The Consultation and Diary Booke of Thomas Pitt Esq. Governour and President &c. Council their Proceedings and Transactions in the Affairs of the Rt. Honble United English East India Company in the Presidency of the Coast of Choromandell &c. Begun 5th. January 1707-08.

Doctor Bulkly acquainting the Governour this morning of Mr. Empsons death he immediatly sent for the Paymaster and Secretary whom he ordered to go to his Lodgings, and to inquire of his Nephew Mr. Griffith whether he knew of any Will, and if not that they three should surch his Scrutores for it, which accordingly they did, but found none, upon wath. 'tis agreed that the Paymaster Mr. Hunt and the Secretary in conjunction with Mr. Griffith his Nephew (who lived wth. him) to take an Inventory of his Estate, and all sign the [same before] me, and for what Cash he has by him, or shall be made his effects when [found] just and due ['ts] ordered they payes into the Companys Cash, and as they have perused his Papers, and are in for circumstances they report to the Governour.

Mr. Matthew Empson who succeeded Mr. Warehouse, Tis agreed for the present that [Mr. Robt.] Raworth take charge thereof till farther [orders] on what Bales the Dutchess can take in, [there]after she's Dispatched to settle the Accounts [on Mr.] Empsons Death, and take an Accot. of an [Inventory] of which they deliver out and [a few words lost] of that Office.

Thomas Pitt Esq^r: President reads his Acco^t of [the R^t. Hon^{blo}.] United Companys Cash for the month of December.

Thomas Pitt Esq^r. Mintmaster reads his Mint Acco^t. of December, and payes into Cash Pa. 77: 24.

The President payes into the R^r. Hon^{ble}. United Company's Cash one hundred forty two Pagod^s. 29 fanams being [for pro]vissions extraordinary for the Souldiers whilst the [troubles] about their Cast, which he received from their Pagoda Duty.

Mess^m: Raworth, Hunt and the Secretary report that they found in M^r. Matthew Empsons Scrutore two Ru[bies], Diamonds p^r: about Eleven Mangeleens, which was left with him by a Merchant to buy, but not finding in any [way] or by his Kinsman or servants that he had pay'd for [them] and knowing 'tis customary for Merchants to leave [Dia]monds for their View; 'tis therefore agreed that the Merchant giving his oath that he had received no money for them [and] they be returned him, and what farther corobarates [we be]leive, is that the Governour affairms that those two [sets of] stones were left with him some dayes, which he returned to the Merchant since New years day as not being [suited] so 'tis hardly creditable that M^r. Empson had agreed [to pay for] them.

M'. Charles [some words lost] Brother Edward Fleetwood and [some words lost] will his [Trus]tees, and the former going soon after to China left all his effects with Mr. Empson, which money he kept apart as by a Note in a bagg, and his Account Currant found in his scrutore, won. is agreed to be delivered to Mr. Fleetwood, and what else belongs to his Brother.

The Heads of both Casts having been for some dayes in the Pagoda, This day appear'd before us, when acquainted us that they had settled all matter in dispute between them about their streets &c*. which they had put in writing and signed, and being Translated was read to us which we confirmed, and promissed to ratify all they had done as soon as the Ship was dispatchd, the Translate of the Agreement is as Entered after this Consultation.

Both Casts complain against the Kicullawarr weavers and the Oyle men that they were very fickle in their Cast, that they were sometimes of one Cast, and sometimes of another, which give trouble to both Casts, so desired the heads may be sent for, which accordingly was done when the Weavers declared for the Left hand, and the Oyle men for the Right hand, which they were ordered to keep too, or be severely punished.

There being upwards of Five hundred houses to be Exchanged between the Right and Left hand 'tis agreed between both Casts, that it be done by Four Bricklayers and Four Carpenters, Viz'.

who are to take their Oaths in the Pagoda that the value of every mans house according to the best of the judgment, and both sydes agreed on. Two Conicoplys are to be sworne in the same manner as to their ke [eping] the Accounts.

The Governour acquaints the Council that about [seven] or eight dayes past the Governour of S^t. Thoma has coined a parcell of fanams and Cash, which he's informed is threw Sunca Rama's means and when he distributed them to the shroffs there and at Pullamullee, he ordered beat of Drum that none of that sort of Coine of [Madrass] should pass in those places, which as soon as [they] heard of, ordered the same here, as to any of those [fanams] and Cash, that whoever should bring any within Bounds, should be severely punished, and since the Governour is Dead.

GIVEN IN THE PRESENCE OF THE HONBLE. THOMAS PITT ESQR. PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. GEORGE &CA. COUNCIL, being Present Raha[. .] RAMAPAU, TANKSALLA VERDAPAU, KITTEE NARRAIN, QUONEGORE QUOMORALL PEDENEAGUE by the Right and Left hand Casts Inhabitants of Chinapatan dated 14th of January 1707.

WHEREAS there has lately been difference [in] streets between Partys, occasioned by a Wedding going [in] procession in the Peddenaigues Petta, and is being brought [before] your Honour &c. who ordered us to choose out Twelve Headmen of each Cast to meet in the Gentue Pagoda, and make matters and then report what done to your Honour those of the Right hand were as follows. NAIRA VEROPA CHITTEE, TA[UNA] TROVITTEE MOODELAREE, VELOORE AUNDEPAU MOODELAREE, PEGUE CHINNIHA, ANCILIA DE[OS]OITTY, MOORAURE RAMONSULOO, MAUMBUL[LUM] CHINA-RAGGA VENGANA, POCALLO RAMMA KI[STNA], GANNAVARAM RAMADOS, BUTSOO-GOUNDA ROSALOO, TINNALURE BOODA CHITTEE, PARANE POOTURE MAREHAPA, FOR THE LEFT HAND WERE CHOSE PALLARAGA VELEAPA NINAPA, TAGGA VINKETTER CHITTER, TERUVENGADEM COLLAWAY CHITTER, QUODUMBAUC[A] CAURNAPA CHITTER, QUODUMBAUCA PERI[TUMBA] CHITTEE, AULATURA PERETUMBA CHITTEE, COOLEB CHITTEE, RAGGA CHITTEE, VELLACHAREE MOOTOMORIA [MAISTRE], PARAU BUTTUNDO, [TAN] KSALLA CHINA [MOOTALLA], [ANSALLA RANGAPAU]. These Twenty Four agreed to and confirm'd as followes. The Left hand Cast cohabiting in severall streets that belong to the Right hand in the Peddeenagues Petra so that they can't safely make their Weddings; Therefore from this day all the [Right] hand that live in the Peddeneagues Petta shall have the following streets to live and make their weddings &c. Vizt. Eastward of Eccombresheraloo Pagoda, as you go on the backsyde corner street of Vencate Narnapa's Stone Choultry and goe from that place along the Southward street as far as the well before Gulla [A . . .] house, where besides the South street there's another North street as you come from Braminy Appihas Garden which Joins to the well, and from the Well Westward as far as Dubash Ragganas house thence as you go Northward facing Mr. Empson, as far as Eccombrasharilloo Pagoda, and there's another corner street Northward of Nautowarry Pillary Pagoda as far as Mr. Empsons Garden, in which streets the Left hand shall live and make their Weddings but if the abovesaid streets are not enough to hold them all, some of those houses that lye to the Westward which belong to the Right hand, we will supply them with, and in case those are not enough too, we will find some houses out either of the East, North or South, and Eccombrasharilloo Pagoda, and Vencate Narnapas Choultry shall belong to both Casts, and the Left hand shall carry their Dead towards the Westward of Bangarr Rammas Garden street; those of the Right hand that now live in the above said two streets, shall change with the Left hand that did Inhabit in the Right hand street and hence forward live there, Both partys [Pages 7 and 8 are missing] Streets. The Left hand shall not buy those Gardens to Westward of the street that Fronts Mr. Empsons Garden without the Owners consent, nor shall the Right hand build any houses there. If any of the Casts Act contrary to this Agreement shall be fined

The Governour this morning summoned this Councell to acquaint them that just then the Peddeneague informed him that he discovered a Villainy in the Boat men un [load]ing the Companys Bales sent on board the Dutchess, [that] he hearing of in the night immediatly secured the Head Boatmen, and two Peons at the watching places by the Sea syde, on whom he found two peices of midling Long Cloth; The Governour immediatly sent for the Conicoply of the Godown to inquire what Peons were sent in the Boats that day they loaded fifteen boats which to his great surprize he told Him no Peons at all. Often at the Councill board he ordered that no [one other then] the Companys should goe off [or in their absence] Peons in the Boats, and the same he had often ordered the conicoply when with him, and twice or thrice beat him himself when that he found he neglected it.

The Cheif of the Boatmen were before us when the Ped[de]neague charged them with the knowledge of this Villa[iny] and brought one of their servants to their face to pro[hibit] it, who did not only do that, but sent some of their people with their servant to one of the Cheifs bouses and found four peices of Betteelaes buryed under Ground, upon which orders were given to apprehend all the Boatmen that

were ashore, and those that were gone off in Boats when they returned, and as soon as the Governour was informed of it, and knowing four Boats were gone off [that] morning with Bales, he sent for Captain Raymond(s] whom he desired to write to his Mate to su[r]ch the [Dutchess] so soon as come on board to see whether they had not play'd the same tricks with those Bales, when some of those Boats off returned near the surff[ace] their associats [and] this Villainy made them some private sign, so that they returned again as farr as the Paddy boats, and there consulted one another, from which we apprehended they would run away to the Northward or Southward, [so] presently sent two Boats with the Vizagapatam Boats men with souldiers to prevent it, which as soon as they discovered Ten Boats run away to the Southward upon which the Governour ordered the Gunner to [fire] shott from the Battery and sinck them if possible severall of which fell very near, but had not [time to go] do execusion, and the [Ship Dutchess] their Pinnace, who cutt off the flight of four & brought them back, but the other six got to St. Thoma, whili ther the Governour sent Peons with our Braminy to severe them as they came ashore and bring them hither which if the Governour refused to charge them with them both which they refused, upon which 'twas thought fitt to fetch them with a Company of souldiers, but upon consideration we then heard the Nabob was at Conjeveron and expected every day at S'. Thoma, we desisted beleiving the consequence would be imbroiling the Company affairs for the present; upon which 'twas agreed to write the Nabob a Letter and another to the Govern'. of St. Thoma, who is now at Pullamullee, and if we have not immediate redress then to apply ourselves to other courses. to procure it.

The Governour being advised that the Nabob was arrived so near as Pullamulle, he this evening sent [our] Mulla and Braminy to meet him, and pay his complyment to him, and accompany him to St. Thoma whither he heard he was coming.

This day about Ten in the morning the Nabob came to St. Thoma with about one Thousand Horse, and Fifteen hundred Foot, when our Mulla and Braminy returned to us, and acquainted they had waited [for] him as ordered, who received the complyment as marke of respect, and returned his thanks.

This morning the Governour severely punished all [the] seasyde Peons, and we ordered the two Peons that were taken with the two Peices of cloth to be whip'd round [the] Town, and tomorrow morning to be put in the Pillory with their Ears nail'd thereto, and at twelve a clock at noone to be cut off.

Tho' we are apprehensive that these Villains have stole out of the Bales on board the Dutchess to a great amount, and that we cannot come at the [certainty] without unloading the Ship, which will not [be] augment[ed] but [lessened or reduced so much] as may indanger her Passage upon which consideration we have resolved to dispatch the Ship, and the Company may have right done them, for what they have stolen to take

We the Conicoplys belonging to the Warehouse, and Sea Gate, and the Peons belonging to the latter with [the] Mucquaws give this writing to the Honble. Governour and Council of Fort St. George, that [besides what the] Companys sent on board the Dutchess, [also] they have taken severall peices the Number [and ...] amount not yet discovered, and to unload this 'tis impossible at this time of year so as to relade her enough to saile to save her Monsoon; we doe hereby oblige ourselves jointly and severall by these presence in the forfeiture of Five thousand Pagodas, that so soon as there comes an answere from the Honble. Company how much is wanting of said Ships Invoice that we will make the same good, and with our free will we give this writing under our hands Fort St. George January 21st: 170%.

Roach should be made Lieutenant of Second Company of Souldiers in this Garrison to which Mr. Frederick (who marryed Captain Seatons Daughter in Law) excepted against it, alledging that Roach came out of France without leave, and therefore was lyable to Acts of Parliament that made it capitall, which exception he Entering in the Consultation with his name, which the Governor knew nothing of till after rising of the Council, and this day he proposed it to be read in Consultation, when he verily believes that what he has Entered is not the produce of his own brain, but the contrivance of a disaffected party that he caballs with, and we taking y'. exception to be not only a reflection upon the members of the Company who sent Roach out on their Ship, Mountegue, but also in the Generall and Council of Bombay who employed him in an Eminant Post there, from whence and from all places where he had been he brought hither a good Character, and has maintain'd it by his good deportment to this day; besides we can't but think it a severe reflection on us the Governour and Council here, that we should not be thought by Mr. Frederick to be better judges of those matters then himself, and that he should be the only Person amongst us that is fitt to judge of men and their capacity when 'tis notoriously known by all in the place, that profound ignorance and Pride, are his only qualifications, and considering of this exception aim's not only at taking away a mans livelyhood but live alsoe, We unanimously agreed that Mr. Roach has Copy of the exception under Secretary's hand to make his answere thereto next Consultation day.

David having wrott us that they were apprehensive that Dowed Cawn as he returned from the Southward [would] stop at their Place; therefore desired we would send them what rarietys we had of China to make up a Present for him, upon which 'tis agreed 25 peices of silk of proper Colours be sent them overland, and that as many more are kept out of the Sale for Presents if there be occasion.

The Company receiving a Brokarage on all Elephants sold, which formerly was pay'd by the buyers who generally are Kings, Princes, Nabobs, Duans, and Buxes, or at least couched under their names wⁿ. we find it very difficult to get it pay'd, and it has often occasioned disputes, which some time or other may be of dangerous consequence to the Companys affairs, 'tis therefore ordered that it be a standing order for the future that the seller of the Elephants pays the Companys and Watchmans Dutys, and this order to be sent to the Land Customer under the Secretarys hand to observe the same.

Roach, as is Entered after this Consultation, the purport thereof being to evade any proof of what he charged him with, which we can't think consonant to the Companys orders in such Cases, Tis true where any one differs in Counsell in any matters relating to the Companys Affairs, and makes his Exception in generall termes 'tis alwayes left to the Company to be judges whether such exceptions are materiall or otherway's, or grounded upon a true Zeal for their service, or threw Faction or want of capacity to Judge better. But this chargeing a particular Person with a capitall crime we can't think but that he's obliged to prove the same before this Board, that soe the persons injured may have reperation, which M^r. Frederick being prest to by the Governour and all the Councill, he at last say'd that Ensign Dixon had told him what he had charged M^r. Roach with, who being immediatly sent for excused coming

Letter with your Present to the Prince of Syrian, and acquaint him that you have Letters for the King and Primere Minister, as also Presents, and desire his advice how they may be forwarded to Ava, which Presents must be all given in the Honble. Companys name, thô 'at your own Charge.

Secondly. That whereas the Company have a peice of Ground at Syrian, and a small House upon it, w^{ch}. we hereby Impower you to take possession of, and thereon build such Houses as shall be most convenient for your accommodation, but at no manner of Charge to the Company, on which house you may hoist S^t. Georges Flag, and hereby order to acquaint all English that come there, that they presume not to hoist any flag on the shore.

Thirdly. The Company having great priviledges in that Country of which we desire you to informe yourself, and afterwards to use your utmost endeavours, and advice, and also assist all others to preserve the same.

Fourthly. We must not omitt to advise you to avoid all manner of disputes with the Government, especially so as to bring it to a rupture between you and matters in such confusion as was lately at Atcheen, for if the Government be unjust to you, or that any English do any Action dishonourable to the Nation, or prejudciall to the Company's affairs, do not you proceed any farther against them then by,

We hoping that the Kent will returne early enough to be dispatch'd in Season for England, but not being able to foresee what impediments they may meet with in their negotiation, so to prevent being detained longer then what limited in the Contract with them, we agree to write a Letter to the Supra Cargo's or Comander of any ship in the United Companys service that they shall meet with in y. Port, and bound hither, that provided the Kent leave them in Port, and a Supra Cargoe of theirs with any stock behind them, that they shall be at liberty to come on such Ship hither, and bring what Treasure they leave behind freight free which Letter is as Entered after this Consultation.

It having been practiced within these two months more then formerly the Traversing of Goods in this Road, from which we perceive if continued that the Companys Revenues will be very much lessen'd, for as most of the Goods that are imported here, are again exported to the Northward or Southward of us on this Coast, none of which Goods will hardly ever be Landed, but Traversed on board Ships and Boats, and some of them Landed very near us which are vendible Inland, for that our neighbour who look upon this Port with an envious Eye, will compound with the Owners of the Goods for one & cent rather then nothing, and the Merchants will bee induced to do it, by saving one and a halfe & Cent, See to prevent this Visible Loss to the Company, Tis agreed that noe more Goods be Traversed in this Road without Payment of the full Custom of Five & Cent then neither without first acquainting the Custom who is to order an officer to goe off to see it done, and take a perfect account thereof, and if any one shall be found Traversing Goods, without leave as before mentioned, such Goods shall be forfeited to all [intents] and purposes Vizt. One Third to the informer, one third to the Company and one third to the Poor.

And if any Inhabitant of this Place shall be found tricking in ordering their Ships or Vessells to any Port near this, whither they shall send [boats] or Vessells to unload the Goods and send them to other ports to evade paying the Companys Customs, they shall be deem'd by the Government as Enemys to the Company and their Interest.

The Accot of what is wanting in the Cargoe under our Management being delivered us but the day before yesterday, and Captain Harrison see much out of order we had not time to reply before we left the shore, makes us give you this trouble from hence.

As for Japan Copper for many years we have not been able to procure more then 131 lb. to the Pecull, and as for the remainder that is wanting if not imbezled here is owing to the goodness of those intrusted by yor. Hon. &c. because Mr. Manning that was instructed on our part, and ordered to attend on that Service was often absent, for what reasons we can't tell but believe he thought it a work beneath him, having more then once refused to go on the same service in China.

We likewise observe that the Companys weight here are heavier then those we bring out of England, and in China we weigh with the same nicety as Gold.

As for the want of the Junan Copper and the over plus of the Tunqueen they ballance each other soe near that it is reasonable to believe that part of one may have crept in among the other by lyeing loose together.

The want of Sugar can be no wonder being weighed in China Nett and put into dry Canesters, for which being moist and wett we suppose occasions yor. Hon. &c. to allow so considerable a Tare here.

Sugar Candy will waste and China Root also decaying daily by the worme your Hon. &c.* know so well the China Trade that we willingly submit to yo. decession and hope a favourable representation to the Company of this matter We are

Whereas there is a Brick and tiled house standing in Wallaga Chittees street in Mutall Patta, adjoining to the Northward Abdull Romains house, and to the southward to Machum Chittees, belonging to Ball Chitt[ee] lately one of the Mint Gold washers, who deserted among the Right hand Cast, and notice having been fixed at all Gates of the Town to give notice the house[s] of those who did not returne to their duty should be sold, which he regarded not but still continued in open Rebellion. Know yes for the abovementioned reason as well as to make reparation to the Hon^{ble}. Thomas Pitt Esq^r. and M^r. Gulston Addison for the sum of Two hundred Pagod^a. wronged them of in a parcell of Gance that were entrusted to him to be run into Slabbs. That Wee in consideration of the sum of Two hundred Pagod^a. received of Verdapa Mint Braminy have made over and sold the above mentioned house Patta, and all other conveniencys and appurtenances as well as his eighth part in the Mint unto the said Verdapa his Heirs and assigns for ever. In Testimony whereof we the said Governour and Council have hereunto put our hands and the seal of the abovementioned Company this Tenth day of June Anno 1708.

10-2. Briggantine Greyhound Capt. Jones Comand. arrived about ten this morning in the Road, Mr. St. John Bennet being much out of order sent the Following Letters ashore to the Governour.

Honble, Sr.

We arrived at Benevoula upon ye. Island of Madagascar the 29th of December, Capt. White and two more came on board of us from the Pyrates, they seemed overjoyed at our coming, and so did the rest of them ashore and with your Honra. Letter, and the copy of the Petition to the Queen, upon which they expect a pardon, & talked to us of nothing less then the performance of every thing they had promissed.

FORT ST. GEORGE, JUNE 1708

A few days after our being here arrived the Neptune Galley one Miller Comander from Scotland, he was Loaden with Liquors &c. before he could get his Ship into the Harbour, we had a most violent Hurricane, and Miller being apprehensive of loosing of her cut his Masts by the Board: In this Storme drove ashore and bilged the Riseing Eagle, the Elizabeth and the Dorothy all three ships taken by the Pyrats from the English Gentlemen in India, we had the good fortune to ride the storme out, but intending to carreen our Ship in order to it, we had put our Guns, water Cask cables and Anchors (except what we rid by) &c. stores into the Dorothy, and so lost them, by this unexpected accident we were obliged to stay near ten weaks amongst these faithless People.

The 26th, of ffebruary the Pyrates took the Neptune Galley and the 28th, they plundered us, they took from us our Brass Colours and manelloes, our Powder and armes (which with we should have bought [the] Negroes) even to some of our Ships, and everything else we had worth the taking, by their excessive drinking and other Irregularitys they brought amongst them flevers and Fluxes, which carryed about twenty of them off while we stayed there, and amongst the rest Capt. White, we had been very secure had either White lived, or North their Quartermaster been there (who lost all his Anchors and Cables amongst the Maldiva Islands, and was obliged to run the Briggantine ashore at Maratan, which lye about one hundred Leagues to the Southward of Bonnevoula, or if we had not lost our stores we had been gone long before they thought of doing us any mischeif. Bonnevoula lyes in the Lattitude of 17 55 [S.] a reef of Rocks which runs about two miles into the Sea makes the Harbour where their Ships lyes, but most of the Pyrettes live upon a River seven Leagues to the Northward, it's one of the most easyest things in the world to burn their Ships, and if they could be kept from Shipping three or four years, they wod. [w last away by sickness into a capacity of doing us no further mischeif in India, should they be at Sea, and any Ship comes out with that design, if they'l lye either at the Mauritius, or at Donmaskareen as they'l most certainly meet them they constantly touching at these two Places in their homeward bound Voyage, The Neptune Galley (won. is the only Ship now have) is about Two hundred Tons, and will carry 26 Guns, she looks a long Ship without board, but is a very crib within, and sail but indiffirently especially before the wind: This year I beloive they'l stay ashore and spend what they have got as is usuall with them; they seem weary of the Red Sea the Moors Ships being too strong for them, their next cruize will be in the streights of Malacca where I suppose we shall hear of them whenever they goe to Sea; let them make themselves as strong as they can, they can't raise above seventy or eighty Europeans, I don't think there's above one hundred on the whole Island.

The 10th of March we left Madagascar to our infinite satisfaction just as we were ready to sail the Pyrates sent on board us Cap^t. Miller five of his officers, and four of his men with M^r. Forbes Second Supra Cargoe, of the Ship, three or four dayes after we had been at Sea Miller dyed, soe did M^r. Forbes and all the Officers we have buryed both our Mates, our Boatswain and one Christian Fellow, Captain Jones and myself very narrowly escaping, there is on board of us fourteen [a few words lost] or two of Goods of the Owners of the Riseing Eagle, and to the amount of about Fourteen Chests of the Governours Benjamin (the Rest being lost in the Storme) which was all we could save, we arrived here the 10th. June without bringing any answere to your Hon¹³. Letter.

Whereas the Houses in the Pedde Naigues Petta belonging to the Left hand Cast do deprive the Right Hand Cast of the Liberty of making their Weddings in that street, that those of the Left hand living in the aforementioned houses, shall remove from the date hereof to the Eastward of Ecaum[bree]surras Pagoda so to the back side of Vincatty Narrannapas stone Choultry, from thence directly to the southward, where they are to joine the Two streets from the Front of Applas Garden[s], which are to the Southward and Northward and to proceed no farther then Gulla Annitches Ho[use] in the Northward street, where stands a Well from thence to goe to the Northward as far as [a few words lost] House, from the [a few

Tis farther agreed that the Left Hand Cast shall have possession of the street from Nautwarree Pillarrees Pagoda to the Westward. The two Alleys one from the front of Ramma Lingas House standing in the Braminys street, and the other to the southward of Durma Rasullas Pagoda, are both appropriated to the use of the Left hand Cast, for liberty of making their Weddings Feasts &c. Ceremonies, as likewise all thereabouts

The streets to the Eastward of NAUTWARREE PILLARRES Pagoda to appertain entirely and solely to the Right Hand Cast, and all the Westward to the Left hand.

The Ecaumerresurras Pagoda and Vincatty Narrannapa's stone Choultry to be free in use to [both] Partys.

As to their Burialls the Left hand Cast are to carry their Dead to Bun[GAR] Ammas Garden thrô' the Westward street, and [if nee]ded they make any weddings &c. in the Country and back again, they are to observe the ffollowing agreement. They are to goe from the North street to Terrottees street, so to the West fronting Gulla Anniches House, from thence to Raisum Applas Garden, so the Southward, where stands a Choultry free to both Partys, which they are to pass by, and from thence [a few words lost] Country, withall their musick [a few words lost] again to Quomma Leeshoorashs Petta.

Those of the Right Hand Casts liveing in the two aforementioned streets are to leave their Habitations ther [ein] to retire to those of the Left hand Cast in the PEDDER NAIGUES PETTA which is with the mutuall consent and Approbation of each Cast, as is likewise everything here incerted relating to our streets, Weddings, Feasts, & Ceremonies.

None of the Gardens to the Westward of Mr. Empsons Street [a few words lost] Left hand Cast [a few words lost] with [the consent and] the [appro]bation of the Owners [a few words lost] are any of the Right hand Cast to build any houses on [the] said Gardens, as P Agreement between both Casts.

If either of the Casts shall presume to break or disturb the Agreement (to which they have assented) they are to pay the sum of Twelve thousand Pagodas to the R^t: Hon^{ble}. Company and to be punished as the Government shall think fitt.

Your Excellency cannot but know, that Miliapore is a troublesome neighbourhood to us, creating always disputes and quarrells, little advantage to the King, nor will it ever be more, which could we obtain, & the Town of Trivitore on the other side of us, it would make us easy and increase the Riches of the Kings Country.

And whereas the Goods we import are Generally carryed to the Capitall Citys of Golcondah and Vizapoor &c. which Trade we should much increase if there was noe Custome pay'd upon 'em between this Place and those Citys, and that the Mettas about us, which of late years have been increast, to the plague and ruine of Trade, were lay'd aside, which only find employs for some little people, who destroy Trade by their Vexa[tion] and Extortion, and in the main very much less[en] the Kings Revenue.

And we humbly desire that you would get inserted in a Phirmaund that whenever we are so unfortunate as to loose any Ship in any part of his Majestys Dominions, that we shall have the liberty to preserve what we can of the [wreck] without any molestation from the Government which is [only] a practice throughout y. wo[rld] but the Inhabitants are Generally Commanded to assist therein, for 'tis a great hardship that after the great Risgoe People have run of their lives, they shall not be at liberty to save what they can of their Estates we must own with great thankfullness that this Justice has been granted us by former Perwannas from Cawn Bahaudar, and the present Nabob, but as it has been formerly disputed it may again, won nothing but the Kings Gracious Grant can prevent.

We extreamly want the Kings blessing & favour to give a new b[eginning] to our Trade, for since yo'. Excell, went hence, this Place has lost near Three Lack of Pagod. by misfortunes, and most by Pyrats, so that its become Poor; and nothing can contribute to the retreiving our Losses, but Gods blessing the Kings favour and your Excellencys continuance in assisting of us.

Here are Ships in few days that will depart for Pegue, when shall write the King what you advised in your former Letter that an Ambassad^r. was coming to him.

Cawn Bahawder always showed himself a freind to our Nation, whose favours we cannot but retaine with great thankfullness, so have wrott him a Lett. which comes herewith, and a Copy of it in your Excellencys, see leave it to your pleasure whether it shall be delivered him.

If please God we are see fortunate as to be blessed [by the King so as to obtain] his Royall Phirmaund we humbly Entreat your Excellency to appoint some able Person to see it see fully penn'd, as that it may not admit of any dispute from the Nabobs and Governours where the same is to be executed, our dependance is intirely upon your Excellencys Freindship, for which we shall be alwayes full of our acknowledgements, and heartily wish your Excellency and all your Family health and prosperity.

Governour to Lend Five hundred Pagodas from his Account, who answered them that it was [the] Companys possitive orders to Lend none of the Companys money to any People whatever, nor that their Governours, or any in their service should lend any money to any in the Country Government, upon the penalty of being discarded their service, and that was to prevent the like dispute that happen'd between Mr. Holcombe and the Government at Vizagapatam but considering our dependance to procure a Phirmaund is upon the Freindship of the aforesaid Ladys husband the Governour acquaints the Council that he promiss'd to procure a Merchant to Lend that money if Auga Mackeem a Merchant of this Place, would give his Bond for it, which he had done for Five hundred Pagods. to [Venkittee Chit]tee to be repay'd in Four months with [a few words lost] Bond being now produced 'twas [a few words lost] Five hundred Pagod'. be on the Companys account, and repay'd the Govern. out of [his cas]h, being a thing absolutely necessary at this [stage] thô not to be drawn into a President for the future.

The Company having a sorrell Persia Horse good for little, and there being some people about to buy him, 'tis agreed the Governour sells him for what he can get.

We having had lately more Thefts and Robberys committed in this City then usuall, and finding they daily increase, to prevent which, 'tis agreed y'. all Persons as [may be found guilty] shall be punished by being whip'd at a Cart through all the streets [of] the Black Town, and afterwards lye in Prison till an opportunity presents to send them to the West Coast where they are to be the Companys slave[s] for Ninety Nine years, and this order to be published by setting it up on every Gate of the Black Town.

The Three Head Boatmen having been long since co[nvicted] for contriving and abetting the opening the Companys Bales as they went on board the Dutchess as & Consultation 10th. February last, and since have been whipt round the Town as part of their Punishment then ordered, and from time to time have lain in Prison, daily making application to us to suspend that part of the [sentence] that orders them to be Pillard and loose their Ears and offer for their attonement to pay Five hundred Pagod. into the Companys Cash, which is now agreed to be received, and the three Persons to be discharged provided that the Peddeniague will give security for their good behaviour for the future, and that they shall not at any time be contriving or abetting any Villany amongst the Boatmen or others.

The Governour being advised from Pegue that a Conicoply one Ausapau that went hence on one of the Ships thither had had the impudence to counterfiet a Letter to the King of that Country as if it came from the Governour here, and with it sent a Present, for which he had an advantageous returne in Elephants as usuall, so to prevent the purnishous consequences that attend such Vile Practices, the Governour seiz'd him as soon as he returned, and put him in Prison, and intended to have punished him severely, but having been there a Fac[tion of] severall Merchants of the Place, to whom [he] had not yet rendered any Account, and it is thought he never would if he is disgraced by a Punishment. Tis therefore agreed that he be fin[e]d for his crime Two hundred Pagod's to be pay'd into the Companys Cash, & give security he never more goes to Pegue.

All health lately Zoode Cawn sent your Hon. a Husbulhockum and Tashereef from the King by his own Chubdarr and six Peons, and has also informed me of the whole business which I here inclose which when Translat'd your Honour may observe the Contents, you doubtless know the Custom to be observed when you Receive the Kings Tashereef, On Sunday I shall come to your Place, and wait upon your Honour and informe you of the whole matter which will be very acceptable news to you, please to advise whether I shall stay out of the Town with the Tashereef or come to your Honour and leave the Tashereef, and where your Hon. will receive it, there is along with me 2 Mogulls and twelve Peons, so desire your Honour would please to order your Mettas to permitt them to come in.

FROM ZOODE CAWNE LORD HIGH STEWARD OF KING SHAW ALLUMS HOUSEHOLD TO AGA MOOKEEM, DATED 2918. OCTOBER 1708.

The King is now at Saufrabauda bidder, and continues his marches daily and in a short time will reach Gulcondah when I beleive the troubles will be appease'd.

The Governour of Chinapatam's Petition is arrived which have presented to the King by Caun Canaun, who ordered him to remember him of it when he is arrived at Gulcondah about the Phirmaund which he promises to Grant as requested, and upon my desire he has Granted Tashereifs and an Husbulhookum about some other busyness to the Governour with Caun Caunauus Seal, which he has ordered me to send which have sent by my faithfull Chubdarr Cossee, but if Mulla Moraud and Hodgee Mahomud are gone from you before this arrives you may carry it, and leave the Tashereif at the Mount, and goe yourself to the Governour and show my Lett. and tell him that he should goe to the Mount and receive it with all manner of respect as accustomary and put on the Cloths, which when received he ought to send an answere to the Husbulhookum with his Presents for him and the Princes and all the Great Omrahs, with all hast possible, and the Governour must take care to obey what mentioned in the Husbulhookum before the Presents and Petition are arrived the whole business will be finished: I have wrott to the Governour what things will be acceptable, and he will act accordingly, and whatever I advised ought not to be published till the settling of this business, if Mulla Moraud and Hodgee Mahomud are with you, you must all goe to the Governour, and goe along with him to ye. Mount and act according to my advice, because 'tis extraordinary business; I have used my utmost endeavours with ye. King on the Governours behalf, if he sends Presents to the Amount of Fifteen or twenty thousand Rup. his business will be done effectually, and he will get twice or thrice that value from the King, Princes and Omrahs, in Horses, Tashereefs &c a see he must not be troubled at the sum for 'twill be for his Honour and Interest, if he sends more the reward will be his.

You may acquaint the Governour that I have given my utmost assistance to their Company in this business, and shall continue so to doe, and be sure to tell him that this is the time for the English Nation to get whatever they desire and other Merchants.

The Governour should Petition the King to destroy the Pyrats Mulla Abdull Fuzeel will come from Gulcondah to the Governour with the Tashereef formerly delivered him, and I will procure Horse wth. Gold Furniture, to be sent you with it, and pray give him your assistance in the Pegue business, I am informed that the King of Pegue has sent his ship, with their Embassadors of which pray advise me.

He shall do the best of his Endeavours to stop up the wayes from Metchlepatam, and all other Sea Ports on that side, and to forbid all Ships and other Vessells in the Surest manner he can. And to this purpose he shall write in the strictest manner to his Gomastahs that if Mahomud Cawn Bux should have a design to fly by way of the Sea, that they will not let him be able to do it, But do their Endeavours to deliver him killed, or a Prisoner into the hands of Power. And he shall use endeavours, that travellers may pass in safety in those Parts, and Trade to and fro in quiett and unmolested; And herein he shall shew all the Duty and service he is able and according to his good service he may expect a Retribution. Writt the 9th. of Shaban

FROM CAWN BAHAWDER TO THE GOVERNOUR OF CHINAPATAM.

RECd. 13th. DECEMBER 1708.

To the Chosen of his Cast, the Head of his Nation, The Exemplar of his people, The Cheif of his Tribe, The great among those that are in favour, and the Sincere of Freinds, Thomas Pitt of Chinapatam Englishman, Be it known, That the writing which he sent with a Petition to the Throne of Greatness and Power did arrive. And the Petition was presented before y°. bright and resplendent Eyes of his Majesty. In regard, that Chosen of his Cast, hath not as yet sent a Present to his Majesty upon his accession to (sitting upon) the Sacred Throne, resembling the throne of Heaven; The Royall Phirmaund in the name of that Exemplar of his people is not come forth. It must be that he send a Present, that is suitable; that at the coming forth of a Royall Phirmaund, and the Graces of the Imperiall Throne (whose Dignity is eternall) he may rejoyce; hold up his head more then this, what is left to write.

FROM ZOODS CAWN LORD HIGH STEWARD OF KING SHAW ALLUMS HOUSEHOLD TO THE GOVERNOUR OF CHINAPATAM.

REORIVED THE 13th. DECEMBER 1708.

LORD OF POWER, and a NUMEROUS PEOPLE, and my BEST OF FREINDS.

May the Gentle breath of the Divine Grace, and the Beneficence of the Throne of Majesty, and Providence, Protect the State and States of your Magnificence and Magnanimity; and refresh the Garden of your thoughts and safety.

After the highest degree of Freindship and affection which hath no bounds; Be pleased to know, that your Letter containing your reciprocall ffreindship within these few days made known, together with your Petition to the Throne, the refuge of mankind, the Place where Kings pay their Devotion at, and your Petitions to his Excellency Nabob Jumlat Ulmulk, Muddar Ulmaham, Chan Channan Bahadar, *Zepher Jang, 'Vefadar, and therein also your answere to the Kings Sacred Husbulhukum. And your Petition to the Nabob Backshee Mummalick. i. e. Backshee of the whole Empire, Amir ul Omrae, arrived in a happy time, And the Petition by means of Muddar Ulmaham (the Prime Minister) was presented before those standing about the Royall Throne, and passed the bright and sacred look. And because of the great favour & affection the Kings Majesty had for your Honour, the Bright Throne of Majesty and Grace bath bestowed upon you a Vest of Honour, a Glory and Credit to the Shoulder that wears it; imparting Joy and lustre, exalting the head, and other glorious good things. And of all that wear hatts within the Ports of his Majestys Dominions this favour is first bestowed on you, for that your Hon". fidelity (devotion) to the Service of his Majesty, and your well wishes for his prosperity, by the favour of Chan Channan Bahadar, and the kindness of Amir Ul Omrae, and by the good endeavours of this your wellwisher, being constantly represented to the Sacred Throne, your Honour of all those that wear Hatts in the Degree of good service and sincerity, and also of understanding appeared the first. And by these means the favours of the Royall Throne were bestowed on you. And according to your desires the matters of Trade, and the flourishing of the Sea Ports by the Blessing of God and the Kings Power will be as it ought. It is necessary you return thanks for soe great a favour, and that, according as we were wont to discourse by way of Freindship and Familiarity, when together, to the purpose that care should be taken for the flourishing of the Sea Ports, and securing of the ways by sea, and the passing to and fro of Merchants of all Countrys; particularly that the passing to and fro of Musslemen, Europeans and other people be secured, you would see it done. And the Petitions you send upon this subject Vizt. for the safety and security of the ways by sea, and yo. flourishing of his Majestys Ports; must sett forth before the I hrone of Greatness and Power, How within these few years, a great quantity of the wealth of Musslemen

by men set on mischief without any reason hath been plundered and made away with; and likewise what Losses Europeans have suffered, which yourselfknows very well so that it is expedient for well minded men such as your Hon. is, to bend their whole thoughts for the removing of this mischief. That the ways by Sea should be in this confusion, and the going and coming of Ships stop'd, Judge in yourself what it is. And by that mean's what great Losses Chinapatam hath suffered in particular. Blessed be God the Lord of all, that his Majestys Angel-like care extendeth over all States of men, small as well as great, in doing of Justice and. righteousness, in shewing of Mercy, in spreading his Loving kindnesses, and like the Sun, in Cherishing the least motes, and in making much of the Poor and Stranger. In like manner the Kings Royall sons Jahan and reJuhaman Jumlat Ulmulk, Muddar Ulmaham. Bachshihee Mummalick, Amir Ul Omrae, and the rest of the Ministers of the Throne of Greatness and Power spend all their asspiring thoughts on the Flourishing of the Citys, and making the State of their People easy. His Majesty hath given an order that after his arrivall at HyderAbada, The Gracious Phirmau, • Guloondah. and your requests shall have the Honour of being Granted. To this effect the Kings Husbulhookum containing some other points, and an answere to your Petition to the Nabob Jumlat Ulmulk Chan Channan Bahadar, Zepher Jang, Vefadar, being come forth will arrive you. In regard of the good and sincere service of your faithfull self, This favour is particularly bestowed on you. It is therefore necessary that according to the way good subjects walk in, yourself walk in the same. The very moment this Husbulhookum arrives you, you are to write to all the Sea Ports, whether belonging to English or to others, where they have a Factory; And to all others, French, Dutch &ca Chargeing them strictly to perform, as therein is directed. And for so doing Lett them know, that their reward shall be in the highest degree. And as to an Answere to the Royall Husbulhookum, and the request you shall have to make, Lett it be after the manner that your wellwisher according to your desire hath writt to you in a seperate Paper, Vizt. the List of Presents and another; and after the way and Custom of the Derbarre, and the way of carrying on of business Let a Petition and Present to the King, to his Highness Jumlett Ulmulk and to the Bachshee Mummalick be sent, and in all respects your thoughts may be at For that by the Blessings of God, all matters will be accomplished according as our Freinds and well wishers would have them your Petition to his Highness Omeer Ul Omrae arrived; the answere to it I have sent, it will come to your hands, what shall I adde more, but my desire to see you, may all matters end well and happyly.

Honble, S.

Abul ffazel who hath been Entertaind to goe from his Majesty to Pegue. will have his dispatches from the Throne, and be sent away immediatly after the arrivall in Hydar Abad, that being arrived in Chinapatam he may goe whither he is bound. The rest which is ordered to goe by Abull Fazel, likewise with it by the same hand perhaps may goe a Horse with a Gold Furniture, We have heard that in persuance to what your Honour writt, The ZameenDar" of Pegue had sent a Person and a Ship for Chinapatam to wait on Abul ffazel and carry him thither. If this be true, pray advise of it, and write away presently an answere to all affairs in the same manner as I write you and send a Petition and Piscash to the King. Know that the favours of the Good and Great King spread over you more and more. It is necessary you let noe man know the Contents of the Husbulhookum under the seal of the Nabob Jumlut Illmulk; And in like manner the Paper I writt you apart, let it be read in private and accordingly, having well considered of it send an answere.

You will doe well to send Raritys, and they will be accepted.

Birds of the Sorts, of Manila Parrots, Newries, Cocatores &c. or of any sort or kind, that can speak; of a good colour and shape. Birds with copple crowns, and of other fashions.

Broad Cloth of the Finest sort, Perpetuances, Sarges &ca. of every colour and of every sort a good many.

Of Silks, Europe, and China, ZerBaftaes, Brocades of good Colour and good fashions.

Allso Europe Vellvetts, Atlasses, and Japan ware of any kind or sort.

Lacker'd Vessells and Porcelane, Scrutores, Targetts & Calamdanes &c. you may send; also Lackerd Scrutores sett with Mother of Pearle.

China Ware whatever is Rare and Fine of any kind or sort, the older the better; The Dishes called Ghoorees which break when Poyson is put into them, will be very acceptable, you must by all means send some of them Small Bowles; Coffee Cups, Muggs &c*. a good many.

Glass ware Flint, as Glass bottles with long necks, Glass cupps and Bowles, Glass Lanthornes, Looking Glasses large and small, Drinking Glasses of Flint, Bookaes of severall Colours, and Hookaes plain, Ditto with Gold or Silver Flowers made in Venice and England, a good quantity of each sort.

Boxes with clock work, China Skreens with clock work both Painted and with images; Images and Juneks yt. goe with clock work &ca. Raritys of this kind & fashion will doe.

Gold and Silver plate Manilha work (Philigreen) Vessells of Silver, Gold plate enamell'd, Europe worke; if to be had will do.

Flowers of Silk of Shells &c*. done according to Art, are also good.

Europe fusees, one or two small feild peices &c. Gunn[s] will not be amiss.

Swords the best of the best Longsticks for pikes, and Lances of Cane &c.

Orange Trees in potts, which Merchants bring from Pegue, Atcheeu, China &c*.if any to be had, please to send them they will do mighty well. Or if any Flower Trees or fllower plants be brought from Europe at this time in potts, Let them be sent they will be proper.

Persia Carpetts large and small Namads dashagge large and small.

Childrens play things that are very fine of what kind soever you may send.

Tapestry hangings or Curtains Europe wrought with Figures &c. If there be any Europe spreadings, in the nature of Carpetts or Shetteringes (Europe worke) finely wrought with figures; or in the nature of skreens, curtains, or Curtains before a Doore that will looke well at a distance, they will doe.

A Good Elephant, A Good Horse, Atcheen Horses, the best of the best, and Bengall Horses will also doe.

Good peices of Ambergrease will doe extreamly well; and is the best of all things.

Clocks and watches that stricke or have Chimes, you must by all means send.

Black lead and Red lead pencills of Europe.

Sea Coco Nutts the best of the best.

For a Nazer (Present) to the King upon his accession to the Throne, a good Rubie, a good Topase (Busarack) a good Sapphire, or if it be an Emerald Ring, or a Serpeechah (a head band) or a Giegha (a Jewell sett upright on the Crown of the

head) to the amount of Five or six thousand rupees; if you send it will doe well; and it will not be Lost, for you will receive in proportion which will be a retribution.

Again of the severall kinds of spices, as Cinnamon, Cloves Nutmeggs and their Oyles; if you send they are proper. Likewise, Raritys of Europe, of China, of Cathay, of Persia &c. Countrys (Hindostan excepted) are all Proper. Vessells, aftabahs (ostos) of white Copper, which they bring from China that are well made.

Of the Kings Rosewaters, The best of the best of Europe Rosewaters; such as you used to send to Dowed Cawn, & other Sorts of Persia &c. you must send along with the Present. Two or three great men desire it mightily, and gave orders about it, what this means let no man know.

The Nazers or Presents, considering the business you have, must not be less. All your business by the grace of God will goe according to your wishes. For from each of the Persons before mentioned, your Honour will receive twice or thrice the kindness. You have business in Bengall, in Suratt, and in all Parts of the Empire, The good countenance and acquaintance of each of them is expedient for the present time, what I have to add a Disire to see you.

FROM ZOODE CAWN LORD HIGH STEWARD OF KING SHAW ALLUMS HOUSEHOLD TO THE GOVERN² OF CHINAPATAM. Rec^d. 13th. December 1708.

GREAT SE: AND THE STRENGTH OF MY ARMES .-

You writt to have inserted in the Phirmân that shall come forth, that none shall stop, or hinder the carrying away of such Goods or Plank as shall come ashore, in case any of your Merchants Ships be Cast away. Allso your requests for taking off the Customs on all your Goods, that shall pass from Chinapatam to HyderAbad and Vizapore, allso your desire to have put into your hands Meilapore and Trevetore, which lyes to the Northward. Allsoe the taking away all the Choukies about Chinapatam, which for some years past have been very many. All this was represented to the King, and allso made known to the Nabob Dumlat Ulmulk Muddar Almeham; And the Kings order came forth, that after his arrivall in Hyderabad it should be done, and Jumlat Ulmulk also promised the same. In fine, untill the arrivall of your Pishcash, and your engaging for the other affair the raising of the Rents, the whole Revenues of each Place, the Pishcash certain for every year. And to yt. effect what Pishcash will you agree to give the first year, and your engagement for the whole (i.e. the whole you will engage to give) what will it amount to? and in what nature you make your Petition; untill these things be represented to the King; all your Seeking will be in vain.

FORT ST GEORGE, DECEMBER 1708—

But to declare your wellwisher his opinion in you matter, and what I think of your business, In regard tis the begining of the Kings happy Reign, and his Majestys sacred thoughts do cheifly regard the well governing and the case of his people and subjects, and the flourishing of his Kingdoms; It is necessary in the first place that your Honour do endeavour the effecting of that business, for which the Husbalhookum was issued forth. If that cannot be done Let so much be done, as that your good service may recommend you. and after the Letter thanks, which you shall write to his Majesty for the Present of Vest, & his Highness Jumlat Ulmulk; Lett it be your Request, that since for severall years last past by reason of the troubles given to Europeans in Suratt, and by the stop put to Trade great Damages have accrued to Merchants, I am now in hopes, that of your benevolence and goodness, the business of Trade may be carryed on in all Ports, as it was wont to be before those troubles of Suratt, and that the requests I have to make may be accepted; I will be security for the Passages by Sea, that such Ships, as shall goe to Persia, Kaabut Ulla (Mocha) (a) &cn. nobody shall meddle with them, and that the Merchants of all Countrys shall goe and come without any molestation, and if at any time a Ship shall happen to be taken, I will either find out the Goods, or else be answereable for the same. At this time by means of the wellwisher of mankind a Phirmand and a Changer have been sent to the Governour of Muscatt, that according tc former Customs the Men and Ships of Muscatt may freely goe and come to Suratt; and that they may forbear their Custom of setting upon and hindering such as would pass that way. In like manner the Dutch by means of Amanat Chan are allowed to Act, as was Customary heretofore. In fine the time is now come, that your thoughts. should be perfectly at ease, as to these things, and your Honour also to come in and in due season let them endeavour, that in all the Ports of the Kings Empire, no Europe Nation whatsoever but the English shall have either Power or Credit; and such a thing at this time with a little endeavour may be accomplished. The year that his late Majesty went on his Journey to Setara, all the English Nation Presenting themselves before the Throne, Requested some Ground near Metchlepatam to. build a small Fort & Factory upon. Now that there is that firm freindship and familiarity between us; and my thoughts are sett on the quietness of Gods people, the flourishing of the Sea Ports, and that Merchants of all parts may arrive in safety to the places they are bound for and by all means to tre up the hands of injurious men from hurting of Gods Servants. It is my desire for your sake having regard to the Freindship between us, and ye. Credit of your Honour, that of all those that were Hatts, what Nation soever they be of, none whatever should be able to appear. I write without either Interest or design whatever is done for the securing of the ways by Sea, & allso for putting of an end to these evills, and that the Goods of Gods people may not be plunder'd and destroyed The endeavours which your valiantness shall use here shall bave their reward (Good and happy days) in this world and in the next. It is request herein you exert your utmost.

The manner of the times, and the manner of the men at Court, are not as heretofore, as to aim only at their own good, and not to seek the good (flourishing) of their Citys, and the ease of their Subjects. And now that your old Freind is at Court, whatever things freindship and acquaintance do oblige us to; I must by all means doe these things for you my acquaintance and my Freind. The very moment the Vest of Honour shall arrive you and the Kings Husbulhookum you must write a Letter (Petition) of thanks for the Vest presented you, and whatever is customary by way of homage and service and in regard it is the begining of the Kings happy reign you must send a Present according to your present ability either by way of Metchlepatam, if the Monsoon Serves, or else along with the Nabob Dowed Cawn, or by way of Kuhmum, which is the nearest way to HyderAbad. And according to the List sent you apart, and a Present of whatever shall be procureable. And let your Petition as to those things you have to request be writt to this purpose. That having regard to the flourishing of the Sea Ports in his Majestys Dominions, I am in hopes that English Fact[ories] may be settled in all the Ports of the Sacred Empire, and that they may without any molestation mind the business of their Trade: And

in regard that the Port of Meilapore adjoyning to Chinapatam, and that indeed both Ports are one and the same, and by reason of Merchants paying Customs at two Places, and the Choukies kept at Chinapatm. by the people of the Jageerdars, and the Diwans, contrary to former Custom (which are plainly extortion of Dutys) there are continuall Outcrys, and the Ports are utterly ruined and destroyed; It would be a great favour, if we might have the Port of Meilapore and the Village of Trivetore, which is adjoining granted to us, being Places that by reason of their nearness to the Sea, produce neither Green trade (Garden herbs and Fruit) nor Corn. you would Petition for a Town or small Village, say it is; two or three Villages in the Neighbourhood of Chinapatam and Milliapore, by way of a Grant and Rent Free; there is noe harm in it; And moreover in whatever Place within the Ports of his Majestys Dominions, towards the parts of Metchlepalam, Bengall &ca. you shall have a mind to settle Factorys, you may doe it after the same manner, ffor the Rent you must engage that the first year I will advance this much; the second this, and the third this upon the whole (Rent) as pay your Piscash as Customary. And you shall (become engaged) engage for securing the ways by Sea, begining at the parts of Suratt to the parts of Bengali and Chinapatam. The Kings Officers such as the Khazee, the Kateeb &c*. for publick Prayers, and to pray for the Kings Long Life, and prosperity, it will be requisite to have. To declare your well wisher his opinion in the matter it seems to me that your business will be effected. And if in effecting of it you should be at some Charge, there is no harm in it. And in a little time the hands of all Europeans will be tyed up from the Trade of Hindostan and in all these Ports there shall noe Factorys remain but those of the English only. If you should also have a mind to the Port of Pollicatt, it will be given you, and an order shall be issued out to the Phousdar there to take the Fort and deliver it to the English. That you should desire the Port of Pollicherry which belongs to the French, is doubtless requisite, for in regard of the difference between the French and English, that the French should have a Fort there can be of noe advantage. At that time y'. your wellwisher was in the Carnatia, I heard it spoake, and by very many, that they for that reason had built a ffort at Poliicherry, that if they should be so minded they might take Tevenapatam, and be possest of a Place, where assistance, Provissions &ca. might be readily brought them. This also is a consideration worth your thinking on, Att this time the troubles by Sea are not so very great. The Muskatters are satisfyed; and the Dutch have content given them. And your Honour may likewise effect it by these ways, Vizt by procuring of the Peace, the quiett, and the safety of the ways by Sea, which will produce the well being of the people. cause the Sea Port[s] to flourish, and make the ways open. By this means all your Requests (Affairs) will be effected according to your hearts desire. And matters by the Blessing of God (according as your Honour would have them) and the flourishing of the Sea Ports will be accomplished.

Along with your Piscash for the King it is requisite and necessary that you send a Present and a token to the Kings sons Jahan and Jahanian. To Jumlet Ulmulck Cawn Caunaun Bahadar, To the Buxee Mummalick Amir Ulmraee; and the Buxee Ulmulk Chaun Zeman Bahadar, o thethird Buxee which is the son of Jumlat Ulmulk, and Cawn Saman (Lord High steward).

Moreover Let there be something of all the sorts that you send, sent along with the rest, that in case there should be necessity for it in another Place, it may be given as time and occasion shall require and if not 'twill not come [to] Loss, for in the Camp 'twill sell for double the value (ten for twenty) and for the Persons you send with the Present, Lett them be men of understanding [and] Judgement; but let it not be an Armenian or a Mogull. Of Brahmins (those) that have seen business and been in business, and of Europeans those that have seen Persia, and have been a long time in Hindostan, and such a Trusty Person is necessary for the management of these matters, both for to act in (Procurator) and stand responsible (be your sponsor)

for affairs before the King. Or suppose a Factory of Merchandize for the Company should be settled here it may be done. And the profit not less then y' you sent to sea. Your wellwisher who is your Vakeel at this time will by the help of God bring your business to a good issue. In fine, it is necessary that you have a Vakeel, and this affair also, [...] hath done for [alre]ady hath its charges. At any rate having regard to our Freindship and acquaintance, whatever freindship and intimacy oblige us to, that your wellwisher hath performed in the highest degree, and by the Grace of God will perform. I have sett the stamp of (represented) your Honours Faithfull service, sincerity, & wellwishes for his pro[s]perity in such a manner as it ought to be before the King. It was a great way off the King of the Earth and Age, the Emperour of Hindostan should regard your estate. Doe you yourself consider, what the affairs of the English may arrive to, in all degrees of Hon. or in case they should be able to possess themselves of any Island near the Ports on the Coast of Pegue, Ceilone, Malabar &c if they doe request it, noe doubt but an order will be issued forth for so many Ships of Warr to be got ready in Suratt, Hugly and the parts thereabouts to accompany and assist them; or such a Place as Kachar and the part on that side, where they may be assisted by Land, they may possess themselves of them. Mans life in this world is only these few days and no more, a man therefore ought to make it his aim to leave a name behind him, that it may be Chronicl'd in Bookes and Historys, That such an one Governour of Chinapatam was so great a man.

And now all will be soon and well done and in a short time, the possessing, settling and ordering of affairs will be effected in such a manner, as it should and ought. Take care that this affair be made known to nobody but such as you trust with your Secretts, for it will beget you enmity. And let your Petition be sent to your wellwisher under your own hand and seal. Your Honour knows that as to my poor self the good of mankind is the object and center of my thoughts, and have no Interest nor design. I have lived and will live without grieving & without repenting. Your Honour never writt to your wellwisher about these affairs, nor made any requests. By reason of our fireindship there hath not a day past from the first time, that at Akbar Abad I had the Hon. of being admitted to pay my devotion to the King, to this very minute, that in discourse your Honours good service, the help and assistance and yo. ammunition of all sorts, which came from Chinapatam for the taking of the Forts, and your constant well wishes for his prosperity, hath not been represented to yo. King. In very deed you have done all this. And now allso w[*] I request of your Honr. is, that in the present affairs y[on] exert your best endeavours with your whole thoughts, and strive all that possibly you can, that your Freind-[ship] and acquaintance by your good service may have always the way open to represent your matters before the King, and that at all times I may be able to assist in your business, and it may appear to the King, that whatever I have spoken relating to your Honours good services, was the real truth. And that your Honour may be able to be the authour of great atchievements And that before your King and in all parts of Europe, I may also have a name, that such an one assisted such an one, his Freind, in his affairs after such a manner. And my good Freind allso to w[in] a degree of name and Credit shall be arise? that the Governour of Chinapatam was the authour of all these great Atchievements. What shall I write more No doubt is to be made but you will do, all that yr. utmost endeavours can effect. And Let your Letter i.e. Petition to the King be immediatly sent, that after arrivall at Gulcondah, I may use endeavour for the procuring the coming forth of a Phirma[nd].

Ships when they drew nigh the largest we perceived had an English Ensign without the Stoth addition, and Queens Jack and Pendant from which we inferr she was not one of our Ships from Europe, the other had Danes colours, and these two chased a Third being a small ship belonging to an Inhabitant of this Place from Vizagapatam who came safe in tho' they persued her within in a League of this Road when they tacked about to the Northward as near as the wind would permitt and about noone were out of sight.

Stoacks, as Entered after this Consultation, and this morning as soon as it was light, we saw them again to the Northward in with the Shore, and a small Ship that had fallen with them in the night bound to this Port, which made us apprehensive that they design'd to Cruize some time upon us, so to provide for the worst we came to the ffollowing resolutions, That the Warehousekeepers unload what Bales from Bengall and as much of the Rice and Sugar on the Dispatch Gally as would put her in the prime trim for sailing and rowing, and that the Governour aquips her well in all respects and dispatch her in the dusk of the evening with necessary Instructions to Cruiz to the Northward and some times a trip out to Sea to warne all Ships bound to this Port coming this side Pollicatt, resolved also that we write a Letter to Cap¹. Stoacks (as Entered after this Consultation) to order him to get ready to sail at a Minutes warning to joine any Europe Ship of the Companys that should appear, to prevent her becoming a pray to the enemy.

It being the Custom of these Countrys to Gratifye very bandsomely the Messenger that brings a Vest and a Husbulhookum from the Great Mogull, Tisagreed that there be given to the Person who brought one lately to the Governour three hundred Currant Rupees and y°. Paymaster to buy the same, and that he has also given him three yards Scarlet and his Charges till his dispatch.

The Secrett Packet Directed to Bengall was now delivered to the Governour for his drawing out private Instructions for the Mountegues homeward bound sailing.

I have given them (I mean the Peon) a note to deliver you first, to know what you are, and not to give this Letter till they are sure you are English, I have also wrott to the Cheif of Sadrass to give you his assistance I am
