### Progress Report of the Revenue Survey Department.

Records with observations the — for the year ending 30th June 1923.

#### READ—

The Administration Report of the Mysore Revenue Survey Department for the year ending 30th June 1923, received with letter No. 58, dated the 1st September 1923, from the Superintendent, Revenue Survey and Settlements in Mysore.

2. *General work of the Department.*—With a view to enable the Department to devote greater attention to the re-settlement work in several taluks in which it was overdue, the re-survey operations were, as in the previous year, confined mainly to the re-classification of wet and garden lands and to such measurement only as was absolutely necessary for settlement purposes. The number of fields thus re-classed was, 104,797 comprising an area of 211,200 acres in 2,151 villages as against 110,463, fields comprising an area of 242,059 acres in 2,471 villages during the previous year. In addition to the re-classification work, the establishments carried out the measurement of 3,643 fields covering an area of 12,721 acres of new additional survey numbers and 23,239 fields covering an area of 27,865 acres for *bab phod* and other correction work. Detailed survey was carried out in respect of only two inam villages during the year as against seven in the previous year. So many as forty inam villages still remain to be surveyed in detail and it is hoped that, with the aid of a special establishment, it would be possible for the Department to finish the detailed survey of these villages during the current year.

Original classification was carried out in respect of 516 survey numbers in four inam villages situated in four different taluks and comprising an area of 1,894 acres during the year. The total number of fields subjected to measurement test was 2,606 or 9.69 per cent of the total number measured, while the number of fields subjected to test classification was 14,557 or 13.90 per cent of the number of fields tested.

3. *Revision settlement.*—Revision settlement was sanctioned during the year in the seven taluks of Heggaddevankote, Sidlaghatta, Devanahalli, Hole-Narsipur, Bagepalli, Arkalgud and Seringapatam (Nala villages) and the revised rates were brought into effect from 1st July 1923, resulting in an aggregate increase of Rs. 2,26,669 over the old revenue collections. There are still as many as nineteen taluks in which revision settlement is overdue and yet to be introduced with a view to have this work carried out with all possible expedition, Government have prescribed a programme of operations according to which re-settlement should be finished in all these taluks within the next three years, seven taluks in the current year, seven more during 1924-25 and the remaining five taluks, in 1925-26. Government hope that, in the interests of the revenues of the State, the Department of Revenue Survey will strictly adhere to the programme prescribed.

4. *Inspection of boundary marks.*—Work under this head by the Survey Department was confined, according to the standing orders of Government, to only a few cases in which it was necessary to inspect the boundary marks for the identification of correct boundaries, for the sub-division of numbers or *bab phod* in misrit numbers, the actual erection and repair of boundary marks in the taluks re-classed being attended to by the Revenue Department.

5. *Potgi to Shanbhogs and Patels.*—The assessment of original potgi in respect of three inam villages was completed during the year and a revision of potgi in respect of 936 villages was also undertaken.

6. *Inams.*—Eight land inams were confirmed and four minor land inams in Government villages were resumed to Government during the year with the result that the inam revenue was reduced by Rs. 7-9-0, while the land revenue was increased by Rs. 42-12-0. Six whole inam villages and five minor land inams were also revised, the net result being an increase of Rs. 29-11-0 in the combined quit-rent.

7. *General.*—The Special Officer deputed for work in the Department was sent on deputation to Bombay and Madras. Considerable retrenchment was effected in the Department during the year involving a reduction of officers as well as of establishment. The total cost of the Department for the year was Rs. 2,74,605-8-6 as against Rs. 2,62,677-1-8 in the previous year, the increase being chiefly due to the disbursement of the arrears of increments of pay due to the officers of the Department. Government are glad to note that the programme of re-settlement prescribed for the year was duly carried out and the work turned out by the Department under all heads was quite up to mark.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the annual Progress Report of the Mysore Revenue Survey and Settlement Department for the year ending 30th June 1923.

2. *Changes in the Department.*—Mr. K. G. Shamanna, Deputy Superintendent, retired from service on the 1st December 1922 after availing himself of four months' privilege leave granted to him from 1st August 1922 preparatory to retirement, and Mr. D. Sreenivasa Rao, Senior Assistant Commissioner, succeeded him. Mr. T. Dharmaraj Chetty, Assistant Superintendent, who was in charge of the Headquarters and Records Office having been directed to take charge of the Special Akar Establishment from 1st August 1922, Mr. B. Muddukrishnappa, Assistant Superintendent, who was under training from 1st June 1922, was placed in charge of the Survey Headquarters and Records Office. Messrs. C. Rajagopal, Sub-Assistant Superintendent, and R. A. Narasimha Iyengar, Assistant Superintendent, were placed in charge of the "M" and the "E" classing establishments respectively. Mr. T. Hanumantha Rao, Assistant Superintendent, was also placed in charge of the Special Akar Establishment to assist Mr. T. Dharmaraj Chetty.

Mr. D. Srinivasa Iyengar, Special Officer, was sent on deputation to Bombay and Madras to acquaint himself with the procedure of survey and settlement prevailing in those Presidencies.

Considerable retrenchment in the Department involving a reduction of officers and establishment was approved by Government.

3. *Settlement of frontier boundaries.*—The special duty in connection with the settlement of the Mysore-South Canara boundary was not undertaken during the year. The question of settlement of boundary on the Molakalmuru-Royadurga frontier was further investigated and results reported to Government.

4. In pursuance of recent orders of Government, the re-survey operations were mainly confined to the re-classification of wet and garden lands and to such measurement only as was absolutely necessary for settlement purposes. In addition, a large

number of records relating to the sub-division of lands granted for cultivation in kharab and assessed waste numbers in the taluks under re-classification and pending in the Revenue Department were called for and disposed of. The sub-division work relating to these numbers combined with the miscellaneous correction work incidental to the demarcation of new roads, railways, irrigation channels, forests, etc., involved a large amount of measurement work.

5. *Original measurement.*—The detailed survey of two inam villages, one in the Hoskote Taluk and the other in the Tumkur Taluk was carried out during the year under report, and extended to 306 survey numbers covering an area of 1,446 acres. So many as 40 Inam villages remaining to be surveyed in detail could not be taken up for want of time, as preference had to be given to field work connected with re-settlement. Now that the field work referred to above is not so heavy as it was in the past years, a special establishment will be formed during the current year for the detailed survey of these Inam villages along with the Special Akar work.

6. *Partial re-survey.*—Consequent on the change of procedure of field operations, regular re-survey work was not carried out during the year.

7. *Original classification.*—Original classification was carried out in respect of four inam villages situated in the taluks of Hoskote, Nelamangala, T.-Narsipur and Yedatore, and extended over 516 survey numbers with an area of 1,894 acres.

8. *Re-classification.*—Re-classification operations under the old procedure were confined to the small portion of work left over in the year previous, and was completed at the beginning of the year under report. The six classing establishments employed on re-classification work during the year were engaged as described hereunder.

The "A" Establishment under Mr. Y. Nanjundiah, Assistant Superintendent, completed the re-classification in 291 villages of the Kolar Taluk as it stood at the original settlement.

The "B" Establishment under Mr. P. N. Krishnaswami, Sub-Assistant Superintendent, completed the re-classification of 164 villages in the original Yedatore Taluk. Re-classification of 136 villages of the Hoskote Taluk under the old procedure, which was left unfinished at the close of the previous year was also completed during the beginning of the year under report.

The "D" Establishment under Mr. Sheik Abdulla, Assistant Superintendent, completed the re-classification of 321 villages of the Bowringpet Taluk during the field season of the year under report. The re-classification of 82 villages of the original Chintamani Taluk and a portion of one village of the Nagamangala Taluk which was left unfinished at the close of the previous year was also completed during the year under report.

The "E" Establishment under Mr. D. Sreenivasa Rao, Assistant Superintendent, before he took charge of the Deputy Superintendent's office, and afterwards under Mr. R. A. Narasimha Iyengar, Assistant Superintendent, completed the re-classification of 166 villages of the original Chintamani Taluk, of 158 villages of the Gundlupet Taluk, of 126 villages of the Seringapatam Taluk (non-nala) and of 22 villages of the Krishnarajpete Taluk during the field season of the year under report.

The "F" Establishment under Mr. B. Venkataswami, Sub-Assistant Superintendent, completed the re-classification of 171 villages of the Anekal Taluk and of 78 villages of the Krishnarajpete Taluk during the field season in addition to that of 50 villages of the Mandya Taluk left over from the previous field season.

The "M" Establishment under Mr. C. Rajagopal, Sub-Assistant Superintendent, did the re-classification of 267 villages of the Malur Taluk during the field season of the year. During the early part of the year under report the same establishment under Mr. R. A. Narasimha Iyengar for the first few days, and under Mr. C. Rajagopal afterwards, completed the re-classification of 119 villages of the Hoskote Taluk which had remained unfinished at the close of the previous year. A small remnant of re-classification in the Mysore Taluk was also completed by this Establishment.

9. In addition to the re-classification work, the establishments had to do a large quantity of measurement work on account of the sub-division of lands granted for cultivation in kharab and assessed waste numbers, of separation of occupied from unoccupied portions in survey numbers, of *bab phodi* in mixed numbers, and of correction work due to the opening of new roads, railways, forests, etc., alluded to in para 4 above.

The following statement gives details of the quantity of measurement done by each of the establishments:—

10. The following is a summary of the total outturn of work during the year:—

- (1) Detailed survey in two Inam villages in Tumkur and Hoskote Taluks.
- (2) Original classification in four Inam villages in four different taluks.
- (3) Re-classification under the old procedure in 255 villages which had been re-surveyed, and covering 12,437 fields with an area of 35,964 acres.
- (4) Re-classification under the new procedure in 1,896 villages containing 92,360 fields with an area of 1,75,236 acres.

11. The following table gives further details of the re-classification carried out by the several establishments:—

An aggregate of 104,797 fields were thus re-classified during the year with an area of 211,200 acres in 2,151 villages as against 110,463 fields with an area of 242,059 acres in 2,471 villages in the year previous.

The comparatively smaller outturn of work in the " E " Establishment was due to the very large number of villages dealt with by the Establishment, more time having been lost than in the previous year in travelling, measurement, and to some extent on account of sickness among the fieldmen.

The re-classification work was finished in the taluks of Anekal, Kolar, Malur, Bowringpet, Yedatore, Gundlupet and Seringapatam (non-nala); in Krishnarajpete Taluk the work could not be completed and the balance that remains will be taken up in the next field season.

12. *Distribution of working days.*—The percentage of days under "field work" and "no field work" for the establishments was 69'09 and 30'91 respectively, as against 69'38 and 30'62 respectively, of the year previous. Taking the establishments individually, the distribution was, as follows:—

The "A", "B", "F" and "M" Establishments have lost the highest number of working days chiefly because of sickness among the men.

The field work during the year under report commenced in the middle of December 1922, the arrears of monsoon tapasni being got through to have the taluks ready for re-settlement proposals in pursuance of the revised programme.

13. *Boundary marks.*—Under the new procedure of re-survey operations the work of inspection of boundary marks was not undertaken except in a few instances where it was necessary for the identification of correct boundaries, for the sub-division of numbers, or bab phodi in *misrit* numbers. In the taluks re-classed during the year under the revised procedure, the erection and repair of boundary marks has to be attended to by the Revenue Department as ordered by Government.

14. *Measurement test.*—The total number of fields subjected to measurement test was 2,606 or 9.69 per cent of the total numbers measured. Of these, 1,515 fields or 58.14 per cent were tested by the Officers and the remaining 1,091 fields or 41.86 per cent by the Surveyors.

15. *Classification test.*—The classing test extended to 14,557 fields or 13.90 per cent of the number of fields classed. Of these, 8,465 fields or 58.15 per cent were tested by the Officers and the remaining 6,092 fields or 41.85 per cent by the Surveyors. Re-tests of Surveyors' tests were also taken and found to be satisfactory.

16. *Measurement monsoon work* was proportioned to the reduction of re-survey in the field according to the new procedure. The work of 7 Inam villages, the field work of which had been completed in the previous year was also performed.

17. *Classification monsoon work.*—The Akar work of 278,473 survey numbers in 2,409 villages in the taluks of Mulbagal, Hoskote, Nagamangala, Mysore, Hunsur, Channarayapatna, Mandya, Manjarabad, Arkalgud was completed by the six classing establishments during the monsoon season and the Special Akar Duffer throughout the year. The above includes the monsoon classification work of several Inam villages in the Hunsur, Malvalli, T.-Narsipur, Nagamangala and Nelamangala Taluks. The Akar work of Chintamani Taluk will be taken up during the current official year. To cope with the revised programme of re-settlements, arrangements have been made for the completion of the Akar work by continuing the special establishment throughout the year.

18. *Preparation and issue of village maps.*—The maps of 1,289 re-settled villages were printed and issued during the year, leaving a balance of 473 to be printed and issued. Maps of 14 other villages were also drawn and reprinted to replenish exhausted stock in the Records Office. The total number issued from the Department was 12,275, of which 1,917 were issued on payment, 6,776 were supplied to other departments free of cost, and the rest 3,582 in number were utilized in the Department for purposes of revision operations. The total number of taluk, district and State maps issued from the Department was 356; of these, 103 were supplied to different departments free of cost and 253 were issued on payment. In addition to these, hand-drawn copies of 95 Inam villages were also issued on payment to private persons.

19. *Inams.*—During the year under report 8 land inams comprising an extent of 49 acres 4 guntas assessed at Rs. 117-4-0 were confirmed with a combined quit-rent of Rs. 36; 4 minor land inams in sircar villages were resumed to Government by which the Inam revenue was reduced by Rs. 43-9-0 while there was an increase of Rs. 100 under Land Assessment. One minor inam of the Sringeri Jaghir with an extent of 500 dayas of garden land assessed at Rs. 20-12-9 was resumed to the Mutt. Six whole Inam villages and 5 minor land Inams were revised during the year; the net result of the revision was that the combined quit-rent was increased by Rs. 29-11-0. The number of registers prepared was 36 for confirmed and resumed cases. Besides these, 44 correction statements were prepared and issued. The final quit-rent registers of Hole-Narsipur, Sidlaghatta and Seringapatam (nala villages) Taluks were corrected and brought up to date.

20. *Remuneration of Shanbhogs and Patels.*—During the year under report revision of potgi based on collections under revised assessments was effected in 83 villages situated in six different taluks and that of 56 villages in the Narasimharajapura Sub-Taluk was in hand. Decennial revision of potgi was effected in respect of 369 villages situated in 3 different taluks and that of 248 villages of the Kankanhalli Taluk was in hand. Original potgi of 3 inam villages was also completed. Special revision of potgi to Shanbhogs was effected for 53 Inam villages. Decennial revision of

potgi of 27 Inam villages and 23 villages of the Sringeri Jahgir was also completed. Decennial revision of potgi of 50 inam villages and in 27 villages of Yelandur Jahgir, is nearing completion. Supplemental revision of potgi was also effected in three cases owing to amalgamation of villages. The temporary establishment employed in the previous year was abolished during the year under report.

21. *Measurers lent to the Revenue Department.*—In pursuance of the requisition of the Revenue Commissioner, 5 more measurers were lent to the Revenue Department for sub-division of lands in some of the Amrut Mahal kavals thrown out for cultivation and one to the Special Revenue Officer. The work of these men was under the direct control of the revenue officers. Appendix IA shows the work done by the District Surveyors. Out of the total number of working days only 38·19 per cent was devoted to work connected directly or indirectly with survey operations, and 34·76 per cent to work in the offices of the Deputy Commissioners.

22. *Cost of the Department.*—The total cost of the Department for the year under report was Rs. 2,74,605-8-6 as against Rs. 2,62,677-1-6 in the previous year. The increase is chiefly due to the increments of pay which accrued to and were drawn by the officers of the Department.

23. *General.*—The original survey operations are now confined to alienated villages, the holders of which apply for them, or which have come under Government management.

24. *Progress of re-survey and re-classification operations.*—These operations have been completed in all the taluks in the State except the taluks of Malvalli, Chamrajnagar, T.-Narsipur, Nanjangud and a portion of Krishnarajpete Taluk in the Mysore District and in Channapatna and Kankanhalli Taluks in the Bangalore District. According to the new programme these taluks will (most of them) have been finished in the course of the next two years.

27. *Revision settlement.*—During the year under report revised rates were announced in the taluks of Heggaddevankote, Sidlaghatta, Devanhalli, Hole-Narsipur, Bagepalli, Seringapatam (nala villages) and Arkalgud. As the revised rates were all sanctioned by Government in June 1923 and were to be given effect to from 1st July 1923, it became a practical impossibility for the Departmental officers to announce the rates in all the seven taluks as was being done hitherto. With the sanction of Government the taluks of Heggaddevankote, Devanhalli, Bagepalli and Arkalgud were left over to the Revenue authorities for announcement.

The tracts brought under revision settlement up to the close of the year 1922-23 comprised the whole of the Chitaldrug District including the late Budihal Taluk, and the whole of Shimoga, Tumkur and Kadur Districts; Bangalore Taluk including the Civil and Military Station, Magadi, Nelamangala, Dodballapur and Devanhalli Taluks of the Bangalore District; Belur, the late Harnahalli (present Arsikere), Hassan, Hole-Narsipur and Arkalgud Taluks of the Hassan District; the late Gudibanda, Goribidnur, Chikballapur, Sidlaghatta and Bagepalli Taluks of the Kolar District; and Seringapatam nala villages and the Heggaddevankote Taluk of the Mysore District. Necessary steps have been taken to adhere strictly to the programme of re-settlements recently approved by Government.

28. *Surprise Inspection.*—Surprise visits were paid to all the Field Establishments during the year and the results were generally satisfactory.

29. The usual statements are appended to this report.

30. In conclusion, I should like to state that the officers and men of this Department have been working most cheerfully in spite of the fact that they are called upon to do very heavy and responsible work which has naturally devolved on them as a result of the programme of re-settlements ordered by Government.
