The President soon after dyed, and the China Ship arrived, who instead of considerable supply brought but a very small one, which Mr. Tillar payd your Petitioners who again intreated him to take off of 'em the rest of the Goods which he refused then to doe but gave his word [he] would on the arrivall of the first Europe Shipping, and some time after acquainted 'em of the Union of both Companys and of the arrivall of some of their Ships at Chinapatam, whither he say'd he must be obliged to goe for to get money wherewith all to clear your Petitioners Debts, This was not a little surprising to your Petitioners more especially upon their heaving of his design [homes] from this Place, [Woh. . .] endeavouring, [. . .] shore by applying themselves, [. . .] which was not harkend, [. . .] shore by applying themselves, [. . .] home without the consent or [. . .] Petitioners, who would not [. . .] the Payment of the whole [. . .] that he did pay.

Your Petitioners ever held an honourable [position] for the Company, and have now been here two years at vast Charge and expences, whereas had they remained at Metchlepatam and secured Mr. Tillard from stealing away they could without halfe the difficulty and trouble they have all this time been procured their money, or satisfaction for it, which your Hon'. &c. would have been compelled to have given 'em Mess's. The great fame of your equal distribution of Justice to all such as are injured [and] wronged (who apply themselves to you for releif) brought

me hither, humbly to represent my case to you and to lay before you the most notorious and unparalleld injustice done me by Capt Alexander Hamilton, and Mulpa the Dutch Broaker at Cotcheen, as by the particulars I beg leave here to incert, corrobarated by strong and undeniable evidence do's appear.

I having sometime resided in Cochin was in the year 1704 employed by Mulpa. the Dutch Broaker there as Comander and Supra Cargoe of his Ship Josiah, to proceed on a Voyage to the Northward of that Place, but he being Indebted considerably to the Commodores Widdow, and others, who threaten'd to Attach his Ship and Effects, and perceiving that I had an Interest with his Creditors prevailed with me to solicite 'em in his behalfe, who upon my application to 'em, consented that their severall Debts should proceed on the Ship I embarqued upon provided I would be security for the Payment thereof on my returne, this I readily Agreed to and Entered into Bonds, accordingly, and for the securing myself, Mulpa was to Lade on board certain Merchandize exceeding his Debt to me, and the sums for which I was security and to give me a Bond upon the bottom of said Ship Josiah for 142454 Cotchin Fanams with the advance of 14 4P Cent upon her returne, which he executed as by his Bond bearing Date December the 8th Anno 1704 do's appear, and in his Instructions consigns and makes over to me the said Ship and Cargoe for the due payment of my own, and the Debts I stood engaged for, and Laded aboard Goods to the Amount of 29824. Rupees as & Invoice, with which I proceeded to Suratt, and there unloaded the Ship and delivered the Cargoe in the hands of Benadash, who I took for my Broaker for the disposing thereof; but upon the arrivall of Capt Hamilton at the Rivers mouth he insinuated to me, that the Ship Josiah being out of repair 'twas highly necessary to carry her into the River to be fitted, and that he and Benadash had an authentick Power from Mulpa to contract for a dispose of any Goods, or effects of the said Mulpa, or any of his Ships whenever they mett them, and their Voyage to alter at their pleasure as specified and acknowledged in their Bonds dated April 28th: 1705, but I insisting upon the Respondentia Bond being due upon the Ships arrivall at Cochin Captain Hamilton solemnly protested that if I would bring the Ship, into the river, and deliver the Cargoe to him and Benadash they would immediatly discharge Mulpas Bonds pretending 'twould be much to his Interest, which inducements made me consent thereto; but trusting too much upon the faith and honesty of that man Hamilton, did not at that time take any writing from under his hand supposing to have had the money in a day or two; I waited some time before I asked him for it, & 'twas about 8 days after desired him to make up accounts he still put me off by telling me 'twas presently done, and that I need not trouble myself about but consulting with some Gentlemen there, Mr. Livesay more particularly told me, he wished Hamilton had not a design to trick me, which made me the more earnest upon him, and being some thing warm in pressing him to a conclusion in his own house denyed he owed me any thing, or had any thing to do with me, upon which finding all other means fail, and no justice to be had from the country Government, I apply'd myself to Sr. John Gayer who could by no means prevail with him to redeliver me the Cargoe for discharging the Debts here [to] before mentioned, and with much perswasion was brought to agree jointly with Benedash to give me a Bond [to] Indemnifie me for the delivery of said Ship an I Cargoe and for the due payment of my Bond and other demands if Mulpa did not dicharge them to my satisfaction, this was all I could obtain, and being late in the year, and the Buckhurst the last Ship there, intended for Cochin, did earnestly press. Capt Hamilton to take my passage on her, having some affairs of moment to negotiate there, but no perswasion cod prevail with him, nor no consideration I could affer to take me about instead of which offer to take me aboard, instead of which, upon his arriving there spread the most Scandalous report of me, as malice could invent, and that I was run away for England, and never to be expected there again, as to my great amazement I heard upon my arrival then about eight or ten months after, where demanding my money of Mulpa he denyed Payment thereof, alledging Hamilton had discharged the Bond. I waited there some time in hopes of meeting him, which I did, and there demanding the payment of his Bond, he utterly denyed that either he himself or Jointly with.

Benedash ever gave me a Bond, and persisted therein, till such time I produced it, The Courts of Justice indeed gave me judgement against them but the Comodore waved the compelling 'em to pay me, alledging that Mulpa owed the Company a great deal of money, and that their Debt must be first satisfied; I had an intention to detain Hamilton ashore, but in my hearing (after my producing his Bond to him) he ordered Mupla to pay the sum but no sooner was he aboard, when he most fraudulently countermanded the order, and charged him not to pay me a penny, he being gone, and finding no other remedy, I returned again for Surat in hope of meeting with him there, but missing of him, and finding the George a ship belonging to the said Mulpa and Hamilton, bound for this Port, am come to your Hon'. &c upon her to crave your justice and pray an Attachment upon the Ship, and all effects therein of what nature soever belonging or appertaining to the said Hamilton, or Mulpa towards the discharging their Debts to me, and [repairing] the irrepairable injurys done me as to [Loss] of time and expence of 4000. Rupees &c in prosecuting the recovery thereof. This may it please your Hon is a faithfull representation of my case, and for ye due proof thereof, humbly beg leave that reference may be had to the severall Authentick Bonds, Certificates, Instructions, and Attestations I have ready to produce; which humbly offering to your Hon. &c. prudent consideration, I am with all deference

My case being particular causes this second aplication to your Hon. &c. in which after humbly beging your pardon for the trouble, I crave leave to remonstrate, that notwithstanding the Rt. Hon ble. Companys orders against paying the West Coast Bills, yet as all accidents cannot be foreseen by the wisest, nor prevented by the ablest Men, The unfortunate condition of Bencoolen by the miscarriage of the Edward and Dudley was such that without a Supply it could not have susbisted, made me willing to serve the Rt. Hon ble. Company in a case of soe extream necessity and (with submission) I cannot but observe, that as the Company thought the place worth their support, or they would never have sent Ships and Servants thither: so I could neither answere it to God, their Honours, nor my own conscience, to let that Place be lost to the Company, when it was in my power to have assisted it, I leave it to your Hon. &c. better understanding what they or you would have thought of me if I should have refused my poor assistance in so needfull a Juncture.

Secondly That the Ship Morning Starr which is sold whereof there was three Owners and Mr. Juxon one Third, which Amot. is hereby ordered to be annexed to the sum to be divided among [his Creditors], and that what Goods came on her [was despatch]ed to Messrs. Humbly Sheweth.

Whereas upon the first settlement of the English in this place, the liberty was Granted to Your Petitioners Casts to have their streets and habitations from Tom Clarkes Gate and the Bridge Gate both within and without [and the Left] hand Cast was Granted from Mud Point Gate, both within and without; yo Two Streets which was kept and observed by each [Cast] till broaken by the troubles which happend to the ffrench at St. Thoma, at which time severall people retired hither, and without knowledge or permission from the Government built their houses one amongst another in both the Pattas, which being complained of to Sr. William Langhorn, and the ill Effects of the falling out of the two Casts being taken into consideration; was ordered that they should not live together, but that yo Right hand people should goe to the place that was first Granted them to Inbabit, and the Left hand people to theirs; Accordingly to which order the right hand people did obey, and likewise some of the Left hand people, but others did desire leave to stay till the Raines [was] over, which was Granted but after to retire to their own Streets, which to this day they have not done; but rather have increached more upon your Petitioners liberty.

Likewise the Weddings that was made by the left hand people that lived amongst your Petitioners was ordered to [be] kept alwayes in their own Streets; but if [it] happen'd that they did not make any Weddings in your Petitioners Streets it was to be done privately in the [ir] own houses, without any musick or any such seremony. But they now very unreasonable desire your Petitioners streets, which never was done before, and they having complained to your Hon* but upon what Account or reason [we do not kn]owe: Now the Streets wherein the Stones are Erected there are about one hundred of your Petitioners Houses, and severall Wells, Churches, Gardens and Choultrys, all which belong to your Petitioners the Right hand people, being very many, being Twenty one Casts of in all of these People, we cannot tell every ones [mind] the Country People have sent Letters to us, but what they can do for us we do not know; we all liveing under your Hon* Protection, are affraid to disoblige yo* Hon* therefore stay quiet; from the beginning of the World [to] this day it never was knowne that any Government did take away your Petitioners streets and give them to the left hand Casts people, which they know to be true. Now they having made many false complaints to yo* Honour, which is the occasion of all this trouble for the Streets where the Stones are Erected are the first streets of the Right hand Casts for all strangers that come from the Country, for these Streets that your Hon*. has given to the Left hand Casts is a very great dissatisfaction to all the Right hand Cast people, Therefore your most humble Petitioners desire your Hon* would be pleased to take into, and they shall as in Duty bound.

The foregoing Consultations of Late mentions severall passages relating to the

Right hand Cast, and Left, of the former many have deserted us, and the others have locked themselves up in their houses in Town, which cheifly consisting of Boatmen, Washermen, Fishermen &c necessary handicrafts, which occasioned the Governour to sumon all his Council except Mr. Fraser, who he was jealouse had betrayed us in what we had done, as to settling the dispute between the Casts, and gave us this Instance of it that when on the 19th past he acquainted the board of the Insolence of the Parriars who went throw the left hand Street with a Wedding, and what he had done thereon, wn. immediately Mr. Fraser according to his Custom made a long senceless speech, the purport showing that he was now against what had been Transacted in Consultation [with] the Casts, which no notice was taken of, as coming from him but then the next minute the Right hand Cast delivered in their Petition which was presently read, & intirely agreed with the purport of what just before Fraser spoake, when the Governour immediatly charged him with making or reading of it, which he then denyed in great confusion, and the same was taken notice of by Messrs. Raworth and Frederick present in Council so the Gov. this day laying before the board the worst of consequences that might attend the Companys Affairs, as well as our own Persons, to have one amongst us to betray our Counsells, of which the Council being equally sensible, desired Mr. Fraser may be sent for, which was accordingly done, when he was charged with what before mentioned, & told by the Governour that it was impossible that he could make a speach so coherent with a Petition that was just after delivered in, without having made, or read it, to which he made no other defence then that we should prove it if we could; The Governour at the same time charged him with directing the Mallabar Inscription that was put upon the Stones, web. he denyed with strange asseverations and execrations but to the making or reading the Petition only a plain denyall, so after he told us he had no more to say in his defence, the Governour desired him to withdraw, which he refused

When we debated the Nature of his offence, and the ill consequences of any of the Council incourageing Petitions against our Proceedings in Generall, or such in particular as he himself seemingly agreed to, without the least hessitation to any thing that was done relating to the Casts, the Governour to prevent his doing farther mischief prest the necessity of his being suspended the Companys service ab officio et beneficio, alledging that no inconveniency could accrue from it, for that his abilitys were so in considerable that all of us know in our conciencys that he never meritted

to do, but afterwards obliged him to it.

Rice and Water from the Company, but yet with his malice, Pride, and Envy, he has often made strange progress in mischeif, and wholy uncapable of doing good: And 'tis not amiss to incert one or two passages thô foreign to this present matter, that some time past, upon a suspicion that there was a difference between the Governour and Mr. Raworth an impudent Dubash that was often trusted with Mr. Frasers whispers, came up to Mr. Raworth in his Chamber, and told him that he heard there was a difference between the Governour and him, and that he treated him as he did others, but if he would stand against him and come and Joine with Mr. Fraser and his party, he was sure they would be able to suppress him, upon weh. Mr. Raworth treated him as became him, by kicking him downstairs: About Five years past here came from Goa a Theatin Padre an Englishman Milton by name, who often passed between this place and Fort St. David, and severall times came to the Govern. pressing for leave to build a Chappell here, or at Fort St. David, which he possitively refused him, considering that the worst of consequences must attend it, or that it would be to the great dislike of the Company to have an English Preist here of the Popish Religion, for that being such he ought to dye by our Law, yet nevertheless one Joseph Hiller a great consort of Mr. Fraser bought a peice of Ground here (without any leave or knowledge of the Governour) for Milton on which he immediatly erected a fabrick, after the modell of a Convent, and had made considerable progress therein before the Governour (who was going to the Garden one morning) knew anything of it, wⁿ. he immediatly sent for Padre Milton, and demanded of him how he came by that Ground, and who gave him leave to build on it, who answered Mr. Hiller bought it for him, upon which the Governour ordered him immediatly to desist from building, and by six at night to depart the place, which he accordingly did to St. Thoma, where a little time after Mr. Fraser and others went to Dinner with him, and has often been seen conversing with him at that end of the Town, and thus whenever the Governour has fround upon any one for crimes or misdemeanours, whether whitemen or Black; Tis well known they were alwayes cherished by Mr. Fraser, who has been the Pest of the Government, as well as redicule, and scum of the Place. Yet notwithstanding all before mentioned is well known to be great truths to every man that sitts at the board who desired the Governour to leave him out in the sorting summons for that he was so impurtinant and troublesome that no business could be done; yet they were Generally unwilling to suspend him the service till the Governour solemnly averred that he would sitt no more with him in Counsel, nor give his opinion in any affairs more of the Company where he was present which induced the Council unanimously to agree to suspend him the Companys service officio et beneficio till their pleasure was knowne in this matter, which the recretary is ordered to acquaint him therewith, and that we will give him a Copy of what we writ home to the Company relating to him, that so his defence and answere may goe therewith.

This morning early the Governour summoned Twelve of the Principall of the Heads of each Cast, who were shut up in a Roome to adjust matters now in dispute between the Casts, which they acquainted him about noone they had done, upon

which at Four this afternoone the Council was summoned when the Number of each Cast appeared, when unanimously and in a most Solemn manner declared they had Agreed on the following Termes. First that none but the Right hand Cast should live in the Patta comonly called the Peddeneagues Patta, Secondly That the Patta called Mootell Patta should be Inhabited by none but the Left hand Cast.

Thirdly. That whereas there are a great many of the Left hand Cast in the Peddeneagues Patta, and so likewise of the Right hand Cast in Mootell Patta, 'tis agreed that each Cast comm[ence] removeing their Houses on or before the first of December to their respective Pattas beforementioned, and that the same be all compleated on, or before the first of June One Thousand seven hundred and eight and if any that have Houses in either of the Pattas can Agree upon the Sale or Exchange thereof they are at liberty to do it, or pull down and carry the materialls to y' Patta appointed for them to live in.

Fourthly. That no Weddings by either Casts shall be made in the Streets in the Peddeneagues Patta lately in dispute between them till that Patta be wholy Inhabited by the Right hand Cast.

Fifthly. That in Mootell Patta they shall keep their Weddings there according to Custom, till the Right hand Cast are removed out of it.

Sixthly. That in neither of their Pattas beforementioned no one shall sell his House, but to one of his own Cast.

Seventhly. That whereas there are Boatmen, Laskars, & Fishermen that have their houses by the Sea syde in Mootell Patta, 'tis Agreed they remaine there as they now are, whout giving any molestation to the Left hand Cast.

Eightly. And as we ordered in Consultation of the 17th July Stones to be Erected for stinting the Limitts of the Left hand Cast making their Weddings in the Peddeneagues Patta and a sutable Inscription thereon, We do now at the request of both Casts Agree that the inscription be cutt out, but the stones remaine for such inscriptions to be made on y^m as the Governour and Council shall think fit her eafter.

To all the foregoing Articles the Governour and Council do now Agree; with which the Right hand Cast are ordered to acquaint their people that are now with drawn that they returne to their obedience without further delay, which they readily

promise to doe.

Ship Charlton Capt Oldham Comrarrived this day in the Road from Battavia, when Mr. Carey Supra Cargoe of said Ship came ashore he acquainted the Governour that before he left Battavia there was arrived Blenheim and Carlton (Lacuna) from Banjar from whence the whole Factory was come, being beat off by the Natives, who attack'd them at break of day with severall thousand; they also boarded the Ships, but were obliged to quitt them, they had lost about twenty five Europeans, but sayd they had kild severall Hundreds of the Natives.

The President as Mintmaster reports that the sixty four Chests of Treasure delivered into the Mint to be coined will be compleated this night; and that the six Chests taken ashore from the Dutchess be sent down in Dollars which by Reasons of the raines we have had, and the troubles about the Casts they could not compleat it; Ordered that the Warehousekeeper to Load the Rupees and Treasure on board the Howland, who is to be dispatched forthwith.

Mr. William Martin Sea Customer payes into the Rt Honble United Companys Cash Two thousand Pagodas on Account Sea Customs.

Notwithstanding that all matters seem to be see fairly adjusted before us on. the 25th past between the two Casts, we have seen no good effect of it by the people returning to their duty, so the Governours ordered this day to be brought before him in Council Suraupau, Naira Verona, Sunca Ramma, and Andee Chittee, and charged them as Chief Instruments in raising the present rebellion, and the information of which he had had from one of their own Cast, who was in the Conspiracy, who say'd they had a great difficulty to stur up the Poor handicrafts, and that the Parriars who are the most numerous refused to sturr unless they sent with them one of their heads of the Cast with One Thousand Pagods to pay their subsistence, which they accordingly complyed with, & the Governour was informed who had contributed thereto, and when they proposed it to the Boatmen, Washermen, and Fishermen they likewise refused, saying they would not leave the livelyhood they for an uncertainty, but with much perswation they prevaild with them, upon giving them a Note under their hands that they would pay them in proportion for the dayes they were absent according to what they usually got here, and that they would allow Batty, or subsistance money to all that should desert us, of which the Governour had daily intelligence from St. Thoma was pay'd them, they denyed all knowing that whoever of their Cast came in against them as an Evidance was in no small danger of their life, so the aforementioned Prisoners the Governour ordered to be kept in safe custody and used sutable to their Crimes.

The Sea Customer reporting that there is a Chest in the Sea Gate Godown belonging to Mr. Hall Late Doctr. Mate of the Place, who went home on Ship Queen; Ordered that Messrs. Martin and Raworth do open the same, and sell at Public Outery wt found therein, and the Amount brought into the Companys Cash.

stand by the Agreement made in Consultation the 25th Instant, and for the Security of Suraupau etc. four of the Right hand Cast, the Pedeneague and ten Cuomitys were bound for their personall appearance.

The Governour acquainting that none that had deserted were come in since the Agreement between the two Casts, which he imputed to their fear as well as shame, so advised that a Paper might be published in the nature of a Generall l'ardon, which he now produced, and was read, and accordingly agreed thereto, and ordered to be set up on the Gates and Mettows in Gentue * and Mallabarr, and one in English at the Sea Gate, and is as Entered after this Consultation.

Whereas some wicked and ill designing people of the Right hand Cast, seduced by others as wicked in the Government, have went about for some sinister ends, to make an insurection and Rebellion in this Government, and the better to effect their hellish designs, have deluded the Poor and Ignorant with a false Notion that we the Governour and Council had favoured the left hand cast in prejudice to theirs; Whereas nothing was done by us, but by the Advice and consent of the Principall of their heads, and since this dispute has happen'd, matters have been throughly canvassed by twelve of each heads of the Cast, and all differences adjusted and finally ended before us in Council. Nevertheless we hear that some people are still [brood]ing on their ill designs to disturbe the peace and tranquility of the Government, which induces us to publish this our Orders and Intentions.

That whereas we have allwayes showed great tenderness of the wellfare of our Inhabitants and tooke speciall care to provide for the Poor and Labouring people, [some] three or four of the Rich and Crafty have imposed upon [us] so as to make 'em desert us, and to terrifye 'em from returning to their duty give out that the Government will punish them sutable to their crimes.

We therefore have thought fitt to publish this our Generall Pardon to all such who have been concerned in this Insurrection, promissing and declaring that such who returne to their Habitations and Duty on or before the Tenth of September next are pardon'd hereby to all intents and purposes, as if they had not been concerned therein, & such as does not comply herewith, their houses & Estates shall be seizd for the Companys use, and their Persons when and whereever apprehended within the Companys Jurisdiction shall be proceeded against with the utmost Rigour, and more particularly such who shall after the Date hereof contribute any money or otherwise towards the upholding maintaining or Employing any that shall not come in by the time herein limited.

Thoma, have sent for the heads of their Cast out of the Country, who wrott us this day a most saucy and impudent Letter the Translate of which is as Entered after this Consultation, wherein is a clause that they site former Consultations, which is plaine indication that some of our people had the pening of that Letter, and they duote it as a Precedent for us, 'tis a sign they don't understand it, we having Acted in this matter exactly according to that clause.

FROM DELLAWAY DONNEPAULO CHITTRE &C., RIGHT HAND CAST, OF THE FOUR CORNERS AND FIFTY SIX COUNTRYS OF THE WORLD TO THE HONBLE THOMAS PITT ESQ. &C COUNCIL

From the first foundation of Madrass 'twas never known that the Lett hand cast, should be adhered to by wrongly informing your Hon. &c to the prejudice of the Right hand Cast, upon whose assertions you have Erected stones in our Streets, and given the same from us, concerning which an address was made to your Hon. by way of Petitions upon perusall whereof you directed that your Petitioners were at liberty to stay or goe where they pleased, which you repeated three times, accordingly they came to St. Thoma, from whom they wrott your Hon. &c., we hearing these matters are come hither.

From the beginning of the world it was never before known that the Left hand in the fifty Six Countrys thereof, ever Erected a stone in the Right hand street, nor was it ever allowed by any Government.

One of your Predecessors with Timmana and Viran did appoint certain streets for the Left hand Cast, and directed how they should act, as upon your Consultation Booke does appear, upon examination whereof advantage [would] accrue to the Company, which you have hitherto omitted to doe.

From your first settlement Justice and equity has [been] distributed with an equall hand in your place, which has occasioned many to resort to you, and to increase in wealth under your Protection, but upon this occasion of Erect[ing] the stones we must have recourse to the Customs of the Countrys, this we write to a Charitable people, who we [know] will observe the same.

The Governour acquaints the board that he had confined Mr. John Rogers for stealing of Papers out of the Secretarys office, which were put in a Press and averred by the Secretary had not been open'd this eight months' and yt it now had been broake open, which the Council wants to view, and confirmed the same, there being all viseable signs of it; Rogers at last confest so farr that he found the Press open, when he tooke out the Anjengo Letters in severall of which was mentioned one Maxwell that lived then with the Dutch at Cutcheen, and is now here (with whom Rogers lately fought a Duell, when Maxwell gave him his Life, whole 'tis say'd in the Letters to have corresponded and Vissetted the Pyrats when they were at Cutcheen, the Copys of the Letters the Governour found upon him, which he had indorsed exactly as the Original were, and counterfitted the hands of those that Entered them into the Letter Booke; we demanded of him to what end did he take the Copys of those Letters, who answered to prosecute him before the Governour and Council, tho' we believe his design was to carry them for England, he not knowing the Company had them sent many yeares since. Mr. Maxwell came hither in the begining of June from Suratt, with a recommendatory Letter from Sr. John Gayer to the Governour when he charged him wth what had been formerly wrott of him in those Letters from Anjengo, to which he replyed that he never went on board of them, conversed with them or negotiated any affair, but with the possitive order of the Governour of Cutcheen, and we having no proof thereof concerned ourselves no farther therein; for which hainous crime we continued the confinement of Rogers to yo Ensigns roome, till we had thoughts of a sutable punishment for him.

The Armenians, Persians and Pattans, perceiving that the Governour and 14. Council was not fairly dealt with in this dispute between the Casts, and that the Persons who are employ'd and confided in to accommodate it, are of the Right hand Cast, all of whom had been either active or passive in raising this difference, and knowing we had no other they came in a Body of Fifty or Sixty and tendered their service, when the Governour summoned what of the Council were to be found; when we accepted of their service and mediation, who promissed to morrow to goe some of them to S^t. Thoma (to which place the Right hand Cast have retired and sent for several of their heads out of the Country, who are come to them) and take with him Narrain our Braminy and Mulla*, when they will demand of them the reasons of their desertion, and accommodate matters as well as they can, and as soon as possible.

The Governour with the Secretary being writing a Generall Letter to the Company in the Consultation Roome, there came a Gusbardar or Messenger to him from St. Thoma, who was sent by the Nabob to turne out the old Governour there and put in a new one; He had been here two or three times before, and seemed to be concerned at the troubles we had about the Casts, which he say'd was frequent in ye Country, and some time grew to such a pitch that the Government found a great deal of trouble and difficult to quell them, and say'd by some discourse he had had with them he found them very impudent and saucy, and that the source of our troubles was not from them in the St. Thoma, but from our own Inhabitants that remain'd in Town, who not only gave them directions, but also sent them their subsistance, he also added saying to the Governour you are likewise betrayed by some people that sitts with you at this Table; so asking him by the Linguist what he meant, he answered that yesterday talking with three or four of the heads of the Casts, they told him that the Second was of their syde, and that without he was restored to his Employ they would not returne on any termes, but if he would come they would meet him any where, and returne with him without insisting on, any Pardon, for that they were assured he was their freind, and that he never consented to what the Governour and Council had done in favour of the Left hand Cast, and that he was against putting up the Stones, which beleive in them had gained him such a reputution amongst the Mobb that they went up and down the streets, in his hearing crying out Chinne Captain, Chinne Captain, which implyes in their language the Second, on which the Governour asked him whether he had heard such discourse more then once from the heads of the Cast, he answered him three or four times, and the Mobb crying out as before mentioned, upon which the Governour told him that in the evening there would be severall of his people there to talk to them, when he desired him to averr, wt. he had now told him before the heads of the Casts to w^{ch}. he readily answered he would; This Man seem'd to be a very Sober, judicious Person, a stranger in these parts of the Country, and could have no manner of Interest in saying what he did, there was present at this discourse the Secretary whom the Governour ordered to take minutes, and for Linguist was present ye. Mulla Narrain, and Paupiha Braminy, who all averred that whereas they had been severall times at St. Thoma about this business, they had often heard the Mobb cry out for the Chinne Captain.

The Governour summoned this Counsell, when he reported to them what discourse he had with the Gusbardar as Entered in a Diary Note of yesterday; in the presence of the Secretary, Mulla, Narrain, and Paupiha Braminy, who all confirmed the same. The three latter now acquaint us that yesterday in the afternoone they accompanyed severall of the Persians and Armenians to St. Thoma in order to accommodate this difference between the Casts, who were stoped by the Mobb at the Gate whilst they sent in word to their heads for admittance, where they continued near two hours, and received no answere but severall affronts, and whilst there heard the Mobb cry out as the Gusbardar told us for the Chinne Captain, who asked Narrain and severall of our people why did he not come, for nothing could be done towards their returns without him. The heads of the Right hand Cast at St. Thoma wrott severall Letters to those of their Cast that remaine here, threatening their lives and being turned out of their Cast if they did not come to them, this much intimmadated the poor people, but for those of any substance little regarded it, since that we kept so good guards to defend them from their threats, and what is to be observed and

generally beleived that all the people that have left us are not worth six thousand Pagods. Narrain likewise acquainted us that all the heads of the Right hand Cast remaining in Town, mett last night and wrott a Letter to our Inhabitants of their Cast in St. Thoma, the purport of which was to let them know they were satisfyed in all matters relating to their Cast, and therefore what ever ill consequences attend farther disputes they cleared themselves of it, and lay'd it wholy at their Doors; the messenger just now arriving was brought in before us, who acquainted us that they had returned no answere to their Cast in writing, but bid him tell them that they would accept no other Cowle then what signed by Mr. Fraser and that the stones must be brought to St. Thoma, or put into the Pagoda, we were also at this time speaking of a report that had run about Town for two or three dayes, that the Casts were rose one against another in the same manner at Fort St. David where severall had been kil'd, amongst which four or five of our Souldiers and an officer mortally wounded, the Governour say'd he beleived it not tho' he had heard of it, Mr. Frederick say'd he had heard it from severall but being also told it by his Dubash, who say'd he had it told him from Mr. Frasers Dubash, who was sent for, when denyed it, but the other confronting him with naming the time and place, where and when he told it him, caused the Governour to give Credit to it, and punished him immediatly for spreading false reports, and this was done to incourage the Right hand Cast, & doubtless by order of his Master, or some of his accomplises whose chief Dubash one Jango and crafty Profligate Villain is actually now at St. Thoma, herding with ye. Right hand Cast and in all their Counsells, so hearing all before mentioned in this days Consultation and what passed yesterday with the Gusbardar rivetts in us a beleive that the Right hand Cast has got Mr. Fraser among them for their toole, or they durst not have adventured to have done what they have, so considering that it his quarrell betweenthem increases 'twill be an unspe[ak]able prejudice to the Company, and an effectuall ruin to the place, and yet to agree to their insolent and saucy demands may in futurity be attended with the like ill consequences; To prevent all which't was agreed to send for Mr. Fraser when the Governour charged him with what before mentioned, and telling him from which [it] were sufficiently confirmed that he was at the head of this vile and base action which occasioned the dispute between the Casts that no less then threatened the distruction of the Place, to which he answered 'twas all a grand suppose, and flatly denyed all; so being order'd to withdraw, we considered of the whole matter, when 'twas unanimously agreed that Mr. Fraser who is now removeing out of his Lodgings in the Fort, to a house in the Town, that he be continued therein and confined without permitting any one to come to discourse him, but in the presence of the Centinall, the Captain of [the] Guard was sent for, to whom the Governour gave a charge accordingly.

That your Petitioner unadvisedly has highly incurred your Hon¹⁸ &c. Gentlemens displeasure by opening the Press in the Secretarys office, and takeing thence severall papers for which he beggs your Hon¹. &c. Gentlemen will consider must inevitably be his ruin, and suffer him to ask forgiveness on his knees, promiseing never to be guilty of the like again, and as in duty bound he shall ever pray &c.

JOHN ROGERS.

The Governour and Council having Granted a Pardon to the Right Hand Cast (who deserted us, and are at S^t. Thoma) being at the request of severall Persians and Armenia[ns] who desired that Doct^r. Lewis and Padre Michæl may goe with them to deliver them the Pardon and accompany them in their returne, who came out of S^t. Thoma all together about Nine this morning, but when they came near the Town, they tooke disgust at something or other the certainty unknown to [us, and] returned again to S^t. Thoma; the Parriars sorrounded the In[ha] bitants, and forced them to goe with them; so Narrain being in hopes of giving them satisfaction went with them who they abused in severall Respects and conf[ined] but was the next day discharged upon a threatening Letter from the Governour that he would fetch him by Force.

Mr. John Bennett Supra Cargoe of the Essex who was taken coming from Mocho by the Pyrate, arrived here in a Boat, being put ashore by the Pyrate in the Riseing Eagle (which they tooke) on the Westermost of the Lackedeva Islands, where he bought a small Boat, which carryed him over, and four wounded men to Anjengo. He acquaints us that Cap^t. Chamberlain and his Mate Philips and four or five more were kild, and that that Ship as also his own was lost by the unspeakable Cowardize of the Captain of the Bombay Friggat, his Relation of which from the time he was taken to his arrivall here is as sent [to] the Company in a paper arart.

A Cowle Granted by Thomas Pitt Esqr. Govern. of Fort St. George &c. Council to the Right hand Cast.

Whereas you deserted us by reason of our giving yor. Thoma the 20th at break of day, (where they are harboured) and put as many of them as possible to the sword, but no Inhabitant of any Cast else, which was unanimously agreed to [by] Council, and preparations immediately [made and] accordingly resolving to march Two hundred and fifty Souldiers, two hundred Tallairs and two hundred Peons as also Eighteen hundred [People of] Left hand Cast have raised since the troubles for their security and the Governour disposed matters to effect the same.

First That they might be [by] consent under their hands seperated for ever. Secondly that they might be seperated for three or four Years. Thirdly that if agreed to neither of the two foregoing propositions that he should give unquestionable security for his good behaviour. The last he agreed to, and promissed he would execute it so soon as he could goe abroad to get such security, upon which 'twas unanimously agreed that Mr. Sinclare and her Daughter should goe and reside at Mr. Glovers House (where Mr. Maxwell is not to goe or molest them there) till that he makes his personall appearance before the Governour and Council that soe such wayes [and] meanes might be taken as to prevent his murthering his wife and this our Resolution we order the Secretary to acquaint Mr. Maxwell,' Mr. Sinclare and her Daughter with.

but allso sign a Paper that they would not desert again on any pretence whatever, upon which they presented Four Heads of their own choosing, which we approved of and Tasherceft¹ them, when the whole Body also signed a Paper, which is as Entered after this Consultation.

Agreed that we advance the Washers Five hundred Pagods. Two hundred Pagodas in Paddy out of the Warehouse at eighteen Mercall for a Pagoda, and T[h]ree hundred Pagods in money.

To prevent the inconveniency that attends ye Boatmen running away as lately, 'tis Agreed that we build Twelve Boats for the Companys Account, and in the time that they are a building, we procure such People to man them as have no dependance on the Right hand Cast. Ordered that the Paymaster forthwith gets materialls to doe it [&] build the Boats with all expedition.

One Torrmull residing in the Nabob's camp, having been serviseable to us, by advising of all that past in the Government, and now the Nabob being about to march farther into the Country, he has advised the Governour that he can't goe with him unless he will furnish him with a Horse, so considering all this time 'tis of great importance to us to have a true Account of the Newes from Dehli and Vizapoore and the motions of all the Armys, Tis therefore agreed we give him an Atcheen Horse to accompany the Nabob in his marches, and that he be forthwith sent.

In Fort S^t. George belonging to the R^t Hon^{ble} English Comp^a before the Hon^{ble} President Baker, Agent Greenhill and M^r. Gurney were present, Connarce Chittee, and Sheshadree Naigue Inhabitants of Chinapatam. There having of late been

severall Differences and Disputes between the Casts about their Streets, which this day is settled, and in case it be not observed by each Cast in regard to their Weddings and Burialls, the first breaker of it shall forfeit a thousand Dollers.

The Right Hand Cast are to reside in the particular streets appointed for 'em where are to live or come none of the Left hand Cast, and the same with the Left hand Cast, where are to be none of the Right hand Cast.

The great street from before the Fort as far as Taggapau Chittees Garden, and all the streets to the Westward of that street are allotted to the Right hand Cast, and the Great street from M^r. Porters, reaching to Mally Carjuns old Pag^o. with the new street (being two street) are allotted to the Left hand Cast.

The market street opposite to the Choultry as farr as the Qommittees Shops is appointed to the Right hand Cast and as far as the Chittees Shops in the same street to the Left hand Cast, where either Cast may pass with their weddings or Burialls, and if either of the Casts act contrary to this Agreement, shall pay one thousand Dollars.

The Pattnawarrs and Cariallwarrs are to pass with their weddings and Burialls from the back syde of M^r. Porters House to the middle of the Quarter Porters house and soe to proceed to the Portuguez Church, they may likewise goe thrô the great street.

Before the Fort is free for all.

Sheshadree Chittee as madiator to each Cast his servants nor the Company's Servants and Painters cannot pass these streets Dated November the 5th: 1652.

This day the Translate of the Left hand Petition was read where a great number of them appeared, the purport of w^{ch} complains chiefly of the affront offered them by the Right hand Cast, praying Justice for the same, or that otherwise we would permit them to goe away at six months end, they prest very hard for an answere thereto, to which they were told we would consider and give them our answere next Consultation day, and the Petition is as Entered after this Consultation.

TO THE HONBLE THOMAS PITT ESQ2.

PRESIDENT FOR AFFAIRS OF THE R^r. Hon^{ble} United East India Comp^a. on the Coast of Choromandell & Governous of Fort S^r. George & Council.

The humble Petition of the Inhabitants of the Left hand Cast of Chinapatam. Most humbly Sheweth,

That as your Petitioners were making a wedding in the Peddenaigues Patta, the Right hand Cast at midnight came in a body, surrounded the Wedding house, untiled it, broke open the Door, and at the same time forced themselves thrô the Topp, and the Bridegroome and some others, whom after they had unmercifully beat, and committed severall other insolencys retired; the next day your Petitioners laid the same before you in Counsell, when the Right hand Cast was sent for, and the occasion of these disturbances inquired into, the Ringleaders were found out and punish'd this gave your Petitioners an opportunity to acquaint you of the continuall Quarrells that ever happen'd between the Casts at their making any Weddings, which induced your Hon. &c to require of the Right hand Casts, whether they had two streets in the Black Town and two more in the Muttella Patta, thrô which they were used to pass with their Weddings; to which replyed they had, upon which you were pleased to acquaint ym of the reasonableness of Granting another street to the Left hand Cast in the Peddeneagues Patta where they already had one, in which both Casts lived, with [wch.] they seemed readily to comply in so much that each Cast was Chosen, Surapau and Narrain for [the Rt.] hand, and Collaway and Vinkettee Chittees for the Left [hand] one of the Council and Gunner to survey the streets were ordered to report to your Honour &c which would be the properest to be appropriated to the use of the Left [hand] Cast, in order thereto a draught was taken of them, [and] lay'd before your Honour &c, Council, when was prese[nt]

Six Persons beforementioned, who reported what [streets] were pitched on for your Petitioners Cast, when both being asked if they were contented therewith, they u[nani]mously declared they were, soe to settle these disturbances on such a sure Bottome that they might not again [fall] out, your Hon. &c ordered Four stones to be Erected, [on] the Corner of each street, with English inscriptions, [and]. Companys chop on them, which was executed by the [said] Persons appointed for this purpose.

Sometime after this your Hon. &c. gave notice by Pap[ers] fixed for that purpose on the four Gates, and that the Comp. Broadcloth was to be put up to publick sale, and that any Persons were at Liberty to make their proposalls of buying to the Governour and Council in Consultation Roome, the day appointed being come, both Casts mett there, when the Right hand Cast bid as much as they thought convenient to give, but your Petitioners exceeding em in their price, they [were] the purchasers, upon which the Right hand Cast applyed themselves to em to come in for a Proportion which was Granted.

Next followed the Companys Investment about which both Casts were summoned before your Hon. &c severall times, and each having made their proposalls it passed in favour of your Petitioners when one of the right hand Cast was ordered to come in with them, but he refused it, notwithstanding he had share of the Investment at Metchlep^m. and Cuddaloor.

The Right hand Cast now perceiving all their measures to be broke, did begin to put Notions in the heads of some of their people, that they had great Injustice done 'em, by having their two streets in the Peddeneagues Patta taken from them, which deprived them of their Ancient Libertyes & made them come to the following Resolution.

Resolved that since the Left hand Cast had so much Interest as to get the Investment from the Right hand Cast, that the latter should send away the Washers, Boatmen &c., Handicrafts, and that there onely should remaine here some of the heads to discourse the Governour &c The Deserters were ordered to hinder all manner of Goods, and Provissions coming into Town, by which meanes your Petitioners were robbed of them; They rose up in Armes with Drums and Trumpets and forced from your Petitioners people sum's of money with Letters as they were bringing it hither to them out of the Countrey; They bribed the Junckan mettas both at Millapore and Pullamullee, which much increased the disturbance to this Place, of these and all other their Transactions yo. Petitioners acquainted your Honour &c of, as they came to their knowledge, and their insolencys were grown to such a pitch, that your Honour &c. were obliged to send eighty souldiers with Peons to Triblicane, Egmore & Tandore, to put a stop to them.

The Design of the Right hand Cast was no other then to impede the dispatch of the Companys Ship for England expecting there was not a sufficiency of Goods in y° Godownes to Load on them, which they thought would occasion the Comp° displeasure against the Governour and Council, and utter ruine to the Left hand Cast, as soon as it could come to their knowledge, and this was their sole aime.

The Governour deliberating upon this, chose twelve of each Cast, locked 'em up in the Consultation Roome, till such times as they had adjusted matters between themselves, we having concluded on, they represented it to the Governour and [it] was, That the Peddenaigues Petta was allotted to the Right hand Cast, and the Muttella Patta to the Left hand Cast, upon this a Consultation was summoned at Five a Clock the Gov'. refusing to give his opinion of it without his Council, notwithstanding the Right hand Cast persisted to have it settled in this method, at the setting of the Council the 24 Persons were called in, who as before said, acquainted the Board of matters being accommodated between them in the manner beforementioned, which was repeated and agreed toe, three severall times during the while of their being lock'd together in the Consultation Roome; and soe Entered in the Consultation Booke, Rose water given, and the Casts dispatched, and that same night the stones by unknown Hands were stolen away.

Tis under your Hon¹⁸. &c umbrage and Protection that your Petitioners have hitherto enjoyed a peaceable and quiet Life, and Traded with what Goods bought of the Hon¹⁸. Company to all Parts of India, soe to enable em to goe thrô their Affairs and comply with their Contracts, and the great advantages that arrises annually to the Hon¹⁸. Company by your Petitioners Trading is soon to be seen by the Customes they pay for Importation & Exportation.

The four Casts of your Petitioners contributed one halfe towards the Tax of the Town Wall, and the other halfe was in a manner raised, by the Moors, Armenians, Braminys, Guzaratts, and Conicoplyes, who are an indifferent people, and the small matter which remained unp^d was filled up by the R^t. Hand Cast.

All the handicrafts of the Mint are your Petitioners Cast, which was your Honour &c is well sensible brings no small income yearly to the Company.

Your Petitioners having thus farr laid before you the services, which they are capable of rendering the Comp^a. occasions this their humble request to your Hon. &c w^{ch}. is that the Agreement between the two Casts as Entered in the Consultation Booke may be complyed with [viz.^t], The Peddeneagues Petta to be given to the Right hand Cast, and the Muttella Petta to your Petitioners, which being concluded on with the unanimous consent of each Cast your Petitioners cannot doubt but that it [would] meet with it's wished for effect, it being the onely method that can be taken to restore all agains to its former Tranquillity, and is impossible to be effected without it, for whenever your Petitioners perceive that they are disrespected, they will not carry long there, & whereas the Right hand Cast have soe lately taken up Arms against the Company 'tis reasonable to beleive they doe the same against your Petitioners.

Narrain in presence of the Governour cautioned your Petitioners to be carefull of themselves for that there was a Design laid to cutt off two or three of the heads of their Cast by the Deserters at Milapore, which required their due consideration and obliged them to give notice to their Casts at Pollicatt, Sadrassapatam, Pollicherry Conimeer, Tevenapatnam, Trincombar, Negapatam [&c] Sea Ports, of the fallings out and Disputes of the Casts, with all requiring their advice what methods they should take, whether they should leave this place, and goe to them, or continue here if the former they desire their Casts to request leave of the Governour of said place for their coming over and residing with them, in their proper Employes and stations as was customary to their Casts, all which was affected by your Petitioners Casts in those places, who doe now frequently importune your Petitioners by Letters to relinquish y⁸ place, and to come to them.

Your Petitioners Casts have had severall meetings and have at last obliged themselves by Oath to adjust Accounts with every one, dispose of their Houses woh, are about Two thousand, to goe thro' which they allow themselves six months time, and in order to effect it designe to give notice thereof by fixing up Papers for that purpose on the four Gates, and then to relinquish the Place, which they will not doe in the same manner as the R^t Hand Cast did, when they run away in the Companys and severall other peoples Debts, but leave it without the least Disturbance or noise.

There has four or five such Troubles happen'd wthin these sixty years, and in every one of 'em yor Petition's cause was espoused by all the Governours and Council by whom they were esteemed as their own Children, for which reason shall be very cautious how they committ anything that may lead to the prejudice of the Honble. Companys Affairs, or give them any trouble whatever and 'tis not long since that both the Right and Left hand Casts gave their Oaths to the Governour and Council, that they would in noewise be instrumentall to a Rebellion which notwithstanding was immediately after violated by the former, shall be sacredly observed by the latter.

The Protection your Petitioners for these sixty year's have received from the Company is now past, so humbly request that your Honour &c for six months only, will be pleased to allow 'em an English Guard during the night, which if not granted,

and that any unforeseen misfortune happens to your Petitioners, the blame will be laid to your charge by all Europeans in these parts, see hope their request will meet with a favourable consent.

Narrain has built in your Petitioners street in Muttella Patta ten houses, and at each end Erected stone, with Gentue inscriptions on 'em which your Petitioners tooke to be done by order of your Hon' &c.

In the four Papers lately fixed up by the R' Hand Cast they hint, as if your Petitioners were the worse Cast, representing the Governour in them to be as black as they can possibly make him, saying that he has extorted from 'em all that he could, and was now goeing about to doe the same by your Petitioners Cast who as far as they can call to mind, dureing the Nine years and upwards of his Government could never soe much as learne or know, that the least thing of that nature could be imputed against him, but on the contrary must judge this place to be sensible that for severall before his time, there has not been such a considerable Trade known to be held here, as has since this Govornours time, who has been the sole promoter and incourager of it, not onely to the advantage of the Company[s] Affairs, but likewise to the entire satisfaction of the white as well as black Inhabitants of this Place, we can impute the notorious falsityes raised against him by the Right hand Cast to be nothing but malice and envy, it [is out] of any of their Power to lay four fanams to his [charge] extorted from any one, since his being Governour [there].

Your Petitioners have delivered in Goods to the [company] at a time to the Amount of 40. or 50,000 Pags. [and] pay'd for the same till four or six months afterw[ards] created a jealousy in the Right hand Cast that you[...] bore the sway in the Companys Interest that [...] a foot the Report of your Petitioners being [...] which tended noe less then to the ruine of the [company] be pleased to inquire thoroug[hly and] you will soon find out, which of the two [casts is in the right.]

There being before us this day two Shroffs & two Pallankeen Cooleys the Governour having apprehended them for two Brass Madrass Pagod's. he found in the hands of the Cooleys, who say'd they had them of the Shroff, but upon Examination we have great reason to believe that the Cooleys brought them from the Country, where they had lately been, so discharged the shroff, and to deturr others from bringing any such false Coine amongst us, 'tis agreed that the two Coolys are whipt at a Cart three severall dayes round the Black Town, and turned out of our bounds, and to loose their ears if ever returne.

The Left hand Cast were again this day before us to desire leave to put up Notes on the Gates to give notice that in six months time they design to leave the place, to which they were answered as last Consultation, and desired they would consider farther on it.

Agreed that the Painters are allowed Fifty six Pag's a Corge for the Chints they painted last year, and that the Warehousekeeper forthwith makes up their Acets. and bring it with him next Consultation day.

ARTICLES of the Charge of Thomas Pitt Esq^r. Gov^r. of Fort S^t. George and Mess^{rs}. Matthew Empson, Will^m. Martin, Robert Raworth, Thomas Frederick, Rich^d Hunt, of Council, Against M^r. William Fraser, as the promoter, ffomenter, and Abetter of the late Rebellion Dated in Fort S^t. George Novem^r. 28th 1707.

FORT ST. GEORGE, DECEMBER 1707-

- 1st. That he the said William Fraser at a Consultation held the 17th of July last, for the considering on the best wayes, and means, to establish the peace and quiet of this City in relation to the Native Inhabitants about settling their street, for their Weddings and festivals did propose the Erecting of four stones, as boundiaries to such streets as were appointed for that purpose, & did carnestly press us to goe in procession to give a sanction thereto.
- 2^{dly}. That having consented to the regulations aforementioned (as we had great reason to suspect) he betrayed our Councills to the Gentues (commonly distinguish'd by the Right hand Cast) and was an Instrument in drawing up their Petition delivered us the 19th of August, having in a long speech distinctly repeated all the heads of said Petition to the Governour and Council, and that too, just before the said Petition was delivered in, that the said Petition did tend to the subverting the constitution of this Government, and was the immediate cause of the Rebellion that ensued.
- 3^{dly}. That the Governour having from the foregoing Circumstances and private testimony been confirmed in his opinion that the said William Fraser had betrayed our Councills, and was abetting in the trouble then brought to a head, did at a Consultation held the 22^d of August charge him therewith, and that he had framed or seen the said Petition before the delivery thereof, who faintly denyed it, but having nothing to alledge in his defence, only that 'twas a Grand Suppose, upon mature consideration 'twas unanimously agreed to suspend him the Companys service ex officio et beneficio, in order to prevent his giving any further information to the Rebells.
- 4thly. That the Rebells continuing their insolence, by stopping provissions coming to us, and committing many Acts of hostillity upon severall of our Inhabitants and threatening others of their Cast, who would not desert us, also publickly declaring in St. Thoma that the second, i.e. The said Will. Fraser, was their friend and on their syde, that he would stand by them and Protect them, so that they were not in the least apprehensive of punishment for the crime they had committed, and that they would hearken to no termes, but such as should be proposed by Mr. Fraser, [nor] would they returne to their duty and obedience unless conducted hither by them, the Mobb in a tumultuous manner crying out a ffraser, a ffraser and this being confirmed to the Governour (the Secretary, the Mullah and Braminy being present) by a Moor, a man of sence a stranger and an indifferent person between the dissenting Casts, which information being strengthen'd by several others of the like nature, we thought it highly necessary to confine him to his Lodgings in the ffort under a Guard, as a means to appeas the clamours of the People & prevent the growing mischief, which threaten'd no less then the ruine and distruction of this Place.
- 5^{thly}. That his Dubash one Jango (a crafty fellow, and for faction one of his Masters stamp) was at the head of the Rebellion here, and a leading man in their Counsells at S^t. Thoma, and as 'tis generally suggested not without the approbation of his Master, who we have great reason to beleive held intelligence with him.
- 6^{thly}. That during the heat of the Rebellion to foment the same and bring in others who had not then associated with the deserters here was industriously spread a report that the like troubles were at Fort S^t. David, and that the Gentues had kill'd and wounded severall of the English officers and Souldiers, which report being false and groundless, and contrived by some disaffected persons the Government, enquiry was made after the Author, who upon due proof was found to be another of M^r. Frasers Dubashes that remained with him in Town, a simple young fellow made use of to spread that report.
- 7^{thly}. That it is well known by most upon the place as also by what appears upon the Consultation books that he has ever been found a person of a factious and turbulent temper, and thô weak in contriving yet industrious in promoting mischief & confusion of a capacity unfit for any business, or advice, impatient of peace, and only pleased when factions run high, wh[ere]in he has alwayes made one, to the great prejudice of the Companys affairs, as appears by severall cases recorded in the

FORT ST. GEORGE, DECEMBER 1707

Dyarys of the preceding Governours, nor has he less meritted that just Character during the time of our present Governour alwayes herding and sideing with such Persons as are under the frownes of the Government let their crime be ever so black, and at the begining of these troubles 'twas observed he was very intimate with his old acquaintance Timmapa, a protlygate and wicked wretch, but a bird of the same feather, noterious for mischeif, and one of the Cheif contrivers of the Rebellion, by whom he was made use of as a proper tool for compassing his horrid designes, and some time before these troubles broke out, to give a proofe of his restless and contentious spirit; having suggested that there was a difference between the Governour & Mr. Raworth his Dubashees Nephew one Veragoe was sent to Mr. Raworth to insinnuate to him that he pay'd too great a deference to the Governour, and if he would but joine with Mr. Fraser, and adhere to his party, they would certainly be able to suppress [y^m].

8^{thly}. That During his being Deputy Govern at Fort S^t. David he brought that place into such confusion and distract[ion] in countenancing of ffaction, and causing divisions among the Inhabitants that upon our Governours progress hither he found them all, as well whites as blacks ready to leave the place, having behaved himself so as that he became odious to the People, and a byeword amongst them and the same here.
