Having been in the Sorting Godown Yesterday and this day to view the Vizagapatam and Ingeram Cloth, all that was white of the former was order'd to be sent home on these Ships and the Sallemores from the latter place, but the Long Cloth being not so well cured as it ought to be agreed that the Warehousekeeper keep that Cloth till the last that so as much of it as is not wanted to fill up the tonnage of these two Ships may be rewashed here.

The Izzarees were also orderd home but being compared with the white Gingham made at the petta it was the unanimous opinion of the board not to provide any more of that sort of Cloth at Ingeram since the Ginghams made here are apparently cheaper.

The Committee appointed to examine the accounts of the Company's Vessels deliver in their Report which is read & orderd to be copied after this Consultation.

Report of the Accounts of the Company's Vessels deliver'd in.

The measures taken in the beginning of the last year to prevent engrossing of grain, the supplies in August & Sept<sup>r</sup>. together with plentiful rains this Monsoon on both sides of us and a moderate quantity here having made Paddy considerably cheaper than the last Year, the furnishing the Military was taken into consideration who having been supplied in the dearer times with what was last Year provided for them were content to take it at the same rate the last three months tho it was considerably cheaper because it was laid in for them. But it would be unreasonable to expect the same now when they may purchase what they want fifty  $\text{P}$  Cent cheaper wherefore it was agreed to deliver it to them from this time at 15 Merca  $\text{P}$  pagoda and the Company having five hundred garse on hand laid in agreeable to their repeated Commands to answer any Emergency agreed that the Warehouskeeper provide this year only so much as to keep up that Quantity and that it be done at the cheapest season which it is judged will be on the arrival of the rest of the northern boats now daily coming in.

Then the Promise made the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court of Directors in the Letter by the Prince of Orange relating to the Broad Cloth being taken into consideration, The advantages and disadvantages of selling it at Outcry were debated and the Board agreed as follows

Method of disposing of the Company's Broad Cloth debated.

That Broad Cloth may be sold at Outcry sometimes for a higher price than the Company's Merchants give for it, but that there appears no other possible advantage from it. That on the other hand the disadvantages are

The disadvantages of selling it at outcry.

1<sup>st</sup>. That there must be a long trust and perhaps some bad debts made.

2<sup>nd</sup>. That if we do not always sell by Contract our Merchants will not take it when the price doth not answer at Outcry.

3<sup>rd</sup>. That those who buy at Outcry will buy only for the present demand.

4<sup>th</sup>. That consequently the consumption is not likely to be encreas'd by it.

That selling by Contract has no Inconvenience attending it but a possibility of sometimes getting a larger price at Outcry.

But the advantages of it are

Advantages of selling it by Contract.

1<sup>st</sup>. a Certain Profit to the Company on what sold.

2<sup>nd</sup>. The Consumption also certain.

3<sup>rd</sup>. A Security from bad debts, the goods being kept in our hands till the money is paid.

And if the Governing Moors continue the Method they are this Year fallen into the selling by Contract may very probably encrease the Consumption since if the Nabobs and other great Officers find a profit by buying this Cloth, it is evident they will encourage the use of it and as they pay no juncans in the Country they can afford to sell it cheaper than private merchants can and having always large quantities of money by them they take off large parcells at once.

To this perhaps it may be said that We might deal with the Great Moor men for it ourselves but We can by no means believe our Hoñble Masters would approve of our engaging in transactions with the Government that might possibly be attended with disputes, the Consequences of which no body can foresee, much less avoid, for which reason it has been the Constant Maxim of this place to have no dealings in Trade with them.

Upon the whole it was resolved to continue the present method, unless We should receive Orders from our Hoñble Masters to the Contrary.

## INGERAM RESIDENCY NOVEMBER 1735.

REMARKS on the Ingeram Books ending Ultimo April 1735 compared with those for the preceeding year Viz<sup>t</sup>.

## CHARGES GENERAL.

This Head exceeds the preceeding Year Pagodas 19. 2. 44 as the several Articles inserted under this Head are casual, sometimes more, sometimes less. The Particulars for so small a difference cannot be exactly enumerated but consists chiefly in Peons Batty to Vizagapatam, as also to Peons that bring money from thence.

## ACCOUNT PRESENTS.

This Head exceeds that of the Preceeding Year Pagodas 204. 14. 33 and arises chiefly from the Presents sent to the Nabob by Mr. Simpson, and afterwards other Presents I was obliged to make to him and his people to procure Phirmaunds and Dusticks to be wrote in my name when I came to succeed Mr. Sanderson, this with some Presents to the several Fousdaars and Others, upon the Revolution of Government in these Parts, occasions the difference abovementioned.

## CHARGES EXTRAORDINARY.

This Head exceeds that of the preceeding Year Pagodas 92. 32 and arises from Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Simpson's and Goddard's travelling Charges from Vizagapatam hither, as also from mine, and the Madapollam Peoples Charges from that Factory to this and entertaining eight Peons extraordinary, and people to attend the great Boat during the troubles in these parts.

## ACCOUNT SALARY.

The difference in this article is occasioned by Mr. Goddard's being here.

DIET MONFY & C<sup>a</sup>. ALLOWANCES.

The difference in this Article from that of the preceeding Year is occasioned by an Increase of Company's Servants, Mr. Simpson for two months, and Mr. Goddards continuing here.

## CHARGES MERCHANDIZE.

This Article exceeds that of the preceeding Year Pagodas 64. 33. 15 and arises from a greater number of Bales being sent to Madrass this, than the preceeding Year as also from Freight of Sundry's sent to, and received from Vizagapatam.

## METCHLEPATAM &amp; MADAPOLLAM FACTORY'S.

As this Head is not in the Ingeram Books for the Year 1733, The Expences arise from the Charges at those Factorys for this Year and amount to Pagodas 469. 7. 70.

As you have been pleased to direct us to examine the accounts of the Honble Company's two Vessels employed in the Country under the direction of this Presidency to see if there be any possible way to prevent the Encrease of the Cost of them or to add to their Earnings, and to get such Intelligence of the expence of other Vessels of near the same burthen, We have determined to begin our examination of the Accounts of Ship George from her return from Manaar which was in the year 1730 to which time we find M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard the then Accomptant has made a report about her and of the Madrass Galley from her first Building both which we propose to carry on till the Close of the last books. This account with the remarks naturally arising from it will we hope fully answer the three first directions we have received from Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>., as for the other there are so few Vessels of or near the Size of the Company's Two belonging to any of the Gentlemen here that we fear we shall not be able to give Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. so full satisfaction therein as we could wish.

SHIP GEORGE has made within the space we have limited ourselves to no more than six Voyages and consequently her Expence has considerably exceeded her Earnings, of which that Your Honour &c. may judge the more exactly we here incert the account of each Voyage instead of carrying on the account from year to year as has been usually practis'd. It is as follows.

When this Ship return'd from Manaar we find the account made up to the 30<sup>th</sup>. April 1730, at which time she stood the Honble Company in the Sum of Pag<sup>as</sup>. 15728 28 45

She lay in the road that year unemploy'd till September because the Season of the year would not permit her going to Bencoolen sooner or at least not afore the middle of August and the bad state of the Fort St. David Investment gave no room to employ her between this port and that In this time her Nabor pay amounted for 5 Months to .. All which is added to the Cost of the Ship because the allowance for carrying the Company's goods over to Bencoolen being 1000 Pagodas was omitted to be charged and the freight of private Goods then sent which amounted to about Seventy or eighty Pagodas and was received at Bencoolen was not accounted for till the next voyage.

In June 1731 she return'd to Bencoolen but as at that Season the Southerly Monsoon blows strong she spent several months getting thither, she was employ'd some time on that Coast and in her return in the Northerly Monsoon which obliged her to come the inner passage she met with a Storm wherein she lost all her Masts, Anchors and Cables and was obliged to put back again, the whole time spent in this Voyage including her fitting at and coming up from Vizagapatam was about twenty months.

The Honble Company having by the Ships arrived here in the year 1733 ordered a quantity of Redwood to be purchased for Bombay and those orders arriving after the usual provision was made the additional quantity could not be brought hither till the Europe ships were all gone to the Bay and this Vessel was sent down with it. It was not supposed that the freight of the Redwood would pay the Expence of the Vessel. This was one of those extraordinary services for which in great measure these Vessels are kept and which cannot be perform'd without them however the Expence would not have been very considerable had she not met with a violent storm as she got to the Foot of the Braces in which she had nigh foundered and in which several ships and most of the Sugar Boats in the river were lost and she had six foot Water in her hold.

When the George return'd from Bencoolen the Galley was expected immediately after so there being no necessity to return her thither and the season being too far advanc'd to employ her between this place and Fort St. David. She was sent to Pegu to fetch Timber and plank for the Buildings at Vizagapatam and Fort Marlbrô and orders sent to the former to fill her up with Bales if the Europe Ships could not bring all away.

This Trip was proposed to be compleated by the middle of January but she met with so many Calms & so strong northerly Currents in her passage from Vizagapatam that it took up above three month's more and thereby occasion'd near 400 Pagodas additional Expence, the account as follows:—

This Ballance is not exactly the same as in the General Books because the Freight of private Goods to Bencoolen and some of her Charges there are not brought to account but it is the true one.

It would be a thing utterly impossible for us to compare every Item of these Expences but in the whole we remark That the whole of the disbursements upon her in five years is Pa<sup>s</sup>. 12371. 29. 59 or P<sup>s</sup>. 206. 7. 7 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> month of which Pa<sup>s</sup>. 112. 24. — is wages the rest is the Expence of fitting and her wear & tear which we must say does not appear to us to be extravagant considering the two Storms she met with which occasioned her being refitted twice in this time. When we say this we have regard to the place she is chiefly employ'd at which makes a larger Expence both for wages and Stores necessary than otherwise. The almost constant rains on the West Coast occasions a great deal of sickness among the officers and mates as well as the Lascars and makes a greater number of people necessary to navigate this vessel than would be wanted for other Voyages. The Extreame hard Gales all the Northwest Monsoon occasions the frequent Loss of Anchors & Cables and strain the Vessels exceedingly as they lie in the road besides the rotting of the sails and Rigging by being almost constantly wet. This occasions frequent Supplies of Stores and makes it necessary to refit the Vessels there and when that happens the unskillfulness of the Malay Carpenters, their Idleness and high wages and the great pay of Europe Carpenters if they have an opportunity of getting them enhances the Charge exceedingly.

THE MADRASS GALLEY came from Pegue the beginning of the year 1732. The Expence of Building her as by Mr. Beiriman and Mr. Palmer's accounts is Pag<sup>s</sup>. 2182. 22. 23.

In February 1731-2 she went to Bencoolen and would have been back in reasonable time had not the Negligence of the master occasioned the Loss of her passage and the spending a considerable Time on the Coast here so that she was a whole year on that Trip.

This Conduct occasioned a Resolution of removing him but there was no capable Man then to be got who would accept of it and the President & Council having occasion to return her to the West Coast they were obliged to continue him in the Command of her till they could find a proper man to put in his place.

of which above seven hundred ought to have been charged to the West Coast where she was kept almost twelve months to fetch pepper from the several Quallos which service the Deputy Governour & Council there represent as absolutely necessary as conducing to the encrease of the pepper Plantations by encourag<sup>s</sup>. the people at the several Quallos to set heartily to work when they were assured of having the pepper taken off their hands as they got it ready but in this Service they spent above 1070 Pagod<sup>s</sup>. on the Vessel whereas she earned only 360. —. — Besides Impress paid when she went out which was not all expended when she arrived there and arrears paid on her return besides also wearing out all her Cables so that on her return here she was supplied with four new ones.

The Lyell not arriving on the West Coast till very late the Deputy Governour & Council painted their distress for want of Cash in such Colours as obliged the president & Council to return the Galley back with five Chests of Silver she perform'd the Voyage with a new master in five months.

This Vessel has cost in thirty eight months upwards of five thousand two hundred and thirty five Pagodas or one hundred thirty eight Pagodas  $\text{₹}$  month of which eighty four is Wages so that her expence of Stores though she be but three years old and was or ought to have been compleatly stored when she went her first Voyage has been one month with another Pag. 54 though for all that we do not find she has ever been repaired except a little Caulking and a few Sheathing Boards shifted at Bencoolen so that on her return she was so leaky that it was necessary to send her to Vizagapatam to be refitted.

It was thought that one thousand Pagodas a Trip for the George and six hundred for the Galley for a Voyage to the West Coast with a freight of four  $\text{₹}$  Cent on private Goods would be sufficient to defray the Charges of those Vessels but experience has shown the contrary. This has been in good measure owing to their lying on the West Coast sometimes under a notion of it's being a bad time of the year to return sometimes to be sent up and down the Coast and at others they have been kept for advices. Wherefore we propose,

That positive orders be given to the Deputy Governour & Council there not to detain either of these Vessels any longer than while they are unloading, loading or refitting unless it be necessary to employ them along the Coast or that they are detained for some other Service of Importance and in such case,

That they give the Vessels credit the George two hundred Pagodas Pr. month and the Galley one hundred and forty keeping a head in their Books of affreightment of ship George or of the Madrass Galley as it shall happen which head they must charge for the said allowance and discharge by the Service performed and not as in the last Voyage of the Galley which they kept on the Coast till her Expence was above 1000 pagodas when her Earnings were only 360. —. —.

And because it is troublesome to examine every Item of the Charges placed to the debit of Account Current Fort St. George as expended on those vessels Your Honour &c. will please to direct them to keep a head of each Vessel in their Books debiting such vessel for what expended on her and crediting her for what earned and at her departure to pass the ballance of the said account to Account Current Fort St. George sending Copy of the said account with the Vessel.

That the allowance to the Galley be eight hundred pagodas for a Trip instead of Six.

That the freight of private Goods be collected by the Sea Customer there with the Customs and paid in with them We mention this because the freight due to ship George for her last Voyage was twelve months unpaid.

We have not proposed any additional freight for private Goods four  $\text{₹}$  Cent on piece Goods being as much as is ever paid to or from Pegue, Bengal or the Malabar Coast and sometimes more.

These are all the regulations we can think of for adding to the Earnings of these Vessels except what we are going to propose with regard to their passages to and from the West Coast which is,

That the Vessel be dispatch'd sometime in January the sooner the better by which she will have the northerly winds to carry her cross the Line and be able to return here in May by the Southern passage or the beginning of June.

That she be again dispatch'd to Bencoolen sometime in August so as to get there by the end of September or beginning of October to be dispatch'd from thence so early as to come back by the streights of Sundy, Banca & Malacca in December or the beginning of January.

These passages we look upon as certain and therefore we should think one Vessel sufficient for the service were it not that the Gentlemen at Marlborough have sometimes occasion to keep a Vessel on the Coast and the Vessels often want repair in either of which cases they would be disappointed of the usual supply for one

Voyage and perhaps for a whole year. Whether it be better in such case to run the hazard of getting a Vessel on freight and being at the Expence of it since private people must have a profit for the use of their ships or to keep both these Vessels Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. will please to determine.

We have not mention'd that the Vessels which return by the southern Passage coming empty may call at Fort St. David and take in what Bales may be ready there nor the probability of their making a Trip thither between such return and their new Voyage in the month of August, either of these will be some addition to their Earnings.

These Vessels have by the several accidents mentiond in the former part of this report run up to a prodigious Sum, We think the George will be overvalued at five thousand Pagodas and the Galley at three However we propose those Sums to Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. to fix them at & the rest to be wrote off to Profit and Loss.

And that the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court of Directors may the better judge of the Expence of these Vessels and the Service performd by them We propose further That the accomptant keep the accounts of every Voyage separate in the General Books and carry the gain or loss to that head lessening the value of the Vessels every Voyage so as that when they have occasion for an extraordinary repair or supply of stores they may not exceed the rates abovementioned.

To prevent the Embezzlement or Wast of stores we propose that the master and Chief Mate of the George now here and of the Galley when she comes in do take an exact Inventory of all the stores on board & sign the same to be lodged with the Storekeeper specifying the Condition of the said Stores whether they be new or how far worn.

That on return from a Voyage they do deliver in an account of the Expence of Stores sign'd in the same manner.

That no new Stores be delivered but in the room of those expended or rendered useless.

That all Sails, Cordage &c<sup>t</sup>. that is said to be grown useless brought ashore and surveyed and such of it as may be converted to other uses be sent on board for such uses and the rest sold at Outcry.

That all their Cables, standing and running Rigging and in fine all their Cordage be Europe because Coir will not last above one Voyage the rains on the West Coast rotting it and rendering it perfectly useless and that sort of Cordage will not serve for anything else whereas the Europe when unfit for Cables or Shrouds will lay over again for small ropes or at worst make Junk which the Vessels must be supplied with, and if not this way it must be purchas'd for them which cannot be done under two pagodas & sometimes more  $\text{₹}$  hundred weight and new Cordage doth not stand the Company in above Pag<sup>s</sup>. 3. 18. The difference is not equal to the Cost of Coir.

And whereas it has been found by experience that the Command of these Vessels is not near so advantageous as of other Country Ships and therefore good men when any other Employ offers are hardly to be prevaild on to continue in the Company's Vessels We propose to Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. to give some further Encouragement to the Masters and mates of them. Their present allowance is 1300 Pagodas adventure. This they borrow at Respondentia and if the goods receive no damage in the voyage they may clear 15 or perhaps 20 Pr. There are so few Vessels of the like burthen with these two belonging to this port that we have been able to get account of the Expence of only two The Tryton Galley and the Neptune Brigantine. The owners of the former assure us that she has

stood them one year with another upwards of two thousand six hundred Pagodas Pr. annum. She is of the same burthen with the George and was built in the year 1731. The other has cost her owners only three thousand five hundred and fifty Rupees Pr. annum in a medium of three years, but she was bought immediately after having been compleatly repaired and has not wanted any since besides that she has every year made only one Voyage out of Bengal to Cochin and back again so that she has been always laid up half the year and her people discharged.

Petitioner should be supplied with as much Water as will be sufficient to water all the Paddy fields since that your Petitioner had no manner of use with that, by reason that the Water does not flow to their paddy fields and all their Corn are wither'd for want of Water and your Petitioner has not the benefit of 10 P.  $\text{₹}$  annum by it he was obliged to borrow Pa. 160 last year for to pay the Company and the Company have also been at the Charge of a great deal of money for keeping it in repair more than that Farm will come to and your Petitioner han't been able to pay that rent for the remaining 2 Years because of the Loss sustained thereby besides this there has been several ballance remaining upon the Bound Habitants & your petitioner could not collect it because of the famine.

In these unlucky Circumstances of Credit your Petitioner refers it to your Worship's most serious consideration so far as to quit him that Farm because your Petitioners have been great sufferers thereby,

THE WINDMILL MASTERS REPORT CONCERNING THE NECESSARY REPAIR OF THE WINDMILL.

FIRST there requires a Bank to be raised round the mill about 6 foot high that the Sails may be handled without a Ladder.

SECONDLY, the four Vains are made too flat & thereby receiving the wind too full doth not discharge it quick enough out again which prevents them moving Swiftly round, whereas if the Vains were sloped a little more the Wind would play quicker out and in & drive them faster round.

THIRDLY The main axletree neck on which the Vains are fasten'd is made so thin that a great Blast of wind would endanger it's breaking but if the stool which supports it was shifted near the Vains the neck would be thereby shorter and by so much the more stronger.

FOURTHLY the main axletree will be too short by reason two wheels and the Water-Roll &c. must be mov'd lower down for the Water is convey'd ten foot above the Ground which is not only needless but loads the water Roll with more weight than is convenient and makes it move more slowly round but note the old axtetree will serve for a Beam of which there are only five whereas there ought to be six.

FIFTHLY the least of the Wheels requires a new axletree the old one being much shorter than the diameter of the said wheel makes it jump out of it's place and always unsteady.

SIXTHLY The Cistern or Receiver of the Water standing within the Water-Roll could not be made bigger than the Circumference of the said water Roll would admit of whereby being too small it always loses much Water for when the Mill goes fast round the Buckets are swiftly conveyed over the Cistern before they can discharge the Water into it or if the Mill goes slow they begin to empty themselves before they arrive at the receiver but if the said Cistern be removed under the Water Roll it may be made big enough to receive all the Spray of the Water without spilling to do which there must be made a new Axletree to the Water Roll. By these alterations 'tis believ'd the Mill may be kept in due order and always discharge double the quantity of Water it did at First the Expencc of which is computed to cost about two hundred Pagodas little more or less.

According to the Deputy Governour's order I have examined the Windmill and to the best of my judgment find what the Manager of that Machine requires to put it into the order it ought to be is necessary but I beleive 'twill exceed the charges he hath calculated it at besides Mens Labour of drawing water is so cheap here and their way so expeditious that a Mill never so well made will not perform the work so cheap, for I have seen six men with three baskets fling out the Water faster than the Mill could supply a Receiver made for a Trial of it's performance.

Petitioner should be supplied with as much Water as will be sufficient to water the Paddy fields since that your Petitioner had no manner of use with that, by reason that the Water does not flow to their paddy fields and all their Corn are wither'd for want of Water and your Petitioner has not the benefit of 10 P.  $\text{r}$  annum by it was obliged to borrow Pa<sup>r</sup>. 160 last year for to pay the Company and the Company have also been at the Charge of a great deal of money for keeping it in repair more than that Farm will come to and your Petitioner han't been able to pay that rent for the remaining 2 Years because of the Loss sustained thereby besides this there has been several ballance remaining upon the Bound Habitants & your petitioner could not collect it because of the famine.

In these unlucky Circumstances of Credit your Petitioner refers it to your Worship's most serious consideration so far as to quit him that Farm because your Petitioners have been great sufferers thereby,

Who as in duty bound shall ever pray.

**THE WINDMILL MASTERS REPORT CONCERNING THE NECESSARY REPAIR OF THE WINDMILL.**

FIRST there requires a Bank to be raised round the mill about 6 foot high that the Sails may be handled without a Ladder.

SECONDLY, the four Vains are made too flat & thereby receiving the wind too full doth not discharge it quick enough out again which prevents them moving Swiftly round, whereas if the Vains were sloped a little more the Wind would play quicker out and in & drive them faster round.

THIRDLY The main axletree neck on which the Vains are fasten'd is made so thin that a great Blast of wind would endanger it's breaking but if the stool which supports it was shifted near the Vains the neck would be thereby shorter and by so much the more stronger.

FOURTHLY the main axletree will be too short by reason two wheels and the Water-Roll &c<sup>t</sup>. must be mov'd lower down for the Water is convey'd ten foot above the Ground which is not only needless but loads the water Roll with more weight than is convenient and makes it move more slowly round but note the old axletree will serve for a Beam of which there are only five whereas there ought to be six.

FIFTHLY the least of the Wheels requires a new axletree the old one being much shorter than the diameter of the said wheel makes it jump out of it's place and always unsteady.

SIXTHLY The Cistern or Receiver of the Water standing within the Water-Roll could not be made bigger than the Circumference of the said water Roll would admit of whereby being too small it always loses much Water for when the Mill goes fast round the Buckets are swiftly conveyed over the Cistern before they can discharge the Water into it or if the Mill goes slow they begin to empty themselves before they arrive at the receiver but if the said Cistern be removed under the Water Roll it may be made big enough to receive all the Spray of the Water without spilling to do which there must be made a new Axletree to the Water Roll. By these alterations 'tis believ'd the Mill may be kept in due order and always discharge double the quantity of Water it did at First the Expence of which is computed to cost about two hundred Pagodas little more or less.

N<sup>o</sup>. 34 from the president and Council of Bombay dated 10<sup>th</sup>. March telling us they will not send the Richmond unless in case of necessity round this way.

Bombay.

Then the President addressed himself to the board to the following purport.

GENTLEMEN

There have lately happened two Cases here which I think necessary to lay before you for your consideration and determination thereupon. The One is my having confin'd a Guzzarat Merchant on a complaint from the Country. The other an Arrest out of the Mayors Court served on the person of a Polligar, an Inhabitant indeed of ours but at the time of serving the said Arrest being in the Moors territories. As the former of these may possibly be represented as a breach of the Rules prescribed by the Royal Charter, and my interposing in the other as an Infringement of the Rights of the Mayor's Court, I shall give you an account of the several Circumstances attending each of them and you will come to such a determination upon them as you shall judge reasonable.

The first of these Cases is as follows.

Sometime in January last notice was brought me that one Moal Chund a Guzzarat Merchant of this place was missing and gone off, as it was said, upwards of thirty thousand Pagodas in debt to the Arcot Shroffs and several others. Among many particulars which were told me at that time relating to his disappearing it was said that the night before Amboidoss one of his Creditors had been at his house carried many things away, several blows were given and Moal Chund was heard to groan this last Circumstance relating a Suspicion of foul play I order'd strict Enquiry to be made after Moal Chund till being assured by some persons of good Credit that he was alive and well but retired out of the Bounds I did not think myself obliged to take any notice of what had passed without some regular Complaint should be made me knowing it was an usual and common way of proceeding among these country people. But

the 2<sup>d</sup>. of February I received a Letter from Moal Chund complaining of the Usage he had receiv'd from Amboidoss which by this means I was obliged to take notice of, however considering how tender the credit of the shroffs is I would not send for Amboidoss to the Fort, but ordered the Poligar to send to his house to tell him the nature of his Complaint and that he must name securities for his continuing in the bounds after which I told the Messenger that brought the Letter I would take care Amboidoss should be forthcoming, but for the Letter of Licence Moal Chund must himself settle that with his Creditors. I heard nothing further of Moal Chund or his Affairs till some time after I saw him in discourse with several other Merchants in the Fort and enquiring how long he had been in the Bounds was answered That he came in two days after his Letter by consent of his Creditors who had all of them settled their accounts with him and agreed upon the time for their being paid, and indeed I concluded it had been so having often seen him since in Company with Amboidoss and Shankara Parreek's Gomastas. But six days ago I receiv'd a Letter from Emaum Sahib by a Horseman who at the same time brought another to Hodjee Addy. So soon as the Horseman had deliver'd me the Letter I gave him the customary Answer that I would get it translated expecting upon that he would have withdrawn but he told me he was acquainted with the purport of the Letter which related to a demand his Master had upon Moal Chund arising from a sum of Money lent him by the hands of Suncara Parreek's Gomastas (who came with him) and as his Message and the Letter he brought, could not be long a secret he hoped I would order Mual Chund into Custody, lest he should withdraw himself out of the Bounds and make his Escape out of the Province. Upon this I asked Shankara Parreek's Gomastas if they had made any application to me or elsewhere and been denied all that was necessary for their Security that they should give Emaum Sahib the trouble of writing me a Letter. I asked them the Question in such a manner that I found by their Answer they understood what I meant by it. They told me they had no intention to give Emaum Sahib or me the trouble of that Letter and had only wrote to Shankara Parreek the state of the Case and desired his Directions whether they should apply to me, but he had given them no other answer than that they should not concern themselves further about it till they heard from him again and that they were ignorant of the moneys being Emaum Sahib's or of any Intention to apply to him.

Then the Several Letters being read the President went on in Substance as follows.

The Case being new and of which there was no precedent since the coming out of the Charter I began to be in doubt whether I had authority to commit Mual Chund to Custody, but considering the Exigency of the Affair, and that by too fearfull an Attachment to the forms of the Law, the Peace of the place and the Company's Affairs might be brought into danger; I did no longer hesitate only out of Compassion to Mual Chund who had made so considerable a figure among the Merchants I asked Emaum Sahib's Messenger and the Gomastas of Shankara Pareek if they would be contented with his being in the Custody of the Poligar, to which they consenting I sent an officer with them to his house, where they found him at home and from thence they carried him to the Poligar.

By the antient Rules of the place no Inhabitant is to have any dealings or Correspondence with the Country Government without special Licence, nor are they to make any application to the Governing Moors in any matter or dispute arising in the bounds. But Mual Chund might in this Case have pleaded that he dealt with Shankara Pareek's Gomastas as Merchants Inhabitants living under our protection, and as such under no obligation to enquire whose money they traded with and Shankara Pareek's Gomastas might urge that it was well known when they came down here whose agents they were and that it could not be wondered at if they corresponded with and were subject to the orders of their principals, and that if it was a breach of our Laws they ought to have been told so when they came down and not suffered to settle in the Town. But the Alteration in the Circumstances of the place has made a dispensation in some sort necessary, for if we were to keep up to the strictness of the old Rules we should drive almost all the moneys'd Men out of the place,

what the Consequence of that would be may be easily guess'd, as money is as much the Sinews of Trade as of War and I suppose it is very well known now that almost all the Trade of the place is circulated by means of the Arcot money and the Credit our Inhabitants have with the Shroffs, and besides that their money is the chief Support of the trade of the place, there is another principal advantage we receive by it, that I suppose will be easily guessed at without naming it.

This being the State of the Case it remains to be considered what method we ought to follow not only upon the present occasion but all others that are attended with the like Circumstances. It has been a point much debated of late whether any person since the coming out of the Charter can be taken up for debt except by Warrant issuing out of the Mayor's Court. But, besides that it often happens that by the Forms of the Court it may be some days before a Warrant can be taken out, we are not certain that the Moors would submit to follow a process there, but if they should consent thereto, yet many things might occur which would give us infinite uneasiness, for though at present I think we are upon so good terms with the Mayor's Court that I am willing to hope they would make all possible dispatch in bringing such a Suit to an Issue, yet we cannot be always sure of such a disposition and if it should ever happen that the Majority of that Court should be composed of persons of a malignant disposition towards the Interest of the Company or actuated by prejudices against the Company's Agents, it is very easy to foresee the trouble and confusion not only the Company's Affairs but the whole place might be involved in. I suppose it is well known how much it is in the breast of the Court to prolong the time before any Suit is finished and a message from the Board if the Court are not rightly disposed would rather occasion a greater delay than quicken their proceedings.

But to consider it a little further if we should admit what (by the way) we have very little reason to do namely that the Moors should have patience to wait the Progress of any of their Actions through our Courts, yet should it be put into the Heads of the defendants that they might appeal to England, I believe it is very easy to conceive what effect it would have upon the Moors and how they would receive any notice that in such Case must be given them that they must follow the Appeal to England; I believe there can be no doubt but they would think they had shewn sufficient Complaisance in demanding Justice of the Company's Agents and that being refused them they would immediately make a peremptory demand of the debtor to be delivered up to them, and as they always deliver up our debtors I see not with what Equity we could refuse to deliver up theirs, and there would be much to justify any measures which they should resolve on to oblige us to it.

The other Affair I mentioned to you is this.

Some days ago the Mayor came with a complaint to me that one of the Court Serjeants going with a Warrant to arrest an Inhabitant of Cattawauk a number of the other Inhabitants together with some peons belonging to the Moors had beat the Serjeant and rescued the prisoner. Whilst I was considering what orders to give upon the occasion, the Court Serjeant came in to confirm M<sup>r</sup>. Mayor's account of the Matter only with this difference which indeed was a very material one that he had arrested the Man in Trivitash a Village not two Miles from the Fort but out of the Company's bounds, upon which I told both the Mayor and Serjeant that though the Charter did say the Jurisdiction of the Court should extend ten Miles yet I supposed it was to be understood and provided that the Company's Bounds had the same Extent; but however that might be I was sure the Moors would not suffer the Mayor's warrants to pass in their Territories and therefore they would do well to confine their Jurisdiction within that of the Company's. Whilst the Mayor was yet with me a Messenger came in from the Hovildar of Pullamulee complaining that whilst he was at Trivitash settling some matters with the Poligar of some of their Towns; a White man came there, used the Poligar very ill, by giving him several Blows and seemed determined upon worse treatment if he had not interposed to prevent it, and desired that I would give orders that such things might not be done again, I dismissed the Messenger with an answer that I would enquire into it.

About six the next morning the Poligar came to me. The account he gave of himself was That he and his Ancestors had for many generations been Poligars of twenty five Villages under the Moors, three of which namely Cattawauk, Sautangot and Ernore were about twenty years ago granted by the Mogul to the Company, That these being the farthest Villages from us and separated from all the rest of our bounds he had very rarely come to Madrass and was quite ignorant of our Laws and Customs and this trouble that was now brought upon him was at the Instigation of the persons who rented those Villages of the Company, with whom, he had some difference and who being better acquainted with the methods of proceeding among us, had taken this way to distress and insult him. The Poligar added that when the Serjeant came to him he was busy with the Hovildar of the Pullamulee Country examining into a Robbery that had happened in one of their Villages that he told the Serjeant he would go with him when he had done, but the Serjeant laid hold of him to carry him away immediately and gave him several Blows with a Cane, the marks of which were very visible when I saw him, and that the Serjeant would have suffered more from the Moors for his attempt to carry him away if he himself had not interposed. The Poligar then delivered me a petition containing some Complaints of the hardships he had suffered from the Company's Renters, who, I suppose, having some Intelligence of it (for it seem'd to have been wrote some days before) were the more earnest to have him arrested to prevent his delivering of it. I shall say nothing here of the Action commenced against him in the Mayor's Court, because it is possible it may come before us in another manner. Neither indeed do I recollect much of the petition having a few hours after delivered it to the Mayor to whom I took notice at the same time that I thought the Arrest was irregular and contrary to the constant Rule and practice of the place, which exempted all the Poligars from any Arrest establish'd upon very good consideration and to avoid the Consequences which might attend their being taken into Custody, besides that the Case of this man was differently circumstanced being Poligar but of three of our Villages and of twenty two belonging to the Moors who would probably claim him out of an opinion that they had a greater right in him. But otherwise the thing in dispute being only a title to a small piece of ground of no greater value than twenty or twenty five Pagodas had it been any body else the necessity of an arrest did not seem to be very urgent and the directions with the Charter were plainly against it. The Poligar appearing in Court some days after to defend his Title, the Court began to examine him touching what happened at Trivitash, an Enquiry certainly that was very improper, because the Arrest being out of the Company's bounds, it is not in our power to support them in it. Before the Court rose they committed him to prison where he remain'd till about six in the Evening when he was discharged after paying forty six fanams and then he came to me and complained of it as a matter that was a Shame and Disgrace to him and the more so as being done in the sight of his people. The Mayor being with me again the next morning I asked him how it could be that the Court had treated the Poligar in the manner they had done after all that I had said to him myself. The Mayor replied that when the Poligar appeared in Court they did design to have decided the dispute between him and the plaintiff that very day but some difficulties arising that could not then be cleared up and being twelve at noon some of the Aldermen cried out Let him give Bail and answer and adjourning immediately upon it, he believ'd the Marshal might have taken him into Custody, but did not know that he was imprisoned till the Evening when a person came from him to be his Bail. To avoid all further dispute I was willing to take M<sup>r</sup>. Mayor's account of the matter, but told him that when the Council met I believed they would take it into consideration and think themselves obliged to make some order upon it to prevent the Consequences which might follow if it should be drawn into Precedent.

The Board having seriously considered these two Cases approved the taking of Mual Chund into Custody and desired the purport of what the President had said upon the occasion might be enter'd upon Consultation as our reasons for the same that the Company may judge thereof and that they be desired in our next general Letter to give us directions in all Cases of the like nature which may happen in future.

The measures taken by the President in Mual Chund's affair approved.

As to the other Affair, The ill Consequences which may ensue from the breach of the old Rules of the place establish'd for many and very good reasons induced the Board to come to the following resolutions thereupon.

Resolutions of the Board on the Affair of the Poligar of Catawauk.

ORDER'D That no Sheriff do serve any Warrant of Arrest or Execution upon the person of the Poligar of Madrass or any of the Poligars of the Villages nor upon their dwelling Houses where they keep their Prisoners nor upon any of the Duties due and payable to them for the Guard and safety of the Town & Villages.

No warrant to be served on any of the Poligars.

ORDER'D also That the Sheriff do repay to the Poligar of Catawauk the Sum of forty six fanams taken from the said Poligar by the Sheriff's officers for prison fees.

Sheriff to repay the fees taken by his officers from the Poligar of Catawauk.

The last parcel of Cloth receiv'd from Fort St. David by the Ramah having been examined yesterday the Board made the following remarks thereon which it is AGREED to write thither and to tell them at the same time that we will on no pretext whatever consent to receive any more Sallem Long Cloth below N<sup>o</sup>. 3.

Remarks on the cloth from Fort St. David.

That the Major part of this parcel of Cloth is sorted to N<sup>o</sup>. 3 & 4 though only a N<sup>o</sup>. 2 was agreed to by Contract.

That the indulging the Merchants in a N<sup>o</sup>. 4 has encouraged them to bring in great quantities of the lower Sorts.

That we were made to believe the quantity of N<sup>o</sup>. 4 was not above 45 Bales though it now appears to be upwards of 160.

That the like has been practised with regard to Andiapa's Cloth there being in the last parcel only one Bale N<sup>o</sup>. 1 and eight Bales of N<sup>o</sup>. 2 whereas there are twenty eight of N<sup>o</sup>. 3 and twenty five Bales of N<sup>o</sup>. 4.

For a long time I was an Inhabitant and Merchant of Madrass under your Honour's Protection during the time of my dealings there I borrow'd several Sums of money of other merchants. It happened that I fell very ill and my Creditors demanded of me to shew them some certain Effects answerable to my debts upon which I made with them some agreem<sup>t</sup>. and Securities when one Amboidoss a Creditor of mine came one night and pulled away the Key of my Chest from me and would not permit my People to come near him; he beat me and with three or four people he brought with him took out the Jewels and every thing that was in the Chest, made them up into a bundle and carried them away with him, together with my signet, as I knew I could not then by his bringing this disgrace upon me satisfy my Creditors I concluded it would be best to make my Escape I now pray Your Honour will therefore send for me and settle me in my habitation in Madrass and assist me in making Amboidoss restore my Effects and prevail with the Merchants from whom I have received money to grant me their Cowle to discharge their several demands in some appointed time when I shall apply myself to Your Honour and acquaint you more particularly of all my Affairs.

FROM EMAUM SAHIB

APRIL THE 13<sup>TH</sup>.

Some time ago I lent a large sum of money to Shankaraparreek who now informs me that he has delivered that money to Mool Chund on account of Merchandize, who sometime ago out of ill designs left Madrass and afterwards on his return did design a second time to have made his Escape; As Your Honour and myself are as one, what is mine & what is Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. is the same wherefore I desire you to favour me in sending for the said Mool Chund and ordering him to pay what shall appear due to me on settling accounts. Please to inform me often of your Welfare.

FROM THE SAME PERSON TO HODJEE ADDEE

Laulasue has inform'd me of the Affair relating to Mool Chund and of the money given into his hand by Shankaraparreek which he attempted to make his Escape with: I have wrote to the Governour thereupon and desired him to look upon my money as his own and get it paid I hope you will also regard it as yours and endeavour the recovery of it I have sent Meer Mahomud Ally to make up accounts with Mool Chund.

The Jenny Snow arriving last night not having been able to make her passage to the Malabar Coast the Master of her was called before the Board and gave the following account of his Passage and the reasons which induced him to return Viz<sup>t</sup>.

From the 28<sup>th</sup>. of February (the day we left the land) untill the 5<sup>th</sup>. March had S. E winds and a northerly Current being then about four degrees off shoar and having light Easterly winds made what hast towards Zeloan if possible before the full moon but it prov'd the 16<sup>th</sup>. before we saw the Friar's Hood, strong N<sup>ly</sup>. Currents & faint winds for several days the 19<sup>th</sup>. a Gale at N. E blew for about 24 hours which carried us within 25 Leagues of Point de Gall, the S. W most part of Zeloan, which we endeavour'd to weather but to no purpose; the aforementioned Gale at N. E dying away it set in to blow at W & W. N. W very hard and a contrary Current that by endeavouring to gain anything in shore was to no purpose; nothing remained that could give us any prospect of weathering Zeloan but stretching off while the Winds were to the Northward of the West knowing that Monsoon would soon set in at W. S. W hoping to reap the advantage of the shift of wind as also possibly to have met with a Vein at S. E which has been known at Sea later, the shift from W. N. W to W. S. W was the only thing that happened according to our Expectations (all other helps fail'd us) 5 days after we put off being near the Equinoctial when the wind changed about to the Southward, we had hopes of weathering of Zeloan even with this according to our dead Reckoning we should have been able to have laid it in with the Malabar

Coast & 45 Leagues to Windward of it, but to our great disappointm<sup>t</sup>. the Currents (being the only thing we had any occasion to dread) prov'd against us and instead of fetching in with the Coast as imagined, did not gain above 5 Leag<sup>s</sup>. to windward of the place I put off from, so by a just Calculation the Current had set us to the Eastward near 90 Leagues; nothing remained to be done after such a series of Disappointments; we kept beating off and on Zeloan untill our provisions were expended and water grew short and finding no shift of wind on the full moon in April and losing ground daily 5 & 6 Leagues on the 14<sup>th</sup>. April bore away for Madrass.

The Company's two Gardens formerly let to Mahaudeu and Perseramah having been taken from them on account of their backwardness in paying their rent and relet the 1<sup>st</sup>. of January this year on promise of putting the said Gardens in good repair, The Paymaster was ORDERED to make an Estimate of what is necessary to be done and the Charge of doing it and to lay the same before the Board next Consultation.

Estimate of the charge [of] repairing the Compy's Gardens ordered to be laid before the Board.

The Painters having been several times before the Board to agree on a price for painting the Bengal Cloth, it was this day fixed at twenty eight 28 Pagodas the Corge on condition that they be permitted to tear the Cloth in two pieces because the Length and weight of it makes it very difficult to paint them whole, the wax being in such large pieces very apt to crack and by that means the Blue dye to run into the ground and spoil the Cloth which is more easily prevented in lighter pieces. It was also agreed that there be always three half pieces of one Muster.

The price of painting the Bengal Cloth agreed on.

Pursuant to order of the 25<sup>th</sup>. March the Storekeeper, Import Warehousekeeper and Steward deliver in their accounts of what Goods under their care they judge proper to be sold as entered after this Consultation, which being examined the Board ORDERED as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Storekeeper, Impo. Wareh<sup>o</sup>. keep<sup>r</sup>. & Steward deliver in their acco<sup>ts</sup>. of things useless & proper to be sold.

That all the particulars in the Storekeeper's account be sold for the most they will fetch.

Orders made thereupon.

That the large anchors lying here be sent as Conveyances offer to Bengal.

And the useless and worn out Arms by the first ship to England.

That the Gold belonging to the Gold Horse Furniture be taken off and melted down.

That such of the horse Furniture as can be made serviceable for some time longer be kept and the rest sold at Outery.

That the House ffurniture worn out be sold and that new Chairs be provided for the Offices, Sea Gate, Sorting Godown &c<sup>t</sup>. in the room of the old ones now to be sold.

That the several particulars mentioned in the Steward's List as destroyed be wrote off the Books.

That the Druggets and Camblets and the Remnants of Broad Cloth, Velvets and the damaged Emboss'd Cloth and Duroys be sold at Outery.

That the Looking Glasses in the Fort and Garden House and the Carpets in the Consultation room be passed to the head of House ffurniture.

The Cloth lately received from Andiapa both here and at Fort St. David proving very ordinary in so much that almost all of it has been sorted to N<sup>o</sup>. 3 & 4 and of one hundred and sixty seven Bales received at the latter place we turn'd out forty on reviewing it here and his servants not being able or inclined to make any allowance for the same: the President was desired to direct Coja Petrus (by whom we have hitherto dealt with Andiapa) to expostulate with him thereupon and to tell him that the Cloth is now so bad, that from the cheapest it is become the dearest Cloth on the Coast, That we must have a considerable amendment in the Fabrick or else there must be a proportionable abatement in the price, for that we can in no wise answer taking the Cloth he now provides at the present rates.

Comands your Petitioner officiated and behaved himself in the said Employ with all due diligence using his utmost endeavours towards procuring the Cloth contracted for within the limited time, which your petitioner being encouraged to perform through Your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. favour and protection But your Petitioner upon perusing and examining the accounts found that it was no ways conducive to his advantage but great difficulties attending it even in the discharge of the money received of the Hoñble Company, Therefore if Your Honour will be pleased to order that the prices of the Cloth may not be accounted on their numbers even as it was in Governour Pitt's time It will thereby enable your Pet<sup>r</sup>. to serve in the Hoñble Company's service for sometime more.

That if your Hon<sup>r</sup>. please to comply with the beforementioned request It will render it effectually good and answer the end desired; otherwise Your petitioner most humbly represents that he will lay before you a just and true accompt of the prices of the said Cloth bought of the Weavers with the charges incident thereon to convince Your Honour and humbly prays that Your Honour will be graciously pleased only to allow him 5  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent Commission for his care and management of the said business and also for being answerable for all ballances standing out from the Weavers which will enable Your Petitioner to carry on and discharge his trust.

And in reference to the Washers they have been much distress'd labouring under great difficulties for the want of subsistence, by reason their cooly allowance has not been sufficient for their maintenance which consequently occasioned frequent demurrs in the discharge of their business. Whereas if they had a competent allowance it would disengage them from any other Employ, thereby inducing them closely to adhere to their proper calling, And as Your Honour was pleased to appoint 8 measures of Rice to be laid in congeing every 10 pieces of Cloth at 4 Measures from the Washers and 4 from the Merchants, whereof if your Hon<sup>r</sup>. shall please to favour them by causing the value of the said 4 measures given by the Washers to be paid by the Hoñble Company it would sufficiently answer their desired end for a reasonable maintenance thereby capacitating them punctually to discharge their duty of washing and congeing the Cloths and all possible care would be taken that no torn Cloths should happen so much as of late happened, and all proper care would be used to prevent

embezzlement of the Cloth, Wherefore your petitioner humbly hopes your Hon<sup>r</sup>. will be pleased to grant the same for them poor Creatures which will then enable them to allow and assist something more to the Beaters, whose Cooly Allowance at present is also not sufficient for their Livelihood.

Your petitioner further entreats your honour to receive the turn'd out Cloth at the prices affixed in the accompanying List.

The money advanc'd to your Petitioner does not answer the full or before hand Allowance to the Weavers for weaving a large Quantity of Cloth by reason your Pet<sup>r</sup>'s money being laid out upon several Weavers Sets as ballances some upon Torn Cloths and some upon the Turn'd out Cloth. Therefore your Petitioner desires an advance of ten thousand Pagodas more for the punctual discharging his duty for the hoñble Company, even for the money he has been advanced, which he doubts not of Your Honour's favourable Compliance.

## THE PETITION OF THE WASHERS

HUMBLY SHEWETH

Whereas your petitioners having faithfully served the Honble Company in washing their Cloth from the first establishment of this place which they were the better enabled to perform by their having in constant Employ between 4 & 5 hundred able and sufficient persons of their Cast to carry on and discharge the said business effectually, but your Petitioners are sorry to acquaint Your Honour that by means of the constant famines which have happened for these ten or eleven years past their Cooley or allowance from the Hoñble Company has not been sufficient for their Subsistence after the usual Charges incident thereon were defrayed, which we shall acquaint Your Honour with hereafter, and also that the Rice for some time was so scarce and dear that it could not be procured under  $\frac{1}{4}$  or  $\frac{1}{2}$  measure for a Fanam, so through these and the like Exigencies they were entirely disabled to support themselves and families provisions &c<sup>t</sup>. being so scarce that induced a great number of their people to desert their habitations and take refuge in other parts where provisions were cheaper many having sold themselves, wives & Children and many likewise embarked themselves on several Vessels to divers places together with a great mortality amongst them which has reduced them to the small number of about 100 Men By whom your Petitioners assure Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. it is morally impossible to carry on and discharge their whole duty of washing the Cloth also another difficulty arises which further disables your Petitioners in completing the whole business is that in former times the Long Cloth weigh'd but 10 to 11 lb  $\text{p}^{\text{ce}}$ . which was more easy for a man to hold and wash it, especially in such times when they had provisions cheap they were the stronger to perform it whereas of late years the Long Cloth provided has been of between 13 & 14 lb.  $\text{p}^{\text{ce}}$ . which in such time of scarcity reduced your petitioners in their strength so much that they found it impossible for a single man to hold a piece of Cloth of that burthen & wash it effectually.

HONBLE SIR, Your poor petitioners most humbly crave leave to represent to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. that the Washers at Fort St. David, Porto Novo & Vizagapatam have larger privileges and larger benefits to support themselves out of their allowances by reason of their having rivers of good and fresh water proper for washing of Cloths and their places being near to the woods, whereby they are likewise gainers in purchasing the several Ingredients required in washing, as soap, Chinam, Choud, Goat's dung, Fuel &c<sup>t</sup>. But as our river being not so good water your Petitioners are obliged to be at the trouble and expence of having water for their purpose drawn out of the wells & that your Pet<sup>r</sup>. allowance from the honble Company being only but P. 1. 5 for every Corge of Long Cloths washing your petitioners crave leave to set forth the charges incident thereon which they defray as follows.

The said P<sup>s</sup>. 1. 5 was the rate allowed to your Petitioners when there was a garce of paddy sold for 5 or 6 Pagodas or thereabouts but by reason of the severe famines aforementioned together with the desertion and Deaths of so many, your petitioners are reduced to such extreme poverty and to so small a number of hands that they are intirely incapable of maintaining themselves & families & likewise not in a Capacity of discharging their duty of washing the Cloth effectually.

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. will be pleased further to consider that since the Paddy sells at 17 or 18 Mercals  $\text{₹}$ . Pag<sup>a</sup>. through Your Hon<sup>r</sup>'s favour to the poor souls in general, Yet the Merchants account for the half share of congeing the Cloths before mentioned at or between 8 & 10 Mercals  $\text{₹}$  Pagoda. Besides that some years ago when Grain was dear Your Petitioners were always favoured by the Honble Company through their Warehousekeeper with the free Gift of 2 or 3 Garce of Paddy.

Your Petitioners therefore most humbly entreat Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. will be graciously pleased to take into your most serious Consideration their miserable and distressed condition and only be pleased to forbid the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. from receiving money for the half share of congeing the Cloths that thereby your Petit<sup>r</sup>s. may receive their full allowance of Pa. 1. 5 for every Corge of Long Cloths without any such deduction by the

Merchants which will enable your Petit<sup>rs</sup>. to procure more hands and to compleat their business effectually, and it will be but just sufficient to relieve them out of their present Calamities.

That the Fort St. David Merchants will provide only one thousand Bales and insist on advanc'd prices for them.

That the man is secure and that by an Experience of many years both in the Company's and our own Affairs we have learn'd that no goods can be provided without advances of money.

Debates

To this it was objected that the Company was very unwilling to have large advances in the Merchants hands lest sometime or other a loss should happen therefrom whereupon the General Books for many years were called for and the following differences between the former times and these were remarked.

First That the Merchants when they contracted for the Broad Cloth had it delivered them immediately to the amount of Sixty or seventy thousand Pagodas for which they gave no security and the money arising from the daily sale thereof was by them employed in the Company's Investment which enabled them to go on vigorously since they had such large Sums in their hands without paying any Interest for it. But now they are obliged to bring the money before they can take a piece of Cloth, out of the Warehouse whereby they are deprived of the benefit of all that money.

That the depriving them of this advantage is not all the injury they suffer by the keeping the Cloth in our hands, but their Credit (which formerly when the Company trusted them thus largely was so good that they could not only find money for the Investment, but even were able to raise any sums in Town and lend the same to the Company) is now so sunk by the distrust the Company shew of them that no body will lend them any money and it therefore lies solely on the Company to do it.

That the large penalties inflicted on them in the year 1725 has compleated the loss of their credit in the town since no body dares to lend them any money lest another accident of the same kind should disable them to pay what should be so lent.

We receiv'd your Letter by the Tappies and observed the Contents; You therein write us that your Intent for employing us in the Company's business is for our own credit and honour and not any advantage to yourself, that others have thought good to be at some Expence to gain the credit of doing the Company's business & what Expence you require to know that ever we have been at for it, that if the Company's money is delivered out any body will provide Goods for it, it's very true that we do esteem the Company's Trade only as a credit to our Names and know that it is no ways profitable to you. We to give you pleasure send our money into the country among the Weavers and provide Cloth rather better than other Merchants and when it comes in we sort it once over at Punnaretty and turn out what we think fit and deliver the good at Cuddalore according to your direction afterwards you wrote us to let it be sorted by the white men there which we also have done and they have sorted it also and taken what they liked and turned out the bad, and though we have taken this trouble sorted it ourselves & turned out what was bad, had it sorted at Cuddalore and turn'd out the bad, and advanced our money among the Weavers, yet when it arriv'd at Madrass it was not esteemed good but thin & bad upon their looking it over Such is our fortune! We from the first of this Affair lived here as your people and have done our business with the greatest truth and according to your direction, We have to the utmost of our power behaved in your Affairs so as to please you, but in such a manner as before we have never practiced nor will not do it nor know not how to go about it; It is well known through the whole Country that we are your people and have got that name but the Company's business has occasioned large ballances to be standing out upon the Weavers and we are also very great sufferers by the turn'd out Cloth not being disposed of, since it's so let it be, but when we design to please you by doing our business well we are told the Cloth is not good but thin and find your mind dissatisfied, if we gain or lose it's the same as to yourself for we look upon you as our Parent. We beleive during the 1000 years of your Life you will not deny any thing to us which is our constant prayers to God and it's well known to all the Country we are not mistaken in this the Company's Trade is extensive as the sea and that they will not want any thing, if they do but advance their money, there is people enough ready to provide goods for them and it's not to be thought that if we don't provide for them that they will want or their business be delayed, all the goods that we provide them if they but think they want it would be provided in three days time; by our being so much concerned with a large place our business on all sides is lessened and occasions our writing so much to you though all these matters are not unknown to you. That if there were Merchants at Vizagapatam of Wealth & Credit & upon whose probity & Circumstances we cou'd have an Entire dependance there can be no doubt we might have a very Considerable share of all the Cloth made between Gangam and Narsipore without being at the Charge of so many Settlements, but we have too much reason to beleive that the slow progress of our business there is owing in a great measure to the Want of Persons in whom to place a proper Confidence.

Except Gunnapundee Ragganaiculu the Renter of Bimilipatam whose Engagements for the Dutch & with the Country Government takes off his attention from us, the other Merchants at Vizagapatam are persons of such Narrow Circumstances that M<sup>r</sup>. Saunderson is oblig'd to observe great Caution in trusting them with any advances of Money & those with whom the Residents of Ingeram & Madapollam are oblidg'd to do their Business are not so properly Merchants as the Heads of the Weavers & as these Inhabit very different & distant parts of the Country, We are of Opinion that a Resident at Madapollam might engage with many of them who by reason of their Distance the Resident of Ingeram Cannot with sáfty and Convenience have any Dealings with, & we know by Experience that our Investment at Ingeram has not encreas'd since we Left Madapollam.

For these reasons the Board concluded that endeavouring to make an Investment at Madapollam would be no prejudice to those at Vizagapatam & Ingeram & thô the Charges of the Residency freight & other Disbursments added to the Cost of the Cloth will make it Come out Dearer than ours, yet considering our present Difficulties in this part of the Country Prevents our making so considerable an Investment as the Company Wish, It was unanimously AGREED to send M<sup>r</sup>. Edward Fowke as Resident to Madapollam to make an Investment in those parts, & that M<sup>r</sup>. Warren who resided some time at Madapollam with M<sup>r</sup>. Graham be sent from Ingeram to assist M<sup>r</sup>. Fowke.

English settlements without Special License first had & Obtain'd shall be fined according to the Value of such goods & Merchandize freighted on any such foreign Ships, and shall forfeit the Companys Protection.

All British subjects forbid by his Maj<sup>ty</sup>. Proclamation to come to India in foreign service or to reside there without the Company's Leave.

ALL PERSONS Subjects to his Brittanick Majesty are to have due regard to his Majestys Royal proclamation prohibiting all his Subjects trading within the Company's Limits in foreign Service, or Under foreign Commissions or being any way Concern'd in foreign Companys, & Likewise forbidding them to Visit, haunt or frequent the East Indies Without the said Companys License.

The Intent of the foregoing Orders explained.

The board thought proper to publish this Notice in such general terms to avoid giving any particular offence, which might have affected the Friendship & Harmony that is subsisting at present with the Country Government & the French, it being Chiefly design'd to prevent all aid & assistance to the trade of Pondicherry & the Moors Ports to y<sup>e</sup>. Southward of us as what affects the Trade of this Place most sensibly & that are our most dangerous Rivals.

And therefore we think fit to enter it here as a Rule to our selves in Case of an Information being Lodg'd against any of the Inhabitants, that as they have been used to have Considerable dealings as, to, & from other places on the Coast & elsewhere & to be Concern'd in Loans at Interest and Respondentia & Affreightments of goods at to & from such places, a Prohibition thereof wou'd be rather prejudicial than of any advantage to this place, it is not our intention to alter or abridge them of any such Liberty, nor shall such Information have any effect against them, till the Contrary shall be publickly Notified, in Case it shou'd hereafter appear that such Loans or affreightments are prejudicial to the publick & general Interest of the Place.

Further as it is almost impossible to Provide for all accidents and Exigencies which may frequently happen in a Course of general Trade, It is hop'd those who may succeed to the Execution of these orders will in Case of any Breach of them, Consider the Circumstances attend<sup>g</sup>. the same, whether it was Involuntary & without design & whether it was unavoidable without great Damage and Loss to the party. Upon the whole that they will act with moderation & Consider our Intention is only to put a stop to all open & secret Undertakings which have a Manifest Tendency to the aid and Assistance of our Rivals in prejudice to the Gen<sup>l</sup>. & Common good of the place, For otherwise whilst there is so great Encouragement given at other Ports for the resort of Merchants to them, it is to be apprehended that by too great severity the Consequences will be more fatal than those which our orders are intended to prevent.

Its a Long time since I sent you upon Clearing Shankarapawrecks & Moovall Chunds acco<sup>ts</sup>. which affair I have been lately inform'd of by Hojee Hodees Letter that there is no settling those acco<sup>ts</sup>. before some Merchants due from him 12572 Pagodas its strange you sent me no advice of these Matters.

Business of their contracts. And the Board having a Little while before the Dispatch of the Prince William insisted with some earnestness upon an advance of five  $\text{₹}$  Cent more than the former prices, the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. desir'd they might give their reasons in Writing why they hop'd to have it at the usual price. But as We were then intent upon the Dispatch of the Prince William the Merchants were told, that after the departure of the Ship, we should have more Leisure to consider of what they had to offer. Accordingly the Merchants attending this Morning, deliver'd us a petition as enter'd after this Consultation, then being asked if they had any thing further to say before they Withdrew, they desired We wou'd Consider besides what they had set forth in their Petition that except in the years 1730 & 1731 they had not for twenty years past given above thirty  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. that the Late Method we have fallen into of Locking up the cloth till they pay for it is an intolerable greivance, & renders the trust we allow them, if it may be called so, of very little use & no Benefit to them because they must either sell at a low price for ready Money, or else borrow the Money at Interest to pay for the Cloth before they can take it out of the Wareh<sup>o</sup>. That besides it was only Late Years had introduced the practise of insisting they shou'd agree for the whole quantity of Cloth at once as it arriv'd, whereas the former Method us'd to be for the Merchants to agree only for two hundred & sometimes three hundred Bales at a time as they heard of any demand in the Country, & then a trust of Eight & sometimes twelve Months was of service as they had y<sup>e</sup>. returns from the country, before the time was Expir'd & whenever it happen'd they could sell a parcell for ready Money or a short Trust they had a further advantage by the use of the Money 'till such Time as they were to pay the Company.

As to their petition, 'tho perhaps they have Exaggerated the Difficulty's they complain of, yet we are very well Convinc'd of the quantity of cloth which remains in the place undispos'd of, & thô we might get a better Price for the Auroras, yet the other sorts wou'd Lye heavy upon us, most of that which is now in Town being ordinary Reds & Greens. It is also upon looking back found to be true that the Merchants have not given above thirty % Cent for twenty years past, except the two years they Mention, & whether it be owing to our Locking up the cloth 'till they pay for it, or whether they went beyond their judgment of the consumption in the country when they indented for one thousand Bales for two years together (a quantity which was augmented by the indulgence to the Europe Captains) it is certain the price of cloth is considerably fallen of late years & the Merchants have been subjected to Very great Difficulty's. Upon the whole the Board were unanimously of opinion that as the most certain dependance for the sale of Large quantitys must be on our Merchants, upon whom we must rely to take it off our hands when the Market is dull, besides that to insist upon any Extraordinary advance which can only be expected on the Auroras, would give them a pretence to insist upon an abatement on the other sorts or to Leave them on our hands; it was therefore AGREED that the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. be debted for the whole six hundred Bales reed. this year, that is Tomby Chitty and his partners for three hundred Bales & Molunga Kistna and his partners for three hundred Bales in equal proportions at the usual advance of thirty % Cent & the Warehousekeeper is ORDER'D to deliver it to them as they pay for it.

The Long continuance of the Famines, Wars & Disturbances in the Country will not permit the Merchants of the Distant Kingdoms to come as formerly to this place to purchase Broad cloth which with the quantitys imported here by some Captains of the Europe ships sometime ago, has greatly Lower'd the price of those Goods, so much that Your Petitioners was not able to dispose of any or but very Little in the place. But nevertheless your petitioners did endeavour to the Utmost of their capacity to sell althô it was at a Less price than they cou'd well afford to do it and accordingly did sell to Emaum Sahib 500 Bales & three hundred to Boochar Mall (Chickless Cawn's Merchant) when he was Last here, & paid their amount into the Hoñble Company's Cash, But your petitioners were Loaded with a heavy charge and great trouble to get their Money from Boochar Mall.

Your Petitioners also took 200 Bales more out of the Warehouse and paid the Hoñble Company their Value. Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c. will further please to observe that Your Petitioners before their receiving the said 2000 Bales before mention'd had receiv'd from the Hoñble Company one thousand Bales and paid their Value to the Company, But it was only put up in the Godowns & unsold the price offer'd not being sufficient for the space of almost two years & at last Your Petitioners were oblig'd to send them up to several parts in the Country to dispose of them, when by the Death of our late Nabob Sadatull Caun several Disturbances happening in the Country as also the severe Famine, at that time a great part of Your Petitioners Money was Lost by Outstanding debts.

Your Petitioners most humbly pray Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will be pleas'd to take these abovementioned Circumstances into your Consideration & Hope thereby your petitioners may Obtain the Favour of this Hoñble Board that they may have the Broad cloth at only thirty  $\frac{1}{4}$  Cent advance according to their List for the same.

According to your Orders we have Perused the several Papers & accounts from the West Coast & what remark's We have to offer thereon We shall continue to do under the usual Heads.

## FIRST SHIPPING

The George agreable to the Liberty given them was dispatch'd to Manna to bring up the Pepper that Lay there, but by the hadness of y<sup>e</sup>. Bar & after a stay of thirty eight Days; she had no more than 47 Bahar sent aboard with which quantity she return'd to Marlborough so that her Demurrage greatly exceeded the Earnings & we are of Opinion therefore the Sloops are the most Proper for that Service as they may be dispatched thither at the Proper Seasons when the Bar is favourable for the Boats to go over.

They desire your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. would Provide & send them a small Sloop of ten Tons with the assistance of which & the two they propose to have compleated there they are in Hopes of being able to Manage the whole Business & thereby put an end to the Charge of hiring Boats.

## SECONDLY GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FORT ST. GEORGE.

In Consultation of the 20<sup>th</sup>. a Report is made by the Accomptant, relating to account remains of Utensils deliver'd by M<sup>r</sup>. Rigg to M<sup>r</sup>. Savage by which it appears there is a Deficiency of Sundrys amounting to Doll<sup>s</sup>. 58. — 21 & an Overplus of others to Doll<sup>s</sup>. 51. 1. 51 which they have refer'd to your Honours & c<sup>a</sup>. Determination. We observe they are Chiefly of the sorts deliver'd to the Workmen & Slaves & we suppose may have either been broke, worn out, Lost or Stolen by them. But neither these or any reasons are given by M<sup>r</sup>. Rigg for the Deficiency's, which we think ought to have been done, altho he deliver'd in an account of the Overplus pretty near the Value. The directions sent them Last Year if duely put in execution will Prevent any thing of this Like in future & we think they Can have but a small Title to any Indulgence, hereafter, the present instance We hope will be the Last, & being of no great Value may the easier prevail with your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. to grant a favourable decision.

## THIRDLY INVESTMENT.

## FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

Pursuant to the orders sent from hence to enquire into the Deficiency of 13½ Bahar of Pepper at Moco Moco in M<sup>r</sup>. Gees time they represent that three Bahar will be a sufficient & Equitable allowance out of the 13½ Bahar for which we think their reasons are very strong & if your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. shall so determine his Estate must be answerable to the Company for the remainder 10½ Bahar out of the sum now Lying in their Cash, as a Deposit, 'till the affair could be decided.

They have also in Conformity to the Directions given them appointed a Committee of Council to examine the Survey's of the Pepper Plantations, & We are glad to observe the Increase of Pepper at Manna & Laye, Saloomah, & Koonkey seem to have suffer'd by their Divisions on account of the Murder of the Dupatty's Son & Soongey Etam produces little occasioned as we observed Last Year by the Badness of the Soil on which account it was recommended to the Gentlemen there to endeavour to remove the Inhabitants of those Parts, to Places more Likely to favour their undertakings Anacksoongey 'tis believed will Produce as much as formerly and the Sultan is much to be commended for his good Conduct and regard to the Companys Interest and may no doubt be Persuaded yet to encrease the Number of Plantations.

The Differences at Laye are at Length accommodated by the Present Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. the rise of them proceeded from a refusal to allow Pangaram Munko Rajah the gratuity usually given on Pepper which is 1 Dollar 79 Bahar, the Dupatthey's & People

of that Country alledging the Pangaram had no authority or Jurisdiction over them and Consequently was not entituled to the Gratuity which they said did properly belong to their Headmen, and it was Carried to such a Height that some of them abandoned their Plantations and assembled in a Tumultuous manner & 50 Bahar of pepper Perished under the Vines during these Commotion's the Gentlemen then thought it high time to interpose their authority, and by Seizing the Ringleader of them did at Last put a stop to those mutinous Meetings & he was not released 'till he had given Security for his future good Behaviour, But notwithstanding the return of the People to their Plantations the Proateens were still uneasy with regard to the Gratuity & insisted the same shou'd not be Paid to the Pangaram & there was no other way to make them easy, than by granting to the Proateens some allowance on that account which was agreed to be half a Doll<sup>r</sup>. ½ Bahar & to Continue the usual allowance to the Pangaram for fear of some ill Consequence that might attend the Lessening his authority for to have deprived the Pangaram of it would have occasion'd those People to have renounced all allegiance to him The title & allowance being inseperable & therefore We think the Gentlemen there have acted very Prudently in preserving his authority over them thô it puts the Company to some Expence & that will in all Probability be made up to them in y<sup>e</sup>. increase of Pepper as it will be an encouragement to the Proateens to Look after their Dependants & preserve the Country in Peace.

The Proateens of Laye having also Claimed the promise made them formerly that they shou'd receive 10 Doll<sup>r</sup>s. ¾ Bahar for their Pepper as soon as the Country produced 100 Bahars ¾ aññ. which being now accomplished the Pepper received from that District being upwards of double that quantity the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. have thereupon agreed with him that next year they shall be paid after y<sup>e</sup>. rate of 10 Dollars ¾ Bahar, to which We think there is no objection, since it is the settled price & what they always rec<sup>d</sup>. when they brought their Pepper to Marlborough the reason they have of Late years been paid but 8 was by agreement with them they Preferring that Price for their Pepper rather than to be at the Charge and Hazzard of Conveying it to Marlbrô themselves & the 2 Doll<sup>r</sup>s. was allowed on that account. But as the Company have now an House at that Place to which they bring their Pepper & it being always the Practice to Pay 10 Doll<sup>r</sup>s. at the Scale they are no doubt intituled to receive the same and more especially as they have Performed their Promise of improving their Country.

In answer to what was wrote to them Concerning the Necessity of keeping a Constant Resident at Laye they now offer to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. their reasons to which We beg Leave to refer you and shall only say that we are of Opinion it may serve the ends Proposed and be advantagious to the Company.

The Country seems to be every where in Peace but at Saloomah & Koonkey the Murder of the Dupattys son as before mentioned has occasion'd several of the People to quit their Habitations & thereby many Plantations are neglected and gone to ruin, they are endeavouring to accomodate this unhappy affair & have to that Purpose invited the Heads of the Contending Country's to meet at Marlbrô in order to put an end to the Disturbances.

The Coffee plantation which was propos'd to be set on foot for the Company in 1733 was shortly after discontinued for want of Hands & Persons skill'd in the Business as to those begun by other People they are silent, but we hear some are Likely to be brought to Perfection.

The sugar and Arrack Plantation Continues a Leek to our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters Estate thô we are glad to observe to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. the acc<sup>t</sup>. does not swell so high as the Last. Yet this amounts to no less a sum than Doll<sup>r</sup>s. 1125. 2. 52 & only 22 Leaguers of Arrack made & no Sugar which at 36 ¾ Leaguer is Doll<sup>r</sup>s. 792 & makes the Loss 633. 2. 52. We have in our several reports said so much relating to these Plantations that we shall not Trouble your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. further at this Time.

## FIFTHLY FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS &amp; REVENUES.

We find they have not as yet made any further Progress in the Buildings designed at Moco Moco than to Contract for the Churam at Doll<sup>rs</sup>. 10  $\text{₹}$  Coyan which we think very reasonable Considering the Distance it must be brought from.

The Hospital is near Completed.

The Pepper Godown at Manna being of small Demensions is not Capable of receiving all the Pepper brought thither and they desire your Permission to Build one, which we are of Opinion is very Necessary as is also a room or two for the Reception of the Servants and People, who are sent thither to receive the Pepper the scituation of the Country makes it very Cold & unhealthy & most People who are obliged to go there seldom return without Fevers, Agues & Colds chiefly occasion'd by the Want of a good House to cover them from the Extream hot sun in the Day and the Cold & Damp at Night & such a Conveniency might save the Lives of many, We beg Leave to offer it to your Consideration.

They represent the want of a storehouse and desire Liberty to erect a Brick Building for that Service the Godowns they have at present being not sufficient for the several stores on hand.

We observe they have of Late granted several Leases of grounds and some near the Fort, as it is a Settlement capable of being greatly improved, it is not improbable but the Company may hereafter be obliged to erect more Buildings than they have at Present, & We submit it to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. whether a Caution to the Gentlemen there may not be Necessary on that account.

SIXTHLY COMPANY'S SERVANTS MILITARY &C<sup>a</sup>.

In Consultation of the 20<sup>th</sup>. September it was resolved by the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. & all the Council, but M<sup>r</sup>. Rigg to allow M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Hurlock nine Months of his Writership and to let him Commence Factor in consideration of his Close application to Business, as Favours of such a Nature have always been esteem'd in the breast of the Company only, & therefore reserved to them This appears to us irregular.

In Consultation of 29<sup>th</sup>. October We observe a Petition from David Pugh Surgeons Mate requesting an advance of Pay alledging that what he Contracted with y<sup>e</sup>. Company for was not sufficient to Maintain him on which the Board agreed to allow him 10 $\text{₤}$  more  $\text{₹}$  anñ. Salary & 5 Doll<sup>rs</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  Month more Diet Money. This further Charge we think might have been spared the Comp<sup>a</sup>. since his Salary & allowances Contracted with y<sup>e</sup>. Company were equal to what they are pleased to allow several of their Covenanted Servants at that place who might with y<sup>e</sup>. same reason urge the insufficiency of it to Maintain them.

That for the reasons given in the West Coast Letter and those by the Committee we do approve the additional allowance of two Dollors ₣ Bahar to the Proateens of Laye for the Pepper brought in by them, and also the half Dollar ₣ Bahar to the Proateens over & above the gratuity of one Dollar ₣ Bahar to Pangaron Monko Rajah, but that it be an Instruction to the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council whenever it may be Necessary in future to make any allowance to encourage the Natives to bring in a greater quantity of Pepper it does not at the same time carry with it any appearance of being done with intention to Calm their Differences, least they shou'd be tempted to pretend a quarrel from the sole View of receiving a Bounty of the Company, when otherwise without such expectation they wou'd remain in Peace and quietness.

That in Consideration of the Reasons given by the Late Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council for Permitting M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Hurlock to Commence Factor nine Months before his Writership was expired we will not reverse it till we know the Company's Sentiments thereon, but that we forbid such a Practice in future without the Company's consent be first obtained.

Extraordinary Allowances to David Pugh to be discontinued

AGREED also that the extraordinary allowances of ten Pounds ₣ Ann. Salary and five Dollars ₣ Month Diet Money to M<sup>r</sup>. David Pugh Surgeon's Mate more than he contracted for with the Company be discontinued.

The Board took into Consideration the state of the Company's Cash induced thereto by the Currant Coin of the Country having been Lately very much debased in the Nabob's Mints insomuch that when it was kept up to the old Standard, the Madrass Pagodas did not bear a Batta of above three, to three and a half  $\text{₹}$  Cent, Whereas now the Batta is from eight to eight & a half  $\text{₹}$  Cent, from whence it is evident the Bills of Exchange we draw upon the Company at eight Shillings the Pagoda we do not receive so good Gold for as before by five to five and a half  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. It is true that for so far as our Business Circulates near us We may not be sensible of any inconvienee from the Present Coin as it passes in this Province for as much as the old Currant Money But then for such Part of our Investment as is made out of the Province the Difference will be very Considerable as we must pay eight to eight & a half  $\text{₹}$  Cent for Madrass Pagodas to send to the Northward, which in account at least will be an additional Charge of five  $\text{₹}$  Cent upon the Goods from thence and how Long this new Coin thus abominably debas'd may be Currant even about us is a question not easy to be answer'd. Our Cash at present is very Large Considering the time of the Year and the addition it may receive next Month for Bills of Exchange and the Company do always expect that when We have sufficient Cash to Carry on our Investment, the surplus be Laid out in Silver and sent to y<sup>e</sup>. Bay but for the present Current Coin we Cannot buy it within five  $\text{₹}$  Cent so Cheap, as for the old Current or Negapatam Pagoda which will make the Pagoda Come out under seven Shillings. We are obliged to give Bills for the Produce of Corral, but it is the amount of those Bills which swells our Cash, and We cannot discharge ourselves of it but greatly to the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Loss if we receive bad Money for good. The Baseness of the Current Money being an Incident the Company could not foresee We cou'd have no Orders from them for our Government and the damage may be great to Wait for any. In such circumstances it is our Duty to consider the fair and equitable part between the Company and the Corral Merchants and such other Persons as may have occasion to send home Money by Bills. The former may perhaps Complain that by being oblig'd to pay Madras Pagodas they must either pay an Extravagant Batta or be oblig'd to sell their Corral so much the cheaper, but certainly such complaint can never be supported for besides that the Company might with much more reason say that the Corral being sold for bad Money produces more, and that more is a proffit made out of their Purse if they give the same now for bad gold as they did for good, may they not also say give us as good Pagodas as you did before if you expect the same exchange or if you pay us in worse, accept of a less Exchange? To Y<sup>e</sup>. first the Corral Merchants might object that the same Money not being now Currant is not to be met with, but they could have Little to say against a proportionable reduction of the Exchange if the objections to that were not on the Company's side, as they must be always Varying the rate of Exchange according as the Currant Money grew better or Worse a most uncertain Method and would be attended with many inconveniency's. The thing we would aim at is to fix the Exchange in Proportion to the Value of the Money and both upon such a footing that as the standard (if we may call it so) of the Company's Bills is certain the standard of the Money we receive for them may be so too. It wou'd be a vain and fruitless attempt to introduce any new Coin as the

standard of the place and the Example and experience of the M. M. pagodas has convinc'd us how ineffectual that Method was, they never were and in all Probability never would be Currant they were alternately passing the fire, from the currant Money into the M.M. Pag<sup>s</sup>. and from them into the Currant Money again. To lower the standard of the Madras Pagodas to that of the old Currant Negapatam Pag<sup>s</sup>. might be attended with worse consequences, for besides that the Nabob might raise a pretence that we were introducing a new coin it may with reason be apprehended that debasing of them would put a stop to y<sup>e</sup>. Currency even in those parts where they have hitherto been receiv'd, and by keeping up to the standard we may hope they will have more general prevalence as they are sought for now since the late alteration in the Current Coin of these Parts to send to the Southward as well as to the Northward. The Board having debated this matter for some time AGREED that it was the best and only Method we can think of at present to resolve that for all Corral sold after this Day the Bills which we give for the Produce must be for Madras Pag<sup>s</sup>. only and as they are nearest Three ¼ Cent better than the old Currant or Negapatam Pagoda that we allow the Persons of whom we receive them three ¼ Cent advance or Batta. That Notice hereof be immediately given to those whom the Corral is Consign'd to and that they will do well to Bargain with those they sell it to, to pay them in Madras Pagodas, but for such parcells of corral as have already been sold for the Currant Money we agree to receive it at eight shillings the pagoda the Persons paying the same making Oath it is the produce of what they had sold before this day.
