#### REPORT OF THE IRISH LAND COMMISSIONERS FOR THE YEAR FROM 1st APRIL, 1928, TO 31st MARCH, 1929, AND FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31st MARCH, 1929.

TO THE MINISTER FOR LANDS AND FISHERIES:

We, the Irish Land Commissioners, beg to submit the following Report of the proceedings of the Irish Land Commission during the year and period ended the 31st March, 1929, together with a summary of previous proceedings under the Land Law and Land Purchase Acts.

#### CONSTITUTION OF THE IRISH LAND COMMISSION.

The Irish Land Commission was originally constituted under the Land Law (Ireland) Act 1881 and is a body corporate and a Court of Record with the powers, rights and privileges of the High Court relating to matters within its jurisdiction. It was mainly occupied during its earlier years with the administration of the Land Law Acts, under which a large majority of agricultural tenants had rents judicially fixed. It also administered the Land Purchase Acts which empowered money to be advanced by the State to enable occupying tenants to purchase their holdings subject to terminable Land Purchase Annuities.

The fixing of judicial rents diminished as land purchase increased, and Section 64 of the Land Act 1923 prohibited the further fixing of Rents under the Land Law Acts, as all agricultural holdings which became subject to the purchase provisions of that Act ceased, pursuant to Section 20 (1), to be subject to rent and became liable for payment in lieu of rent to the Irish Land Commission. As explained hereafter, the rents fixed under the Land Law Acts form the basis for the Annuities payable in respect of judicial holdings vested in tenant purchasers under the Land Acts 1923-7, as well as under the Land Acts, 1903-9.

Particulars of the total number of Rents fixed under the Land Law Acts up to 9th August, 1923 (the date of the passing of the Land Act, 1923) are given, by Counties, in Table 1 in the Appendix.

The Irish Land Commission was transferred to the Government of Saorstát Eireann on the 31st March, 1923, and its powers, duties and jurisdiction were confirmed by the Land Law (Commission) Act 1923, which became law on the 24th July, 1923. This Act dissolved the Congested Districts Board, and transferred the Board's lands, tenements and hereditaments with its assets, liabilities, jurisdictions, powers, duties and staff to the Land Commission, and further provided that every jurisdiction, power and duty which immediately before the transfer date was vested in or imposed on the Estates Commissioners appointed under the Land Act 1903, who had ceased to function after the date of transfer, was to be vested and imposed on the Commissioners appointed under the Act of 1923. By the Ministers and Secretaries Act 1924, passed on the 21st April, 1924, the Department of Lands and Agriculture, the Department of Fisheries and other Departments of State were established, and the Land Commission (including the Agricultural and Land Branches of the late Board) was assigned to the Minister for Lands and Agriculture, the Board's Fisheries and Rural Industries Branches being assigned to the Minister for Fisheries. By the Irish Land Commission (Redistribution of Public Services) Order 1927, dated the 27th July, 1927, the Land Commission was transferred to the Minister for Fisheries, who, pursuant to the Ministers and Secretaries (Amendment) Act, 1928, is now known as the Minister for Lands and Fisheries.

The land purchase operations of the Land Commission now fall into three main categories:—(1) The vesting of tenanted land under the Land Acts 1923-7; (2) the acquisition and division of untenanted land for the relief of congestion under the Land Acts 1923-7; and (3) the completion of sales initiated under the Land Acts 1903-9 and the resale of Estates purchased by the Estates Commissioners and the Congested Districts Board.

#### LAND ACT, 1923.

The main purposes of the Land Act 1923 were two-foldto complete Land Purchase and to relieve congestion. To carry out the first of these purposes the Act provides that, with certain exceptions, all tenanted land to which it applies-that is to say, generally speaking, all tenanted agricultural land in Saorstát Eireann-shall vest in the Land Commission on appointed days to be declared by the Land Commission, and shall vest in the tenants as owners in fee simple subject to land purchase annuities (with the power to the Land Commission to retain certain holdings in whole or in part for the purposes, inter alia, of improvement, enlargement or the relief of congestion). In the case of judicial tenants, these annuities will give them a reduction of 30 per cent. or 35 per cent. of their judicial rents according as they had been fixed after or on or before the 15th of August, 1911, and in the case of non-judicial tenants their annuities will give them such reduction as is agreed upon between them and their landlords, or is fixed by the Land Commission. On the passing of the Act of 1923, all rent ceased to be payable by the tenants to whose holdings the Act applied, and pending the vesting of the lands in

the Land Commission the tenants pay in lieu of rent sums which represent an immediate reduction of 25 per cent. on their former rents. The purchase money of tenanted land under the Land Act 1923, including the State contribution of 10 per cent. provided by Section 25 (1), is advanced in  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Land Bonds, repayable by terminable annuities at  $4\frac{3}{4}$  per cent on the purchase money advanced, which include for redemption a sinking fund of  $\frac{1}{4}$  per cent.

As regards the problem of relieving congestion the Act provides that, with certain exceptions, all untenanted land situate in Congested Districts Counties, and such untenanted land situate outside such Counties as is declared to be required for the relief of congestion, shall vest in the Land Commission on appointed days to be declared for the lands; and, to supplement these compulsory powers, untenanted land outside these Counties may be bought by voluntary agreement by the Land Commission. (The "Congested Districts Counties" are defined by Section 46 of the Land Act 1909, as the administrative Counties of Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Roscommon, Mayo, Galway, Kerry, and the six rural districts of Ballyvaughan, Ennistymon, Kilrush, Scariff, Tulla, and Killadysart in the County Clare, and the four rural districts of Bantry, Castletown, Schull, and Skibbereen in the Untenanted land acquired by the Land County Cork). Commission is utilised in the creation of new holdings or in the enlargement of existing holdings. The purchase money of untenanted land is also advanced in 41 per cent. Land Bonds, and is repayable by terminable 43 per cent. annuities, which include 1 per cent. sinking fund. Provision is made in the Parliamentary Vote for the Land Commission for moneys required for the improvement of rearranged holdings or of newly created holdings which involves, where necessary, their equipment with roads, fences, drains, buildings, turbary, etc., and for expenditure on land reclamation, and so much of the expenditure on such improvements as the Land Commission consider can be repaid by the purchasers is made repayable by them along with their purchase annuities.

Migration forms an important part of the work of relieving congestion, as in many districts the area of suitable untenanted land is not sufficient for local needs. In such cases some of the more substantial holdings are, where practicable, acquired from the owners, who are paid for their interests or are given in exchange suitable holdings, which are sometimes situate in a different County. The legal machinery for the acquisition of holdings by the Land Commission and the late Congested Districts Board is varied and complex. The powers of resumption given by Section 5 of the Act of 1881 were utilised by the Board, as were also the powers of compulsory exchange of holdings given by Section 1 of the Act of 1901 (subsequently modified by Section 21 of the Act of 1909). Section 23 of the Act of 1909 empowered the Board and the Estates Commissioners to arrange for the exchange of tenancies on Estates purchased by them. The Board and the Commissioners also acquired tenancy interests on these Estates by direct purchase. The powers given by Section 46 of the Land Act 1923 have greatly facilitated the Land Commission in dealing with the exchange of registered holdings and Section 1 of the Act of 1929 has simplified the taking of transfers from the persons in occupation.

The process of migration involves many difficulties-practical, legal and technical-of which not the least is the understandable objection of the occupiers in the neighbourhood of the new holdings to immigrants being given land to which they consider they and their families have a prior claim. Much tact and foresight are necessary in planning migration schemes and inducing holders to migrate to a part of the country where the local associations and methods of farming would be strange to them, and the preservation of the language must receive the consideration due to its importance. In transfers other than under Section 23 of the Act of 1909, the title to the tenancy interest has to be carefully investigated before holdings can be acquired and after acquisition a rearrangement usually has to be carried out before the holdings can be divided amongst the adjoining landholders. Though migration formed a definite part of the policy of the late Congested Districts Board in dealing with their Estates-and also of the Estates Commissioners on Estates purchased by them-the inherent difficulties and attendant expense of equipment, fencing, and erection of buildings prevented a development of the policy on a very extensive scale. The large powers given to the reorganised Land Commission under the Land Acts 1923-9 and the now almost universal scope of land purchase in Saorstát Eireann make it possible to effect more extensive schemes of migration.

#### THE GAELTACHT.

The peculiar needs of the Gaeltacht have been always matters of deep concern to the Land Commission, and shortly after its reorganisation in 1924 special investigations were made with regard to the advisability of acquiring lands within the Gaeltacht suitable for migration and reclamation, and as a result the Land Commission ordered proceedings to be taken with regard to acquisition of lands, particularly in that portion of the Gaeltacht situated in Iar Connacht; and in 1926 proceedings were instituted for the acquisition of 23,121 acres situated in the Cloosh, Oorid and Maam Valley districts. In addition to the Relief Work Schemes put into operation in that area a sum of £8,000 was sanctioned for the construction of roads, reclamation of lands, fencing and drainage, and the erection of buildings and out-offices for migrants. The Oorid Section of the lands, comprising 3,699 acres, was acquired, and the major portion of this area has now been allotted to migrants, the lands surrendered being available for re-arrangement purposes afterwards. In the Cloosh Section, possession has been taken of 12,267 acres, and provision has been made for equipment of six holdings with dwellinghouses, out-offices, reclaimed land suitable for tillage, fences and drainage. In order to open up this area, the Land Commission constructed a new road (over 5 miles in length) connecting Oughterard and Cashla, rendering accessible for the future large supplies of turbary as well as holdings for migrants.

In carrying out this work the Land Commission has had the valuable assistance of the Department of Agriculture with regard to the tillage part thereof and the result of the co-ordination in this respect has proved a striking success. In the Maam Valley Section, 811 acres have been acquired, but pending acquisition of further essential lands, work in connection with preparation of these lands for installing migrants thereon has not yet been commenced. A further large area of land in Iar Connacht is in process of acquisition, and in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture all areas of land suitable for afforestation purposes in this locality will be specially set aside for that purpose. In addition to these reclamation proceedings, grants and advances amounting to £2,750 were made to a large number of tenant purchasers to enable them to repair and re-roof their dwelling-houses. On the Island of Inishboffin some 33 cases of this nature are being dealt with. Sums amounting to £2,500 have been expended in carrying out Improvement Works, comprising bog roads, extensions to roads, drainage, etc.

In the Ballycroy and Erris Districts of County Mayo a special examination was made by the Land Commission, and as a result extensive schemes of reclamation, comprising approximately 1,000 acres. are in hands, and it is gratifying to note that the Department of Agriculture consider that the reclamation carried out has yielded excellent results. The work involved is of extreme difficulty, as the land the subject of reclamation is usually held in undivided shares of commonage by a great number of tenantry and their consent has to be obtained to an allocation of all or part of the commonage in clearly defined divisions. A sum of £2,800 has been expended by the Commissioners in connection with reclamation of this district, and a further sum of £1,585 has been sanctioned for construction of roads and drainage therein. Special grants and advances, amounting to over £1,000, have been sanctioned and are in process of being expended in supplying additional out-offices accommodation, and, where necessary, new dwelling-houses.

In the Belmullet area, large tracts of land have been acquired and distributed under the Land Act 1923. Special attention has also been paid to the wants of the Inishkea North and South Islanders who suffered severely in the West Coast Disaster of 1927; and an area of approximately 400 acres has been acquired on the mainland. The necessity for migration of any of the Islanders to the mainland has received full consideration, and a scheme of re-settlement is in course of preparation.

In the Ballycastle and Killala districts additional road accommodation is being provided, on which considerably over £2,000<sup>°</sup> has already been expended.

Furthermore, in continuation of the special housing and other improvement schemes in Achill Island inaugurated by the Congested Districts Board, a sum of £35,000 has been expended since the 1st April, 1923, bringing the total so far expended under the scheme to over £57,000, of which some £40,000 was in respect of buildings alone.

Special reclamation work is also proceeding in the Rosses District, Co. Donegal, where 1,698 acres have already been acquired, and grants amounting to £1,450 have been expended for reclamation purposes.

The foregoing will indicate some of the special steps taken by the Land Commission for the benefit of the parts of the Gaeltacht. mentioned, and it should be noted that they are ancillary to the normal activities of the Land Commission in connection with the purchase and improvement of lands in the Gaeltacht and the vesting in tenant purchasers on resale of lands purchased under the Land Purchase Acts.

Since its transfer to the Saorstat Government on the 31st March, 1923, the Land Commission, by way of the completion of Sales from Landlord to Tenant pending at that date under the Acts 1903-09 and of the resale of Estates purchased under those Acts, has up to the 31st March, 1929, vested in the Gaeltacht Counties of Donegal, Mayo, Galway, Clare and Kerry, a total area of 673,000 acres in over 20,000 purchasers for a total price of £3.335,000. Under the Land Acts 1923-27, the Land Commission has, up to 31st March, 1929, in those Counties, as regards tenanted land, gazetted preparatory to vesting an area of 175,750 acres, representing 5,768 holdings, of which 39,362 acres, representing 1,168 holdings and a total price of £239,273, have already been vested, and as regards untenanted land, acquired an area of 105,638 acres for a total price of £884,134, of which 79,475 acres have already been divided among 3,990 allottees. This area is exclusive of over 111,000 acres of untenanted land in the Gaeltacht Counties also divided by the Land Commission since 1923 on Estates previously acquired under the Acts 1903-09. The addition of this latter area brings the total area of untenanted land.divided in the Gaeltacht Counties since 1923 to over 190,000 acres.

As regards expenditure on Improvement Works, during the period from 31st March, 1923 to 31st March, 1929 a total of £550,173 was expended by the Land Commission in improving the Gaeltacht area (including £206,815 for buildings), and considerable further sums have been sanctioned and will be expended progressively with the resale of Estates and the division of untenanted land. In addition, during the last few years, a total of £213,808 has been expended by the Land Commission in the Gaeltacht area on Special Improvement Works out of moneys provided by the Oreachtas for the relief of unemployment and distress, making a total expenditure for Improvements in that area since 1923 of £763,981 (apart from some further general expenditure not readily apportionable by counties).

#### SUBSEQUENT LEGISLATION TO LAND ACT 1923.

The Land Bond Act 1925, which was passed on the 3rd July, 1925, made further provision in relation to Bonds issued under the Act of 1923, and an Act entitled the Land Act 1926 was passed on the 11th March, 1926, to confirm and declare the extent of the application of the Land Act 1923 to tenanted land and to define more fully the land which is tenanted land for the purposes of that Act.

The Land Act 1927, which became law on the 21st May, 1927. inter alia, provides for the application of the Land Act 1923 to sub-tenancies on holdings purchased under Acts prior to 1923, to fee farm grants, renewable and long term leases and to land suitable for building ground, in certain circumstances. By enabling outstanding Compounded Arrears of Rent to be added to the purchase money of holdings, the Act has expedited the vesting of tenanted land in the purchasers.

The Forestry Act of 1928 provides that when the Minister for Agriculture proposes to acquire compulsorily lands for afforestation, application is to be made by him to the Land Commission (exclusive of the Judicial Commissioner), for an Order authorising the compulsory acquisition of the lands and such application and any objections lodged by the parties concerned are to be heard and determined by the Commissioners with a right of appeal to the Judicial Commissioner.

The Land Act 1929, which was passed with the object of removing certain legal difficulties which delayed the vesting of lands, provides for the automatic fixing of Standard Purchase Annuities (except in cases where objections are lodged by the parties concerned) at 65 per cent. of the rent for non-judicial tenancies coming under the Land Act 1923 where not already agreed upon or fixed at the date upon which the Act became law (24th July, 1929). It also provides for the vesting of lands in limited administrators in certain cases and defines and extends the powers of the Land Commission in regard to the acquisition and disposal of fishery rights on lands coming within the provisions of the Land Acts 1923-7.

#### Rules and Regulations made under Land Act, 1923, and Amending Acts.

Provisional Rules made by the Land Commission for carrying into effect the provisions of the Act of 1923, and prescribing the Forms to be used in the various proceedings under the Act were issued during August and September, 1923. Consolidated General Rules made by the Land Commission under the Land Purchase Acts (which included any necessary amendments in the above Provisional Rules) were issued in February, 1924, and were amended by Provisional Rules of the 30th April, 1925 and 27th September, 1926. Provisional Rules of the Land Commission under the Land Act 1927, were issued on the 24th August 1927. Pursuant to Section 57 of Land Act 1923, Rules were made on 25th February, 1926, as to registration on exchange of holdings under that Act and for registration with qualified or possessory titles of lands sold under prior Land Purchase Acts. In addition, the following Rules were made by the Minister for Finance --- Purchase Annuities Fund Rules 1924, dated 30th January, 1924, and Land Finance (Interim) Rules 1924, dated 18th August, 1924, made under Land Act 1923; Land Finance Rules 1925, dated 10th November, 1925, made under Land Act 1923 as amended by Land Bond Act 1925 (which revoked Rules of 18th August, 1924); and Land (Finance) Rules 1927, dated 19th September, 1927, made under Land Act, 1927.

#### I.—PURCHASE PROCEEDINGS UNDER LAND ACTS, 1923-7.

#### TENANTED LAND.

Up to the 31st March, 1929 (the period covered by the present Report), Schedules of Particulars and Maps have been obtained in respect of 89,241 holdings, which included some 3,900 subtenancies, situate on 5,788 Estates comprising an area of 2,832,906 acres, and representing a previous Rental of £1,260,246. In addition, Schedules of Particulars have been lodged under Section 10 of the Land Act 1927 in respect of 49 sub-tenancies on holdings purchased under Land Acts prior to the Land Act 1923, comprising an area of 720 acres and representing a Rental of £298, and Schedules of Particulars have been lodged under Section 34 of the Land Act 1927 in respect of 9 parcels of land held by Local Authorities on lease under the Labourers Acts 1883 to 1919, comprising an area of 13 acres and representing a Rental of £15.

After detailed examination and survey, and the disposal of such matters as discrepancies in area, tenure, occupancy, rights of turbary and rights of way, etc., 20,770 holdings comprising 744,513 acres and representing a Rental of £408,946 have been provisionally gazetted preparatory to vesting the lands. 6,779 holdings, comprising 266,758 acres and a Rental of £162,648 have been vested in the Land Commission, the purchase price amounting to £2,503,925, including the State contribution provided by Section 25 (1) of the Land Act, 1923. Particulars, by Counties, of these holdings, classified according to whether the rents were fixed on or before or after the 15th August, 1911 or were nonjudicial, are given in Tables 2, 3 and 4 in the Appendix. Of the above totals, during the *year* ended the 31st March last, 4,447 holdings comprising an area of 128,565 acres and a Rental of  $\pounds$ 57,526 were provisionally gazetted, and 3,785 holdings comprising an area of 132,618 acres and representing a Rental of  $\pounds$ 71,920 and a total purchase price of  $\pounds$ 1,103,151 were vested.

Up to the 31st March last, 759 holdings comprising an area of 48,496 acres and representing a total standard price of £477,952 have been gazetted in Final Lists as "Retained Holdings" under Section 28 (6) of the Land Act 1923, either on account of the Standard Price exceeding the statutory limit or for improvement or enlargement prior to resale to the tenants or for resumption by the Land Commission for utilization in connection with the relief of congestion.

The following Summary Return shows by Counties the total area of *tenanted land* in respect of which the prescribed Schedules of Particulars have been lodged under the Land Act 1923 up to 31st March 1929, divided under headings indicating the stages of the purchase proceedings:---

Of the 89.241 holdings in respect of which Schedules of Particulars have been lodged, 35,758 were held at non-judicial rents. Up to the 31st March, 1929, the Standard Purchase Annuities for 9.258 non-judicial holdings have been agreed upon between the landlords and tenants at an average reduction of 33.4 per cent. of the rent, and Standard Purchase Annuities for 3,088 nonjudicial holdings were fixed by the Land Commission at an average reduction of 38.5 per cent. of the rent. Of 182 appeals to the Judicial Commissioner 43 were withdrawn. 2 were struck out, the Annuities in 5 cases were fixed by agreement, the Annuities in 51 cases were affirmed and in 81 cases the Annuities were varied on appeal. Of the total Annuities fixed either by the Land Commission or on appeal, the average reduction of the rent was 37.9 per cent. Of the total Annuities agreed upon or fixed, the average reduction of the rent was 35.1 per cent. Particulars by. Counties are detailed on Table 5 in the Appendix.

#### UNTENANTED LAND.

Up to the 31st March, 1929, the Land Commission have inspected or instituted inquiries relative to the 1,069,566 acres of untenanted laid situated on 2,973 estates, with a view to their acquisition for the purpose of distribution under Sections 24 and 36 of the Land Act 1923; of this area 246,385 acres situate on 602 Estates have been gazetted for acquisition under Section 24 of the Land Act 1923 and prices have been offered under Section 36 of the Act for a further 143,708 acres on 397 Estates. Of these areas under Sections 24 and 36, prices have been fixed or agreed on for 297,671 acres on 748 Estates for a total price of £2,930,041. Of this area 234,266 acres on 546 Estates, acquired for a total price of £2,481,988, have been vested in the Land Commission up to the 31st March, 1929. In addition, under Section 35 of the Land Act 1923 18 Demesnes, comprising an area of 6,432 acres have been acquired for a total price of £55,841 up to 31st March, 1929 and negotiations have been initiated for the purchase under this section of 16 Demesnes, comprising an area of 6,126 acres. Under Section 29 of the Land Act 1923 up to the 31st March. 1929, 43 "Retained Holdings" comprising an area of 12,160 acres, and representing a standard price amounting with Com-pounded Arrears of Rent added under Section 2 of the Act of 1927 to £126,843, were resumed by the Land Commission, the compensation therefor paid to the tenants amounting to £68.875. At that date the Commissioners had obtained orders for resumption of 15 additional holdings comprising an area of 3,588 acres, representing a total Standard Price of £23,193, for a total compensation to the tenants of £16,456, but the proceedings had not advanced to the stage to permit the date of resumption to be fixed. Under Section 46 of the Land Act 1923, 52 registered holdings, comprising 4,031 acres have been transferred to the Land Commission in exchange for new holdings provided, and 19 Retained Holdings comprising 289 acres have been surrendered to the Land Commission.

Detailed particulars by Counties of lands acquired and in process of acquisition are given in Tables 6, 7 and 8 in the Appendix

Up to the 31st March, 1929, Declarations under Section 24 (3) of the Land Act 1923 had been gazetted in respect of untenanted laids on 134 Estates, aggregating 43,486 acres, necessary to be acquired for the relief of congestion.

#### NATIONAL LAND BANK ESTATES.

Under the provisions of Part III (Sections 48 to 56) of the Land Act 1923, particulars of lands purchased by 48 Societies or Bodies of Trustees by means of advances from the National Land Bank in respect of a total area of 16,976 acres were furnished to the Land Commission by the Bank. Notices in respect thereof having been duly gazetted, the lands were vested in the Land Commission on appointed days fixed in respect thereof, the purchase money amounting to £390,026, including £35,457 State contribution. The powers of the Land Commission to retain lands so vested, were extended by Section 43 of the Land Act 1927, and further provisions were made by that Act in regard to the resale of such lands, the recovery of debts due by or to Societies or bodies of Trustees and the repayment of deposits.

#### " COMMITTEE " CASES.

Pursuant to Section 42 of the Land Act 1927, 115 applications from Committees for the purchase by the Land Commission of lands held by them, comprising some 32,000 acres, have been received up to 31st March, 1929, and up to that date advances amounting to £71,263, have been made in 13 cases for the purchase of 1,969 acres.

#### UNTENANTED LAND ACQUIRED IN Year ENDED 31ST MARCH, 1929.

The total area of untenanted land acquired by the Land Commission during the year ended the 31st March, 1929 was 54,754 acres, made up as follows:—45,266 acres on 129 Estates acquired for a total price of £446,749 under Sections 24 and 36 of the Land Act 1923; 829 acres on 3 Demesnes acquired for a total price of £6,921 under Section 35 of the Land Act, 1923; 5,279 acres on 20 "Retained Holdings" (representing a Standard Price amounting, with any outstanding Compounded Arrears of rent added. to £52,837) resumed by the Land Commission under Section 29 of the Land Act 1923 for a total compensation paid to the tenants of £25,848; 289 acres on 19 "Retained Holdings" surrendered to the Land Commission; 1,225 acres on 28 registered holdings transferred to the Land Commission in exchange for new holdings provided; and 1,866 acres on lands held by 12 Committees of Tenants, vested in the Land Commission for a total price of £66,263 pursuant to Section 42 of the Land Act 1927.

The following summary Return shows by Counties the total area of *untenanted land* which has been the subject of proceedings or inquiries under the Land Act 1923 up to the 31st

#### ALLOTMENT OF UNTENANTED LAND ACQUIRED.

Up to the 31st March, 1929, of the total area of 276,123 acres of untenanted land acquired (including National Land Bank Estates and "Committee" cases and holdings resumed and registered holdings transferred to the Land Commission, and holdings surrendered to the Land Commission) 205,670 acres have been allotted among 10,035 allottees coming within the classes mentioned in Section 31 of the Land Act 1923, who have been put in possession of their respective divisions. Particulars by Counties of the area allotted are given in Table 17 in the Appendix. REDEMPTION OF HEAD RENTS UNDER SEC. 38, ACT 1923.

Under Section 38 of the Land Act 1923, up to the 31st March, 1929, 149 applications to the Judicial Commissioner for advances for the purpose of redeeming fee farm or other rents were lodged. 12 of these applications were dismissed by the Judicial Commissioner and 6 were withdrawn by the applicants. Redemption prices amounting to £208,352 (exclusive of costs) have been fixed by the Judicial Commissioner to redeem a rental of £12,000 in respect of 105 applications, embracing an area of 15,084 acres. Of these, up to the 31st March, 1929, advances amounting to £120,992, with an additional sum of £3,997 for costs, have been made to redeem a rental of £6,756 in respect of 59 applications embracing an area of 9,587 acres.

REDEMPTION OF SUPERIOR INTERESTS UNDER SEC. 39, ACT 1923.

Under Section 39 of the Land Act 1923, up to the 31st March, 1929, three applications for advances for the purpose of redeeming Superior Interests were made to the Judicial Commissioner. One of these applications was dismissed, and in one case the redemption price was fixed at £2,300 in respect of a Superior Interest of £104 12s. 6d. The remaining case had not been adjudicated upon at the 31st March, 1929.

#### Applications under Section 11, Land Act 1927.

Under Section 11 of the Land Act 1927, up to 31st March, 1929, 161 applications in respect of a total area of 17,066 acres and a rental of £12,375 were received for the vesting in the Land Commission. with a view to the resale of the lands to the occupying grantees or lessees, of parcels of untenanted land situate in noncongested districts counties held under fee farm grants, leases for lives or years renewable for ever or leases for a term of years of which sixty or more were unexpired at the date of passing of the Land Act 1923.

#### II.—ADVANCES MADE IN RESPECT OF SALES INITIATED UNDER ALL LAND ACTS PRIOR TO THE LAND ACT 1923 AND ADVANCES MADE ON RESALE OF ESTATES PURCHASED BY THE ESTATES COMMISSIONERS.

Having regard to the number of inquiries addressed to the Land Commission as to the history of Land Purchase in Ireland and the provisions of the Acts prior to the Land Act 1923, an account has been incorporated in the Appendix (page 35) extracted from a pamphlet entitled "The Irish Land Acts, a short sketch of their history and development," which was prepared by the late Mr. Commissioner Bailey, C.B., for the Royal Commission on Congestion in Ireland in 1906, and published in a revised and enlarged form by the Stationery Office in 1917, but now out of print.

#### LANDLORD AND TENANT ACT 1870.

Advances for the purchase of holdings under this Act were made by the Commissioners of Public Works, who also collected the annuities in respect thereof. A total of 469 loans for £347,480 in respect of a total area of 34,924 acres were made under the Act of 1870.

#### LAND PURCHASE ACTS 1881 TO 1896.

Proceedings under these Acts have long since been completed and all applications disposed of, a total of 49,771 loans for £17,721,722 in respect of the total area of 1,856,506 acres having been issued. Particulars of the advances made under the respective Acts are given in Section XIII. of this Report and are detailed by Counties in Table 10 in the Appendix.

#### IRISH LAND ACTS 1903-9.

SALE OF HOLDINGS UNDER THE ACTS 1903-9 THROUGH THE IRISH LAND COMMISSIONERS OTHER THAN THE ESTATES COMMISSIONERS.

Including the advances made since the commencement of the 1903 Act in respect of Sales under the Redemption of Rent (Ire land) Act 1891 (12 advances for £14,565) and Sales under Section 40 of the Act of 1896 (483 advances for £142,087), the total advances made under the Acts of 1903-9 by the Land Commissioners other than the Estates Commissioners amounted to £901,137 in respect of 3,664 holdings and a total area of 104,960 acres. In addition 88 holdings aggregating an area of 388 acres were vested in tenants who purchased outright by lodgment of the entire purchase money in cash. Particulars by Counties of the above advances are given in Table 9 in the Appendix. These figures are exclusive of Resales by the Congested Districts Board through the Land Commission, particulars of which are given in Section III.

#### SALE OF ESTATES THROUGH THE ESTATES COMMISSIONERS UNDER THE IRISH LAND ACTS 1903-9.

The Estates Commissioners were the three members of the Irish Land Commission appointed under the Act of 1903 for the sale of "Estates" under that Act, which gave them considerable powers to improve small and uneconomic holdings by the purchase of untenanted land for resale to tenants or occupiers of small holdings in the neighbourhood and to tenants evicted from their holdings since 1878 or their representatives. The Act of 1909 extended their powers to facilitate the relief of congestion by migration and exchange of tenancies and the compulsory acquisition of Estates or untenanted land required therefor situate outside the Congested Districts Counties, in respect of which special powers were given to the Congested Districts Board.

Sales of Estates under the Acts 1903-9 were effected by Owners direct to Tenants (Direct Sales) and by Owners to the Estates Commissioners or the Congested Districts Board.

(For Sales of Estates to the Board see Section III. of this Report.)

In the case of Direct Sales the terms of purchase were arranged between the owner and his tenants and embodied in Purchase Agreements lodged with the Commissioners.

Estates, including untenanted land, purchased by the Commissioners were acquired for the purpose of resale to the tenants and other purchasers under the Acts.

Up to the passing of the Act of 1909 all advances under the Act of 1903 were made in cash. To expedite the payment of the purchase money of sales of Estates pending under the Act of 1903 at the passing of the Act of 1909. Section 3 of the latter Act enabled Vendors in such pending sales to elect to take payment either wholly or partly in Guaranteed 2<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> per cent. Stock at the price of 92 instead of waiting for payment in cash of the purchase money of their Estates.

The Act of 1909 also provided that advances in respect of Purchase Agreements in Direct Sales lodged after the 15th September, 1909, and in respect of Agreements entered into by or with the Estates Commissioners after that date were to be made by means of the issue of an amount of Guaranteed 3 per cent. Stock equal in nominal amount to the sum advanced and repayable by annuities at 3½ per cent. under the Act 1909, save as regards certain Estates and lands pending for sale under the Act of 1903 to the Commissioners at the passing of the Act of 1909, which were financed in cash repayable by 3¼ per cent. Annuities on resale. The purchase money of lands acquired by the Commissioners by means of "Final Offers" under Section 43 of the Act of 1909 or under the compulsory provisions of Part IV. of that Act, was also advanced in cash repayable on resale by Annuities at 3½ per cent.

Under the Act of 1903 a bonus calculated at the rate of 12 per cent. on the amount of the purchase money advanced was payable to Vendors for the purpose of aiding the sale of Estates under the Act, subject to a limit of 12 millions which was removed by the Act of 1909. The Act of 1909 also provided as regards sales of Estates under that Act for the payment of a graduated bonus at rates ranging from 3 to 18 per cent. inversely to the number of years purchase of the rent; such bonus worked out in practice at an average of about 10 per cent.

As the issues of Stock to provide cash Advances under the Acts 1903-9 were in practice made at a discount varying with the state of the money market, a considerable amount of excess Stock had to be issued in order to finance such advances

Under the Act of 1903 any deficiency of income as regards the excess stock was charged upon and made good out of the Guarantee Fund. The Act of 1909, however, provided that the charge on the Guarantee Fund for any deficiency in respect of the issue of stock at a discount should extend only to the amount of the Ireland Development Grant which formed part of the cash portion of that Fund (i.e., £160,000) and that any such deficiency in excess of that amount should be made good out of voted moneys. Under both the Act of 1903 and the Act of 1909 the interest and sinking fund of Stock issued to provide the bonus percentage were paid out of voted moneys. Under the Ultimate Financial Settlement made between the Governments of Great Britain and Saorstát Eireann in 1926 the Saorstát contribution to the total charge for excess Stock and bonus percentage in respect of sales of Estates in Saorstát Eireann under the Acts 1903-09 (amounting at present to approximately £1,100,000 annually) was fixed at £134,500 per annum.

The Sales of Estates under the Acts 1903-9 have now practically all been completed, those still pending consisting mainly of residues of Estates held over on account of unusual difficulty. The Advances made during the year ended the 31st March, 1929, in respect of such pending Sales, amounted to £33,631, representing 112 holdings, comprising 4,465 acres.

#### NEGOTIATION FEES.

During the year ended the 31st March, 1929, the Land Commission sanctioned, under Section 23 ss. 12 of the Irish Land Act, 1903, Negotiation Fees amounting to £1,937 in respect of 16 estates on which an agent had been employed by the Vendor to negotiate the sale of such estates to persons other than the Land Commission, which sum represents an average percentage of 2.6 on the aggregate purchase moneys.

The total amount of fees sanctioned from the commencement of the Act of 1903 up to the 31st March, 1929, was £1,140,644, in respect of 5,897 estates, the average percentage being 2.5. During the same period, fees amounting to £19,083 were paid under Section 23 ss. 11, as part of the expenses of the Land Commission to negotiators of sales of estates to the Commissioners under Sections 6, 7 and 8 of the Irish Land Act, 1903, this sum representing 0 44 per cent. on the aggregate purchase moneys.

#### ALLOTMENT OF UNTENANTED LAND ACQUIRED BY ESTATES COM-MISSIONERS UP TO 31ST MARCH, 1929.

Of the untenanted land acquired by the Estates Commissioners (and the tenanted land surrendered by migrants and others on allotment of new holdings), 359,727 acres have been allotted up to the 31st March, 1929, and 8,831 acres remained to be allotted at that date. Particulars by Counties of the area allotted are given in Table 17 in the Appendix. Included in the area allotted are 10,106 acres, representing 360 holdings provided for persons coming within the provisions of Section 1 of the Irish Land (Provision for Sailors and Soldiers) Act, 1919.

#### RESALE OF ESTATES PURCHASED BY THE ESTATES COMMISSIONERS.

When the rearrangement and enlargement of holdings and other improvements which the Commissioners considered desirable were completed the lands were vested in the purchasers subject to Purchase Annuities, the Advances in respect thereof being written off the Advances already made to the Commissioners for the purchase of the Estates.

During the year ended the 31st March, 1929, of the lands purchased but not vested on resale by the Estates Commissioners, the Land Commission have vested in 1,356 purchasers on resal: 20,701 acres for a total resale price of £255,573.

The position in regard to the resale of Estates purchased by the Estates Commissioners under the Acts 1903-9 at 31st March, 1929, was as follows:—

The total area of lands purchased but not yet vested on resale on the 31st March, 1928, was 55,534 acres and the corresponding purchase money was £592,165. In respect of these lands purchased but not yet resold, 1,713 Purchase Agreements had been obtained from tenants and other purchasers, representing a purchase money of £586,210 and an area of 46,703 acres.

#### III.—RESALE OF ESTATES PURCHASED BY THE CON-GESTED DISTRICTS BOARD.

The Congested Districts Board was established under the Act of 1891 for the improvement of the conditions arising out of the specially congested districts in the West of Ireland. The powers of the Board as to purchase, improvement and resale of land, including migration and the amalgamation and enlargement of holdings, were analagous to those of the Estates Commissioners under the Act of 1903, and under the Act of 1909 the Board was reconstituted with enlarged powers and jurisdiction and made a Corporate Body. As already stated, the Land Law (Commission) Act 1923 dissolved the Board and transferred its powers and staff to the Land Commission.

PROCEEDINGS BY THE LAND COMMISSION SINCE DISSOLUTION OF THE BOARD ON 24TH JULY, 1923.

#### Purchase of Estates.

In the period from 24th July, 1923, to 31st March, 1929, of the Estates which the Board had agreed to purchase but which had not been vested in the Board at date of its dissolution, there have been vested in the Land Commission 15 Estates, comprising a total area of 19,654 acres (of which 3,292 acres consisted of untenanted land and 607 acres of demesne lands) for a total purchase money of £93,475 (of which £14,328 was advanced in cash and £79,147 in Guaranteed 3 per cent. Stock).

#### Allotment of Untenanted Land on C.D.B. Estates.

In the period from 24th July, 1923, to 31st March, 1929, of the untenanted land in the hands of the Board but not allotted at the date of its dissolution, the Land Commission have allotted 109,725 acres. In addition, 19,475 acres have been allotted in respect of holdings on the Board's Estates in which the tenants' interests have been acquired by the Land Commission since the dissolution of the Board.

#### Resale of Lands Purchased by the Board.

In the period from 24th July, 1923, to 31st March, 1929, of the lands purchased but not resold by the Board, the Land Commission have vested in or conveyed to 16,653 purchasers on resale a total area of 572,939 acres, representing a total resale price of £3,070,636, of which 129,380 acres, representing a total resale price of £607,049 were vested in 3,831 purchasers during the **year** ended the 31st March, 1929.

Purchase of C.D.B. Estates.

Exclusive of payments made out of the Board's own funds for the purchase of tenants' interests, and now met out of the Land Commission vote.

Sales of Estates to the Board were effected through the Estates Commissioners by Owners under Section 72 and 79 of the Act of 1903, or by Final Offers under Section 60 of the Act of 1909, or, where the Final Offers were not accepted, by compulsory proceedings under Part IV. of the Act of 1909. The purchase money of Estates purchased by the Board from the Land Judge under Section 77 was advanced by the Land Commission. The statement on page 18 with regard to mode of payment of advances and bonus percentage on purchase of Estates by the Estates Commissioners under the Acts 1903-9, applies *mutatis mutandis*, and with the substitution of "Section 60" for "Section 43," to the purchase of Estates by the Board under the Acts 1903-9.

#### Allotment of Untenanted Land on C.D.B. Estates.

The area of untenanted land (including holdings acquired on Board's Estates by purchase or exchange) allotted up to 31st March, 1929, was 543,094 acres (of which 240,000 acres consisted of arable land). The area of untenanted land not yet allotted was some 85,000 acres, consisting almost entirely of mountain and turbary.

Resale of C.D.B. Estates.

• 1817 parcels have been consolidated with holdings.

Particulars by Counties of the purchase and resale of Congested Districts Board Estates are given in Tables 15 and 16 in the Appendix, and particulars of the area of untenanted land allotted are given in Table 17 therein.

In respect of lands purchased but not yet resold at 31st March, 1929, 2,300 Purchase Agreements had been obtained from tenants and other purchasers, representing a Purchase Money of some £500,000, which had not yet been vested in the purchasers on resale.

#### **IV.--REINSTATEMENT OF EVICTED TENANTS.**

On the 31st March, 1929, 1,786 evicted tenants (or their representatives) had been reinstated as purchasing tenants in their former holdings or other holdings by landlords, with the assistance, where necessary, of grants by the Commissioners, and 1,648 were reinstated or provided with other holdings by the Commissioners on Estates purchased by them, making a total of 3,434 evicted tenants reinstated or provided with other holdings up to the 31st March, 1929. Of this number 125 were provided for since the 1st April, 1923, and in connection with their resettlement the Land Commission authorsed the expenditure of £10,796 (of which £7,321 was by way of free grant) for the improvement of holdings, erection of buildings, purchase of live stock, etc., bringing up the total expenditure sanctioned for these purposes during the period ended 31st March, 1929, to £366,383. of which £255,848 was by way of grant.

V.—EXPENDITURE ON IMPROVEMENTS, &c. (Section 12 (1) Land Act, 1903, Section 1 (3) Land Act, 1907, Sections 28-30 Land Act, 1909, Sections 6 and 13 of the Land Law (Commission) Act, 1923, Sections 43, 44 and 77 Land Act, 1923, Section 22 of Land Act, 1927).

Expenditure on Improvements by the Land Commission under the Land Purchase Acts is provided out of the Parliamentary Vote for the Land Commission and is incurred on the improvement of existing holdings and the equipment of new holdings. created on the division of untenanted land, with buildings, fences. drains, roads and, where necessary, with live stock and implements, also on embankments, division of turbary, etc. Payments in respect of contributions under the National Insurance Act for employees on Improvement Works and in repayment of Board of Works Improvement Loans made to the Congested Districts Board, purchase of Tenancy Interests on the Board's Estates, etc., are also included 'under this heading. In addition, in the administration of funds specially voted by the Oireachtas for relief of unemployment and distress in the poorer districts, the Land Commission expended large sums of money on special works, such as the construction of roadways to homesteads not already provided with proper means of access, the improvemen. of existing roads and bridges, the construction of roads for the development of bog areas and the repair of existing bog roads the execution of minor drainage schemes and other works of public utility.

The total amount expended during the six years from 1st Aprii, 1923, to 31st March, 1929, under the Land Acts 1923-7 and previous Acts for the benefit and improvement of Estates (including Estates which had been acquired by the Congested Districts Board) was £1,154,935, and the total amount expended in respect of Special Works for the relief of unemployment and distress was £382,905, making a total of £1,537,840. of which £232,030 was expended during the year ended the 31st March last—£226,719 on Estates Improvement, and £5,311 on the completion of Special Works.

It is estimated that about one-third of the amount expended on Estate Improvements and that some of the expenditure on the Special Works will be repayable as part of Tenant Purchasers' Annuities when the holdings are vested, but the amount cannot be determined until the resales of the Estates are completed.

#### VI.—DISTRIBUTION OF PURCHASE MONEYS.

During the period from the 1st April, 1923, to the 31st March. 1929, in respect of advances made under the Land Acts of 1903-9 a sum of £5,762,818 was distributed by the Judicial Commissioner, together with £81,665 representing payments in cash by tenant purchasers as part of their purchase moneys, and £693,343 paid out of the Land Purchase Aid Fund under Section 48 of the Land Act of 1903 and Section 6 of the Act of 1909, amounting to £6,537,826. In addition, during the same period a sum of £4,153,849, and £68—representing payment in cash as part purchase money, was distributed by the Judicial Commissioner in respect of advances (including State Contribution) made under the Land Acts 1923-7, together with £67,137 out of the Costs Fund under Section 5 of the Act of 1923 and £85,130 Land Bank Security Deposits lodged under Section 52 of the Act, amounting to £4,306,184. During the same period a sum of £44,436 was dis-tributed in respect of Sales of holdings on default in payment of moneys due to the Land Commission The total sum distributed by the Judicial Commissioner under all Acts during the period from the 1st April, 1923, to the 31st' March, 1929, was thus £10,888,446, of which £1,454,403 was distributed during the year ended the 31st March, 1929.

#### VII.—APPLICATIONS AND APPEALS TO THE JUDICIAL COMMISSIONER.

30 applications by way of objection to the final offer of the Estates Commissioners for the purchase of Estates or untenanted land have been heard and decided by the Judicial Commissioner under Sections 62 and 63 of the Act of 1909.

181 appeals to the Judicial Commissioner against the price fixed by the Land Commissioners for untenanted land proposed t : be acquired under the Land Acts 1923-7 have been heard and decided by the Judicial Commissioner up to the 31st March, 1929. In the same period, 404 applications (of which 23 were withdrawn) by motion for judicial declarations as to whether the Land Act 1923 applied to holdings and 3,675 objections (of which 891 were withdrawn) as to accuracy of particulars of rent, etc., lodged by owners came before the Judicial Commissioner. There also came before the Judicial Commissioner 28 appeals (of which 7 were withdrawn) against orders of the Land Commission on objections to Provisional Lists of lands to be vested in the Lan1 Commission, 163 appeals (of which 25 were withdrawn) against Standard Purchase Annuities fixed, 49 objections (of which 21 were withdrawn) to certificates of Compounded Arrears of Rent to be added to the purchase money of holdings vested in the Land Commission, 69 applications (of which 5 were withdrawn) for resumption of retained holdings, 118 applications to fix the amount of intervening interests, 32 miscellaneous motions (of which 3 were withdrawn) and 125 applications (of which 3 were withdrawn) under Sections 38 and 39 of the Land Act 1923. Further particulars as to appeals against Standard Purchase Annuities and applications under Sections 38 and 39. will be found in Section I. of this Report.

#### VIII.—SPORTING AND MINERAL RIGHTS.

#### SPORTING RIGHTS.

In the 9,080 Estates for the purchase of which advances were made by the Land Commission under the Land Acts 1903-9 during the period from 1st November, 1903 to the 31st March, 1929, the sporting rights were dealt with as follows:—

In 118 Estates exclusive sporting rights were preserved to superior landlords.

In the remaining Estates sporting rights within the definition of Section 13, s.s. 2, of the Irish Land Act 1903 were vested as follows:—In 5,845 Estates in the purchasers; in 812 in the vendors; in 620 in the purchasers concurrently with the superior landlords or vendors; in 51 partly in the purchasers and partly in the purchasers concurrently with the superior landlords or vendors; in 197 partly in the purchasers and partly in the superior landlords or vendors; in 83 in the vendors concurrently with the superior landlords; in 15 partly in the vendors and partly in the superior landlords; in 245 in the vendors for life, afterwards in the purchasers; in 26 partly in the purchasers and partly in the Land Commission; in 109 partly in the Land Commission and partly in the superior landlords or vendors; in 57 in the Land Commission.

The number of Estates in which the exclusive sporting rights have been vested in the Land Commission is small compared with the number of Estates sold, and it has not been found that the sporting rights on these Estates are of value. In 26 cases, however, the sporting rights have been leased by the Land Commission for a sum of £54 12s. 0d., and in respect of Estates purchased under the Land Act, 1923, the sporting rights have been leased in 59 cases for a sum of £423 10s. 0d. On estates vested in the Congested Districts Board in which the sporting rights had not been disposed of prior to its dissolution, the Land Commission have made leases in 21 cases for a sum of £226, and temporary lettings have been made in a number of other cases.

Under the Land Act 1923 in the case of tenanted lands the sporting rights on and over holdings, other than fishing rights and fisheries, are to vest in the tenants with the holdings, and in the case of untenanted land vested in the Land Commission the sporting rights and all fisheries appurtenant thereto vest in the Land Commission, subject to any lease then existing.

#### MINING AND MINERAL RIGHTS.

In the 9,080 Estates for the purchase of which advances were made by the Land Commissioners under the Irish Land Acts 1903-9 during the period from 1st November, 1903, to the 31st March, 1929, the right of mining and taking minerals was dealt with as follows:—

In 7,796 Estates they were reserved to the Land Commission; in 859 to the superior landlords or vendors; in 419 partly to the Land Commission and partly to the superior landlords or vendors; in 2 to the superior landlords and Land Commission jointly; in 1 partly to the Land Commission, partly to the purchasers and partly to the vendors; in 2 partly to the superior landlords and partly to the purchasers; in 1 partly to the Land Commission and partly to the purchasers. In the case of one holding on an Estate the mining rights were vested in the purchaser. In 24 cases the Commissioners have made prospecting leases, and the sum of £1.956 13s. 6d. has been received in rents and royalties for distribution under the Land Act 1907. As under Article XI of the Constitution minerals reserved to the Land Commission are now the property of the State, the Land Commission has not power to grant leases or options thereof, pending further legislation.

Section 45 (5) of the Land Act 1923 provides that, on the vesting of any land under that Act, the exclusive right of mining and taking minerals and digging and searching for minerals on or under that land, including such mineral rights as may be superior interests, shall (save as regards any mine or quarry being worked or developed by the owner or his lessee on the date of vesting, or as to stone, gravel, sand or clay) vest in Saorstát Eireann, and that where any such rights vested are subsequently leased or sold, the person who would have been entitled thereto if they had not so vested shall be entitled to receive such share of any rent, purchase money or any other net profit received in respect of the same as shall be determined by the Oireachtas.

#### IX.—SUB-DIVISION AND SUB-LETTING OF PURCHASED HOLDINGS.

During the year ended the 31st March, 1929, 693 applications for liberty to sub-divide purchased holdings were sanctioned and 31 refused. 34 applications for sub-letting were also sanctioned during that period.

During the year under review, 782 Orders apportioning Land Purchase Annuities were sealed by the Land Commission following upon consents previously given to sub-divide the holdings. while 41 licences to sub-let were similarly sealed.

#### X.-RESERVATION OF ANCIENT MONUMENTS.

In the case of 104 Ancient or Mediaeval Monuments situate on Estates coming under the Irish Land Acts 1903-9, the Commissioners of Public Works or the Councils of the following Counties have intimated their willingness to have the monuments vested in them under Section 14 of the Act of 1903:—

Commissioners of Public Works, 37; Cavan, 5; Clare, 5; Cork, 11; Donegal; 1; Galway, 6; Kildare, 5; Kilkenny, 2; Leix, 3; Limerick, 1; Louth, 1; Meath, 5; Offaly, 2; Roscommon, 1; Tipperary, 7; Waterford, 4; Westmeath, 5; Wexford, 2; Wicklow, 1.

In the case of 18 Ancient or Mediaeval Monuments situate on Estates coming under the Land Act 1923, the Commissioners of Public Works have intimated their willingness to have the monuments vested in them.

STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED THE 31ST MARCH, 1929, RELATING TO THE COLLECTION OF HALF-YEARLY INSTALMENTS OF LAND PURCHASE ANNUITIES PAYABLE TO THE LAND COMMISSION UNDER THE LAND PURCHASE ACTS

Proceedings are in progress for the recovery of the amount uncollected at 31st July, 1929.

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The holdings of 432 purchasers under the Land Purchase Acts who were in default in payment of their instalments were advertised for sale during the year ended 31st March, 1929 In 86 of such cases the sales were withdrawn, the arrears having been paid or the cases otherwise settled, in 123 cases the holdings were sold to purchasers, and in the cases where there was no bidding at the sales, the Land Commission propose to institute proceedings to take possession of the holdings pending resale,

#### INTEREST IN LIEU OF RENT, &C (LAND ACTS, 1903-9).

During the year ended 31st March, 1929, the total amount of interest in heu of rent collectible under the provisions of the 35th Section of the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1896, was £1,516, together with £11,637 arrears due by 620 payers at 31st March, 1928, making the amount collectible £131,523, and of this £4,219 was collected by the 31st March, 1929, leaving an arrear of £8,933 due by 450 payers at that date. The amount so collected was paid out to the persons entitled to receive it.

During the year ended 31st March, 1929, in Estates purchased by the Estates Commissioners for resale, the sum of £28,211 for rent and interest was collected, leaving an arrear at 31st March, 1929, of £12,662 due by 581 payers.

As regards Estates purchased by the (late) Congested Districts Board for resale, the sum of £164,189 for rent and interest was collected during the year ended 31st March, 1929, leaving an arrear of £54,158 due at 31st March, 1929.

Proceedings are in progress for the recovery of the arrears outstanding at the 31st March, 1929.

#### COMPOUNDED ARREARS OF RENT (LAND ACTS, 1923-7).

Under Section 19 of the Land Act, 1923, Compounded Arrears of Rent (defined as a sum equivalent to the total rent and arrears of rent due on the gale day next preceding the passing of the Act in respect of rent accrued since the first gale day in the year 1920, less a deduction of 25 per cent.) are collectible by the Land Commission in 5,426 Estates, from 84,296 tenants for a total of £1,270,440. Up to 31st March, 1929, a total of £711,085 thereof had been collected in respect of 'the first instalment of arrears, of which £703,432 had been distributed to Landlords or their accredited agents, less statutory deductions for Income Tax and towards cost of Collection, pursuant to Section 19 (4) of the Act of 1923, and the balance was held pending administration of Estates on devolution of title, etc. Under Section 2 of the Land Act, 1927, in cases where any Compounded Arrears of Rent payable had not been collected before the appointed day, a sum equivalent to the amount of the Compounded Arrears of Rent remaining unpaid may be added to the purchase money of the holding and repaid by a proportionately increased annuity. Sums so added to the purchase money are payable to the person who would have been entitled to receive the Compounded Arrears of Rent for his own use.

#### PAYMENT IN LIEU OF RENT (LAND ACTS, 1923-7)

For the year ended the 31st January, 1929, the sums collectible under Section 20, Land Act, 1923, from 95,426 payers, amounted to £845,025. The sums due and uncollected on the 31st January, 1929, for all Gales from the 9th August, 1923, to the 31st January, 1929, amounted to £225,790, and proceedings are in progress for the collection of this amount. A sum equivalent to the Payment in lieu of Rent payable by the tenants is payable to the landlords or their accredited agents, less statutory deductions for Income Tax and towards cost of Collection pursuant to Section 20 (4) of the Act of 1923

#### XII.—TEMPORALITIES OF THE LATE ESTABLISHED CHURCH.

The property of the late Established Church, which was vested in the Land Commission in 1881, including the income on redemption moneys which had been invested mainly in recent years. produced during the six years ended 31st March, 1929, a total receipt of £1,054,428 (which sum included £218,292 received for the proceeds of sales of property and the redemption of income). Out of the sums so received, and sums to credit, payments were made during the six years ended 31st March, 1929, amounting to £867,505 for annual charges on the Church Temporalities Fund, £8,092 paid to the Government of Northern Ireland on final apportionment of the Fund and £227,104 invested.

Annual payments amounting to £133,848 are charged on the Saorstat share of the Church Temporalities Fund by various statutes These comprise interest at 3 per cent on a capital sum of £886,600, amounting to £26,598 payable under the National School Teachers' Pension Act 1879 to the National School Teachers' Pension Fund, an annuity of £10,000 payable under the Irish Universities Act 1908 to the National University of Ire-land, interest at  $2\frac{3}{4}$  per cent. on a capital sum of £1,500,000 amounting to £41,250, formerly paid under Section 35 of the Purchase of Land Act 1891 to the Congested Districts Board and now under Section 9 of the Land Law (Commission) Act 1923 appropriated to the Vote for the Irish Land Commission, and an annuity payable under Section 15 (b) of the Agricultural and Technical Instruction Act 1899 (revisable on 1st April, 1930), of which £14,000 is payable to the Department of Agriculture and £42,000 to the Department of Education.

The amount of arrears due to the Fund in respect of Tithe Rent charges and other collectible revenue from landed property on 31st March, 1929 was £25,892.

An Account of the Receipts and Payments of the Church Temporalities Fund, audited by the Controller and Auditor General, is presented annually to both Houses of the Oireachtas.

#### XIII.—GENERAL SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINS UNDER ALL THE LAND PURCHASE ACTS.

The figures in the above Table include Estates purchased by the Land Commission and the (late) Congested Districts Board for the purpose of resale to tenants and other persons, irrespective of whether or not these Estates have yet been completely resold, the number of holdings therein being estimated as the probable total number of resales,

In addition, a total of £3,795,984 has been advanced by the Land Commission to Rural District Councils under the provisions of the Labourers (Ireland) Acts 1906-14, repayable by  $3\frac{1}{4}$  per cent. annuities under the Land Act 1903.

In addition to the holdings sold under the Land Purchase Acts, 6,057 holdings, representing a purchase money of £1,674.841, were also sold to tenants under the Irish Church Act 1869. These have been excluded from this Return as the Church Act is not included in the definition of the Land Purchase Acts. The sales to Church Tenants were not carried out by means of advances as under the Land Purchase Acts, but by way of credit to the Church Temporalities Fund, and a large number of the sales were to direct tenants of Church lands, and to others subject to tenancies in respect of which subsequent sales under the Land Purchase Acts have been carried out and still take place.

The position at 31st March, 1929, in regard to the purchase and resale of Estates acquired by the Land Commission and the Congested Districts Board was as follows:---

The amount of untenanted land (and tenanted land surrendered by migrants, etc., on the allotment of new holdings) included in the area acquired by the Land Commission or the Cougested Districts Board is 997,072 acres, of which 902,821 acres have been allotted up to 31st March, 1929. The area not yet allotted consists mainly of mountain and turbary.

#### COMPLETION OF PROCEEDINGS PENDING UNDER LAND ACTS 1903-9 AT 31st March, 1923.

During the six years from the 1st April, 1923 to 31st March, 1929, in respect of proceedings for Direct Sales between landlord and tenant which had been initiated under the Land Acts 1903-9, but had not been brought to completion at the date of transfer of the Land Commission to the Government of Saorstát Eireann, advances were made amounting to £3,592,356 (which together with £77,078 cash lodged by purchasers made the total purchase money £3,669,434), representing 14,372 holdings comprising 436,225 acres. In addition, in respect of the *resale* of Estates purchased by the Estates Commissioners or the Congested Districts Board, the Land Commission vested during the same period an area of 698,506 acres in 22,206 purchasers for a total resale price of £4,090,981.

In respect of the *purchase* of Estates which had been agreed to be acquired by the Estates Commissioners or the Congested Districts Board prior to the date of transfer, £236,110 was advanced by the Land Commissioners during the same period for the purchase of 46 Estates comprising 47,356 acres and 1,187 tenants.

#### LAND ACTS, 1923-7.

In reviewing the proceedings under these Acts it should be borne in mind that the first few years of the administration of a Land Act embodying novel features must necessarily be occupied largely in elaborating the machinery and in preparatory work for bringing the Act into operation. In the case of the Land Act 1923, the preparatory work was unusually heavy, as it included the task of arranging for the collection of the Compounded Arrears of Rent and Payment in lieu of Rent in respect of *all* tenanted land in Saorstát Eireann coming under the provisions of the Act, that is to say, nearly 100,000 holdings on some 6,000 Estates.

In our previous Report for the period up to the 31st March, 1928, a brief account was given of the steps necessary to be taken before "appointed days" can be fixed for the vesting of tenanted lands coming under the Land Acts 1923-7, such as checking of the Schedules of Particulars lodged by the owners, survey and subsequent inspection of the holdings and other lands, fixing of Standard Purchase Annuities for holdings subject to non-judicial rents, determination of questions as to joint tenancies, sub-tenancies, retained holdings, resumption of holdings, provision for drainage maintenance rates, embankments, turbary, rights of way, etc, and hearing by the Commissioners of objections in Court. Careful consideration has been given to the possibility of abbreviating the process of completing the sale of tenanted land, and measures have been taken towards expedition which it is hoped will give good results. The Land Act 1929 will obviate a considerable amount of inspection and other work in respect of non-judicial tenancies by the general fixation of Standard Purchase Annuities, in the absence of objections, at 65 per cent. of non-judicial rents.

Up to the 31st March, 1929, 20,770 holdings comprising 744,513 acres have been provisionally gazetted preparatory to the fixing of appointed days and the vesting of the lands, and of these 6,779 holdings comprising an area of 266,758 acres and representing a purchase money of £2,503,925 were vested up to 31st March, 1929.

As regards untenanted land, up to the 31st March last 276,123 acres have been vested in the Land Commission and prices have been agreed on or fixed in respect of a further 72,007 acres. Of the untenanted land acquired 205,670 acres have been divided among 10,035 allottees up to the 31st March, 1929.

Including 152,568 acres of untenanted land on Estates purchased by the Estates Commissioners and the Congested Districts Board under the Land Acts prior to the Land Act 1923 which have been divided during the last six years, the total area of untenanted land divided by the Land Commission since 1923 exceeds 358,000 acres. Steps are also being taken towards the vesting in the allottees of the fee simple of the parcels of land of which they have been placed in occupation.

#### REGISTRATION OF TITLE.

Lands sold under the Land Purchase Acts and vested in purchasers subject to Land Purchase Annuities are, pursuant to the Local Registration of Title Act 1891, compulsorily registered in the Central and Local Offices of the Land Registry. When holdings are vested in the purchasers, the Land Commission furnishes to the Land Registry the necessary registration particulars, which are entered on the Registers and the boundaries of the holdings. are delineated on the Registry Maps.

#### APPENDIX "A."

#### THE IRISH LAND ACTS, THEIR HISTORY AND DEVELOPMENT PRIOR TO 1923.

The foregoing Report gives an account of the main provisions of and the operations under the Land Act 1923 and the amending Acts 1927 and 1929, and it also gives in summarised form statistics of the proceedings under the prior Land Acts from 1870.

In order to give more detailed particulars of the history and development of the Acts prior to the Act of 1923 this Appendix incorporates the following extracts from a pamphlet entitled "The Irish Land Acts, a short sketch of their history and development," which was prepared for the Royal Commission on Congestion in Ireland in 1906 by the late Mr. Commissioner Bailey, C.B, and published in a revised and enlarged form by the Stationery Office in 1917, but now out of print.

#### ECONOMIC IRELAND BEFORE THE LAND ACTS.

The Ireland of 1850—and I take that date as representing the state of the country at the close of the Famine period—was very different from the Ireland of to-day In 1845 the population was nearly double what it is now. Local or county government was in the hands of a few of the better-off inhabitants, who were selected by arbitrary, as opposed to representative, methods. The Land Laws recognised no rights of ownership in the occupier beyond what his agreement with the landlord gave to him, and the economic state of the country was wretched in the extreme.

The old order of things then gave way before the combined influences of the potato failure and the introduction of Free Trade in England. The effect of these forces was immediate. An enormous emigration commenced, and pasture took the place of agriculture over a great part of the country. New conditions were thus created, and new problems had to be faced. The miseries and misfortunes of the country that had been evident for generations, we may say centuries, now attracted the attention of social and economic as well as of political reformers. It soon became evident that the policy of "let alone" could not be maintained, and after a long period of controversy, strife and agitation, several Acts were put on the statute book that well-magh revolutionised the conditions of the people.

#### RELATION OF LANDLORD AND TENANT IN IRELAND PRIOR TO 1870.

The relation of landlord and tenant in Ireland, down to the year 1860, was based on tenure, not on contract. The old feudal tenures imported from England were modified and altered during the last two or three centuries by the existing Irish customs. The result was that a period of much doubt and confusion arose, and an extraordinary collection of enactments dealing with land was placed on the Irish Statute Book. In the reign of George III. upwards of sixty of these Acts were passed for Ireland, while six sufficed for England. The following reigns were equally productive in agrarian legislation, and the condition of the occupiers became more and more unsettled and unsatisfactory, and "wild doctrines," to quote the words of the eminent authors of a standard work on Irish Land Tenure, published in 1851, were agitated, including "extravagant demands for fixity of tenure and compulsory valuation of rents."

The relation of landlord and tenant, based on tenure that prevailed down to the year 1860, gave no security of occupation to the tenant, and did not protect his improvements; but the cost of ejectment and the legal difficulties of proof that accompanied it, exercised a powerful restraining influence in preventing capricious eviction.

The Irish "Ejectment Code," which originated in the reign of Queen Anne, got rid of every formality by which the old Common Law delayed and obstructed the forfeiture of the tenant's estata. Statute after Statuto was passed for this purpose. The Irish Ejectment Code applied only to tenant's holding under leases or written contracts. The Civil Bill Court Act of 1851 extended the ejectment for non-payment of rent to tenancies from year to year. The law governing the relations of landlord and tenant In Ireland became more and more favourable to the owner. This tendency culminated in 1860, when by "Deasy's Act" (23 & 24 Vic., c. 154)—which was passed through Parliament without amendment—it was proposed that "The relation of landlord and tenant shall be deemed to be founded on the express or implied contract of the parties, and not upon tenure or service." This statute marks a turning point in the history of Irish Land Legislation. With well-meaning, but blind violence, it imported anto Ireland after the Famine the English idea of landed property and contract.

The Land Act of 1860 proceeded on the assumption that the land is the exclusive property of the landlord, and that the tenant's interest is nothing more than that of a person who has agreed to pay a certain remuneration for the use of the soil for a limited period. It simplified and increased the remedies of the landlord for recovering possession of the land, and rendered efficient the law of ejectment for non-payment of rent and on notice to quit. Thus a default in payment of one year's rent entitled a landlord to evict the tenant and get possession of the land, with all the tenant's improvements on it, even where such improvements many times exceeded in value the amount due. So also, by serving a notice to quit, the law did get rid of the tenant's improvements, no matter how valuable these might be, without having to pay any compensation for them. The governing principle of the Act was that whatever attached to the free-hold became part of the freehold.

During the ten years after the passing of "Deasy's Act" the position of the Irish tenant reached its nadir. He had no right of any kind, except such as were given him by the contract under which he held. All the improvements which rendered the land capable of being worked were made by him. He had built the houses, erected the fences, made the roads, drained and manured the land, reclaimed it from bog or mountain generally at a cost out of all proportion to the return—and yet, as we have seen, he could be turned out, without compensation, at the will of the owner, either by the service of a notice to quit or by ejectment for nonpayment of one year's rent.

#### Effects of Political and Economic Changes on the Relations between Landlord and Tenant during the 19th century.

In the early part of the last century the landlords, for political as well as commercial reasons, encouraged the sub-division of farms, and a consequent increase in the number of the tenantry. The political system that prevailed gave considerable power to the landlord who had a large number of tenants. The economic conditions of the time made small tillage farming productive and the demand caused by an ever-growing agricultural population increased the competition for land, created a "land hunger," and enabled the rents to be raised About the middle of the century all these conditions altered. The combined influence of the Famine and the introduction of Free Trade made it the interest of most owners of good land to get rid of their small tenants as expeditiously and completely as possible. Now came the era of pasture and larger farms. Although the population rapidly decreased, the consolidation of farms kept up the competition for land, and rents rose rapidly. The "clearances" so common from the Famine to 1870 were made in many cases quite irrespective of the non-payment of rent, and were greatly facilitated by the provisions of the Act of 1860. Emigration was, the only resouce for the dispossessed tenants, and the result was outrage and constant agrarian disturbance. Various suggestions for a reform of the Land Laws were made, but such proposals were usually denounced as confiscatory. Various attempts to alter the law were defeated, until at length, in 1870, Mr. Gladstone introduced and passed his Landlord and Tenant Act—the beginning of a new Land Code.

#### THE ACT OF 1870.

The Act of 1870 did three things:--(1) It gave compensation for disturbance; (2) compensation for improvements; and (3) it legalised the Ulster Tenant Right Custom.

I. Compensation for disturbance was strictly limited to such loss as "the Court shall find" to have been sustained by the tenant when obliged to quit the holding by the action of the landlord. It was held that the

higher the landlord raised the rent the smaller was the loss and the com-The amount of compensation could in no case exceed £250. pensation and was limited to tenancies created after the passing of the Act No compensation was to be given to tenants who had sub-let or sub-divided their holdings without the consent in writing of the landloid, or to any tenant under a lease for thirty-one years or upwards, and, from the amount awarded, the landloid had a right of deduction for deterioration, etc.

II. The right to compensation for his improvements to be awarded to a tenant when quitting his holding was subject to so large a variety of exceptions as greatly to limit the number of tenants able to take advantage of the provision.

Even when compensation was awarded, the landlord could deduct from the amount for rates and taxes and for the loss due to the non-observance of express or implied covenants or agreements, and the Court in awarding compensation was required, in reduction of the claim of the tenant, to take into consideration the time during which the tenant may have enjoyed the advantages of such improvements, and any other benefit he may have had.

III The legalisation of the Ulster Custom did not prevent the landlord from increasing the rent from time to time, so as almost to destroy the tenant's interest. The Act did not define the custom, and the onus lay on the tenant of establishing that the particular usage under which he held was within it,

The Act of 1870 failed in its object mainly for three reasons — (1) The great variety and complexity of the exceptions from the benefits of the Act

(2) The principle of administration which, as a rule, tended to reduce the compensation to as low a figure as possible.

(3) The insecurity of tenure of the tenant, and the right the landlord still had of raising the rent at his pleasure.

#### THE FAIR RENT ACT.

### The Land Act of 1881.

Though the Act of 1870 failed to settle the Irish land question, it marked the beginning of a new era. It was an admission that the Whig policy or the beginning of a new era. It was an admission that the whig policy of *lanssez faire* had broken down—at any rate, that it was not applicable to the relations between landlord and tenants in Ireland. It failed because of the timidity with which it was administered, and because it allowed landlords full power over the rents. The years that followed the passing of the Act were agriculturally prosperous in Ireland. Industrial prosperity in England was reflected in Ireland on the rise in the price of meat and farm produce Ireland was the main source of supply to England. Graz-ing lands and down lands here we while and rent, were reused in ing lands and dairy lands became more valuable, and rents were raised in . most parts of the country. But they were not always raised in relation to the economic returns from the land. They were often increased on farms that did not bear the rise. American competition suddenly sprang up in the later "seventies," and the rents that were raised in the preceding years became immediately excessive Bad seasons came, and in 1880 the agrarian condition of Ireland grew desperate. The Land League was all-powerful Rents were not, and in many cases could not be, paid, and Mr Gladstone had again to face the question. In 1870 he had strongly declared against giving fixity of tenure and the power to reduce excessive rents. But something had to be done. A Royal Commission was appointed under the Chairmanship of the Earl of Bessborough. Largely, on its recommendations, the Act of 1881 was framed—an Act which revolutionised the relations of landlords and tenants in Ireland. The Irish tenants had long fought for the "Three F's "—the right to

Free Sale of their interests in their holding; to Fixity of Tenure; and to have Fair Rents fixed by an independent tribunal. All these were con-ceded by the Act of 1881. The administration of the Act of 1870 largely failed, as we have seen, because the Courts did not realise the urgent revolutionary character of the change made in the law. The framers of the 1881 Act saw the necessary of screeting a new tubural to the 1881 Act saw the necessity of creating a new tribunal to carry into effect the revolutionary principles now introduced. A Land Commission, presided over by a Judge of the High Court, was set up, with power to organise sub-commissions that would sit in all parts of the country. Applications could be made by either landlords or tenants to have a judicial rent fixed for their farms, and such applications could be made before the Land Commission or in the County Courts. The great majority of cases came before the Sub-Commission Courts, and in a few years most of the agricultural tenants in Ireland had fair rents fixed. The fair rent provisions of the Act were limited to "present tenancies"—that is, practically to tenancies that were subsisting at the time of the passing of the Act—and to holdings that were agricultural or pastoral in character. The statutory term during which such fair rent could not be altered ran for fifteen years.

Various amending statutes were passed in 1887—admitting leaseholders —in 1891 and 1896.

#### EARLY STAGES OF LAND PURCHASE.

Under the Irish Church Act of 1869 for the first time State funds were given to help tenants to purchase their holdings, but this was not a Land Purchase Act, and its benefits were confined to a limited class. Under this Act the Church Temporalities Commissioners were en-

Under this Act the Church Temporalities Commissioners were enpowered to sell to tenants of Church Lands their holdings at prices to be fixed by the Commissioners themselves. If the tenants refused to buy on the terms offered to them, the Commissioners could sell to the public. The sale of each holding was for cash, or if one-fourth was paid in cash, the balance of the purchase money might be secured on a mortgage of the holding, to be paid off in thirty-two years by sixty-four half-yearly instal ments.

The terms of repayment and the rate of interest charged on loans were afterwards altered and reduced under the Purchase of Land Act of 1885, Section 23.

### Landlord and Tenant (Ireland) Act, 1870.

Under what are known as the "Bright Clauses" of this Act, the landlords and tenants of agricultural or pastoral holdings could arrange for a sale of their holdings with State and to be carried out in the Landed Estates Court. Upwards of two-thirds of the price agreed upon could be advanced by the Board of Works, to be repaid in thirty-five years by an annuity, at the rate of five per cent. on the loan.

#### The Act of 1881 (the "Gladstone Act").

Under this Act the Land Commission established under the Act was empowered to make advances to tenants for the purchase of their holdings, and was enabled to purchase estates for resale to the tenants. The limit of advance was extended from two-thirds of the purchase money (as in the Act of 1870 to three-quarters. The terms of repayment were the same an annuity of five per cent. for thirty-five years.

# The Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1885 (the "Ashbourne Act").

Under this Act—commonly known as the "Ashbourne Act"—a sum of  $\pounds 5,000,000$  was authorised to be advanced to the Land Commission to enable sales to be carried out between landlrods and tenants by agreement, and to enable the Land Commission to purchase estates in the Landed Estates Court for the purpose of re-selling them to the tenants. The Land Commission was empowered to advance the entire purchase money subject to the retention of one-fifth by way of guarantee deposit for a period of about seventeen and a half years, by which time an equivalent amount of the capital advanced had been repaid by means of the sinking fund. The deposit could be utilised if the tenant purchaser made default in his repayment, and if the landlord vendor was made a guarantor for the repayment of the annuity by the tenant purchaser. (Section 3.)

The advances made under this Act were to be repaid by annual instalments (which included interest and sinking fund), extending over a period of forty-nine years

In 1888,' the £5,000,000 given ander the Act of 1883 being practically exhausted, an additional sum of £5,000,000 was advanced to the Land Commission for the purposes of land purchase (51 and 52 Vic., c. 49).

# Purchase of Land Acts, 1891 and 1896 (the "Balfour Acts").

The funds advanced to the Irish Land Commission for the purposes of land purchase having again become exhausted, Mr. Balfour, in 1891, introduced a new system, under which the landlord or vendor was paid in a specially created Guaranteed Land Stock (exchangeable for Consols at the option of the vendor), equal in nominal amount to the purchase money. This stock bears interest at the rate of two three-quarters per cent. per this stock ocars interest at the rate of two interquarters per cent, per annum, and cannot be redeemed until the expiration of thirty years from the date of the passing of the Act of 1891. The dividends and sinking fund payments required for this stock are paid out of a "Land Purchase Account," e-tablished by the Land Commission (Section 4), to which all moneys received on account of any purchase annuity for the discharge of an advance are paid. If this Land Purchase account is at any time insufficient to meet the dividends and sinking fund payments (owing, for instance, to default in the repayment of instalments), the deficiency is to be a charge on a "Guarantee Fund," established for the purposes of the Act (Section 5). This fund consists of a cash portion and a contingent portion. The cash portion is mainly made up of the Irish Probate Duty (now Estate Duty) Grant and an Exchequer contribution, and the contingent portion consists of the Irish share of the local taxation (Customs and Excise) duties and ceitain local grants (Section 5). Any deficiency in the Land Purchase Account is to be paid out of this Guarantee Fund. This financial expedient, of course, throws the securing of the repayment of the ad-vances for land purchase on the ratepayers of the country, as any default will be recouped by deductions from the various payments and contribu-tions an aid of rates that make up the Guarantee Fund. The amount of stock that would be issued for each county for the purposes of Land Purchase was limited to twenty-five times the share of the purposes of Land Pur-chase was limited to twenty-five times the share of the county an the Guranatee Funds by the Act of 1891 (Section 9). This limit having been reached in the case of County Wexford, it was provided that the limit be extended to fifty times the share of such county in the Guarantee Fund by Mr. Wyndham's Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1901 (1 Edward VII., c. 3). By the Act of 1903 (Section 46) the limit for each county was further raised to thirty times its share in the Guarantee Fund, which limit might be further raised to sixt times where the Treasury on the limit might be further raised to sixty times where the Treasury, on the certificate of the Lord Lieutenant, were of opinion that such increase in advances could be made without any risk of loss to the Exchequer.

The Act of 1891 was amended in various aspects by Mr. Gerald Balfour's Act of 1896, which introduced, among other changes, a method of reducing every decade (up to thirty years after the advance was made), the annuity to be paid by the tenant purchaser. As under the "Ashbourne Act" of 1885, this annuity was calculated at £4 per cent on the purchase money, two and three-quarters per cent. being for interest, and one and a quarter per cent. being sinking fund. Under Mr. Gerald Balfour's system, during the first decade after the purchase, the annuity is calculated on the original advance, and during the second and third decades on the portion of the advance which is ascertained to be unpaid at the end of the previous decade. At the end of the third decade the annuity is calculated on the amount of the advance then outstanding, and runs until the entire debt is paid off. The Act of 1896 also permitted the Land Commission to dispense with the whole or any part of the guarantee deposit required under the Act of 1885 if the security for the repayment of the advance was considered to be sufficient without it (Section 29).

# IRISH LAND ACT, 1903 (THE "WYNDHAM ACT"). -

Some short Acts were added to the code during the following years to clear away certain difficulties, and in 1903 Mr. Wyndham brought in and passed his Irish Land Act, which may be said to have opened a new era in Irish agiarian legislation. Under it a new body, known as the Estates Commissioners, was formed, and included in the Land Commission to administer land purchase in Ireland.

Sales under previous Purchase Acts were carried out by holdings A landlord could agree with one or more of his tenants to sell them their farms, and if the Land Commission, after examination, found that the particular holding was security for the advance asked for by the tenant to buy out the landlord, such advance was made irrespective of any other sales on the estate. The Act of 1903 introduced the system of sales by "estates" A landlord, to obtain the benefit of the Act, is obliged to sell his entire estate, or such portion of it as the Land Commission considers fit to be regarded as a separate estate for the purposes of the Act. The Commissioners, before defining any lands to be an estate, have to consider all the circumstances of the district and of the property. Once the estate is "declared," the holdings comprised in it are dealt with in accordance with the provisions of the Act. Those subject to judicial rents and within certain "zones" laid down in the Act are freed from the liability to inspection as to security or equity of price. The Act presumes that a holding subject to a judicial rent which is sold at a price the annuity on which is from ten to thirty per cent. less than the judicial rent, where that rent was fixed since the passing of the Act of 1896, or from twenty to forty per cent where the rent was fixed before that date, is good security for the payment of the annuity, and that the agreed price is equitable. Holdings not subject to the "zone" provisions are liable to inspection as to security and as to equity of price.

The Act also introduced the system of sales of estates to the Commissioners under Section 6 (the direct sales to tenants by landlord being under Section 1). When a landlord so sold, the Commissioners, after due enquiry as to the price that should be paid by each tenant for his holding, may offer to purchase the estate for the purpose of re-selling to the occupiers, provided that at least three-fourths of the tenants agree to purchase their holdings from the Commissioners at the estimated price.

To encourage sales of estates, and to enable owners to get such a sum as would give them their net income out of the purchase money, when re invested in suitable securities, a bonus of twelve per cent. on the purchase money was paid to the owner on the completion of the sale. At the same time, the tenant was enabled to borrow the money he is to pay for his holding on easier terms. As we have seen under the former Purchase Acts, the annuity rate was fixed at four per cent, of which two and threequarter per cent. was for interest and one and a quarter per cent. for a sinking fund, the accumulation of which, with compound interest, would repay the sum advanced in about forty-three years. Under the Act of 1903 the annuity rate which the tenant had to repay was reduced to three and a quarter per cent, of which two and three-quarters per cent is for interest and a half per cent. for sinking fund. This reduction in the sinking fund lengthens the period over which the repayment will extend to sixty-eight and a half years, and, of course, rendered it practically impossible to continue the system of giving decadal reductions in the annuities. Those decadal reductions, which were abolished by the Act of 1903, worked out at about 15 per cent. reduction in the annuity every ten years.

The Act of 1903 also enabled owners to sell their demesnes and untenanted lands to the Commissioners, and to repurchase them, or so much of them as the Commissioners approved, with the aid of advances made in the same manner and under the same conditions as to tenant purchasers.

The Act of 1903 gave considerable powers to the Estates Commissioners to improve small and uneconomic holdings by the purchase of untenanted land, to be re-sold to the tenants or sons of tenants on the estate, or to the occupiers of holdings not exceeding £5 in rateable value in the neighbourhood, or to tenants evicted from their holdings since 1878, or in case such tenant is dead, to a person nominated by the Land Commission as his representative.

It also gave power to the Commissioners to purchase untenanted land for the purpose of enlarging holdings and of creating new holdings, and to enable this work to be carried out satisfactorily, the Land Commission is given all the powers conferred on the Congested Districts Board by their Act of 1901 for facilitating re-sales to tenants.

#### THE EVICTED TENANTS ACT, 1907.

A considerable number of evicted tenants had been reinstated in their holdings under the Act of 1903, or had been provided with new holdings where their former holdings were not available. Large sums of money (drawn from the Reserve Fund established under the Act of 1891, which was made available by Section 43 of the Act of 1903) were expended in equipping these holdings and in financing reinstated tenants where, in the opinion of the Estates Commissioners, this was necessary. The provisions of the Act of 1903 were, however, found to be insufficient to carry out the intentions of the legislature, and in 1907 Mr. Birrell passed an Evicted Tenants Act, which enabled the Estates Commissioners to acquire untenanted land compulsorily for the purpose of providing holdings for tenants who, or whose predecessors, had been evicted from their holdings since the year 1878, and who had applied to the Commissioners before the 1st May, 1907.

#### IRISH LAND ACT, 1909 (MR. BIRRELL'S ACT).

After six years' experience of the Act of 1903 it became evident that further legislation was required if Land Purchase was to go on. In two important matters Mr. Wyndham's Act broke down. Under the financial provisions of the Act the money required for advances to enable tenants to purchase their holdings was provided by the issue of a stock bearing interest at  $2\frac{3}{2}$  per cent. But it turned out that at no time after the passing of the Act could the money be raised on these terms, except at a large discount, averaging over 12 per cent. The Act provided that a fund, known as the Irish Development Grant, should bear any loss due to the issue of stock at a discount. This fund made available a sum of £160,000 a year. The first issue of stock under the Wyndham Act was made at 87, or a discount of 13 per cent. Thus, to provide £100 in cash over £113 of stock had to be issued. The interest on this "excess stock" was notipaid by the tenant purchasers, and was to be provide for out of the Development Grant so long as that fund was available, and afterwards would fall on the Guarantee Fund, which meant the Irish ratepayer. In the year 1909 it, however, appeared that the charge for "excess stock" necessitated by the continual flotation of stock at a large discount had soeaten into the Development Grant that that fund had become exhausted, and consequently all subsequent assues of stock for land purchase purposes would have to be made at the expense of the ratepayers.

It became evident that the Irish ratepayers would not tolerate land purchase on these terms. Mr. Birrell, accordingly, by his Land Act, passed in December, 1909, provided that the charge for excess stock to finance all pending purchase agreements should be provided by the Treasury instead of the ratepayers. As regards future purchase agreements, the Act provided that the vendors should be paid in 3 per cent. stock, and that purchasers should pay an annuity of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. instead of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

#### CONGESTION.

#### Two Classes of Occupiers in Ireland.—Establishment of the Congested Districts Board.

The various statutes that I have summarised dealt with the rights and obligations of Irish tenants, without any attempt at economic discrimination. No distinction was drawn between impoverished and uneconomic occupiers, and those who were able to make a living and pay a rent out of their holdings. It was, indeed, recognised, that the smaller tenants had a special claim to protection, and in the Compensation for Distubance Clause of the Act of 1870 (Section 3) the tenant of a holding valued at £10 and under might be awarded a sum not exceeding seven years' rent, while a tenant above £100 valuation could in no case get more than one year's rent. It was, however, gradually borne in on Statesmen dealing with Ireland that something besides the three "F's" was necessary if the periodical famines and endemic misery of the poorer occupiers of the West of Ireland were to be grappled with. It was recognised that in some parts of the country the average character of the holdings was below the level that made a reasonable standard of living possible, and that special means should be adopted to improve the condition of the people. The establishment of the Congested Districts Board, in 1891, was the first attempt made by liggislative enactment to discriminate between the impoverished occupiers of Irish land and those who had holdings capable of affording a means of livelihood.

The term "congestion" has become generic on Ireland. It has acquired a special meaning as applied to guase agricultural nopulation living on holdings insufficient to support a family. The definition of a congested district given in the Act of 1891 is a district in which more than twenty per cent. of the people live in electoral divisions of which the total rateable value, when divided by the number of the population, gives a sum of less than thirty shillings for each person. This definition as purely arbitrary, and, as a fact, includes regions through which one may drive for miles without seeing a human habitation, and excludes districts an which the people are crowded together on totally insufficient holdings. The problem is not so much one of locality as of the condition of the people Owing to the various historical reasons, an excessive population, having regard to the means of subsistence, is to be found on the large area of bad land that extends along the western seaboard of Ireland from Cork to Donegal. That part of the country has come to be considered as the true region of congestion, or agricultural poverty, and undoubiedly there it is most pronounced and most obtrusive. It would, however, be a mistake to assume that the same problem does not arise in other parts of Ireland—even in the Province of Leinster—an an acute form.

It is not necessary to describe in detail the various statutes that deal with congestion in Ireland. The Congested Districts Board was founded under the authority of Section 34 of the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1891, to continue for twenty years, "and thereafter until Parliament shall otherwise determine" It was given power (Section 39) to aid migration and emigration within a Congested Districts County, to sell suitable seed potatoes and seed oats to occupiers, to aid and develop agriculture, forestry, the breeding of live stock and poultry, weaving, spinning, fishing (including the construction of piers and harbours, the supply of fishing boats and gear, and industries connecting with fishing), and any other suitable industries. Powers were also given for the enlargement of holdings, whether subject to purchase annuities or to rents to private owners, but these powers were so circumscribed and guarded as to be unworkable. The Board was given an income to commence with of £41,250 a year In 1893 an Act was passed (56 & 57 Vict, c. 35) which gave the Board power to acquire land and to hold it as landlords for the enlargement of holdings and for the purposes of the Land Purchase Acts. In 1894 another Act was passed,, which enabled the Board to give a guarantee to the Land Commission on selling to a tenant purchaser within such limits as the Treasury might fix, for the repayment of the annuity. Such guarantee Treasury might fix, for the repayment of the annuity. Such guarantee enabled the Land Commission to dispense with the retention of any sum out of the purchase money as a guarantee deposit, a practice which, if followed, would have seriously crippled the operations of the Board. The Land Law Act of 1896 gave power to the Board to obtain an advance from the Land Commission for the purchase of estates "in like manner as if the Board were a tenant purchasing his holding" This Act contained some provisions that greatly hampered the Board Thus, an advance could not be obtained by a tenant valued at under £10 for the re-purchase of his holding. Also Section 40 (2) enabled court tenants and temporary tenants holding. Also Section 40 (2) enabled court tenants and temporary tenants to obtain advances under the Purchase Acts in the case of sales of estates in the Land Judge's Court. This meant that the lands that were most required by the Board for the relief of congestion were commonly disposed of to graziers and others in such a way as to prevent their being acquired by the Board. The Congested Districts Act of 1889 cleared away these two obstacles to the work of the Board, and also enabled the Land Commission to make advances for the redemption of head rents, etc., and increased the Parliamentary Grant from £6,500 to £25,000. The Congested Districts Board Act of 1901 gave a limited power of dealing with obstruc-tive tenants in the re-arrangement of the estates purchased. It also gave the Board all the powers of entry on a holding subject to a statutory tenthe board all the powers of entry on a holding subject to a statutory ten-ancy for the purposes of mining, quarrying, cutting timber or turf, open-ing or making roads, fences, drains and watercourses, hunting, fishing, shooting, etc., given to the landlord by Section 5 (sub-section 5) of the Act of 1881, and further extended these powers to holdings not subject to statutory tenancies. The Act also enabled the Board to purchase land outside a Congested Districts County with the approval of the Lord Incutenant. The Land Act of 1903 gave increased facilities to the Board for the purchase of sectors similar to these oven to the Estates Commisfor the purchase of estates, similar to those given to the Estates Commissioners under the Act. It also gave the Board the discretionary power of deciding whether an advance should be made to a purchaser; of what amount the advance should be; and how far the security was sufficient. The collection of the purchase annuities so made, however, was still left

to the Land Commission. The Act also added £20,000 to the annual income of the Board, to be drawn from the Irish Development Grant (Section 38).

The Act of 1903 enabled the Estates Commissioners to deal with congestion under two procedures. They might buy an estate, after making due inquiry, under Section 6, and if that estate included untenanted land, they could divide it among the holders of uneconomic farms. They could expend money out of the Reserve Fund placed at their disposal (Section 43), either by way of free grants or by advances, to be recouped by additions to the annuity to be paid by the purchaser. As, however, this Reserve Fund amounted only to the sum of £250,000, and as it had to be used not alone for the improvement of land, but also for the reinstatement of evicted tenants, it was soon exhausted, and the Estates Commissioners had to carry on this work by means of a sum annually voted by Parhament.

The second method allowed by the Act is to treat the property purchased as a "congested estate." This is defined by the Act [section 6 (5)] as "an estate not less than half the area of which consists of holdings not exceeding five [raised to seven by Act of 1909] pounds in rateable value, or of mountain or bog land, or not less than a quarter of the area of which is held in rundale or intermixed plots." The Act provides for a loss in the purchase of such estates of 10 per cent. on the purchase money (Section 9 and 44); such loss to be paid as part of the expenses of the Land Commission.

Notwithstanding all this special legislation, it was felt that land purchase under the voluntary method would not solve the problem of the West of Ireland.

A Royal Commission, under the chairmanship of Lord Dudley, was appointed in 1906, which took a great deal of evidence, and reported in 1908. Its recommendations were embodied in Mr. Birrell's Land Act of 1909, under which the constitution, powers, duties and income of the Congested Districts Board were enlarged and reconstituted.

Since the passing of this Act, the Land Commission could not enter into an agreement for the purchase of land situate in any of these Congested Districts Counties without the consent of the Congested Districts Board, unless such land as required for the purposes of the Evicted Tenants Act; and no Congested Estate could be sold under the Land Purchase Acts in a Congested Districts County to persons other than the Congested Districts Board without the consent of that Board. The power of purchasing estates and lands compulsorily through the Estates Commissioners was given to the Board within their district.

For Statistics of the operations of the Land Commission and the Estates Commissioners under the Land Acts prior to the Land Act, 1923, see Section II. of Report; and for Statistics of the operations of the Congested Districts Board see Section III. of Report.
