The Cause of the encrease of the Expences at this place are there mention'd and thereon. the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort S' David gave the reasons for theirs, the other two cou'd not be explain'd in the Account because of the late arrival of the Books, As to the encrease of the Revenues it is Chiefly owing to the advanced price of Grain, and the greater importation of it by sea.

The Accomptant reports the Fort St. David Expences for November to be decreased almost One hundred l'age, in the article of the New Garden House, and those of Vizagapatam seventy odd Rupees, the former month being encreased by payment of Arrears for Wages.

O'ader'd that Mr. Rous in the stead of Mr. Burton who is now ill go on Board the Europe Ships with the Gunners to survey their men, and take an exact Accot. of their Warlike Stores, and report the same to the Board.

Petition from Mess. Douglas, Barlow, Hart, Tullie, Johnson, Colebrooke, Lethieulier, Simpson, Crawford, Percival, Golightly and Empson read setting forth that the Mayor's Court had Elected them to serve as Aldermen and on their requesting to be excused that service had imposed a fine of One Hundred pagodas on such of them from which they pray to be reliev'd.

their Petitions are Granted.

of the matter The follow-

ing by Law

is proposed.

This matter being taken into Consideration it was Agreed that since the making by Laws, and Ordinances for the good Government of the several settlements and the imposing pains and Penaltys for the breach thereof was by the Charter expressly reserved to the Presidents and Councils, The Mayors Court cou'd have no authority to impose a penalty on any man refusing to act in that station, till a By-Law for that purpose shou'd be made nor cou'd such by-Law take place till it had agreeable to the Charter been transmitted to England and Confirm'd by the Court of Directors, and consequently the penaltys imposed on the Petitioners abovenamed are irregular, and not warranted by the Charter, it was therefore Agreed to excuse the Payment thereof.

But howsoever as on Perusing these Petitions it Appearing that some of the Petitioners had not shew'd reasonable Cause for declining that service, and that if No penalty was to be incurr'd by such refusal every one might do the same, and consequently the Execution of Justice might be retarded, It was agreed to make a by Law with the relation to this Affair to be sent to the honourable Court of Directors by these Ships for their Approval, which by Law is as follows.

The By Law.

If any Person shall be duly chosen by the Mayor and Aldermen to serve as an Alderman for the Town of Fort St. George, and such Person shall refuse to serve and be sworn into such office he shall be fined unless some reasonable Cause of refusal be proved to the President and Council who are to judge of the same, such fine not exceeding fifty nor less than ten Pagodas, as the President and Council shall think reasonable to inflict.

The Cloth reed. from Vizagm. P the Royal George being norted, Agreed to allow the last Years prices for it. A propor-tionate deduction to be made on the short cloth.

The Cloth from Vizagapatam brought up by the George in August being now wash'd and sorted, It was agreed to allow the price of the last Year for it, But almost all of it being Short Cloth occasion'd as it is most likely by Mr. Davis's Illness, which made him incapable of giving such due attendance to the Investment as he ought to have done, the Warehousekeeper was directed to allow for the same Pro Rato, and it is agreed to advise hereof in our General Letter.

Thomé in Order to send the Boat to Madrass, but to my utter misfortune my Gomastoes disregarded my Orders, and did not send the said boat which caused Your Hon^{r's}. displeasure and Anger to fall on me, and I was told by Your Honour that I do not deserve Your Honours protection, and only such as S^t. Thomé upon which I thought it better to keep myself at a little distance till those ill days which happen'd through my misfortune were blown over when I cou'd take opportunity to beg Your Hon^{rs}. Pardon, so I staid till now in Triplicane under Your Honour's Protection and Jurisdiction.

Honours Protection, and I shall for the future only Act according to Your Honours Approbation, and not in any other Way, and I beg Your Honour will please

to take into Y'. serious Consideration that I have borrow'd several sums of Money in Rupees from many Merchants and sent the same to the Northward, and that all the Grain, and other Goods of mine which are now remaining in Banksalls, and in many other Places will meet with Considerable Loss, and bring great damage upon me if there falls any Rain as by the Clouds and Lightening that appears it seems likely to do, and more especially if my affairs lye in this manner my Creditors will come upon me to demand their Moneys, and thereby I shall be deprived of my Credit. Imagining I cou'd take a more favourable Opportunity to Address Your Honour I retir'd to Trivlicane, where I now am under Your Honours Jurisdiction. There is now a boat belonging to me Anchor'd in Madrass with Grain from Pundemudacha, Her Tandel is ashore and I am talking with the St. Thomé Government to get leave to bring away the Boat, that is at that place according to Your Honrs. Order. I shall in all things Act according to Your Honours Will, But in these bad Days it's not proper to let Goods remain in Our Vessels, but ought to be brought on shore, and if the Grain shou'd remain unsold, either in the Banksalls or any other Place the Merchant may be a great Looser thereby all which is well known to Your Honour. The Board cou'd not but remark from these proceedings of the said Mayors Court how little regard they shew'd to the Orders of the Board, and even of the Company themselves. A further instance of which disregard to the Company their Letter of the 13th. of this Month seems calculated and design'd to give us, since they therein treat the Directions which our Honble: Masters are pleas'd to call plain, express and Possitive Orders for the Constant observance of us and the Mayors Court as simple Recommendations from them, and Notices of such measures as it may be proper for the said Court to pursue, these remarks the Board

The Mayors Court having thought fit to impose a Fine on Mr. Torriano the Themethod

On Occasion of the Sherifs Appeal the President remarked to the Board that there were many more reasons for keeping such a Register besides the Orders abovemention'd, One of which, and that a Principal one was to prevent the Moors from purchasing too many Houses in the Town, a thing absolutely necessary to be guarded against, but which cannot possibly be done while the practice of Registering Bills of Sale &c. continues in the Mayors Court since it is not probable that Court who have in Express terms told us they do not look upon themselves as accountable to us, and who in so many Instances besides this now before us have shewn so open a disregard, and disobedience to the Orders of the Government, will alter their conduct for the Iuture, or take more Notice of what we may hereafter recommend to them than they do at present.

Another reason mention'd by the President for keeping such a Register was the preventing of fraudulent Conveyances which the present Method doth not so well guard against since the Mayor's Court having made a Rule that all Houses sold by Execution issueing out of their Court let them be of what value soever shall be register'd there; Whereas the Custom of the Place is to Register all Bills of Sale, Mortgages &c. under one Hundred Pagodas value in the Choultry. Nothing is easier than for the Proprietor of a House sold by the Sheriff to resell the same by Private Contract or to make two Conveyances of the same Premises himself, of which Nature there is at this time an Instance. A Man having Very lately sold his House to two different Persons, One Bill of Sale being Register'd in the Choultry and another (thô under One Hundred Pagodas value) in the Mayor's Court.

Regulations proposed to be made thereupon. For these and many other Reasons the President proposed to the Serious Consideration of the Board whether it was not absolutely necessary for them in Pursuance of the abovemention'd Orders, and many others made at different times to have but one Register kept for Conveyances of Lands, Houses and other Hereditaments within the Limits of this town of Madrasspatnam and the Villages belonging to it.

Which proposal being fully consider'd and debated the Board resolvd that the instruction to President Thomas Pitt was a Standing Order which had never been revoked, and that therefore all Deviations from the same were erroneous, and that the said Order ought to be comply'd with for that the said Company have since the arrival of the Present Charter in their Letter dated the 14th. Feby 1727 Paragraph 96 Order'd a Sett of their Standing Orders to be sent them for the information of those Lawyers whom they Consult and in their Letter dated the 23d. Janry 1729 Paragh 108 after receipt of the said Standing Orders directed that such of them only as were repugnant to the laws of England must be look'd upon as void which directions must be understood to be given Consonant to the opinion of those Lawyers for whose perusal the said Orders were sent home, and therefore all such of their Standing Orders as are not contrary to the Laws of England are still binding, and that this for Registering Bills of Sale, Mortgages &c. is not Contrary to those Laws is plain from the 61st. Paragraph of the Company's Letter dated 17th. Febry 1726 wherein the Company in Express Words approve of keeping such a Register at Fort St. David which happening at the very time when the new Charter was sent us is a plain, and full proof that the Register now proposed to be kept is agreeable and Consonant to the Laws of England.

Several regulations agreed to.

It was therefore resolv'd that the said Order and Instruction to President Thomas. Pitt which has allways been Obey'd for such Conveyances of Lands and Houses as have been Register'd in the Choultry though by some means or other neglected to be observ'd latterly for such as have been Register'd in the Mayor's Court, be for the future Strictly and Punctually observ'd, but the Board remarking by some Acts of Parliament made for erecting such a Register in England in the County's of Yorkshire and Middlesex certain Rules and directions for the more regular keeping of such Register, It was agreed to take time till the next Consultation for regulating the Method of keeping the same here, and bringing it as near the practice at home as the Circumstances of the place will admit of.

The Company's Solicitor attending acquaints the Board he had deliver'd to the Mayor's Court on the 6th. 19th. and 30th. of May three several Injunctions from the Court of Appeals requiring them to issue a Warrant of Execution against the effects Board with of Sunca Vencatachelum, Ball Chitty, Tomby Chitty, Mutavencatty Chitty and Tagapa of the Mayors ant to a decree of the said Mayors Court dated the 14th. of June last past in favour of the honourable Company or to shew Cause to the contrary that to the first of those them Chitty for the sum of Eight thousand five hundred and seventy Nine Pagodas pursuanswer'd they wou'd take the Purport of it into consideration, to the second that they Appeals. had made some progress therein, but that when he waited on them the 10th. Instant to know their resolution on the third injunction deliver'd to their Register the 30th. Past they told him they wou'd come to some determination about the Paper when they had duely consider'd it but that wou'd not be imediately.

The injunction from the court of Appeals which the said Mayor's Court are Remarks on pleas'd in so contemptuous a manner to stile the paper, was then read and appear'd to be no more than an Order to issue a warrant of execution, or to shew cause to the contrary. Which command being very plain and express, and the only thing that can require consideration being whether they shou'd obey it or not. It seems odd that the Company and Mayors Court shou'd want so much time as from the 6th. May to the 10th. June to catachilum. determine what they wou'd do therein, much less can it be conceiv'd that they shou'd want yet further time to consider thereof, and therefore this board do unanimously agree in opinion that this answer from the Mayors Court is only an excuse with design to avoid a possitive refusal and of equal detriment to our honourable Employers as such refusal wou'd be.

The unaccountable conduct of the leading Members of the Mayor's Court during this whole prosecution has in part been laid before our honourable Masters in our Letters by the last Shipping. Their dismissing the Bill against Sunca Vencatachilum and others for want of naming all the Partys, and giving sentence against the Company in favour of Suncavencatachilum, and others without naming all the partys. Their mixing two Decrees together in Order to deprive the Company of the benefit of one of them; their rejecting the Companys plea without suffering it to be argued, Their disobedience to a former Decree of the Court of Appeals; their presumption in pretending to receive Security for Costs of an Appeal to the King in Council when the Court of Appeals had declared the said Appeal irregular, these and some other steps in the carrying on this cause have been laid before the Company as well as some of the ill consequences of this Conduct such as dividing the minds of the Inhabitants making them in doubt where, or to whom their obedience is due destroying that influence over them without which it is impossible for the Government to subsist or the Companys affairs to be carry'd on with any success. To these ill consequences must be added that since this cause has been in agitation Sunca Vencatachilum, He, whom these very Men till he became an open and avow'd Enemy to the Government treated as the vilest and most abominable oppressor on whom they charg'd almost all those proceedings in former times which have given but too just cause of Complaint as Contriv'd or executed by him or by his means, and who deserv'd the severest punishments our Law could inflict, This Man thus branded by them is now so chang'd and become so just, so impartial an Umpire among the several Casts of the Inhabitants, that it has been the practice of the Court (at such times as they have thought fit to have any regard to the Customs of the Natives) to apply to him and they have as blindly comply'd with his decissions, as they have obstinately disobey'd the Commands of their Superiours. What justice the Chitty Cast might expect on

such occasions need not be remark'd nor the General uneasiness the Inhabitants express at such influence. Nor need this Board expatiate more largely on the mischiefs arising from the extraordinary countenance, and favour shewn him after making this one remark more, that the disregard shown to the President and Council by the Inhabitants is nothing when compared with the contemptible figure we make in the Eyes of the Country Government, and the ill consequences to be apprehended therefrom since while they see a black fellow beard us in this manner they cannot avoid entertaining a very despicable Opinion of us, and will infallibly be led to think they also may reap some advantages from our Weakness.

After these remarks we shou'd highly deserve the Censure of our Honourable-Masters did we not endeavour to apply a remedie thereto. Therefore,

ORDER'D that the Sollicitor do apply to the Court of Appeals to pray a Warrant of Execution may be granted by them for the amount of the said decree, and costs, And

The conduct of Sunca Ramah during his dispute with the Company consider'd. That Pursuant to the directions in the Charter he do prefer a complaint to this: Board against the Mayor and each of the Aldermen, for disobeying the Injunctions sent them from the Court of Appeals.

After which the President remark'd to the Board the conduct of Sunca Ramaduring the progress of this cause in the Mayor's Court, Arrogantly as well as insolently defying the Company's Authority, and impudently preaching in the Black town, that as his friends in the Mayors Court had given their words to stand by him, he did not value any other Power. The President also reminded the Board of Sunca Rama's practices in relation to Chindadre Petta and the other uses he made of ye. liberty of coming into the White town extreamly prejudicial to the Company's Affairs, and the English Government, for which alone the late President had it under consideration to prohibit him that Liberty and only forebore moving it in Council upon Account of the Cause he had with the Company, and that the wicked might have Suggested such prohibition proceeded only from Malice, and to hinder him from obtaining Justice. Add besides the Scandalous use he makes of his daily visits to the leading Members of the Court, which is so notorious and so Shamefull a prostitution of the justice of the place that ought not to be Suffer'd in any civil Government. For which reasons and to shew a proper and necessary resentment the President propos'd that Sunca Rama might now be forbid coming into the White Town without particular leave which was Agreed to.

That the fees to be paid for the same be one Per Cent to the said Justices, and half 1) Cent to the Register, as also one fanam to the Choultry Talliars and one fanam to the Town Conicoply for each Conveyance and no more, provided that as the Houses in the White Town are many of 'em of considerable value no more shall be paid for registering any of those than five pagodas to the Justices, and Two Pagodas and a half to the Register.

The complaint of John Savage Solicitor to the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies in behalf of the said Company against John Saunders Esq^r. Mayor of the town of Madrasspatnam, Hugh Naish, Holland Goddard, Robert Allen, Thomas Day, Thomas Appe[1] by and Edward Mitchell, Aldermen of the said Town, and now residing there

SHEWETH

That in the year One thousand Seven hundred and twenty nine the then President and Council of this place enter'd into a Contract with Sunca Vencata Chilum, Ball Chitty, Tomby Chitty, Muta Vencatty Chitty, and Tagapa Chitty for Seventeen hundred Bales of Callicoes to be deliver'd on or before the thirty first of January following under penalty of paying to the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies twenty & Cent for all Such Cloth as shou'd then be wanting of the said Seventeen hundred Bales and that Moodoo Ramah was concern'd with Sunca Vencatachilum and head of the house resident here though his name was not mention'd in the Contract.

That the said Merchants at the expiration of the term allow'd them by the said Contract had deliver'd very few goods and were indulg'd another year to bring in the remainder, that at the expiration of the Year 1730 there still remain'd half the Quantity contracted for undeliver'd, and the President and Council yet further indulg'd the said Merchants with another year, but were as ill requited for this indulgence as before; Sunca Vencatachilum, and Ball Chitty two of the Companys Merchants at last declaring they wou'd provide no more goods for the said Company, whereupon the President and Council demanded of them the penalty due on the remainder of their Contract but to no effect.

That the said Company were therefore oblig'd to prosecute the Said Sunca Vencatachilum, and Ball Chitty together with Moodu Ramah for recovery thereof and accordingly in the Month of November 1733 (till which time they had waited trying amicable measures to no purpose) they prefer'd their Bill against the said Sunca Vencatachilum, Ball Chitty and Moodu Ramah in the Honble the Mayor's Court which Bill the said Court rejected because Moodurama's name was not to the Contract, though he had join'd in a petition with the other two to the President and Council acknowledging his concern therein, and praying to be execused from the Penalty incur'd by the breach thereof.

That another reason why the s^d. Court dismiss'd the said Bill was that the rest of the contracted partys were not prosecuted for the penalty whereas since the prosecution was only for recovering of damages incurr'd by their Breach of Contract, It was undoubtedly in the breast of the Sufferers to forgive whom they pleas'd though they demanded the proportion of Penalty from the rest.

That Sunca Vencatachilum, and Ball Chitty two of the said Merchants some months after preferring a Bill against the said Company, they put in a plea thereto, which plea the said Mayor's Court order'd to be filed, and it thereby became a part of the records of the said Court, but afterwards finding that by having filed the same, they had admitted the purport of it, and consequently the Bill must be dismiss'd, they did irregularly and illegally order the Register to take the same off the file again though neither the said Sunca Vencatachilum or Ball Chitty or their Attorney so much as requested the same and tho' the Companys Solicitor insisted that agreeable to the practice of all Courts, and to the Laws of England the said plea shou'd be allow'd or demurr'd to.

That the said Sunca Vencatachilum, and Bill [sic] Chitty imediately after rejecting the said Plea demanded Judgment to be given in the said Cause, but as complying therewith wou'd not have been so much to their advantage the Court

refus'd it in order that both Causes might be heard at once and one decree given therein that so the said Company might be debarr'd from the benefit of the decree which the said Court found themselves necessitated to give in their favour on the other cause.

That the complaint exhibited against the said Company was admitted by the said Mayors Court as a Cross Bill to the Complaint of the said Company though no Body Appear'd as prosecutors but Suncavencatachilum and Ball Chitty, and consequently the rest of the Party's to the former Bill was not concern'd in the latter, yet so great was the partiality of the said Court that thô they had dismiss'd the Company's Bill which was exhibited against Suncavencatachilum, Ball Chitty and others because it did not mention the rest by name they admitted this Bill against the Company for damages sustain'd by Suncavencatachilum, and Ball Chitty and others without obliging them to say what others were damag'd and what others sued for relief which was done because without adding those words, and others they cou'd have no pretence to mix the two Causes together, and had they nam'd Tomby Chitty &c. the Court well knew the whole Quantity of the Cloth having been deliver'd either to Tomby Chitty or Suncavencatachilum, the dispute the proportions each of them receiv'd wou'd have lain between them, and have no way concern'd the Company. It was therefore necessary that Tomby Chittys name shou'd not be mention'd and yet that he shou'd be suppos'd a party to the Bill in order to make it of service to the said Suncaventachilum and Ball Chitty and the said Court who had been so remarkably nice in favour of Suncavencatachilum and Ball Chity as to dismiss the Companys Bill for not incerting every partys name, yet when it came to be Sunca Vencatachilum, and Ball Chitty's case, overlook'd all such Objections, and gave Sentence against the Company without saying on whose account they were condemn'd or in whose favour the money was to be paid to Suncavencatachilum, and Ball Chitty.

That the said Court refused to grant execution upon the first Cause though the Court of Appeals had declared that no appeal had ever been brought before them from the decree of the Mayors Court, and signify'd the same in writing to them. That the said Mayors Court have since refused to obey three different injunctions from the said Court of Appeals commanding and requiring them to issue such warrant, pretending a right to examine into such orders whereby they have acted contrary to the rules laid down in the Royal Charter, and have been guilty of a breach of their duty as Aldermen, to the great damage of the said Company, and the interruption of Justice, and for these things the said John Savage prays leave to refer the annex'd Charges against the said John Saunders, Hugh Naish, Holland Goddard, Robert Allen, Thomas Day, Thomas Appelby, Edward Mitchell.

A CHARGE exhibited to the President and Council of Fort S'. George against M'. Hugh Naish one of the Aldermen of the Town of Madrasspatnam by John Savage Solicitor to the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies—

For that in the year One thousand seven Hundred and thirty four the said Hugh Naish being Mayor of the said Town application was several times made to the Mayors Court by the said Company's Solicitor for a warrant of excution against the Effects of Suncavencatachilum, Ball Chitty, Tomby Chitty, Mutavencatty Chitty and Tagapa Chitty for the Sum of Eight thousand five hundred and Seventy nine Pagodas the amount of a decree given in the said Court on the 14th, of June in the same Year, but such warrant was refus'd on pretence that the decree aforesaid, was for the Sum of Eight thousand five hundred and Seventy nine Pagodas, twenty two fanams to be paid by the said Company to Suncavencatachilum and Ball Chitty in behalf of themselves, and others &c. notwithstanding that the said Solicitor deliver'd to the said Court a decree of the said Court of Appeals whereby it was expressly decreed that the one cause mention'd in the said Decree of the Mayor's Court cou'd have no relation to the other Cause in the said decree mention'd, and consequently they cou'd not be look'd upon as Cross Bills nor the decrees thereupon mix'd.

That John Saunders Esq^r. being since elected Mayor of the said Town, and the said Hugh Naish continueing an Alderman of the said Town the Court of Appeals did on the fifth of May last past issue a writ commanding the said Court to grant execution in the Sum of eight thousand five Hundred and Seventy Nine Pagodas agreeable to the decree of the said Mayor's Court or to shew cause to the contrary, which was not comply'd with, and the said Court of Appeals did thereupon on the 19th. of the said Month issue a Second writ to the same effect which also was not comply'd with, and the said Court of Appeals did again on the 29th. of May issue a third writ ordering such execution to go out but this was also disobey'd and no execution granted nor any cause shewn to the Contrary.

All which actings and doings of the said Hugh Naish tend greatly to the detriment and damage of the said United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, are contrary to the due administration of Justice, breaches of his duty as an Alderman of the Town of Madraspatnam, and against the rules prescribed in the Royal Charter. And the said John Savage therefore prays the said Hugh Naish may be Summon'd to answer for the same on a day to be appointed by your Honour &c. and that you will please to give such Sentence thereupon, as to your Honour &c. shall seem meet.

The above charge Mutatis mutandis was at the same time severally exhibited against.



President, Randall Fowke, Aug. Burton, Nic. Morse, Francis Rous, William Monson & George Torriano Esq. Councillors of Fort S. George by Mr. John Savage Solicitor to and in behalf of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies the 16th. June 1735.

These Respondents saving to themselves all Benefit of Exception to the errors, and imperfections in the said charge contain'd also saving to themselves all rights priviledges, and immunitys belonging to them, and each of them as Mayor and Aldermen of Madrasspatnam and Judges of a court of Record created by the name of the Mayors Court of Madrasspatnam by protestation not confessing or acknowledging all or any of the matters or things in the said Charge contain'd to be true in such manner and form as therein, and thereby sett forth, the scope of the said Seperate Charges being as against each of these Respondents for a breach of Duty as one of the Aldermen of the said Town is refusing to obey the writs sent to the Mayor and Aldermen of the said Town for issueing a warrant of execution against the effects of Suncavenceatachilum, Baal Chitty, Tomby Chitty, Moota Vencatty Chitty, and Tagapa Chitty, for the sum of Eight thousand five Hundred and Seventy Nine Pagodas with Costs of Suit to be paid to the said Company or to shew cause to the contrary for Demur thereunto say.

Because the Charge is against each of these Respondents being an Alderman of the said Town and not as being a Judge of the said Court of Record which Offices being two distinct offices and Dutys the one cannot be responsible for the other because first the charter constitutes a Corporation consisting of a Mayor and Nine Aldermen, and Secondly by another distant Clause the Mayor and Alderman are as it were afresh created a Court of record. In like manner the Oath of an Alderman is compos'd of three parts and consequently three dutys, first Allegience to the King, secondly the Duty as an Alderman of the corporation & thirdly the Duty as a Judge of the said Court. The duty of an Alderman as these Respondents conceive is peremptory and determinative requiring his best service in behalf of the Body Politick and conformity to the rules and regulations of the Major part of the said Body, inconsideration of which Services and conformity he as an alderman may, and does enjoy certain Franchises, and priviledges. The duty of a Judge is not peremptory or requiring conformity but leaves him to judge and act in Law and equity according to the dictates of his own conscience and judgment conceiv'd and believ'd, and thereupon the Judge receives not, nor can claim any Franchises, and priviledges but a General exemption from Prosecution as judge except in Parliament. Wherefore these Respondents conceive a Breach of duty as an Aldermen, nor that of an Alderman be imputed a breach of duty as a Judge, so in a similar case, a breach of duty in one of the Council here present as a Companys Councillor, and Servant in their Mercantile Affairs cannot be imputed to him as a Breach of his Oath, and duty as a judge of the Court of Appeals or as a justice of the Peace or as a Justice of Sessions which four dutys and offices are in nature distinct though the same charter ordains that he that is of Council, or the Companys Trade shall be a Judge of the Court of Appeals, and by a new creation Ordain'd that he (being one of the five Seniors) shall be a Justice of the Peace, and again a Justice of Sessions which four dutys and offices require different Oaths, Tallents, Capacitys, and Circumstances, for as much as an action in the one capacity may be highly criminal thô not so in the other, or may be criminal in conjunction thô not so when consider'd singly and seperately when possibly it may not be in the Power of Man to alter the Case.

In Alderman Barrington's case the said Company say, "That his charge was "not founded on any offence or misdemeanour in that (his Aldermans) office, but is "as he (Barington) objects properly for a breach of Covenants only, and therefore he "shou'd have been prosecuted and pursued upon, and by virtue of the Covenants only "and the Charge upon him for breach of Covenants shou'd not have been connected "with any charge upon him in respect to his office of Alderman, the contrary to which "haveing been done has render'd the reasons he has offer'd for himself very weighty.

the Respondents for Breach of Duty as Judges shou'd not be connected with any Charge upon them, in respect to their office of Alderman, the Contrary to which having been done has render'd the reasons the Respondents have to offer to themselves very weighty.

Because the Charter permits the President and Council to remove an Alderman upon reasonable Cause namely, "The committing some offence against this Oath and to the prejudice of the Body into which he's incorporated," the which is not charged

in the complaint.

Because neither he'the said John Saunders Esq^r., Hugh Naish, Holland Goddard, Robert Allen, Thomas Appleby, Thomas Day or Edward Mitchel can in their seperate and distinct capacitys, Estates, Rights & Personages to be responsible for the act or omission of a joint Body of men.

The act requir'd to be done was to grant or award a writ of execution which ought not or cannot solely be awarded by any one judge But must be an act of a Court of Record and under the Broad seal of the said Court as appears by the Tenor of the writs execution wherein is always indispencibly and efficaciously affirm'd that the "Court doth award Execution under the seal of the said Court and under the "hands and seals of the two Judges of the Mayors court", Whereof the Mayor and Senior Alderman must essentially be one. Thus the order of court and that alone gives motion to the Seal, and the Seal of the court gives Life and Vigour to the writ, which Seal symbolically expresses the act and authority of the incoporated Body, by which all the Judges then, and there acting are as one natural Body, and therefore cannot be disjointed or sevr'd as by the said Charges the Members are disjointed and sevr'd.

Because the suppos'd act charged must have been done in open Court and by Judges of a Court of Record "Whom the Law and reason has exempted and forced from all prosecutions whatsoever except in Parliament for any thing done by them openly in such Court as Judges. To whom it belongs especially to judge what is a reasonable [Time], Custom, fine &c*.

Because the President and Council constituting the Court whereto these respondents are summon'd, and now Setting in judgment are partys concern'd and Interested in the Event, and decission to be had upon the Charge Viz.

First in that the said Randall Fowke, Aug^s Burton and Nicolas Morse Esq^{rs}, in Association with others then of Council as Agents, and Representatives of the Company Plaintiffs in the charge did enter into and conclude the original Contract with the said Sunca Vencatachilum, Baal Chitty, Tomby Chitty Mutavencatty Chitty and Tagappa Chitty for Breach of which Contract the execution demanded is founded the refusal whereof the Respondents are now charg'd with.

Secondly in that the said Richard Benyon Esq^t. President, Randall Fowke, Aug^s. Burton, Nicolas Morse, Francis Rous & William Monson, in association with George Morton Pitt, and John Roach Esq^t. as Council, Agents and representatives of the said Company Plaintiffs in the charge were prosecutors, solliciting defending and maintaining the Cause and action and whereon is founded the present demanded

execution, the refusal whereof these Respondents are charg'd with.

Thirdly in that the said George Torriano Esq^r. was lately Solicitor, and by the said Richard Benyon Esq^r. President, Randall Fowke, Augustus Burton, Nicolas Morse, Francis Rous, William Monson Esq^r. as Council Agents and Representatives for the said Company now plaintiffs in the charge was retain'd, and for an [sic] in behalf of the plaintiffs in the charge dil solicit defend and maintain the cause and action whereon is founded the present demanded execution, the refusal whereof these Respondents are charg'd with.

Fourthly in that the said Richard Benyon Esqr. President, Randall Fowke, Augs. Burton, Nicolas Morse, Francis Rous, William Monson, and George Torriano Esqr. and no others did sett as President and Council, and individually did constitute the Court of Appeals from whence the said writs demanding Execution did proceed. For each and every of the aforesaid reason these respondents do conceive the said

they bear in the said Company's Service as also in regard to the Power and jurisdiction of the said Court of Appeals to which they wou'd now command and enforce
obedience and consequently cannot in Law and equity sett in Judgment on the
Merits of said Charges altho' otherwise the same might come regularly before themseeing M^r. Wood in his Institutes says "The King himself cannot judge in his own
cause," and the said Company in the case of Robert Addams Esq^r. by their Council
and Solicitor in England do inform us "That whenever the Judges are Interested in

Because the Books, and Autoritys sent from England do plainly urge "That "in default of complyance in the Judges of an inferiour Court with the writs of execution from the Superiour Court an attachment ought to be taken out against "the Judges at the Suit of the King, and the Party returnable into the Court of Kings Bench which Court only may regularly examine all and all manner of Errors in fact and in Law of all Judges and Justices in their Judgements, processes, and proceedings in Courts of record, not only in pleas of the Crown but in all pleas real, personal and mix'd.

Thus far these Respondents have demur'd, unto the Charges exhibited against each of them thereby saving, and reserving unto these Respondents as above Sav'd and reserv'd, and for the more ready conclusion of this affair have annex'd the extracts at large whence they derive and hope to Support the same.

And in default thereof these Respondents for Answer thereunto do add, and say as hereafter is said by the Records of the Mayors Court which these Respondents pray may be accepted as their Answer, copy whereof is hereto annex'd from the 2^d. December 1734 to the 16th. June 1735 the date of the said Company's Charges "which Records in the words of Serjeant Hawkins being the memorials of the Judges are of such uncontrolable credit that they do admit of no proof to the contrary in so much that they are to be try'd only by themselves, and by which these Respondents ought to be judg'd." in fact and in Law of all Judges and Justices in their judgments processes and Prest. State proceedings in Courts of record, not only in pleas of the Crown but in all pleas real of G. B. ps. personal and mix'd, the Court of Exchequer excepted as shall appear hereafter.

Chambres. 111. W. Ins*, 447.

The Rolls being the memorials of the Judges are of such uncontrolable Credit, that they admit of no proof to the contrary insomuch that they are to be try'd only by themselves.

A Judge is a person appointed by Publick Authority with Jurisdiction to him Ditto 448. it belongs especially to Judge what is a reasonable time, Custom, Fine &c. and not to a Jury. He cannot be excepted against or challeng'd or regularly have an action brought against him for what he doth as judge, but he ought not to judge in his own cause except in case of necessity.

The Law hath also freed the Judges of all Courts of record from all prosecution 1st. H.P. whatsoever except in parliament for any thing done by them openly in such Courts \$.6. as Judges.

Yet if there be no extraordinary circumstances of any such delay to bring a 24 H.P. 150 judge under a reasonable suspicion of corruption it seems the more usual method to

take out a writ to such Judge commanding him to do the thing, of the delay whereof you complain, and if such writ be not obey'd to take out an Alias and Pluries or to take out an Alias & Pluries together with the first writ, and thereupon if the Judge refuse to comply to take out an attachment against him at the suit of the King and of the party which may either be returnable into the Court of K. B or at the party's Election into the Court of Common pleas except in some Special cases, and this seems to be the proper remedy to compel the Lord of a manner to hold a Court for determining a writ of right patent or a writ of Right close, or to compel a Judge of any inferiour Court whether of record or not to proceed in a plea or to give Judgement or to award execution.

Executione Judicii is a writ directed to a Judge of an Inferiour Court to do Jacobs D. execution on a Judgment therein or to return some reasonable cause wherefore he delays the execution F. N. B 20 if execution be not done on the first writ an Alias shall issue and a pluries with this cause (velcausam nobis Significes Quare &c.) and if upon this writ Execution be not done the execution returnable in BR & BC (new NB 43) If the Judgment be in a Court of Record this writ shall be directed to the Justices of Court where the Judgment was given and not unto the Officer of the Court for if the Officer will not execute the writs of the Court nor return them as he ought the Judges of the Court may amerce them.

But as You the Governour and Council and the Mayors Court are distinct Courts Madras of Record Your Judgment & theirs are to govern you, and them notwithstanding Extracts Febry 1731/2 anything we now say or shall say by your own Judgment and theirs, you and they are P.4. to stand and fall therefore we do not dictate but send our Opinions, and advice only.

That it is our opinion when any of the Judges either of the Mayor's Court or Ditto P. 15. Court of Appeals are interrested in the matter in question it is just and fit that such persons withdraw from the Bench, and the rest of the Judges before whom the cause is heard shou'd take more than ordinary care to do equal Justice least any imputation, and reflection fall upon them as having been partial to, and favourites of their fellow Judges.

And if it should happen that so many of the Judges of either Court are partys Ditto P. 16. in the cause as that on that Account there is not a competent Number of disinterested Judges left to decide the contraversy such contraversy ought in our Opinion either to be left to arbitration, or reserv'd to be determin'd in Westminister Hall.

But what he particularly offer'd to the observation of the Board was the number and value of the presents. For though that to the Nabob is no more than usual yet those to the others are new and for which the Precedents are very rare. The last Nabob wou'd very seldom suffer

any but himself to send a Seerpaw whereas in February last Sunta Sahib, Subderally Sahib, Jehore cawn, and Emaum Sahib had all of them taken upon them to send distinct Secreaws to the President which proceeded in some measure from the situation of Affairs at Arcot and had also made a return necessary and unavoidable; for the present Nabob has for some time past devoted himself chiefly to a religious Life, and left the management of Affairs to those who wou'd struggle for it, a conduct that has occasion'd very violent contests between Sunta Sahib, and Subderally Sahib in one of which the Nabob himself was oblig'd to fly from Arcot. The contention between the two Brothers had also occasion'd an alteration in the Interest of the ministers, and Coop Chund is again come into power, and a considerable influence in the affairs at Arcot, for which reason the President had been advised, when he was sending up the other presents to take some notice also of Coop Chund thô he had receiv'd no Seerpaw from him, The French and Dutch have also been very liberal this Year with their presents to Arcot particulary upon the marriage of Hassanally Caune; an Expence that has been saved to our Company it not being the practice of the Durbar to make a present upon any particular occasion before a return has been made for the Seerpaws which also was another reason why the President was not in hast to remove the other difficultys which had so long kept him from sending these. The board being satisfied of the necessity of making these Presents approv'd the List which is enter'd after this consultation, and we hope our Honourable Masters will be perswaded it has approv'd. not been in our power to be better Husbands upon this occasion.

and the Consultation of the 5th. September 1730, they made the following remarks.

That the first considerable complaint in Mr. Macraes time proceeded from a Quantity of Pagodas imported from China part as it is said by Mr. Hugh Cambell, and part from Pondicherry they were of the Negapatam stamp but a Baser Allay, and so nicely imitated that a great number were mix'd among the Currt, money before the Shroffs discouer'd them.

That the success the introducers of the China pagodas met with possibly gave encouragement to attempts for bringing in other bad pagodas of the sorts which were usually current, but however this Board are of Opinion that the Government took all the Care to prevent the evil that was usual, or cou'd then be thought of upon such an occasion.

That it is not new or unusual upon accidents of this Sort to magnifie the Inconveniences beyond the truth and to censure the Government for want of care or somewhat worse. At the time when the Company had upwards of four Hundred thousand pagodas in Cash the greatest Sum that ever was known at one time, and more than it is to be hop'd they will ever have again it was Suggested there was a considerable quantity of Bad money mix'd among it that they wou'd be sufferers by when it was Issued out. Perhaps also it was insinuated that somebody had, or was to be a gainer by it, but it appears beyond all contradiction the Company were discharg'd of the whole of that vast Sum without the loss of one pagoda.

Those Suggestions it is to be believ'd gave occasion to the direction in the 43 and 44th. paragraphs of the Company's Letter dated 23^d. January 1729 to coin a new pagoda here of the Negapatam fineness, and though it was in some sort left to the discretion of the President and Council yet when such reasons were given by the Company it might be thought unsafe not to make tryal of a new coinage, and to prevent all suggestion that it was omitted for private views.

The reasons given for coining the M. M. Pag^s. are enter'd at large in the Consultation of the 5th. Septem^r. 1730 but the experience of upwards of four Years are convincing that those pagodas have occasion'd much greater inconveniencys than those which it was intended to prevent. Such has been the effect of popular clamour and the suggestions of wick'd Men.

It was hoped when the M. M. Pagodas were first coin'd they wou'd before now have been Curr^t. not only in all Branches of the Company's Business but likewise in all other payments and Receipts, the experience of more than four Years has convinced us of the falacy of that Notion, and that they are no more Curr^t. now than they were the first day they were coin'd. The reasons of which are obvious and are as follows. There is a perpetual Circulation of the Currant Money between this place and the Country. None of it Centers here, nor are the Pagodas exported by Sea to any Country where the intrinsick value of the Gold is consider'd.

The rents of the Province, and all other payments into the Nabobs Treasury are paid in a pagoda coin'd different from all the rest which yet the Nabob has not aim'd at making currant because he wou'd reap the advantage of a double coinage. It is easy to conceive his influence without interfereing with his power will in a great measure govern the Currency of any particular coin, and it wou'd be a fruitless attempt for any European Settlement to force the currency of any coin without the Nabobs concurrence a thing that is neither to be hoped or expected where it interferes with, or is prejudical to his Interest.

It is further to be remark'd here that before the country Government tasted the sweets of coining the Money the pagodas generally current were the Tevenapatam Pogoda coin'd at Fort S^t. David, the Allumgeer pagoda coin'd here, the Pullicat and Negapatam pagodas. The three first are not now met with in any of our payments and Receipts, and the Negapatam are very scarce and when wanted to send to the Southward bear a Batty equal to the M. M. pagodas, But at other times those as well as the M. M. pagodas are consider'd by the Shroffs only as so much Gold bought by them as such, and coin'd into the Old Madrass pagoda, or else into the Allumbrum, St. Thome or Trivilore pagodas, these three last being now the Currt. Coin which prevails in the country, doubtless fix'd at the Standard they are now, and coin'd in the Country Mints with intention to destroy the Mints in the European Settlements, which purpose has been effected without the use of any other means than that influence which is natural to every Government where first or last all the coin of the province centers The advantage of the coinage has been of late years so considerable a Revenue to the Nabob that he is very quick to take notice of every thing that might seem to affect it, accordingly we find upon the first coining of the M. M. pagoda, it imediately rais'd his resentm't. and that he afterwards acquiesced was perhaps more from the knowledge that it wou'd be no prejudice to his Mints, and that sooner or later he shou'd have the coining of those very Pagodas, than that he was satisfied with the reasons which were then given to support it. In short it is without reason the Europeans value themselves upon having obtain'd the priviledge of Mints because those coins which they had a grant for are not now currant, and therefore the charge of coinage is a dead Loss to them. This was lately the case of the Dutch at Pullicat who imported a quantity of silver there, and coin'd it into Rupees which were no sooner deliver'd out of their Mint but they were bought by the Shroffs as Silver of such a fineness & carry'd directly into the St. Thomé Mint to be recoin'd into the Arcot Rupees. The same wou'd be the case of our Madrass Rupees, and to

Export to Bengall there is not a Merchant (that is to say a Pattan Merchant) wou'd give us any thing more for them than he wou'd for the Arcot Rupees notwithstanding there is so great a difference in the intrinsick value.

These remarks the Board thought necessary to premise as well to show how useless our Mints must be as to prove what we have further to add of the M. M. Pagoda. It has been already said they are not curre, out of the Companys Cash Chest, when any therefore are wanted to make payments to the Company if there be no other Gold to be bought the Curr', pagoda's of the Country must be coin'd into M. M. and is what occasions the Batty or Agio, when they are issued out again the shroffs take them at their own rates, sometimes they have been under parr, but generally the Shroffs will take them as current to recoin again into the Current Money, and thô it cannot be supposed the charge of coinage does amount to the Batta yet when the difference is consider'd it will not be thought a great deal for the Shroffs trouble, and Interest of his Money. The Company's Merchants have been often Loosers by receiving the M. M. Pagodas, for hoping there might be some demand for them to be paid into the Company's Cash they pawn'd them to the Shroffs, and the Interest of the Money has exceeded the Batta.

It must indeed be confess'd the Company are Gainers about One thousand pagodas P Annum sometimes more sometimes less according to the Quantity of Mad. Pagodas that are wanted for the Northern Settlements, the M. M. pagodas being better, and nearer the Madrass Standard than the Currt. pagoda, but then the inconvenience and loss to the Company in other respects does far exceed all advantages which they have or can hereafter have by them. Whoever buys the Company's goods either at Outcry or otherwise considers the sort of money he is to pay for them with, and the batty it will cost him, and bids accordingly. Yet the Company do not buy their Goods cheaper by paying the same Money, for whoever receives it of them receives it as Current because before it can be so it must be recoin'd again, the charge of which with Int. and the Shroffs trouble is reckon'd to amount to the former Batta. There is also an entire loss of two and a half to three & Cent Batta to all persons who remit by Exchange to England, and is what in all probability occasion'd the Company's relinquishing One & Cent Custom and half & Cent Consulage on all the Coral imported here, besides the confusion, uneasiness, and charge it creates to all those who are any ways concern'd with or in the payment of the Revenues.

It was then consider'd if we shou'd lay aside the M. M. pagodas, what others we shou'd fix upon as the Currant Money of the place, and the most knowing and eminent Shroffs being consulted upon the occasion it was put to them whether to order all payments and receipts to be made in the Arnee pagoda of 813 Matt instead of the Allumbrum St. Thomé and Trivilore pag. of 83 Matt the Arnee pagoda only being paid into the Nabobs treasury. To this they reply'd that we shou'd still be subject to the Inconvenience of a Batta in the same manner as we were now with the M. M. pagodas except the nabob shou'd make them Currant in all payments at Arcot and all other parts of the province, which it is not likely he will do, so long as he has the advantage of a double coinage first in that all the Gold is coin'd in his Mints in the common Curr'. pagoda, and afterwards recoin'd into the Arnee pagoda when paid into They added it was their advice upon the whole to fix upon that Standard which was in most General use, and acceptation in all parts of the Country which agreeing also with our own Sentiments, and prudence also Suggesting to us that we shou'd submit to the irresistable force of those Effects which proceed from the nature of commerce in General, and not vainly attempt to introduce noveltys that we have They are laid aside, the neither power or influence to go through with, it was unanimously AGREED to lay aside common Pageda in all payments. the M. But as the Coral Merchants will now remit their Money Two and a half \$\psi\$ Cent cheaper we believe the Company will think it but reasonable they shou'd again pay the one \$\psi\$ Cent Custom, and half \$\psi\$ Cent consulage as formerly, accordingly the same is order'd to be charg'd to their Accounts but however kept under a distinct head in the Books that if the Company disapprove thereof it may be repaid to those who are charg'd with it.

That from several Years they have been servants to the Honourable Company as Washermen, and has allways used their best endeavours in their service which was carry'd on by 500 Washers and that the severe famine which begun to continue from Mr. Macraes Government till the end of Mr. Pitts forced great part of the said Washers to quit the place, and fly to those parts where they cou'd procure Grain &c. cheaper some of them being infirm, and unable to walk died, at last most part of those that remain'd and escaped were oblig'd to dispose of themselves, their Wives or Children &c. So that by these misfortunes great many familys are come to decay, and the number of them is very much decreas'd that at present there is no more but about 100 Washermen that are fit to work, who unless your Petitioners shou'd send for many others to join with 'em in their Business as we have annually done since the continuance of these famines, will not be able enough to carry on their business to which purpose your Petitioners are oblig'd to send for some from the Country though it is a great trouble for them.

Your petitioners are very sorry to assert that some of their people were so unfortunate through their wicked proceedings, and offences to bring themselves under confinement, and exasperate your Honour so far against them as to create in your Honour a design of sending them to the West Coast (as your Petitioners were inform'd) Your honour therefore is earnestly entreated to consider that their ill behaviours proceeded from the change of their stations into a most misserable condition by means of the famines abovemention'd, and they being of very illiterate, and vulgar spirits are consequently very ignorant of all right, and well manured behaviours whatsoever.

Your poor Petitioners therefore most Humbly presume to be seech, and pray your honour begging that Your Honour through your Candour, and well known Goodness will be so pleas'd to pardon, forgive, and excuse them the foremention'd prisoners from their crimes whatsoever that they may thereby be releas'd from their confinements, and enter themselves into the Number of their familys with whom that they may preserve their healths in a very gratefull remembrance of Your Honours undoubted favour wen is hop'd to be conferr'd towards them poor creatures by Your Honour, for which

Your petitioners further labour'd and took great care in transplanting the trees of the garden which stood at that place where Chindadre pettah is built, levelled that ground, and procured all things necessarys for building the houses &c. as is not unknown to your honour on which account they have already expended between the Sums of five and six thousand pagodas the particular accounts whereof Your petitioners have ready (if requir'd) to produce to your Honour. Your petitioners own labour and service in these matters they expect no other advantage for than the great benefit of gaining your honours constant favour towards them.

The Houses that are already built at Chindadrepetta are 100.

Your Petitioners now most humbly entreats your Honour to grant them that Sum which was promis'd unto them to be advanced when Chindadrepetta was design'd to be erected and what favourable encouragement the Erectors of the said Pettah are thought worthy to be gratify'd with they humbly leave to your Honours most gracious pleasure.

January 1723/4 about twenty one Years the Company used always to receive a Custom on the goods deliver'd them at 21 P Cent at the Choultry, but they never receiv'd any Custom on the Wrappers Cloth that was torn in washing, stolen from the washing town, and such as met with other accidents from Rats or white Ants in consideration of the great Loss the Merchants sustain'd by such Cloth. As this was the Custom used from the first establishment of the Company's Trade here Your petitioners pray your Honour &c. will please to alter the method Mr. Macrae made use of for receiving the said Customs, and establishing it again on the former footing.

PRESIDENT & GOVERNOUR &C. COUNCIL OF FORT St. GEORGE. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Your Honour &c. Gentlemen of Council having employ'd Mess¹⁵. Nathan Wright and Self Supracargoes of the Royal George on a Voyage to the Mallabar Coast, Persia and Bussora, I make bold to give your Honour &c. Council the following Narrative of our transactions with respect to the wars between the turks, and Persians, and how we were forced to engage in it. We arriv'd at Bussora the 24th. March last where we found the Arabs engaged in a dispute with the Turks account some ill treatment receiv'd from them, the same being afterwards accommodated, and every thing made Easy on both sides, we remain'd in that scituation till the 18th. May when the Bashaw receiv'd advices that the Persians had enter'd the River with 50 Sail of Trankeys, two small Brigantines, and a Grab of about three Hundred Tons with an intent to take the town of Bussora (having been invited thereto by the Arabs during their difference with the turks) whereupon the Bashaw sent the Captain Aga to Messrs. Wright and self for the loan of the Ship in order to send her down the River to repel the Persians but as we apprehended the Companys Affairs in Persia might be impeded, and their Servants come into some trouble on this account in case we comply'd we earnestly requested to be excused for that reason alledging further that notwithstanding we had a large Ship under our direction she cou'd be of no service to them having but little ammunition on Board, That we came there only as

Merchants, and consequently not provided for such an undertaking. We were answer'd it Signified nothing that the Ship they wou'd and must have, and if we had no ammunition on board, they wou'd send a sufficiency with two thousand Men, that they had hitherto treated us as friends, and were very indulgent to us as Merchants in giving us the Liberty of the port in preference to all other Nations and therefore thought us in duty bound to assist them to the utmost in their necessity, otherwise they wou'd hereafter treat us as common Enemys, and not suffer the face of an Englishman to appear among them again. Your Hon'r. &c. must needs believe we were under no small Delemma on this Account, the Honble Companys affairs calling upon us to remain Neuter on one side, and the lives of all the Europeans there present on the Spot, as well as the fortunes of our Employers on the other. We therefore thought it the only and best expedient to apply to Mr. Marten French the Honble Companys chief resideing there, for his advice in this conjuncture who having before receiv'd some intelligence of the Bashaws design advised us to comply with his request, and accordingly went with us to the Bashaw's house to let him know the Ship was at his Service but not before we had expostulated with him, and found him in the same mind and resolution as we had before been apprized of by his Officer, accordingly the Captain Bashaw with Turkish Soldiers took possession of our Ship when they hoisted Turkish Colours, and fell down the River as far as Cothee Shabanny where they met with the Persians and after four days engagement defeated them, The Deane Frigate (belonging to the Gentlemen of Bengall) and all the turkish Galleys saild the next day after our ship who join'd her in the said engagement.

I inclose your Honour &c. a certificate under the hands of M². Marten French, and others residing at Bussorah which I am in hopes will meet your Approbation (relating to our proceedings in this Affair) a Copy whereof we beg may be transmitted to the Honble Court of Directors of the East India Company and that your Honour &c. will be so kind to represent our Case in that manner that if their Affairs shou'd come into any trouble by cur proceedings on this account they will impute it to the power of Government, and not to the will of either M^r. Wright or

This is to Certifie that we the underwritten were witness to the Conduct of Mess: Cristopher Craddock & Nathan Wright in relation to the Royal George going down the River against the Persians, and give our Narrative as follows.

The 18th. May we had advices of their having enter'd the River, and made their way up as high Halfar a place in distance not twenty Miles from us. You may easily conjecture the confusion this Alarum rais'd which put the Bashaw upon requesting the Royal George to go down in order to repel them, all arguments were used by these two Gentlemen to avoid so dangerous an enterprize to a Ship of her large draught of Water, but all to no effect in the final, they declared if they cou'd not have her by fair means they wou'd otherwise. We thinking the first most Elegible at this Juncture gave our advice towards it which these Gentlemen comply'd with, otherwise it might be attended with the worst of consequences both in regard to our lives, and your Estates. Dated in Bussorah this 4th. day of June 1735.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Whereas a complaint has been given in to the Honble. Company by James Palmer Soldier against David Wilson, and Peter Eckman officers at Fort St. George and a copy of the said Complaint has been deliver'd to the said officers by your Honour's Secry, requiring our answer thereto, and Whereas the said Complaint is not only very ill grounded, and the true reasons of his pretended sufferings disguised & conceal'd and other artfull reasons substituted in the room of the true and real ones,

We shall therefore give an account of the matter of fact to the best of our Knowledge, whereby the whole affair we hope will be sett in its true light and Your Honours fully satisfyed of the unreasonableness of the said Complaint.

Palmer therefore and Williams having an intrigue to carry on with one of Mrs. Harrington's Lodgers who at that time was Gallanted by some Swedes Agreed in order to appropriate the more effectually that Lodger to their own use to drive the Swedes from the House. They went thither accordingly and began to quarrel, the Mistress of the House sent her servant to call a Guard, the servants who by chance espyed Ensign Stewart in the street ran to him, and made his address to him, the Ensign trusting to his own sufficiency went without a Guard.

Upon his arrival he found Dessey and Palmer two Soldiers who being more imediately under his command order'd them to be gone, Dessey walk'd off, but Palmer not regarding the said Ensign's order he was oblig'd to enforce it by applying his Cane to Palmer's Shoulders, whereupon Williams who had hitherto been only a spectator, and Palmer both together closed in with the Ensign, But he readily disengage-ng himself from them, and putting himself in a posture of defence, bad them keep off, in short seeing themselves foil'd and disappointed, they retired.

About nine a Clock that evening Williams, and Palmer passing through the Choultry Guard where the Serjeant was walking ask'd him if he had heard anything of their haveing Quarrel'd that Evening with Ensign Stewart to which he answer'd in

the Negative, they then fell a bragging how heartily they wou'd have drubb'd him had they been arm'd as well as he the said Ensign was, the Serjeant bad them take care how they takl'd at that rate

Williams notwithstanding went on and told the Serjeant that he wou'd have his revenge, and for that very purpose lie on perdue for the Ensign, and that he had a good Quarter Staff which he beleived wou'd do his business, To which Palmer Answer'd that if his Quarter staff woud not do he had a good knife that shou'd do, and then they bid the Serjeant good night.

When the Ensign came to his Guard the Serjeant told him what words had passed between Palmer, Williams and himself, the Ensign made his report next morning to the Cap'. of the Main Guard, and complain'd of Williams and Palmer who were thereupon order'd to be taken up.

Williams not being a Soldier was sent to a Justice of the peace who finding sufficient cause for his commitment bound him over to the Sessions and Palmer was confin'd to the Main Guard, next morning he was publickly reprov'd for his disobedience to his Officer and being a Newman not yet acquainted with the rules of the Garrison, was acquitted without any further censure or punishment.

And as for the other part of his complaint which did not happen till a considerable time after Viz^t.

It is imprisonment punishment, and transportation it shall also be accomptant for, Palmer finding that he was not permitted to converse freely with Williams now in Goal wrote him several Letters in one of which "He applauded the brave resolution which Williams had taken to revenge himself on his Enemys as soon as sett at "liberty, and that he might depend on his assistance at all times.

But Williams who for some time had suspected Palmer of Treachery sent this Letter to the Captain of the Guard who carry'd it to the Governour, who after having perused it gave orders to Captain Eckman to put Palmer in the Cockhouse to give him a gentle exemplarry punishment which was perform'd by the Corporal by giving 24 stripes on the shoulders more to disgrace then hurt him (his Military Coat only being pull'd off, and not otherwise striped) and send him to the West Coast to all which orders the said Officer gave due obedience.

And as to the Additional blows, and hard appellation which Palmer said was given him by Captain Eckman He the said Eckman upon mature enquiry and reflection cannot charge his memory with any such thing or words as being very forreign to the purpose, and no ways appertaining to either of them in their Military capacities.

You wrote to us that the Governour had spoke to you to direct us to provide a large Quantity of Nine Caul Cloth, for the Company against Janry. and that all such Cloth as shall be short of breadth and length or shall prove bad or torn in washing we must take again and deliver other Cloth in the room of it. You formerly wrote to Andiapa that the Governour had directed you to write him to provide a large Quantity of Nine Caul Cloth and Salampores for the Company to which he answer'd you that he on his part never used to contract with the Company but if any Person advances him Money he provides them such Cloth as they want at the price it Costs, charging only his Brokeridge, and in such manner he shou'd be content to provide as well as in his power; You approved of it and wrote us what Cloth that shou'd be short in length or Breadth shou'd be turn'd out Brown and that there shou'd be no further trouble about it, and sent money to provide such Cloth which we have done now for four Years receiving back only such Cloth as was turn'd out Brown for want of length and Breadth for which we deliver'd other Cloth, and the Governour has approved to this time such our Business and we have receiv'd his favour, and as you now write us that the Governour Orders us to take bad Cloth and such as is torn in washing, how can we do it as we provide and send only for our Brokerage; if we take it back again it will destroy our Affairs and Trade, if this was a concern with Contract Merchants, if they loose by one sort of Cloth they get by another, and so they will be able to perform it without Loss, but we can't that only receive our Brokerage for our trouble We hope you will not be offended at this our reason but will explain it to the Governour in an handsome manner, and if you will please to get him to accept our service in such manner as formerly and not let the Cloth be turn'd upon our hands only such as is brown at the time of measuring, We shall do all we can and get a large Quantity by January and as for the new Contract also, if you can get this Granted we shall receive

You write us to send you an Account in English of what Long Cloth we deliver'd in ffort St. David. We have delivered of the Old Contract 1200 Corge and on the new Contract some we have and shall deliver, for which our Conicoply went to Governour Hubbard to get an Account in English he told them there was about seven Corge and an half of Cloth torn in the Washing which he bid him take back and sell it and he wou'd answer any thing that shou'd be lost by it, by which means we have been hinder'd to have an Account ready to be sent you in English. You have wrote us to take care not to deliver any torn Cloth brown in to the Washers, and that if any was torn in washing it wou'd be on the Company's Account but now the people in Fort St. David use us as above related, which causes us to request You'l inform the Governour of Madrass of these affairs and procure his Directions to the Governour of Fort S. David to take such Cloth as shall be torn in Washing on the Company's Account, and give us their Receipt for what Cloth we shall deliver, and to favour and help us in all We have sent considerable sums among the Weavers to provide Nine Caul Cloth and we shall take care to sort it well, and send it to Fort S'. TARHERD FROM IMAUM SAHIB TO MAHOMUD MOCTURE GOVERNOUR OF PUNNARER AND PULLIACAT, OCT. 13TH. 1735.

I have been lately inform'd that the Governour of Madrass's people going and coming to, and from Vizagapatam by the way of Punnaree and Pulliacat, have been often stopp'd by your people for Juncan for which Cause I write to inform you that as there is no difference between the Governour and me, therefore you must not stop or hinder his People on any pretence whatever.

From Subdaraily Cawn to Shedre Busheer Octr. 13th. 1735.

I am inform'd that you have often stoped the people from digging Clay to make bricks for the Govern'. of Madrass wherefore I write you that as soon as you see this my Peravana you shall no more stop or hinder his People, but let every thing be done relating to this Affair as usual.

From the same Person to the same Person Oct 8, 3°. 1735

There is a strict friendship lately settled between me and the Governour of Madiass, and we are as Brothers. I therefore Command you to obey whatever orders you receive from him as you wou'd from myself without any hinderance or interruption in woh. You are to observe this as a strict Taukeed and in all things relating to the Mettow &c. You are to let them go on according to Sallabad, and whatever Taukeeds I have sent you before this you are to act according to the Contents of them.

From Imaum Saib.

DECEMBER 187, 1735.

I have not receiv'd any Letter from your Honour a great while but have often wish'd for them, according to Your Honours desire I have procured Nabob Subturally Cawns three Pervanas to the Hovildar of Pundamulle Country, which I now send to your Honour, and their attested Copys under the seal of the Caujee at Arcot so Your Honour may keep the Originals and send those Copys to the Hovildar. The Nabobs son Subderally Cawn & Chunda Saib have your Honours ffriendship often in remembrance and speak nruch of Your Praise.

Subderally Cawn has lately receiv'd from the Magul's Court the Honour to Command 5000 Horse, a Nagarah and a fflagg was sent him on the Occasion, and he is named Sadatula Cawn and to Chunda Saib the Com[mand] of 2500 Horse and the name of Hussen Doast Cawn. On which it will be proper and look friendly for Your Honour to write them Letters of Congratulation. I desire your Honour will be always believe me as ready to serve in yours as my own affairs.

General Letter from Bombay. General Letter No. 98 dated the 9th. October from the President and Council of Bombay desiring us not to send any ship to Bussorah on Account of the Wars between the Turks and Persians.

Scavinger orderd, to repair the Publick wells The Coroner having reported to the President that he lately sat on the Body of a Child found drown'd in a well, and the like accidents having frequently happen'd of late Years occasion'd by the want of proper Breast works to the said Wells Order'd that the Scavinger do repair such of the Publick Wells as need it so as to prevent the like danger for the future, and that the Tom Tom be beat through the Bounds directing all Persons who have wells in their Grounds and Houses to do the same under Penalty of being punish'd if neglected.

The repairing the Bridges near the Town consider'd of.

The Bridges next the Town and that in the Way to Triplicane being both much out of Repairs in so much that if some care be not taken they will soon be so bad that they will require to be new Built. It was mov'd to consider what means to take for putting them into some tolerable repair, since the fund which used to be appropriated to such Uses namely the Town Conicoplys duty is by the Honourable Court of Directors in their last Letter order'd to be past to the Credit of their Revenues.

There appeared to Board only three ways of doing this, One by an assessment on the Inhabitants; the next by a Duty to be establish'd as a fund for keeping them in a constant repair, the 3d. at the Companys Expence the two former of which have considerable Inconveniences, and difficultys attending 'em. An assessment wou'd make the Inhabitants very uneasie, lest whenever it shou'd be thought proper to undertake any New thing for the use of the place it shou'd be drawn into a Precedent besides that the expence wou'd fall on the Persons imediately Inhabiting here, whose Residence among us is by the necessary state of the Trade, and circumstances of the Place very Uncertain, and new Comers wou'd reap the Benefit of it without being at any part of the Charge. A Duty appropriated for these uses to be levy'd by way of a Toll wou'd in all probability be very difficultly collected and hardly answer since the Bridges are of use only in the Winter Season of the Year when the Waters are high, and therefore the Country People wou'd avoid paying by passing the Rivers without coming to the Bridges in the other Season. And to levy dutys for repairing these Bridges without the Persons who pay the same reaping any advantage thereby as wou'd be the case if any other Method but a Turnpike was made use of, wou'd occasion much murmuring among the Inhabitants of which we find a remarkable Instance in the case of the Scavingers duty which tho' levy'd for their real Benefit is still look'd upon as a Grievance.

Paragraph of the Hobble Court of Directors Letter of the 1th. December 1734 in which they are pleased to order, that a neat Brick house be built of such Dimensions and such a sum of Money be allow'd for the same, and no more as Your Honour &c. shall direct.

We find from the said Letters and Papers that the several Buildings are very much decay'd and particularly the house so as not to be habitable with safety, the setting about which imediately seems to be absolutely necessary, we herewith deliver Your Honour &c. a Plan of such a one as we judge is required at that Place consisting of

a Hall.

2 Chambers for the Resident.

1 Chamber and Closet for the ffactor.

1 Chamber and Closet for the Surgeon.

1 Chamber for the Captain of the Ships or extraordinary use.

1 Warehouse for the Company's Peice Goods.

We are not able to make a just Calculate of the Cost of such a House, as there has been no brick or Chunam as yet made at Moco Moco, but as we suppose this will be Chiefly perform'd by the Company's Slaves it will occasion no further charge than their Labour, and we are of Opinion it will save a very considerable Expence if Teak Timber and plank are used instead of what are procurable there. This will make it durable and lasting, whereas the other is always decay'd and rotten in a few Years, if your Honour &c. so determine the Carpenter and Joiners Work may be Perform'd here & sent over which will lessen the Charge considerably of Workmanship and forward the Building the Boards from the Old House will nigh line the New, so that there will be little occasion for the purchase of Materials on that Coast for the service.

The other Buildings are in so bad a condition that by the time the house is finish'd, they will be entirely decay'd and must be rebuilt, Viz^t.

A Wall of 10 foot high, round the Paggar the fence being now only of Wood and rotten.

A Gateway Corps De Guard & Barrack for the Military,

A Room for the sick,

A Storehouse and Powder Room,

A Lodging for the Officer,

A Cookroom and three Godowns,

besides which there will be required a Pepper Godown and Garbling shed, without which it wou'd be unsafe to have within least the Guard who are generally but few in number shou'd be surprized at any time by the Number of People who come on that Business.

These Buildings are in our opinion sufficient for that Settlement, and are no more than what are required as long as the Company shall think fit to continue a Residency there, and without a place capable of making some Defence their affairs cannot (from the experience we have had of that Country) be carry'd on with any probability of Success, since if the Sultan is not supported in a fast Authority over his people, they will neither be obedient nor regard their Plantations. The Sultan is so sensible of this, that he has seen with Concern the decay of the ffactory Buildings and Paggar, and has often remonstrated to the Gentlemen on the Coast the necessity of haveing them in good order, and that it was of the utmost Consequence to the wellfare of the Company's affairs, By his care and good management, with his Zeal for their Interest in promoting the increase of Pepper, His Country is now in a more flourishing Condition than ever was known but the continueing it in this happy State, will in our Opinion be very precarious, unless these measures are put in Execution.
