Wee have received a paper by your Purser signed by yourself, and dated this day, demanding a Lading for your ship in Persuance of the Direction of Charter-party within 30 dayes in answer whereunto wee promise to use our utmost endeavours to finish the Lading of your Ship within 30 dayes or so much sooner as wee can, and in order to the quicker dispatch wee desire you to take effectuall care that boats may bee dispatched from the ship as fast as they shall come aboard. Dated in Fort S^t: George this 3rd: day of January 169 $\frac{7}{8}$.

Wee observe y^e: [. . .] you alledge for your opinion that the Rajas [. . .] masters of the Countrey & if they are, that [. . .] it with the R^t: H: Comp^s Interest [to] carry [. . .] in that Countrey and that you are going on with the Fortification and intend to quitt the Farmed Sea ports, so soon as you can wherein wee concurr with you.

There have been so many revolutions in the Government of the Countrey that till itt doth appear to bee [settled] we must not thinke of makeing new Factoryes either att Durampatt or any where else.

Inclosed is Invoice and Bill of Lading for sundryes Laden on Freight on ship Fleetwood, Robert Coffee Master being what wee can now send you of the severalls, you have heretofore wrote for, wee have made no bargain for freight, but leave itt to you to pay as you judge reasonable.

Wee send you the Copyes of the 19th: 21st: 56th: 63^d: & 66th: Par: of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Companys Generall Letter to us, by ship Tavestocke dated 16th: April 1697 and of the 17th Paragraph of the Auditor Generalls paper, dated 17 April 1697, wherein you will understand that the chargeableness of Vizagapatam Fac[tory] is blamed; and direction given for itt's limitation [in] order to which lett us have your opinion of [the nu]mber of servants &c^a: necessary for carrying on [the R^t] Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: business as expressed in the 56 Par. [the . . .] charge of your Factory may bee reduced to a certa[inty] in the ordinary Expence.

[. . .] January

This [evening we received] yours of 21st: 23rd: and 24th: Decem^r: with [. . .]. That of the 21st: desireing 10 or 12: Bricklayers [. . .] on your Fortification; wee shall send you some by the next opportunity (this ship being to saile tomorrow). Itt also acquaintes us that your washers hands are full of Cloth but by the accompanying papers itt appeares that you had no bales ready to send aboard the Sidney when she arrived, thô you had notice of her coming for them, which seems very strange considering how long a time had passed since the departure of the Madrasse frigatt from your Port.

Wee observe the notes which passed between you, and the Sidney and the Entries in your Diary and Consultat[ion] for the expeditious sending off the stick-lack, Gunnyes &c^a which tho' itt was dilligently done yet wee cannot blame the Comander for coming away (considering the season of the year) after he knew you had no bales to send off.

You shall have due Credit for the amount of you[r] Invoice Pag^s: 207: 3: 2: for what sent by the Sidney Inclos[ed] is the Warehousekeepers account of the quantity received here of each sort of goods.

Send us Copyes of [the] acco^{ts}: of your Expences kept by M^r: Bridges and M^r: [Mo]rrice for the month of November last which were read [in con]sultation on 13th: December. You will observe that [the] R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company in the aforesaid 56th Paragraph [di]rect the copyes of those accounts to bee yearly remitt[ed to] them that they may examine the particulars.

Our last was 23^d: November overland copy whereof comes inclosed.

Wee send you this by Cap^t: John Hampton in the [Anne] that if she shall arrive with you sooner then the Tav[estock] he might bring you advice of the Tavestock's coming [which] is designed to bee dispatched to you on the 15th: Instant, or so soon as the winds prove favourable, which being a very large ship her demorage will run very high if she shall lye idle in Bengall a whole year for her Lading which cannot bee prevented otherwise then by returning her to us with a Lading of saltpetre and Provisions, upon discourse with the Commander and Cap^t: Hampton, the most proba- ble method for effecting it seems to bee, that she proceed no further then Coxes and lye there to take in her Lading. That you doe upon receipt hereof take the best course you can by the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: sloops and hir'd Purgoes to send down a sufficient quantity of saltpetre and Provisions to lade her, vz^t: about 600 Tons. In order to which wee have by [this] conveyance ordered all the sloops in the road to [repair] forthwith to Chuttanutta but the Thomas which [is] to attend the Tavestock over the Braces to co [. . .] then proceed to Chuttanutta wth: the Treasure.

The Tavestock [. . .] a great quantity of Lead near 100: tons whi[ch . . .] order those Vessells that carry down the [. . .] to [c]arry up, or such part of itt as you think [. . .] to take out. Wee have enough here for our markt and we don't know whether you are overstock'd having no advice of your sales.

On the 15th: past the Chambers frigate brought us yours of 25th: November, and sailed on the 19th Ditto for Bombay M^r: Winder came on that ship But M^r: Davenport did not the Commander pretending that he had not room for him and his necessaries.

On the 31th: December The Sidney brought us yours of 2^d: December and another from M^r. Walsh dated 14th: Ditto with Bill of Lading and Invoice amo^t: Rupees 9833 4: 0: 3 for which wee shall give you Credit whereunto must bee added the cost of the three Cask of arrack when you advise itt, which M^r: Walsh says he could not calculate, because hee did not know their weight.

The difficulty you meet with in Lading the Sidney in the river; would bee greater in Ladeing a greater ship, drawing 22 foot water when full laden, which doth discourage the Comander of the Tavestock from venturing his ship up to Hog river. And indeed itt would contribute little to her dispatch, since she cannot come down from thence unless [she dra]ws less then 18 foot, and the[n] hazardous att that [season] because of her great length and itt seems dou[btful whether] she can with her full Lading goe from Co[al]our all that can bee done is that she lade as deep [as she can] passe with in the judgment of the Pilotts.

Wee [have] received yours of 1: 5th & 8th Instant with an account of Pag^a: 44: 12: 2 expended for Anjenga on [. . .] sent Ⓢ ship Sedgwick for w^{ch}: shall give Cred^t: [. . .] Debt you for the Anchor left with you by [. . .] Pag^a: 32 as itt cost with the stocke which you [. . .] sell, and wee can furnish you with more from 4 [. . .] weight if you can sell them att about Pag^a: [lacuna] Ⓢe.

Wee have sufficient store of match for more then 12 months and expect more from Bengall next year being left behind by the Sidney, which when it comes will bee sufficient store for both Forts so that you need not contract for more then the 20 Candy mention'd.

Wee observe the number of Bales you have ready and expect. Lett them bee sent to us as oppertunity offers that they may bee ready when occasion requires.

It is certain that Zulphaker cawn has taken Chingie and thereby become absolute masters of this Country and if the moors army bee not otherwise employed or diverted, it seems very probable that they will seek some occasion of giveing Fort S^t: David, & ffort S^t: George trouble, as well as Pollicherry. The latter was taken in a hostile manner, for which wee leave others to answer. But Fort S^t: George being for many years possessed by grants of the king of Golconda, and Fort S^t: David bought

of ramraja the then Lords of these Countreys before the mogulls Conquests, so that the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company have a right, strengthened by so many years quiett possession from which right itt is not in our power to depart or quitt to any pretender [without] our masters own order or consent and as we [. . .] entrusted, itt is our Duty to secure and defend [. . .] when occasion requires to the utmost [. . .]. But all circumstances duely considered [wee] fully concur with your opinion (of the 5th: instant), that if the moors doe attempt to take possession of the Towns within your bounds that you doe your utmost to accommodate the businesse but if fair means will not doe, to force them out and stand upon your guard to defend the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company's bounds.

Wee had before receipt of yours, upon the [. . .] notice of Chingies being taken, sent a congra [tulatory] Letter with a present in fine cloth and [their] and Liquors to the value of Pag^s: 260: 10 [. . .] bee presented by Amerjeahn, who still rema[ins] . . .] from whom wee have not yet heard any thing of [their] present design to trouble you and us. The settling of the conquest will probably employ them for some time, and they will hardly attempt any new great thing till they have received the Kings order after advice of Chingies being taken. Itt hath been said the king designed to carry his conquest to Cape Comorine, and if he prosecute that design they must carry their army that way or an army of the morattas may come into these parts.

Wee know of no person att present fitt to serve as your mulla, but will make enquiry. Herewith comes Paper for writeing ordinary Letters.

Ship Tavestock will be in a few dayes ready to sail by the [first watch] of a fair wind, being designed to returne in [March] from Bengall Laden with saltpetre &^{rs}: and if she do's not goe quickly will not have time to lade, and so will stay there till December next att dead demorage. For which reason she cannot spend time with you. The Sidney hath begun to take in her Lading for England, and will we hope bee laden in 10: or 12 dayes. Wee are

On the 5th: instant a ship came into this road, piloted by one William Willock an Englishman, who gives us the following account of himselfe and the said ship. That in January last being master of a free ship belonging to the English of Bengall he was in his passage from thence for Suratt, taken by two pirate ships near Cape

Comorine, who taking out what they thought convenient sunke his ship, & detained him [Prisoner] aboard one of them, which in June last in the streights of Mallacca tooke this Ship and (dismissing the merchants Passengers) carryed her with them to the Island of Negrais whereafter they had careened and repaired their own ship with the help of this and her stores departed from Negrais on the 22 December last first permitting the said Willocks and severall other Prisoners of divers Nations [which] they had taken out of severall ships and [vessells] embarke in this ship, and caused her to sail [. . .] att the same time, that they sailed themselves. [. . .] Pilott finding the winds favourable for [. . .] directed his Course hither, and upon his arrivall declared to us very honestly that he pretends no [claim] unto the ship or Cargo; tho' given him by the Pirate but offered to deliver them into our hands, that they may bee preserved for the right owners, whom he hath been informed is a Chinese who passeth under the name of the Captain of the Chinese of Japarra, whose son he saith was aboard the ship when taken, and being dismissed by the Pirates went with others for Acheen. The Lascars belonging to the ship doe also say the same. The Pilott further acquaints us that y^e ship had Dutch Collours and a Dutch Passe when taken, but doth not remember either the name of the ship nor of the owner mentioned in the said Passe but doth remember the ship was rated at about 120: Lasts.

Wee heartily wish wee were able to give your Hon^r: &c^a: a more satisfactory account of this matter but because wee know no more then wee are informed from ignorant persons, wee hope your Hon^r: &c^a: will excuse that Defect. But from the relations wee have received (such as they are) Wee find reason to beleive that the ship doth belong unto some persons living or sailing under the government or Protection of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Netherlands East India Company, and being readily inclined to lay hold of all opportunityes of expressing the Duty wee owe to the strict alliance and good agreement between our nations & Comp^{as}: Wee desire your Hon^r: &c^a: will please to send & empower such as you shall think fitt to enquire farther into this matter, offering to deliver ship and Cargo to yo^r: order and dispose all if your Hon^r: &c^a: shall find reason to demand the same as belonging to any Person serving or subject to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Netherlands East India Company. In the mean time wee have taken due care for the preservation of ship and Cargo in order to which wee have furnished the ship with necessary anchors and Cables (haveing but one, and that too small) and before any Passengers were permitted to come ashore caused all things found in the ship (except their mean necessaryes and 20 bags rice left on the Deck for the Lascars maintenance to bee putt down into the hold, and the hatches locked and sealed, and so the ship continues att anchor in the road, under the charge of said Willock and Lascars whom he saith did belong to the ship when taken, unto whom wee have added one officer more for better security.

Wee cannot give an acco^t: of the sorts or quantity of goods in the said ship, but the Pilot informes that she was full Laden when taken by the Pirates who threw overboard and tooke for their own use a [. . .] part, that the ship remaineth still about halfe [. . .] and that, among the uppermost goods there app[ear] [. . .] bales of sugar, sugar Candy, and rice, but I know not] what is in the bottom. Which sorts of [goods . . .]&c^a: know are perishable, and if they lye [long . . .] hold they may not onely suffer damage, but [may . . .] contract heat. Wee therefore pray your Hon^r: &c^a: to give a speedy answer so recommending yo^r: Hon^r: &c^a: to Gods Protection. Wee remain

Our last was dated 10th: Instant, sent P Cap^t: Hampton in ship Anne copy P Tavestock. whereof comes inclosed. This comes by ship Tavestock Cap^t: Samuells Jones Comand^r: by which, wee have sent you Rupees 202000: Doll^s 4000 and Lead 1639: Piggs amo^t: Pag^s: 3077: 9: 2. Wee are coining more rupees, and shall not fail of sending you the full sume ordered by the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company as opportunityes shall present, but could not detain the ship for finishing the Coinage, because it is necessary that she proceed for Bengall by the first fair wind, that you may have the more time to lade and returne her to us by the latter end of Feb^{ry}: or begining of March as winds shall favour. In order to which wee have done all that lyes in our power by preadviseing you, as well by our overland Letter of 23^d: Novem^r: last as that sent by Cap^t: Hampton, but the performance wholly depends on the dilligence of yourselves, and the Comander who is acquainted with the design and hath promised to contribute all that lyes in his power towards a Dispatch.

Our next business is to consider how and when the ship shall bee Laden for England. She will require att least 1,500 Bales. Wee conclude neither your stock will alone reach so far, nor ours without a further supply. But wee cannot depend on that, for there may bee disappointments during the warr, or itt may come too late to bee invested. Therefore itt will bee necessary that she bee Laden part from the Coast and part from Bengall either in August or January next. The first is preferrable for two reasons. All the stocke that either you or wee have may bee as well invested by August as January and if she can bee dispatched in August it will save 5000^l^{bs}: in Demorage.

Wee think the best method for dispatching her in August will bee that she returne to Bengall in June or July next with her Kentilagee saltpetre, and as many Coast Bales stowed for Europe, as wee can procure by that time and proceed no further then Ballasore road, where she must take in your Bales, and if she shall want but a [little] tonnage the defect may bee supplied with saltpetre [and] Cotton yarne.

This proposeall is grounded upon a [supposition] that your sloops or hired ships can in th[. . .] July and August carry the Bales over the Brace[s . . .] the road. That itt would be hazardous ventureing the Tavestocke over the Braces when two thirds Laden and that if she should goe in over the Braces she cannot in those months when full Laden goe out either over the Braces nor thro' the new deeps.

But if the ship cannot bee dispatched before Janu^{ry}: we would then propound to returne her to you in June or July next empty, that she go over the Braces as high up the river as the Comander will venture. And that you put aboard her Kentilage, saltpetre, and as many Bales &c^a: goods for Europe as you shall have ready all to bee stowed for Europe. The vacancy to bee filled up with saltpetre, rice, wheat gunnyes, ropes Twine, Longpepper and Bales on freight, and the ship to depart from Bengall for this Port between the 1st: and 10th: day of Decem^r: that wee may have time to take out those Countrey goods and fill her up with our Coast Bales by the 10th: Jan^{ry}: when her Charter party time expires.

Ship Sidney was dispatched yesterday and sailes this day full laden. God grant a safe passage. The Sampson was to bee dispatched from Bengall by the 20th: Instant as by the Agent and Councils advices, and were in hopes she would

have come time enough to accompany the Sidney. But she doth not yet appear and [wee] are not well assured that they have a full Lading ready for her in Bengall. If shee comes hither to fill up, and shall want above 100 bales, wee shall have occasion for some of yours which wee hope to receive time enough since you advise the Brigantine is ready to come with a Lading of Bales. Ship Tavestocke is dispatched for Bengall with 202000 rupees coined of her silver. But she is still at anchor in the road wind bound.

Our business now is to provide for her Lading that she may bee dispatched from India so soon as possibly wee can that so large a ship may not lye on dead Demorage longer then necessary. Advise us by your next how the acco^t: stands with your merchants and weavers upon Contracts, and how much they can undertake to provide by the latter end of May next. Itt will bee necessary to hasten the Contract before the Manilha ships arrive. If you shall want 3 or 4000 Pag^s: wee will supply you.

Wee have yours of 13: 18: 25 and 28th: Instant to answer by which wee received your answer to the Auditor Gene^{ls}: Paper Pacquett to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company Generall bookes G and Consultations to 1st: January. All which were sent by the Sidney except the first paper which the secretary omitting to keep in the place appointed for Papers for Europe was forgott to bee made up in the Pacquett, and being not found till the ship was under sail could not bee sent off. Wee have also received Copy of Bookes G: to bee kept here and observe your Intentions of sending us the Cobby of your Consultations wee desire also copy of your Letter to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company, and of such other papers as you thinke necessary to bee sent again to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company, whereof wee could not take cotypes here att the time of the ships Dispatch wherein all were otherwise employed. Wee design to send them, and Cotypes of our own Letters by the first opportunity for Bombay and expect a ship from Bengall which is bound that way. Therefore hasten your said Generall Letter &c^a: as soon as you can.

Lett our Merchants cloth all ready washed be [. . .] and sent us as oppertunity offers. But lett the re[. . .] Cloth bee sent brown that itt may bee w[ashed . . .] here, there being time enough before it [will . . .] England.

After mature consideration of all that you have [wrote] in your severall Letters concerning the troubles you apprehend from Seilim Cawn, wee wholly concurr with you[r] resolve expressed in yours of 5th: Instant. That you do your utmost to accommodate the business, but if fair mean[s] will not doe to stand upon your Guard and defend the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: bounds and if any of them shall attempt to come into the bounds in a hostile way to give them such civill notice (as expressed in yours of 2⁵th:) that the place was fairly bought and cannot bee parted with.

Wee have already paid the Nabob a civill congratulation of his conquest of Chingee and sent him a Present but he returned part as unfitt for his use (tho' very proper flint ware) wherein his meaning doubtless is that [he] would have something of greater value tho' by Amerjean wee sent him the value of Pag^s: 260: in October last thus doe his demands grow upon us and the more wee give the more he craves, and if wee goe on in feeding his avaritious humour wee shall run into an unanswerable charge and yet his favour is necessary, because it is in his power not onely to stop all businesse which depends on the Countrey, but without the kings order to give us unreasonable trouble about the bounds of Fort S^t: David and our new Townes here, and if he bee inclined to pick a quarrell can do't att any time and aggravate and carry on further then could bee convenient for our circumstances. Itt is in our power to prevent. Money will doe itt but then wee may bee blamed for parting with itt upon timourous and groundlesse suppositions. And if any ill accident shall happen wee may then bee also blamed for want of foresight, and for not preventing the mischeife when itt was in our power. This is the difficulty of our case and wee know no other Generall Rule to direct us, but this, That wee spend money when itt is, and spare itt when it is not necessary to secure the main chance as emergent circumstances require, whereof those upon the place are best able to Jdge.

If the Dutch shall send two of their people and a great Present to the Nabob their Example doth not oblige nor will itt warrant us in imitating them unlesse the necessity doth appear. They are went to spend great sum's of money upon such occasions, and sometimes more then necessary to appear greater then other nations, and there is no end of vying with them in that humour, because they will outdoe us att last. But besides in this case as you observe there is a great difference between Pullicherry and Fort S^t: David, and they may have good reason to pay dearer for the Nabobs freindship then wee. Tho' tis probable if they prosecute their design'd Embassy and Present to the Nabob they may obtain their own end, and do us an injury too if the Nabob should from thence take occasion to demand the like from us, and [put] tricks upon us to force a compliance. However wee cannot send Englishmen from hence to the Camp, which [would] cost allmost as much as itt cost before nor [can] the Dubash and mulla under at least 3[. . .] cannot spare so much money unlesse com[. . .]rent and unavoidable necessity, or secured of [. . .] equivalent nor doe wee thinke itt convenient that [you] send any English from Fort S^t: David to the Nabob, because that will looke as if you had no dependance on Fort S^t: George, but itt may in many cases bee very usefull to you to tell the Nabob or his officers that you cannot comply with their demands without order from Fort S^t: George, and itt may bee as necessary for us to referr [them] to the order of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company.

Wee shall by the first opportunity send you the saltpetre you wrote for and twenty souldiers, which are to bee returned to us again for you have already as many Europeans as wee, and by Letters received yesterday from Vizagapatam they demand a supply from us for secur[ing] of that Factory apprehending troubles from a new Seer lascar and wee must allso suddainly send some to the West Coast. Ship Tavestocke brought but eight.

There is a report here (which wants confirmation) that Azumtarra doth appear to claim the Crown, if itt prove true the whole empire will bee suddainly in a comotion and all his freinds will repair to him.

If you shall find the Nabobs officers troublesome and that to prevent a quarrell itt shall bee necessary to send him a Present, wee thinke the best way would bee that the Presid^t: write the Nabob a Letter, that the Governour of Madrasse hath ordered him so to doe, and send the Letter and present by Vincatee to bee delivered by Amerjeahn if there or by Vincatee in case of his absence concerning which wee shall write to Amerjeahn that hee observe your directions and in the meantime advise you what passes relating to Cuddaloor, which he hath hitherto writt us nothing of which makes us willing to thinke there hath passed nothing considerable in the Nabob's Durbar.

Our last was 6th: past since which wee have received yours of 9th: past by ship Simon wth: Diary and one without date, on the 30th: past with your Diary to the 14th: past adviseing the change of the Government & the approach of the new seer lascar and his severity to the old seerlascars freinds.

That wee may not make false steps in a matter of such importance, and that wee may not thwart one another in our sentiments, wee desire you to consider with us what hath passed, and to peruse the inclosed Copyes of severall Paragraphs of the following Letters Vz^t:

In the first and last you will observe that wee [. . .] misrepresented Vizagapatam to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: [and] in the others, the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: orders concerning your Fortification Investments and expences.

Their order of 1st July 1696 (in answer to ours of 6th June 1695) doth approve of your Fortification, but that approbation seems to bee conditionall Viz^t: [if itt can bee done with the Seerlascars approbation] and that will bee best construed by their order of 11th: Septem^r: 1689 wherein they approve of a Fortification att Vizagapatam if procureable on such like termes as Fort S^t: George is held; otherwise thinke itt is to no purpose to make any great improvement by building or otherwise.

All that wee have written you on this subject is agreeable to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: orders as you will observe by peruseing our letters dated 9th February 1697, 29th: April 1695, 25th July 1695, 2: October 1695, 4 Decem^r: 1696 and 26 October 1697. And wee can give you no other direction then have been given in those Letters particularly dated 2nd: October 1695 and 26th: October 1697 wherein the present case is stated and wee cannot add but by a needless repetition.

Wee shall by the first oppertunity send you ten souldiers and what rarities wee have for presents &c^a.

Wee are sending 20 souldiers to Fort S^t: David, and must suddainly send some to the West Coast but wee rec^d: no more then eight by the Tavestocke.

The Nabob hath taken Chingee and there is no army of the Morattas in these parts.

The Tavestocke is sailed for Bengall, but could not spend time in touching at Vizagapatam because she is to returne from Bengall in March.

Itt is our positive opinion and order that you doe not proceed in the designed additional Fortification till you have gained the Seerlascar's concurrent approbation or connivance but lett the foundation laid bee ev[e]ned to the ground and covered, and so lett it lye till a favourable oppertunity happen for carrying it on. Our last was the 17th: since which have received yours of 16th: giving a further account of the disposition of your Inhabitants towards a removeall, the impatience of Collebeague for an answer, and the necessity of giving a Present to the Nabob with a particular relation to Fort St: David standing on the Chingee countrey now conquered. Wee are of the same opinion especially since the Dutch do take that method, tho' itt will not be necessary for us to vye with them in the charge and pompous show, and beleive our businesse will be better done with a lesser charge if the money be given privately. Lett Vincattee proceed to the Camp and join with Amerjeahn; give him the necessary Instructions. The management of such businesse seem's to depend on Wootumchund, who hath hitherto much obstructed Amerjeahn, and till his freindship bee engaged there will bee nothing effected to purpose. Wee have nothing proper for presents that would bee acceptable to him or the Nabob. Hee is promised a Manilha Trunke so soon as any comes.

By the returne of the Brigantine wee will send you the four minion and four saker guns, which you write for, that being the onely opportunity which wee can expect in a considerable time for sending to you, if you will upon receipt of this send us a List of all stores you want. Wee will by her supply you with all wee can procure and what money wee can spare.

Wee can buy Jagry here att four Pag^s: ☞ Candy or under if you want a store and thinke you cannot buy itt cheaper wee can send you as much as you want.

Zulphaker Cawn hath taken Chingee Fort, & hath given Cuddaloor and Tegupatam towns into the Jaggeer of Gussfur Cawn Governour of Chingee, who hath sent his servants with the Nabobs perwana demanding the delivery of them. How far the Nabob will proceed in this demand wee cannot tell, but whatever the consequence bee wee cannot deliver them so long as they can bee defended, being fairly bought and paid for above 7 yeares before the Nabob conquered Chingee.

Yesterday wee received yours of 18th. advising the treacherous design of Seilim Cawn [. . .] Cudduloor and how prevented. There is mo [. . .] King has ordered the Nabob to goe to Vellore [. . .] Cawn being willing to have possession of the Jag^{geer} . . .] to him before the Nabob went, urged the sending of [. . .] and give him possession of Cuddaloor & c^a: But that the Nabob refused and bid him stay which hath putt Gusfur Cawn upon attempting the seizure in that manner by Seilim Cawn. If this bee true possibly the Nabob will not prosecute in earnest. However there being so many men killed and taken Prisoners he will from thence take occasion to encrease his demand of money and this is the least that can bee supposed. But if it were done by the Nabobs order and design to pick a quarrell, Hee will probably prosecute itt, both against you and us: and if he hath rec^d: any orders from the King, a quarrell here may have an ill influence upon the other Factoryes in the Mogulls Dominions.

Which being considered with our circumstances wee think itt is the Interest of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: to prevent further proceedings of Hostility if itt can be done by fair meanes thô chargeable. In the meantime that wee defend ourselves as well as wee can.

In order to an accommodation, itt will bee requi[s]ite that you send the Horses and men you tooke Prisoners to Seilim Cawn and demand the Elephant w^{ch}: probably he will not deliver. However lett the Horses and prisoners bee delivered with the bags of the false Treasure takeing a writing from the Hands of the Prisoners testifyeing w^t: itt is.

Wee have this morning received yours of 19th: you doe very prudently in being cautious of Ebrahim Cawn Gurry's pretended freindship and of admitting Horsemen or Footmen strangers. Have a great care that the party of 30 men sent to Trepulore bee not cutt off. They will bee too few to withstand the force w^{ch}: Seilim Cawn can bring with the assistance of the neighbouring Phousdars and Polligars.

You did well to send the Nabob an account. Wee will allso write to the Nabob this day and send you the Copyes of our Letters to him, Amerjeahn &c^a:

By the Brigantine which arrived yesterday we shall send you (this night or tomorrow) all that y^o: have wrote for.

Wee have received yours of 20th adviseing Seilim Cawn's returne with 300^{Sent} Horse and 1200 : Peons in order to a second attacque of Cuddaloor. Wee have this ^{over-}land. day sent Letters to the Nabob, Wootamchund and Emam Cooley and Amerjeahn the Copyes whereof in English come inclosed. In that to the Nabob is not a mention of the purchase of Tegnapatam onely in Generall termes that the Comp^s : have enjoyed settlements on this Coast before the King conquered the Golconda and Cornatta countreys. And Amerjeahn is ordered to offer 1000 : Pag^s : to Zulphaker Cawn 500 to Wootamchund and 250 to Emam Cooley. Not that wee thinke that will bee sufficient, but in order [. . .] Wee shall thereby understand whether itt ha [. . .] virtue of the King's order, or onely by the Nabob.

Pray enquire further into the certainty of senn [. . .] his furnishing Powder and shott.

Wee will send you a vessell so soon as wee can get one fitt to lye in the road but wee cannot advise or approve the takeing of any ships, which would confirme the false storyes which have been raised against the English concerning Piracy, and was the first cause of their late troubles att Suratt.

Wee hope you are well assured of Santo Rows fidelity otherwise the more people he brings to your assistance the more dangerous.

The Brigantine sailed yesterday with 8 Guns 20 souldiers 40 Musketts 1000 flints and 4000 Pag^s : There is order given for sending those things you writt for in the last Letter. The small brass mortar and larger shells wee cannot send but shall send 100 shells of 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches if too little for the mortar the vacancy may bee filled with rambed Oacum, and then they will flye further then if shott from the small mortar.

The Letter written in Persian by your mulla to the Nabob is as our mulla sais so ill writt as was not fitt to bee shown the Nabob. Keader Jeahn sett out yesterday from hence, who is said to write well, tho' wee dont thinke there is any confidence to bee putt in such mullas further then meer writeing.

Wee find reason to suspect that Seilim Cawn's actions are by the Nabobs order and that wee shall in time have like trouble by some treacherous contriviances, but whether they proceed from the Nabobs inclination or others is doubtfull wee shall probably understand some thing by the Nabobs answers to the Letter sent him from President Hatsell and from hence, and hourly expect further advice from Amerjeahn upon Receipt whereof wee shall write you. demanding the delivery of Cuddaloor and Tegnapatam town's since which wee are advised from thence that upon refuseall to deliver, Seilim Cawn did on the 19th: Inst: attempt to surprize Cuddaloor wherein being defeated, hee hath gathered more force, and in a second attempt hath burnt severall of the Tegnapatam Town's as by the inclosed Coppy of severall Paragraphs of our last Letter received yesterday and dated 22^d: Instant.

Wee were willing to hope the first attempt was the rash act of Seilim Cawn, but find reason to doubt that the second was by the Nabobs order, which will allso effect this place and if the Nabob hath received any orders from the King, all the Companys settlements in the Mogulls Dominions.

There are Letters sent to the Nabob upon this occasion when wee receive an answer wee shall bee better able to judge, and shall send you further advice. In the meantime itt is necessary that you bee very cautious of the moors pretended freindship and provide for your defence and for your withdrawing allso if occasion shall require. For wee cannot foresee the tendency and issue of this quarrell and indeed doe not understand the true originall, whether itt proceeds from the king the Nabob or others. But itt is our present thoughts that if they quarrell with Madrass you will not bee long free and itt will not bee in our power to send you the necessary suplyes of men and stores, it will bee in vain for us to undertake the defence of soe many Forts, and better to defend one then loose all.

We wish wee had a Ship to send you, but wee have not one on the Coast. If you find occasion hire one to lye in the road till this trouble is ended which if itt bee onely a contrivance of officers to gett money, may soon blow over, but if itt proceed from the Kings order may prove a storme.

the same that the Nabob doth publickly disapprove of Seilim Cawn's act and would not permit Daud Cawn to goe to his assistance, also that 4: or 500 Morattas are come to Vellore, and more comeing and that the Nabob is come to Wandevas in order to his goeing against Vellore. But wee dont understand the bottom of their designes nor the springs of their motion. It will bee a very strange proceeding in a subordinate officer if hee made the attempt and prosecutes itt thus long without the Nabobs order or against his inclination.

Our last was dated 17th: past ☞ Ship Tavestocke which being detained by contrary winds lay in sight many dayes after her dispatch. By her wee sent you Treasure & c^a amount Pag^s: 64129. 1. 3. as ☞ Inclosed Copy of Invoice.

Ship Sidney sailed for England on the 29th: past full laden with Pepper and Coast Bales after wee had taken ashore 2500 bags Petre and 100 bales Cotton Yarne and wee have now remaining in our Godowns of goods for Europe.

Which with about 100 bales from Fort St: David & Vizagapatam is all wee are possessed or assured of towards the Tavestockes Lading tho' if wee are not prevented by the troubles which the moors seem to design against us we might expect 3: or 400 bales more by June next.

In the last month the Nabob Zulphaker Cawn tooke Chingee Fort (Ramraja haveing before escaped by the Nabob's contriveance to Vellore Fort where he remaines) and appointing Gusfur Cawn Governour of Chingee fort gave him Cuddaloor and Tegnapatam Towns for part of his Jaggeer, and sent a Perwana to Presid^t: Hatsell demanding the delivery of the Townes to Gusfur Cawn's people. Which being refused, Seilim Cawn a neighbouring Phousdar under a pretence of Lodging the Kings Treasure in Cuddaloor for a night's security in it's passage to the Camp, did in the morning of the 18th: Instant haveing about 50 men attending the pretended treasure seize upon one of the Gates, and lett in above 100 more, but being opposed and dri[ven o]ut by our Garrison they onely robb'd a few shops [and] two [men] and carried away three Elephants, but left 8 men dead, and 5 Prisoners with 6 Horses and the treasure bags which proved clay and lead. On the 22^d. Seilim Cawn returned wth: 300 Horse and 1200 Peons and entred the bounds burning & destroying the villages till mett with a party of 50 sould^{rs}: who after severall Hours dispute gave them occasion to retreat, and by our last Letter from Fort St: David Seilim Cawn remained without the bounds encamped on a Hill, as you will more particularly understand by the inclosed Coppies of severall of their Letters.

Wee are willing to hope the first attempt was the rash act of Seilim Cawn, but find reason to doubt that the second was by the Nabobs order which may allso effect this place, and if the Nabob hath received any orders from the King all the Hon^{ble} : Comp^s: settlements in the Mogulls Dominions.

There are Letters sent to the Nabob upon this occasion when wee receive an answer wee shall bee better able to judge and shall send you further advice. In the meantime it is necessary that you bee very cautious of the moor's pretended friendship, and provide for your safety, and for your withdrawing allso if occasion shall require for wee cannot foresee the tendency and issue of this quarrell and indeed do not understand the true originall whether itt proceeds from the King the Nabob or others. Tho by many travailing peons merchants and spyes wee are informed that the Nabob doth publickly blame Seilim Cawn for meddling with Cuddaloor without order and would not permit Seilim Cawn's brother Daud Cawn (master of 5,000 Horse) to goe to his assistance and there is some ground of probability, because itt is notoriously known that there hath been an irreconcilable feud between the Nabob and Daud Cawn for many yeares which is lately increased by his pushing on the takeing of Chingee against the Nabob's own inclination and intention but their Counsell are subtile and in the darke, and lye hid from us what appeares is, that the Nabob did give Cuddaloor and the Tegnapatam Towns to the Jaggeer of the Governour of conquered Chingee as the appendance of Chingee, and hath demanded the delivery of them, and upon refuseall the place is attacked by an Army, in which attempt severall Moormen are killed among whom is the brother in Law of Seilim Cawn, wee have right on our side. The Hon^{ble}: Company fairly purchased those Town's of the Prince in possession seaven yeares before Chingee was conquered. And those men were killed in our own Lawfull defence. But wee doubt such arguments will bee little regarded by men flushed with victory and who esteem themselves Lords of the universe, and if they will insist upon their demand, either wee must deliver or persist in Defence, either of which would involve the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: affaires in India in great inconveniences wee have therefore by our application to the Nabob indeavoured to avoid bringing the main point of our right into question, and have rather chose to make an offer of withdrawing so soon as the kings pleasure is known and the Companys orders received.

Wee cannot yett] judge the issue, but thought itt necessary thus far to give you our sentiments and advice supposing itt probable that if the quarrell encrease you may feel the effects of itt in Bengall and possibly in Suratt allso and therefore wee desire you to send the Copy of what wee now write to the Hon^{ble}: President and Council of Surat and to his Excell^y: the Generall by some good merchants conveyance, tho wee intend to write them from hence suddainly.

Haveing no ship here, wee are upon this occasion necessitated to detain the Mary Buoyer (which arrived the 7th: Instant from Tonqueen) to carry men stores &c^a. between this place and Fort S^t: David. She will bee sent y^o so soon as the occasion is over.

28TH FEBRUARY

Since the foregoing wee are advised from Fort S^t: David by their Letter dated 25th: that Seilim Cawn continued encamped on a Hill without the bounds. And that a neighbouring Phousdar Ebrahim Cawn Gurry was come to his Camp and pretends to mediate an accommodation. In order to which wrote to President Hatsell for delivery of the Prisoners and the dead Corps of Seilim Cawns brother, and to give Seilim Cawn some money that he might bee gone. The two former are complied with but the last proposeall rejected. And by their Letter dated 26th: received this day they advise that Seilim Cawn hath raised his Camp and departed to his adjacent Government. But wee have no certain advice from the Nabobs Camp, nor doe wee understand his inclinations. Credible reports agree that 3 : or 4000 Morattas are come to Vellore,

and that a considerable army is coming which hath caused the Nabob to decamp from Chingee in order to the Suddain attacke of Vellore. Wee are.

Our last was 26 past on the 27th: & 28th wee received yours of 25th: and 26 and thanke God for the good prospect you give us of your being freed from the further attempt of Seilim Cawn att least from the present and for the Peace wee have hitherto enjoyed here.

But tho the Nabob doth see cause not to own the act of Seilim Cawn yet wee have no assurance that he did not order itt, or that he will not insist on the demand of the Towns. Itt is more probable that he will, unlesse we comply with his expectation which doubtless are large, and perhaps more then can bee gratified. Wee have no further advices from Amerjeahn then that hee delivered the Lieu^t: Generalls first Letter to the Nabob, but had received no answer from him, nor was the second Letter then come to his hands.

If you apprehend itt safe for Vincatee to goe to the Camp, wee think itt would bee very convenient that you send him to join with Amerjeahn, and the rather because wee suspect Amerjeahn hath unhappily intangled himself in some inconveniences by furnishing the Brain[in]e Renter of the Polimelle Countrey with 30000 Rup^s: being tempted with the great Profit of 5 p Cent p mensem usually allowed on such occasions.

Wee have detained the Mary Buoyer from Bengall to ply between this and Fort S^t: David dureing this occasion but wee cannot by any means approve of your employing her or any other ship in takeing of any ships att Portonovo for the reason formerly mentioned.

There are Credible reports that the Morattas who lately came to Vellore have carried away Ramraja with them and that the Nabob 3 dayes since out from Wandevas for Vellore with the Army onely, leaving the Baggage att Wandevas. Wee are

P.S.

There is a farther reason for Vincatees going to the Camp Vz: that he might give the Nabob a right infbrmation of the manner of Seilim Cawns attempt, and contradict the false Storyes which Seilim Cawn hath and will raise against you to prosecute his revenge.

On the 1st Instant wee answered yours of 25th and 26 past adviseing your sending of Vincatee to the Camp to join with Amerjeahn. This day wee received yours of 1st acquainting us that Seilim Cawn intends to trouble you again, and propounding your opinion that applications ought to bee made to the Nabob, by mean's of Uttumchund to prevent further trouble.

With ours of 22^d past wee sent you Cobby of a Letter to Amerjeahn ordering him to apply to the Nabob for his necessary Perwannas and to offer him 1000: Pag^s: 500: to Uttumchund and 250 to Emam Cooley. Not that we thought that would bee sufficient, but to begin a treaty not thinkeing itt prudent to give Amerjeahn the liberty of giving what he pleases, the reason whereof you have in our last Letter adviseing that hee is intangled by lending Rs. 30000 to the Junckaneer which is also a reason for sending another Person to join with him, for which

there can be none fitter then Vincatee, being soe well acquainted with all Circumstances relating to Tegnapatam. But if you cannot possibly spare Wincatee send another.

Amerjeahn has not advised the receipt of our said Letter, because the Nabob sett out from Wandevas for Vellore and Amerjeahn with him before itt could arrive, but wee hourly expect to hear from him.

In the meantime wee cannot propound any other method of application unlesse wee should recall Amerjeahn and send another, which cannot be adviseable.

Jeamseed Cawn wrote to our Mulla for his family to be admitted here upon which the Governour tooke occasion to write him, and hath received his answer Coppys of both which come inclosed and wee have thereupon resolved to send one to remaine with him as he desires and shall make tryall of his freindship thõ are not willing to trust his family till matters are accomodated. Hee hath been formerly very freindly and is a confident of the Nabobs.

Yesterday the Mary Buoyer sailed with Invoice & Bill of Lading of stores sent (what you wrote for) but wee must repeat our positive opinion all circumstances considered, that no attempt be made by her or otherwise on any ships or Vessells.

As for the Engineer wee shall answer you when the opportunity offers for his going. Wee are

Inclosed is the Copy of our last dated 25th past by ship Elizabeth since which Seilim Cawn hath withdrawn from Cuddaloor, and retired to his adjacent Government, and wee are by severall wayes assured that y^e Nabob hath publicly disowned and disapproved Seilim Cawn's act, and refused to accept three Elephants which he had robbed and presented to the Nabob, and order'd them to be returned. But itt hath happened in this Juncture 4 or 5000 Morattas came to Vellore, whither Ramraja had escaped from Chingee which obliged the Nabob to carry his Army thither. Ramraja upon that news is gone from Vellore with the said Morattas, and the Nabob follows them, but probably no further then the extent of his Countrey, and his returne is expected suddainly after which itt will appear whether he do's really design to trouble us. Att present wee can make no judgment having yet received no answer to the Letters sent him so that wee find reason to confirme the caution given you in the inclosed, and the rather because the last Letters received from Fort S^t: David yesterday give an account of their advices, that Seilim Cawn doth threaten and prepair for another assault of Cuddaloor. Our last was 3rd: Instant yesterday wee received yours of 5th: adviseing Seilim Cawn's preparation for some unknown expedition, and you intend to send Vincatee to join with Amerjeahn, and that hee shall come hither to receive Instructions. Wee thinke itt would bee very proper for you to give him instructions, because you may know many circumstances relating to your Place, better then wee, and deliver him Copyes of all Cowles and Perwannas which have been received from the Nabob or other officers, & Copy of Ramrajas sale, that hee may bee able to produce [them] if occasion shall require, and wee shall give him further Instructions if itt shall appear necessary.

Spye Bramines from the Camp advise that the Nabob hath followed after Ramraja as farr as Gurrum[e]umda and that from thence the Nabob will returne to Sautgur and from thence to Arcott to keep the Ramzan. Amerjeahn is gone with the Camp, but there is no Letter from him since hee sett out from Wandevas, so soon as wee heare anything from him shall communicate itt to you.

On the 5th: Instant the Olive Branch arrived from the west coast with advices of 20th: January that the Amity was dispatched laden in November that the Madrass frigate arrived att York Fort 13th: January & would bee dispatched full Laden in 7 dayes that their Pepper plantations encrease and the Countrey in peace.

9th: March

This morning came yours of 7 adviseing Seilim Cawn and Collebeagues intentions and preparations for a further demand of the villages, and Ebrahim Cawn Gurry's overture concerning the Prisoners and Horses, which wee should bee glad to hear you were well rid off, for so long as you keep them you keep a pledge in your own hands for Seilim Cawn's returne.

Wee have nothing from Amerjeahn. When Vincatee comes wee will send him forward: hasten to us the Copies aforementioned supposing you may have some usefull writeings which wee have not.

Wee shall order the buying of 40: or 50 Candy of Jagry to send you by the returne of the Brigantine which is not yet in sight. We are

Our last was 8 Jan^{ry}. Via Anjengo overland relating to a Japparra ship taken by the Pirates of the Mocha Frigatt and brought hither by William Willock. In

persuance of consultation 6th. January last. wee did by our Letter dated 12 January last make an offer of said ship and Cargo to the Governour and Councill of Negapatam, as belonging to persons subject to their Government and sailing under a Dutch passe & colours which they accepted and by their Letter dated ²⁸/₁₆ Febr^{ry}. deputing Mess^{rs}: Yseinbaart, Grouseur and Hackaart to receive her, wee delivered the Ship and Cargo to them with the hatches lockd and sealed on the 23^d: February who gave us a receipt for the same dated 26th: february but quitted a parcell of goods (China silks &c^a which the Pirates had probably taken from severall ships, and liberally distributed according to their fancyes) which the master, Passengers and Laskars had brought ashore in their chests, as not being a part of the ships Cargo & left them to the ships Company in part satisfaction for their bringing the ship, as by their Declaration dated 26: February a List whereof wee have caused to bee publicly exposed, and a Bill sett upon the gates in severall Languages inviting all persons to make claime if they have any by the 1st of April, Coppies of said Letters, receipt Declaration and Bill come inclosed, which is all wee have to write on that subject, onely that Mess^{rs}: Yseinbaart &c^a sent the Ship out of this road with the Hatches sealed with their own seales on the 28th: February to Pollicherry.

Ship Sidney sailed from hence on the 29th January full Laden for England, with a Cargo amo^t: Pag^s: 86618: 1: 3 besides Diamonds amount Pag^s: 12677: 6: 3.

Our last Letter from Bengall dated 2^d: December advised their Intention and readiness for dispatching the Sampson full Laden by the 10th: January but wee have not heard anything since, wee were in hopes after calling here to accompany the Sidney and her not coming makes us doubt she did not saile so soon.

The Tavestock was dispatched from hence on 25 Jan^{ry}: for Bengall but lay in the road and in sight till the Febr^{ry}: being detained by contrary winds which makes us doubt tho' wee gave notice to Bengall to prepare for her coming whether she will returne from thence in March Laden with Saltpetre &c^a: as designed. Wee have towards her Lading about 400 Coast Bales and 400 Candy Pepper but till wee understand from Bengall what they can contribute, wee cannot foresee when she will be laden for England or whether from hence or Bengall wee would willingly send her home so soon as wee can to save the demorage of so great a ship.

On the 5th: Instant Ship Olive Branch, which sailed from hence in May last to the West coast with souldiers stores &c^a returned with 100: Candy Pepper, and 21 Caske Battavia arrack bought att 12 Dollars φ Cask of 40 Gall: The Letters received from the Governour & Councill of York Fort dated 19th: January last from M^r: Frith are too large to send the coppies by this conveyance. The former give an account that the Pepper plantations doe increase and thrive and yeild great quantities of Pepper. That besides 500 Candy spared by themselves to Countreyship and by M^r: Frith to the Interlopers, and 210 Candy sent hither by the Dolphin and Olive Branch, they have despatched the Amity full Laden in November last, and had sufficient for the Lading of the Madrasse frigatt for England, and of the Dolphin for this place, all which wee compute at about Candy 1500 in the space of one year, notwithstanding the disorders and impediments which happened in the fertile rivers of Sablat and Cattown lying between Tryamong and Bencoolen, which they now write are in a fair way to bee reduced into good order, the principle promoters of those troubles having sued for an accommodation. But M^r: Frith gives a different account and represents them irreconcilable to M^r: Mildmay, because he cutt off severall of the Chief men, when invited to a Bitchar by freindly promisses, without accustomed processe.

Tho' wee might suspect M^r: Frith's representations are calculated with respect to his own justification, yet wee doubt there is too much truth in the reason alledged, considering the matter of Fact and the revengefull temper of the Mallayes which single consideration went a great way in determining our resolve for [to] send M^r: Soam's supravisor, and ordering the Madrass frigate to call att Acheen for him (as advised in ours of 16th: Sep^r: last) and wee are concerned for the Disappointment. The Madrass frigate spending so much time, from the 10th: Septem^r: to 8th: November in her passage to & stay att Vizagapatam, could not gain the port of Acheen and arrived York Fort the 13th: January and by the 20th: was Lading for Europe, & they

write wo^d : be dispatched by the 30th : after w^{ch} : they intend to send the Dolphin hither by w^{ch} : ship we shall send the necessary orders & supplies if she comes in due time wee

Your's of 11th : instant brought us coppies of Ramrajas sale, Zulphaker Cawnes Perwannas & c^a as P list. That Perwanna which Kidder Jeahn translated hath been translated also by M^r : Lewis the Mulla and Ramapa with exactnesse the copy whereof is inclosed and doth agree in sense with that of Kidder Jeahns. They agree that the first part is very well, and very proper to bee produced upon all occasions, had not the latter clause been added (Viz^t : It must bee that the Captain render an account of the revenues according to the established custom) which the mulla doth still positively affirme, ought not bee produced least it render you accountable for the revenues of the Place from the date of the Perwanna, and M^r. Lewis & Ramapa think the words (according to established custom) in the Persian Language capable of various construction which no word in the English Language can expresse fully.

Instructions are prepared for Vincattee but since the 2nd February wee have received no Letter from Amerjeahn, nor do wee certainly know where the Nabob is, or how far he (will) goe or when returne, nor what number of Morattas are coming into the countrey. The onely probable account is that Ramraja is gone for Parrarra, that the Nabob followed beyond Gurrungunda and there waits the Kings order for his further proceeding. And wee have no certain account of what you write concerning Daud Cawn and Birojee Gulpura so soon as wee receive better advice, we shall send Vincattee forward.

The losse of 10,000 houses and their Inhabitants is very great, and not reparable in many yeares. But it ought to bee considered whether an account of damages may bee presented to the Nabob in such manner as to bee transmitted to the Kings notice tho' a demand may doubtless bee made of Seilim Cawne for the utmost damage to terrify him.

The Brigantine brings you Jagry & c^a as P invoice & bill of Lading which will bee sent therewith and Cap^t. Werlinghoff doth according to your desire take his passage upon her.

The Mary Buoyer will bee wanted in Bengall wee therefore desire you to send her hither, unlesse you have a present occasion for her, and when you have occasion wee had rather you would hire another Vessell then detain her. Wee are

By our's dated 10th : January wee acknowledged the receipt of your's dated 25th November ☞ Chambers frigate and 31 D^O : ☞ Eagle and 2^d : December ☞ Sidney. On the 12th : instant we received your Pacquet ☞ ship George dated 3^d : February, and your Letter dated 5th : February by Ship Wanstead, and on the 13th March yours of 29th . January by a Portuguez ship of S^T : Thoma, who kept the letter three dayes after arrivall as they generally doe whereunto wee returne the necessary answer.

25th : November.

2. Wee had been informed that the same pepper which was bought att 8 rupees ☞ mā^d : was att the same time sold to the Hon^{ble} Company att 10^{ra} : ☞ mā : which was the occasion of enquiry, but the information proving wrong there is an end of that matter.

3. Mr. Winder came by the Chambers Frigate who stood accused in your Generall Letter of 4th : March 1697 of corresponding with the Interlopers, and Lading Goods upon the Ship, notwithstanding his promise to the contrary, for which reason wee ordered him hither, understanding the sense of your Letter (hath falsified his word and laded severall peices of goods for England) thus, that whereas he had by your leave received from y^e : Interlopers some consignment made to him by his Brother without his knowledge, and had promised not to Lade any upon the ship, yet had Laden the returnes of that consignment, and did not understand itt otherwise till Mr. Winder upon examination doth freely offer his oath that he never did nor designed to Lade any goods, and onely gave a Dutchman to bee delivered to an officer of the Ship 3 night rails, 2 p^s of Mull[mulls,] and one quill for a present to his sister, which upon notice of your dislike recall'd it which design of his tho' utterly disapproved, yet differs much from lading Goods (in the common acceptation) and considering

the Apology you made for him in the same Letter that he had not been otherwise guilty, and was a necessary diligent servant, and particular Letters from some of yourselves to some of the Councill here expressing a desire of his returne, wee had agreed, tho' 'twas not convenient that he should returne presently yet that he should returne so soon as the Interlopers Ships were gone. But upon perusall of your Generall Letter to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company by the Sampson dat^d. 20th: January in the Post-script you advice them in generall terms (M^r. Bowridge and M^r. Winder being found guilty of corresponding with the Interlopers they were ordered up to the Fort upon our advices of the matter of Fact) but you do not advise them what the matter of ffact was, or what the difference between Bowridge and Winder so that the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Company will by your Letter conclude Winder as Guilty as the other & will expect that wee should deal with him accordingly and if wee returne him to you will not their Hon^{rs}: thinke that you having faithfully discharged your Duty, wee have a favour for the Interlopers & such as correspond with them w^{ch}: consideration hath for some time occasioned a Demur to his returne.

4. M^r. Davenport came by Ship Sidney concerning whom you informe us that you have nothing to say further then that he has been serviceable to y^e French in bringing up their Ships and Vessells but there being no instances given of particulars, and nothing Criminall to bee found in any register of Fort S^t. George, nor confessed by himself on examination in such manner as to fix a processe against him in Court, wee have accepted his Bond for his good behaviour & appearance when called. In the meantime if you have any proofes against him, wee desire you to remitt them and to give him what assistance you can in getting in the severall Debts which he alledges are due to him from severall in Bengall as by an Account of particulars w^{ch}: will come inclosed if he delivers it, and pay the money wⁿ: received according as he shall therein direct.

31st. December.

5. The Computation you sent us of the Sidneys Tonnage was forwarded to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company by the same Ship with due deduction of what Laden short.

6. The Sidney touched att Vizagapatam but they had no Bales ready.

7. Cap^t: South's refusal to take Francis Davenport on board was advised by the same Ship to his Excell^r: &c^a:

8. The Mary Buoyer was (as advised in ours of 26th: past) detained for the service of Fort S^t. David they writeing for her, but the occasion seeming to be intermitted by the Nabobs removall, wee have sent for her and now returne her to you with Rupees 7193.

9. Of the 180 : bales Cotton yarne you sent us by the Sidney wee continued on Ditto Ship, but 80, and reserved the rest for other Ships having other Bales enough to fill the Sidney.

10. Wee observe the particular account you give of the applications designed by yourselves and made by the Dutch and Interlopers to the Prince and Duan. The large sums paid and offer'd by the Latter for one Ship, layes the foundation of the ruine of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Companies trade in Betgall.

11. The Cotton received by the Chambers frigate sold here att above 20 Pag & Candy.

12. You bought 4000 bags of Petre att Hugly, and now advise the receipt of 10000 : from Pattana wee can't call to mind that you have since sent away any but by the Sidney, Sampson and George. But the List of goods remaining for Europe 5th. February last mentions, but 2200 mads and your Letter to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company by the Sampson mentions 1000 : Tons in the House. There is a mistake in one of the advices.

13. As to M^r. Peaches Goods you will have an answer in the following Paragraphs, and concerning M^r. Stanley.

Wee are very sensible with you that you have had too small a Stock for carrying on your businesse without Credit, and by the Tavestock will have

a lesse for a greater Ship but wee have alwayes sent as much as possible we could (frequently paying Interest for moneys sent you) and shall make up the stock ordered by the R^t: Hon^{ble}. Comp^a: £30,000.

14. Wee design to send M^r. William Warren (late Chyrurgeon of Tonqueen) to you by the Mary Buoyer or so soon as business depending in the Court can be finished.

29th: January.

16. The Sampson did not call here or if he had, it would have been too late to accompany the Sidney, who sailed from hence on the 29th: January. We doubt not but the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company will accept your good service in compleating so good a Lading for the Sampson, and sending so much hither towards the Lading of the Sidney.

3^d: February.

17. The Copsy of your Letter to the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: ☿ Sampson, shall bee forwarded by the first opportunity.

18. Wee desire you to peruse our Letter of 4th: February 15 & 17th: March 169⁹ Par: 11: 12: 13 and our Letter of 6th: April 1697. Par: 1: 2: 3: 4: 5 and consider with us what answers y^o: have returned. Your Letter of 27th: May 1697 tells us that you will give an answer by the next, the Agent being then indisposed 12th: June. The Agent being recovered y^o: will answer suddainly 16th: August. That the answer requires more time then was foreseen and therefore desire our patience.

28th: August ☿ Wellfair. That you have made the utmost enquiry in M^r: Peachies business, and send us papers relating thereunto.

When the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company read this, they will conclude that you had sent a perfect answer to all that ever we had wrote for in our said Letters or before: but the List of the Pacquett ☿ the Wellfair mentions onely account of Maulda Goods sent to England. Answer to Attorney Generalls queries. List of M^r: Peachies papers, and Copies of his Persia and Gentue papers and no answer then nor since to all these aforementioned 11: 12 and 13 Parag: wherein you will find 12 queries propounded, which can be answered by none but yourselves. Whereupon wholly depends the question relating to M^r. Peachies overvaluing of the whole Maulda Investment; which cannot be brought to an issue without your answer.

19. In our said Letter of 4th: February 169⁹ we acquainted you that we demanded of M^r: Peachie the writings of Maulda Factory, and desire you to send us a List of them in his Boxes, and copyes of what related to the last Investment with an account of what you know concerning those which he alledges were lost in the Warr.

You have sent us a List but you have also sent us more papers then were contained in the List. Therefore that List is not true nor fit to be produced in a Court. Wee advised you of the defect but instead of sending us a perfect List, you tell us, that M^r: Peachies papers are kept together and none lost or embezled, and give no account of those said to bee lost in the warr. What all can be made of that answer in a Court, or how can that matter be brought to an issue.

You send us M^r. Peachies Account Curr^t: as it stands in your Bookes, and design to bring some rupees and Mohurs of his into the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Companys Cash. If you had not time to bring them into Cash before, you might now have told us how many rupees and Mohurs there are, that he might have due Credit for them, and for the Collobutta &c^a: mentioned in the Bengall Consultation 26th: October 1693 to bee delivered into the Hands of Agent Ellis, which he saith was delivered by him to Agent Eyre's.

20. If you peruse our Letter of 24th: June 1695 sent ☿ Martha with M^r. Peachies returned Bales you will find that wee then desired the following.

- (1) Invoice of Maulda Goods sent home to y^o: R^t: H: Camp^a.
- (2) Valuation of those goods.
- (3) List of Maulda writings.

The second was sent with your Letter of [*lacuna*]. Wee advised you of a defect in itt, but you gave no answer.

The first and third wee received with yours of 28th: Aug^t: 1697. The latter defective, and you dont think fit to make itt perfect. And all this while those Bales lye in your Godown, and you complain they will receive damage to prevent which you desire for their disposall. Judge you by the foregoing whether it bee our fault or y^r: own. M^r. Peachie is so perverse that he will not give any pertinent answers to any thing, and you have not sent us the necessary answers required. How can this matter bee brought to an issue. Wee know you have much business especially in times of trouble with the Government and Interlopers, and possibly you have not had time to spend upon such things but the fault if any bee, is not ours.

21. There is a new seerlascar of the Gingerlee Countrey Rustumdill the son of the Golconda Suba, who begins to bee troublesome. The Factory hath been supplied wth necessarys from Hence.

22. Wee have advice from York Fort of the safe arrivall of Madrass Frigat in January last, from whence she was to bee dispatched full Laden by the ult^o: January and the Amity from England was Laden from thence in November. On the 5th: instant the Olive Branch arrived with 100 Candy pepper. The Ship being unfit for service without great repair, we have broke her up: wee suddainly expect the Dolphin again wth: a Lading of Pepper, and intend to returne her to the West Coast with necessary supplies.

23. Wee can say nothing concerning the Tavestocke till wee hear from you wee are advised from Vizagapatam she touch'd there, and proceeded on the 15th February.

24. M^r: Stanlyes persisting in a scandalous cohabitation with a woman of ill fame, whom he will neither leave nor marry, and his refusall to proceed on the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Comp^{as}: service to the Prince upon frivolous pretences of want of necessaryes, which would cost but 20: rup^s: deserve suspension, and wee thinke he ought to stand suspend'd till the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Companys pleasure be known and if you apprehend him troublesome in Bengall order him to proceed hither when the Monsoon serves.

25. You did well in sending M^r. Ravenhill hither with his accusation and answer which hath not been fully examined.

26. Wee have received the Petre by Ship George 2000 bags and leave ship 500 for freight in specie. It is very course black and dirty and desire no more on freight, having now [*lacuna*] bags, which with what the Tavestock or other Ships of the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Companys will occasionally bring is a sufficient store unlesse twere better.

27. Wee have sent the silke wormes received by the George to Fort S^t. David, and observe you cannot Φ swade any natives to come with them. Wee fear these will also prove dead and useless.

5th. February.

28. We have received the Invoice and Bill of Lading for the Bombay Iron & Nails Φ Ship Wanstead which wee expected by the Sidney.

29. Your Letter of 29th: January requires no answer, and also that of 2^d: December Φ Sidney hath had the necessary answer except relating to M^r: Bowridge whom you advise that you have sent by that Ship, and that he hath paid 214 rupees for his two Childrens passage for England.

30. M^r. Bowridge upon his arrivall here being examin'd concerning his dealing with Interlopers, and your information perused, wee have permitted him to take his passage on Ship Sidney. Wee inclose the Copyes of the Entryes in our Consultation and of the Examinations taken here. Wee find in your Consultation 21st October last (received since) that you did not consent to his Discharge but referred him to the Fort for a discharge, whereof you advise us not, and deliver to himself papers amounting to a discharge. The reason whereof wee can't understand nor why Hartop so materiall a wittness (who came hither after Bowridge was gone) was not examined from May to September last, nor why the Agent should give M^r. Bowridge Dusticks for such great quantities of goods proper for Europe, or permitt him to goe down the river with his Laden Sloop.

31. Wee do upon this occasion thinke it necessary that the following Rule bee observed Vz^t: That the Agent grant's no Dustick's for any persons, or for any occasion whatsoever, till the copy thereof (Vz^t. the name of the person and Place, and particulars of the Goods) be Entered in a Booke to bee kept for that purpose, and copy of each Dustick signed by the Agent and at least one of the Councill in the s^d: Booke and y^e booke to lye every consultation day upon y^e Table for perusall.

5th April 1698.

32. This day Ship Sedgwick arrived from Anjenga & brings us the inclosed Copy of an Account of the Pirates actions on that Coast, and the Sedgwick in her returne from Anjengo was taken by the Allgerine Galley one seivers a Dutchman Commander an Extraordinary sailer and rowes with 24 Oars 250 Tons 150 men & 28 Guns but was dismissed, without impairing her Cargo (which was nothing but pepper, and not for their turne) but they rob'd her of two new Duck courses, their Cable, cordage, Pitch, Tarr &c^a Stores.

33. Wee have no advise of the arrivall of the Bedford, or Dorothy but are advised of the Chambers frigate, and Frances, safe arrivall att Bombay.

34. This comes by the Mary Buoyer Cap^t: George Weoley Comander who brought her from Bombay, recomended by His Excell^y: as an able man, and so he hath approved himself in the Tonqueen Voyage, and a careful good Husband and wee observe no fault in him, but that he doth too much overvalue his own abilities.

35. Inclosed is the Invoice and Bill of Lading for rupees and Cables amount Pag^s: 2870:24:2 wee send no more rupees, because wee have no more. Wee send the Cables because wee have more here than wee can dispôse of, and it seems probable that you will dispose of them sooner in Bengali.

Since our Last of the 16th of March Seilim Cawn ha[th] advanced with his Army, Ladders, rocketts &c^a near Cuddaloor but returned without making any attempt. Amerjeahn remains still att the Camp treating with the Nabob and gives a probable Account of an accommodation but the issue is not yet certain. There is one unlucky passage in the Account of Kidds piracyes in February last vz^t: that he told the Persian Factor of the Quedda Merch^t: that he tooke the Ship by Commission from the King of England, whereof the Persian intends to complain to the King.

On the 19th Instant wee received yo^r: of 20th: past by Ship Fleetwood and on p Boat. the 20th: Instant your Pacquett by Peons dated 28th: past with papers according to List. wee returne your Peons by this Boat belonging to John Parera whose Factor desires your Liberty and assistance for bringing the Boat into your river and her repair.

This is not intended for a full answer to your Letters but onely to inclose the Copy of our Last dated 4th: Instant and to confirm the caution given you in that and a former of 25th. past. Since our last the Nabob proceeded as far as Seerpe in persuit of Ramraja, and wee are this day informed, that he is coming back half way to Chingee but wee have received no advices from the Camp tho' have many people there in 25 dayes. On Saturday last Selimon Cawn came within ten miles of Cuddalore with 200 Horse and 300 foot prepared and designed for the third attack of Cuddalore, but return'd without making any attempt. Wee remain still doubtful of the Nabobs design, and therefore you ought to preparè for the worst, and hasten in Your Cloth as fast as you can, and give out no more money or but little att a time to the Merchants till you receive further advice from us, which wee shall not fail in sending y^o: as occasion requires and opportunities offers.

You write that it is impossible to reduce y^e Factory charges to the regulation of the R^t Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: and therefore desire to be acquitted wherein you seem to make too suddain a resolve. Pray give us your opinion as desired in our's of 6th January of the number of servants &c^a necessary for carrying on the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: mercantile affairs (Vz^t: those Six Heads mentioned in the 66th Parag^o: of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: Letter dated 16th-April 1697. Dyett Factors Provisions, Servants Wages, stores and Garden) there is a difference between a Factory and Fortification and between ordinary charge in the common course of Investments, and Extraordinary charges occasioned by accidents, and though a Horse is convenient for state yet you may carry on your business without one,

Wee have received your severall Letters of [*lacuna*] Ins^t since ours of 18th with Translates of papers relating to Selim Cawn and have been in daily expectation of receiving advices from Amerjeahn from the Camp that wee might understand where the Camp was, and whether he had Entred into a treaty with the Nabob. Last night our Peons came from the Camp who advise that the camp was 8 dayes agoe beyond Gurrungunda, and that the Nabob designed to go (after hee had finished some business with Polligars) against Vellore. They brought a Letter from Amerjeahn the translate whereof comes inclosed with the copy of our this dayes Consultation relating thereunto in persuance of which Ramapa and Vincatte will proceed so soon as Presents, Bills, Instructions &c^a: can bee finished. Itt doth not seem probable that the Camp will be suddainly settled in anyone Place.

Wee have for a considerable time past had various reports, that a great Army of Morattas were coming to retake Chingie but they dont appear that att the Kings Camp Assid Cawn was in disgrace, that Azumtarra had began a rebellion against his Father that Aurungzeb was grown very crasy and incapable of Government. But a very intelligent man who came very lately from thence and had occasion to attend the Mogulls Durbar three moth: doth inform that Assid Cawn doth appear to bee

in as great favour and power as ever, and indeed the onely minister of state since the death of Bahadar Cawn that Azumtarra lives att liberty att some distance from the King with an Army but no appearance or discourse there of rebellion or disturbance. That the Mogull doth himself sitt out to do justice daily once or twice a day and once a week rides a Horseback to the Mosque and if this bee true we have no reason for a present regard or expectation of alterations in the Empire.

This night Letters will bee sent to Amerjeahn and if anything of importance happens with you, you may write him either in Persian if it ought to be shown, or in gentue. Wee are

Hon^{ble}: Company having wrote, that it is in vain to spend much money upon Vizagapatam unlesse a gra[nt] could bee obtained for a Fortification, and you writing that it is impossible to expect a grant of Permission, wee think itt is vain for you to goe on with and spend money upon a Fortification till such a grant can bee obtained as the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Company requires. you have a Lease of Vizagapatam, when that termes expires it is in the Seerlascars choice whether he will continue it, and upon what termes. There will bee a constant trouble and Charge upon renewall of the Lease, and upon change of the Seerlascar as you have already found on Rustundells succession.

Wee shall pay M^r: Chardine the freight of Goods sent by Ship Simon.

Inclosed is the List of Souldiers sent by that Ship and their Pay.

Wee cannot send a Chyrurgeon at present being oblig'd to send one to Bengall.

Itt will not be convenient that M^r. Morrice continue in the R. Hon^{ble} Comp^s: service after the committing such an extravagant Folly, unless you bee fully satisfied in his reformation, or he was forced away by the Souldiers.

On the 5th: Instant the Lieutenant Generall sent you the Translate of a Letter from Amerjeahn. On the 2^d Ins^t: wee received yours of the 30th: past, and on the 4th: y^{rs}: of 2^d: Instant, and this day yours of 5th: Instant with the severall papers and translates of Letters which have passed between you and Seilim Cawn. By which it doth appear as you write, that Seilim Cawn has a mind to gett something under your Hands which may amount to a discharge and his last Letter is meer wheedle, wherein he doth not promise satisfaction (as is expressed in your Translate) but onely promises freindship for the time to come, if you will bee freinds and by his freindship make amends.

There is no doubt but the Horses should [be] deliver'd to such as deliver you the Elephants and we wish you rid of them.

Wee shall pay your Bill Pag^s 500: to M^r: Chardine when demanded.

The Copies of the Letters from and to Seilim Cawn will bee sent too [sic] night to Amerjeahn with a Letter Cobby whereof, and of two Letters last wrote to him come inclos'd.

Ship Sedgwick arrived the 6th: Instant from Anjenga and brought a Generall to Fort St: David, which comes inclosed, with a narrative concerning Kidd the Pirates proceeding's on that Coast, which if copped will come herewith or by the next. The Sedgwick as going was persued three dayes and 3 nights by Kidd, being calme weather, and Kidd outrowing her she narrowly escaped by favour of a Breeze of wind in which she out sailed Kidd, but was taken in her returne near Cape Comorine by Chivers a Dutchman in the Algerine Gally of 250: tons 150 men and 28 Guns and 24: Oars after 9 houres persuit with sails and Oars. But the Cargo not proving for their turne, and the Cap^t: giving the Company a bow'l of punch they lett her go in a good humour taking only sailes Cordage, cable &c^a: Stores.

M^r. Vicessimus Griffith doth alledge that the money for which Tominas conocples house sold for ought to be brought to his Credit, being the Hon^{ble}: Companys debt. Lett us know how much it amounted to and how itt hath been or ought to bee disposed. Wee are

Our last was 29th: ~~P~~ Ship Simon last night wee received yours dated 22: Ditto by Peons advising Rustindills design of sending an Army against you, and your intentions of defending the Factory, and desiring a supply of men, armes, Amunition and Ships.

By the next Ship that sailes from hence for Vizagap^m: (which wee are informed will bee in few dayes) we design a more full answer, and now returne the Peons to acquaint you that the treaty with our Nabob is not yet finished and wee do not know the issue, tho' wee have reason to hope from what doth yet appear, that he designes (for money) to putt an end to the Fort S^t: David trouble, and to grant the desired Perwannas, and wee are willing to think that Rustundills proceeding are not really grounded on advice from the Nabob, but rather on the accustomed demands which new Seerlascars impose on the Country renters. But whatever his demands are or the grounds of his offence, if he shall send a force against you, which will necessitate you either to deliver the Place, and yourselves into their power, or to defend yourselves by Hostility; rather then Enter into an hostile engagement with his Army acquaint them that you are ordered not to fight but to quitt the place, and if they [will] give you leave to carry away your goods [. . .] will goe quietly aboard Ship and accordingly [. . .] all either to Bengall or this Place as the winds [favour].

And that you may not bee impeded [in your retreat] cause the Goods and necessaryes of the Factory to be first aboard, before you give the notice after which if they sho^d endeavour to stop you, you may the more easily gett aboard when you have nothing but your Persons to carry off.

Wee have no ship here fitt for your service, but if Mr. Holcombe can spare one or two of his Ships for such time as the Factory shall have occasion, wee will allow him a sufficient Hire, as much as he can in reason desire. Wee cannot spare any men from this Garrison. We are

Our last was the 7th Instant. This inclosed Copy of a Letter received last night from Vizagapaam dated 22^d March. Upon the first notice of Seilim Cawnes attempt on Cuddalore wee advised Vizagapatam y^t: they might provide for their security and because we did not know the consequence and issue, if it should prove a Breach with the Moors, wee ordered them allso to keep themselves in a readyness for with drawing if occasion should require. Now by the inclosed they apprehend themselves in danger of being attacked by a great force, by order of the new Seerlascar Rustundill upon the account of the fight att Cuddalore whether [this] be the true

reason or no, or Zulphaker Cawnes advice (with whom he holds Correspondence) wee cannot tell but if Rustundill shall beseidge Vizagapatam, & there shall follow acts of Hostility on our part, tho' merely defensive, there is great reason to apprehend notwithstanding the present treaty with the Nabob for Perwana, that Fort S^t: George and Fort S^t: David & probable Bengall will bee involved in the same quarrell, and we cannot foresee how farr the Nabob will proceed against us, there being no moratta army to divert him.

It behoves us to consider whether in case of such Extremity wee shall bee able to defend Four Forts.—Fort S^t: George, Fort S^t: David, and Vizagapatam and Bengall, and whether wee ought not to withdraw some for the preservation of the rest & w^{ch}: to withdraw and which to defend. The Agent & Council of Bengall have advised the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company in their Letter by the Sidney that they are strong enough to defend themselves against any Country Force. From Vizagapatam they now write for Ships and men. But we have no ship nor can spare men.

We desire your Hon^r: to consider this Question [and] give us your opinion so soon as you can conveniently, there being a Ship bound thither in six or seven dayes. By which wee intend an answer to this Letter.

There is an advice from Anjengo that the Chambers frigate is employed this year in the convoy of the Mocha Fleet and possibly Rustundills quarrell will pro[. . .] but the accustomed demands which new Se[. . .] make upon the Country renters, upon acco[. . .] the sea Ports rented by Mr. Holcomb [. . .] know the Counsells and designes of the [. . .] thinke it best to take the most prud [ent . . .] secureing the main chance. CAMP DATED 19TH APRIL 1698.

I received your letter of 16th. this day, and on Sunday your's of 14th. which I have perused and four more which I received last week all which being written in Armenian, I could not understand them till interpreted by Coja Gregoria, who sometimes is very full of business which is the reason I could not answer you so soon as I would.

I perceive you meet with a great deal of trouble and that the people do not keep their words. You formerly thought Wootema Chund was contented with 12000 : Rupees for the Nabob but now demands 7000 : Pag^s : and will not bee content with 20000 : rupees, formerly you wrote 1500 : rupees to the Duan, now it must bee a quarterpart of what is given to the Nabob ; & besides these nobody knowes what to the Buxee, Wallanayee Connago, Wootamachund, Emam Cooley, and Durbar charges. I think all this will Amount to 40000 . rup^s : you write that it will cost a yeares revenue of those Townes, but I think it will bee more then 10 yeares revenues, now the Townes are ruined. That Place have already cost a great sume for the purchase and yearly charges. And now to throw away such great sumes it will cost more then it is worth, or ever will be and I cannot answer it to the R^t Hon^{ble} Company. I have therefore resolved with the Councill not to exceed 20000 : rupees in the whole (nor would I spend a quarter part of that, unless you can get good and firm Perwannas such as will secure our possession and prevent further trouble) but I hope you will bee able to get the business done for less.

I formerly wrote you to advise how much wo^d : satisfie the Nabob Wootamachund &c^s and I would send the money. You answer in all your Letters that you have not agreed and sometimes you write that I must not send the money till agreed. Now you write for the money but I don't know how much nor whether you will ag[ree] or no. It may bee their demands att last will be so unreasonable that I cannot comply and then I [must] trust to gods providence and referr all things to [the] Mogull and the Company, between whom there is an agreement for the convoy of their Mocha Fleet. But I am very willing to prevent quarrell, and desire all things may bee settled and accommodated if it can bee done for the sume before limited, and shall alwayes acknowledge your good service, I beleive to your Credit & advantage.

I cannot give you directions what sumes must be given to the Nabob and each of the rest. You must conce[rn] that as well as you can, and if you find you can make an Agreement for 20000 : rupees in all go on, and make an end, taking great care that the Perwannas for the Tevenapatam Townes and the rest bee worded right, and without such deceitfull words as will give us trouble hereafter, and to prevent those Townes being Entréd into the Kings account of the Chingie Countrey which doth probably depend on the Duan and Connago and therefore they must bee gratified as you rightly advise and I perceive also you don't intend to part with the money till you are sure of the Perwannas, so that I need not inlarge, I know you will do every thing well.

I have wrote to Governour Hatsell to send you an account of Losses.

I observe the many discourses you have had with the Nabob, Wootamachund and Emam Cooley, and the good answers you gave them, and depend upon you for advice, if you find any private ill designe.

In your Letter of the 12th: you write about a Silver Chest all your other Letters are translated to me a Gold Chest, and it is making as soon as it is done I will send it.

The spye Braminyes allowance is increased.

I have sent two Cases of white spectacles for Emam Cooley, pray present my service to him and tell him they are the best I can gett, and cannot get any green ones, but what are broken and unfitt. I will send you them whenever I can get them.

I have sent a letter to the Nabob and inclose a copy that you may deliver it or not, as you find cause. Also draught of a Perwana desired for Tegnapatam Townes besides which you must get another Perwana for Selim Cawnes, restoring althings plundered. As for the Nabobs generall Perwana for all the Companys business to go on according to Sallabad in all parts within his Government and for the broken ships. You have the Coppys of them what need I write more.

Seilim Cawn having committed such an outrage upon us att Tevenapatam and finding so great a difficulty and delay in procuring satisfaction, I fear others will bee encouraged to doe the like in other places. I have therefore ten dayes agoe sent order to the Cheif of Vizagapatam to withdraw that factory, and come all away to

Madrass or Bengall, according as the winds favours and if the Kings Officers go on to impose upon us unreasonably I must withdraw all, for tho' I love to live in Peace and quietness, yet cannot live in disgrace.

I send you a Bill for 3000 : Pagodas as you advise me I will send more, tho' it is hard I should pay so much money who have reason to demand a Lack of Pagodas of Seilim Cawn.

I have sent two Letters to the Nabob the Copyes are inclosed by which you will understand whether [. . .] or which of them is fitt to deliver. The Larger Letter [con]cerns Seilim Cawn, and may please the Nabob, if he [does] not approve Seilim Cawnes Actions.

If you find the Nabob will not make a bargain for the Phirmaund, go on without itt.

After the Conquest of Chingie I hoped your Excell^{cy} would have continued the Tegnapatam Townes to the English Company which they have enjoyed Peaceably so many yeares. But Seilim Cawn hath plundered and ruined them. I have complained to your Excell^{cy} for justice and requested your Perwanna for preventing the like trouble hereafter. If your Excell^{cy} refuse to [hear] to whom shall I complain, or what can I do, I cannot carry on the R^t : Hon^{ble} : Companys business under [such] disgrace, for when the Kings officers in other [parts] hear what Seilim Cawn hath done, and that I cannot get satisfaction, they will bee encouraged [and] abuse us everywhere to prevent which I am forced to withdraw Vizagapat^m : Factory altho' you granted your Perwanna.

The English Company are merchants known to the King, and it is well known wee have done the King service and therefore may justly expect rewards but instead of reward to bee robed, plundered and ruined how will that looke? I pray your Excell^{cy} : to take these things into your serious Consideration, and grant such Perwannas as are necessary for prevention of future troubles, and that the Companys business may go on according to Sallabad what can I write more, but wishing your Excell^{cy} : long life and prosperity that you may bee the protector of the Innocent.

So soon as we receive credible advices of such an important affair wee shall not fail to communicate the same, hoping the same from yo^r. Wee have received yours of 11th : 18th 19 & 20th Instant with Translates of severall Letters.

Wee doe not hear nor beleive that Amerjeahn is in Custody tho' it is true y^t he was security for 30000 Rupees for the Junckaneer as you will perceive by his own Letters wherein he intimates that he did it for carrying on the Companys busnesse. But wee rather think he was drawn into the inconvenience, by a prospect of gaines tho' itt is true wee have received a considerable advantage here by the removall of Allebux and introducing another Junckaneer, which was done by Amerjeahns meanes. Yet he never gave us any notice of his engagement till after he had entred into the treaty with the Nabob concerning Tegnapatam.

Wee observe your opinion for pressing Amerjeahn to get the Nabobs Perwana, and the inconveniences which you find and fear by the delay. You will understand by the Coppys formerly sent and now inclosed of Letters to and from Amerjeahn what difficultyes and uncertaintyes he meets with from their unreasonable and variable demands, and our Directions to him wherein wee did not think fit to leave itt to him absolutely to contract for what sume he pleased, (for reasons which not be mentioned) but desired him to advise what sume, he could bargain for. To the last Letter hee do's not advise any certain sume but require orders wee have therefore limited him to 20000: rup^s. in the whole a great sume, and yet as things are [. . .] to us it seems, that it will cost more, there being severall officers to bee obliged, particularly for prevention of the Entry of the Tegnapatam Townes in the Kings Bookes and wee expect to hear from Amerjeahn again to the same effect. However it was necessary for us to limit a sume to him, that the Charge may be att length reduced to a certainty.

Lett the Points and walls bee repaired as mention'd in yours of the 18th. Instant, as far as is necessary for defence.

Wee shall pay your bill Pag^s : 100 : mentioned in yo^{rs} : of 18th :

Wee have received the Invoice and Bill of Lading 13 bales of Brigantine, and shall give you Credit [for] the Pag^s : 623. 28. 3.

The Letter from Gussfur Cawn renewing demand of the Townes must proceed from one of these three Causes, either a contrivance of Collebeague himself to draw a Piscash, or done by Gussfur Cawnes to excuse himself from being answerable for so much as Cuddalore &c^s. were rated at in his allotted Jaggeer, whereof he is now to render an account upon his quitting Chingie Fort to Cawker Cawn, or else the Nabob has ordered it either to enhance his Piscash or to pick a quarrell. Wee don't know which.

Wee therefore think it proper that you give such an answer that they cannot lay hold off to this effect, that you never promised to deliver the Townes in 15 dayes, that you have wrote to Madrass about their demands, but have not received any orders for delivery.

Amerjeahn presses for a particularly account of the Losses, and for some of the sufferers to bee sent to complain Personally before the Nabob against Seilim Cawn, wee have answered him that the people are not willing to goe, and that wee have wrote to you to send him a Calculate of the Losses, wee thinke, it wo^d : not bee convenient for the Inhabitants to go, but if you can make a rationally particular calculate of the Losses there can bee no hurt in sending itt to Amerjeahn that he may make use of it if occasion require.

Amerjeahn writes in the Armenian Language & some very long Letters which can be Translated only by Cojee Gregoria, whose indisposition and business frequently occasions delay, and then must be translated from the Persian into English, and the same method in the Letters sent to him, which is the reason you have not had the Copyes of Amerjeahns Letters sooner. Last night I received yours of 18th. three dayes since I sent you a full answer to your former Lett^{rs}: which is also an answer to this with two Letters to the Nabob, and draught of a Perwana for Tegnapatam Townes and a Bill for 3000: Pag^s: drawn by Suncca Rama on Nellacunta. I will not pay any money to the Bramine. I may make an end with Aggala's sons, as Doct^r: Browne formerly wrote you. He ought to abate att least halfe of his demand but agree with him for a quarter, halfe, three quarters, as you can and Doctor Brown shall pay it. I have writ to President Hatsell to send a List of plunder, but I perceive the people are not willing to go to the Camp and I am not willing to force them. I need not enlarge till I receive y^r answer to my last Letter. I have paid 200: rupees to and now send you 300 rupees by these two Peons whose names are Coope Chitte Paupia & Hodje Hussan.

I send you the Copy of Gussfur Cawnes Letter to Presid^t: Hatsell. I don't understand the meaning.

On the 28th past wee received yours of 12th Ditto with your Diary. On the 14th : Ditto wee wrote you by ship Anne and sent you the Copy of our resolution in Councill concerning Vizagapatam, and do not find any reason to add or alter, either from the posture of affairs with us or with you, notwithstanding the change of the Seerlascar which you are so well satisfied in, that thereupon you propound an Investment of 50000: Pag^s : but wee should not adventure to trust any great sume into the Countrey till it doth appear to bee better settled, & lesse subject to alterations in the Government, which have been many in a few months past & it doth appear to us by the Entries in your Diary that if Rustundill doth continue he will insist upon the putting down of your Guns and walls, and you have no assurance that his successor will not doe so too notwithstanding his supposed freindship, for if the Kings officers shall goe on to represent your Fortification in the same manner to him as they did to Rustundill, he will bee forced to take publick notice of it, especially considering the Draught made which represents the Factory buildings with guns and like a Fort which draught will probably come to the Kings notice.

Wee do not mean that you should for fear of hazards quitt the Factory (wee know all our affairs are at [. . .] times and Places subject to hazards & alterations) But by your advices wee are confirmed in our opinion that y^o should put yourselves into a prepared posture for wth draw^s and you must withdraw rather then engage y^r selves in a hostile quarrell with the Government for defence of a Fort which stands in a Town, for which you have a lease for a very short time, at the expiration whereof they may give it to whom they please.

There is also a further reason for your withdrawing. The R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company doe limit a sume for your Factory expences. You say you cannot defray them under three times as much, and neither you nor [. . .] are willing to pay the Overplus. Nor can wee [. . .] advisably to send another Cheif (if any [. . .] take the Factory Charges att the rate limited) who must bee very much to seek in the present intricate circumstances.

Wee therefore repeat the confirmation of our former resolve that if you cannot carry on the Hon^{ble}: Companys businesse for the limited Charges you must withdraw so soon as you have an opportunity of repairing hither in the meantime retrench the Charges; by dismissing Peons, state & c^a and sell Horse for as much as you can gett and get in as many debts and as much Cloth as you can, and lay out no more money on building-or repairs.

If neither necessity shall compell you, nor opportunity permitt you to withdraw before December, wee can then order the Tavestock from Bengall to touch att your Port and take all in.

Wee shall want bales for that Ship, and should be very glad to receive 6: or 700: from your Factory, had wee sufficient stock to send you, and rationally assurance that they could bee procured. But wee cannot send you much, and shall send none, till wee receive your answer to our Letter of 14th: Instant, and Consultation inclosed.

There will be no occasion of sending a Chyrurgeon or Mr. Hymmers.

Wee send this by your returned Peons and shall send Coppy by the next sea Conveyance.

Wee have just now received the Translates of two Letters received from Amerjeahn last night, one in Armenian and the other in Jentue. The latter copy whereof Amerjeahn writes that he hath sent you in Jentue, so that wee suppose you will have received it before this. The Letters are large coppyes of the translate will bee sent to-morrow morning. In the meantime we observe to your Honour that tho' wee did in our Letter to Amerjeahn limit him to 20000: Rupees in y^e whole expence, yet he now advises that he has concluded with the Nabob to give him 8000: Pag^s: for himself and 2000 Pag^s. more among the other Officers besides w^{ch}: there will probably bee expended att least 1000: Pag^s. more one way or other. Hee seems positive that the Nabob will not take less and that the Nabob has promised to deliver all the Perwannas desired.

There are some considerations which plead for the disbursing of the money.

1st. The Nabob's Perwanna will secure us in the ~~present~~ peacable possession of Tegnapatam &c^a and if wee doe not close with his proposall and get his Perwannas, there is great reason to fear he will give further trouble both to you and us, & we ought to avoid a publick breach.

2^d. The Dutch being now gone thither will upon our breaking with the Nabob, make him large offers to our prejudice, and it is apparent that he will doe any thing for money.

On the other. Hand The Nabob's Perwanna cannot certainly secure us from future troubles from [his suc]cessors, which nothing can do effectually [. . .] Phirmaund and that is not to bee expected [. . .]

2^d. The sume is very large 11000: Pag^s. too much [. . .] given away for an uncertain benefit.

3^d. It will seem very strange to our Hon^{ble}: Masters that when they have suffered so great a Losse already for which satisfaction may bee expected and demand'd they should pay so great sume for the quiet possession of their own. And if there were no other Place or affaires in India to bee considered in the consequence of a Publick Quarrell, It were undoubtedly better to defend the Place to the utmost extremity rather then submit to such hard and unjust useage.

Wee desire your Hon^r: to consider these things, and give us your opinion so soon as you can whether we shall order Amerjeahn to proceed in getting y^e Nabobs Perwannas upon the Termes proposed. Upon receipt of your answer we will send Amerjeahn a possitive order, and in the meantime answer his Letter, so as not to break off the Treaty.

Amerjeahn is very pressing for the sending of the List of Losses and men to prove the Losses. Wee observe by your Letter to Amerjeahn (sent us with your Generall Letter of 30th past) that you sent him copy of the same List which you sent us which wee think is sufficient because the particulars cannot be proved, nor is it convenient to send the men. Wee are

On the 2^d Instant I received yours of the 28th April, wherein you acquaint me that the Nabob demands 8000: Pag^s: for himself and that it would cost 2000: Pag^s

more among the other officers. On the 3^d I answered you that I could not order the giving away so great a sume without y^e Consent of the Councill and that you should try again to get the businesse done for 20000 : Rupees in all, since which I have received no Letter from you.

I have discoursed the Councill and they have consent'd to comply with the Nabobs demands. You may therefore proceed and take out the necessary Perwannas, which you ought to receive before you pay the money. You have a draught of a Perwanna desired for Negapat.^m [. . .] get itt agreable to that in the main points tho' with some alteration in the wording, you need not stay so long as to send the draught to me, It will bee convenient that the business bee concluded before the Dutch begin.

If you find in the management of the Durbar that you cannot accomplish all without spending 1000 : Pag^s : more then Pag^s : 10000 : I leave it to you, to act as occasion requires trusting that you will deal faithfully with the Hon^{ble} : Company.

The last letter I received from you was dated the 28th April. In conpliance wherewith I yesterday wrote you, that the Councill had at length consented to your proposall of paying the Nabob 8000 Pag.^s and 2000 Pag.^s to other officers and also that you might spend 1000^{pa} : more if you found it necessary since which I have received none from you. But I am advised from Fort St: David that Seilim Cawn is returned from the Camp to his Government at Chellumbrum and that he hath sent his people to burne and plunder as they did before and doth intend to come himself with Ebrahim Cawn Gurry against Cuddalore. It is strange if these things are done against the Nabobs order and if he hath given order, and it bee his resolution to proceed so, we must trust to God to preserve us. However if he will yet grant his Perwanna as before desired and recall Seilim Cawn you may conclude with him. The money shall bee sent you upon your first notice. But should I send it till I know what he intends to doe I may loose it for nothing. Pray consider these things very well and give me your true opinion of the meaning of the Nabobs proceedings and your advice.

President Hatsell hath sent me the draught of the Nabobs Dustick which you sent to him, for Mahmood Hossan beague to demand of Seilim Cawn restitution of the Elephants and Plunder. I am advised it is very well if you can trust the man employed but if you cannot trust him get another man to bee employ'd whom you can trust and you may promise such proportion of what shall bee restored as you think necessary either to him or others, as I formerly wrote you I returne you the Draught.

The Emperour takeing time to consider as your Hon^r: formerly advised. I have no further account of that matter, but I have the copy of an Intelligence sent from Adrianople to Gombroon dated $\frac{13}{23}$ September, concerning a Battle fought between the Imperial[ists] and the Turk's, copy whereof is inclosed with the confidence that your Honour will not Hold me answerable [for the] truth of every particular as written. The number therein mentioned to bee slain and taken Prisoners being extraordinary tho' the advantage Germans had, make it not impossible. I have no other news worthy your Hon^{rs}: notice onely that on the 5th: of August Barcelona was surrendred to the French. So recommending your Hon^r: unto the Divine Protection I remain

Hee spent 3 week's in y^e Journey, Aggala Cawn allowed him 10: rupees a day for 7: dayes for the Battee of Palenkeen boyes &c^a: & [. . .] him 2000: fanams and 4: Gold Moh[urs . . .] D^r: Browne laid out the greatest pa[. . .] Physick but before he could get [it . Agawla .] Cawn dyed. now if Doct^r: Browne rep[ays . . .] he will not onely spend so much time for nothing, but loose the money which he spent in

travelling and laid out in Physick. I pray your Excell^y: to order what that bee allowed D^r: Browne for Doctors fees of three weekes attendance for charges of travailling & losse of Physick, and what your Ex^{cy}: shall then judge due from D^r: Brown will be made good by Amerjeahn. This is a small matter but your Ex^{cy}: being a great master of Justice will not think much to consider it.

I have wrote a Letter to the Nabob, and [ano]ther to Emam Cooley, which come inclosed with the [C]opies, by which you will understand I have referr'd [to] the Nabob to judge what part D^r: Browne shall repa[y] and you may pay accordingly and send me an Acco^t: D^r: Brown did not receive 400 : rupees but 2000 : Allim[ghur] fanams. Pray use your endeavours that right may bee done to D^r: Browne. Great men doe not use Doctors after this manner. Hereafter I must not trust. Emam Cooley wrote me also about 596 : rupees due to him from M^r: Yale for Oxen. Hee hath refused to pay saying they are not worth halfe the money but I am satisfied they are, and that Emam Cooley dealt very freindly in getting them, and M^r: Yale unworthily in refusing to pay. Lett Emam Cooley send me his receipt or a Bill and I will pay the money, and by Emam Cooley's receipt can compell M^r Yale to repay me. Pray hasten to get the Nabobs Perwana about Cuddalore &c^a.

In Gentue.

On the 11th: I received yours of 16th: April, about Dausapa requiring a Present from me by Sallabad. There never was such a Sallabad and I shall not say anything to Dausapa till you come.

You also write Orringgapanague has built a Fort and rob'd 1000 : Pag^o: I never heard any thing of his robbing any body. I hear he made a mud wall in the Woods no more like a Fort then an Egge. He will pull downe these walls before this comes to you, you may [. . .]

I sent Ramapa to Dausapa, [. . .] in getting what money he would [. . .] upon pawn but he wholly waves [. . .] offers to give townes for security [. . .] think may bee taken from them by another renter in a month or two, and therefore they won't meddle wth: Town. There are many people demand money of Dausapa. I wish you get all your money before his time is out.

I send you herewith a Letter in Persia about Mr. Yale and Dr. Browne. I hope the Nabob will order Aggala Cawnes sons not to trouble Dr. Brown any more or at least cause them to take a part of the money pray use your indeavour to do Dr. Brown right. But if they will have the whole I send you a bill for 2000 : fan^s : & 4 Gold mohurs, drawn by Sunca rama on [lacuna] receive and pay what they demand.

Yesterday I received your Letter dated the 9th. wherein you write that the Perwannas are all ready & that the Nabob will make them according to the draught desir'd, I suppose you had not heard that Seilim Cawn did on the 6th instant send his people to burne y^e : remaining houses in the Cuddalore villages, whereof I gave you an account in my Letter of the 9th Instant and hourly expect to hear from you till when I know not what to write. The Gold Chest will bee sent tomorrow without fail.

1. Our last was dated 21st : March & Mary Buoyer which made a Pacquett too large to copy on y^e 11th. April wee received your's of the 2^d. March & ship Anne [and] on the 15th April yours of 10th March & Acheen Merch[ant] both give such an account of the Tavestocks proceed [. . .] as renders itt very improbable that you will bee [. . .] to send her hither this season, and in failure you [pro] pound to lade her kentilage with 800 : Bales, and [fill] her up with Grain, and send her from Bengall by the 10th of September for this Place, which you judge agreeable to our proposall of 17th January, but you will find our Letter upon a reperusall doth not mention any thing of her proceeding hither in the month of September, but between the 1st : & 10th : of December in case she could not bee dispatched for England in the month of August from Ballasore road, wee had two reason for against her coming out of Bengall in September for this place. 1st : Because you could not send the Princess in that time of the year, which was a lesser ship. 2^dy : if you send her out from Bengall in the begining of September she will not arrive here till the latter end of that month or the begining of the next and consequently wee shall not have time to unlade 100 Tons of Grain and compleat her Lading with Bales & c^a : nor will the Commander have time to make due preparation for such a Voyage, before the monsoon, which wee expect early this year having had none the last, nor any rain or wind since November last for which reasons wee think the Ship ought not to come up hither from Bengall in September, and unless you can yourselves compleat her Lading for England by August you must not send her hither till the latter end of November or the beginning of December.

2. Wee received your Attestation signed by Mess^{rs} : Russell Curgenven and Lloyd concerning the want of 134 rupees found short in Chests N^o : 1, 18 and 19 [ship] Taves[stock] wee return you the copy of an attes[tation] by the Warehousekeeper signed [. . .] who saw the rupees put into the [. . .] to determine which of the attestation [. . .] false.

3. Wee are not furnished with a sufficient store of Teak Plank and Timber, and itt is now excessive dear, when itt growes Cheaper wee shall supply you.

4. Wee have spared so many Guns to severall places of 1000 : to 1500 w^t : that wee can spare no more.

5. Wee shall give your Account Credit in the close of our Bookes ending April last for the Debts of John Haynes & c^a : as directed by the Auditor Generall.

6. Wee have resolved to send you by the first good conveyance of a two decked Ship 180 : Bales of Broad Cloth ord^r : and but 10 : Bales of Aurora because the price y^e : mention of 4 Rup^s & yard is extreme low, but hope a small quantity may go off better.

7. Wee have received no Letters from Bombay or Surat lately nor any Europe news, but what comes in private Letters, to which wee do not give full Credit and therefore for [. . .] send you.

8. Amerjeahn continueth still att the Nabobs Camp treating for necessary Perwannas for settling Fort S^t: Davids &c^a: and acquaints us frequently with the Nabobs promisses of granting all he desires, but he still delayes and on the 6th: Instant Seilim Cawn, who had been at the Camp confirmed Phousdar of Chellumbrum did in his return from the Camp to his Government send a party of Horse and foot into Fort S^t: David bounds and burnt and destroyed a great number of houses and did prepare to go himself with all the force he could make in [order] to forme an attack against Cuddalore, but he only [. . .] and passed on to Chellumbrum wee conclude [. . .] as done by the Nabobs private order, but whether [. . .] as designed onely to enhance the Present or to per [. . .] in the delivery of the Townes wee do not yet certainly know, all circumstances considered wee doubt he will not grant such Perwannas as are necessary for prevention of future trouble, and that he will quarrell wth: us att last, so that wee have no reason to retract the caution wee gave you in ours of 26th February. The Nabob continues the seige of Vellore in which hee hath now spent three months.

9. Our last advices from Vizagapatam inform us that Rustundill is displaced and Faquirasab's son of the last Seerlascaer is restored to the Government of that Country, in whose freindship the Cheif and Councill of Vizagapatam have a great confidence, wee have ordered them to put themselves in a posture of withdrawing as occasion shall require, and if they shall bee forced to withdraw in the southerly monsoon they will repair to you in Bengall as you will by the inclosed copy of our Consultation dated 14th: past which wee then sent to Vizagapatam, but have received no answer. And in case they shall withdraw to Bengall, wee desire you to observe the Directions given in said Consultation.

10. Wee had no advices from the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: that gave us cause to think one of S^r: John Chardins Bills for 250[£]: was sent to Bengall the same being inserted only in the Invoice to Fort S^t: George. Wee have rec^d: Pa: 585: 8: of M^r: Daniel Chardin on the 2^d: Decem^r: in full of S^d Bill.

11. M^{rs}: Croke is willing to dispose [. . .] her Husband purchased and alle [. . .] great sume of money in improv [. . .] woody land to a good arrable g [. . .] capable of yeilding a considera [ble . . . there] fore hopes that you will be able to get more then she was offered for it immediatly after her Husbands death being 3000: rupees but leaves itt to you to get as much as you can, requesting that will take such reasonable time for the sale as may be necessary for disposing of it to the best advantage.

12. Her request seems to be reasonable, but we don't know what are the express words of the Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: orders, and therefore can onely on behalf of a widdow with many Children, desire you to do her what kindness y^o: can in the disposall thereof so far as is consistant wth: the Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: orders. Inclosed is her order to Henry More for delivery of all the writings relating to the purchase of the Jimedarship to the Agent and Councill. Wee are

I this day received your Letter in answer to mine of 8th: Ins^t: wherein In Jentoe. I acquainted you that the Council had consented to the expending of 10000 Pag^s: for the Perwannas, and 1000 Pag^s: more if you saw occasion and desired you to get the Perwannas for Tegnapatam & Townes agreeable to the draught sent you, in the main points, but not to spend time in sending draughts to me, by reason of small differences in the wording. Now you send me a draught which agrees with that I sent you, onely leaving out [. . .]tion of the Fort and Townes being bought and [. . .] desire my answer. I approve your reasons and [approve the Draught you have now sent. and desire [you] to gett the Perwannas finished, and if there shall bee any further scruple made about words do not contend, onely secure the main points which you fully understand, and don't send me any more Draughts to peruse but make an end, gett the Nabobs Perwannas and cause due Entryes to bee made in the Duan's & Connago's Bookes, and with the Waccanaveez, and with any other officer that is necessary for prevention of further trouble.

While you write that the Nabob and Wootamachund promise Perwannas, and give you fair words; Seilim Cawn goes on in doing mischeif att Tegnapatam (as advised this day from President Hatsell) which makes me suspect he acts by the Nabobs orders. Otherwise how dares he Act so. Now if the Nabob do's grant his Perwannas upon your next request it is well, if not, what can I think, but that he gives you, and me fair words, and designs something more than yet appeares. Pray consider these things very well and give me your reall opinion all inquire well what is the design of sending Gussfur Cawn from the Camp.

The gold Chest will bee sent away this night, or to-morrow night att furthest, and on Monday I will send you Bills for 7000: Pag^s: or if I cannot gett bills then for so much, I will send you bills for the rest in a day or two as soon as I can get them, unlesse I shall receive any Letters from you, in the mean time to forbid me.

1. On the 17th: January last wee received yours of 9th. Octo^r & ship Wellcome & Ship Anne. on the 5th: March yours of 19th January last & ship Olive branch. On the 6th: March yours of 26th. October '96 which you sent by M^r: Ramsden & came hither via Acheen & ship Nonsuch together with severall bookes and Papers according to the Lists of the respective Pacquetts.

2. Our last Letter to you was dated the 29th: October by the Dolphin the receipt whereof you acknowledge, since which we have had no oppertunity of sending to y^o: your last letter & Olive branch gave us reason to expect the returne of the Dolphin but her long stay makes us suspect she is detained by some accident and have resolved to send you by a country ship if the Dolphin shall not arrive by the 20th: Instant.

3. The advice you give us in yours of 19th: January of your dispatching ship Amity with her full [lading and in due time is very acceptable, and shall Credit, your account for her Invoice amount to Dollars 9395: 3: also your dispatching of the Madrass Frigatt full Laden will bee very satisfactory to the Hon^{ble} Company.

4. You must bee very carefull to prevent the progress of Pangran Jantanalle's design in conjunction with the Sultan of Bantam whose Slavish subjection to the Dutch gives just ground of suspition, that those quarrells are fomented and carried on by their direction, and may bee of dangerous consequence if [. . .] stopped in time.

5. Since the Olive branch could not proceed for Bengall [. . .] time designed you did well to send her hither she [is all] together unfitt for service without extraordinary [. . .] and therefore we have hawled her ashore and broke her up.

6. Wee doubt you have sent rather too much Benjamin by the Amity and the Madrass unless it proves extraordinary white, therefore send no more till wee shall receive farther directions from the R^t: Hon^{ble} Company, but continue to provide and send home 10: or 20 Pecull of Dragons blood yearly, if good and clean be procureable, till forbid and as many Pecull of Quill Cassialignum if procureable of the best fine sort which turns into little rolls little bigger then a goose quill, and if in buying a parcell you shall receive any gross thick peices you must not send them home, but seperate them from the fine and sell them for what you can get.

7. Wee observe the consideration you have of makeing York Fort a markett for Pepper and Cloth & the good reason you give why the inhabitants of Catton[e] and Sablatt will not bring [. . .] to Bencoolen Viz^t: because they have no prows of their own, nor are used to the sea the pepper of those pla[ces] cannot bee secured, but by one of these two methods y^e: propound either by settling a Paggar in each river, or by compelling the Noquedahs to bring the pepper they buy there to Bencoolen att Bencoolen price, to settle Paggars among such unquiet and troublesome people will undoubtedly require a greater number of men then you can spare, and will consequent[ly] bee very chargeable, but if the Noquedahs could be [. . .] to bring all the pepper which the [. . .] rivers to York Fort, itt would [. . .] 2: or 3: Dollars in a bahar, [. . .] if you had Paggars, some may bee [. . .] will not answer the end, but if they [. . .] ligned with their Proffitt they will willingly comply. Their Proffitt will consist in the price they will receive for their pepper and the cheapness of those goods they can buy, if you do not pay them so much for their Pepper as they used to receive att Bantam, yet if you can supply them with the same goods as they buy att Bantam and as much cheaper their Proffitt will bee the same, and they will rather chuse to make a short then a long a voyage.

8. You make a considerable objection w^{ch}: discourages the Noquedahes from trading att Bencoolen Vz^t: That there they can gett onely cloth; but at Java they can gett severall other commodities more proper for the Natives of Cattown and Sabblatt by which they gett an advantage if you had now given us a Particular Account of the goods which they usually import from Java the quantities and cost at Java wee would now have sent you what procureable and if wee can furnish you with the same sorts from hence, so as that you can afford them as cheap they can buy at Java, itt will undoubtedly induce them to drive a great trade to Bencoolen, Pray consider this Point very well and give us your answer.

9. It may bee thought that it may bee better for the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company to mannage the whole trade, buy all the Pepper directly from the Natives and to furnish them with all those sorts of goods which they are [su]pplyed with from Java by the Noquedahs, and were (the p)people of those parts quiett among themselves, & [. . .] in a good inclination to the Company so y^t. [they in]ight trust a Paggar with one Englishman, and [. . .] 4 Topazes and Buggesses itt would bee undoubtedly the best method, but the charge of defending a Paggar with a great Company of Souldiers would so much over ballance the Proffitt of buying of Pepper, and selling of goods that it seems better to prosecute the other method of encouraging the Noquedahs till those parts are reduced to a better temper, but wee do not possitively direct either one or the other, wee only give you our opinions and reasons and leave you to Act as you shall find most agreable to present circumstances.

10. You did well to send Thomas Pritchard and the two Topasses, whereof one dyed in the passage. There is one John Rodriguez who went over by the Dolphin or Olive Branch whose freinds doe earnestly beg his returne. Lett him come by the first.

11. Wee have accepted and paid your severall bills [for] 400 : Dollars mentioned in your Generall Letter of the 19th : January, and 3365 ; dollars in Letter 9th : Oct^r : last.

12. The Dollars sent by the Madrass Frigatt were such wee could then gett. But unless you have a prospect of sending them suddainly hither, you may send them by this Ship for Bengall consigned to the Agent & Councill (with the copy of the inclosed Invoice which wee received from the R^t : Hon^{ble} ; Company) if the Ship proves good & tite & the master bee satisfied to take them in.

15. Wee do not approve of William Murrine's continuing a Factor in the R^t ; Hon^{ble} : Companys service, because he is a Foreigner. Lett him be discharged.

16. If Mr: Coote and Smalridge are really becom sober and dilligent men, lett them continue, but when they prove otherwise, dismisse them and send them hither.

The Countrey being thus settled and such plenty of Pepper, It is a great trouble to us, that your stock is so low, and it is not in our power to supply you with Dollars to enable you to purchase it and the rather because you acquaint us that there lyes 700 : bahars in the Rivers of Sablatt and Cattowne, which you have stoped the Dagon from exporting and to hinder the Countrey from selling to others, and yet not to buy it yourselves will bee a real injury to the Natives and give them just occasion of complaint and discontent.

Rectify as many as you can some have been already adjusted and more will be in the closing of our Bookes QQ but there are some can never be adjusted by reason of the imperfection of the Indapoorra bookes.

37. The Moor's have been very [troublesome to] Fort [. . .] since their Conquest of Chingee in December last, and have attempted to seize Cuddalore wherein being defeated they have att severall times burnt and plundered most of the out villages, and still go on in acts of Hostility which hath obliged us to send thither more men then wee could well spare, and is the reason why we cannot now send you more then four Topazes, but hope by the next opportunity to send you a good supply, in the meantime being sensible of your great [want] of a good military officer. Wee have sent by the [. . .] Mr. Natt: Eyton with a Commission for [Lieutenant] of York Fort att the usuall pay of 25: [. . .] Wee also appoint him young [er . . .] his sallary will bee according [to . . .] vances to. Hee is to serve three y[ears on his] arrivall att York Fort) as £ Copy of [. . .] inclosed . . .] att the expiration of which, or in case of sickness, [. . .] six months notice he hath liberty of returning hi[. . .] where he is to enjoy his station in the Civill or m[ilitary] according as the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Companys service require which Mr: Eyton hath been acquainted with doth [. . .] with a condition of referring all to the approbation & order of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company, and when ever you shall receive any order from the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company repugnant to this Agreement in any part of it, you and He must conform thereunto.

38. Itt is not customary (nor intended for a President) to appoint a Lieutenant to bee one of Councill, but wee have done itt now, because he hath for many years approved himself a sober dilligent usefull man, and hath good experience as well in civill as military affaires. 39. Inclosed is the Cobby of the Articles of Peace concluded between the English and French. The Dutch & Spaniard have also concluded a Peace with the French but the Emperour tooke a month or two's time to consider, and wee do not know whether he hath agreed. The conclusion of the peace renders itt the more probable that you may have a ship directly from England before this arrives.

40. In your Consultation dated 28th: March, you order that the coppies of Mr.[Smalridge] Mr: Philips and Mr: Ange's Declarations relating to Mr. Frith should bee delivered to Mr: Frith as was reasonable. Mr: Frith being here Examined why he did not deliver the Accounts as required, doth declare that hee deliverd the Acco^{ts}: of the quantity of Pepper shipped on board the Interloper from the severall Places, but could not give an account of the quantity received from the severall merchants, and had referred you two months before his departure from York Fort for that Account to Mr: Ange, who was the person that delivered itt att Bantall & Indickells and had deliver'd the said Acco^t: of Mr: Darley and Mr: Everall doth affirm he saw Mr: Ange write out the said acco^t: and deliver itt to Mr. Darley, thô we have not observ'd any notice taken [of it] either in Lett[ers . . .] Diary w^{ch} [. . .] fully peruse [. . .]

I have received your two Letters in Gentue & Armenian wherein you advise the Nabob will not add a word to the Perwanna which hee offered, which you think is firm & desire the money may bee sent. I have acquainted the Council therewith and I perceive they have a great confidence in you. Therefore I now write you this positive answer. Try once more whether you can prevail with the Nabob to grant the Perwannas according to the draught I sent. If he will not you must att least procure that the Perwanna bee directed to the officers of Chingie, and Chingee Countrey, and that the word, Sallabad, bee inserted in that draught which the Nabob offers, towards the end Vz^t: after those words (Lett them pray for the Kings life and Prosperity) Lett these words bee added (and goe on with their business according to Sallabad.) But if att last you cannot prevail take the Perwanna as the Nabob hath offered, because you say it is firme, & don't expect any further orders from me, do it as well as y^o: can.

As for the money I don't certainly understand how much you will want, for you once wrote the Nabob demanded 8000 : Pag^s : for himself and 2000 Pag^s : for his officers after which you wrote that he demanded 2000 : Pag^s : for himself, besides the 8000 : but you were in hopes to gett the 2000 : Pag^s : abated. Cap^t: Heron in a sloop from Battavia mett with ship Nassaw Cap^t: Mintay bound for China on the 22^d: of May last, but wee have no Letters from the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company by Ditto ship. Hee alsoe mett with M^r: Gough in an Interloping ship bound for China. The 30th: past wee received a Letter from Cap^t: Erle from the Cape adviseing of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Companys shipping, Copy whereof comes inclosed. The Danes ship w^{ch}: brought itt gives account of a French ship or two w^{ch}: sailed before her from the Cape for Bengall.

Inclosed is your Account Currant with Journall parcells taken out of our Bookes QQ from 1st: January to the ultimo April last, with remarks made by our accountant on the last account Curr^t: received from you whereunto wee referr.

Herewith goes M^r: Jeremiah Peaches account as stated by the Court with their Judgement against him for Rs. 5,330-3-6 (including the remains of Maulda Factory) which you must receive out of those Bales which you sent hither and were returned to you Vz^t: the remain's in specie, or so much as you shall find among those Bales, accounted as they stand Entred in Maulda Bookes, and if you do not find enough in specie, you must make up the said sume of Rs. 5,330-3-6 out of such of the Bales as are most proper for Europe by valuation. The remainder if any be [must] bee deliver'd to M^r: Peacheys order and in case he shall neglect to give order, let them lye in the Warehouse as secure as you can from Damage. Inclosed is an Execution warrant.

In the said account you will find M^r. Peachey debted for all Bills and receipts as ₹ Maulda Bookes & Credited for the old Bills alledged by him to bee lost. But as to the new Bills they are remaining with you, concerning which wee wrott you, and you sent us a parcell of writeings with a List which was not true, there being some more and some lesse in the List. We advised you the mistake and desired you to rectify itt; by your answer you apprehend the Error was not of importance nor worth rectifying. The Court could not make a Judgement upon an imperfect account, & therefore that matter rests as it was. and those writings are now returned to you, who onely can make use, and render an account thereof to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company.

You will also find Mr. Peachie has credit for Rup^s: 1,486:12: in 3 sums for Rupees, gold & silver thread, delivered by him in 1693 as appears by the Bengall Consultation booke if you have received any thing more, you must give him Credit for it. or if there bee a mistake in the value of gold and silver thread it is not our fault, itt being necessary to bee brought to an issue by valuation for want of a certain acco^t:

M^r: Jonathan Winder having given bond with security in a thousand Pagodas not to correspond or deal with Interlopers, will return to you by Ship Acheen merchant. and Mr. William Warren who [was] Chirurgeon of Tonqueen Factory will come to you by the same ship to be Chirurgeon of Chuttanutta Factory. But wee tell him, the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company made the Agreement, and they onely can alter it, in order to which you may acquaint the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company with his request and deportment, and in the meantime charge 36 £: or the usuall Doctors salary in your account of salary, pay him 18£ Debt acco^t. On the 16th: past wee wrott M^r: Noden, and ordered him to use his endeavours in defeating the Interlopers designs, if they should touch att Metchlepatam and to follow

your orders. wee have advice of 2 or 3 other Interloping ships come, and coming for India, and it is not improbable that one or more may call on the Coast, wee must all use our utmost endeavours to defeat their Trade as occasion requires. We are also advised of three ships belonging to the R^t. Hon^{ble} Company bound for this Coast and may suddainly expect them.

On the 19th past wee received yours of 24th May with Diary, by your two peous whom wee now returne by a Boat bound for Metchlepatam and upon peruseall thereof have resolved as by the inclosed copy of this dayes Consultation, whereunto wee onely adde that since wee don't see how you can avoid withdrawing the Factory there will bee no occasion for presenting Fuckerasaib, with the usuall Pishcash, or at least not exceeding a third part, and when you withdraw Mr. Holcombe may let him know he is ordered to bring all hither, but if he will permitt Mr. Owen to stay till his returne, he will endeavour a resettlement of the Factory in a short time.

You desire us to send you a calculate of your particular Expences. Wee desired you long since to send us one, and when you send it wee will give you an answer. In the meantime wee can onely referr you to the R^t. Hon^{ble} Comp^s. Generall orders relating to your Charges.

Wee have this day received a Letter from Amirjeahn advising the Nabobs [*lacuna*] to the granting of Perwannas, tho' not exactly conforme to our design, but wee don't yet know the issue.

Inclosed is the copy of a letter received from Cap^t. Erle Commander of the Sampson dated 24th: Aprill [. . .] the safe arriveall of severall returning ships [at] the Cape.

Our last was 21st June by an Armenian Cossid Duplicate whereof comes inclosed with one date 11th March omitted to be then sent.

On the 30th past wee received a Letter from Cap^t: William Erle Command^r: of Ship Sampson dated from the Cape on the 24th April last, adviseing that on the 23^d as he stood in for the Cape harbour hee saw the Charles the 2^d the Sidney and Scepter standing out of the Road for England, & that the King William departed thence two months before, but he makes no mention of the Amity and Madrass frig^t: This Letter came by a Danes ship which brings intelligence that two French Ships had sailed from the Cape for Bengall.

By the Articles of peace between France & Holland Poddicherry is to bee delivered to the French before the arrivall of the Articles the Dutch had sent two to the Nabob about Pollicherry & c^a and have continued there ever since without concluding any part of their business. Yesterday wee are advised from the Camp that the two Dutch men had privately wth: drawn from the Camp leaving their Tents behind. About 8 dayes since arrived severall ships from Batavia, on which the Heer Comans is come Govern^r of Negapatam and Comissary of this Coast & Govern^r: Pitts is to repear to Batavia.

Cap^t: George Heron in a sloop from Batavia on 22^d May, met the Nassaw Cap^t: Minty near Bantam bound for York Fort and China. The supra Cargo Cap^t: Rawdon

who was Comand^r: of the Sarah to China with M^r: Gough last Voyage. They esteem'd itt late and therefore would not call att York Fort, but proceeded for Battavia. It is probable they brought Letters from the R^t Hon^{ble} Company at least for York Fort if not for Fort S^t: George, But sent us none. They came out from Cales in the begining of Decemb^r: last. Cap^t: Heron 6 dayes before [is] met with M^r: Gough in a new ship of 400 Tons an Interloper bound for Batavia and China, who came from England in January and from Cales in February last, and gives out two ships more are to follow him for China, so that wee have now news of 5 or 6: Interlopers. Hee also informed that when he left England the Martha and two more ships in the service of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company would bee ready to sail for this Coast in two months.

The foregoing was dispatching to you just as the Martha Cap^t: Raines from England arrived the 6th: Instant in this road on which came Thom^s: Pitt Esq^r: Com-missioned by the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company to be President and Governour of their affaires in these parts.

Wee had sooner dispatch'd the Inclosed to you but that wee daily expected an end of our trouble some business about Fort S^t: Davids. Our Vacqueel Amirjeahn having advised us that he concluded all with the Nabob for 10000 Pag^s: so that with the three thousand Pagodas wee had long since remitted him and 8000 Pag^s: more upon the arrivall of President Pitt, which wee expected would have finished all, but contrary to our expectation he has now wrote for 2000: Pag^s: more, writing us that he has taken out the Nabobs Perwanna of which wee shall send y^o: a Copy as soon as received, this unhappy business will not stand our masters in less then 15000: Pag^s: and how long this Nabobs Perwanna may bee of value God knows.

The Fame arrived here the 8th Instant, which wee are just now dispatching for Fort S^t: Davids wth: stores and some Souldiers, for that some forces of the Nabobs are gathering together near that place, but wee are not assured of their design.

The Dutch are under some apprehensions of the Nabobs making some attempt on Pollicherry, and are making great preparations to resist him.

The Martha Cap^t: Raines wee shall dispatch in few dayes for Bengall from which place we have not heard since April last so not knowing how affaires stand there are att an uncertainty how we shall dispose of our masters ships, for that if wee were assured y^t the Agent &c^a in Bengall could Load directly thence the Tavestock which lyes on great demorage, and the Martha wee would Dispatch the Fame hence in September Directly for England, and send the Thorndon when she arrives to the West Coast.

The Anna which wee hope is arrived long since safe in Bengall must lay in for a freight for Persia or if times were settled here that merchants dare under take Investments, wee might bee able to provide for her on this Coast, so as to Dispatch her January next.

Wee here inclose what the R^t Hon^{ble} Company have wrott us concerning Anjengo, & accordingly shall write them in a day or two.

The 11th: Instant the Diamond Cap^t: Laurence arrived here from Persia, who brought a Generall Lett^r: from M^r Owen &c^a dated 30th May last. Inclosed are some Clauses relating to the death of Mr: Barwell &c^a and Mr: Thomas Harbins Debt to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company wee shall according to their desire send down a Warrant to the Agent of Bengall for attaching what money or other Effects in the Hands of Mr: Beard belonging to said Harbin.

Wee recd. yo^{rs}: of the 15th: past in which you advise of the safe arrival of the 5,000 Pagodoes &c^a: we expected not otherwise then y^t: you would meet wth: all imaginable opposition from the Dutch for doubtless they have found it much to their advantage being y^e: sole buyers of chay goods & paintings proper for Europe for many yeares past Tho the goods seem deare you have agreed for wth: Quallonarso, wee confirme the same that is for the 5,000 Pagodoes and refuse not the other five thousand provided that all or most part will be brought in by the beginning of Jan^{ry}: and advice y^t: you would run most upon Chay goods & paintings & of yo^r: chay goods cheiffly allejars but on p^t: of your contract, wee verry much dislike (& more especially that you M^r: Lovell who have often had the Φ usuall of our contract

here wth: the Merchants should agree to it) w^{ch}: is that the Company shall be at the charge to clear all pretences of the Govern^t: on the goods when it should bee at the Merchants charge thô under our countenance & protection and unless you alter y^t: part of the contract, you put it in y^e: power of the Merchants to goe of or comply wth: their contract as they pl[e]ase, Wee here send a letter of encouragem^t: to Quallonarso: & empower you to Tashereef him Wee were formerly well assured y^t: the Interlopers agreed wth: the Governm^t: for 3 \mathcal{P} C. Custome. What wee desire is y^t: you'll get an attestation of it If possible, under the Cojas & the most eminent Merchants hands for that wee would send it home to our masters.

Wee will enquire by w^t: conveyance wee can send you money but wee would have w^t: possible of those goods to goe home by next shipping.

As for y^e: quit-rent due for the factory Narran must settle it as formerly. The 2 peeses of Chinse wee reced as to the striped pese the Chay & cloth is verry ordinary, the other something better, but compareing lengths and bredths and difference in the goodness of the Cloth wth: ours, here they are verry deare but [if] they will agree to make about twenty or thirty serge [. . .] fine Cloth and a good chay, we then think 25 [. . .] \mathcal{P} Corge may be tollerable & would have [. . .] for them but remember that there bee ten peeses of a sort in each bale at least.

Wee find that Charge for security of the money you paid him had deposited pallampores and Chintse if proper for England & reasonable wee would have you agree for them.

Our last to you was the 26th: July since which wee received yours of the 16th: & 21st and hope that you have succeeded in your troublesome business of the Quedda merchant according to your expectations, wee take notice of the behaviour and gratitude of the Honest Armenians of whom our Masters formerly gave such frequent incomiums.

Our Honest Armenian att last has found the way back from the Camp, and brought us the Nabob and Duans Perwannas, Copy of which wee here inclose, the charges of which we formerly advised you.

The 3^d: Instant wee dispatcht the Fame Cap^t: Betton for England with a Cargo amo^t: to upwards of [Pagodoes 6]0000 and in few dayes shall dispatch the [. . .] for the West Coast where wee hope she will meet with Pepper enough to fill up for England.

The Anna Tavestock and Martha are in Bengall the two former wee hope will bee dispatch'd thence for England, thô their business is not quite settled with the Prince who daily invents new tricks to strip the merchants, the Martha wee expect here in Jan^{ry}: against which time wee hope to make such provision as to give her a seazorable dispatch for England.

As to what you write about Hussen Ammein Ship which was gone to Tenassere before Mohomud Cossim came here with your Letter, who brought us no Letter in Persian as is mention'd in your's, and whereas Mahomud Cossim pretends to have a Lett^r: of attorney and other papers relating to Hussein Ammeins concernes, the Letter of Attorney nor papers are neither signed nor sealed by him, which makes us jealous that Hussen Ammen designs to make some unjust demands att last, so that unless he sends authentick papers and powers wee shall Concern ourselves no farther in y^r matter.

By the first ship bound from your Port hither, pray send us three or four Corge of red and white Saloo's for Flaggs. Wee are

Your Letter I have received and understand the Contents, you mention that I have grounded my action of sending Peons to your meets by misinformations, and as you say have robb'd them of a great deal of money. Itt is never my Custom to act anything, but what have first truely represent'd to me, I understand your putting a stop upon some Beetle that came to your meet, and belonging to the merchants of this Place, was not for the Kings dutyes (they having before paid itt) but an information you had of Bansee & Vellapilla that the Beetle merchants gave an annuall bribe of 12 Pag^s: I have severall times sent some of my People to demand beetle you have stop'd but never releas'd it, taking no notice of it. My sending for you was for noe other reason then to discourse how such things happen, as also to increase our friendship, you construing my meaning contrary, by thinking I sent for you to fight; I admire you should harbour any such a thought, for I never undervalue myself by fighting with those that gett their Rice by their pen, or those but what are equall to me, & better then you, what the bearer of yours informes me that they had paid the Kings dutyes, but were stop'd upon the bribe account. After I heard; they were stop'd upon no other account, I sent my [Peo]le to fetch itt away, who in a civill way took itt without giving any trouble to the meet, there being no money brought in beetle, I apprehend your own servants take some money out of the Beetle, I hope you will inquire into this business if you value my freindship, and that wee may see one another, desiring you not to regard the stores of mean Fellowes.

I have received your freindly Letter and understand the Contents, you write Concerning the beetle merchants One Vellapaw, and that you have a great desire to see me, you and I being freinds when ever you are pleas'd to come my house shall bee att your service.

You write me that the Beetle merchants gives 5 Pagodas Annually for a Cowle, and that Dossapa has received 1^{pa}: 18th. in part for this year, Tis true Dossapa and his predecessors were great oppressors, but now to mention any such thing is a great sin; your business is to clear the King Custom's, and after that is paid, for you to oppr[ess] them is very unjust, I know you to bee a man of great parts therefore do but consider of these things.

As for Vellapa he is one that belongs to Madrass, and he is Indebted to severall people as appeared upon prooff of their Bonds, and if any one will bee security for the money he can bee soon sett at liberty, yo[u being] an understanding man what can I [say more].

I have received your Kind Letter, and understand the contents thereof.

You writt me about the Cattle that were stolen the very same time I ordered the Justices of the Choultry to inquire about them, here were 4 cattles sold which have delivered to your people againe, now I desire you to check them for going away without orders. I am inform'd that the ancient Custom of the Phousdars fees is for every ox load of cloth two Doodas and two Cash, but now they take two Cash for each peice of Cloth, which after this rate will amount to a great deal of money. Therefore desire you to grant a Cowle to the merchants that your people may receive no more then the ancient Custom is, w^{ch}: will bee the mean's of increasing our freindship.

1. Our last was dated 17th: May 1698 by Ship Aune and 20th: August Via Acheen Copies whereof comes inclosed, since which wee have received yours of the 21st: May 11th: June last by Ketch Success, from Bengall allso a generall Letter from M^r: Richard Darley & c^a: Councill of [P]ryamong dated 18th: May with their Journall & Leidger Ending June 97, & c^a: [. . . . hookes] of accounts.

2. This comes by Ship Thorndon who arrived here on the 29th: August, but in her passage meeting with very bad weather, she sprung most of her masts, w^{ch}: occasion'd her being so long detain'd here, wee have sent on her seven Chests of Dollars proper for your Coast, thereby to enable you to provide Pepper enough to fill her up, which you must bee sure to see well garbled before you Lade itt on board, Our masters having complain'd of the foulness of the Pepper lately receiv'd and possitively order'd that none bee sent them for the future, but what is well garbled, thereby to prevent paying freight and custom for dust.

3. This is a large ship and will require a considerable quantity of Pepper to Lade her, therefore wee have added two Chest Dollars more then what order'd by the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Company, and you must use your utmost diligence in procuring a sufficient quantity to fill her, so as to save her passage, which undoubtedly will bee an acceptable service to our masters.

4. Wee have perused the Agreement made between Sultan Mahomud Shaw and Mr. Richard Darley &c^a: and think they did well to procure the old Emperours Ratification of the Contract made by Mr: Barwell with Sultan Guilimot and Addill (for wee find tis almost the same). But ought to bee very cautious how you trust him, for there is great reason to suspect notwithstanding his pretensions of freindship, that he still Espouses and promotes the Dutch Interest thô secretly.

5. Wee cannot by any [means] either approve or consent to your resettlement of] Indrapoora without the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: own order for so doing, for we are well assur'd that when our masters had a settlement there, the proffitt of the Pepper they provid'd never defrayed halfe the charge. But if you could prevail with the old Emperour &c^a: to deliver their Pepper att a certain price, either att Bencoolen or [P]ryamong, wee should esteem such a Contract to bee for our masters Interest but the multiplying of settlements serves to no other end then to increase Charge, and weaken yourselves by Divideing your Forces.

6. Wee approve of your entertaining Alexander Clark and William Jones who came out sould[i]ers on the Trumboile Gally as writers, if they are sober men and qualified as you mention, wth: reference to the R^t: Hon^{ble}s: Comp^s: approbation whom you must advise thereof, that if their Honours approve them they may take security, and acquaint them to write to their freinds to tender the same.

7. Wee have paid your Bill for 300: Dollars dat'd 11th: June last to Mr: John Styleman.

8. Wee have sent you by this ship writing Paper, Quills &c^a: Factors provisions as ₤ Invoice you must supply [P]ryamong with such part as you think necessary.

9. M^r: Charles Everall having pretty well recover'd his health and requesting our leave to returne to York Fort on this ship, we have [att his de]sire paid him halfe a years whole [salary . . .] ending 29th: Septem^r: 1698. Inclosed is a Paper he deliverd us, wherein you'l find he mention'd 312 Dollars to bee detained from him without just reason, pray examine this matter, and if you find his allegations true, lett right bee done him without delay.

10. Inclosed is 2 Par: of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Companys Gen^l: Letters to Fort S^t George ₤ ships Sidney and Tavestock wherein you'l perceive they order an exact Inventory of their Estate as well moveable as immoveable to bee sent them once every three years, and one by the first conveyance which you must be sure to comply with.

11. The Auditor Generall in his Letter to Fort S^t: George dated 5th: February 1698 hath order'd that the Journall of the Generall Bookes of accounts be signed by y^e: Chief of each respective Factory as well, as the accomptant which order you must observe.

12. Wee do expect that on receipt hereof the Deputy Governour do make good the amount of the Freight of the 35 Bahars Pepper he Laded and permitted to be Laded on the Fleet ffrigatt on account of an pretended priviledge, to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: Cash att the rate of 20 ₤ cent freight, and do for the future utterly forbid the Lading of any Pepper on the Companys ships, but for their Hon^{rs}: Acco^{ts}:

13. Tis almost needless to tell you how excessive chargeable the West coast settlements have been to our masters, for that the Auditor Generall in his Calculation of the charge, and what pepper rec^d: makes itt come out att about 11^d ₤ pound which been all sold in England [. . .] 12^d: to 20^d: whether this great losse has arisen from ill management or misfortune wee will not decide, tho' are afraid from both, but the greatest from the former.

14. The 3 Principal things the Comp^s: recommend to all their Presidents Agents and Chiefs are the increasing their revenues and trade & the retrenching all superfluous expences all w^{ch}: we earnestly recommend to you & that you'le take such measures as that in the end we may find a different effect from w^t: intended; the increase of revennues & trade is not to be effected by wise and gentle means & impartial administration of Justice and freedom of trade wth: out w^{ch}: no place can ever flourish.

15. We consider the many pretty Princes & Governors you have to deale wth: all some of w^{ch}: we know are govern'd intirely by the Dutch, an instance whereof we had in y^e: business of Indapoorā you must make it your business fas aut nefas to root out all y^t: interest or else you will find they only lye lurkeing for an oppertunity to doe the same as they did at that place, we would not have you concerne yourselves too often in the small peaks & quarrells among shore Sultans & Gov^{rs}: for whilst they don't arise to a warr so as to commit any devastation upon one anothers plantations you are y^e: safer but be sure to keep things so between them as that you at all times may be the balance,, otherwise if you should make a generall union amongst them and considering that in their humours they are weavering you'l alwaies be in their power to be destroyed, and twill be easier for y^e: Dutch to engage them to their interest when they are united then when they are divided.

16. The R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: wee know have often wrote you concerning improvem^t at your place in planting of pepper Indico Sugarcanes Cotten and what else the place will produce w^{ch}: they had rather have done by letting out ground to [. . .] of all nations then by their own slaves in w^{ch}: [. . .] you to be verry dilligent.

17. Wee could heartily wish (if it can be effected) that all pepper might be deliver'd you att Bencoolen or [P]riamong thō you gave something y^e: more for it for the keeping so many little Pagars doe but divide your fforce and so consequently weaken you as we have mention'd in another paragraph and thō we have at present a Generall peace tis but prudent to provide for warr, of the Dutch we have already had large experience of their friendship in time of peace, so have reason to fear they will do their utmost in time of warr. The ffrench will most certainly attempt the makeing of Settlem^t: in all parts of India, for that they have this year sent three ships to Bengall on their Comp^a: acco^t: and 4 men of warr the designe of y^e: latter is yet unknown so y^t: it requires you to be verry carefull and circumspect in strengthening & securing w^t: you are possessed of to prevent any surprize & wee shall doe our utmost to contribute towards it by sending you large & constant supplies of goods and mony to enable you to purchase all the pepper the Country about you produces thō it be to y^e: amount of 4,000 bahar yearly wee doe expect after the arrival of ship ffame (who we dispatch'd full laden the 4th: instant) in England that the R^t: H^e: C^a: will for y^e: future yearly send out a ship of 4 or 500 Tons directly to yo^r: place to be laden wth: pepper for this Port & so constantly to be dispatch'd hence in Septem^{br}: for England.

18. If as you advise there is great quantity of pepper procureable & that after you have laden this Ship you can spare 100 Tonn and send us the same on freight so as to arrive here by the beginning of Janua^{ry}: it will be a good peice of service to y^e: R^t: H^e: C: and enable us to fill up the great Tonnage we have lying in our hands & in Bengall.

19. The paying of Custome at Yourk ffort for all goods imported there thō the same goods have paid the R^t: H^e: C: y^e: Custome of 5 ^Ɔ cent at any other of their settlements as you will see by y^e: enclos'd Copy of our Consultation Dated 13th: October 1698 whereunto we referr you for y^e: reasons inducing us thereunto and would have you observe the same Except otherwise order'd by the R^t: H^e: Comp^a.

20. We have sent you on this Ship 11 English & 19 Topas souldiers & one M^r: Jn^o: E [. . .] ns [with] Commission to be [ensign] in the room of Tho: Gutteridge [. . .] esteeming him a person fitt to be entrusted [. . .] able a port & would have you either send him to England on this ship or hither by y^e: first oppertunity w^{ch}: you shall judge most convenient among y^e: souldiers now sent there is one John Cumberland who has y^e: Character of a sober man and a good penman if you have occasion for a writer and find him deserving you may entertain him as such.

21. We have permitted M^r: Frith to take his passage on this Ship in order to the adjusting his acco^t: wth: the R^t: H^e: Comp^a: wherein we would have you give him what assistance requisite & to state his acco^t: fairly & impartially by w^{ch}: means all just grounds for future Compl^t: will be prevented. We have been inform'd that M^r: Frith hath an adventure wth: Cap^t: Phrip Com^r: of Ship welcome if Cap^t: Phrip-

arrives at York ffort or [P]riamong and upon enquiry you find he hath any effects of M^r: friths you must attach the same in his hands (if he refuse to deliver it to you) for satisfaction of his debt to the R^t: H: Comp^a: and advise us thereof for he hath nothing here that we know of & If what he presents be true has not where withall to buy food for w^{ch}: reason we would have you dureing his stay (w^{ch}: is to be no longer yⁿ: necessary for the finishing his acco^{ts}:) lett him have his dyet at the table.

Your Letter dated 18th of May last w^{ch}: the several Books and papers according to List we have receiv'd.

We are glad to hear y^t: all Picques as well those w^{ch}: had their rise either from personal prejudice or private interests are laid aside & y^t: you Joyne unanimously in the prosecution of such methods as seem the most effectuall for uniting the rajahs formerly one to another and all in the service and interest of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: comp^a: and hope y^t: such unhappy differences as are destructive to both will never grow to ahead againe amongst you.

All persons that have had any dealings or Commerce wth: the Mallyans are sensible of their false & weavering tempers and therefore it behoves those who are the Chiefe Man[ager] of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: affairs among them to be prudent & cautious. Wee find by the Character you give of rajah Addill that he is much the same unsteady weavering man as when M^r: Darwell was there but in consideration that his mild Governm^t: had gain'd him a Generall esteem he thought it for y^e Comp^a: interest then to carry it fair wth: him and tho there was not a probabillity of his ever doeing them any great service by reason of [. . .] temper yet by that means to prevent his doeing [. . .] injury and we think for the same reason you [. . .] that method still and that raja Macoota who hath approv'd himself faith[full] to the R^t: H. Comp^a: ought to be encourag'd so far as it can be done without giveing disgust to the other as for the delivery of y^e swords you that are upon the place are best able to judge whether they ought or not. But it is our opinion that you doe not think it convenient to deliver both, you had best to deliver neither.

Wee have perus'd your articles of Agreem^t: wth: the old Emperour, but are apprehensive, that the old Emperour is not real & that he will betray you when ever he has an oppertunity, and therefore ought not to [be] trusted.

Wee have wrote fully to York ffort concerning y^e resettling at Indapoor, to w^{ch}: we cannot by any means consent. That ffactory haveing formerly provd a great charge to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: and but of little or noe advantage and wee doe esteeme it rather the comp^s: true interest to secure all the pepper to themselves that the Country between York ffort & [P]riamong produce them by multiplying of settlements. Encrease charges and divide yo^r: Strength and thereby disenable yourselves to keep what you already possess; and wee are well assured that, that tract of Land will produce a great quantity of Pepper if the planting thereof is encourag'd.

You ought in all your agreem^t: to mention the R^t: H. Eng^s: E^t. I^a: Comp^a: and the name of the place where such person was chief who made them w^{ch}: are omitted in the Coppys wee have recd.

When you can procure Quil Capia of that sort, Whereof M^r. Barwell bought a muster wee would have you send some home to the R^t. Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: for a tryall.

Wee have supply'd York ffort wth: ffactors provissions and order'd them to send you what necessary.

There is Laden on board this shipp Thorndon seven chest Dollars for York ffort but have given the Commd^r: orders to touch at [P]riamong in his way thither and to deliver you two chests of Dollars if you require it that you may immediately apply yo^r selves to the provideing a good quantity of Pepper. There are also one board her, severall bales of Cloth mark'd wth: the Letter Y of w^{ch}: you may take ashoar so many as are necessary for supply of yo^r: markt.
