights shall be maintained in every village and such record shall include the following particulars:— The record of rights.

(a) the names of all persons (other than tenants) who are holders, occupants, owners or mortgagees of the land or assignees of the rent or revenue thereof;

(b) the nature and extent of the respective interests of such persons and the conditions or liabilities (if any) attaching thereto;

(c) the rent or revenue (if any) payable by or to any of such persons;

(d) such other particulars as the ⁵[Provincial Government] may prescribe by rules made in this behalf.

(2) Provided that the said particulars shall be entered in the record of rights with respect to perpetual tenancies, and also with respect to tenancies of any other classes to which the ¹[Provincial Government] may, by notification in the ²[Official Gazette], direct that the provisions of this section shall apply in any local area or generally.

Acquisition
of rights to
be reported.

135C. Any person acquiring by succession, survivorship, inheritance, partition, purchase, mortgage, gift, lease or otherwise, any right as holder, occupant, owner, mortgagee, landlord or tenant of the land, or assignee of the rent or revenue thereof, shall report orally or in writing his acquisition of such right to the village accountant within three months from the date of such acquisition, and the said village accountant shall at once give a written acknowledgment of the receipt of such report to the person making it :

Provided that where the person acquiring the right is a minor or otherwise disqualified, his guardian or other person having charge of his property shall make the report to the village accountant ;

Provided further that any person acquiring a right by virtue of a registered document shall be exempted from the obligation to report to the village accountant.

Explanation I.—The rights mentioned above include a mortgage without possession, but do not include an easement or a charge not amounting to a mortgage of the kind specified in section 100 of the Transfer of Property Act, 1882.

Explanation II.—A person in whose favour a mortgage is discharged or extinguished, or lease determines, acquires a right within the meaning of this section.

135D. (1) The village accountant shall enter in a register of mutations every report made to him under section 135C and shall also make an entry therein respecting the acquisition of any right of the kind mentioned in ³[the first paragraph] of section 135C which he has reason to believe to have taken place and of which a report has not been made to him under the said section.

(2) Whenever a village accountant makes an entry in the register of mutations he shall at the same time post up a complete copy of the entry in a conspicuous place in the chavdi, and shall give written intimation to all persons appearing from the record of rights or register of mutations to be interested in the mutation, and to any other person whom he has reason to believe to be interested therein.

(3) Should any objection to any entry made under sub-section (1) in the register of mutations be made either orally or in writing to the village

accountant, it shall be the duty of the village accountant to enter the particulars of the objection in a register of disputed cases.

(4) Orders disposing of objections entered in the register of disputed cases shall be recorded in the register of mutations by such officers and in such manner as may be prescribed by rules made by the ¹[Provincial Government] in this behalf.

(5) The transfer of entries from the register of mutations to the record of rights shall be effected subject to such rules as may be made by the ¹[Provincial Government] in this behalf: provided that an entry in the register of mutations shall not be transferred to the record of rights until such entry has been duly certified.

(6) Entries in the register of mutations shall be tested and if found correct, or after correction as the case may be, shall be certified by a revenue officer of rank not lower than that of a Mamlatdar's first karkun. Entries in register of mutations how to be certified.

(7) The provisions of this section shall apply in respect of perpetual tenancies and also in respect of any tenancies mentioned in a notification under sub-section (2) of section 135B, but the provisions of this section shall not apply in respect of other tenancies, which shall be entered in a register of tenancies in such manner and under such procedure as the ¹[Provincial Government] may prescribe by rules made in this behalf. Tenancies.

135E. (1) Any person whose rights, interests or liabilities are required to be, or have been entered in any record or register, under this chapter shall be bound, on the requisition of any revenue officer or village accountant engaged in compiling or revising the record or register, to furnish or produce for his inspection, within one month from the date of such requisition, all such information or documents needed for the correct compilation or revision thereof as may be within his knowledge or in his possession or power. Obligation to furnish information.

(2) A revenue officer or village accountant to whom any information is furnished or before whom any document is produced in accordance with a requisition under sub-section (1) shall at once give a written acknowledgment thereof to the person furnishing or producing the same and shall endorse on any such document a note under his signature, stating the fact of its production and the date thereof.

135F. Any person neglecting to make the report required by section 135C, or furnish the information or produce the documents required by section 135E within the prescribed period shall be liable, at the discretion of the Collector, to be charged a fee not exceeding twenty-five rupees, which shall be leviable as an arrear of land revenue. Penalty for neglect to afford information.

Requisition of assistance in preparation of maps.

135G. Subject to rules made in this behalf by the ¹[Provincial Government]—

(a) any revenue officer or village accountant may for the purpose of preparing or revising any map or plan required for or in connection with any record or register under this chapter exercise any of the powers of a survey officer under sections 96 and 97, except the power of assessing the cost of hired labour under section 97, and

(b) any revenue officer of a rank not lower than that of an Assistant or Deputy Collector or of a survey officer may assess the cost of the preparation or revision of such map or plan and all contingent expenses, including the cost of clerical labour and supervision, on the lands to which such maps or plans relate, and such costs shall be recoverable as a revenue demand.

Certified copy of record to be annexed to plaint or application.

135H. (1) The plaintiff or applicant in every suit or application as hereinafter defined relating to land situated in any area to which this chapter applies shall annex to the plaint or application a certified copy of any entry in the record of rights, register of mutations or register of tenancies relevant to such land.

(2) If the plaintiff or applicant fails so to do for any cause which the Court or conciliator deems sufficient, he shall produce such certified copy within a reasonable time to be fixed by the Court or conciliator, and if such certified copy is not so annexed or produced the plaint or application shall be rejected, but the rejection thereof shall not of its own force preclude the presentation of a fresh plaint in respect of the same cause of action or of a fresh application in respect of the same subject-matter, with a certified copy annexed.

(3) After the disposal of any case in which a certified copy of any such entry has been recorded, the Court shall communicate to the Collector any error appearing in such entry and any alteration therein that may be required by reason of the decree or order, and a copy of such communication shall be kept with the record. The Collector shall in such case cause the entry to be corrected in accordance with the decree or decision of the Court, so far as it adjudicates upon any right required to be entered in the record of rights, register of mutations or register of tenancies. The provisions of this sub-section shall apply also to an appellate or revisional Court: provided that, in the case of an appellate or revisional decree or order passed by the High Court or the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind, the communication shall be made by the Court from which the appeal lay or the record was called for.

Notwithstanding anything in section 87, the Collector shall refuse assistance to any superior holder under the said section, if his claim to such assistance is not supported by an entry or entries duly made in the record of rights, register of mutations or register of tenancies. 135J. An entry in the record of rights, and a certified entry in the register of mutations shall be presumed to be true until the contrary is proved or a new entry is lawfully substituted therefor. Presumption of correctness of entries in record of rights and register of mutations.

135K. Applications for certified copies of entries in the record of rights, the register of mutations and the register of tenancies may be made to, and such copies may be given by, the village accountant, Mahalkari or Mamlatdar. Certified copies.

(1) No suit shall lie against the ¹[Crown or any servant of the Crown] in respect of a claim to have an entry made in any record or register that is maintained under this chapter, or to have any such entry omitted or amended, and the provisions of Chapter XIII shall not apply to any decision or order under this chapter.

(2) The correctness of the entries in the record of rights and register of mutations shall be inquired into and the particulars thereof revised, by such Revenue officers and in such manner and to such extent and subject to such appeal as the ²[Provincial Government] may from time to time by rules prescribe in this behalf.]

CHAPTER XI.

OF THE REALIZATION OF THE LAND REVENUE AND OTHER REVENUE DEMANDS.

Liability
for land

³**136.** (1) In the case of unalienated land the occupant, and in the case of alienated land the superior holder, shall be primarily liable to ⁴[the Provincial Government] for the payment of the land revenue, including all arrears of land revenue, due in respect of the land. Joint occupants and joint holders who are primarily liable under this section shall be jointly and severally liable.

(2) In case of default by any person who is primarily liable under this section, the land revenue, including arrears as aforesaid, shall be recoverable from any person in possession of the land :

Provided that where such person is a tenant, the amount recoverable from him shall not exceed the demands of the year in which the recovery is made :

Provided further that, when land revenue is recovered under this section from any person who is not primarily liable for the same, such person shall be allowed credit for any payments which he may have duly made to the person who is primarily liable, and shall be entitled to credit, for the amount recovered from him, in account with the person who is primarily liable.]

137. The claim of ⁴[the Provincial Government] to any moneys recoverable under the provisions of this chapter shall have precedence over any other debt, demand, or claim whatsoever, whether in respect of mortgage, judgment-decree, execution, or attachment, or otherwise howsoever, against any land or the holder thereof.

133. In all cases the land revenue for the current year of land used for agricultural purposes, if not otherwise discharged, shall be recoverable, in preference to all other claims, from the crop of the land subject to the same.

The liability of the crop for the revenue of the land.

139. The land revenue shall be leviable on or at any time after the first day of the revenue year for which it is due; but, except when precautionary measures are deemed necessary under the provisions of sections 140 to 144, payment will be required only on the dates to be fixed under the provisions hereinafter contained.

Land revenue may be levied at any time during the revenue year.

140. When the crop of any land or any portion of the same is sold, mortgaged or otherwise disposed of, whether by order of a Civil Court or other public authority or by private agreement, the Collector may prevent its being removed from the land until the demands for the current year in respect of the said land have been paid, whether the date fixed for the payment of the same under the provisions hereinafter contained, has yet arrived or not.

Removal of crop which has been sold, etc., may be prevented until revenue paid.

But in no case shall a crop or any portion of the same, which has been sold, mortgaged or otherwise disposed of, be detained on account of more than the demands of the year in which the detention is made.]

141. It shall be lawful for the Collector, in order to secure the payment of the land revenue by enforcement of the lien of ²[the Provincial Government] on the crop—

In order to secure the land revenue the Collector may prevent the reaping of the crop, or

(a) to require that the crop growing on any land liable to the payment of land revenue shall not be reaped until a notice in writing has first been given to himself or to some other officer to be named by him, in this behalf, and such notice has been returned endorsed with an acknowledgment of its receipt;

(b) to direct that no such crop shall be removed from the land on which it has been reaped, or from any place in which it may have been deposited, without the written permission of himself or of some other officer as aforesaid;

the removal thereof, or

(c) to cause watchmen to be placed over any such crop to prevent the unlawful reaping or removal of the same, and to realize the amount required for the remuneration of the said watchmen, at such rate not exceeding the rate of pay received by the peons on his establishment as he may deem fit, as an arrear of land revenue due in respect of the land to which such crop belongs.

142. The Collector's orders under either clause (a) or clause (b) of the last preceding section may be issued generally to all the holders of land

Any person who shall disobey any such order after the same has been so proclaimed, or a notice thereof has been served upon him, or who shall, within the meaning of the Indian Penal Code, abet the disobedience of ^{XLV} any such order, shall be liable, on conviction after a summary inquiry by ^{of} the Collector, to a fine not exceeding double the amount of the land revenue due on the land to which the crop belongs in respect of which the offence is committed. 1860.

Reaping,

143. The Collector shall not defer the reaping of the crop, nor prolong its deposit unduly, so as to damage the produce; and if within two months after the crop has been deposited the revenue due has not been discharged, he shall either release the crop and proceed to realize the revenue in any other manner authorized by this chapter or take such portion thereof as he may deem fit, for sale under the provisions of this chapter applicable to sales of moveable property in realization of the revenue due and of all legal costs, and release the rest.

144. If owing to disputes amongst the sharers, or for other cause, the Collector shall deem that there is reason to apprehend that the land revenue payable in respect of any holding consisting of an entire village or of a share of a village will not be paid as it falls due, he may cause the village or share of a village to be attached and taken under the management of himself or any agent whom he appoints for that purpose.

Powers of
manager,
and disposal
of surplus
profits.

The provisions of section 160 shall apply to any village or share of a village so attached, and all surplus profits of the land attached, beyond the cost of such attachment and management, including the payments of the land revenue and the cost of the introduction of a revenue survey, if the same be introduced under the provisions of section 111, shall be kept in deposit for the eventual benefit of the person or persons entitled to the same, or paid to the said person or persons from time to time as the Collector ²* * * may direct.

145. The precautionary measures authorized by the last five sections shall be relinquished if the person primarily responsible for the payment of revenue or any person who would be responsible for the same if default were made by the person primarily responsible shall pay the costs, if any,

lawfully incurred by the Collector up to the time of such relinquishment, and shall furnish security satisfactory to the Collector for the payment of the revenue, at the time at which, or in the instalments, if any, in which, it is payable under the provisions hereinafter contained.

146. Land revenue, except when it is recovered under the provisions of the foregoing sections 140 to 144, shall be payable at such times, in such instalments, to such persons and at such places as may from time to time be determined by the orders of ¹[the Provincial Government].

Provincial Government to determine the dates, etc., on which land revenue shall be payable.

147. Any sum not so paid becomes thereupon an arrear of land revenue, and the persons responsible for it, whether under the provisions of section 136 or of any other section, become defaulters.

Arrear. Defaulters.

²[148. If any instalments of land revenue be not fully paid within the prescribed time, it shall be lawful for the Collector to impose as a penalty or as interest such charge on such instalments, and on the arrears, if any, of former years, as may be authorised according to a scale to be fixed from time to time under the orders of the ³[Provincial Government], and further to proceed to levy at once the entire balance of land revenue due by the defaulter for the current year :

Liabilities incurred by default.

Provided that no such charge shall be imposed on any instalment, the payment of which has been suspended by order of ¹[the Provincial Government], in respect of the period during which the payment remained suspended.]

149. A statement of account, certified by the Collector or by an Assistant or Deputy Collector, shall, for the purposes of this chapter, be conclusive evidence of the existence of the arrear of the amount of land revenue due, and of the person who is the defaulter.

Certified account to be evidence as to arrears.

On receipt of such certified statement, it shall be lawful for the Collector of one district to proceed to recover the demands of the Collector of any other district under the provisions of this chapter as if the demand arose in his own district.

Collectors may realize each other's demands.

A similar statement of account certified by the Collector of Bombay may be proceeded upon as if certified by the Collector of a district under this Act.

150. An arrear of land revenue may be recovered by the following processes :—

Process for recovery of arrears.

(a) by serving a written notice of demand on the defaulter under section 152 ;

(b) by forfeiture of the occupancy or alienated holding in respect of which the arrear is due under section 153 ;

(c) by distraint and sale of the defaulter's moveable property under section 154 ;

(d) by sale of the defaulter's immoveable property under section 155 ;

(e) by arrest and imprisonment of the defaulter under sections 157 and 158 ;

(f) in the case of alienated holding consisting of entire villages, or shares of villages, by attachment of the said villages or shares of villages under sections 159 to 163.

Revenue demands of former years how recoverable.

151. The said processes may be employed for the recovery of arrears of former years as well as of the current year, but the preferences given by sections 137 and 138 shall apply only to demands for the current year :

Proviso.

Provided that any process commenced in the current year shall be entitled to the said preferences, notwithstanding that it may not be fully executed within that year.

When notice of demand may issue.

152. A notice of demand may be issued on or after the day following that on which the arrear accrues.

The Commissioner may from time to time frame rules for the issue of such notices, and with the sanction of the ¹[Provincial Government] shall fix the costs recoverable from the defaulter as an arrear of revenue, and direct by what officer such notices shall be issued.

The occupancy or alienated holding for which arrear is due may be forfeited.

153. The Collector may declare the occupancy or alienated holding in respect of which an arrear of land revenue is due, to be forfeited to ²[the Provincial Government], and sell or otherwise dispose of the same under the provisions of sections 56 and 57, and credit the proceeds, if any, to the defaulter's accounts.

Proviso.

(a) unless previously thereto he shall have issued a proclamation and written notices of the intended declaration in the manner prescribed by sections 165 and 166 for sales of immoveable property, and

(b) until after the expiration of at least fifteen days from the latest date on which any of the said notices shall have been affixed as required by section 166.]

154. The Collector may also cause the defaulter's moveable property to be distrained and sold.

Such distraints shall be made by such officers or class of officers as the Commissioner under the orders of ¹[the Provincial Government] may from time to time direct.

155. The Collector may also cause the right, title and interest of the defaulter in any immoveable property other than the land on which the arrear is due to be sold.

1908. 156. All such property as is by the Civil Procedure Code exempted from attachment or sale in execution of a decree, shall also be exempt from distraint or sale, under either of the last two preceding sections.

Exemption

The Collector's decision as to what property is so entitled to exemption shall be conclusive.

157. At any time after an arrear becomes due, the defaulter may be arrested and detained in custody for ten days in the office of the Collector or of a Mamlatdar or Mahalkari, unless the revenue due together with the penalty or interest and the costs of arrest and of notice of demand, if any, have issued and the cost of his subsistence during detention is sooner paid.

Arrest and

If, on the expiry of ten days the amount due by the defaulter is not paid, then, or if the Collector deem fit on any earlier day, he may be sent by the Collector with a warrant, in the form of Schedule C, for imprisonment in the civil jail of the district :

Provided that no defaulter shall be detained in imprisonment for a longer period than the time limited by law in the case of the execution of a decree of a Civil Court for a debt equal in amount to the arrear of revenue due by such defaulter.

158. The Commissioner may, with the sanction of the ²[Provincial Government], from time to time, declare by what officers, or class of officers, the powers of arrest conferred by section 157 may be exercised, and also fix the costs of arrest and the amount of subsistence-money to be paid by ¹[the Provincial Government] to any defaulter under detention or imprisonment.

159. If the holding, in respect of which an arrear is due, consists of an entire village, or of a share of a village, and the adoption of any of the other processes before specified is deemed inexpedient, the Collector may, with the previous sanction of the Commissioner, cause such village or share of a village to be attached and taken under the management of himself or any agent whom he appoints for that purpose.

160. The lands of any village or share of a village so attached shall revert to ¹[the Crown] unaffected by the acts of the superior holder or of any of the sharers, or by any charges or liabilities subsisting against such lands, or against such superior holder or sharers as are interested therein, so far as the public revenue is concerned, but without prejudice in other respects to the rights of individuals ;

Powers of manager.

and the Collector or the agent so appointed shall be entitled to manage the lands attached, and to receive all rents and profits accruing therefrom to the exclusion of the superior holder or any of the sharers thereof, until the Collector restores the said superior holder to the management thereof.

Application of surplus profits.

161. All surplus profits of the lands attached, beyond the cost of such attachment and management, including the payment of the current revenue, and the cost of the introduction of a revenue survey, if the same be introduced under the provisions of section 111 ²* * * shall be applied in defraying the said arrear.

Restoration of village so attached.

162. The village or share of a village so attached shall be released from attachment, and the management thereof shall be restored to the superior holder on the said superior holder's making an application to the Collector for that purpose at any time within twelve years from the first of August next after the attachment—

if at the time that such application is made it shall appear that the arrear has been liquidated ;

or if the said superior holder shall be willing to pay the balance, if any, still due by him, and shall do so within such period as the Collector may prescribe in that behalf.

Disposal of surplus receipts.

The Collector shall make over to the superior holder the surplus receipts, if any, which have accrued in the year in which his application for restoration of the village or share of a village is made after defraying all arrears and costs ; but such surplus receipts, if any, of previous years shall be at the disposal of ³[the Provincial Government].

Village, etc., to vest in the Crown for the purposes of the Province, if not redeemed within twelve years.

163. If no application be made for the restoration of a village or portion of a village so attached within the said period of twelve years, or if, after such application has been made, the superior holder shall fail to pay the balance, if any, still due by him within the period prescribed by the Collector in this behalf, the said village or portion of a village shall thenceforward vest in ⁴[the Crown] for the purposes of the Province free

from all incumbrances created by the superior holder or any of the sharers or any of his or their predecessors-in-title, or in anywise subsisting as against such superior holder or any of the sharers, but without prejudice to the rights of the ¹[persons in actual possession of the land].

164. Any defaulter detained in custody, or imprisoned, shall forthwith be set at liberty, and the execution of any process shall, at any time, be stayed, on the defaulter's giving before the Collector or other person nominated by him for the purpose, or if the defaulter is in jail, before the officer in charge of such jail, security in the form of Schedule D, satisfactory to the Collector, or to such other person or officer.

But all processes to be stayed on security being given:

And any person against whom proceedings are taken under this chapter may pay the amount claimed under protest to the officer taking such proceedings, and upon such* payment the proceedings shall be stayed.

or on amount demanded being paid under protest.

165. When any sale of either moveable or immoveable property is ordered under the provisions of this chapter, the Collector shall issue a proclamation, in the vernacular language of the district, of the intended sale, specifying the time and place of sale, and in the case of moveable property whether the sale is subject to confirmation or not, and, when land paying revenue to ²[the Provincial Government] is to be sold, the revenue assessed upon it, together with any other particulars he may think necessary.

Procedure in effecting sales.

Such proclamation shall be made by beat of drum at the head-quarters of the taluka, and in the village in which the immoveable property is situate, if the sale be of immoveable property; if the sale be of moveable property the proclamation shall be made in the village in which such property was seized, and in such other places as the Collector may direct.

Proclamation of sales.

166. A written notice of the intended sale of immoveable property, and of the time and place thereof, shall be affixed in each of the following places, viz., the office of the Collector of the district, the office of Mamlatdar or Mahalkari of the taluka or mahal in which the immoveable property is situate, the chavdi or some other public building in the village in which it is situate, and the defaulter's dwelling-place.

Notification of sales.

In the case of moveable property, the written notice shall be affixed in the Mamlatdar's or Mahalkari's office, and in the chavdi or some other public building in the village in which such property was seized.

The Collector may also cause notice of any sale, whether of moveable or immoveable property, to be published in any other manner that he may deem fit.

- 167.** Sales shall be made by auction by such persons as the Collector may direct.
- 168.** Nothing in the last three sections applies to the sale of perishable articles. Such articles shall be sold by auction with the least possible delay, in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be made by the Collector either generally or specially in that behalf.
- 169.** If the defaulter, or any person on his behalf, pay the arrear in respect of which the property is to be sold and all other charges legally due by him at any time before the day fixed for the sale, to the person appointed under section 146 to receive payment of the land revenue due, or to the officer appointed to conduct the sale or if he furnish security under section 164, the sale shall be stayed.
- 170.** Sales of perishable articles shall be at once finally concluded by the officer conducting such sales. All other sales of moveable property shall be finally concluded by the officer conducting such sales, or shall be subject to confirmation, as may be directed in orders to be made by the Collector either generally or specially in that behalf. In the case of sales made subject to confirmation, the Collector shall direct by whom such sales may be confirmed.
- 171.** When the sale is finally concluded by the officer conducting the same, the price of every lot shall be paid for at the time of sale, or as soon after as the said officer shall direct, and in default of such payment the property shall forthwith be again put up and sold. On payment of the purchase-money the officer holding the sale shall grant a receipt for the same, and the sale shall become absolute as against all persons whomsoever.
- 172.** When the sale is subject to confirmation, the party who is declared to be the purchaser shall be required to deposit immediately twenty-five per centum on the amount of his bid, and in default of such deposit the property shall forthwith be again put up and sold. The full amount of purchase-money shall be paid by the purchaser before sunset of the day after he is informed of the sale having been confirmed, or, if the said day be a Sunday or other authorized holiday, then before sunset of the first office day after such day. On payment of such full amount of

the purchase-money, the purchaser shall be granted a receipt for the same, and the sale shall become absolute as against all persons whomsoever.

173. In all cases of sale of immoveable property, the party who is declared to be the purchaser shall be required to deposit immediately twenty-five per centum on the amount of his bid, and in default of such deposit the property shall forthwith be again put up and sold.

Deposit by purchaser in case of sale of immoveable property.

174. The full amount of purchase-money shall be paid by the purchaser before sunset of the fifteenth day from that on which the sale of the immoveable property took place, or, if the said fifteenth day be a Sunday or other authorized holiday, then before sunset of the first office day after such fifteenth day.

Purchase-money when to be paid.

175. In default of payment within the prescribed period of the full amount of purchase-money, whether of moveable or immoveable property, the deposit, after defraying thereout the expenses of the sale, shall be forfeited to ¹[the Provincial Government], and the property shall be re-sold, and the defaulting purchaser shall forfeit all claim to the property or to any part of the sum for which it may be subsequently sold.

Effect of default.

176. If the proceeds of the sale, which is eventually made, be less than the price bid by such defaulting purchaser, the difference shall be recoverable from him by the Collector as an arrear of land revenue.

Liability of purchaser for loss by re-sale.

177. Every re-sale of property in default of payment of the purchase-money, or after postponement of the first sale, shall, except when such re-sale takes place forthwith, be made after the issue of a fresh notice in the manner prescribed for original sales.

Notification before re-sale.

178. At any time within thirty days from the date of the sale of immoveable property application may be made to the Collector to set aside the sale on the ground of some material irregularity, or mistake, or fraud, in publishing or conducting it ;

Application to set aside sale.

but, except as is otherwise provided in the next following section, no sale shall be set aside on the ground of any such irregularity or mistake, unless the applicant proves to the satisfaction of the Collector that he has sustained substantial injury by reason thereof.

If the application be allowed, the Collector shall set aside the sale, and direct a fresh one.

179. On the expiration of thirty days from the date of the sale, if no such application as is mentioned in the last preceding section has been made, or if such application has been made and rejected, the Collector shall make an order confirming the sale : Provided that, if he shall have reason to think that the sale ought to be set aside notwithstanding that no such application has been made, or on grounds other than those alleged

in any application which has been made and rejected, he may, after recording his reasons in writing, set aside the sale.

Refund of deposit or purchase-money when sale set aside.

180. Whenever the sale of any property is not confirmed, or is set aside, the purchaser shall be entitled to receive back his deposit or his purchase-money, as the case may be.

On confirmation of sale, purchaser to be put in possession. Certificate of purchase.

181. After a sale of any occupancy or alienated holding has been confirmed in manner aforesaid, the Collector shall put the person declared to be the purchaser into possession of the land ¹* * * and shall cause his name to be entered in the ²[land records] as occupant or holder in lieu of that of the defaulter, and shall grant him a certificate to the effect that he has purchased the ³[land] to which the certificate refers.

Bar of suit against certified purchaser.

182. The certificate shall state the name of the person declared at the time of sale to be the actual purchaser; and any suit brought in a Civil Court against the certified purchaser on the ground that the purchase was made on behalf of another person not the certified purchaser, though by agreement the name of the certified purchaser was used, shall be dismissed.

Application of proceeds of sale.

183. When any sale of moveable property under this chapter has become absolute, and when any sale of immovable property has been confirmed, the proceeds of the sale shall be applied to defraying the expenses of the sale and to the payment of any arrears due by the defaulter at the date of the confirmation of such sale, and recoverable as an arrear of land revenue,

and the surplus (if any) shall be paid to the person whose property has been sold.

Expenses of sale how calculated.

The expenses of the sale shall be estimated at such rates and according to such rules as may from time to time be sanctioned by the Commissioner under the orders of ⁴[the Provincial Government].

Surplus not to be paid to creditors, except under order of Court.

184. The said surplus shall not, except under an order of a Civil Court, be payable to any creditor of the person whose property has been sold.

Certified purchaser liable only for land-revenue subsequently due.

186. If any claim shall be set up by a third person to moveable property attached under the provisions of this chapter, the Collector shall admit or reject his claim on a summary inquiry held after reasonable notice. If the claim be admitted wholly or partly, the property shall be dealt with accordingly. Except in so far as it is admitted, the property shall be sold and the title of the purchaser shall be good for all purposes, and the proceeds shall be disposable as hereinbefore directed.]

Claims to attached moveable property how to be disposed of.

187. All sums due on account of land revenue, all quit-rents, nazranas, succession duties, transfer duties and forfeitures, and all cesses, profits from land, emoluments, fees, charges, penalties, fines, and costs payable or leviable under this Act or under any Act or Regulation hereby repealed, or under any Act for the time being in force relating to land revenue ;

What moneys leviable under the provisions of this Chapter.

and all moneys due by any contractor for the farm of customs-duties, or of any other duty, or tax, or of any other item of revenue whatsoever, and all specific pecuniary penalties to which any such contractor renders himself liable under the terms of his agreement ;

and also all sums declared by this or by any other Act or Regulation at the time being in force ¹[or by any contract with the ²[Crown]] to be leviable as an assessment, or as a revenue demand, or as an arrear of land revenue ;

shall be levied under the foregoing provisions of this chapter ³[and all the foregoing provisions of this chapter shall, so far as may be, be applicable thereto.]

under the terms of their security-bond, be liable to be proceeded against under the provisions of this chapter as revenue-defaulters ¹[and all the foregoing provisions of this chapter shall, so far as may be, be applicable to such persons.]

On resumption of a farm, no payments made to contractor in advance to be admitted.

And in the event of the resumption of any such farm as is aforesaid, no person shall be entitled to credit for any payments which he may have made to the contractor in anticipation.

The recovery of free grant^s as arrears of revenue in case of misuse.

CHAPTER XII.

PROCEDURE OF REVENUE OFFICERS.

Subordination of revenue officers.

188. In all official acts and proceedings a revenue officer shall, in the absence of any express provision of law to the contrary, be subject as to the place, time and manner of performing his duties to the direction and control of the officer to whom he is subordinate.

Power to summon persons to give evidence and produce documents.

189. Every revenue officer not lower in rank than a Mamlatdar's first karkun, or an Assistant Superintendent of Survey, in their respective departments, shall have power to summon any person whose attendance he considers necessary either to be examined as a party or to give evidence as a witness, or to produce documents for the purposes of any inquiry which such officer is legally empowered to make. A summons to produce documents may be for the production of certain specified documents, or for the production of all documents of a certain description in the possession of the person summoned.

All persons so summoned shall be bound to attend, either in person or by an authorized agent, as such officer may direct : Provided that exemptions

V of 1908. under ¹[sections 132 and 133 of the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908], shall be applicable to requisitions for attendance under this section ;

and all persons so summoned shall be bound to state the truth upon any subject respecting which they are examined or make statements, and to produce such documents and other things as may be required.

190. Every summons shall be in writing, in duplicate, and shall state the purpose for which it is issued, and shall be signed by the officer issuing it, and if he have a seal shall also bear his seal ;

Summons to be in writing, signed, and sealed. How to be served.

and shall be served by tendering or delivering a copy of it to the person summoned, or, if he cannot be found, by affixing a copy of it to some conspicuous part of his usual residence.

If his usual residence be in another district, the summons may be sent by post to the Collector of that district, who shall cause it to be served in accordance with the preceding clause of this section.

Service in district other than that of issuer.

191. Every notice under this Act, unless it is otherwise expressly provided, shall be served either by tendering or delivering a copy thereof to the person on whom it is to be served or to his agent, if he have any ;

Mode of serving notices.

or by affixing a copy thereof to some conspicuous place on the land, if any, to which such notice refers.

No such notice shall be deemed void on account of any error in the name or designation of any person referred to therein, unless when such error has produced substantial injustice.

Notice not void for error.

V of 1908. 192. In any formal or summary inquiry if any party desires the attendance of witnesses, he shall follow the procedure prescribed by the ²[Code of Civil Procedure, 1908, for parties applying for summonses for witnesses].

Procedure for procuring attendance of witnesses.

193. In all formal inquiries the evidence shall be taken down in full, in writing, in the language in ordinary use in the district, by, or in the presence and hearing and under the personal superintendence and direction of, the officer making the investigation or inquiry, and shall be signed by him.

Mode of taking evidence in formal inquiries.

In cases in which the evidence is not taken down in full in writing by the officer making the inquiry, he shall, as the examination of each witness proceeds, make a memorandum of the substance of what such witness deposes ; and such memorandum shall be written and signed by such officer with his own hand, and shall form part of the record.

If such officer is prevented from making a memorandum as above required, he shall record the reason of his inability to do so.

Taking evidence given in English. Translation to be on record.

When the evidence is given in English, such officer may take it down in that language with his own hand, and an authenticated translation of the same in the language in ordinary use in the district shall be made and shall form part of the record.

Writing and explanation of decisions.

194. Every decision, after a formal inquiry, shall be written by the officer passing the same in his own hand-writing, and shall contain a full statement of the grounds on which it is passed.

Summary inquiries how to be conducted.

195. In summary inquiries the presiding officer shall himself, as any such inquiry proceeds, record a minute of the proceedings in his own hand in English or in the language of the district, embracing the material averments made by the parties interested, the material parts of the evidence, the decision, and the reasons for the same :

Provided that it shall at any time be lawful for such officer to conduct an inquiry directed by this Act to be summary under all, or any, of the rules applicable to a formal inquiry, if he deem fit.

Formal and summary inquiries to be deemed judicial proceedings.

196. A formal or summary inquiry under this Act shall be deemed to be a "judicial proceeding" within the meaning of sections 193, 219, and 228 of the Indian Penal Code, and the office of any authority holding a formal or summary inquiry shall be deemed a Civil Court for the purposes of such inquiry. XLV
of
1860.

Hearing and decisions. Notice to parties.

Every hearing and decision, whether in a formal or summary inquiry, shall be in public, and the parties or their authorized agents shall have due notice to attend.

Ordinary inquiries how to be conducted.

197. An inquiry which this Act does not require to be either formal or summary, or which any revenue officer may on any occasion deem to be necessary to make, in the execution of his lawful duties, shall be conducted according to such rules applicable thereto, whether general or special, as may have been prescribed by the ¹[Provincial Government], or an authority superior to the officer conducting such inquiry, and, except in so far as controlled by such rules, according to the discretion of the officer in such way as may seem best calculated for the ascertainment of all essential facts and the furtherance of the public good.

Copies and translations, etc., how to be obtained.

198. In all cases in which a formal or summary inquiry is made, authenticated copies and translations of decisions, orders, and the reasons therefor, and of exhibits, shall be furnished to the parties, and original documents used as evidence shall be restored to the persons who produced them, or to persons claiming under them on due application being made for the same, subject to such charges for copying, etc., as may, from time to time, be authorized by ²[the Provincial Government].

199. Whenever it is provided by this Act that a defaulter, or any other person may be arrested, such arrest shall be made upon a warrant issued by any officer competent to direct such person's arrest.

200. It shall be lawful for any revenue officer at any time, and from time to time, to enter, when necessary, for the purposes of measurement, fixing, or inspecting boundaries, classification of soil, or assessment, or for any other purpose connected with the lawful exercise of his office under the provisions of this Act, or of any other law for the time being in force relating to land revenue, any lands or premises, whether belonging to ¹[the Crown] or to private individuals, and whether fully assessed to the land revenue or partially or wholly exempt from the same: Provided always that no building used as a human dwelling shall be entered, unless with the consent of the occupier thereof, without a notice having been served at the said building not less than seven days before such entry; and provided also that in the cases of buildings of all descriptions, due regard shall be paid to the social and religious prejudices of the occupiers.

Power of revenue officer to enter upon any lands or premises for purposes of measurement, etc.

Proviso.

201. The ²[Provincial Government] may declare what shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to be the language in ordinary use in any district.

Provincial Government to determine the language of a district.

202. Whenever it is provided by this, or by any other Act for the time being in force, that the Collector may or shall evict any person wrongfully in possession of land, such eviction shall be made in the following manner, viz. :—

Collector how to proceed in order to evict any person wrongfully in possession of land.

by serving a notice on the person or persons in possession requiring them within such time as may appear reasonable after receipt of the said notice to vacate the land, and,

if such notice is not obeyed by removing or deputing a subordinate to remove any person who may refuse to vacate the same, and,

if the officer removing any such person shall be resisted or obstructed by any person, the Collector shall hold a summary inquiry into the facts of the case, and if satisfied that the resistance or obstruction was without any just cause, and that such resistance and obstruction still continue, may, without prejudice to any proceedings to which such person may be liable under any law for the time being in force for the punishment of such resistance or obstruction, issue a warrant for the arrest of the said person, and on his appearance commit him to close custody in the office of the Collector or of any Mamltdar or Mahalkari, or send him with a warrant, in the form of Schedule I, for imprisonment in the civil jail of the district for such period not exceeding thirty days, as may be necessary to prevent the continuance of such obstruction or resistance.

CHAPTER XIII.

APPEALS AND REVISION.

Appeal to lie from any order passed by a revenue officer to his superior.

203. In the absence of any express provision of this Act, or of any law for the time being in force to the contrary, an appeal shall lie from any decision or order passed by a revenue officer under this Act, or any other law for the time being in force, to that officer's immediate superior, whether such decision or order may itself have been passed on appeal from a subordinate officer's decision or order or not.

Appeal when to lie to the Provincial Government.

204. An appeal shall lie to the ¹[Provincial Government] from any decision or order passed by a Commissioner or by a Survey Commissioner, except in the case of any decision or order passed by such officer on appeal from a decision or order itself recorded in appeal by any officer subordinate to him.

Periods within which appeals must be brought.

205. No appeal shall be brought after the expiration of sixty days if the decision or order complained of have been passed by an officer inferior in rank to a Collector or a Superintendent of Survey in their respective departments ; nor after the expiration of ninety days in any other case.

In computing the above periods, the time required to prepare a copy of the decision or order appealed against shall be excluded.

Admission of appeal after period of limitation.

206. Any appeal under this chapter may be admitted after the period of limitation prescribed therefor, when the appellant satisfies the officer or the ¹[Provincial Government] ²[to whom or to which] he appeals, that he had sufficient cause for not presenting the appeal within such period.

No appeal shall lie against an order passed under this section admitting an appeal.

Provision where last day for appeal falls on a Sunday or a holiday.

207. Whenever the last day of any period provided in this chapter for the presentation of an appeal falls on a Sunday or other holiday recognized by ³[the Provincial Government] the day next following the close of the holiday shall be deemed to be such last day.

Copy of order to accompany petition of appeal.

208. Every petition of appeal shall be accompanied by the decision or order appealed against or by an authenticated copy of the same.

Powers of appellate authority.

209. The appellate authority may ⁴[for reasons to be recorded in writing] either annul, reverse, modify or confirm the decision or order

of the subordinate officer appealed against, or he may direct the subordinate officer to make such further investigation or to take such additional evidence as he may think necessary, or he may himself take such additional evidence.

(a) when an appeal is dismissed summarily, or

(b) when the decision or order appealed from is itself a decision or order recorded in appeal, or

(c) when an appeal is made to the ²[Provincial Government] under section 204.]

210. In any case in which an appeal lies, the appellate authority may, pending decision of the appeal direct the execution of the decision or order of the subordinate officer to be suspended.

Power to suspend execution of order of subordinate officers.

211. The ²[Provincial Government] and any revenue officer, not inferior in rank to ³[an Assistant or Deputy Collector] or a Superintendent of Survey, in their respective departments, may call for and examine the record of any inquiry or the proceedings of any subordinate revenue officer, for the purpose of satisfying ⁴[itself or himself as the case may be] as to the legality or propriety of any decision or order passed, and as to the regularity of the proceedings of such officer.

Power of Provincial Government and of certain revenue officers to call for and examine records and proceedings of subordinate officers.

The following officers may in the same manner call for and examine the proceedings of any officer subordinate to them in any matter in which neither a formal nor a summary inquiry has been held, namely,—⁵*

* a Mamlatdar, a Mahalkari, ⁶[an] Assistant Superintendent of Survey and an Assistant Settlement officer.

If in any case, it shall appear to the ²[Provincial Government], or to such officer aforesaid, that any decision or order or proceedings so called for should be modified, annulled or reversed, ⁷[it or he] may pass such order thereon as ⁷[it or he] deems fit :

and to pass orders thereupon.

Rules as to decisions or orders expressly made final.

212. Wherever in this Act it is declared that a decision or order shall be final, such expression shall be deemed to mean that no appeal lies from such decision or order.

The ²[Provincial Government] alone shall be competent to modify, annul or reverse any such decision or order under the provisions of the last preceding section.

CHAPTER XIV.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Maps and land records open to inspection. Extracts and copies shall be given.

213. Subject to such rules and the payment of such fees as the ²[Provincial Government] may from time to time prescribe in this behalf, all maps and ³[land records] shall be open to the inspection of the public at reasonable hours, and certified extracts from ⁴[the same] or certified copies thereof shall be given to all persons applying for the same.

Rules.

⁵[214. (a) regulating the appointment of revenue officers and the exercise by them of their powers and duties ;

(b) regulating the assessment of land to the land revenue and the alteration and revision of such assessment and the recovery of land revenue ;

(c) prescribing the notice to be given in the case of inquiries and orders under section 37 ;

(d) prescribing the purposes for which unalienated land liable to the payment of land revenue may or may not be used, and regulating the grant of permission to use agricultural land for non-agricultural purposes ;

(e) regulating the disposal of land and other property ¹[vesting in the Crown for the purposes of the Province] ;

(f) regulating the disposal of forfeited land ;

(g) prescribing the terms and conditions on which, and the periods for which, unoccupied unalienated land may be granted ;

(h) fixing the maximum amount of fine leviable under section 61 ;

(i) regulating the conduct of surveys and settlements of land revenue, and prescribing the notice to be given under section 103 before the introduction of a settlement ;

(j) regulating the division of survey numbers into sub-divisions and the fixing of the assessment of sub-divisions under section 117A ;

(k) regulating the construction, laying out, maintenance and repair of boundary marks ;

(l) regulating the compilation, maintenance and revision of the record of rights and the registers of mutations, disputed cases and tenancies, and prescribing the forms in which they are to be compiled and the officers by whom the said records and registers are to be tested and revised ;

(m) regulating the exercise by village accountants and revenue officers of the powers of a survey officer and the assessment of costs and expenses under section 135G ;

(n) prescribing the mode, form and manner in which appeals under Chapter XIII shall be drawn up and presented ;

(o) prescribing the records, registers, accounts, maps and plans to be maintained for the purposes of this Act and the manner and forms in which they shall be prepared and maintained.

(3) The power to make rules under this section shall be subject to the condition of previous publication.]

Chapters VIII to X how far applicable to alienated villages.

1216. (1) The provisions of Chapters VIII to X shall be applicable to—

- (a) all unalienated lands situated within the limits of an alienated village ;
- (b) unalienated shares of villages of which a definite share defined by metes and bounds is alienated ;
- (c) alienated villages the holders of which are entitled to a certain amount of the revenue, but of which the excess above such amount belongs to ²[the Crown].

(2) Save as is otherwise provided in section 111 and in this section, no provision of the said Chapters shall be applied to any other alienated village except for the purposes of fixing its boundaries and of determining any disputes relating thereto, unless the extension of the provision is authorised by the Commissioner acting on the written application of the sole holder, or, if there be more than one holder, of the holder or holders representing in the aggregate not less than one-half of the total interests in the village in respect of its alienated revenue. If any share of the village is unalienated the prescribed proportion of one-half shall be reckoned as if the village were wholly alienated, ²[the Crown] being considered as the holder in respect of the unalienated share.

(3) In any case in which action under sub-section (2) is taken lawfully by the Commissioner on the application of some only of the holders of the village any covenant or agreement relative to the extension of the said Chapters or incidental thereto, entered into by such holders shall also be binding on the remaining holders of the village in respect of their shares in the revenue of the village as if such covenant or agreement had been entered into by them.

(4) All survey settlements heretofore introduced in alienated villages shall be valid as if they had been introduced in accordance with the provisions of this section.

Holders of land in alienated villages.

217. When a survey settlement has been introduced under the provisions of the last section or of any law for the time being in force, into an alienated village, the holders of all lands to which such settlement extends shall have the same rights and be affected by the same responsibilities in respect of the lands in their occupation as ³[holders of land] in unalienated villages have, or are affected by, under the provisions of this Act, and all the provisions of this Act relating to ³[holders of land in unalienated villages] ⁴* * * shall be applicable, so far as may be, to them.

Nothing in this Act, which applies in terms to unalienated land or to the holders of unalienated land only, shall be deemed to affect alienated land, or the rights of holders of alienated land or of ¹[the Crown] in respect of any such land, and no presumption shall be deemed to arise either in favour, or to the prejudice, of any holder of alienated land from any provision of this Act in terms relating to unalienated land only. An Act to consolidate the immoveable and other property vesting in the Trustees of the Port of Bombay and certain other property on, or connected with, the foreshore of the Island of Bombay into one estate, and to vest the control and management of the same in one Public Trust; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the immoveable and other property vesting in the trustees of the Port of Bombay should be consolidated

with certain other property on, or connected with, the foreshore of the Island of Bombay into one estate, and that such consolidated estate should, together with the rights and powers now exercisable by the said trustees, be vested, subject to the provisions hereinafter appearing, in a new trust; It is enacted as follows:—

I.—PRELIMINARY.

- Short title. 1. This Act may be called the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879.
- Repeal of Bombay Act I of 1873. 2. From the date¹ which shall be notified by the ²[Provincial Government] under section 8, Bombay Act I of 1873 (the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1873), shall be repealed:

Provided that all debts and obligations incurred, all contracts entered into and all matters and things engaged to be done by, with, or for the trustees appointed under the said Act shall be deemed to have been incurred, entered into, or engaged to be done by, with, or for the Board constituted by this Act;

and all rates and sums of money due to the said trustees shall be deemed to be due to the said Board;

and all suits or other legal proceedings, civil or criminal, instituted, or which might, but for the passing of this Act, have been instituted, by or against the said trustees, may be continued or instituted by or against the said Board.

- Interpretation-clause. 3. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context,—

(1) the word “rates” includes any toll, due, rent, rate, or charge leviable under section 43;

(2) “port” means the Port of Bombay within such limits as may, from time to time, be defined by ³[the Central Government] for the purposes of this Act, by notification in the ⁴[Official Gazette], and until a notification is so issued, within such limits as may have been defined ⁵* * * * * under section 73 of the ⁶Bombay Port Trust Act, 1873, for the purposes of that Act;

(3) [Definition of "vessel."] *Rep. Bom. Act III of 1886, Schedule A* ;

(4) "master," when used in relation to any vessel, means any person having for the time being the charge or control of such vessel ;

(5) "owner," when used in relation to goods, includes any consignor, consignee, shipper or agent for the sale or custody of such goods ; and, when used in relation to any vessel, includes any part-owner, charterer, consignee or mortgagee in possession thereof ;

(6) "land" includes the bed of the sea below high-water mark ;

(7) "wharf" includes a bandar and any part of the foreshore used for loading or unloading goods, and any wall enclosing or adjoining the same ;

(8) "dock" includes basins, locks, cuts, entrances, graving-docks, graving-blocks, inclined planes, patent slips, gridirons, quays, warehouses, and other works and things appertaining to any dock ;

(9) "pier" includes any stage, stairs, landing-place, hard, jetty, landing-stage, floating barge or pontoon, and any bridges or other works connected therewith ;

(10) the word "goods" includes wares and merchandise of every description ;

(11) "immoveable property" includes wharfage-rights and all other rights exercisable on, over, or in respect of, any land, wharf, dock, or pier ;

II.—OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Constitution of Board.

The duty of carrying out the provisions of this Act shall, subject to such conditions and limitations as are hereinafter contained, be vested in a Board, to be called "the Trustees of the Port of Bombay," and such Board, hereinafter referred to as "the Board," shall be a body corporate and have perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall sue and be sued by the name first aforesaid.

(3) The Secretary of every electing body shall make a return to ¹[the Central Government] of the name of every person so elected by such body and his return shall be published in the ²[Official Gazette].

(4) In the event of default being made by any electing body in electing a trustee under the foregoing provisions within the period hereinafter prescribed in this behalf, it shall be lawful for ¹[the Central Government] by notification in the ²[Official Gazette] to nominate a person, and the person so nominated shall be deemed to be a trustee as if he had been duly elected.]

the same manner and subject, so far as may be, to the same provisions as are applicable in the case of original appointments and elections of trustees: Provided that the trustee so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating trustee would have retained the same if such vacancy had not occurred.

Acting trustees.

(2) If a trustee departs from Bombay with an intention of being absent for a longer period than three months, or if a trustee shall have been absent for such period, a person shall be elected or appointed as aforesaid to act for such trustee during his absence or until he shall cease to be a trustee, and the person so acting shall be deemed for all the purposes of this Act to be a trustee.

(e) any joint-stock company which shall contract with, or be employed by or on behalf of the Board ; or

(f) the occasional sale to the Board, to a value not exceeding two thousand rupees in any one official year, of any article in which he trades.]

Notwithstanding anything contained in section 17, the signature of the Chairman may be engraved, lithographed, or impressed by any mechanical process on the coupons attached to debentures issued under this Act, and such signature so engraved, lithographed, or impressed shall be as valid as if the same had been subscribed in the proper handwriting of the said Chairman.]

Board may

18. The Board may compound or compromise for, or in respect of, any claim or demand arising out of any contract entered into by them under this Act, or in respect of any action or suit instituted by or against them, for such sum of money, or other compensation, as they shall deem sufficient.

The Chairman.

Duties of
Chairman.

19. The Chairman shall—

(1) attend every meeting of the Board unless prevented by sickness or other reasonable cause;

(2) exercise supervision and control over the acts and proceedings of all officers and servants of the Board in matters of executive administration, and in matters concerning the accounts and records of the Board; ²* * * * *

(3) furnish to ³[the Central Government] a copy of the minutes of any of the Board's proceedings, and any returns or other information which ⁴[the Central Government] may from time to time call for.

20. ¹[The Central Government] may from time to time grant to the Chairman such leave of absence as they may deem fit, and any person whom ¹[the Central Government] appoint to act for the Chairman during any such absence on leave shall, while so acting, be deemed for all the purposes of this Act to be the Chairman. Leave of absence to Chairman.

The allowance, if any, which ¹[the Central Government] direct to be paid to the Chairman during his absence on leave, and the salary which ¹[the Central Government] direct to be paid to the person appointed to act for him, shall be a charge on the general account of the Board. Leave and acting allowances how defrayed.

III.—OF THE OFFICERS AND SERVANTS OF THE BOARD.

Strength of Staff.

21. The Board shall from time to time prepare and sanction a schedule of the staff of officers and servants whom they shall deem it necessary and proper to maintain for the purposes of this Act. Such schedule shall also set forth the amount and nature of the salaries, fees and allowances which the Board sanctions for each such officer or servant. Schedule of staff and of pay and allowances to be prepared and sanctioned by Board.

acting allowances ; (3) for determining the remuneration to be paid to the persons appointed to act for any such officers or servants during their absence on leave ;

length of service ; (4) for regulating the period of service of all such officers and servants ;

pensions, etc. ; (5) for determining the conditions under which such officers and servants or any of them ¹[and the Chairman] shall, on retirement, receive pensions, gratuities, or compassionate allowances, and the amount of such pensions, gratuities or compassionate allowances :

²[Provided that it shall be in the discretion of the Board to determine whether all of such officers and servants, or any, and, if so, which of them, shall become entitled on retirement to any such pensions, gratuities or compassionate allowances as aforesaid ;]

contributions to provident fund ; (6) for authorizing the payment of contributions at certain prescribed rates and subject to certain prescribed conditions to any provident fund which may, with their approval, be established by the officers and servants appointed under this Act, ³[or to such provident fund, if any, as may be established by the Board for the benefit of such officers and servants ⁴[and the Chairman] ;

contributions to welfare fund. ⁵(6-A) for authorizing the payment of contributions to any welfare fund or funds which may be established by the Board for the benefit of the officers and servants appointed under this Act ;

contributions or appropriations to special funds. ⁵(6-B) for authorizing the payment of contributions or appropriations to any special fund or funds which may be established by the Board for any of the purposes of this Act :

Provided that no such special fund shall be established without the previous sanction of ⁶[the Central Government] ; and the maximum amount to which any such special fund may be allowed to accumulate shall be fixed from time to time by ⁶[the Central Government.]

(4) Anything done by a Deputy Chairman within the limits of his authority as so determined from time to time by the Board shall for all the purposes of this Act be deemed to have been done by the Chairman.

(5) The Deputy Chairman shall hold no other salaried office and save in so far as he may be otherwise permitted by the Board, shall devote his whole time and attention to his duties as Deputy Chairman.

(6) Any person appointed by the Board with the approval of the ¹[Central Government] to act for the Deputy Chairman during his absence shall while so acting be deemed for all the purposes of this Act to be the Deputy Chairman.]

Powers of Appointment, etc.

23. ²[Subject to the provisions of the schedule for the time being sanctioned by the Board under section 21 and of the regulations for the time being in force] under section 22, the power of appointing, promoting, suspending, dismissing, fining, reducing or granting leave to the officers and servants of the Board shall be exercised by the Chairman in the case of officers and servants whose monthly salary does not exceed ³[five] hundred rupees, and in every other case by the Board ⁴[and, subject to the regulations at the time being in force under section 22, the power of disposing of all other questions relating to the services of the officers and servants of the Board and their pay, privileges and allowances shall be exercised by the Chairman :

Provided that the Chairman may upon such terms as he shall think fit and subject to the aforesaid provisions and regulations and to the Chairman's powers of revision and control delegate to the head of any department for the time being all or any of his powers under this section in respect of officers and servants of the department whose monthly salary does not exceed three hundred rupees.

Explanation.—In this section the words “head of any department” shall include the Chief Accountant, the Secretary, the Chief Engineer, the Railway Manager, the ¹[Deputy Conservator], the Docks Manager, the Manager, Land and Bunders Department, the Controller of Stores and the Chief Officer of any other department which may be constituted by the Board ; they shall also include any officer acting for the time being in any of the aforesaid capacities.]

The power of dispensing with the services of any officer or servant of the Board, otherwise than by reason of such officer's or servant's own misconduct, or of permitting any such officer or servant to retire on a pension, gratuity or compassionate allowance, shall, subject to the aforesaid provisions, be exercised by the Board alone.

Every order or regulation made by the Board under any of the four last preceding sections shall, so far as the same relates to the Deputy Chairman, Chief Engineer, Railway Manager, Secretary, Chief Accountant, ³[Deputy Conservator], Docks Manager, Manager, Land and Bunders Department, Controller of Stores or any person who may, from time to time, be employed in the capacity of Consulting Engineer to the Board, be subject to the previous sanction of ⁴[the Central Government].

Continuance of present Officers and Servants.

25. All officers and servants holding any office on the day previous to the date notified by the ⁵[Provincial Government] under section 8, under the trustees appointed under the ⁶Bombay Port Trust Act, 1873, shall be deemed to have been appointed under this Act, and shall continue to hold the same office and to receive the same remuneration under the Board until an order to the contrary is passed by competent authority under this Act.

IV.—OF THE PROPERTY AND LIABILITIES OF THE BOARD.

General Powers as to Property.

Powers of Board as to property.

26. The Board shall, for the purposes of this Act, have power to acquire and hold moveable and immoveable property, whether within or without the limits of the Port or City of Bombay; and shall also have power to lease, sell or otherwise convey any moveable or immoveable property which may have become vested in or been acquired by them:

Provided that no sale of immoveable property and no lease of any such property for a term exceeding fifty years shall be valid unless such sale or lease shall have been made with the previous sanction of ¹[the Central Government].

Procedure when Board unable to acquire, by agreement, immoveable property.

27. When the Board are unable to acquire, by agreement, any immoveable property required for the purposes of this Act, ¹[the Central Government] may, ²* * * * * order proceedings to be taken for acquiring the same on behalf of the Board as if such property were land needed for a public purpose within the meaning of the ³Land Acquisition Act, 1870.

The amount of compensation awarded and all other charges incurred in the acquisition of any such property shall be forthwith defrayed by the Board, and thereupon the said property shall vest in the Board.

Transfer of property to Board.

Transfer to Board of property of present Port Trust.

28. All such immoveable and other property as is held by or in trust for the trustees of the Port of Bombay under or in pursuance or for the purposes of the ⁴Bombay Port Trust Act, 1873, shall, upon and after the date notified by the ⁵[Provincial Government] under section 8, vest in the Board, but subject to all charges and liabilities affecting the same.

The property vested by this section in the Board shall be deemed to include the estate, right, title and interest of the ⁶[Crown] in the rock, stones, shingle, gravel, sand or soil within the port, and also the right of levying rates on all goods landed at or shipped from any part of the foreshore between Malabar Point and Colaba Point.

29. Whereas the Secretary of State for India in Council has initiated measures for the acquisition, from the holders thereof, of the properties severally named and generally described in Schedule A, but the arrangements for the said acquisition are not yet complete; and whereas it is expedient that all such estate and interest as may be acquired by the Secretary of State for India in Council in the said properties should vest in the Board; It is hereby enacted that upon and after such date as shall be fixed in this behalf by the ¹[Provincial Government], all the estate, right, title and interest of the Secretary of State for India in Council in the said properties shall, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, become vested in the Board, subject to all covenants, charges, contracts and liabilities affecting the same.

Vesting in Board the right, title and interest acquired by Secretary of State in other properties.

30. And whereas it is proposed that the purchase-money of the said properties shall be paid in Port Trust securities bearing interest at the rate of four per centum per annum; It is hereby enacted that the Board shall within two months from the date aforesaid execute and deliver to the holders of the said properties, securities in the form of Schedule B, under their common seal, for the sums for which the said properties shall be respectively purchased by the Secretary of State for India in Council: Provided that the said sums shall not exceed, in the aggregate, seventy-seven lakhs of rupees, and that so long as the said amount is not exceeded it shall be competent to the Secretary of State for India in Council to acquire such estate, right, title and interest in the said properties as he shall deem fit, anything contained in Schedule A notwithstanding.

Board to issue securities in payment of price of properties vested in them under section 29.

Every such security shall be for an amount of not less than one hundred rupees, and shall covenant for the payment of interest on the principal sum at the rate of four per centum per annum from the date fixed by the ¹[Provincial Government] under section 29; and such interest shall be payable half-yearly on or after the 1st April and the 1st October.

Securities to be for not less than one hundred rupees each

The said securities shall be transferable by endorsement.

The holder of any security in the form of Schedule B, or in any new form duly authorized under this section, may obtain in exchange therefor, upon such terms as the Board shall from time to time determine, a security in any other form so authorized.

32. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to affect the power of ²[any Government] to order proceedings to be taken under the ³Land Acquisition Act, 1870, or any other law for the time being in force for the acquisition of land for public purposes in respect of any land vesting in the Board.

Liabilities.

Capital-debts of Board.

33. The capital-debts due by the Board on account of the immoveable and other property vested in it by this Act are as follows (namely):—

(b) to the holders of the securities to be issued by the Board under section 30—the amounts of such securities.

Interest in what cases to be paid by the Board.

34. On the amounts mentioned in column 3 of Schedule C no interest shall be payable.

On the amounts, if any, which may hereafter be advanced to the Board by ¹[the Central or the Provincial Government] ²* * * interest shall be payable by the Board to ³[that Government] on such dates and at such rates as shall be agreed upon between ³[that Government] and the Board in respect of such advances.

On the amounts of the securities issued by the Board under section 30 ⁴[or section 30A] interest at the covenanted rate of four per centum per annum shall be payable by the Board half-yearly on the 31st March and the 30th September to the Accountant General of Bombay or other officer for the time being performing the duties of the office of the said Accountant General, who shall pay the same on or after the 1st April and 1st October respectively to the holders of the said securities.

If any sum due by the Board under this section on account of interest, or any portion thereof, is not paid by them on the date on which the same is hereby declared to be payable, they shall continue liable for the payment thereof, and interest shall be paid by them to the ⁵[Government concerned] upon the balance from time to time overdue at the rate of four ⁶* * * per centum per annum, until the whole amount is paid.

35. In the event of default being made by the Board in any payment of interest due by it under paragraph 2, 3 or 4 of the last preceding section, the same shall be paid by the Accountant General of Bombay or other officer aforesaid, who shall debit the amount so paid to ⁷[the revenues of the Central Government]; and, in the event of default being made by the Board in any payment due by it under paragraph 5 of the said section, the Accountant General or other officer aforesaid shall nevertheless pay to the security-holders the interest due upon their securities, and shall debit the amounts so paid to ⁷[the revenues of the Central Government].

property or some portion of the property, vested in the Board, which would otherwise be liable to be assessed to the said tax, a sum ascertained in the manner provided in sub-sections (2) and (3).

(2) The rateable value of the buildings and lands in the city vesting in the Board in respect of which the said tax would be leviable from the Board shall be fixed from time to time by the ¹[Central Government]. The said value shall be fixed with a general regard to the provisions contained in the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1883, concerning Bom. III of 1888. the valuation of property assessable to property-taxes, at such amount as the ¹[Central Government] shall deem to be fair and reasonable. Every such decision of the ¹[Central Government] shall hold good for a term of five years, subject only to proportionate variation, if in the meantime the number or extent of the buildings and lands vesting in the Board materially increases or decreases.

(3) The sum to be paid annually to the Corporation by the Board shall be ²[nineteen-twentieths] of the amount which would be payable by an ordinary owner of building or lands in the city, on account of the general tax on a rateable value of the same amount as that fixed under sub-section (2).]

Roads and thoroughfares constructed by Board to be maintained by Municipality in consideration of such payment.

37. In consideration of the said payment the Municipal Commissioner shall, on being satisfied that any road or thoroughfare has been duly levelled, paved, metalled, flagged, channelled and sewered by the Board, declare such road or thoroughfare to be a public road or thoroughfare, and the Municipality shall thenceforward maintain, keep in repair, light and cleanse such road or thoroughfare: ³[Provided that in respect of any such road or thoroughfare wholly constructed after the passing of this Act the Commissioner before making such declaration may further require to be satisfied that the same has been drained, and that such lamps, lamp-posts and other apparatus as in his opinion are necessary for the lighting thereof and should be provided by the Board have been so provided]. The Municipality shall also, on requisition by the Board, maintain, keep in repair, light and cleanse the road of any wharf, dock or pier vested in the Board.

Roads and thoroughfares not to be stopped up without consent of Board.

The Municipality shall maintain, keep in repair, light and cleanse the said roads and thoroughfares in the same manner and with the same liabilities in respect thereof as if the said roads and public thoroughfares vested in the said Municipality; but it shall not be competent to the Municipal Commissioner or to the Municipality to discontinue or stop up any road or thoroughfare which at any time vested in, or which has been constructed by, the Board or the Trustees of the Port appointed

Payments shall be made half-yearly to such sinking fund, and such payments shall be of such amount as shall with interest suffice to liquidate the loan within such period not exceeding sixty years from the date of the contracting of the same as the ²[Central Government] may in each case direct.

The holder of any debenture in the form of Schedule D, or in any form duly authorized under this section, may obtain in exchange therefor, upon such terms as the Board shall from time to time determine, a debenture in any other form so authorized.

Every debenture issued by the Board shall be transferable,—

- (a) if it is in the form of Schedule D, by endorsement, and
- (b) if it is in any other form, in such manner as shall be therein expressed.

The right to sue in respect of the money secured by debentures issued under this section shall vest in the respective holders thereof for the time being without any preference by reason of some of such debentures being prior in date to others.]

- (f) the form of transfer to be used, the formalities to be observed and the fees to be levied on a transfer of stock ;
- (g) the form in which debentures or other securities delivered for renewal are to be receipted ;

- (i) the circumstances and manner in which duplicate debentures or other securities may be issued in case of debentures and other securities alleged to have been wholly or partly lost or destroyed and the period after which interest may be paid, or a duplicate be issued, in the case of such debentures or other securities alleged to have been wholly or partly lost or destroyed, and the fees to be levied in respect of the issue of duplicate debentures or other securities ;
- (j) the circumstances and manner in which duplicate stock certificates may be issued and the fees to be levied on any such issue ;
- (k) the nature and amount of indemnity to be given by a person applying for the payment of interest on debentures or other securities alleged to have been wholly or partly lost or destroyed, or the issue of duplicate debentures or other securities ;
- (l) generally the measures to be adopted for carrying out the purposes of this Part.

VI.—OF REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

Levy of Rates.

43. The Board shall frame a ²scale of tolls, dues, rents, rates and charges to be levied for each or any of the following matters (namely):—

(a) for the landing, shipping, wharfage, cramage, storage or demurrage of goods at,

(b) for permission for vessels or boats to approach, or to be alongside, and

(c) for animals or vehicles carrying goods to or from, or entering upon or plying for hire at or on,

any wharf, dock, ³[pier, land or building] in the possession of the Board, and so much of the ⁴[Sewri] and of the Gun Carriage Reclamation as is in the possession of the Great Indian Peninsula and the Bombay Baroda and Central India Railway Companies, respectively: Provided that no such toll, due, rent, rate or charge shall be leviable at so much of the said ⁴[Sewri] and Gun Carriage Reclamation as is aforesaid in respect of any goods, vessel, animal or vehicle belonging to the said companies respectively.

Scale of charges for use of dock, etc.

¹[43A. The Board may also frame a scale of charges to be levied—

(a) for the permission to use, and for the use of, any dock in the possession of the Board, and for services which the Board renders to, and

for gear, tackle, tools, instruments, utensils, staging or materials supplied by the Board for the purpose of any vessel using, or any person working in, any such dock;

(b) subject to the provisions of section 68, for the use of water-boats, barges, and fire-engines belonging to or maintained by the Board, and for water supplied by the Board in accordance with the provisions of section 68; and

(c) for the towing of, and rendering assistance of the nature referred to in clause (9) of section 68 to, vessels outside the limits of the port.]

46. The Board may procure and maintain such number of steam-vessels as they may deem fit to be employed in towing vessels into, out of, or in the harbour, and may make such charges for towage by the said steam-vessels as they shall think fit.

Division of Accounts.

47. In the accounts of the Board a pilotage account shall be kept Pilotage account. separate from the general account.

48. The rates and charges from time to time levied under sections 43 Items to be credited to general account. to 46 together with all rents of lands and buildings, and all fines and penalties levied under this Act, other than fines and penalties levied from pilots or other persons employed in the pilot service, and all miscellaneous items of revenue recovered by the Board, except pilotage fees, shall be credited to the general account.

49. The moneys credited to the general account shall be held by the Moneys credited to general account Board in trust, and, except as is hereinafter provided, shall be applied by them in payment of the following charges (namely) :—

²(1) (i) the salaries, fees, allowances, pensions, gratuities, compassionate allowances or other moneys due to the trustees and to the how expended. officers and servants appointed under this Act ;

(ii) the contributions, if any, duly authorized to be made,

(a) to any provident fund established by the said officers and servants or,

(b) to such provident fund, if any, as may be established by the Board for the benefit of such officers and servants and the chairman ;

(c) to such welfare fund or funds, if any, as may be established by the Board for the benefit of such officers and servants ; Provided that any contribution to a welfare fund established by the Board for the benefit of such officers and servants drawing not less than Rs. 300 a month shall not exceed the amount accruing from the following sources viz. :

(i) fines levied from such officers and servants ;

(ii) unclaimed salaries of such officers and servants ; and

(iii) forfeitures of contributions to the provident fund established by the Board for the benefit of such officers and servants ;

(iii) the contributions or appropriations to such special fund or funds as may be established by the Board for any of the purposes of this Act ; and

(iv) if any such provident fund or welfare fund or special fund be established by the Board, the cost and expenses, if any, which may be incurred by the Board in the conduct and administration thereof ;

(2) the cost of repairs and maintenance of the property vested in the Board and all charges upon the same and all working expenses ;

(4) the cost, or such portion of the cost, of any new work, plant, vessel or appliance which the Board may determine to charge to revenue ;

(5) the interest payable by the Board under section 34 ;

¹[(6) the payment of pensions, gratuities and compassionate allowances granted by the Board to officers and servants of the Board injured, or to the surviving relatives of such officers and servants killed, in the execution of their duty ;]

Provided always that no charge which is debitable under section 50 to the pilotage account shall be debited to the general account.]

All fees for pilotage and all fines and penalties levied under this Act from pilots or other persons employed in the pilot service shall be credited to the pilotage account and shall be held by the Board in trust, and be applied, in such proportions as they shall from time to time direct, to the following purposes only (namely) :—

(1) the purchase and maintenance in repair of such vessels, and the supply of such materials, stores or other things as the Board deem it necessary to maintain or supply for the efficiency of the pilot service ;

(2) the payment of the salaries and allowances of pilots and other officers and servants of the Board employed in the pilot service or in the supervision thereof ;

(3) the payment of pensions or retiring gratuities or compassionate allowances to pilots and other officers and servants engaged in the pilot service, and of the contributions, if any, duly authorized to be made in their behalf to any provident fund ¹[or welfare fund ;]

²[(4) the payment of pensions, gratuities and compassionate allowances granted by the Board to pilots and other officers and servants engaged in the pilot-service, who have been injured, and to the surviving relatives of pilots, officers and servants so engaged, who have been killed, in the execution of their duty ;]

³[(5) the payment, in accordance with regulations sanctioned by ⁴[the Central Government], of gratuities granted by the Board to the widows or children of pilots and other officers and servants engaged in the pilot service who may die in the service of the Board ;]

Disposal of Balances.

51. The Board may invest any balance remaining on the 31st March of each year to the credit of either the general or pilotage account after meeting all the charges properly debitable to such account, in public securities, and may from time to time sell the said securities and re-invest the proceeds in other public securities, or credit the same to the account to which the balance invested belonged, for expenditure on any of the purposes to which the moneys credited to such account may lawfully be applied.

Balances may be invested by Board in public securities.

But the money so invested by the Board, whether in respect of the general account or of the pilotage account, shall not exceed such amount, annually or in the aggregate, as shall from time to time be prescribed by ⁶[the Central Government], and any surplus remaining after deducting the amounts which may be so invested shall be applied—

Amounts to be so invested to be limited by Central Government.

(a) if such surplus belongs to the general account—in liquidation, on or before the 1st August next following the 31st March on which such surplus accrued, of the principal of any loan raised by the Board

under section 39 or of the capital of any debt at any time due by the Board to the ¹[Crown]; or of the money due to the holders of the securities issued by the Board under section 30; and

(b) if such surplus belongs to the pilotage account—in such manner as ²[the Central Government] shall direct:

Proviso as to claims of pilots, etc., on balance of pilotage account.

Provided always that the pilots and other officers and servants employed in the pilot service shall have no claim upon any balance to the credit of the pilotage account or upon the profits or interest arising from any investment thereof, or of any portion thereof, except to such extent as payments to them, or in their behalf, may from time to time be sanctioned by the Board under clauses (2) and (3) of section 50.

Interest, etc., how credited and debited.

The interest and profits accruing and the loss, if any, arising from such investments as aforesaid shall be respectively credited and debited to the account to which the balance invested belongs.

Board may invest in their own debentures and securities.

³[51A. (1) For the purposes of any investment which the Board are authorized to make by this Act it shall be lawful for the Board to reserve and set apart any debentures or securities to be issued by them on account of any loan to which the consent of ²[the Central Government] has been given, provided that the intention to so reserve and set apart such debentures or securities shall have been notified as a condition to the issue of the loan.

(2) The issue of any such debentures or securities direct to and in the name of "The Trustees of the Port of Bombay" shall not operate to extinguish or cancel such debentures or securities, but every debenture or security so issued shall be valid in all respects as if issued to, and in the name of, any other person.

(3) The purchase by, or the transfer, assignment or endorsement to, the Board of any debenture or security issued by the Board shall not operate to extinguish or cancel any such debenture or security, but the same shall be valid and negotiable in the same manner and to the same extent as if held by, or transferred, assigned or endorsed to, any other person.

(4) All debentures or securities of the Board heretofore purchased by, issued, transferred or assigned to, or endorsed into the names of the Trustees of the Port of Bombay, or any person on their behalf, and all debentures and securities heretofore issued by way of renewal, consolidation or sub-division of any such debentures or securities, shall be and shall be deemed to have always been valid and negotiable in all respects and in the same manner and to the same extent as if held by, or issued, transferred, assigned or endorsed to any other person.]

Annual Estimates.

52. The Chairman shall, at a special meeting to be held in the month of February in each year, lay before the Board an estimate of the income and of the expenditure of the Board for the year commencing on the first day of April then next ensuing in such detail and form as the Board shall from time to time direct. Chairman to submit annual estimate of income and expenditure.

Such estimate shall be completed and printed, and a copy thereof sent by post or otherwise to each trustee at least ten clear days prior to the meeting before which the estimate is to be laid.

53. The Board shall consider the estimate so submitted to them, and shall sanction the same either unaltered, or subject to such alterations as they shall think fit. Board to revise and sanction estimate.

54. The estimate, as sanctioned by the Board, shall be submitted to ¹[the Central Government], which may, if it thinks fit, at any time within one month after receipt of the same, disallow such estimate, or any portion thereof, and return the same for amendment. The Board shall, if the estimate is so returned by ²[the Central Government], forthwith proceed to amend the same, and shall re-submit the estimate so amended to ¹[the Central Government]. Estimate to be submitted to Central Government.

55. The Board may, at any time during the year for which any such estimate has been sanctioned, cause a supplementary estimate to be prepared and submitted to them. Every such supplementary estimate shall be considered and sanctioned by the Board and submitted to ¹[the Central Government] in the same manner as if it were an original annual estimate. Supplementary estimates may be made when necessary.

56. Save in cases of pressing emergency, no sum exceeding five thousand rupees shall be expended by or on behalf of the Board, unless such sum is included in some estimate at the time in force which has been finally approved by ²[the Central Government]. No expenditure above five thousand rupees to be incurred unless sanctioned in estimate.

If any sum exceeding five thousand rupees in amount is so expended on a pressing emergency, the circumstances shall be forthwith reported by the Chairman to ¹[the Central Government], together with an explanation of the way in which it is proposed by the Board to cover such extra expenditure.

Audit of Accounts.

Accounts to be audited and examined.

58. The accounts of the receipts and expenditure of the Board shall, twice in every year, be laid before ¹[the Central Government], and shall be audited and examined by such auditors as shall, from time to time, be appointed by ¹[the Central Government.]

Auditors to have power to call for books, etc.

For the purposes of such audit and examination, the auditors may, by summons in writing, require the production before them of all books, deeds, contracts, vouchers and all other documents and papers which they may deem necessary, and may require any person holding or accountable for any such books, deeds, contracts, accounts, vouchers, documents or papers to appear before them at any such audit and examination, or adjournment thereof, and to make and sign a declaration with respect to the same.

Remuneration to be fixed by Central Government. Report to be published.

The auditors shall be paid by the Board such remuneration as ¹[the Central Government] shall determine, the amount being debited to the general account; and, within fourteen days after the audit and examination shall have been completed, the auditors shall forward their report upon the accounts to the Board, who shall cause the same to be published, together with an abstract of the accounts, in the ²[Official Gazette.]

Fulfilment of Board's Liabilities.

Board bound to provide for fulfilment of liabilities.

59. It shall be incumbent on the Board to make ample provision year by year, either by retrenchment of expenditure or by increase of rates, for the due fulfilment of all their liabilities and for the efficient administration of this Act; and in the event of any deficiency being at any time anticipated in the income of the Board, they shall forthwith take such measures as shall seem most expedient for preventing such deficiency.

In default Central Government may require Board to increase rates;

60. If it shall at any time appear to the ³[the Central Government] that sufficient provision is not being made by the Board to meet their liabilities, or if default shall at any time be made by the Board in any payment of interest which they are required to make under section 34, the ³[Central Government] may require the Board, ⁴* * * to increase, subject to ⁵[its] sanction and to the provisions of section 43, to such extent and for such period as shall appear necessary, the rates or any of the rates for the time being in force under the said section.

If within fifteen days after receipt of such order the Board do not comply with the same, the ¹[Central Government] may, by notification in the ²[Official Gazette], increase the said rates or any of them, and such notification shall have the same force as if a new scale of rates to the same effect had been duly framed, sanctioned and published under section 43.

and on Board's failing may itself increase them.

And for the purpose of realizing any interest which has not been paid by the Board when due, in accordance with section 34, the ¹[Central Government] may, by an order published in the ²[Official Gazette], appoint some person to receive the rates, charges and other income which the Board may be entitled to receive, or any portion thereof, and to apply the same in discharge of the amount due and of all expenses authorized by ³[the Central Government] in respect of the appointment of such person and of the recovery by him of the said rates, charges and income: and the person so appointed shall have, for the recovery of the said rates, charges, or other income, all and singular the powers and authorities conferred by this Act on the Board for the said purpose.

Central Government may also appoint receiver to recover portion of Board's income.

⁴[60A. All moneys at the credit of the Board which cannot immediately be applied in the manner or to the purposes specified in this Act shall be deposited in such bank and subject to such conditions as may from time to time be prescribed by ³[the Central Government]: Provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to prohibit an investment in public securities as defined in section 3 (12) or in such other securities as ³[the Central Government] may approve in this behalf; and the said securities shall be held in trust for the purposes of this Act by the Board.]

How the balances of the Board may be employed.

VII.—OF THE POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF THE BOARD.

Recovery of Rates.

61. For the amount of all rates leviable under this Act in respect of any goods the Board shall have a lien on such goods, and shall be entitled to seize and detain the same until such rates are fully paid. Rates in respect of goods to be landed shall become payable immediately on the landing of such goods. Rates in respect of goods to be removed from the premises of the Board or to be shipped for export shall be payable before such goods are removed or shipped. The lien for such rates shall have priority over all other liens and claims, except for general average, for the ship-owner's lien for freight upon the said goods (where such lien

exists and has been preserved in the manner hereinafter provided), for primage and for money payable to Her Majesty. 1* * * *

Board to take charge of goods landed.

61A. (1) The Board shall, immediately upon the landing of any goods, take charge thereof, except as may be otherwise provided in the bye-laws, and store such as are liable in their opinion to suffer from exposure in any shed or warehouse belonging to the Board.

Goods not stored in licensed warehouses to remain at risk and expense of owner if not removed within seven days.

(2) If any owner, without any default on the part of the Board, fails to remove any goods other than those stored in the warehouses appointed by the Board for the storage of duty paid goods or in warehouses appointed under section 15, or licensed under section 16 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, from the premises of the Board within seven clear days from the date on which such goods shall have been landed, such goods shall remain on the premises of the Board at the sole risk and expense of the owner and the Board shall thereupon be discharged from all liability theretofore incurred by them in respect of such goods. VIII of 1878.

Lien for freight preserved after landing if notice be given.

62. If the master or owner of any vessel, or his agent, at or before the time of landing from such vessel any goods at any wharf, dock or pier in the possession of the Board, shall give to the Board notice, in writing, that such goods are to remain subject to a lien for freight or other charges payable to the ship-owner, to an amount to be mentioned in such notice, such goods shall continue liable to the same lien, if any, for such charges as they were subject to before the landing thereof. Such goods shall be retained either in the warehouses and sheds of the Board, or, with the consent of the Chief Customs authority of the Presidency, in the public warehouses, at the risk and expense of the owners of the said goods until the lien is discharged as hereinafter mentioned.

Discharge of lien by payment or release.

63. Upon production to the proper officer of the Board of a document purporting to be a receipt for the amount claimed as due, or a release of freight from the person by or on whose behalf such notice shall have been given, it shall be lawful for the Board to permit such goods to be removed without regard to such lien, provided they shall have used reasonable care in respect to the authenticity of such document.

If rates not paid or lien for freight not discharged, goods may be sold after two months.

64. If the rates payable to the Board in respect of any goods are not paid, or if the lien of the ship-owner for freight, when such notice as aforesaid, had been given, is not discharged, the Board may, and in the latter event, if required by or on behalf of the person claiming such lien for freight, shall, at the expiration of two months from the time when the goods were placed in their custody, or if the goods are of a perishable nature, at such earlier period (being not less than twenty-four hours after the landing of the goods) as they shall think fit, sell by public

auction the said goods, or so much as may be necessary to satisfy the amounts hereinafter directed to be paid out of the produce of such sale.

Before making such sale, ten days' notice of the same shall be given by publication thereof in the Bombay Government Gazette, unless the goods are of so perishable a nature as, in the opinion of the officer aforesaid, to render their immediate sale necessary or advisable, in which event such notice shall be given as the urgency of the case admits of.

If the address of the owner of the goods has been stated on the manifest of the cargo or in any of the documents which have come into the hands of the Board, or is otherwise known, notice shall also be given to the owner of the goods by letter delivered at such address, or sent by post ; but the title of a *bona fide* purchaser of such goods shall not be invalidated by reason of the omission to send the notice hereinbefore mentioned, nor shall any such purchaser be bound to inquire whether such notice has been sent.

65. In every case of any such sale as aforesaid, the moneys received from the sale shall be applied as follows— Application of proceeds of sale.

firstly, in payment, according to their respective priorities, of the liens and claims excepted in section 61 from the priority of the lien of the Board for rates ;

secondly, in payment of the expenses of the sale ;

thirdly, in payment of the rates and expenses due to the Board in respect thereof.

The surplus, if any, shall be paid to the owner of the goods or his agent on his applying for the same, provided such application be made within one year from the sale of the goods, or good reason be shown why such application was not so made, to the satisfaction of the Board ; and in case such application shall not be so made, nor reason shown, such surplus shall be applied by the Board to the purposes of this Act.

66. If the master of any vessel in respect of which any rates, charges or penalties shall be payable under this Act, or any bye-laws made in pursuance hereof, shall refuse or neglect to pay the same or any part thereof, on demand, it shall be lawful for the Board to distrain or arrest, of their own authority, such vessel, and the tackle, apparel or furniture belonging thereto, or any part thereof, and detain the same until the amount so due shall be paid ; and, in case any part of the said rates or penalties or of the costs of the distress or arrest, or of the keeping of the same, shall remain unpaid for the space of fifteen days next after any such distress or arrest shall have been so made, the Board may cause the vessel, or other thing so distrained or arrested, to be sold, and with the proceeds of such sale may satisfy such tolls, dues, rates, penalties or charges and costs of sale remaining unpaid, rendering the surplus (if any) to the master of such vessel on demand. Power to distrain for non-payment of rates, etc.

Port clearance not granted till rates, etc., are paid.

67. If the Board shall give to the ¹[servant of the Crown] whose duty it is to grant the port-clearance of any vessel a notice stating that an amount therein specified is due in respect of rates, charges or penalties chargeable under this Act or any bye-laws or orders made in pursuance hereof, against such vessel, or the owner or master of such vessel, in respect thereof, such officer shall not grant such port-clearance until the amount so chargeable shall have been paid.

Alternative remedy by suit.

²[67A. Notwithstanding anything contained in the seven sections last preceding and in section 85, the Board may recover by suit any tolls, dues, rents, rates, charges, damages, expenses, costs, or in case of sale the balance thereof, when the proceeds of sale are insufficient, or any penalties or fines payable to, or recoverable by, the Board under this Act or under any bye-laws made in pursuance thereof.]

Works.

Works to be executed under Act.

68. The works to be undertaken by the Board under this Act may include—

(1) wharves, docks and piers within the port or on the foreshore of the port, with all necessary and convenient arches, drains, fences, roads, railways and approaches ;

(2) tramways, warehouses, sheds, engines and other appliances for conveying, receiving, and storing goods landed, or to be shipped, or otherwise ;

(3) lighthouses, light-ships, beacons, pilot boats and other appliances necessary for the safe navigation of the port and of the approaches thereto within a distance of three miles from the limits of the port ;

(4) laying down moorings, and the erection of cranes, scales and all means and appliances necessary for berthing, loading, and unloading vessels ;

(5) reclaiming, excavating, enclosing and raising any part of the foreshore of the port vested in the Board, when such reclamation, excavation, enclosure or raising may be necessary for any of the purposes of this Act ;

(6) the construction and application of dredges and other machines for cleaning, deepening and improving any portion of the port or foreshore aforesaid ;

(7) the construction of such works, without the limits of the port, as shall be necessary for the protection of works executed by the Board within the port, and all such other works and appliances as may, in the opinion of the Board, be necessary for carrying out the purposes of this Act ;

Regulation of use of Wharves, etc.

69. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to affect—

(a) the right of ³[the Central Government] to collect customs-duties, or of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay to collect town-duties, at any wharf, pier or dock in possession of the Board, or

(b) any power or authority vested in the Customs authorities of the Presidency under any law for the time being in force for the administration of sea-customs.

Saving of rights of Central Government to use wharves, etc., for collecting duties ; and of power of Customs officers.

Places to be set apart for use of Customs officers on wharves, etc.;

70. Whenever any wharf, pier or dock in the possession of the Board shall be appointed, under the provisions of any Act for the time being in force for the administration of sea-customs, a wharf or place for the landing and shipping of goods within the meaning of such Act,

and whenever any warehouse, or portion of a warehouse, in the possession of the Board shall be appointed or licensed under the provisions of any such Act as a warehouse for the deposit of dutiable goods on the first importation thereof without payment of duty,

the Board shall set apart and maintain such place on or adjoining such wharf, dock or pier, or in such warehouse, or portion of a warehouse, for the use of the officers of Customs, as ¹[the Central Government] shall in that behalf approve or appoint ;

but right of Board to levy rates not affected ;

but all rates payable in respect of any wharf, pier or warehouse, or portion thereof so set apart, or for the storage of goods thereupon or therein, shall be paid to the Board or to such person or persons as they may appoint to receive the same, notwithstanding that the same has been so set apart ;

surplus income derived from portion of Customs Bonded Warehouse used as public warehouse to be paid to Board.

and if any portion of the Customs Bonded Warehouse shall, with the consent of ¹[the Central Government], be appointed a public warehouse for the deposit of dutiable goods as aforesaid, the Board shall set apart and maintain such portion thereof in good order for the said purpose ; but the Chief Customs authority shall pay to the Board from time to time, as may be determined by ¹[the Central Government], all surplus income derived from the use of such portion of the said Customs Bonded Warehouse as a public warehouse as aforesaid after payment of all charges and expenses of management.

Board to provide free landing-places.

71. The Board shall provide such number of public landing-places as shall, in the opinion of ¹[the Central Government], be sufficient, from and upon which the public shall be permitted to embark and to land free of charge.

Control of Pilots.

Trustees vested with right and privilege of maintaining pilots.

72. The Board shall have the right and privilege of maintaining pilots for the navigation of vessels at the port, and all fees for pilotage shall be paid to the Board : provided that no person shall be appointed to be a pilot by the Board who is not for the time being authorized by ¹[the Central Government], under the provisions of the ²Indian Ports Act, 1875, to pilot vessels.

The Board may also, from time to time, make such bye-laws and regulations as they shall think fit—

(a) for fixing and regulating the wages and allowances for pilotage to be received by pilots, and

(b) for regulating the behaviour and conduct of pilots ;
and shall enforce the observance of such bye-laws and regulations by the imposition of pecuniary penalties not exceeding two hundred rupees for each offence, or by suspension or deprivation of appointment, or otherwise, as to them may appear expedient :
Provided that such bye-laws shall first have been approved by ¹[the Central Government], and published in the manner directed by section 74.

Bye-laws.

73. The Board may, from time to time, make bye-laws—

Trustees
empowered
to make
bye-laws.

(a) for the guidance of persons employed by them under this Act ;

(b) for the safe and convenient use of the wharves, docks, piers, warehouses, tramways and other works constructed or acquired by them under this Act ;

(c) for the use of the public landing-places constructed by or belonging to them ;

(d) for the reception and removal of goods brought within the premises of the Board ;

(e) for keeping clean the harbour and basins and the works of the Board, and for preventing filth or rubbish being thrown therein or thereon ;

(f) for settling the mode of the payment of the rates and charges leviable under this Act ;

(g) for regulating, declaring and defining the wharves, docks and piers vested in the Board on which goods shall be landed from, and shipped on board, vessels ; *²

³[(h) for fixing the maximum amount of fees payable under section 15 ; and]

⁴(i) generally for carrying out the purposes of this Act.

The Board may also, from time to time, vary, alter or revoke any such bye-laws so made by them.

74. No bye-law, or alteration or revocation of a bye-law, shall have effect until the same shall have been approved by ¹[the Central Government], and such approval shall have been published in the Bombay Government Gazette ; and no bye-law or alteration or revocation of a bye-law shall be approved by ¹[the Central Government] until the same shall have been published for three weeks successively in the said Gazette.

It shall be lawful for ¹[the Central Government] at any time by notification in the said Gazette to cancel any bye-law or regulation made and published under the provisions of this and of the last two preceding sections.

Penalties for infringement of bye-laws.

75. The Board may, in the bye-laws made under section 73, prescribe such penalties as they shall deem fit for the infringement of the same : Provided that no penalty for any one infringement of a bye-law shall exceed one hundred rupees, nor, in case of a continuing infringement, shall any penalty exceed fifty rupees per diem for every day after notice of such infringement shall have been given by the Board to the person guilty of such infringement.

Bye-laws and scales of rates and charges to be exhibited.

76. The Board shall cause the said bye-laws and the scales of rates and charges leviable by the Board to be printed in the English, Marathi and Gujarathi languages, to be hung up at the several wharves, docks and piers, and other convenient places on the premises of the Board.

Continuance of bye-laws framed under Bombay Act I of 1873.

77. Until bye-laws are framed by the Board under section 73, the bye-laws framed by the trustees appointed under the ¹Bombay Port Trust Act, 1873, under section 85 of that Act, and in force when this Act comes into operation, shall be deemed to have been framed under the said section 73 of this Act.

VIII.—PENALTIES.

For being interested in contracts with Board.

78. Any person who, being a trustee or an officer or servant of the Board shall acquire, directly or indirectly, any share or interest in any contract or employment with, by or on behalf of the Board shall be deemed to have committed the offence made punishable by section 168 of the Indian Penal Code :

For obtaining illegal gratification.

79. Any person employed under this Act, not being a public servant within the meaning of section 21 of the Indian Penal Code who shall accept or obtain, or agree to accept or attempt to obtain, from any person, for himself or for any other person, any gratification whatever other than legal remuneration, as a reward for doing, or forbearing to do, any official act, or for showing, or forbearing to show, in the exercise of his official functions, favour or disfavour to any person, or for rendering, or attempting to render, any service or dis-service to any person with the Board or with any public servant as such, or with ³[any Government], shall be liable to the same punishment as is provided by the Indian Penal Code in the case of the like offence committed by a public servant.

80. Any person who shall refuse or neglect to appear before any auditor of accounts, or to produce any books, deeds, contracts, accounts, vouchers, documents or papers, or to make or sign any declaration when duly required so to do by any auditor of accounts under section 58, shall be punished for every such neglect or refusal with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees.

For refusing or neglecting to appear before auditor, etc.

81. Any person, other than the Board or the Conservator of the port, who shall, without first obtaining the written consent of ¹[the Central Government] to his so doing, make, set up or fix, below high-water mark within the port, any wharf, quay, pier, mooring or other erection whatsoever, shall be punished with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees, and to a further fine which may extend to one hundred rupees for every day during which he shall permit such wharf, quay, pier, mooring or other erection to remain after notice to remove the same has been given to him.

For setting up erection below high water mark in port.

Any such wharf, quay, pier, mooring or other erection may be removed by the Board, and the person who made, set up, or fixed the same shall also be liable to pay all expenses which may be incurred by the Board in the removal thereof.

82. If it be found, when goods are imported at, or exported from, any wharf, dock or pier in the possession of the Board, that the weight or quantity of such goods, or the tonnage of any vessel carrying such goods, has been understated in any document presented to any officer of the Board for the purpose of enabling him to determine the rates or charges payable in respect of the said goods or vessel, the consignee in the case of goods imported, and the consignor in the case of goods exported, shall be liable to pay to the Board such sum not exceeding twice the proper rates or charges on the weight or quantity of goods or amount of tonnage so understated as may be determined by the Board, and the said sum shall on the application of the Board be recoverable under a Presidency Magistrate's warrant as if it were a fine inflicted by such Magistrate.

For understating quantity or weight of goods, etc.

83. Any person who removes, or attempts to remove, or abets within the meaning of the Indian Penal Code the removal of, any goods, vessel, animal or vehicle with the intention of evading payment of the rates or charges lawfully due in respect thereof to the Board, shall be punished with fine which may extend to fifty rupees.

For evading rates, etc.

84. If, through the negligence of any person having the guidance or command of any vessel, or of any of the mariners or persons employed on such vessel, damage shall be caused to any wharf, dock, pier or other work in the possession of the Board, the amount of such damage shall, on the application of the Board, be recoverable, together with the cost of such recovery, by distress and sale, under a Presidency Magistrate's warrant, of a sufficient portion of the boats, masts, spars, ropes, cables, anchors or stores belonging to such vessel :

Recovery of value of damage to property of Board.

Provided that no such warrant shall issue until the master of such vessel has been duly summoned to appear, or if he appears, until he has been heard ; and

Provided also that no such warrant shall issue if the vessel was at the time under the orders of a duly authorized ¹[Dock Master or] officer in the pilot-service of the port ²* * * ³[unless the damage caused is in no way attributable to the order, act, or improper omission of such Dock Master or officer].

Cognizance

86. Whenever any day by this Act appointed for any purpose shall happen to be a Sunday or a public holiday, the business appointed to be done on such day shall be done on the day next after such Sunday or public holiday.

No suit or other proceeding shall be commenced against any person for anything done, or purporting to have been done, in pursuance of this Act, without giving to such person one month's previous notice in writing of the intended suit or other proceeding, and of the cause thereof, nor after six months from the accrual of the cause of such suit or other proceeding.

The Board shall not be responsible for any misfeasance, malfeasance or non-feasance of any officer or servant appointed under this Act ;

nor, if they should be appointed by ⁵[the Central Government], under the Indian Ports Act, 1875⁶, Conservators of the port for any misfeasance, malfeasance or non-feasance of any Deputy Conservator, Master-attendant or Harbour-master, or of any assistant or deputy of any such officer, or of any person acting under the authority or direction of or in subordination to any such officer, assistant or deputy ;

nor for any damage sustained by any vessel in consequence of any defect in any of the moorings, hawsers or other things belonging to the Board which may be used by such vessel ;

nor shall the Board, or any of the said officers or servants, be liable in damages for any act *bona fide* done, or ordered to be done, by them in pursuance of this Act.

An Act to provide for Irrigation in the Bombay Presidency.

WHEREAS it is necessary to make provision for the construction, Preamble.
 maintenance and regulation of canals, for the supply of water therefrom

PART I.

Interpretation-clause.

3. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context,—

(1) “canal” includes—

(a) all canals, channels, pipes and reservoirs constructed, maintained or controlled by ¹[any Government] for the supply or storage of water ;

(b) all works, embankments, structures and supply and escape-channels connected with such canals, channels, pipes or reservoirs, and all roads constructed for the purpose of facilitating the construction or maintenance of such canals, channels, pipes or reservoirs ;

(c) all water-courses, drainage-works and flood embankments as hereinafter respectively defined ;

(d) any part of a river, stream, lake, natural collection of water or natural drainage-channel, to which the ²[Provincial Government] may apply the provisions of section 5, or of which the water has been applied or used before the passing of this Act for the purpose of any existing canal ;

(e) all land belonging to ³[the Crown] which is situate on a bank of any canal as hereinbefore defined, and which has been appropriated under the orders of ⁴[any Government] for the purposes of such canal ;

(2) “water-course” means any channel or pipe not maintained at the cost of ⁴[the Provincial Government], which is supplied with water from a canal, and includes all subsidiary works connected with any such channel or pipe, except the sluice or outlet through which water is supplied from a canal to such channel or pipe ;

(3) “drainage-work” means any work in connection with a system of irrigation or reclamation made or improved by ⁵[any Government] for the purpose of the drainage of the country, whether under the provisions of section 15 or otherwise, and includes escape-channels from a canal, dams, weirs, embankments, sluices, groins and other works connected therewith, but does not include works for the removal of sewage from towns ;

(4) “flood-embankment” means any embankment constructed or maintained by ¹[any Government] in connection with any system of

irrigation or reclamation-works for the protection of lands from inundation or which may be declared by the ¹[Provincial Government] to be maintained in connection with any such system, and includes all groins, spurs, dams and other protective works connected with such embankments ;

(5) "Collector" ^{2*} * * * includes any officer appointed by the ¹[Provincial Government] to exercise all or any of the powers of a Collector under this Act ;

(6) "Canal-officer" means any officer lawfully appointed or invested with powers under section 4 ;

(7) "owner" includes every person having a joint interest in the ownership of the thing specified ; and all rights and obligations which attach to an owner under the provisions of this Act shall attach jointly and severally to every person having such joint interest in the ownership.

4. ³[The Provincial Government] or, subject to such orders as may be passed by ³[the Provincial Government], any ⁴[servant of the Crown] whom the ¹[Provincial Government] empowers ⁵officers, in this behalf, may—

(a) appoint ⁵such officers with such designations, and assign to them respectively such powers and duties, under this Act, as ³[the Provincial Government] or such officer may deem fit ;

(b) invest ⁵any ⁶[servant of the Crown], in any department, either personally, or in right of his office, or any other person, with such powers, and impose upon him such duties, under this Act, as ³[the Provincial Government] or such officer may deem fit :

Provided that any assignment of, or investment with, powers or duties made under this section may at any time be cancelled or varied by the authority who made it. Proviso.

5. Whenever it appears expedient to the ¹[Provincial Government] that the water of any river or stream flowing in a natural channel, or of any lake or any other natural collection of still water, should be applied or used by ²[the Provincial Government] for the purpose of any existing or projected canal, the ¹[Provincial Government] may, by notification in the ³[Official Gazette], ⁴declare that the said water will be so applied or used after a day to be named in the said notification, not being earlier than three months from the date thereof.

Powers of Entry on Land, etc.

Powers of Canal-officers for purpose of so applying water-supply.

6. At any time after the day so named, any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf may enter on any land, remove any obstruction, close any channel and do any other thing necessary for such application or use of the said water, and for such purpose may take with him, or depute or employ, such subordinates and other persons as he deems fit.

Entry for inquiry.

7. Whenever it shall be necessary to make any inquiry or examination in connection with a projected canal, or with the maintenance of an existing canal, any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf, and any person acting under the general or special order of any such Canal-officer, may—

- (a) enter upon such land as he may think necessary for the purpose, and
- (b) exercise all powers and do all things in respect of such land as he might exercise and do if ²[the Provincial Government] had issued a notification under the provisions of section 4 of the ⁵Land Acquisition Act, 1870, to the effect that land in that locality is likely to be needed for a public purpose, and
- (c) set up and maintain water-gauges and do all other things necessary for the prosecution of such inquiry and examination.

8. Any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf, and any person acting under the general or special order of any such Canal-officer, may enter upon any land, building or water-course, on account of which any water-rate is chargeable, for the purpose of inspecting or regulating the use of the water supplied, or of measuring the land irrigated thereby or chargeable with a water-rate, and of doing all things necessary for the proper regulation and management of the canal from which such water is supplied.

Power to inspect and regulate water-supply.

9. In case of any accident being apprehended or happening to a canal, any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf, and any person acting under the general or special order of any such Canal-officer, may enter upon any land adjacent to such canal, and may take trees and other materials, and execute all works which may be necessary for the purpose of preventing such accident or repairing any damage done.

Power to enter for repairs, and to prevent accidents.

10. When a Canal-officer or other person proposes, under the provisions of any of the three last preceding sections, to enter into any building or enclosed court or garden attached to a dwelling-house, not supplied with water from a canal, and not adjacent to a flood-embankment, he shall previously give to the occupier of such building, court or garden such reasonable notice as the urgency of the case may allow.

Notice to occupier of building, etc.

Canal Crossings.

11. Suitable means of crossing canals shall be provided at such places as the ¹[Provincial Government] ²[or any Commissioner if empowered by ³[the Provincial Government] in this behalf] thinks necessary for the reasonable convenience of the inhabitants of the adjacent land; and suitable bridges, culverts or other works shall be constructed to prevent the drainage of the adjacent land being obstructed by any canal.

Means of crossing canals to be provided and obstruction to drainage to be avoided.

Removal of Obstructions to Drainage.

12. Whenever it appears to the ¹[Provincial Government] that injury to the public health, or public convenience, or to any canal or to any land for which irrigation from a canal is available, has arisen or may arise from the obstruction of any river, stream or natural drainage-course, the ¹[Provincial Government] may, by notification published in the

Provincial Government may prohibit formation of obstructions of rivers, etc., within certain limits.

¹[Official Gazette], prohibit, within limits to be defined in such notification, the formation of any such obstruction, or may, within such limits, order the removal or other modification of such obstruction.

Thereupon so much of the said river, stream or natural drainage-channel, as is comprised within such limits, shall be held to be a drainage-work as defined in section 3.

Canal-officer may issue order to person causing obstruction.

13. Any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf may, after such publication, issue an order to any person causing or having control over any such obstruction to remove or modify the same within a time to be fixed in such order.

Canal-officer may cause obstruction to be removed.

14. If, within the time so fixed, such person does not comply with the order, the Canal-officer may cause the obstruction to be removed or modified; and if the person to whom the order was issued does not, when called upon, pay the expenses of such removal or modification, such expenses shall be recoverable by the Collector as an arrear of land-revenue.

Construction of Drainage-works.

When drainage-works are necessary, Provincial Government may order scheme to be carried out.

15. Whenever it appears to the ²[Provincial Government] that any drainage-work is necessary for the public health or for the improvement of the proper cultivation or irrigation of any land, or that protection from floods or other accumulations of water, or from erosion by a river, is required for any land, the ²[Provincial Government] may cause a scheme for such work to be drawn up and carried into execution,

and the person authorized by the ²[Provincial Government] to draw up and execute such scheme may exercise in connection therewith the powers conferred on Canal-officers by sections 7, 8 and 9, and shall be liable to the obligations imposed upon Canal-officers by sections 10 and 34.

PART III.

OF WATER-COURSES.

Construction of new Water-courses.

Construction of new water-courses by private arrangement. Application for construction by

16. Any person may, with the permission of a Canal-officer duly empowered to grant such permission, construct a new water-course if he has obtained the consent of the holder of the land required therefor.

17. Any person desiring to construct a new water-course, but being unable or unwilling to construct it under a private arrangement with the

holder of the land required for the same, may apply, in writing, to any Canal-officer duly empowered to receive such applications, stating—

- (1) that he is ready to defray all the expenses necessary for acquiring the land and constructing such water-course;
- (2) that he desires the said Canal-officer in his behalf and at his cost to do all things necessary for constructing such water-course.

18. If the Canal-officer considers the construction of such water-course expedient, he may call upon the applicant to deposit any part of the expense such officer may consider necessary,

Procedure when Canal-officer considers construction of water-course expedient.

and upon such deposit being made, shall cause inquiry to be made into the most suitable alignment for the said water-course,

and shall mark out the land which, in his opinion, it will be necessary to occupy for the construction thereof,

and shall forthwith publish a notification in every village through which the water-course is proposed to be taken, that so much of such land as is situated within such village has been so marked out,

and shall send a copy of such notification to the Collector of every district in which such land is situated, for publication on such land.

The said notification shall also call upon any person who wishes to share in the ownership of such water-course to make his application that respect to the Canal-officer within thirty days of the publication of such notification.

Application by person wishing to be joint owner.

If any such applicant appears, and his application is admitted, he shall be liable to pay his share in the construction of such water-course, and in the cost of acquiring the land for the same, and shall be an owner of such water-course when constructed.

If application admitted, applicant liable for share of cost.

19. On receipt of copy of such notification, the Collector shall proceed to acquire such land under the provisions of the ¹Land Acquisition Act, 1870, as if a declaration had been issued by ²[the Provincial Government] for the acquisition thereof under section 6 of that Act, and as if ²[the Provincial Government] had thereupon directed the Collector to take order for the acquisition of such land under section 7 of the said Act, and (if necessary) as if ²[the Provincial Government] had issued orders for summary possession being taken under section 17 of the said Act.

Collector to acquire land.

20. On being put in possession of the land, the Canal-officer shall construct the required water-course; and on its completion shall give to

Procedure after construction of water-course.

the owner notice thereof, and of any sum payable by him on account of the cost of acquiring the land and constructing the water-course. On such notice being given, such sum shall be due from the owner to the Canal-officer. On receipt of payment in full of all expenses incurred, the Canal-officer shall make over possession of such water-course to such owner.

Rights and Obligations of owners of Water-courses.

Obligations
of owner of
water-
courses.

21. Every owner of a water-course shall be bound—

- (a) to construct and maintain all works necessary for the passage across such water-course, of canals, water-courses, drainage-channels and public roads existing at the time of its construction, and of the drainage intercepted by it, and for affording proper communications across it for the convenience of the occupants of neighbouring lands;
- (b) to maintain such water-course in a fit state of repair for the conveyance of water;
- (c) to allow the use of it to others or to admit other persons as joint owners thereof on such terms as may be prescribed under the provisions of section 23;

Rights of
owners and
users of
water-
courses.

and every owner of a water-course and every person duly authorized under the provisions hereinafter contained to use a water-course shall be entitled—

- (d) to have a supply of water by such water-course, at such rates and on such terms, as may from time to time be prescribed under section 44 and by the rules made by the ¹[Provincial Government] under section 70 :

Provided always that any owner of a water-course and, subject to the terms of any agreement between the parties, or to any condition imposed under section 23, any such person as aforesaid may at any time, by giving three months' previous notice in writing in this behalf to a Canal-officer duly empowered to receive such notices, resign his interest in such water-course.

Arrangement
with owner
by other
person.

22. Any person desiring to have a supply of water through a water-course of which he is not an owner may make a private arrangement with the owner for permitting the conveyance of water thereby, or may apply to a Canal-officer duly empowered to receive such applications for authority to use such water-course or to be declared a joint owner thereof.

23. On receipt of any such application, the Canal-officer shall serve notice on the owner to show cause why such authority should not be granted, or such declaration should not be made, and, if no objection be raised, or if any objection be raised and be found insufficient or invalid, shall, subject to the approval of the Collector, either authorize the applicant to use the water-course, or declare him to be a joint owner thereof on such conditions as to the payment of compensation or rent or otherwise as may appear to him equitable.

Canal-officer after inquiry may authorize supply or declare applicant to be joint owner.

24. No land acquired under this Part for a water-course¹[and no land occupied by a water-course constructed under section 92], shall be used for any other purpose without the previous consent of a Canal-officer duly empowered to grant such permission.

Use of land acquired for water-course for other purpose.

25. If any owner of a water-course fails to fulfil any obligation imposed upon him by clause (a) or (b) of section 21, any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf may require him by notice to execute the necessary work or repair within a period, to be prescribed in such notice, of not less than fifteen days, and, in the event of failure, may execute the same on his behalf, and, except as hereinafter provided in this section, all expenses incurred in the execution of such work or repair shall be a sum due by such owner to²[the Provincial Government].

If owner fails to execute work or to repair water-course, Canal-officer may execute same.

Every person other than an owner who uses any water-course in respect of which any repair has been executed by a Canal-officer under this section shall, in the absence of any agreement between the parties or of any condition imposed under section 23 at the time such person was authorized to use such water-course to the contrary, be liable to pay to²[the Provincial Government] such proportion of the expenses incurred in the execution of such repairs as shall be determined by the said Canal-officer.

Persons using water-course to pay share of expenses of repair.

Settlement of Disputes concerning Water-courses.

26. Whenever a dispute arises between two or more persons in regard to their mutual rights or liabilities in respect of the use, construction or maintenance of a water-course, or among joint owners of a water-course, as to their respective shares of the expense of constructing or maintaining such water-course, or as to the amounts severally contributed by them towards such expense, or as to failure on the part of any owner to contribute his share,

Settlement of disputes as to mutual rights and liabilities of persons interested in water-course.

any person interested in the matter of such dispute may apply, in writing, to any Canal-officer duly empowered to receive such applications, stating the matter in dispute.

Such officer shall thereupon give notice to the other persons interested that, on a day to be named in such notice, he will proceed to inquire into the said matter,

and if all the persons interested consent, in writing, to his being arbitrator, he may pass his order thereon ;

failing such consent, he shall transfer the matter to the Collector, who shall inquire into and pass his order thereon.

Any order passed by the Collector under this section shall remain in force until set aside by a decree of a Civil Court.

PART IV.

OF THE SUPPLY OF WATER.

Applications for Supply.

Water to be supplied on written application,

27. Every person desiring to have a supply of water from a canal shall submit a written application to that effect to a Canal-officer duly empowered to receive such applications, in such form as shall from time to time be prescribed by ¹[the Provincial Government] in this behalf.

and water may be supplied for purposes other than those of irrigation.

If the application be for a supply of water to be used for purposes other than those of irrigation, the Canal-officer may, with the sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government], give permission for water to be taken for such purposes under such special conditions and restrictions as to the limitation, control and measurement of the supply as he shall be empowered by ¹[the Provincial Government] to impose in each case.

Provisions as to Supply.

Power to stop water-supply.

28. The supply of water to any water-course or to any person who is entitled to such supply shall not be stopped except—

- (a) whenever and so long as it is necessary to stop such supply for the purpose of executing any work ordered by competent authority ;
- (b) whenever and so long as any water-course by which such supply is received is not maintained in such repair as to prevent the wasteful escape of water therefrom ;
- (c) whenever and so long as it is necessary to do so in order to supply in rotation the legitimate demands of other persons entitled to water ;

- (d) whenever and so long as it may be necessary to do so in order to prevent the wastage or misuse of water ;
- (e) within periods fixed from time to time by a Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf, of which due notice shall be given ;
- ¹(f) whenever and so long as it is necessary to stop such supply pending a change in the source thereof by a Canal-officer under section 91.

29. When canal-water is supplied for the irrigation of one or more crops only, the permission to use such water shall be held to continue only until such crop or crops shall come to maturity, and to apply only to such crop or crops.

30. Every agreement for the supply of canal-water to any land, building or other immoveable property shall be transferable therewith, and shall be presumed to have been so transferred whenever a transfer of such land, building or other immoveable property takes place.

Duration of supply.
 Agreements for supply of water transferable with property in respect of which supply given ;
 right to use of water not transferable in other case without permission of Canal-officer.

No person entitled to the use of any work or land appertaining to any canal, and, except in the case of any such agreement as aforesaid, no person entitled to use the water of any canal, shall sell or sub-let, or otherwise transfer, his right to such use without the permission of a Canal-officer duly empowered to grant such permission.

PART V.

OF THE AWARD OF COMPENSATION.

Compensation when claimable.

31. Compensation may be awarded in respect of any substantial damage caused by the exercise of any of the powers conferred by this Act, which is capable of being ascertained and estimated at the time of awarding such compensation :

Compensation in cases of ascertainable substantial damage.

Provided that no compensation shall be so awarded in respect of any damage arising from—

- (a) deterioration of climate, or
- (b) stoppage of navigation, or the means of rafting timber or of watering cattle, or
- (c) stoppage or diminution of any supply of water in consequence of the exercise of the power conferred by section 5, if no use have been made of such supply within the five years next before the date of the issue of the notification under section 37, or

(d) failure or stoppage of the water in a canal, when such failure or stoppage is due to—

- (1) any cause beyond the control of ¹[the Provincial Government],
- (2) the execution of any repairs, alterations or additions to the canal, or
- (3) any measures considered necessary by any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf for regulating the proper flow of water in the canal, or for maintaining the established course of irrigation ;

Remission of water-rates when allowable.

but any person who suffers loss from any stoppage or diminution of his water-supply due to any of the causes named in clause (d) of this section shall be entitled to such remission of the water-rate payable by him as may be authorized by the ²[Provincial Government].

Limitation of claims.

32. No claim for compensation under this Act shall be entertained after the expiration of twelve months from the time when the damage complained of commenced, unless the Collector is satisfied that the claimant had sufficient cause for not making the claim within such period.

Summary Decisions.

Compensation for damage caused by entry on land, etc.

34. In every case of entry upon any land or building under section 6, section 7, section 8, or section 9, the Canal-officer or person making the entry shall ascertain and record the extent of the damage, if any, caused by the entry, or in the execution of any work, to any crop, tree, building or other property,

and within one month from the date of such entry compensation shall be tendered by a Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf to the landholder or owner of the property damaged.

If such tender is not accepted, the Canal-officer shall forthwith refer the matter to the Collector for the purpose of making inquiry as to the amount of compensation and deciding the same.

Compensation on account of interruption of water-supply.

35. If the supply of water to any land irrigated from a canal be interrupted otherwise than in the manner described in clause (d) of section 31, the holder of such land may present a petition for compensation to the Collector for any loss arising from such interruption, and the Collector, after consulting the Canal-officer, shall award to the petitioner reasonable compensation for such loss.

36. The decision of the Collector under either of the last two preceding sections as to the amount of compensation to be awarded, or, if in any rule framed under section 70, such decision shall be declared to be appealable, then the decision of the authority to whom the appeal lies, shall be conclusive.

Decision as to amount of compensation under either of last two sections conclusive.

Formal Adjudications.

37. As soon as practicable after the issue of a notification under section 5, the Collector shall cause public notice to be given at convenient places, stating that ¹[the Provincial Government] intend to apply or use the water as aforesaid, and that claims for compensation may be made before him.

Notice as to claims for compensation in certain cases.

A copy of sections 31 and 32 shall be annexed to every such notice.

38. All claims for compensation under this Act, other than the nature provided for in sections 34 and 35, must be made before the Collector of the district in which such claim arises.

Claims to be preferred to Collector.

39. The Collector shall inquire into every such claim and determine the amount of compensation, if any, which should in his opinion be given to the claimant ; and sections 11, 12, 14, 15, 18 to 23 (inclusive), 26 to 40 (inclusive), 51 and 58 of the ²Land Acquisition Act, 1870, shall apply to such inquiries :

Collector to be guided by provisions of Land Acquisition Act, 1870.

Provided that instead of the last clause of the said section 26, the following shall be read :—

“ The provisions of this section and of sections 31 and 40 of the Bombay Irrigation Act, 1879, shall be read to every assessor in a language which he understands before he gives his opinion as to the amount of compensation to be awarded.”

40. In determining the amount of compensation under the last preceding section, regard shall be had to the diminution in the market-value, at the time of awarding compensation, of the property in respect of which compensation is claimed ;

Diminution in market-value to be considered in fixing compensation.

and, where such market-value is not ascertainable, the amount shall be reckoned at twelve times the amount of the diminution of the annual net profits of such property, caused by the exercise of the powers conferred by this Act.

41. All sums of money payable for compensation awarded under section 39, shall become due three months after the claim for such compensation was made ;

Compensation when due.

Interest. and simple interest at the rate of six per centum per annum shall be allowed on any such sum remaining unpaid after the said three months, except when the non-payment of such sum is caused by the neglect or refusal of the claimant to apply for or receive the same.

Abatements of Land-revenue and Rent.

Abatement of revenue-demand on interruption of water-supply. 42. If compensation is awarded under section 39 on account of a stoppage or diminution of supply of water to any land paying revenue to ¹[the Provincial Government], and the amount of the revenue payable on account of such land has been fixed with reference to the water-advantages appertaining thereto, the holder of the said land shall be entitled to an abatement of the amount of revenue payable to such extent as shall be determined by the Collector.

Abatement of inferior holder's rent on interruption of water-supply. 43. Every inferior holder of any land in respect of which such compensation has been paid shall, if he receives no part of the said compensation, be entitled to an abatement of the rent previously payable by him to the superior holder thereof in proportion to the reduced value of the holding ;

Enhancement of inferior holder's rent on restoration of water-supply. but, if a water-supply which increases the value of the holding is afterwards restored to the said land otherwise than at the cost of the inferior holder, the superior holder shall be entitled to enhance the rent in proportion to such increased value : Provided that the enhanced rent shall not in any case exceed the rent payable by the inferior holder before the abatement, unless the superior holder shall, independently of the provisions of this section, be entitled so to enhance the previous rent.

PART VI.

OF WATER-RATES.

Supply Rates.

Determination of rates for supply of canal-water. 44. Such rates shall be leviable for canal-water supplied for purposes of irrigation, or for any other purpose, as shall from time to time be determined by the ²[Provincial Government].

Provision for cases in which existing If, owing to the construction of a new canal or to the improvement or extension of an existing canal, the amount or duration of any water-supply, in respect of which either no revenue or a fixed amount of revenue

has hitherto been paid to ¹[the Provincial Government], is increased, water-supply rates shall be leviable under this section in respect of the increased ^{is improved.} water-supply only.

The said rates shall be payable by the person on whose application the supply was granted, or by any person who uses the water so supplied.

Occasional Rates.

45. If water supplied through a water-course be used in an unautho- Liability rized manner, and if the person by whose act or neglect such use has when person occurred cannot be identified, the person or all the persons on whose using water land such water has flowed, if such land has derived benefit therefrom, unautho- rizedly cannot be or, if no land has derived benefit therefrom, the person, or all the identified. persons chargeable in respect of the water supplied through such water-course,

shall be liable, or jointly liable, as the case may be, for the charges which shall be made for such use under the rules prescribed by the ²[Provincial Government] under section 70.

46. If water supplied through a water-course be suffered to run to waste, and if, after inquiry, the person through whose act or neglect such Liability water was suffered to run to waste cannot be discovered, when water runs to waste,

the person or all the persons chargeable in respect of the water supplied through such water-course shall be liable, or jointly liable, as the case may be, for the charges which shall be made in respect of the water so wasted, under the rule prescribed by the ²[Provincial Government] under section 70.

All questions arising under this and the last preceding section shall, subject to the provisions of section 67, be decided by a Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf.

47. All charges for the unauthorized use or for waste of water may be recovered, as water-rates, in addition to any penalties incurred on Charges account of such use or waste. recoverable in addition to penalties.

Percolation and Leakage-rates.

48. If it shall appear to a Canal-officer duly empowered to enforce the provisions of this section, that any cultivated land within two hundred yards of any canal receives, by percolation or leakage from such canal, an advantage equivalent to that which would be given by a direct supply of canal-water for irrigation, Land deriv- ing benefit from perco- lation liable to water- rate.

or that any cultivated land, wherever situate, derives by a surface-flow, or by means of a well sunk within two hundred yards of any canal after the admission of water into such canal, a supply of water which has percolated or leaked from such canal,

he may charge on such land a water-rate not exceeding that which would ordinarily have been charged for a similar direct supply to land similarly cultivated.

For the purposes of this Act, land charged under this section shall be deemed to be land irrigated from a canal.

Recovery of Water-rates and other Dues in Arrears.

Water-rates when and to whom to be paid. 57. Every water-rate leviable under this Act shall be payable in such instalments and on such dates and to such officers as shall from time to time be determined under the orders of the ¹[Provincial Government] ²[or of any Commissioner empowered by ³[the Provincial Government] in this behalf].

Arrears to be recoverable as land revenue. Any such rate, or instalment of the same, which is not paid on the day when it becomes due, and any sum due to ³[the Provincial Government] or to a Canal-officer, whether on behalf of ³[the Provincial Government] or of any other person under Part III * * *⁴ which is not paid when demanded, shall be recoverable according to the law and under the rules for the time being in force for the recovery of arrears of land-revenue.

Rent due to owners of water-courses to be recoverable as arrears of land-revenue. Rent payable to the owner of a water-course by a person authorized to use such water-course shall be payable in such instalments and on such dates as the Canal-officer duly empowered to act under section 23 shall direct, and may be recovered on behalf of the owner according to the law and rules aforesaid :

Provided always that no more shall at any time be payable to the owner than is actually recovered from the said person.

PART VII.

OF OBTAINING LABOUR FOR CANALS ON EMERGENCIES.

58. Whenever it appears to a Canal-officer duly empowered to act under this section, that unless some work or repair is immediately executed such serious damage will happen to any canal as to cause sudden and extensive public injury, .

Procedure for obtaining labour for works or repairs urgently required.

or, that unless some clearance of a canal or other work which is necessary in order to maintain the established course of irrigation is immediately executed, serious public loss will occur,

and that the labourers necessary for the proper execution of such repair, clearance or work cannot be obtained in the ordinary manner within the time that can be allowed for the execution of the same so as to prevent such injury or loss,

the said officer may, by order under his hand, direct that the provisions of this section shall be put into operation for the execution of such repair, clearance or work; and thereupon every able-bodied person who resides or holds land in the vicinity of the locality where such repair, clearance or work has to be executed, and whose name appears in the list hereinafter mentioned, shall, if required to do so by such officer or by any person authorized by him in this behalf, be bound to assist in the execution of such repair, clearance or work by labouring thereat as such officer or any person authorized by him in this behalf may direct.

All persons so labouring shall be entitled to payment at rates which shall not be less than the highest rates for the time being paid in the neighbourhood for similar labour.

59. Subject to such rules as may from time to time be prescribed under section 70 in this behalf, the Collector shall prepare a list of the persons liable to be required to assist as aforesaid, and may from time to time add to or alter such list or any part thereof.

List of labourers.

60. All orders made under section 58 shall be immediately reported to the Collector for the information of the Commissioner of the Division, and likewise to the Chief Engineer for Irrigation, for the information of ¹[the Provincial Government].

Reports to be made by Canal-officer.

PART VIII.

OF PENALTIES.

61. Whoever voluntarily and without proper authority—

(1) damages, alters, enlarges or obstructs any canal;

For damaging canal, etc.

- (2) interferes with, or increases or diminishes the supply of water in, or the flow of water from, through, over or under any canal, or by any means raises or lowers the level of the water in any canal ;
- (3) corrupts or fouls the water of any canal so as to render it less fit for the purposes for which it is ordinarily used ;
- (4) destroys, defaces or moves any land or level mark or water-gauge fixed by the authority of a public servant ;
- (5) destroys, tampers with, or removes, any apparatus, or part of any apparatus, for controlling, regulating or measuring the flow of water in any canal ;
- (6) passes, or causes animals or vehicles to pass, in or across any of the works, banks or channels of a canal contrary to rules made under section 70, after he has been desired to desist therefrom ;
- (7) causes or knowingly and wilfully permits cattle to graze upon any canal or flood-embankment, or tethers or causes or knowingly and wilfully permits cattle to be tethered, upon any such canal or embankment, or roots up any grass or other vegetation growing on any such canal or embankment, or removes, cuts or in any way injures, or causes to be removed, cut or otherwise injured, any tree, bush, grass or hedge intended for the protection of such canal or embankment ;
- (8) neglects, without reasonable cause, to assist or to continue to assist in the execution of any repair, clearance or work, when lawfully bound so to do under section 58 ;
- (9) violates any rule made under section 70 for breach whereof the ¹[Provincial Government] shall, in such rules, direct that a penalty may be incurred ;

and whoever—

- (10) being responsible for the maintenance of a water-course, or using a water-course, neglects to take proper precautions for the prevention of waste of the water thereof, or interferes with the authorized distribution of the water therefrom, or uses such water in an unauthorized manner or prevents or interferes with the lawful use of such water-course by any person authorized to use the same or declared to be a joint owner thereof under section 23 ;

shall, when such act shall not amount to the offence of committing **XLV** mischief within the meaning of the Indian Penal Code, on conviction of **1860.**

before a Magistrate, be punished for each such offence with fine which may extend to fifty rupees, or with imprisonment 1* * * for a term which may extend to one month, or with both.

62. Whoever without proper authority—

For endangering stability of canal, etc.

- (1) pierces or cuts through, or attempts to pierce or cut through, or otherwise to damage, destroy or endanger the stability of any canal ;
- (2) opens, shuts or obstructs, or attempts to open, shut or obstruct any sluice in any canal ;
- (3) makes any dam or obstruction for the purpose of diverting or opposing the current of a river or canal on the bank whereof there is a flood-embankment, or refuses or neglects to remove any such dam or obstruction when lawfully required so to do ;

shall, when such act shall not amount to the offence of committing mischief within the meaning of the Indian Penal Code, on conviction before a Magistrate of the first or second class, be punished for each such offence with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, or with imprisonment 1* * * * for a term which may extend to six months, or with both.

63. Whenever any person is convicted under either of the last two preceding sections, the convicting Magistrate may order that he shall remove the obstruction or repair the damage in respect of which the conviction is held within a period to be fixed in such order. If such person neglects or refuses to obey such order within the period so fixed, any Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf may remove such obstruction or repair such damage, and the cost of such removal or repair, as certified by the said officer, shall be leviable from such person by the Collector as an arrear of land-revenue.

Obstruction to be removed and damage repaired.

64. Any person in charge of, or employed upon, any canal may remove from the lands or buildings belonging thereto, or may take into custody without a warrant, and take forthwith before a Magistrate or to the nearest Police-station, to be dealt with according to law, any person who within his view—

Persons employed on canal may take offenders into custody.

- (1) wilfully damages, obstructs or fouls any canal, or
- (2) without proper authority interferes with the supply or flow of water, in or from any canal, or in any river or stream so as to endanger, damage, make dangerous or render less useful any canal.

65. Nothing herein contained shall prevent any person from being prosecuted under any other law for any act or omission made punishable by this Act :

Saving of prosecution under other laws.

Provided that no person shall be punished twice in respect of one and the same act or omission.

Payment of
fine as
award to
informant.

66. Whenever any person is fined for an offence under this Act, the Court which imposes such fine, or which confirms in appeal or revision a sentence of such fine, or a sentence of which such fine forms part, may direct that the whole or any part of such fine may be paid by way of award to any person who gave information leading to the detection of such offence or to the conviction of the offender.

If the fine be awarded by a Court whose decision is subject to appeal or revision, the amount awarded shall not be paid until the period prescribed for presentation of the appeal has elapsed, or if an appeal be presented till after the decision of the appeal.

PART IX.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Appeals
against
orders under
Act.

67. Every order passed by a Canal-officer under sections 13, 18, 25, 30, 45, 46 and 48 shall be appealable to the Collector :

Provided that the appeal be presented within thirty days of the date on which the order appealed against was communicated to the appellant.

All orders and proceedings of a Collector under this Act shall be subject to the supervision and control of the Commissioner ¹* * *.

Power to
summon and
examine
witnesses.

68. Any officer empowered under this Act to conduct any inquiry may exercise all such powers connected with the summoning and examining of witnesses and the production of documents as are conferred on Civil Courts by the Code of Civil Procedure ; and every such inquiry shall be deemed a judicial proceeding.

Service of
notices.

69. Service of any notice under this Act shall be made by delivering or tendering a copy thereof signed by the officer therein mentioned. Whenever it may be practicable, the service of the notice shall be made on the person therein named. When such person cannot be found, the service may be made on any adult male member of his family residing with him ; and, if no such adult male member can be found, the notice may be served by fixing the copy on the outer door of the house in which the person therein named ordinarily dwells or carries on business ; and, if such person has no ordinary place of residence within the district, service of any notice may be made by sending copy of such notice by post in a registered cover addressed to such person at his usual place of residence.

70. The ¹[Provincial Government] may from time to time make rules not inconsistent with this Act to regulate the following matters:—

Power to make, alter and cancel rules.

- (a) the proceedings of any officer who, under any provision of this Act, is required or empowered to take action in any matter;
- (b) the cases in which, the officers to whom, and the conditions subject to which, orders and decisions given under any provision of this Act, and not expressly provided for as regards appeal, shall be appealable;
- (c) the person by whom, the time, place or manner at or in which, anything for the doing of which provision is made in this Act, shall be done;
- (d) the amount of any charge to be made under this Act;
- (e) and generally to carry out the provisions of this Act.

The ¹[Provincial Government] may, from time to time, alter or cancel any rules so made.

Such rules, alterations and cancellments shall be published in the ²[Official Gazette], and shall thereupon have the force of law.

Publication of rules.

71. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to apply to any canal, channel, reservoir, lake or other collection of water vesting in any municipality.

Saving of municipal water-works.

³[PART X.

OF SECOND-CLASS IRRIGATION WORKS.

72. This Part shall apply to Second-class Irrigation Works only.

Application of this Part.

73. (1) The ¹[Provincial Government] may publish a notification in the ²[Official Gazette]—

Notification of Second-class Irrigation Work.

- (a) declaring that it is proposed to constitute any canal, channel, stream, river, pipe or reservoir, natural or artificial, or any part thereof, whether constructed, maintained or controlled by ⁴[the Provincial Government] or not, which is actually used or required for the purposes of irrigation, a Second-class Irrigation Work;

- (b) fixing a period of not less than four months from the date of publication of such notification in the ¹[Official Gazette] for the submission of objections to such proposal :

Provided that no artificial reservoir or water-course supplied from such reservoir which is actually used for the purposes of irrigation by a single irrigator shall be included in such notification except either with the consent of such irrigator or, if in the opinion of the ²[Provincial Government] such inclusion is necessary in the public interests, then without such consent but subject to the payment, after the issue of the declaration mentioned in sub-section (3), to such irrigator of such compensation for his rights as may be settled in accordance with the provisions of section 79,

(2) After the publication of such notification in the ¹[Official Gazette] it shall also be published by the Collector as soon as practicable in the language of the district at the Mamlatdar's Office of the taluka in which the work is situated and in every town and village which in the opinion of the Collector is likely to be affected by such notification.

(3) After considering such objections as may have been received within the period fixed as aforesaid the ²[Provincial Government] may, by notification in the ¹[Official Gazette], declare such canal, channel, stream, river, pipe or reservoir or any part thereof to be a Second-class Irrigation Work.

Proclama-
tion by
the Col-
lector.

74. When a notification has been issued under sub-section (3) of section 73 the Collector shall publish in the language of the district at the Mamlatdar's Office of the taluka in which the work is situated, and in every town and village which in his opinion is likely to be affected by such declaration, a proclamation—

- (a) specifying, as nearly as possible, the source of supply, situation and limits of the Second-class Irrigation Work notified under sub-section (3) of section 73 ;
- (b) stating that this Part applies to the work so notified from the date of the notification published under sub-section (3) of section 73 ; and
- (c) fixing a period of not less than three months from the date of such proclamation, and requiring every person claiming any right in the work so notified either to present to the Collector within such period a written notice specifying, or to appear before him and state, the nature of such right.

75. (1) A Second-class Irrigation Work shall be deemed to be a canal Application within the meaning of sub-section (1) of section 3 and to such work the of certain following sections and Parts only shall, so far as may be, apply, sections of the main Act. namely :—

Sections 3, 4, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 28, 30, Part V, Part VIII, except sub-section (8) of section 61, and Part IX.

(2) The aforesaid sections and Parts shall, for the purposes of this Part, be subject to the following modifications, namely :—

(i) In section 16 before the word “any” prefix the words—

“Subject to any rights recorded in the Record-of-rights prepared or revised as hereinafter provided”.

(ii) In section 17 before the word “any” prefix the words “Subject as aforesaid”.

(iii) In section 21 for clause (d), the following shall be substituted, namely :—

“(d) To have a supply of water on such terms as may be prescribed in the Record-of-rights prepared or revised as hereinafter provided.”

(iv) To section 22 the following proviso shall be added, namely :—

“Provided that no such private arrangement shall affect any rights to water recorded in the Record-of-rights prepared or revised as hereinafter provided.”

(v) In section 30 for the words “every agreement for” the words “all rights to” shall be substituted, and in the same section after the word “property” the words “which have been recorded in the Record-of-rights prepared or revised as hereinafter provided” shall be inserted. Paragraph 2 of the same section shall be omitted.

(vi) In Part V, section 31, proviso clause (c) and the last paragraph shall be omitted.

(vii) In Part V, section 34, the words “section 6, section 7” shall be omitted.

(viii) In Part IX, section 67, after the figures “48” the words “and Part X” shall be inserted.

76. (1) As soon as possible after the expiry of the period fixed by the Collector under section 74, clause (c), a Canal-officer duly empowered in this behalf, who shall be a Revenue officer not below the rank of a Mamlatdar, shall inquire into and settle claims to any right in the Second-class Irrigation Work, and shall record the extent of such right and draw up in the form from time to time prescribed by the ^{Framing of Record-of-rights.} 1[Provincial Government] an Irrigation Record-of-rights so far as the same may be ascertainable from the records of Government and the evidence of any

person likely to be acquainted with the same and any other documentary or oral evidence which the parties concerned or their witnesses may produce.

(2) Such Record-of-rights shall contain the following matters :—

- (a) the nature of the Second-class Irrigation Work and any work subsidiary thereto,
- (b) the lands irrigable therefrom
- (c) the custom or rule of irrigation,
- (d) the rights to water and the conditions on which such rights are enjoyed, and
- (e) such other matters as the ¹[Provincial Government] may by rules prescribe in this behalf.

Powers of
Canal-officer.

77. (1) For the purposes of the inquiries under section 76 such Canal-officer may enter, by himself or any officer authorised by him for the purpose, upon any land adjacent to any such work, and may survey, demarcate and make a map of the same.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in section 76 where no sufficient evidence is forthcoming as to all or any of the matters specified in that section such Canal-officer shall, so far as may be, settle and record the aforesaid matters in such manner as he may deem fit.

Revision of
Record-of-
rights.

78. The Record-of-rights prepared under section 76 may be revised from time to time by a Canal-officer duly empowered in that behalf, who shall be a Revenue officer not below the rank of a Mamlatdar.

Commuta-
tion of
rights.

79. Where the Canal-officer who has prepared or revised any Record-of-rights under this Part finds that, having due regard to the maintenance or management of the Second-class Irrigation Work, any right contained in the Record-of-rights cannot continue to be exercised to the extent recorded, he shall (subject to such rules as the ¹[Provincial Government] may from time to time prescribe in this behalf) commute such right wholly or in part, either by the payment to the holder of such right of a sum of money in lieu thereof, or by the grant of land, or in such other manner as he may think fit; and he shall revise the Record-of-rights accordingly.

Power of
Provincial
Government
where
works are
undertaken
increasing
supply.

80. In the event of ²[the Provincial Government] undertaking at their own cost any work whereby the supply of water in any Second-class Irrigation Work is increased beyond the amount of such supply at the time of preparing or revising the Record-of-rights under this Part the ¹[Provincial Government] may, without prejudice to any rights so recorded, direct that the right to such surplus water shall vest in

81. When any Record-of-rights has been prepared or revised under this Part it shall be published in the language of the district at the Mamlatdar's Office of the taluka in which the work is situated and in every town and village which in the opinion of the Collector is affected by such Record-of-rights.

82. An entry in any Record-of-rights prepared or revised under this Part shall be relevant as evidence in any dispute as to the matters recorded, and shall be presumed to be true until the contrary is proved or a new entry is lawfully substituted therefor :

Provided that no such entry shall be so construed as to limit any of the powers conferred on the ³[Provincial Government] by this Part.

83. (1) In any suit or proceeding in which an entry made in any Record-of-rights prepared or revised under this Part is directly or indirectly called in question, the Court shall, before the final settlement of issues, give notice of the suit or proceeding to the Collector, and, if moved to do so by the Collector, shall make the ⁴[Provincial Government] a party to the same.

(2) Save as provided in sub-section (1) no suit shall lie against ²[the Provincial Government] in respect of anything done by the Collector, Canal-officer or any other person acting under the orders of ²[the Provincial Government] in the exercise of any power by this Part conferred on such Collector, Canal-officer or other person or on ²[the Provincial Government].

(3) Any suit or proceeding in which an entry made in any Record-of-rights prepared or revised under this Part is directly or indirectly called in question shall be dismissed (although limitation has not been set up as a defence) if it has not been instituted within one year from the date of the publication under section 81 of the Record-of-rights containing the said entry, or if one or more appeals have been made against any order of a Canal-officer with reference to any entry in such Record-of-rights, then from the date of any order passed by the final appellate authority, as determined according to this Part.

84. In every Second-class Irrigation Work the following repairs shall be performed by the persons on whom the obligation to perform them is imposed by the next following section, that is to say :—

(1) The filling up of gullies, ruts and holes, especially at the back of revetments, and all petty repairs of a like nature essential

for the safety of bunds, of tanks, channel-banks or other portions of the said Second-class Irrigation Work.

- (2) The prevention of the growth on such work of prickly pear, young trees and other vegetation endangering the safety or concealing the condition of such work.
- (3) The preservation of such bushes and grasses as have been planted for the protection of the interior water slopes of such work.
- (4) The clearance of silt from sluices, supply and distributing channels.
- (5) The clearance of waste weirs and waste channels.

Incidence of obligation.

85. The obligation to perform the repairs prescribed by the last preceding section shall, with reference to any land irrigated from such work, be deemed to be imposed jointly and severally, in the case of unalienated land, on the occupants of the land, and, in the case of all other land, on the holders of the land, as defined in either case in the ¹Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879.

Power to enforce rights and obligations.

86. If any person on whom any obligation is imposed with reference to any Second-class Irrigation Work by any of the provisions of this Part, fails to fulfil the obligation so imposed, or if any person infringes any right recorded in the Record-of-rights prepared or revised as hereinbefore provided, the Canal-officer may require him by notice to fulfil such obligation or to desist from infringing such right within a period to be prescribed in the notice of not less than fifteen days, and in the event of failure may take such steps as may be necessary for the discharge of the said obligation, or the enforcement of the said right, and the amount of any expense so incurred shall be a sum due to ²[the Provincial Government] and recoverable as an arrear of land revenue.

Duty of Patel to report failure to effect repairs.

87. It shall be the duty of the Patel of any village within the limits of which any Second-class Irrigation Work or portion of such work is situated to report to the Mamlatdar, without unnecessary delay any failure or neglect to carry out any of the repairs specified in section 84.

Public servant and some other persons protected from legal proceedings.

88. No suit, prosecution or other legal proceeding shall be maintained against any public servant or person appointed under this Part in respect of anything in good faith done or purporting to be done under the provisions thereof or the rules made thereunder.

89. The ¹[Provincial Government] may, from time to time by notification in the ²[Official Gazette] and after previous publication, make rules as to all or any of the following matters :—

- (i) the manner of framing and revising the Record-of-rights,
- (ii) the proceedings of any officer who under the provisions of this Part is required to take action in any matter,
- (iii) and generally to carry out the provisions of this Part?

³PART XI.

SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR CERTAIN LANDS IRRIGABLE BY THE LLOYD BARRAGE CANALS.

90. This Part shall apply, in the first instance, to lands irrigable by the Lloyd Barrage Canals only. The ¹[Provincial Government] may, from time to time, by notification in the ²[Official Gazette], extend this Part to lands irrigable by such other canals in Sind as may, from time to time, be improved or re-modelled for the more efficient distribution of water therefrom :

Provided, however, that no such notification may be published until the said notification together with the scheme in respect of such lands has been laid ⁴[before the Legislative Assembly of the Province] and approved ⁵[by the Assembly] on a motion made by ⁶[the Provincial Government]:

Provided further that if and when this part is extended to such lands, the cost of reconstructing water-courses shall not be charged on lands watered within the 20 years immediately preceding the date of such notification by canals in lower Sind outside the zone commanded by the Lloyd Barrage Canals.

91. (1) Whenever it appears to any Canal-officer not inferior in rank to an Executive Engineer that it is expedient to change the source of water-supply of any land for the more efficient distribution of water, he shall serve a notice on the holder or holders of the land and, if he proposes to transfer the source of water-supply of the land to any existing

water-course, on the owner or owners of such water-course also, calling upon them to state in writing their objections, if any, as to the source or alignment or construction of the proposed water-course.

(2) (i) If no objection is raised within thirty days from the date of service of the notice, the Canal-officer may change the source of water-supply of the land in such manner as he thinks expedient.

(ii) If any objections are received within the said period of thirty days, the Canal-officer shall give the holder or holders of ¹[the land and the owner or owners of the water-course] a reasonable opportunity of being heard and may, if the said objections are settled, proceed to change the source of water-supply accordingly.

(iii) If no settlement in respect of the said objections be arrived at between the Canal-officer and the holder or holders of ¹[the land and the owner or owners of the water-course], the Canal-officer shall forthwith refer the matter to the Collector whose decision, subject to any orders that may be passed in revision by the Commissioner, shall be final and conclusive as regards the alignment and construction of the proposed water-course and shall not be called in question in any Civil Court.

2 * * * * *

Construction of new water courses and liability of landholders for payment of cost thereof.

92. (1) If ³* * * it shall appear to ⁴[any Canal-officer not inferior in rank to an Executive Engineer] that new water-courses should be constructed for the irrigation of any land in place of any existing water-courses, ⁵[or of any existing sources of water supply] it shall be lawful for him to construct such water-courses as he thinks necessary :

⁶[Provided that before a Canal-officer constructs a water-course under the provisions of this sub-section, the provisions of the last preceding section relating to notice, objections, reference and revision shall, so far as may be, apply as if such water-course were a water-course to be constructed under the said section, and]

Provided ⁷[further] that if the holder or holders of such land agree to construct such ⁸* * * water-courses at his or their own cost to the satisfaction of the Canal-officer within a specified period, the said officer shall give the said holder or holders an option of so constructing the same.

(2) In the event of the holder or holders of any land failing to construct any ¹[such] water-course ²[under the option given to such holder or holders in the proviso to sub-section (1)] either to the satisfaction of the Canal-officer or within the period specified ³* * * *, the Canal-officer may construct ⁴[or reconstruct the same in whole or in part] as he thinks necessary.

(3) The Canal-officer shall, on completion of any such water-course as is referred to in sub-section (1) or (2), give to the holder or holders of land concerned notice thereof, and shall make over possession of the water-course to the said holder or holders.

(4) ⁵(a) It shall be competent to the Canal-officer to fix the boundaries of local areas which are irrigated by one canal system, and within which water-courses have been or are to be constructed in whole or in part under the provisions of sub-section (1) or (2), and to determine the cost or estimated cost, as the case may be, of such water-courses, and the sums to be recovered from all holders of lands irrigated or to be irrigated within such areas as their share of the cost thereof. The estimated cost of such water-courses to be constructed within a local area shall be determined by the Canal-officer on the basis of the actual cost of such water-courses constructed within the local area before the 30th day of September 1933.

Explanation.—For the purposes of this sub-section a canal system means a canal taking off direct from the river Indus, except in the case of the Nasrat Branch, Jamrao, Thar and Hiral Canals each of which shall be deemed to be a canal system.

(b) When the Canal-officer has determined the cost of the construction of water-courses in any local area in accordance with the provisions of clause (a), he shall distribute such cost proportionately over the lands irrigated or to be irrigated and shall declare the amount payable on account of such cost in respect of the land constituting each survey number as defined in the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, and the amount so determined shall be deemed a charge upon such land and shall be payable in the manner hereafter provided, by the holder for the time being of such land and no such survey number shall be sub-divided so long as the amount so determined with interest remains unpaid :

Provided that in distributing such cost in accordance with the provisions of this clause land ⁶[belonging to the Crown] on the 1st day of August 1931 shall be assessed to such cost at twice the rate of occupied land :

Provided further that when the holder or holders of land have constructed a part only of a water-course under the option given by the proviso to sub-section (1) and the Canal-officer has constructed the remaining part of such water-course there shall be credited to such holder or holders the cost of the construction of the part constructed by them, such cost being based upon and proportionate to the cost of the construction of water-courses by the Canal-officer within the local area as determined by the Canal-officer in accordance with the provisions of clause (a).

(c) The Canal-officer after determining ¹[and declaring] the sum ²* * * payable by each holder of land on account of the cost of constructing ³[or reconstructing a water-course in accordance with the provisions of clause (a) or (b)] shall give notice thereof to ⁴[such] holder or holders of the land concerned, with an intimation that ⁵[the sum payable on account of such cost] has become due from the date on which possession of the water-course was made over to ⁶[such holder or holders] and that, if so desired, ⁷[such holder or holders] shall be permitted to pay the sum due in ⁸[twenty equal instalments payable either annually or at such lesser intervals as may be convenient to such holder or holders] together with interest at such rate as may be fixed by ⁹[the Provincial Government] but not exceeding the rate payable by ⁹[the Provincial Government] on its own borrowings on the date on which the said sum became payable as aforesaid :

(d) In the event of any default in payment ¹¹[of any sum due under clause (c)] by the ¹²* * * * holder or holders, the sum payable shall be recoverable under section 57.

(5) ¹³[The holder or holders] of land to whom possession of a water-course is given in accordance with the provisions of sub-section (3) shall be ¹⁴[the owner or owners] of such water-course.

(6) Any person aggrieved by an order of a Canal-officer under sub-section (4) as to the apportionment of the cost of construction of a water-course may present a petition to the Collector requesting him to revise that order, and the Collector after such inquiry as he thinks necessary and after giving the persons concerned a reasonable opportunity of being heard may pass such orders as he thinks fit. The orders passed by the Collector shall, subject to revision by the Commissioner, be final and conclusive unless modified by a Civil Court of competent jurisdiction.

²(7) If after the construction of any water-course under the provisions of this section the Canal-officer finds that any further alterations in the alignment or construction of the said water-course are necessary, it shall be lawful for him with the previous sanction of the Collector to carry out such alterations at the expense of ³[the Provincial Government.]

Explanation.—For the purposes of this section “the cost of constructing a water-course” shall include the cost of aligning the water-course and of such preliminary operations as are necessary for such alignment, but shall not include more than two-thirds of the cost of main rectangulation and sub-rectangulation.

An Act to amend the law relating to the settlement of Villages held by Khots.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make special provision for the settlement and revenue-administration of villages in the Ratnagiri District which are held by khots ; It is enacted as follows :—

Preamble.

PART I.

PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be cited as the Khoti Settlement Act, 1880.

Short title.

It extends to all villages held by khots in the district of Ratnagiri.

Extent.

The ²[Provincial Government] may, from time to time, by notification in the ³[Official Gazette], extend all or any of its provisions to any such village in the Kolaba District.

Khots shall continue to hold their villages conditionally on the payment of the amounts due on account of the jama of the same, according to the provisions of this Act and of the ¹Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, and of any rules for the time being in force made under this Act or under the said Code, and subject to the fulfilment of any other term or liability lawfully annexed or appertaining to their tenure.

Continuance of khots' villages to be subject to payment of jama.

Inferior Holders.

5. Every holder of khoti land who has actually occupied or cultivated the same continuously from any time previous to the commencement of the revenue year 1845-46 has a ²[permanent tenancy] in the land so occupied or cultivated.

What holders are to be deemed permanent tenants.

The occupation or cultivating of the father or other person from whom the present holder inherits, and in the case of ³[permanent tenancies] which are transferable otherwise than by inheritance, the occupation or cultivating of any former holder through whom the present holder claims, or of any mortgagee or lessee of the present or any former holder, shall be deemed to be the occupation or cultivating of the present holder within the meaning of this section ;

and, in the case of land which is periodically fallow, years of fallow shall be reckoned as years of occupation or cultivation for the purpose of this section.

6. If ⁴[a permanent tenancy] which is not transferable otherwise than by inheritance, has been so transferred, the actual holder of the land shall be deemed to be the tenant thereof, and if he, or his father, or other person from whom he inherits, has occupied or cultivated the land continuously from any time previous to the commencement of the revenue year 1845-46, he shall have a ²[permanent tenancy] therein :

Provided that, if the actual holder is in possession of the land as mortgagee, or lessee merely, his occupation or cultivating shall for the purpose of this section and of section 5 be deemed to be the occupation or cultivating of the mortgagor or lessor, and that, if such mortgagor or lessor has a ¹[permanent tenancy] in the land, ²[such permanent tenancy] shall, notwithstanding the provisions of section 9, be subject to the mortgage lien or lease of the said mortgagee or lessee until the same is duly discharged or determined.

Continuance

7. Privileged occupants shall continue to hold their lands conditionally on the payment of the rent from time to time lawfully due by them to the khot or other person entitled to receive payment of the same.

8. Tenants other than ³[permanent tenants] shall continue to hold their lands subject to such terms and conditions as may have been, or may hereafter be, agreed upon between the khot and themselves, and in the absence of any such specific agreement shall be held to be yearly tenants liable to pay rent to the khot at the same rates as are paid by ³[permanent tenants] in the village in which the lands held by them are situate: Provided that the said rates shall not exceed the maxima prescribed in section 33, clause (c).

If the land ²[held by] a privileged occupant lapses for failure of heirs or is forfeited on the occupant's failing to pay the rent due in respect thereof, or if any ³[permanent tenant] resigns ⁴[his land or any portion of his land] or does any act purporting to transfer ⁵[his] land or any portion thereof or any interest therein without the consent of the khot (except in the cases provided for in section 9), ⁶[his] land shall be at the disposal of the khot as khoti land free of all encumbrances, other than liens or charges created or existing in favour of ⁶[the Crown].

Resignation, lapse or forfeiture of privileged occupants' lands.

But it shall not be competent to a privileged occupant at any time to resign a portion only of his entire holding except with the consent of the khot; and no privileged occupant shall be deemed to have forfeited his land on failure to pay rent unless such forfeiture is certified by the Collector.]

Grant of Privileged Occupant's Rights by Khots.

11. It shall be competent to the khot at any time to confer on any tenant the right of a privileged occupant of any class, or on a privileged occupant of one class, the right of a privileged occupant of a superior class:

Privileged occupant's rights may be conferred by khots.

Provided that the grant by the khot of any such right shall not affect any right of ⁶[the Crown] in respect of the land which is the subject of such grant or of the trees or other forest-produce of such land.

12. On receipt of a written application from the khot, in such form as shall be prescribed in rules to be framed under section 40, the Collector shall cause an entry to be made, in such record as may from time to time be prescribed by ⁷[the Provincial Government] in this behalf, of any right conferred by the khot under the last preceding section, and an entry thus duly made and authenticated by the Collector's signature shall be conclusive proof of the facts therein recorded.

Record of grant.

Nothing in this section or in section 11 shall be deemed to apply to a mortgagee lawfully in possession of a khotki unless such mortgagee shall have been expressly authorized by his mortgagor to exercise the powers conferred by the said sections.

Rent of land which a permanent tenant neglects to cultivate.

14. If ¹[a permanent tenant] neglect to raise a crop on any land in his holding on account of the rent of which he would, if he raised a crop, be liable to pay the khot a share of the produce, the khot shall be entitled to receive from him the same amount of rent as if he had raised a crop.

In the event of a dispute as to the amount of rent due under this section, such amount shall be determined by the Collector, but no such rent shall be recoverable by the khot if the tenant shall satisfy the Collector that in the year for which such rent is claimed it was proper, having regard to the custom of the village in respect of lands of the same class, or to the nature and requirements of the soil, that the land should be left fallow.

Accounts.

Khota to keep accounts;

15. The khot shall—

(a) keep, or cause to be kept, such accounts as may from time to time be required by the Collector under the orders of ²[the Provincial Government]; and

and to produce them when required;

(b) produce such accounts, whenever required, to the Collector or to any officer subordinate to the Collector not lower in rank than a mahalkari, and

and to give written receipts.

(c) give a written receipt for every payment of rent or land-revenue made to him whether by a privileged occupant or tenant, or by a co-sharer in his khotki.

Penalty.

For disobedience of any order duly made under this section, or for any infraction of the provisions of this section, the khot shall, on conviction before the Collector or the Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the taluka in which such khot's village is situate, be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees, which shall be recoverable as an arrear of jama.

SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT.

Settlement-records.

Preparation of settlement-register of khoti villages.

16. Whenever a survey-settlement of the land-revenue of any village to which this Act extends is made or revised under the provisions of Chapter VIII of the ³Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, the settlement-register prepared under section 108 of the said Code shall show the area Bom.

and assessment of each survey-number and also whether such survey-number is held by a privileged occupant or not.

¹[If a survey-number is held by one or more privileged occupants, the said register shall further specify the tenure on which such number is held, the names of the occupants thereof, and, in the case of a survey-number held by a permanent tenant, whether his interest therein is transferable otherwise than by inheritance or not.]

Survey-numbers which are not held by privileged occupants shall be entered in the said register in the name of the khot, or, if a partition of the khotki has taken place, of the co-sharers to whose shares they respectively belong.

The said register shall also contain a list of all the co-sharers of the khotki, if the village be not held by one khot in his own sole right, and shall specify the extent of each such co-sharer's interest in the khotki.

Custody and Amendment of Records : Determination of Disputes.

Collector to keep records after survey-settlement completed.

¹18. (1) When the survey-settlement of any village to which this Act extends is completed, the settlement-register and other records thereof shall be kept by the Collector.

Power of Recording-officer to amend records with written consent of parties ;

(2) So long as the settlement-register and other records are in the charge of the Survey-officer, the said officer, and afterwards the Collector or any other officer whom the ²[Provincial Government] from time to time empowers in this behalf, may, in the cases specified in sub-section (3), but not otherwise save with the consent of the parties affected thereby given in writing before the Recording-officer, at any time amend, or cause to be amended, any entry in such register or records, whether by addition thereto, insertion therein, cancellation or other alteration thereof, as may be required ; and unless and until so amended, every entry made shall, as long as the survey-settlement for which it was made remains in force, continue to be applicable to the land referred to.

and in certain other cases.

(3) The cases referred to in sub-section (2) are the following, namely :—

- (a) any clerical error, or any error which all the parties affected thereby admit to have been made in the same, may be corrected ;
- (b) any entry which the Recording-officer is satisfied has been caused by mistake or obtained by means of fraud, misrepresentation or personation, or by other means amounting to an offence under the Indian Penal Code, may be cancelled, ^{XLV} and such other entry (if any) substituted therefor as the ^{of} Recording-officer shall determine ; 1860.
- (c) any entry which is rendered inapplicable or incorrect by any change of circumstances or transfer of rights or interests relating thereto may be cancelled or corrected, as the Recording-officer may deem fit ;
- (d) an entry of the description and amount of the rent payable by ³[a permanent tenant] may be inserted or altered in accordance with any of the provisions of rules IV and V under clause (c) of section 33 ; and
- (e) subject to the provisions of section 20, any entry in respect of which the parties affected thereby may have obtained *inter se* a final decree of a Court of competent jurisdiction under section 21, shall be amended in accordance therewith, on an application, accompanied by a certified copy of such decree, being duly made to the Recording-officer for that purpose.

119. (1) If it appears to the Recording-officer that there exists any dispute as to any matter which he is bound to record, or as to any amendment proposed to be made under section 18, he may, either on the application of any of the disputant parties, or of his own motion, investigate and decide such dispute, and frame or amend the settlement-register or other record accordingly.

Disputes to be determined by Recording-officer.

(2) No such decision and no amendment of any entry in the settlement-register or other records shall be made until after due notice to the parties affected thereby, and without giving them an opportunity of being heard in respect thereto :

Notice and opportunity of being heard to be given to parties.

Provided that no such decision or amendment of an entry shall be deemed invalid merely, for want of such notice or opportunity as aforesaid.

Proviso.

(3) But any person affected by any such decision or amendment, to whom such notice or opportunity as aforesaid has not been given, may apply to the Recording-officer to have such decision or amendment cancelled or altered, as the circumstances of the case may require, and, subject to the provisions of sub-section (2), the Recording-officer shall re-investigate the matter and may, if he thinks fit, cancel or alter such decision or amendment accordingly.

Remedy of party affected to whom no such notice or opportunity given.

120. (1) Subject to such orders as may be passed on appeal under sub-section (2) and to the provisions of sub-section (3), every entry in the settlement-register or other records made by the Recording-officer under section 16, 17 or 18, and purporting to record—

Recording-officer's decision final in certain matters ;

(a) the fact that the interest of any ²[permanent tenant] is or is not transferable otherwise than by inheritance, or

(b) the liability of each privileged occupant to pay rent of the description and amount entered,

shall, subject to the provisions of section 18, be conclusive and final evidence of the fact or liability so recorded.

(2) Any person aggrieved by any such entry may, within one year of the making of the entry, appeal to the ³[Provincial Government] to have the entry altered, and the entry shall be altered if the orders passed on the appeal so direct, and the entry so altered in accordance with such orders shall be conclusive and final evidence in the manner and to the extent specified in sub-section (1).

subject to appeal to Provincial Government.

(3) Nothing in this section shall affect proceedings pending in any Civil Court at the time when this section comes into force.

Recording-officer's decision when not final to be set aside only by a decree of Court. Proviso in restraint of suits.

121. In any other matter the decision of the said Recording-officer shall not be open to appeal or revision, and shall be binding upon all the parties affected thereby until reversed or modified by a final decree of a competent Court :

Provided that—

(a) no person shall be permitted in any Civil Court as a defendant or otherwise, to plead, whether directly or indirectly, that such decision or entry is erroneous or is not binding upon him, if such person is, at the date of the institution of the suit in which the question arises, debarred by the law of limitation for the time being in force from instituting a suit for, or with a view to, the reversal or modification of such decision or entry ; and

(b) no fresh cause of action shall accrue in respect of—

(i) a decision or entry made for the purpose of, or in the course of a revised survey-settlement, or

(ii) an amendment of an entry made under any of the provisions of section 18,

which makes no alteration affecting the substance of the previous decision or entry relating to the same subject-matter.

Bar of suits against the Crown or officers of the Crown.

122. No suit shall lie against ²[the Crown] or against any officer of ²[the Crown] to set aside any decision or order of a Survey-officer or other Recording-officer under this Part.

PART IV.

ADMINISTRATION OF SURVEY-SETTLEMENTS MADE UNDER THIS ACT.

Provisions of this Part when to apply.

23. The provisions of this Part shall not apply to any village to which this Act extends until such time as the ³[Provincial Government] first after the passing of this Act sanctions a survey-settlement or a revised survey-settlement of such village and declares the assessments settled thereunder fixed for a period of years, in accordance with section 102 of the ⁴Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879.

Until such time, the rights and responsibilities of all parties so far as regards the matters treated of in this Part shall continue to be such as they would be if this Part had not been enacted.

Khots' Jama.

24. The jama payable to ¹[the Provincial Government] by the khot shall be the aggregate of the survey-assessments of the lands of the village minus such percentage of deduction, if any, as ¹[the Provincial Government] may in each case direct. Jama how to be calculated.

The amount of the said jama shall be from time to time fixed for the same period for which the survey-assessments are fixed. Amount to be fixed for certain periods.

Managing Khots.

25. The annual kabulayats hitherto executed by khots shall no longer be required from them : Abolition of khots' kabulayats.

Provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to affect the liability of khots to perform any condition of their tenure, or to do any act which they are now bound to perform or to do, or their obligation to refrain from doing anything which they are now bound not to do.

26. When a village is held by two or more co-sharers jointly, the said sharers shall be jointly and severally responsible for the jama, but one of their number shall be nominated every year to receive the inferior holders' rents, to pay the ²[Crown dues], and generally to perform all acts required by this Act or by any other law or rule having the force of law, to be performed by the khot. Appointment of "managing khot".

The sharer so nominated shall be called "the managing khot"
3* * * *

27. If the co-sharers have, at the time of the framing of the survey-settlement records or at any subsequent period, agreed in writing as to the order of rotation, the nomination of the managing khot shall be made by the Collector in the order so agreed upon. Managing khot how to be nominated.

In the absence of any such agreement, ⁴[or if the sharer whose turn it is to be nominated is for any reason unable to serve as managing khot, and fails to delegate his duties and powers under section 31A within such time as may be prescribed by the Collector in this behalf,] the co-sharers shall be called upon to nominate one of their number year by year, ⁵[or for the year, as the case may be,] and in the event of their failing so to do within such time as may be prescribed by the Collector in this behalf, or if they are not unanimous as to the nomination, the Collector shall either select the managing khot for the year, or cause the village to be attached and taken under the management of himself

or any agent whom he appoints for that purpose in the manner provided in section 144 of the ¹Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879. Bom.

Collector's nomination or selection not to be disputed.

28. ²[The Collector's nomination or selection under section 27 shall be made by a written order, which shall not be open to appeal, and no suit shall lie against ³[the Crown] or against any officer of ³[the Crown] in respect of any such nomination or selection.]

But suits in respect to the right of management not barred amongst the khotas themselves.

But it shall be lawful for any of the co-sharers at any time to sue for a decree *inter se* to declare which of them is entitled to the management, or the order in which they should respectively have the management, if more than one of them be entitled to the same; and from the commencement of the revenue year next after an application (accompanied by a certified copy of any such decree) is duly made to him for the purpose, the Collector shall nominate the managing khot in accordance with such decree.

Managing khot's certificate.

29. * * * * * The mamlatdar shall furnish every managing khot ⁵[nominated or selected under section 27] with a certificate under his hand and seal to the effect that the holder thereof is the recognized managing khot for the year to which such certificate relates, and a certificate so signed and sealed shall be conclusive evidence of the right of the khot therein named to manage the village to which it relates for the year therein specified.

Managing khot when there are no co-sharers.

30. When a village is held by a khot in his own sole right, he shall be deemed to be the managing khot thereof for all the purposes of this Act, and it shall not be necessary to furnish him with any such certificate as is described in the last preceding section.

Exclusive power of managing khot.

31. When a managing khot has been duly appointed under any of the foregoing provisions, he alone shall be entitled to assistance for the recovery of rent from privileged occupants under sections 86 and 87 of the ¹Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879. Bom.

Delegation of duties and powers by managing khot.

Separated Sharers.

32. When the khots have divided their khotki or a partition thereof has been effected by the Civil Court, or otherwise, and the co-sharers hold their respective shares in severalty, the Collector shall determine the amount of jama payable in respect of each separate share, and the holders of the said shares shall be held severally liable for the portions of the jama so fixed on their respective shares, and all the provisions of this Act shall apply to them respectively as if they were independent holders of entire khotkis.

Separated sharers to be severally responsible for their respective shares.

Privileged Occupants' Rents.

33. The rent payable to the khot by privileged occupants shall be as follows, namely:—

Nature and amount of rent payable by privileged occupants.

- (a) by a dharekari: the survey-assessment of his land;
- (b) by a quasi-dharekari: the survey-assessment of his land and in addition thereto the amounts of grain or money respectively set forth in the schedule * * *;

²[(c) by any ³[permanent tenant]:

in each case according to the terms of the entry in the survey-record made in respect thereof, and for the time being applicable thereto, under the following rules:—

Rule I. Every such entry shall show whether any rent is payable and, if so, whether it is payable as—

Entry to show form of payment.

- (a) an amount fixed: that is to say, a certain amount, irrespective of the crop, payable in money or kind, or both; or
- (b) a crop-share: that is to say, a fixed proportion of the gross annual produce of the land, and of the produce of fruit-trees (if any).

Rule II. (I) Amounts fixed shall be entered as determined by agreement of the parties—

How and what entries are to be entered as determined by agreement.

- (a) at the time of framing the survey-record, if the Recording-officer is satisfied that they have then or at any time previous agreed that such amounts shall be the rent payable during any period subsequent to the introduction of the survey; or

(b) at any other time, on the parties appearing in person or by duly authorized agent before the Recording-officer and consenting to such entry.

No crop-share to be entered as determined by agreement.

(2) No crop-share shall at any time be entered as determined by agreement.

Meaning of the word "parties".

(3) In this rule the word "parties" means, with reference to an agreement, the tenant and the person who at the time of the agreement is the managing khot :

How far, in an agreement with a tenant, a managing khot can bind a sharer or sharers in a khotki.

Provided that if any sharer in a khotki whose interest, or any number of such sharers the aggregate of whose interests, exceeds three-eighths of the entire khotki, shall declare in writing delivered to the Recording-officer at the time of the nomination or appointment of a managing khot, or at any time during the tenure of his office by such managing khot, that the managing khot shall have no power to bind such sharer or sharers by an agreement with any tenant specified in such writing, no agreement entered into after the delivery of such declaration, between such managing khot and such tenant, shall be binding on such sharer or sharers, unless—

(a) such sharer or sharers shall appear before the Recording-officer and assent thereto, or

(b) written notice of an intention to execute such an agreement has been sent at the cost of such managing khot or tenant through the Recording-officer by post in a registered cover addressed to such sharer or sharers, and such sharer or sharers shall, for a period of not less than three months after such notice has been sent as aforesaid, fail to appear before the Recording-officer and object to such agreement.

How entries other than those of amounts fixed by agreement are to be determined.

Rule III. If at the framing of the survey-record there appears to be no amount fixed by agreement of the parties, the Recording-officer shall,

(a) if he finds that a crop-share has theretofore been paid in accordance with the general custom of the village in respect of similar lands,

enter such crop-share ; or,

(b) if he finds in any case that the rent theretofore paid has been different in description or amount from that payable under the general custom of the village in respect of similar land therein, or that no such general custom is ascertainable,

enter the rent theretofore paid in such case, or, if such rent has not been uniform, the average of the rent paid or payable for such land during the twelve years last preceding his inquiry; or,

(c) if he finds that a commuted value of a crop-share has become payable under sub-rule (1) of rule V,

enter the commuted-value payable under sub-rule (3) of the same rule :

Provided that no crop-share shall in any case be entered exceeding in the case of rice-land one-half and in the case of warkas-land one-third. Limits of crop-shares.

Rule IV. (1) If in any case—

- (a) no entry has been made at the introduction of a survey-settlement, or Power to make or alter entries in case of omission of entry at settlement or on account of entry ceasing to be applicable;
- (b) the entry made has, by reason of a decree of a competent Court or of any change in the tenant's mode of cultivation or otherwise, ceased to be applicable, wholly or in part, to the land in respect of which it was made, of entry at settlement or on account of entry ceasing to be applicable;

and no amount fixed by agreement has been subsequently entered,

the Recording-officer may determine and enter, or alter the entry already made in respect of, the rent payable, as if he were acting under rule III.

(2) If any land is held wholly or partly in consideration of services to be rendered by the tenant to the khot or to the village community, or for the benefit of any class thereof, the Recording-officer shall, upon proof that such services are no longer rendered, determine and enter the rent which would have been leviable, but for such total or partial exemption. or when tenant holding on special conditions of service ceases to render such service;

(3) If in respect of any land, other than land which is entered as held rent-free, the amount fixed, or in the case of crop-shares the commuted-value which has been, or might be, under rule V entered as payable, is less than the total sum representing the survey-assessment and local fund cess recoverable from the khot in respect thereof, together with twenty-five per centum of such assessment and local fund cess (hereinafter called "the percentage"), the Recording-officer shall, on the application of either of the parties, or when amount fixed is not equal to sum of survey-assessment and local fund cess together with a per-

centage thereon ;

raise such amount fixed or commuted-value to such total sum or the equivalent thereof in kind, and shall alter the entry accordingly :

subject to proportionate reduction, if Provincial Government defrays whole or part of the percentage ;

Provided that the ¹[Provincial Government] may, during the period of the survey-settlement in force at the commencement of the Khoti Settlement Act Amendment Act, 1904, by general or special orders in this behalf, direct that the whole or part of the percentage shall during the remainder of such period be defrayed by ²[the Provincial Government]; and so long as such defrayal continues, the rent payable by the tenant to the khot under the provisions of this sub-rule shall be reduced to the extent of the amount so defrayed, and a note shall be inserted by the Recording-officer in the altered entry accordingly.

(4) If the survey-assessment fixed on any survey-number has been reduced or struck off on account of diluvion, deterioration by floods or other cause beyond the control of the ³[permanent tenant], the Recording-officer shall reduce the total amount fixed, or in the case of crop-shares the total commuted-value (if any), which has been entered as payable for the portion of that number in such tenant's ⁴[occupation] by an amount bearing to that total amount or commuted-value the same proportion as the amount of assessment remitted or struck off bears to the total assessment for the entire area in his ⁴[occupation] and shall make an entry in the record specifying—

(a) the reduced amount, and

(b) the limit of time for which it is without further entry to hold good.

When entry of commuted-value of crop share may be made, and effect of such entry.

Rule V. (1) On an application made on or before the first day of May in any year by any tenant, whose rent is payable wholly or partly as a crop-share, the Recording-officer shall fix and enter the commuted-value of the whole of such crop-share, and such commuted-value shall thenceforth, subject to the provisions of sub-rule (3), be payable, with effect from the commencement of the next ensuing revenue-year, by the tenant in lieu of the whole crop-share hitherto payable by him.

(2) In this rule "commuted-value" means the average money-value of the produce payable, and the Recording-officer shall, in the absence of any satisfactory evidence to the contrary, take, as a standard for estimating such money-value, a half crop-share as equivalent to three multiples of the survey-assessment, fixed on the land, a third crop-share as equivalent to two multiples of such assessment, and any other crop-share as equivalent to a proportional multiple of such assessment :

Meaning of "commuted-value" and how fixed.

Provided that the commuted-value of the produce payable on any warkas land entered in the records existing on the day when this rule comes into operation, as land actually used for the purpose of rab manure in connection with rice cultivation shall not exceed an amount equal to the survey-assessment on such land.

Proviso as to warkas land used for rab manure.

(3) Where a commuted-value has become payable under sub-rule (1), the Recording-officer shall at a revised survey-settlement revise the commuted-value in accordance with the provisions of sub-rule (2) with reference to the revised survey-assessment fixed on the land, but shall not alter the description of the rent so payable.]

Commuted-value subject to revision at a revised survey-settlement.

34. The rents due by privileged occupants shall be payable on such dates, in such instalments, and subject to such rules not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as may from time to time be prescribed in this behalf by the ¹[Provincial Government].

Privileged occupants' rents how and when to be paid.

Cesses, etc.

35. It shall not be lawful for any khot to levy *phaski*, *veth*, *nangarveth*, *wartala*, or any other cess, rate, tax or service of any description or denomination whatsoever, from any privileged occupant other than the rent lawfully leviable under the provisions of this Act.

Abolition of all cesses, etc.

Local Fund Cess.

Dharekaris and quasi-dharekaris to what extent liable for the cess. Existing survey-settlements confirmed. 37. Existing survey-settlements of the land-revenue of any village to which this Act extends, made, approved and confirmed under the authority of the ⁴[Provincial Government], shall be deemed to have been lawfully made, and, except as is hereinafter otherwise provided, shall continue in force for the terms for which they have been respectively guaranteed, subject to all the provisions of law which would be applicable thereto if this Act had not been passed, and anything in this Act which is inconsistent with any of the said provisions shall be deemed not to apply to such settlements.

New settlements may be substituted for existing settlements. 38. Upon the expiry of the period of any such guarantee, or, if it shall appear to the ⁴[Provincial Government] that a majority of the landholders affected by any such guarantee so desire, at any time previous to the expiry of the said period (such time being fixed by the ⁴[Provincial Government]), a new survey-settlement shall be introduced into the village in which such guarantee was in force, and the provisions of this Act shall thenceforward apply to the said settlement, anything in any other law to the contrary notwithstanding.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the levy of fees for the use of public landing-places in certain ports in the Bombay Presidency ;
It is hereby enacted as follows :—

1. This Act shall be called “the Bombay Landing and Wharfage Fees Act, 1882.”

2. ²[It shall extend to any ports] in the Presidency of Bombay to which ³[Government] may from time to time, by notification in the ⁴[Official Gazette], extend the Act.

3. Bombay Act III of 1879 is hereby repealed, and all fees levied and every declaration, appointment, or rule made under that Act shall be deemed to have been levied and made under this Act.

4. In this Act ⁵[the term “Government” in relation to a major port means the Central Government, and save as aforesaid means the Provincial Government]; the ⁶term “landing-place” includes a bandar,

(3) All monies received under this Act at or on account of any port to which this Act applies shall be credited in the landing and wharfage fees fund account of the port.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide additional funds for the construction and proper maintenance and repair of public roads in or near stations which are chiefly used by the residents for purposes of local convenience, as, for example, for intercommunication, pleasure driving or riding, other than for military purposes or for purposes connected with agricultural operations of petty trade, dealing or industry, and which are not provided for out of imperial, municipal or cantonment funds; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. This Act shall be cited as the Bombay Highway Act, 1883, and it shall come into force in the manner provided in the next following section.

2. This Act shall extend to the whole of the territories administered by the Bombay Government, but shall not come into force anywhere within the said territories until the ²[Provincial Government] may, by notification in the ³[Official Gazette] apply ⁴the same to any local area to be specified in such notification within the said territories; and the ²[Provincial Government] may, in like manner, amend or cancel any such notification.

It shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government], after the publication of the notification referred to in the last preceding section, to levy² a tax on all carriages, coaches, vans, carts, hackeries, horses or ponies in accordance with the rates specified in the Schedule ³* * * * from all persons owning or having charge of the same, who are resident within the local area so notified :

Provided—

- (a) that the ¹[Provincial Government] may reduce, alter or modify this tax as ⁴[it] may deem fit, but may not increase the rates specified in the said Schedule ;
- (b) that any person who may have owned or had charge of any vehicle or animal as aforesaid kept for use within such local area for a period exceeding fifteen and not exceeding thirty consecutive days shall be liable only to one-third of the tax for that quarter, and for any period of a quarter exceeding thirty consecutive days shall be liable for the whole tax of that quarter ;
- (c) that no tax shall be leviable in respect of any vehicle or animal as aforesaid which shall have been out of use for the whole period contained in any quarter on due notice in writing being given by the owner in accordance with the rules of assessment hereinafter provided for in section 4 ⁵* * * *.

For the purposes of this section the word “resident” means and includes any person who dwells or takes up his abode in a local area notified under this Act for a period exceeding fifteen days.

4. It shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government], from time to time, to make ⁶rules for the assessment and recovery of the tax referred to in the last preceding section, which shall be published in the ⁷[Official Gazette], and such rules may be general for all areas notified under the provisions of section 2 ⁵* * * or special for any one or more such areas, according as the ¹[Provincial Government] directs, and it shall be lawful for the ¹[Provincial Government] at any time to amend or cancel such rules.

Whenever in any municipality or cantonment, within any local area notified under this Act, a tax on vehicles and animals is levied within the limits of such ¹[municipality] or cantonment under the authority of any law for the time being in force therein, the tax imposable under section 3 ²* * * shall not be levied within such limits; but such contribution which, under any law for the time being in force, may be made out of the funds of any such municipality or cantonment to provincial or local funds, as shall, in the opinion of the ³[Provincial Government], be deemed a just and proper share towards meeting the expenses of maintaining provincial roads which are not provided out of such municipal or cantonment funds, but which are calculated to benefit the residents within the limits of such municipality or cantonment, may be applied in the manner prescribed for the application of the proceeds of the tax imposed under section 3 ²* * * *

1. This Act may be called the Bombay Public Authorities Seals Act, Short title. 1883.

2. Bombay Act II of 1870 is hereby repealed. Every notification issued under the said Act and now in force shall be deemed to have been issued under this Act. Repeal of Bom. Act II of 1870.

3. The ³[Provincial Government], may, from time to time, by notification in the ⁴[*Official Gazette*], direct what official seals ⁵each of the following ⁶* * * public authorities shall have and use (namely) :— Provincial Government empowered to prescribe the seals of certain public authorities.

(1) Sessions Judges, Additional and Joint Sessions Judges and Assistant Sessions Judges ;

(2) Presidency Magistrates ;

(3) any other Magistrates ;

An Act to provide for the protection of pilgrims at the ports of Bombay and Karachi.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the protection of pilgrims at the ports of Bombay and Karachi; It is enacted as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as “The Protection of Pilgrims Act, 1887”. Short title.
It extends only to the cities and ports of Bombay and Karachi. Extent.
2. In this Act,— Definitions.
 - (1) “pilgrim” means a Muhammadan who is about to proceed from the port of Bombay or Karachi on a pilgrimage to the Hedjaz, whether he is going direct to Jeddah, or via any other port: “pilgrim”:
 - (2) “pilgrim-broker” means a person who buys and resells, or sells on commission, or takes any reward for the purchase or sale of passage-tickets for pilgrims: “pilgrim-broker”:
 - (3) “agent” includes a person who has chartered a vessel for the conveyance of pilgrims: “agent”:
 - (4) “the Commissioner” means, in Bombay, the Commissioner of Police or his deputy: and in Karachi such officer as the [Central Government] may appoint. “the Commissioner”:
3. Any person who, without a license from the Commissioner, acts as a pilgrim-broker shall be liable for each such offence to a fine which may extend to five hundred rupees. Penalty for acting as a pilgrim-broker without a license.
4. Subject to the orders of the ²[Central Government], the Commissioner may grant to such persons as he thinks fit licenses to act as pilgrim-brokers. Persons may be licensed to act as pilgrim-brokers.

(c) the conditions on which, and the restrictions and limitations subject to which, it is granted ;

and shall be granted on payment ¹[to the Central Government] of such fee, if any, as ²[that Government] may from time to time direct :

³[Provided that, until provision to the contrary is made by the Central Legislature, all such fees shall be payable to the Provincial Government under this section as were being lawfully taken thereunder immediately before the commencement of Part III of the Government of India Act, 1935.]

6. Any licensed pilgrim-broker who shall—

(a) commit a breach of any of the terms or conditions of his license ;

(b) purchase for or sell to any pilgrim a passage-ticket by any vessel to which the provisions of the ⁴[⁵Pilgrim Ships Act, 1895], ^{XIV of 1895.} apply, at any time before notice has been given by the master, owner or agent of such vessel, under section ⁶[8] of the said Act, of the date on which it is proposed that such vessel shall sail, and unless, in the case of any vessel, the proposed date of sailing is printed on the passage-ticket ;

(c) charge a pilgrim more than the cost price of any passage-ticket, provisions or other articles purchased for him, or receive from him any fee or commission on account of such ticket ;

(d) receive from the master, owner or agent of a vessel any fee or commission, in respect of the sale of any ticket, exceeding five per-centum of the price of such ticket ;

(e) purchase for any pilgrim a passage-ticket, on which there is not printed the price charged by the master, owner or agent of the vessel for each class of accommodation ;

(f) by fraud or by false representation as to the size of, or accommodation on board, such vessels, or otherwise, or by any false pretence whatever, induce any person to purchase a passage-ticket ;

shall be liable for each such offence to a fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

An Act to consolidate and amend the law for the prevention of Gambling in the Presidency of Bombay.

WHEREAS it is expedient to consolidate and amend the law for the Preamble. prevention of Gambling in the Presidency of Bombay ; It is enacted as follows :—

1. This Act may be cited as the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, Short title. 1887.

It extends to the City of Bombay, to the Island of Salsette, to all Extent. ²[railways and] railway station-houses without the said city and island, and to all places not more than three miles distant from any part of such station-houses, respectively, and all or any of its provisions may be ³extended from time to time by the ⁴[Provincial Government], by an order published in the ⁵[Official Gazette], to any local area in the Presidency of Bombay.

The ⁴[Provincial Government] may from time to time, by an order published as aforesaid, cancel or vary any order made by ⁶[it] under this section.

Any transaction by which a person in any capacity whatever employs another in any capacity whatever or engages for another in any capacity whatever to wager or bet whether with such licensee or with any other person shall be deemed to be ‘gaming’: Provided, nevertheless, that such licensee may employ servants, and persons may accept service with such licensee, for wagering or betting in such manner or by such contrivance as may be permitted in such license.] ⁵[The collection or soliciting of bets, receipt or distribution of winnings or prizes in money or otherwise in respect of wagering or betting or any act which is intended to aid or facilitate wagering or betting or such collection, soliciting, receipt or distribution shall be deemed to be ‘gaming’.]

(a) being the owner or occupier or having the use of any house, room or place, opens, keeps or uses the same for the purpose of a common gaming-house, Keeping common gaming-house.

(b) being the owner or occupier of any such house, room or place knowingly or wilfully permits the same to be opened, occupied, kept or used by any other person for the purpose aforesaid,

(c) has the care or management of, or in any manner assists in conducting the business of, any such house, room or place opened, occupied, kept or used for the purpose aforesaid,

(d) advances or furnishes money for the purpose of gaming with persons frequenting any such house, room or place,

(c) to take into custody and bring before a Magistrate all such persons,

Provided that no officer shall be authorised by special warrant unless the Commissioner of Police, the Magistrate, the District or Assistant or Deputy Superintendent of Police concerned is satisfied, upon any complaint made before him on oath and upon making such inquiry as he may think necessary, that there are good grounds to suspect the said house, room or place to be used as a common gaming-house.

17. When any instrument of gaming has been seized in any house, room or place entered under section 6 or about the person of any one found therein, and in the case of any other thing so seized if the court is satisfied that the Police officer who entered such house, room or place had reasonable grounds for suspecting that the thing so seized was an instrument of gaming, the seizure of such instrument or thing shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, that such house, room or place is used as a common gaming-house and the persons found therein were then present for the purpose of gaming, although no gaming was actually seen by the Magistrate or the Police officer or by any person acting under the authority of either of them.

Presumptive proof of keeping or gaming in common gaming-house.

8. On conviction of any person for opening, keeping or using a common gaming-house, ^{2*} * or gaming therein, or being present therein for the purpose of gaming, the convicting Magistrate may order all the instruments of gaming found therein or on the persons of those who were found therein, to be forthwith destroyed ³[or forfeited],

On conviction for keeping or gaming in common gaming-house, instruments of gaming may be destroyed.

and may also order all or any of the securities for money and other articles seized, not being instruments of gaming, to be sold and the proceeds thereof, with all moneys seized therein, to be forfeited; or, in his discretion, may order any part of such proceeds and other moneys to be paid to any person appearing to be entitled thereto.

9. It shall not be necessary, in order to convict a person of any offence against any of the provisions of sections 4 and 5, to prove that any person found ⁴[gaming] was playing for any money, wager or stake.

Proof of playing for money not required for conviction.

10. Every person who shall have been concerned in any gaming contrary to this Act, and who shall be examined as a witness by or before a Magistrate on the trial of any charge against the owner, keeper or occupier or other person having the care or management of any common gaming-house, touching such gaming, and who upon such examination shall make true and faithful discovery to the best of his knowledge of all things as to which he shall be so examined, and who shall thereupon receive from the said Magistrate a certificate in writing to that effect,

shall be freed from all prosecutions under this Act for anything done before that time in respect of such gaming.

Payment of portion of fine to informer.

11. The Magistrate trying any case under the provisions of sections 4 and 5 may direct any portion, not exceeding one-fourth, of any fine which may be levied under either of the said sections, or any part of the proceeds of articles or moneys seized and ordered to be forfeited under section 8, ¹[to be sent in the City of Bombay to the Commissioner of Police and elsewhere to the District Superintendent of Police for distribution as reward in such manner as he may think proper, among the persons, not being Police officers, who may have given assistance in the detection or investigation of the offence.]

Power to arrest without warrant for gaming, and setting birds and animals to fight in public streets.

12. A Police-officer may apprehend ²[and search] without warrant—

(a) any person found ³[gaming] ⁴[or reasonably suspected to be gaming] in any public street, ⁵[or thoroughfare, or in any place to which the public have or are permitted to have access] ⁶[or in any race-course];

(b) any person setting any birds or animals to fight in any public street, ⁵[or thoroughfare, or in any place to which the public have or are permitted to have access];

(c) any person there present aiding and abetting such public fighting of birds and animals.

Any such person shall, on conviction, be ⁷[punishable] with fine which may extend to ⁸[three hundred rupees], or with imprisonment which may

extend to ¹[three months] ²[and where such gaming consists of wagering or betting or of any such transaction as is referred to in the definition of gaming given in section 3, any such person so found gaming shall, on conviction, be ³[punishable] in the manner and to the extent referred to in section 4, and all moneys found with such person shall be forfeited.]

And such Police-officer may seize all birds and animals and ⁴[things reasonably suspected to be instruments of gaming] found in such public street, ⁵[thoroughfare, ⁶[place or race-course]] or on ⁷[or about] the person of those whom he shall so arrest, and the Magistrate may, on conviction of the offender, order such instruments to be forthwith destroyed, and such birds and animals to be sold and the proceeds forfeited. ⁸[When any thing has been found on or about any person and a court is satisfied that the Police-officer had reasonable grounds for suspecting that such thing was an instrument of gaming, such circumstance shall, until the contrary is proved, be evidence that such thing was an instrument of gaming and that the person on or about whom the thing was found was present for the purpose of gaming.]

Seizure and destruction of instruments found.

⁹12A. A Police-officer may apprehend without warrant any person who prints, publishes, sells, distributes or in any manner circulates any newspaper, news-sheet or other document or any news or information with the intention of aiding or facilitating gaming.

Power to arrest without warrant for printing, publishing or distributing any news or information.

Any such person shall, on conviction, be punishable in the manner and to the extent referred to in section 4.

And any police officer may enter and search any place for the purpose of seizing, and may seize all things reasonably suspected to be used or to be intended to be used, for the purpose of committing an offence under this section.

13. Nothing in this Act shall be held to apply to any game of mere skill wherever played.

An Act to amend the Bombay Hereditary Offices Act so far as it relates to Matadars.

Bom. III of 1874. WHEREAS some portions of the ²Bombay Hereditary Offices Act are found to be unsuited to matadars, and it is, therefore, expedient to amend the said Act and to enact special provisions for the regulation of the service of matadars ; It is enacted as follows :—

1. This Act may be cited as the Matadars Act, 1887.

Short title.

It extends to the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach and Surat ; but the ³[Provincial Government] may, from time to time, by ⁴notification in the ⁵[Official Gazette], extend its provisions to any village in the Panch Mahals District.

It shall come into force at once : Provided that every appointment to any patel's office to which this Act applies, made under the provisions of the ²Bombay Hereditary Offices Act, or of ⁶Act No. XI of 1843 (*an Act for regulating the service of hereditary officers under the Presidency of Bombay*) and still in force, shall hold good—

(a) until the time when, if this Act had not been passed, such appointment would become vacant, or until the expiry of two years from the coming of this Act into force, whichever first occurs, or,

(b) in the case of an appointment which has been made to have effect pending further orders, until such time as the Collector directs ;

and a fresh appointment under this Act in lieu of any such appointment as aforesaid shall only be made to have effect from the time when the latter appointment ceases to hold good.

s. 2. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context,—

(1) “matadar family” means a family to which the office of village patel, or some share in the discharge of the duties or in the exercise of the powers ordinarily appertaining to that office, belongs hereditarily ;

(2) “mata” means the aggregate of the rights, privileges and responsibilities vesting in a matadar family as such ;

(3) “member of a matadar family” does not include a female, or a person claiming through a female, whilst such female or person is, under section 2 of ¹Act No. V of 1886 (*an Act to amend Bombay Act III of 1874*), postponed in the order of succession to the mata, or part thereof or interest therein, to a male member of the family ;

(4) “matadar” means a member of a matadar family whose name is entered in the register kept under section 5, and includes a representative matadar ;

(5) “representative matadar” means a member of a matadar family whose name is entered as a representative matadar in the said register ;

(6) “senior heir” means the heir who first acquired the right of inheritance, whether by birth, marriage or otherwise ;

Expressions defined in the Bombay Land-revenue Code. (7) any word or expression which is defined in the ²Bombay Land-revenue Code, 1879, and is not hereinbefore defined, shall have the ^V meaning given to it by that Code ; ^{1879.}

³[(8) in determining who is the heir to a matadar for the purposes of this Act, the rule of lineal primogeniture shall be presumed to prevail in the matadar family.]

Modifications of Bombay Act III of 1874. 3. In applying the ²Bombay Hereditary Offices Act as amended by ^{Bom.} Bombay Act No. V of 1886 (*an Act to amend Bombay Act III of 1874*), ^{III of} and section 2 of the last-mentioned Act, to matadars, the term “watan” ^{1874.} shall be deemed to mean all and each of the matas of a village, and a member of a matadar family shall be deemed to be a watandar, and the said Act, as so amended, shall be read subject to the following modifications, namely :—

(1) sections 24 to 31, both inclusive, 36 to 59, both inclusive, 61, 62, 67, 69, 71, and clause (2) of section 73, and so much of section 73 as relates to orders passed under Part VI or Part VII or section 58 of the said Act, and in section 4 the definitions of “watandar” and “representative watandar,” shall be deemed to be repealed ;

(2) in sections 33 and 34, the words "the coming into force of this Act" shall be taken to mean the coming into force of this present Act, and the word "matadar" shall be substituted for the words "registered representative watandar" and "watandar" wherever they respectively occur ;

(3) for the first four words of section 60, the words "when any person elected to officiate or a representative matadar" shall be deemed to be substituted.

Bom. III of 1874. 4. Subject to the provisions of the last preceding section, this Act shall be read as one with the ¹Bombay Hereditary Offices Act. Construction.

Of the Register.

Bom. III of 1874. 5. In the register of lands and allowances in consideration of which liability to perform service still exists, kept under section 65 of the ¹Bombay Hereditary Offices Act the Collector shall specify for every village in which there are matadars :— Matadars' service register what to contain.

(a) the number of distinct matadar families in the village separately recognized in the Collector's records ;

(b) the name of the representative matadar of each matadar family to which a right to hold the office of patel appertains ;

(c) the name of every other person directed by the Collector to be entered in the register under section 7 or 9 ;

(d) where there are more representative matadars than one, the order of rotation in which, failing the appointment of an officiator by election, the right to the patel's office is to vest in the said representative matadars ;

(e) the number of persons required to officiate as patels contemporaneously ;

(f) a description of the service lands held by each matadar family, showing the area, survey numbers and the assessment thereof, together with the quit-rent, if any, payable, and the net amount of revenue alienated by ²[the Provincial Government] ;

(g) the amount and nature of the cash or other allowances, if any, held by each matadar family ;

(i) such other particulars as ²[the Provincial Government] from time to time direct.

The said register shall be amended from time to time whenever any change is made in any of the particulars therein specified in accordance with the provisions of this Act or of the ¹Bombay Hereditary Offices Act.

Right to patel's office to appertain ordinarily to every matadar family ; but exclusive right may be declared by Provincial Government to appertain to one matadar family.

6. In every village in which there are two or more distinct matadar families separately recognized in the Collector's records, a right to hold the office of patel shall ordinarily be deemed to appertain to each of the said families :

Provided that it shall be competent to the ²[Provincial Government] to declare, if, upon consideration of the past history of the tenure of the office in any village, and of the circumstances, so far as known, under which the village was founded, it shall appear to ³[it] equitable so to do, that the right to the patel's office in such village appertains ⁴[to one or more than one of such families to the exclusion of the remainder of such families, and shall vest in such order as ⁵[it] may thereby determine, and every such declaration shall be conclusive evidence of the rights thereby affirmed.]

Determina-
tion of
matadars.

7. In the register prepared under section 5 the Collector shall enter the name of every member of a matadar family contained in any list of matadars made under the orders of ⁶[the Provincial Government] subsequent to the year 1866 :

Provided that—

(a) if, for any village, no such list exists, or if, in respect of any matadar family, no person's name has been entered in any such list, or if at the time when this Act comes into force, there is any dispute pending as to the completeness or correctness of any such entry, the Collector shall hold a summary inquiry, and shall enter in the register the name of each member of a matadar family who shall appear to him to have been recognized in the records previous to the year 1867 as a matadar of the family for which such list or entry is wanting, or to which such dispute relates ;

(b) if any person whose name should be entered in the register in accordance with any of the foregoing provisions is dead, the name of the heir next in succession, or, if there are two or more heirs of equal degree, the name of the senior heir, shall, subject to the provisions

of section 2 of Bombay Act No. V of 1886 (*an Act to amend ¹Bombay Act III of 1874*), be entered in the register instead of his.

8. (1) The name of one matadar shall be entered in the said register as the representative matadar of each matadar family to which a right to hold the office of patel appertains. Determination of representative matadars.

(2) For every such matadar family of which there is only one matadar, the said matadar shall be the representative matadar.

(3) If there are two or more matadars of any such matadar family, the Collector shall, as soon as may be after the passing of this Act, enter in the said register as representative matadar of the matadar family such one of the said matadars as shall appear to him to be the head of the matadar family.

9. On the death of a representative or other matadar, the fact shall be reported by the village-officers to the Collector, and the name of the heir next in succession, or, if there are two or more heirs of equal degree, the name of the senior heir, shall, subject to the provisions of section 2 of Bombay Act No. V of 1886 (*an Act to amend ¹Bombay Act III of 1874*), ²[and to any declaration under the proviso to section 6 of this Act] be registered in his stead : Name of heir to be registered when a matadar dies.

³[Provided that, in any case where the deceased matadar was not a sole representative matadar, if the heir next in succession is not a member of the branch of the matadar family to which the deceased matadar belonged but is another matadar of the same village, or is a member of the branch of another matadar of the same village, the share entered in the register against the name of the deceased matadar shall—

(a) if there is only one remaining representative matadar of the same village who is descended from the same original matadar as the deceased, pass to that remaining representative matadar,

(b) if there are more than one such remaining representative matadars, be divided among such remaining representative matadars in proportion to their shares,

and the register shall be corrected accordingly.]

10. If at any time any person shall, by production of a certificate of heirship, or of a decree or order of a competent Court, satisfy the Collector that he is entitled to have his name registered under section 7 (b) or section 9 in preference to the person whose name the Collector has ordered to be registered, the Collector shall cause the entry in the register to be amended accordingly. Amendment of the register.

Of Service.

Duties and privileges of matadars, as such.

11. Every matadar shall be bound, when so required by the Collector, to perform the duties customarily discharged by matadars, and shall have the privilege of signing the abstract of village-lands and revenues, and such other village-records as it may be customary for matadars to sign.

Area to which matadars' functions extend may in certain cases be reduced.

12. If within the limits of any village in which there are matadars a new village or hamlet has been, or shall hereafter at any time be, formed, it shall be competent to the Collector, with the previous sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government], to exclude the limits of such new village or hamlet from the area to which the functions of the said matadars extend.

Number of officiators requisite for patel's office to be fixed by the Collector.

13. The Collector may fix at his discretion, from time to time, the number of officiators requisite for the due discharge of the duties of every patel's office.

Right to office to vest in representative of families whose rights declared.

²14. In every village in which the ³[Provincial Government] makes a declaration under section 6, the right to the office of patel shall vest to the exclusion of all other matadars in the representative of each of the families whose rights are thereby declared, in such order as may therein be determined.]

In every other case right of office to be enjoyed by matadar families in rotation.

15. In every other village the right to the patel's office shall vest in each of the matadar families entitled thereto in rotation.

Determination of order of rotation.

16. For the purpose of determining the order in which the said right shall vest in the said families, the Collector shall, as soon as may be after this Act comes into force, by written notice, require the matadars of the village to assemble in his presence.

On failure of majority of matadars to agree, Collector to determine order by lot. Proviso.

If a majority of the matadars present in accordance with the said notice do not agree to some order of rotation, the order shall be forthwith determined by the Collector by lot, in the presence of the assembled matadars, in such manner as he shall think fit :

Provided that if, in the course of any proceeding held under the ⁴Bombay Hereditary Offices Act, an order of rotation for service of the representative watanadars of the same families has been already settled ^{Bom. III of 1874.}

by lot or by agreement of the parties, the order so settled shall hold good for the purpose of the last preceding section.

17. On or in anticipation of the occurrence of a vacancy in the office of patel in any village to which section 15 applies, the matadars of the village ¹[who are not deprived of the right of voting under sub-section (2) of section 30] may elect some member of the matadar family whose turn it is to enjoy the right of office to fill the vacancy.

When officiator may be elected by matadars.

If a majority of the said matadars fail, within such reasonable period as shall be prescribed by the Collector in this behalf, to nominate some member of the matadar family aforesaid for the vacancy, or if the person nominated is disqualified for office, the right of office shall vest in the representative matadar of the said family.

Failing election of officiator by matadars, right of office to vest in representative matadar.

18. Elections under the last preceding section shall be held in accordance with such rules² as the ³[Provincial Government], by notification in the ⁴[Official Gazette], from time to time, prescribes in this behalf.

Rules for elections to be prescribed by Provincial Government.

19. Every representative matadar in whom the right of office vests under section 14 or 17 shall ordinarily be required by the Collector, if he is not disqualified for office, to officiate in person; but the Collector may, if he thinks fit, dispense with his personal service.

Representative matadar must ordinarily officiate in person.

If, in any village to which section 15 applies, the representative matadar of the family whose turn it is to enjoy the right of office declines, when so required by the Collector, to officiate in person, the turn to enjoy the said right shall pass to the matadar family next in the settled order of rotation.

On refusal by one representative matadar to officiate in person, turn to enjoy right of office to pass.

A representative matadar who declines, whilst officiating, to forsake some other employment which, in the opinion of the Collector, is incompatible with the due discharge of the duties of the patel's office, or fails when so required by the Collector to reside in the village for which he is appointed, shall be deemed to decline to officiate in person.

Other employment when prohibited to representative matadars. Failure to reside in village.

20. A deputy may be appointed at any time—

(a) by a representative matadar who is, or who whilst officiating in person becomes, disqualified for office; and

When deputy may be appointed by representative matadar.

(b) with the Collector's permission, by a representative matadar who does not wish to officiate or to continue to officiate in person, although not disqualified for office; and

(c) by a sole representative matadar, who proposes to officiate or is already officiating in person, when one or more other officiators are necessary :

¹[Provided that no representative matadar who is disqualified under clauses (f), (g) or (h) of sub-section (I) of section 30 shall be entitled to appoint a deputy.]

Removal of deputy.

A deputy appointed by a representative matadar may at any time be removed from office by the Collector at the request of the representative matadar, if, in the opinion of the Collector, there are good reasons for such request.

Procedure when appointment of deputy has to be made by a representative matadar.

21. When an appointment of a deputy has to be made by a representative matadar, the Collector shall, by written notice, require him to nominate a fit person to be his deputy within twenty days from the date of service of the said notice.

Should the representative matadar fail, within the said period, to nominate any person, or if the person he nominates is not a member of a matadar family of the same village, or is disqualified for office, the Collector may, in his discretion, extend the period of nomination for a further term of ten days.

If within the prescribed period of twenty days, or, when the Collector extends the period, within the extended term, no person is nominated by the representative matadar, or the person nominated by him is not a member of a matadar family of the same village, or is disqualified for office, the turn to enjoy the right of office shall, ²[pass to the representative matadar or matadar family next in the settled order of rotation according as section 14 or section 15 applies to the village.]

Appointment of deputy when to be made by Collector. Such deputy ordinarily to be member of matadar family.

22. If a sole representative matadar declines, when so required by the Collector, to officiate in person, or fails to appoint a fit person to be his deputy in accordance with the provisions of the last preceding section, the Collector shall appoint a deputy.

A deputy so appointed by the Collector shall ordinarily be a member of the matadar family of the village for which he is appointed, but, ³[if there is no member of such family fit and willing to officiate, any other person may be appointed].

Procedure where a disqualified representative matadar is not entitled to appoint a deputy.

23. If a matadar is under eighteen years of age, or if disabled by lunacy or imbecility of mind, the guardian or other legal curator of his person may act in his behalf in any of the matters provided for in sections 16, 17, 20 and 21.

Guardian may act on behalf of matadar legally incompetent.

24. The term of office of a sole representative matadar shall be for life, if the representative matadar shall not in the meantime become disqualified for office.

Term of office of sole representative matadar, and of an elected officiator.

The term of office of a person elected under section 17 shall be for five years, or, for such longer period as a majority of the matadars shall, at the time of election, desire, if the person elected shall not in the meantime die or become disqualified for office.

The desire of the matadars as to the duration of the term of office of any person elected by them under section 17 shall be ascertained in accordance with the rules prescribed under section 18 for determining nominations.

25. The term of office of a representative matadar in whom the right of office vests on failure of an election under section 17 shall be—

Term of office of representative matadar entitled to office on failure of election.

(a) five years, when the number of representative matadars exceeds nine;

(b) seven years, when the number of representative matadars exceeds four but does not exceed nine;

(c) ten years, when the number of representative matadars does not exceed four.

26. A deputy appointed by a representative matadar, or by the Collector in his stead, shall be appointed for the term, or for the residue of the term, of office of the representative matadar by or for whom he is so appointed; and, if a deputy dies or resigns or becomes disqualified for office during the said term, another deputy may be appointed for the residue of the said term in accordance with the provisions of sections 21 and 22:

Deputies to be appointed for period of their principal's term of office.

Provided that—

(a) if a representative matadar who has appointed a deputy because he himself was disqualified for office, or because he did not wish to officiate in person, subsequently at any time during his term of office wishes to officiate in person, he may, if he is not then disqualified for office, be permitted so to do by the Collector;

(b) if a representative matadar dies during his term of office, the deputy, if any, officiating in his stead shall cease to officiate, and the successor of the representative matadar shall, subject to the provisions of section 19, officiate in person for the residue of the said term, or a deputy shall be appointed by him or by the Collector in his stead for the said period, according to the provisions of sections 20, 21 and 22.

No change of officiator to be permitted during last year of representative matadar's term of office.

27. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained to the contrary, no representative matadar in any village to which section 15 applies shall be permitted to commence to officiate in person, and no new deputy shall be appointed by or for a representative matadar in any such village during the last year of the term of office of such representative matadar.

If occasion arises for any such change, office to be deemed vacant.

If occasion arises during any such year for any change of an officiator in any such village, there shall be deemed to be a vacancy in the office.

Appointment of temporary officiators by Mamlatdar or Mahalkari.

28. During any interval between the occurrence of a vacancy in a patel's office and its being filled up in accordance with the foregoing provisions, and during the time that any officiator is suspended, the ¹[Mamlatdar or Mahalkari, as the case may be] may appoint such person as he thinks fit, whether a member of a matadar family of the village or not, to officiate temporarily.

Officiators to retain substitutes during their absence or illness.

29. If an officiator is temporarily absent from his village, or is temporarily prevented by illness from discharging the duties of his office, he may depute some other fit person, whether a member of a matadar family of the village or not, to perform the said duties, but shall be responsible for the acts and omissions of the person so deputed as if they were his own acts and omissions.

Of the Disqualifications for the Patel's Office.

What persons to be deemed disqualified for office.

²[30. (1)] The following persons shall be deemed to be disqualified for the patel's office, namely :—

(a) females ;

(b) persons under eighteen years of age ;

(c) any person who has not passed such educational test, if any, as ³[the Provincial Government] think fit, from time to time, to prescribe in this behalf ;

(d) any person who has attained sixty years of age, except when such person's appointment or further continuance in office is specially permitted by the Collector ;

(e) any person who, in the opinion of the Collector, is disabled by lunacy or imbecility of mind, or by deafness, blindness or other permanent infirmity of body ;

(f) any person who, ¹* * * * * is adjudged by the Collector, after a summary inquiry, to be of general bad character; ²[and whose disqualification on account of his being so adjudged has not been removed by an order which the Collector is hereby empowered to make in this behalf];

(g) any person who has been sentenced by a Criminal Court to imprisonment or whipping for an offence punishable with imprisonment for a term exceeding six months, or to transportation, such sentence not having subsequently been reversed or quashed, and whose disqualification on account of such sentence has not been removed by an order which the ³[Commissioner] is hereby empowered to make, if he shall think fit, in this behalf;

(h) any person removed from office ⁴[or declared to be ineligible for re-employment] under section 31, except when such person's re-employment is expressly sanctioned by ⁵[the Commissioner].

Any officiator who during his term of office becomes disqualified for any of the above reasons shall cease to officiate.

⁶[(2) Any matadar who is disqualified under clause (f) or clause (g) of sub-section (1) shall, so long as his disqualification has not been removed as aforesaid, be deprived of any right which he would otherwise have of voting at an election of an officiator, or of appointing a deputy to officiate.]

Of Penalties.

31. Any matadar who shall neglect or refuse to comply with any order made by the Collector under section 11, and any matadar or officiator who shall be careless or negligent in the discharge of his duties, may be punished by the Collector, for each such offence, by fine which may extend to one-fourth part of the annual emoluments of such matadar or officiator. Punishment of matadars and officiators by fine, and

If an officiator shall be accused of any misconduct which shall seem to the Collector to require a severer punishment than that aforesaid, the Collector may suspend him from office during investigation into such accusation, and, after holding a summary inquiry, may, if he consider the officiator guilty of misconduct meriting such punishment, suspend him from office for a further period not exceeding six months, or, if fraud or wilful framing of incorrect records or other grave misconduct or of officiators by suspension or removal from office.

offence is proved against him, may, with the previous sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government], remove him from office, ²[or, if he has ceased to officiate, may declare that he is ineligible for re-employment without the sanction of ¹[the Provincial Government].

Disabilities of representative matadar, removed from office.

When a representative matadar has been so removed from office, he shall, if ¹[the Provincial Government] so direct, be deprived for the rest of his life of any right which he would otherwise have of voting at an election of an officiator, ³* * * *.

Forfeiture of life interest of representative matadar in case of removal from office.

If any representative matadar or deputy is removed from office under this section, the ⁴[Provincial Government] may direct the forfeiture of the life interest in the mata of the representative matadar so removed from office, or of the representative matadar by whom the deputy so removed from office was appointed, as the case may be.

Liability of officiator to criminal prosecution and suspension pending inquiry and trial.

32. Nothing in the last preceding section shall affect the liability of an officiator to a criminal prosecution for any offence which he may be accused of having committed; and the Collector may suspend any officiator subjected to any such prosecution pending the inquiry and trial, and at its close may take the proceedings and the finding of the Criminal Court into his consideration for the purpose of dealing with the case under the last preceding section.

BOMBAY ACT No. VII OF 1887.¹

[THE TODA GIRAS ALLOWANCES ACT, 1887.]

[28th April, 1888.]

Adapted and modified by the Adaptation of Indian Laws Order in Council.

An Act to declare and amend the Law relating to Toda Giras Allowances.

WHEREAS it is expedient to declare and amend the law relating to toda giras allowances; It is enacted as follows:—

1. This Act may be called the Toda Giras Allowances Act, 1887. Short title.

2. In this Act, "toda giras allowance" means a cash payment made periodically to any person on the part of ²[the Crown], or by or on the part of a holder of alienated land, under the name of *giras*, *wol*, *tora giras* or *toda giras*. "Toda giras allowance" defined.

3. Every toda giras allowance is continuable hereditarily to the lineal male heirs in male descent of the first recipient thereof under British rule: Toda giras allowances to be held hereditarily in male descent.

Provided that, on failure of such heirs, the allowance, or some portion thereof, shall, whenever the ³[Provincial Government] has already so directed, or shall hereafter so direct, be continuable hereditarily to the lineal male heirs in male descent of a brother of the first recipient of such allowance under British rule.

4. No mortgage, charge or alienation of a toda giras allowance, or of any part thereof, or of any interest therein, by any recipient of the same, shall be valid as to any time beyond such recipient's natural life. Mortgage, etc., of toda giras allowance.

5. No toda giras allowance shall be liable to attachment or sale in execution of a decree: Exemption of toda giras allowances from attachment and sale in execution of decrees.

Provided that any money due or likely to become due to a judgment-debtor on account of a toda giras allowance may be attached in execution of the decree against him, but such attachment shall not affect any money which becomes due on account of such allowance after such judgment-debtor's death.

6. (1) Nothing in this Act applies to a toda giras allowance which has already been alienated—

(a) if the instrument purporting or operating to effect such alienation has before the date on which this Act comes into force been registered under any law for the time being in force relating to the registration of documents ; or

(b) if the said instrument, not being compulsorily registrable, and not having been registered under any such law as aforesaid, has been executed before the date on which this Act comes into force, and is presented for inspection, together with a copy thereof for record, at any time within six months after the said date, to the Collector of the district in which such allowance is payable ; or

(c) if when such alienation has not been effected by an instrument, proof thereof is produced within the period and to the Collector aforesaid.

(2) When any instrument is presented to a Collector under clause (b), he shall, before returning the same, endorse thereon, under his signature and official seal, the date of such presentation. When proof of an alienation is produced before a Collector under clause (c), he shall give to the alienee a certificate, under his signature and official seal, that the toda giras allowance so alienated is not subject to the provisions of this Act.
