You must not persist in takeing great care, yt: the new Compa: do not bring in goods upon our Dusticks, and wee observe what past between you and them upon that occasion and commend your proceedings therein.

Wee are sorry to see soo much turn'd out [goods] for want of its true lengths and breadths, but considering [ . . . ] great ship wee are to loade, wee hope your discretion will lead [yo':] taking them in upon a proportionable abatement, and [ . . . ] order the same, and if this should not reach you before you Dispatch the King William to us, that when wee [order you] Load those goods upon a country ship or vessell bound to [this] Port, provided their's a probability of their comeing time to be ladeing upon the King William.

Wee wonder how those merchants could [ . . . ] two hundred Pag\*: upon their last Bills, being paid in the current money of this place.

Wee are unwilling you should take up [ ... . ] att Interest, but rather allow the one #cent as offer'd.

Wee cannot gratifie Mr: Bugden in his request nor is itt his Interest wee should, and therefore insist upon what formerly ordered therein.

You may dis[pose of] the horse as [you] think fitt, by sending him hither

[ . . ] otherwise. [ . . . ].

The mistake in the superscription [of the] Governours Letter was occasioned through a misinfor [mation] here, so have wrote itt over and here send it you, but leave you to write the superscription, not being thrôly info [rmed] of his name we would have it delivered and his answer desired.

Wee think itt necessary that you send [one line lost in the original] under our Dusticks [ . . . ] come upon us for arrears, and [ . . . ] the loss of our own privilidges, and [ . . . ] make for the future you must tye up [ . . . ] from dealing with the new Company.

Wee the Governour and Councill for Affairs of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company in Madrass and the Coast of Choromond[ell] &c<sup>a</sup>: did on the 2<sup>d</sup>: Instant receive a paper dated the 16<sup>th</sup>: of last month sign'd John Pitt, wherein were sundry expressions [as] itt had been dictated to him by the Oyster wenches att Bill gate, besides itt being stuffed with so many notorious facts that none would nor could averr, but monsters of Ingrati[tude] and such as had shook hands with shame.

It's very Improbable as well as untrue, that the Governour and Councill should apply themselves to undertake so considerable an Imploy, who had nothing to eat nor clothes to cover him, No 'twas through his own opportunitys wth: some persons recommendations in England he was Entertained, wh [ . . . ] only wronged the Company in their Investment [ . . . ] niously taken sundry goods [ . . . ] of their Warehouses and ffactory [ . . . ] appear unquestionable proofs when wee [ . . . ] on his tryall, Whatever our orders were [ . . . ] no other than what became us to give [ . . . ] arly when wee ordered him not to game [ . . . ] Sr: William Norris nor yourself nor any [ . . . ] to be a necessitous person, whereby great damages [ . . . ] accrue to the Comp\*: By the Informations [Woolston] gives you, and the Credit you give to [him] we can't but take notice that he finds he has soft wax to work on, and wee must be of the same Opinion. For your mentioneing stones chests for show, Our masters circumstances don't want such deludeing Varnishes whatever yours doe, and for more than the sum wee charge 'em, wee have their acknowledgments of the receit thereof.

As for your summoning the Governour and Councill of this place before you, is equally rediculous with your behaviour when in this port, and know yee too, that wee have sufficient powers to try all manner of Delinquents if occasion requires and can send force enough out of the little Garrisson to fetch you hither.

Wee think itt a triviall crime (if any) to disowne a Consull, considering our circumstances and yours but are assured us a Capitall Crime to disowne a king,

weh: with some if it had soe hapened they had never been Consulls.

"Tis certaine a great misfortune for any society to have a holt-brain'd President att the head of their affairs, but a farr greater to have a Cracke-brain'd and un[...] President, who must undoubtedly in a little time [...] [...] ill spent in answering your imper[tinent] you and your Councill take notice, that [...] President and In consider [...] Councill, . ] of the protest sent you being grounded on hone [ . . . ] and will put in execution our resolutions [when] opportunity presents, In confirmation [we . . . ] hereunto sett our hands and seall of [ . . . ] Honble: Company, In ffort St: George this 9th: day of January 1700/1.

Wee shall suply you with: money soe soon as possible wee can, and you'l do well to advice us the prices of all sorts Rupees, for that wee fear will be difficult

to procure Madras Pagodas to send you.

We well approve of your good intention of retrenching your charges, and of your caution in disposseing of the bricks of the house pull'd downe, which [ . . ] rather should lye by some time, than be bought by the new Company. The Seaven timbers you mention were would have sent hither, and the others if they are broke about the mi[ddle] or the longest part of them.

Wee are sorry to see that you are no forwarder in your Investments, which

makes us fear [ . . . ] for the King William.

Mr: John Pitts unmanerly answer to our proposal [ . . . ] accordingly have given him an answer thereto [ . . . ] &c: will impart to you [ . . . ] [infor]med from Metchlepatam that your merchants [were] also concern'd in the new Company bring in the [ir goods] under our Dusticks, wen: you must use your utmost endeavours to prevent, for this may endanger the Loss of our Priviléges, so that for the future you must take care not to contract wth: any merchants that are concern'd with them. Wee are

As to what you wrote us in yours of y<sup>a</sup>: 10<sup>th</sup>: past concerning the Barbarous murther Committed by Native Inhabitants of your place, wee can't think itt adviseable to try 'em for the same, till wee see how this new Nabob Dou'd Cawn will carry himself towards us, wee having this day Dispatch'd Sen<sup>r</sup>: Manuch & Ramapah with a considerable Present to him &c<sup>a</sup>: in behalfe of this place and yours.

Wee paid your Bill to M': Roger Bradyll for 169 Pag': 29 fan': mentioned in that Letter.

As to what wee [ . . . ] the Enginer wee thought itt had been plain [ . . . ] no more than that he was return'd [ . . . ] now he had no leave from us to come [ . . . ] must be paid by you and charged at former [ . . . ] having been an addition [ . . . ] and unnecessary [ . . . ] place.

Wee are of opinion that the makeing of Demi[ties] and chequered [cloth ought] to be encouraged, by excuseing them from Paying Custome and Dustore, till they are settled some years with you.

Wee received two pair of your Generall Books, K, one pair of weh: shall send to England on the King William.

Wee did hope by this time you would have returned the Parr Recovery Laden with Bales to us, which wee desire you to hasten what you can, and as any safe oppertunity presents, send what you have ready hither, for that we hourly expect the King William, to whom wee must give a quick dispatch.

Here is now Brimstone to be had, web: came on the Pearl from Manilha, advise us what you want and wee suply you with it.

Wee have lately been presented w<sup>th</sup>: two Bills of yours dated the 10<sup>th</sup>: Instant for Five Thousand Pag\*: each Payable to your Merchants, whereof you gave us [no advice] w<sup>th</sup>: is very unmercantile, so order you for the future to charge no bills upon us, but att the same time give us ad[vice] thereof, tho' these two bills wee have paid, fearing the delay till receipt of your advice, might prove prejudiciall to your present Investment.

If there be any greivances that can be remedyed by application to the Nabob, wee desire you forthwith to acquaint us wth: them that so wee may write to our people.

[ . . . ] informed that Ensigne Reay has behaved himself [ . . ] his superior officer Cap<sup>t</sup>: Kugonin for which [ . . . ] have checked him and afterwards if he per[sist] severely punished him, and if wee hear any more [ . . . ] order him a punishment from hence.

The [ . . . ] Negapatam Pag\*: was the mistake of the Conicoply, who was ordered to put up none but Tevenapatam, nor did wee hear till now, but that Negapatam Pag\*: were as Current with you as any other.

We have paid your Bill of Pag\*: 470:29 to the President.

Wee perceive the number of your bales rise very slow, and 'tis now high time to think of Embaleing Longcloth and salampores brown Ordinary, and lett all imaginable care be taken to be so packed as to make good stowage.

The prizes of the Dimities and chequer'd cloth are so much risen since you formerly wrote us, that wee can't see it worth while to meddle with them.

One Candy of Bees wax wee'l send you by the first Boate,

Pray hasten your bales to us and send the Goods that our merchants have lyeing there. Wee are

Srs .

The Parr Recovery arrived here yester[day] in the afternoon and this Day wee are unloading of her [ . . . ] observe you have sent a great deal midleing [Longcloth] little ordinary.

[...] sailled yesterday for your Port, the wind hav[e been . . .] tollerable fair ever since, so hope shee'l be soon [. . . ] wee must desire you to give her as quick a Dis[patch as] possible to us, who wee believe will take in about [ . . . ] bales thô wee expect not less than 600 bales including the 160 [already] received.

Our Merchants says that their Gomaster has not sent all their Goods, pray

send for him and reward him for his Carelessness.

Last night Sen': Manuch and Ramapah return'd from the Camp, who have been treated very scurvily by the Nabob, giveing 'em ill language and Dismissed 'em w<sup>th</sup>: out a Tasheriff, and in plain termes tells them, that his Employ cost'a great deall of money att Court and he expects good part of itt from us, not speaking less than one hundred thousand Pag<sup>\*</sup>: The business of Seliam Cawn still sticks in his stomack, and if he has an oppertunity he will certainly revenge itt, he is makeing great preparations for a march, but wither is uncertain, and he may as well clap in upon you or us as anywhere else, therefore itt is very requisite that wee be upon our guard and make all manner of preparation accordingly. If he comes near you, be sure send no Englishman to him, if any body, and if he seems to expect or Demand a Present, tell him that Chinapatam has done itt for you and us to, haveing given him and his officers near 3000 Pag<sup>\*</sup>: he gives out that he is going for Tanjore and so to Porto Novo, your Place and Polichery and afterwards to S<sup>\*</sup>: Thoma, you must bee sure to keep good lookeing out upon the roads to prevent surprise and we will order our spyes to write you frequently.

Hasten your goods hither, for its high time this ship was Dispatched.

Your two [Bills one] hundred Pag\*: and other for seventy two [...] paid. We are

It being uncertain whether this ship will call att your Port, is the reason wee don't give you a plenary answer to all your letters received by the Tha[nk]-full Cap': Phrip Commander, who the' you would load wth: Pepper, yett you did us with Bills, to the most extra[va]gant Summ as ever was heard of to be drawne from any subordinate ffactory, those from [T]ryamong & your place amounting to no less than Ryalls 23,616: 1: 1½ which were paid and the reason you give for not Ladeing that ship wth: Pepper is so insufficient, that certainly you could[n't] think wee wou[ld] Brook itt. Wee know itt is the Comp\*: order to keep 200 To[ns] there for their use, for wth: this was likewise intended, and you yourselves say that you heard y\*: Madrass merchant was comeing to you from England, and so you know that the Comp\*: never sends a ship for Pepper, but always [ . . . ] her value to Lade her home. You also advise that the Country abounded in Pepper, that the greatest Crop of the year was approaching, that the ship could for her la[ . . . ]ing four months without a penny charge to the Company further that you had upward of five hundred Bahar [ . . ] yet all this could not prevaile with you to set [ . . . ] ship's Loadeing, what construction to put upon this [ . . . ] of yours, wee have not yett resolved on, whether Ignorance [or sloth] fullness or what else, and let it be what itt will that occas[sion'd this] must say that no men of a graine of sence [would have] done the like.

Your cheif and second well know how heavy the Ton[nage] us'd to lye on us here, and what a hardship itt is upon the owners [of] ship to load hence without Pepper besides [had] you laded her [ . . . ] wa': have been att this time, [ . . . ] would have been a great credit [ . . . ] as well as advantage to yo: Compa: and no breach of the Compa: [order] since you had soofair a prospect of procureing the Madras Mer[chants] Cargoe, so as to Dispatch

her in due time, therefore if this ship [Ruby] comes to your port (on which is M<sup>r</sup>: Edward Barkham Supra Cargoe) Wee order and require you to Lade her wth: Pepper for this Place if Possibly you can, and embrace all opportunitys to send what pepper you can hither, when itt do's not render you uncapable of your being in due time supplyed wth: that quantity the Comp\*: order you to keep

The Comp\*: have given us leave to buy a Vessell for your Coast, which we shall doe as soon as wee meet with one proper for itt, and send you supplys by

her or any bound to your Port.

[Received] a Paper Dated the 25th: past from Mr. John Pitt [att Metchle-patam] wth: Copys of papers to our Compt. Cheif there, [and at] Madapollam as also a Copy of a Consulls Commission [ . . . ] to the usuall fform, said to be fresh by ye: Tank[erville . . . ] having Compar'd itt to what you sent hither former[ly it is] verbatim the same, unless it be an adition[al] clause empower. ing Mr. John Pitt the successive Cheif to give Pasports to any of the natives shipping if they request itt, but not a word that they shall be obliged to take his Passes or any else nor can wee think that those Commissions were Granted with any intent to affect our masters concerns in these parts, nor can itt be supposed one that was but their ffactor the other Day, either for his abillity or Disaffection to our Comp\*: Interest, of which he has given large Demonstration, will or can promote their Good, in preserving their privilledges, when he can purchase none for his masters, not as much as leave to build a slight wall about a Dwelling House, and by what has past, wee know that your pride and ambition was such, that you expected to have bore all downe before you, when had you consider'd that 'twas as probable that the minutest star in the firmament should Eclipse the Sun, for such is the Dispropotion of our masters Circumstances and yours in these parts, who have not a Cottage that you can call your own, whereas ours are Lords, proprietors of Forts, Castles, Cittys, Townes, Villeges, and under their Command some hundred thousands of People, which are daily encreasing, and this is not unknown to you nor to many of your Employers, wen: should have putt you upon procureing the kings Order to yo: Governour and Presidents here, or our masters orders to us to have subjected the Direction of their Affairs to you the new Comp\*: President, till when wee shall as wee formerly wrote you not permitt you to intermedle w\*: our affairs in any respects whatever, assureing [you that] whatever our Deportment has been to you tho' better [than you] ved, you'l find us the same without the walls a[s within] and not to spend more time in answering your [ . . . ]ous papers, wee againe tell you, that whereas you [have har]bour'd a servant of our master who has wronged them in [many] respects whose person has been demanded of you which [wee] referein in [many] respects, whose person has been demanded of you which [you] refusing to deliver up, wee have resolved to use all means to wrest him from you by applycation to the Governm: or otherwise and if any ill Concequences attend itt. we charge itt on you, and to returne your advice of which you are so liberall, we think your time might be much better spent than in encourageing and Protecting Fellows of which wee have unquestionable proofe against Wooleston: Given under our hands, and the Rt: Honble: Company's seal, dated in Fort St: George, in the Citty of Madrass this 20th: day of February 1700/1.

The Presidt: read to us a clause in his particular Letter of the 28th: past, wherein your Dep: Governour advices the aproach of Seliam Cawn with a body of horse near your place, and desire our orders for cutting downe Gardens, wently so near the Fort as to incommode it, and convenient to lodge an Enemy, and Erect Batteries without being discovered, so not knowing the exact distance the Gardens are from the Fort, were can give no orders therein, but must leave itt to [the] discretion of you the Dep: Governour and Councill, but [with all], in such cases that you Consult the Captains of the millitary des [ . . .]y be cutt downe, itt may be out of necessity and no [injustice] or prejudice to any of the proprieties thereof.

If we have any Mortar shells of the Diameter you mention wee will send them in a day or two by the Madra [ss Pinnace] with some Brimstone and Planks for Carriages which wee desire you to returne loading with Bales [she] being able to carry about 60 or seventy, and hasten the getting in of the remains of your Investments. Wee shall in few days send you an answer to all ye: Letters

We received yours of the 14<sup>th</sup>: February, and by the Thankfull who arrived here the 17<sup>th</sup>: wee received three hundred and eight bales, the Invoice whereof came overland afterwards amo<sup>ts</sup>: to Pag\*: 20,842: 33: 3: Wee took some of the bales ashore to veiw them, and found your brown salampores and Longcloth very ordinary in respect to ours here, as also your Succutoms, and thô your orringall Betteelas are tollerable, yett still they are not comparable to those sent hence, and our Judgment is, that upon your whole Investm\*: your goods are att least 15 p cent dearer than ours here, with regard to the goodness and Prices, which seemes strange to us, your place being better scittuated for makeing all those sorts of goods, Wee desire and order that scrutiny be made what is the occasion of itt, and that it may be remedied for the future.

Wee [received] Consultation Book and Diary which was sent [ . . . ] but comeing soo late, wee had not time to peruse [and so] desire you forthwith

to send us Copy thereof.

The [ . . . ] [you] mention employed by Doud Cawn to raise soldiers, [ . . . ] aware of him, and ordered one of our Portyguez to [list him] self with him to observe what hee did, who is able to raise but 3 or 4 men, for that ours went w<sup>th</sup>: him as farr as the Mount in his way to the Camp, and there left him; our advices from the spyes as also the Gennerall report is, that Dowd Cawn will come to S<sup>t</sup>: [Thomé] and Seliam Cawne to your place, we

cannot imagine att their Disgust wth : us, unless it is occasioned by what former [ly had] past with Seliam Cawne att your place, and that wee do[n't] [ . . ] give Dowd Cawne as much as his predecessor had, our [Present] now having been three times more than the French & Dutch have given.

Wee received yours of the 4th: Instant this morning, and shall pay the two

bills mentioned therein amounting to Five thousand Page: when Presented.

Wee have sent you Plank for Carriages on the Madrass Pinnace, and shall send you a further supply thereof as soon as procurable, for you ought to have stores of Carriages, axell Trees and Trucks in case accidents shou[ld] happen when you come to action.

Your saltpetre wee suppose is the same as wee have here, and wee find the same inconveniency as you mentioned, but wee hope for the future t'will be remedi-

ed by the Gentlemen in Bengall.

There is great reason to fear that Seliam Cawn will give your place trouble, so wish the [Peiques] among you do not weaken your defence, in your next Gennerall [...] write us whether you have complyed wth: what we formerly ordered about Capt: Hygonin and what reason you had [...] his two servth: out of the Company, who were as [...] service as any of the black Portuguez you before [entertai] ned, and you never answered us, whether you had [forwarded] our orders about Reay, who behaved himself soo im[pudent] and saucy to his Captaine, wee would also [have you] incourage Mocdum[Nina], who im former time[had giren] large demonstration of his faithfully asset to the who in former time[had given]large demonstration of his faithfullness to the Comp\*\*: Interest.

Mr: Cranwell returnes to you on the Madras [Pinnace], whom wee order to be one of the Justices of Tevenapat": Choultry and storekeeper Independant

from the Paymaster.

To yours of the 13 November, wherein you acquaint us of the arrivall of the King William, and yt: [ . . . ] towards us with her Kentilage stores &c: according [ . . . ] which wee doubted not your Complyance, but upon [ . . . ] here wee found you had laden no more than [11 of salt] Petre, which was no small surprize to us besides [ a great dis]appointment to us, in so much that itt renders us uncapable of sending our masters a Septembr: ship, Wee having now by us [no more] than 453 bags which is bare[ly]

store enough for our Garrison wee can't imagine what occasion'd this mistake, Wee send [ing] you with the ship her charterparty, wherein her Kintlage is men-

tioned, and the 1,000 bags, wee desired more, was in our list of stores.

The Expedient wee propose to retreive the Error is, that you'l exchange a ship with us of about 400 Tuns and send us up in August the first that arrives of that burthen with her full Kentlage of petre and att least 1500 bags for store, and wee will send you a ship of ours of the same burthen as near as wee can.

Here was no ship bound hence to your port in January, otherwise would have sent you some red wood, which shall not omitt to doe by the first opportu-

To yours of the 17<sup>th</sup>: & 19<sup>th</sup>: December: Wee observe what you write in the

former about coining part of your stock here into Rupees, wen: shall be complyed, with, if an [early] ship of yours call here, and your pacquet shall be forwarded by a Country ship as you desire.

The Fame sailled hence the 8th: February on whom wee loaded 124 bales amounting to Pag\*: 4,082: 15:2 Which with some private trade she tooke in, made [her] a full ship. Wee wrote you last the 14 past by St: Anthon[io] and here give you full answer to yours of the 15th: January 23 Ditto and 4th: February, which had been sooner done, but that wee have been very buisie in dispatching the King William who sailed for England the 25th: past att night, on which was Laden 1,800 bales

her Cargoe amounting to Pag\*: 160,640: 14:2[.]

2. To yours of the 15th: January by the King William on wth: ship wee received seventy seven bales, but in such Confusion, for want of sorting, washing, measuring &c\*[...] if ever the like againe be practiced, but it be by whom it will [...] & shall be im[mediately] discharged [...] can [...] how you spend your time, having had five [months ...] you provided so small a quantity of Bales and [ . . . ] had better been let alone, than sent us in such a condition as they were, all seeming as you say) to be sorted in the Evening, and you can't but know, that wee have [full] employment for our washers here, as also for our [sorters], all web: neglect of your Duty proceeds from Carelessness and prodigious slothfullness.

3. On the Brampore chints, you are to abate as you found 'em short in ' measure, which was very impertinentely put upon our decision here, having not one of the Merch's: here to convince 'em by measureing 'em before their face, as

you had, wen: Goods were very Coarse and Ordinary in all respects.

4. The Browne cloth as you say that you could not sort, how was wee to do it here when washed having no muster by us. On which you contracted wth: the merchants, so have been forced to do all that by guess by Compareing it wth: our cloth here.

5. As for the two bales of saucergunty Ramalls No. 3 you were as able to compare 'em with No: 2 as wee were here, and had as much leisure to do itt.

6. And as to washing your Longcloth you must be directed in that by what formerly has been done, wee paying here no more than Pag': 1:10 \$\psi\$ Corge.

7. Wee were not little surprised to see such a number of Golcondah Beetteelas, against woh: we so often cautioned you, and must tell you that upon opening 'em, they were the worst that ever wee saw in this place, wee compareing 'em with those of M': Lovells, we': were att least 25 p': cent better, besides there ought to be [ . . . ] more than [ . . . ] of such Goods in a bale, which is a suitabe La [ . . . ] in England.

Wee received in the Letter from Metchlep<sup>m</sup>: your Invoice for 52 bales ship'd on board the King William amounting to Pag<sup>a</sup>: 9291: 15: 2 of woh: there was 16 bales of brown cloth, woh: certainly had you been dilligent in calling on your merch<sup>16</sup>: you might have gott washed, & not have sent 'em hither to hinder us, considering the few Bales you provided, wee also received Copys of your Diary Paymaster (as you call it) and stewards acc<sup>16</sup>: upon woh: wee would have you consider whether so small an Investment as you make, can bear so great a charge.

Wee received the seven Timbers, & wish you had sent as the Door and

To yours of the 10th: Decembr: in wth: you write us of the suddaine revolution in your parts, from wen: wee refer, that wee must expect but few Bales, and but a small part of the great remaines, wen: has been so many years in your merch's: hands, well: is a very great disapointment to us, not only in regard of the want of Bales wee were in fear of to fi[ll]up the King William, but that wee gave the Compa: in our former Letters assurances that you would clear your Merch's: Debt by the returne of this ship, and how wee shall salve the brea[ch] of that promise to 'em we can't imagine, for that of a resolution of the Country will be as unsatisfactory an answer to them as itt is to us here.

To yours of 27 Decembr: woh: wee received [by] the King William wth: Bill Ladeing & Invoice for but 152 [bales] amounting to Page: 8989: 9: 4 weh; is farr short in number [ . . . ] value of what you promised and wee expected ] bestird ourselves here to fill'd up the ship our ma[sters] would

have suffered very much in their Interest and Credit.

Wee received your Generall Books R, wen: wee order henceforward to be sent us in the month Sepbr: and not deferred as they have been of late, having

not had time to peruse 'em before the Dispatch of the ship.

To yours of the 7th: Janty: pr: ship Dorothy in wch: was received Bill Ladeing & Invoice for 38 bales Laden on her amounting to Page: 2918: 15: 3.

Wee opened here severall of your Bales, & find your Goods come out very Indifferently well, and wish that those striped Betteelas had been with variety of stripes, as also finer, won: if you could bring 'em to make, as likewise the plain they would turn to a much better account, but we would never have you pack more than 100 ps: in a bale.

Wee think it the Comp': advantage, that you send up the Betteelas brown in time to be washed here, unles[s] you can bring 'em to wash better than they have of late at your place, but your longcloth & sallampores wee desire you to gett well washed, for brown is but bad Tonnage, besides yours was so ill packed this year, that they were loose in the bales web: is a great prejudice to the Cloth.

Wee here send you ffactors stores as # Invoice Inclosed, wth: Ten Candy of Gunpowder, and we cant but wonder that you should write for money for your Expences, when you have such large arrears in your hands, and for the two Kestees you are in arrears to the Nabob, we do not understand the meaning of it, and for the repairing of the ffactory, wee shall deferr giving our orders untill wee speak with Mr: Owen to whom you have referrd us.

. ]th: January, in woh: you advise that since yours by To you [ you had received two thousand Page: of Goods, [and hope] Long ere this, you have gott in to a farr greater amount.

As wee have mentioned before, the Disapointment wee have mett with from your place, have given us a great deal of care, and have caused us to come to this resolution, that wee'l send you no more money, till the Merch": have cleared their accounts, went: we expect to be fully complyed win: by the September ship, or otherwise wee must withdraw the ffactory, or take some other methods.

Upon opening the Broadcloth and Perpetuano's you returned us # ship Howland, wee find torn off from the fag ends, some one, two and 3 yards we believe must be the roguery of your warehouse Conicoply or Braminy, therefore order you to examine strictly into this matter.

#### 26 March 1701.

Wee have received yours of the 11th: past with: the papers inclosed, the purport of with: being the Opinion of some of your Officers concerning the inconvenient scittuation of the Gardens near the Fort, for with: wee should have had a greater value, had wee seen Capt: Hugonins name to that paper, who wee are of opinion, is a better Judge of those matters than any that have signed it, as having been oftener in action and seen great Variety of Fortifications. Wee do still [ . . . ] what wee formerly wrote about cutting downe the [gardens], leaving itt intirely to the discretion of Dep: Governor and Councill, desireing that your two Lieutenants be consulted thereon.

By the papers of Bollogees and some sent the President lately in a private Letter by your Dep: Gov<sup>r</sup>: wee have reason to fear that Bollogee is contriving to draw you into treat w<sup>th</sup>: Dowd Cawne, w<sup>ch</sup>: will be a thing of pernicious Concequence, therefore wee order you to avoid itt, for that wee have given the usuall present, and resolve to part w<sup>th</sup>: no more, wee are advised the Nabob continues Belching out Threats against this place and yours, w<sup>ch</sup>: wee Tacitly defie resolving to stand the upshod, being upon our Guard and keeping spyes to observe his

motion, who wee hear is march'd towards Vellore and intends afterwards for Chelly Naiques Country and so to Porto Novo: and downe the Coast to S<sup>t</sup>: Thom[a]. The President has ordered the spy Braminies hence to advise you of all that happens att the Comp, so would desire you to keep yourselves in a very good posture of defence, and with all speed that you would cloath your soldiers, wee hearing that they are in such a ragged condition, that it is a discredit to the Nation in Gennerall, and the Comp<sup>a</sup>: in particular, and what wee more wonder att, is that wee hear there has been many months ago money stopt out of their pay for cloathing 'em, yet nevertheless not one to this day. Wee would have you persue the method that is taken here, w<sup>ch</sup>: is that the warehousekeeper by an Order of Councill delivers out the Cloth to the Paymaster att Invoice price, This wee desire may be done w<sup>th</sup>: all immaginable expedition, for there is nothing that makes soldiers more formidable to Veiw than Good arms and Cloaths.

You wrote hither some time past [for] some mortar shells of 13 inches Diameter we have none [ . . . ] seven, w<sup>th</sup>: are the size of yours, so if you have [occasion] must winde about w<sup>th</sup>: rope and other things to make [them] fitt

You advise that your Cheife Gunner John Twyman is dead, to supply whose place wee can find no fitt person here. We have had application made to us by Wathen and Owen the Gunner of Cuddalore, & the Gunners mate, to both whose abilitys wee are strangers therefore recommend itt to you to prefer him, who is most capable of that employment thô as matters represented to us here, Wathen is the properest person.

Wee received yours of 10th: Inst: wth: severall annexed Paragraphs from the Cabball att Cuddalore, who seem to sett up for themselves, and believe had their ugly reflections on the Depty: Govr: made any impression on us, so as to have withdrawn him, wee doubt not but there was one of the Gang ready to be proposed to succeed; as wee have and shall never encourage an unbecomeing Deportment of a Depty: Govern: towards any of his Councill, so on the other side, wee shall be very far from Countenancing any that Cabball and scrible for scribleing sake against their superiours, which savers of nothing but mutinous, uneasy and revengfull tempers, who to gain their Ends on some would hazard the bringing all into ruin and Confusion, and this is the interpretation wee put upon your Cuddalore Narrative.

And to show our Dislike of such practices, whose consequences tend to no less then the ruine and distraction of the [Comp\*:] affairs, Wee resolve to reduce the Government [of Fort] St: Davids to a Depty: Govr\*: and four to be of Councill [ . . . ] upon receipt of this; Wee dismiss Mess\*\*: Farmer Cranwell and Berlue from Councill, and order them to repair hither forthwith.

Wee observe what you write about Capt: Hu[g]onins Servt. Where is the prejudice to the Compt: to List a Serv[ant] or two of theirs able to doe good service, when every Day you take in tag rag rogues, that you dont know from whence they come, or whether they are good for anything; as wee wrote you formerly you make a misconstruction of the practi[ce] of Fort St. George. Doe you but follow the orders you rece[ive] and there can be no danger of any blame accuring to yourselves.

Wee can give you no other answer than what wee have formerly concerning the Gardens, whether they shall stand or be cutt downe, but leave it wholly to you decission of the Dep<sup>ty</sup>: Govern : and Councill wth: the Lieuts: adjoyned.

What wee wrote to you about Sunda Bollagee, was what wee infer'd from the Letters of his you sent us, wherein he desired severall things for Presents and acquainted you how desirous Dowd Cawn was to speak wth: him.

Wee are certaine your Dep<sup>ty</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: could not be ignorant of the method of Cloathing the soldiers here, w<sup>ch</sup>: wee wonder was not follow'd when the money was first collected for that purpose, thô itt has been done here by the Paymaster buying the Cloth att outcry, but of late (w<sup>ch</sup>: certainly is most propper) it has been delivred out of the Comp<sup>e</sup>: Godowne att prime Cost.

Wee shall be thinking of some method to reduce [...] of your soldiers [equal to ours] here. [It] seems strange that it was not done many years [ago] when the Cause Ceas'd, for we's end it was given.

I received your Letter and thank you for the concern you seem to have for the Comp\*: prosperity, I am sensible tis not our Interest to have a Difference wth: Doud Cawn, nor shall I be against a reconcilation, if itt can be done att so small an Expence as you mention, about which wee have writt to the Dep: Governour who will advise with you about itt.

On Doud Cawn's first arrivall at Arcott, wee sent seu': Manuch & Ramapah to him wth: as handsome a present as has bin given to any Nabob, and I believe three times as much as the French & Dutch have given him wth: att first he received well, but afterwards return'd itt, and than sent for itt againe, abuseing your Egyps, demandeing Extravagant Sums, so att last he dismist them he gave a scandalous Tashereiffe but sent no tasherefe nor horse to me as is usuall at such times, wth: lookt like a disigne he had to affront us in the face of the Country, tho att that very juncture, I was design'd to send him a very fine Persian Mare, wth: our Egyps mett in their returne and brought her back.

I observe what you write about your Inhabitants deserting; woh: I wonder att, when they see wee stick at no charge to provide for their defence, you have lived long enough amongst the English to know their temper, who will never suffer money to be Extorted from them, and are seldome or never scared wih: threats nor afraid of blows, and as to what you say, that it may hind[er] our Investments weh: will be more prejudiciall to his King['s] Coun[try than] to us, & if can make no Investments on the Coast [by not] sending our money to Bengall or Surrat and for what Injuries Doud Cawn may be able to doe us on the shoar, tis an easy matter for us to repay 'em att sea.

I am under apprehensions that this difference between Doud Cawn and us has been occasioned by some of our Inhabitants here tampereing with him, and putting him upon itt, won: I wish you could learn by the means of Abdell Labby, who were esteem our freind.

Doubtless Mr: Holcombe &c\*: has long ere this wrote you about the buissiness of Ben to Ferario who you say acted for Mr: Hillier whereof we heard nothing

before receipt of yours so shall also write Mr: Holcombe &ca: about itt.

To yours of the 16th: whereof wee have only received the Copy, in which you are pleased to say there is no blame of your side for our not being supplyd wth: saltpetre, whereas wee sent you the King William to take in her Kentilage and the Charterparty wth: her to direct you as to the quantity and that of the one Thousand bagg[s] was under the head of stores, of wth: you were soo far from sending us one ounce, that you loaded short of her Kentlage 300 bags and what Sr: Charles urg'd as to lessening the stock, he should have considered that wee all belong to one society, whose Interest wee should Jointly

promote. Wee observe the unreasonable proposition of your Merchants, as for what Goods prized here wee are satisfied wee gave more than their reall worth then, that they would clogg you with such a Number of Golcondah Betteelas in a future contract is unreasonable, for they do not sell for prime cost in England, and for the Dustores wee expect that they pay itt, being demanded upon the first contract made with them and they promised payment thereof as by M. Lovells lettter.
- 4. Wee are not unsensible that whilst you have competitors, who take in Goods att any prizes, & without being very strict in measureing or sorting twi'l be difficult for you to manage your Merchants as you ought to doe, but when you can't doe so well as you would or should, you must do as well as you can, for you see our Masters are resolved to bear down the other party by tradeing.

pores you can gett wash'd to send this ship, lett 'em be made up brown, but see

that the [ . . . ] [well packed.]

And upon the encouragement you give us of your being able to make a large Investment for the Jan : ship, we have laded to what wee formerly intended for your place six Thousand Pag: and would still send you a farther supply, were wee assur'd you could Invest itt, and the reason wee doubt itt, your so often fayling us of what you promise, concerning which you may write us that wee may be able to make returns before this Monsoon is over.

To yours of the [ ]th March by which [ . . . ] was surrendred to us so hope by the good effect of your [ . . . ] att Tryamong you'l manage our Masters affairs, so as to prevent their being brought into the confusion they [were] in by the ill conduct of your Predecessour.

You say that the Companys affairs here suffer'd very much for want of supplys of Dollars web: you take due care to prevent, by the great draught of Bills you draw on us, as also on the Company by the Armenian Merchant who brought you about 7000 Dollars more than the amount you laded on her all web: summs amount to little less than 40000 Dollars, which by what the Comp\*: write us, will be no small surprize to them, nor is it to us here.

Wee received the Copys of your Letters to the Company by the Armenian Merchant and Scepter, as also your Diary and account Cash, and should be glad to see your Generall books, for wee are in the dark how you have disposed of the amot: of the Cargoes from Europe, and the great supplys you have had here.

amo<sup>t</sup>: of the Cargoes from Europe, and the great supplys you have had here.

Wee have credited you for the amount of the Armenian Merchant, and Scepters Invoyce and debt you for the bills drawn on the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company for Eight Thousand five hundred peices of Eight.

Wee have wrote you our resentment of dispatching the Armenian Merchant before the Scepter and given you good reasons for itt, the Scepter wee wrote you

winter'd att Mauritius, since which she has been att St: Helena.

Mr: Frith you say has been very serviceable to the R1: Honble: Company in

Assisting Mr: Eyton.

Wee observe you have entertain'd Joseph Hilton a writer of w<sup>ch</sup>: we approve and shall send you more Assistance hence upon the first supply wee have from England, and in the meantime do desire you to use your uttmost endeavours to bring up the books that are behind hand.

Wee hope the new troubles that Raja Addell was contriveing to the Northward proved abortive, for by the represention of your condition you seem not to be prepar'd to Quell him by force, and if Tryamong be see very sickly (which Factory you say is like to tumble down, and that the repaireing of itt will be as much charge as building a new one att Bentall) wee can give no reason why you should not remove itt unless itt be more inconvenient for the procury of pepper.

Wee are of your opinion, that tis a force that must awe the Mallays, without which they never will be quiet, which force our Masters must send you from England, for wee are not able to do itt from this place, nor can wee send you Mussoolas, for tis next to impossible to bring up Cofferees to manage them as you desire.

Wee here send 2646 Rupees, and 54836 Fa; of which write us how they goe off, and wee shall send you a Constant supply of them.

Wee commend your retrenching the expence and desire you'l prosecute your

intentions therein.

Tis a great Loss the death of your Chyrugeon, which were will supply hence as soon as can gett [one] but believe itt may be eassy for you to procure one out of a [ . . . ].

Wee here send you three Coffrees being what have been brought up to Carpenter and Mason work but for other slaves are difficult to procure here.

Wee here send you a receipt for makeing ink with a box of all other Factors

If Ire Banny (whereof Capt: Phrip gives you an account) be conveniently scittuated for procureing large Quantitys of pepper, those Qualifications as being

healthfull, affording plenty of Provisions, and a good harbour for shipping, makes itt preferrable to any of your settlements, of which if you are well inform'd twoued not be amiss if you make a small experiment, so as to try the fidellity of the

People, and to be throughly inform'd of the Product of the place.

To yours of the  $22^{nn}$ : July by which you advise that the Troubles you fear'd from the Northward were prevented by the speedy supplys you sent thither, and wee hope soon after, your want of Cash was also supply'd by the arrivall of the Madrass Merchant, who wee heard was att the Cape, and that she brought suffecient to enable you to buy considerable quantitys of pepper.

Wee observe how the sablat boats gave you the slip, which must be a caution

to you for the future.

If Mathew Ridley continues to behave himself well, you may employ him as a

Invoyce, and Bill ladeing inclos'd.

Wee not only complain of the vast expence of your place, but the Company have also taken notice in their Generall Letters to us copy of which clauses were here remitt you as also what the Auditor Generall have wrote out, Wee shall and do expect that you send us the Rubie, & this ship laden wth: pepper to help out the great Tonnage that's likely to be on our hands this year, in Leiu of the Regiment of Bills you draw on us, and the great supplys of stores &c. wee now send you What pepper you Lade on the Sarum must be att 18 \$\psi\$ cent to be payd according to the current [price of pepper] [ . . . ].

Wee received yours of the 26th: and 31st: past and cannot but admire att the misconstructions you put upon our orders, but certainly you only cursorily read our Letters but never consider the purport of them.

In ours of the 12<sup>th</sup>: March last wee promis'd you a supply by the first oppertunity and recommended to you the makeing provision for a new Investment, and for the sorts of Goods wee referr'd you to a list sent October last wherein wee remember you were ordered to provide what fine Longcloth, and sheets you could, and all Chint and chey Goods forbid, by reason of the prohibiting act, but after the arrivall of the Hampsheire, wee [ . . . ] on the 29<sup>th</sup>: May when remitt [ . . . ] of chey Goods, some Romalls, and ten Thousand peices of Brampore Chints.

By the Dutchess, and Phoenix wee received a Generall Letter of what Goods our Masters would have bought upon this Coast, and took out of itt what sorts wee found therein, of w<sup>ch</sup>: wee had not before orderd you to make your Investments for which reason wee say in our Letter by the Dutchess these very words Vizt: Wee here inclose a List of the Goods which the Compa: desires from your Factory as also their opinion of severall sorts, and desire that you'l keep up to itt as near as possible, which wee find not contradictory to what they wrote us by the Hampsheire w<sup>ch</sup>: wee remitted you, but be sure to remember to leave out Longcloth, and sheets In which List of the Company fine Longcloth, and sheets were forbid by reason they were soe extravagantly dear, and bad of their sorts, and if they had recall'd their order about Brampore Chints and Romalls, wee most certainly would have advisd you of itt, and wee thought wee had spoke plain enough to men of tollerable apprehension, when wee wrote that that list was not to contradict what wee formerly since the arrivall of this years shipping; therefore to prevent more mistakes buy the ten Thousand peices of Brampore

Wee have perus'd your contract, wen: in severall respects, wee cannot but dislike, for whereas the Company writes that they gett little or nothing by Dimmitys, and therefore order but one Thousand peices, you have contracted for Two Thousand seven hundred, and the same in Izarees on we's: there is rather loss than Gain for we's: reason they have order'd but [ . . . ] sixteen Hundred, and they likewise forbid Sarcergunty Romalls, of we's: you have contracted for Two Thousand, and those sort Romalls [you] call Bengall, wee hopeare the sort the Company [orders] we are cotton Romalls of the squareness wee formerly wrote you; otherwise wee know not how to answer the sending them.

Amongst the Goods that are forbid to be sent you see that there are Ordinary Chints by woh: is meant those of 21 or 22 Pags: corge and the others are so dear that they will not sell for prime cost. Wee therefore recommend it to you toendeavour to retreive this great crime of yours by leaving out part of the Demmitys, Izzarees and all the Sacergunty Romalls Brampore Chints and all

other such Goods the ('omp": has ordered.

As for the Present to the Governour you must use the best terms you can in wet: wee recommend you to be as frugall as you can, as also in your Present to-Fuckrula Cawn if there be a necessity to give him any.

When the Dutchess arrive will you wee would have you not to detain her-

Wee approve your takeing in Capt: Vernon as an Assistant to the storekeeper, but wee think the allowance you give is a little of the largest, consider[ing] how go d an employment he has besides.

Wee have paid the severall Bills you drew upon us amounting to peices of 8/8 seven Thousand eight hundred forty six and one sooka.

Wee commend your timely Mediat[ion in] preventing that rupture web: threatned you by the [depra]dation of a Dupatty up the river, who you say [took up]a family of one of the Neighbouring Towns, weh: wee [hope] you have taken care to see restor'd.

Wee observe the good character you give Raja Macoota, being sincere in our Masters Interest, to whom wee would have you give all manner of encouragement, as also to those, by whose means you may not only secure a Present but a future

Interest.

The unhappy fate of the Dutch att Indrapore, who you say are all cutt off, wee hope will caution you how you putt any manner of confidence in the Nati [ves] who will be ready to do the like to you, if you give th[em] an oppertunity,

and had the Letter reach'd the hands of the Dutch, so as to preserve their lives, from which you must not have expected on any occasion a suitable [reply].

Wee observe for what end you have entertaine'd 30 Mallays, and wee are of your opinion, that ['tis] much cheaper to maintain a place when once poss[ssed

than to | regain itt after tis lost.

Wee are sorry that wee can't send you supplys for the carrying on the civill, and millitary [ . . . ] as your circumstances require, but hope the comp[any] who can do itt much cheaper from England ha[s] plentifull supplys of all sorts,

Whereas formerly we compell'd [ . . ] soldiers to go hence to serve in . . . idesert the [a line torn] incouragement [ your parts, which[ their pay to two Pagodas pr: month, and [are endeavouring] to gett a Portugueez Padre to come up [by the Advi] ce Frigot, who will be dispatched to you the [begining] of next month, and hope shall prevaile with some familys to accompany him, and shall if possible gett you a cairurgeon to come upon that ship.

Wee observe the reason you give for pepper falling short in your parts of what itt has formerly, occasioned by many applying themselves to the Planting of ontton, which you must discourage by all prudent means whatever, or otherwise your

settlement will be but of little use in few years.

Wee observe the particular account you give of your settlements, with the quantitys of pepper they produce but you say the badness of the barrs, renders itt dangerous and allmost impossible to ship it of; there are no places where the barrs are so very bad, but that att some time of the year they are tollerable, when the pepper should be brought off and deposited att the convenient place on your Coast for shipping off and how to send you Mussoolas, and Chellingals hence wee cant imagin, and then ti's impossible to prevaile wth: the Boatemen to come upon them; it haveing been often attempted but to no purpose.

Wee have and shall send you all manner of supplys wee can procure by this Vessell, and the Advice Frigot, att this time here are no slaves to be bought on this Coast, only three Coffrees wee accidentally meet with, but wee have wrote to Bengall to send some [if possible] here [ . . ] this Vessell can [assaign . . ] particulars of which is here inclosed, with [Copys of L]etter to York Fort so that this Vessell to [uch first] att your Fort, you may take out

what you [want,] but not so as to streighten those att York Fort.

The Cotton Romalls are doubtless meant by the Company the chey Romalls to be made of that squareness they order, but Sarcergunty Romalls are particularly forbid, so itt must certainly be the Bengall sorts, and lett it lessen the Contract what itt will, you must keep to the Compa\*: orders, therefore send no more-Izarees Demitees, nor a peice of any other sorts than what mentioned in the Companys List.

Wee have severall times had the same news here that Sr: William Norris had

got a Phirmaund, but alwaies in a few days contradicted.

Mulla Mahomud Backers Debtor lived at S': Thoma, and not in this place, otherwise wee would have served him in what he desires.

The Codges Watch wee received, and so soon as mended shall be returned

to you.

Wee observe what you write about your two head Merchants, who have undertaken an Investment for the new Company, which you should endeavoured to have prevented by all means imaginable and when an oppertunity presents, be sure make them sensible of their infidelity.

Wee received the papers the President for the new [Comp]anv sent you [concerning] Mr Du [ . . . ] in which you [ . . . ] unha [ . . . . ] Woolston, who was our Companys servant [ . . . ] ed to them. The President here acquainted us [that he wrote] you about itt, and itt was unanimously [agreed] that you should protect him, and wee are glad he came upon the

Wee have reason to fear there is a war wth: ffraunce therefore order you to avoid speaking with any ship att sea, and that you Keep your ship allways in a posture of defence, Wee wish you a good Voyage and date these in ffort St: George this 25th: day October 1701.

Wee dispatched the Dutchess yesterday who took in 1459 bales amounting to Pags: 150617: 24: 3 but by reason of the uncertainty of the weather web: pro-

mised not to be very good [she sailed without an Invoice].

By the quantity of bales that ship has taken in, you may guess what streights wee shall be under for the Bedford's Loading and therefore expect that your Merchants will not contribute less towards it than 1000 bales.

Wee received yours the 15th: May via Vizagapatam, and that of the 4th: and 12th: August pr. the Advice Frigot, with Invoice and bill Ladeing &ca. papers as pr: List of the Pacquett, which ship arrived here not till the 8th: past Month.

Wee observe what you write about the Seymour's Guns, The produce of the two sold, President's Beard remitted home on the Chamber's Frigot att the request of the President here, who intends to do the same, when the rest can be

sold and accordingly wee have wrote the Company by the Dutchess.

wee have left towards loading of the Bedford att this time is not above fifty [a line lost] leave [ . . . ] [cons]ider wh[at frei]ghts wee [ . . . ] [When] the Advice ffrigot returned from you [ . . . ] had neither water nor provisions on board [to pr]osecute her intended Voyage for the West Coast, so t'was the 25 past before wee dispatch'd her to Fort St: David's where she was to take in 200 bales and then proceed to York Fort to fill up with pepper for England, but soon after her arrivall att Cuddalore there arriseing a very great storm and he not putting out to sea as ordered from hence was drove ashore between that place and Porto Novo the treasure she had on board (upwards of £ 1000) wee hear is saved and hopes of saveing the bales which was then about 70, but the Loss of stores, and dissapointment att the West Coast will be a considerable prejudice to the Company, the particulars how the ship was lost and what the Damage will be, wee have not yet received.

The Persian that came up with Sr: Charles Eyre belonging to the Phousdar of Hugly in few days after his arrivall sett out upon his Journey, and dureing his stay here was not guilty of any extravagancy as wee over heard, and accord-

ingly the President has answered his letter weh: comes inclosed.

The 28th past here arrived the Pembrook Frigot belonging to this Port from Madapoll<sup>m</sup>: who soon after comeing over that barr meett wth: the Catherine a new Companys ship about 200 Tons who left England the latter end of Aprill, when y\*: Commanders says wee and the Dutch had 125 men of warr in the Downes, and that our sea Port towns were full of Land forces, every day expecting [a line lost] parliament were [ . . . g] to unite [the two] Comp: and that M\*: Sam [wel Sh]epherd was in the Tower, wee daily expect Letters from Metchlepatam, when hope to have a more particular account of Europe news, so have ordered as these Peons calls att Metchlepatam that the Cheife and Councill there, remit you all the news they hear.

Our last Letters from Suratt are of the 27th: August wherein they advise that the Generalls &ca: confinement were stricter than formerly by means of the new Company's Ambassadour, and Consull stireing up people to complain against them, the former endeavouring att the Camp, no less than to fix the Pyracies upon us, and to extirpate our Master's Interest out of the Mogulls Dominions, to effect which he has offered great sums of Money, but as yet all to no purpose, Wee also inclose some news that was in a particular Letter which wee have reason to credit, tho' the Generall &ca: says nothing of itt web: wee admire at,

Wee take notice what you write of the new Company's People haveing paid Custom in the Mint, which wee likewise beleive will be very difficult to be gott off since, as you say, 'tis entered in the King's books.

Our last to you was of the 25th: Septembr: Copy of which wee have since

sent by French Cosseds and here inclose another.

As advised before wee dispatched the Dutchess the 9 Instant, haveing but that morning filled her up, when [itt blew] fresh, and a prospect of [a line torn] not stay for the Invoice if he saw itt [as] [ . . . ] blew which he and his Officers being of Opinion itt would he sailled that night without the Invoice so have sent itt here directed to the Company, which wee desire you'l forward by the first ship, with orders to putt itt aboard the Dutchess if they mett her, suposeing that if itt be a warr, to meet their ships att St: Helena where they will be stoped some time till all expected be arrived.

If this arrives with you before the dispatch of the Bedford, wee beleive t'would not be amiss since there's so great a probability of a warr if you added a Thousand or fifteen hundred bags more of salt Petre to the three Thousand wee formerly wrote you for that so wee may have store lye ready here on all

Wee received yours of the 28th: August with Invoice, and Bill ladeing &c. papers according to List by the Dutchess, who arrived here the 8th of last Month, being all the letters from you since the 8th: June for which wee can't but censure you Guilty of great neglect, for that wee heard itt rumoured up, and down the Country, that your place was in troubles whereof you never advised us, thô pri-

vate people could have an account of the same.

You say the Dutch were the Fomenters of itt, and stirred up the Rajahs to do what they did, but whether itt be true or false, wee must say you have always hitherto found out some excuse or other to frustrate our expectations, as to your Investments, and more particularly at this time, for wee are all surprized att your sending no more than 118 bales, when the President here shewed us the Cheifs Letter in May last which says there was then one hundred bales then in the ffactory and the old remains near cleared and that there should come up in September no more, is the admitation of us all which makes us conclude in short that you do not deal fairly with the Camp\*: and that their money is applyed to other uses than carrying on their Investments, wherefore wee must and will apply a speedy, and effectuall remedy.

At the begining of the year wee observe wee have [. . .] you large

Promises but [a line torn]

[By] reason of the bad weather, and y': great distance the Dutchess Lay'd off shore wee did not dispatch her till yesterday, who deceived us very much in her Burthen, for whereas wee expected about eleven hundred bales would have filled her, she has taken in 1459 the Invoice amounts to Pag': 150,617: 24:3 so that wee have not att this time above 50 bales of Goods by us, by which you may guess w': readyness wee shall be in to loade that great ship the Bedford, by whom wee expect, and order you to make full returns as you promise, and see that the greatest part or all is in Longcloth, and salampores, and not in such Betteelas as you have now sent, being both dear, and Course.

You have promised us in your last that soon after, you would dispatch to us your books and give us an account how the affairs of the Country stood, of which to this day wee have not heard one word from you, tho' Letters are frequently

received from private persons in your place.

Mr: (Iwen wee hear is dead who you say owed your Merchants 500 Rupees woh: wee hope your Cheif took care to see paid them, and stoped itt out of his

ffreight for Paddy on Mr: Owen's Vessell to Metchlepatam.

Wee hear there's a new Camp': ship arrived att Maddapollam weh: left England in April last; by what news, she has brought that wee have allready heard of, wee believe there is now a warr wth: Fraunce, the particulars wee have wrote the Cheif and Councill att Metchlepatām to advise you, that [ship] also confirm [. . .]

[Wee expect] you give as quick a dispatch as possible to the Bedford ordereing her to call att Metchlepatam, and nott att Madapollam and hope you will not lade on her less than 800 bales, without which, tis impossible to dispatch her this

Wee observe what you write about the sheets, and Longcloth that remained in the washers hands at Maddapollam, which wee would by all means if possible to avoid the takeing them in, for t'is more the advantage of our Masters to return their ships dead ffreighted, than send' em [. . .]

[Wee] are not a little concerned to see how often you deviate from our orders, particularly in that of your Investments, by takeing in such great quantitys of those Goods that the Company writes they gett nothing by, and others they soo possitively prohibit. The Company orders no more than 1000 pieces of Dimeties, which you have augumented to 2700 the Cost amounting to 8,775 Pags: and then they positively forbid sacergunty Romalls, whereof you have taken in 2,000 pieces, which amounts to Pags: 4,500 so yt: there is near 1/3 of your Contract in Goods that ys: Company will not see the prime Cost, and how they will aprove of such management you may easily guess.

As for Mr: Lapie if he pleases to come hither, and accept of any service at the West Coast, wee shall readily imploy him, all the ffactorys on this Coast being suffeciently filld by the Compreservants. President Pitts paper was so trivial

that wee wonder you took any notice of itt.

Wee hope by this the troubles of your place is over, and that you'l hasten your Merchants and washers so as to make a plentifull provision for the Bedford.

Wee payd Capt: Raymond for the Vinegar you mentioned Pagt: 6:14.

Wee wrote you in our former Letter [a line torn] any money till [...]

the roads being [tro]ublesome and the rivers unpassable, so that your Mercht must find out some way or other to gett bills wen: if they can procure you may

draw on us sufficient to compleat your, and Maddapollam contracts.

Wee considering that since the Comp<sup>a</sup>: has forbid any Investment in fine Long Cloth and sheets which was the Cheif of what was provided att Madapollam, that the Investment there will be so small as not to be able to bear the charge of a ffactory, wherefore wee would have you upon receipt of this, to draw that ffactory to Metchlepatam, and leave only a writer, and what servants shall be suffecient to secure the ffactory and as often as any buisiness requires lett the Cheif of Metchlepatam or some other fitting person go to dispatch it, and accordingly wee have wrote M<sup>r</sup>: Frewen &c<sup>a</sup>:

Wee wrote you in our former Letter to procure if possible one hundred bales of Ordinar's: Long Cloth, hopeing you'l provide 300 bales at least of all sorts of

Goods for the Loading the Bedford.

The 9th: Instant wee dispatched the Dutchess, who deceived us mightily in takeing in 3 or 400 bales more than wee expected, haveing laden on her 1,459 bales, the Invoice amounting to Pags: 1,50,617:24:3 so there's not left here more than about fifty bales, and therefore shall be putt to a very great plunge to gett Goods for the Janry: ship

Wee hoped ere this to have received what news by the Catherine who Capt: Wealy mett with, but brought us an imperfect accot: [a line forn] nor did they [...] whether they heard of the Howland, but told him the Scepter was lost in the chanell, what news that ship brings pray remitt to Vizagapatam, and Ben-

gall win: the accompanying pacquets for those places.

Wee have received both yours of the 12th: and 13th: Instant, and shall examin into the manner of the Loss of the ship, when the Commander, and Officers come hither.

Wee observe what you write about the wreck being bury'd in the sand, and can't think but if proper means were used, all might be saved that was in her, about which wee would have you consult with the most proper persons whether blowing up or cutting her to peices may answer that end and speedily put it in execution, but in regard to the owners, be sure consult the Captain, and take his consent therein and for whatever is saved belonging to the owners, lett Mr: Haynes take itt into his Custody to prevent embezlement, but not to dispose of anything without the Cammanders consent under his hand.

Wee know not what orders as yet to give relateing to the seamen belonging to the ship and souldiers designed for Bencoolen, the Madrass Pinace being so very small, that she'd be able to take in but very few, of we's: lett there be two or three English souldiers go, and the slaves if possible, out more especially the Coffree, and provisions layd in for them for two months, and wee order you to ship on her the ten chests of treasure saved out of the wreck, and what else saved that she can take on board consigning the same to the Dep: Governour &ca: att [York] ffort.

Wee accept of Mr: Collier's offer of going Master of the Madrass Pinace for the West Coast, and order you to impress him three Months Pay att Twelve Pagodas pr: Mensem, and have entertained Thomas Standly as mate, who now brings the Vessell to your Port, which wee would have you to dispatch, with all imaginable expedition for that if possible she is to fetch Acheen to advise of some

Wee have ordered this Vessell if possible to fetch Acheen, being to send thence advices to Malaca to caution our China ships of severall considerable Pyrats: being abroad, but if she meets wth: difficulty to fetch that Fort, the Master is ordered directly for yours.

We have lately had ill news of the Diamond who is seized att Judda on pre-

tence of Pyracy and Messrs: Wheeler and Cockroft in Prison there.

Wee have ordered our Dep: Governour, and Councill att fort St: David to Impress you three Months pay att Twelve Pag': Pr. Mensem, and have entertaind here Thomas Standley your mate, and payd him three Months, att Eight Pags and ordered to be putt on board you as many Passengers as you can conveniently take in, for which end you must have great regard to yor: water and quantity of Provisions for that you may happen to have a long Passage.

Wee would have you use your uttmost endeavours to fetch Acheen where you are to deliver a Letter directed to M': ffrancis Delton and another lett': directed to the Govern': of Malaca, but in case M': Delton should be dead or gone from that place, Wee then order you to open Mr: Delton's letter, and put in execution what therein desired, concerning web: you had best advise with what English you find at that place, the Purport of web: Letter is to desire Mr: Delton to send with all Expedition, the Governours Letter to Malacca being to caution our China ships of severall considerable Pyratts being abroad, we's is of very great consequence to this Port, and therefore wee shall esteem itt a valuable peice of servicein you, if you answer our Expectation in this matter.

If in your endeavouring to fetch Acheen you meett with bad weather or contrary winds wee would not have you spend much time in beating for itt but goe directly to Bencoolen, and if itt should be your misfortune to meet with any Pyrats, be sure take care that none of our letters fall into their hands, that you sink them over board, or put them into some [a line torn].

Wee have ordered this Vessell to remain on the West Coast or return hither

as the Dep: Gov': &c': of York Fort shall think fitt.

You must receive aboard what the Dep: Govern: and Councill att ffort S: David shall ship on you, in which wee would have you as Expeditious as possible, for that 'tis late in the year considering where you are bound, Dated in ffort S': George this 18th; day November 1701.

Our last to you was on the 20th: past Copy of which comes inclosed, since

have received none from you.

On the 25th: Past wee dispatched the Advice ffrigot to ffort St: David in order to proceed to the West Coast as formerly advised but after she had taken in between 60, and 70 bales, there arose a very violent storm, wch: put her ashore between Porto Novo and ffort St: David, the treasure for the West Coast and most part of the bales were saved so that wee compute the Loss to be about six or seven Thousand Pagodas, besides the dissapointment to the West Coast.

The Dutchess rode it out here at a great distance weh: very much detarded our Loadeing her wee not compleating her Loading till the 9th: Instant she takeing in 1454 Bales, her Invoice amounting to Pagodas 1,50,717: 24: 3 when wee dispatched off the Capt: desireing him to stay for the Invoice if there was no probability of bad weather, but that night itt blowing fresh, and a great sea comeing in he sailed without an Invoice, weh: wee here inclose desireing you'l forward to the Company by the first Oppertunity, and have sent another to Bengall though wee are apt to beleive that if it be a warr all ships will be stoped att S': Helena to goe home in a body with a squadron of men of warr.

4. Wee hope to dispatch the Bedford in ffebrs: though shall be hard putt to

it, ship Dutchess haveing taken in 3 or 400 bales more than wee expected.

5 Wee lately received Letters from Anjengo adviseing of a Pyrat, went supposed he who[m] Capt: Fye chased, haveing taken a rich ship of Abdull Gopher of Deman, went: wee fear will create new troubles to you. Mr: Braburn also advises of the misfortune of the Diamond, he being informed thereof by a Copy of a Letter of the Supra Cargoe, and Commanders sent by Mr: Penning from Callicut, copy of went: comes inclosed the wee doubt not but you have had it sent you long ere this.

This misfortune wee can't but impute to the Villany of Sr: Nicholas Waile who as you informed us [a line torn] Government of Surat that our Company, and their fractors were the Pyrats, and wee have reason to believe that he has put Hussen Amud upon writeing to his Country to seize this ship, and wee fear another

ship the Acheen Merchant att Moco will meet wit: the same fate, and if a speedy remedy be not found out to make Judda render satisfaction, wee must expect all our shiping will be seized in Moors Ports throughout India.

7. The Loss of this ship and those taken lately, and formerly by the Arabs, makes great murmureing amongst the Inhabitants of this place who think it very hard to pay Customs, Anchorage, Tonage for passes, and other Taxes and have

[no?] manner of protection.

Wee being informed that Judda [ . . . ] the grand sign<sup>r</sup>: the President, and Council &c<sup>a</sup>: Inhabitants of this place have wrote a Letter con-] the grand sign<sup>r</sup>: the cerning this matter to our King Ambassadour, att Constantinople, and his Consull att Grand Cayro, The President has also wrote a Letter to the Governour of Moco, and to the Bassa of Judda requireing of the latter immediate satisfaction, all web: comes inclosed in a Pacquet to Messre: Wheeler and Cockroft att Judda, when: wee desire your Hon: &c": will be pleased to forward to them by the first and safest conveyance, haveing remitted Duplicates, and Triplicates to Bengall, and Callicut to be sent thence if any oppertunity offers.

Wee also request of your Hon': &c': not only in our own behalves, but also for all the Inhabitants of this place, that if Judda ship should [be?] in your Port, that you would be pleased to represent this notorious Injustice of the Bassa to the Government of Surat, and procure if possible an arrest to the ship till full satisfaction be made us or otherwise could wee be timely advised, wee would be prepareing to waylay her return, for wee must and will have reparation from that Port or those that belong to itt lett the consequence be what it will and doubt not but wee shall have your uttmost assistance in procureing it, Copy of all our letters on this Occasion, wee here inclose for your peruseal.

About the 26th: past Month there arrived at Metchlepatam the Catherine a new Company's ship who left England the latter end of Aprill, and brings out the news as p': the paper inclosed, and says that just upon her comeing away 'twas, reported the ffrench were marched to Mastreicht web: had obliged the Dutch to pull their sluces, that there was a ship of our Masters about 150 Tunns ready to sail for this Port, and that the two Compas: were at greater Variance than ever,

and no probability of their uniteing.

Wee desire you'l please to send us by the first snip bound to this Port the Quantity of wheat wee wrote for last year, the disappointm': of weh: has putt us to hard shifts for good bread and that you'l send us four times the quantity of Good new and fresh Garden seeds, for that the discouragement our Inhabitants has mett win: of late in trade makes 'em inclined to turn adamites. - Cargoe belongs to the proprietors and none else, nay by our law, there can be [no] forfeit if a cat or dog be in the Vessel, and that [the] Custom is practised in Bengall, Surat, and as much as amongst the wild Arabs, and they have as g[ood] a pretence to any Goods in our ffactorys as th[ey] have to the least thing in or belonging to th[at] ship, and according the President has wrote [to] the Nabob and Duan about it.

If you cant procure bills you must advise us, and wee will send you money with a strong Guard by land.

Wee shall bind your consultations as you desire.

As to what you write about the souldiers, and sailors being an extraordinary charge to your place, tis not to be avoided till the turn of the Monson, and then you may send those you have not occasion for hither, for should they not be Entertained and permitted to straggle up and downe the Country greater inconveniences would attend it than the charge amounts to.

Wee received yours of the 8th: Instant with an account of what was saved out of the wreck of the Company's and private Persons.

Wee have payd your three bills for Eight Thousand Pag: as you advised of in the aforesaid Letters.

As to what you write us concerning the Dutch haveing lately defrauded our Company of their Customs on a parcel of Pappys in un[der] valueing them, wee would have you represent it [ . . . ] one full Custome according to the Tenor of their [ . . . ] and for the future you must have a stricter Eye [on] them, and keep to the resolutions in your Consultations of the 14<sup>th</sup>: September last, but if possible avoid [tra]velling w<sup>th</sup>: them at this time, for though they [are] freinds w<sup>th</sup>: us in Europe to preserve their own Country, yet by large experience, wee know they are profest Enemies to us in trade, especially in [these] parts.

Wee payd your two bills to Sun[ka] Rama of four Thousand Pagodas as advised in yours of the 7th: past and another bill for one Thousand Page: advised

in yours of the 11th: Ditto.

Wee wrote to our Masters by the H[igh]land about the Engineer, from whom wee expect and answer p': first ship, till when shall deferr dischargeing him.

Wee take notice of the Monthly in [voice] of the Beetle and Tobacco, weh:

hope by your [order] and management will increase.

Wee approve of your disposeing y.: Lead at six Pags: pr: Candy and wish you could put off all the rest at the same price, wee haveing sold none under in this place.

Wee received your Generall Letter to the Company which was sent them in

our Pacquet.

If the Neckcloths are not lost or shiped off, we would have them knotted,

tho' it putts you to the charge of rewashing them.

Wee have before advised you that y': screws will not be ready to send you to pack brown cloth which bales if you send early, we will doe them here, and if you have other cloth to employ your washers, the sooner you do it the better, for should you deferr it till the last, you may chance to have your cloth spotted in the bringing in which must by no means be packed brown but this we leave wholly to your discretion and good management.

You may double the quantity of blew Cloth, but it must be a deep dye, and such as the Dutch sends for Europe, and may also lay by a quantity of cloth fitting to be packed brown at last, if you have not time to wash it, for wee must use all means immaginable to fill the Bedford, more especially haveing lately had letters from Vizagapatam, from whence wee expect little or noe goods towards it.

You may remember that there were five Prisoners that the President brought away with him, which had been committed by M.: Fraser for a murther they had done without our Bounds for which wee once intended to send them to the West Coast, but it being represented to us that they have relations capable of prejudicing the Comp.: affairs wee thought fitt to detain them here, who have proposed giveing five hundred Pagodas to the Company to obtain their liberty, in order to which wee gave leave to three of them to come to your place to raise the money amongst their ffreinds, who wee hear you have clapt up in Prison so desire on receipt of this, to sett them at liberty if you have no material reason to the contrary, for the murder was committed out of our bounds, there was no obligation on us to trouble ourselves with them.

Here is Ensign Jolly has complained to the President that Robert Tomes has publickly aspersed him, that through his instigation he committed here a most notorious theft, into the touth of which wee desire you to enquire, and if you find him guilty punish him severely for wee are well satisfyed in the integrity of Jolly,

who hath given large testimonys thereof on several Occasions.

Wee wait with great impatience the arrivall of your Generall books, ours

being kept open for them.

Last night the President received Letters of the 23°: past from Anjengo, adviseing that the night before Capt: Robert Hudson arriv'd there in our Comps: ship for Surat: he left England in June, and brings the following news, that the [Parliament] was inclined to disolve the new Company, Our Masters haveing offered to advance the two Millions lent on the act, that Mr: Shepherd, was close prisoner in the Tower, and six others of the new Company in Newgate for bribeing of Parliament men; Kidd was hanged and made no confession; great preparations made by us and the Dutch for a war who wrote our King a letter, which was ordered to be printed by the House of Lords setting forth their deploreable condition, Copy of which comes inclosed.

The Commons had petitioned the King to banish his presence for ever, my Lord Portland, my Lord Summers, and three other Lords, Capt: Hudson stayed

not half an hour, the Pyrat lying within 10 leagues of him.

Another small ship of our Masters called the Nathaniell Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hill bound for Surat fell in the 13<sup>th</sup> past in sight of the Pyrat, who sent his boat with ten men to see who he was, which the Pyrat detained and chased the ship, but lost her in the night, so tis supposed that Cap<sup>t</sup>: Hill is gone to Zelone.

The Emperour has had a Battle with the ffrench in Millan, and gained the

Victory.

Wee desire you to send us up as soon as possible two Hundred Weight of

English white Lead if procurable.

- 1. Your long expected Letter of the 24th: Novr: was received the 12th: Inst: with the accompanying papers as pr: List, and observe the excuse you make for writing but once in six months.
- 2. Wee are obliged to believe what you write about the uncertainty of your Country Government, and the frequent Vicessitudes that happens, went if true must of necessity be very prejudicial to trade, but one thing were take notice of

that the Government and Country is very well settled when you write us for money to carry on an Investment but the troubles allwaies happen so as to disappoint us of the quantity of Goods wee might reasonable expect from you, and likewise prevents your performing your usuall large promises on that subject.

- 3. Wee never had more need of your assistance than at this time, and find wee never saw less hopes than by this Letter you sent us, so that if these misfortunes are not speedily remedied, by better management or a thorow settlement of your Government (knowing not w<sup>cb</sup>: of the two to impute it too) wee shall have it under our consideration to remove your flactory for that hitherto, what assistance you give towards loading the Companys ships, is meer chance, and not to be depended on.
- 4. Your Generall books not comeing has detarded the closeing of ours, and though Mr. Stables was indisposed others might have finished those small books

Your Investment of 20,000 Pags: you say comes in pretty plentifully, but as you stuff it with an undue proportion of Betteelas, twill amount but to a small number of bales and instead of rectifying that Error, you have made it much worse in making a new Contract for 12,000 Pags: all in Bettelas and if Bieddy Narran &cs: papers be true, were are to expect no other than Betteelas this year wsh: will tend more to the prejudice of the Company, than if the money had lain Idle as you say in the Chest or returned it hither, for, wt: can you imagine the Company shall do wth: such a quantity of Betteelas, considering how Ordinary they are, and dear besides, in plain they'l never see their prime Cost nor will their ships be loaden.

Wee have also by us above 40 bales of your Betteelas sent by the Dutchess, which could not be washed before her departure.

You say you have made a compleat effort at a small charge, and thô never so small yo': Investments will not bear it, as Buddy Narran and you carry them on much less a Number of men, and a Quantity of amunition, the sending of which wee'l consider of ere wee putt the Company to that Charge.

Wee shall Load your ship with Rice as you desire and wonder she is not yet arrived with: us.
