# PREFACE

Mental illnesses ha e been known in our county of the TTP ( monoral. and methods of their treatment evolved from the earliest times Elaborate passages on the n ture of treatment of mental illness appear in our anc ent The Bhore Committee was co strained to comment on the un books satisfactory nature of the facilities a anable in the country for mental treatment

Today in Indi there are 33 Mental Ho p tals A number of patients are kept in vario s j ils fo want f bett r ccommod tion and whe e the care they get s mainly custod al To co d r various aspects of the problem as 1 o to redraft the Indian Luna y Act 1912 which s out mod d a Confe ence of S perint d ts of Me tal Hosp tals was c e ed at Agra for two days—25th & 26th November 1960 This Conference recommended a revised draft Mental Health Act When this d aft Bill s finally p ssed much will have b a h mpl fy g the procedure đ ı of adm ssion to M ntal Hosp tals and General Hospitals as also in the care of pat ents I am of fi m co viction that mental cases should be diagnosed as early as possible in the out p tients clinics and treatment given to them the e before they become chronic so th t hospitalis tion will be cons derably reduced

This compilat on of Mental Hospitals of Ind a together with the resolutions p sed at the Confe ence of Superintendents of Mental Hospitals may be of interest to all persons desiring such information

My thanks are d e to the staff of the Directorate and all the Superinten dents of Mental Hospitals who have helped in this compilation

# HOSPITAL FOR MENTAL DISEASES HYDERABAD

Sho t History — The Hosp tal for Mental Diseases was shifted from Jalna Distri t Aur ng bad of erstwhile Hyderabad in April 1953 and now is located on a spacio s ground cov ring about 58 acres of 1 nd in the old military barracks which we e constructed during the World War II There are 18 barracks in two rows of nine barracks each On one s de there are 9 male wards In male ward No 1 newly admitted acute patients are kept for observation and diagnos s In Ward No 2 are patients who are under tr atment and are likely to be discharged in the near future In Wards No 3 7 & 8 chronic patients a e the e who are not curable and not claimed Wa d No 4 s for physically ill patients and Ward No 9 is for paying pat ents Criminal patients are kept in Ward No 6

Female patients are kept similarly in second row from Ward No 1 to A with Ward No 5 as a paying ward

Sanctioned bed strength of this hospital is 600 but the daily average during the year 1959 60 was 636 50

Pati nts are given such forms of treatment as Insulin Coma Treatment, Electric Convulsive Therapy and Tranquilliers with successful results

Occupational The apy —As works in the kitchen, tailoring, workshop garden needle work embroidery etc are given under the supervision of the Occupational Therapy worker

Patients are entertained by film shows and radio music Some of them are encouraged to take part in in-door and out-door games in the evening Regular games as foot ball and volley ball are the features of this Hospital.

The Hospital has a L brary It receives complimentary copies of Deccan Chronicle and Journals and Magazines from the Indian Red Cross Society

Patients are fed in the Dining Hall under the supervision of the 'Steward Nurs ng Superintendent and Nursing Staff incharge of the Wards Personal attention s paid in feeding the patients who due to their mental cond tion refuse to take food Prote ns and vitamin supply is especially kept in mind as it is also one of the precipitating causes Their we ghts are recorded on history sheets and at regular intervals Those losing -weights are kept on extra det and investigated for tuberculos s cancer diabetes etc

### ANDHRA PRADESH

Members of the Board of Hospital Vis tors meet at this Hosp tal once a month and patients who have recovered are put up for discharge Remarks passed by the Committee are attended to promptly

Final year MBB'S 'students of Osmania Med cal College Hyder b d and Kurnool Medical College Kurnool are sent here twice a year for training in Psychiatry 14 lectures and 6 demonstrations are given to them

Bu ld gs - 150 bedded Female Wards with a cost of Rs 7 60 lakhs are under construction and work is in progress

Construction of the Administration-cum-out patient Department at a cost of about Rs 3 22 lakhs is also in progress Kitchen and Dining Hall at an estimated cost of 1 69 lakhs are also progressing rap dly

There is one S perintendent, one Deputy Superintendent and 3 Medical Officers (Male) and one Lady Medical Officer There are twenty Nursesincluding two Nurs ng Superintendents (Grade I—Gazetted and two Grade II—non gazetted) and Class IV employees on the staff The Director of Medical Services Andhra Pradesh takes a been interest in the training of the Medical and Nursing Staff in psychiatry

Short History — The M ntal Hospital Tezpur was started in 1876 and like every other mental hosp tal of old it functioned as a custodial hosp tal It was reconstructed in 1929 and n w has a t tal bed strength of 755 (660 f r males and 130 for f males) The Hosp tal has fac lities fo electric shock and insulin therapy Tranquillisers are also in use There is an o c patio al therapy department under a fully q alified occupational therap st recreational facilities for indoor and out-door games and æ 1 boratory 1

# HOSPITAL FOR MENTAL DISEASES KANKE, RANCHI

# Sho t History

The Hosp tal for Mental Diseases, Ranchi formerly known as the European M ntal Hospital is one of the p emier institutions of its kind in India It s located at Kanke about 7 miles from Ranchi town Kanke occup es a central pos tion n B har and West Bengal and possesses a healthy climate People from the Calc tta can reach Ranchi town e ther by bus or by train from Mu i Station which is one of the stations on the Howrah B k kana line Those from Delhu can come to Ranchi town by from Ranchi Road which is bout 35 m les from Ranchi Ъ Ranch Road is a station on the Gomoh Dehri-on Sone line Those coming from Bombay s de can get to Ranchi town either by b s from Chakradharpur which is 72 miles away and is sit ated on the Bombay Howrah line via Nagpur or via Tatanagar by the Tata Patna Passenger Taxis and cyclericksh ws re av I ble from Ranchi town to the Hospital

The Hosp tal for Mental Drse ses should be distinguished from the Ranchi Mansik Arogyashala Ka ke which s a different Institution and which s managed by the Governm nt of B har That Hosp tal is also located at Kanke

The Hosp tal for Mental D e ses was established in the year 1918 It was origin lly ntended only fo European mental p t ents S nce 1948 the Hospit 1 s ope to the c tizens of Ind a Upto 31st M y 1954 the Hospital was under the management of the Board of Trustees with epresentat ves of the part c p t n State Gov rnments co t tut ng the Board On 1st June 1954 the Hospital was taken over by the Government of India. Since then many mp ovements h ve been made to the Inst tut n, so that the Hosp tal has been eq ipped and staffed to-day on the most progress ve lines

The Hospital is administered by the Governm nt of India, Ministry of Health assisted by an Advisory Committee which is constituted as follows —

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The total expenditu e in respect of the Hosp tal is borne by the Gov ernment of India The participating State Governments for whom beds have been reserved at the Hosp tal p y charges in respect of the patients admitted against the State Quota of beds on per capita bass The patients have to bear only a fraction of the charges Charges in respect of Indepen dent patients are borne in full eith r by the patients or by their relatives/ guardians

The bed strength of the Hospital is 420 Out of this 390 beds have been allocated to various States/Administrations as detailed below —

The beds allocated to States/Administrations are known as State quota beds and are filled through the Di ectors of Health Serv ces of the respective States The remaining 30 beds are called Independent beds

The Hospital is meant primarily for the treatment of acute cases the duration of illness being less than a year Mental defectives and epileptics are not ordinarily admitted into the Hospital unless they show behaviour disturbances Children below 10 years are not admitted for want of suitable facilities in accommod ton Cases needing simple custodial care are not The relatives of mental patients are advised to write to the admitted Medical Superintendent in ad ance about the condition of their wards and seek his advice regarding the su tability of the case for admission and treat ment in the Hospital It will be preferable for the relatives to obtain a "Personal History Questionna re from the Medical S perintendent and answer the various quest ons contained therein and return it to him This will enable a more satisfactory evaluat on of the case to be made before he is in a position to advise Wherever possible the patient may be brought. to the hospital for p eliminary examination in the Out Patient Department This is naturally by far the best method of assessing the nature and seventy of the case and advice regarding admission or treatment as an out patient will be eas er and more satisfactory

As a pilot project, an Out P tient Department has been started at the Hosp tal since April 1958 The O P.D is open from 10 a m to 12 noon on five days in a week from Monday to Friday All the diagnostic and therapeutic facilities of the Hospital and the services of the specialists are

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available for patients in the Out Patient Department. Most cases of psychoneuroses early psychoses psychosomatic problems neurological cases problems of psychological dj stment in home and profess onal life, problems in connection with vocational choice etci can be treated satis factorily in the Out Patient Department. The scales of fees chirged for the various diagnostic and the apeutic fic lities made available at the Out Patient Department are as follows —

The Hosp tal runs a Ch ld Gu dance Cl n c at the Sada Ho pital Ranchi and the St Xavier's Coll ge Ranch The clinic is open once a week on Mondays from 4 to 5 30 pm Children's ffering form beha o r problems le rning difficult es emotional mal adjustment etc are examined investigated and treated at the Clinic by a Spec list team form the H sp tal for Mental Diseases Ranchi comp is ng a Psych at it 2 Psycholog sts and a Cultural Worker If necessary the patients attending the Ch ld G id nce Clinic may be investigated at the Hosp tal without a y e tra charges The services at the Child Guidance Clinic a é entirely free of child ge

The Hosp tal has well-equ pped Psychological Department with a Psychologist and an Assistant Psychologist who carry out the various diagnostic tests and also partic pate in individual and group psy hotherapy Spec al psy hologi al tests are valiable to detect o game br n d mage correct assessment of the level of intelligence and for estimating the personal resources of a p tient, etc

The Hosp tal h s a Path logi al Laboratory which carries out routine clinico-pathological inve tigations like examination of urine blood stools etc and is under the charge of a whole time Pathologist. The Department also carries out spec al pathological investigations as may be required from time to time like colloidal gold curve test, Widal reaction Protein estimation etc

Among the diagnostic and therapeutic facilities available in the Hospital, are psychological testing with various tests vocat onal rad ography of the skull including stereoscop c views of the skull electro-ca diography guidance electro-encephalography B M R. estimation narco-analysis psycho-analysis Carbon-d oxide treatment, ind vidual and group psychotherapy electro-convulsive therapy Insulin-coma therapy psycho-surgery (including Cingulectomy) pharmacotherapy occupational therapy and recreational therapy

In line with the more progress e in titut ons of this kind in the West attempts are made to create a therapeut c milieu for the patient when he is in the Hospital With this idea in m nd t e efforts are made by the staff members to gi e h m a sense of belonging with full cons de ations to h m as an ind vid al in h s own right and the p t nt is enco raged by voice his fe I gs through the S ggestion Boxe installed n the various Wards of the Hospital and the Patients Welfa e Committee

Weekly C ma shows (English Hindi and Bengali) are held in the Recreat on H ll Frequently concerts dr m s to are also arranged by the patients in the well-eq ipped stage of the H sp tal

The guardi s enquiring after the health of patients a e promptly replied. Periodical reports are not s nt a tomat ally unless asked for each t me

Free and informal relationsh p with members of the staff is actively enco raged The p ti nts who a e well eno gh to beneft by attend ng the Staff Cl b are allowed to do so with a view to e able the patient to g n self acceptance and p ep e h m f r getti g back into social c rcul t n after discha ge without undue d flidence

The e a e cottages s tuated outs de the hosp tal where patients a e allowed to stay befo e th y re fin lly d sch ged Duri g th s period they e joy a good deal of pri leges of going out and y ting frie ds and staff me bers

The maintenance charges of the p tie t 1 de treatme t charges spcial investigations and drugs d et and bed linen. The relatives are ad vised to deposit s me m ney in the Hosp tal at the time of admission for any private expenses of the patient like cigarettes pan etc

The pat ents can be admitted either as a Voluntary Boarder or as a Certified Patient. When he comes as a Voluntary Boarder the patient

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goes through no mo e formal ties than he would were he seeking admiss on in a general hosp tal for a phys cal a lment The patient will be required to sign an application f rm for dmi s on in the presence of the Med cal Officer The guardian of the patient, undertaking the payment of the maintenance charges has to submit a written Indemnity Bond in the prescribed p forma guilt to g to pay the maintenance charges of his ward regularly

A cert fied pat t can be admitted after procuring a Reception Order from the Magistrate of the area the p tents h ls from Deta ls of methods f cert ficat n of the p tient who s u willing to come to the Hosp tal on h s own m y be obtained by writing to the Med cal Supe intendent of the H p tal It s ad sable to admit the pat ent on a Voluntary basis whe eve po s ble Usually p te t re admitted and d scha ged during office hours

The f llowing doc ments should be prod ced at the time of the ad m on of a certified path nt —

- 5 A certificate of Physical fitn ss of the p tient to undertake j urney to Mental Hosp t 1

There are separate wards for the admission of Male and Female Mental Patients The patients belonging to the States who have been allocated beds at the Hosp tal can secure admiss on against the State Quota of beds on product on of a certificate from the Director of Health Services of the State concerned sancti ning him/her a bed in the Hosp tal out of the quota of that State W thout this specific sanction from the Director of Health Services of the State concerned a Government quota bed will not be allotted to any patient P tient can be allotted independent beds without any restriction of domicile in India A patient who is unable to get a State quota bed can be admitted to an independent bed. He can be fransferred to the State quota bed if and when he is able to secure one thro gh the Director of Health Services of h s State At the time of admiss on it is advisable that the patient be accompaned by a close rel tive who will b able to give a detailed account of the history of the patients illness and elucid te other points that the Hosp tal a thorities might like to know

The DPM and DMP courses re being planned to be started in July 1961 12 cand dates will be el ted by the Government of Ind a for each cou se and supe ds will be pad at the s me rates as sanctioned in the All Ind Instit te of Mental He lth B ng lore

# R se h act tes

D D S ty Nand studied the problem of comparative psycho-analysis of the Schools of Freud Stekel Klien Adler Jung and Horney with the object of valid tating some of the findings in Indin s bjects and of find g the cause of the differences between the findings of the various schools

He found th t the m thods of D eam Interp etation and the method of assessm t of the meanings of symbolism was mainly subjective in the hands of these workers and that this was the cause of their having arriv ed at conflicting findings The method of collecting reminiscences was introd ced in addition to the method of free associations The reminis cence method was arrived at by study of recent experimental psychology as well as by researches in the Indian Samadhi method The methods of research used by him were made as objective as is possible in this field at present.

The over-concentration and over-evaluation of one or the other factor of personality by the above mentioned workers w s highlighted by the findings of total p ycho-analysis after the u e of the above mentioned combined method

In the findings of total psycho-analyss the part findings of the above mentioned wo kers were co-o dinated in an over all hypothesis

The symbols of Indian mythology were studied by the modern psychological methods The above mentioned findings have been recorded in three books

Recent advances in biology physology neurology bio-chemistry and genetics were studied correlatively with the findings in the psychological and sociological fields with the result that a comprehensive preliminary report in the form of articles are being published as the organic basis of memory symbol formation character learning intelligence and ego-formation

It was found that the self analysis will be more useful in Indian con ditions than group-analysis or group therapy because of our conservative backgrounds Self analysis of Arjuna in Bh gwat Gita and Mahatma Gandhi have been publi hed n Sc entific journals as sample self-analys s as prototype for further work by other workers

It was found that Transo bital Leucotomy is not often successful and Prefrontal Leucotomy damages a good bt of the personality and its functions Cingulectomy s being done in other countries e tens vely but it requires very highly equipped ope ation theatre and staff. Therefore after previous experiments and due to his having worked as Civil Surgeon for some years he performed a modified operation on the cingulate gyrus which can be performed in a District or Division hospital after training

The results of operation in three cases are being published in Indian Journal of Psychiatry He has p blished 30 articles and three books

Dr K Bhaskaran Deputy Medical Superintendent in conjinction with Dr D Satya Nand and others has assessed the therapeutic values claimed by western workers on vario s psychopharmacological gents like Largactil Serpasil Miltown Meratran Ritalin Frenquel Stemetil Tof ranil M rs lid D amox BZ 55 etc

He has also studied the influence of socio-cultural factors on the psy chopathology of various psychiatric syndromes like schizoph enia depression etc and compared the psychodynamics and clinical fe tures of these syndromes with those observed in the West.

He has also been interesting himself in various narco-analytical agents like combination of Sodium Amytal and Methedrine Ritalin intravenously etc

He has published 14 papers (7 papers alone and 7 papers in conjunction with Dr D Satya Nand)

In the Pathological Department Dr P Subrahmanyan in corn nction with Dr K. Bhaskaran and Dr D Satya Nand, has collaborated in a study of effecties of combining BZ 55 with Ins ln in Insulin coma ther py He along with the above mentioned invest gators is also engaged at present in a study of abnormalities of excretion of phosphate and cre timine in the urine of schizophrenics

In the Psychological Department, Shri H N Murthy and Shri P Kumar have attempted to adopt standard diagnostic tests worked out in western countries like work association test, Rorschah test, multiphas c inventory and socio-metric measures in Indian subjects Shri Murthy has also been actively engaged in trying out the effectiveness of the different methods of group psycho-therapy Shri Murthy and Shri Kumar have published about 6 scientific articles in connection with their work.

# RANCHI MANSIK AROGYASHALA RANCHI

The dea of starting a Mental Hosp tal for Indian patients was con ce ved in 1901 when there w s big B ngal which today comprises of the States of Bihar West Bengal Or ss and East P ki tan Ranchi was select ed because t happened to be the centre of Bengal There were three Mental Hosp tals then in this rea They were at Berhampore and Dacca in Bengal and Patna in B har The three Me tal Hospitals were lo ed and th s Mental Hosp tal was started in 1925 and it was then dec ded that with q ota wise admiss ons Bengal would have 75% of ts patients and Bihar and Orissa 259 In 1936 when Ori sa was separ ted the Govern ments of Bihar and Ors a were all tted 20% and 5% of the beds n this hosp tal respectively In 1947 after the independence of the country the 75% of beds from Bengal were divid d equally between West Bengal and East Pakistan each of them getting  $37\frac{1}{2}\%$  of the beds here The East Pakistan pad its contribut on only for one year after independence with no further contributions In 1950 all the Muslim pat ents from East Pak 1 tan staying in this hosp tal we e transferred to West P kistan Mental Hosp tals and the Non Musl m p t ents staying in West Pakistan Mental Hospitals were tran fe red to this hosp tal The result has been that the previous arrangement and percentages have been disturbed and today the beds in this hospital have been allotted to different States as mentioned below ---

The total sanctioned strength of the hosp tal is 1380 There are about 200 observation cases on an average every month

The hospital is situated at Kanke which is 5 miles away from the town and 7 miles from the Ranchi Railway Station The place is connected with the Town Bus Service

The Hospital is built on modern lines on a Villa system. It is divided into two Sections the Men's Section and the Women's Section Both the Sections cover an area of 100 acres The Men's Section contains n ne twostoreyed buildings with four dormitories and eight single rooms in e ch of them Bes des these there are two other buildings-one is the Infirmary and the other the Refractory Ward The Infi mary serves as the Reception Ward Observat on Ward and Ward for a tive treatment of ment 1 a d physical d so de s The Ref actory W rd is meant for agitated re tless and those p t ents who are likely to prove d ngerous to them elves or to others The Men's Section provides accommod tion for 11.08 patients The Women's Section is planned on a similar line and provides accommod tion for 272 patients The expenditu e of this hospital is borne by the different States as mentioned above The hospital has electrical install t ons and adequate supply of filtered water There s a project to provide water closet system

The Hosp tal is run on modern lines and all up-to d te and modern methods of tre tment are carried out Electric Convuls ve Therapy Insulin Shock Therapy Hydrotherapy Organotherapy P ychotherapy and treat ment with modern drugs are available here Recently a Neuro-Surg cal Un t has been started at Ranch. The hospital s taking full advantage of the services of the Neuro-S geon and abo t 100 Prefrontal Leucotomy ope rat ons have been carried o t during the last one and a half years The Occupational Ther py and R reational Thearapy are still the sheet anchor of all treatments Major ty of patients are employed in various occ pations both o tdoor and indoor such as gardening weaving ta loring cane and basket m king carpentry smithy d rree-making book b nd ng etc The Occupational Ther py Department of this hosp tal 1 o e of the best org n sed d partme ts in the contry Abo t 60 to 70% of the patients staying in this hospital are egula ly employed here M st of our requ eme ts of furn t re and other necessiti s of the hospital are had fr m this department The f male p t ents are also s tably employed in wea g needle and embro dery work lace making coir teas ng and mattress making domestic and other miscellaneous works

There s also plenty of p ovis on for recreat onal therapy incl d ng religions therapy for all p tients who take part in various indoor and out d or games s ch as foot ball hockey tennis badm nton cricket ropequoit teniquo t volley ball etc and cards chess carrom ping pong ludo etc There is also a fairly b g L b ary conta ning s table Engl sh Bengah Hindi Urdu and Oriya books The total number of books today in our hb ary is 4270

There are now 7 blocks built for the male patients and 3 for female in an area of abo t 13 acres The major portion of the land is vacant. Though the accommod t on is now for 157 patients there are 324 which includes 94 female and 230 male patients

There is only one male doctor who is also the Superintendent of the Hosp tal He has had training under Lt. Col Parasuram, the Retd Supdt of the Mental Hosp tal, Madras There is an out patient department attached to this Hosp tal not for the purposes of treating mentally ill cases

but for the general p blic of the area The doctor in-charge of this out patient Department is appointed m nly for the purpose and not for the mental hospital There are 7 n ses including 2 men with no special training n Psychiatry The other staff consist of 27 ward boys and 8 cle nes 2 cooks 2 lascars a lady Weaving Instructor a compounder a barber a dhobi and 2 clerks

The average attendance of Out p tients is about 8 per d y Mental defective children admitted in this hospital are separated and kept in separ te blocks. There is a school building and a trained te cher whose services are well utilised for the benefit of children. Teaching aids as well as facilities for their games are available.

There is a post of Welfare Ass stant and of a Psychiatr c Soc al Worker to guide and give necessary assistance to the relative of the patients and to help in history taking etc

# GOVERNMENT HOSPITAL AND ALL INDIA INSTITUTE OF MENTAL HEALTH BANGALORE

The Mental Hosp tal Bangalore one of the major medical institutions of the Mysore Medical Department, is stuated abo t two miles from Lal Bagh on a hillock south-east of the City It commenced working in the year 1938 with an in patient pop lation of bout 200 New departments have been added and the staff has been increased to deal with the increasing demands on the services of the hospital Now there are about 600 patients and the annual admission s about 1500

The hosp tal occup es an area of 130 acres and cons sts of the main hosp tal buildings quarters for the staff and extens ve gardens for the patients The hosp tal is well served with buses and other transport facilities

Since September 1954 the hospital which is administered by the Government of Mysore is associated with the All India Institute of Mental Health established by the Government of India The Institute has on its staff specialists including those appointed by the W H O. The medical graduates and graduates in psychology from all parts of India undergo a

two-year course lead ng to post graduate d plomas in Psychological Medi cine and Medical (Clin cal) Psychology respectively There s also a prog amme (one year) for the training of psychiatric nurses In add tion to teaching the Institute is engaged in research projects in the field of mental health

The Out patients Department of the hospital works five days in the week The serv ces are pervised by qualified special sts. Patients if manageable at home are brought to the Out patients Department for con sultation. The cases are fully investigated and most of the modern forms of treatment are administered.

Befo e the patient s taken to the spec alist in charge of the Out patients the name a d other particulars should be register d with the Recept onist The patient thus registered will be seen and necessary in vestigations carried out It is desirable that relations and friends who know the behaviour changes in the patient int mately should accompany the patient

The e s a separate dep rtment for the investigat on of ch ldren suffer ing from behaviour and other d s ders Here psychological mechanisms at work in the development of the child's abnormal behaviour are investigated and the necessary treatments ind cated If there s any bodily cause that s at the root of the trouble the Psych atrist att ched to the same department will be con lted and the med cal aspect of the treatment in d cated Th s department wo ks fo five days in a week

This department functions under the guidance of a WHO e pert and with the help of a trained neurologist Patients suffering from he d che fits paralys s etc are req i ed to attend this section of the hosp tal on Mondays and Thursdays If any of the patients need n p t ent ca e the e is provis on for the adm ss on of such cases

The hosp tal s meant for the treatment of ac te cases and prefe nce is given to ca es which would respond favourably to modern form of t eat ment in a short time Children below 10 years are gene ally not admit ted for want of s table accommodation It is proposed to have a sepa rate children s unit in the near future

Cases need ng s mple custodial care are generally not admitted Before the patient is admitted to the hospital the relative is advised to consider seriously whether he thinks that admission of patient is unmanageable or when a specialist ad ses admission in patient treatment will be con sidered. If a patient offers to enter the hospital for observation and treatment, he is admitted a voluntary boarder

If the patients or guard ans income is over Rs 50 per month the maintenance charge is Re 1 per day and Rs 30 should be paid in advance

towards det and accommod tion Spec al wards are also available and the cha ges vary f om Rs 60 to Rs 150 per month For patients who cannot affo d to p y treatment is free of cha ge

It s alw ys adv sable to admit the case on a voluntary basis Usually patients a e admitted and discharged during the day

Ca s who refuse to come in vol ntary need to be certified The procedure for this is to get the patient examined by two doctors One of them being a gazetted medical officer Cert ficates are to be written on spec al forms These are not readily avail ble with all general practi To avoid un ecessary delay the relative may go to one of the tioners major ho pitals (V ctoria or the Bowring Ho p tal) and get the certificates The concerned Magi trate (in Bangalo e the C ty Magistrate and the First Class Mag st ate C vil Stat on) m st be approached with the medical certi ficat s a d the patient and a pet tion on 75 nP stamped paper submitted The Magistrate then takes evidence and if s ti fied issues a Reception O der The patient will then be admitted by the doctor on duty without any other formality At the time of admiss on the guardian is required to sign a d 1 r t on permitting the doctor in charge to administer electrical insulin and other forms of t eatment as these involve some small risk Considering the unfort in the out-come of many untreated cases there should be no he t tion on the part of the patient or his guardian to avail himself or herself of the benefits of the modern forms of treatment

Aft r dm ssion the guardian should give a detailed history of the patients lines. This will help in understanding the illness as well as in planning treatment t will also help in arr v ng at the possible outcome of the illness.

Diet clothing and linen are supplied by the hospital and care and supervisi n exe ci ed over the pate ts For ext a diet a su table amount, usually Rs 25 may be deposited in the ho pital office Out of this any re sonable e tr d t will be s ppl ed in add tion to the bas c d et For all payments made in the office the gua dian should ins st on getting a receipt

The p t ents may rece ve letters bout once a week the guard an may also m ke e q ries from the Supe intendent about once a week for the progress of the se in the ho p tal. The patie ts are encouraged to write as freq ently s possible to the r 1 t ves and friends. It is inadvisible to d sturb the doctors  $\sigma$  the telephone at all odd hous. Normally the Pat ents can be v s ted only between 4 and 6 PM on all days. In the ca e of serio ly ill patients the doctors in charge w ll report to the guar d an that the case is serious and the v s t g hours in each cases are extended at the d scretion of the doctors

MYSORE

No v s tor is allowed to give food in the mornings without the specific permission of the doctor as the patients on Elect ical and Ins lin tre tment must be on an empty stom ch unt l the treatment is over

Voluntary patients when sufficiently recoins ered are sent out on parole for not more than 3 days at a stretch. The guardian is encourged to ut lise this facility as it will help in the early recovery of the patient. At first it is desirable to take out the pitient in the morn g and b ing him back before d rk. A y relevant observations should be reported to the doctors When a patient is taken out on pirole the g dian should see that there are no dues plyable to the hospital. Cert fied patients are not permitted to go out on paloe

Vol ntary p tie ts w ll be d scharg d from hosp tal on gi ing notice in writ ng of the r nte t on to l at least 24 hours bef e the intended departure Certified p tients if they e w ll enough are also dis harged on a formal apple t on by the petitir r Other types of cases are de lt with by the Board of Visit which meets o ce a month. Whin this body recommends the d scharge of patient the guidian is expected to take the patient of the hopit l at once Patients who hive been admitted unde Section 14 as wandering and digerous lunatics may be discharged by the Magistrate who has o de ed the committal of the patient to hospital Accused and criminal patients cannot be discharged in the ordinary way

# THE PUNJAB MENTAL HOSPITAL, AMRITSAR

# Short H t ry

The Punjab Mental Hospital was planned in October 1947 shortly after the partition of Punjab and built hurredly by extensi e add tions and some modifications to a Reformatory Settleme t building. It was built as a hostel for 500 patients. Apart from a section of 32 rooms for men and 20 for women the rest of the accommodat on is in barracks. It was opened in March 1949 with a few patients. In M y 1950 about fifty patients were received from an improvised. Mental Hospital for Refugees but the rest of the accommodation was kept vacant for the Non Muslim patients from West Pakistan who arrived here on 6th December 1960

An Out patient Clinic was opened even before the actual opening of the hosp tal Its clientele increased progressively so that more disturbed patients from outs de Amritsar started staying in Verandahs of the Out patient Clinic and under the trees In 1956 these patients were allowed to stay in tents in the hospital compound till by the end of 1959 about

100 tents were constantly pitched w thin the hosp tal compound whe e the outp tients hved with the r families some of whom h d yo ng ch ld en as In 1958 the m in prison like g te was repl ced by a gate keepers well lodge and entrance to the hospital compound made open About 6000 p tients were treated in the Outpatient Chnic last year of whom half of them were given Electric Convuls ve treatment A further recent de elopment has been the opening of an outpatient ward of 16 beds and five single rooms in which psych logically ill and very disturbed p tients a e housed They are fed and looked after by the r families while the hospital p ovides free med cal attendance This work his been in the n ture of Voluntary Service by the do to s having been done in off-duty hours from 5 pm to 10 p m by almost all the doctors and till midnight or past m d night by one on 3 days a week Separate staff for this Clinic was sanct oned in 1958 and some appointments were made early during this year The Vol ntary work 1 however being continued in the same tempo as before as the attendance of the Clin c h s increased

During the 2nd F've Yea Pl a wad of 80 beds (40 beds each for men and women pati ts) 6 sol t on rooms for infectious cas 12 beds for insane children a psychology laboratory a family ward of 5 su tes and a new Occupation The apy barack for me p t ents have been added An o t p tient ward of 8 rooms s under construction Of these the 1st (namely 80 bed accommod tion) has been completed and is in use since January 1960 This is b ilt on modern lines and has such amenities as s ting room dining room play room art room m c room and library There are e ght single rooms each with an attached fl sh lavatory and bath instead of 40 beds for accommodating disturbed p tients Plans fo 400 bed accommodation f r ch on c incur bles at a cost of 8 lakhs are under preparation and the work is expected to be taken in hand this year

Other distinctive features of this hosp tal are that all the med cal office s h v v l t rily g en up pri ate p actice and hold interview with p tients 12 hours a day The guardians are enco aged to give company to their wards as long as they like and are permitted to st y at n ght if they so wish

Modern methods of treatment (except psycho-surgery and ind v dual psychothe apy) e avail ble he e Patients are given an insight into mental illnesses gene ally in lecture-meetings in which a convalescent p tient rec tes the story of his illness or gives t, in writing Apart from psychological and phys ological explanations of symptoms solace provided by b s c tea hings of religion and the need to respect social ethics are stressed in these meetings Occupation therapy is given its d e place although to a rel ti ely limited extent.

The e w re 380 patients on eco d on 1 1 51 (1st January 1951) and 917 on 1 11 1960 (against autho ised accommodation of 600) of whom 81 (79 men and 2 women) are crimi als and 836 (504 men and 332 women) are non-criminals Out of these 917 inmates 850 are classified as incurable insanes. Most acute cases are handled and treated in the out patient Clinic and the people have become used to it and prefer to stay with their wards even at the expense of discomfort and absence from work to running about in the Courts for securing orders of admis on But for the out p tient service the pl ght of the mental patients in the state would have been miserable

About 400 patients are admitted e ery year of whom nearly  $40^{\circ\prime}$  a e incur ble at the time of admis on, and 300 patients are discharged Manageable patients who are not classified as social recoveries a e not discharged from the hosp tal unless desired by their guardians because such patients are likely to be a burden on the families and a bad influence for the children in the home and n the local ty Death from natural causes claim 30 to 40 patients every year and abo t 60 are added yearly to the incu ables of the hosp tal

Out of the 917 110 only are paying patients and the rest are non paying The tariff for o dinary class d et is Rs 60 per month and Rs 130 p m for better class diet, against Rs 78 and Rs 128 respectively actually spent by the Government on each of these two categories of patients As in most Government Mental Hosp tals admiss on s available only to the Punjab domiciled person but outpatient services are available to all The Punjab Go ernment charges Rs 2 503 per annum as cap tation cha ges from s bj cts of states other than Punjab

The total an ual come of the hospital is about Rs 70 000 f om paying patients Rs 80 000 as fixed contribut on from municipalities and district boards in the Stat s and Rs 15 000 are miscellaneous receipts The annual expenditule of the hospital is about 6 lakhs rupees

Information on Mental hygi ne is given to the convalescent p tients and their guardians in the thrice weekly meetings mentioned ea her In additi n lectures on the subject are given by the senior medical officer in about a dozen training colleges for teachers and in some schools every year

A psychiatric Out p tient Clin c was opened at the Amritsar Med cal College Hosp tal in 1958 a d at the Medical College Hospital Pat ala in 1960 under qualified psych atrists Manageable psychotic patients Lave been allowed to be treated as out patients and in patients at the Civil Hospital Gobindgarh where the Medical Officer has had training in Psychiatry at the Hospital for Mental Diseases at Ranchi

The inc ease or decrease in the incidence of mental diseases cannot be judged properly from the number of patients admitted to the Mental Hosp tal or attended at the Psychiatric Outpatients Clinics because these Clinics have been recently established and people are coming to know about these slowly by the word of mouth of recovered patients or their guard ans However the senior med cal p actitioners who have practised in a partir 1 r area for years a e of the opinion that the incidence of major mental b eakdown (psychoses) which are relatively easily spotted out is increasing p ogre s vely. Those who have had some knowledge of neuroses think that these illnesses are also much more frequent than before. His own experience of wo k at the psychiatric out patient Clinic Amritsar s as below —

- 1 Organ c psychoses are comparatively fewer than in European Countries
- 2 Alcoholic addiction in Punjab is not so pronounced as to cause alcoholic psychoses
- 3 Syphilitic encephalitis and meningo-encephalitis are e tremely rare conditions being not more than one per cent of major psychoses
- 4 Incidence of major mental b eakdown a little before or after marriage s inc easing particula ly in girls
- 5 Hysterical illnesses are getting fewer du ing the course of years
- 6 Anxiety ne os s p ycho somatic illnesses and obsess onal neuroses appear to be increasing
- 7 Toxic delirium in continued feve s appears to be more frequent during 1 t two years (as compared to the period 1951-58) particularly in cases who have had large doses of chloram phenicol and tet acycline ant b otic

Psychoses occurring shortly after puerperium (but not of the type of toxic psychoses) are getting p ogress vely more frequent in younger pe sons of 18 25 yeas of age who has a had poor health and compartively frequent pregnancies

Psychoses from optum withdrawal (due to the recent stoppage of s le of op m in licensed shops) has been ins gnificant e ther because the addicts have adj sted to the reduced quantities available on a permit or pe h ps have acces to smuggled op um

The Me tal H sp tal Agra w s opened in 1869 as the A ra Lunatic Asylum For many years this hosp tal contin d as a collect al charge of the C vil Su geon Since 1904 t has been run by a whole-time Superin tendent In the year 1925 the word Asylum was om tted and the title of Me tal Ho p tal was granted to Mental Hospital, Agra

The gh Agr Mental Hospital was s ppo ed to admit patients only from certain districts of UP it serves the need of a major part of North India comprising of UP Delhi and eastern parts of the Punjab It has now become ne of the most important psy h atric institutions in the country where modern treatments a e available

In Western contries the incidence of psychoss i approximately 4 per thousand excluding psycho-neurosis and mental deficiency If the num ber of psychotics s taken 2 per tho sand in Ind a, the e should be approximately 1 26 400 persons suffering from certifiable mental d seases Th s number does not include the psycho-neurot cs and the mental defectives The total number of beds for mental patients n the whole of UP s 1407 including the 408 beds of the Mental Hospital Bareilly 331 beds of the Mental Hospital Varanas a d 668 beds of this hospital Another 60 beds ha e been added to the Mental Hospital Agra

La ge scale imp o ements are expected in the Third Plan and consider able improvements have already been affected after the Second Wold War The Hospital lays great stress on employment and encouraging the patients in various types of activities—occ pational recreational and soc al The inst tution s being developed as an open psychiatric hospital and the staff has learnt to adopt a very progress e outlook

Post gr d ate training for the MD degree in Psych try is given here Teaching programme for under graduate of Agra, Kanpur and Lucknow Medical Colleges and Lady Hard ng Medical College Delhi is also carried out

#### MENTAL HOSPITAL, VARANÀSI.

#### Short H story

The Mental Hosp tal is s tuated on the North side of the Collectorate Varanas and near the village Pandepur It is an old institution built by the Government in 1809 and located in Hukulganj It was expanded in 1817 and again in 1855 and entirely rebuilt on the present site Before the 1928 period, the Hospital was used for both criminal and non-criminal patients but after that period the non-criminal wing was closed down and the hosp tal chiefly utilised for housing the criminal mental cases The non-criminal patients were transferred to Agra and Bareilly Mental Hospi tals

The hospital has a bed strength of 252 male and 79 female adults in which Observation cases from Varanasi Districts alone are admitted The hospital provided for the education and treatment of criminal lunatics of Himachal Pradesh.

A scheme has been forwarded to the State Government for considering the expans on of the hospital by the opening of a non-criminal wing combrising of 100 beds

# BANGIYA UNMAD ASRAM DÜTTANAGAR, CALCUTTA 30

Bangiya Unmad Asram is the only mental hospital in India where treatment is followed according to the Indian system of medicines This is a private mental hospital which is run without taking any help from outside

This hospital was started on January 26 1935 in a garden house at Liluah Howrah with only 25 beds In 1940 this institution was shifted to the present site at Duttanagar in its own buildings and on its own lands me suring about 20 acres At present the hospital has got 110 beds for 60 males and 50 females

The peaceful surroundings of this institution are very pleasant and its well laid-out gardens with play grounds and a park in front of the newly built Silver Jubilee Block are attractive. This hosp tal has cultivated a large collection of Indian medical plants in its garden. This in titution had organised Mental Health Exhibitions on three occas ons first in 1954 which wis inaugurated by H.E and Dr. H. C. Mukherjee Governor of West Bengal, a second time in 1958 inaugurated by Dr. A. B. Roy Minister of Health West Bengal and for the third time in 1960 inaugurated by Sri B. K. Banerjee Mayor of Calcutta. Many rare collections and valuable publications and informations collected from different countries of the world on Mental Health Services were shown at the Exhibitions and exhibits preserved in the library. Kaviraj Atul Behari Dutt is the founder-Superintendent of this Institution.

During the next 3rd Five Year Plan it is intended to complete the work of the new building of the female ward the foundation stone of which waslaid by Her Excellency Shrimati Padmaja Naidu, the Governor of West Bengal on 20th March, 1960 and to expand the research work on mental diseases

## LUMBINI PARK MENTAL HOSPITAL CALCUTTA

## Sho t History

The Lumbini Park Mental Hosp tal was started in 1940 under the auspices of the Indian Psycho-Analytical Society which is affiliated to the International Psycho-Analytical Society and within the jurisdiction of the Calcutta Corporation It has then only 3 beds for treatment of cases of mental ill health In the last 20 years the hosp tal expanded and now accommodates a total number of 185 patients 150 male and 35 females 15 of whom are treated free by the West Bengal Government Further the Institute maintains 2 free and 8 concess onal beds from its own funds The Hosp tal receives grants from the West Bengal Government from time to time It is gratifying to state that the Union Relief and Rehabilitation Department donated 40 000 rupees for the construction of new two storey building to accommodate 20 more beds The construction work is now almost complete The building of both male and female words the twosto ey build ng and the area incl ding the compo nd of the 2 wards covers nearly 2 b gas in the case of the male ward and 24 b gas in the case of the female ward The building of the male ward was donated by the late Ratsekhar Bose of Calcutta The Institute maintains the following Departments ---

1 Clnucs—Two Out-door Clinics one for mental and the other for general patients were opened in 1940 The treatment and medicines are given free The other city clinic was opened in 1948 at 14 Parsi Bagan Lane Calcutta

2 Bodhayana — Since January 1949 the Institute started a school for the education of young children named Bodhayana A new section of the Bodh yana was opened from August, 1951 for mentally defective children and children with gross problem behaviour due to other cases

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# RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT THE FIRST CONFERENCE OF SUPERINTENDENTS OF MENTAL HOSPITALS IN INDIA HELD AT AGRA ON THE 25TH & 26TH NOV 1960

### **Resolution No 1**

THIS CONFERENCE after considering in det il the draft Mental. Health Bill RECOMMENDS for adoption the Bill with the changes pro posed by them

THIS CONFERENCE also wishes to place on record its appreciation of the work undertaken by Dr S tya Na d and his colleagues in drafting this Bill

## RESOLUTION NO 2

THIS CONFERENCE noting with c n ern that there s a g eat shortage of trained doctors and par med al personnel in the field of psychiatry and that the numbe of cent s a allable for tr ni g them is not adequate to meet the requirements recommends that immed at st ps should be taken for

- increasing the n mb f trainees in the exist ng private or gove nment t a n ng centres by expanding d strengthen ing them
- (u) opening add tional centres for post graduate train ng in psychia try at appropriate places The trainees should be given adequate stipends In order to ensure that the pe sonnel trained get suitable ass gnments THIS CONFERENCE recommends that the State Governments should sponsor the personnel already employed in their medical institutions as well as others so that in co se of time nuclei of trained personnel in psychiatry are made avail ble
- (iii) improving the pay emoluments opportunities of promotion and service prospects for persons in the field of Psychiatry so as to attract suitable p rsons

## **Resolution No 3**

THIS CONFERENCE emphasss that t s necessary for selected medical auxiliaries working in Medical and Health Institutions to be given a short period of training in Psychiatry after their normal training Short training courses of 3 months m y be arranged at training centres which already exist and/or which may be set up in future

#### **RESOLUTION NO 4**

The developments in the field of medicine specially n the field of Psychiatry are advancing at a very rap d pace and this CONFERENCE recommends th t short refresher courses may be arranged for the following c tegories of personnel

- (1) those already employed in Mental Hosp tals
- (11) those who are employed in other Medical & Health Institutions

(m) General Practitioners

The G vernm nts concerned should sponsor the cand dates and give them supends

## **Resolution No 5**

The attent on gi en to Psychology and Psy h atry in the present under gr du te med cal co is considered to be nsufficient. The cas al visits to a m ntal hosp tal are not obviously likely to gi e the under graduates sufficient knowledge of the subject. W thout increasing the duration of the medical course the curriculum may be revi wed and improved and strengthened

THIS CONFERENCE fu ther resolves that full use of Medical Hospi tals which ha e suffic ent facilities and clinical material for teaching should be made use of by the medical coll ge and un versity centres if such me tal hosp tals are in close proximity and Professorial Chairs in Psych at y sho ld be created in all medical colleges and all tra ned special ists of these hosp tals should be utilised as teachers

#### **Resolution No 6**

THIS CONFERENCE recommends that the government should provide sen or tra elling fellowsh ps for exchange visits to other parts of the country and other countries to enable Psych atrists to keep in touch with modern developments in Psychiatry

#### **Resolution No 7**

THIS CONFERENCE viewing with concern the poor standard obtain ing in most m tal hosp tals in the country considers

- (1) That the improvem nt of the existing mental hospitals *e g* remodelling and modernising the buildings provision of improved treatment facilities and amenities provision of adequate staff etc is the most important need today and should be given the highest priority in the National Plan ming during the Third Five Year Plan
- (11) That hospitals for chronic patients with wings for mentally defect ves senile and epileptic patients should immediately be set up

- (11) That Psychiatric clinics and Psychiatric wards be added to all general hospitals and hospitals attached to med cal col leges There should be at least on clinic for ea h district. Such clinics and wards should be in charge of qualified Psychiatrist
- (1v) That special sch ols for education and training of lesser degrees of mentally retarded children may be opened
- (v) That Day Hosp tals be established wherever pr cticable
- (vi) That the system of maintenance of hosp tal records should be immediately rev sed and detailed history and exhaustive psychiatric examination and progres notes should be maintained according to standard Psychiatric techniques Such eco ds should be uniform in all the mental institutions
- (vii) That the standard nomen lature for the diag osis of mental disorders as adopted by the World Health Organisat on in their detailed list of nomenclature of diseases be adopted uni formly by all Psych atric institutions
- (viii) That a sub-comm ttee be appointed to rev se the various forms and returns u ed for stat stical purposes

## **Resolution No 8**

THIS CONFERENCE noting that the drugs used in Psychiatry are either too expens or a e not e dily vallable r commends that governm nt should take steps for the mpot of such drugs as are not av ilable and also should encourage a m facturing programme of these drugs in India

THIS CONFERENCE further recommends that steps be taken to enco rage the manufacture and f b atton n Indu of ECT EEG and other electro medical eq pm nt used in Psy h atry

## **Resolution No 9**

THIS CONFERENCE n ti g w th concern the tendency for the e cess ve use of tranquilize s and other drugs urges upon all concerned to e ercise the utmost are nd restraint in the regard

#### **RESOLUTION NO 10**

THIS CONFERENCE recommends th t an Adv ser in Mental Health be appointed by the Government of India in the Ministry of Health to dvis the go riment on mental health and that sim 1 r Advisers be appointed in the States also

### **Resolution No 11**

THIS CONFERENCE recommends that no non-criminal mental patients be observed/or detained in a jail. All such patients should be kept for necessary observation in general hospitals, where mental hospitals do not exist

### **Resolution No 12**

THIS CONFERENCE is of the opinion that it is essential to segregate criminal psychiatric patients in institutions solely meant for them The Government is urged to take urgent steps for this purpose

### **Resolution No 13**

THIS CONFERENCE recommends the training of Child Psychiatrists from among qualified psychiatrists and the establishment of mental health services for children and adolescents such as child guidance clinics Mental Health Services in Schools and Colleges youth counselling Premarital counselling and Ma age Guidance Clinics

### **Resolution No 14**

THIS CONFERENCE endorses the recommendation of the Estimate Committee of Parliament regarding the setting up of Councils of Mental Health by the Central and State Governments

#### **Resolution No 15**

THIS CONFERENCE recommends that Governments sponsor health education n the field of mental health

THIS CONFERENCE end rses the WHO's recommendation of integratio of mental h alth all filds of public he lth activities

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
