Wee have advice of 5 French Ships arrived at Goa on y^e: 29th: November last, it is not certain but credible requires our Provisions against ther Designs which are Kept private and wee dont know but there is a greater Fleet gone to other parts the R^t: H: Company have Sent out Some Souldiers by these Shippes their Number unknown but wee think not many wee must make y^e: best Shift wee can with what wee have you have wrote about fortifying Cuddalore town by Trenches and finishing the wall wee have Discoursed M^r: Hattsell about it and leave it to your Effecting it being very convenient for y^e: Sattisfaction as well as the Security of y^e: Inhabitance but the main thing is the Fort to render that tenable against an Europe Enemy therefore first forward the repaires as Soon as you can and Consider of the best method of procureing a store of provisions at cheapest rate. What money you Shall want for this accasion you may Draw upon us Till wee can otherwise Supply you.

It is not Convenient that you Coyne any money with y^e: Inscription of Ram Raja while it remains uncer[t]ⁿ: who will be the master of the Countrey your Coyning of Madrass Pag^{es}: may have the same Effect as the Coyn^s: of the Pullicat Stamp at

Negapatam had on the Dutch Coyn and in Generall y^e: Mint is not to be farmed if a future and lasting benefitt is designed for the farmers will only Consider their present Profitt and notwithstanding their offers of haveing their Coyn tryed by Assays yet they will by one trick or another ruin the reputation of mint by adulterateing the Matt and therefore that matter requires your further consideration.

Wee have caused the papers which passed between you and the Wooriar &c: and those from Chinge to be Translated wee fully Concur with M^r. Hattsells opinion that it is necessary that you Keep a fair Correspondenc[e] [with] Ram Raja because your Countrey lies within his Territorys and this will be best done by means of Sadeballage and that you cannot avoid gratifying him and officers with some of those things which may [be] required but we cannot limit you to [?]a]sume not doubting but you will be as frugall as you can in complying with the Imergent occasion which wee cannot foresee but may be Suddainly [...].

As to Tommant the Shroffe wee approve of M^r: Haynes reason for not securing the Worriars kindsman Espeasially considering the impediments w^{ch}: y^e: Marrattas army will probably give to Your Merchants business in other parts, it is the more necessary to Keep faire with y^e: Worriars that the Merchants may be Supplied with Cloth from thence and for the Sake of the Overland tread of Pepper tho on the other hand it is very hard and unjust in y^e: Worriars to protect a Debtor and a runaway thief whome his Kindeman your watchman was obliged to see forthcomeing and it will be in vain to think of Keeping freindship wth: him upon those terms for by the same reason he protects one he will protect Every man that can gett an oppertunity for runing away with mony of other mens and your Taliar who ought to prevent will promote and assist their runing away.

The R^t: Honourable Company haveing forbidden y^e: sending home of course Indigo wee return you three hundred and fif[t]y Baggs to be made fine or to be Sold at a markt price Some may be used in Dying Blew Cloth for the R^t: H: Company.

The R^t: H: Company have acquainted us by the Russell Friggott Generall Letter that they have appointed M^r: Hattsell President of Fort S^t: George but the Commission being not yett arrived he now returns to his station at Fort S^t: David and bring with him a Gen^l: [from] y^e: R^t: H Company to Fort S^t: David.

Wee have Delivered to M^r: Owen Channell Mas^r: of the Greyhound a Letter Directed to Cap^t: Thom^s: Raynes Commander of the Martha with orders to Deliver y^e: Same [to] Cap^t: Rayns if he meets with y^e: Martha and to Deliver you Cap^t: Raynes receipt for y^e: Same or if he meets not the Martha to Deliver you the Letter itSelf which the Agent & Second only may open & peruse the forme of the orders given therein.

The R^t: H: Company have sent us by the Russell Friggott: in Cloth and led £11,851-10-3 in Silver £21,776-2-8 wⁿ: the Silver comes to us wee shall coyn it into Rupees as fast as wee can and Send it all to you or as much as wee can possibly Spare perceiving there is a further Stock upon other Ships tho wee

have no advice of the amount or Sorts of goods &c: but wee conclude there is a considerable quantity of cloth and led comeing which advice us by the first how much of each may Vend you may depend upon it that wee must send you a great part of your stock therein wee shall Willingly supply you with as much as is necessary for finishing the last contract and makeing another and that wee may be the better directed therein give us a calculate of what is wanting to compleat the last and the Amo^t of your next Investment and when payable.

Wee take notice what you think your Selves able to lade another Ship (besides the Martha) as big as the Success, but wee fear none of this Fleet will arrive with you time enough to be dispatched home this Season (22^d: January [...]).

Our advise daily confirm the growth of y^e: Marratte forces and y^e Decrease of Zulphakar Cawns army & there is no certainty tho many reports of forces coming to his assistance, which renders it more necessary that you make a freindship withe y^e Marrattas by Pishcashes as you propound tho the less Publick y^e: better to prevent giveing offence to Zulphakar Cawn.

Herewith is Invoyce of the 5 bales of Aurores w^{ch}: you took out of the Russell Friggott am^t: Pag^s: 761: 9 we can Spare you a fewe more and as much broadcloth Ord^r: and Perpetuanus and Crimson and Lead as yo^r: Merchants or markt will Take of and Indeed wee have so much Europe cloth now in the Godown that unless you can Dispose of at least 100 or 150 Bales we dispaire of Selling it in Sev^l: years if accasion requires wee are Content to abate the price Considerably on the 5th: Instant We wrote you Concerning the Concludeing of your Merchants old Contract and begining another. We know not what accation there may be for Dispatching a Ship from hence in Agust or September next Especially if there should another early Ship or two arrive here in May or June next.

Wee have rec^d: the bales you sent us by the Russell Friggott and S^t David Yatch (tho they came to late for the Mary which was sent before they came and saild on the 12th: Instant) the warehouse keeper haveing accasion to open a few bales which seem'd to be wett, finds a p^s: of white long Cloth in one bale that is much torne and throughout the whole p^s: spotted with Yellow & Dirty spotts. The faults of the beaters and washers and one peice Brown the outers foles [folds] clean and good, but all the inner foles very black both which peices seem to have bin Packedup in the same condition as they now are becaus there is no Ship Damages, and the Cloth is not moist bothe the said bales are sorted by M^r: Games and Embald by M^r: Ingram. We are Inclined to think that neither of them saw those two peices, but rather that they were changed by Your Servants in the Packing.

When the warehous keeper is at leisure he must [have] Examined all the bales and then wee shall give you a further report of their Condiion in the mean time lett those that are concerned in the Sorting and packing be more carefull.

Inclosed is the Cobby of the Europe Invoice of y^e 2 bales of Clothashes N^o: 58: 59 said to co[n]tain 11 peices Each wee shall pay your Bill of Pag^s: 994 To Narrain dated 19th Instant and have received the Freight of 18 Slaves Φ Ship Elizabeth a Pag: Φ head.

Wee are much concerned for the unhappy accident about the Dutch Souldier wherin after many times consideration of your Letter and protest, we think you have Driven the Contraversy farther then the Nature of y^e thing will bear wee are not against asserting of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: Rights and their Jurisdiction over all that inhabits wth in their bounds whethe[r] Indians or Europeans but y^e Dutch are to be considered, not only as they are Inhabitants wth in the bounds of the English Governm^t: pay Custome in w^{ch} respect you term them Subjects but as a Comp^a: In Amity wth: y^e English Comp^a: and the Companies Indipendent and Standing upon Equell Termes Case of the Dutch Souldiers Seems to fall und^r: the Latter notions and y^t the Dutch are not therein to be considered as Subjects [?but] as a Company in amity.

And the contraversy will turne upon these 2 questions whether the Souldiers runing from the service off one may be intertaind in y^e Service of the other Company and whether a Souldier so entertained ought not to be delivered when Demanded without Doubt by the Strickness of the Rules of amity one Company ought not to Entertain the runaways of the other and when they are Demanded and appear to be runaway they ought to be delivered for if it be not so upon what ground have we at any time Demanded our runaways of the Dutch or upon what grounds did you Demand y^e Dutch Soulr: of M^r: Calendrini &c^a: after he run from your Service the maine ground of the protest is that he was in y^e Compa[n]ys pay and if that be a sufficient reason for Your Demand they had the like reason to Demand him at first, if run from their Service into ours, and you were as much obliged by y^e strickness of rule of amity to Deliver him on their Demand as you can Suppose them to be obliged to Deliver him now. There is one Circumstance on our Side Viz^t: they liveing under our Government it is in them a greater presumption to intice or receive our runaways but that dos not alt^r the right of the case and must pass instance of aggrevation but they have that in Entertaining him into Your Service you received another Circumstance on there side Viz^t that a runaway from their Service, and when he ran from you they onely rec^d: one that was there one before and if that had bin in your case you would have Justified the Detaining him with that reason.

from y^e : Factory before this arrives wee think it nec[essary] to order possitiuely y^t you forthwith withdraw them and take of y^e Stop on provision &c^a : And what Ever the case be its at this Instant y^e more necessary to maintain a frindly Correspondence with y^e Dutch because wee have certain advise y^t 6 French Ships have arrived at Goa and from thence Departed for and are arrived at Surratt and wee have no reason to think but they will come into these parts a Difference between you and the Dutch now may prove of ill Consequence but that you may wth Draw yo^r men with better Credit we think this y^e : best method that you acquaint M^r : Calendrini &c^a : that you haveing acquainted us with what hath past wee have order^d to refer The Matter to us wee haveing wrot to Negapat^m abu^t it Cobby of the Letter to Gov^r : Pitt comes Inclosed for your perusuall with a Copy of y^e Mentioned articles. wee hav [ing] been y^e larger upon this Subject because it is requisite y^t we & you agree in one Sentiment and therefore we Desire you to give us your opinion freely if you Differ from us or have in the Severall Disputs you have had with the Dutch observed any thing fit to be noted on this accasion.

Since the writing of the foregoing we rec^d : yo^{rs} : of 25 and 26 Instant this afternoon q^t : a Letter from Gov^r : Pitt and from Pullicherry to yorselves when translat^d wee shall send you a Cobby thereof. at present wee see no reason against your withdrawing your Guard from y^e Factory Especially since it Dos appear that the Souldier Demanded is not in the Factory and we Desire you to Endeavor accomodation with your Dutch neighbour in order to a freindly reconsilation that the present Difference may not Increase and Interrupt our agreem^t against our Common Enemy. The last Letter I rec^d: from Yo^r: Hon^r: was Dated Pm^o: Februy adviseing the arrivall of 6 French Ships at Goa I this Day am Inforemed by a Armenian Merchant that last night he rec^d: letters from an Armenien Resid^t: in Golcundah adviseing no more then that he had rec^d Letters from Surratt Dated 49 Days from this Date that 7 French Ships were arrived there but I have receiv^d no advice whereunto I can give credit concerning the Designe of their further proceedings. However I cannot amit to observe one passage to Yo^r: Hon^r: that some times after the first advise rec^d: here concerning French Ships Designed for India a French Capuchin of this place told me he thought their Design was for Mergen but I give no more heed to that then other reports till the last week the Supra Cargoe of a Madrass Ship arriveing from Canton, adviseeth that the French Missionary Jesuits there told him of Letter they had rec^d: overland from France in 4 months time to aqaiant y^m: of 6 French Ships Designed to Settle at Mergen & y^t: upon y^t advise Several Missionaries were ordred from China to Siam. While wee are so much concerned [to] unite in a freindly agreement and mutuall assistance against the Common Enemy I am troubled y^t there Should happen any Difference between our Gov^r: and Council of Fort St. David and yo^r: chief and Council of Tegnept^m concerning a runaway Souldier I dont pfectly understand the circumstance of the case but upon the first notice the Govern^r: and Council of Fort S^t David are ordered to quit any further Demands on the Chief and Council of Tegnapatam and to referr the Matter wholley to us and I Shall at better leasure offer to yo^r: Hon^r: consideration the concerting of Some Method for the preventing of such Difference for the future wherein yo^r: Hon^r: may rest assu^d of my sencere intention whereof I have lately given a prooffe tho' the Success hath not answered my Expectation upon the notice your Hon^r: gave when at Pullicate of Some Souldiers run from yo^r: Service there one of them Hendrick Leflore comeing afterwards and offering his Service in this Garrison I caused him to be Secured & Kept upon our Guard and advised the Worp^{ll}: Adrian Visser

Pitt wee have Severall yours to answer I [n] yours of 25th: and 26th you complain of 5 ₤ Cent charge on y^e 5 Bales of aurora Taken by you from the Russell Friggott which don by the accountant by Virtue of y^e Genⁿ: Order for charging 5 ₤ Cent on all Goods Sent from hence to Subordinat Factorys which order was made 3 Years Since & [? calculated] to make Good the Charges losses and wast upon severall Good [s] which would otherwise Fall upon this presidensy and prevent the Trouble of Antecalculating upon Every Sorts of Goods but that the proffit of Every Factory may appear, Goods are Invoiced to them at Invoice price or prime cost whereas formerly goods had be[en] frequently Invoiced at the Madrass price whereby the proffit [. . .] to the accou[n]t of this presidensy. Therefore in the whole you are not hardly Dealt with but if you think it requisite you may recharge to Acco^t: Cur^t: the 5 ₤ Cent charged on the Side 5 bales Your note of 40 ₤ Cent advance on Silver Fanams coined here, is a great mistake the price is 36 Fanams ₤ Pag^e: and we receive & pay at 36 Fan^s: ₤ Pag^e: and all others ought to doe so to[. . .] price of 37 is the Shroff^a: Roguery which requires a remedy that Parrigraph of your letter and this answer hath Spent more paper then the Subjects required.

Wee Sent you a few Madrass rupees for a Tryall but sin^e: they doe not pass wee will send no more, wee Shall send you by the David Yatch Such writinge paper as wee can procure (the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: haveing Sent none this year) wee can Send more Small-paper if you want but no more booke paper that sent will be sufficient for the Geneⁿ: books if not applied to other use there is no wax procurable but shall send you some Cādles rec^d: from Bengall w^{ch}: if they are not good wee have no other.

The Gunnyes sent you last were the best procurable and wee no better for our own use wee have rec^d none From Bengall this Year, wee Shall Send you all the Salt Bengall Porke wee have by the Yatch and the cordage according to your list wee leave it to the Gov^r: and Counⁿ: to appoint by commission either Rob^t: Read or Such other as you thinke fitter Ensigne of the Second Company.

By the next oppertunity you Shall have as many assistances as can be Spared and one to fitt your councill.

Wee Send you the Translate of the Dutch Letters from Gov^r: Pitt and from Pullicherry.

Yours of the 27th: of Febru^r: brought us the copy of yo^r: Letter to Gov^r: Pitt &c^r: at Negapatam of the Sam[e] Date and Your of 28th: a Letter and Translate from Pullicherry and your ans^wr thereunto of the Same date all which relateing to the runaway Souldier requires no further answer till you have rec^d: an answer from Gov^r: Pitt yours of the 29th of Feb^r adviseth of a bill drawn on us for Pag^s: 300 Payable to M^r: Wright which is paid.

Yours 2nd Instant rec^d the 6th, acquainting us that you had withdrawn the guards from the Dutch Factory puts an end to the writeing about that matter till the Dutch give further occasion and yours of 5th: adviseing that you not think it Convenient to send Gov^r: Pitt our Letter till Some extraordinary Circumstance make it necessary wee Suppose it is your meaning that wee should leave the management of the Contraversy to your Selves wherein we wish you good Success tho wee are of oppinion that you had better have sent Forward that Letter because it contains other Matters and if you send it you may still proceed in the management of the controversy till they referr it to us the Instance which you gave of Souldiers entertained at Pullicherry from Fort S^t: David and Fort S^t: George are very materiall and the better prooffe can be gained thereof y^e better it will serve to Justify or at least excuse your entertaining their runaways also the Letter from Van Neek will [be] of good use to prove their Trapanning him and carying in Irons thro your Bounds but these are acted privately by them and tho beleaved by y^u yet not owned by them but the placing of a gaurd of Sould^r [at] their Factory the Stopping of goods trade &c^r: are acted publicly and need no proof because owned and avowed by your Letters to Pullicherry and Negapatam and this is the Difficult point because we are affraid it will be construed not agreeable to the Generall articles of Peace notwithstanding the particular circumstance of the Dutch Factory being within the English bounds.

Inclosed are the Translates of Van Neeks Letter tho wee think they ought not to be exposed much less Discoved to the Dutch here but rather reserved to [be] transmitted to Europe.

Wee are sorry to find by yours of the 7th: Instant y^t your Mer^t will not make a formall contract till the Countrey is better settled but when they doe you must no[t] contract for more Succolombs then bear a proportion to the other goods mentioned in the list. it is a fine cloth and will Take up a great deal of money in a little room and is proportionably Dear then other Sorts of Calicoes.

Wee Shall pay your Bill of Pag^s: 2500 to Anti^o de Vass Concelloes when due and cause the two Pag^s: which you sent of your new stamp to be Examined and for the better security of the goodness of the coin observe the following method out of Every parcell of Pag^s: coined lett one be taken indifferently by the mint master in presence of Samde Bollage or Some appointed by him and put into a Box Kept for that purpose with two Keys (to be kept by the mintmaster and Samde Bollage or one appointed by him) once in a Month or two according to the num^r of percells and quantity coined whereof an account to be kept by the mintmaster in this manner Viz^t:

Yesterday we Rec^d: Yo^{rs}: dat^d: 2 Inst: wth: papers According to list N^o: 1: to 9 wherein you give us a ¶ticular Acco^t: of the Case between the Chingee Goldsmith and the Dutch Merch^t: wherein we observe you have proceeded wth: due Consideration and Stop at Sen^r: Calendrini &c^a: Refuseing to deliver the Criminall till ord^{rs}: from Negapatam w^{ch}: if they direct the delivery of Criminall you will have no difficulty in Executeing the Sentence against him.

But tis most probable that the Dutch will according to their Constant pra[c]tice, contrive some Pretensions whereon to Ground a denyall and it is likely they will alledge the Priviledge by Cowle of Punishing their owne Serv^{ts}: w^{ch}: priviledge was never denyed them (nor ought) in matters Relateing to themselves, and their business as Merch^{ts}: but cannot be construed to Extend to Crimes w^{ch}: calls a mans life into

question, or concerns the publick peace and good understanding between the Govern^r : of Tegnepatam and the Country Govern^t : w^{ch} : belongs onely to the Cognecance of the R^t : Hon^{ble} : English East India Comp^a : as Lords Proprietors.

We think therefore that the Dutch are wholly in the wrong in protecteing the Merch^t : from Justice and that we must not quitt the Demand of his delivery untill Justice be done to the Satisfaction of the Partyes aggrieved and if the Dutch shall find a way to Satisfy them wth : out delivering the Criminall to you that he might suffer punishment in the manner appointed by the Sentence, and the partyes shall by writeing attested acknowledge themselves fully satisfied tho you may in such case, for peace sake forbear to prosecute the demands of his delivery yet it will be Requisite, that you send Sen^r : Calendrini &c^a : a declaration Signifying that tho upon the P^{ty}es declareing themselves Satisfyed, and out of Regard to the ffreindship between the nations you forbaer to demand the delivery of the Criminall att P^{sent}, yet that you doe not thereby intend the quitting but do still claim and Reserve our Right & Authority for demanding the delivery of Criminalls in like Casses and in this if occasion shall hereafter Require & [in] the mean time declare them Responsible for Evill Consequence if any shall happen for want of their delivering the Criminall.

If the Dutch doe not satisfie the P^{ty} and yet Refuse to deliver the Criminall we thinke you must not proceed to take him out of the ffactory by force but send them a Protest to make them Answerable for all consequents and P^{use} their Cowles w^{ch} : they P^{tend} to have Rec^d : from the Country Govern^t : and Consider wth : us whether there may not from thence be gathered some Reasons for stoping their tread. &c^a : in such cases as the Country Govern^t : would and without doubt have formerly done there as well as in all other ffactoryes Dutch and English.

If the Complaints Continue to demand Justice as probably they will it will be difficult to answer their for if you deliver them a Copy of the Sentence and acquaint them that you have demanded him of the Dutch, but they Refuse to deliver him the Complainants will probably apply to Ramraja and he will send you a letter wth : a Cobby you may send to the Dutch and leave the Cobby wth : y^m : (but keep the originall) and if they yet Refuse to deliver Protest againe, but if you answer Ramraja y^t : the Dutch declair the Criminall, he will still insist the more Earnestly upon the delivery and if he be not delivered, he may order his fforges when they come that way to trouble you and the Dutch too and it would be a very hard case y^t : we should not onely suffer for their sakes but be oblig'd to defend them as Inhabitants who occasion the trouble.

If the ffrench fleet of five or six ships shall come upon this Coast I am inclined to think they will come to S^t: Thoma, where they may Expect to Receive not onely the Common Civility of newters, but all the ffreindly Assistance w^{ch}: Portugees of that place cane give them wth: out declareing themselves our open Enemies I doubt not but yo^r: Hon^r: did p^rceive their Inclinations when you were here in the Year 1690. I have had some Expeirence of itt since, and beleive them to be ffrenchmen in their harts.

Being advised by a vessell w^{ch}: come from Acheen in May last wth: out lett^{rs}: that the Ship Pearle was arrived there: wth: M^r: Keeling M^r: ffarmer and Cap^t: Howell but being uncapable of p^rceeding hither her Cargo was Landed there and M^r: ffarmer waited our orders, we sent an Europe Ship the Mary Cap^t: Thomas Oyles Comand^r: to bring away the Pearles Cargo and Passengers who in Decem^r: last, brought us all Safe, and your Packett q^t: y^r: Gen^{ll}: latter dat^d: 25th: Jan^{ry}: 1693/4 and 8th: Novem^r: 1694 wth: the accompanying Books and Papers According to List.

This comes to you by way of Conton Recommended to M^r: Dolben and M^r: Trenchfeild supra Cargoes of ship Elizabeth for Conveyance by land Patamars by whom we desire you to Returne us an answer with the Necessary Advices.

The R^t: Hon^{ble}: Compⁿ: have by their last Gen^{ll}: Letter to us order'd y^e: wth: drawing of the ffactory of Tonqueen to ffort S^t: George so soon as possibly it can be Effected we have used our outmost Endeavours to gett a ship for y^t: p^rpose, but we have had none from Europe of a fitt Size and there haveing been 11 ships Cast ashore from our Road by a storme in Aprill and 9 Ships yett missing w^{ch}: ought to

have arrived before April, and still Expected we have not yett mett wth: one that is fitt and are unwilling to send one that is crazy but we are still in hopes of procureing one to send before the 15th: June w^{ch}: we Reckon y^e: latest time of departure.

Wee are very Sencible of the Necessity of Sending one this Year finding by Yo^r Books that you have very little Stocke Remaining besides Debts w^{ch}: if you cannot Recover you will not be in a condition to carry on any trade but will live wholly on Charges and therefor the sooner the ffactory is withdrawn the better.

Yo^r: onely business therefore now is to prepare for a Removeall in order to w^{ch}: use Yo^r: utmost Endeavours for getting in the Debts and for disposing of the Remains to y^e: best advantage and consider of the best methods for ¶venting Yo^r: being detained by the Govern^r: that you may be in a Redyness to come away when a ship arrives.

The Debts amo^{ts}: to a great Sum: above 20000 tale but we doubt itt will be difficult to gett them considering w^t: you write in Yo^{rs}: of 8th: Novem^r: 1694.

That you have nothing to Shew for them M^r: Keeling doth affairme to us that he hath deliv'd all the Bills to you but you Refused to give him Receipt for them or any thing else as you found him in Tonqueen so he proves here some times in a more composed temper, but when we Enter into discourse wth: him concerning the affairs of Tonqueen he dos by degrees fall into a kind of distraction w^{ch}: we cant yett ¶ceive to be feigned all y^t: we can gett from him is that you have Grossely abused him in Tonqueen and taken from him by force all y^t: you could meet wth: of his, that you have Rec^d: from him all things whatsoever belonging to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: & would give him no Receipt nor shew him any Acco^t: that he hath secured all his Concerns and Papers in such hands in Tonqueen, as will not deliver any thing to any one unlesse he goes himself tho he should send never so many orders in writing.

When we send a Ship we shall send presents for the King &c^a: and also 24 pecull of salt petre and 24 pecull of Brimstone in Returne of 20,000 Cash w^{ch}: Ungja Tophow delivered you as an adventure.

We know not how far any of you or others may have been concerned, or accotable for former mismanagem^t: w^{ch}: may create an apprehension of being sevearly dealt with as guilt naturally produces fear of punishm^t: and that puts men upon projects of Escape if there be any that for this Reason shall Refuse to come and shall chouse Rather to Expose themselves to the miserys of vagabonds life banished from their Country and nation, wee desire them to consider seriously what the Consequence will be, and then we doubt not, but that they will be of opinion that it is better to Referr themselves to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^{as}: Goodness, wherein we shall give them as kind an assistance as the nature of things will bear and they Had better trust to us then involve themselves in Greater troubles.

We have this day heard a Report that M^r: ffarmer Rec^d: about 600 or 700 p^s: Pelongs from a Dutchman a free Merch^t: in Tonqueen, as an adventure for w^{ch}: he was to make Returnes by next ship M^r: ffarmer is now att ffort S^t: David & we cannot hear from him before this ship goes but you may assure the Concerned if he make any Enquiry or demand that We will call M^r: ffarmer to a strict acco^t: and cause him to deliver us the full produce of his adventure, w^{ch}: shall by the first be sent to Tonqueen or if it be not sent by a Ship it shall be made Good to his order here

Herewith we send you our letter to y^e: ffrench Bishop Relateing to M^r: Keeling Goods money and paper supposed to be left in his Custody if the Bishop will comply wth: out application to the King itt is better if not you must take Such Course as shall appear most adviseable to compell him or others to deliver to you y^t: you can gett and bring itt wth: you you will observe that we promise y^e: Bishope you shall give him a Receipt w^{ch}: ought to be signed by you all and take good care of what you Receive y^t: it may not be imbezeld or damaged.

If we cant send a ship this Year another Years Charge of the ffactory will Eat out your Stocke we therefore leave itt to you to Embrace any other oppertunity that shall offer for y^r: comeing away And if any offer advise us thereof by all wayes of Conveyance we are

Whereas the late dec^d: Gen^l: S^r: John Goldsborough and Council of ffort S^t: George being informed of the many miscariages of M^r: W^m: Keeling late Cheife of Tonqueen did by virtue of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: English East India Comp^a: ord^{rs}: send by the Ship Pearle in the Year 1693 M^r: Rich^d: Watts Cheife and M^r: Rich^d: ffarmer to Enquire into the State of affaires in Tonqueen and to demand and Receive from M^r: Keeling all the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: Concernes, wth: power to call M^r: Keeling to Acco^t: and to send him hither butt M^r: Watts &c^a: informe us by their Severall letters that att their arrivall att the ffactory of Tonqueen M^r: Keeling had Removed from thence not onely his Goods money and Necessarys; but all his bookes and papers and that when they came to Examine the Acco^{ts}: of the ffactory they found wanting many Bookes Papers Bills and Acco^{ts}: Relateing to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: Affairs w^{ch}: M^r: Keeling allwayes Refused to deliver to y^m: desireing his stay there and that M^r: Keeling had imbezeld of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: Estate above 12,000 tal[e] when M^r: Keeling arrived here in Decemb^r: last wee demanded of him the said Bookes and Papers he answered that he hath brought none with him but left them in Tonqueen we have also demanded Satisfaction for the Great Sum of money w^{ch}: he hath imbezeld, but he answered that he hath not brought a Cash wth: him but hath Left all that he had in the hands of such P^{ersons} as will not deliver it to his own ord^r: unless he goe himselve to demand it and Whereas M^r: Keeling being Vix compos mentis cannot give us any Rationall acco^t: of his actions nor will not yett comply wth: any Reasonable terms onely declareth that he has left all in Yo^r: hands whereof we are otherwise informed now wee the Liv^t: Gen^l: for affairs of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: East [Ind]ia Comp^a: in India and the Council of Fort S^t: George doe in y^o: name and behalfe of the s^d: Comp^a: desire and demand you will please to deliver unto M^r: Richard Watts Cheife &c^a. On the 2^d: Aprill the Mary Bowyer arrived wth: M^r: Barwell and M^r: Butterfeild M^r ffeetwood Kenned Emmett and 3 Topassees and brought us Yo^r: Gen^l: Letter Dat^d: 10th: ffeb^y wth: the Sevrall bookes and Papers according to list whereby we Gladly observe the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^{as}: affaires are so well Settled, and our former Directions so well observed that in sted of censure the usuall Style of fformer letters we find Reason to approve and Commend any little matter of further directions tis Yo^r: part to p^psecute the Methods settled wth: due Consideration and industry itt is however Requisite to give an answer to severall p^pticulars in Yo^r: letter.

2: Soe long as Liv^t: Delgardner Continues delligent and servisable in his Employ as Liv^t: and overseer of the Coffreys, lett him have due countenance, and Encouragement but we Expect that he pay all due respect to his Superiours.

3: The managem^t: and Employ^mt: of the Coffreys is a matter of vast importance to the Emprovement of the place they cost a Great Sum^e for their purchass but more for their maintenance, this being a constant Charge Requires a Constant Employ in some thing benefitiall besides their worke on Charges ffortifications and Merchandize.

4. Upon M^r: ffeetwoods arrivall we have demanded of him the ballance of his Acco^t: as Stated at York ffort, w^{ch}: he disownes and finding him persist in his usuall practice of Evasive pretences we have caused an Action to be Entred against him in the Court of Admiralty that he may be there compelld to give a p^pticular answer to every article of his acco^t: we will not now perjudge him but if the matters shall prove so bad as they seem at p^psent, we will transmitt to you the whole State and adjudication of the cause that the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^{as}: Serv^{ts}: wth: you may not be onely satisfied wth: y^e: Reasonableness of our proceedings but be causioned from ffollowing so ill an Example, the information you had of his p^pvate mischeivous practices was sufficient Reason for securing him on board the Amety to p^pvent the Effect.

5: M^r: Butterfeild hath finished the [P]riamon[g] Bookes but they will not be Coppied time Enough for this conveyance, Inclosed is y^e: Cobby of the Remains of Bookes C: by w^{ch}: Books D: may be carryed on.

6: Wee have sent you another Supply of Garden seeds wth: Docter Browns directions for the planting of some of them.

7: You did well in Returning us Superfluous Stores &c^a: and in keeping the Damage Tappais for the use of the Slaves.

8: Wee have sent you as full a supply of the desired stores provisions Goods for Presents as this place affords, and shall take care that you shall be particularly supplied wth: Bengall Arrack Yearly and Silver fanams whereof we have now sent.

9. You have taken a very proper method for the increase of Pepper in obligeing the Proarteens to plant, and allowing Raja Mooda $\frac{1}{2}$ Dollar P Bahar if he brings 1000 Bahar and if the same method were used wth: some of the Rajas of [P]ryamong itt would doubtless promote the procureing of Pepper and we thinke itt not necessary to insist so strict upon the Exaot quantity of 1000 Bahar, either wth: Raja Moode or others if they bring but halfe the quantity promised they will pretend some Reasons of a disapointment and demand the allowance, and if you doe not know apparent Reason to the Contrary you may for the first Year or two allow y^m: $\frac{1}{4}$ Doller but if it be very near the full quantity lett them have the $\frac{1}{2}$ Dollar.

10. Wee have sent you 10 Cattle for a breed spare no cost that is necessary for the presarvation, and increase of Cattle and Hoggs the Cattle now sent are of the largest size the Country affords and will be very fitt for the Plough.

11. M^r: Betts as you observe has Delt very desingeniously and unworthly hee knows as well as we that he went onely to bring up the Books and state the Acco^t: at the West Coast, for w^{ch}: he was promised a gratuity, and part paid him before he went & promise made him that When that business was done he should Returne and be second of one of the ffactorys on this Coast. It happened by mortality contrary to our intentions, and his own Expectation the Govern^t: fell upon him before it could be otherwise supplied besides that surley humore, w^{ch}: he hath discovered in a sullen neglect, and refusall to P fect that necessary Service he had begune there is another reason w^{ch}: we forbear to mention, but is not unknown to himsele that Renders him unfitt for Govern^t: there is not wth:standing what hear he dos, Clamorously complain of our breach of promiss it is not convenient that a person soe unreasonably discontent should continue there and therefore lett him Returne by the first oppertunity and give him timely notice that he may not P tend a necessity of Stay for getting in his debts &c^a:

12. The 5 Coffrey boys sent us by the Mary Boyer are thus Employed Viz^t: two under the Carpenter two under the Bricklay^r: and one under the Smith and wⁿ: they are perfeted in their trade will be Returned to York ffort to instruct others.

13. The 34 Parg^h: of your letter contains an objection against the keeping of Rain water in Jarrs because it will putrefie wth: standing but if the new spring you have found out doe not answer y^r: Expectation and you cannot find another Good one you need not scruple the use of Raine water, for tho it be true, it will putrefy yett it will in time purge it selfe & become sweet, tho it be kept in the same Jarr, on the Sedi-ment and in short^r time if itt be drawne of (by a Crane or hand Pumpe or otherwise clear of its sediment, from one Jarr to another w^{ch}: the greatest Criticts in water have approved before all other kinds.

14. Tho you have found other worke for y^e: Coffrey as P sent more necessary then clearing the Bambo Swamp and cutting the Ditch to draine y^e: moorish Ground Either into the Sea or River yett wⁿ: ever you can spare the Coffreys for those services they must not be forgotten there being nothing Really more Conducive to the Health-fulness pleasantness and Profitt of the place.

15. The dispatch of the London ffrigatt and Amety for England wth: 684 Bahar of Pepper will be very acceptable to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: and Esteemed as an Earnest of better improvement.

16. Wee ordered a small Sloop to be sent you from y^e Bay but whether that comes or [not] we intend to Send you another in Octob^r: next soe that you may allways have one upon the Coast.

17. Haveing formerly Debted your Acco^t: for wages due to Ship Satisfaction Amo^t: Pag^s: 1456: 29 supposing that sev^{ll}: tho then absent would in time appear and demand their pay we have given y^a: Credit ffor Pag^s: 119: 25 the amount of the wages yet unpaid.

18. Our Present Aime, and Interest is to secure Yorke ffort and [P]ryamong and the Pepper Growing between them, and their dependancies.

19. Arcus the Dubash whome you found Reason to dismisse him for his Exzaction, being gone to Batavia ought never to Returne and the suspition y^a: had of his holding a Correspondance there is a caution of admitting any into such services, as keep their family there.

20. Wee have discharged all the Bills you drew upon us amounting to 6422 Roy^{l^s}: at the Rate of 17 Roy^{l^s}: ₧ 10 pag^s: as usuall.

21. Wee have perused Yo^r: Gen^l: letter to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: Dat^d: 29th: Octob^r: last w^{ch}: gives y^m: a perticular Acco^t: of the state of their affairs att that time as we hope to their Satisfaction, the proposall made them for the advancing the Toppassees pay $\frac{1}{2}$ Dollar ₧ meⁿsem seems to be Grounded on so Good Reason that we dont doubt their Hon^{rs}: approbation in confidence whereof, and in consideration of the Great sum w^{ch}: will be Yearly saved by that small addition we order you to pay the Toppassees from the Receipt hereof 2 Dollars ₧ meⁿs as Sentinalls pay, and as your number of Toppassees doe increase you may lessen the number of the Buggessees by degrees.

22. The Success of the Treates wth: the Emp^r: Prince, and Rajas hath Exceeded our Expectation, Sulton Guillimot Raja Addill Raja Macoota and the Mandreens seem to be as firmly united both to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: and among themselves as they can be by oath Contract, and Interest and so long as they can be kept true to that union, and Contract, there is a good prospect of secureing all the pepper from Mandutta to Bencoolen or at least from [P]ryamong to Bencoolen; but whatever the ₧ sent appearance is considering the unstable and wavering humore of those people it is best to think off, and provide against y^e: variety of accidents w^h: may happen.

23. It is not to be supposed, but that the Emp^r as he never was a true friend, is now a professed Enemy and [will] use his utmost indeavours to break the union either by Pollecey or force against w^{ch}: there is but one Gen^l: Remedy that a right understanding be kept between Raja addill and Raja Macoota, and matters carryed so indifferently towards both that neither of them may be jealous that the others is more favoured then himselfe Raja Addill by the history of the Transactions att Mandutta seem to have the Greater Interest among the Mandreens and proarteens and M^r: Frith ought to use a great caution that he doe not disoblidge him by favouring Raja Macoota too much openly and Raja Macoota wth: the Young Sultan seem to be the most firmly bound to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: by their own Interest having no other ffreind.

24. Wee shall not cease to put you in mind of Carrying on the Ditch to the Sea, till we hear it is finished it is so necessary for Clearing the Ground to Render it both Emprouceable and healthy that it ought to be done as soon as possibly you can, and all the Ground Round the fort cultivated.

Wee have delayed the sending of this ship for some time, that we may send you Yo^r: Gen^l: Bookes three pair of [P]ryamong and two pair of York Fort come herewth: finished by M^r: Butterfeild the stating of the Acco^t: Curr^t: could not be done time enough to bring into the Ballance, but it comes apairt w^{ch}: you may adjust in Yo^r: next Bookes.

26. By this Ship comes M^r: James Leigh Entertained to serve as Gunner at York ffort, or [P]ryamong (at the usuall pay of those places) according as you shall find occasion we think he may be usefull at York ffort, & design him for that employ^{m^t}: being a ₧son of good abilityes, but doubting whether Lev^t: Delgardner, and he may accord in one place being both too hasty) we oblidge^d: him to serve in the other place if you shall see occasion.

27. The Dutch Price of Pepper (mentioned in the 43 Parg^h: of your letter to us) 4 pe^a: longcloth or 7 p^a: Sallampores for a Bahar of 637^{l^b}: is equall to 11 Dollars ₧ Pahar of 500^{l^b}: lon[g]cloth being valued at 70 Dollars ₧ Corge 4 p^a: is 14 Dollars the Difference of the weight is equall to the difference in the price but the

Pepper being Rec^d: at Bencoolen at 560^u: to the bahar it is necessary to lower the Price of Cloth or advance the price of pepper, to Encourage the Mallayes to bring it to us Rather yⁿ: to the Dutch therefore lett the longcloth be sold at 65 Dollars $\text{\textcircled{P}}$ Corge, and other Goods proportionable Viz^t: for Dollars but in Exchange for Pepper at 60 Dollars there will be no occasion as you will observe to limitt the price to privatt traders so long as Yo^r: Godowns are free and open to all buyers that will Govern the Price.

28. M^r: Kennedy doth affirme to us that in y^e: Year 1692 he Rec^d: all the pepper he bought at [P]ryamong by a measure, w^{ch}: held out but 500^u: to the Bahar and that the meas^e: was not then Settled by M^r: Frith by w^{ch}: Good Sound Pepper weighd 635^u: to the bahar but some tryall made by M^r: Barwell the weight differs 20: 30 or 40^u: in a bahar according to y^e: quality of the pepper w^{ch}: when it comes to be Rec^d: in Bencoolen by weight makes a difference in Acco^{ts}: and Casts a short weight upon [P]ryamong ffactory, w^{ch}: he thinks may be the Cause of Charging 21 Bahar Pepper to M^r: Frith acco^t: for short weight and if it be true, M^r: Frith ought to be allowed it if the Mallays can be induced to deliver their Pepper by weight, it will be more certaine then the measure and y^e: acco^{ts}: will better accord, and if they scruple the weight of 637 $\frac{1}{2}$ ^u: it is better to take 620^u: or 600^u: but if they will not Consent lett them goe on wth: their Measures and y^t: you may have a Check upon [P]ryamong lett there be a [P]ryamong Measure kept att Bencoolen, by w^{ch}: all the pepper w^{ch}: comes from thence may be measured, as well as weigh^d and the difference noted.

1. The complaining Goldsmiths are not Inhabitants within the bounds of Tegnapatam, but of [...] Belonging to Ramraja and are not onely his Subjects, but known to him by perticular Service in the way of their trade, and therefore probably will be heard if they complaine.

2. If Ju[s]tice be not done them doubtless they will complaine because the Injury and disgrace suffered is so great and Notorious.

3. The Criminall Colla Chitte is an Indian inhabitant within the bounds of Tegnap^m: Employ'd by the Dutch Cheife &c^a: as one of their Merch^{ts}.

4. The said Goldsmiths complain'd to y^e: Gov^r: of ffort S^t: David against Coolee Chitte that he had disgras'd them by Debauching in Grosse manner one of their wives comitted to his care as a freind hee advised them to try if the Dutch Cheife would doe them justice to their Satisfaction but after a tryall made they Returned and Complained againe.

The Gov^r: and Council tooke cognisance of the complaint and by a message charging the Dutch Cheife with the forthcomeing of Colla Chitte, then in their ffactory proceeded to the hearing of the Case and caused the matter to be Examined in the Choultry of Cuddalore by indifferent Natives, the most competent of understanding the nature and Circumstance of the Crime and the Custome of the Country who Reported Cooll Chitte Guilty (by his own confession) and that he ought to forfitt his Estate to the Dutch and be turned out of Town (wherein they were moderate) Declaring that by their Custome he ought to dye.

The Gov^r: and Council after due consideration of said Report, and of all circumstances of the case waveing that part w^{ch}: Relates to the Duan they onely considered the inflecting such a disgracefull punishment as would Satisfy the complainers, and therefore on the 5th: May Sentenced Colla Chittee wth: in ten dayes to be mounted on an ass wth: his face to the Taile and to be carried thro the streets of Tegnapatam and to be sent out of y^e: bounds Either to Negapatam or where the Dutch Cheife thought convenient; but not to Returne under forfeiture of his Ears and being made a slave to the Comp^a:

The Gov^r: and Council on the same Evening sent two messengers to acquaint y^e: Dutch Cheif therewth: but he protecting Coola Chitte in their ffactory, Refused to deliver him to our Marshall wth: in the time limited under Partence of orders Excepted from Negapatam tho sev^{ll}: messages were sent to the Dutch Cheife to demand him Particularly on the 15th: May.

Now by the aforementioned abstract of the Hon^{ble}: Gov^r: Pitts Letter it doth appear that Yo^r: Cheife of Tegnapatam ffactory doth protect, and detaine the Criminall from Justice by the order of Yo^r: Hon^r: &c^a: w^{ch}: is grounded on these Reasons that because the Crimanall is a subject of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Netherland East India Comp^a: therefore he cannot be tryed by any other Judicature then your own.

It must be taken pro confesso, that Coola Chittee the Criminall is Guilty, and desirveth a punishment att least Severe as that Sentenced by the Govern^r: and Council of ffort S^t: David and that hee is a native Inhabitant wth: in the bounds of Tegnapatam.

Wee will not now consider the question whether every Subject of the Netherlands Company inhabiting within the bounds of Tegnapatam, as well as all others when they are within the said bounds are under the Judicature of the English Company, nor will we contend with Yo^r: Hon^r: about your calling Coole Chittee the Subject of Yo^r: Company supposing that you intitle all Yo^r: Serv^{ts}: your Subjects, but we are obliged to affirme that the English Company being lords proprietors wth: in the bounds of Tegnapatam purchased of Ramaraja they have y^e: Sole Dominion and Right of Judicature wth: in the said bounds, but as derived, or held of them The Netherlands Company have Rec^d: Sever^{ll}: Cowles from Ramraja or his predecessors prior to the English Company purchased and all the priviledges and Immunitys thereby granted, ought to be and are P^rserv^d inviolate to the Netherlands Comp^a: but there are three things to be considered 1st: that y^e: said priviledges both in the intention of the Giver, and Receiver Relates onely to the Management of Trade, as Merch^{ts}: 2th: that by all the Coppinges of the Cowles Granted by Ramraja or his predessors, w^{ch}: we have seen there doth not appear the [least] Ground for claiming a Right of Judicature over the Native Inhabitants, in Criminall cases w^{ch}: Extend to forfeiture of life or Estate 3th: the priviledges Immunityes or power within the bounds of Tegnapatam w^{ch}: the Netherlands Comp^a: derived from Ramraja or his Predecessors are now held of the English Comp^a: by virtue of their purchased propriety and Dominion and it is to be further noted y^t: by y^e: Custome of India Such Priviledges are generally understood to be conditionall, and consequently may be forfeited, and Revoked or abated upon failure or misdemeanors, as ail the Europe Nations who have ffactorys depending on the Govern^t: and favour of the Princes of India have found by dear bought Experience.

If then the English Comp^a: have power of Judicature the Netherlands Comp^a: have not a power of impeding the Execution, & the detaining and protecting of the Crimanall from Justice, is a violation of the English Comp^a: Right of Govern^t: w^{ch}: wee cannot Rec[e]de from but are obliged to claime.

For w^{ch}: Reasons we cannot consent to the preposall of Coola Chittee being carried to Pollicherry and punished there by yo^r: Judicature because that would amount in common construction to an acknowledgment that the English Comp^a: have not power of Judicature in this case. Besides where the Crime is comitted there is the proper place of Punishment and most agreeable to that main Ends of detaining others from the like crime, and Satisfaction of the Injured who have hitherto insisted positively not onely upon the Crimanall being punished, but that he be punished in the place where the Crime was comitted, and it is Reasonable that the Reputation of the Injured be Repaired in the place where the disgrace is Suffered more over if we admitt of the carrying this criminall to Pollicherry to be punished there it will be a precedent for carrying all crimanall thither to be judged and punished Viz^t: so many as y^e: Dutch Cheife &^a: of Tegnapatam shall please to call the Subjects of Yo^r: Comp^a: w^{ch}: may be all that are or att [? any] time have been Entertained or Employed to serve in any manner of business w^{ch}: may take in the Greatest part of the Artificers Cooleys, and others Inhabitants of Tegnapatam to Pollicherry, and Render one Subordinate to the Govern^t: of the other.

Lastly the probable consequent of y^e: not Executing Justice on the Crimanall ought to be Remembred for considereing the nature and circumstance of the Crime comitted the desperate Effects some times made in Revenge of Extreame disgrace the quality of the Injured tho mean Enough in themselves, yett as they are Subjects of Ramraja, and known to him and his officers by their perticular Sarvice the Notoriety of so Extraordinary a cause may Gainè an Easy hearing and tho it is not to be Supposed that in Revenge of their quarrell Ramraja will send an army yett if to be business draw his army that way it is not impossible but he may from hence take occasion to demand Satisfaction and from whome will he demand but from the English Govern^t: to whom the Injured made aplication for Justice or if from the Dutch Cheife of Tegnapatam the case is much the Sume if warr or trouble doe arise wth: in our bounds and if any Extraordinary accident shall happen hereupon after w^t: manner or by w^t: means will Yo^r: Hon^r: &^a: secure the English Company from Damage or make it Good if any bee doubtless in this case prevention is the

best Remedy by inflecting Punishm^t: on y^o: Criminall to the Sattisfaction of the Injured in the place where the crime was comitted wth: will content them & barr their further complaints and oblidge us to continue.

Wee are sencible you will find it difficult to putt off the Europe Goods but the Greatness of the quantity we have Rec^d: made it necessary to send you a small part we have Still Remaining more yⁿ: we can hope to vend in two Years if you cannot

Sell att the former price wee think you had better abate something then keep the Goods in the Godowns Subject to damage.

Both Yo^r: lett^{rs}: of the 19th: and 29th: ffebr^y: Giveing us an Assurance that you will be able to dispatch one Small Ship in August and the 29th: onely an uncertain hope that you may be able to dispatch another we have chosen Rather to send the ffeet ffrigat to the West Coast, under orders of being dispatched from thence by y^e: 15th: Septem^r: att farthest, and leave the Russell ffrigat (the bigger ship) to be sent home alone in August and we hope the ffeet ffrigat will be wth: you time Enough to be dispatch^d: in Nov^r: or X^{br} and will bring you a good Cargo of Pepper.

When you dispatch the Russell ffrigatt for Europe order her to tuch here if the winds shall favour wth: out Busking too much possibly we may Receive new Sailing orders from our Hon^{ble}: Masters for the Returning Ships.

You advised M^r: Holcombe that the postilion was fitting out and Ready to Saile but we hear nothing of their designe whether to Cruise for Prizes or to meet the ffrench ffeet w^{ch}: we are certainly informed (5 Ships departed from Surratt on the 17 Aprill and are Gen^{ly}: Supposed to be bound for Bengall) and therefore we have detained the Mary Bowyer to prevent her falling into Bengall wth: the ffrench ffeet and in hopes of Receiving advise but we have yet heard nothing Either of the Postilion or y^e: ffeet.

Wee cannot send you the additional Stocke of 400000 Rupees w^{ch}: you acquainte us will be necessary for the putting off the Europe Cloth to the Merch^{ts}: wth: $\frac{5}{8}$ money upon Dadne & you must not Expect from us aboue 150000 Rupees w^{ch}: wth: the Stock already sent by the fleet ffrigatt and Russell ffrigatt will amo^t: to About 550000 Rupees and we can Send no more unless we should clog your Markett wth: more Europe Goods of w^{ch}: you already complaine yⁿ: have too much, and this Seems to be Sufficient both to discharge Yo^r: Debts (and Considering the Goods Ready to provide Good cargos for the two small ships or Yo^r: Credit cannot faile for a small Sume if occation Requires if there shall come more ships they will bring more Stocke besides the commotions in Bengall Renders it not advisable to trust more stock there then is necessary for the Φ sent business till you can make a Judgem^t: of the Issue as appears by the Φ ticular Acco^t: you give of the passages between the Nabob Duan, & Rebel Raja.

Goods haveing been formerly Invoiced from the Fort to Subordinate ffactorys at the ffort price it was three Years agoe Resolved that all goods be Invoiced att prime cost, y^t: the Proffitt of Subordinat ffactorys might appear, and to Φ vent the bringing a loss upon the head ffactorys by Damage wast and Charges Merchandize, it was thought Requisite to Charge 5 Φ Cent upon all Goods Invoiced hence to any other ffactory w^{ch}: Indeed is too much upon Goods not wastable as lead &^{ca}: but is not too much upon some & is too litle upon others that are Subject to want & damage and it would be too nice an acco^t: to make distinct Rates according to the quality of Each sort of Goods 5 Φ Cent was therefore calculated as a medium and tho in some

It is very probable that Either M^r: Stanley paid to little for the House or the Comp^a: pay's to much Rent 20 Rupees ₹ month for 350 Rupees prime Cost lett a good Enquire be made of the Real Value of the House the Amount of the Yearly Repaire and by whom it hath been paid M^r: Stanley hath wrote us a letter concerning it wherin he describes the defects of the House and inlarges much upon the Greatness of the Charges in Repairing but his answer is not Satisfactory.

Our next will bring you orders for the disposall of M^r: Peacheys Effects attached, wherein we could be more certaine if you had given us an acco^t: of the ₹ particulars.

Wee are of Yo^r: opinion that Mottradass proposalls for buying all the broadcloth is not to be Accepted not wth: Respect to the price but the time w^{ch}: he takes for payment if you Could Sell for Ready money or for Goods deliverable within the Year it is better to take less (if you cannot gett so much) then to keep them upon Yo^r: hands when more is Expected, and Bengall must take of itt's Share.

If the delivery of the whole dadne will oblidge the Merch^{ts}: to complye wth: their whole Contract it is better to deliver all at first when y^u: have money enough but when you have not it is better to deliv^r: $\frac{3}{4}$: $\frac{5}{8}$: $\frac{1}{2}$ according to Yor: Stock then to make no Investment at all.

Cap^t: Merry hath Carryed the Anchor wth: him and is answerable to you in Bengall. Wee have Laden on the fleet ffrigatt for Bengall Lead [. . .] and Redwood her Charterparty proportion C^a: [. . .] Inclosed is the Receipt for 1000 Do^{ll}: on Charterparty, and the Pursers acknowledgm^t of damaged Goods from Bengall both w^{ch}: papers must be sent home by the Ship.

Wee Rec^d : Yo^r : Exc^y : &^a : Letter dated 18th : May by Ketch Josia on th 5th : June by which wee understand the miscarriage of our large Pacquet sent over land by way of Surat in Septemb^r : last which containing papers of Great import (coppyes of our lett^{rs} : to and from the R^t : Hon^{ble} : Comp^a ;) upon the first news of the imprisonment of the Hon^{ble} : Presid^t : &^a : at Surat and Ever since wee have been concerned for its safe Conveighance and thought it not fit to trust another a Pacquet over land for fear of miscarriage but Presid^t : Annesly &^a haveing sent Pattamars to us by their Returne we have the oppertunity of acquainting Yo^r : Exc^y : &^a : that y^e : Josia Ketch was on the 11th : June Run away within the night by the mate and five English (the master Sick ashore) but by a Ship arrived from Acheen on 4th : August we are advised by M^r : Soams that She was brought thither by an unskillfull man who left the Rest of the Crew ashore on the Niccobars and the lett^{rs} : brought us the said news of the Mocha Frigats Surprizeall by the ships company to the Eastward of Polyway who exposed Cap^t : Willock and 17 more (Refuseing to join) in a pinnace who are safe arrived at Acheen and will come hither on the Ketch and two Country ships (driven by Stresse of weather on their passage from Pegu into Acheen) so soon as the winds will permit upon her arrivall wee shall have no occasion to Send her to Bengall for what Yo^r : Ex^y : ordered, being Sufficient Supplied here, and shall send her away so soon as the master will Venture out and by her shall Send Yo^r : Ex^y : the needfull advices inclosed in a letter from Cap^t : Willock w^{ch} : wee suppose Gives a particular Acco^t : of the Mocha Frigat.

Wee have heard no news of the French ships since their departure from Surat if they had gone directly to Bengall wee must have heard of their Arrivall and there was no news of them at Acheen on 6th : July so that we cannot Guess where they are gone unless to Europe (or to some of the Islands between this and Madagascar.)

Inclosed is the Abstract of the Europe news by the Danes Ship w^{ch} : came out in Novemb^r : last and will Returne y^e : next m^o :

Wee have no ships on this side India but the King William in this Coast the Russell ffrigat in Bengall and the ffeet ffrigat Sent in June last to York ffort (wth : Sufficient Stocke) wee are not willing to Entrust this paper wth : [in] the time of their intended departure, but Yo^r : Ex^y : may Rest Satisfied (till more fully advised) that they will be timely dispatched unless ~~vented~~vented by some Extraordinary unforeseen disappointment.

The Ships will be dispatched from these parts under the Sailing orders w^{ch} : they bro^t : us & wee conclude the America brought the Same to y^r : Exc^y :

The Elizabeth alias Fortune is gone to China being sold for 5000 Pag^a : Rec^d : under condition of her being delivered to us if occasion Require at her Returne M^r : Dolbin and M^r : Trenchfeild are gone Supra Cargoes.

In March last Zulphaker Cawn demanded y^e : loan of 100000 Pag^s : by Emam Cooley (formerly Employed about the Phirmund) and because we could not Supply him, hee hath ever Since Expressed a disgust upon all occasions hearing and Encourageing complainers, and favouring the Portugees of S^t : Thoma who lately sent one to desire a ffort the Customes and ffarming of the adjacent aldeas, and they will probably succeed so far as it is in his power to Grant wee hear many Stores y^t : Madrass is to be beseidged &^a : but God be thanked hitherto wee have Enjoyed peace and our Garrison is kept in the Redyest posture of Defence.

The Gingerlee Briggantine w^{ch} : the mate &^a : Run away from Anjengo, some of the Portugees Sould^{rs} : and Lascars brought her hither in May last being Extreemly defective, wee sent her to Vizagapatam to Repaire but proved so leaky

in the way that the man could not keep her free and therefore they Run her ashore at Pettipollee where part of her stores is Saved, and Sent to Vizagapatam by a hired boat whereof wee have not Yet Rec^d: a P^ticular Acco^t:

In Septemb^r: last we sent Yo^r: Hon^r: & C^a: a large Pacq^t: q^t: 130 Sheetes of Paper Coppies of Severall letters to and from the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Coup^a., and other Papers of importance directed to his Exc^{cy}: by one of our Peons whose name is Ponkula Ragana in Company wth: two Returning Surat Peons Raggana Has a family and Relations here who have never heard of him since. The miscarriage of that Pacquet has made us forbear Ventureing any more by land not knowing into whose hands they may fall wee send inclosed an Extract of a few Danish Gazeets w^{ch}: the Danes Ship brought from Europe in Novem^r: last wth: a sad Acco^t: of the Losse of severall India ships Returning.

Ship Elizabeth alias Fortune is Gone to China being sold for 5000 Pag^s: Rec^d: under condition of the Ships being delivered to us if occasion Require at her Returne.

In May last Gingerlee Briganten was brought in hither by some of the Portugees Sould^{rs}: of Rhetoras who were put aboard to Serve as Lascars and gave us an Acco^t: that in Rhetorah Road when the Master was ashore the Mate Contrived wth: two others, and Cut the Cable & Sailed away whereof one dyed in the way and the other two goeing ashore about Sadraspatam they brought the Sloop hither which wanting Repair we Sent her to Vizagapatam but in the way made so much water that the Master Run her ashore att Pettipollee to save their lives.

Ketch Josia being in this Road design'd to proceed for Bengall the Master being sick ashoar the mate getting 3 English men of other ships Run away wth: her on 11th: June and by lettr^s: from Acheen dated 6th: July wee are advised that the

Wee have by this Parra belonging to Yo^r : place sent you as many workemen as the Parra could conveniently Carry according to A list wth : followes and by the Josia Ketch or other conveyance wee shall send you more, and some Sould^r : and money.

The ffreighter of Ship Eagle and Experiment gained so little by those two voyages that wee cannot Expect they will be perswaded to any further Considerable Adventure.

You have not advised us the particular difference between Silver, Gold Chequeen Rupees, and Pag^s : we shall send severall sorts, advise us particularly abo^t : Silver because it may some times be in our power to send you some wⁿ : wee cant gett other sorts.

The Gingerlee Brigantine proved so leaky that the men Run her ashore in fair weather at Pettipolle to save their lives where she is lost but severall of her stores are saved and sent to Vizagapatam whereof wee have not yet had y^e : Acco^t :

The Josia Ketch was Run away wth out of this Road on the 11th : June but wee are advised from Acheen of her being safe there in Good hands, that will bring her hither as soon as the winds Φ mit. Wee Expect her daily the Ships Company of the Mocha ffrigat on the 17th : June last conspired and murdered the Command^r : Cap^t : Edgecombe and seized y^e : Ship to the Eastward of Acheen Mr : Willock wth : 17 others who Refused to join we[r]e exposed to the Mercy of a turbulent sea in a Pinnace, and by God's good providance are arrived Safe at Acheen. These workemen come upon a Parra belonging to Raja Cayum cullum whereof Prince Murcawn is Nocqueda for whose Passage you are to pay 22 Rupees unto Vandeny as Nadan ffactor of the Parra according to an agreem^t : made wth : and delivered unto him.

Tho Yo^r : Merch^{ts} : possibly may have brought Goods from thence, yet they have never brought in any of this sort but hitherto both the Cloth of Fort St : David and ffort St : George has been for the Greatest part inferior to N^o : 1 and very little of that w^{ch} : has been taken in for N^o : 2 : has been Really Equall in all Respects to our Muster N^o : 2 our Merch^{ts} : have now undertaken this method that they may provide better and if they succeed in it and settle a Correspondence there, so that they shall be able to carry on further contracts and if they should offer such proposealls as ought to be accepted, it would be un-Reasonable and discouraging to throw y^m : off and quitt the business wholly to the ffort St : David Merch^{ts} : unless these should make the better offers as probably they will now because comeptiors and other Merch^{ts} : allso in Fort St : George of w^{ch} : competition wee make a Good use if it be not our own faults and therefore if Yo^r : Merch^{ts} . make any proposealls dont conclude wth : them till you have advised us, and wee will also advise you that wee may mutually consider what is best for the publick Interest.

Whereas Thomas Gullocke an Englishman, and Serv^t: to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: English East India Comp^a: haveing been sentenced by vertue of the Judgem^t: of Court to pay unto his Creditors ye: sum: of about four thousand Pag^s: after due allowance made him, for the vallue of his ship and Cargo, and being confined to prison in order to the discharging thereof did on the 30th: Aug^t: last in the night break prison, and make his Escape to or near S^t: Thoma where he now Remaines, and Refuses to Returne.

Now wee the Liev^t: Gen^{ll}: of India for Affaires of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: English East India Comp^a: and the Councill of Fort S^t: George doe by this Royall Maj^{ty}: Charter to the said Comp^a: and from them derived to us, by their Commission, promise, and if the said Thomas Gullock shall upon Receipt hereof Returne to ffort S^t: George, wee do hereby pardon and Acquitt the said Thomas Gullock from any Penalty or punishment for breakeing prison and escapeing as aforesaid he submitting himselfe to the laws and Customs of the English in Cases of Debt given under our hands, and the Seal of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: East India Comp^a: in ffort S^t: George this 11th: day of Sep^r: 1696.

Yesterday Ship Greyhound arrived from Vizagapatam wth: out lett^{rs}: but the Master adviseth that he departed from thence on the 15th: Ins^t: and that the King William was to sail on that or the next day so that we Expect her daily and hope she will bring wth: her so many bales as will enable us to compleat her ladeing upon her arriveall Especially if we shall in due time Receive a hundred bales more from you, but if we can fill her up wth: out them, wee shall not att this uncertaine Season detaine her longer then is necessary, for her ladeing for the sake of Yo^r: bales, or bookes, we are

Our last was 26th: Ins^t: last night comes Yo^r: of 22th: and 26th: Ins^t: w^r: Invoice and bill of lading for 61 bales laden on S^t: David Yacht, and Invoice of 43 bales, and 164 bags of Pepper on a Par wee are sorry that y^e: Yacht was forced to Returne and that yo[u] have no other oppertunity of sending th[e] bales to us wee shall want them for the King William and itt is doubtfull whether this uncertain weather will allow her to call att Yo^r: port, to take them in however lett them be Ready, and as many mor[e] as you can procure that if a favourable sta[te] present for her touching you may put y^t: aboard wth: Expedition but if you meet wth: a good oppertunity, in the mean time send them to us.

The Par by w^{ch}: you sent bales and Pepp^r: doth not yet appear nor the boat wth: y^e: Madras Merch^{ts}: Goods.

Ginghams of 16: ^{oo} and 40: ^{oo} and fine morees are Esteemed fine Goods in our contracts, tho it is not Suppos'd that the Merch^{ts}: gain so much by them as by the beteelas.

Wee observe Yo^r: answer to the 3 propositions as to the 1st: tis time Yo^r: Merch^{ts}: p^d: dearer for the Europe Goods they took, then ours doe the price hath falne in two Years, and tis our opinion y^t: if they or any other Merch^{ts}: will take off any considerable quantitys y^e: price must still bee abated but still w^r: wee make contracts there must bee a Regard had to the putting of Europe Goods if possible, and that is better then to trust to the uncertain sale of Fort S^t: George Godowne.

2^d: Wee Esteem Yo^r: Merch^{ts}: Responsible, and wish wee could find out in Fort S^t: George a Company more Responsible then they. *

3^d: Wee gladly take notice of what you informe us that the Cloth now provided by our Merch^{ts}: att Wooriar Pollam is the Exact sorts w^{ch}: have been made for Dutch for a long time, for, many Years the distinction has Run thus when a peice of Good cloth is shown, it is called the Dutch sort, and a bad piece the English cloath both by the Natives and our selves and if the provision of this cell of Cloth att Wooriar pollam will show us the way of makeing the English and Dutch sort alike it will prove a Good Service to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: and Provision of that Cloth is to be Encouraged, and promoted by such men and in such manner as will best answer the End Concerning w^{ch}: you promise us Yo^r: further thoughts.

In the mean time wee are to advise you that a small Country Ship from Bengall arrived on 27th: Ins^t: and brought us a Gen^l: lett^r: from the Agent & C^a: adviseing that there is an Interloper, the Antelope Edw^d: Clyves Supra Cargo arrived there, who gives advice of 4 Ships of the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: designed for Surat and Persia, and 3 for this Coast and Bengall, and one f[. . .] w^{ch}: were Ready many months [. . .] and therefore wee may Suddainly [? expect] their arrivall they will probably [? bring] us more Europe Goods and Stock to [? be in]vested for their laiding and itt mus[t be] our immediat consideration how to procure Goods Enough to dispatch at least one [in] Jan^{ry}: wth: Coast Goods but wee Expect th[ere] will be another allso to be filled up fro[m] the Bay and therefore wee must as soo[n] as possibly wee can make contracts, [and] the larger the better Especially becau[se] this Interloper Spreads Reports of mor[e] coming if so perhaps one may come upon the Coast, and it is our duty to doe all y^t: lyes in our power, to defeat, and disappoint their designe.

Mr: Clyves hath advised y^t: there was a plott in England for the Murdering of the King on the 25th: ffeb^{ry}: last but by Gods Good providence it was discovered the day before; & prevented, and itt appeared that King James was Ready wth: an Army of 30,000 men and transport Ships on the Coast of france to make a descent into England.

Our Spy Bramine att the Campe adviseth that the Nabob went out about 8 dayes since from Arcott wth: his army to fight the Morattas, whom 25,000 a part of w^{ch}: Army Encounted wth: David Cawn and surrounded the Moors Camp. The Nabobs provisions being Spent (after he had sent messages to Santogee Gurpoora) mad his way through the thimest of the Morattas, and came to Arcott 3 dayes agoe it is said Santogee is gathering all his men to beseige Arcott if he bee in earnest they will probably bee to hard for the Moors for they are five to one but there hath hither to seemd to be an understanding between the Nobob and Morattas and ¶haps twill end onely in a Good piscash.

The King William being pester'd wth: freight Goods, w^{ch}: must be unladen, and the weather being uncertaine wee cannot fix a day for her dispatch, but wee conclude She cannot saile from hence in 12 dayes if you send any bales order y^e: Vessell to looke out for the King William and if they meet to deliver the Goods wth: Invoice, an[d] to take a bill of ladeing w^{ch}: must be inclosed in a letter to the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: but yⁿ: some ¶son must bee sent wth: those Goods who is capable of doeing it.

If our Merch^{ts}: shall bring in any more Goods from Wooriarpollam, [? which if you] cannot ¶sently meet wth: an opp[ert]unity of sending hither you may Recei[ve and] Embale brown, so many peices of [?long]cloth and Sallampores as you shall [find] fitt for that purpose, and Either se[nd] them hither or lade aboard the Ki[ng] William in same manner as you [may] find occasion to dispose of Yo^r: ow[n] bales Invoicing that Cloth apa[rt. wee] are.

On the 27th: past Ship Anne broug[ht] your Generall Letter dated 25th: August ^{¶ship Anne.} and on 30th: D^o: Mar[y] brought us your Gen^l: Letter dated 3^d: September with the papers according to the respective Lists.

We are sensible of the necessity of keeping two Sloops for the service of the R^t: H: Comp^a: ships in Bengall; Experience [? proves] that you cannot hire vessells when occasion requires. [. . .] as you desire wee shall either return the Mary Buoyer or se[nd] the Josia Ketch to you. But the latter being not yet arrived w[ee] cannot determine which. If she doth not arrive we must th[en] send the Mary Buoyer forward to Bombay from whence we suppose his Excell^y: &c^a will return her to you with all expedition. Wee thank the Owners of the Greyhound for the kind offer of her service upon this occasion.

You give very good reasons for fortifying [. . .] [and it has] been the R^t: H: Comp^a: designs for many years to [have a] ffortification in Bengall according to the [design] concerted by Agent Charnock, and since the [. . .] emprove this oppertunity for that purpose [. . .] by the R^t: H: Comp^a: that we do not neglect it [. . .] advised we have no Engineer that can [. . .] ffortification according to the Rules of Art and the[refore] must leave it to you to ffortifye in such manner a [?s you may] judge best. Wee did not apprehend you intend[ed to fortifie a] building in a place distant from the ffactory [. . .] Letter of the 23^d April expressly mention [. . .] design & proposall was to

make if [. . .] ffactory, and if that can be mad [. . .] we are of opinion that it will be better to save then loose the money w^{ch} it hath cost (at least 7,000-Rupees) and it will be less observed by the Government.

Wee gladly observe that you are able to maintain a freindship with the Government and with the rebell Raja also in time of warr. The rule holds good in generall, That Traders in India ought to maintain a freindship or at least a neutrality with both parties, and not espouse the quarrell of either openly. But it seems you have managed the business by a higher strain of policy, assisting neither and yet makeing the Moors beleive that you assisted them, and the Raja that you are his freind. Tho^o this is a very nice point and difficult to maintain long without giving occasion of jealousy to one or other yet we think you ought to prosecute this method as long as you can, and, if at last things happen so that you find a necessity of declareing for or takeing part with one, you must by all possible means maintain your freindship wth: the Moors and not act any thing contrary unless you shall be compelled by a necessity of present preservation.

Wee are sorry there is an Interloper come to disturb and impede your business at this unhappy Juncture. It is doubtless our Duty to do all that lyes in our power to defeat & disapoint their proceedings concerning w^{ch}: we need not add to what the R^t: H: Comp^a: have ordered in their Gen^l: to Bengall dated 6th: March 1694, Parag: 21.

Wee don't perceive whether Cap^t: Blundell intends to call here or no. Hee ought to call for orders and for Company. [We] observe his Protest and your answer. Wee cannot tell [? what qua]ntity of each sort of Goods are Laden aboard that should make him complain. If you have dealt to h[?ard with] the ship in giving her too many round Bales and su[? ch] as make great breakage, if the Comander will in beha[lf of] himself and owners enter into Bond to save the R^t: H: Co[mp^a:] harmless from all Demorage from the time of his disp[atch]. Lett something be done to mend his Lading, for two reasons 1st. Because the owners ought not to be discouraged by filling up their ships with such Goods only as will make their tonage fall short, when it can be prevented. Indeed they s[h^d] all fare alike. 2^d. Such Lading will make the ship Cranke a [nd] so endanger ship & cargo to prevent which it had been better to have bought 500 or 1000 m^d: Pepper to have filled up betw[een] the Bales below to make the Ship stiff. But wee suppose the ship will be gone ere this comes to your hands.

We are glad the Diamond has escaped the danger and hope you have received the money by her.

Since you find that your Markets cannot t[ake] off Europe Cloth wee will not send you any more from hen[ce . . .] advise us. Pray use your utmost endeavours [. . .] of what you can. But if you cannot, rather then [? keep it] in your Godowns where it will be exposed to more ha[?zard] you may return to us so much as you have not a [. . .] of vending in a years time.

Wee shall depend upon you for the lading of the Fleet fr[igate] for England. If before her departure you shall [have] received Directions for new private sailing [. . .] cannot dispatch her before the middle of Jan[uary] Comand^r: orders to touch here in his way [. . .] sailing orders or for Company.

Wee don't know whether you advised M^r: Holcomb concerning the Postilion, but wee found it so entred in the Vizagap^m: Diary.

Wee don't deny to have received the acco^t: or List of M^r: Peachey's Goods signed by M^r: Cormell, but we deny that you have ever given an answer to what we wrote in ours of 24th June 1695, for want of w^{ch}: we cannot proceed with M^r: Peachie. On the first Leisure day when other more necessary business will permit, let the Councill meet and peruse that part of our s^d: Letter which relates to that matter with yo^r: answer of 14th August 1695 and you will find that you have answered only to one question, Viz^t: concerning M^r: Peachies refusing to deliver remains &c^a.—but you have not sent a valuation of the Maulda goods, nor an acco^t: of the Maulda Bills w^{ch}. M^r: Peachie ordered M^r Bowridge to deliver.

The fleet frigate will probably bring you 4 or 500 bahar of Pepper, perhaps more. If there be no other ship to be dispatched and it be necessary for completing the Ships Tonnage she may take it all, but if there be another ship to be dispatched she ought to have a share; or if you can otherwise fill up the ship, you may keep some for the next. Wee hear that Pepper is now sold in Bengall at 9 or 10 Kup^s: 4 m^d: if you want goods to make up a ships Lading, we think you ought to buy it, we having the R^t: H: Comp^a: orders for buying at above 20. Pag^s: 4 Candy, and we have bo^t: above 1000 Candy here and at Fort S^t David. Besides your buying may prevent the Interlopers, who will otherwise, probably buy it.

M^r George Crook deceased having many acco^{ts}: depending with Merchants of this place, to adjust which his widow [desi]reing to come hither and having made request by her relations that she may have liberty of bringing her Childr[en] and ffamily to reside here, wee have consented that she may with her family take her passage on any of the R^t: H Comp^a: [ships] bound hither.

Lieutenant Seaton who married the widow of Thomas Mackrith dec^d: desireing to have an acco^t: of the salary of [M^r] Mackrith payable in England, Lett the Accomptant send us a copy thereof signed as it stands in the Gen^l: Books.

Wee have very little Salt petre and know not how soon we may want. If there comes more Ships then you can dispatch for England in Jan^r: or february send them hither Laden with Salt petre Grain &^{ca} stores wrote for, and if it sho[uld] happen that you can dispatch no more Ships this year then the Fleet ffrigate reserving enough for her Lading send the remaining bales to us by the R^t: H: Comp^a: ships, w^{ch}: may enable us to dispatch a ship from hence in february.

If you shall not have one of the R^t: H: Comp^a: s[hip]s to s[end] hither with Salt petre, send us as much as you [? can in the] Country Ships in the months of December and Jan[uary ? at the] rate of 20 4 Cent freight, w^{ch}: will be much cheaper [? then to] buy salt petre here, as we shall be compelled to do if [you] supply us not. Wee are

And because we cannot tell but there may be occasion for more Bales to fill up the King William, let all the Cloth that our Merchants shall bring to you, besides what you embale brown be delivered to the Washers & embaled that they may be ready also for the King William, sorting them as you do your own, making due abatements for want of measure or goodness, placing the charges to Acco^t: Curr^t:

Wee are sorry for the disappointment by the return of the S^t David Yatch & Parr (advised in yours of 29th: past) w^{ch}: wee are afraid will force us to send the

Our last was 13th August. Wee have receive[d] yours of 24th July and 6th August overland and 14th September @ Ship King William and 25th September @ Mary Buoyer with the respective accompanying Bengall Pacquets Pap^{rs}: and Books according to your Lists.

As you find any difference in the passing of Madrass & Surat Rupees on your Coast advise us.

The Buff Coat is English fashion.

The King William arrived here on 29th past with 251 bales.

The eight slabs of Lead we shall debt your Acco^t: for Pa: 18: 22. The Bell from Metchlepatam is to be entered in yo^r Acco^t: Carr^t: as all other things y^t: you receive, noting the place from whence received.

Wee have received the Chest unknown and keep it und[er] seal as received. There appearing no cause for chargeing Lewis fferrara with the designed death of the Jentu Woma[n] wee have thought it fitt not to prosecute him but he se[rves] in our Garrison, and Christ^s: Fening also when recovered of the Sickness he contracted by serving the Seerlascar and the unhealthy hills.

Wee shall debt your Acco^t: Pag^s: 51: — for the prime [cost] of 206 Teak plank part of the Brigantine stores, whi[ch M^r] Holcombe bought and he is to pay the s^d: sum in[to the R^t:] Hon^{ble}: Comp^s: cash at Vizagapatam.

If you had advised us that Pepper, tinn, Ele [. . .] Sandall & Gance would have yeilded a profit [. . .] wee would have sent them, but before you [. . .] the Monsoon is past and there can be no [. . .] sending till february, in the mean tim[e . . .] and quantity of each sort vendable, without which we shall not know how to govern ourselves in buying.

Wee should not acco^t: the price of sticklac dear at 20 Rup^s: @ Candy if it were good, but the muster you sent us seems to be quite decayed, yeilding little or no colour and would be altogether unfitt to send home. There comes some (tho not of the best sort) from the Woods in the Country lying far west from hence, w^{ch}: seems to be much better. Wee send you two small sticks of it, by which you may compare any muster of Sticklac which shall be brought you, by powdering a pagoda weight of each and put them into a little cold water w^{ch}: in few hours will discover the difference in the colour. The deapest colour is esteemed y^e best.

Tho' you cannot procure any dureing the warr with Somberdu remember to provide it so soon as it can be procured good. The R^t: H: Comp^s: do much desire it, and we should not think 50 Candy a year too large a quantity.

By your keeping all the treasure sent you by the K. William wee conclude you have a prospect of Investing it.

There are no Ships as yet arrived from England, but we have advice of eight designed for India whereof three for the Coast and Bay and daily expect their arrivall.

The King William will clear us of all the Bales wee have and wee hope she will sail this month a full ship. It is our business now to provide a Lading for another Ship in Jan^y: or febr^y: if wee can possibly procure 1000 bales, and that will but just serve for a ship of 400 or 500 tons. Wee shall use our utmost endeavours here and at Fort S^t David, But y^o Merch^{ts}: small performance this year gives little reason to expect [. . .] 100 bales from both places, because of the so long continuance of the war between the Moors and Morattas (who only take turns to rob the Country) and the great scarcity and dearness of Cotton; which in our parts hath been all this year 24 & 31 pag^s: of Candy, and there is little reason to hope that the price will fall so low as 20 pag^s: of Candy, Tho' in those parts about ffort S^t David it is at that price. Wee are sencible that you have laboured under the same difficulty: The Country is not yet freed from war and there is not a prospect of Cotton being so cheap and plentiful this year in your parts as it has been in former years, and tho' wee had hopes from yo^r: former advices that we might have received more bales by the King William then 251 yet we are well satisfied you have done your best.

But if things prove no worse with you then they are at present wee hope you will be able to Invest yo^r: whole stock by January, w^{ch}: by the Invoices rec^d: and sent wee conclude to be above 20,000 Pag^s: Viz^t: in Cash and what due from your Merchants, which wee suppose may be sufficient for about 350 bales of your four Contract Sorts. Wee sh[all] depend upon you for so many but if you can encrease that number, the more the better.

Wee easily credit the reasons you give for not pr[ovideing] such sorts of Cloth as the Merchants have not used to [provide] and till the Country is better settled and Cotton chea[per you] will not be able to make any considerable progre[ss ? in your] undertakings. You may therefore Contract wit[h ? your merchants] upon the last terms to the Amo^t: of your Stock [. . .] by the 15th or 20th Jan^y next, or so soon as you [. . .] them to undertake, and wee hope they [. . .] all sooner because by yo^r advices you hav[e . . .] considerable sums to them long since.

But wee have occasion to consider not only the provision of Goods for the R^t: H: Comp^a: but how to prevent the Interlopers from procureing them on this Coast if any should come. Wee are advised from Bengall (as wee suppose you will hear from thence) that an interloper is arrived there the Antelope M^r Edward Clyves supracargo, who gives out there is another acomeing (*sic*). If the stop on the trade of Bengall continue as it is now (occasioned by the rebellion of a Raja) it is very probable that they will find themselves disappointed of their Lading there, and may come to try their fortune on this Coast. Wee esteem it our duty in conformity to our R^t: Hon^{ble}: Masters orders to do all that lyes in our power to defeat & disappoint them. For which end we think it a very proper & effectual method, to engage our Merchants by as large Contracts as wee can prevail wth: them to undertake, so as to keep them and the weavers in full employ throughout the year. Therefore wee order you to make a further Contract with your Merchants for the delivery of 4 or 5000 Pag^s: in Cloth monthly, till August or Janu^y 1697 you contracting to deliver them 4 or 5000 Pag^s: on the first day of every month, and they to deliver the same amo^t: in Cloth wthin 6 weeks or 2 months (as you can agree) after their receipt of each sum. If your merchants shall object that some moth: will not allow them to provide so much as others, you may make the sums deliverable in such months more or less accordingly.

Wee cannot tell what sum you will have in your hands when you receive this and therefore cannot name the precise time from whence such a contract sho^d: comence but we leave it to you to make it comence from that time w^o will best comport with your stock the provision of 3 or 400 bales in Jan^y next and the end designed in keeping yo^r: merch^{ts}: and weavers constantly employed. Wee have no prospect of send^e you any further stock till february and then probably wee may send one of the R^t: H: Comp^s: Ships to you as wee did the Russell frigate last year, and after that time the Monsoon will afford frequent oppertunitys of sending as occasion shall require.

Wee propose a double advantage by this method. When your Merch^{ts} : have engaged the weavers they cannot serve others, and if they do, the justice of your plea and the good correspondence w^{ch} : M^r : Holcombe has hitherto maintained with the seerlascars may prevail with him to grant such Rocca's as will compell both weavers and merchants to due compliance.

If any Interloper shall come upon your Coast or if you hear of their comeing, do not wait for our orders but we desire and require you to take such a course and to use such methods either by applycation to the Nabob or otherwise, as you shall upon due consideration think most proper for defeating thei[r] designed trade, which is so injurious to the R^t : Hon^{ble} : Company and tending to the ruin of the East India trade. Wee are

But the weather being uncertain wee have ordered the Master to repair and remain aboard and in case of bad weather to make the best of his way to Bombay. This serves only to inclose the Bill of Lading & Invoice of Saltpetre laden in Bengall 500 bags, and to acquaint that the King William is now Lading for England and wee hope will depart in ten days if weather permitt.

The Agent and Council of Bengall desire the Mary Buoyer may return to them for the service of the River, as we suppose they mention in their accompanying packet received by the Mary Buoyer. Wee are

to put out to sea and make the best of your way for the Port of Bombay where when arrived you are to deliver our Letter herewith delivered you as directed to his Excell^y: S^r: John Gay^r Gen^l: &c^a Councill whose orders you are to follow for your Lading & further proceed[ing] dated in Fort S^t: George this 8th day of October 1696.

May it please yo^r Excell^y &c^a.

Our last was dated 18th [. . .] via Surat, copy whereof comes inclosed, w^{ch}: acknowle[dges the] receipt of yours dated 18th May by the Ketch which is not ar[rived] as wee expected from Acheen, nor have wee heard any th[ing of] her nor the other Ships since our last, but there being [. . .] in Company wee hope they are safe. On the 30th day [. . .] the Mary Buoyer arrived from Bengall with [. . .] wee have waited thus long in hopes of the [. . .] bring you the Salt-petre, and then wee would have returned the Buoyer to Bengall where she is wanted; but now despairing of the Ketch and it growing too late to keep her long for fear of the Monsoon, wee send her forward, with the 500 bags Salt-petre and 200 bags more added here, as P Invoice and Bill of Lading amo^t: to Pag^s: 1665: 11: 4: Cap^t: Baker being willing to return to Bombay, wee have appointed him master of the Buoyer. When the Ketch comes, wee shall send her to yo^r: Excell^y: &c^a and pray that the Buoyer may be returned for Bengall according to the request of the Agent & Councill.

The severall Papers w^{ch} wee sent yo^r Excell^y: but miscarried with our overland Pacq^t: of September 1695 having been since copyed comes herewith as P List of this paquet.

Wee take good notice of what yo^r: Excell^y: &c^a wrote in yours of the 18th May concerning the difficulty of obtaining a Phirmaund and when obtained may not answer the greatness of the charge by reason of the suddainly expected change in the Empire, and till that can be obtained we must buy our freindship here with the Nabob at as cheap a rate as we can. And wee may well call it buying for he is Mercenary and rapacious who under the coller of conquering the Morattas, doth only employ his army in Plundering and robing the Country, and if he stays here many years more, the Country will be utterly ruined and dispeopled.

According to the request of Coñadore Brabourn &c^a we sent 22 Bricklayers, Carpenters &c^a Workmen by a Parr belonging to that place, and we now send them by the Buoyer 21820 Rup^s: and a Gin and Topaz soldiers the amo^t: of what sent by the Buoyer and Parr is Pag^s: 6405: 26: 3 as by the Inclosed copy of our Invoice. Wee could not send more soldiers because the Vessell wants suitable accomodations, but wee suppose another oppertunity may suddainly P sent.

Wee take due notice of your Excell^s: approbation of what hath been transacted here, with respect to Cochin China, Pegu and Acheen; The event hitherto hath not answered expectation. Wee have heard nothing yet of the Ship w^{ch}: went to Cochin China in May 1695. Wee despair of doing any good at Acheen while M^r: Delton is

there and the Loyall Captain w^{ch} went to Pegu in September 1695 lost her passage in her return from thence and was put into Acheen by contrary winds and is not yet arrived, so that there is no further acco^t: of M^r. fleetwoods Treaty with that King, then that the captives are released.

The Dutch and others have found so much trouble by farming Lands in Bengall, that wee could never find reason to give the Agent & Council orders for ffarming the Towns adjacent to Chuttanuttee; and wee have had a late instance here (tho' there is something ¶ticular in our case) of the inconvenience of meddling wth them. When Narrain carryed a Present to y^e Nabob in May 1695, the Nabob gave him a Perwan-na for a town called Cattewack about 10 mile [s] off to the northward for y^e maintenan[ce] of the Chinapatam Dubash. Wee took possession of it for y^e Co[m]pas] Acco^t: but Narrain being since dismissed from being Duba[sh] the Nabob has lately taken it away by another Perwa[nna] and given it to the Pullomalee renter: wee did not think fitt [to] contend for it, but suffered those that brought the Perwana to take possession.

The Estate of Thomas Pilson dec^d: being Pag^s: 797 [. . .] paid to M^r: W^m: Morrice by the Attorneys of M^r: Dolben [. . .] paid into the R^t: H: Comp^{as}: Cash on the 31st Jan^y:—95/6 and [. . .] him on the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: to ditto Pilsons widow.

On the 24th day of September wee received yo^r: Excell^[y^es letter] dated the 10th July overland, w^{ch}: was accompanied [. . .] the Hon^{ble}: Presid^t: & c^a: at Surat, which gave us the [. . .] their releasem^t: from so long and troublesome a confinement, during w^{ch}: they sent us severall Letters adviseing their circumstances under french cover; but wee had not confidence enough in the french to trust our answer by that conveyance.

Wee have not heard any thing concerning Cap^t: Etherington since his being at Batavia.

The papers relating to M^r: Walsh & c^a and Ship Elizabeth comes herewith as ¶ List. M^r: Walsh understood our Instructions to limit the price and therefore did not sell the Cloth at Acheen.

They write from Bengall that if there comes a great quantity of Cloth they shall not be able to sell for half the prime cost. Wee have ordered them to return to us so much as they find that they cannot vend in a year or two's time. Wee sell here at Pag^s: 20 & 21 ¶ half peice Broad Cloth and 42 for Aurora, but if wee could meet wth: a Chapman that would take off the whole or a considerable part, we should gladly take a less price because we expect more yearly and we have more already then we can expect to sell this twelve months, but no body will offer a price for so great a quantity, because the Country will not afford a vend otherwise then now & then a few peices to the Camp.

Should wee make further applycations to the Queen of Acheen, for the delivery of M^r: Delton & c^a it can't be done without a further charge, w^{ch}: wee dare not put the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: to wthout your Excell^s: order. The accompanying acco^t: contains the charges w^{ch} have been already expended, and tho' the greatest part thereof is occasioned only by the Pearls Cargo & men & c^a from Tonqueen yet there was 100 Tale left by M^r: Walsh & c^a with M^r: Soams for the Paggaring of the ffactory which wee fear the R^t: Hon^{ble}: Comp^a: will expect to be refunded, because as they have expressed it in some of their Gen^l: Letters to Fort S^t George, tho' they allow a free private Trade to such places as Metchlepatam, Pegu & Acheen and the use of their deserted ffactorys, yet they will be at no charge for their repairs or otherwise. M^r: Walsh & c^a had no orders for expending that 100 Tale, and yet it seems hard to make them pay for it, because they intended well, and it appeared to them necessary for the ordered settlement. Wee pray yo^r: Excell^s: consideration & direction in this matter.

By what your Excell^y: writes of Issa Cooley we find further reason to suspect that he cheated us of 5,000 Rup^s: w^{ch}: we p^d: here to his order, upon his advice that he was obliged to make good that sum for the procureing of the Kings Husbullhookum for takeing off the stop of Trade in Surat and Bengall in 1693/4, and tho' it

is probable that he is capable of managing business well at Court, yet doubtless he do's his own business with other peoples money and at best is very extravagant, and wee are fully of yo^r Excell^y: mind that he is not a fitt man to be trusted. But do not know where to find a better either of the same or any other nation.

Wee sent a few pieces of Europe cloth of severall sorts by M^r: Dolben & M^r: Trenchfield by the Elizabeth to Canton for the purcha[se] of the Velvets &c^a Issa Cooley desired for the Mogull according to his Muster; and withall desired them to bring us an acco^t: not only of the prizes, but also of the quantity vendable at that Port, and if they bring us an encourageing report, perhaps the Merch^{ts}: of this place will send some thither next year.

Wee heartily wish it true that Mooculas Cawn h[as] obtained a Phirmaund for the excludng Interlopers, it wo^d: now be very seasonable (there being one arrived in Bengall the Antelope Edward Clyves supra cargo and another expected whereof as well as their other affairs the Agent &c^a advises to have given yo^r Excell^y: &c^a an Acco^t: in their Pacquet which comes herewith). But wee are afraid it is too good news to be true.

Inclosed is 5 Rup^s: of the Madrass stamp and a copy of our Perwannas for coining. Wee receive $\frac{1}{2}$ P Cent for Pagodas and Moohers and 2 P Cent for Silver Rupees coined for perticuler persons.

By the Fleet frigate in May last M^r: Francis Ellis and M^r: Roger Braddyll arrived and took their places in y^s Councill according to the station appointed them by the R^t: H: Comp^{ss}: Commission. The informations received from Bengall relating to M^r Braddyll have been under our consideration in Councill, but is not yet brought to a result; which will be if not before soon after the King William is dispatched; if thereupon it shall appear that he is not really guilty of y^e matter charged, wee presume your Excell^y: doth not intend his suspension but if it shall appear that he is, wee shall observe your orders relating to M^r Braddyll.

The sailing orders w^{ch}: wee sent to Bengall for Ship Martha did not arrive there till her departure.

Wee have no news of the french Ships on this side of India. Wee hope they are gone home and pray God preserve our masters Ships out & home that they may not meet with those or any others. M^r: Brabourn sent us the Copy of a Letter from Tellecherry concerning a Pyrat there, w^{ch}: gave an acco^t: of 16 french ships that were gone either to the West Indies or South seas, it is not plainly expressed which. wee cannot tell what to judge of it but doubtless yo^r Excell^y: has a more perfect acco^t:

A Parr that came from Gallee the 1st September advised that the America was there, and put in to stop a Leak, and y^t there was a ship or two from China but no further Acco^t:

17th October 1696.

Letters from an Armenian at the Kings Camp to an Armenian here dated 21st September advise of News received there from Surat, that the five french Ships have met with six Dutch Ships near Muscat and taken three and sunk two. The other escapeing to Gombroon foundred in the road (no time mentioned) and that the King of Persia has sent an Army by Land against Muscat, and the Portuguez fleet is to assault them by sea.

By the List your Excell^y: will observe the copys of the severall Letters inclosed w^{ch}: we have received from and sent to y^e: R^t: H: Comp^a: and severall other papers. Particulerly the Duplicate of our Letter intended by the King William, where unto wee pray yo^r Excell^y: to be referred for an Acco^t: of our affairs so far as we have written. What shall be added will be sent your Excell^y: overland after the ships departure, w^{ch}: wee hope will be in a very few days if it please God wee be not hindred by fowle weather.

Several Paragraphs of our Letter to the R^t: H: Comp^a: advise them of our referring somethings to yo^r: Excellys direction, w^{ch}: wee pray your Excell^y: to observe as if

wee did repeat the perticule[rs] and give us orders therein and in the matter contained in the inclosed copy of our Consultations dated 15th & 17th Instant being a matter of great importance.

The Nabob hath had severall skirmishes with y^e: Morattas. Santogee Gurporow with an Army of 12,000 hath fled from these parts towards Kisna river. The Nabob hath followed hi[m] till he came within 4 leagues from this place to the north [. . .] of Pollicat. The Generall report is that he will in [his return to] Arcott visit the Sea Coast, and it is very probable [. . .] don't happen to call him directly and speedily to [. . .] at Arcott, and if he comes this way it will cost us either money or trouble or both. Wee are

Our last was dated 31st August 1696 ☞ Country Parr Copy whereof comes inclosed, since w^{ch} wee received yours dated 24th August adviseing of a Pyrat appearing upon y^e Coast of India, which is bad news and hath occasioned us to consider whether it is convenient to venture so much upon the Mary Buoyer as you intimate necessary for your present supply. Yet considering how much that settlement doth depend upon the speedy finish [of] the ffortifications, as you have constantly represented to us, Wee have sent you Rup^r: 21,820 and Dollars 205 such as wee co^d: get, and some other things as ☞ Bill of Lading & Invoice, there being neither Acheen Gold nor Chequeens nor more Ddollars procureable. This Vessell being not fitt for carrying of Passengers wee shall send you Souldiers, Armes &c^a by the next conveyance which wee hope will suddainly happen by a Country Ship bound for Persia.

Wee have paid your Bill to M^r: William Morrice for Pag^r: 211: 18 fan^a.

Yesterday an Armenian received Letters from the Mogulls Camp adviseing news from Surat, that the five french ships have met with six Dutch ships near Muscat and have taken three and sunk two, the other escapeing to Gombroon and there sunk in the road. The time and other circumstances not mentioned wee do not know what Credit is to be given to this report, but wee thought fitt to advise you of it, tho' if it be true you will probably have the news before you can receive this; and if any of the R^t: H: Comp^r: ships sho^d: arrive as expected, 'twill be convenient that you give them this caution, there is advice of eight more designed for India. Wee are

Upon receipt hereof you are to repair aboard and (the treasure being laden) you are with the first opportunity of wind and weather to sail and make the best of your way for Anjengo, where you are to deliver our Letter to y^e Comodore & Councill and the treasure &c^a Laden for that Port. From thence you are to proceed for Bombay and when arrived deliver our Pacquet as directed to his Excell^y: S^r: John Gayre Generall &c^a Councill whose orders you are to follow for your unlading and further proceeding. Wee have certain advice of a Pyrate of 120 tons seen in July last on the Coast of India, and we have also a report that the ffive french ships which departed from Surat have been since on the Coast of Muscat and mett with and taken or destroyed six Dutch ships, but whither they are since gone is not known. Wee give you notice hereof for yo^r: caution wishing you a good voyage wee date these in Fort St. George this 17th day of October 1696.

HON^{ble}: &c^a:

Our last was 3^d Inst^t: adviseing our intention of filling up the King William ^{& Pattamar.} here, and yet fearing wee should not have bales enough wee ordered you to receive all our Merchants Cloth which they should bring in to you, & to embale as much as you could brown and to cause the rest to be washed and sorted.

Upon further consideration of the season of the year wee resolved to fill up the ship here with Pepper rather then to send her to take in your Bales, and it proved very well, for on Saturday the 24th in the morning the very day she sailed the wind began to blow fresh from the NW^t: and so continued encreasing till Sunday night when the wind veer'd to the NE^t: and blew very hard with much rain all night till Monday noon, and then shifting to the southward abated. The NE^t: wind brought in the sea to the ffort walls Batterys and points but God be thanked hath done no greater damage then to wash away part of y^e sea gate Platforme and bare the Angle of York point about 4 foot deep, notwithstanding a double row of stakes. There was one ship in the road the Greyhound w^{ch}: on the heighth of the wind on Sunday night (as is supposed) put out to sea. If you hear any thing of her upon the Coast lett her have your assistance as the Circumstances of the case shall require.

Your severall Letters of the 5th 7, 8, 12, 14, & 20th: wee received concerning the embaleing of goods brown and white for the King W^m: with your Gen^l: Letter to K^t: H: Comp^a: Consultations & Diarys ending 15th Sep^r: last and Journalls and Ledgers Letter E and F which are sent by the K: William. Also copy of yo^r Diary to the 15th past to remain here.

Wee observe your supplying our merchants wth 1,000 Pagod^a: more then wee have drawn Bills for, as mentioned in yours of 12th Instant. The accomptant is ordered to charge the same to your Credit and their Debt in our Gen^l: Books.

Wee don't at present think of any other method to be taken in the case of the Chingee Goldsmith, then that you deliver M^r: Calendrini & c^a a Protest for continuing to protect the Criminall from Justice setting forth therein the contents of Ramrajas Letter & declareing them responsible for all damages which shall ensue.

The Nabob hath lately persued Santogees Army till he came to the Northward of Trivelore, and Santogee went on plundering the Country to Kisanpatam, where he took 42 Elephants whereof 20 had been bo^t: here and at S^t Thoma. The Nabob remained some time at Trivelore and from thence returned to Arcott and now it is credibly reported that Santogee is returned to Triparlee [? tripattee] and has an Eye upon some Treasure at Coverapack. When y^o: Nabob was at Trivelore, it was reported that he designed to Visitt the Sea Coast in his return to Arcott, and there are now daily advices from severall Pollygars that Hussim Cawn y^o: Phousdar of Trivelore, hath by the Nabobs order summoned all the Neighbouring Pollygars to bring in their proportion of peons to come wth him against Madrass, and that he designs to come as soon as the Nabob sends him 1,000 horse to assist him. In these reports theres nothing certain except that they are spread up & down the country, but whether there be any reall ground, or only raised and spread on purpose to frighten us into Piscashes time must discover.

For want of M^r: Griffiths Acco^{ts}: wrote for wee cannot proceed in examination hereof.

Wee have received the Pattern of strip'd Beetelaes, and desire you to go on in makeing as many as you can according to that and the other Patterns herewith sent, which wee received from the R^t: H: Company. But the Pattern you sent us is too course and advise us the lengths, breadths & price and how many peices a month.

Herewith comes the adjustment of yo^r: Acco^t: Curr^t: books Letter F wee want Copy of said Books to remain here.

As to your Merch^{ts}: offer of a Contract for 2000 Pag^a: we are glad to hear it and would not much stand upon an abatem^t: of the Fort S^t. George prices of Long cloth, Salampores, Beetelas nor an advance of the price of Europe cloth. But there are two things w^{ch}: must be further considered. They offer to provide these goods in 6 months which will fall in the month of May and wee can expect little or none of it in february, whereas we depend upon you for about 300 bales against that time (besides what already embaled) to help dispatch a ship then if it please God the expected ships shall arrive time enough and we shall endeavour to provide as many here, w^{ch}: with y^o Bales expected from Vizagapatam and the Cloth already in our possession wee hope may be sufficient for a small ship. The other objection is, that your Merch^{ts}: do not allow ours to provide any Cloth at Wooriar Pollam. But the case is thus. They would not in 4 months past provide in those parts one peice of Longcloth fitt for sorting, and if we contract with our Merch^{ts}: and exclude them from Wooriar wee must Contract only for fine goods w^{ch}: wont answer the end. And Serapa hath already employed & engaged a considerable number of Looms which are ready to go on in makeing Longcloth & Salampores there, and will probably go on faster under the same muster then under new ones. Besides, it seems to us that he hath broke the way for providing those sorts of Goods Longcloth & Salampores and don't remember that either the Fort S^t David or Fort S^t George Merchants have for many years past provided those sorts. Upon these considerations wee cannot allow that Serapa be excluded from buying there. But neither he nor any of our Merch^{ts}: shall have any thing to do within your Bounds.

Wee desire you to make the best Contract you can with yo^r Merchants for the provision of 20000 Pag^s: of cloth allowing them such an encouragem^t: as you can agree not exceeding ten P Cent to be paid if by the 20th day of Feb^r: they shall deliver 250 or 300 bales, but if they fail in time & quantity not to receive the said advance, and so as not to exclude our Merchants from buying at Wooriarpollam and instead of 3000 Pag^s: in Succatums, the one half of that sum to be provided in ordin^r: Neckcloths.

Lett us know by what Musters you are to sort. Wee suppose by the same musters as Fort S^t George. Wee are

Wee have received yours of 7th Instant & upon consideration of the Contract P Pattamar offered by your Merchants have resolved to accept of the same for so much only as they shall deliver in february, by which time wee hope to have a Ship and are content to allow your merchants an extraordinary advance for the goods that shall be then provided to serve that occasion; as wee do our own by a Contract now agreed, For the reasons wee referr to the inclosed Copy of our Consultation of 14th Instant.

Your Merchants being under no obligation not to dispose of Europe goods here or where ours use to dispose of it wee do not think it reasonable that ours should be limited and debarred from disposing [of] it at Wooriarpollam, and therefore wee have not propounded it to them; and P haps a Limitation may be in generall an impediment to the vend.

Wee shall send you money by the first oppertunity.

Wee have received M^r: Griffiths acco^{ts}: which are deliv^d: to him; and he promises his answer in few days.

On the 8th Ins^t: the Russell frigat touched here in her passage from Bengall, laden for England and sailed in the night following. Wee are

Our Merchants being acquainted that the ffort S^t David Merchants objected against their buying Goods in the bounds of Fort S^t David. They represent y^t: Serapa hath brought a considerable number of Weavers into your Bounds, that he hath employed them and others in weaving Salampores for our last contract, whereof they have received about 2000 P^s: within 5 months past, which proveing not so good as those from Wooriarpollam, they have caused about 300 Looms to be altered to a better sort, which are at this time employed and have delivered about 1000 P^s: of the new sort, and the weavers have about 500 Pag^s: in their hands. But for an Exact Acco^t: they referr to Punnapa Chittee and Ramadapilla their Servants, from whom you may receive a more P^ticular information, and may also view the s^d: 1000 P^s: Salampores.

If this prove true, It will be a reall discouragement to our Merchants to be thrown at once out of that business, and a Loss too since they have given out their money. If your Merchants take these weavers into their Employ, they must at least make good to the Fort S^t George merchants the money w^{ch}: they have given out. However, Serapa intending suddainly to go that way, you may permit those weavers w^{ch}: are already engaged to go on till he comes and then act in such manner as you shall find just to both parties.

The Paymaster has by Daniel Alleins order paid his wife here Pag^{as}: 1: 12 fa: for the month of October and is to pay her the same sum monthly dureing her stay here. Also Danⁿ: German hath ordered the paym^t: of Pag^o: 1: 24 fan^s: out of his wages to his wife and Creditors monthly w^{ch}: must be deducted out of his wages for October and forward, which payments wee shall charge to yo^r: Acco^t.

Wee should rather choose to have all the Wooriar Cloth washed and sorted here, but it would be unreasonable to compe[ll] our Merchants to bring it overland because of the risgo & charge. And if we stay till the winds permitt its comeing by sea, it may come too late for a February Ship. Wee therefore desire yo^r: Hon^r: & c^a: to take the trouble of causeing all our Merchants cloth that is or shall be brought in by them upon their last or present Contract to be washd sorted and Embaled.

What is now or shall be shortly brought in may be all washd, but of the Long-cloth w^{ch}: shall be deliver'd in the latter end of Jan^y: or beginning of ffebruary you may embale as much brown as may prove fitt for it. Wee would not embale Salampores brown unless upon a great necessity to prevent dead freight.

Wee take it for granted that you sort yo^r: Cloth by musters equal to Fort S^t George musters. If you apprehend any difference advise us, because our contract is by those Musters.

If you want packing stuff advise us. The package of your last Bales was not good: M^r: Ingram should take better care. Wee can send you 3 or 4-Corge of Wax Cloth if you want. You made use of Coir Rope and Coir twine last year. Wee will endeavour to supply you with better.

Wee have above 1000 Gunny bags by us w^{ch}: you sent up with pepper, wee can send you (when oppertunity shall P^sent) as many as you shall advise necessary.

December 2^d.

Yesterday wee received yours of 26th past with papers according to List. Those relating to Cooley chittee being large require further consideration.

Wee approve your Contract for Ten thousand Pag^s: deliverable in ffebruary. But there are two Articles the 7th and 9th which exempt the merchants from the risgo of the Cloth in y^e washers hands; and from the risgo of the Cloth in case of

warr between the Company and country Government. Whereas our Contracts have usually run so, that the whole risgo is the Merchants till embaled, and in case of Stoppage wee promise our endeavours to clear it as exprest in the 8th article.

Wee are sorry the 10th Article was concerted with your Merchants before you receiv'd what is before wrote concerning the provision of Goods within your bounds. Wee referr it to you to do our merchants right, that they may not have any just cause of complaint. But if your merchants shall wholly and at once exclude ours, wee doubt not but you will take care that your merchants do employ your weavers to as good purpose, and in makeing as good cloth, which as y^o: note is agreeable to the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: orders.

Our merchants do not yet speak of vending Europe Goods at Wooriarpollam &c^s.

You may go on in buying as much overland Malabar Pepper as you can gett, but if it be not really brought overland it do's not answer the design of the R^t: Hon^r: Company and the other sorts of Sumatra, Jehore &c^s can be bought considerably cheaper: Wee therefore think it better that you forbear to buy any more of the Danes, or others (imported by sea) unless you can buy at about Pa: 21 ₹ Candy, the importer paying custome.

Wee shall Debt our Merchants and give you Credit for y^o: Pagodas mentioned to be paid them in yours of 4th: past. Wee have paid your bill Pa: 500 to M^r: Alvarez, mentioned in d^o Letter, and shall pay your bill Pag^s: 55: 13: to M^{rs}: Millisent Woolnough when demanded.

You may continue to draw Bills upon us as occasion offers, wee having sufficient stock in Cash Pag^s: 20,000 more then wee are obliged to pay our merchants upon our ₹ sent Contract.

For your Direction in sorting, Prizeing and embaleing our merchants cloth, Wee send you a copy of our present Contract (you have the cobby of our last) and the warehouse keepers acco^t: of the severall mark's and numbers to be putt in the Ticketts and on the Bales. Lett your Warehousekeeper and accomptant keep the acco^t: thereof distinct from y^o: Fort S^t David merchants acco^t: and send us coppys thereof as the Cloth shall be received and as oppertunitie offers.

Wee are heartily sorry for M^r: Butterfields death. Wee shall send one to supply his place.

Severall Ticketts in the ffort S^t David bales have been signed by 3 or 4 sorters. It is more agreeable to the R^t: H: Comp^s: orders that each sorter only sign the Tickett of the Bale sorted by himself.

Wee can't expect any oppertunity will offer for sending bales or Pepper to us till the latter end of January and wee cannot yet foresee whether the ship on w^{ch}: they will be Laden may not take them in at ffort S^t David. However if any of the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: Ships happen to fall in with yo^r: Port bound hither, you may lade as many Bales & Pepper as you shall then have ready or the ship can take in.

Send us an Acco^t: of all the Stores you want that wee may take the oppertunitys as they shall happen in the Northerly monsoon to send them. Wee are

Our last was answered by yours of 26th past received by Ship Simon on the 2^d Instant, with copy of yo^r: Consultations & Diarys from 13th September to 23^d November.

The Rupee you sent for a Brass Rupee had a great defect in the stamping, being thick on one side and thin in the other with two or three cracks & a Hole w^{ch}: was covered with Ashes of a Collour which made it look like Copper. but the rupee being cutt in two and examined proves full rupee Silver, w^{ch}: might easily have been discerned by any shroffe upon the stone. Wee had such another sent from Bengall as false w^{ch}: proved good nor have wee yet found one false Rupee of our stamp. If you meet wth: any more suspected rupees you may cause them to be examined by the touch or by cutting. Wee return the rupee you sent.

Tho' the Surat rupees at present go at 2 or 2½ ₹ Cent more then ours, yet wee doubt not but if our minters do not abuse y^e Matt, they will quickly pass as currently as any other, to promote which wee allowed your Merchants the favour of receiving them at the Madrass price, upon their former Contract, but that was not intended to make it a custome. Hereafter they must acco^t: with you for the Vizagapatam Market price of Rupees.

Inclosed is a copy of the Invoice formerly sent you for the Rose water and Bell.

Wee have ordered the provision of the desired quantity of copper & c^a: Country commodities as the same can be bought at such rates as will yield 12 or 15 ₹ C^t: profit upon your prizes advised, that the same may be ready for the first conveyance w^{ch}: shall offer.

Wee take good notice of what you write concerning Sticklaek and depend upon your promised endeavours for procureing it. You need not fear exceeding in the quantity. 100 candy yearly would not be too much if cheap bought and good. Wee should not esteem 15 rupees a candy dear. Tho it seems probable to be bought rather cheaper in those places from whence it has not been usually bought. All those Hills generally afford it, but the natives have hitherto neglected because it was not known to be a commodity and if it hath not been gathered before in the Raja of Mergota's hills; possibly you may make a Contract wth: him for all his Country affords at a certain price, after wee have had experience whether it be good, if you write to him about it, advise him to order his people to gather none but sticks that are ripe and full covered. It will be an advantage to the Woods to let the young and half covered twigs grow till they are quite covered.

Wee are sorry to hear that you cannot provide more then 100 bales by the 20th January but you give such a reason for it as cannot be answered Viz^t: That there is not Cotton enough procurable till a next Crop, after w^{ch}: wee desire you to proceed in giving your Merchants and weavours a full employ in the method propounded; for w^{ch}: wee doubt not but wee shall be able to supply you with a stock equal to your Merchants undertakeing tho' it should be more then 5000 pag^s: a month, having this day rec^d: advice from Surat of 3 ships prepared for India with £00000^l Stock, whereof wee expect a Share.

If so large a stock should come, it is probable that the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: will order proportionable Investments on the coast. Wee have no promising prospect that wee shall be able to provide much here or at ffort S^t David during y^e: Warr between the Moratta's & Moors, who have for so many years taken turns to rob the Country. If we sho^d: meet with disapointments here, our dependance will be the greater on Vizagap^m. As soon as cotton shall be more plentiful and cheap, when y^e: can make a judgement of what you can do in the next year advise us that we may the better know how to direct the Investments of the Coast for the following Year.

Wee have perused w^t: you write (in your Gen^l: Letter, Consultation & Diary) concerning the acceptance, on y^e Sier Lascars and Merchants desire, of the Govern- ment of Bimplipatam, Conarra, & Veldore in the R^t: H: Comp^s: name for three years and observe the good assurance you have of many advantages and no probability of loss or damage that can accrue thereby. The grounds whereof may better appear to you who are upon the place and understand more p^ticularly the circumstances of the Country and nature of the Governm^t: then we can at a distance. Wee readily apprehend many conveniencies w^{ch}: may arise from it, for the better managem^t: and securing of Investments, promoteing private trade, furnishing this place and ffort S^t David wth: Gram and provisions, and preventing of Interlop^{rs}: But wee cannot be assured otherwise then from yo^r: judgements, that there can arise no loss or damage to the R^t: H: C: and others concerned in case of the Seerlascars removeall, or change of his present good humour or p^ticular affection to M^r: Holcombe. But it is need- less for us to offer at any considerations of that nature, because the thing is done, and wee suppose cannot be undone till the expiration of the term: and indeed wee know not what to advise till better informed: in order to w^{ch}: send us y^e: Coppys of the Seerlascars Cowle, your obligation (or Catopa) to him and y^e Merchants obligation to you, The Amo^t: of the town rents in the Kings books and the last years produce & charges of Government. At present we question whether any of the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: Merchants ought to be Avaldar of Bimplipatam, Conarra or Veldore, or an officer concerned in the collecting of the revenues, least they should thereby be rendered liable to be called before the Seerlascar or Duans Durbar, upon complaints of Merchants or informations of acting contrary to the Duans Interest. And wee think that it is not the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: interest, that the custom's or revenues of those parts be inhanced to any considerable sum above the rent, and that care be taken that all y^e: acco^{ts}: be kept in such manner that the true amo^t: may appear and for y^e: Justification the more publick they are made the better. M^r: Holcombe took a very prudent course in rectifying the abuses in Weights, measures and coins and removeing new impositions.

Your authority in those places may enable you to induce the country Traders to bring their Gram and provision either hither or to ffort S^t David. But that is to be done wth:out force, or useing such methods as may cause the thing to be much observed.

Wee have occasion for Chinam, but wee think y^e: freight would render it too dear if brought hither from Vizagapatam by boat or Ship, and it would be liable to damage, and therefore don't expect you sho^d: send us any, unless it could come freight free.

Inclosed is the Accomptants adjustm^t: of your Acco^t: Curr^t: to be Entred in your present Books, wherein you are to Credit Acco^t: Curr^t: by Samuel Owen, for his Debt recharged and Debt Acco^t: Curr^t: to Sam^l: Owen for 200 Pag^s: recovered of Presid^t: Yale, which being Pa: 33: 12 less then what M^r: Owen was Debted for upon that acco^t: he must in equity be Credited for the said difference by proffit & Loss, and wee suppose he ought to pay the remaind^r: of his Debt into the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: Cash. Wee are

Our last was dated 2^d October sent on the 6th by Ship Ann and a Duplicate thereof on the 8th overland by way of Vizagap^m. This comes the same way to acknowledge the receipt of yours dated 19th October by ship Russell frigate, w^{ch} : called here on the 8th November, and having no other business but to fitt a few Cask of Water sailed the same Evening for England, The King William having sailed on the 23^d October, and wee could not keep her longer at that uncertain season for the company of the Russell frigate. God send y^m : both safe to our R^t : Hon^r : Masters.

2. On the 11th ins^t : Ship Sedgwick advice Vessell arrived & brought us a Pacquet from the R^t : Hon^r : Comp^a : dated in ffebruary and May last, w^{ch} gives the good news of the arrivall of the Nassaw at Scilly, Armenian Merchant & London frigate in Ireland, The Amity parted in bad weather from the London frigate not far from Ireland.

3. This small ship came alone to bring advice of five ships w^{ch} : came out before her under the Convoy (to the Cape) of four men of Warr & a fireship, one the Charles the second for Persia; three for Surat, the Scepter, Chamber frigate & Dorrill; and one for the Fort, the Sampson. Besides w^{ch} : three were in May last in y^e Dow[n]es whereof two, designed for Bengall, the Sidney of 600 tons and Madrass frigate of 260 tons, and the other for Surat. All which ships were taken by the R^t : H : Comp^a : into their service and their cargoes in greatest part ready before the great loss sustain'd in the Princess Ann & c^a Ships taken by the ffrench. After w^{ch} : the Adventurers paid into stock 300,000^l fresh money for the more vigorous carrying on of the trade And tho' wee do not know the Amo^t : of the stock sent out upon these ships, wee conclude it very large, there being about 2,000,000 oz Silver whereof wee may reasonably expect a considerable part will bee sent hither.

4. Wee have not yet heard of the arrivall of any of those Ships in any part of India, but since wee expect so large a stock, It concerns us all to be considering how it may be best employed in order to the quick dispatch of the ships.

5. Wee don't know what will come hither or what directly to the Bay, but you may be assured that of the Silver w^{ch}: comes hither wee will send you as much as possibly wee can spare and you may forecast your Investment as depending upon at least ten Lack of Rupees.

6. When your merchants are assured of this, they may probably be induced to be, in the mean time, employing their own stock for the provision of Goods and the expected stock may gain you a credit for as much money as you want, and tho' wee wo^d: not needlessly put the R^t: H: Comp^a: to the charge of Interest, yet considering both the great convenience in the timely provision of Goods, and the prevention of the Interlopers, wee think it very requisite for their interest that you borrow as much as is necessary for those purposes. One months demorage saved for 100 tons will near pay the Interest of a Lack of Rupees for a month. The Demorage now paid being 12^d ₤ ton a day, and the freight 40^l ton.

7. As to the sorts of Goods to be provided you cannot commit any great Error in governing yourselves by the last List till the receipt of a new one. Wherein it is not probable there will be much alteration because of the small quantity of Bengall Goods w^{ch} the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: have received since their sending of the last List.

8. Wee depend upon the Sampson's comeing hither directly, But whether the Sidney and Madrass frigate, one or both will come first hither or to Bengall wee don't know, nor when they will arrive and therefore cannot foresee how they shall be disposed or employed, only that whatever Ship o[r] Ships shall arrive with you time enough for gaining their passage hither, that they be with all convenient speed dispatched to us wth: saltpetre and Provisions; except you shall find it necessary with respect to y^e Rajas troubles to keep such a Ship as the Madrass frigate as a guard Ship.

9. Pray inform us how the Armenians ₤ the Fleet frigate comply with and proceed in their Contract for the Europe Goods and provision of Bengall Goods.

10. The R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: have ordered us to procure all the Pepper wee can, in all parts. Wee have been informed, that pepper was at 8^{Rs} or 9 Rup^s: ₤ Maund in Bengall and possibly y^e: Rajas troubles may have prevented the Sale of that store w^{ch}: made the price so very low. If you would truck off your Europe Goods for pepper it would be a good Exchange, tho' you pay a Rupee or two in a Maund more for the pepper. However buy or secure as much as you can till the price shall rise to 12 Rup^s: ₤ Maund and send it home in such Ships as you shall dispatch for England or send it hither as opportunity offers by the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: Ships.

11. The R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: take notice to us that M^r Braddyll was indebted upon the Balance of Maulda Books LL Rup^s: 137,584: 5: without the Agent and Councils sentiments how and when y^t: Debt was taken to be discharged. M^r: Braddyll hath produced to us the succeeding Books MM: wherein is an Entry of as much remitted from Rajamaul in rupees to Hugely before the time when the Books LL ended, and doth alledge y^t M^r: Peachy would not bring the Acco^t: of the s^d: rupees remitted into his Books LL. To all w^{ch}: wee give credit, and the rather because M^r: Braddyll produceth to us an Acco^t: Curr^t: wherein he is charged with Rup^s: 135 the Balance of Maulda, and y^e: Agent has acknowledged the receipt of the Balance. Acquaint the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: with the truth.

12. Inclosed is a copy of a Parag: of the R^t: H: Comp: Letter to us dated 20th february: 1695 relateing to William Messenger. If the Sidney shall arrive first at Bengall let him proceed hither and send with him (or by the first opportunity) a perticular acco^t: of all that you know concerning that matter, with as authentic Evidence and attestations as you can to prevent further references to Bengall for full information.

13. Wee observe your prudent management in y^e: further acco^t: you give in yours of 19th October of your assisting the Government without disobligeing the Rajah. Wee cannot foresee how far the Rajahs rebellion may proceed, how long it

will continue, or what accidents may happen, how far yo^r: Investments may be impeded, wee must therefore leave the management of affairs to you to act according as in the best of your Judgements shall appear most agreeable to the Interest and security of the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: affairs, and to Emergent circumstances.

14. Wee find no reason from any advices wee have received to discourage you from prosecuting the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: former orders for preventing & defeating the Interlopers, by such methods as you shall find most proper, tho' it should put the R^t: H: Comp^s: to charges, wherein wee doubt not your frugality. Notwithstanding the usuall Bravadoes of the Interlopers, there appears no reason but to conclude that the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: is before this time confirmed by act of Parliament, the doing of which was in the last Sessions prevented by the discovery of that Hellish plot against his Maj^s: life and by other nationall business interposing till the end of the Sessions.

15. The Comander of the Sedgwick adviseth that y^e: Martha and Sarah departed from S^t: Helena in July last in company with the Dutch fleet, who instead of stopping at the Cape called there. Wee are

This serves to advise you that on the 11th Ins^t: the Sedgwick advice Vessell arrived here and brought us a pacquet adviseing of five ships sent out of England for severall parts of India with a considerable stock under a convoy to the Cape, before this Ship left Plymouth on the 26th May last, and there are three

more in readiness for India. Wee are also advised of the safe arrivall of the Armenian Merchant [and] London frigate in Ireland & Nassaw at Scilly (the Amity being forced from the London frigate a little before). The Comander of the Sedgwick adviseth that the Martha & Sarah saild from St. Helena in July last in company with the Dutch fleet.

2. Wee find no occasion from the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: orders to alter any thing w^{ch}: wee have wrote you concerning your Investments, but their Letter directes the reducing of the Expences of yo^r ffactory: from what Books that acco^t: was taken w^{ch}: gave the occasion we don't know, but desire you to cause a Generall Table to be drawn out for every year since M^r: Holcombe went thither, of the Amot; of each head of your ffactory Expences, that wee may bee the better able to give the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: an answer; not having hitherto observed any extravagant or unreasonable charges. Add also a generall acco^t: of the Revenues.

Yours of 31st October wee received on the 10th Instant acknowledging the p^{er} Pattamar receipt of ours dated 31st August wth: the work men.

Our last was 17th October by Mary Buoyer by which wee sent you Pag^s: 6251: 7: 3: w^{ch}: with the Gold you advise to have received from the China Ship wee hope will suffice for your present supply. Wee designed to have sent you souldiers & c^a but the ship with w^{ch}: wee had contracted for their passage was lost out of this road in a storm on the 25th October, since w^{ch}: there hath happened no opportunity, and wee are not yet assured of one, but when one offers wee intend to send them.

On the 11th Instant Ship Sedgwick advice Vessel (90 tons) Cap^t: Alex^r: Dennett comander arrived & brought us Letters from the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: dated 20th ffbruary & 20th May last adviseing that y^e: five following ships were departed under Convoy of four men of Warr and one fire Ship to the Cape Viz^t: the Sampson for this place, the Charles the Second for Persia, the Chamber frigate, Dorritt & Scepter for Surat, with very considerable stocks, and that the Sidney and Madrass frigate for the Coast, and the East India Merchant for Persia & Surat were ready in the Downs to follow. The consideration of the Settlement and Security of the East India trade was before the Parliament in their Sessions from Nov^r: to April last, but the conclusion was obstructed by the Discovery of the Plott against his Maj^s: life in ffbruary and other nationall business, chiefly relating to the vigorous prosecution of the warr against ffrence, but the confirmation & settlement of the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^s: by Act of Parliament was expected in the Succeeding Sessions.

Wee have wrote to President Hatsell & c^a at ffort St. David concerning the Poola's complaint, and wee doubt not but they will return you a satisfactory answer by this or another conveyance, and wee leave it to you to give his Exc^v: & c^a: a particular acco^t: of that affair.

Inclosed is our Letter to his Exc^y: the Generall &c^a Council at Bombay, which wee desire you to send forward as oppertunity offers.

The R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: in their Letter to us, dated 20th february last, complains of the terms of the Contract w^{ch}: you made wth: the Queen of Attinga, as very defective, but there is no instances given of the perticulars, and their Hon^{rs}: add, that the Defect must be repaid by a future good management. Wee are

Our last was dated the 14th: & 17th: October last by the Mary Buoyer Stephen Baker master, since w^{ch}: none from yo^r Exc^y: &c^a. Inclosed is the copy of the List of that Pacquet.

Ship Sedgwick advice Vessell Cap^t: Alex^r: Dennet comānder who departed from Plymouth on the 26th May last and called at S^t. Helena, arrived here on the 11th Instant and brought us a Letter dated 20th february sent Ⓕ Ship Sampson. The coppyes whereof with coppyes of other papers will be sent yo^r: Exc^y: &c^a overland by way of Surat in a very few days. The List of the intended pacquet comes inclosed, so far as it is finished.

In the mean time wee thought it requisite to give yo^r: Exc^y: a short acco^t: by this conveyance (overland to Anjengo) of what the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: are pleased to advise us.

That the Adventurers have paid into the Stock 300000^{li} fresh money. That on the 19th May last there sailed five Ships from Spithead, under Convoy (to the Cape) of four men of Warr and a fire ship Viz^t. The Sampson for this place. The Scepter, Chamber frigate & Dorrill direcfly for Bombay and the Charles the Second for Persia & Bombay or Surat. That three more were then in or near the Downes Viz^t: for Surat the East India Merchant, and for the Bay and coast, the Sidney and Madrass frigate. The Nassaw was safely arrived at Scilly, The Armenian Merchant at Corke, the London frigate at Galloway, from whom the Amity parted in bad weather 250 leagues from thence in Lat: 51: 18.

The R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: Letter doth not mention the amo^t: of the stock, but by Prints it is confirmed, that their ships bring for India 2150000 oz: Silver, and it is not to be questioned but they bring Europe cloth, Lead, &c^a.

Wee have sent the necessary advices to Bengall, Vizagapatam & ffort S^t David by this conveyance wee have advised M^r: Brabourne &c^a: That the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: haue ordered us to buy up what pepper wee can possibly it being risen in England to 2^s: 6^d: Ⓕ LL.

28th December D^o.

Yesterday wee rec^d: a Letter From Cap^t: James Thwaits commander of Ship King William from Trincomalay dated 18th November last adviseing that on the day after he went out of this road, w^{ch}: was on Saturday the 24th October, they mett with a Storme within the night following, grew so great as disabled his ship as ~~the~~ the inclosed narative by w^{ch}: it doth appear that the ship is uncapable of proceeding on her Voyage at present, and 'tis also doubtfull whether She can be refitted according to Charterparty, wee shall give him all the assistance wee can on such terms as may secure the R^t: H: Comp^a: from further loss, w^{ch}: is already too great by the wast of the Salt-petre and Damage of bales, whereof 'tis supposed the greatest part are wett, and our present thoughts are to send Vessells to Trincomalay to fetch them hither to be rewashed.

This day we rec^d: Letter from the Agent & Council of Bengall dated 8th Instant adviseing the arrivall of the Fleet frigate from the West Coast and the progresse of the Rebell Raja's army.

The same conveyance bro^t: us a paquet from the West Coast dated 3rd September ~~the~~ Fleet frigate, who arrived there the 12th July and hath carryed to Bengall 315 bahar Pepper. One reason why he carryed no more was because the Ship being sent to [P]riamong to lade pepper two or three prows were cast away laden and they could get off but 70 candy by reason of bad weather. The Gov^r: &c^a. give a satisfactory accot: in generall of the State of that place, which now proves so healthy and comfortable to the souldiers, &c^a. that none of them desire to return, tho' offered. They advise that M^r: Langley Supracargo of the Dorothy to China comeing to Bencoolen from Batavia on a dutch ship with 160 chests China wrought silks took his passage on the fleet frigate with D^o: Chests for Bengall from whence there is advice that he is dead.

The balance of their cash was on the last August Ryalls 28532:2:1 so that wee shall not haue occasion to send them much cash this year, but shall send them some calicoes so soon as wee can meet with a vessell that is fitt for the use of y^t: place.

No news of the Josia Ketch but that she came out of Acheen on the 20th: August last, in company of three other ships all bound for this place, of whom wee have heard nothing.

Our last was the 30th Novem^r & 2^d Inst. Yours of 16th: wee received on the ~~the~~ Pattamar. 20th Instant. Besides the paym^t: to the wives of Daniel Allen and Dan^l: Germain our paymaster pays monthly to the wife of Thomas Christie P: 1: 18th. monthly from the 1st October which was omitted to be before advised.

If your musters are the old musters of those southern ffact^o: there is no occasion to send any others, it being taken for granted that they are agreeable to the Fort St. George Musters. Wee desire that the Fort St. George merchants cloth may be sorted by your musters and sorters in the same manner as you sort your own investments. Wee will send you assistants. But wee cannot send a person fit to entrust with the management of the sorting.

Wee will send you Gunnyes and ropes when wee receive them and 200 pepper-bags when opportunity offers.

It is and should be a standing rule for all contracts with the merchants in all ffactoryes, that all manner of risgoes are for the merchants acco^t: till the cloth is embaled and it is no injury to y^e merchants, because their profit is supposed to be a valuable consideration and if it were otherwise it will be in the power of y^e. merchants to put tricks upon us by false pretences wth: can't be disprov'd.

Your merchants offer to procure goods for 5 p Cent comission on the prime cost and to run the risque of the weavours debts would be a very good contract for our investments were it not for the risques in the country, which would be in the merchants power to make as much as they please and to juggle with the government to bring a loss upon the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: It will be also in their power to deceive us in the prizes of cotton, thread and the weaving & juncan &c^a charges. There is therefore no other way of contracting wth: them for cloth bought out of your bounds but by a muster for a certain price, and the risgo and charges upon their Acco^{ts}: for w^{ch}: reasons wee have always waved all other sort of offers which have been frequently made. But if your merchants will contract for the provision of goods within your Bounds (where there is no risgo run of the country government) they running the risgo of the weavers debts, it would be very reasonable to allow them a commission as well for the trouble as risgo of debts. But then the price must be stated with the weavers by muster, or if cotton and thread were constantly procureable and cheap it would be a good way to deliver that to the merchants, contract with the Weavers for the cooley and allow something to the merchants for their pains and the risgo of the Weavers Debts.

And this wee think may be a good method for prosecuting the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: orders in the inclosed 9th: paragraph of their Letter now receiv'd dated 20th Feby: last.

Wee have no reason to doubt but wee shall have a sufficient stock to answer the largest contract you can make with your merchants wherein wee are referred by the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: to the last list formerly sent you, and they have sent no other.

When wee receive a supply of stores wee will send you a due share of each sort according to your list.

Tho' the Olla of the Poola's factor doth assert that the doctor bo^t: the palmera's of him, yet if wee understand the meaning of yo^r: letter aright, it was done by his servant and Tomana's combination to cheat both the doctor and the ffactor, and the Doctor being here doth affirm that he knew nor heard nothing of it till Tomana was run away. Hee also informs that his servant Chellumbrum when examined by your selves did acknowledge the same, and that we gave good security for his forthcoming. If this be true, wee doubt not but Chellumbrum (since Tomana is dead) or his security is answerable; or if he hath a house or any estate in Cuddalore or Tevenapatam it ought to be sold to make good the debt. However since M^r Brabourn &c^a have represented the ill consequence to the ffactory, if the Poola be not paid what is really due to him, to prevent that, wee think you ought forthwith to pay the money due to his ffactor takeing a receipt to be sent to M^r: Brabourn &c^a and by this peon give advice either that it is or will be done, which must be reimbursed again out of the estates of those concerned in y^e bargain.

As to the tryall of Rama Reddee, our present thoughts are that his Maj^{ty}: Characters do sufficiently empower you to proceed therein without a comission from hence, but wee shall endeavour to give you a more satisfactory answer.

Wee have lately wrote to you to forbear buying any pepper but overland Malabar pepper, unles procureable at 20 pags: p Candy but the R^t: H: Comp^a have

now repeated their orders for buying as much pepper as wee can, as by the inclosed 17th Par: of their letter dated 20th Feby: Notwithstanding which wee ought to buy as cheap as wee can, and to make a difference between the Malabar and other sorts in the price, proportionable to the difference in the goodness.

Inclosed is a copy of the 4th Parag: of the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a: said Letter relating to ffort St. David, occasioned by the character w^{ch}: wee had given of the place, and as to the charges complained of as they appeared by the Books then received, wee have acquainted the R^t: Hon^r: Comp^a by a Letter lately sent to Bengall to go by y^e: Fleet frigate, that your Books ending in April last make the profit of the ffactory equal to your charges.
