READ—

Letter No. C. 2 of 18, dated 15th October 1918, from the Excise Commissioner, forwarding the report on the working of the Excise Department for the year 1917-18.

Order No. 9450-9—Ex. 62-18-24, dated 28th January 1919.

Principal features.—Measures of reform in accordance with the policy in excise matters enunciated by Government continued to receive attention during the year under review. The establishment of Licensing Boards in the Cities of Mysore and Bangalore and the Kolar Gold Fields, the reduction in the number of hours for the sale of exciseable articles except toddy, and the holding of District Conferences of Excise Officers in regard to the location of shops or closing down unnecessary shops with a few other minor improvements, mark an advance over the administration of the previous year. The working of the Licensing Boards which have many possibilities should be watched carefully by the Excise Commissioner and a fuller account should be given of them in future reports. Government have recently ordered the establishment of Advisory Boards at all the other district headquarter towns to help the local officers in locating new shops or removing existing ones to unobjectionable places. The development of these Boards also will be watched with sympathetic interest. A special committee of the Representative Assembly was appointed in Government Order No. G. 13601-50—G. M. 554-16-1, dated 19th May 1917, to report on the drink question. In their Order No. Fl. 6241-2—S. R. 98-17-3, dated 18th April 1918, Government have adopted such of the Committee's suggestions as were found to be practicable.

2. *Financial results.*—The total income and expenditure of the department during the year were Rs. 65,37,316 and Rs. 5,28,367 against Rs. 58,73,487 and Rs. 8,13,114 respectively in 1916-17. The increase under receipts was contributed chiefly by the items "Arrack" "Toddy" and "Ganja," while the increased expenditure of 1916-17, was largely due to a debit of over three lakhs under Local Cess against a debit of Rs. 79,989 during the year under review. It is satisfactory to note that there was an improvement in the collection work of the year which represented '99·7 per cent of the total demand including arrears. The arrears have thus been reduced from Rs. 1,60,844 in 1916-17 to Rs. 1,33,997. It is hoped that stringent measures will be pursued energetically till the arrears are all cleared.

3. *Incidence of taxation.*—The general incidence of taxation per head of population was Rs. 1-2-3, against Rs. 1-1-8 in 1916-17.

4. *Manufacture and consumption of country spirits.*—The construction of an extra warehouse in the Distillery buildings for bottling and storing special liquors recently sanctioned by Government should be completed early.

Government note that the experimental scheme sanctioned in Government Order No. 1476-82—P. W. 8069-75, dated 5th July 1918, to abate the nuisance caused by the spent wash of the Distillery is yielding satisfactory results.

There was an increase of 46,996 gallons in the quantity manufactured and of 48,079 gallons in the issues from the Distillery. It is satisfactory to note that the consumption within the State itself fell by nearly 6,500 gallons. The large increase both in the manufacture and issues of the year was due to the supply of 1,22,631 gallons to the Civil and Military Station of Bangalore against 67,820 gallons in 1916-17.

5. *Arrack*.—The total number of arrack shops fell from 733 in 1916-17 to 723 during the year of report. The consumption for the whole State showed a decrease of nearly 10,000 gallons. There was a fall of about 25,145 gallons in the districts of Mysore, Hassan, Kadur and Shimoga due in a large measure, to the unfavourable seasonal conditions, high prices and restrictions in railway traffic due to the war. The incidence of consumption per head of population was only 3·7 drams against 4·5 in the previous year; while the taxation rose from 8 annas 2 pies to 8 annas 5 pies.

6. *Foreign Liquors*.—The consumption under this head amounted to 18,677 against 24,712 gallons in the previous year and the decrease is attributed to the rise in their prices and the difficulty of obtaining supplies also due to war conditions. This explains the increase of 3,080 gallons in the consumption of special liquors during the year but it is gratifying to note that the steady fall in the consumption of foreign liquors during the recent years has not resulted in a corresponding increase in the consumption of special liquors though the former is being replaced to an appreciable extent by the latter.

7. *The Mysore Pharmaceuticals*.—There was a decrease of nearly 200 gallons in the quantity of rectified spirits issued to this company. Though the issues of alcoholic preparations by this company showed a large increase of nearly 6,000 oz., the issues to the Government Medical Stores fell considerably. The Department of Industries and Commerce under whose patronage the concern is working is requested to investigate into the matter.

8. *Toddy*.—The revenue from toddy was Rs. 30,76,124 against Rs. 30,00,823 in 1916-17. The number of toddy shops was reduced by 43 and the average number of villages served by each shop rose from 5·3 to 5·5, the area served by a shop from 9·14 to 9·7 square miles, and the population from 1810 to 1889 as compared with the figures for the previous year. The progress though slow continues to be steady and Government hope that action will be promptly taken to further reduce the number of shops wherever possible after taking proper safeguards against illicit practices. The number of trees licensed during the years increased by about 45,000 and the percentage of Government trees rose slightly from 62·5 to 63·5.

9. *Date groves*.—It is noted that the question of improving the toddy yielding capacity of trees and preventing their early destruction is being carefully investigated. The results of the investigation will, it is hoped, lead to useful practical action being undertaken at an early date. Government observe that the progress made by the special staff employed for revising the old reserve list is slow and greater supervision over their work is necessary. The report called for on the subject should be expedited.

10. *Country beer*.—The consumption of country beer during the year was 1,13,913 gallons against 17,428 in 1916-17. The major portion of this consumption (95,905) gallons was in the Military Canteen at Hebbal.

11. *Akkibhoja*.—The Excise Commissioner's report on the result of his investigation of manufacture and sale of Akkibhoja or rice-beer is awaited.

12. *Ganja*.—There was an increase of 37 acres 16 guntas in the area under Ganja crop. The out-turn of the Ganja crop during the year was better than that of the year previous, the yield per acre being 4·3 maunds against 3·3 maunds in 1916-17. The quality of the crops is also reported to have been better. The number of shops licensed was 261 against 257 during the last year. The consumption of Ganja during the year was 12,119 seers against 10,430 seers in 1916-17. Ganja cultivation under more stable conditions, *i.e.*, as an irrigated crop is being tried in the Bombay Presidency. The Excise Commissioner is requested to consider the desirability of making similar experiments in Mysore which will enable the State, in case improvement in the quality of the crop can be effected also, to supply the local demand without having to depend on outside markets.

13. *Opium*.—The number of these shops was reduced by one and there was also a decrease of 199 seers in the consumption of the drug during the year. Smuggling is reported to be still rife in Bangalore and Kolar Districts. Detection work in these areas require greater vigilance.

14. *Offences*.—During the year under report 3,171 cases affecting 3,793 persons were reported against 3,011 cases affecting 3,547 persons in 1916-17. Of these

438 cases related to heinous offences, 2,540 to breach of license conditions and 19 other offences. It is gratifying to note that there has been no instance of smuggling of country spirits from or to British India. The number of cases of illicit distillation decreased by 11 being 62 against 73 in 1916-17. The District Staff in the Kadur and Shimoga Districts should show better detection work as illicit distillation is still rife in those districts. Out of 258 cases involving 474 persons referred to Magistrates 199 were disposed of by them. Including cases pending at the beginning of the year, the total number dealt with by Magistrates was 335 against 365 in the previous year. The percentage of conviction was 86·74 against 59·6 in 1916-17, which is satisfactory. The number of pending cases with the departmental officers is still large and should receive prompt attention.

15. *Intelligence Staff.*—It is noted that the Intelligence Staff was usefully employed during the year and detected 87 cases as against 61 in 1916-17. The proposal to make this staff permanent and that for publishing an Excise Intelligence Gazette will receive separate consideration of Government along with the Re-organization scheme which is now pending their orders.

16. *Inspections.*—The Excise Commissioner toured through all the districts of the State during the year and his inspection work was on the whole satisfactory. The work done by the District Excise Officers in this respect leaves much to be desired. Considering the comparatively light charges of these officers, it is regretted that a complete inspection of all the important subordinate offices, shops and taverns, was not carried out by even a single District Officer, though the number of days spent on tour by some of them was disproportionately large. The necessity for systematic and regular inspections should be clearly impressed on these officers and the Excise Commissioner will bring to the notice of Government any neglect or omission on their part.

17. The Administration of the department during the year was on the whole satisfactory.

I have the honor to submit the following report on the working of the Excise Department of the State for the year 1917-18, with the usual statistical returns.

CHAPTER I.—INTRODUCTORY.

2. Mr. P. Raghavendra Rao, B.A., B.L., was in charge of the Department till the afternoon of the 22nd December 1917, when I assumed charge of the office, and continued till the close of the official year except for a short period of ten days at the close of the year when I was absent on privilege leave. During this period Mr. T. Royaloo Chetty, my Head Quarter Office Assistant was in charge of the Department.

3. Mr. D. Sreenivasiengar, B.A., Head Quarter Assistant Commissioner was transferred to Mysore as Revenue Sub-Divisional Officer, and his successor Mr. T. Royaloo Chetty entered upon his duties as my Personal Assistant on the forenoon of the 15th February 1918. A statement showing the names of Deputy Commissioners and the District Excise Officers, who were in charge of the District during the year, is appended to this report.

4. *Excise Ranges.*—There was no change in the constitution of Excise Ranges. The reconstitution of Ranges and Sub-Ranges in the State will be taken up after the Re-organisation of the Department is sanctioned.

5. The principal events in the Excise Administration during the year are:—

(1) A Licensing Board was constituted for the Bangalore and Mysore Cities and the Kolar Gold Fields, as directed in Government Order No. Fl. 5371-82—S. R. 136-16-4, dated 17th March 1917, to fix the number and locality of Excise shops within those limits.

(2) The arrack shops in the Bangalore City were leased out for a period of two years on the tender system with effect from 1st July 1917, for an annual rental of Rs. 1,38,000.

(3) The Foreign liquor shops in the Cities of Bangalore and Mysore were also disposed of by tenders for three years commencing from 1917-18, instead of under the fixed fee system.

(4) The penalty on date trees killed by over or careless tapping was raised from one to two rupees per tree, and the percentage (3%) allowed to contractors free of penalty was cancelled.

(5) Hemispherical Nickel dram cups were prescribed for use in all arrack shops in the State and supplied to all shop-keepers in place of the cone-shaped copper ones; and new pattern copper gallon pots were supplied to all Bonded Depots and Inspecting Officers.

(6) A special Establishment consisting of two Assistant Inspectors on Rs. 25+10 each and 4 tree-markers on Rs. 10 each per mensem, was sanctioned for each District in Government Order No. Fl. 993-5—S. R. 12-17-3, dated 27th August 1917, for the revision of the Date Reserve Lists.

(7) The time for the opening of shops for vending Excise articles except toddy was fixed at 9 A.M., instead of at 8 A.M.

(8) The retail selling price for arrack was altered from a fixed rate to a minimum rate of 2 annas 4 pies per dram. *Per contra*, the rate for sugar-cane jaggory arrack (bottled) was raised from Rs. 1-9-0 to Rs. 1-10-0 per reputed quart, and for molasses bottled arrack the rate was reduced from Rs. 9 to Rs. 8-4-0 per gallon.

(9) A conference of the Excise Inspectors in each district was held during the latter part of the year 1917-18, chiefly for making proposals for closing unnecessary shops, and removing them from prominent and objectionable places agreeably to the Excise policy of Government. Advantage was taken of this conference in districts to discuss important questions connected with the Department.

CHAPTER II.—COUNTRY SPIRITS.

6. *Distillery Buildings.*—Government sanction has recently been accorded to the construction of an extra ware-house, office buildings, etc., in the Central Distillery, at Bangalore, and the Superintending Engineer, Southern Circle has been requested to take in hand urgently the construction of the Special Liquor bottling ware-house for want of which the manufacturing contractors had to experience great difficulty in supplying the required quantity of the Special Liquors to the Bonded Depots.

During the year the installation of electric lights was further extended to the servants' quarters.

Regarding the smell from the spent wash, Government have since passed orders in their No. 1476-82—P. W. 8069-75, dated the 5th July 1918, sanctioning a scheme by which the liquid waste gets absorbed in the ground. An experiment was started in August 1917, and was reported to have worked satisfactorily. The Government sanctioned the continuance of this "absorption" method by the rotation of plots divided into seven blocks; the annual maintenance charges including those incurred during 1917-18 have been ordered to be debited to the Excise Department. The Executive Engineer, Sanitary Division is in charge of this scheme.

7. *Water Supply.*—The Distillery Officer reports that the present pipes with half an inch bore take longer time to supply the quantity of water required for the purpose of reducing the strong distilled liquor. The question of replacing these small pipes by bigger ones will be taken up with the Water Supply Department.

8. *Coffey Stills.*—There was no interruption in the working of the stills.

9. *Visitors.*—(1) Reverend E. W. Thompson, M.A., Wesleyan Mission, (2) Doctor Henry Gray, Physical Culture Expert, Y. M. C. A., and Mr. T. A. Chalmers, C.S.I., Indian Army Reserve, visited the Distillery during the year. It was once inspected by me and by my predecessor Mr. P. Raghavendra Rao and by the Head Quarter Office Assistants, Messrs. T. Rayaloo Chetty and D. Sreenivasa Iyengar.

10. *The privilege of manufacture.*—Throughout the year the manufacturing contractors supplied the required quantity of arrack and special liquors without giving room for any complaints. Since January 1917, Sugar Cane jaggory was used as the base for distillation, as the stock of cane molasses was exhausted and no fresh supply of it could be obtained from Java. The bulk of the arrack issued to shops thereafter, for consumption, was jaggory arrack of 30° U. P. for which the manufacturers are paid at the rate of 13 annas and 2 pies per gallon.

There was however some stock of Palmyra molasses imported by the manufacturers; the liquor distilled therefrom, though scientifically unobjectionable for potable purposes, was not liked by the consumers of the Bangalore City. Government have since ordered that the available stock of Palmyra molasses might be utilized and further importation for distillation has been prohibited.

11. *Manufacture, stock and issues.*—The opening balance on the 1st July 1918 was 22,768 gallons, 14 drams, and the quantity manufactured during the year was 555,282 gallons, 29 drams, as against 508,296 gallons, 14 drams last year. Out of the total quantity of 578,050 gallons, 43 drams available for issue, a quantity aggregating 554,850 gallons, 33 drams was transported from the Distillery as against 506,771 gallons and 25 drams during 1916-17, leaving a closing balance of 23,200 gallons, 10 drams on the evening of the 30th June 1918. The above quantity includes issues made to the Civil and Military Station ware-house and the wastage incurred in the Distillery amounting to 122,631 gallons, 8 drams and 3,497 gallons respectively, as against 67,820 gallons, 1 dram and 3,189 gallons, 9 drams respectively. The increase of 54,811 gallons, 7 drams issued to the Civil and Military Station area consists of 53,238 gallons, 7 drams of 30° U. P. arrack 1,505 gallons of Rum, 15 gallons of rectified and 54 gallons of Methylated spirits. There has been an increase under all heads.

12. *Issues within the State.*—The total quantity issued under each head is as follows :—

The increase under special liquors was due to the continued difficulty of obtaining Foreign liquors.

13. *Methylated Spirits.*—One thousand four hundred and fifty gallons and thirty eight drams of this spirit were manufactured during the year and the stock balance of the previous year was 6 gallons. Of this 1,448 gallons were issued, leaving a balance of 8 gallons and 38 drams at the close of the year. The details of issues are :—

14. The revised rules regarding the possession, import, export and sale of Methylated spirits consequent on the abolition of *ad Valorem* duty thereon are pending sanction of Government. The question of manufacturing Mohua Spirit for commercial purposes is still under investigation by the Director of Industries and the Manufacturing Contractors. The Conservator of Forests in Mysore, has stated that of the three kinds of Mohua flowers found in the State about 1,000 tons could be collected annually in year of bumper crop which occurs once in three years and about 250 tons in normal year.

15. *Rectified Spirits.*—One Hundred and eighty six gallons were issued duty free direct from the Distillery to approved public Institutions and 24 gallons from the Bonded Depots to the Mission Hospitals at Chikballapur and Kolar and the Mines Hospital, in the Kolar Gold Fields. Eight private Firms and the Superintendent of the Sandalwood Oil Factory purchased, in all, after payment of duty, 70 gallons of rectified spirits from the Distillery as against 51 gallons last year, and the quantity issued under bond to the Mysore Pharmaceuticals Limited, Bangalore, was 1,250 gallons—

Messrs. T. L. Upadhayaya & Sons and the Mission Hospital, at Mysore obtained 6 gallons of the spirit from the Mysore Depot on payment of duty. Out of this, 2 gallons, 34 drams were issued at concession rates of duty at Rs. 3 per gallon to Messrs. T. L. Upadhayaya & Sons, as per Government Order No. Fl. 49-17-2, dated the 14th March 1918.

16. *Transport of liquor* :—The arrack carrying contractor transported 426,885 gallons, 14 drams of liquors of all kinds as against 4,47,922 gallons and 23 drams during 1916-17 ; out of the total quantity transported during the year 129,622 gallons, 50 drams were sent to the Bangalore City Depot as against 115,010 gallons, 45 drams last year. The remuneration paid to the Contractor for the twelve months during 1917-18 amounted to Rs. 1925-1-5 in the case of the Bangalore City Depot and Rs. 43,350-9-7 on account of the other Depots in the State. The duty and price of the wastage incurred in the City Depot was deducted from the monthly bills payable to the contractor. The total wastage relating to the other 68 Depots amounted to 4153, gallons 37 drams as against 4,251 gallons 27 $\frac{3}{4}$ drams in the previous year, *i.e.*, 1'39

per cent as against 1·27 last year. The duty and price on the excess wastage, after making free allowance of 1·25 per cent on the total quantity transported to the Mofussil Depots will be recovered from the carrying contractor.

17. The carrying contractor experienced great difficulty in arranging the transport by Railway of liquor casks and empties for want of waggon space. Necessary facilities were afforded to him by issuing priority certificates with effect from 28th June 1918, and also by permitting him to establish temporary Store-house wherever necessary; but before this could be effectively done, the stock of liquor in some Depots was completely exhausted and the shop-keepers depending upon them for their supply have applied for compensation. Government have since ordered in their order No. R. 4875—Ex. 5-18-5, dated 26th September 1918 that they are not in favour of issuing any general instructions on the subject of settling the shop-keepers' claims and that the merits of each case would be considered at the end of each quarter.

18. The situation has much improved since 1st July 1918. It has been ascertained that similar difficulty was not much experienced in the Madras Presidency where the Government Ware-houses system is in vogue, according to which strong liquor is transported from the Distillery to the several were-house and diluted to the issue strength there. Liquor was mostly transported by roads and canals which could not be done here on account of the great distances between the Central Distillery and most of the Depots. Under the Madras system the quantity to be transported from the Distillery is the minimum for the purpose of transport. Further the responsibility of carriage of liquor from the ware-houses lies on the shop-keepers themselves. There is no separate carrying contractor in the Madras Presidency as in the Mysore State.

Messrs. Parry & Co., of Madras, have been permitted to transport through Paschimavahini Railway Station 35,000 gallons of over proof spirit from the Nellikuppam Distillery to the ware-house at Mercara during the British Official year 1918-19.

19. *Advance to Manufacturers.*—The particulars of advance with adjustment and the balance are shown in appendix A. From this, it will be seen that Rs. 307-6-6 represented the net amount of gain on the issue price recovered from the shop-keepers as the accounts stood on the 1st July 1917. Receipt from shopkeepers during the year, including the above debit balance, was Rs. 23,023-13-1 more than the amount advanced to the Manufacturers. This excess collection represents not only the gain of Rs. 15,149-8-7 on the quantity sold to shop-keepers during the year but a sum of Rs. 7,874-4-6 due on account of excess issues to shop-keepers as compared with the quantity purchased from the manufacturers during the year.

20. *Transactions in the Bonded Depots.*—Appendix J, shows the particulars of transactions for each District of several kinds of liquors in the Bonded Depots during the year. Receipts under all heads of liquor supplied from the Distillery showed a decrease of 9,557 gallons, 15½ drams and issues to shop-keepers also showed a decrease of 8,138 gallons, 35½ drams, as against an increase of 46,729 gallons, 9½ drams and 36,557 gallons, 34 drams respectively during 1916-17. Considering the large increase last year, the decrease during the current year cannot be called abnormal. Except in Bangalore, Kolar and Chitaldrug Districts, where both the receipts and the issues were more than in the previous year, the remaining Districts have shown decreases.

21. *Incidence of taxation.*—The incidence of taxation per head of population was 8 annas, 5 pies as against 8 annas 2 pies last year. During 1900-01 and 1910-11 when the strength of arrack was 20° U. P. and 25° U. P. respectively, the incidence was 5 annas, 4 pies and 6 annas 6 pies respectively. Excluding the Bangalore City and Kolar Gold Fields the incidence is Re. 0-6-6 *per head* of population and the incidence in these areas is as high as Rs. 5-6-4 and Rs. 5-8-0 respectively.

The following comparative study of the incidence for 1916-17, is interesting.

22. *Consumption of arrack.*—The consumption fell from 419,621 gallons and 19 drams to 409,904 gallons and 32 drams or by 2·3 per cent. The increase in the Bangalore, Kolar and Chitaldrug Districts is not very excessive in view of the growing wealth of the important towns in the State. It is satisfactory that there has been a decrease elsewhere ; but it is feared that illicit distillation is partly responsible for the decrease in the Kadur and Shimoga Districts.

The following statement gives for every district the minimum retail rate per dram of arrack necessary for the realization of the rental amount payable to Government without making any allowance for expenditure and profit to the licensees.

The minimum retail rate below which, sales to consumers would be an offence is 2 annas 4 pies per dram ; and thus the whole of this is being recovered by Government.

The anomaly that the rate of vend rental per gallon exceeded the margin of profit allowed by the fixed retail rate, no longer exists now after the introduction of the minimum rate with effect from 1st July 1917. The prevailing rates during the year varied from two annas four pies to three annas per dram which appears to be fair as judged from the paying capacity of ordinary consumers. It has since been reported from the Shimoga District that some licensees have raised the retail rate to 3 annas 6 pies per dram.

The highest consumption on record was 466,107 gallons in the year 1913-14, when the rental was Rs. 403,721, the strength of arrack issued for consumption was 25° U. P. and the number of shops licensed was 752 as against 722 shops during the year under report. The following statistics also repays perusal.

The consumption figures during the three years noted above when expressed in terms of proof gallons read 241306·4 ; 281,817 and 286932·8 respectively.

During the period of 18 years the rental revenue has increased by 81·2 per cent, but the consumption in terms of proof gallons has increased only by 10·6 per cent and the duty thereon has increased by 61 per cent. The increase when regard is had to the increase in population during nearly two decades, is inconsiderable.

23. *Incidence of consumption.*—The incidence of consumption per head of population was 3·7 drams for the whole State as against 4·5 drams during 1916-17, and for each District as follows:—

The incidence for Bangalore City has risen from 50·22 drams to 55·08 drams.

24. *Jaggory Arrack.*—Separate license were issued for the year 1917-18, and the rental recovered therefor amounted to Rs. 1,428 as against 1,488 during 1916-1917. Certain arrack shop-keepers were also permitted to sell this bottled liquor in their shops. The consumption in all the shops was 1,464 gallons, 10½ drams as against 1,920 gallons last year. The decrease is due to increased retail rate per bottle charged by shop-keepers.

25. *Special Liquors.*—The number of shops sold was 24 and the rental realized was Rs. 23,169-8-0 resulting in an increase of Rs. 4,256-14-7 as compared with the rental for 1916-17. The consumption of these liquors shows an increase of 3,080 gallons, 45½ drams over last year's figure. The consumption had increased from 1,720 gallons, 12½ drams in 1900-01 to 12,564 gallons, 50½ drams in 1917-18, and the decrease of consumption of Foreign Liquors during this period of 18 years is from 49,375 gallons, 12½ drams to 18,677 gallons 17½ drams showing thereby that the consumption of Foreign liquors is being partly replaced by the local made Special Liquors.

26. *Proof Liquor.*—The quantity of proof liquor used for adjustment of weak liquor in Depots at the cost of Government was 38 gallons, 17½ drams, and the quantity used for fortifying weak liquor found in shops was 8 gallons, 42½ drams only. Last year's figures were 102 gallons 15 drams issued free of cost and 15 gallons, 2½ drams on payment of duty by defaulters.

27. *Arrack Revenue.*—The total revenue from country spirit amounted to Rs. 30,08,240-12-9, as against Rs. 28,59,076-3-4 during 1916-17. The receipts from shop rentals were Rs. 7,21,892-4-2 or 24 per cent of the gross revenue and the amount of duty under all items was Rs. 22,56,666-12-7. There was a drop of Rs. 41,801-11-5 in the amount of duty, and a rise of Rs. 1,89,157-8-10 in the rental revenue. The decrease under duty, due to decreased consumption, was made good by the rise in rentals resulting in a net increase of Rs. 1,47,355-13-6. The proportion of still head duty to total revenue has fallen from 80 per cent to 75 per cent. Though this result is not quite in consonance with the approved policy of realizing the maximum Excise Revenue from duty direct, yet the circumstance that the strength of liquor issued for consumption was reduced from 250 to 300 U. P. without a corresponding decrease in the rate of duty, tantamounted to a direct rise in duty which is now equivalent to Rs. 7-8-0 per proof gallon in Mysore as against Rs. 8-2-0 in Madras, Rs. 4-13-9 in the Central Provinces, Rs. 5-14-3 in Bombay and Rs. 9-6-0 in the Presidency of Bengal, for the year 1916-17. The question of still further decreasing the strength of

arrack to 35° U. P. without any corresponding lessening of duty has to be considered, as the strength of liquor in the surrounding districts of the Madras Presidency has been reduced.

MYSORE PHARMACEUTICALS, LIMITED.

28. *Buildings.*—The rooms taken up for the manufacture of the Pharmaceutical preparations, packing and despatching of consignments are being rendered more spacious by connecting the adjoining sides of the old building with a fresh set of rooms. The bond room and the office of the Inspector are proposed to be located in one of these new rooms where it is intended to store all finished products.

29. *Visitors.*—During the year (1) The Honourable Mr. G. G. Todhunter, I. C. S., Commissioner of Salt and Abkary in Madras and 2nd Member of the Board of Revenue, (2) Mr. M. Rama Rao, Special duty Forest Officer, Mysore, (3) Mr. V. Rangaswami Iyengar, Director of Industries and Commerce in Mysore, and (4) Mr. M. G. Srinivasa Rao, Professor of Organic Chemistry, Central Collège, Bangalore, visited the Factory.

30. *Receipts from the Distillery.*—During the year the Company received 1,250 gallons of rectified spirit (60° O. P. from the Distillery under bond as against 1,465 gallons last year, the price thereon amounting to Rs. 3,723-15-4 having been paid to the manufacturing contractors before issue. The balance of the spirit in the Factory on the 1st July 1917, was 18 gallons and 107 ozs, out of the total quantity 1,268 gallons 107 ozs. ; 1,263 gallons 90½ ozs. (including the stand wastage of 16 gallons 114¾ Ozs.) were expended leaving a balance of 5 gallons 16½ ozs., on the evening of the 30th June 1918. The average stand wastage was 107 ozs. per cask.

31. *Issues of Alcoholic preparations.*—(a) Within the State—During the year under report, medical preparations containing 10018·2 ozs. of 60° O.P. as against as those containing 4091·6 last year, were issued to the local institutions for which a duty amounting to Rs. 334-4-8 was recovered and credited into the Treasury. The quantities issued to the Government Medical Stores, free of duty in 1916-17 and 1917-18 contained in them 93727·1 oz. and 1108 oz. of the rectified spirit. The decrease is reported to be due to want of sufficient patronage on the part of the Government Medical Stores during the year. It is not known why indents from the Mysore Government Medical Stores have fallen when supplies made outside the State are on the increase.

32. (b) *Beyond the State.*—The quantity of alcohol contained in the Medical preparations exported during the year including 22,976·6 ozs. exported under bond to Madras for Singapore and Colombo was 223253·5 proof ozs. as against 164807·9 last year and the duty thereon amounting to Rs. 14,083-5-6 was credited into the State Huzur Treasury. The quantities issued to different places were as follows :—

33. *Watch and Ward Establishment Charges.*—The establishment consisting of one Excise Inspector, one Sub-Inspector, two Watchmen and two peons continued throughout the year. The salary, the contributions towards their pension and leave allowances, and the cost of liveries supplied to Watchmen were recovered from the Company as usual, the total amount being Rs. 1,621-10-0 for the year 1917-18.

34. *Rules and Forms of Accounts.*—The Watch and Ward Inspector has reported the marginally noted accounts prescribed under the rules could not be maintained unless the Pharmaceutical Buildings are completed and the stock of all Alcoholic preparations is kept under the custody of the Inspector. The Managing

- (1) Register showing the several kinds of alcoholic preparations.
- (2) Ledger showing the preparation, stock and issue of all pharmaceutical preparations containing alcohol.

Director of the Firm has proposed certain alterations in the Rules. These will be considered separately and a report submitted to Government with a revised set of Rules. The question of framing a new set of Rules on the following points is also being considered.

(1) Publication of a schedule of Medicinal preparations to be manufactured under bond, as annexure to the Rules.

(2) Framing Rules as regards the use of finished preparations and distillates in the manufacture of other preparations of the same or other kind.

(3) Providing Rules for the Examination of samples of all finished products, by the Chemical Examiner to the Government of Mysore, before calculating duty to be paid on such products.

(4) Rules as regards the manufacture of derivatives of alcohol not liable to spirit duty such as collodian from denatured spirits, chloroform, iodoform, etc.

Government have in their order No. 1378-80—S. R. 122-17-2, dated the 24th July 1918, sanctioned the continuance of the Watch and Ward Establishment for another period of three years with effect from 1st July 1918.

CHAPTER III—FOREIGN LIQUORS.

35. *Shops.*—The total number of licenses of all kinds issued during the year under report was 47 as against 49 during 1916-17. Appendix "I Abstract" shows the number of licenses not renewed and of licenses newly issued for the year 1917-18. Thirteen occasional licenses were issued as against three last year, in connection with the Annual Gymkhana Race Meetings and the "Our Day" fete at the Cubbon Park, Bangalore and the encampment of the Indian Defence Force at Mysore. The English draught Beer tavern at Andersonpet remained closed during the year. Dining car licenses also were not issued. A license free of any fee, was issued as in the previous year to the Superintendent of Government Gardens for the supply of Foreign liquors to *bona fide* visitors to the Nandi hills. The quantity so supplied has not been stated in the District report.

36. *Consumption.*—The quantity of Foreign liquors sold during the year was 18,677 gallons and 17½ drams as against 24,762 gallons and ¼ drams sold in the previous year. The details of consumption by districts under each class of license are shown in Appendix "I." There was a decrease of 6,084 gallons 33¾ drams in the consumption of Foreign liquors this year. With the exception of the Mysore District where there was an increase of 109 gallons and 42¾ drams, due to the issue of an occasional license in connection with the encampment of the Indian Defence Force, all other districts have shown a decrease. This fall is attributed in general, to the enhancement in the price of these kinds of liquors and the difficulty in procuring them, owing to the present War conditions.

37. *Realizations.*—Realizations under Foreign liquors including the Registration fees of Rs. 1,440 and surcharge of Rs. 780, amounted to Rs. 11,106-8-0 as against Rs. 10,009-12-0 of the preceding year. The increase was chiefly under license fees. The following amounts were accepted as the annual license fees for the Foreign liquor shops disposed of under the tender system for three years with effect from 1st July 1917.

(1) Bangalore City Rs. 2,553.

(2) Mysore City Rs. 1,630.

Final orders of Government as regards the amendment of the definition of "Foreign Liquor" with a view to exclude cheap varieties of liquors imported from Japan and Java from the category of Foreign Liquors are still awaited. Supplemental and revised lists of Foreign Liquors imported into the Madras and Bombay Presidencies by sea were obtained, and a consolidated list compiled and issued for the guidance of the licensees in the Mysore State. Liquors weaker than 25° Under Proof have been excluded in the compilation of the above list. Weak Foreign Liquors are allowed to be sold in the British Territories; but in Mysore where no duty is levied on Foreign Liquors, such a step will obviously injure the Revenue derivable from country spirits, which is 30° Under Proof.

CHAPTER IV—TODDY.

39. *Shops.*—The number of toddy shops fell from 3,063 to 3,020 as detailed in the margin while the total revenue from toddy rose from Rs. 30,00,823-5-7 to Rs. 30,76,124-5-2. This increase occurred both under shop rental and tree-tax; A drop in the shop rental has, however, occurred in the Districts of Kolar, Mysore, Hassan and Shimoga, aggregating Rs. 63,245-3-0 and under tree-tax in the three last named Districts, amounting to

40. As a result of further reduction of the shops, the number of villages served by each shop rose from 5·3 to 5·5 and the area for each shop from 9·14 to 9·7 square miles and the population from 1810 to 1889. Corresponding figures in the year 1910-11 were 5 villages, 9 square miles and 1,624 persons; and in 1900-01, 4 villages, 7 square miles and 1,392 persons per shop. While the number of shops has been reduced by 22·8 per cent during the past 18 years, the toddy revenue of the State has increased by 72 per cent.

41. The incidence of taxation which was Re. 0-5-4 during 1900-01 has risen to Re. 0-8-7 in the year under report. The number of trees licensed for consumption has on the other hand decreased from 519,537 to 468,020, during the period. So far as toddy administration is concerned, the avowed policy of Government, *viz.*, maximum of revenue with minimum consumption has been successful. The ratio of date tree-tax to the rental was 401 as against 43 in the previous year and that of bagani tree-tax, 62 against 58. The percentage of total tree-tax to total toddy revenue rose from 30·05 to 30·5 and that of shop rentals fell from 69·6 to 69·4.

42. A conference of Excise Officers was held in every District to concert measures for further reduction in the number of shops. As a result of this, 279 date and 89 bagani toddy shops have been closed for the year 1918-19.

43. *Marking Operation.*—Red paint was used for marking all toddy yielding trees during the year 1917-18. The total number of trees of all kinds increased from 422,458 to 458,454 of which 96·4 per cent was for local consumption and 3·6 per cent for the shops of the Madras Presidency as against 96·3 and 3·7 per cent respectively during the year 1916-17.

The percentage of Government trees to the total number licensed in the year under report was 63·5 as against 62·3 in the previous year.

Appendix G shows the details of marking in each district.

44. *Intertapping.*—The statement below gives an idea of the advantages gained by the Durbar and the Madras Government since the year 1911-12:—

45. *Consumption of Toddy.*—This is best considered in terms of the number of trees licensed, as the quantity of yield varies in different parts and in different seasons. This feature prevents the actual valuation of toddy shops being estimated accurately and hence any attempt to fix the rental value of a shop accurately would be futile. As regards toddy, therefore, the auction system of disposing of the privilege of vending should continue. There are advantages and drawbacks in extending the contract to three years. The matter is still under investigation.

The following statement shows the comparative number of trees licensed for local consumption, in the State groves, as well as in the Madras Presidency.

CHAPTER V.

51. *Country Beer*.—Mr. G. Anderson worked the country Beer Tavern at Robertsonpet during the year 1917-18, paying a monthly rental of Rs. 528-5-4. The English Beer Tavern at Andersonpet remained closed throughout the year.

The three bottled beer shops in Bangalore and Mysore cities and at Robertsonpet were sold at a monthly rental for Rs. 130, Rs. 90 and Rs. 75, respectively. Due to the difficulty of obtaining stock of bottled beer from any of the approved Breweries in India, the shops at Robertsonpet and Bangalore could not work with effect from 10th July 1917 and 1st July 1917, respectively. The proportionate rental for 9 days in the case of the Robertsonpet shop was credited into the Treasury. In Mysore however, one Jeevaratna Mudaliar offered to work up the shop if leased out to him on a monthly rental of Rs. 25. His request was granted and he managed to get stock of bottled liquor from the Bangalore Brewery with effect from 1st January 1918. The total amount of rental realised was Rs. 150. Similar arrangements could not be made in the other two places.

The beer canteens at Hebbal were opened during 1917-18 on the same terms as in the previous year.

52. *Consumption*.—One hundred, and sixty-three gallons, 34 drams were sold in the Mysore District as against 251 gallons, 46 drams last year. In the Bangalore District, the quantities sold in Railway Refreshment Rooms was 524 gallons 25½ drams as against 832 gallons, 34 drams and the consumption in the Military Canteen was 95,905 gallons as against 30,503 gallons last year. The decrease in the Refreshment Rooms is explained to be due to the sale of cheap Asaki Beer manufactured in Japan in the Foreign Liquor shops at Bangalore. The consumption in the Kolar District was 17,320 gallons. The total quantity consumed in the whole State was 1,1,3913 gallons, 8½ drams as against 17,428 gallons, 45½ drams during 1916-17.

53. *Akkibhoja*.—As usual the privilege of manufacturing and selling this rice beer was sold only in the Tirthahalli Taluk, and 35 licenses were issued for a sum of Rs. 5,622 for the year 1917-18 as against Rs. 4,272 for the previous year. Nothing has been heard from the Kadur District regarding the manufacture of Akkibhoja for private consumption by those who abstained from drinking arrack. The Reserve Inspector has reported upon the process of manufacturing Akkibhoja detailing the various herbs used to increase the intoxicating and flavouring properties. The Chemical Examiner has been requested to give an expression of his opinion regarding the effects on consumers of the various ingredients used in the preparation of Akkibhoja. On receipt of a reply from him, further necessary action will be taken.

CHAPTER VI.—INTOXICATING DRUGS.

54. *Stock of Ganja in the Provincial stores*.—The stock of ganja in the Provincial stores on 1st July 1917 was 7,569 seers 48 tolas. To this were added 215 seers and 5 tolas being what was picked out of the old stuff set apart for destruction last year and 327 seers, 64 tolas found in excess of the account balance when stock was taken on 10th March 1918. This with the quantity, viz., (1) 11,528 seers, 34 tolas purchased from the licensed cultivators of the Gcribidnur Taluk, (2) 17 tolas of confiscated Ganja ordered to be taken to stock and (3) 10 seers returned by the Amildar of Chiknayakanhalli as being old, made a total quantity of 19,651 seers, 8 tolas.

55. *Issues*.—Out of the above stock a quantity of 12,067 seers was issued to the several treasuries of the State for sale to the licensees, 750 seers were supplied to the Civil and Military Station, Bangalore and 676 seers, 51 tolas, being sweepings and condemned pieces of Ganja were ordered to be destroyed. Thus the balance at the close of the year was 6,157 seers, 37 tolas.

56. *Cultivation of Ganja*—During the year under report, 33 licenses for cultivating Ganja in the Goribidnur Taluk, were issued. The cultivation was carried under the supervision of the Departmental Staff as in previous years. The total area licensed for cultivation was 67 acres and 25 guntas as against 30 acres and 9 guntas in the previous year. The amount of remuneration paid to the several raiyats who cultivated and supplied the drug was Rs. 11,801-3-4 against Rs. 3,944-15-0 in the year 1916-17. The yield of Ganja per acre during the current year was more than last year being 4.3 maunds against 3.5 maunds per acre and the quality was on the whole reported to be better than that of the preceding years.

57. *Price of Ganja.*—As usual the price of ganja payable at the Taluk Treasury by shop-keepers was Rs. 1-4-0 per seer of 80 tolas.

58. *Shops.*—The number of shops licensed during the year was 261 against 257 in the year previous, one shop in the Mysore District being closed, while 1 in Bangalore, two in Tumkur one in Hassan and one in Shimoga were newly opened.

59. *Rentals.*—The rental realised from the sale of 261 Ganja shops referred to above during the year under report was Rs. 1,05,726-4-0 as against Rs. 87,869-8-0 in the year previous thus showing an increased rental of Rs. 17,856-12-0. This increase is distributed over all the Districts of the province.

60. *Consumption.*—Consumption of ganja rose from 10430 seers to 12119 seers, 10 tolas. The increase was common to all the Districts except Kadur where there was a slight fall of 27 seers.

61. *Majum.*—Five seers, 34 tolas of this halva preparation was sold to shopkeepers in the Kolar District. There was no consumption of this in the remaining Districts.

62. *Cocaine and Novocaine.*—Thirteen licenses were granted for the possession and use of these drugs by Medical practitioners during the year as against twelve last year. A fresh license was issued to a firm in the Tirthahalli Taluk. Till now no statistics have been collected as regards the sale of these drugs. Considering the prevalence of cocains smuggling in other parts of India, the District Excise Officers will be instructed to watch the sales in the licensed premises and to be on the alert against smuggling.

63. *Opium.*—The issue price of opium continued to be Rs. 41-8-0 per seer of 80 tolas while the rate payable to the Madras Government whence the supply was got, was Rs. 12 per seer during the year 1917-18. One hundred and nine shops were licensed for the retail sale of Opium, of which the annual rental value was Rs. 29,799 as against 110 shops which had fetched Rs. 25,749 during the previous year. There was one shop less in the Mysore District.

64. *Consumption.*—One thousand, five hundred and fourteen seers, 2 tolas of opium were issued to the shops as against 1713 seers, 37 tolas during 1916-17. The decrease was observed in all but Shimoga, Chitaldrug and Bangalore Districts. The increase in Shimoga and Chitaldrug was small. Bangalore and Hoskote Taluks alone shows an increase of 71 seers 15 tolas. The Deputy Commissioner observes that an organised gang of smugglers is at work in the district, who purchase opium ostensibly for the shops, but accumulate as much of this as could be done without causing short stock in the shops, and convey the stuff so collected to Madras *Enroute* to Burma. A very successful detection of 440 tolas was made by the Reserve Staff in Hoskote lately. The Deputy Commissioner adds that the Range Inspectors of the District have been put on their *Qui-Vive* against the operation of this gang. The use of opium by the villagers when any epidemic breaks out among the cattle, and the reduction in the rate of selling price in some shops seem to account for the increase in places where smuggling is not suspected. In the Kolar District which shows the greatest fall by 200 seers, 40 tolas, the taluks, of Chintamani and Sidlaghatta show large increase while the fall in the Bowringpet Taluk is conspicuous. The Deputy Commissioner attributes the fall as due to prevention and detection of cases of illegal export which was evidently rife in the previous year. There seems to be still much scope for the detection of smuggling cases in this district.

CHAPTER VII.

MEASURES FOR THE PROTECTION OF EXCISE REVENUE.

65. *General results.*—During the year under report 3,171 cases affecting 3,793 persons were reported as against 3,011 cases affecting 3,547 persons in the year previous and including those pending at the beginning of the year, the total number of cases which the Departmental officers had to deal with in the year was 3,486 cases affecting 4,245 persons. Appendix M, gives a classified statement of the offences reported during the year from which it will be seen that 438 cases relate to heinous offences 2,540 to breaches of license conditions and 193 to the cutting of date leaves and trees as against 419, 484 and 108, respectively during the previous year.

66. *Offences relating to liquor.*—No instance of smuggling of country spirits from or to British India has been reported. The Bangalore Deputy Commissioner

suspects smuggling of duty paid arrack from the surrounding village shops into Bangalore City where surcharge fee and registration fee are levied in addition to the duty and price on arrack. It behoves the Deputy Commissioner to get a few cases booked and punished deterrental so as to put a stop to this practice. One case which has been classified under smuggling in the Shimoga District relates to smuggling of toddy from the British groves for consumption in the State. Sixty-five cases are classed under "illegal transport", 24 in the Kolar, 5 in the Kadur, 35 in Chitaldrug and one only in the Bangalore District. It is not understood whether toddy smuggling cases are included under the head "illegal transport" in the district classification. These offences will in future reports be classified under different heading as they are clearly two separate offences, the one involving loss of tree tax revenue to Government while the other is mostly a breach of the license condition on the part of the local contractors.

67. *Illicit distillation cases.*—Numbered 62 as against 73 last year and 32 in the year 1915-16, 56 of these were detected in the Shimoga District, 4 in Kadur and one each in the Kolar and Chitaldrug Districts. The number of cases reported from the Shimoga District last year was 70, and I do not think that the decrease this year shows that there is real abatement of the commission of the offence by the Lambanis. As there is a decrease also in the consumption of licit arrack, it seems necessary to adapt some special preventive measures in the Shimoga District against the prevalence of illicit distillation. As the introduction of low duty areas, and the issue of weak liquor only in certain areas will both lead to smuggling, it seems that a system of issuing coloured weak liquor at a cheap rate, along with the issue of liquor at 30 U. P. may advantageously be tried. This may lead to increase in consumption; but the consumption of weak and sound Government Liquor appears to be less harmful than illicit distillation and consumption of strong and badly made spirits. The staff for the detection of cases of illicit distillation will also have to be strengthened.

68. *Dilution and short measure.*—These offences are very common and afford a convenient means of evading a fixed retail price. The introduction of a minimum price, which enables the seller to fix any maximum he likes might have been expected to reduce these cases, but they have actually increased from 36 to 52. It is not possible to draw any useful inferences till the effect of the system on such cases is watched for a longer time.

69. *Offences relating to intoxicants and opium have slightly increased.*—From recent information there is reason to suspect that duty paid drugs are smuggled out of the state by an organized band in large quantities at a time. The matter is under investigation in communication with the department in Madras.

70. *Date leaf cutting.*—The total number of cases under this head amounted to 193 during the year under report as against 108, cases in the year previous. The increase is seen in Chitaldrug, Shimoga and Mysore Districts and there is a slight fall in the Tumkur District. The Deputy Commissioner, Chitaldrug assigns the increase to scarcity of fodder in the Challakere Taluk.

71. *Departmental Disposal.*—Appendix M 1, shows the disposal of cases by the Officers in the Department and the Magistrates. The marginally noted figures represent the percentage of the departmental disposal in each District. The percentage for the whole State was 90.6 as against 93.0 in the year previous. The disposal in Chitaldrug District tops the list with 99.6 per cent while Kadur with 75.86 per cent of disposal stands the last as usual. This is not complimentary. Chitaldrug had the heaviest file and Mysore the lightest. The disposals are 100 per cent in the Chitaldrug and Challakere Ranges which is creditable to the Range Inspectors concerned. The cases disposed of by warning in the Bangalore and Kolar Districts are too many. Adequate punishment in a few good cases will probably be more effective than so many warnings in trivial cases.

The total amount of fines levied departmentally is Rs. 4625-2-0 on 2,238 persons as against Rs. 5,597-1-4 on 2,264 persons last year. Offenders have been treated very leniently in the Hassan District, the average fine for each person being 10 annas. Heaviest fines were ordered in the Shimoga District (Rs. 3½ per head) and next in order come Mysore, Bangalore, Tumkur, Kadur, Chitaldrug and Kolar Districts,

(Rs. 1-7-0). The District reports give no idea of the actual collection of amounts of fine ordered by them. The Deputy Commissioners will be asked to furnish this information in future.

As the law stands at present, Excise offences falling under section 56 of the Excise Regulation are alone compoundable by the District Excise Officer. With a view to minimise unnecessary prosecution in Courts the Legislature has taken up the question of extending the provision of compounding offences by the District Excise Officers to offences falling under Sections 55, 57 and 58 of the Regulation also.

72. *Pendency of cases.*—Three hundred and fifteen cases were pending disposal at the beginning of the year and 399 at its close. Kolar and Kadur have the largest number of cases pending, and Chitaldrug the smallest.

Disposal by the Magistrates.—The number of cases sent up for trial before the Magistrates was 258 as against 306 in the previous year. Including the cases already pending the total number dealt with by them was 335 as against 365 in the preceding year. All but 59 cases were disposed of by them before the close of the year, the percentage of disposal being 82·3 as against 78·9 last year. In Tumkur the disposal by Magistrates was 57 per cent against 61·1 in the previous year. In the Mysore District disposal by Magistrates was 62·9 per cent as against 85·7 last year.

Out of 474 persons, 327 were convicted, 45 acquitted and the cases against 5 were struck off the file, leaving 97 persons awaiting their trial at the close of the year. The percentage of convictions has increased from 59·6 to 86·74 which is satisfactory. The District reports do not show the number of persons sentenced to imprisonment as a substantive punishment and the amount of magisterial fines levied. They will be asked to supply this information also in future reports.

73. *Opium cases.*—Seven cases of illegal possession of opium were reported during the year, three from the Bangalore District and four from Mysore. Fifty three cases related to ordinary breaches of license conditions. No case on cultivation of the poppy plant was reported during the year.

74. *Assault of Officers.*—One case of this description was reported in the Chitaldrug District in which the Assistant Inspector of Anagood Sub-Range was assaulted by a toddy vendor while he was checking the toddy consignments during a jatra. The case is still subjudice in the Court of the Davangere Taluk Magistrate.

75. *Rewards.*—The amount disbursed on account of rewards and secret service during the year amounted to Rs. 986-3-0 as against Rs. 562 in 1916-17, Shimoga District heads the list while Tumkur stands the last.

76. *Enhanced punishment.*—There is no provision in the Excise Regulation for enhanced punishment of Excise offenders on subsequent convictions, and as evidence of previous bad conduct is excludent as inadmissible unless it is a relevant fact under the Evidence Act, adequate punishments are not being secured even in cases of second or third offenders.

77. *Inadequate Sentences.*—Criminal Courts are apt to overlook the importance of Excise offences prosecuting officers should therefore draw the attention of the Magistrates to the inapplicability of Section 562 of the Criminal Procedure Code; the futility of small fines and the necessity of substantive sentences of imprisonment as deterrents against the Excise offences.

78. *Responsibility of village Officers.*—The patel of any village, where a grave Excise offence is going on for sometime, deserves to be suitably punished if the detection be not due to information furnished by him, or if he shows indifference during detection by an Excise Officer, even though no direct proof of connivance on his part is obtainable. Under Section 39 of the Excise Regulation the village officers are bound to give information of offences that come to their knowledge. The detection of Excise cases will become easier if in some instances suitable notice is taken of the conduct of village officers by the Deputy Commissioners.

Rewards are being granted fairly liberally; rewards given to Excise officials, to Police officials, officials of departments of other than Police and Excise and to private individuals may advantageously be separated in future reports.

79. *Inter-Departmental Relation.* The Deputy Commissioner of Kolar attributes the increase in the number of cases of illegal transport and unlicensed Sale of liquor in the Bowringpet Range to the vigilant and efficient supervision of the local

Police. One case of illicit distillation was taken up by the S. H. O. of Bethamangala but ended in acquittal, the accused being given the benefit of doubt. The District Magistrate has been requested to take steps for setting aside the order of acquittal. A reward of Rs. 20 was granted to the Shekdar of Davangere Hobli for having detected a case of illegal sale of arrack in a Jatra.

80. *Drunkennes*.—The Police took up 159 cases of drunkenness during the year as against 115 in the preceding year. Out of these 153 cases ended in conviction and two in acquittal. Only four cases were pending disposal at the close of the year. As in previous years no cases were booked by the Department against vendors for causing drunkenness in shops. Such cases are in their nature difficult of detection in shops.

81. *Inspection*.—During the year under report Mr. P. Raghavendra Rao, B. A., B. L., my predecessor in charge toured in Bangalore and Mysore Districts; I toured in all Districts and inspected 6 Districts 15 Taluks and 13 Range offices and 16 Bonded Depots besides a number of groves. The details of inspection made by the several District Excise Officers are given in Appendix "O". The following offices have not been inspected by the District Excise Officers concerned.

1. *Bangalore District*.—Bangalore Taluk office, Magadi Range and Solur Sub-Range offices.

2. *Kolar*.—One Taluk, one Range and all the Sub-Range Offices.

3. *Tumkur*.—Two Sub-Range Offices. No District Excise Officer except Hassan, where the number of shops is comparatively small, has inspected all the arrack and drug shops in his District, and it is regretted that this omission has not been explained by any. The Deputy Commissioner of Mysore District has remarked that Mr. B. Shamanna's inspection work in the Mysore District was quite inadequate. "He spent only 71 days on tour during a period of over nine months and the number of toddy and arrack shops inspected was only 15 and 25 out of a total of 760 and 59 respectively. The weekly diaries of the District Excise Officers do not give any comprehensive idea of the inspection work done by them during any definite period. It is therefore under consideration to prescribe a quarterly or half-yearly statement of inspections made and work done, for review in the Head Office.

THE RESERVE STAFF.

83. The Reserve Staff detected 87 cases during the official year 1917-18, as against 61 cases during the period of 8 months from November 1916, in the previous year. Excepting 8 cases of offences relating to breaches of license conditions, the others were important ones. Of the important cases detected in the Shimoga District 18 related to illicit distillation and one to illegal cultivation of Ganja. Thirteen of these were pending disposal at the close of the year, 7 before the Magistrates and 6 before the local Departmental Officers. Three cases of illicit possession and sale of opium and one of illegal transport of ganja were detected in Bangalore City.

In addition to the detection work the Reserve Inspector was employed in the prosecution of 12 cases of illicit tapping of bagani trees reported from Chikmagalur Range and of one illicit distillation case in Tarikere in all of which the Inspector did well.

The Reserve Staff investigated in conjunction with the local staff a case of theft of 40 gallons of arrack from the Depot at Belur. Beyond finding reason to suspect a dismissed Mutsaddi, sufficient evidence was not gathered to warrant a charge sheet being put up. The duty and price will be recovered from the persons whose negligence contributed to this loss.

A case of illegal possession of opium with the intention of smuggling it outside the State was detected in the Hoskote drug shop in the latter part of the year, and was handed over to the Police for further action. It is understood that an organised band of smugglers is collecting opium in collusion with the opium licensees. The Reserve Staff is engaged in attempting to apprehend the gang.

Proposals have been submitted to Government to make the detection Staff permanent as in British India.

In my letter to Government recommending the continuance of the Reserve Staff permanently I have shown the necessity for publishing an Excise intelligence Gazette at least once in a quarter. Its publication serves a useful purpose and stimulates good detective work, and the inclusion of extracts from other Provincial Supplements helps to widen the outlook of the general staff.

CHAPTER VIII.

84. *Financial Results.*—The gross demand under all items amounted to Rs. 66,71,314-11-5 as against Rs. 64,00,526-4-4 during 1916-17. Total collections including remissions amounted to Rs. 56,37,316-12-0, as against Rs. 62,39,681-15-1 and the balance fell from Rs. 160,844-5-3 to Rs. 133,997-15-5 as detailed in the statement below:—

87. *Collection.*—Of the arrears demand Rs. 30,569-7-5 was actually collected and Rs. 15,570-15-1 remitted. The collections were satisfactory when compared with those of the previous year. The Deputy Commissioners will be requested to expedite transmission of the remission papers for irrecoverable arrears.

The percentage of collection of arrears was highest in the Chitaldrug District and lowest in the Bangalore District. The percentage of reduction of old arrears for the whole State was 28·6 as against 25·8 in the year 1916-17.

The total collections under current demand were Rs. 64,91,176-7-6 in the year under report, the percentage of collection under this item for the whole State being 99·7 as against 99·4.

89. *Current year's arrears.*—Excepting Chitaldrug District where the current arrears amount to Rs. 79-6-2 the other Districts show more than one thousand rupees, Mysore District, showing the most Rs. 4,611-7-1, Tumkur, Hassan, Bangalore and Shimoga next in order for over Rs. 2,000, current arrears are very heavy in the following taluks :—

It is hoped that the Amildars of these taluks will endeavour to reduce the arrears.

Most of these arrears have been outstanding for several years past. Out of them a sum of Rs. 5,284-12-10 represents the arrears due by the contractors of toddy farms prior to the introduction of tree tax system. More strenuous efforts have to be made by the District Officers concerned who are being urged to clear up this long standing balance either by collection or by submitting remission statements. The several District Excise Officers have also been directed to note in their weekly diaries the progress made towards the adjustment of these arrears and it is hoped that they will be cleared soon.

were Rs. 60,59,091-13-2 as against Rs. 54,82,251-2-2. The general incidence of taxation per head of population was 1-2-3 as against 1-1-8 in 1916-17. It was 0-11-0 in the year 1900-01 and 0-13-2·4 during 1910-11.

The Departmental Expenditure during the year 1917-18 is 5·33 per cent of the gross amount as against 5·5 last year.

Proposals for the reorganisation of the department involving an extra expenditure of Rs. 87,000 are before Government.

CHAPTER IX.

91. I have been in charge of the department only for a short period, and venture to submit that it has continued to maintain the level of efficiency that Mr. Raghavendra Rao noted with satisfaction last year. The Deputy Commissioners have co-operated cordially with me and the District Excise Officers and their subordinates have on the whole been working satisfactorily. Mr. Sreenivasiengar and Mr. Rayaloo Chetty have both been of great help to me, and the establishment has uniformly and cheerfully coped with the heavy work that they had to do with a limited number of lands.
