Wee shall Creditt you for yo Twenty Rupees you paid the Silk winders

Wee Desire you Forthwith on receipt of this to send us Coppies of your Books S & T', M' Cranwell M' Morton & M' Horden haveing leisure time enough to doe y' same, & y' youll Peruse the Journall Parcells from our Accomptant & settle the same

If your Country Continues quiett wee would have you sett your Merch<sup>18</sup> att work to bring in theire Proportion of Longcloth & Sallumpores so as they may Answer to the great quantity of Bettelaes allready sent us w<sup>ch</sup> must be at the same Prizes you agreed on in these Contracts otherwise the Company have a Trick upon them, & when your Merchants have Complied wee then sha[ll] order you to make an Investment in Longcloth and Sallumpores alone w<sup>ch</sup> we hope youll by as Cheap as the Country can Afford them & to enable you to Doe y<sup>c</sup> same wee will speedily send you money waiting onely the Arrivall of the Chambers Friggott w<sup>ch</sup> if not very soon wee will make other Provission for you, Your place at Present is a Dead Charge to y<sup>c</sup> Company which if not to be Remedyed by Advantageous Investments it is theire Intrest y<sup>c</sup> it should be withdrawne

The Mary Smack Arrived lately from Bengall whither wee have Returned her and order'd her in her way thither to call at Your Port on whom wee have Loaden a Chest of Treasure severall for Presents Factors Provissions as # Invoise inclosed Amounting to 5435 20 4 which wee order Immediately to be Landed and the Vessell Dispatched for Bengall & not detained upon any pretence whatever for fear of the Approaching Munsoon

Wee Observe what you write about y° Dispatch of the Colchester & how y° by the delayes of Cojah Surhaud she departed without signeing Bills of Loading or carrying his Letters wch, must of Necessity occasion great Confusion in Delivering her Goods in Persia or Bussera by wch means many disputes will arrive at her returne

Your husboulhowcom for liberty of Trade has been Long expected & find it is to same Purport of that sent us from Surratt they will Certainly extort money from you before you have the bennifit of it & then God knows how long you may Enjoy it, For y' they of Surratt write they expect fresh Troubles upon the First Pyrasy Committed web may be Reasonable expected since there is still some of Those Rogues in being

Wee Perceive you have Laden a good Cargoe for the Wentworth web wee

wish may arrive in Safety

These two Vessells bringing up baile goods as before mentioned was no small surprize to us Since wee Did not write to you for any unless you had Returnd us both the Colchester & Phenix when wee Desired your Assistance & for the reason you your selves give you could not Immagine that wee wanted them nor y' the Loss of y' Norris was any Advantage in regard to our Investments here whose Stock was to be Invested in Metchlepatam Goods but what has to streighten us for goods here has been the Troubles of the Country & great Investments made by Dutch & French more Troubles of the Country & great Investments made by Dutch & French more Thiculerly the Former, and we cannot infer any thing less from your sending These Bales but your desire of Investing our stock which is not agreable to w' orders Recd from y' Company w' wee advised in our Former Letters for was y' Chamber Friggott arrived now from China wee have more then is Suffitient of our owne Bales to Lade her, Tho at this Time shall not Venture to Dispatch any ship so unseasonable as to Oblicge themselves to goe to Mauratius by w' she would run no small risque so

that were it not for the Approaching Munsoon wee would have Returned you your bales wen now must lye here to Fill up any Ship Consigned you next year

for which you may chance to want Stock or Goods for yo Same

Wee Recd by neither of these Vessells any Goats or Geese nor doe wee desire you to send any more for whither they are bad when putt on Board or abused in ye Voyage wee Cannot tell but they come in a misserable Condition here & few or

none of them lives Long after their comeing hither

You write that you have sent yo Charles & Betty Sloop to remain wth us but have Omitted to put her in your Invoice the Reason of which wee guess att if shehad trose good qualifications ye Company expected wee should have writt you for her as they directed us but being Truely Informed that she would neither hite nor hee nor bear Saile nor had any one qualification to render her Servisable to us wee here return her to you again & Thank you for the Favour you intended us

Wee have Continued the Red Lead on board the Mary Smack & here send you an Account of what wee have supplied the sloops with here & have orderd the Mary to call att Vizagapatam to putt a shoar Some Treasure & Goods & y. Charles & Betty to doe the same att Metchlepatam both which wee hope will

arrive you in safety

Wee have not one Rupee by us nor Allumgeer Pagodaes for yt wee are very low in Cash & owe a great deall of money to yo Merchants att Fort St David. wch wee shall speedily pay off by ye sale of our Silver nor have wee any Copperbut what was long since disposed of to Merchants here, the price of which you never advised us

Wee wrote you in our last wt Saltpetre was remaining here & when the Chamber Friggott arrives shall dispatch her to you to be Loaden with Saltpetre & returned to us in August intending that she shall be the Sepr Ship when she can goe directly to the Cape to Join the Dutch ships there bound for Europe

After ye. Perusall of Mr Trenchfields Accounts now sent us wee shall do what wee can to settle itt with his Trustees weh, had been much better had it been-

done many Years Agoe

John Baily whom you sent on the Smack is under Armes here who shall serve out his time agreed with ye Company, tis said he occasioned no small disturbance on Board the Wentworth for which wee will have a watchfull Eye over him here

The 28th Inst wee Recd Letters from Metchlepatam adviseing of an herolick. action of Mr Jnº Pitts ye new Companys Consull, upon the Preside first comeing hither, he brought Instructions from ye Company to use all means to make an Investment in Metchlepatam Goods whither by Imploying Armenians or other wayes but being willing rather to Trust our owne Countrymen twas offer'd to any of the Companys Servants that would goe to Metchlepatam where they should have 5 \$\mathbb{H}\$ Cent Commission on what they Invested but accepting Thereof but M' Lovell & wee being willing to Join another with him M' Sam' Woolston was recommended who came from England with the Presidt who was Perticuler kind to him in his Passage hither, After they both went hence to Metchlepatam they behaved themselves Tolerable well till ye new Companys Butufusys Arrived there who soon after Reduced them to theire Intrest & betrayed all ye Companys affairs to them, discovering web wee sent for Mr Lovell to call him to Account for severall mismanigments who when arrived Throughed all upon Woollston so to be Throughly Informed of all matters wee had to lay to there Charge wee sent for Mr Woollston who Immediately quitted our Servis & shelterd himself under the Pretended Consull where he was Imployed till they found him no Faithfuller to them then he had been to us will he was allso expected but still Continued his pratution to him Notwithstanding our demanding him and with Applications to yo Government & watching Oppertunitys to seize him which he prevented by keeping in his house all won, yo Company was Advised off who answer'd in theire last Letters they doubted not but there would be an order to Mr Pitt for his Delivering him to us Coppy of which Paragraph.

Wee have wrote you Fully y° Condition of your cloth as to their last Investment and if you find it so difficult as you represent to sort to any other Number then the first wee would have you for y° Future make Musters for y° other Numbers wch will in a great measure direct your Judgment & may Contribute to a better sortment wee never Complained of many Numbers in Mr Frasers time but Thought it rediculous to sort Cloth so Nicely as to make Ten & Twelve fan° Cent in a Corge

Wee fear ye Chamber Friggott will not be here so soon as expected so shall make some other Provission for money to Supply your Merchants of which wee'l speedily advise & wee cant but wonder your Merchants should be so Clamarous for what Remains when they have been so plentifully supplyed and that they are sure of good Payment the short Delays of which wee are not any ways Jealous will be Prejuditiall to a Future Investment on which wee expect Considerable abatements in ye Prises

Wee have perused the List of our Merch<sup>ts</sup> Cloth who tells us there will be speedily more Longcloth brought in & for what you Dye for the Future wee would have it of the Deepest Colour being According to the Companys Orders

Our Trade here is but very little at presant but what there is goes on as formerly, You advise that the Kings Hosbul[h]okum for Takeing of your Restraint was arrived in your Parts, & they write the same from Bengall, but say that the Prince will have a Considerable Presant before they have the Fruits of itt, The new Compare people tis said have given him about 15000 Rupees & ours have Deferred it, till the Arrivall of our Masters Shiping, Wee hear of no Hosbulhokum come to these Parts, though wee Believe there is, & this has been hinted to us that wee must expect None without a Considerable Present, which wee shall not agree to unless compelled by Urgent Necessitys

Wee are apt to believe that the Unaccountable behaviour of Cap' Lambert has very much prejudiced the Comp. Intrest as to the Freighting of their Ships in these parts & by w' you write wee had it has Effected your Shiping Likewise.

If 5' Nicholas has been Tampering with the great men for a Phirmaund he will find it difficult to come off, of that matter without a Considerable Charge

The 11th Day of Last month here Arrived the Union Cap'. Goodsoule, and Mess". Cliffe & Bebbington Supra Cargoes, Designed from England to China but Looseing theire Passage Loaded Pepper att Bencoolin to Amount of wt. y. Company Orderd us to supply Them wt. silver, but they had disposed of the Rest of their Cargoe att Battavia for Gold, Soe that they wanted in silver near the Amount of their whole Stock On their Arrivall wee Acquainted them of the News of the Pyratts & laid before them the Danger of their Proceeding to China, yett Nevertheless they Resolved to Procicute their Voyage & prayed our best Assistance, & if possible a good Ship to Accompany them in order thereto wee made Proposalls to the London, who wanted Silver for their Stock as did allso y. proprieters of the Sedgwick whose Stock [y.] was intended for China was not Sufficient to bear the Charge of so great a Ship to obviate wt. Our last to you was dated you like of past month coppy of web. comes inclosed, since web. on the 17th. Instant here arriv'd you collecter from Persia on whom comes severall Armenians, who complain of Injustice done by Capt. Rouse web. we are about adjusting with them, and shall acquaint you in the Sequall of this Letter, what conclusion wee make.

Mr. Bruce has most unaccountable kept all the Effects of Cap\*. Rouse, which must tend to y\*. ruin of y\*. Widdow, more especially if he has taken up all or most part of itt att Bottomrie.

Here was a rumour that the Ship was leaky was occasioned the orderring a Surveigh upon her, the report of which is here inclosed, yett after all wee can't but think she requires cleaning and good Caulking and that leak stopt in her Stern, before she be laden Home.

The Companys orders hither are possitively to send them yearly a September Ship was an alvantage to them in Selling the Cargoe the beginning of the Summer, ships going out then to all parts whatever, but itt being now a Warr and all their ships orderd to stay att St. Helena for Convoy, they cant reap that advantage, but then cutts off about four months demorage, the owners in Charterparty being obliged to Stay where they shall order to join others of their ships, or wait for Convoy att y'. own Charge, itt being for the mutuall preservation of ship and Cargoe, but we fear this ship late returne from Persia, will hardly give you an opportunity to load her for this place before the munsoon. which if you can do we shall be ready to give her a quick dispatch on her arrivall here, and itt would be a great direction to us to know the certainty which we hope to hear by your next letters overland, for if your Petre be not come down, we cant expect her, so that if the Gloster arrives from the west Coast with Pepper, we will return her thither again with 1000 or 1200 Baggs of this Petre by us, some redwood and four or five hundred Bales which wee cant doe if wee are to dispatch the Colchester.

Wee have inclosed a List of stores we desire you to send for this Garrison and that you will oblige those that have the Charge to provide them to send us the best of their sorts, and wish you could rather increase then diminish the quantity of Salt Petre, not only that it is Warr time, but the Company have now ordered that we should supply the West Coast with Salt petre for Kentlage for their shipping.

We wrote to Persia about M'. Harbins mony wee attacht in Presid'. Beards

hands, y. Answer thereto comes inclosed to wa. we referr you.

Here being none as yett of our Ships arrived from Europe and beleive if they come late near this Coast, they will goe directly to your Port, where arriving late may not find you in a Condition to returne them laden in January, which may put you upon Freighting one of them for Persia if so we desire you to reserve a priviledge of bringing six Horses for the Company and stores for this Garrison as P List inclos'd.

Wee have by us att this time here and att Fort S'. David, near about fifteen hundred Bales, but no stock for a new Investment, the design if meet with encouragement either here or att Fort S'. David by goods being Cheaper, then formerly shall goe about procureing Seven or eight hundred Bales more for that the Colchester must be dispatch't as allso the Chambers Friggatt if she arrives in Jan.

Since writeing the foregoing we have with much difficulty satisfied the demands of the Armenians, Coppy of which comes inclos'd, and have agreed thus that Cap<sup>t</sup>. Ro[use and t]hose that had goods on board are to pay freight for 20 Tonn att 84 rupees \$\P\$ Tonn, \$w^{\text{ch}}\$ the Cap<sup>t</sup> and M' Walker are to adjust in their Passage down, and what is Cap<sup>t</sup> Rouse proportion were desire you to pay and by first oppertunity write to Gombroon that they make good the same Amount out of his Effects, and pay itt into the Companys Cash, and wer will allsoe write thither by the first oppertunity by way of Surratt, and altho the Voyage is att an end according to y° strictness of the Contract, were have permitted them to Carry whit Persia Goods remains on board, with what measure brought thence and their Persons ffieight free to your port, in Consideration the Ship did not proceed to Busserah and that they have paid Considerable custom here, besides to Sweeten them up a little who we find have been Sowerd in the Voyage

Paddy has risen here within these ten days upwards of twenty five \$\psi\$ Ct and if we have not rain itt will again be very dear, so desire you will send us, what rice you can on the Compas Ships bound to this Port but lett itt be very good

By last letters from the West Coast wee expected by this time the Glocester would have bin here whose Capt Perhaps may chance to loose his way, and arrive att your port instead of this, when we desire you will open the Pacquett and send us Coppies thereof by the first Pattamars, reserveing the Originalls to come by the first ship, and if she comes loaden with Pepper wee desire you will unload itt and send us what you can spare thereof by the Colchester, beleiveing itt more the Companys Interest to send all ye Pepper to England, than sell any

The Presid' produced to us the Coppy of a letter in Dutch from the Genu and Councill of Batavia, in answer to a Gen'i Letter we wrote them concerning affirs of our R' Hon'ie Company, and read to us what your Depty Govern wrote him concerning the same which was not a little surpriseing in sevil respects, and we cannot but resent his opening of itt, for alltho' his name was upon y superscription yett he could not but know two not for him, there being added to itt (for' and Councill of Fort S' George and then afterwards his sending us a coppy of itt here instead of the originall, to answer itt, is very Extraordinary, and not such treatment as wee expected from any of our Companys settlem much less from a Subordination, so to make no more reflection on this matter att present, we enjoyn you on receipt of this to send us the Letter and cover to itt, as itt came to the Dep<sup>ty</sup> Governour, with that, that came allsoe from Negapatam, who could not but know who was Gov<sup>r</sup> of Fort S<sup>t</sup> George, and when we returne our answer, wee shall take notice to them of their Error, both att Negapatam and Batavia

Wee are impatient to hear what you have done about the Contract with your Merch<sup>16</sup> if your Sec<sup>17</sup> can write Dutch so very well surely he can translate

itt which we order him to do and send it with the originall

2 On y° 8th of Septr 1702 we are advis'd from Bengall that the John and Mary was arriv'd there Laden with round Pepper but whether Loaden in part or wholy was uncertain to us till we rec<sup>d</sup> yours of the 6th July P Ship Phænix y° 15th Jan<sup>ry</sup> last with the Accompanying Papers according to List

3 Wee observe your haveing made Copper cash curr<sup>t</sup> to the N° ward with which we could have supplyd you att this time but for the uncertainty of this

Vessell calling there or att your Port

4 Wee very well approve of your ladeing the John Mary with Pepper, and dispatching her for this Port, but the Capt was pleasd [to] mistake his Way and goe for Bengall, att the very time the Hampshire came thence hither [and] he immediately run up the river of his own head & risgoe and unloaded his Pepper and was dispatch't thence for England of which we have complaind to the Company not only again[st] the Commander (who wrote us not one line) but allsoe against the Presidt and Councill for meddling with a ship they had nothing [to] doe with, besides rather then we should have any of the Pepper they sold itt so that we had not one come to lade on the Phænix

5 Wee hope by the good use you'l make of it the Company will find it to their advantage, their reduceing the Penny in the Pound on Pepper to a half penny, by the incouragem<sup>t</sup> given to the Planting of itt, and Vessells tradeing to

your port for that Commodity which must increase their revenues

6 Wee know the Company is averst giveing their Servi dyett mony where there is conveniencys to keep a Generall Table which you are enjoin'd to mannage

9 Wee observe the frequent differences that happen between the Sultans Rajaha, &c, which your prudence must reconcile or widon as itt tends to our masters interest and Security of their Affairs, but, remember lett itt be your greatest care to keep matters in a Ballance between them, so that upon any suddain revolution, you may make advantages thereof

10 We want to hear of your finishing the Pagar att Sillabar and to know

whether itt answers y' end expected

11 Wee are glad to hear your men keep so well in health and hope the good provission you have made for their Lodging &c will much contribute the continuance of itt

12 Wee approve your entertaining M. John Manning a Factor and Thomas Upton a Writer and wish wee may see the good fruits thereof, for to us att seems very surpriseing that since the arrivall of the Deputy Governour and Mr Shaw there, we not had as much as one pair of books, notwithstanding the good aggistance we have sent you hence, and to be plain with you without terming itt majesteriall, we are inform'd that when the Union came away there was not one line begun in the Generall Books to web. we expect as punctuall an Answer as you were upon your oaths

13 The encomium you give of Priamin is enducement enough to erect a settlement, but that can't be done without the Companys possitive orders, besides before any such thing be attempted we must be well informed of the Dutch

pretention thereto.

- 11 Wee shall by all opportunitys send you what slaves procureable which you must train up to such Trades you want them for, for tis impossible to perswade those handicrafts you desire to goe from hence
- 15 Wee beleive the Company [d]o's hardly allow the Commander and officers their Charterparty Tonnage from Port to Port in India who we doubt not but will dispute that Pepper them to Ship off
- 16 Wee wish the Company may see their prime cost for that Benjamin you bought of Cap<sup>n</sup> Renox, wen should be a good Bargain by your allowing 15 p C' Interest, wee paid Cap' Phrip on that Acc' as follows

22 Wee were glad to hear you gave so seasonable a dispatch to the Hampshire and that she went a full ship, went God send to arrive in safty.

23 Wee dont well understand your removeing Capt John Vernon who haveing been brought up to writeing busieness might have assisted att his leisure time in the Books, but we beleive his removeing was more to gratifie some private end then promote the Compas Interest, besides where you have so few private Sentinells you Should have fewer officers and we should think a Leivtenant with a serjeant or two wod be sufficient without being att ye Charge of an Your Answer about the age of Pepper is Satisfactory to us, and suppose Ensign twill be to yo Company who orderd the same

24 Wee agree that Mr Thoms Graves have the same encouragement, as

accustomary to writers who goe from this Place

25 A Rich Soyl must of course produce good grass and some of that must run to Seed, but if itt [18] as you say not procu[rea] ble wee must get itt some where else, as allsoe the Java Horses which we are told are to be bought Cheap att Bantall and those parts

26 Wee are still of the same opinion that two or three monopolize the Trade

of your place, we is by all oppertunitys confirm'd to us

27 Notwithstanding theris no likelyhood of Warr with Portugall with the think fifty Buggesses will be of service here and Fort St David, but of this

wee will consider and write you our further resolution thereon hereafter

28 Wee take notice of what you write for your Vindication in drawing of Bills, which wee think does not carry that weight with itt as you seem to lay on itt, The Company is desirous the Trade of the place should be encourag'd but not by the Depty Gov and Councill of Bencoolen to take to themselves what they please out of their Cash att Fort St George and we are sure their intention is, that you should draw no more bills on this place then what is absolutely necessary for the carrying on their affairs for suppose you meet with any Dutch Bargains or others to the amount of twenty or thirty thousand Dollars and they want bills hither to be paid for the same which you draw, and when they come hither wee are out of Cash, must the Company take up that mony att interest to carry on other peoples Trade, we think not, and therefore for the tuture enjoin to draw no bills on us but what are absolutely necessary as before directed, and before such bills are given lett the mony be Actually paid into the Companys Cash

- 37. Yours dated the 6th March last wee recd. Whip Union who arriv'd here the 11th June laden with. Pepper which was so very fou'l that when it was garbled, itt made but 300 Candy, which wee paid them for According to the Companys order, who Contrary to all advice saild hence the 10th. July for China notwithstanding the news we had Pyratts which a ship of this Port calld the Pembrook Friggatt brought from Mayotta, where they mett them as PM. Fenwick &c. Narrative inclos'd, for which reason wee laid by all our Ships of this Port bound through the Straits of Mallacca.
- 33. Your Bills advised of by the aforesaid Ship Amts. to Dollars 2654: 1 are Accordingly paid.
- 39. Wee hear from all People that come from Bantall of the insolent behaviour of Scott and Kingsley towards their Cheif Mr. Eyton besides in all other respects they lived more like beasts then Christians so that upon receipt of this wee order them to be turn'd out of the Companys service and sent hither by the first shipping or if there be no inconveniences by itt, you make them serve as souldiers upon your place.
- 40. Wee have perus'd M'. Eytons Letter to you of the 20th Febr. last, and your Generall Letter 39 M'. Bugden when went to Bantall, and since you had such large experience of Mr. Eytons ability and fidelity in those parts, where he was allways so well receiv'd and esteemd by the Country people you should have continued him in his Employ and removed those who [disturbed] his quiett and y. Comp. affairs, Thô we hope M'. Bugden will apply himself to the understanding the customs of the Country, and the humour of the people and whereby to prosecute the Company's Interest.
- 41. Yours of the 30th of March with all papers according to List wee receiv'd P Queen Ann Ketch the 30th of June who fell in with Vizagapatam and is there to this day.
- 42. Wee have perus'd your orders to Cap'. Collier on the Sarum, which ship for want of pepper you have sent to Nayas in which we hope he'l meet good success and wish you had Employ'd Mr. Frith whose long experience in the Country might have much contributed thereto the Cap'. Collier we take to be a very Sensible and industrious man who wee hope will give a good Acc'. on his returne on that affair.

Wee approve of your takeing in John Harris a Writer, but can't tell what you mean by takeing in Mr. Robert Coast to fill up your Vacancy in the Councill when you never had but Four and have now that number without him, besides his deportment here was such that we could not send him over to you in any Employ, nor can we think itt consists with y. Companys interest or Honour

to have such a person of Councill in any of y' Settlements his crimes here was that he was very lavish of what he had gott in your parts, besides he liv'd so Sottish a life more like a Beast then a man, of this perhaps he may be reclaim'd, if so you may give him incouragement according to his merritt

- 44 By the ship or Vessell of the Companys wee shall supply you with gun Powder and what else we can spare you of the List you formerly sent thô we hope in a great measure your necessitys for the Sent have been Supply'd by the John and Mary and Glocester [ . woh ] wee recd and forwarded [the] other three as directed and doubt not but you will follow the Companys orders adverting to their affairs and particularly the mannagers orders relateing to your Accts &c as therein Directed, woh have been sent to our Subordinations, who have Stated some querys thereon which have been answer'd as \$\phi\$ Coppy thereof inclos'd and may some Direction to you in that matter
- 45 Twas good news to hear that yo Loyall Cook was well att the Cape thô very sad news yo of the report of the Bedford which we give no great Creditt to, hopeing that she winter'd att St Lawrence, or gott about the Cape to St Helena, and there lye for the next Convoy
- 46 Wee did hope by this y° Glocester would have bin here, who we would have returned to you with some Petre Bales and iedwood, but wee believe now wee may give over expecting her
- 47 Tis very strange y° Company sent you no more Souldiers on this Ship, knowing they have so few here, by the first Ship or Vessell of the Companys wee shall send you what Porteguez are willing to come but shall not be able to spare any Europeans
- 48 Your Bills advised of in this Letter Amounting to Dollars 631 2 are paid
- 49 We rec<sup>d</sup> severall Letters from Bantall which we have now answerd and here send you a Coppy thereof
- 50 Your being so unaccountable behind hand in your Accts still sticks in our Stomacks, your excuse for which is Mr Shaws indisposition but then why does not the Depty Gov take care of them or see that some other of the Council doe itt and if Mr Shaw be so sickly pray who Acts as Storekeeper for him which Employ we heever knew before belong'd to a second where there was others [in] Councill, [the Depty Gov & others] of Council here knows that the second of all Factorys keeps the Books, the third the warehousekeeper, the fourth Paymaster and the fifth and eldest Factor of Stores, and a carefull sober young man Steward, and wee would have ye same practis'd by you and all their Accts read in Consultation monthly, which wee find frequently omitted and some times four five and six months read together which for ye future pray lett those faults be mended

Wee have been advis'd from York Fort the Occassion of Mr Bugdens being sent to your place and cannot but resent the insolences of Kingsly and Scott to their Chief who wee possitively order you to send to Bencoolen or this place as an oppertunity for weh shall happen first

Wee are glad to hear the Country continues in peace about you but for makeing any new Settlement it is not to be done without the Companys Possitive order

Wee Expect you performs your promise in improveing your new Settlement. and you see the Company is willing to be att Charge to make commodious Building for their People but you must take care not to be Extravagant therein

The Pepper you laded on the Union was Excessive foul in so much that they Lost Ten PC here therefore pray take are what you lade for England or send hither be well garbled with such an Engine as they have at York Fort

Wee wish Mr Frith had been sent on the Sarum to Nayas, but for takeing him into the Service we must deferr the Consideration thereof till the arrivall of the Ships we daily Expect, we all look upon him to be well quallifi'd and have a regard for him

Wee have paid your Bill for Doll's 1660 3 but order for yo future you draw no Bills upon us but such as are absolutely necessary for Carrying on the Companys affairs and in your next lett us know what peices of § are paid into the Companys Cash or what other coin for Acct of these Bills drawn

Yours of 15 Aprill P Queen Ann Ketch we recd the 30th June from Vizagapatam where she fell in

Wee have perus'd the Letters and affidavids relateing to Kingsly and Scotts behaviour towards their Cheife [by which they] Appear to be [such]vile Persons, that wee chuse rather to confirm then alienate our orders for their being turn'd out of the Companys Service and sent to Bencoolen or hither, for itt Consists neither with the Companys Hon nor Interest to continue such miscieants in their Employ

Your two Bills for 268 Ryalls advis'd in the foremention'd Letter where accordingly paid

Wee here send you what few medicines we could spare out of this Garrison and recommend to you to putt in execution our following directions

First that you daily apply your selves to yo bringing up and settling all Accts in your Factory and ye adjacent Paggars under you

2dly that you give all incouragement and importane y' Rajahs, &ca to encrease their pepper plantations in your paits

3dly that you are very frugall in all your Expences, putting ye Company to no unnecessary charge

Wee shall observe the Contents of the Rt Honble Companys Letter, and from

the Court of Mannagers and shall in all respects Act accordingly

Wee recd the Europe News by the Regard and thank you for itt As you [wrote S' Nicholas] Waite &c Councill so we did here their Presid' and Councill at Metchlapatam who return'd the answer as Sr Nicholas.

By that time this can come to you we suppose the Katherin Capt Jenifer Commander will be arriv'd wth you from Bengall and your Ship Prosperous from China from whom you will have all the news of Amoy for we have none nor have Wee had any Letter from M. Dolbin or any one in the Ship since they were outward bound from Mallacca

The Howland after she went from hence call'd att Fort St David where she

staid four dayes but for what we know not

This comes by Capt Gostlin Commander of Ship Charlton who has taken in part of his Cargoe att St Thoma and we not knowing what it is, cannot distinguish itt from what he has taken here which paid the Companys Custom, so that if he lands any part thereof att Bombay, that matter must be decided by his outh or else he must pay the Companys Duties and accordingly we have wrote the Dep'' Gov' and Council att Bombay
By a Seperate Stock Ship that's arriv'd att Batavia, tis reported that when

they left England there was designed for this Coast & Bay the Tavestock, Dutchess and Sommers, but to this day we hear nothing off them, nor is there

any news since we wrote you last

The Colchester arriv'd here from Persia ye 17th August and brought us the Horses, we wrote for, one of which dyed aboard, but whereas we wrote for one hurdred Chests of wine they sent us but thirty five, which is a little hard considering M'. Bruce sold some Hundred Chests to Pticular persons and itt is a great ease to the Companys Chargo to have wine thence att Thirty abasses a thest, w h if bought here stands them in Nine and Ten Page so that we desire your Hon' &c will be pleas'd to give your [ ] place is subordinate to ye Agent &c there, to supply us with what we write for on the Companys Account and that it be the best of their sorts

What wee fear'd is come to pass for th[em] Mr Bruce has kept Capt Rouse's effects and sent by the Ship no manner of Account thereof

And however itt happens ye wine from Persia is not near so good as formerly, the bottles much smaller and very often come out one or two Bottles short in tale in a Chest Wee are

Our last to you was the 4th and 5th of December 1702 since which were have rect yours of the 23 of Aprill last from Ispahium by Ship Colchester who arrived here the 17th of last month, the answer M' Bruce &c att Gombroon Justifies the sid Bruce in detaining Capt Lamberts many as we advised, and to show us that they think themselves in y' right they have done the same by Capt Rouse, so that we shall only advise the Persons prejudiced thereby and lett them take their remedy which may chance to convince them of their Erior and unfair dealing

The Stores &c wee rec<sup>1</sup> 7 Ship Colchester except our quantity of rane for that we wrote for one hundred Chests, and but thirty five sent, which cannot be computed to the want of wine, for that Mr Bruce sold some hundreds of Chests to puticular persons, besides of late there's not only great Complaint of the Badress of your Persia wine, but allose against the smallness of the bottles to what they were formerly, and many of them want one or two bottles in a Chest, one of the Horses died in yr passage by receiveing some mischief in Shipping off

It tends much to the Companys advantage by lessening their charge here, to have Horses Wine &c sent as oppertunity presents on their own Ships hither, therefore desire you'l yearly send to this place what we desire as P List inclos'd, and we have made the same request to ye Generall and Council at Surratt to confirm the same, but since we have no Ships arriv'd yett from Europe, we are afraid there will be hardly any from Bengall to your Port, so Can't expect Wine &c without you procure freight for the sa[me We ad]visd in that of ye 4th of Dec' of our drawing on you a Bill for ten thousand three hundred and five Rupees, which we rech here of the Kings Buxie, for which wee gave him first and second bills, one of which he dispatch'd by his Servant overland to Surratt, intending thence for Persia to bring the bill, and receive the mony but he hearing nothing of him, he's affiaid he's miscarry'd in the Way so sent to us for a third bill which we have given him, which wee desire you to Comply with and redraw itt on us by Ships bound to this Port as formerly advis'd

They wrote us from Gombioon y' Mr Harbins Acct was remitted to Surrat which they knew not whether he had cleard it, the clause of their Letter concerning that matter wee sent to Bengall, Poor man dyed in his Voyage bither on the London

S' Wee heartly thank you for the good news you sent us, and desire your continuance itt, remitting to us what Europe news you hear

There will be this year from Bengall a Ship called the Humphry and Charles 200 Tonn whereof Mess's Fleetwood and Whistler are Supra Cargoes, belonging Cheifly to the Presid' & Councill of this place to whom we request your particular favour, and assistance which shall on all occassions be acknowledged by us who wish you health and prosperity and are

Yours of the 10 Aprill last we recd \$\P\$ Ship London who arriv'd here the 22d of May and yours of the 30th June wee recd P Ship Colchester who arrivd here the 17th August

The two Horses Phænix were and doe continue as we represented them to you, and whereas wee shall allways desire six Horses yearly when any of our Companys Ships come to your Port, so itt would not be amiss to buy up two or three good Horses as oppertunity presents, tho' the Company be att the Charge of keeping of them till a conveniencecy offers of freighting them hither

As to what you write about Capt Lamberts busieness were can say no more than what allready wrote you, and are still in the opinion that Mr Bruce ought to have retained Capt Lamberts and Capt Rouses upon the particular Ships they belonged to and whereas he has done otherwise we think itt very unfair for that ill consequences will attend itt, on Accot of those that have a right to itt, or Mr Bruce who has detaind itt, and for Capt Rouses widdow we beleive she's undon

The [a few words lost] of for ten thousand three hundred and five Rupees, we believe is not come to your hands for that few days past the Kings Buxie desired of us a third bill haveing given but two before one of weh he had sent overland to Surratt, but hearing nothing of itt's arrivall he's affraid itt has miscarry'd, so when either of the three Bills is presented to you we desire you make due paymt and redraw itt as formerly advisd, concerning web wee have allsoe wrote Agent Owen

Wee thank you for the news papers and desire you will Continue sending the same to us as opportunity offers

When you proceed so agrously against a Person as to send him a prisoner on board ship we mean Charles Attkins, without so much as letting him gett necessarys or collect what small Effects he had in, you Should have drawn up the Charge against him upon oath, we beleive him to be a wild young fellow but upon his promiseing great amendment we have made him Surgeon at Fort S' David

Wee rec<sup>d</sup> the Carpets sent by y<sup>e</sup> London

Mr Harbin dyed in the Voyage hither and the clause in your Letter relateing to him we have remitted to Bengall

Wee here inclose a List of what we desire yearly to be sent to this Presidency on the Companys Acci if any Company Ship presents but if not all or as much as you can gett freight for itt, on any private Ship bound hither

Weerec<sup>4</sup>, what you sent on y° Colchester, except one of the Horses that dyed on board wc<sup>4</sup> was the paccing Horse which the Commander says rec<sup>4</sup> some prejudice in Shipping off, and hope the others will prove tollcrable good, tho' much gall'd and abus'd in the Voyage, and 13 Chests of Rosewater omitted to be taken ashoar, which hope remain'd on board [a few words lost] Bengall about itt, not haveing the quantity of wine wrote for, is a disappointment to us and a great Charge to y° Company for y' we must buy itt before the year comes about and itt is very surpriseing to us that the Comp° can't have their quantity when apticular persons can be Supplyd with whatever they want wee hope they will fare better for the future and that you will send us every thing y° best of their Sorts, and wee must not omitt Acquainting you of the great complaints, not only against the badness of the wine but allsee the Smallness of your Bottles to what they where formerly, and in some of your Chests for one two to three bottles wanting, your Rosewater likewise is very ordinary.

We are Sorry to hear there is no probability of releasing those poor & unfortunate Captives at Rustock but hope by the first Ship there will be some care taken thereof from England

Since the concludeing our Generall letter dated 23d Inst directed to Mr Bugden &c Councill, we have maturely considerd that whereas your Port is Sittuated in a part of the Country that produces great quantitys Pepper and capable of great improvement by encreasing their plantations, so consequently [they de]sire wellfare of itt, being of the greatest concern to our masters, and therefore itt requires an experient prudent man to be att the head of their affairs, who is well vers'd in the customs of the Country and humour of the people and we not only takeing from our own experience which is allso confirmd to us by all persons that come from thence That M' Nathaniell Eyton has the qualifications before mention'd, by his long resideing in that place who has laid done his Employ by reason of the insolences of two of his councill Scott and Kingsly and att present remains S-cond with an intention speedily to leave the place which we are under some apprihention that the Company will Suffer in their affairs in those parts, to prevent which we hereby reinstate the aforesaid Nathan" Eyton in the Cheifship of Bantall requiring all persons both Civill and Military to regard him Accordingly & by vertue of this Letter we null and revoke all Commissions orders or Powers there has been formerly granted by the Depty Gov and Councill of Bencoolen, that tends to the makeing any other person whatever Cheif of that place unless itt be by the R' Honble Comp" possitive order, wee allsoe appoint M' Bugden to remain Second, of which if he dislike we permitt him to return to his former post att Bencoolen, and then M' Vernon to be second in Councill otherwise M' Vernon to be third, and in case M' Bugden does retuin to Bencoolen we then desire the Dep<sup>ty</sup> Gov' and Councill of that place to send a prudent and Sober man to be third att Bantall

Wee would not have M<sup>r</sup> Bugden resent any thing of this alteration for whom we have a very good Esteem assureing him that nothing in our opinion makes M<sup>r</sup> Eyton preferrable to him but his large Experience

What [a few words lost] att all in the least Lessen your Subordination to Bencoolen therefore charge you by all oppertunity rem[itt] to y<sup>m</sup> your Consultation[s] and Diarys to that very time Acc<sup>t</sup> Cash, Paymast<sup>rs</sup> Acc<sup>t</sup>, Warehouse-keeper and Storekeeper which Acc<sup>ts</sup> by the Companys order (which wee enjoyn you to follow) are to be read monthly in Councill and may lett us hear by your next that your Bookes are all made up and sent to Bencoolen

It is our reiterated request and order that you heartily apply your Selves to you encreasing the Pepper Plantations, and retrenching all superfluous expences, and that you are very frugall in those that are unavoidable

Wee observe you are about forty men in the Civill and Millitary, so that we dont see the urgent necessity there is of haveing distinct Principall officers for the latter, therefore it wod save something if the Cheif be Leuitenant and Mr Vernon Ensign, and the principall officers otherways to be but Serjeants, This we recommend to you to put in Execution as you find itt for the Companys Service

A Duplicate of these Letters we have sent to Bencoolen for the Dep<sup>ty</sup> Gov<sup>r</sup> and Councill there to observe what therein containd

Wee Shall consider on ye Acct of the Duties collected on Trade and then give you our Answer thereon

Serjeant Trumball had leave to goe hence, but forgott to take his Certificate.

Wee find that the Letter from the Generall and Councill of Batavia is not directed to the Gov and Councill as itt ought to have been, so that there is nothing more to be said of that matter, only that the orniginall ought to have been att first sent us, seeing itt related to the Companys busieness

Wee possitively ordered att the making the last Contract that the Contract brought in over and above the Contract before, should be inserted in that which now again confirm, and will not recode from it. Therefore if they will abate twelve \$\foatheta C'\$ and you see you can bring them no more, wee would have you close with them and we [a few words lost] as you mention, lett them be oblig'd to bring in their Cloth by the last of J invary or sooner if possible upon the Madrass musters and the Species of goods to be in proportion to the last years Contract and if any augmented lett it be long Cloth and Sallampores, to this lett them give their yea or Nay immediatly, and with all expedition return us their answer If the Danes bring in their Cloth within your bounds purely for washing sake we think 2\frac{1}{17} \mathbb{C}' sufficient for the Custom Wee are

Since our of the 16th & 27th of past month we have recd yours of 30th Augt. by Sloop Greyhound who arrived here the 27, with Bill of loads for what laden on her

Att the time of M' Peachies decease which was in M' Dubois's house, who we then thought was Sufficient enough to answer what Effects left by M' Peachie being recommended to us by the Company to any Place of trust in or next the Councill besides as we wrote you before nobody did care to concern themselves with M' Peachies Effects nor doe we hear with any bodys but Companys Servants and had we designd to have taken care of them believe we Should have found but little worth and as for what you say you have done about his Effects was not to be avoided you haveing long before Seiz<sup>4</sup> [two lines lost]

Wee doubt not but we Shall have good enough for the Tonnage that is att present on our hands, but every Ship requires more of Petre then her Charter party proportion, so that had there been no other reason we must have sent the Colchester for Salt Petre and Stores, for of our 1000 bags, she would not require less than 1400, and the other must have remaind in Store for the Garrison so that what we wanted more Petre for was Cheifly for the Chambers Friggat, who when arri must be immediatly dispatch'd

Wee perceive the Expedition Sloop narrowly escaped being lost, we thought 7° Pilots who are the Companys Servants had been obliged in the first place to take care of their Vessells for if it be true what the Cap' writes Coppy of which we here inclose we think the Pilot lyable to make good the damage, and did he serve any other nation he would be fined to Boote we all took her here to be a good

Vessell and that she wanted only some Strengthning in her upper works we never expected she would Carry above five or Six hundred bags, and when she comes we intend her forthwith to the West Coast where a Vessell of her burthen is very necessary for the Comp<sup>as</sup> Service

Wee rec<sup>d</sup> the Petre by both Vessells According to Invoice and Bill of loading y<sup>e</sup> freight of which might have been saved, since you know we resolved to send the Colchester

The Dutch mannagement of their Affairs is very unaccountable at this time for they stick att no manner of writeing nor money to gain their present ends

The Copper Sent by Capt Harton on the Endeavour Briggantine was delivered him by English weight 131 to the bagg and whatever it comes out by [one line lost] [y]ou say the Bill of loading [Com]putes it to the Candy and four of those bags makes a Candy

You say you wish you had sent the 1000 Chests of Copper when you requested it, which long before was sold to a Merchant here who was to pay for itt as he fetch'd itt away but not Complying, was the occassion of our sending itt, nor had we then nor since any Allumger Pag\* or other coin to Spare you, for what allready sent has so lessend the Stock of this place that we are now about takeing up mony att interest to Carry on the Companys affairs

Wee cant but admire att yo Delatory proceedings of Sr Edward Littleton

Here has as yett been none of the new Companys People from Metchlapatam as directed by the mannagers orders to take Acc<sup>t</sup> of the dead Stock nor doe we hear they intend to come, our Acc<sup>ts</sup> are agoing on in the method yo<sup>rs</sup> are and hope they will be finish to goe by the Jan<sup>ry</sup> Shipping

The Glocester is not arrived from the West Coast the they possitively wrote us they would send her, The Stock the Comp<sup>a</sup> sent on her was twice what would purchase her a Cargoe of Pepper

Wee think it very unreasonable as well as ungratefull that Commanders of the Ships will not pay the Charge of getting the run away men, The order you have made to prevent those practices is very necessary espetially in this time of Warr

Wee think it not adviseable to freight any Salt Petre to the West Coast from your place by reason that we must once or twice a year send Vessells hence with men and Stores which we intend shall be the Companys and load on them Redwood and Salt Petre for that place

### 20 October 1703

Wee Sufficiently Shew'd our resolution and inclinations to the due observeing our Companys and ye Mannagers Commands of laying aside all Feuds and heats arriseing from the oppositeness of the interest wee Servd, by not takeing notice of your raveing and scur[r]illous Expressions of us in your Letter dated the 18th Aprill 1703, to our Companys Gov and Councill of Fort William who have lately remitted us the Coppy of another Letter of yours dated 8th past month, which we cannot omitt answering finding itt stuffed throughout, with so many impious and notorious fallsitys, wee know not what new matter occurd to you, that incullcated such base Suggestions of us, who here avery that Mr Lovells and Woolstons Accis were never allowed of nor can they be ended till they are both together, and att this place from whence they were employed

[The Government of myself] and likewise jointly with the Councill doe challenge all mankind to produce any order Particular or Generall that they ever gave that can be Construed or thought they designed the Blood of Woolstone and further averr we never heard of that bloody Expression here

Then that twice there has been assassines hired, from woh he once narrowly Escaped to which we here deleare that we never gave our orders to any for the Seizing of Woolston but to our Cheifs att Metchlapatam M' Focquett and after his death to M' Frewen, on the former you took the liberty in past Letters to make your unjust refflections, tho' from our Experince and knowledge of them both, wee are Confident he that is dead and the other liveing, were and are men of such Honble principles as to detest such Vile practices whilst those that pen'd and signed those infernall Suggestions, we believe will Stick att nothing

You likewise say that its nothing of Wollstons Acc<sup>t</sup> occassions our furious heat (as you call itt) but his not Consenting to the perpretateing a fram'd designe as horrible and wicked as ever was Contrivd, w<sup>ch</sup> he over threw, to produce any particular or Generall orders from us unfitting to give or him or they to Execute had he been a person of Nicest Hon<sup>r</sup> and Integrity, from whom we found the quite contrary and therefore 'tis very probable that not only one of us, but all have wished that our orders had been Executed

If your beleif went with your pen why doe you Charge us so att random, as fools shoot their bolts (and desend to Pticulars besides Fort W<sup>m</sup> is not so farr from you) and wee beleive will be nearer to you in a little time whither you might have sent Woolston with [a few words lost] English or Other evidence you had prepar'd and there to have proved before the Gov<sup>r</sup> and Council, but a probability of one word of truth, in your Scandulous Letter, w<sup>ch</sup> if Credited by those fentlemen there it would have carried some weight with it, whereas now by all good men wherever seen, as 'tis pend twill be looked upon as the spurious Issue of mallicious brains (If any) and Contrived by men of the Vilest principles

Our list to you was dated the 5th and 20th past month Coppy of which comes inclos'd, and this is Chiefly to advise you that on the 24 last month past by this road to y° S° ward three Sail which we guessed to be French Ships, when few days after 'twas Confirmd to us they were arrived att Pollicherry, two of them being Ships from France who departed thence the first of Aprill and y° other a Moors Ship from Cuddaloie bound to Atcheen with our pass which they took att Sea

The news they give out which is Calculated for these parts comes inclos'd and likewise what we have Collected from Private Letters to web we give most Creditt

Wee had sooner dispatch'd these advises to you, but that their arrivall att Pollicherry was not Confirmd to us from Fort S' David till last night Coppy of

wen Clauses relateing thereto likewise comes inclos'd

'Tis reported they are haistening away from [Pollicherry, and have] taken in two Pilots, giveing out for Murga, for which reason we believe they are not bound thither but design to Ciuize somewhere or other for Purchase and according as they have advises after y° Munsoon to Clap in att Pollicherry and take in their Cargoo Thô 'tis not improbable that their Chief designs are for Cruzers in these Seas, one of them is a great Ship 6 or 700 Tons, and the other about 400, and 'tis said they are both full of men, we hope they'l meet with no Small trouble for takeing y° Moors Ship

Wee know it is needless for us to mind you to impart this news, to the Company when we hope their Ships will join with ours to come up the Coast

for the Security of each other

Wee advised you in a former letter that we feared a Scarsity of grain in this place since which time we have had no rain nor no great proba[bi]lity of itt, timely enough to preser[v]e the crop on the ground, besides there is att this time no water in the Tanks so pray if you can freight hither five or sixthonsand Mds of rice for Acco<sup>\*</sup> of the Company and encourage what Ships or Vessells you can to come hither with grain, for we are not a little afraid of a Famine

wee are sorry she had not the Good luck to proceed to us

The Mañagers ordered the Sallary of none here but their Governour & Council, as also at ffort S<sup>t</sup> David, copy of which wee here Inclose, and whereas the New Companys ffactors and writers Salary were more then the Old Companys, they order that what of the new Companys Servants were taken into the United Service their salary agreed for in England should be Continued to them till the Expiration of their Covenants, and then to be reduced to the Old Companys accustomary salary, and all salary to be paid in the Country, to such as were in their service from the 22<sup>d</sup> July 1702, as also to those that serve them for the future

Your original Letter by the Armenian Cossid never came to hand the purport of the Copy of which were observe, and find that Cap<sup>th</sup> Raymond had boisterous weather to encounter with, who if he had happened to got out in the Condition the two Dutch Ships were, without an anchor as reported he would have found it very difficult to have dealt with this Coast at that time of year, you doubtless did well to protest, which his owners and him must answer at home

The Gold sent on the Tavistock was weighed in the presence of severall

here and 15 may be in the difference of the scales, Silver was not procureable here but at extraordinary rates, besides by our last years accounts of the sale of Gold, more especially Allumgeer Pagodas turned to a better accot then at the price wee must have bought Silver or Rupees here, which was the reason wee sent you Gold

Wee are in expectation of the small vessells you mention, who can run so near the Shore as to avoid the danger of an enemy more particularly the vessell wee lately wrote for to send to the Neptunes wreck

The Mannagers writt us that we are to Lade 200 Tons of Goods on the

Tavistock and that the Dutches is to be dispatched from Bengall

Wee doubt not but the Scipio has brought you out some Physick, which is the reason wee send you none, but if it should so happen that they have not, there is a Chest Doct Bulkly acquaints us that the Doctors matte of this Ship has, to whom he has wrote, if you should have occasion for one, to offer you the refusall

You say you design to Dispatch the Tavistock in November which is Generally a Tempesteous month, and whereas the Mannagers have given no directions to the Contrary, were think it emplys that they leave it to discretion to dispatch their ships so that they may be a security one to another

Wee are heartily glad to hear that your Government is so quiet, as ours also is, and wish they may both Continue so, and all other places where the Company have Settlements We are

Wee observe what demands are made by the Gov<sup>mt</sup> on the Old Company, w<sup>ch</sup> we are sorry to hear, but hope they are not spurr'd on theirto by their own country men, where that burthen will light at last a little time will show, wee can say little to the proceedings of the men of Warr, hopeing he will not exceed his comission in his Actions, but whereas he was wrote bigg to the Government, and if at last should goe away without setting S' John Gayer at Liberty, he will then Leave the English Interest in a much worse condition then he found it

Wee are likewise of your opinion that many opportunityes have been Lett slip, when advantagious adjustments might have been made of those demands

Wee wish the Lasckarree who was so near Bombay may not be ill neighbours to it, and for what you write about the two Messengers sent to Goa, concerning the two Arrab Ships, we hear nothing of it from thence

Your early advices to us of all matters of importance, will be great service to the Company and acceptable to us, and we shall be sure to do the like from hence

Your writing that the Ships bottom floated off, which afterwards was halled ashore by the natives, makes us very apprehensive that the Treasure and heavy goods are buryed in the sand and irrecoverable of which were expect an Account from you in your next, if Capth Lestly proceeded to the wreck, as you wrote us, as also whether the natives, had purchased anything considerable out of the sea

Wee much fear that all our friends at Surat are in great troubles of which

we daily expect an Account

The Packet for the Court of Mannagers shall be forwarded by the first ship that sails from hence

Wee here send you Pickets for Surat web pray forward by the first and safest conveyance, Remember us to Capta Lestly, whose Letter wee have recd, & hope he will meet with good success on the Expedition he was then going

Here is as yet no news of the four French Ships that have been so long expected, which has tired the Patience of those at Pollicherry, who have sent out a Sloop and the small Ship that arrived from France double Manned in search of them, which makes use Jealouse, that they know to what Port they are to come, tho at Present they give out they are afraid they are fallen into their enemys hands, for of certain they came out of France

#### 25TE OCTOBER

In one of your Letters you mention of takeing in Old and New Comp<sup>ac</sup> Servants into the United Service, which wee think not to be farely done, till they have cleared their Accounts with their former Masters

You write as if it was left to your Choice by the Managers to dispatch either of the Ships Tavistock or Dutchess from your Port to England, which is otherwayes in their Letter to us, who possitively direct the Dispatching of the Tavistock from hence

Wee deferr'd from day to day dispatching of this Cosset, expecting that wee should before this heard of the arrivall of the four French Ships wee formerly advised you off, which to the great trouble of these at Pollicherry are not yet heard off, who about Six weeks since sent out a sloop and a small ship double mann'd about twenty days past in search of them, so that reasonable to conjecture that they know where they are to come, Tis most certain they departed firance,

and unless they are fallen into their Enemys hands, wee may be sure to hear of them at some Port in India, so hope all our ships will act wth that caution and

Security as to prevent any misfortune from them

Wee did hope long ere this the Sloop wee wrote you for to send to the Neptunes wreck would have been arrived here, as also two small Vessells of the New Companys from Maddapollam, we wee did design for that expedition, but are so unfortunate as to be frustrated in all, which as yet is undeterminable, whether 'twill be to the prejudice or advantage of the Company, for in our last Letters from Anjengo, which were dated the 9th September, they write that the bottom of the ship wth the working of the sea was floated off, notwithstanding the great weight that was upon it, which bottom the Natives had halled ashore, and found but Lead on it, so 'tis feared the heavy goods, with the treasure are sunck too deep in the sand to be recovered, at which time they were sending Captin Lestly wth a Monchew to the place of the wreck to prevent the Natives working on it, an Account of which wee daily expect

They from Anjengo write us also that the troubles at Surat, were likely to swell to a greater bulk then ever, the Mogull haveing countermanded the delivery up of the security Paper, and ordered all Christians, the Armenians included, to be strictly confined to the Citty, till they paid for those two ships the Pirats took

Tis a great disappointment to us the not comeing of the Yatch and Fly, which we have so long expected, we well observe what you write relateing thereto, for which can lay no blame to your charge

When you have taken an Account of the Dead Stock at Maddapollam, wee expect your account thereof as you promise

Wee shall receive the Pallankeen of Mr Tillard of which you advise

M' Wood the former Master of the Yatch has as yet made no demand of wages, which wee take not to be due from the United Trade, when Thomas Chapman arrives here with the Yatch, wee shall see and settle his pay and adjust all matters with him, The 12 Laskars Ship't in August when recd two months pay, since they refused to come up with the Vessells they ought to return the pay, or at least to have half pay during their lying in the River

Wee wod not have you refuse the New Companys Merchants Warehouse roome for their Goods, nor their Servants Accomodation in the ffactory
