That the Deputy Governour & Council be directed first to be sure of a sufficient Quantity of Pepper to fill the two Ships which they may expect next Year, and after that if they have any Surplus they send so much of it hither upon the George

That if at any time they should receive any Stores from England which are not of use to them & not veudible there, that such Stores be sent hither by the first opportunity.

A Letter from Captain Headley of this date read as entered hereafter, setting Capt. Hoadforth that the Tea put on board him in China on the Honbie. Company's account is ley requests so much in the way & will take up so much time in shifting from place to place that to order 500 in order to forward his dispatch he requests the Orders of the Board to send ashoar Cheets of Tea five hundred Chests.

AGREED that the Secretary do send Captain Hoadley an order in Writing to which is send ashore five hundred Chests Tea agreable to his request, And that the said granted. order be entered hereafter.

Honber. Sir & Sirs,

In Obedience to your orders We have perused and examined the several Papers & accounts received from Fort Marlbrô and now lay before you what observations We have made thereon.

FIRST SHIPPING.

On the Commander of the Lorrains petitioning for Surplus Salt Petre We observe the Gentlemen there agreed with him that whatsoever time it should take up in Shipping on board after the 24th. December the day his demorage commenced should be on Account of his Owners which We beg leave to remark to Your Honour &ct. as an instance of their care to save the Company that Expence.

The Honble Company direct that strict orders should be given to the Commanders of their Shipping to take the utmost care to prevent fire on board Copy of which orders We beleive may be proper to be sent over thither as We are sorry to observe so fresh an Instance in the accident that has attended the Compton.

In their Letter by the Jane they represent their great want of a Sloop about 40 Tons to transport their Pepper from Manna which Vessell We beleive will be of great Service to them for that purpose.

In Consultation of 20th. January an order was made to hire a Prow for \$ 120 to transport some money and Stores to Moco Moco to which & to other articles namely a Bill of Exchange drawn by the Resident of Moco Moco for \$ 1000 & Ensign Stewards having leave to come up from thence Mr. Rigg dissented and declined signing that Consultation, which he being called upon to do in Consultation of 14th. February he then delivered in his reasons which were animadverted on by the rest of the Board who there say the Company had no Boats of their own then, and that it was necessary to comply with the Resident of Moco Moco's demands, as to the Residents giving previous advice before he draws the Bill We think with him is a Rule necessary to be always put in practice, the other part relating to Mr. Steward is dropped by Mr. Rigg and indeed very proper it should be so, all We shall say further on this Head is that when the Company's Boats can be employed no other should be hired which must always occasion an extraordinary expence and that Mr. Rigg ought to have signed the Consultation agreable to the Company's orders though he might think fitt to differ in opinion in some points from the rest of the Board for which he might give his reasons.

SECONDLY GOODS FROM EUROPE & FORT ST. GEORGE.

In Consultation of 25th. August 1736 Mr. Samuel Greenslate and William Rigg interchangeably sign the Account remains of the Honble Company's Effects under the Charge of the Paymaster and there appears a Surplus of Sundrys amounting to \$70.—.30 & a deficiency of others amounting to 254. 1. 57 upon Examination of which they find that several Utensils as there mentioned amounting to 171.—.8 were worn out and expended in the Companys Service which they permitted to be wrote off to profit and Loss on that account giving Mr. Rigg credit for the Surplus's and debting him for the other deficiencys so that his account stands Debtor \$14.—.19 this Sum is indeed small and there's no reason to believe but that this happened from the Carelessness of Workmen into whose charge the Tools were delivered therefore We beg leave to offer to your Honour &c., for the more regular accounting for the Several Articles under the charge of the Paymaster there that the several Workmen employed under him such as Carpenters, Joiners, Shipwrights and Guardans do give receipts for the Tools delivered them, and that the Paymaster or his Assistant do every month oblige those Persons to produce them and see that they are answerable to the receipts given and that such as are useless and worn out may be sold at outery and as to deficiencys of Stores as mentioned in the eighteenth

Paragraph of their Letter to the Honble Court of Directors by the Duke of Lorrain such as rust on Iron and Steel, waste on salt and other perishables for which they desire directions from Your Honour &c'. We presume to say that as they generally have but small Quantity's of Iron and Steel laying there, the weighing such articles once a Year in the presence of two of the Council will give but little trouble, as for Salt We think there can be no just computation made of what that may waste in a Year and are therefore of opinion the best method would be to measure that also and that a regular and exact account be every Year taken of all the Stores comparing the same with the Ballance of the General Books, and that all old Guns and armory Stores which are useless be sent to Europe directly from thence & the Stores directly to this place which are not wanted.

The Country of Anack Soongey will we compute from the last year's produce require 90 Corge of Long Cloth Ordinary white in order to exchange for Pepper according to the agreement of the People of that Country.

THIRDLY INVESTMENT.

The Large Quantity of Pepper procured on the Coast will we doubt not give our Honble Masters great satisfaction, it being near 900 Tons part of which they believe to be the Surplus of the preceding year since they judge all they shall be able to get in this will not exceed 650 Tons though there is reason to hope it may produce a larger Crop in the other Seasons the present one being represented to have been less favourable to the Vines, & other Growths of the Earth. They will now fall short in the Tonnage designed them occasioned by their giving so large a Quantity to the last Shipping. The Honble Companys directions to them this year are to send all the Pepper on the Coast that they may be able to judge of the produce of one Year and We are of opinion that though they would not compleat their Tonnage this Year, yet they will be able to provide for two Ships yearly who carry Salt Petre Kintlage admitting that they do not send any Surplus Pepper home, as may happen by the favour of a good Season to be brought into their Godowns which being kept in reserve may supply any deficiency that may happen to the next Crop of Pepper by drought or other accidents.

The Anak Soongey Country We observe has produced a much larger Quantity of Pepper than before, the Sultan exerts himself in the promoting of it having lately invited upwards of 100 Familys to come and settle there from Serampy, the Gentlemen there have in acknowledgment of his Services presented him with \$50 and to encourage the Planters of Bentall and Triamong ordered a house and Godown to be built for the receiving their Pepper at those Qualloes, they having made complaint of their having been obliged to waite a whole Year till the Europe Ships come down urging if they could get a little money as they wanted it, they might be in a Condition to make a considerable improvement.

On the Representation of the Gentlemen in their General Letter by the George in regard to some ill conveniences that might attend the removing the settlement to Bentall Your Honour &c*. have come to a resolution and given directions accordingly for the continuing it at Moco Moco from the assurance given you that they can raise brick buildings there, the making of which firm and durable will save the Company a considerable Sum and We believe it will contribute much to the health of the People who are to live there if a large opening was made by cutting down the Woods that Surround it.

That Settling of the Pepper Customs with the People of Manna, Saloomah and Cooncay appears to us to have been transacted not only to the Satisfactions of the Pangarans & Dupattys but to the Head Planters under them who will thereby partake of the Gratuity given them by the Honble Company and encourage them to promote the increase of Pepper in their respective districts.

The Company in their General Letter this year from England sent directions for the laying aside the Sugar and Arrack Plantations if the Military could be otherwise Supplyed, the Gentlemen there seem to make no difficulty of procuring it,

We are certain it will save the Company a Considerable Sum in a Year to put an end to that work, the Stills they say will sell for little there wherefore they desire your orders whether they shall send them to England or this place.

The Account given of the Coffee Plantations in the 30th. Paragraph of their Letter will shew our Honble Masters the little prospect there is of having any Coffee from thence.

FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMT.

The Differences between the Saloomah and Cooncoy People are at length terminated to do which they have been obliged to make use of their authority to restrain the contending Partys from proceeding to further acts of violence, after the burning the Village of Nappall by Dupatty Sareo in revenge for the Murder of his Son, the Plantations in this part of the Country have suffered very much by these divisions, and we think the Gentlemen have acted very prudently in not letting them subsist any longer by making use of Force where Perswasion had no effect, the Planters in those Parts now promise to retreive their past neglect, by clearing their Plantations & setting heartily to work which We presume the Gentlemen will be mindfull to see them perform.

We observe in their several Letters the care that has been taken to Suppress the Vice of gaming so predominant amongst the Malays the chief cause of their feuds and animositys & will be of great Benefit to the Country if no such thing is tollerated there but it being part of the revenues of Jolle Pangarans and head Men, will be a Task of great difficulty to Effect.

FIFTHIY BUILDINGS REPAIRS & REVENNUES.

The Godowns not being Sufficient to receive the Salt Petre expected there by the Compton they purchased one for \$60. The Duke of Lorrain and that Ship having taken all on board that had been sent from Bengall tis now made use of to put Stores in, they have directed Materials to be provided for the erecting a house and Godown at Manna which will be of great Service at that place as that part brings in so large a part of their Investment.

The Arrack, Ophium and wine Licence is now let for \$53 \$\polday \text{Mensem more} than last Year.

SIXTHLY COMPANY'S SERVANTS AND MILLITARY.

On the Complaints of Lieutenant Cuney and Williams against Ensign James Jedderee for misbehaviour, as recited in Consultation of the 27th. February 1737, his Commission was taken from him and We can't but think with great Justice.

On the Death of Mr. Daniel Coles who was murder'd the 9th. October they took charge of his Effects as he stood indebted to the Company \$ 234. 3. 20 which were sold for 232. 2. 40 and paid into Cash, this has reduced that debt to a very small Ballance, they promise the same Care in regard to the deficiency of Cash 4000 at Moco Moco during Mr. Savage's Residence, who is represented to have been Seiz'd with a distemper that has [deprived] him of his Senses and Limbs and now suspended the Company's Service on that account, his allowances they advise are continued to him till further orders from Your Honour &ct. We are of opinion the accident of the money has been occasioned by his distemper, and that his Servants must have taken the opportunity to convey the Money away as he always before acted with great fidelity in the Company's Service, his unfortunate Case is therefore to be Pitied.

SEVENTHLY ACCOUNTS.

We herewith lay before your Honour &ct. the charges on the Coast for the Year ending April 1737 taken from their Books Letter P and being compared with the Preceeding one it appears they are increased \$ 8937. 2. 43 under the following: Articles:

CHARGES DIET Encrease from \$ 600 paid Mr. Lennox at Fort St. George now brought into their Books with an addition of a Factor & four Writers among the Covenanted Servants.

Considerations about providing Saltpetre in Pegue.

Governour Stackhouse having in a private Letter to the President dated the 4th. March last speaking of the difficulty of procuring Salt Petre in Bengall, intimated that he had been informed that for a present and by proper Application a Grant might be procured for the Company for the Liberty of exporting Salt Petre from Pegue & that large Quantities could be made there which if true, it would be worth the Company's while to give a very considerable present for the Grant, As it might in time be a means to lower the Price in Bengall when the Government there came to be convinced that it might be provided elsewhere And the Presidt. having with the Cuncurrence of the Board wrote to the Resident in Pegue to sound the disposition of the Government with regard to such Grant, Mr. Smart the said Resident in answer thereto writes the 1st. August last That he had employed Coja Simon an Armenian to talk with the Ministers at Ava, that he had also talked with the Prince of Syrian who assured him that if such a Grant could be obtained the Country would furnish sufficient to load many ships yearly, withal that he beleived it not impracticable to obtain such a Grant and that any good offices on his part should not be wanting. The Resident in another Letter, dated the 18th. Decr. Writes as follows, He had received a Letter from Coja Simon at Ava purporting that he had consulted with the proper Minister of State there who Answered him It was not impracticable to gain the Liberty of Exporting Saltpetre but he wanted to know whether the Company proposed to make a Present at once for it or to pay an Annual Rent to the King, To which Coja Simon reply'd That his Instructions went no farther than to know from the Ministers whether the King might be prevailed upon to grant such Liberty and that when he went down to Syrian He would know from the Company's Resident there what Powers he had to come to an Agreement Upon which Mr. Smart writes for further instructions how he is to act when Coja Simon gets down.

All which being taken into Consideration the Board agreed to write Mr. Smart in substance as follows, That his own Experience of the Government in that Kingdom is sufficient to convince him We can have no relyance upon their Faith So as to put any Considerable Value upon any of their Grants besides if we are rightly informed of the Constitution of the Government no Grant of his Present Majesty will be bin ding upon his Successor for which reasons we shall never advise the Company to give any considerable present nor to pay anything annually for a Liberty the Enjoyment of which will be very precarious; That the only

Martin & Sheppard had taken the Examination of several persons who were on board when the accident happened, in consequence of which he had brought the Man here in Irons in order to a Trial.

Captain Hoadley being withdrawn and his Majesty's Commission for trying Pyrates being called for & examined it was found that We are thereby empowered to try Pyracies, Felonies & Robberies without any mention of Murder which being debated it was agreed that neither the word Pyracy nor the word Felony could be understood to imply Murder and the rather because in the Preamble to the said Commission Murder is distinguished from the other two and also for that the Oath appointed by the Act of the 11th. & 12th. of King William the third to be taken by the Judges of the Court of Admiralty plainly referrs to Pyracy, Robbery & Felony and not to Murder.

The prices of the Superfine Longcloth could not be fixed upon now Comrapa promises to give us a very fair Account of the Cost in the Country, and that he will be contented with a very small allowance for his trouble & the Risque of the money with the Weavers, but he could not consent that any should be turned out, because our Measures are different from the French Musters, & therefore would not be taken by them if we turned them out.

Honourable Sir & Sirs,

Your Honour &ct. having the last Consultation acquainted me in a more particular manner with the reasons of my being sent for to Madrass and as you were pleased to allow me the liberty of giving in my Answer in writing I must in the first place return you my thanks for your indulgence in giving me a hearing before you

proceeded to pass any Censure upon my Conduct, and I doubt not I shall convince. Your Honour &ct. that it was not possible the last Year to do more or better than I did, & that no body under the like Circumstances could have done otherwise.

Part of the time I was at Vizagapatam till this last Year I employed a Set of Merchants in Joynt Stock and the Year before last I employed the same people seperately, and Raganageloo all along alone when I found I succeeded best, but there being a large Ballance standing out on the Joynt Stock Account, as likewise some on the same people seperately, it gave me some uneasiness to think how little I should be able to get in my Ballance, which could be done no way but by proposeing to Raganageloo if he would take the outstanding ballances, I wou'd give the whole Investment to himself which he readily agreed to, and gave me assurance of bringing in Five hundred Bales between the first of May and the last of December, and one hundred more by the last of February. In June, July and August the Cloth came in the fastest, that was taken in, and the Quantity was not much Lessened, it altered so much for the worse both in Quality and measure that instead of 170 Corge # Month I could not take more than between 70 to 90. Corge P Month, the rest was all turned out and put in a Godown by it Self, hopeing it wou'd put a Stop to such proceedings. Upon my Inquiring into the reasons for such great alterations in the Cloth, I was told several According as they happened at the time of my asking as the Dearness of Copper Dubs and the Exorbitant price Cotton bore, The Death of Chittana, The Troubles in the Country and the unsettled Condition the People were in by having two contending Armies just at the very doors from whence most part of the Cloth came. To be sure the same difficultys I under went were not only and particularly my Case or the French Chief at Yanam. & the Dutch Chief at Cacanata wou'd not have been turned out, The Dutch Chief at Bimblepatam is not of above four Months standing, therefore his performance is not as yet known, and how much Mr. Graham's performances have been better than mine Your Honour &ct. are the best Judges, what I take leave to say further is, the necessity there is of throwing a Dependance upon more than one or two People who otherwise Cramps the Gomasters in the Price, & they the Weavers, and the Merchant at the same time complaining of the hardships, as the Excessive Price of Cotton, The great Famine, the large Ballance in the Weavers hands, this last is a bardship the Company must have suffered by had I employed those People I did the year before, for they were as little able to make good a Loss as those Gomasters and Weavers that had nothing of their own, and Eat faster than they worked, But if Your Honour &ct. will please to permitt me to take two or three more Merchants seperately and advance them such Sums as I find necessary according to their performance & allow a ballance of Two thousand Rupees for every hundred Bales they have provided within the Year, I may have more hopes of Succeeding better both in Quality, and Large Number of Bales, but to be pin'd down to one person for the sake of his being a Man of Substance and so little probity is the Reason I cannot give the least hopes of succeeding better then I have done for this last Year past.

As to the Muster of Vizagapat^m. Sallampores now in the Warehouse and by which the Cloth I have sent up has been sorted, we have no such Muster at Vizagapatam and I will venture to say no such Cloth has been made that way for some Years, at least in my time. The best I can give any hopes of procuring in those parts. I have produced the Musters to Your Honour &c^t.; the Dutch provide great quantitys of the same sort, but whether for Europe or the Eastern Islands I am not certain, but when they come from the Washers you will be able to Judge how farr they are fitt for the Europe Market.

According to order of Consultation of the 13th. Ultimo We have made a Survey of the Silver Mint, the Essaymaster's Lodgings & the Mint Point. The two latter Articles require but little Repairs, But the Silver Mint Verandoes have long been thought wanting of Repairs, yet have hitherto been omitted, & consequently the Repairs must now be more generall. We find the Verandoes are two low, in so much that when the Mettle is melting the palmeiras are damaged thereby, if not in danger of setting on Fire. As your Honour &ct. have ordered a thorough repair, We wou'd propose to have the Verandoes raised higher two feet at the least, such of the Materials as will serve again shall be reused, besides which we beleive the following Materials may be wanting, as by an Estimate hereto annext.

We have likewise in obedience to an order of Consultation of the same date made a Survey of the Town Hall so long complained of, and formerly ordered to be repaired. We find the palmeiras under the Terrass to the Eastward are entirely eaten by the white Ants, The Terrass only resting on two or three props put under the Joists, The Grand Jury, & Pettit Jury appartments have long been infested with white Ants, who are now very numerous among the Reapers of the Ceiling, and in all likelyhood the Reapers under the Ceiling are destroyed & rendered unsafe. Honble Sir & Sirs,

This serves to acknowledge the Receipt of your Honour's &c. Councill's orders, by your Secretary, and to lay before you an abstract of my Voyage, as the reason of my bearing up for your Port.

The 23^d of February I received my dispatches, at Ingellie. baving wrote off 956 Baggs of Rice which were not come down, after waiting four days with Strong S. W^t. Winds, we weighed, & could not get clear of the Pilot, till the 4th of March, we met with Strong Westerly winds, and an Easterly Current, off the head of Zeloan, so that were twice drove back to the E^t ward of the Island.

On the 20th. Instant, were in the Lattitude of Cape Comerine, and by Account near the meridian of it, and laid her head to the Southward 'till day break, at which time saw the Island Zeloan again distant about Six leagues. As it was then so late in the season I judged it would be impracticable to gain that Passage 'till the Monsoon Changed without eminent danger of the Ship and Cargoe, and accordingly bore up for this port, either to attempt the outer Passage in June, or to take such instructions for my future Proceedings as to your Honour &ct. shall seem most agreable for the Interest of my Honourable Masters.

Acton's after, requesting in behalf of his Owners to be unloaded here if no ways prejudicial to our Honble Masters, urging for the reasons of his request, That he is informed that the Island of Bombay had been so well supplied with Grain, that, it is not now in such want as had been represented, that his returning to the Bay would permitt his being dispatched early to Europe, & would also give him an opportunity to search more strictly into the damage his Ship had sustained, than he could do in the great hurry she was before repaired in, that a Supply of fresh Rice might be sent from Bengall to reach Bombay very near as soon as he can from hence and that the Rice he has on board, either by Length of time or the heat of the Ship's hold, is already very indifferent and he fears will be almost perished before he can arrive at Bombay.

The Board having considered the said Request Ordered the Secretary to write The Board's Cap*. Acton in answer thereto that as his Ship is not consigned to Us we do not Answer to think ourselves qualified to give him any orders therein but that having duly request to be considered the reasons urged by him & the several Circumstances that occur to us unloaded upon that Subject, We think his pulling out his Cargo here cannot be any ways here. prejudicial to the Honble Company and that therefore should he resolve to land it we will send Boats on board for it & order a proper Officer to take charge of it here ashore.

I beg leave in behalf of my Owners to request your Honour &ct. if no ways prejudicial to my Honble. Masters, to be unloaded here, that I may return to the Bay again in Order to be dispatched early for Europe, which otherwise I can hardly expect, for as we were obliged to Repair the Ship in a great hurry, without going into a Lock, I am willing to make a more Strict Search into her Damage, before we take on board our homeward Bound Cargo.

Captain Acton attending the Board delivered a Sealed Packet directed to the Lyell's President and Council of Bombay which he said he received from the President & Bengal Packet for Council of Fort William & it being reasonable to beleive the Invoice & Bill of Bombe Lading for the Lyells Cargo were inclosed therein it was AGREED to open the said opened. Packet and it was found to contain the several Papers as # List entered hereafter. The President informs the Board, That the Syrang & others belonging to the Information Narcissus having sent him notice by a Peon, who had been on board that Ship, in one of a Murder committed on of the Rice boats, of a Murther committed by the Chief Mate, He had sent for the board the said Mate & the Witnesses on Shore, who were all waiting without & being Naroissus. called in

Proceedings thereon.

Mr. Cornelius Cosins Second mate gave an Account that on Sinklayer the chief Mate coming on board, he told him His (Sinklaer's) Servant had been pilfering several things, upon which complaint, Mr. Sinklaer ordered his said Servant to be laid on a Cask & beat with ropes in a most cruel manner, that he afterwards made him take a peice of a broken oar, and for the space of two hours, move it up & down as if he was working at the pump and afterwards on the Boy's seeming to faint, & leaning on one of the Capstorne bars, he Oblig'd him to carry an oar on his Shoulder & walk up & down the Deck like a Centinel, but that he saw nothing more.

The Syrang, Tandell & several other Lascars being examined, agreed with Mr. Cosins in the two first Articles of the punishment, but for the third none of them mention it, & they all added that after the two first the Boy went to lean on a Capstorne bar, on which Sinklaer took up a Nipper struck him a blow on the small of the back, another on the breast, & a third on the neck, which some of them affirmed immediately killed him, others that he then fell down but languished till next morning & and then died, but every one of them agree that from the first beating to the death was all within the space of 24 hours, & that the beating all happened while the Second Mate was aboard, but the death after he went ashore.

Part of this Evidence was confuted by the Second Mate, who affirms that he did not come ashore till about 10 the next morning, & that he saw the Boy that morning about his Business thô very Stiff with the punishment of the preceeding day. This assertion gave the board some reason to Suspect the Lascars Evidence & they were more inclined thereto from the time of the boy's death, which did not happen till the thursday, whereas the beating was on the Saturday, & they all agree in making it the transaction of a few hours. However the further consideration of this matter was deferred till next Consultation against which time the Secretary was ordered to send to Captain Maul for the Letter that past between him & Sinklaer on occasion of the boys death.

President & Governour of Fort S. George and to the other Gentlemen of Council.

HONOURABLE SIR & SIRS,

Yesterday I Received a Letter from M^r. Savage Secretary to Your Honourable Council, requiring my Reasons for putting into this Place, which I take the Liberty of laying before You in the following Manner.

On February the 6th. We met with a most Violent Storm in Lattitude of 39 S. and about 2 Degrees We[s]tward of the Island of St. Pauls, at which time we Sprung our Bowsprit and Shiver'd it from End to End, and it was with the greatest difficulty we were able to Save our Foremast but not being able to carry any Sail upon a Wind it was judged by a Consultation of my Officers highly necessary to make the best of our Way to Batavia as the most likely place to be supplied with an other Bowsprit and to which place we might proceed with the most Safety. According we bore away, But as an addition to our Misfortune we fell in a Little to the Eastward of Java Head and by a hard N. Wt. Wind and a Current Setting to the Eastward we were drove about Eighty Leagues to the Eastward on the back of that Island, where the Westerly Winds & Current continuing, We were detained near a Month & most of my People in a miserable Condition with the Scurvy. We arrived at Batavia the 18th. of April and sailed from that place the 4th. of May. My People in a great Measure recovered, But in my Passage Over, began to Relapse a pace, So that I judged it highly Co[n]venient to get them some fresh Provisions as soon as possible. An other Reason for my putting in was my being unwilling to have it reported by the first Ship for England that we were a missing Ship. Besides in my Instructions from my Honble Masters I am permitted to put in here, If I thought Convenient.

A DIARY OF TRANSACTIONS AT BANJAR MASSEEN ON THE ISLAND OF BORNEO, KEPT BY JOSEPH HURLOCK ON BOARD SHIP JANE CAPTAIN ROBERT MYLNE COMMANDER.

We arrived in Tomborneo Road, when a Boat came a board from the Sultan 1737/8 with orders to enquire from whence we came, & on what Account, of which we MARCH informed accordingly, likewise the Messenger assured us of perfect peace & tranquillity in the whole Country, we asked the price of Pepper, when he told us it was 9 Dollars \$\psi\$ Pecul last Year, besides other Customs, as to the present price he could not tell, there being but one Junk from Limpo (in China) arrived as yet, but that they were in dayly Expectation of two more, which if they should safely come, without all doubt it would still rise higher.

The Captain having considered the great charge which would arise in Shipping the Pepper on board his Ship, laying without the Barr, as also the ill conveniency to Negotiate our business in being so remote from Tatas the Metropolis of the Kingdom here, that he resolved to proceed with the Ship into the River up to Banjar Masseen, the Place which the Honble Company formerly built a Fortification on.

Having made it my Business to get good intelligence of the Pepper Merchants, as also the proper objects that can incite them to industry, distributed presents in the Name of the Honble Company in the most likely manner to be of energy & force to promote a good alliance between the Honble Company & them.

This day I had a Second audience before his Majesty with whom I confer'd about the price of Pepper, & importuned him to abate something of his aforesaid resolution for that we have been here 12 days already & not in the least any appearance of succeeding in our Negotiations, & told him such delays amongst Europeans are esteemed pernicious to all Correspondence, for it carrys a colour of reluctance to the Friendship we naturally proposed from the encouragement promised in Letters to the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlbrô, & the unavoidable expence in . defraying the continual growing charges of a Ship, These I made use of as strong incentive arguments to promote a speedy conclusion of our Affairs, they being a litigious and slothful sort of People, who without such expostulations are continually for keeping one in suspence with the view that we must in process of time be glad to embrace their own proposals, to which he gave me no other Satisfaction, than that the Chineese had consent to the same terms he had proposed us, & if we did not concurr also, we could not obtain any of that Commodity, at the same time he acquainted me with his intention of returning to Cayatonge his place of Residency & is computed to be 50 Miles inland from Tatas, therefore for the better executing our business he had deputed Key Wergo the Shabander to be applyed to.

The Shabander sent a Messenger to acquaint us, that he could not protect us Aprill unless the Ship was at Tatas, the reason of which I could not imagine, when it was first their earnest desire the Captain should bring his Ship to the town of Benjar Masseen, until I had heard from the most creditable persons that by the Ship lying at Banjar we might design some underhand dealings with Pangaran Singo Saree &c. which in no light would be agreeable to his Majesty, as they are not reconciled to each other, therefore to convince them we had no such intention, sent the most plausible excuse we possibly could, without giving them any cause to apprehend, we were in the least defident of their protection, though certainly we was not perfectly satisfyed with their pressing to carry the Ship to Tatas, where we must entirely be in their power without being able to make any resistance against them, in case they should attack us.

Since the 3^d. Instant nothing remarkable happened concerning the Price of Pepper, so that I desired Key Wergo would wait on his Majesty with my Respects & that he would be pleased to satisfy me whether or no the Honble Company may have any encouragement to trade with his Highness upon more reasonable conditions, than already proposed.

This day Key Wergo returned with his Majestys answer to the Message sent him the 10th. Instant, the Substance of which was that his Majesty being willing to give any encouragement to the Honble Company within the limits of reason, therefore he had accordingly reduced the Price of Pepper to Six Dollars & Pecul including Customs, which he expected would be acceptable without any more Sollicitations for a further abatement, & in reallity it is the price which was thought reasonable by the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlbrô in their Instructions to me, wherein they mention 5 Dollars & Pecul besides Customs to his Majesty which at this present is one Dollar & Pecul.

Having been here almost a month Captain Mylne desired to know what Progress I had made in relation to the price of Pepper when I acquainted him with Yesterday's Transactions, & that I was of an Opinion there is no probability of geting it for less, considering the vast demand in China for that Commodity which the Natives here are perfectly sensible of, & there being now here a Junk which will obtain the purchase of 5000 Pecul, on which Captain Mylne this day made a Contract in behalf of his Owners for his Ship Load on the same terms.

Arrived Captain Pelly Commander of the Prince of Wales with Mess¹⁵. Lyell & Hodgson Supracargoes from the Honble Court of Directors, bound here with orders to procure a Cargo of Pepper & then proceed for China, as also they informed me the Honble Company had delivered them instructions for making a possitive Contract with the Sultan at any price they shall think proper, & I considering my

#### HUMBLY SHEWETH

That Your Petitioners having been called upon by Your Honour &ct. to contract for the Honble Companys Broad Cloth which arrived here in the Year 1737 & told that in Consideration of the debasing of the Current Coin of the Country Your Honour &ct. insisted on an advance of three # Cent on the price usually given for some Years past by the Honble Company's Merchants for the said Cloth Your Petitioners did thereupon represent to your Honour &ct. That they could not purchase the st. Cloth on the above terms unless Your Petitioners could first settle an agreement among themselves for the selling the same again and Your Honour &ct. have allowed us time in order for making such agreement. Your Petitioners did in the month of March last agree to the purchase of the said parcel of Cloth at the rate demanded, But to Your Petitioners very great surprise when they came to take out a parcel of the said Cloth They were charged from £ 14 to £ 16 \$\varphi\$ Cloth, Whereas the Sortment which used to be sent out by the Honble Company used never to exceed £ 13:10 to £ 13:15 of which there were only a few Bales the greatest Quantity being from £ 12: 5 to £ 13 which last Sorts are what were always indented for from hence. Your Petitioners did hereupon examine the Invoices & Compare them with those of the Year before as by the [State] thereof hereunto annexed by which it appears That Y. Petitioners are Sufferers by the said advance in the amount of twelve hundred pounds Sterling. Yr. Petitioners did not however immediately apply for releif being in hopes the Merchants in the Country would make a proportionable allowance in the price according to the goodness of the Cloth but Your Petitioners have been intirely disappointed in their expectations for the Buyers in the Country will give no more for these than for the common Sorts because the Common Auroras are good enough for the uses they are put to and when the Merchants will go to a higher price they always demand the fine Scarlets. Your Petitioners further beg leave to represent to Your Honour &ct. That the Lists called in the Invoices Stop Lists are a great detriment to the Sale of the Cloth the Buyers disliking them insomuch that Your Petitioners are with great difficulty able to get them off at the old rates thô some of them are charg'd at £ 16 \$\phi\$ Cloth the white Lists being preferred thô the cloth is courser.

Your Petitioners acknowledge that they might have examined the Invoices before they contracted for this Cloth and had they done so they would have no reason to apply now to Your Honour &c. for releif. But as they were well apprised that the Indents from hence in the Year 1735 were for the same Sorts as had been usually Sent out They did not apprehend this Cloth was of a different kind & therefore such examination seemed to be needless.

Your Petitioners humbly request Your Honour &c^t. will take the premises into your serious Consideration and allow them such releif as Your Honour &c^t. in Y^r. great equity shall seem meet.

The Lead of the drying place full of Cracks and unsolder'd, by which the Water had soaked so into the platform as to render it quite useless. The Walls of the Beating places, refining places, & the several godowns for keeping and mixing the Saltpetre, Brimstone &c. other materials which have for many years been supported by several Buttresses fallen down in many places and the rest so water soaken, cracked and swelled that they must fall very shortly insomuch that it is dangerous for the workpeople to go in and out least the roof (the Palmiras & rippers of which are most of them rotten) should fall in as two of them did the last Year. The Doors and Windows quite decayed and Shatter'd with Age and the Tank filled up, insomuch That no part of the Building is any longer serviceable.

It's agreed to pull it down.

The Condition of the said Building being taken into Consideration it was agreed to be necessary to pull the whole down in order to save what few of the materials may be serviceable again to rebuild the same, whereupon the Paymaster and Store-keeper were directed to form a Plan for a new one, & to make an Estimate of the Expence thereof.
