[From January 1 to December 30.]

—FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 1726-27—

The Consultation and Diary Book of James Macrae Esqr. President & Governour &ca. Councill. their Proceedings and Transactions in the affairs of the Honourable United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies—in the Presidency of the Coast of Choromandell. Began this First day of January 1726-[27].

- Ship Essex Captain Jonathan Sommers Commander Imported here from Bengal, last from Vizagapatam, and brought a General Letter from thence dated the 23<sup>th</sup>. ultimo, advising of Bales sent up on her. Mr. Symonds came up on this Ship. 1
- Brigantine Amity Robert Reay Master came back from Metchlepatam, having lost her passage to Bengal. 2
- Received by Peons a General Letter from Mr. John Blunt Re[sident] at Ingerum dated the 14<sup>th</sup>. ultimo. —
- Ship Mary Captain Thomas Holden Commander imported from Bengal last from Vizagapatam and brought a General Letter from thence dated the 29<sup>th</sup>. ultimo advising of Bales put on board her. 4
- Brigantine Good Hope John Hunt Master, came in, in com[pany] with her from the same port. —
- Brigantine Good Hope John Hunt Master sailed for Fort St. David for a freight of the Company's Bales. 9

George used to sell for more than the same sortments from Fort St<sup>t</sup>. David, and it being affirmed by Several Gentlemen now at the Board that the Long cloth Fort St<sup>t</sup>. George Sent home that year was better than our Muster particularly the N<sup>o</sup>. 2 and we having in Consultation of the 6<sup>th</sup>. July upon Comparing the Fort St<sup>t</sup>. David Long Cloth ordinary with our musters found it not so Good as the said musters, and therefore complained of it to Fort St<sup>t</sup>. David; and they having sent up their Musters for us to examine their cloth by and We after having Compared their Long cloth ordinary with their

Musters and found it full as good as said musters, and afterwards compared their Musters with ours and found theirs to be Considerably worse than ours.—In order therefore that we may be enabled to Write to the Honble Court of Directors an answer to the abovementiond two paragraphs of their Letter—Why the Fort St. David Long Cloth particularly the N<sup>o</sup>. 2 Sent home 1724 provd to be so much better than the same Sortment from hence that year, though that sent from hence was full as good as our Muster, and though the Fort St. David Muster is considerably inferior to ours,

although upon comparing Lately the musters at each Settlement the Fort St. David, [muster] was judgd to be considerably Inferior to that used.

Having Taken into Consideration,

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF THOMAS WILFORD

SHEWETH.

That your Petitioner (in answer to the accusation against him by the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Joseph Walsh Esq<sup>r</sup>. Deputy Governour &c<sup>a</sup>. Council of Fort Marlborough on the West Coast of Sumatra) begs leave to say as follows.

The method I used upon the first discovery of my escrtoire being broke open out of which I lost a Considerable value of my own as I can make appear and my answer to their examination I hope will sufficiently clear me.

As to the declaration of the Malay Merchants and the examination of M<sup>r</sup>. Venable and M<sup>r</sup>. Greenslate, no Conclusions can be drawn from them ; I never being called to answer ; then or afterwards though personally in the Garrison but had my papers Secured and myself arbitrarily made Prisoner.

As a clearer proof of my Innocence, be pleased to observe that the hooks of my Windows in my room in the fort were to be taken out with care and put in again without making any Noise which way I think they came in to it, broke open my Escrtoire and had recourse to the Keys of the Warehouse; besides I never lived in the fort but in a little house of my own at the Waterside being at that Time Custom Master and for the Companys Interest I thought it more proper to live there than in the fort; so that I had not been in the Warehousekeepers godown for some Time, not having had any call that way for several days.

I now beg leave to acquaint the Honble Board that M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Walsh Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. at that time lost Thirty corge of Peice goods out of his godown as also M<sup>r</sup>. Philip Heigham Wheake who Succeeded me in my employ of Warehousekeeper lost several bales out of the Companys Godown where no locks appeared to be Broke though they alledged it next to an impossibility to be done without a Discovery, the Gentlemen Laying underneath and the Main Guard in view to which I beg Leave to answer that M<sup>r</sup>. Walsh as I before observed lost his goods though a Centinell is continually at his door & also in view of the Main Guard and he lodging over it So as that I am not the only Person that has met with this misfortune I hope that such accidents in my Time are entitled to the same favourable Construction.

I am Chargd with a Deficiency of eight hundred sixty one dollars the ballance of my account accord<sup>d</sup>. to their calculation; tho they did not give me credit for notes on sundry persons payable on Demand w<sup>ch</sup>. Belong<sup>d</sup>. to deceased Gentlemen whose estates were paid into the Honble Company's Cash.

The book (they lay so much stress upon wherein they alledge great part of the bale of Handkerchiefs are found to be vended which I reported to be Stole out of the Warehouse) I beg leave to refer to, they Denying me a Copy when they granted me one of all the rest of my Papers, at the same time I hope the said book will prove they are only Memorandums of what the Malay Merchants used to enquire for when they Desired any particular sorts of goods to be kept for them.

As to my relying on the justice and Mercy of the board, that was the result of mere necessity, their arbitrary proceedings being such that I was detained Prisoner and threatened to be whipped at the Flag Staff if I would not condescend to sign a bond & Acc<sup>o</sup>. Current.

As to the Notorious breach of Trust I am charg'd with as being Custom Master, in not charging M<sup>r</sup>. John Bartlett chief mate of the George brigantine for Goods belonging to him—I hope it is the same in effect if they were chargd to Captain Tye's account, as will appear by my books.

The several trespasses I am charged with formerly being Guilty of, for which I was Suspended—I believe the present Governour, James Macrae when he was Supra-visor would scarce have restored me, had he thought me Guilty.

I therefore humbly request the Honble Board would be pleased to take into consideration how uneasy it must render your petitioner to be kept so long in Suspence and So unhappy is his present Circumstances, that he is beholden to some Charitable persons for the common Necessaries of life, and without Them he must Inevitably perish.

May it Therefore please the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Board to Take it into your Serious consideration that what the Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. and Council of Fort Marlborough have wrote is what they cannot prove, and are so extravagant in their assertions that I hope what I have said, will satisfie your Honour &c<sup>o</sup>. after which I doubt not of being still Intitled to Your favour by a just and Generous acquittance.

And as the Europe ships are near their departure for England I humbly beg that I may be permitted to take my Passage home; that I may Appear before the Honble Court of Directors to clear myself of so scandalous a charge laid unjustly against me.

N<sup>o</sup>. 1 landed out of Ship Mary, anno. 1720 and though your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. were pleased the 30<sup>th</sup>. of June last by a paper fixed at the several Gates of the Town, to offer a reward of Three hundred pagodas to be paid immediately to such person or persons as should bring Sufficient information or proof by whom or by what persons the said Chest of Coral was conveyed away and concealed; yet we have not had any information or been able to Discover what became of the foresaid chest of coral.

We have fully examined M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings's Conicoply Sumadru about this chest of Coral and he Denies that he ever Saw it or knows anything of it upon which (according to the Honble Court of Direct<sup>rs</sup>. orders) we had him Take his oath in the Pagoda before his Priest and Paupa Braminy Sworn Interpreter, the said oath we now Lay before your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. in English and Malabars Signed by Sumadru & witnessed by Paupa Braminy and Singariah Priest to the pagoda.

The Conicopies which belonged to the Sea Gate at the Time this chest of coral was landed are all Dead; and we cannot find any of M<sup>r</sup>. Bernal's servants to examine.

We Searched all M<sup>r</sup>. Bernals books & papers in the Townhall for the bill of Lading but could not find it, nor any Mention of this chest of Coral in M<sup>r</sup>. Bernals books.

In pursuance to your order of Council the 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant we have examind the charge exhibited against M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Wilford by the Deputy Governour and Council of the West coast, and find by their Consultations and General letter to this Board they charge M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford with embezlements in the Warehouse to the amount of Two Thousand Three hundred Seventy three Dollars Two Sucas and eighty five Cash. 2373. 2. 85 and M<sup>r</sup>. Wilfords effects being Seized and disposed of at outcry produced only nine hundred Seventy two dollars three sucas & twenty five Cash. 972. 3. 25.

The Account of remains in the Warehouse was ordered by the Deputy Governour & Council to be taken by Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Carnegie and Wheake in presence of M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford, and the order was made on M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford's acquainting the Deputy Governour the 28<sup>th</sup>. March 1724/25 that his Escritoire was broke open, that the keys of the Companys warehouse had been taken out of the Escritoire and Thrown underneath it, and that he feared thereby the Warehouse had been robbed, the Deputy Governour askd him several questions thereupon as ¶ Consultation of the 29<sup>th</sup>. March 1725 and Suggested there was forgery to cover or cloak some frauds and upon a full hearing of the matter in Consultation the 29<sup>th</sup>. March 1725 the 31<sup>st</sup>. of the same month and 8<sup>th</sup>. of April following. M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford was agreed to be Suspended the Service, charged with deficiencies in the Warehouse under his care to the amount as before said of Two thousand three hundred seventy three dollars two Sucas and eighty five Cash. 2373. 2. 85. and himself ordered to be confined till he had made restitution to the Company for that Debt.

On Monday the ninth instant M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford delivered a petition by way (as we Take it) of remonstrance and defence of himself to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. in which he sets forth.

That he never was called before the Board at the West Coast to answer either on the Declaration of the Malay Merchants or on the examination of M<sup>r</sup>. Venable or M<sup>r</sup>. Greenslate—therefore he says no Conclusions can be drawn from them.

The Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. and Council in their consultation the 31<sup>th</sup>. of March 1725 Declare M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford was present at that consultation and being asked several questions, answered as therein is recited, to which We beg leave to refer your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>.

In Mr. Wilford's petition given in to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. last Consultation day, he says that the Book the Deputy Governour and Council lay So much Stress upon (and thereby alledge great part of the Bale of handkerchiefs are found to be vended which he reported to be stole out of the Warehouse) he begs leave to refer you thereto, for that he was at the West Coast Denied a Copy thereof, though he was Granted Copies of all other his papers, this book (being sent over) we have carefully examined, & cannot find as he says, it was kept by him only as Memorandums of what the Malay Merchants used to enquire for when they desired any Particular Sorts of Goods to be kept for them; and we desire to refer the book as it is but very Small, to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. particularly the account of Malamputtee D<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>r</sup>. to whom he seems by the said book to have sold Goods, in the months of August September & October to amount of Seven hundred thirty seven Dollars & Two Sucas. 737. 2. — of which money the said account acknowledges the receipt of Six hundred sixty four Dollars and one Sucā. 664. 1. — The particulars of what sold by this account, we have examined with Mr. Wilford's Warehouse books and find the Company have only Credit given them in his accounts for Three corge of white Gurrahs at Twenty six dollars ꝯ corge, though he sold them by his book at thirty dollars ꝯ corge and five Corge and eleven peices of ordinary Salampores white at five and twenty dollars ꝯ corge, in relation to the other goods inserted in the said account, as We had Mr. Wilford before us on this examination. We Talked to him thereupon and particularly about the Handkerchiefs sold to amount of Three hundred Dollars, to this article he at last answered that they Belong'd to Mr. John Bartlett Chief Mate of the George Brigantine, but upon examining the said Thomas Wilford his Sea Custom books, we find that the said Bartlett had paid Custom for no such Goods, which books of his being shown him he then declared as in his Petition to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. last Consultation day, that the Customs on Bartlet's goods he had chargd to Captain Tye's account, as his custom books would make appear: whereupon we turned to his Custom Books but neither he nor we could find that either Captain Tye or Bartlett were chargd for the Custom of any handkerchiefs so that we must refer it to your Honour's &c<sup>a</sup>. judgment, whether these handkerchiefs sold by Mr. Wilford are not most reasonable to be thought the Company's instead of other persons, or stole out of the Warehouse as he represented to the Deputy Governour and Council, we must also beg leave to lay before your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the Three Consultations before mentiond in this report as also the General letter from the Deputy Governour and Council at the West Coast for your judging whether Mr. Wilford is Guilty or not of what laid to his charge of Deficiencies in the Warehouse by the Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. and Council instead of the Company's being actually robbed thereof, by the warehouse being broke open as Mr. Wilford sets forth in his Defence at the West Coast and his petition delivered your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the ninth Instant.

Mr. Wilford has Shewn us a paper from one [Lacuna] Spence, his Servant at the West coast about the robbery of the Warehouse a copy thereof we now Lay before your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. also a paper he has Delivered us of Debts due to him from Intestate persons whose estates he tells us have been paid into the Company's cash and he complains his account has had no credit for the said debts due to him thô for Goods he sold them out of the Company's Wareh<sup>o</sup>. The several notes he Says are in the hands of the Deputy Governour and Council at the West Coast.

The Board having Taken into Consideration the declining state of the Trade of this place which appears by the Customs to be greatly diminished & if expedients are not found for its Support must in consequence affect every other branch of the Honble Companys revenue & utterly ruin the inhabitants. It principally appears to be owing to the following causes.

## —FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 1726-27—

That whereas heretofore the Trade was entirely Carried on by the Shipping of this port it is now in part, in the possession of the French Armenians and Moors who traffick on other Bottoms and import their cargoes into other Settlements which they are enabled to do by the Money taken up here at Respondentia and without which they could not carry on so extensive a trade. It seems most probable that the preventing this evil will most conduce to the recovery of the customs & make all other ports on this Coast Dependent on us tho' the Duties are less elsewhere—and whereas several of our English Supra Cargoes take up large sums of our Inhabitants at Respondentia and afterwards proceed to Bengal where they Take up as much more of persons who are ignorant of their engagements here; So by thrusting into their private Adventures greater Quantities of Goods than the Markets where they are bound can possibly consume, They are forced to lie in those ports two Seasons to dispose of their own private effects to the great prejudice of those concerned in the Stock & puts a stop to the Quick Circulation, which will effectually be prevented by Letting the Gentlemen in the Bay know what engagements those Supra cargoes lie under here, & by Degrees reduce Trade to its proper bounds: which by this licentious practice has been quite over done.

In order therefore to Support the Honble Company's revenue and to prevent the injuries this place receives from there clandestine practices It is RESOLVED that in future all Respondentia Bonds, Notes or writings at Respondentia for money lent by the Inhabitants of this place, Company's Servants as well as others upon all ships trading from this or any other port in India, shall be duely and regularly registered in a book to be kept for that purpose.

That in case of any Supra cargo Merchant Commander Mariner or other shall have Borrowed money at Respondentia of any of the said Inhabitants proving Insolvent, all such bonds so registered shall be Accounted and Deemed a preferable claim to such as are not.

That the Sub Secretary do keep the s<sup>d</sup>. book of Register and that he shall receive nine fanams for registering each Respondentia bond or note under one hundred pagodas principal, and eighteen fanams for each such bond or note for one hundred pagodas or upwards, that after having registered the said bonds or Notes he shall sign them registered the day of the Month and year, and that the Secretary do put up at the Sea gate a publication of this resolution in writing in the usual languages for the Notice & observation of all the Inhabitants.

The Washers having made great complaints lately, especially since the price off Grain has been so Considerably raised, that they could not Subsist their Families by their Labour, while so large a Deduction as Fifteen  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent was continued out of their wages towards discharging their debt to the Company, and severals of them having left the place for that reason, and because they were not concerned in contracting the debt, by which means there are not hands sufficient remaining, to wash the Company's cloth as it is brought in, and the washing is not so well performed as it used, and ought to be. Goodapilla Rangapah having brought a Large Diamond from the Mines to be sold here, & being a Stranger and recommended to Gruapah a Goldsmith to Assist him in disposing of the said Diamond, he had Trusted him with the Sale of it, but the said Gruapah with intention to defraud Goodapilla of the real value of the diamond, persuaded him upon several Delusory pretexts to retire to Conjeveram in the meantime, that he might carry on the Fraud with the greater Security, & possessed the ignorant Stranger with Several Groundless Calumnies to the prejudice of the Presidents character & to the Trade of the place. Goodapillah being thus removed Gruapah applied himself to Gopaul a Diamond Merchant and they entered into an agreement to have the Diamond cutt without the Owners knowledge or Consent, & afterwards Sold it likewise without acquainting him, to Mr. Parkes for Four thousand one hundred and Fifty pagodas, of which Gopaul and Gruapah received each one half thousand though Gruapah had been to Conjeveram & affirmd to Goodapillah that the President had taken the Sto[ne] from him and had given him only one thousand [and] Five hundred pagodas for it, and told him that he must not come to Madrass, that if he did he would [be] in danger, but Goodapillah Suspecting the Fraud came at last to Madrass, and having information that his Diamond had been sold as above, made his Complaint thereupon to the President, and craved that Justice might be done him; whereupon the President had ordered the saids Gopaul and Gruapah to be committed to prison: of all which he now acquaints the Board, and they and Goodapillah being called before the Board and the whole affair very particularly enquired into, it appears evident that Gruapah had Imposed upon and Defrauded Goodapillah Rangapah, and aspersed the President very Grosly, as above narrated; Mr. Parkes being called declared he paid So much for the Diamond. Gopaul and Gruapah acknowledge that it was the same Diamond that Goodapillah had trusted Gruapah with to Sell for him, and that they had received each one half of the money; Gruapah affirms he had paid Goodapillah Seventeen hundred pagodas. Pag<sup>s</sup>. 1700.—.—, but the other persists to Affirm that he had received only Fifteen hundred pagodas, 1500.—.— for his Diamond. It being likewise evident that Gopaul was Concurring with Gruapah in this Cheat, and that he knew the diamond was Goodapillah's and had treated with Mr. Parkes about the Sale of it, the Board came to the following resolution.

all his Effects shall not prove Sufficent, that Gopaul shall make up the Sum that Shall be wanting, and that he shall recover of Gruapah the sum so made good, if ever he shall be found to have effects; that both be remanded to prison untill this judgment is complied, and that Gruapah be exemplarily punished for groundlesly aspersing the Presidents Character in so Gross a Manner.

Wheatley not agreeing to, the Pepper &c<sup>t</sup>. provided by him was not Sent us and Captain Hanson Carried several goods upon Freight both from Macao to Batavia, and back from Batavia to Macao & took the profit of them to himself, notwithstanding he had hired his whole Ship to the aforesaid M<sup>r</sup>. Wheatley and under Contract not to carry any Goods without his permission and knowledge, and though he evidently Broke his Contract demands the full Freight of his Ship when by the said Contract made at Canton he was obliged to receive on board his Ship at Batavia whatever goods M<sup>r</sup>. In pursuance to your order of Council of the 19<sup>th</sup>. of last December for our taking a General view of the houses, tenements and Gardens and Grounds within the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's Bounds not ffarmed or Comprehended under Cowles, in order to settle a more proportionable Assessment according to the Circumstances of the Inhabitants and value of their possessions, we now lay before your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. our Book of Assessment on the Division which Fell to our Lot which were all the Company's Bounds to the Southward of the White Town one side of the Choultry Street and all the Black town within the Walls to the Eastward of the Choultry Street.

Our foresaid book of Assessment will show your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. the Sums, the several houses and Gardens were Rated at in the last Rent Roll, and in the said book you will likewise observe what sums we have now put on the said houses and gardens both for Quit Rent and Scavenger's Duty.

In Going through the several streets of the Black Town we had the Cries of many poor widows and decayed People which obliged us out of Charity and Compassion to ease them what we could and that the amount of the Company's duty of Quit rent and Scavengers duty might be made more Certain and not decrease we were necessitated to put on the Rich the small Sums we took off the poor. Some were so poor that we were obliged to take all off, others We eased by taking off a few Fanams, these persons are described in one of the Columns of our Book of Assessment by the words very poor being wrote over against the Persons names and those which we eased by only taking off a part of the Duty are described by the word Poor being wrote over against their names.

We once thought that Calling in the Bills of Sale for the Black Inhabitants' houses would have helped us in making a more proportionable Assessment than formerly, but upon their being brought us we found most of them to be old Bills of a great many years' Standing amounting to small Sums of Money ; so that on viewing The Several houses, we found the Greatest part of them had been made new and large houses long since the date of the Bills of Sale wherefore we were forced to proportion our Assessm<sup>t</sup>. by the largeness and value of the houses and ability of the Possessors, as near as we could judge.

Our new Assessment within our Division amounts to Ten pagodas and Six Fanams 10. 6. — in the Quit Rent more than in the last Rent roll and in the Scavengers duty it comes to fifteen 15 Fanams [le]ss, We should have been willing to have made a greater encrease in the branches of the Company's Revenues, could we have judged the Inhabitants in Circumstances to bear it.

In and about Triplicane we found Sixty seven houses and Gardens which had no Quit rent laid upon them So that we assessed each of them as near as we could judge the value of them ; and it amounts to one hundred and sixty five pagodas thirty one fanams 165. 31. — these Gardens have most of them been made out of Sandy Spots of Ground, are a great Improvement to the place, but are as near as we can Learn, more an expence to the Owners than any real gain to their Estates.

We have gone through all the Streets in Triplicane Town but could find very few houses to Assess ; the Inhabitants thereof being mostly Braminies, maintained by the Merchts. and poor Painters, Gardiners and other Labouring People.

Upon a representation which M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Houghton late Rental General and Scavenger delivered in Consultation of the 19<sup>th</sup>. December last of the Causes of the deficiencies of that branch of the revenue, with some proposals for preventing the same in future, Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. after Considering the needfull, were pleased to order a General View to be made of all the houses, Tenements, Gardens and Grounds within the Company's Bounds not Farmed and Comprehended under Cowle, to proportion an Assessment according to the Circumstances of the Inhabitants and Value of the Gardens, that so the Poor might be relieved by taking off something from them and laying it on those who we might judge better able to bear it, the division which fell to our Lot was the Western part of the Black Town within the Walls from the Choultry Street also all the Muteall Pettah and what Gardens and Grounds stretching out so far as the Garden Commonly called Addisons Gardens n[ow] Sunca Ramah's on one side of the road to Pullicaatt & Narran's on the other, through all which we have been & Shall give you a description thereof as we found them and of the methods we have taken to Concur with your Intention.

In the Black Town we find Six hundred & thirty eight houses, the former Quit Rent and Scavenger's duty Laid therein, both amounted to Six hundred and thirteen pagodas and Seven fanams 613. 7 — which we have now raised to Six hundred thirty seven pagodas and nine fanams 637. 9. —, the Difference is twenty four pagodas and two Fanams 24. 2. —.

In the Muteal Pettah are Fourteen hundred and Five 1405 houses and among them we believe there are not Ten worth three hundred 300 pagodas each and the Inhabitants all miserably poor, some Carpenters, Peons & Coolys and Great numbers of Beggars and Braminies who live in Straw hutts on the sand upon Charity, others are poor Widows and Children who threw themselves at our feet as we passed along, we took off these Sort of people a few Fanams and shared it among those whom we thought by the Appearance of their houses and the information we could Get of their Circumstances (better able to Bear it), the former Quit rent and Scavenger's Duty together amounted to four hundred and ten pagodas and three fanams 410. 3. — the present amounts to four hundred and fifty Seven pagodas and twenty nine fanams 457. 29. — so that we have raised here, forty seven pagodas and twenty Six fanams 47. 26. — and We humbly offer our opinion 'tis as much as possible can be d[one] without distressing the Subject.

The amount of the other three gardens was Twenty eight pagodas and nine fanams 28. 9. — which we have now Raised to Fifty one pagodas and twenty seven fanams 51. 27. — So that the increase is twenty three pagodas and eighteen Fanams 23. 18. —.

One of Com Chittees Gardens produces nothing being at present but a heap of Sand, nevertheless we have laid on him but one pagoda ₹ Annum, also the Garden of Chinia Mootah.

We are of opinion what part of this revenue has been every year wrote off to Profit and loss which commonly amounted to Two or three hundred Pagodas happend thus that whereas the Rental General and Scavenger has always made up his roll in August for the year following, before which is expired great numbers of people generally Die in debt and leave nothing but a poor widow and Children who are Forced to Suffer their pots and pans to be sold to pay three or four or half a Dozen Fanams quitrent, and some there are that have nothing but the bare Matt they Lie on, that we cannot see how it can be avoided among Such multitudes of poor people and such a large sum of Money to be Collected in such small Driblets.

We herewith deliver an account of all the houses in the several Streets and places where we have been with the Owners names, their value according to their Writings or Bills of Sale Some few there are that have lost them, those we have left Blank, we have also ruled a Column for the former rate and another for the present, that at one view it may be seen where we have added or taken off and in the Spaces between the columns we have wrote very poor against their names that are so, or so decrepit and disabled that can't pay one Fanam.

The Care and method we have taken in this affair we hope will meet your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. approbation, having duly had at heart our Hoñble Master's future Interest whose we are, and

In Compliance to your Honour's &c<sup>t</sup>. order for Finishing the Survey of that part of the Black Town called the Pedda Naignes Pettah formerly under the direction of Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Houghton and Pyot deceased, I herewith present a new Roll of Rates for the same with proper Columns destinguishing the value of the houses and Grounds So far as I could learn by their Bills of Sale, the old and present assessment whereby will appear such Alterations as I thought necessary for the relief of the Poor and benefit to the Hoñble Company the whole amounting to thirteen hundred and twenty nine pagodas and nineteen fanams 1329. 19. — and the advance Gained thereby eighty five pagodas and twenty six fan<sup>s</sup>. 85. 26. — which I believe is the most the Inhabitants can bear and is Submitted to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. for your Approbation.

As the Annual and Strenuous recommendaçon from the Hoñble Court of Directors to this Presidency for preventing of the bad debts yearly outstanding on the Scavenger's Account, have been the Chief Motives for your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. appointing this Survey, I have Carefully examind how those debts have arose and found the

whole remains of the last year's to be one hundred seventy four pagodas Seventeen fanams and Forty Cash 174. 17. 40. of which above Sixty 60 pagodas arises from Persons leaving their houses uninhabited, the humour of the People being such that in Cases of Mortality or Misfortunes they had rather go up the Country and Suffer their houses to decay many Years for want of Repairs than sell them out of the Family, the Scavenger can have no defence against Such and though the said debts are wrote off for that year, yet the Annual rates of these houses are Continu'd in the Succeeding Rent Roll, though it's uncertain when the Owners will return, the same I may say of the many Places in the Black Town and Pettah that have Continued empty without houses or Improvement thereon for many years (as may be observed in the Roll now presented), all which were Charged according to the old rates amounting to upwards of thirty five, 35 pagodas, though the Scavenger had little probability of receiving any part of it, the reason that has been Given for this Custom is that by Continuing them on the Rent roll, they may the better remember the old Tax that was laid on such Grounds and to endeavour a recovery of the same when the Owner shall return though I never yet knew or heard of such debts so recovered and it is to be feared the Multiplicity of such vacant places may in time lay waste great part of the Black Town, the Owners of many of them are unknown and out of memory and others nominally known yet no one knows where to find them or how to apply for the purchasing their Grounds and Consequently must lie useless, whereas were these Grounds publickly sold for the payment of the Company's Quitrent and the Over plus deposited in the Company's Cash for the Benefit of such as shall hereafter make good their Claims, Such places would be rebuilt or Improved and the whole Town in a Constant Employ.

The rest of the Bad debts arise from the Poverty of the Inhabitants of whom Thousands that pay the Company half a Fanam and upwards  $\text{₹}$  month have no better means of Supporting themselves and Families than by Beating Rice Cooly hire and such low Business by which the most Industrious cannot gain above eighteen to Twenty Fanams  $\text{₹}$  Month and many Widows and Orphans that are daily fed with Rice from their Friends and Relations.

The unfortunate death of Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Houghton & Pyot late Scavengers, having prevented their good Intentions in representing many Inconveniencies arising from the Evil Customs now practised in the Black Town and the better management of that Business for the future, I therefore beg leave to mention what of them I can remember to have heard proposed, had they survived the report now made to this Honble Board.

It has been a frequent Complaint to the Scavenger that notwithstanding the great assessment with which the Inhabitants are yearly charg'd, the Streets are yet in a most abominable and filthy Condition which I presume will be found to arise from the Insufferable Custom of the Inhabitants going to Stool in the streets, their perpetually throwing out of Ashes and house Dirt, their keeping hogs, Buffaloes and horses in the Streets, all which make a Constant dung and Litter, which the small number of Carts allowed by the Company cannot Clear away, wherefore I humbly propose that an Order be Attained that no person whatever be Suffered to Dung in the Streets, keep any hogs, Buffaloes or horses, but in their Compounds and for the better and more easy carrying away the Dirt and Ashes which is the produce of every house, I should think it but a Small trouble for the Several Inhabitants to Carry their dirt to Some one or more places that shall be appointed for a General Dunghill in every Street, which the Scaveng<sup>r</sup>. can take care to have removed every Morning.

It is a most Greivous Custom for every house to have a Sink hole to receive the housewater which are dug in the open Street and lie uncovered in the passages or perhaps two or three Long Stones cast over them but yet not Sufficient to prevent the Passengers and especially Children from Falling into them, besides, the Intolerable Stench that proceeds from them is so very strong that it is Justly Complained of, as one of the greatest nuisances in the Black Town and yet is easily remedied by obliging such persons to Cover them and that in such a manner as to be on a Level with the Foot Path.

The Wells have not been publickly repaired since Governour Collets Time and are now become dangerous to young Persons that Draw Water, and by Scattering the Water make a Muddy Kennell in the Street encouraging the Hogs to wallow and Vermin to breed in them all which were formerly remedied by repairing the Wells and to which I find the Neighbours are Willing to Contribute according to their Abilities.

The frequent encroachments in the Streets Grow So General that without Care be timely Taken, the Passages will become too narrow for Passengers, and pernicious to the health of the Town in so warm a Climate, almost everyhouse lately Built has encroached further into the Street by enlarging the house or by raising Pyalls of Two foot and a half high and others Parades before the doors of Stone or Brick Ten to twenty Inches higher than the Common path and Six to nine foot into the Street which Serve only for the Maker's use and throw off the passengers, whereas were the Same Stone or Brickwork on a Levell with the path (as in the White Town) they would be as a General Pavement. There are Innumerable Smiths Cajan's, Shops and Sheds, Buttecas and small Brick houses built against the Front of other large houses which come Six to eight foot into the Street and from eight to Sixteen foot Long, which pay no quitrent to the Company, likewise several parcels of large Stones Timbers, planks and Palmeiras all which are so many encroachments, croud up the Streets and turn aside the Passengers.

Many Persons expose to sale Cloth, Brass ware and other Goods by Spreading of Matting &c<sup>t</sup>. in the middle of the Street which pester the passage and can be of no Account but saving Butteca rent, while the Honble Company's Butteca's remain neglected to the loss of the Butteca Farmer and the lessening of that revenue to the Honble Cempany.

These are what have fallen under my observation and though they may seem in themselves trifling yet as I do not doubt but they will Contribute very much to the Wholesomeness, Beauty and good Order of the City I hope your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. will excuse the presentation from

Being Commanded to deliver in writing an answer to some charges and demands laid against me from England and lately transmitted hither, I shall here Give as true a state of those affairs as the distance of time and remoteness from my Books and papers will allow, being the same in substance with what I Informed the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the President and Council by word of mouth upon examination, I therefore declare to the best of my knowledge as follows.

Captain John Haye having presented a petition to the Honble the Court of Directors for the Affairs of the East India Company against me, Wherein he has stated the affair between him and me in the Falsest manner and has represented me in a very unjust and odious Character, I am obligd in my own Vindication to be somewhat more particular in relation to him than I ever intended. In the General I might safely Appeal for a Character before my Misfortunes to all the Gentlemen who knew me in the Army in Spain the latter end of the late Queens reign and to all those of the Garrisons in Minorca after that Time to the highest of whom I had the honour to be well known and served in many different Stations both in Catalonia and Port Mahone without Blemish or reproach, and my Character is sufficiently known in London not to have ever given any room for such Base and malicious reflections as have been thrown upon me by that Gentleman, and had I been Guilty during the general Infatuation in South Sea time and in time of my Greatest necessities of Contributing to the hurt of others knowingly or Wilfully, I should be the first to Condemn myself and could not find fault with such as would join in the Same Accusation against me, but I can't help thinking it the Severest of all Calamities to have my reputation in danger of being destroyed by drawing me into very bad Colours and that my Misfortunes a Fate almost universal and Common to Thousands besides me at that Time should be Charged upon me as a Crime, the far greater part of persons engagd in dealings at that unlucky Juncture were involved in the same ruin and Consequently proved the unhappy Occasion of making many others share in their Sufferings which was also my most unfortunate case.

A Great many years are past since Captain Haye and I were first Acquainted having served together in the same Regiment for some time at Port Mahone where it was well known what offices of Freindship I did him but more particularly by Venturing my whole Fortune by my Credit with Mr. Neale then Pay Master General, to raise him from an Ensign to Captain at a time when not one person wou'd give him the least assistance either by their money or Credit (many years after that I having sold out of the Army and Settled in London Captain Haye arrived there in the South Sea year 1720 and hearing that I was in very flourishing Circumstances, he came to me to ask advice how to employ a small sum of money not exceeding as I can remember Six hundred pounds, my Opinion was to put it into South Sea Stock then upon the rise but he chose rather to put it into my hands begging me to allow him good Interest for it, to serve him I Complied with his request paying him for some months ten  $\text{p}$  Cent  $\text{p}$  Mensem he having gained considerably by these means, I thought it unreasonable for him to expect that I should always keep it at so high a præmium and so very much above what any Body else would allow and therefore made him take his money back again, upon which he Bought a Bargain in York Buildings Stock for Time, but it happening to fall Considerably before the Term of payment came he Complained to me that he and his Family were ruined if I did not help him, and did by his importunity prevail upon me to deliver him from that Bargain and to take it upon myself which was an actual Loss to me of 400<sup>lb</sup>. that being the Difference between the price of the Stock at the time he purchased it and the time I paid for it after this, he teased me till I took his money a Second time being about 800<sup>lb</sup>. but at lower Usury being at the rate of three or four  $\text{p}$  Cent  $\text{p}$  Mensem if I remember right, sometime afterward he having raised some money by taking in Subscriptions from Sundry Persons to a Bubble called the North Sea w<sup>ch</sup>. he did by Giving notes promising so much North Sea Stock for money received at the same time sinking Six pence on every half Crown for his notes run only two Shillings for a half Crown paid him, with money raised in this manner he Bought 330<sup>lb</sup>. South Sea Stock. This happening soon to fall in a very precipitant manner he came to me about the beginning of September complaining in his wonted stile that he and his Family would be ruined if I did not help him in this Distress by taking that Stock off his hands. I refused it on account of being too deeply Concerned in Stocks already, he then proposed that I should buy it of him at Time allowing him an advance to which he pressed me with great earnestness and prevailed upon me to give a bond for said 330<sup>lb</sup>. Stock to pay him 2600<sup>lb</sup>. in three months a very extravagant advance, Stocks falling Soon after to a very low rate involved me in utter Ruin and put it absoutely

out of my power to comply with that or other Bargains I had then depending, as to the sum of 800<sup>lb</sup>. which I had taken at the abovementioned usury, I did all that was in my power even after I was ruined, to Clear it which my Wife and I did to near 400<sup>lb</sup>. as  $\text{£}$  his receipt appears. She out of Compassion to his Family sold some of her jewels to raise him money and sometime after when I had no way to find more I Gave him Pictures and other Things to the value of the remainder of my note but he not waiting for a proper time to dispose of them sold for Five and twenty pound as he acquainted me, what cost me above four hundred pounds some years before: by all which it Appears that of all my Creditors Captain Hays has the least reason to persecute me though the only one that has done it since my Misfortunes, I having often reduc'd myself to the last necessities to Supply him, his troubles which he maliciously imputes to me are chiefly owing to his Fraudulent management in the North Sea Bubble as aboverelated.

As to his Charge of my Carrying large sums of money with me to India nothing can be more ridiculous or Inconsistent: can it be Supposed that any man in his Senses would part with his Family, Country & Freinds and at my Age to live in India under dependance on Strangers and enjoy so large a Fortune as thirty thousand 30000 pounds, as he used to give out in all places when I was at home, had I been possessed of so much money could I not have retired to many parts in Europe where I might have lived more at my ease & Satisfaction in case my Creditors would not have Suffered me to do so in England, but what shews the Falsehood as well as Malice of that charge to a demonstration is this, had I been possessed of any Sums of money the law woud certainly have given him as well as others a right to them and Sure I am he left no methods untried to find out and Seize all he could of mine while he was in England, but it is very easy for any person Concerned, to know if they please what money I brought aboard with me, all I had was delivered into Captain Charles Small's hands with whom I came out hither which was a very small sum and was Lessened before I got to this place by my expences at Deal and Portsmouth and aboard Ship and my living out of Business for above a twelve month after my Arrival here, exhausted the little money I brought out with me, when by the favour of the Honible Governour I went to China last year I Carried but a Small Sum with me which I took up at Sixteen  $\text{£}$  Cent Respondentia and which produced not much more than defrayed the expence of my table and other Charges to and from China, So that at present I have not more than will enable me to pay my Passage back to England and answer my expences here till I can meet with a favourable opportunity to return.

As to Mr. Wordsworth's and Mr. Heathcotes demands I am very Sensible that they would not have given me any trouble had not Captain Hays raised such false and malicious reports of my Flying to India with large sums of money they having never Given me any Disturbance the Four years I was in England from the time of my misfortunes for which I reckon my Self extreamly obliged to them. I believe they were then Convirced of the badness of my Circumstances as well as of my Inclination to do all that was in my power having given them for a further Security all the Stock I had left, there were many Sums of money due to me upon account of Bargains in Stocks and otherwise but I was not able to recover above two hundred 200 pound of all that was oweing me and my Circumstances did not permit me to carry on Law Suits to endeavour to recover any more. I Gave those Gentlemen such Securities for their money as they judged very good at that Time and which then sold above the value of the Sum borrowed and by the Contracts and Defeazances passed between us they had full power and Authority without my Consent, to sell said Securities and pay themselves at what time they pleased, but it was a great misfortune to them and me that they did not sell those securities as they were empowered to do. I came to India with no other View than to try my last and utmost endeavour to get money in order to give some satisfaction to those Gentlemen and others being unwilling to have any reason to reproach myself with having neglected any means or the least probability of any that might put it in my power to do justice to those that Suffer by my Misfortunes, to this view I sacrificed all the ease and happiness I was

possessed of and Submitted to a Voluntary Banishment and to the Greatest distance from my Family, Freinds & Country. It is unfortunate for my Creditors as well as me that my design has miscarried, there remaining nothing now to do in these parts, So that I propose to return in Some months and shall very willingly give all my Creditors a fair state of my Circumstances, as soon as it pleases God to bring me safe back to England.

All the aboverelated particulars, I Declare to be true to the best of my memory and knowledge.

On the 21<sup>th</sup>. May 1727 our Boatswain William Bromfield by name complained that he had lost out of his Cabbin about two quarts of Brandy [for] which Search being made in the ship a part thereof was found in the Chest of one of the Souldiers by name Henry Pendre, which with several other Circumstances concurring made it evident that he was Guilty of the Theft ; being a Souldier, I thought a Military punishment the properest for him and accordingly ordered that he should run a Gantlope and receive a Blow from every Souldier and Sailor in the ship, but when he came to the Gangway, as he was running he leaped overboard, at a time when we went eight knots and consequently it was Impossible for us to save him, this is the exact acc<sup>t</sup>. of the case as by the accompanying Certificate will appear ; and from the same it will be further manifest that the said William Pendre was in the opinion of all my Officers, Guilty of the Fact charged on him and deserved the punishment ordered, as also that it proceeded solely from his abominable Stubborness that he flung himself into the sea and not from the Severity of the punishment, all w<sup>ch</sup>. is humbly represented to your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. by

Having in pursuance to your order of Council of the 21<sup>th</sup>. June last examined the West coast Consultations and Accounts lately come from thence by the Supra-Visor, We now lay before your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. such remarks which we have made thereon.

The monthly expence of the Coast we have compared with that settled by the Honble President when he was SupraVisor, and Find the West Coast expence as follows.

The reason for the encrease in the expence of Charges Garrison we observe to arise from their having more Men, viz<sup>t</sup>. Six Europe Centinels, three Topasses and six Bugguesses, these last were lately taken into pay by the SupraVisor and Council to watch about the hospital at Bencoolen in the night and to keep Rogues from burning the Buzar, and the Souldiers from going out of the hospital into the Buzar, to drink strong Liquors, another reason for the encrease of Charges Garrison is occasioned by eleven Lascars being sent over with the SupraVisor and are placed in the Gunroom, which makes an encrease of about Forty dollars  $\text{\textcircled{P}}$  month, but then there will be a Considerable decrease by Seven Topasses, four Arabs and three Lascars being permitted to come away, in case the Deputy Governour and Council do not Entertain Bugguesses in their room. The standing Forces at Fort Marlborough are as follows.

- 1 one Captain.
- 1 one Lieutenant.
- 1 one Ensign.
- 4 Four Serjeants.
- 4 Four Corporals.
- 2 Two drummers.
- 45 Forty five Europe Centinels.
- 25 Twenty five Topasses.
- 8 Eight Arabians.
- 39 Thirty nine Bugguesses.
- 16 Sixteen persons of the Gunroom Crew.

144 persons in all, which makes nine persons more than last year.

The Forces at Mocomoco Factory are as follows.

- 2 Two Serjeants
- 2 Corporals
- 13 Europe Centinels, but how many in the Gunroom we cannot tell, for want of the Mocomoco Paymaster's Acco<sup>ts</sup>. which are not sent over.

We humbly conceive it may not be improper to Fix the Forces at Fort Marlborough and Mocomoco to a certain number of persons not to be encreased but on an emergent necessity and when so encreased that the Deputy Governour and Council do enter their Reasons at large in their Consultations, and discharge the new raised Forces as scon as the necessity for raising them is over.

We observe M<sup>r</sup>. Torriano and the Council have reduced the two Companys of Military into one by which there is one Serjeant, one Corporal and two drummers less, and on the Suspension of Lieutenant Jedderee and making Maskalyne a Lieutenant, there's one Lieutenant and one Ensign less in the Forces at Fort Marlborough.

In Consultation the 28<sup>th</sup>. of October last we Find M<sup>r</sup>. Torriano SupraVisor, complains of Lieutenant Jedderee for disobeying his orders in that upon reducing the two Companys into one; he woud not according to the SupraVisor's orders relieve with Ensign Maskalyne as is Set forth at large in the said Consultation, the SupraVisor charges Lieutenant Jedderee with allowing too many Free Guard Men contrary to his orders, that the said Lieutenant Jedderee allowed several of the

Souldiers to have Free Guards who had no means of getting their Livelyhood so that they committed disturbances; to prevent which the SupraVisor ordered Ensign Maskalyne on his Guard day, to go & acquaint Lieutenant Jedderee that he would have no person changed or taken off the Guard without his Consent first asked to which Lieutenant Jedderee shewed so little respect as to change several the same month and even out of the Deputy Governour's own Guards, that thereupon he had again Sent Ensign Maskalyne to Lieutenant Jedderee to repeat the same order, on which Lieutenant Jedderee came to the Dep<sup>y</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. and told him he would receive no orders from an Inferior Officer, that his Commission told him he was not to do it, that he was Chief Officer upon the Coast and would be so while he bore a Commission and woud receive no orders from any Man but the Dep<sup>y</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>s. own month : upon which the Deputy Governour bid Lieutenant Jedderee bring his Commission and accordingly he went home but instead of bringing his Commission he sent a letter to the Deputy Governour in the following words as appears by a Copy thereof entered after the aforesaid Consultation."

To GEORGE TORRIANO Esq<sup>r</sup>.

I Told you just now I would not obey any Commands from an Ensign or any "Inferior Officer, on which you bad me send my Commission to you. I have "thought on it and if you please to appoint anybody to take a copy of it or send me "a Written order you are Welcome, being "

this matter being debated in Council, it was Agreed to take away Lieutenant Jedderee's Commission and that another should be drawn out for Ensign Maskalyne.

In pursuance to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. orders we have sent for Lieutenant Jedderee and acquainted him with what the Deputy Governour and Council of the West Coast charge him with, to which he replied he had nothing to say in answer but that he could not think he had broke any orders because if he understood the Words of his Commission right he was, as Chief Officer upon the Coast, only to receive orders from the Deputy Governour or the Deputy Governour & Council and not from his Inferior Officers, which the Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. and Council thinking otherwise, was their most material reason for dismissing Lieutenant Jedderee the Hoñble Companys Service.

CHARGES GENERAL in which is included HOSPITAL CHARGES amounts to double what they were Fixed at when the Hoñble President was SupraVisor.

CHARGES SLAVES comes to about Fifteen dollars ₧ month more than formerly, but we observe in the month of February last the charges reduced from 315 dollars ₧ month to 274. 3. 33.

SILLEBAR PAGGAR that expence is reduced from 150 dallars ₧ Annum, to about 90.

MOCOMOCO FACTORY. It's expence is about nineteen dollars ₧ month less than last year but exceeds the Charge settled by the Hoñble President when he was on the Coast about sixty one dollars ₧ Annum.

## AS TO SHIPPING

We find the Grantham arrived at Marlborough the 18<sup>th</sup>. July and was dispatched for Europe the 29<sup>th</sup>. September wanting a small matter of her Tonnage to the amount of about seven or eight days demorage which might have been taken in to the Northward but then the lost time would amount to more than the dead Freight.

The Carnarvon arrived from England the 19<sup>th</sup>. August and was dispatched to Batavia the [*lacuna*] to take in M<sup>r</sup>. Tempest and proceed to Benjar to take in a loading of pepper, the SupraVisor and Councils reasons for sending her to Benjar instead of putting what pepper they had on the Coast aboard of her and dispatch her to this place according to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. orders, are as follows.

“that if they kept her for the February Crop they could not expect by the  
“nearest Calculation above one hundred tons but by going to Benjar since the  
“Honble Company have sent no ship there this season she might very probably get  
“between one and two hundred Tons of pepper and return to the West Coast some-  
“time in January to fill up for Europe, that by sending the Carnarvon to Benjar  
“for pepper, if she should succeed in getting a loading there would be the more  
“pepper on the West Coast ready for the Dispatch of the next year's ship and save  
“the Honble Company a considerable sum in demorage, that if they had kept the  
“Carnarvon to send to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George in May, it would have been encreasing the  
“quantity of Tonnage on the coast whereas the quantity before, had laid the Honble  
“President and Council under extreme difficulties.”

The George Brigantine we find made two Trips to Mocomoco with Stores and Supplys, between the 4<sup>th</sup>. of March and 27<sup>th</sup>. of April and returned each time with a full Lading of Pepper; after which she was sent to Sillebar to refit, and dispatched to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George the 27<sup>th</sup>. June.

Ship Marlborough arrived at the West Coast the 4<sup>th</sup>. of December and proving Leaky was sent to Sillebar to refit the 8<sup>th</sup>. of the same month, she returned from thence the 13<sup>th</sup>. January and was dispatched to Mocomoco for a lading of Pepper the 25<sup>th</sup>. from which place she arrived at Marlborough the [*lacuna*] and on the [*lacuna*] was dispatched to this place with the SupraVisor and the late Deputy Governour M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Walsh, and having thus given your Hon<sup>r</sup>. an account of the arrival and disposal of all the Honble Companys ships and vessels on the West Coast, we Submit it to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. Consideration whether they have been employed according to your Expectations and orders.

In Consultation the 11<sup>o</sup>. August we find a particular entry made, of the condition of the Buildings at Fort Marlborough, by which it appears most of them want considerable repairs and the Company's Servants are so streightened for Lodging Rooms that they are Forced to lie in the Offices. They recommend in their General Letter to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. a neat Timber house with upper rooms in length twenty feet and in breadth twenty feet belonging to M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Walsh which they now rent of him at Six dollars  $\text{₹}$  mensem and cost him dollars [*lacuna*] which is said to be cheap and if your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. permits it to be bought on the Company's Account, M<sup>r</sup>. Walsh is content not to receive the rent that may be due thereon.

In Consultation the 20<sup>th</sup>. of August the Surgeon reports that several of the Medicines said to be sent in the Chest from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George were wanting and those which did come he declares were so old that they were not to be depended upon, which obliged them to buy of Doctor Douglas the medicines he brought over with him, to the amount of Dollars 109. 2. -.

We find in Consultation the 14<sup>th</sup>. September, M<sup>r</sup>. David Welsh delivers a paper relating to the Stores which he says were Stole out of the Storehouse which being so near the Arab Guard M<sup>r</sup>. Welsh says could not have been done without the Arabs being Accomplices in the Fact. We Incline to Believe the same to be true and that several of the small stores might have been stole out of the Godown, because we find by the Consultations that the Storehouse was very much out of repair but we cannot

think the Coil of a 3½ inch of Could be taken out without the assistance or Consent of Mr. David Welsh's Servant who he acknowledges to have trusted in delivering the Stores out of the godown from time to time and as it is not improbable but Mr. Welsh's Servant might be a Party in the Robbery we Submit it to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. Consideration whether it will not be convenient to write off half the loss to the Company's Account & that Mr. Walsh do pay the other half, to teach him and all others to be more carefull of the Company's Effects in future.

We observe by Mr. Torriano's report of his SupraVisorship on the West coast, that on his arrival there he found by their account, only 224 tons of pepper which being as much as the Grantham wanted was ordered on board her, but on the delivery thereof a Deficiency happened at Marlborough of 156. 2 or Five  $\text{q}^{\text{rs}}$  Cent and at Sillebar of 67 or almost 12½  $\text{q}^{\text{rs}}$  Cent, for want of which he was obliged to send the Grantham home, dead Freight, the deficiency being enquired into, Messieurs Savage & Greenslate Gave an Account thereof in writing, in Consultacons the 14<sup>th</sup>. and 24<sup>th</sup>. September, which we beg leave to refer your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. to.

The SupraVisor in his report declares that he went himself to the godowns and found them in a miserable condition not fitt to keep out the weather, that he did see pepper sticking to the walls of the Godown in some places two inches thick, in others one, all which looked as fair as could be to the eye but immediately upon touching it it crumbled to powder, the Sillebar house has no Eves to the sides or over the windows, the Crevices of the house are all open and the rain is continually beating in, the SupraVisor further says that he went to Marlborough with a notion that nothing but carelessness could occasion a Deficiency in the pepper but found it otherwise for that he saw one parcel sifted before it was received from the Malays, and then taken with the same allowance for one bag as was generally given for Three <sup>lb.</sup> notwithstanding which there was 30 wanting by the garbling of it afterwards, thus much he says in defence of the Gentlemen concerned because in his Conscience he believes the Loss has proceeded from no ill management of theirs, for that Pepper brought from the Malabar coast to Madrass or carried from Madrass to China, generally loses Five  $\text{q}^{\text{rs}}$  Cent, and we are of Opinion it cannot come so less in the damp godowns at the West Coast when it has lain there eight to twelve months, however the SupraVisor obliged Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Greenslate and Savage to give bonds into Consultation the 21<sup>th</sup>. of December to be answerable for the amount of the deficiency in the pepper if your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. think fitt to order it and we accordingly Submit this matter to your Consideration.

We find that the SupraVisor upon this examination has made an agreement with the Pangarans that for the future all the pepper should be sifted and Garbled before it be received, and then should be Taken at the usual allowance of Two  $\text{q}^{\text{rs}}$  Cent which is full little enough considering that the pepper may lie at least some of it a year round and must be Garbled again before delivered the ship, which will always occasion some Loss.

In the SupraVisor's report to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. he says that thô the pepper which came from Mocomoco had been garbled before it came from thence and a large allowance made by the Malays, yet it wanted on trial at Marlborough near nine  $\text{q}^{\text{rs}}$  Cent, about this Affair he wrote to the Resident at Mocomoco, but could not get his answer till just as he was coming away, so that he has been forced to leave that affair to the Examination of the Deputy Governour and Council.

On perusing Mr. Carnegie's answer to our last year's report of the expence at Fort Marlborough, we find he says the repairs of the Buildings at Marlborough will continue an unavoidable expence so long as the wooden buildings remain and there is no determining that expence to any Particular sum on those sort of Buildings because a hard Gale of wind may occasion a hundred dollars charge or more by uncovering the houses.

We have agreeable to your orders examined into the affair of one Thousand Candys of Pepper Contracted for the Company with Suncaramah by the Governour and Council May the 19<sup>th</sup>. 1722 which has been since Disapproved of, and in many of their Letters Retribution demanded of the difference between eighteen pagodas and twenty two amounting to Four thousand pagodas; for which the year before last those of the Council that were upon the Spot gave Bond to pay if upon another reference to the Company it was thought reasonable, by our last General Letter the Company determine it in their own Favour and order payment but do not say in

what proportion it is to be Collected ; which you are pleased to order us to give our opinions in, after enquiring who were the Managers and whether a profit was made by Negotiating this business and by whom.

We find when Mr. Hastings was Governour it was thought for the Companys Interest that some pepper should be bought, and the Warehousekeeper ordered to provide it but it not being possible to get it at two and twenty pagodas  $\text{₹}$  candy which was the dearest price had ever been Given for it by the Company, it was then dropped ; when Mr. Elwick came to the Chair an opportunity offerd to get it at that rate it being a conveniency to Suncaramah who must have otherwise lost more by remitting money he had to the Southward than he should by giving the pepper at the rate of Twenty two pagodas  $\text{₹}$  candy, without which consideration he could not undertake to have done it, and not been a Loser, so that we cannot find that any of the Board were concerned and it is very demonstrable it was not worth their while. What has given some suspicion that this pepper belonged to some of the Gentlemen is, That Mr. Torriano says Mr. Benyon paid to Mr. Elwick four hundred and odd pagodas on acc<sup>o</sup>t. of pepper but is not certain y<sup>t</sup>. it was a profit upon what was sold to the Company, and we find by Mr. Benyon's Conicoply that there was Pepper b<sup>o</sup>t that year for China & Bengal which Evidence being doubtfull and Suncaramah's positive inclines us to believe that no profit was made by any of the gentlemen of the Board but a general mistake, without any biass in the principals more than the gentlemen of a lower Station.
