The Consultation Book and Diary of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Nathaniel Higginson Esq<sup>r</sup>: Lieutenant Generall of India & Governour: of Fort St: George &c<sup>a</sup>: Councill their Proceedings and Transactions for the affairs of the R<sup>t</sup>: Honourable: English East India Company, Begun the 12th of January 1697.

12. Delivered a Passe to Brigantine Olive Branch John Furcaud master bound on a trading voyage.

M<sup>r</sup>: Francis Ellis pays into the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Cash Pag<sup>s</sup>: 1157: 1: 3, being the balance of the outstanding account of ship King Williams damaged Cargo.

Doctor Buckley recommending his Prentice M<sup>r</sup>: Edward Rawdon, who has served him above 6 years as qualified for his mate, and one Jacob [Dunot] a Dutch Musteez for an assistant. It is ordered that there be allowed five Pag<sup>s</sup>: a month to [y<sup>e</sup>: Mate] and three to the Assistant.

The charges of the Hospital running [very high] Doctor Buckley is desired to consider thereof [and] make a report that they may be regula[ted], in dietting sick souldiers for each of whom 3 for a day is allowed, besides which the Stewards Acco<sup>t</sup>: amounts monthly from ten to eighteen Pag<sup>s</sup>:

M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis having delivered an account of 8 [bales] of severall sorts of cloth belonging to Ship King Williams returned Cargo, stolen from y<sup>e</sup>: [ . . . ] was [hers] and the accomptant having calculated the value by the outcry rates at Pag<sup>s</sup>: 22:27 fanams. The Secretary is ordered to pay the said sume out of the Talliards money into the R<sup>t</sup>: H: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Cash.

The Justices of the Choultrey also acquaints that there is on the Choultrey one of Timapa Nague Talliards, upon whom two pieces of [ . . . ] cloth was found.

Ordered that Pag<sup>s</sup>: three thousand due on a [ . . . ] dated the 8<sup>th</sup>: Novem-ber 1697, with the interest paid to M<sup>r</sup>: Stephen Frewen.

FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 1697

M<sup>r</sup>. Fraser, doth in the behalfe of the owner of Ship Tonqueen Merchant, represent to us Cap<sup>t</sup>: Knox Comander of the Tonqueen Merchant when at Bencoolen in 1692, left in the hands of Charles Fleetwood then Governour 6 [pipes] of wine for sale, one whereof appears to have been expended there for the use of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: for which M<sup>r</sup>: Fraser demands one hundred [D<sup>s</sup>:] M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwood not having charged the said sume to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company in his cash account, whereupon the question being put whether the said sume of 100 Dollars ought to be paid out of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Cash. It is resolved in y<sup>e</sup>: negative for the following reason. By the acco<sup>t</sup>: of D<sup>o</sup>: Fleetwood w<sup>th</sup>: the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company as stated by judgement of the Court of Admiralty now produced, signed by William Fraser, Judge Advocate Charles Barwell and Edward Tredercroft Assistants dated the first of August 1696, the said 100 dollars is actually accounted in the credit of said Fleetwood, and the said account is actually transmitted to York Fort w<sup>th</sup>: order to give said Fleetwood credit accordingly in their Books. Besides he is by the said Judgement of Court condemned in a large sume w<sup>ch</sup>: he doth not own to have sufficient Estate to pay, so that if wee pay the said 100 Dollars and charge the same to Fleetwoods account, wee shall make a desperate Debt.

The Justices report of the Quarrel at M<sup>r</sup>: Kennedy's house being considered and there appearing no evidence of a challenge given. It is resolved y<sup>t</sup>: they be not presented for the same, but for their disorderly and quarrelsome behaviour. It is ordered that M<sup>r</sup>: Griffith, M<sup>r</sup>: Sewell and Kennedy do not wear a sword within the bounds of Fort St. George, during the term of six months. And that Patrick Dixon be referred to a Councill of Officers to be punished in such manner as may be exemplary to y<sup>e</sup>: Garrison.

Messrs. Griffith, Sewell and Kennedy being sent for were acquainted w<sup>th</sup>: the foregoing order & discharged from their confinement.

Generall letter to the Governour and Councill of Nagapatam relateing to the ship brought thither on the 5<sup>th</sup>: instant: by William Willocke and another to Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David dated the 12<sup>th</sup>: Ins<sup>t</sup>: read & approved.

In persuance of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: orders in [the] 56 paragraph of their Generall Letter by [the] Tavestocke D<sup>r</sup>: Brown having been Discharged from their service in this Garrison and an [ . . . ] made him of being a Chirurgeon of Chuta[nutte] ffactory in Bengall, Hee doth excuse himselfe from goeing for the present by reason of his engagement in practise here.

Cap<sup>t</sup>: Joseph Turner who came out a Passenger on the Tavestocke without signing freemen Indentures, w<sup>ch</sup>: having been required of him [ . . . ] and he hitherto scrupling to enter into such obligations, and by his common discourse of serving Moors &c<sup>a</sup>: and the tenor of his behaviour giving us just reason to suspect that if he stays in India, he will not comply w<sup>th</sup>: the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: orders nor the same rules which others are under and that he will be very troublesome. It is resolved that an order be given to Cap<sup>t</sup>: William Gifford Comander of Ship Sidney for receiving [ . . . ] him Passengers for England on Charter party terms, if the said Turner can be induced thereby to return.

Ordered that the Paymaster pay to each of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: servants who are to proceed for Bengall by Ship Tavestocke six Pag<sup>a</sup>: to furnish themselves with provisions for y<sup>e</sup>: voyage.

The Generall Letters from York Fort dated 9<sup>th</sup>: October, from [P]riamong  
dated 20<sup>th</sup>: November. M<sup>r</sup>: Frith dated the 16<sup>th</sup>: September, being read, it is  
observed that the said Letters and Diaries advices the arriveall of the Amity there  
on the 11<sup>th</sup>: August and their intention of sending her home full laden by the 20<sup>th</sup>:  
October. The arriveall of y<sup>e</sup>: Bencoolen Yatch on the 31<sup>st</sup>: August which went  
from hence in June last. That M<sup>r</sup>: Frith upon receipt of L<sup>tes</sup>: from ffort S<sup>t</sup>:  
George turning out M<sup>r</sup>: Darley and making himselfe Chief of [P]riamong, the  
Deputy Governour went from York Fort w<sup>th</sup>: the Amity, and settling the factory  
carried M<sup>r</sup>: Frith with him to York Fort, to remain there till the [P]riamong  
accounts are finished, That the Countrey was peaceable and Pepper Plantations  
flourish to that degree that after they had secured 1500 Bahar for the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>:  
Comp<sup>s</sup>: service, they spared 200 bahar to the Wellcome, That the misunder-  
standing between the Rajahs doth yet continue, for which reason they forbore  
to deliv<sup>r</sup>: the swords sent to Sultan Guillimot and Sultan Addill. In order to a  
firm union they propound the removeall of [P]riamong factory to Manduta. That  
the King of Bantam pretending a right to the Island of Sumatra to Cattown, he  
has sent people to make dissentions among the Sillabar and Bencoolen Rajahs.

The Governour acquaints the Council that on the 14<sup>th</sup>: Instant two Moor-  
men & three Siamers belonging to a Siam Ship lately arrived at Pallicat, came to  
him and made a demand of a Cable and Anchor and Jarrs which belonged to the  
Siam ship last taken by the Mocha frigate, and which they were informed are  
aboard the Japarra Ship in the road, and of severall pieces of Paintings and  
Cloth which they said were in possession of severall persons belonging to the  
Japarra Ship; whereupon the Governour answered that the Cable Anchor and

Jarrs were aboard and should be delivered to them when they pleased, and as for y<sup>e</sup>: Paintings if there were any belonging to them, they might be seen at the Sea Gate if they would goe and view them, being kept there for the right [ . . . ] and will be delivered when claimed. They promising to come the next day but did not. Also William Willcocke Pilot of the Japparra Ship being called before them to know if they had anything to charge against him, one of the[m] positively affirmed that he was in the Siam Ship w<sup>ch</sup>: last year went for S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma and was taken by the Pirate (M<sup>r</sup>: Frigat) last year near Mergen, and that Willcocke was the man that tooke the Ship, and desired time till Monday to deliver his demand in [ . . . ] concerning w<sup>ch</sup>: it is known that this will [ . . . ] was Master of the Ship satisfaction belonging to M<sup>r</sup>: Stanley &c<sup>a</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: sailed in January 1691 from Bengall and was taken on the 23<sup>rd</sup>: day of ditto Month near Cape Comerine by the Mocha frigot who had sailed thither directly from Mergen after the plundering of the said Siam Ship.

Hee also acquaints that on the 15<sup>th</sup>: in y<sup>e</sup>: Evening he received a Letter from Amirjean from the Camp, adviseing that the Nabob received the whole present sent him in congratulation of the Conquest of Chingee; but afterwards returned two basketts of flintware as being not fitt for his use, which seems to be an intimation that he expects something of more value.

Ordered that Christopher Kell be discharged from the gun room crew and Amor de Payvor Entertained to serve therein.

Ordered that Pag<sup>s</sup>: one thousand be paid to M<sup>r</sup>: Matt: Empson Paymast<sup>r</sup>: for defraying charges Garrison.

M<sup>r</sup>: Edward Tredcroft Land Customer read his acco<sup>t</sup>: Land Customs for the month December last particulars Viz<sup>t</sup>:

and pays into the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Companys Cash Pag<sup>s</sup>: 496 : 27 : 5 : as the balance of that months acco<sup>t</sup>: Tho the Passengers by the Tavestocke and Sidney do declare that they paid twelve pound for their salt provissions in coming out, yet there being but Eight pounds mentioned in y<sup>e</sup>: copies of those Charter parties received. It is resolved y<sup>e</sup>: the said sume of Eight pounds be inserted in y<sup>e</sup>: Orders given the Commanders, for their returne. There being a List now produced of Eleven persons who designe to take their passage on the Sidney.

There being severall Bills drawn upon us by the Deputy Governour and Council at York Fort amounting to Dollars 3365, and one by the Chief and Council of Priamong payable at six days sight. It is ordered that the said Bills be paid at the usuall rate of 17 Dollars for ten Pag<sup>s</sup>: and that the severall bonds for money borrowed at Interest be discharged as the same shall become due, to prevent the growth of Interest.

The rupees designed by Ship Tavestocke of Bengall being not all coined, nor will be [coined time] enough for her. It is ordered that M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll do cause all the Dollars in the Godown to be laden on the Tavestocke for Bengall.

The accomptant having reported his opinion upon M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis Bengall account and all [the] Papers relateing thereunto having been perused, It is resolved as followeth.



[24<sup>TH</sup>]— FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 169 $\frac{3}{4}$  —

Whereas M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth alledge that he frequently demanded of the Agent and Council & warehouse keeper at Chutanuttee the account of the goods which he had received for the 20000 Rs. he lent the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company, but did not receive the same till the 15<sup>th</sup>: November 1694, till when he did not know how much he had received more then the said twenty thousand Rupees, & therefore the sume of Rs. 775: 3. The Interest of the over plus Rup<sup>s</sup>: 7751: 15: 6 from the 25<sup>th</sup>: January 169 $\frac{3}{4}$  to the 15<sup>th</sup>: November 1694, ought to be charged to them by whose fault the stating of said acco<sup>t</sup>: was delayed. That the said sume of Rup<sup>s</sup>: 775: 3 be deducted from Rs. 1767: 6 the balance of his account received from Bengall and that a Copy of M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis his allegations be sent to y<sup>e</sup>: Agent and Council of Bengall & that upon receipt of their answer it be determined whether the said sume of Rs. 775: 3 shall be made good by M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis or the warehousekeep<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>o</sup>: of Chutanuttee.

That whereas M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth claim Rup<sup>s</sup>: [ . . . ] for Claret bought and spent by him for the Entertainment of the Dutch at Agent [ . . . ] funerall and at the Generall Table Agent and Council do also give us an account whether the same were really bought & spent as alledged. That whereas M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis claims Credit for Rupees 350 for a House which the Agent & Council acknowledge to have taken for the R<sup>t</sup>: H: Comp<sup>as</sup>: use, which he alledgeth cost him so much [ . . . ] is to have Credit for the same as the Agent and Council shall advise the value.

That whereas M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth claim Rupees 300 for the Interest of twenty thousand Rupees but the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company from the 11<sup>th</sup>: December [ . . . ] to the 25<sup>th</sup>: January 169 $\frac{3}{4}$ . No Interest ought to be allowed him for the same, because the money is not Lent at Interest, but paid into Cash under a Contract w<sup>th</sup>: the Council for receiving y<sup>e</sup>: value in goods out of the Comp<sup>s</sup>: Investment which was accordingly delivered; and if the money had not been paid into the Companys Cash, he must have delivered it to the Merchants for provision of goods.

That whereas he doth claim Rs. 56 for three years Interest of Rs. 1576 the a[cc]ount of redwood Lent by him to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company in November 1693 which redwood was not ready till November 1696. That the Agent and Council do give an account of the terms upon which it was lent; and the reasons why it was not repaid sooner.

M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis now pays into the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Cash Pag<sup>s</sup>: 283: 17: 2 on account Interest due from him by the Bengall account to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company. The new Painters having brought in three Corge of fine Paintings and ten Corge of Courser painting designed for Hangings, which the sorters having reported as entred after this Consultation, whereby they do not approve of the latter by reason of the variety of fancy which doth not allow enough of any one figure for a roome and esteem the former to dear. It is notwithstanding ordered some pieces being now viewed that they be rec<sup>d</sup>: and Embaled at the prizes of Pag<sup>s</sup>: 29  $\frac{3}{4}$  Corge for the Courser and Pag<sup>s</sup>: 55 for the finer; being esteemed cheaper and better then any yet made, and if they are to dear the price will in time fall and the defects in the fancys may be rectified by such as understand it.

The Persons appointed last Consultation to survey the ship Amity report her to be capable of a Voyage with the addition of a few stores, but upon further inquiry she proves to be a very Crank Ship ill condition and a Dull sailor especially upon a wind, so that she is altogether unfit for a voyage to the West Coast at such a season, when it is y<sup>o</sup>: Opinion of those Masters who have most used Acheen [&] the West Coast, that a good sailor can't reach neither in two months. and that the only time for gaining a passage both to Acheen and the West Coast is to depart from hence in the latter end of March and the following particulars being also considered.

First, Our last advices from the West Coast intimate their intentions of sending the Olive branch hither, by which wee shall probably understand whether the Madrasse frigate came at Acheen for Mr: Soames (which seems [ . . . ] by reason of her late departure from Vizagapatam) and whether it shall be necessary to send Mr: Soames from Acheen or to send another from hence to settle the affairs of the West Coast.

Secondly, The stores Cloth and Dollars sent them by the Madrasse frigate and the Dollars they received from England by the Amity would be a sufficient supply till May or June next.

Thirdly, It is intended to send 15 (or) 20 Topasses souldiers in which respect along y<sup>o</sup>: passage may prove subject to many inconveniencys and hazards by want of Provisions or water sicknesse & charge.

It is resolved not to send a vessell to the West Coast till the latter end of March. In the mean time Mr: Wright and Mr: Empson are ordered to treat w<sup>th</sup>: the Owners of S<sup>t</sup>: David Brigantine for the voyage at a certain monthly pay. The Owners provideing an English Master Mate & Boat swain and Ten Lascars, and furnish the vessell w<sup>th</sup>: all stores &c<sup>a</sup>: throughout the voyage, but not to make an absolute Contract, that wee may be at liberty to make use of another if occasion shall require.

The Judge Advocate delivers the examination of Richard Hartop, relating to Mr: Will<sup>m</sup>: Bowridge as entred after this Consultation.

Ship Nuglee Savoye mentioned in Consult<sup>a</sup>: of the 19<sup>th</sup>: of August last, and recommended to our care by the Surat Generall Letter dated the second July last, being arrived on the 4<sup>th</sup>: from Bengall since which the Sea Customer having furnished the ship w<sup>th</sup>: Boates for the unladeing of her Cargo of rice, and taken care to secure the Pilots and Nocqueda's accounts which being written in y<sup>o</sup>: Guzeratt language are delivered to Ramapa to translate which will require time, and the Owner of the Ship having ordered that she should be sent to him to Surat by an English Pilot and his servants sent upon her. Cap<sup>t</sup>: Weoly being supposed the fittest man for carrying her, was now discovered. But he refuses to undertake it under one thousand Rupees to be paid in hand for carrying the Ship to Surat or at the rate of one hundred rupees p<sup>m</sup>ensem if he failes and returns,

Generall Letter from Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David dated 16<sup>th</sup>: Instant rec<sup>d</sup>: this day, read giving an account that Seilim Cawn sent a letter to President Hatsell desireing that nine ox load of the Kings [ . . . ] passing to the Camp, might remain one [ . . . ] in Cuddalore for security, which being brought in by some Horsemen on the 17<sup>th</sup>: in the afternoon said Horsemen next morning seized Porto Novo Gate wounding a Corporal, and another person coming to their assistance, they also seized on Chellumbrum Point, rob'd the buzaar and carried away three Ellephants. But a party of men being sent from the ffort to the assistance of the guard at Cuddalore, the Moors were beaten out of the Town w<sup>th</sup>: the losse of Eight men killed five taken prisoners and six Horses. There being one Dutchman a souldier and Capt. Tracy a Voluntier killed and five or six souldiers wounded, and that Seilum Cawn was in person with the routed party about seven miles of, and had sent to Ebrahim Cawn Gurry to come to his assistance.

They desire Eight Guns may be sent them and so many souldiers as can be spared w<sup>th</sup>: a supply of flints and good musquetts.

They also write that they have withdrawn all their out guards for the defence of Cuddalore.

The Brigantine being arrived w<sup>th</sup>: 78 Bales from ffort S<sup>t</sup>: David, The same are ordered to be unladen w<sup>th</sup>: all expedition, and the following things to be Laden.

By the Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David Generall Letter it doeth appear that Seilim Cawn had a reall designe to make himselfe master of Cuddalore, and it being probable that he would not make such an attempt without the Nabobs order or privity, and we have allwais had an opinion that the Nabob would not committ any acts of Hostillity without the Kings Orders. If this proceeds from the Kings Order it may have an influence upon other parts in the Mogulls Dominions. If from the Nabobs own order, it may occasion a breach with this place as well as Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David; or if it were the rash act of Seilim Cawn, yet the Nabob haveing expressed himselfe so long disgusted may probably from thence take occasion to quarrell with us (on account of the Kings pretended treasure and the losse of their men) or demand a considerable sume of money.

The circumstances of all parts of India so far as it falls within our knowledge being considered. It is our opinion that it is most consistent with the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Interest to prevent any further acts of Hostillity if it can be done by fair means and for a reasonable expence.

Ordered that the Paymaster Lieutenant [ . . . ] Gunner do on Tuesday morning view & report the condition of the Garrison Guns [ . . . ] &c<sup>s</sup>: and that the steward do immediately cause a quantity of Porke and Beef to be [salted].

The Gov<sup>r</sup> : thereupon tooke occasion to write him concerning Seileman Cawn's treacherous action at Cuddalore under pretence of the kings treasure and desired his assistance in settling that affair and getting the Nabob Perwannas for carrying on our businesse according to Sallabad

Whereunto Jemzeer Cawn having returned a very fair & kind answer, adviseing that the Nabobs had checked Seilaman Cawn and refused to accept but returned the Elephants'; and promisses to give his assistance in procureing the Perwauna's if a vaquel be sent to remain w<sup>th</sup>: him. Considering that Jemzeer Cawn is a man of interest with the Nabob, and was Assistant to the Dubash and Mulla when at y<sup>o</sup>: Camp in 1695 and desires that some fitting person be sent to remain w<sup>th</sup>: him.

Resolved that Braminy Verdupa be employed for that purpose at Pag<sup>s</sup>: three  $\text{₹}$  mensem w<sup>th</sup>: the necessary charges of the Durbar.

M<sup>r</sup>: Charles Alleyn pays into the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Cash five pag<sup>s</sup>: for leave to practise as attorney in both Courts.

It appearing by the warehouse account that the Pepper last received from York Fort by Ship Dolphin fell short of the weight by Invoice & Bill of Lading Candy 9: 2: 7; in Bahar 109: 420 besides Eight Candy which the Master one Charnell laded as he pretended on his own and w<sup>th</sup>: losse is not yet known how it happened whether by short lading at York Fort, short delivery from the ship, or by the roguery of the Boatmen in bringing it ashore, and could not be known before the ships departure because she arrived here in hard blowing weather in October when a Monsoon was expected, and so soon as [ . . . ] could be unladen was dispatched backe to York Fort, before the Pepper could be weighed nor was there any advice in the York Fort Generall [that] the Dolph in carryed any Pepper backe; thô: Cap<sup>t</sup>: Child doth affirme that Charnell told him there he had brought some Pepper backe. It is ordered y<sup>t</sup>: the following method be observed in unladeing the Olive Branch.

That the Master goe aboard and by every Boat send ashore a note, writing No. 1 on the first note that comes from the ship No. 2 on the second, and so on till the last boat, inserting in each note how many Bags of Pepper or parcells of other Goods come ashore, and the number which is painted on the stern of each Mussula, w<sup>th</sup>: note y<sup>e</sup>: searcher of the sea Custom house is ordered to receive so soon as the Boats come ashore, and enter all y<sup>e</sup>: contents in a Booke to be kept for that purpose, and then send the notes to the warehousekeeper, (M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis) who is likewise to enter the contents thereof in a Booke and to compare w<sup>th</sup>: the searcher and master, which method is allways to be observed in the unladeing the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: ships or goods and the like in Ladeing Viz<sup>t</sup>: That the warehousekeep<sup>rs</sup>; send w<sup>th</sup>: every Boat a note expressing therein the parcells and the number of the Mussulla; which note the searcher is to enter. That the warehousekeeper cause a Packer to be sent aboard the Olive Branch to sew up y<sup>e</sup>: mouths of all the bags of Pepper, and mend them if [defective] to prevent the Mucquaws stealing.

That he is in hopes by Wottum Chunds means of effecting it for twenty thousand rupees to the Nabob and to gett such Perwannas as may prevent future demand and trouble.

Upon a full debate and consideration of the circumstances of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Companys affairs at ffort S<sup>t</sup>: David and this place, Vizagapatam Bengall and Surat

The Governour acquaints that in persuance of the Consultation of the 28<sup>th</sup>: past. He hath endeavoured to procure the Pearls and Rubies for Wottum Chund, but cannot gett[ . . . ] fitt under very great prizes which are demanded for picking of pairs out of parcels. That there is no Gold chest procurable till the arrivall of a Manilha ship and then uncertain.

That on Monday the 28<sup>th</sup> past he wrote a letter to Amirjeahn to advise the receipt of his letter and our intention of sending those things he writes for by Vincatee, so soone as they could be procured which Letter being sent by Ramapa to Cojee Gregorie to translate into Armenian Ramapa returned w<sup>th</sup>: Cojee Gregories advice against sending Ramapa and Vincatee, w<sup>th</sup>: a Postscript ready written, Ordering Amirjeahn not to expect Vincatees comeing but to go on since w<sup>ch</sup>: he hath fully discours'd w<sup>th</sup>: Cojee Gregorie the reasons of his advice, and he doth give it for his possitive opinion, that so soone as they shall arrive [ . . . ] Amirjeahn will quit the businesse and shew them to the Nabob and Wottom Chund as persons appointed to manage it, that thereupon all the treaties which Amirjeahn hath begun will be at an end and they must begin de Novo, that the Nabob and Wottum Chund will encrease their demands upon them being the Chief Dubashes of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: George and Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David, and will expostulate many difficult points with them which they don't with Amirjeahn. That Amirjeahn having gained Wottum Chunds friendship there is no doubt of a good issue, and if Wottum Chund should be offended w<sup>th</sup>: either of them he would spoil all, being very humoursome ill-natured and covetuous, and can and will impose or make an end as he is pleased.

That Amirjeahn understands the Persian Language and speaks it as naturally as his own, and tho he cannot read it, yet has acquaintance enough to consult with, that he will not be imposed upon in the wording of Perwannas.

Which occasions the following remarks. That tho Amirjeahn hath been advised in severall Letters of Vincatees being sent to assist him, yet he hath not in any one letter taken any notice thereof, as doubtlesse he would, if he desired his oweing.

That Cojee Gregorie understands Amirjeahns temper and inclination (probably from his private Letters) and supposeing Amirjeahn so inclined his reasons are good, and it seems very probable that Amirjeahn is ambitious of the credit of doeing the businesse himselfe.

That there doth appear reason to thinke that neither Ramapa nor Vincatee notwithstanding their pretensions of readinesse to serve the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company are

willing to goe as assistants to Amirjeahn, and consequently there will not be a good agreement between them three.

That it doth appear by Amirjeahns Letters y<sup>t</sup>: he hath a true notion of the businesse relating to Cuddalore &c<sup>a</sup>: viz<sup>t</sup>:. That such Perwanna<sup>s</sup>: must be gott as will not onely put an end to the present trouble, but prevent future trouble for succeeding Officers, in order to w<sup>ch</sup>: he will take care that those towns be not entred in the Kings Books at the first registring of the Chingee conquered country, w<sup>ch</sup>: is the main point.

That Amirjeahn is an able diligent solicitor and the main question is whether he may be trusted in the single management, it being in the power of such vaqueels (and too common) to provide for an advantage to themselves.

The foregoeing being thus plainly stated and discoursed, and the letters received from Amirjeahn on the 30<sup>th</sup>: and 31<sup>st</sup>: past being read. It is resolved (notwithstanding the Entrey in Consultation of y<sup>e</sup>: 28<sup>th</sup>: past) that the management of the treaty with the Nabob be entrusted to Amirjeahn, and that Ramapa and Vincatee do not proceed unlesse further reason shall appear.

It is allso resolved that the Nabob be put in mind of the bargain he made long since concerning a Phirmaund, which if procurable will prevent future trouble, and seems necessary upon the conquest of Chingee, the Nabobs army having little more businesse to do in these parts against Morattas, and this seems to be a convenient opportunity for. [*lacuna in the original*].

That notwithstanding the various reports of the King's displeasure against Assid Cawn and Zulphaker Cawn and his intentions of sending another Suba of this Country. Paulo an intelligent Armenian now come from y<sup>e</sup>: Kings Camp where he hath spent three months, doth assure us that Assid Cawn doth continue as great as ever in the ministration of affairs and that while he was there the King upon notice of the conquest of Chingee, gave order for adding one thousand Horse to Zulphaker Cawns [Mansab], w<sup>th</sup>: a Tasherief of Elephant Horse, and sword, and the letter last received from Amirjeahn confirms the receipt thereof, Letter from Amirjeahn dated 31<sup>st</sup>: past read and approved. Ordered that the Broad Cloth &c<sup>a</sup>: bought by Consultation of the 25<sup>th</sup>: past to be sent as presents to the Nabob w<sup>th</sup>: Ramapa and Vincatee be returned to the sellers if they will take them or sold, and the losse (if any be) charged to account. Presents, and that Vincatee returne to Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David.

Ordered that a Gold chest be made by the Goldsmiths not exceeding two hundred Pagod<sup>s</sup>: for Wottum Chund.

Resolved that a copy of this Consultation w<sup>th</sup>: copies of the two last Letters from Amirjeahn and the letter to Amirjeahn, dated the 31<sup>st</sup>: past be sent to President Hatsell &c<sup>a</sup>: Councill. The Judge, and M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis do acquaint that M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll did on Wensday last in y<sup>e</sup>: Court of Admiralty speake words to this effect to y<sup>e</sup>: Court viz<sup>t</sup>: you sitt here illegally or unjustly and did affirme that the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company have ordered appeals to the Generall and Councill of India and that he would appeal in y<sup>e</sup>: case between Bowridge and Chardin.

M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll doth deny that he said those words (that the Court satt there illegally or unjustly) and M<sup>r</sup>: Tredcroft doth not remember it and as to the appeal doth now here affirme y<sup>t</sup>: appeals do lye for this reason, that the King hath given the regall power to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: and they by their Commission to the Judge do appoint that the Court shall give an acco<sup>t</sup>: of their proceedings to the Company and to the Generall and Councill, as doth appear by Commissions now produced, w<sup>ch</sup>: he construes thus.

That the Company have devolved many regall powers upon their Generall and Councill of India, and amongst the rest that of redresseing grievances as well acted in the Court of Admiralty as elsewhere when any person appeals to them. This matter is referred to further consideration. The wine Licence being expired and the last farmer M<sup>r</sup>: Hiller, having made appear by his accounts that he looseth by the two last years farms, tho he paid no more then two hundred Pag<sup>s</sup>:

Lieutenant Delgarno having demanded his Pay since October 1696. Upon peruseing of the York Fort Diary for the month of October 1696, being lately received viâ Acheen the following passages [ . . . ].

October the first, he is discharged from acting as Lieutenant for his abusive actions to the Inhabitants and refractory disrespectfull carriage to the Govern<sup>r</sup>: and Council and ordered to be sent to Fort S<sup>t</sup>: George by the first oppertunity and in the meantime confined to the ffort or give security for his good behaviour. On the 8<sup>th</sup>: October they offer him a passage to the Coast on a sloop bound for Vizagapatam, but permit him to stay till the next oppertunity upon his own request, that he might have time to gett in Debts and dispose of goods. On the 17<sup>th</sup>: Ditto is a particular account of y<sup>o</sup>: occasion and manner of his mutinous calling the Garrison to assist in opposition to the Governour, for w<sup>ch</sup>: reason he was put in Irons and upon the 19<sup>th</sup>: for swearing Revenge on some of the Inhabitants when at liberty, ordered to be kept so till a conveyance offer'd for Fort S<sup>t</sup>: George, to prevent murder or outrage, which being considered with the many complaints w<sup>ch</sup>: have been sent us from the West Coast ever since his first going thither, of his unruly turbulent spirit and carriage, wee do approve of the act of the Deputy Governour and Council of York fort in dischargeing him, and are of opinion there is no pay due to him from the first of October 1696, the time of his dismission. Wee also note the unreasonableness of his complaints of long Imprisonment there, being offered a Passage eight days after his first confinement, but refused it & stayed no longer then the next oppertunity.

M<sup>r</sup>: Trecroft acquainting us, that Simon Kilpatrick and Frances Monk do offer two hundred Pag<sup>s</sup>: for the wine Licence for the ensueing year, and being well satisfied that by retailing out the Licences it will not come to near that sume. It is agreed that the wine Licence be granted to them, at that rate they paying fifty Pag<sup>s</sup>: quarterly for the same.

Ordered that two Hundred Pag<sup>s</sup>: be paid Ragina & c<sup>s</sup>: washers.

The accomptant is ordered to draw out the acco<sup>t</sup>: of salary due to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: serv<sup>ts</sup>: for six months ending the 25<sup>th</sup>: past.

Ordered that Pag<sup>s</sup>: seven Hundred be paid to M<sup>r</sup>: Matthew Empson Paymaster for defraying charges Garrison.

Ship Sedgewicke Cap<sup>t</sup>: Lockyer Watts Command<sup>r</sup>: arrived from Anjengo and brought a Generall Letter from the Comodore &c<sup>a</sup>: dated the 17<sup>th</sup>: past, adviseing that their Fort is near finished, that the Queen continues still in Hostillity, and that a ship passeing by the fort without shewing coulors, severall shott were Exchanged between the ship and fort, till the ship bore away, supposed to be a Dane.

The Mast<sup>r</sup>: acquaints that in going to Anjengo he was persued by Kidd the Pirat three days and three nights and with great difficulty escaped, it being calm and Kid out rowing him, and that in his returne from Anjengo he was taken by another Pirat Chivers a Dutchman in the Algerian gally near Cape Comerine w<sup>th</sup>: with her excellent sailing and rowing fetch'd up the Sedgewick in nine hours. The Cargo of Pepper not being for their returne, they dismissed the Ship after they had rob'd her of her two courses, Sheet Cable, anchor, Cordage, Pitch, Tarr &c<sup>a</sup>: stores. Tho<sup>se</sup> severall of the Ships Company being mightilly taken w<sup>th</sup>: the Sedgewicke's built and usefullnesse for a Cruiser. Captain Watts w<sup>th</sup>: great difficulty prevailed to save her by a merry management of a bowl of Punch among the ships Company, upon w<sup>ch</sup>: they said he is an honest fellow lett him goe with the Pacquet came a narrative of kidds proceedings, particularly that he tooke y<sup>e</sup>: Queda Merchant richly Laden from Bengall and told the Persian factor (who had 400 bales aboard) that Hee tooke the ship by the King of Englands Commission and that the Persian would proceed to the Mogulls Camp to complain against the English as Pirates.

The Lieutenant Generall doth produce a Declaration given by M<sup>r</sup>: Thomas Marshall regist<sup>r</sup>: of the Court (who had been omitted to be summoned on the 6<sup>th</sup> Instant) taken on the 8<sup>th</sup> Instant, w<sup>ch</sup>: being now read by M<sup>r</sup>: Marshall is owned by him. Upon a reperusall whereof and the report made by the Judge to the Councill on y<sup>e</sup>: 6<sup>th</sup> Instant and of the Declarations taken in Councill on the 6<sup>th</sup>: Instant, It doth thereby appear that M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll did on the 30<sup>th</sup>: past in the Court of Admiralty then sitting openly declare that he would appeal in the case then depending between M<sup>r</sup>: Bowridge and M<sup>r</sup>: Chardin and asserted and argued that the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: had by their letters directed that appeals might be made from the Court of Admiralty. In discoursing whereof the Judge Inferring (from a supposition of something asserted by M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll) that then the Court satt here illegally or by an illegall authority. M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll thereupon replied [in my opinion so you do] or to that effect which is confirmed by the declarations of the Judge, M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis, M<sup>r</sup>: Mead, and M<sup>r</sup>: Marshall, that M<sup>r</sup>: Chardin and M<sup>r</sup>: Bridger are doubtfull and the rest mentioned in Consultation of the 6<sup>th</sup>: Instant do deny to remember it. It is further declared by the Judge & assistant that M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll did then show a very disrespectfull carriage to the Court, in such manner as thô it cannot be duly described, yet gave great offence and doth tend to the diminution of their authority in common opinion, and that they do not think fitt to hold a Court till the credit of the Courts authority is vindicated, w<sup>ch</sup>: they referr to this Councill, M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll being a member thereof.

Resolved that there doth not lye any appeal from the Court of Admiralty to the Generall or Lieutenant Generall and Councill as appears by the following particulars.

1st. The Generall Letter from the R<sup>t</sup>: H: Company dated the 15<sup>th</sup>: February 1688<sup>g</sup>: Paragraph. the 45: doth in terminis assert the Court of Admiralty to be the Supream Court of Equity.

2nd. Another dated the 16<sup>th</sup>: April 1697 Par: 46: doth referr us to reports made by a Committee appointed to examine complaints made by John Coventrey of injuries rec<sup>d</sup>: from the Courts of Madrasse, which reports do direct that the Lieutenant Generall President and Councill of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: George do cause the s<sup>d</sup>: complaints to be reheard in the Court of Judicature.

3<sup>rd</sup>. The R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company do direct that the causes wherein they themselves are parties be determined by the Court of Admiralty. The methods of administration of Justice are the same and equal to all persons indifferently.

4<sup>th</sup>. Since the first erection of a Court of Admiralty in this Place, severall persons have moved for appealing, but it hath never been granted. But how far the Generall, Lieutenant Generall or President and Councill may in case of a fraud, corruption, Perjury violence &c<sup>a</sup>: [interpose] their authority for the relief of perticular P<sup>ersons</sup> injured or for the Security of the Publicke wealth and Peace of the Place, may be better referred to the Emergency, then determined by any generall rule.

Resolved, that the Court of Admiralty hath full power to vindicate their authority by punishing such as publickly affront it, th<sup>o</sup> y<sup>e</sup>: person offending be a member of this Councill, but the Court may if they see cause acquaint the Governour and Councill therewith before they proceed against a member of the Councill.

That M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll starting and argueing in open Court the question of appeals was very imprudent and not becomeing a member of this Councill, where questions of that nature may be more properly moved.

That his telling the Court in the presence of so great a number that they satt there illegally in his opinion, and using a disrespectfull carriage to the Court, doth directly overthrow the foundation of their authority and tends to the withdrawing of the Inhabitants from that obedience and respect w<sup>ch</sup>: is due to a Court of Justice. The Government of the Place is also concerned in the example, which being aggravated by the station which he hath in this Councill will have the greater and more generall influence, especially upon disaffected persons, as M<sup>r</sup>: Wessendonck who hath been very buisy in appealing and Protesting against Courts and Councill, and hath suffered for it and was present at the late passages in Court, hath in publick Company declared that now he hath one of the Councill of his side, & by natural consequence those that are so inclined will by his example be encouraged to esteem themselves indemnified in asserting the illegality of the Court and affronting its authority, if M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll may do it impune.

M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll doth declare, that th<sup>o</sup> he doth deny the words alledged, yet that since the Councill have adjudged him guilty, of speaking them, he doth for quietnesse sake and to avoid any Contention or disturbance resigne his Place in Councill, and it is resolved that M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll be suspended from acting in this Councill till further orders from the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company or the Generall of India, and that it be referred to the Court of Admiralty to cause M<sup>r</sup>: Braddyll to give them such satisfaction for the affront, and in case of refuseall to inflict such punishment as they shall [deem] necessary for the Vindication of their authority.

6<sup>th</sup> The Chief and Council of Vizagapatam are very possitive that they cannot defray the charges of the Factory for the sume possitively limited by the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company & the excesse being chargeable on the Chief, Hee desires to Quitt, rather then undertake the managem<sup>t</sup>: of the factory upon those terms. Resolved that the Chief and Council do forthwith put themselves into a readinesse for withdrawing, by getting in their cloth and debts and clearing the accounts of the rented sea Ports, and that they do actually withdraw y<sup>e</sup>: factory in case they cannot stay without Entring into Hostillity with the Seer Lascar, or in case they cannot maintain the Factory charges for the sume limited by the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: and that they repair either to this place or Bengall as the winds will favour. Embarkeing the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: servants, Goods, Stores Souldiers & all English people there Resident on hired ship leaveing a Bill on the factory Gate expresseing the cost of the factory Buildings, the occasion of leaveing it, and a List of such things which cannot be laden on a ship and shall be left in the factory, w<sup>th</sup>: a copy thereof Inclosed in a Letter directed to the Seer Lascarr.

That if they proceed to Bengall they deliver to the Agent and Council all the Goods for Europe, and such Stores and necessaries for the Agent &c<sup>a</sup>: shall have occasion for & bring y<sup>e</sup>: reminder with them when an oppertunity offers, and during their abode in Bengall to assist in the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: businesse as the Agent and Council shall appoint, & leaving so many ffactors there as they shall require. The Lieutenant Generall doth acquaint that having received a complaint from the Moor Mulla, that Allee Serang had caused him to be carryed away by force from this Place by S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma Peons to S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma and from thence to Congeveron before the Cozee, and that he had in the way grossely abused him, pulling the hair out of his beard, and caused him to be beaten and closely confined, which necessitated him to spend Eighty Pag<sup>s</sup>: before he was released. That y<sup>e</sup>: Mulla brought witnesses who affirmed they saw him carryed away by force from hence, and alledged he had sufficient witnesses to prove what was transacted abroad: Allee Serang was thereupon committed to the Custody of the Marshall since which great intercession has been made for his release by Hojee Mahomod Allee Avaldar of S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma, Colloway Chittee and others concerned w<sup>th</sup>: him in a voyage designed for Arracan. The Mullas complaint being read, The Attorney-Generall is ordered to prosecute Allee Serang in the court of Admiralty, that he may receive such punishment as his crime shall seem to deserve for the deteifing of others.

1. That Seileman Cawn's returne & attempt on the out Towns is by the Nabob's Order, and probably the first attempt was also.

The Nabob's designe is either to gett money or to take all Tegnapatam towns for the king but wee don't know which.

3. If wee give him money he may grant us Perwannas w<sup>ch</sup> : may put of further trouble for the present. But if the Nabob be really displaced by the king and called to Court (in displeasure for w<sup>m</sup> Rajah's escape) as it hath been many months reported, they will be of no force after his departure and his successor will renew the same demand. Tho' if the Nabob shall continue they will secure the possession of the place for so long, and will be a good step towards securing them hereafter.

4. If the Nabob really designes to take the Tegnapatam Towns by force, Hee hath probably received the Kings Order upon the advices sent him by the Nabob & Daud Cawn of the passages of Cuddalore at Seileman Cawn's first attempt, and if it prove so the Nabob will either prosecute the Kings Order or increase his demands.

5. That whether the Nabob goe or stay, if it be necessary to gett Perwanna's for prevention of such future trouble, they must be procured from him who is Conqueror of the Countrey, and if he goes away without giveing his Perwanna's his successors cannot grant them after they shall be by the Nabob brought into the Kings books; and it will undoubtedly prove the occasion of a publicke quarrell between the Mogull and the Company one time or other

Sarsapa & Minters pay into the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Cash Pag<sup>s</sup>: 150 being in lieu of 500 Rupees the balance of the coinage of Silver by ship Tavestocke for w<sup>ch</sup>: Roger Braddyll mintmaster is to have credit in the Generall Books.

Cap<sup>t</sup>: Gostlin & c<sup>a</sup>: report the condition of ship Dolphin as Entred after this Consultation.

Having found by experience that y<sup>e</sup>: repairing of shipping either at Bengall or Vizagapatam is chargeable, and that ship Dolphin cannot be so repaired as to make her long serviceable at the West Coast without Teake Timber & Plank w<sup>ch</sup>: is not procurable.

It is resolved that said ship be sold at outcry by Mr: Wright and Mr: Empson on Tuesday the 14<sup>th</sup>: Instant, if she will sell for 450 Pag<sup>s</sup>: but if she will not yield so much, that then she be brought ashore and broke up, and that the Guns be brought ashore and placed upon the Batteries for salutes and such of y<sup>e</sup>: small arms and Ammunition as is necessary for use be brought ashore before sold.

The Justices of the Choultrey report the Examination of the Passengers Lascars & officers of ship Dolphin concerning the Death of a Lascar as ordered by Consultation 30<sup>th</sup>: past, w<sup>ch</sup>: Examinations are ordered to be delivered to the Attorney Generall in order to prosecution if the said examinations do contain matter sufficient to ground an Indictment upon.

The warehousekeeper reports the weight of Pepper received from ship Dolphin Bahar 102: 10<sup>ind</sup>: 9<sup>lb</sup>: good and damaged together, being to make good 97<sup>can</sup>: 345<sup>lb</sup>. Laden on the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Companys account, and as the Mas<sup>tr</sup>: alledgeth Eight bahar on his own account. Besides the seventeen Candy mentioned in Consultation 30<sup>th</sup>: past, to be short delivered the last voyage, which is in all 122 Candy, in order to the adjusting whereof, the warehousekeeper is ordered to cause the Pepper to be garbled and the damaged part separated and sold at outcry.

A Letter to Amirjeahn of this date, read and approved w<sup>th</sup>: the Draught of a Perwana to be required from the Nabob, being approved by Cojee Gregorie, Cojee Saffur the Mulla & Ramapa, who all understand the Persian Language and Customs of the country.

But a Letter from a Portuguez at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma advises that she was suspected to be a Pira<sup>t</sup>: severall Peons and spies were ordered to bring inteligence of what passed at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma, and to observe who had correspondence w<sup>th</sup>: them, and the Chief Peon ordered to keep a good watch.

In the Evening advised Toache John Domingo Mattor and Francisco de Saa, 12 had been this day aboard ship to treat about trucking salt petre for sugar.

Severall ffort S<sup>t</sup>: George Dubashes having been at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma, were as they returned in the Evening brought by the Peons to the Govern<sup>r</sup>: and sent to the trunk to deter others.

The following advices have been received concerning the English ship at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma Viz<sup>t</sup>: That on Sunday the D<sup>r</sup>: & Purs<sup>r</sup> were treating with Francisco Mendez for salt petre, who sent two Portuguez aboard with Musters to truck for sugar. The Doctor and Purser returning in the evening brought two Hatts and a Baskett of wine as a present to Lucas Luiz at whose house they Lodge, and a Bag of Dollars. Some Portuguez allso have written that they suspect them to be Pirats because they refuse to bring goods or to lett people goe aboard and offer 30 Great Guns to sale and the Captain keeps aboard.

Resolved that the following Orders be published in English, Portuguez, Jentue & Mallabar:—

That no Europe Inhabitant goe out of the bounds of Madrasse without leave of the Gov<sup>r</sup>: or second of Council.

That all Europeans strangers, comeing by Sea or Land, do repair to the Gov<sup>r</sup>: immediately upon their first arriveall, and in case of omission to be secured on the Guard till examined.

That no Inhabitant do entertain any stranger whatsoever in their Houses without notice given to and leave obtained from the Govern<sup>r</sup>: or Chief Justice of the Choultreys.

That no person whatsoever, Inhabitant of this place, hold any correspondence directly or indirectly with any person belonging to the ship now in S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma road which arrived there on the 11<sup>th</sup>: Instant w<sup>th</sup>: English Colours, under pain of a months imprisonment or so long as the said ship shall remain on this Coast, and fine not exceeding 500 Pag<sup>s</sup>: and tis further declared that if any of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Compa<sup>s</sup>: Servants shall be found guilty of the breach of this order, they shall be forthwith dismissed from their service.

Cojee Gregorie, Cojee Pantus and Cojee Saffur the principal Armenians being sent for were acquainted that they having formerly given a writeing not to deal with Interlopers and there being now a ship come to S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma weareing English Colours, not known whether Interloper or Pirat, but she not belonging to the Company. It is expected that in compliance w<sup>th</sup>: said writeing, they hold no manner of correspondence w<sup>th</sup>: them and that they take care the rest of their Nation observe the said orders, w<sup>ch</sup>: they promised to comply with.

A letter to the Avaldar of S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma, and another to the Cap<sup>t</sup>: More read and approved as entred after this Consultation.

Antonio Ferreira de Silva commonly call'd Touche a Portuguez Inhabitant of this place having been aboard the Ship at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma Yesterday, and being suspected by the slight account he gives, that he designs to drive a trade with them, and the likelyest man to carry it on for himselfe and others, to prevent which he was committed to the Custody of the Marshall till further order.

Joã Domingo de Mattor a Portuguez Inhabitant of S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma having been yesterday aboard the ship treating about sug<sup>r</sup>: and saltpetre, and comeing to town being concerned in a ship in this road bound for Beng<sup>l</sup>: came and acquainted that he went upon the request of the Avaldar to know whether the ship was a Pirat (and allso upon M<sup>r</sup>: Stylemans order to him to enquire news whereof he gave him notice on Saturday night by a Letter, and now came to give a further account). That he pretended to treat for trucking saltpetre for sugar, but observed that few men did appear and no arm's above deck and being desirous to buy a fowling piece they would not suffer him to goe down to see them, but caused them to be brought up & that by many circumstances he suspected them to be Pirates. That he made no bargain nor did not intend it, thô he and his unckle are concerned  $\frac{2}{3}$  in 3,000 maund of saltpetre now lyeing in S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma wherein Francisco Mendez and Francisco de Saa (son-in-law of Joã Baptista) are allso concerned and he now gave a writeing in five hundred Pag<sup>s</sup>: penalty in behalfe of himselfe and unckle that the saltpetre should not be sold wi[th the] said ship. It is upon this occasion resolved that if Francisco de Mendez or Francisco de Saa or any other Portuguez Inhabitant of S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma shall buy or sell with the said ship, they shall not be admitted for the future to come into Madrasse, nor have any dealings w<sup>th</sup>: any Inhabitant of Madrasse.

M<sup>r</sup>: Meverell and M<sup>r</sup>: Lovell having been on Saturday last at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma in company w<sup>th</sup>: some persons belonging to the Ship, they were sent for, and upon examination given the following account.

M<sup>r</sup>: Edward Tredcroft pays into the R<sup>t</sup>: H: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Cash Pag<sup>s</sup>: 8: 30 fanams on acco<sup>t</sup>: Town Conicopies Duty for three months Ending May last, and Pag<sup>s</sup>: 49: 33: 20: to the Secretary on account Peddinaigues duty for ditto time.

Ordered that Francisco de Brett be entertained to serve as a souldier in this Garrison at Portuguez pay.

The Attorney Generall delivers his opinion (as entered in the Copy book of Letters) upon the examination of witnesses relateing to the Death of Juã a Lascar belonging to Ship Dolphin, That the accusation was by combination and therefore no ground for prosecution.

It is ordered that Captain Owen Channell be not prosecuted till further matter shall appear.

Calloway Chittee, Ragga Chittee and Servina were sent for and particularly admonished not to have any dealings w<sup>th</sup>: the people belonging to the ship at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma.

But I know they don't belong to y<sup>e</sup>: English Company, and therefore if any damages shall follow to the Kings people or their Ships the English Company is not answerable, you have heard of Pirats upon the sea, whose evill actions have been unjustly charged to the English Company, who have suffered more by them then any others. You will do well to consider, I write this that neither you nor I may be blamed.

Wee are informed that two days past a Ship came into S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma road w<sup>th</sup>: English Colours and that you entertain the people belonging to that ship in your House and that they are buying saltpetre and provisions of your people. Wee know not what they are or who they belong to or from whence they came. But wee know they don't belong to y<sup>e</sup>: English Company, and therefore if any damage shall follow to yourselves or the Mogulls people or their ships the English Company is not answerable. But wee hereby declare you and all those that do abett and assist them answerable for all damages and if you shall now do the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: English Company so great mischief by entertaining trade with and assisting that ship, wee shall hold ourselves discharged from the rules of friendship which we have hitherto observed and shall further thinke ourselves obliged to prosecute such methods as are proper towards those who openly act so injuriously to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company and to those who are much inclined to be.

M<sup>r</sup>: Joseph Lister requesting leave to goe a voyage to Bengall. It is resolved by majority that he may goe giving one thousand Pag<sup>a</sup>: security for his good behaviour and for not corresponding or dealing w<sup>th</sup>: Interlopers being informed that the last time he was in Bengall he had correspondence with Interlopers and otherwise misbehaved himselfe. The Vizagapatam Generall Letter dat: 24<sup>th</sup>: May last and their Consultation 28<sup>th</sup>: April having been used. It is observed that they persist in their opinion that they cannot defray the factory charges for the same limited by the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company and give the following reasons against withdrawing y<sup>e</sup>: ffactory upon account of charges.

1<sup>st</sup>. The Countrey is settled and the Merchants offer to make an Investment of 50,000 Pag<sup>a</sup>: in six months.

2. If the Factory be withdrawn the Merch<sup>ts</sup>: Debt will be lost.

3<sup>dy</sup>. It cannot be resettled again so well as it is now.

4, 5. A resettlement will occasion a great charge in presents &c<sup>a</sup>: and in removing and carrying backe stores &c<sup>a</sup>:

6, 7. The Factory Buildings will be pulled down and cannot be rebuilt and the Dutch will gett away the weavours & the Duan ruain y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>:

Concerning which it is considered—

1<sup>st</sup>. That two years since there was the same good appearance of a settlement &c<sup>a</sup>: and the Chief &c<sup>a</sup>: advised the sending of 60000 Pag<sup>a</sup>: to make an Investment, whereupon wee sent but 24000 Rup<sup>s</sup>: and Pag<sup>a</sup>: 15000 in July 1696. They could not invest a third part & sent 14000 rupees of it to Bengall in April 1697. There can bee no better appearance now then there was then of a firm lasting settlem<sup>t</sup>:

2<sup>nd</sup>. The old Merchants Debt of 6000 Pag<sup>a</sup>: is equally desperate whether the factory be continued or removed, for if they have not been able to pay any part in six years, they cannot now, some being Dead, the rest scattered or broke.

3<sup>rd</sup>. If the new Merchants can Invest 60000 Pag<sup>a</sup>: in six months they can bring in the arrears of their contract in a little time.

4, 5. The charges of removing the Factory will be inconsiderable to the present yearly excesse of charges above the usuall proportion of Investments or abbut the summe Limited.

3, 6, 7. The Factory hath been removed and resettled and therefore may againe.

From the premises, It is resolved that if the charges of Vizagapatam factory can be reduced to the sume limited by the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company that it be continued, but if it cannot, the reasons alledged by the Chief and Councill of Vizagapat<sup>m</sup>: are not valid for its continuance at y<sup>e</sup>: present excesse of charge.

But there is another reason against a totall withdrawing, w<sup>ch</sup>: hath not been duely considered, Vizt. That the Dutch, French or Dane may strike in with the Government for the Place. To prevent which it is resolved that it be propounded to M<sup>r</sup>: Owen with one factor or writer to continue in the factory (after the rest are withdrawn) & carry on small Investments and to be allowed five  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent upon the amount of their Investments and no more for all charges whatsoever except salary, till the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Companys pleasure be further known.

M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis his Bengall account & the severall papers and answers relateing thereunto, having been perused it is observed,

That M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis his principal allegations relateing to the question of Interest in his paper dated the 4<sup>th</sup>: November are.

1<sup>st</sup>. That the goods which he receivd from the R<sup>t</sup>: H: Company above 17465 Rupees were all or the greatest part prized w<sup>th</sup>: him by M<sup>r</sup>: Beard warehousekeeper under the tree, and were delivered to him after he was out of the factory and consequently out of his power to order or demand more then due.

That notwithstanding his many requests to the Agent &c<sup>a</sup>: that Sunker the warehousekeeper Banyan (without whome the accounts could not be adjusted) might come and give in the accounts, yet whenever Sunker came to him and was entred into businesse, the Agent, M<sup>r</sup>: Beard or M<sup>r</sup>: Winder sent for him away, so that he could not gett the account finished till the 15<sup>th</sup>: November 1694 from w<sup>ch</sup>: time he commenced the account of Interest.

3. He blames the Agent &c<sup>a</sup>: that they did not take that care they ought, to make him sensible of the Debt to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company and if they had been as willing as he the money had been paid sooner.

The Agent and Councills answer received the 11<sup>th</sup>: April 1698.

To y<sup>e</sup>: 1<sup>st</sup>: That the present Agents orders to the warehousek<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: was that M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis directions should be observed, that he might cleare the Investment of what he gave out money for, and that the present Agent would begin the

ensueing years, because M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis had all the Merchants contracts and could thereby distinguish what was the Comp<sup>s</sup>: and what was permissive.

To the 2<sup>d</sup>: The Agent and M<sup>r</sup>: Beard deny that they ever sent for Sunker when they knew that he was with M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis and M<sup>r</sup>: Winder being here, doth also deny the same for himselfe.

To the 3<sup>d</sup>: They plead the same against M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis as he against them.

The 2<sup>d</sup>: & 3<sup>d</sup>: are mutually affirmed and denyed and don't appear, and therefore are of no great w<sup>th</sup>: in the decision of the question. But it is very probable M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis might (tho the Agent & c<sup>a</sup>: had secretly obstructed w<sup>ch</sup>: they would not do openly) have finished the adjustment of the accounts w<sup>th</sup>: the warehousek<sup>r</sup>: Banyan in lesse then nine months time, and if the Agent & c<sup>a</sup>: had taken due care they might have compe'd M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis and the Banyan to finish it sooner.

But the first Article is the main question wheth<sup>r</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis or the warehouse-keeper ought to have made up the account & w<sup>ch</sup>: of them failed.

It appears that the adjustment of the acco<sup>ts</sup>: was incumbent on M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis by y<sup>e</sup>: following p<sup>t</sup>iculars.

1<sup>st</sup>. The Agent and M<sup>r</sup>: Beard affirms the finishing of the contract made by M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis, while Agent was left to him, w<sup>ch</sup>: is further proved by the following.

2<sup>nd</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth own that he had all the Merch<sup>ts</sup>: contracts in his hands and that he did actually make up their accounts, and delivered up severall of their Contracts when finished, and hath still some of them in his keeping.

3<sup>d</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth own in his Paper that he prized those Goods w<sup>th</sup>: the warehousekeep<sup>r</sup>:

4<sup>thly</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth produce severall acco<sup>ts</sup>: of those prized Goods signed by the warehousekeeper, being mixed part permissive, and part the Comp<sup>s</sup>: why should such accounts be delivered to him after he ceased to be Agent unlesse the adjustment of the Investment were left to him and why should he receive them and make up acco<sup>ts</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Merchants and deliver their contracts unlesse he understood it.

5<sup>th</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth own that out of the Companys goods mentioned in the said accounts he received all those Goods which he received on account of the twenty thousand rupees (except R<sup>s</sup>: 17465 Laden on the Charles and Sampson) & consequently must know that he received more then his due for in the months of February & March 169 $\frac{3}{4}$  he actually Laded them (or the greatest part) on ships bound for Madrasse by Invoice, and it lyes upon him to demonstrate how he could Invoice those goods and not know that he had them or not know their account.

6. M<sup>r</sup>: Winder who was warehousekeep<sup>r</sup>: assistant for four years (and the whole time in question) declares that he kept the warehouse prize Bookes of all the Comp<sup>s</sup>: Goods except the permissive goods and the goods prized and Embaled under the tree which was done by M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis and M<sup>r</sup>: Beard, and that after y<sup>e</sup>: dispatch of the Charles he did not enter any goods into the warehouse prize Booke, till the Merchants brought them in upon Agent Eyres his Contract.

7. The finishing the Contract being thus left to M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis direction and undertaken by him. It was the warehousekeepers part to deliver the accounts of the goods as prized to him w<sup>ch</sup>: he did, tho it cant appear whether he delivered them so soon as he ought or might have done, nor what was the reason why they were not delivered sooner, and M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth affirme that the warehouse-keep<sup>r</sup>: did never deliver an account of Narrandats goods amount to Rupees 3,036:-9:-9: but M<sup>r</sup>: Feake tooke the account thereof in 1694 from the Banyan and Entred the same in M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis Booke. The last of the accounts produced being Dated 24<sup>th</sup> May for goods delivered in April. Those accounts of y<sup>e</sup>: warehouse-keeper do distinguish the goods into the permissive account and the Comp<sup>s</sup>: account and note some delivered to M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis. Now M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth alledge that he could not understand their account till he was informed by Sunker in November 1694 and yet Sunker was the man that delivered him the account thereof by w<sup>ch</sup>: they were Invoiced in February & March 169 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

By the forementioned acco<sup>ts</sup>: it doth also appear that all those over plus goods were not delivered to M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis by the 15<sup>th</sup>: January the time of commencing the Interest, but some in April and the account thereof dated by the warehousekeep<sup>r</sup>: 24<sup>th</sup>: May and therefore the account of Interest ought to be made up from the times when y<sup>e</sup>: severall parcells were delivered, whereof nobody can give an account but M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis or y<sup>e</sup>: warehousekeep<sup>r</sup>:

Resolved that till M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis doth give a satisfactory account of the times of receiving the over plus goods (w<sup>ch</sup>: he must know by his own particular accounts those Goods having been Laden on Countrey ships mostly in February or March 169<sup>2</sup><sub>4</sub>) that he stand charged w<sup>th</sup>: the full Interest from the 15<sup>th</sup>: January as Entred in the Bengall account, and thô the warehousekeep<sup>r</sup>: were faulty in not delivering the accounts so soon as he ought, yet that he ought not to pay any part of the interest, because he had no part of the Goods, but M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis did actually receive them all to his own use.

Resolved, that M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis have credit for 350 rup<sup>s</sup>: the value of his House in Chutanuttee, as advised by the Agent and Council being taken by them for the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: account and for 108 Rup<sup>s</sup>: wine, whereof the Agent and Council acknowledge part to be spent at the Generall Table, & that M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis do pay the balance of that account being Pag<sup>s</sup>: 90 : 32 : 1 : and when M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis shall make appear what part of the Goods he rec<sup>d</sup>: after the 15<sup>th</sup>: January, that he be repaid so much as the Interest.

Resolved that M<sup>r</sup>: Ellis do deliver here y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: Contracts in his hands that they may be sent to Bengall.

And whereas M<sup>r</sup>: William Fraser and M<sup>r</sup>: Roger Braddyll both nominated in said Comission stand suspended from acting in this Councill, the President thought fitt to deferr the consideration thereof for the present.

Att the desire of the late Governour Higginson made to your Hon<sup>r</sup>: last Consultation day, that I should set down in writeing what I then said relateing to the Tobacco farm which is briefly thus viz<sup>t</sup>:

On Thursday the 22<sup>nd</sup>: day of March 169<sup>8</sup> between the hours of 7 and 8 at night, the late Governour M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben and myselfe, went up to the Guard Chamber the Governour telling us that the farming out of the Tobacco and Ganjee for the insueing year, was to be put to an outcry (I do not mean by inch of Candle as is the Custome in London) & he that bid most to be the buyer, the bidders & Competit<sup>rs</sup>: were Datha Rama ꝓ Contra Jango, Jango advanced to Pag<sup>s</sup>: 2000 at which Datha Rama left off and bid no more, thus it stood when the then Presid<sup>t</sup>: asked Jango if he would give fifty Pag<sup>s</sup>: more, he answered if your Hon<sup>r</sup>: will have me give 50 Pag<sup>s</sup>: more I will, which he did then y<sup>e</sup>: Presid<sup>t</sup>: bid 50 Pag<sup>s</sup>: more, then Jango bid Pag<sup>s</sup>: 50 more, w<sup>th</sup>: The President advanced Pag<sup>s</sup>: 50 more, which brought it up to Pag<sup>s</sup>: 2200, and then asked Jango if he would bid any more to which he answered no, having already outbid his Competitor Datha Rama, but if he said Rama would yet bid, he would bid also then the Govern<sup>r</sup>: said it is mine and desired his servant Kisna then present, to call Vincatee puttee upstairs saying he bought it for him, and asked him by Kisna if he would accept of the farme at Pag<sup>s</sup>: 2200. He said he would, but so soone as he appeared in the Chamber (which I should have said before) Jango bid 50 Pag<sup>s</sup>: more, the President said no he was too late, Jango answered and said Vincateeputtee ought to have been present at the time of bidding.

M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben and myselfe modestly discoursed the point with the President, who asked M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben if hee were not as free to bid and buy the farme as anybody else, M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben is now here upon the Place and knows as well as I what answer he then gave the President.

On the Monday following being the 26<sup>th</sup>: day, Jango sent in a Petition directed to y<sup>e</sup>: President and Council then in Consultation and therein advanced Pag<sup>s</sup>: 600 more than the former sume, but all to no purpose M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben and myselfe did not agree w<sup>th</sup>: the President in the manner and method he took in that affair, so that it was about the middle of April following before the President could be prevailed upon, and the Secretary in Consultation altered the sume from Pag<sup>s</sup>: 2200 w<sup>ch</sup>: was in figures in the fair Consultation to Pag<sup>s</sup>: 2800 and was given and continued to Vincateputtee and then that Consultation was signed by us all.

I remember not that either the Secretary or Narrain the Comp<sup>s</sup>: then Chief Dubash were w<sup>th</sup>: us in Consultation on the said 22<sup>d</sup>: March, M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben may remember severall passages of that affair, too much to be incerted here, w<sup>ch</sup>: time gave as I apprehend date to the late Govern<sup>rs</sup>: displeasure and prejudice against me. I forbear to adde any more till this is debated.
