PREFACE.

The matter contained in this volume represents immense labour on the part of Mr. Rahalkar and those who worked with him. When a record of this kind was originally proposed, I was very doubtful as to whether it would be possible to collect such information even for Indore City alone. However, Mr. Rahalkar was not daunted and this work is the result of his investigations. That no error should have crept into a volume containing so much statistical detail, and collected, moreover, for the first time, is not conceivable but the figures may be safely taken as a sound basis for examination and discussion, while a commencement has been made for a regular decennial review of the State's resources. Perhaps this review might even be made quinquennially as regards certain statistics, such as statements IV, V, VI, VII, VIII, IX, XIX, XLII, XLIII, XLIV, XLV, LI, LV, LVI and XCVIII. Certain statistics are automatically collected for the annual Administration Report and hence are always available.

It is at any rate to be hoped that all the labour expended on this work will not be allowed to remain pigeon-holed away unused and without being periodically brought up to date.

I must offer my congratulations to Mr. Rahalkar for this successful termination of a most laborious task.

Appendix A.

A NOTE ON THE CONTROL OF FOOD-STUFFS.

The Holkar State always pursued a policy of non-interference with trade and gave facilities for the development of trade. The years of 1917 and 1918 were agriculturally very bad years and great scarcity of food stuffs was felt by all including the Government of India who had also to arrange for the supply of food-stuffs in war-time. The prices of food stuffs rose very high and the Native States round about Indore had recourse to prohibition of export of food-stuffs. The British Indian provinces drew their supply of grain from Indore only in Central India and as a consequence the stocks of grain were exported in large quantities from Holkar State as the exporters got good price for their commodities. The source of supply to recoup the depletion from the neighbouring States being thus stopped our stocks continued to be depleted and grave apprehensions were being felt to meet our own needs. Applications were also sent by the people of Indore requesting prohibition of export of grain from Holkar State. War arrangements produced great congestion on Railways and a stage was reached when Railway facilities could not be obtained for movements of grain. Indore always imported wheat from the Punjab in normal times and this supply replaced the Malvi wheat that was exported as it was in great demand in foreign market and fetched good price. Inquiries were made, the district officers and the people were interviewed by the Chief Minister and officers of the State to ascertain the situation with respect to food grains and it was found that in view of our sources of supply of grains being stopped, unless we stopped all export there would certainly be great depletion of stocks and probable starvation of the people. The Government of His Highness therefore stopped all export of grain from the 21st January 1918.

To regulate the supply of food-stuffs in different parts of India at reasonable rates, to lessen the congestion of traffic on Railways and to check the evil propensity of grain dealers to take undue advantage of the situation by demanding high prices the Government of India established the system of "Control of Food-stuffs" and Directors of Civil Supplies were appointed to all the provinces who consulted one another and allowed movements of grain from provinces where a particular grain was a surplus to provinces where it was deficit. No movement of grain could take place on a Railway without a "Priority Certificate" from these Directors of Civil Supplies. A Director of Civil Supplies was appointed for Central India and it was necessary to make arrangements for import of rice pulses grain from outside through him. Statistics had to be kept to be supplied to this Director and control had to be exercised on commodities brought from outside. This necessitated the appointment of "Controller" for Holkar State, to consider the stocks of food-stuffs and other necessaries of life and to receive and examine applications from merchants and others for the movements of traffic in the State, to scrutinise reports and demands sent to him by the district

officers of the State, to communicate with the Director of Civil Supplies in Central India as to the nearest point from which supplies for the State could be obtained and to co-operate with him in preventing non-essential movements and particularly the cross movements.

The Government of His Highness considered the proposal and Mr. S. L. Tambe B. A. was appointed the controller of Supplies for the Holkar State in addition to his duties as Registrar, Co-operative Department and Director of Agriculture.

Grain Committees were formed in the important centres of the Parganas with the Amins and Naib-Amins as their Presidents and the movements of the grains were allowed on the strength of certificates given by these committees.

Arrangements were made through the Director of Civil Supplies for Central India to import high quality of rice for which there was great demand, for gram and pulses and these were sold under the "Control System". This prevented the dealers from profiteering and enabled the people to get good rice and other grains at reasonable rates. Reports were invited from districts and arrangements were made to supply grain from surplus districts.

Complaints about the smuggling of food grains were reported and many cases were also detected by the Sayar Department but the measures taken by the Sayar Department to prevent smuggling proved in-effective and the Government of His Highness had to be moved to make smuggling a penal offence and soon after smuggling was made a "Penal Offence" the cases were sent to the Magistrate concerned for trial and this step helped greatly in minimising the chances of smuggling.

As the work of Control increased, the necessity of having an Assistant was very keenly felt to manage the office as the controller was often required to go on tour. The Government of His Highness appointed Mr. L. B. Deshmukh, Assistant to the Controller, in December 1919.

Early in October 1919 the merchants holding large stocks of Jwar applied for the export of their Jwar to foreign territories as it was getting more and more spoiled every day. Figures were obtained for our stock of Jwar and other food grains from all Parganas of the State. It was found that there was surplus quantity of Jwar which could profitably be exported. Recommendations for allowing partial export of old Jwar to foreign territories were made. The matter was fully discussed in the Council and the orders of His Highness the Maharaja were obtained for partial removal of restrictions on the export of Jwar for one month only from 18th of November 1919 to the 18th of December 1919 on condition that one-fourth quantity of Jwar should be kept with the grain Committees for local requirements at 15 seers per rupee and the remaining portion to be exported on the recommendations of the grain committees. A grain Committee consisting of local merchants and two or three State pensioners as its members and the Subha of Indore as the President was appointed to do this work in the City of Indore for allowing export of old Jwar from Indore City. This measure enabled the people to get the Jwar at

cheap rate and freed the capital of the dealers which otherwise would have been locked up and had not been serviceable for purchase of the Jwar from the cultivators who would have thereby been forced to dispose of their Jwar at low price to pay their revenue dues.

Later on the wheat arrangements in the city were also entrusted to this Committee. At this time the supply of wheat was inadequate on account of the wheat harvest being very poor. This fact was already corroborated from the figures of the forecast prepared by the Director of Land Records. This danger of shortage of wheat was already apprehended. Arrangements for regular supply of wheat in the city were made by opening "Control shops of wheat" in the city.

The situation with regard to wheat continued to grow serious and a meeting of the special Council was held and stringent measures were proposed to be adopted for taking out stocks of wheat from the stock-holders. For this purpose the Amins and the Subhas under orders of His Highness were empowered to take possession of the grain stocks within their respective jurisdictions.

Doctor S. N. Deo, the then Superintendent Municipality was appointed as a Joint Controller for Indore City and all wheat arrangements for Indore district and city were entrusted to him. This arrangement is still in force as it was considered more useful.

Owing to the acute conditions in the general rise in the prices of food-grains it had become imperative to discuss and propose measures for the control of food-stuffs in the State. Committee consisting of the Revenue Minister, Food Controller, and the Subhas was called together and this committee passed a scheme in which powers were given to the Subhas to allow the movements of grains within their districts and the Amins within their Parganas. It was also decided to ascertain the stocks in the Districts and to prepare statements of stocks to enable this office to regulate the movements of grain supply knowing the surplus and deficit quantity of grain in the districts.

The harvest of wheat in 1919 being poor the situation with regard to wheat continued to be bad and arrangements had to be made to import wheat from the Punjab on facilities afforded to importers to export their unsold wheat as it was necessary to preserve our good Malwi variety for seed purposes.

As is natural smuggling was practised in various ways and in order to minimise it smuggling was made a penal offence in January 1920.

Wheat being the great staple grain of the Holkar State which fetched good price it was found necessary to control it rigorously. All wheat has therefore been ordered to be brought into Indore and all transactions are done with the knowledge and sanction of the Customs Commissioner, Muntazim Bahadur Doctor S.N. Deo. As the Control in British India has now been abolished, steps are being taken to amalgamate the office of the controller of supplies, Holkar State, Indore with that of the Customs Commissioner and therefore all future arrangements as regards grain will be entrusted to him.

“Control” implies restrictions and restrictions tend to retard movement and growth. “Control” has therefore been an impediment to the growth of trade. The Holkar State has all along been following the policy of non-interference of trade and to give stimulus to it the Shiwa Gunj duty free zone was established. But “Control” in all the British provinces and the neighbouring States necessitated departure from that policy as otherwise all our grain would have been exported and we would have been starved. Care was, however, taken to enforce rigidity of Control as much as self-sufficiency demanded. This had the effects of enabling the subjects of the Holkar State to have cheap grain when prices in British India had risen very high. This had alliviated the sufferings of the people and afforded them relief. The interest of the trading community had been guarded by allowing export of surplus Jwar so that traders could realise their money locked up. When it was found that there was shortage of wheat it was arranged to allow importation of wheat by giving concessions to the importers with regard to re-exportation of any Punjab wheat that may not be sold here. “Control” has no-where been fully successful as varied and complicated interests of producers, consumers and middle men are involved in it. It militates against the natural law of demand and supply, and it is next to impossible to convince people about the relative dependency of all these interests. Control is found to be unpopular. The British Government had to abolish Control and it has always been the desire of His Highness’ Government to gradually relax it and allow trade to have its normal course. But unfortunately the past two years have been agriculturally very bad years, and no suitable time had fallen to our lot when we could gradually relax control and ultimately abolish it. The cultivator has been hit very hard as control has prevented him from getting good price for his produce of grain. The consumers have, however, been benefitted as this has given satisfaction to the people.

NOTE ON APPENDIX B.

This appendix is the statement showing particulars about Dewasthans (देवस्थान) of the Holkar State.

This statement, parts A and B, does not contain all the Dewasthans of the State. In statement A those institutions, the annual grant (Nemnuk) of which exceed Rs. 100 have been given and in statement B those, whose annual grant is upto Rs. 100 but not below Rs. 40 have been shown

In order to classify all the Dewasthans of the State properly according to the amount of their annual grant they have been divided into four classes, viz. A, B, C, and D, by the Huzur Khasgi Department under whose control these institutions lie. The Institutions coming under the category of class C, and D, i.e. those getting upto Rs. 40 but not below Rs. 10 per annum as well as those getting below Rs. 10 per annum have not been sorted and arranged in a statement form like A, and B, as yet, since the information is not yet readily available. But the work of collecting this information, it is understood, is in progress.

Besides the Dewasthans that come under classes C and D., there are several other State institutions situated outside the State in several Kshetras all over India which have also not been shown in these statements.

The information contained in this appendix was, supplied by the Huzur Khasgi Office.
