The Consultation and Diary Book of James Macrae Esqr. President & Governour &c. Council of Fort St. George containing their proceedings and transactions in the affairs of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies relating to the Presidency on the Coast of Choromandel Began this 4<sup>th</sup>. day of January, one thousand seven hundred and twenty nine.

Ship Cadogan belonging to the Honble Company and Commanded by John Saunders arrived from West Coast and brought a packet for this Presidency and Europe. [JANUARY] 4.

I was informed after the Heathcote was dispatch'd of a paragraph in the General Letter wherein a Transaction about some Tutenague in which I was concerned with the President was so unluckily worded as to give the Board occasion to object against it as an affair it was unacquainted with and improper to be incerted ; but as accident not any ill intention was the Cause I was mentioned in such general terms

the President frankly Cleared up the matter by declaring it was an affair he Transacted himself without my advice or knowledge, for which I was in no respect answerable but lest there should remain the least doubt I think it necessary to acquaint you I was at St. David when the President bought the Tutenague he advised me of it and offered me a third part which I accepted but do solemnly declare I had nothing to do with the sale or ever was Consulted about it.

It is natural to Think my Masters at home will require an Explanation of this matter, wherefore I hope your Honour will give them the same satisfaction as the Board has already received, lest my Justification should not be so Effectual as you intended it.

Neina replied that Anconah would expect a most extravagant price and therefore he or his partners could not or would not Take it. Your Pet<sup>r</sup>. Neina then offering to go away about some other business Markistnaraia said your Pet<sup>r</sup>. must Take it and endeavoured by abusive names and menaces to compel your Petitioners immediately to measure the said rice but your Petitioner still giving some reasons why he could not comply, Markistnaraja struck him in the face and threatened him in the name of Goda Anconah with such practices your Petitioners being intimidated the said Markistnaraja did the next day compel your Petitioners to Take and pay for the said rice.

Your Petitioners also beg leave to present to your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. that the said Markistnaraya hath several times by threats and menaces extorted several sums of money from your Petitioners amounting to upwards of Three hundred 300 pagodas, as by your Honour's & c<sup>t</sup>. leave your Petitioners shall more fully make appear hereafter. One instance your Petitioners humbly offer for the present namely that the said Markistnaraja sent for your petitioners and commanded them to Take some Paddy at sixty pagodas  $\text{₹}$  garse. Your Petitioners frequently declined the Offer insisting upon the market price to be but forty 40 pagodas  $\text{₹}$  garse. Yet nevertheless the said Markistnaraja sent the said paddy to your Petitioner's houses, and after some time by many threats and insults of his Peons your Petitioners were forced to pay the full price of sixty 60 pagodas  $\text{₹}$  garse for all such paddy as he the said Markistnaraya had put upon them.

Diamond to be brought to him but that not being in the power of these petitioners They were sent away under a guard of peons, that the next day they were carried to the Governour at his Garden House, where after a great many menaces and threats of the pillory and being hanged and such like punishment for daring to sell the Stone to any but the Governour it was proposed that these Petitioners should pay three Thousand pagodas as a fine for this heinous crime, but these petitioners representing their poor condition and inability to pay such a Sum, it was at length brought down to one Thousand 1000 pagodas which sum They actually paid to the Governour besides which Anconah insisted on a Gratuity for interposing with his good Offices otherwise as he told these petitioners They had Surely lost their Ears, that Gopaul one of these Petitioners carried Seventy five 75 pagodas to Goda Anconah on this Account but he not contented therewith ransacked his Cl[otes] and found about him a Small diamond of more value which he took from the said Gopal, that Goda Anconah did also exact fifty pagodas on account of a diamond mortgaged to Ball Chittee and by him to the Governour and that after this These Petitioners did again fall un[to] the Governour's displeasure and were confined to the Choultry prison whe[refrom] They could not be released till [they] had further paid [to Goda] Anconah the sum of one hund. and fifty pagodas [150] which sum he has within a few days past returned to them.

All which petitions are referred to the Honourable the Mayor's Court.

In obedience to your Commands I have herein given an Account of the State and condition of the Honble Company's ship Marlborough.

THE REPORT.

The Ship is very Crank notwithstanding what doubling is put on and her mast and yards lessened under proportion, she wants to be doubled higher for that which was put on at Pegue when Loaden is near a foot and half under water and all the doubling wants sheathing otherwise must be shifted every time her bottom is sheathed, which will soon split the Timbers and planks in peices. She is very leaky making ab<sup>o</sup>. Seven inches water an hour in a double reefed topsail gale and three inches  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour in fair weather and Leaks most when she is loaden and pitches much, which makes me believe most of these Leaks lie under the Cheeks of the head and about her doubling. She is in great want of Caulking both without board and within and when her Decks is well Caulked the Oakum works out of the Seams in bad weather which is occasioned by her planks not being well fixed to the Beams and

Carlains and I Conceive her bottom to have the same fault not being well put together, therefore will want some strengthening especially all the butts of the doubling which is only nailed and the most of the nails comes only through the planks. The Ship sails badly and did steer worse until in part prevented by a new Rudder which is big enough for a ship of Two hundred and fifty Tons and it is now Loose in the Gudgeons, so that some of the pintles or Gudgeons will be wanting new. I Cannot be Certain whether She will want sheathing until we see her on shore to examine her here and there within and without. She will want several odd jobs to be done within board, as places fitted to run out the guns and the Hatches mended and a new barricado, Hen Coop, and the Hauser Holes want new Leading.

The Ship will want for a Voyage a Sett of new standing & Running Rigging and some Sails but may do for a small Trip with some small ropes.

She is in want of Two new Coire Cables and one Europe Cable in lieu of one taken up at Marlborough, being oversized.

SHEWETH

That Having been a most grievous Sufferer by the Late General Imposition of Tutanague in the time of Governour Macrae both in his Estate and Credit, he humbly offers to your serious Consideration a State of his Case & pray for some redress of the notorious injuries he has received. Your Pet<sup>r</sup>. therefore sets forth that on or about the 16<sup>th</sup>. May 1727 a parcel of Coolys without his knowledge and against his Consent came into the yard of his House and threw down a parcel of Tutenague which he was told came by Sunca Ramah's order and was for his proportion, in all 372 whole peices and 254 half peices weighing Cand<sup>s</sup>. 31. 5. valued Thirty three pagodas  $\frac{1}{2}$  Candy besides one  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent dustore and amounting in the whole to P<sup>a</sup>. 1041. 13. 40. that some time after a peon of Sunca Ramahs named Yellu and another in the Company's Service named Eyana came to him to demand the money, which he told them he Could not pay being very poor and unable to bear such a Loss as this must bring with it. They thereupon hauled your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to Sunca Ramah who abused him with much Ill Language, and then Sent back the peons with him to his house to remain there as a Guard upon him, in which miserable state of Confinement your Pet<sup>r</sup>. continued four or five days. Your Pet<sup>r</sup>. having occasion to Go a little way out of Town Sunca Rama imagining he had fled first Set two peons and

then four Talliars and a Moorman as an additional Guard on your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. brother who would neither let him Eat or Sleep one whole night, for your Pet<sup>r</sup>. returned the next morning and was at the same time carried to the Governour's garden house as the Peons told him by order of Moodu Ramah, where were present Anconah, Com Chittee, Kishamah, Jaldoo Paupa, Moodu Ramah and Lancapilla Gruapab. Moodu Ramah told Anconah that your Pet<sup>r</sup>. would not pay for the Tutenague and bid him get the Governour to whip him, and Sunca Rama coming in, said further to him (of your Pet<sup>r</sup>.) this Rascal is ags<sup>t</sup>. us. Sunca Rama pressed your Pet<sup>r</sup>. for the money who could only use Entreaties to get himself Excused and pleaded poverty whereupon They all Left him and went to the Governour who Soon after sent for your Pet<sup>r</sup>. and Enquired of him by Lancapilla Gruapah Interpreter, how he durst abuse Moodu Ramah, yo<sup>r</sup>. Pet<sup>r</sup>. denied the Charge, but being unable to Justifie himself against such powerfull Opponents in a cause which They were obliged to Support, and Sunca Ramah at the same time whispering something in the Governour's Ear, the Governour Immediately ordered the Chubdar to give your Petition<sup>r</sup>. Ten blows (which Sunca Rama desired might be well laid on your poor Pet<sup>r</sup>.), after this great indignity was hurried away forthwith into the Choultry prison, and as the Talliars said by order of the Governour, put into the most filthy place in it where all the prisoners ease themselves and in this miserable condition remained Three days. Your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. brother then went to Moodu Rama and represented to him that your Pet<sup>r</sup>. had eat no victuals for all that Time and desired he might have the Liberty allowed him to come home to eat, but Moodu Ramah only abused him and threatened They should both be put in the pillory and be hanged and the like altho he afterwards gave Leave for your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to go to the next house adjoining to the prison to eat in which uncomfortable manner your Pet<sup>r</sup>. Lived about fifteen days, having but one meal every day. Your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. brother in the meanwhile laboured to procure your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. releasement and applied to Moodu Rama very earnestly who referred him to Anconah and he again to Sunca Ramah, So that your poor Pet<sup>r</sup>. was Turned off from one to another in this Sorrowful manner without any hope of redress. Upon your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. brother's further Application Moodu Rama bid him if he had no money by him to Sell off the Tutenague and raise some to which your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. brother answering that he was but a boy and did not know how to manage such a large Concern, he bid Jaldoo Paupah Assist him in the sale of it which being in this Extraordinary maner at length obliged to do, it produced no more than P<sup>s</sup>. 927. 18. 45. So that the difference in price comes to P<sup>s</sup>. 113. 30. 75. for which Your Humble Petitioner desires Satisfaction may be made him together with the Lawfull interest thereon as well as for the manifest and Violent injuries as above set forth which he has most wrongfully sustained in his person and Character.

Your Humble petitioner MEDCALF NEINA CHITTEE of Madras Merchant, having Carried on a Considerable trade here for many years past and therein all along acted in Conformity to the established rules for the good regulation of the place, which he hopes and thinks will entitle him to the protection of an English Government, and being further Encouraged by the gracious Assurances your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. have given that the injured person shall have recompence for his wrongs, begs leave to represent to you that during the administration of the late Governour M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae the Merchants of this place in general were very considerable Sufferers by having Goods put upon them against their Consent and at exorbitant prices, which nevertheless They have been obliged to receive to their certain Loss and prejudice, under dread of exposing themselves and families to immediate ruin by a refusal and offers the annexed Schedule to your Consideration as a proof that he is an unhappy instance of this grievous oppression in particular, which he declares to be a just Account and is willing if required to Attest by the most Solemn Oath.

He has also ready to produce, receipts for the money for these goods Signed by Somadrue Governour Macrae's Conicoply, and thinks fit to mention that the four following persons namely Pooteah Kistnamah, Veraugo, Peiremaul Raja, and Mootealoo, all peons in the Honble Company's Service, were employed in Collecting these moneys.

Your Petitioner therefore craves redress of the injuries he has received from mo[st] notorious Abuses of the public Trust, & hopes his Case will sufficiently recommend itself to your Consideration since by these measures the fortunes of the fa[rm] Trader are rendered very precarious to the manifest Scandal and detriment of the Common Interest.

TO THE HONBLE GEORGE MORTON PITT Esq<sup>r</sup>.

PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. GEORGE & C<sup>t</sup>. COUNCIL.

Your poor Petitioners Gopaul and Gruapah of Madras, Merchants, humbly complaining to your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. Set forth that having been concerned in the Sale of a Large Diamond in this place on or about the month of December in the year 1726 the late Governour Mr. Macrae did thereupon by force and other Ill means extort from them the sum of one Thousand pagodas, and that on or about the same time and on the same Account Goda Anconah his Servant did also force from your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Effects and moneys to a Considerable value, for proof of which They take the Liberty to present a State of their hard case, and implore your favourable Assistance for redress of their Grievances.

Anconah having come to the knowledge of our having had in our possession the diamond beforementioned sent for us to his house where we found Ball Chittee & several other persons and in their presence enquired of us how we had presumed to carry such a stone to any one in town before the Governour, adding that we should go back & fetch to him to which we replied it was out of our power because it was sold. This happened in the evening and at ten a Clock that night Anconah sent us under charge of his peons to Tagapanaigue's house, who locked us both up together in a godown belonging to the House, Gopaul had been confined there about four hours when one Nallum Juggoo (who in the mean time had Interposed in his behalf and on promise [to] become Surety for him had procured Anconah's order to release him for the present), came and Carried him away, the next day about nine in the morning we were both Carried to the Governours Garden house under charge of Changala Raya with other Talliars where were present Anconah, Ball Chittee and the aforesaid Nallum Juggoo the first of whom met us at the door of the Chamber & used several very severe menaces serving to intimidate us and then introduced us to the Governour, who upon our entrance rose up from his Chair and walked across the room expressing much passion, and as it was represented to us by the said Anconah his dubashe, Threatened us with the pillory and Cutting off our ears for presuming to Carry any Goods so Clandestinely about Town when we knew it is our duty to bring them to him first as our Governour we were under the greatest Terror and Consternation at this Treatment but however ventured to answer that being entrusted with the sale of such a stone we had carried it about the Town indifferently and so had disposed of it to the best Bidder. Anconah thereupon asked us who that was, which we be[ing] Merchants and used to trade with the English thought it was necessary to Conceal, till being pressed to the uttermost we were obliged to declare the name of the Buyer and the ter[ms] of the sale which were that part only of the money had been then paid for it and a note payable in few days was given for the remainder upon which the note was immediately called for and being accordingly produced, they seemed so Satisfied that the diamond was actually sold.

Anconah then charged us with a breach of our duty in having acted in this manner, and threatened us with the ill Consequences of it if we did not some how or other make up the matter privately and proposed to us to offer the Governour first Three Thousand pagodas and then Two Thousand pagodas, either of which Sums we represented to him we were utterly incapable of paying, and at length Compromised the matter for the sum of one Thousand pagodas to be paid to the Governour, & upon this Telling Anconah that we had no money by us he (Anconah) immediately carried us both down to Mr. Pyot the Governour's Bookkeeper and made us sign a note in our own name to the said Pyot for the said sum of one Thousand pagodas as borrowed of him at the signing of which note the Governour's Conicoply Somadrue was present. This money we took with us up Stairs and gave the bag into Anconah's hands who before us and in the presence of Ball Chittee and Nallum Juggoo beforementioned, put it into the hands of the Governour who then Sat smoaking on a Couch in the room who accordingly took the bag and looking all round to see if any one observed, put it under the pillow of the Couch. As soon as this was done the Governour gave to both of us and to the said Nallum Juggoo Three

yards of broad cloth each and so dismissed us. But Anconah attacked us next and saying he had Interposed very earnestly in our favour or we should surely have Lost our ears, told us he expected some acknowledgment for his trouble, whereupon Gopaul carried the next day to Anconah's house Seventy five 75 pagodas in money in order to pay the same to him, but Anconah suspecting he might have something better about him, ransacked the Cloth that was tied round his middle and took out his purse in which There was a Cutt Stone of a quarterless Two mangelines and about one hundred pagodas value he took this Stone from said Gopaul letting alone the money, although Moodu Ramah who was present desired Anconah not to Take away the Stone. This Gopaul paid and Gruapah having at the same time a diamond in the hands of Ball Chittee mortgaged for five hundred pagodas taken up upon it which the said Ball Chittee mortgaged again soon after to the Governour for that sum. Anconah stoped fifty 50 pagodas out of his money.

Some time after this we had the misfortune to fall under the Governour's displeasure again and were confined in the Choultry prison and on Anconah's promise to procure our releasement we gave him jointly the further sum of one hundred and fifty 150 pagodas; but this money Anconah has within a few days past returned to us so that we have no demands upon him for the same.

Goda Anconah Servant to the late Governour M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae has forced your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. to let him have their grain at his own prices to whom your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. were unwilling to Consent. Then the said Goda Anconah begun to give your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. abundance of trouble. Your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. out of fear of some ill Consequence went to S<sup>t</sup>. Thomé while They were absent the said Goda Anconah begun to carry away the Grain by force, which your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. hearing returned to this place, when They arrived Anconah abused them and kept the Company's peons & his Conicoply Markistnaraya over their banksalls and abused and Threatened the Measurers to make him a good measure which They accordingly did, and carried to his godowns the particulars of which your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. will perfectly understand by the Account of the Grain, and also that the abovenamed Anconah has forced them to give receipts with their Signs in his book which They were obliged to do by reason of his unlimited authority over the Black Town. Therefore your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. most humbly offer this to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. consideration that these matters may be Examined that your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. may have justice and Your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. as in duty bound shall ever pray.

Sometimes by abusive Language and threatenings to go to the Honble Governour and lay some charge & complaint against your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. whereby as he said your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. should be put in the pillory, lose their Ears, and be whipped out of the Company's bounds, sometimes Harrassing your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. with frequent messages and attendance upon him, and in case of your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. not coming upon Such summons, frequently hath he sent his peons Pooteah Kistnamah, Veraugo, Raganaculoo, Jangomiah and others to haul and drag your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. by force from their families, and having expelled your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. shut up their shops and Warehouses to prevent their Trade and livelyhood till your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. should submit to his impositions. many times have his Servants Compelled your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. to be in his warehouses wherein his Grain was measuring as if by Consent, commanding the Coolys to Carry such and such parcels to Such and such Godowns belonging to your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. where the Coolys would by his order Set it down before the door and leave it to rapine and the weather—at the same time commanding your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. to take, buy and pay for such parcels thus forceably thrown upon their hands and upon non-compliance or even endeavouring to put off the payment the said Anconah and Markasayah have beat, bruised, whipped, and confined your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. not only within doors but even uncovered in the Sun till payment—yea, many times have They so done even for refusing to receive some parcels of rice and Oil Seeds though at the most exorbitant prices. If your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Scrupled to buy or take at such prices, giving for reason the order of Consultation whereby all persons were forbid to buy or sell above such Limited rates, and your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. then saying they were afraid that the

Governour should hear of such bargains and They be most Justly and Severely punished, he the said Anconah would Laugh and put a scorn and contempt on the said order of Consultation, Saying who should Tell the Governour of what he does? who dare to complain of the dearness of his rice? he always would stay by the Governour, and If your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. would Take his rice at his price, They might sell it again without fear of persecution upon the said order of Consultation.

If it should be asked why your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Submitted to such Severities? or wherefore did not your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. make a regular complaint of these Things before? Your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. must appeal to the knowledge of all men, how often They have complained of these Things in a private manner, and should undoubtedly have been more ready to have done the same in the most Public and solemn manner, had your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. any hopes of relief, or could They have been secure from the resentment & revenge of this great favourite of the then Governour's whose authority and dread Servitude were so deeply implanted in every man's heart, that your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. The General Letter from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David of the 12<sup>th</sup>. May, was again read, representing the unhappy Condition of the Merchants and the great decay of the trade of that place on Account of the dearness of Cotton and other impediments whereby there appears an absolute necessity that some speedy means be used to give new Life and vigour thereto wherefore ORDERED that M<sup>r</sup>. Symonds get himself in readiness to go there by Tuesday next, that being arrived there he with the Council take this affair immediately into consideration, and after well advising with the Merchants and others and having maturely deliberated thereon, that They Give us their opinion what are the most requisite methods for promoting the Investment with the reasons their Opinion is grounded on, that we may be the better able to give what further directions are necessary therein.

M<sup>r</sup>. Symonds not having sufficient time to Settle all his affairs here, AGREED that he be permitted to return So soon as he has finished what is immediately necessary to be done at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David.

ORDERED that in his absence M<sup>r</sup>. Roach take upon him the charge of the accomptant's Office, M<sup>r</sup>. Fowke that of the Export Warehouse and M<sup>r</sup>. Hyde that of the Import Ware House.

ORDERED that M<sup>r</sup>. Holland Goddard be appointed to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David to fill up the vacancy in Council there.

ORDERED that five hundred Candys of Redwood be purchased, and sent to the Bay with what already on hand in such quantities on each ship as They can conveniently take.

A Letter from Captain Fitzhugh Commander of the Derby was read, requesting to bring ashore Two Chests of Silver and two boxes of Gold Thread, They being Licenced by the Company though not mentioned in any manifest hither and he producing some vouchers to prove the same AGREED that his request be granted, he giving the usual Security.

also a request from Captain Holden for landing Two chests of silver omitted in the manifest for which he produced a receipt as a Voucher—his request granted on the former conditions.

Five petitions from the Black Merchants, complaining of sundry injuries they have Sustained by the practices of Goda Anconah and those concerned with him, which in Substance are as follows.

from Mamodue Chittee Tomiah Setting forth that he having been a Considerable Trader to the Port in Grain and other goods, had always received good usage & encouragement till the beginning of the year 1729, when some of the Petitioners concern<sup>d</sup> arrived under the care of two attorneys, whom Goda Anconah Servant to the

late Governour Mr. Macrae sent for by a Peon and demanded a Certain quantity of Grain of them, but They endeavouring to evade it by saying They were not the Owners but only Servants and that what They had in possession was already contracted for, the said Goda Anconah was in a great passion, and after he had threatened & abused them bid them in particular take care of tomorrow, that in the morning Goda Anconah went to the Govern<sup>r</sup>. what Complaint he alledged there is unknown to the Pet<sup>r</sup>. but his servants were ordered to be whipped five Strokes with a Chabuck at every Banksal, that on hearing of this order one of his Attorneys made his escape but the other named Maurolee Juggoo underwent that punishment, the pain of which threw him into a fever and flux of which he languished about a month and then died, that some Servants whose particular duty it was to take care of the Pet<sup>r</sup>. Effects were so terrified at the punishment, fled and left his Godowns exposed to force and rapine, and that a Great part was actually stole away, that the day after the punishment was given Goda Anconah Sent for some other of the Pet<sup>r</sup>. Servants and asked them in an insulting manner if They were grown wiser and whether They would comply, who being obliged to submit, the said Anconah commanded away a certain parcel of Rice and Paddy which was then worth above one hundred and fifty pagodas, but he would only pay them sixty pagodas and obliged them to sign a discharge in full, by which matters the Petitioner is a Sufferer above Two hundred twenty nine pagodas.

from Veranasa Narran setting forth that he being a considerable dealer in Grain, Goda Anconah Servant to the late Governour Mr. Macrae, did oblige him to deliver several parcels of Grain, for which he would only pay him at his own rates, whereby he has been a Sufferer one hundred seventy eight pagodas, and that the authority exercised by the said Goda Anconah was so exorbitant that it would have been in vain then to make complaints, much less to hope for any redress. by Grain Merch<sup>ts</sup>.

from Porponde Ragganaguloo, setting forth that about the month of February 1723-9 he imported here several parcels of Grain and other goods which Goda Anconah Servant to the late Governour by his arbitrary practices publickly hindered this Pet<sup>r</sup>. from selling to any, in order to make him Submit to such prices as said Goda Anconah was pleased to give, that the Pet<sup>r</sup>. having sold some parcels without the permission of said Goda Anconah he obliged him to pay as a fine for that Trespass, the Sum of Four hundred and two pagodas, that being Terrified by such unjust and violent methods, he Complied with said Goda Anconah's other unreasonable demands by which he suffered to the amount of nine hundred and Seventeen pagodas as  $\text{P}$  Account Annexed for which he prays redress. do.

from Mudala Numashavia, setting forth that he being a Considerable dealer in Grain and other goods, did accordingly Import a large quantity about January 1728-9 a great part of which Goda Anconah servant to the late Governour Mr. Macrae did take from him without agreeing for any price, and that he has not to this day rendered him any satisfaction for the same and that by this Illegal and unjustifiable practice, he is a Sufferer near one Thousand Six hundred pagodas as  $\text{P}$  Account Annexed, for which he desires redress. Grain Merch<sup>ts</sup>.

from Vishvinaadah Company's Shroff, complaining that about the 5<sup>th</sup>. September 1726 he being sent for to the Governour's Gardens to Shroff and bag a parcel of pagodas and attending for that purpose, an alarm was made of a bag of one Thousand pagodas being Stolen out of one of the rooms on which every one present was strictly searched, but nothing found, that Gooda Anconah first charged the robbery on Mr. Pyot's Conicoply and Dubashe, and sent them to the Choultry and then charged the same on this Informant & accordingly sent him to the Choultry prison, where he remained fifteen days, in which time he was pressed by Anconah to Sign a promissory note for five hundred pagodas, but he refusing to do so was put into closer Confinement and kept without Sustenance, that this Informant's father and Father in Law made earnest solicitation in behalf of this Informant, but instead of meeting with redress They were whipped at the Governour's Garden house Twenty one blows each with a Chabuck and sent to the Choultry where they were severely treated, that Goda Anconah sent to this Informant to Tell him he must not Hope for his Liberty but Company's Shroff.

Expect worse treatment If he did not sign the said note, that being in these Circumstances he thought himself under a necessity to Submit and did accordingly sign the said note for five hundred pagodas, and was thereon released, that about two months after the said theft was found out to be committed by the said Mr. Pyot's Conicoply and great part of the money recovered, that Goda Anconah under pretence that this Informant was concerned therein, sent him again to the Choultry prison and loaded his legs with heavy Chains (without giving him any opportunity of justifying himself), and there kept him in that misery for a whole month at which time he let him understand by one Wooteapah, that if he would part with a certain parcel of Redwood in this Informant's possession he might procure his releasement, and this Informant despairing of obtaining his Liberty by any other means did at length submit thereto and Somadrue the Governour's Conicoply did weigh the same off, being in value one thousand six hundred and eighty pagodas, of which this Informant has been wholly deprived and not received the least Satisfaction whatsoever besides Two hundred pagodas he paid on account of the said promissory note.

that your Petitioner hath for many years been a considerable Trader to this port in Grain and other goods from the Northward, and having duly paid the Honble Company's Customs and other the usual port charges, always met with good usage and encouragement till some time in the month of March 1728-9 when some of your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Concerns arrived at this port under the care of Two Gomastah's, one named Maurolee Juggo, the other Strepaudum Nersia whom Goda Anconah of this place, Servant to the late Govern<sup>r</sup>. James Macrae Esq<sup>r</sup>. sent for by his peon Jangomiah & demanded of them to deliver to him two garse of rice and two of paddy which They endeavoured to evade and assured him they were not the owners thereof, but only employed as servants to your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to dispose of the said goods, beside which all the rice and paddy They had in their possession was already contracted for and They could not Sell it to any other person, at which refusal the said Goda Anconah was in a great passion with your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Servants and after having threatened and abused them bid them in particular take care of tomorrow, in the morning the said Goda Anconah went to his Master the then Governour and formed some complaint of what your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Servants knew not, but They were thereupon ordered to be beaten with a Chaubuck five Stripes at every Banksall, at the hearing of which Strepaudum Nersia made his Escape but the other Maurolee Juggoo underwent that punishm<sup>ts</sup>. of which when your Pet<sup>r</sup>. saw him a month after he was in great torment and the pain thereof threw him into a flux and fever, of which he died the day after your Pet<sup>r</sup>. saw him—all the rest of your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Servants whose duty it was

to look after the Banksals fled for fear and left your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Goods exposed to rapine, by which your Pet<sup>r</sup>. lost near the value of one hundred and twenty pagodas which was actually stole from your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Banksals at that time, the day after your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Servant had received the aforesaid punishment, Anconah sent for them again to his house and asked them in an Insulting manner if They were not grown wiser, and whether They would comply with his demand, to which your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Servants could answer no other than That he might do his pleasure, and he thereupon sent Marca-saya with a mercial, who after his way Caused to be measured one garse and twenty mercial of rice and Three hundred and sixty mercial of paddy, which with the overmeasurage was then worth to your Pet<sup>r</sup>. P<sup>s</sup>. 150. 4. 58 for payment of which sum your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Servants often attended on the said Anconah and at last received from him sixty pagodas, on the payment of which he insisted that They should Sign a full discharge which They accordingly did by which matters afore related, it doth appear that together with the Interest now due thereon, your Pet<sup>r</sup>. is a Sufferer by the said Godah Anconah to the amount of P<sup>s</sup>. 229. 30. 58. and therefore prays your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. will please to grant a General relief,

and Your Pet<sup>r</sup>. as in duty bound, shall ever pray.

The Information of Vishvinaadah of the town of Madrasapatnam Shroff taken upon oath before me Robert Symonds, one of y<sup>o</sup>. Justices of the peace for the said Town. Town of

patnam S<sup>o</sup>.

This Informant saith, that on or about the fifth day of September 1726 he was called to Shroff and bag a parcel of pagodas for M<sup>r</sup>. David Pyot deceased private Secretary to the then Governour M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae, and that at the time of his attending for that purpose there was an alarm of a bag of one Thousand pagodas being lost, immediately upon which every one that was found thereabouts was strictly searched and examined and among the rest this Informant, but nothing could be found at that time, that Anconah Servant to the said M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae first charged the said M<sup>r</sup>. Pyot's Conicoply and Dubashe with the robbery and upon their denying it sent them prisoners to the Choultry, after which he taxed this Informant and in the same manner sent him to the Choultry prison where this Informant continued in confinement about fifteen days without any relief, that on this Informants application to Anconah for a releasement, He (Anconah) proposed that this Informant should Sign one promissory note for five hundred pagodas and the poligar another note for the like sum in order to make up the loss aforementioned which terms this Informant refused, and was thereupon ordered into very Close confinement and the peons that were set over him had directions not to suffer any manner of Sustenance whatsoever to be brought to him, on which melancholy Occasion this Informant further saith that his Father & father-in-Law made their Earnest application to the said Anconah for this Informant's release, but that instead of meeting with relief the said Anconah by his Influence with the said Governour M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae did cause them both to suffer at the Garden House Twenty one blows with the Chaubuck and then sent them from thence prisoners to the Choultry, where They were treated in a very severe manner, that some time after this the said Anconah sent word to this Informant in the prison aforesaid, that the Polligar had on his part Signed a note for the five hundred pagodas and that he this Informant till he should do the like, must not hope to recover his Liberty, but might expect worse treatment, which Threats so far terrified this Informant that he found himself under a necessity to submit to this violence, and accordingly he did on his part likewise sign a note for five hundred pagodas, w<sup>ch</sup>. procured his release at that time, but this Informant further saith, that about two months afterwards it was discovered that the said M<sup>r</sup>. Pyots Conicoply by name Ramah, had committed the Theft, and such part of the money as the said Ramah had not yet expended, as well as part of what he had expended was actually recovered from him the said Ramah, but that nevertheless as this Informant has good reason to conceive by the tampering of some of the said Ramah's freinds with the said Anconah in order to take the odium in part off the family, the said Ramah charged this Informant with having received four hundred pagodas of this money, whereupon the Said Anconah did order this Informant without Giving him an opportunity of justifying himself, again into the Choultry prison, and caused heavy Chains to be put upon his Legs in which great misery this Inform<sup>t</sup>. Lay for a whole month and till he understood by his uncle Wooteapah whom Anconah had sent for for that purpose, that he might procure his releasement upon condition that he would part with a quantity of red wood which he had then lying in the place, which at length this Informant was obliged through despair of Gaining his Liberty otherwise, to Give his Consent to, and that accordingly Sumadrue the late Governour's Conicoply weighed off the whole parcel as four hundred and fifty Candies whereas it really weighed four hund<sup>d</sup>. and eighty Candies and this Informant has never to this

day received from any person whatsoever any satisfaction or value for the same although the Current price was then Three pagodas and a half  $\text{₹}$  Candy, at which rate this Informant has in this article suffered an actual Loss of one Thousand Six hundred and eighty pagodas, besides which, this Informant doth further declare that he hath paid two hundred pagodas in part of the note for the value of five hundred pagodas extorted from him in the manner above asserted.

It being observed that in the petitions of the Merchants dealing in Grain, there is constant complaint made of undue measurage, although there is an Officer particularly appointed for that purpose and Sworn to do justice, wherefore the Town-Measurer was Called for and being examined on this head, he acknowledges that of late there has not been justice done to the Merchants in measuring their Grain for that Goda Anconah gave him orders always to take over measurage, and that he represented to Anconah the Ill consequences of such a practice, but that he bid the measurer do it and Anconah would take the Ill consequences upon himself, that in pursuance to his orders he used sometimes to take more but never less than forty mercals in every Garse he measured for Anconah of Grain Seeds &c<sup>t</sup>. the quantity of which he says to the best of his knowledge, amounts to Six or Seven hundred garse, but says when the same Grain Seeds &c<sup>t</sup>. were delivered again to others he did not make any allowance but Struck the mercals to even measure, he further saith that Anconah's peons frequently Locked up the Company's Mercals, so that none could measure but as he pleased, and that They customarily measured the Grain all the day and in the night time carried it away, that after the Company's order for selling twelve mercals of paddy for a pagoda, the poor people could get none in the buzar it being all carried to Anconah's godowns and sold in the night sometimes for ninety pagodas ¼ garse.

then being Questioned concerning the measurage of the Two hundred Garse of Paddy said to be bought on the Company's Account he declares that he used the same method as he did in that bought for Anconah both in the receiving in and delivering it out, and that the Merchants Seeing They should not be fairly dealt with, frequently abandoned their Grain and left him to measure as he pleased.

Messieurs Symonds, Roach and Hyde declare that Mr. Newcome, who was appointed by the Governour to see that paddy measured that was taken on the Company's Account, told them There was gained on the measurage from fifteen to Twenty ¼ Cent, that Mr. Newcome perceiving this Ill practice, forsook that Office, but was ordered back to see it finished and Major Roach says he offered Mr. Macrae a bag of pagodas to have the profit on measuring that Grain, for that there was above fifteen ¼ Cent to be gained by it, but Mr. Macrae answered that he had already Given the key to Ball Chittee.

The Examination of Sunca Vencatachelum of Madraspatnam Merchant taken upon oath before me John Roach one of his Majesties Justices of the peace for the said Town. The town of Madraspatnam. SS.

This Examinant saith that M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae late Governour of this place, in the year 1727 sent for this Examinant and the rest of the Company's Merchants and proposed to them to Take one thousand Candies of Tutenague of him, which was strenuously opposed then by the Instigation of Goda Anconah he ordered us to put it upon the Casts, to which this Examinant and the rest answered They could not, then he bid Anconah and Somadrue distribute it, to this Examinant with the other Merchants went to Anconah's house who drew out the List of the people to whom it should be sold but this Examinant and Moodu Ramah finding there were very few persons named, did prevail on Anconah to permit them to draw out a List more at large that so the loss might fall lighter upon the people by being divided among so many more, this new list was delivered to Somadrue who weighed off five hundred Candies to this Examinant's Cast people. When this distribution was almost Completed M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae by Instigation (as this Examinant believes) of the said Goda Anconah sent for this Examinant and the other Company's Merchants and obliged them to Sign bonds for the whole amount, which after four days disputing was complied with on a promise that the Company's Peons should Collect the money, but as this Examinant was afraid to Trust Somadrue, he this Examinant always sent one of his own peons along with the others to Take care that when the money was received it might be brought to this Examinant, who carried it as he got it to the Garden, to pay off and Clear his bond.

The Examination of Tomby Chittee of Fort St. George Merchant, Taken before me John Roach one of his Majesties Justices of the peace for the said Town. The Town of Madraspatnam. SS.

This Examinant saith that in the year 1727 M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae then Governour of Fort St. George having one Thousand Candies of Tutenague sent for this Examinant and Ball Chittee, Moodu Ramah and Sunca Vencatachilum, and proposed to them to buy it, which They refused; but this Examinant during his talking with M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae telling him he would do better to keep it and sell it as it was wanted, Goda Ancona then present made answer no, no, It will be a great trouble and loss of time to do it, your Honour had better put it upon the Casts and accordingly the Governour ordered it to be done and bid Anconah divide it, then this Examinant with Ball Chittee and Moodu Ramah went to Goda Anconah's house and Sunca Vencatachelum came afterwards, then Ancona told them to stay without and he would draw out a List whom the Tutenague should be delivered to which he did and shewed it to me, but finding there were not above thirty people named I told him the Loss would be too Great on them and prevailed on him to divide it among all the trading people of my Cast & accordingly appointed four people to make out a new List which was shewed to Anconah and approved of, This Examinant further saith that his share came to one hundred and fifty Candies, and the remaining three hundred and fifty Candies were carried from the Governour's godowns directly to the several people's houses

under charge of the Company's peons, excepting when They came to the godowns themselves to receive their proportions, and further this Examinant saith that the distribution of the Tutenague began the twenty first day of April and was not Completed till the Twenty first day of June ; that on the seventh or eighth day of June, the Governour sent for this Examinant with the other Merchants and bid them sign bonds for the amount of the Tutenague, to which this Examinant replied he had never received it, that the Governour's people had weighed it and delivered it, and they should Collect the money, that it was then the price was fixed and that M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae proposed Thirty one 31. pagodas & Candy, but Anconah told him it was divided among a great many people, and he might charge 34 which he thereupon resolved to do, but that this Examinant and the rest having represented it to be too great a Loss, Anconah then pretended as a favour, to beg of the Governour to be contented with Thirty three 33, and that this Examinant and the rest persisting to refuse signing the said bonds They were severely Threatened, and after four days did Consent to sign them, which done, Pooteah Kistnama the Company's peon was ordered by Anconah to Gather in the money of the Chittee Cast, who brought it as he gathered it in to this Examinant, who in four payments cleared off his bond.

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF JELLIPILLA NAUGONAH

SHEWETH

that Goda Anconah Inhabitant of this place some time in the year 1720, being minded to go up in the Country delivered to your Pet<sup>r</sup>. a considerable sum of money, which was to remain at Interest till he should demand the same, and he also delivered to your Pet<sup>r</sup>. at the same time a bond for five hundred pagodas which he desired your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to receive, and on such his request your Pet<sup>r</sup>. did often demand of Mar Kistnah from whom the said bond was due, to discharge the same which he promised to do, but so it happened that about that time M<sup>r</sup>. Nathaniel Elwick was ordered Governour of this place, and the aforesaid Mar Kistnah was Committed to prison so that your Pet<sup>r</sup>. was never able to recover any part of the said bond, and your Pet<sup>r</sup>. further sheweth that some time after Goda Anconah's Departure from this place your Pet<sup>r</sup>. by his order, at several times remitted all the aforementioned moneys which was by him delivered your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to remain at Interest, and on his return your Pet<sup>r</sup>. did request of him to Settle and clear all accounts, which then he promised to do, but some small time after being Settled in the service of the late Governor James Macrae Esq<sup>r</sup>. he sent for and ordered your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to deliver his Accounts to his Conicoply Marcasagihim which was accordingly done as your Pet<sup>r</sup>. supposed to make up the same, but on the contrary Anconah told your Pet<sup>r</sup>. what sums of money had been paid to him or to his order, was of no Signification, and also that your Pet<sup>r</sup>. should be answerable for the aforementioned bond of five hundred pagodas due from MarKistnah, that the ballance was due from your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to him to the amount of Three Thousand five hundred pagodas and demanded of your Pet<sup>r</sup>. Immediately to give bond for the Same—one bond in the name of Com Chittee for Two Thousand pagodas and one bond in his own name for fifteen hundred pagodas which demand your Pet<sup>r</sup>. refused to comply with. about Ten days after said Anconah sent Talliars to your Pet<sup>r</sup>. house and there kept your Pet<sup>r</sup>. with his whole family confined for near Three months, till your Pet<sup>r</sup>. did give such bonds as he demanded. some time after Goda Anconah complained to his Master the then Governour who sent for your Pet<sup>r</sup>. and shewing the aforesaid bonds asked if they were your Pet<sup>r</sup>. signing, which being acknowledged, he ordered your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to discharge the same, but not being able to comply with that judgement, your Pet<sup>r</sup>. was ordered to the Custody of the Marshall, some time after which your Pet<sup>r</sup>. paid said Anconah eight hundred pagodas in part of the aforesaid obligations, and gave a Mortgage of your Petitioners Houses for twelve

hundred pagodas more and thereupon Anconah delivered up to your Pet<sup>r</sup>. the bond of P<sup>s</sup>. 2000. which was in Com Chittee's name and on the aforesaid Mortgage bond about twenty months after said Goda Anconah preferred his complaint in the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the Mayor's Court, and obtained a decree for the sale of the said houses which produced about eight hundred and thirty pagodas, and in order to Get the remainder of the said bond, he procured a warrant to commit your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to prison, on which your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. mother applied to the said Goda Anconah and requested the releasement of your Pet<sup>r</sup>. which was not granted till she sold her jewels and paid him Two hundred pagodas and till Poncala Kistnah of this place at your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. request paid said Goda Anconah four hundred pagodas more, after which the houses being purchased by the said Goda Anconah, he sent his people and locked up the Household Stuff, and all your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. Cajan's Accounts and bonds, and having turned your Pet<sup>r</sup>. out of the said house he took the key thereof, by which your Pet<sup>r</sup>. may have been a great Sufferer by the damage the said Cajans may have sustained, which as your Pet<sup>r</sup>. as yet knoweth not, but said Anconah not yet contented with what he had already Extorted from your Pet<sup>r</sup>. Still continued to keep your Pet<sup>r</sup>. under charge of Talliards and demanded another Interest bond to be given him for two Thousand pagodas which your Pet<sup>r</sup>. was obliged to Consent to being under Confinement; which bond being executed he delivered up your Pet<sup>rs</sup>. bond for P<sup>s</sup>. 1500 in all which matters before related your Pet<sup>r</sup>. most humbly prays your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>s</sup>. assistance, and as in duty bound, shall ever pray.

Council" the said petition was read and the several Subscribers thereto were called in and Questioned concerning their signing the said petition.

Examinations taken by the Board touching the petitions of y<sup>e</sup>. Casts formerly dd. into Council now lately presented by the Grand Jury.

Tomby Chittee says he did not sign it, but that his brother set his name to it in his absence.

Sunca Ramah owns that he did make application to have the Liberty of adjusting some of the differences amongst their Own Casts as usual, but that no other part of the petition was of his framing or done by his Consent though he was prevailed on to Sign it.

Rangomar Tomby Chittee and a few others likewise own They did desire the differences amongst the Casts might be adjusted amongst themselves as usual, but that They had nothing to do with any other part of the petition, but Signed it at the command of Anconah who told them it was the Governour's will, and if They did not, They must not expect the Governour's favour.

Somadroo says that he was only a servant, and was obliged to do as he was bid, knowing he must else suffer for it.

Chittombee says he very much opposed it, but being Threatened, at last Complied.

The rest say they did not read the petition, or know what was in it, that they were sent for by peons and required to sign it, and when They enquired what it was They were answered it was no matter to them what it was do you sign first, and you shall know afterwards that it was Anconah's and the Governour's orders that it should be signed, and that several of them who did not Immediately Comply, were Confined.

Chinna Narran one of the Chief Dubashes Acknowledges that Anconah gave him the petition and bid him get it Signed, Saying it was by the Governour's order that he carried it to Ball Chittee's house and sent for Several persons but They refused to sign it, that he told Anconah of this, who said, You fool, you must get it Signed, Curse at them.

These people in general observed that it was usual amongst them when They desired to petition, to meet and agree about it themselves; but this was quite different, it being drawn up by others and they sent for by Peons and obliged to Sign it.

The Paymaster acquainting that the Fort House not having been repaired a great while, now wants it very much, the window frames and several other parts being very defective, ORDERED that the Paymaster Give it what repair is necessary and that it be done with the utmost frugality.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Pursuant to an order of Consultation of the [7<sup>th</sup>.] Instant, we have examined the Letters books and papers received from the West Coast  $\Phi$  ships Cadogan and Marlborough, and lay before your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. such remarks as we have made thereupon.

We observe They dispatched the Cadogan hither the latter end of October for want of pepper to fill up a Ship of that burthen for Europe the reasons They give in their letter to the Company for sending her hither so early rather than keeping her to the end of November, which was chiefly that it would be very precarious whether she would then arrive time enough to be dispatched home that season, we think very just and proper to be continued for the future.

We take notice that See Jibb Undertaker of the Sugar and Arrack plantations was preparing to make his Escape, for which reason They had confined him in the Fort, and taken the management into the Company's hands, as it is now carried on, They reckon the monthly Charges 120 Dollars, and that when there is a greater quantity of Sugar Canes (Gibb having left very few on the ground) there may be made five leaguers of arrack and from twenty to thirty pecol of Sugar in a month, which computing the Sugar at 2½ dollars  $\Phi$  pecol and arrack, 20 without the Cask, will amount to upwards of Dollars 160.  $\Phi$  month by which there will be some gain to the Company, so that we beleive it for their Interest to carry it on in this manner, and that See Jibb ought upon no Account to be employed again but that his Effects which were Seized by the Deputy Governour & c<sup>t</sup>. Council for the Company's Security should be disposed of as soon and in the best manner They can in order to Lessen as far as possible his large debt, which is decreased since M<sup>r</sup>. Morse's Arrival there six hundred 600 dollars.

In compliance with the orders from hence by the Marlbro we find they have settled the price of pepper at Loo[y] . . . at \$ 8  $\text{P}$  bahar the rem<sup>s</sup>. two being to answer the charge & risque of the boats the Company are to send to take it in w<sup>ch</sup>. the natives were well satisfied with the like they propose to do at Polly w<sup>ch</sup>. we doubt not will be a means of having larger quantities brought from those parts.

We observe there was no more salt sent them last year than was sufficient to serve them four months for that reason no body woud offer to take the licence therefore it was put under the management of the Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. & Storekeeper to deliver it out in Exchange for rice as the people came for it, very little salt we find has of late years been brought from Java which we have reason to believe will come this year in greater quantities. M<sup>r</sup>. Morse having agreed with the Nocodahs to give them twenty five dollars  $\text{P}$  Coyan, which rate or thereabouts the Farmers of this Licence (when its lett out) we think should be obliged to give; otherwise we are persuaded none will be brought from thence which must occasion a Constant scarcity, and by that means the Company will not only lose the benefit of the Farm but the Native will be universally uneasy & apt to raise disturbances for keeping the salt at present. They have hird godown belonging to the old farmers for fifty dollars  $\text{P}$  year and propose to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. the buying them for the Company, which now they can do for one hundred ninety two dollars. Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Newcome and Savage report the Condition They are in, in Consult<sup>a</sup>. of 1<sup>th</sup>. Janry and reckon them worth three hundred dollars so that we beleive it of great use to this Settlement to buy them for the Company, since it can be done at present for so much under what They Cost, or what They can now be built for.

Of buildings on hand and erected since M<sup>r</sup>. Morse went thither the Barracks on the S. W. Curtain, and row of buildings on the N. E. are the principal. The former was begun by M<sup>r</sup>. Torriano and the foundations raised half the length even with the Ground and the other half two feet above it but is now wholly finished, it contains in length 100 feet besides the Gateway 18 in bredth and 11 in heighth and cost in all \$ 3088. --. 10. of which \$ 981. is for the Labour of the Slaves. The whole appears to have been done with all the care and frugality possible, on the N. E. Curtain the gateway, and row of buildings containing a Storehouse, Gunroom, Care of arms & Cookroom are raised to their full heighth, and the Timbers are got ready to put up, but could not be terrassed for want of a person skilfull in that business, but we may expect M<sup>r</sup>. Newcome has finished them before this time.

The present Betle & Tobacco farmers Quit their Cowle.

At the same time Mr. Weston the Assay Master, delivers a petition from the Mint Braminies &c<sup>t</sup>. representing the hard conditions upon which They are obliged to coin rupees, which They consented to, only because They were promised and flattered that there should be a prohibition of all uncoined Silver's being exported, by which means they would be so perpetually employed that their gains would be equal to or more than what it was before and requesting that half  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent more be allowed them as heretofore since we had thought fit to take off the prohibition, upon due consideration of the matter we agree to their request, being sensible that the prohibition of exporting silver inland was the motive that induced them to consent to coin at the present rate and lest too great a restraint upon them who are numerous and poor, should tempt them to debase the Coin which is well known to be the practice in foreign Mints where the Arcot rupee is coined cheaper.

SHEWETH

that your Petitioners have been for a long time past Inhabitants of this place and Servants to the Honble Company and have supported themselves and families by undertaking the coinage of such gold and silver as has been put into your Honour's & c<sup>t</sup>. Mint the usual rate of which coinage was six and a half 6½  $\text{₹}$  mille on gold and two  $\text{₹}$  Cent on silver.

that about the year 1725 the Arcot Rupee having then grown into demand to the prejudice of those of Madras it was judged by your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. that to reduce the charges of Coinage would (by bringing the Madras rupee nearer to a parr with the Arcot) be the most likely way to discourage the latter. It was therefore proposed to us by James Macrae Esq<sup>r</sup>. then President and Mintmaster that If the Minters would be Content to coin Silver at a half  $\frac{1}{2}$   $\text{₹}$  Cent less (which reduced it to one and a half 1½  $\text{₹}$  Cent) Your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. would prohibit all Silver from the Inland exportation unless in Madras Rupees, whereby it was urged that the Smaller profits arising to us from a greater Quantity of money, would be equivalent to a larger profit on a Less quantity.

that in consideration of the said prohibition, we did then agree and have since to this time, coined silver at the rate of one and a half 1½  $\text{₹}$  Cent, although we have thereby been great Sufferers, as we are ready to make appear when your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. shall require it.

that your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. have been pleased on the 25<sup>th</sup>. of August last, to Take off the said prohibition and Give a General and free liberty for the Exportation of all silver.

We therefore humbly declare to your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. that under these present circumstances we cannot undertake of the silver money at the same rate with the ruin of ourselves and families, and do most humbly request that we may be allowed the half  $\text{₹}$  Cent as formerly, viz<sup>t</sup>. Two 2  $\text{₹}$  Cent Coinage on silver whereby we can only be enabled to discharge those many debts we have contracted in the service of the Honorable Company.
