This Board cannot see any reason to allow him anything from the time that M<sup>r</sup>. Henry Davenport arriv'd Fort St. David with the character of Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. And M<sup>r</sup>. Harrison remain'd in the Fort adhœring to, & acting with M<sup>r</sup>. Raworth & his Accomplices.

We wrote your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. the 4<sup>th</sup>. instant, the original of which was sent by your returning peons, & the copy to Bengall design'd to be forwarded by Shipping. This is chiefly to convey the inclos'd Letters One from Syud Sallabut Cawn Behauder, another from Zeowdy Cawn to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>., as likewise recommendatory Letters from each to Sadatulla Cawn, with whom Zeowdy Cawn pretends He has a particular freindship, & acquaintance, so that He expects a great deal of Notice will be taken of his Letter.

We have advices here that Hassen Ally Cawn and Dowd Cawn are come to a rupture in Barrampore so that 'tis likely a battle will ensue, the latter having engag'd many of y<sup>e</sup>. Decan Country to his party, it's whisper'd at this Court that this is a design laid to involve Hassen Ally Cawn in trouble & retrench his grandeur which [of] late has not been very pleasing.

The King proceeding no further than Pony-Pun[t] return'd to the City the 15<sup>th</sup>., but being a little disorder'd in his health has not made any publick appearance, so that We have not had an opportunity to deliver the remaining part of our present, or commence our Negotiation which shall be done by the first.

Our last to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. was August the 31<sup>st</sup>. since Which we have not receiv'd any Letters from Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. We then advis'd that We had prepar'd our General Petition. We design'd to have presented it the first good opportunity, but his Majesty's indisposition continuing, and M<sup>r</sup>. Hamilton having him [under] cure, it has been thought advisable by our freinds as well as ourselves to deferr delivering it till such time as it shall please [God] that his Majesty in some measure returns to his former state of [health] Which advice, We intend to follow considering that whilst He is in [so] much pain it can be but a very indifferent opportunity to beg favour of him, The first distemper the Doctor took him in hand for was swellings in his groin which thanks be to God He is in a fair way [of] curing, but within these few days last past, He has been taken with violent pain in his posteriors, which is likely to come to a fistula, [w<sup>ch</sup>.] hinders his Majesty from coming out, so naturally puts a stop to [all] manner of business wherefore must have patience perforce.

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. will have heard of the Death of Dowd Cawn in Ducan, Slain in a battle with Omeer All Omrah, this has given a great deal of uneasiness to this Court, it being quite otherwise laid by the King and his favourites, and that which was design'd for Omeer All Omrahs ruin, has proov'd a great addition to his former glories. The King at first seem'd to resent it to his Brother, who not taking it so patiently as He expected, He has alter'd his resolution to Sending Hassen Ally Cawn a Seerpaw & c<sup>t</sup>. marks of favour. We have advis'd in our Letters to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Councill of Madrass to have particular regard to the freindship of that great Omrah, otherwise whatever We shall be able to do here for that Coast will be of little Service, unless backed with his favour.

The Kings indisposition has much impeded the forwardness of our Negotiations, so that want of matter has occasion'd our long silence, We hope his Majesty is at present in a fair way of Recovery, which if it pleases God to grant it must of necessity redound to the honour and credit of our nation, He having been under the sole care of our Surgeon, who has administred much to his Majesties Satisfaction.

Without doubt the whole Decan Country has rung with the engagement and victory of Omeer All Omrah over Dow'd Cawn, the glory that has accrued to that great man on this Account has been a particular mortification to this Court, but however We find he is little disturb'd at it, being as it were too unweildy to be check'd by any Court favourite or even the King himself. Being pretty well assur'd of this before was the reason of advising yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. in our formers to keep a good Correspondance with him, but that your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. might have some grounds to go upon, We thought we could not do better than gain a Recommendatory Letter from his Brother the Vizier in favour of the Chormandell Factories, the Letter with it's copie for perusal comes inclos'd. We hope this Letter will have the design'd effect, it being wrote very candidly as Wee esteem' it in our behalf.

The cure of his Majesty's indisposition will [We] hope be effected in a few days, when We shall go on with our business & We hope with Success in the mean time We are.

1<sup>st</sup>. The English Company pay no custom in Indostan, (Surat excepted), In the Subahship of Behar, Bengall and Orixa, they are custom [free] according to the Phirmaund of the Great Aurengzeb, The Nishaun of the deceas'd Azimuth Shaw, Azzimtarra and Sha Sujah, The Husbulhookum under Assid Cawns Seal, and former Sunnuds and orders instead of which to this day, they pay yearly 3000 rupees into the treasury of Hughly as a Piscash.

2. In Calcutta the Company have a Settlement De[wani] Calcutta, Govindpore and Sootaluty, which three towns being [near] the ffactory, his deceas'd highness Azzimuth Shawn gave to be rented by the Company. The rent of these three towns above[named] according to the Kings books amounts to Rup<sup>s</sup>. 1194: 14 and some more which is yearly paid into the Treasury. We humbly [petition] that the renting Several other Towns, that are near the above [Towns] and whose rent

amounts to near or about 8000 rupees may be gr[anted] to the Company, that the rent shall be yearly and duely paid into the Kings Treasury by us, and that particular care shall be taken to [make] them flourish. We further petition that the Town of Calcutta may have the great name of Furruckbunder given it & that the [Towns] above which are in other Durgunnaes be made Purgunna, having the name given it of Furruckabad, which will be to the great honour of your Humble petitioners.

In Bengall Beharr & Orixia the Company has Several Settlements and in Several places, We are in hopes by your Majesty's favours to settle others, We humbly petition that in any place where a settlement shall be made forty Begaes of ground be granted by your Majesty to build a house on, and in Patna where for y<sup>e</sup>. long time the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Settlement has been they have rented the house, We are in hopes by your Majesty's favour to have the house of the deceas'd Meir Moduffer, that belongs to the King granted for our residence.

The Compa<sup>s</sup>. Factorys are in many places very much pestered with Phirmausts and impositions laid on them. We humbly petition that your Majesty will be pleas'd to order that in all places, the Company be excepted from Phirmauts, Phousdarry, Jamidarry & all other impositions and that they receive no hinderance on that Account, Their ffactors &c<sup>t</sup>. Servants going on in their business with satisfaction and Content.

In all Subahships the Companies Gomasto's go backwards & forwards to buy and sell, if anything should be stolen (which God forbid) We humbly petition that your Majesty will be pleas'd to give strict orders that the Jemidars &c<sup>t</sup>. of those places thoroughly assist to have due punishment inflicted on those rogues, and that the goods be return'd to their right Owners.

In every Subahship the Duans demand a sight of the Original Phirmaund, as likewise that We receive a particular Sunnud under the Seals of the Subah and Duan of that province, It is impossible to shew the Original grant in all places, for which reason We humbly petition that your Majesty will order, y<sup>t</sup>. a Copy from the Original under the Cojees Seal be sufficient and of force and that no one demand a sight of the Original. Farther that We shall receive no Sunnud from the Subah or Duan, they acting pursuant to the great Phirmaund your Majesty has granted.

In former days the Mint was settled at Dacca and Rajahmaull, where the Companies Gold and Silver was coin'd the Mint at present is in Muxodavad, We humbly petition through the favour of your Majesty that according to former custom the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Gold & Silver may be coin'd in the present Mint, without any Lett or Molestation, that the Mutsuddys of the Mint make no unaccustomary demands, taking the Mintage only and that in the Season, when other Merchants goods are coining, the Company may have three days in a week allow'd to them, which will be a particular favour.

At the time of buying goods in Hughly notes are given by the Droga and Mushreif, which are so tedious that the season of the Year passes before they can be obtain'd and is a great imposition on the Companies Factors, We humbly petition that your Majesty will be pleas'd to order that the Drogas permission of the above-mention'd Port be sufficient to bring goods from Merchants houses to the ffactory by which means We shall be capable to dispatch our Ships at the proper Season.

There was a Mint Settled at Madrass in the reign of Aurengzeb the mony coin'd at which place receives so much  $\frac{3}{4}$  Cent Discompt, before taken into the Treasury of any Subahship altho of the same finess and goodness with Rupees made in Surat, which is a considerable Detriment to the Company, We hope from yo<sup>r</sup>. Majesties favour to have an order on all the Muttsuddy's of every Subahship in India, forbidding that imposition for the future, that said mony pass like that coin'd at Surat and other places, and that they be receiv'd by the Muttsuddy's into the Treasury like all other Siceaes.

It sometimes happening at Sea by reason of Storms & misfortunes that ships are oblig'd to take Port and are now and then wreck'd, The Govern<sup>r</sup>. of those ports frequently seize w<sup>th</sup>.out any reason on such ships and Cargoes, Ships likewise missing their Port and being oblig'd to harbour in Chittagong, Ganjam Namoud-bunder &c. the Governours of these places also have seiz'd both on Ships and Cargo's, sometimes demanding a quarter part Salvage, a[ll] which is to the irreparable loss of the Owners, Thrô the great favour of your Imperial Majesty, We humbly petition that such orders may be given to the Muttsuddys of all Subahships in Indostan that they in no wise offer to trouble or molest us on this Account, but on the contrary assist such ships as much as lies in their power, so that being under the Shadow of yo<sup>r</sup>. Majesty We may pray for length of years & success in all your undertak<sup>s</sup>. whilst with Satisfaction our trade is improv'd to the Great increase of your Majesties Customs.

There is protection given by your Majesties officers to several of the Companies Servants and those from whom debts and Accounts are due, so that neither mony or acco<sup>t</sup>. are procurable, We for this reason humbly petition that your Majesty wo<sup>d</sup>. please to order that whosoever so deserts the Company be sent back to the cheif of the Factory's.

In the Subahship of Golcondah, all the Cornatta Country, the upper and lower Country, Metchlepatam and Vizagapatam, in all which places and ports the Company trade Custom free, at Madrass where they pay yearly the Sum of twelve hundred pagodas into the Kings treasury, We humbly Petition that a fresh grant be given According to former Custom.

The Company have a Settlement at the Port of Vizagapatam for which & four towns more Viz<sup>t</sup>. Moza Perwana, Wooda Punda, Woodall Terra, & Maalcapoor being near the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Settlement 4862 rup<sup>s</sup>. is duely paid into y<sup>e</sup>. treasury of Chicacool, being the yearly rent in the Kings books, amongst these Moza Perwana, and Wooda Punda two towns which pay nine hundred rupees yearly, but are too farr from the Factory, Wee humbly desire may be return'd and that these towns Viz<sup>t</sup>. Alipour, Dundepoor, Fogadass and Cuperah may be granted in their stead, paying what is their yearly rent in the King's books into the Treasury.

Divy Island near Metchlepatam being in y<sup>e</sup>. hands of a rebell, Poligar-Obiram, who sometimes acts as a Subject sometimes otherwise. This Rajah by reason of the desolateness of the place Several times has and does even now invite us to [go] & inhabit there that the Island may flourish, his disobedience to [your] Majesty and the ill name that might accrue to us from our [accepting] his offer has caus'd us always to refuse him, the annual [rent of] this Island is Seven thousand pagodas, We humbly petition the renting this Island may be granted to the Company that they make Settlements there to the great improvement of the Island, and by the currency of trade and inhabiting of Merchants much encrease the customs of Metchlepatam for which We will Yearly pay the accustom'd rent in the Kings treasury.

Momud Cawn Bucks, Assid Cawn and Zulphaca Cawn at the Warr of Chingie for assistance of sending all sorts of ammunition Cannon and provision to the Kings Camp after gaining the Victory as a reward for our Services according to Aurengzeb's order gave the Company five Towns, Trivatore &c. which remain'd in our possession many years, It is now three years that the Kings Officers have seiz'd on them since the reign of your Imperial Majesty. What We assisted against your competitor and acted in Hughly, pursuant to Your Majesties Orders in helping Zeowdy Cawn with all manner of provisions Ammunition &c. Doubtless your Majesty is not unacquainted with, for which reason, Wee humbly petition that those Towns may be regranted.

In the Warr of Chingie the rebels from the Port of Cuddalore sent provisions and ammunition to the assistance of Chingie: for which reason We bought the Town of Cuddalore and some others round it with the permission of the Imperial Court, that by our means the way might be stop'd and no provisions arrive from thence to their assistance, at present several Jemidars &c. round that place are troubling and

molesting, which obliges us humbly to petition your Imperial Majesty to give orders to the Officers and Muttsuddy's of that Province to assist us, by which means, We may be able to punish those who give us any molestation.

At the Port of Surat the Company in the time of Shaw Jehawn paid two  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent custom, in the reign of Aurengzeb  $3\frac{1}{2}$  Cent Viz<sup>t</sup>. 2 Custom and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  Jedjea, in the reign of Behawder Sha  $2\frac{1}{2}$  Cent was order'd which custom is paid at present. Wee have hopes from your Imperial favour that as We enjoy the priviledge of Custom free in other parts We may have the same priviledge at Surat, and that according to the custom of Bengall, a certain yearly piscash may be paid instead of Custom, the reasons are for these twenty years elaps'd, there have been new impositions laid on and injustice done us yearly by the Kings Mutsuddy's, The goods [we] value at one rupee they prize at two, & of which they take custom [with] that severity, that a duty is laid on the very cloaths & Orname[nts &] Wherefore helpless We have been oblig'd for these three years to withdraw that Factory, which cannot be resettled without some particular marks of your Majesties favour such as have been shown to Bengall &c<sup>a</sup>.

Our residence for many years in Surat has been in one of the Kings Houses Which We have rented, at present this house is gone to ruin, and untill such time as your Majesty is pleas'd to give it us, We are incapable to repair it. We humbly petition a grant of it from your Imperial Majesty, as also four hundred Begaes of ground w<sup>th</sup>:out the City, whereon We may make a house and Garden, that so We may satisfactorily encrease our trade, bless our Benefactor and wish him a long and glorious reign.

In the Subahships of Bengall, Behar and Orixa with others in the Kingdom of Indostan, the Company having subordin<sup>te</sup>. Factory's where Englishmen reside, there are likewise some places and Aurungs, where Englishmen cannot be sent, for which reason We make Agreements with Merchants of the Country, giving Impress mony with which they go to the Aurungs and buy goods. In some places the Kings Officers molest and hinder the buying of such goods. Wherefore We humbly petition that pursuant to the Dustuck of the Cheif of that Factory the Merchants may be permitted to trade as Englishmen, and enjoy their priviledges without any hinderance.

RULES FOR THE BETTER ESTABLISHING & MANAGEMENT OF THE CHARITY SCHOOL,  
ERECTED BY THE UNANIMOUS CONSENT OF THE VESTRY OF S<sup>t</sup>. MARY'S PARISH  
IN FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE ON THE 28<sup>th</sup>. OF OCTOBER 1715.

THAT in some convenient place within the English town there be proper accomodations made, at first, for thirty poor protestant Children, [board] and education gratis.

THAT the Scholars be train'd up to a practical sense of religion, and be particularly instructed in the Doctrine of the Church of England as by law establish'd, and therefore no person shall be capable of being Master of the School unless he be qualified according to the acts of Parliament.

THAT the Children whether Boys or Girls shall be taken to the School house at five years of Age or thereabout & [begin] service or apprentice-ships when they are about [twelve years] old; and while they are entertain'd in the School they [shall] be taught to read, Write, Cast Accompts or what they may be further Capable of, and the Girls shall be instructed in reading and the necessary parts of Housewifery.

THAT no Scholar shall be taken in, nor any matter of moment transacted, without the previous consent of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. for the time being.

THAT besides the Ministers and Church Wardens, who shall always be Overseers of the Charity School there be three others chosen yearly by the Vestry for the better management and more carefull inspection of the affairs of the School, and in order thereunto that the said Overseers (or at least four of them) meet every weak at the Vestry and keep minutes of what they agree upon (if it be of any moment) to be laid before the Governour for his approbation.

THAT one of the Overseers annually chosen by the Vestry shall at the same time be nominated Treasurer to the School, and be oblig'd to keep exact regular Accounts of the School Stock and expences to be laid before every Vestry, and before the other Overseers or any of the Contributors when they require it, at any of their Weekly meetings or otherwise.

THAT when the Cash belonging to the School Stock shall amount to the Sum of One thousand pagodas, it shall be employ'd at Sea, or let out at interest by the Treasurer, with the advice of the rest of the Overseers, and the consent of the Governour and if the mony cannot be thus employ'd that it be lent to the Church at the usual interest.

THAT all Bonds, Deeds of Conveyance, and other writs for the use and benefit of the Charity School shall be drawn and granted in the name of the Treasurer, and other Overseers for the time being.

THAT all Legacies, Gifts and Benefactions to the School, whether of money or other things be duely enter'd by the Treasurer in a book to be kept for that purpose, which He shall sign at the foot of every page.

THAT no part of the School Stock shall on any pretence whatsoever be employ'd to any purpose, or in any manner, but what is agreeable to the Original design and institution above express'd.

THAT in all difficult cases and disputes about any matter of consequence, the Overseers shall make application to the Governour for calling a Vestry, wherein all such matters shall be determined by a majority of the Contributors.

THAT the aforesaid Articles shall be the standing Rules and fundamental constitutions of the Charity School, according to which the Overseers shall always be oblig'd to act. And therefore that the said Rules be Registered in the beginning of a Book wherein the said Overseers shall enter all the Subsequent Orders and regulations which they may have occasion to make hereafter concerning the said School providing that such Subsequent Orders shall be first approv'd by the Governour & Council for the time being.

WHEREAS upon enquiry after the effects of Cheva Naigue Keddee &c<sup>t</sup>. Renters who are considerably indebted to the R<sup>t</sup>. Hon<sup>ble</sup>. United Eng<sup>sh</sup>. East India Comp<sup>y</sup>. it appear'd y<sup>t</sup>. Gunnaputtee Chittee dec<sup>d</sup>. had sev<sup>l</sup>. Sum<sup>s</sup> of mony of theirs lodg'd in his hands, whose estate was divided amongst Milapa & Gunnaputtee Chittee, Tonapa Chittee, Durmeroy Chittee & Porto Novo Tonapa Chittee, & Whereas they did agree with the Dep<sup>ty</sup>. Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Coun<sup>l</sup>. of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David on the 14<sup>th</sup>. ff<sup>eb</sup><sup>y</sup>. 17<sup>14</sup>/<sub>15</sub> to pay into the R<sup>t</sup>. Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Masters had approv'd of what [was] done in the time of M<sup>r</sup>. Pitt, but now the board being sensible it [has occasion'd] a great heart burning among the Patan Merch<sup>ts</sup>. afore[said who] annually import great quantities of rich goods from Bengall [and since] that We find they begin to leave us and land their goods at S<sup>t</sup>. [Thoma] Where the present Nabob has granted them a Cowle with sev[erall] priviledges and particularly that they shall pay no more than [ . . . ] 4 Cent Custom, 'tis thought high time to use all means in our [power to] make these people easy, and prevent their forsaking us to [S<sup>t</sup>. Thoma].

In obedience to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. commands I have pen'd down an experiment, which I lately made on Country powder Viz<sup>t</sup>.

FIRST. Do not receive any new Powder, that two Ounces will not carry a four pound Ball above ten chains with a small Mortar, and therewith do commonly find eleven sometimes seventeen.

I have lately observ'd that Powder which has lain [in] the Godown fifteen days, will not carry the same shot more than seven chains, when it has remain'd a month six and a half & when a year four Chains. I have several times try'd this experiment & seldom found it vary.

With submission to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. I shall lay down my opinion what occasions so great a decay in the strength of the Powder & what measures are most proper to remedy it.

The Country Powder being always made as soon as the Salt Petre is refin'd, without allowing it time to dry the moisture before the other compositions are joyn'd to it, is undoubtedly the reason For although the Powder is dried very well, yet after a little while remaining in the Godown, it gives so much that the best part of the Salt Petre goes out, which loss may be prevented by delivering a quantity of Salt Petre to the Powder man, that it may be refin'd before May, & kept upon Boards till August in a Convenient place, [nor] to be expos'd to the Sea air, which the Powder house will furnish at a small charge.

We have esteem'd this as a particular happiness & hope it will prove ominous to the success of our affairs it being the only thing that detain'd us hitherto from delivering our general petition, so pursuant to the orders We receiv'd from Cawndora, the Kings recovery was succeeded by the giving in the remainder of our Present (reserving a small part only till the Ceremony of his marriage should be over) & then deliver'd our petition to Cawndora by his means to be introduc'd to his majesty. Syud Sallabut Cawn who has all along manag'd our affairs under Cawndora, being at that instant & some time before much indispos'd, We were oblig'd to carry it ourselves, with all taking care to have his recommendation Annex'd: since the delivery Cojee Seeraad has been frequently with Caundora to remind him of introducing it to his Majesty, but has always been inform'd no business can go forward till the Solemnization of the Kings Wedding is over when He has promis'd a speedy dispatch. All Offices have been shut up for some days, & all business in the Kingdom must naturally subside to this approaching Ceremony so that We cannot repine at the delay.

Sometime ago We receiv'd yours dated November the 10<sup>th</sup>. which We hitherto forbore answering, in expectation to give some account of our negotiations.

Our first general Petition to his imperial Majesty is [now] return'd & sign'd, as to what respects the trade of Surat is as follows.

To the free trade of Surat, ORDER'D that in the 20<sup>th</sup>. year [of] Aureng Zeb's reign, being at what time the English paid but two Ɔ Cent Custom, the amount of Customs of the English trade be examin'd, pursuant to which a yearly piscash is to be made, & a Phirmaund given them, that there be no further molestation on that Account.

For the ground Petition for without Surat, & the grant of the Kings house in it, the former part is left unanswer'd and to the latter the house is granted to live in, the Muttsuddy's of Surat being Order'd to permit you to build thereon, but without any fortifications.

By the grant of having a piscash in lieu of Customs We have hopes of gaining as good as a free trade, supposing that the trade might not then be so great as lately, & accordingly have been examin'd the books for those times, the only year as yet taken out being the 18<sup>th</sup>. of Aureng Zeb's reign to our Surprize amo<sup>ts</sup>. to 28,000 Rupees, some part of which We must attribute to the private trade, We shall endeavour by bribe<sup>s</sup>. the Muttsuddy's to alleviate the sum as much as possible before the account reaches his Majesty, but being under apprehension that it will not be feazable to bring it down so low, as five or eight thousand Rupees, which are the sums limited from the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. President and Councill of Bengall, We take this opportunity to advise you how affairs stand at present, withall to represent our opinions on this head.

That in case We can get a Piscash settled instead of Customs, We may advance to the Sum of twelve or fifteen thous<sup>d</sup>. rupees Ɔ Annum, which We beleive will prove no little Advantage to our Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Masters, & as this is extensive of all the English trade in general to Surat so it lies in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Companys breast to lay what duties [they] shall think proper on all private trade, thereby contributing to pay the yearly piscash abovemention'd, We desire a Speedy answer to this Article, and also that you will not be too strict in the orders thereon but in some measure leave it to us as We shall see convenient.

We have given a second Petition to the King concerning y<sup>e</sup>. house in Surat, & the ground without it for a house & Garden desir<sup>d</sup>. that the first may be given to the English for ever, and then permission to build upon it, which We have hopes will be granted.

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. will perceive by the notations above that We have not got the full answers we desired to our Petition, but as it is a thing customary at this Court, We were not daunted at those articles, which were as good as denied, but drew up another petition, which that it might not be bulky, We left out all but what was of absolute necessity, hoping to get our meaning explain'd in orders from the Kings Mutsuddys when it arrives them.

OUR SECOND PETITION contain'd the following [articles].

1<sup>st</sup>. A Confirmation of our Phirmaund for a free trade in Bengall Beharr & Orixa, which was by a mistake of the Mut[suddies] before omitted.

2<sup>nd</sup>. That the Surat house be given us otherwise We coul[d not] pretend to build upon it, & for the ground desired [for us] to shew that We have had it by former custom, We [hearing] that there was one belonging to the English, which [...] in by the walling of the City of Surat has since that [time been] lost, at which time the Cheif of that settlement pet[itioned] AurengZeb that the garden stood the Company in 22 [...] which Sum AurengZeb ORDER'D to be allowed in the Customs.

3<sup>dy</sup>. We have petition'd for Divy Island showing that to waitè for an answer from thence, would add a longer time to our negotiation than We expected from the favour of his Majesty, that the letting us have that Island, would be a particular advantage to his Majesty's Dominions, considering there was no port for the harbouring of Ships, on the coast of Chormandell, but that in the Monsoon time they were oblig'd to leave his Majesty's Dominions for want of shelter, Bengall excepted, and winter on the Coast of Arracan Pegu, and the Island of Ceylon, however in case We were permitted to rent this Island of Divy, We should make a Port able to harbour any Shipping, which would of a certainty be an addition to the trade of all those Countrys, and consequently of the Kings Customs, that We dare not presume to offer anything to his Majesty but matter of Fact, humbly begging the renting of that Island may be granted us, according to the truth of our Petition.

4<sup>th</sup>. We petition again for the Towns round Calcutta, that at the granting of Calcutta &c<sup>t</sup>. three towns, it was first given in the Neshawns, & then bought from the Owners, after which admission was given by the Duan of Bengall for the renting of them. That in case the towns We desir'd, were not first mention'd in the Phirmaund, no one would permit us to buy, nor would the Duan any wise assist us in it, for which reasons We humbly petition'd, that those towns might be granted in our Phirmaund that We would get the consent of the Owners from the several Jemedars, and afterwards take admission from the Duan. To this article We have added a List of the Purgunnaes.

5<sup>th</sup>. For Vizagapatam Towns, We have likewise desired they may be inserted, but have not laid so great a stress on them as the above Article, for fear of giving too much Jealousie besides We had no particular account of the rent of those towns which they desired in lieu of the two old ones.

The above articles are what We pick'd out of the former petition as not answering our purpose, and to which We have added two new Articles Viz<sup>t</sup>.

6<sup>th</sup>. To have the liberty of a Mint in Bombay, & that in case those rupees are of the same finess weight & stamp with those at Surat, that they may pass Currant in the Kings Dominions.

The occasion of this article was a Letter lately arriv'd from Bombay [copy] of which comes herewith.

7<sup>th</sup>. We have petitioned for redress to those barbarities committed by Rogues round Calcutta pursuant to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. [order].

This last Petition has been deliver'd in some days, but [thô] We have receiv'd no answer thereto. We have hopes all will be gra[n]ted except Divy Island of which We have some mistrust. We have [been] examining, the Books concerning the entrys of custom for the English trade at Surat. We find it is much encreas'd, by the additions of private trade for the 18<sup>th</sup>. year of AurengZeb's reign amounts to about 2800[0] Rupees, We are still examining other years to find out the [least] which We shall diminish as much as We can, by bribing the Mutsuddies, that We may by that means answer our end in a Piscash. It will be a glorious thing for our Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Masters, if it can be effected but We cannot leave this Article without offering something to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. that has accrued to our knowledge. The reasons of the great ab[uses] committed on the English at Surat, has been cheiffy occasion'd by the many buyers and sellers of English men there, so that for these many Years, there has been a difference made in paying custom from the Company and other English traders as at present, the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Custom is but  $2\frac{1}{2}$  % Cent Whereas all other English traders pay  $3\frac{1}{2}$  % Cent, for which reason We humbly presume that should We get the Custom turn'd into a Yearly Piscash, there would be an absolute necessity to lay aside any Supra Cargo going to that port, with a full power to dispose of any goods, seeing this priviledge will entirely devolve on the Company, so the goods ought to go into their Warehouses, and be dispos'd of by their Servants, which will hinder any future impositions or differences, giving likewise an opportunity for the Company to lay any duty on those goods, which may contribute to the payment of the yearly piscash laid on that trade. We should not have so boldly offer'd our opinion on this head, had not the interest alone of our Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Masters, oblig'd us to it, and besides the unsufferable impositions that for several years past have been on all English men in Surat which We hope will be a Sufficient excuse, farther We humbly desire your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. will please to acquaint us in your next, whether we ought or no to write the same to all the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Settlements in India.

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. will observe the notice that [is taken of] the Madrass rupees, as if they were not of the same finess [with those at] Surat, We are in some measure our selves inform'd that they are [...] that some Essays have been made of them in Calcutta, so [...] the advantages are to be had from the priviledges We have got there is an absolute necessity of refining that Mint. We are humbly of opinion that if those Rupees were something better then ordinary it would be no great loss, wherefore We beg your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. will please to advise the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. at Fort St. George on this head, as We shall do by Land as soon as We finish all the business of that Coast.

The Mutsuddys here would have persuaded us that the King had granted us, sufficient in respect to the towns round Calcutta but We being well acquainted with Jaffer Cawns freindship towards us made us insert it again in our second petition, that We might have better grounds to go upon.

Our affairs being under the patronage of Caundora, who is a very dilatory man, We cannot expect to have finish'd our Negotiation so soon as We at first hop'd for.

We have drawn a bill of Exchange on your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. for six thousand, six hundred siccaes, payable to Mr. John Prat, being for value paid into us here by John Sarman, which We hope will meet with due honour.

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. will doubtless have heard by flying reports the troubles that have possess'd this place for the past month occasion'd by the coming of Meir Jumla, and all his forces, as 'tis said, without the Kings order, all the Tartars mutinously joyn'd to demand their pay, which they gave out, they would force either from the Vizier or Caundora. This was certainly the grounds of gather<sup>e</sup>. forces on all sides, the Vizier himself having not less than twenty thousand Horse, all which continually fill'd the streets & attended him when He went to the King, Cawndora & the rest of the Omrahs with their forces, and all the Kings Tope Conna, kept guard round the Fort for about 20 days. The Vizier was obstinately bent, not to pay y<sup>e</sup>. Tartars

anything without very particular examinations & Accounts to be made up for the plunder<sup>s</sup>. the Town of Patna, which conditions the Tartars did not think to comply with till such time as they found the Vizier was not to be bully'd w<sup>n</sup>. they seem'd to be willing to come to a composition, which was effected by breaking their party & the Kings orders for Meir Jumlahs proceedure for Lahore. The King order'd Chicklis Cawn &c<sup>t</sup>. to go and see M: Jumlah out of the City, divest<sup>s</sup>. him of all his posts at Court, as also of his Munsub Jageers &c<sup>t</sup>. with the glorious additional Titles of Nozem Cawn, Behawder Caun Conna, Jaunney Seer, Walla Shey Zuffer Jung, which are order'd for the future never to be us'd. It is the general observation of this City that this has only been a scheme laid if possible to entrap the Vizier, and take away his life, but He has been so continually on his guard, that nothing could be effected, so once more all is calm'd much to his Hon<sup>r</sup>., & the entire disgrace of all Tartars in general, they being almost all turn'd out of service, a few great ones excepted Meir Jumlah is now 20 Cos of this place in his way to Lahore, at present w<sup>th</sup>.out any Munsub or post, but 'tis reported He will enjoy the former by the Kings favour, these troubles occasion'd the shutting up all Ketcherry's for this month, so that no business could possibly go on, in which ours met the same fate, with the rest being just in the same state as a month ago, Caundora very frequently promises, that He will make an end withall possible expe[dition] but He is such a strange dilatory man, and with all inaccessible y<sup>t</sup>. We have occasion to summon the outmost of our patience, there is no help for it, for withall this dilatoriness, He is the only reigning man in the Kings Durbarr, so that We hope He will at last consider and for his own [sake] see us handsomely dispatch'd with all full grant to all our petitions.

The great Rebel Gooroo who has been for these 20 years so troublesome in the Subahship of Lahore, is at length taken with all his [family] & attendance by Abdell Summed Cawn, the Suba of that Province, so[me] days ago they enter'd the City loaden with fetters, his whole attendance which were left alive, being about 780, all severally mounted on Ca[mels] which were sent out of the City for that purpose, besides about 2000 [heads] stuck upon poles being those who died by the sword in battle, He was carried into the presence of the King, & from thence to a close prison, He at present has his life prolong'd with most of his Muttsuddys in hopes to get an [Account] of his treasure in the several parts of his Kingdom & of those y<sup>t</sup>. assisted him when afterwards He will be executed for y<sup>e</sup>. rest, there are 100 eã. day be-headed. It is not a little remarkable with what patience they undergo [their] fate, and to the last it has not been found that one has apostatiz'd from [the] new form'd religion.

Kings books as We formerly advised that the Customs of Surat exceed the suñs we expected, We were under some apprehension, y<sup>t</sup>. in finish<sup>s</sup>. this business, We should be oblig'd to advance a larger suñ than We are at present empower'd to, for which reason We have wrote to Surat a Full Account of the matter desiring their permission that in case we should be oblig'd to advance upon y<sup>e</sup>. suñ they formerly mention'd that We may not be stinted to less than 12 or 15000 Rup<sup>s</sup>. to which We hope We shall have an answer before We have any occasion for it.

We have lately had Letters from Bombay which give an Account of the arrival of Charles Boone Esq<sup>r</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. of y<sup>t</sup>. Island and Laurence Parker his Second both from England, We have receiv'd some news from Surat by way of Aleppo, copy of which comes inclos'd.

We have frequently complain'd to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. of the strange dilatoriness of our Patron Caundora Behauder, He is never known to sit out in publick, & return answers to any manner of business; so that what can be said to him in the way from his apartment to his Pallankeen is all that can be got, which is so very little for a man of great business, that many days pass before an opportunity [can] be had even for the least answer, & that to his own Servants, Syud Sallabut Cawn, who has the management of our affairs under him & is as intimate as any one with him, can do as little that way as other people, wherefore the main part of all our business has been manag'd by notes, this has been a great occasion of the dilatoriness of our affairs, all which We were oblig'd to bear with abundance of patience, still having very fair promises that our business should be done to our satisfaction, nay Caundora himself very often both by word of mouth & in several notes promis'd to do it. a few days ago when Seerhaud went to pay his respects as usual to Caundora & put him in mind of our petition, He was very Surprizingly asked what Petition? have not I done all your business to which Cojee Seerhaud answer'd, but the time and place not allowing of a further explanation He got into his Pallankeen & went away. This strange forgetfullness made us in very pathetick terms enquire of Salabut Cawn

what We might expect after so many promises of having our business effected to our satisfaction When We had so long & patiently waited and been at so great an expence to be thus answer'd was very surprizing, & what We did not nor could not expect in the least, We were answer'd that daily experience might convince us of the strange carriage & forgetfulness of that great man still bidding us not to despond, but that everything would go very well, after so many fair promises as we before had receiv'd this gave us but small satisfaction, & the rather made us the more inquisitive, which gave us this farther light Viz<sup>t</sup>. that Caundora had been advis'd by his own Mutsuddies, that it was not his business to perswade the King to sign our Petition contrary to what He had formerly desir'd but that it was better to get sign'd upon it, Cootbulmooluck whose business it was, as Vizier to advise the King what things were proper to be granted us, We find this was chiefly levell'd against our Petition for Divy Island, & the ground round Calcutta now desir'd. We were in hopes that in case We could have got those Petitions granted us by the means of Caundora, that afterwards the Vizier would not gainsay it or at least by a little bribery it might have pass'd, there has been sev<sup>n</sup>. endeavours made to get an opportunity to speak with Caundora so as to convince him, but none has been procurable, We fear the Petition in this interim may be gone in, & will come out sign'd as beforemention'd.

Yesterday the King contrary to the advice of the Vizier & purely on his own will went out a hunting, & all the Omrahs to their Tents, the place at present mention'd is about eighteen Cos off, but God knows what may be the design of it, or where He will march to, this obliges us to follow him to morrow or next day, leaving M<sup>r</sup>. But as for his assertion that on the beginning of the fourth year, the warrs with Chingie continuing more violent than before, He requested He might surrender his Cowle, but that M<sup>r</sup>. Raworth press'd him to keep it in his hands, and render an Account at the years end. It does not appear by the extract of the ffort S<sup>t</sup>. David Consultations remitted yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. the 20<sup>th</sup>. of July 1714, that there are any entry's therein which will give him releif in this point, & before I leave this Article, I must acquaint you I find by comparing the extract aforementioned with that drawn out by Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Our last to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. was March 21<sup>st</sup>. giving a particular Acco<sup>t</sup>. how our affairs stood at that time in the close We inform'd you that We heard our Phirds were sign'd Cutbulmoolk, w<sup>ch</sup>. was afterwards confirm'd by the papers themselves this put us into a serious consideration what was to be acted in that juncture. If the papers were carried to the Vizier & our business carried on that way, We should at best be esteem'd as Caundoras cast off favourites, turn'd over to the goodness of the other, whom if it were possible to engage with bribes; or otherwise to get our petition granted, yet Caundora who is naturally disposed to do little good might even then disserve us with his Majesty & so inevitably ruin our business. For it is certain He has such an ascendancy over the King as to dispose him according to his own inclinations these thoughts induc'd us to make another Essay of Caundora's generosity & give him an account of our affairs, leaving the Vizier as our last reserve. First Syud Sallabut Cawne at our instigation wrote largely to Cawndora concerning us, but this had not the desired effect, however this was supply'd in some measure by the opportunity some days afterwards to encounter him in private (an opportunity not before happening for some months) when He discours'd him concerning us & our affairs at large, and to the following purpose. That this present to his Majesty had laid by many Years no one having courage to proceed in this negotiation till encourag'd. by his kind promises of protection, & that all our reasonable desires should be granted. That all our Addresses to his Majesty had been by his means. That He himself had deliver'd in our present & such a one had never been made by any European nation to the Kings of India since the reign of Tamerlane. That We were under great concern to find our papers turn'd over to the Vizier, whither We could not go either for his, or our own honour, seeing we could expect no other usage than of cast off favourites. That We had not to our knowledge deserv'd so severe punishment, & accordingly hop'd it would not be inflicted without a farther Scrutiny, & Lastly that We were resolv'd, whatever favour his majesty would conferr on us should be by his means, & that what was by him rejected should not induce us to apply to any other person. It seems He was not a little tickled w<sup>th</sup>. this discourse, but pretended first a misinformation, that our business belong'd entirely to the Duanny, for w<sup>ch</sup>. reason He turn'd it over thither for examination, but since it was our earnest desire, He wo<sup>d</sup>. reassume those papers & get them signed. Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. will beleive that after such melancholly reflections, this for the present a little reviv'd us.

The King removing about 14 Course from the City, We found ourselves under an absolute necessity to attend him, tho' it rais'd our expences to a very great pitch fearing least He might proceed to Lahore as was publickly given out, But his Majesty seem'd wholly taken up with hunting, which us'd to engage him most days in the week, and then from morning till night, so that there was a general stop to business. It was the camp report that this Journey was design'd purely to entrap

the Vizier, however his care & precaution, hinder any sinister Council from taking Effect, during this encampment, Coja Seerhaad daily attended at Caundora's levy, whose only answer was (whenever He gave any) that We must wait till the time of hunting was over, when our business should be compleated, a full month has now elaps'd in this Condition, but in the interim there hapned a quarrel between the people of Caundora & Mahamud Amilaun as they came from the Durbar which after their masters got to their tents, ended in a down right fight. Wherein they fired with small arms, bonds & Great Guns for above 2 hours notwithstanding the Kings repeated commands to forbear, Yet was it at last made up after about 100 men were kill'd & wounded. The King was highly displeas'd with the liberty they took & resented it to both of them, but the munsab of all the Actors, took the trumpet from his favourite who was not admitted to his presence for three days, & threatned much more. But at present all is made up, & his Majesty again reconciled to them. This being likewise over, we reiterated our desires to Sallabut Cawn to speak to Cawn Dorah, insinuating that We could not long support our selves, in our present necessity. It pleased God this morning He found an opportunity to speak to Caundora (as He says) in a very ample manner & was answer'd that as We had staid so long, We must wait two days more, when He would speak to his Majesty Efficaciously in our behalf.

We have endeavour'd to dive into the reasons why Cawndora after all the world knew He was our Patron should fling our Petition to Cutbulmoolk, & besides put such a considerable stop to our affairs: There goes a report (altho We cannot affirm the truth of every Article) & not improbable that when our petition first went to Caundora some of his Mutsuddys, who thought they had too small a share in the profit Sallabut Cawn had made of us, on examination of our petition rose several objections to Cawndora. That our asking for ground &c<sup>t</sup>. Was not fit to be granted. This disturb'd the affair so much that We were oblig'd to a second Petition, finding this out too late, Sallabut Cawn as a means to accomplish the business was oblig'd to ask their assistance towards signing the 2<sup>d</sup>. Petition, which we are inform'd they refus'd saying that w<sup>t</sup>. they had before contradicted, could not be now advis'd with any good face, & for Sallabut Cawn himself He had some apprehensions that out of spight those Mutsuddys had acquainted Caundora with our Bribery, which prevented his appear<sup>s</sup>. so boldly, as He might have been otherwise inclined. By this means the business was apparently stop'd, yet to releive which & keep us in heart (for our obligation to Sallabut Cawn is conditional) The Jentu rogues took this as a fit opportunity to make up their mouths, & so advis'd the signing Cutbulmoolk telling Sallabut Cawn & us, that things would be more easily effected there than with Caundora, nay We are of opinion, Sallabut Cawn privately consented to it, Had we given our Consent, it is very probable things would not have succeeded. They having an opportunity to plunder us, & perhaps our whole business in danger of being overthrown. Whereas foresee<sup>s</sup>. so many ill consequences, we got an opportunity without cognizance of the Jentues to convince Sallabut Cawn that We were in the highway to ruin. But desiring that by the first opportunity He would endeav<sup>r</sup>. to work in the same manner on Cawndora, which happen'd accord<sup>s</sup>. to the abovemention'd paragraph, yet was this impossible to be effected with the privity of the Jentues.

Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. has now rec<sup>d</sup>. a full Acco<sup>t</sup>. of our affairs, nothing but patience can serve our turn, seeing our application at present to the Vizier, or anybody else would entirely ruin us.

We now come to ans<sup>r</sup>. yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. of the 3<sup>d</sup>. of March Which lately came to our hands.

Cncern<sup>s</sup>. Bernasse Seats mony & the calculation Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. are pleas'd to make of Allumgerry rup<sup>s</sup>., We cannot tell what agreem<sup>t</sup>. is made with him, or how the mony is to be paid whether specie del<sup>d</sup>. here into Cash, or according to the exchange of mony the allowance of the exchange excepted, If the former we have no difference here, between Surat & Hosanna Rup<sup>s</sup>. but are inform'd that the Rupees call'd here Allumjerry are the same as pucca, Hossanna in Bengall, which is all

except new Surat Rupees, if the latter then He is to receive Sicca's in Bengall for Allungerry paid in here. The differance here between Allungerry & Sicca's is from  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1  $\text{₹}$  Cent Currant mony of Delhi 9108: 3: makes Allungeery 8842: 14: 6: We beleive the above is sufficient to clear that account.

We observe what yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. write concerning Jaffer Cawn, with the trouble He has given the Merchants, We are likewise inform'd y<sup>t</sup>. y<sup>o</sup>. have agreed to pay him 15000 Rup<sup>s</sup>. for the easy carry<sup>s</sup>. on the Companies business In Bengall. We formerly advis'd you that a complaint against him here would be to no purpose, for which reason We have hitherto evaded it.

Concerning the Madrass complaints for those towns We formerly advis'd your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. as also the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Councill of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, that Omeer All Omrah takes very little notice of any orders from Court, & that a private Letter from the Vizier was the only Serviceable method (altho the Towns are granted when the Phirmaund is wrote) which was the reason We procur'd it, & which We hope came safe to hand, being a means to ingratiate our Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Masters affairs with that Omrah. We shall be very carefull to observe all Instructions either from ffort S<sup>t</sup>. George or Bombay.

About two months ago arriv'd here Hossein Amidan Owner of the Ship taken by the Danes in Bengall. We are inform'd He is endeavour<sup>s</sup>. to do us all the disservice in his power, having here forg'd Lett<sup>rs</sup>. under the Zereef of Mecca's Seal to the King, Vizier & Caundora. That the English are Pyrats, & that the King will do well not to favour us, besides these, there are sev<sup>l</sup>. other Certificates counterfeited, which will be occasionally made use of. We shall endeavour all that is possible to render the designs of that Impostor Abortive.

We wrote your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. April the 20<sup>th</sup>. from the Camp at Shallamar, in which place we continued till the 7<sup>th</sup>. of May, His Majesty making his entry the day following.

This last month has elaps'd with very little alteration as to the state of our affairs, We having not proceeded a step further, except in the fair promises of Caundora, which of late have been very frequent. It's now about a fortnight since Cawndora ask'd for the Pétition which was deliver'd him. We at that time hop'd He would have got it sign'd without much further examination, but have prov'd to be mistaken the cheif objection made to the petition, were the demands of more ground round Calcutta, the Island of Divy and the ground without the City of Surat, it has been carefully instill'd into Caundora that Grants of this nature may be one day very prejudicial to the King of Indostan, first in respect of Calcutta. We shall have an opportunity of frequently quarrell<sup>s</sup>. with the Phousdars & c<sup>t</sup>. We being already too strong without any addition, & for Divy Island were we once in possession of it, & ever came to a rupture with them, no Ships would be able to pass to or from Bengall (We are inform'd the King has had particular notice given him of this) lastly, for the ground at Surat altho it's very certain the Dutch had a grant for it from Mozdeen that the present Government is very unwilling to allow it, Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. may be very well assur'd all possible means have been used to contradict

these advices and We are of opinion that Caundora may be something convince'd of the reasonableness of our petition but yet He is still apprehensive that He may be reflected upon for the ill consequences, which has made him resolve not to do our business purely on his own head, as appears by his ans<sup>r</sup>. to Seerhaud "Let me get the Vizier first to consent and act joyntly with me in this affair, & I'll certainly effect your business to which He added a very solemn asseveration.

Our last Letters from the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. President & Council of Bombay seem to make a very slight matter of the Surat business seeing they have orders from England to withdraw that ffactory but for your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>ts</sup>. more particular observation we herew<sup>th</sup>. send copy of that Letter, with it's answer, which comes inclos'd.

There has been a rumour spread that the main reason of Cawndoras putt<sup>g</sup>. us off so long, was by his Majesty's private order that the time might come about when He was first seiz'd with the distemper last year, wherein He would perceive whether He was perfectly clear or no, before He could dispatch either us or M<sup>r</sup>. Hamilton, but for this We have no further authority than common report. To our surprize there is something of that nature broke out again, what may be the end of it God knows, M<sup>r</sup>. Hamilton has been with His Majesty two or three times, but enjoyn'd the utmost secrecy being admitted to his presence through the Womens apartment for fear it should come to the World

We wrote your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. the 20<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. an account of our affairs, since which we rec<sup>d</sup>. your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>ts</sup>. [dat<sup>d</sup>.] April the 16<sup>th</sup>. which We find chiefly in answer to ours [of] the 7<sup>th</sup>. with notations made on the petition & the Kings [orders].

In our last We advis'd your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. [of our] keeping a good correspondance with the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. & Council [of] Bombay, We have not lately had any Letters from thence [nor any] occasion of writing thither, As for the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Presid<sup>t</sup>. & Council [of] Fort St. George, We have not receiv'd a line from them [since our] arrival at Dilly, & 'tis long since We have wrote them, [w<sup>ch</sup>. was] chiefly deferr'd by reason of the backwardness of our last [...] & dispairing of any answer from thence in due time, the [re being] no absolute necessity for it, So soon as our petition is [signed] We shall imediately advise them, that their affairs may [be put] into such a posture, as they themselves desire.

We observe what your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. write [about] the omission of the first Article in the petition, 'tis certain [...] that to those people, in whose hands the Phird were being [of . . .] any omission of ours.

We likewise observe what notations your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. make concerning the ground round Calcutta [We] are endeavouring to persuade the Mutsuddy's, that [their] signing should be mention'd in the Phirmaund, which [they] seem to object against as not fit till the ground was [ours] whereas at present We had not bought it.

Concerning the Patna House which [was] granted to live in, yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. writes that it's not worth ac[quiring] unless as a free gift, the Mutsuddys sticke so much at [that] which we desire for Surat, that We did forgoe y<sup>t</sup>. Ar[ticle] for fear of hindering that which was of much greater [a few words lost] advices [from Bombay] the Dutch had a house given them within, & liberty for ground w<sup>h</sup>.out the City of Surat from the King for upon examination of their Phirmaund, there is not a word mention'd of it, & only a Husbulhookum under the Consommas Seal, to the Phousdar of Surat to let them have such a ones house to live in as likewise another

in Patna. They have likewise a Garden without the City as well as the French, but is a permission from the Phouisdarr; not a grant from the King, so that if we obtain a grant for a House and garden without Surat, it will be more than was ever yet given to any European Nation.

We very well remark what your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. write concerning Madrass Rupees, & the finess thereof, there will be an absolute necessity to have them refin'd, to make them pass the treasury. It is a thing of that consequence that Autusham Cawn informs us that Jaffar Cawn had, in a particular manner, mention'd it to him among other things, & that our coining at Madrass was very prejudicial to the King and his Customs, which has made Autusham Cawn object more against our having seperate Mints, than any thing else in the whole petition, so that this grant will very well compensate the refining Madrass Rupees: and We hope the Gentlemen there will be of our opinion.

If it please God that We finish the payment of a yearly piscash in Surat according to our desire, We shall pursuant to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. orders, write our opinion concerning the private trade, both to Madrass and Bombay, of which if particular notice is not taken, no private trader will ever reap the benefit of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>as</sup>. Phirmaund at Surat, We formerly advis'd yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. of the great amount of Customs at that place, w<sup>ch</sup>. so startled us, that lately upon delivering our second petition, We added that of Surat to it, & did persuade the examiners of the Books to underwrite, that the books for the 20<sup>th</sup>. year were not to be found, with this view, that the making of that piscash may be render'd the more easy.

We here inclose a particular Account of mony & c<sup>t</sup>. that was given as a Supply to M<sup>rs</sup>. Woodville, but having no receipt from her it comes attested by us all, which we hope will be Sufficient to regain the debt.

Having now answer'd your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. in full we [*a few words lost*] affairs and what [*one line lost*].

Cawndora finding himself much press'd on all sides to make an end of our business, at last ORDER'D that Autusham Cawn, Syud Sallabut Cawn & Rey [Regon] should set down & make an end. Sallabut Cawn [finding y<sup>t</sup>.] Rey Regon might again have an opportunity to spoil [it] told the Nabob He was a very unfit person to meddle [with the] affair, having acted from the beginning with a great [deal of] enmity and spleen, & that his designs were to ruin it, on [that] the Nabob order'd him to be left out, & that the [petition should] be deliver'd to Autusham Cawn & Bokechund, [the Kings] Mutsuddys, We knowing that our papers at length [must be] there, caus'd us the more easily to consent to it, making [the] necessary preparations accordingly Viz<sup>t</sup>. drawing up a List of a handsome present for Autusham Cawn, with [intention]s to bribe him further, if to be prevail'd on no other [way] as also his Councillors, and for Bokechund, who is [the Head] of the Ketcherry, We found it necessary to promise a [great] Sum accordingly a note was carried for 10000 rupees [for] finishing our business, & by his advice to the examiner of the Books & c<sup>t</sup>. Writers to about 1200 Rupees this [treat]ment has put a very good gloss on our demands; We [find] our petition return'd, from the examination of the King [&] with a quite different air and a seeming consent to all [our] demands, Autusham Cawn (altho He has not accepted the pre[sent]), He has been very favourable in the disputes, which He had [with] Cojee Surhaad, & all the Calsa Mutsuddys on the perusal [of our] petition seeming pretty satisfied with the gross of it accord[ingly] three nights ago be carried it to Caundora, who perus'd it over with it's remarks, & seem'd very satisfied, Autusham Cawn inform'd him of what We insisted on, (and as we suppose what was proper & what not) the Nabob return'd the [papers] & told him, that as Duan Calsa He knew best what can be done, but that He would do well to take Bokechund [&] make an end of the business, there has been no meeting [since] so cannot advise yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. what method they in[tend] to take, but being satisfied that We have laid a good foundation hope for the best.

Our last to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. was dated June 24<sup>th</sup>. Since which on the 17<sup>th</sup>. July We have rec<sup>d</sup>. yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ts</sup>. of the 23<sup>d</sup>. & 29<sup>th</sup>. May to which we shall reply.

We observe in the former part of yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ts</sup>. first Letter, it is suppos'd that We had flown to the patronage of the Grand Vizier, in our former Letters. We have given Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. a particular acco<sup>t</sup>. why we did not follow y<sup>t</sup>. method. We have still great reason to be satisfied in our conduct on this occasion, & do beleave it must be us'd only as our last stake by no means [appeal] to any other person so long as We have the [a few words lost] [our bus]iness by the hands off Caundora & is the same that the whole Court have here of him, [thô. no] one follows & makes addresses to him out of love, but fear [that he] serves us only as He uses the rest of the world, with all these [enemies] He carries an arbitrary command over all the Officers at Court, [nor] is there one in it (the Vizier excepted) that dares do anything [without] his knowledge & Consent, if they should, the presumption would be repaid with the imediate loss of their posts, & the Viziers chief [mutsud]dies (viz<sup>t</sup>. Duan Calsa, and Junke Duan) are entirely under his controul so that the poor Vizier has but the title, with very little of the [authority] however having a very great mistrust, that we may one day be [oblig'd] to go to the Vizier to try the extent of his power in casé [Caundora does] nothing for us. We have from our very arrival here, taken [very] particular care not in the least to disoblige him, but on the contrary He is acquainted & (we beleave) satisfied of our respects towards him, and as he is not a little noted for being avaritious, We [took] care whenever We went to him, never to go empty handed, but [with] some little rarity or other endeavour'd to oblige him, which has been always answer'd with greater Candour & Civili[ty] which We could really expect, Our last letters carried down [increas]ing Account of our affairs, which continued for some [time] till at last, all our joy came to nothing, & from the greatest hopes brought to the very brink of despair of doing anything [To be] brief Attesham Caun the Duan Calsa sign'd our petition as follows.

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. will conceive how strangely we were startled at this news, when we had such dayly advices from Surhaud, that all was done, nay to the very last, but what was worse than all, We receiv'd the papers out of the Ketcherry from other hands, w<sup>ch</sup>. He own'd afterwards was known to him 3 or 4 days before, the only reason He gave for this unaccountable concealement, was that since Attesham Cawn had so deceiv'd him, He was resolv'd not to be communicative, till He had try'd all possible means to retrieve it, & by that means hinder the great concern and chagrin that must necessarily seize us on such disappointments. We are unacquainted with what answer He can give himself, or our Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Fullerton with forty good Soldiers were lodg'd in Trevlicane ready to assist them in case of a refusal, to bring away the Boat & her Lading by force.

President soon after I receiv'd them, who was of the same opinion upon the best enquiry He could make, & therefore they have lain dormant ever since.

dearness of Silver at 16 Doll<sup>rs</sup>. for 10 pag<sup>s</sup>. thô the former method of reducing the amo<sup>t</sup>. of all goods at 20 fan<sup>s</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  Doll<sup>r</sup>. has been follow'd by us to this time, which occasions a difference of reduction in accounts between us.

Now the Accomptant at the West Coast has rated all at Sixteen Dollars for ten pagodas, wherefore I am humbly of opinion it's best to make but one way of reduction [viz<sup>t</sup>. 16] Dollars  $\text{₹}$  ten pag<sup>s</sup>. is nearest the intrinsick value as the [price] of silver is now, to let that be the settled Exchange between us. It is long since we wrote your hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. Occasion'd chiefly by the little progress we have made in the Negotiation we have enter'd into, as we have from time to time given a very particular account of the course of this affair to the hoñ. President and Council of Bengall, w<sup>th</sup>.out doubt you have receiv'd the same from them upon all Occasions, and consequently the last, which we wrote them from hence, will be communicated to your perusal. This dispair was occasion'd by our having consum'd much time and money, without making any farther progress then the many promises and shifts of these inconstant Courtiers, which tend'd in y<sup>e</sup>. end meerly to show us, that they were made to get y<sup>e</sup>. present from us and then for our business, which we came about shuffle us off from one to another, till being quite wearied out, we should accept of any thing, we found the only thing that touch'd them was the apprehensions they had in case we were really disgust'd, we might do them such damage, at Sea, as might by that means alone bring them to reason. The Hoñ. Charles Boone Esq<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. Council of Bombay advising us, that pursuant to y<sup>e</sup>. orders they had received from our hoñ. employers they had withdrawn Surat Factory, and accordingly had given orders to M<sup>r</sup>. Clerke & c<sup>a</sup>. to repair to Bombay upon the Knowledge of which Hydera Cool Cawn the new Phousdarr, sent for them and with a great many fair promises, prevail'd on them to stay till such time as he should write to the Hoñ. Charles Boone which Occasion'd M<sup>r</sup>. Clerkes permission to remain till such time as they could judge of our Success we find this the fittest Oppurtunity we could have to sta[rt] our Patron Cawndora, into some reasonable Compliance [the] port of Surat being immediately under his Care Hydera Cooli Cawn the Phousdarr thereof being not only a particular favourite of his, but of the King himself so that what he shou'd write would have a very considerable influence upon our Success here. Upon these considerations we wrote to y<sup>e</sup>. Hoñ. President and Council of Bombay that it was our Oppinion in case y<sup>e</sup>. Factory of Surat was offer'd to be withdrawn under the pretence [that] we were dissatisfy'd here, that Hydera Cooli Cawn would be so farr from allowing of it, that he would immediately write to this Court to give us full satisfaction accordingly it happen'd, for [H]ydera Cooli Cawne as soon as ever he [had] received intimation of it, wrote to Cawndora and the [king] the ill consequences that might attend that port in [case] we should leave it, and we at the same time took particular care to tell the world know our disgust there all this immediately reach'd his Majesty's Ears who question'd Cawndora about us, and as he himself confes'd order'd him to grant all our demands, we were in great hopes that this would have been follow'd with punctuallity, but instead of that to our sorrow we

found the same Excuses and shifts renew'd, of today and to morrow, it should be done, which made us conclude that now there was no other practical way remaining but the most desperate remedys [w<sup>ch</sup>.] might have y<sup>e</sup>. best influence Viz<sup>t</sup>. actually to [leave] the city in digust which would make them be[lieve] a rupture might follow, but as this would have been a very bold Action in it self so it might [have] very different consequences Upon all y<sup>e</sup>. Companys Settlements in India, For which reason we did not think ourselves sufficiently [Authorized to do] without first advising with those [Gentlemen who gave us] Our Commissions, y<sup>e</sup>. Hoñ. President and Council [in Bengall] we are still of the same Opinion that in case they do[nt think] fit to be as good as their words that they only way to [make a] compliant is to put in practice y<sup>e</sup>. methods abovemention'd.

About twentyfive days agoe Cawndora was pleas'd to [ . . . ] Coj. Seerhaud in private the only time that has ever happen'd during our 14 months stay here he then promis'd he would make an end of our bussiness, but he desir'd that nothing might be insistd on that might reflect on his prudence for granting of it, Seerhaud Answerd we should not dare [to] demand any thing that was contrary to former custom, [or] prejudiciall to the Kings real Interest, and that he [was] there ready [to] answer any insinuation that might have been made to the Nabob on that acco<sup>t</sup>. Accordingly our Petition was immediately produc'd read over & Examin'd when it was tender'd to be sign'd as follows.

Mast<sup>r</sup>.

[one or two lines lost] at this rate there remain'd only two things Viz<sup>t</sup>. having Culcutta Towns enterd in y<sup>e</sup>. Phirmaund, and to have the [Gift of] the Surat house about which Cawndora promis'd he would [speak] to the King and then sign and deliver y<sup>m</sup>., this has pass'd 25 [days] without either his speaking to y<sup>e</sup>. King or we receiving any [news] of the papers which makes us some times think that this [is] only intend'd as a trick to keep us easy, God send it may prove otherwise if it should your hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup> may depend y<sup>e</sup>. [news] shall fly by the nimblest Cossids, in the mean time we wait with patience till we have receiv'd an Answer to our Letter to y<sup>e</sup>. hoñ. Presid<sup>t</sup>. and Council in Culcutta.

We have had the best Oppurtunity in the world of trying the fieleness and unfaithfullness of this Court to the last, They [have] nothing but their own Interest in View, without the least [sp]ark of honour or gratitude. Since writing the foregoing is come to hand [copies] of your hon<sup>rs</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. dated Nov<sup>r</sup>. the 19<sup>th</sup>, as also Duplicates dated June the 19<sup>th</sup>. The Originalls of neither being [as yet] come to hand, we suppose it may happen by y<sup>e</sup>. mis[arriage] of the Kings Goorzeburdars, or what other Mess[engers] might have been made use of seing the way from [thence] by land hither is very dangerous.

For a particular Account of the state [of our] affairs we refer your hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. to our [foregoing . . . as we] are not able to add any thing thereto.

We are glad to hear that your hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. [have] been so happy as to keep all quiet hitherto [God grant it] may continue.

Herewith comes an Answer to the Letters [sent] by the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Edward Harrison Esq<sup>r</sup>. to Syad Sallabut Cawne and Zeaudee Cawne, we suppose the Latter has been very particular in giveing an Account of our affairs, he [has but] very little power [to do] either good or [bad in our Negotia[tions . . . ] wee have reason to [*a few words lost*] generosity as any of [*a few words lost*] generous and only observe [*a few words lost*].

It would be sufficient if only the grant would be obtain'd for it since the difference will be disputed in the Mints of Bengall & c<sup>a</sup>. However should a dispute arise here we are sufficiently arm'd with reason sent from your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>., and transmitted to us by y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Presid<sup>t</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. of Bengall.

We shall, if possible get distinct Phirmaunds for Bengall Madrass and Bombay and to be Effected without too much trouble, if not we shall then join all together, taking particular care that all which is perfectly granted may be inserted, As for the rest, they will be in Sunnods under the Vizier's Seal.

Concerning the Vizagapatam Towns your Hon<sup>r</sup>. will perceive a clear answer in the foregoing, so that you may have sufficient time to prepare for their Surrendry, when they shall be demand'd by the Government.

Divy Island your hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. will se[e] is granted if our friend Cawndora continues but as good as his word, upon whom alone depends the good or bad Success of this Embassy.

We observe what your hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. are pleas'd to order how the five Towns shall be inserted in our Generall, or particular Phirmaund, We are not able to inform your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. [how] that will [be dis]gested, till such time as the papers begin to run in y<sup>r</sup>. offices when we shall have a particular regard to your honour & c<sup>a</sup>.'s Instructions on this head.

THE DEPOSITION OF ROGER LAYE LATE BOATSWAIN OF THE GEORGE BRIGANTINE  
TAKEN BY JOSEPH COLLET ESQ<sup>R</sup>. IN FORT ST. GEORGE DEC<sup>R</sup>. 11<sup>TH</sup>. 1716.

The Deponent maketh Oath that he was on board the George Brigantine in the road of Bencoolen, being Boatswain of the said Brigantine, That on or about the 3<sup>d</sup>. of Aprill last, about eight a clock at Night Eaves the Cheif mate of the Rochester then lying in the said road came on board them (the master [of] the said Brigantine

one Ford being on shoar) and only Stevens the Mate and himself Europe[ans on] board, Eaves went into the Cabin with [Stevens] and about a minute after call'd this Deponent to them, when Eaves told him the said Deponent that he was taken, This Deponent at first suppo[sed] him to be in jest, but being convinc'd that he [was] in earnest, he beg'd that he might be set on shoar or put on board the Rochester which Eaves prom[ised] but for the present confin'd him in the Cabin [and] set a Centry with a Cutlace over him, then Eaves [and] Stevens went upon Deck and weighing Anchor came under the Rochester's Stern, where they [came] to an Anchor again, and takeing this Deponent out of the Cabin put him into the Hold, and [held] him [there] with some of the Lasscars, in the [a few words lost] plunder'd the Rochester [and] they came on board again. This Deponent was permitt'd upon Deck, where he put Eaves in mind of his promise [to] put him on board the Rochester but Eaves refus'd [to do so] and weighing Anchor set sail Immediately, they ta[lked] first of going to Maddagascar, then for Java head, [and] then for the Mallabar Coast, but after two months [sail] they found themselves at the Mergen Island and [being] very much streighten'd for provisions they put for [Junck] Ceiloan, all this time Stevens acted joyntly in con[cert with] Eaves and were both Cap<sup>ns</sup>. but about the time [they reached] the Mergen Island Stevens went a shoar in the boat [on] his returne on board, he was Immediately seiz'd by Eaves orders and clapt in Irons, and some time after turn'd ashoar in Junck Ceiloan, whereby Eaves had the sole Command. This Deponent further says that William Rice a Dutchman was the person that stood centry over him on board the Brigantine, and [adds] that Thomas Brown and Henry Harrard belonging to the ship Rochester were forced from thence, by [the] Pyrats as themselves declar'd and the Pyrats themselves acknowledg'd to be true; and a few days after their arrivall at Junck Ceiloan they took a Malay [Prau] with some Rice and Jaggary on board which they kept, the people making their escape on shoar except, one or two said to be kill'd in the Action. The Deponent further says that about a month after the[ir] arrivall at Junck Ceiloan, He being indispos'd and almost blind was set on shoar by Eaves, and at the same time hearing of an English [a few words lost] [Mary] and Leonora which lay about [seven or eight leagues] distance he travelled [a few words lost] on board her, giving [a few words lost] further th[a few words lost].

THE DEPOSITION OF HENRY HARRARD & THO. BROWN LATE FOREMASTMEN ON BOARD THE SHIP ROCHESTER TAKEN BY JOSEPH COLLET ESQ<sup>r</sup>. THE 11<sup>th</sup>. DECEMBER 1716.

THESE DEONENTS take oath that they were on board ship Rochester in the road of Bencoolen on or about the 3<sup>d</sup>. of Aprill last, and that in the Evening Eaves the Cheif Mate, called the Gunner, Boatswain and Carpenter of the said ship afft to drink a Bowle of Punch, and that quickly after he came out and called the people about him, who immediately went in, and seized on the Gunner, Boatswain, and Carpenter and pull 'em down in the Gunroom, and then orderd the people to take arms. These Deponents further say, that they refus'd to take Arms with the rest, and were forced down into the Gunroom, and afterwards in the Breadroom with the Gunner Boatswain and Carpenter, who all refus'd to joyn in running away with the Brigantine, which Eaves had then propos'd, that the two centrys were set over them Viz<sup>t</sup>.
