Mr. Sanderson declining it Mr. Simpson is, appointed Chief of Vizagapatam. M^r. John Sanderson who arrived here from Vizagapatam the 29th. past desiring to be excused from returning thither, his request was granted & M^r. Charles Simpson appointed Chief of Vizagapatam in his room.

Cap*. Martin acqts. the Bod, he took in his St. Helena Tounage at Bengal. Letter from Captain Martin of the Princess Mary read as entered hereafter acquainting us that his Charterparty proportion of Goods for S^t. Helena was put on board in Bengal.

The Fine Long Cloths prove inferiour to Muster. The Warehousekeeper having acquainted the Board last Consultation, that the Merchants would have ready as this day some fine Long Cloth to be sorted, we accordingly mett in the Warehouse this morning, but there not being one Bale of it equal to Number One, the whole parcel was ordered into the turned out Godown, and the Merchants directed to attend the Board in the Fort, & being now called in

and asked the reason why this sort of Cloth came so short of the Muster, gave for answer, that it did not proceed from any want of Care on their part, but the constant practice of the Weavers who would not undertake to work before they were advanced almost the whole price, nor could they be obliged to keep up to Muster, for it would have no Effect to threaten not to employ them, because the great demand for the Goods of this Coast, which is greater than all the Weavers in the Country can Manufac-The Causea ture, is the occasion that whenever they are in humour to work they never want assigned. employ of one sort or other, and to return or leave the goods upon their hands, would have a worse Effect, as it was attended with almost a Certainty of loseing the Money. The Merchants went on to say that we could not be ignorant of the difficultys they met with in the country, as well from the little tricks of the Government, as the preverse Temper of the Weavers. That as to the last the only way they had to deal with them, was to make them abate in the price when they made the Cloth worse than Muster, but that was mostly rather imaginary than real, as the instances were very rare, that they could get the Ballances out of the Weavers hands. In the course of the Debate, Terremungalem Comrapa told us a story which if true, gives us reason to beleive the Practices of the Government are so great a discouragement to Industry, that there is little reason to hope the Tempers of the People will be mended by it. He told us that having sprinkled a good deal of money among the Weavers at Cundatore, about six Weeks ago, he went up there to press them in their work, and whilst he was there the havildar sent for all the heads of the Weaver's houses and told them, as it appeared to him they had a good deal of Business, he thought they could afford to be taxed at Twelve pagodas # house; but the Weavers refusing to pay more than four pagodas # Annum, as they had done for some Years past; the Havildar imprisoned them, & all the favour Comrapa could obtain was that they might have the liberty of working for him in the day time upon his giving security for their appearance, and to return them every Night to the Prison. he said the dispute was not ended when he left Cundatore, but he apprehended the Consequence to himself would be a difficulty hereafter in geting his Ballances out of the Weavers hands.

The Merchants being withdrawn the Board took into consideration what method The Board's would be best for the Company's Interest, and thô it is to be doubted whether if we resolves about the Fine should take this Cloth at lower Numbers & a proportionable Price, it would mend the Long Cloths. Fabrick of the next Parcell, yet considering all, the Merchants have said upon the occasion, and that the 2^d. Number of the 2^d. Sort at 55 \$\pi\$ Corge is really a much better & cheaper cloth in proportion than the Salem Cloth at $47\frac{1}{2}$ Corge; considering also how pressing our Honble Masters have been for these two Years past to Encrease the quantity of Fine Long Cloth, and that it is not in our power this year to get more or better, it was AGREED that if the Merchants will consent to have the Fine Long Cloth of 12 Cawls sorted & prized after the same manner as we did that by the Beaufort, we would take it in, otherwise we must reject it; and the Merchants being called in and acquainted with our Resolution, replied that we might sort it to as many numbers as we thought fitt, but as to the Price they desired time to consider it, and to look over their accounts. In the mean time the Warehousekeeper was ordered to summon a sorting for dividing the cloth to such numbers as it would sort to, and then the Board adjourned.

whole, the causes of which being unavoidable & particularly set forth in the said report, leave the Board no room for any further remark thereon. The Revenues appear also to have encreased in the same time Eight thousand five hundred eighty thereon. three Pagodas, six fanams & forty seven Cash 8583. 6. 47 which is chiefly owing to a large Importation of Goods from Bengal, the Royal Guardians Cargo from China, & two Macao Ships.

Remarks

But by the Accounts now delivered in by the Sea & Land Customer as entered Remarks on hereafter of those Revenues severally collected by them from primo January 1738 to the Sea & Land Customs the 31st. Ultimo, compared with those of the former year there appears a decrease in Accors. the Sea Customs of five thousand eight hundred & three pagodas twenty four fanams, & entered. and forty seven Cash 5803. 24. 47 and in the Land Customs of three thousand two hundred ninety six Pagodas twelve fanams & twenty two Cash 3296. 12. 22.

The decrease in the Sea Customs proceeds from a smaller Importation of Bengall Causes of the Goods than the former Year, the Penha not arriving from Macao, four or five ships them. having lost their passage from Pegue, the detention at Junkceilone of the Tin ship, and not any that came here from Mergy. The decrease in the Land Customs proceeds from a very small Exportation of Goods to Pegue, and not any to Junkceilone & Mergy, but chiefly that no ship went from hence this Year to Manilla except the St. Domingo that lost her passage the Year before and carried very few fresh Goods.

Honble Sir & Sirs

According to your Orders We have perused the several Books & papers received from Fort Marlbrô by the last return of the George, As we find the Gentlemen have given so full an Account of their Transactions in the General Letter, we shall have little to offer to Your Honour &c*. at this time w*ch*. we shall proceed to do & then lay before you the Expence & Revenues for the last Year as usual.

The several Reasons for the dispatch of the Queen Caroline an early Ship for Europe as recited in Consultation of the 30th. June and Tenth paragraph of the General Letter, will we presume be satisfactory to our Honble Masters, as thereby some months Demorage will be sav'd, the dispatch of the Scarborough be Facilitated, & the great satisfaction it will give the Planters to have their Pepper taken off.

In Consultation the 30th. June a Report is made of Sundry deficiencys in the Storehouse Amounting to \$955. —. 66 and of Overplusses to \$253. 1. 6 upon which M^r. Rigg was called upon, who delivered in his Answer the 10th. July, and has therein explained how those deficiencys did arise, and it appears thereby that for several Years past no allowance had been made for waste, Rust, and other Decay of Stores, & many Delivered out for the Companys use, and Omitted to be brought to Account, as particularly mentioned by him to the value of \$925. —. 53 Occasioned as it is said by the Deaths and frequent removals of several persons who have acted in that employ for the two last Years. The two Accounts being compared the difference is only \$30. —. 13 and the Overplusses as abovementioned \$253 1. 6 and we are therefore of Opinion that as there are these Overplusses and no exception has been made to any Article contained in M^r. Rigg's Account he is not chargeable for any Sum, how far the reasons given for the Omission of not regularly taking and Signing the Account remains to each other, may Plead an excuse will be determined by your Hon^r. &c^t.

The Crop of pepper is likewise to be Plentiful, and the Investment much larger than the preceding Year, when the Vines suffered very much by the Drought. They have Appointed an European surveyor of the Southern Plantations, which part of the Country seems to require an overseer, especially Koonkoy where most have neglected their Gardens and it is high time to call them to an Account, They have also on the reconciliation of the two pangarans persuaded them to go themselves into the Country of Soongey Etan to encourage the people to make a thorough Trial in that part and if it does not succeed to Plant Coffee.

If Seedé Ibrahim can be brought to perform his promise of setting the people of the Eight Dusans to the making of pepper plantations and not to Harbour or Conceal the Company's and other Slaves that run away, we are of opinion the allowing him Ten Dollars P month will be much for the Company's Interest, but that no Confidence ought to be put in him as he is a Man notorious for Villany & Treachery and was the Cheif Promoter of the Troubles in 1719.

As there have been so many Fires of late, the Tiling the pepper Godown & removing the small houses that were adjoining it, are Certainly very proper.

They have pitched upon a Spot to erect the small Fort at Moco Moco, and have prepard some Bricks & Chinam, but represent they are in great want of people to carry on the Buildings there, At Manna also a House and some fence seems absolutely necessary to secure the Company's Effects on any sudden troubles in those parts.

We are sensible of the difficulty there is in providing Brick & Chinam at Moco Moco, however we think the advance of 500 Dollars to Bugginda Rajah (considering him as a Mallay Man of no substance) by much too large a sum to put in his hands, and One or two hundred Doll's at a Time would have been a Sufficient sum to have enabled him to have gone on with that Business.

The Difficiency of Cloth at Moco Moco during Mr. Savage's Residence they mention will be made good from the produce of his Effects, and as to the deficiency of Stores under his care at that Settlement referr'd to Your Honour &ct. it cannot be so well adjusted here at present as we observe from the Moco Moco Letters, there are several Articles have been found, and not brought to his Credit, and others which require some Explanation, thô in general we beleive with them, that most of the Articles for which his Account has been Debted, have been expended for the Compys use, and omitted by him during his Sickness to have been brought to Account, as they are of that kind, w^{ch}, are every month delivered out at that place.

In reference to Mr. Crawford's Petition to Your Hon. &ct. for the Amount of his Bill of necessarys sent the deceased Mr. Innes, it appears those things were received by the Secretary & sold at Outery, and that the Estate is answerable to Mr. Crawford for the Cost amounting as Phis Bill to P. 67. 4.

A Number of Slaves are very much wanted at that Settlement, without a Supply of which a great part of the necessary Business cannot be carried on, we believe 150 Coffrees will be as few as can serve the several Occasions.

A Ship arriving Yesterday from Manilha, it was taken into consideration whether to purchase any silver to send to Bengal in Consequence of the letter wrote us by the President & Council there the 25th. December last. Our Cash is at present considerably larger than we can want upon Account of the Investment, and thô we should towards the end of the Year be obliged to sell some of the silver by the expected Ships, it is not likely that the price will be much cheaper than fourteen and a half Dollar weight Mexico Silver the price it is now at in Town, & as it is probable the Company may be paying an high Interest in Bengal when at the same time they have a large Cash lying useless here, it was agreed to be for our Honble Master's Interest to buy some Silver to send by the Sloops now bound to the Bay, and that the Quantity should be about 50,000 Pagodas, and the Import Warehousekeeper was ordered to purchase the same if he could agree for it at 14½ Dollar weight # 10 Pagodas.

The Badness of the Current Pagodas debated.

There being at present great Complaints in Town of the badness of the Current Money coined in the Country Mints, and many of the Merchants having stopp'd payment upon pretence that they cannot get any page. of Eighty and a half Touch, agreeable to the Regulation of December 1737, the Board entered into Debate concerning the same And the President having acquainted the Board that he had complained to Imaum Sahib at his last Visit of the practices of the Country Mints, He replied that it was impossible to put a stop to them without the Nabob would interfere with his Authority, that if it was very true he had three Mints under his own direction where he beleived they Coined as bad money as any where else, but it would be to little purpose and would ruin his own Mints if he should prohibit them from Coining as bad mony as the rest which were not fewer than fourteen in number, That the fault was more in the Merchant than the Minters and all he could do at his own Mints was to Order that if any of our Merchants would send

their Gold into the St. Thome Mint they should be Coined there of Eighty and a half Touch if they desired it, and if that would not do, we might try what Effect would follow from fixing a Batta or rather a discount upon all such Pagodas as should be worse than that Touch.

Though the Board do not build much upon the Success of this Expedient, yet as we cannot at present think of any other which is not liable to as many Exceptions, it Was AGREED to try the Experiment and therefore ordered that on all Pagodas that do not come up to Eighty & a half Touch a Batta or discount shall be allowed of Four P Cent without regard to the Touch of the said Pagodas, provided notwithstanding that if any Pagodas shall be offered in Payment of a Touch inferiour to Seventy Eight they shall be melted down and Coined into Madrass Pags. at the Charge of the person who offers them in payment, being first carried to one of the Justices, and by him sent to the Mint.

Mr. Burton delivers in a Remonstrance concerning several Foreign Ships gone from hence to China this season.

The President informs the Board That he had called them together at the request of M^r. Burton who told him he had somewhat to offer to their consideration where upon M^r. Burton delivered in a paper to the Secretary which was read as entered after this Consultation to the following purport.

proposing in particular the stopping one belonging to Mons^r. de La Metrie. The subject of it considerd

That several French and Maccao Ships having been permitted to load here this Season for China had been, as he apprehended, greatly destructive of the interest of the English in general & the Inhabitants of this place in particular, & that opposing such proceedings would be acting in Conformity to the Company's sentiments & Commands. He further in the said paper declares he has no concern directly or indirectly in any of those Ships & proposes to join in any measures that might be thought proper for stopping one of them which still remained in the Road belonging to Mr. De Lametrie whom he calls an Inhabitant of this place, lastly he desires the said Paper may be entered upon Consultation to clear him to our Honble Masters.

Remarked on.

Then the Company's orders by the Decker referred to by Mr. Burton were read, as were also the resolutions affixed at our Sea Gate here said by him to have been put there, consequent to the said orders but was done several months before, as is plain from our Consultation of the 21st. July 1736 where the said resolutions are at large entered. And on the Debate it was the Concurrent Opinion of the whole Board (Mr. Burton excepted) That the orders in the Letter by the Decker seem rather to encourage than discourage foreign Ships to import here even thô they were from China. The Company tell us therein That they design to send a ship to us to go to China & that We may be concerned in her, of which they give us this early notice to prevent our engaging elsewhere. But it seems to be greatly stretching the meaning of those words to make them signifye That no Ships but their own shall go to that Port, especially since in the same paragraph they tell us the reason of their sending such Ship is to secure the China trade to this Port which say they, The Portuguese & Armenians thô they now come to your Port may in time erect another Mart for all which put together seems to intimate That the Company esteemed the Customs arising from the China trade too considerable to be lost of which there was great danger if the Portuguese & Armenians went to another Port and we ourselves continued to neglect sending Ships thither as was the case for two years together, & therefore to prevent it They had resolved to send their own ship.

As to the resolutions We came to here & affixed at the Seagate The substance of them is That no Inhabitant of Madrass shall be concerned in the Stock of any foreign Ship nor in any loan at Respondentia nor shall procure others to be concern'd. But surely this is widely different from selling them goods. The design of those orders was to prevent if possible foreign Ships being fitted out with Madrass money in hopes thereby to prevent their going at all, But when such Ships were fitted out without our assistance & could get cargoes elsewhere it seems to be the interest of the place & of the Company also to encourage them rather to buy here than at any other place since the Inhabitants have the profit on the Sale & the Company the customs of such goods.

For these reasons it was agreed by the same majority not to detain M^r. De Lametrie's Ship as not thinking themselves warranted, so to do either by the Company's orders, or any advantage that could accrue to the place thereby However as they could not easily believe M^r. Burton would have made a proposal of so extraordinary a

nature as this, without being fully satisfyed the Company's orders were positive for it & having well considered on the means for putting them in practise He was desired to point out such orders & to propose the most proper measures for detaing. Mr. Lametrie's Ship in obedience to them, But replied That he referred the choice of proper measures to the Consideration of the Board, & that he was of opinion what he had proposed was supported by the Company's orders, which reply being so general & giving the Board no satisfactory reasons for altering their resolution above mentioned, It was again agreed That we are by no means warranted to detain the said Ship.

But there being some Expressions in Mr. Burton's Paper which seemd calculated The other to cast reflections on some of the members of the Board as if they were either negligent or ignorant of their duties or worse, He was desired to explain himself thereupon & think answered That he did not mean by any thing in his said Paper to reflect on any person reflected on whatever.

Members of the Board by Mr. Burton's paper. He Explains himself.

But notwithstanding this Declaration of Mr. Burton's, The rest of the Board The Board thought it incumbent on them since thus attacked to explain the reasons of their explain the proceedings with regard to the several foreign Ships that had been at this Port this their Conduct season bound for China which are as follow.

with regard to the foreign Ships that have gone from hence to China this

Those Ships are the Penha, The Concessão & the Invocação, all three from Maccao, & a small Ship bought here of a Moorman; The S^t. Benoist belonging to Pondicherry and another freighted by M^r. Lamitrie. As to the Maccao Men, they sold their China Cargoes & took in their returns here, This is a trade which has been carried on longer than any one of us can remember, & we need only remark, That the Customs paid by them on the imports from China are upwards of two Thousand four hundred pagodas besides what the Company have received on the peice goods, Tin, Sandalwood &ct. of which their returning Cargoes consist to show how advantageous that trade is to the Company.

For the French Ship thô Mr. Burton affirms she took in her proper cargo here yet it is certain she took on board her Sandalwood, Silver, Cotton & Pepper at Pondicherry & nothing here but two hundred Candies of Tin which she might if we had impeeded her here have taken in at St. Thomé.

As to Mr. Lametrie's Ship she has hoisted French Colours & has a Pass from Pondicherry & thô Mr. Burton says Mr. Lametrie is become an inhabitant here, It is certain he is a Frenchman & at this very time Supracargo of the St. Benoist nor do we know any cause for calling him an Inhabitant here, but his being just married to a Daughter of the late Mr. Barneval.

These Ships then belonging to the French and Portuguese The Board can by no means think the Company would approve any severe conduct towards them especially since such proceeding would also occasion a considerable loss in the Company's Customs, a great decrease in the trade of the place, & obtain no considerable benifit for them.

If indeed there had been no goods proper for China procurable any where but at Madrass this year It might possibly have been some advantage to the Duke of Lorrain's Voyage not to have suffered our Inhabitants to sell these goods to any other Ship, But (besides that this was far from being the case, as will appear presently) no future Ship of the Company's could have reaped any advantage from it for this plain reason That we should never hereafter have had any of those goods brought us, since no trade can bear such restraint nor is it a good answer hereto That still the Merchant will come to us rather than go to a Moor's Port since he has no security under that

Arbitrary Government, For (not to mention That the extensive trade carried on from S¹. Thomé is a proof the Merchant is secure in his property there) a certain restraint on the Liberty of trade is undoubtedly worse than the Chance of ill usage can be.

The Cargoes proper for China consist of the following goods Cotton, Pepper, Tin, Sandalwood & Redwood not one of which Commodities are peculiar to this place. The first comes from Surat on the Bengal Ships cheifly designed for that Port & is not procurable here but by giving the full Bengall price or within a trifle of it the only inducement to the Supracargoes of those Ships for selling it here being to exchange This the French bring themselves from Surat & the Company's it for ready money. Ship Augusta brought as much as we wanted for the Duke of Lorrain. The Pepper the French had came from the Mallabar Coast on their own ships & there was none procurable here but what the Chouliar Merchants brought us in boats from Nagore. The Sandalwood is brought from a Country that lyes on the back of Fort St. David & what comes hither is brought thrô those bounds but what the French have is carried directly to them & may as well be procured by the Porto Novo Merchants as by them. The Redwood which for the small value of it scarce deserves to be reckoned comes from a Gentue Port to the Northward & is carried to all parts of the Coast. It is therefore plain that what we have of any of these commodities is brought us in consideration of our giving as good a price & allowing as much freedom to the Importer as he can meet with elsewhere & it necessarily follows that on a restraint he must go somewhere else.

As for the Tin, There are two or Three of our people who with much ado are enabled to carry on that trade to Merguy, Quidah & Junkceylone & it was one of them who sold the French what they took on board the S^t. Benoist at thirty eight Pagodas & Candy a price long since agreed to be too high for the Company to purchase at for China, But should they meet with any impediment in it they must either quit it or retire to S^t. Thomé to carry it on & which they may do with more advantage, than they do even now, at this place, because the Ships from thence go chiefly for Elephants for the use of the Moor's Army & if they get a full freight of them make good Voyages & therefore the Tin they bring is cheifly to stiffen their Ships whereas our Merchants are forced to make Tin the staple of their returns & a disappointment in that Commodity intirely ruins their Voyage.

Thus then it appears That the Restraint proposed by Mr. Burton would prevent any of the goods proper for China coming to us, & it is very possible it might stop many others since it might at another time appear advantageous to put a stop to some other trade as well as this, But should it not, yet we should find a great difference in the price of Goods between going elsewhere to look for them & having them brought home to us.

Thus much with regard to our Conduct towards the foreign Ships in general but for Mr. De Lametrie's Ship the only one remaining in the road when Mr. Burton delivered us this remonstrance & which therefore seems to be the only one he had in view. The Board think themselves obliged to remark thô tis with reluctance they do it, That Mr. Burton as well as all the Town knew at least six weeks ago That Mr. De Lametrie had hired this Ship to go to Maccao & was afterwards to send her to Manhilla there to be returned to the Owner. He knew also That Mr. De Lametrie was buying up a Cargo for Maccao yet he never thought of objecting to this Voyage till now, that the Cargo is all on board the Ship impressed & ready to sail & Mr. Lametrie himself going a way to Pondicherry to take charge of the S'. Benoist's cargo. This proceeding of Mr. Burton's the Board cannot but think very severe since were we to do what he proposes, It would not only involve Mr. De Lamatrie in a breach of Contract with the Owner of the Ship for not delivering her in Manilla but in a loss of the Charges he has been at in storing & impressing her, & in a much greater loss on the Sale of a Cargo proper for China when there remained nobody to buy it, & what is yet worse such a proceeding must inevitably detain him here so long, to put his affairs in tollerable order after it, That he must lose the consignement of the S'. Benoist's likewise.

Thus much the Board have thought themselves obliged to lay down here in answer to Mr. Burton's paper & in justification of their own Conduct, and we hope our Honble Masters when they have considered it will think we have acted agreeable to their orders & our Duty as well as to their interest & the general good of the place thô possibly there may be some particular people who might find their Account in a different manner of acting.

After this Debate was over The Board proceeded to consider of the instructions be given the Supracargoes of the Duke of Lorrain for their managing that Supra Cargoes Ship's Stock as also to what amount the outward bound Cargo should be made up the of Lorrain first thing that occurred to them was that the Royal Guardian & Godolphin having debated & debate each of them carried a Stock of about 40,000 Pagodas the Supracargoes had been agreed on. obliged to invest a Considerable part of the returns in gold at so high a price that there was nothing got by it & it was therefore a question whether any silver should be sent on this Ship, or whether she should go with her gruff Cargo only since it was to be hoped that would be sufficient to purchase her returning Cargo, It was at last agreed to send some silver for the following reasons.

First to prevent the disappointment that might arise by any part of outward bound Cargo selling for less then we expected or Goods proper for the returns being dearer in China, In either of which cases it was proper some provision should be made that the Ship might not return empty.

Secondly in hopes gold might be cheaper than it had been lately, and

Thirdly Because thô it was at as high a rate yet we should thereby be supplyd with gold to coin into Madrass Pagodas for our northern Settlements which we find great dfficulty in procuring any other way now the Current money in the Country is

For these reasons it was agreed to send Eight Chests of Silver by which means the Stock will be about forty thousand pagodas.

For the returns altho there is so great a Quantity of Tutenague imported That the price is now but twenty four pagodas & that there is no reason to expect it will be above twenty six when she returns yet there being no other Commodity they can procure in China in which they can invest near the produce of their Cargo it was agreed to order them to make that the principal article of their returns unless,

They should find Gold at one hundred & ten or under in which case It is further Agreed to order them to lay out part of their money in Sugar, Sugarcandy, Allum & ·Chinaware if they could be procured at a price whereby they might hope to gain any profit. The prices which may be expected for these Commodities at her return the Board judge to be,

> 9 Pagodas P Candy. Sugar Sugar Candy .. 16 to 17 6 to $6\frac{1}{2}$

Chinaware it is impossible to compute what each sort wlll sell for & they must be left to their discretion therein to purchase as they find the price in China.

As to Quicksilver it is so dear in China that a large Quantity brought here will not sell for prime cost. It was therefore agreed to order the Supracargoes not to buy any at all if above 95 Tale \$\Phi\$. Pecull, only fifty peculs if above 80 and but 100 peculls if under that price.

With respect to the time of their return from China her late dispatch from hence makes it difficult for us to determine any thing certain. It is therefore agreed to

tell them what our Honble Masters orders are in their several Letters relating to the China Ships & to recommend to the Supra Cargoes to be as exact as possible in complys. therewith.

Masters of having any concerns directly or indirectly on any of the ships gone or going to China from hence this season or at any other time, Vizt. one Ship named St. Benoist Arrived here the 19th of May from Pondicherry belonging to the French which took in her proper Cargo for China & sailed to Pondicherry the 1st. of June in order to take in her silver there at the arrival of their Europe Ships & to proceed from thence to China, & another Ship purchased here by Mons^r. Lemetrie who is now become an Inhabitant of this place, & has likewise taken in her proper Cargo for China, as Tin, Sandalwood, Cotton, &c^t. besides several Maccao. Ships, in all which I declare that I have been no ways aiding or assisting nor have I sold them any Goods or am I concerned with them in any Commerce or Adventure whatever.

I must beg likewise leave to declare that I am willing & desirous to enter intoany measures whatever, that may be thought proper to hinder the said Lamettries Ship from sailing from this Port with such a Cargoe; in order to deterr him & others for the future from proceeding in a manner that is so distructive of the Interest of the English in general, & the Inhabitants of this place in particular, And it is my opinion that our opposing these proceedings, will be doing our Duty to the Honble Company, & acting in Conformity to their Sentiments & Commands. General Letter No. 61 from the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort St. David of the 31st. Ultimo read, in answer to ours of the 18th. Inclosing their monthly Papers desiring Cash for June & Cash Account for July of which they desire a Supply, They therein advise that one Nanjan Chitty having taken at Farm of the King of Misore the Coinage of Fanams & making of cloth at Salem intends to raise the price of the former & insists that all the Cloth made there be sold to him, or that he be paid an allowance upon it, That some who were buying Cloth there had already settled such allowance with him at 2 or $2\frac{1}{2}$ Pagodas \oplus Corge, but that their Merchants had not as yet complied. & as by these means the price of Cloth must be considerably raised, they desire our directions how to act in that matter, They also advise that a large ship with French Colours & a pendant which they supposed to be from France, passed their road the night before.

The Affair considered.

This Affair of Nanjan Chitty's had been some time ago mentioned to us by our own Merchants but as it was then thought from the nature of the attempt It could be of no long duration as well as for that the advice seemd imperfect & to want confirmation the Board had contented themselves with only giving directions to our Merchants to act in conformity with those of Fort S^t. David in opposing Nanjan Chitty's designs if the attempt was really made. But being now confirm'd from Fort St. David the Board proceeded to consider what directions we can give the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort St. David upon the occasion.

In debating the matter it occurred very obviously that if Nanjan Chittys design should grow into Execution it must considerably raise the price of Cloth at Salem, but this appears an Evil not in our power to remedy & that must be submitted to as a necessity of the times for we have no reason to hope or expect that we can procure Cloth at lower rates than other Buyers.

It was also considered that our Merchants doing most of their business at Worriapollam & but little at Salem the Fort St. David Investment must be most sensibly affected by it. And that the delays occasioned by the Deputy Governour & Council writing up hither for directions upon every fresh step to be taken may be attended with further Inconveniences.

And therefore Agreed to referr the Measures to be followed in this business Measures to intirely to the Conduct of the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort St. David who lye so much nearer to that Country. And to repeat our former Injunctions to our own Merchants to act in it exactly conformable to those the Fort St. David Merchants snall receive from the Deputy Governour & Council.

AGREED also that a Supply of twenty thousand 20,000 Pagodas be sent overland to Fort St. David tomorrow.

Sou Rajah, about two years since, had meditated a design to fall upon this-Country with a powerful Army under the Command of Baujee Rove, in order to revenge the insult offered his relations by the ambitious intentions of the Governours of this province to put themselves forcibly in the possession of Tanjore, a Kingdom which belonged to them alone, & therefore wou'd have been a direct invasion of their right. But Nadir Shaw in the interim having penetrated very far into the Empire, made him suspend his project for the present however. I am now certainly informed. he will very shortly put it in Execution. To this purpose he has made choice of between 40 & 50 thousand of his best troops, the Flower of his Army, & given the Command of them to Baujee Rove, with express orders to lay waste this whole We have not the least reason to doubt the truth of this intelligence. If therefore the Gunyms shoud come this way, You may depend upon it they will visit Madrass. The strict Friendship that has been & continues to be between the Governour & me makes me have the welfare of his Government at heart Upon this Account I sent him early informations in the former Alarm we had, but no notice was taken of them. I hope greater stress will be laid upon these. It is a friendly part I am now acting, and therefore, (I cannot repeat it too often) don't slight the advice I give you, Acquaint the Governour of what I have here related to you very privately, & tell him to make the necessary preparations for the defence of the Town. Desire him particularly to lay up a good Store of provisions, & to forbid the carrying of Paddy or any other Grain out of Town. Let him also provide himself with Amunition sufficient, & Warlike Stores. The greatest precautions you can use will be too little to defeat the Attempts of an Enemy, whose sudden & quick motions, will make you stand in need of your utmost vigilance. I take my leave of you with once more entreating you to credit the above Accounts.

This last Letter being first taken under consideration & the Draught of the Fort Answer to St. David Bounds being called for, the better to guide the Board in judging of the Hubbard's Steps M'. Hubbard had taken & what further directions it might be necessary to send Letter him, It was agreed to be very improper to make the Garrison already too weak much more so by setting off the several parties that would be necessary to the defence of all the Outguards it being to be hoped that those of Chemundalom, Trepopilore & Bandapollam being fully manned & well supplied with Ammunition &ct. may be sufficient to protect the Bounds from any small straggling Parties, but as Tevenepatam seems to lye much exposed to the Northward and Patcharee Point the best situated for it's protection it's agreed to permit the Deputy Gov'. if it be tenable to place a Guard & remount the Guns there; The Weakness of our own Garrison not suffering us to spare any Europeans to Fort St. David It's agreed to permit the Deputy Governour if he judges them of any use to entertain as many Topasses & Peons as he shall think necessary at this Juncture of which it is agreed to advise in the next general Letter thither.

The Board then proceeding to consider the other Letter from the Deputy Ponapa Governour & Council of Fort St. David ordered Ponapa Chitty to be called in who attends. & being interrogated to the matters charged upon him in the said Letter, told to the the Board That his Gomastas at Salem had bought Cloth of Nanjan Chitty last year Complaint but declared possitively that since that time Nanjan Chitty had not provided any in the Fort Cloth for him nor have his Gomastas bought any of him. As to the information Sashacilum gave Nanjan Chitty He said, He hoped he should not be made answerable for every Story Sashacilum might tell Nanjan Chitty, that for his part he had no correspondence with Sashacilum nor was he under any necessity (having his own Gomastas at Salem) to acquaint Nanjan Chitty by him with any thing he thought proper.

Being further examined about his people being privy to the Agreement made by the Agent of the Fort St. David Merchants with Rashapa at Worriapollam for twenty oxloads of Cloth at 39 Pagodas P Corge & afterwards offering 39½ for it. That till he had wrote to his Gomastas & received their answer about it, He would not take upon him possitively to say It was not so, but that he beleived the Deputy Gov. & Council of Fort St. David had been imposed on as well in that as in the other Particulars they had been inform'd of. He having given very express orders to all his people not to advance any thing in the price above the Fort St. David Merchants nor to take in any Cloth which they refused.

Then being directed to withdraw He made a request to the Board That they would write the Deputy Gov. & Council of Fort St. David in case any complaint should be brought them against him in future to call for his father Custoora Chitty who lives there & examine him thereupon by which means they would come to the knowledge of matters as fully & with much less trouble than by writing up hither.

The purport St. David, with a Caution to Deputy Govr. & Council against too readily encouraging such Complaints.

Answers to be it was agreed to advise the Deputy Gov. & Council of them cautioning them at the sent to Fort same time not encourage complaints of this natural land. The purport of these answers of Gopal Chitty & Ponapa Chitty being considered arise so much animosity between their Merchants & ours as to impede both of them in their Business & their near Neighbours the French who are watching every opportunity of advancing their investment should reap the advantage of it.

Answer to the proposal from Fort St. David of withdrawing their Merchants from Salem.

The Deputy Gov. & Council having proposed to us to withdraw their Merchants from Salem It was considered what answer to make thereto, & at last agreed to tell them That as the Company must have Cloth for their returning Shipping we are under a necessity of providing it where it is to be had, & therefore have engaged several people to get it us, since theirs cannot engage for the whole; That we cannot give them any directions in such a point since their Merchants themselves must be the best judges whether their stay on their retiring will be best.

To which they answered that they would provide Cloth for the Company on the terms the other Merchants did That they would be answerable for all moneys the Company should advance them for that purpose, but would have nothing to do with the old Debt, which being widely different from what Tomby Chitty & his people told the Board, they were ordered to withdraw.

Then the Board demanded of these latter what security they had to give for their paying in annually the five thousand Pagodas promised in their proposals in discharge of their debt to which they answered They had none but that Tellisinga & Nellamoota Comrepa by maks. fresh advances in the Country would enable the Weavers (who have been disabled by famine for so many years) now that there was a prospect of plenty to pay a part of their old Debts by which means & by the profits they hoped to make on the Broad Cloth they expected to receive from the Board, they should be able to perform their promise.

Tellesinga & Nellamoota Comrapa being again called in, it was objected to their proposal that they had made no offer for paying off the old Debt, That the Board expected to have satisfaction in that point, or else could come to no agreement with them, to which they answered by positively refusing to enter into any engagment for that purpose, But that their employing the Weavers who were now in their Debt would in all probability enable them to pay off a part of their arrears, & that the profit on the Broad Cloth with those arrears & other debts which Tomby Chitty &ct. might hope to recover while the Board shew'd them countenance would enable them to comply with the promise they had made of paying in annually five thousand Pagodas; To which Tomby Chitty & his people subjoin'd a request that the Board would look upon this as security since they were sure the new advances would be duely employ'd and they only ask'd till April next for the first payment of their old Debt at which time if they did not comply the Board would have it in their power to take such measures with them as they should think proper; Then being ordered to withdraw,

These offers were very fully debated & agreed to be accepted for the following proposals accepted. reasons.

That the delay desired by the Chittys is only eight months, that they cannot get out of our reach, and therefore the only difference to the Company if we are obliged to use compulsive measures will be in the time.

That by this indulgence we have hopes of recovering the debt in time, &

Of being supplied with Cloth from the new Contracters which we could not get otherwise.

Also that by this means a Set of Weavers now in our Service will be continued in it, whereas if the Chittys ceased providing Cloth these people must look out for fresh employers and thô our other Merchants might possibly engage some of them yet many would doubtless go to other Nations.

For these reasons it was agreed to try them till April next & they being all called in again after some time spent in vain to endeavour to persuade Tellisinga & Nellamoota Comerapa to engage for the annual payments in discharge of the old debt 200 Bales of on our side & more on theirs in desiring some broad Cloth might be now delivered them which we could not comply with having the last month sold the whole of what we had on hand of the last & former years to be paid for in April next, least the Chittys having a small quantity to sell should undersell the other Merchants who have taken off near 800 Bales, However on a promise That they should after April have two hundred bales of the Cloth come out this year as their proportion, provided they performd the conditions on their side; It was agreed as follows.

A Letter from M'. Hubbard of the 3d. Instant read as entered in the Appendix to our Letters received, advising that agreeable to our permission he had placed a Guard & remounted the Guns at Patcharee Point, & that he had given directions for entertaining as far as an hundred good Topasses, but doubted his being able to get near that number, because the French have already on this occasion listed several & are looking out for as many as they can get. In this Letter he mentions a void space of 250 Yards between the N. Et. Instant read, acknowledging the receipt of the money last sent them & of the Goods for presents & inclosing their monthly Papers for August & Cash Account for last month, adding that it's uncertain what rout Subdarally Cawn will take in his return to Arcot from Tanjore but generally beleived he will march near the Sea Side.

The Chay Goods providing to the Northward to be put on board at Motopolee. The President acquaints the Board that Matoor Chitteram & Coopertee Pera Lingam the two Northern Merchants had been with him this morning to know what Instructions they shoud send their Gomasta about Shipping the Chay Goods they are providing for us to the Northward in Decem. next, that on his telling them the Board understood we were to provide a Vessel to take them in at Metchlepatam they offered in objection thereto that delays might arise from the too frequent Impositions of the Government there and that the Goods they are providing being made a good way on this side Metchlepatam, the charge of sending them thitner by Land would add considerably to their Cost, therefore they had proposed to him that the Vessel should be ordered to Motipoly a place on this side Diue Point whereby the several abovementioned Impediments will be provided against and he had ordered them to attend the Board to day for our resolutions thereon.

Sanderson Ten thousand three hundred & ten Arcot Rupees five anaes & Eleven pice 10310. 5. 11 on account of the ballances due from some of the Vizagapatam Merchants, and M^r. Sanderson now pays into Cash on said account Seventy eight Madrass Pagodas thirty fanams & Sixty one Cash 78. 30. 61. But as we cannot be certain what their just ballances are it's agreed to order the said Merchants respective Accounts from the Ballance of the Vizagapatam Books in April 1738 to be sent us by the first Opportunity.

That the making so many different Packages of the same species of Goods might not only breed confusion in the Accounts, but might also prejudice the Sale at home, a risque it was not judged proper to run as the Company have large Quantities of these Goods from the Bay. And therefore agreed to direct the Deputy Governour and Council to take in only the whole pieces of the full Length & Breadth.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Having perused the several Books and Papers from the West Coast, we now offer what observations we have made thereon under the usual heads.

FIRST SHIPPING.

The Marlbrô having met with a long passage from Europe did not arrive there till the 3^d. of Decem^r. and then in a very weak condition so that she did not Sail for Benjar till the 3^d. of February, some days before which we observe the Commander had a protest delivered him on Account of his Ship not being in a Condition to proceed earlier on her Voyage, which our Hoñ'ble Masters may likely expect should have been done sooner, and the circumstances of the case left to them to consider of. The sending Messrs. Hurlock & Wheeler on the Galatea to Benjar for the more early dispatch of the Marlbrô will we presume be approv'd of, and we wish it had answered the design, but from what we observe in Mr. Hurlock's diary, the Marlbro, was not likely to get her full Lading before August or September, the Sultan had given his Chop for the Pepper at Six Dollars Pecul and much fairer promises than performances of compleating their business for we find the China Junks were permitted to carry away very large quantitys, insomuch that thô it had been determined to keep the Marlbro for the next Crop, yet it was not expected the Walpole would carry away above 3000 Pecul with her to China & the Galatea is returned without any. Mr. Hurlock further mentions that it was judged there would be remaining after the Marlbro's dispatch about 3000 Pecul of the produce of that Season which he should endeavour to perswade the Sultan to keep for the next Ship that may call there in her way to China.

On the Shoreham Sloop being missing from Manna with 130 Bahar of Pepper on board, we think it was very prudent in them to fit out the small one called the Boneta in search of her & to carry her provisions & Arms to defend her from the Boats in the streights of Sunda, to whom she must have been a Prey in so defenceless a Condition.

SECONDLY, GOODS FROM EUROPE & FORT ST. GEORGE.

In complyance with the orders for Examining the remains every Year with the General Books, we observe the Storekeeper has delivered in the Same, which the Paymaster and Warehousekeeper we suppose will also do to make their Accounts Tally with them.

As to the deficiencys under Mr. Savage's care we'are of Opinion that they arise from the Causes recited in the 9th paragraph of their Letter, and that no frauds or Embezelments have been made in those articles, & they desire your Honour's &ca's directions thereon.

THIRDLY INVESTMENT & FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

The Country has produced a larger Quantity of Pepper this Year than last, and there appears to be proper Care taken to encourage the growth of it, the Examples recited in their Letters & Consultations of Fining some of the Notoriously negligent, at the same time shewing favour to such as have distinguish'd themselves, will very much contribute towards it, as will the putting in Execution the Orders that have been sent them of late Years for building Godowns at Manna, Bentall, & Ippoo & which are now setting about. This is very much desired by the Sultan & People, as we find by his Letter to the board of the 8th. October, and is certainly a very necessary and usefull work, the Planter receiving hereby the produce of his Labour as often as he has any Pepper to bring to the Scale, and 'tis a great ease and advantage to them to deliver it as soon as gathered for thereby the Inconveniency of Lodging it in their small Houses is avoided & they are not obliged to be so long

absent from their plantations which has been often Injurious to them from the Elephants & Wild Beasts entering and spoiling the Vines, and their being now paid at the Qualloes it will enable & encourage them to make larger plantations being now not subject to the Dangers that often attended the carrying their Pepper to Marlbrô, when an accident on a Bar prov'd the ruin of many a Planter, The Godown at Laye is an Instance hereof, the Plantations in those parts having ever since 1729 when the agreement was made with them been Yearly encreas'd and now produces a large Quantity.

On Comparing the last Survey of the Plantations in Anack Soongey with that made the Preceding Year, there appears a decrease of Chincareens and Vines, that taken in the Year 1738 is judged to be erroneous as there seemed to be then an uncommon encrease when the country did not produce so much Pepper as it had done the last Year, This therefore may be look'd on as more exact, but we observe the Resident of Moco Moco in his Letter of the 25th. October advises that several Plantations had been almost entirely neglected, and that he had discoursed the Sultan thereon, who was resolved to punish them for their neglect, but as the punishment is by Fining the Party, the half of which is paid the Sultan, The Caution given the Resident in their Letter of the 8th. November may be judged no ways unnecessary, lest those Fines should be laid in such a manner as to destroy the Intent of them, & drive the people out of the Country.

They have made agreements with some Men from Moosie & others from Pulo Pisang for the Planting & selling of Pepper to the Honble Company. The former being to the Eastward and a pass to Pallambam and the other an Island to the Southward, as it will enlarge their Trade they may both answer very good purposes if the people continue stedfast & well affected to the Company.

The Troubles likely to arise from the differences of the people at Pinajee & Saloomah, have been timely stopp'd, & the Country remains in Quietness.

The Rules laid down for the regulation of the private Trade, as mentioned in Consultation of the 24th. February in relation to the manner of taking securitys, we think are very proper, and the reasons there urged to have their due Weight. As to the enjoyning the Company's Servants to have as few dealings as possible wth. the Planters & Dupattys the caution may be often of service to them, and prevent their trusting their Effects in bad hands, But to go further may be thought too great a restraint on Trade, a hardship both to the Company's Servant & Planter, and not consonant to that Liberty which the Honble Company have been pleased to allow them, & may in time occasion the Trade to fall entirely into the hands of the Malays, which may not only Affect the Interest of the English in General, but serve to disgust the Planters &ca. when they find themselves in such a situation as not to be allowed the advantage even of purchasing their own necessary Cloathing at the first prices but must buy them of the Malays at exorbitant rates, Whenever an Ill use is made of that Liberty by particular persons, it is always in the power of the Governour & Council to remedy the Evil but the general good & Wellfare of the Settlement does not in our opinion make it necessary to lay a prohibition on the Trade so carried on. The other two orders in that Consultation concerning giving Credit to Soldiers, Buggueze Arabs &ct. & paying in money for purchases made on the Company's Accot. As they are standing Orders & Strictly enjoyn'd to be observ'd they do not requireany thing to be said of them here.

FIFTHLY BUILDINGS REPAIRS & REVENUES.

For security of the Buildings from Fire they are about covering them with Tiles, in which they represent they find some difficulty, having no persons well skilled in laying them, who we think might be got from Batavia where they are constantly made use of, thô if the Tiles they give \$ 16 \$\psi\$ 1000 for be such as are commonly used in covering houses We think them excessive dear.

The few Slaves they have being almost wholly employed in the Pepper business, is the reason the buildings go on very slow at Moco Moco, where there appears to be a great want of them. The Factory being entirely decayed, there are some Bricks, Chinam and other materials prepared, the Window & Door Frames & Joices are sent thither, & they seem only to want a good Number of Slaves to forward the Work, And as we are mentioning Slaves we must remark to your Hon. &c. that as the Godowns at Bentall, Ippoo, Manna, Laye, &c. are built for the conveniency of the Planters carrying their Pepper to them as often as they have any ready it will require a large Number of Slaves to attend all those Services, of which it may we presume be necessary to acquaint our Honble Masters that they may send a sufficient supply to the Coast for those & other occasions.

We cannot but agree with the Gentlemen in opinion that no Timber or boards should be made use of in Buildings but Teak, as the other sorts so soon decay, and the procuring as many as can be got from Batavia will certainly be very much for the Company's advantage.

In answer to what the Gentlemen write about the South East & China Building Whether it would be proper to remove or continue it, we are of opinion that as they are in so much want of Godowns at Fort Marlbro, and the Timbers being represented to be strong, it may be usefull to them for the present, & ought to be continued till they have finished the other Buildings & have Workmen ready and materials proper for the design they propose of Erecting more Commodious Godowns in the room of those that are standing at present.

The Arrack and Opium Licences are let on the same terms as last year.

SIXTHLY, COMPANY'S SERVANTS, MILITARY & THEIR ACCOUNTS.

We have nothing to remark under this head, but that we judge it may be proper to send the Gentlemen some Instructions for the management of Deceased Persons Estates, as we observe in the case of Lieutenant Horne their having paid a Demand when they could not be certain the assets would be sufficient to pay every Creditor which might occasion Disputes.
