Socio-Economic Study of Chamba Gujjars

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It is generally held that Gujarat was the original homeland of the Gujjars and that they came to Himachal Pradesh in search of pastures for their livestock. The Gujjars in Chamba were driven by the growing inadequacy of grazing resources in the neighbouring parts of Jammu & Kashmir. Muslim Gujjars in general are staunch believers in the teachings of the Prophet but are not fanatics. Their economic activities revolve round the buffaloes, though in the herd there is a sprinkling of other animals too. So far no economic studies have been conducted about these people and hence this task was taken up by this Centre.

Shri Renveer Singh S.A.A. and Shri C.S. Vaidya S.A. of this Centre collected the necessary information for the study. For this they stayed in Maingal and had discussions with the people for the purpose. Our most sincere thanks are due to the people of haingal who provided the much needed information gladly.
