To Stringer Lawrence Esq². Sir.

You was pleased to inform me on the 12th. of October last, the day after I had been made prisoner, that it was done in Consequence of and in Obedience to the orders of the Governour and Council of Fort St. David to whom I had the honour to address myself on the 17th. of that month, and then did request of them the favour to give me their Reasons for their having Commanded me to be Confined in the manner I had been; But I am as yet so unfortunate as not to be thought deserving of any Reply, at least I have not yet received any from them, which treatment naturally has led me to beg, sir, of you to interceed with those Gentlemen to grant me what I have so unsuccessfully Solicited for my Self; and at the Same time I do not think that I am asking for more than I am entituled to by birthright, by the known Laws of my Countrey, and the rights and priveledges of all English Men, who it's notorious cannot be abridged of their Liberty as I have been without having offended some Law, and even then the nature of the Crime is to be Signified to him, be it ever so triffing or ever so enourmous, whereby he is to reap all benefit of Exception, and have all manner of advantages to prepare for his Defence, all which benefits and advantages you are sensible Sir I am likely to be deprived of totally, unless I am acquainted with the Misdemeanour which has brought on me not only the disgrace of an Arrest, but an Eternal Stain to my Credit as a Merchant, and utter ruin of my Fortune, and as those damages are irreparable, I Conclude from thence that it may be thought my Offence (for I am Concious of none) is unpardonable, and the World will naturally enough Conclude it to be so, if it is kept from them as it is from me; Therefore it is Sir for my own Vindication that I do most earnestly request that you would inform those Gentlemen, That I do demand from them an Exhibition of their Charges against me; for I stand upon a high Bail to Answer every thing which they may have to accuse me of, and if I cannot acquit my self Lawfully and Honourably, then may not only the whole weight of the Laws, but their Resentment fall heavy on my head; and I should be wanting in many Dutys were I patiently to Suffer such Vigorous proceedings to pass over Silently, Since they are of a Nature for which I know no precedent, therefore I shall think my Self highly to blame were I to Submit to it's becoming a precedent in me.

The time for my departure out of India in consequence of the Security I have given for my so doing draws on apace, the Ship destined for me to take my passage to England upon may go early in January, in such Case no time is to be lost, for my Supposed Crime, if I am guilty of any, must I think have been committed in these parts, then Sir you will Surely grant that all I can have to produce and all Testimonys and proofs for my Justification must be in India also, and to be deprived of all these I cannot as yet imagine will be my Case, for I am persuaded that Gentlemen of your Honour and Integrity pay too great a regard to Laws human and Divine than to let such a Manifest Infringement thereof take place. Perhaps I may have the Mortification (notwithstanding all the kind offices you may be so good to make use of,) to meet a denial to my request, In such Case I must be each of you to grant me an attested Copy of such Orders you have received from the Governour and Council of Fort St. David for my Arrest and Imprisonment, and also another Copy of that part of their Letter to you wherein they Seem to deny me a reply to my aforemention'd Letter of the 17th. October.

I am next to inform you that on the 21st. Instant Messrs. Starke and Walsh Served me with a precept from you Signifying to me that my house in Choultrey Gate Street was by the Order of the Governour & Council of Fort St. David Confiscated for

the Use of the Honble Company, this has added but very little to my Astonishment, because I yet flatter my Self it will not be carried into Actual Execution, that is I hope so; But Should they be pleased to confirm that Order, then I beg they will be also so gracious as to give me at least one good Reason for their seizing and Confiscating my property to the Amount of Two thousand Pounds Sterling.

In what I have already said if there is any Word capable of giving Offence I Sincerely beg your forgivness, because I Shou'd be concern'd and very much so to Misbehave in the least Circumstance to you or any other Gentleman, But as all I Solicit for is I believe within the bounds of Reason and Justice, and what you would Sir I am Certain not withold from the lowest of Mankind, therefore it is that I have taken the freedom to make my Application to you, for through your Means and by your Representation of my Case I hope to obtain what I have asked for, and that which will infinitly Serve me In my present unhappy Condition.

TO THE WORSHIPFULL RICHARD PRINCE ESQ².

DEPUTY GOVERNOUR OF FORT S⁷. GEORGE &CA COUNCIL.

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRS

I must own that I am under no small concern at this time to perplex Your Worship &ca with the following Address, because I believe Your time and Attention to Affairs of a more Important nature are required, Nevertheless I hope to Obtain Redress of my greivances withhut engaging much of either, for they are of such a nature as will I hope need no more Enquiry than barely to cast your Eyes over this

paper, since every Circumstance therein shall be truly laid down, and if I am detected in uttering, or writing more than I can justly abide by, I beg that I may be treated Accordingly and Wholly lose all your Estimation for me.

- 2. In the Latter end of June 1748 after I was superseded in the Command of the Train by Cap^t. Alexander De Lavaux, I for the sake of being retired, and at ease, went from there to Tranquebar, in order to settle many Accounts which needed it and more particularly those depending between M^r. Levy Moses and my self, of his Transactions in Joint Trade Anno 1747, and did then Obtain a faithful promise of M^r. Moses that he would Transmitt to me all materials necessary for so good a Work, and more than that, he promised also that he would come himself thither in Case his presence was thought necessary.
- 3. About the latter end of July I wrote him several Letters requesting him to enable me to go on with our joint Books, continuing my Correspondence in the most Friendly and Cordial manner 'till the beginning of October, without the least success or satisfaction, one Evasion or another allways took place; From that time I found it highly necessary for me to enter all Letters which I wrote him, and have them ready to produce and to shew with what earnestness I pleaded for Accounts, with what Gentleness I treated him, and what Just cause he gave me to be disatisfied. However, I could not succeed either in this or any other way, for none of my Friendly remonstrances could avail any thing, Thus tired out with writing Letter after Letter, I at last came to a resolution of waiting upon Mr. Moses at Fort St. David Accordingly took passage upon the Danbury the 1st. of March last, and when I arrived with him I discover'd the real Cause how and why he Omitted to comply with my repeated requests, The Truth was he had no Accounts to produce, but such as even Confounded himself to Explain, I spent 16 days with him and all that time dilligently apply'd my self in collecting together, and putting into order and method such as I Could possibly conceive, what with them and such Others he gave me (though confused) I flatter'd my self I could bring them into some Regularity and on the 19th, of March set out again on the Danburry for Tranquebar.
- 4. After my return thither I apply'd my self with the utmost Assiduity to Adjust the several Accounts; and Accordingly form'd two Ledgers. Which I Eallanced & Closed, One contain'd M^r. Moses's Transactions upon the Coast, from the time we were driven out of this place by the French to the time he left Fort S^t. David bound to Bengall, This I call the Pagoda Account. The Other Ledger Contains his Transactions in Bengall and is a Rupee Account, both these I transmitted to M^r. Moses, and pointed out a Manifest deficiency in the first of Pagodas, 2827. 34. 72. And in the

latter Rupee Current 2462. 15. And with these Books I sent him also, one paper containing 44 Remarks on his Pagoda Account, and another containing 28 on his Rupee Account, whereby he might himself see at one View how all this arose, in hopes if any error or Omission had been committed to have had the same pointed out to me, for I have many & repeated times told him I would give up and relinquish 500 Pounds Sterling rather than expose him to the World or hurt his Credit.

- 5. All this had (I am sorry to say it) not the least good Effect, instead of setting down to his desk for half an hour in the day which would have been time enough for him to have set things clear at least it would have afforded me much satisfaction, and I verily believe matters might have gone well again, The little time he chose to spare from his pleasures was spent in loading me with a deal of his Malignant Wit, and some base false scandalous imputations, which Obliged Me to stop all manner of Correspondence with him.
- 6. However he afterwards was pleased to favour me with what he called a Cash Account for 1747. I returned it to him again having made it appear 'twas Falacious, some time after that He sent me another, which I Returned also, for the very self same reason, He again sent me a Third and which he told me he would swear to, in the first Article, I placed my Eye upon he had made an Error in his own prejudice of Pagodas 3103. 25. 74. I returned this and I did the rest, and he made no Overture whatever himself nor would he listen to my many solicitations for settling our Accounts Amicably afterwards; neither would he come down to Tranquebar where

I promised him I would do all in my power to make him easy, and clear up every doubt he had Concerning Accounts, He treated this proposal as a jest, I then proposed to meet him in Madrass, and beg'd he would come were it only for an hour, No! nothing I could say had any Weight with him, nor could I ever Obtain from him more than that I had debted him for deficiencys where there were no deficiencies, but to this Hour he has not confuted any one charge made in his account nor are there 100 Pagodas as I can discover were they put all together, I nevertheless continued still to employ Mr. Henry Collins as mediator between us & to try his skill and influence over Mr. Moses, to make him hearken to reason and settle matters Friendly but whether, his natural stubborness of Temper or the strong pursuit of his pleasures blinded him to his own Fortune and future Wellfare I cannot pretend to say, but his inflexibility Worked so strong upon me as to have made me come to a Resolution, and I am now determined to sue him at Law not only for the Ballance of his Account, but also for the Penalty of his Covenants in partnership, which he has forfeited and broken so manifestly and so very Unrighteously in many Instances And I have Accordingly sent powers to England to take out an Action of Debt & Damages Against him in Michaelmas Term 1750, to Which place I shall Refer him for whatever differences, deficiencys, and Overcharges he may have to point out in Respect to all Accounts depending between him and myself, our own proper accounts upon the Joint Books.

- 7th. His long delays, his many Evasions, his prevarications and the Idle subterfuges which he for upwards of twelve months that imposed upon me made me at last Resolute and firmly determined to seek that from the Laws which he is not willing to grant, And as I hold myself ready to give Bond or any Reasonable security that I will carry on the suit against M^r. Moses in such Court in Westminister as may be judged proper to Commence the process, I therefore beg Your Worship &ca would be pleased to direct M^r. Levy Moses to give me any reasonable security to appear personally to Answer the same.
- 8th. The 24th. Instant he arrived in this place, and on the 27th. I wrote him a Letter to demand from him all such other Accounts respecting the Joint Books as he had managed this last Year, but He omitted to either Reply or give me any direct Answer to my Letter, Mr. Walsh was pleased to bring me a message from him, which was Verbally deliver'd telling me Mr. Moses wanted now to settle our Accounts & to propose Arbitrators to decide any differences; I would most joyfully and thankfully have Accepted of such proposals any time, since April, & beg'd for the very same all along but in vain, nay told him in June last & since several times, the fatal necessity he would urge me to by his delays, which he was pleased to scoff at, and indeed continued so till his arrival in this place, & I have told him tis now too late, for he has known it to have been my stedfast purpose to leave India in January, & were I now ever so pacifickly inclined, the Time (had I no other business upon my hands) will not admit of it, nor will I now admit of any thing but the Laws to take its course between Mr. Moses & myself, & I avow to Your Worship &ca that I ever trembled at the thoughts of such a desperate recourse, which I was so well convinced would be so much to Mr. Moses's prejudice.
- 9. That what I have said in the last paragraph in respect to Time might not be deemed or thought, either an Evasive or an idle Excuse in me, Permit me to inform Your Worship &cta, That M^r. Moses has stopp'd the carrying on the Joint Books since the first day of March last, by not having furnished me with one single Transaction in Trade from that day to this more than his monthly Cash Accounts, which I did not receive from him till the 8th. of August when I was preparing to leave Tranquebar; He is possessed of many Weighty Articles in Joint Trade, has had under his management & still has many valuable Consignments from England, besides Accounts with many Gentlemen in Bengall and other parts of India. The Heads of which I shall beg leave to lay before you in a following Paragraph; In the first of these I am half concern'd in the second I am named first Factor, & in both these and the Third I am by the Laws of Partnership bound for M^r. Moses's management of their Affairs, and Answerable both in my person & Fortune for all Frauds, Omissions and Other damages which may befall them either through want of care, neglect, or Bankrupcy, This granted, I have now upon me a charge which far exceeds my real

worth in the World and all in the hands of Mr. Moses who has been pleased to keep me in entire Ignorance of every thing relating thereto not even permitting me to see one Letter which he has wrote & they are concerns which I especially ought to know; so that if he has his Will all which I stand possess'd of and more, lays at his Mercy, and this is one of the principal hardships of which I have to complain and to beg Your Worship &ca to interpose with your Authority by possitively directing Mr. Moses to deliver in all Accounts whatever relating to the Joint Books from the first day of March untill now & when he does that before they can be enter'd and Posted; and our Books brought to a Ballance, let me labour ever so hard It's a question whether I shall have many hours to spare to prepare for my Voyage between the time that can be done, and the departure of the ship for England Upon whom I purpose to make my passage Admit she does not sail till the beginning of February; Therefore as I am straitned in point of time and as I think myself exceedingly ill used by Mr. Moses having paid so very little regard to his Friends to his Covenants or to his own or my fortune, let his sufferings hereafter be rightly imputed to his own imprudence, and Refractory behaviour.

10. The 28th. Instant in the presence of Messrs. Goodwin & Greenhaugh he flatly told me he would deliver me no Accounts, unless I would settle his Account first, I have settled his and the last Ballance of his proper Account Current is Pag'. 14885. 5. 45 so much has he anticipated his own Fortune, and that is the Account which I will stedfastly abide by, But what I am about to demand of him at this time and In the names of the Gentlemen to whom the Consignments Belong I do request Your Worship &ca Assistance to Oblige him to deliver the accounts of the following Imports from England, and as the first named Factor in the said Consignments for the sake of my principals, as well as myself, I would have all duely and Regularly Booked and Accounted for.

Sirs

This day between the hours of Eleven and Twelve in the forenoon, I Received Mr. Barnefrom you in Consultation a Peremptory order for me to depart this Town of Fort St. Wall's Protest. George and it's Dependancies in the Space of five days; as will appear by the said 1749-50--9

Order signed by Each and all of you; I having well and duely consider'd the Nature of the Order, do Now tell you that 'tis not only an unlawfull but a Barbarous, a Malicious and a Wicked Order, and such an One that I cannot obey without offending the Laws of my Countrey; for as a Subject of Great Britain I cannot nor dare I consent to give away or Part with so much of my Liberty and freedom, as the Above-mention'd Order imports, Nor can you say that either Yourselves or the Governour and Council of Fort St. David can Presume to arrogate either of you a Power to Banish a Subject of Great Britain as I am from the English Territorys into those of the Mahometans, or other Foreign Dominions, Or from the Protection of the Laws or his Majesty's Flag,

That I am ready and desirous to leave this Place, and to depart from India, I have already told you, and now tell you so again; Therefore I Charge you upon your Allegiance to his Majesty King George not to Offer the least Violance to me his Subject more than the Law can Support you in, & that you do not Presume to Make use of [any] Force or Violance towards me, by Putting the Abovemention'd Order [for] Banishment in Execution; as you shall answer the same at your [cost &] your Perils; But that you immediately cause to be issued [out an order] to any Commander of an English Ship Bound to England, to resceive me as a Passenger.

And For as much as the said Order for my Banishment, is you say done in Consequence of one given you by the Governour and Council of Fort St. David. Know ve That I Francis Barnewall In the Name of his Majesty King George on the Part and behalf of all his subjects, as well as on my own Part and behalf do now enter my Protest, and by these Presents I do Protest against CHARLES FLOYER. EDWARD CROKE, STRINGER LAWRENCE, ALEXANDER WYNCH, FOSS WESTCOTT and THOMAS COOKE all and every one of them for having Issued or caused to be issued, the said Order for my Banishment from this English Settlement and Town of Fort St. George, so Manifestly destructive to the Libertys of the Subject and so Repugnant to the known fundamental and Establish'd Laws of Great Britain. Furthermore I also in the Name of his Majesty King George whose Subject I am, and on . Behalf of all the Subjects of Great Britain, as well as on behalf of myself do by these Presents enter my Protest and accordingly I do Protest against you RICHARD PRINCE, You RICHARD STARKE, you WILLIAM SMYTH KING and you John Walsh all and every one of you, in the sum of One hundred thousand Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain; besides all Damages, Costs of Suit, Loss of Credit, Interest Suffer'd, and to be Suffer'd, by me Francis Barnewall, whatsoever, or howsoever, in Consequence of all and every unwarrantable and illegal Proceeding had and done by you and every one of you, and also for your having Issued out and Signed this day an Order to Expel and Banish me out of the English Limits of Fort S'. George, and Furthermore In Case you do Persist in Executing the Abovemention'd Order or Offer any Violence or Force to my Person by Putting the abovemention'd Order in Execution, or by Expelling or Banishing me from this Town of Fort S. George, Know YE, That I do Protest and Accordingly do hereby Protest against You RICHARD PRINCE, You, RICHARD STARKE, You WILLIAM SMYTH KING and You JOHN WALSH all and Every One of you in the Sum of One hundred thousand Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain, For so enforcing and Executing upon me so very Unlawfull, Wicked and Unchristian an Order, so greatly tending to the Destruction of the Rights, Libertys and Priviledges of a Subject of Great Britain, and the Establish'd Laws of the Land. Samuel Greenhaugh his Petition. That Your Petitioner sometime in the Month of September last Agreed with M^r. George Jones for the Purchase of a House situate in Middle Gate Street in Fort S^t. George Aforesaid belonging to him and M^r. Levy Moses for the sum of 3243. 18. 36 Pagodas and Your Petitioner hoped that they both would have Joined in making him a good Title thereto, but is disappointed therein In as much as the said M^r. Moses Refuses to join in the Bill of Sale Alledging for Reason that he will not Execute it unless the Purchase Money be deposited in the hands of one M^r. Cornelius Goodwin for their Joint Benefits. Which Your Petitioner shows is not in his Power to Comply with And for this Cause.

M^r. Jones by his letter to your Petitioner Dated the 1st. day of October last signified he had Obtained M^r. Moses's Consent (who was then at Fort S^t. David) for the sale of the House at the Above Price, but it since appears that M^r. Moses's Consent did not bear Date And that too at Fort S^t. David, Untill the day after M^r. Jones wrote that he had it at Fort S^t. George, under these specious Pretentions Your Petitioner not having the least suspicion of any wrong Practices paid M^r. Jones 2500 Pagodas in Part of the Purchase Money which Sum Your Petitioner is not Able to get return'd him, nor can he get what he is Advised is a Good Title to the House: And M^r. Jones is about to take his departure for Europe in a very short time.

Your Petitioner therefore most humbly Prays that he may have his Money returned him or a good Title made to the House on his Paying the Remainder of the Purchase Money before M'. Jones be Permitted to take his departure or that he may have such other relief in the Premises as may be Agreeable to Equity.

THE ANSWER OF LEVY MOSES, TO A PAPER PREFERR'D TO YOUR WORSHIP &CA BY GEORGE JONES.

WORSHIPFULL SIR & SIRS

I must Confess that with the greatest sincerity of heart I am sorry it should be my Lot to be in the least Instrumental in giving your Worship &ca the trouble this affair must of Cource Occasion, when it might have been so easily prevented, but hopes Pardon will be obtained without difficulty considering the Terms I have offered, plainly indicates my unwillingness to take one step towards it, Indeed with submission I think it is not at all surprising that I should meet with such treatment at Mr. Jones's hands, for whom I would have laid down my all, when he has been Capable of treating the best of Masters, I cannot help saying with Ingratitude; one who even snatched him from Penury and want, and has been the source and Instrument of his acquiring his Present fortune, which puts him, from the State of Servitude in that of Independency, could be possibly lay aside that wrangling & overreaching Temper of his and enjoy the sweets of What he has in his Power.

I hope this degression will be thought pardonable, when Compared with the many that he has introduced, Shall now Proceed to Answer his Paper wherein I will not only endeavour to be as Concise as possible, but will Positively to the best of my knowledge and in as plain Terms as I am able introduce nothing but Truth, a matter he has paid very little Regard to.

To the 2^d. Paragraph wherein he is pleased to talk of his Retiring to Tranquebar, I say it would have been very happy had that Retirement answer'd the end, it was Pretended to be designed for, which was to settle M^r. Morse's Accounts, as well as our own but instead of that he did neither, unless he would have it thought that Puzzling and Perplexing them with Errors and Divinations ought to be deemed as such, and as to his Fretence that want of materials from me was the Reason that ours were not settled must appear to be a Pretence only, as I furnished him in the best manner I was able, or he had the least Reason to Expect from me, for it is well known and especially so to M^r. Jones, that I am no way expert in accounts and now it is too plain that it was his desire and Intention that I should Continue in that Ignorance, in order that he might the better Accomplish his subtle Purposes. And to the Charge of my breach of Promise in not going to Tranquebar, I say that I would have gone, had that Friendship Continued which then to fore, at least in appearance had subsisted, but when that failed, I was advised, as well as my own mind dictated to me,

not to go, as my want of knowledge in accounts might render it dangerous for me, as it now too Plainly appears, for it is hardly to be imagined that he would in Private have scrupled to take those advantages that he now attempts in Publick contrary to all Rules of honour and honesty.

To the 3d. Paragraph with Regard to his kind letters and Cordial Affection, I say that the Issue too Plainly Shews that there was no other love towards me than in mere outward appearance, and that too, I am now well satisfyed was only to keep me entirely Ignorant of the true state of our Affairs and so lay me under the necessity of having my sole depandance on him, a method not admitted to enter into a Persons thoughts much less into Practice, where there is nothing in view but sincerity true Love and Affection and as to the Pretence of his Journey to Fort St. David being on Purpose to settle accounts with me I hope I Shall not be charged with too harsh an Expression, in saying that it is noteriously false, as will evidently appear by his Letter bearing date 3d. March 1748/49, Ready to be Produced when Required, and with Regard to Mr. Jones's saying that I could only furnish him with Confused accounts must appear in the Eye of the World when Rightly understood to be something very Odd. That I did not furnish him with such accounts or Papers to frame Accounts from, when he went to Tranquebar, is very true, and the reason was because he did not ask me for them, for when he went thither it was in So Precipitate a manner, that he asked to the best of my Remembrance for two Books only which I gave him; and very lucky it was that he did not ask for all my Papers, for I verily beleive if he had at that time done it I should have delivered them to him, and what a state I should have been in then I humbly submit it to your and every candid Man's Judgement, for I doubt it much whether I should ever have had them Returned to me, and make no doubt but that he would have made out the accounts in the same manner he has done, if not in a worse on my Part when he knew me to be entirely deprived of the Power to Produce one Vouchier against him, for I do say that I had always by me Papers and Memorandums of my Transactions which I believe were full sufficient for any one Versed in Accounts to Put my Affairs in proper and clear lights though I acknowledge my own inequality to the Work.

To the 4th. Paragraph I acknowledge the Receipt of Two Books called Ledgers. but so Erroneous that they ill deserve the name, and to Justifye this my Opinion humbly Referr to those Accounts and my Remarks on them. I think Mr. Jones tells Mr. Collins by Letter that he was thirteen days about this Work and Considering that they are the Product of his own Brain it is a great one, but I cannot help, and I hope I shall be excused in Saying though they are very fair to the Eye, that their Contents are foul & most Vilely made out and I hope I may without vanity say I am satisfyed, that all the dirt Mr. Jones throws will not stain my Character for it will not stick, and I wish I had not Cause to believe it, will Recoil with Interest to one more deserving of its favour. But to Proceed as Mr. Jones did not begin his Cash Account, 'till February 1746/7 and I, mine in November 1746, this one thing must make so Sensible a difference betwixt us, that was there nothing else, it is humbly Conceived it would not be improper to have our accounts set to rights by indifferent Persons skilled in such matters. The Accounts I have only Consist of Cash Account and Accounts Current (for I could not get a Person at Fort St. David to bring them up by way of Journal and Ledger, though I am Promised to have it done here). fore must Content my self (and I hope it will suffice for the Present) to make my Remarks on Mr. Jones in the best manner I am able. Mr. Jones has Confused the Accounts, by the above difference in time of beginning his Cash Account by what he calls cash corrected which nobody I have meet with understand and his making me pay and Receive money I never did. About the begining of February 1747/8 I Returned to Fort S^t. David from Bengal when I deliver'd M^r. Jones an account of my Transactions there, and he enter'd them without making any Objection, nor did he till about May 1749 when it suited his convenience find out or at least mention the great difficiencys that then Presented themselves to him, tho' I doubt not but to make it very obvious that he found them where there are none, and Certainly this is Plain that had Mr. Jones been the Real instead of Pretended Friend, he would not have sent

up those Vile and false Accounts Clean drawn out, with Interest Clapt to every Article, without first Advising me of what he looked on as Errors, which I could then as easily as now have Cleared up, for he surely had sufficient Caution given him of my sentiments of them by my Writing him it was impossible there should be any difficiency, and I must submit it to Judgement whether it is probable if there really had been any such difficiencys, Mr. Jones would have buryed them in silence for fifteen months, that being the length of time that he had to make his Remarks.

Here I hope I shall be Excused in Remarking that when People are in Pursuit of what is unjust they very often overshoot and Confound themselves and lay open to that Censure which the Just and upright man is not lyable to, this I am sorry to say it, is M^r. Jones's case, For he says there is a difficiency in that Account of Current Rupees 2463. 15. Which he makes out in this manner. He says I Received from M^r. Holland Goddard a Bill of Exchange drawn on M^r. Corn^s. Goodwin for R^s. 10000 —

and of Martha Saunders 1960 —

Curr^t, Rup^t. ... 11960 —

I say that Mr. Godard never gave me a Bill on Mr. Goodwin, It is true I paid that Gentleman in Calcutta Current Rupees 8000 for which he gave me a note Payable on the Coast, and Messrs. Fitch and Burrows gave me a Draught on Mr. Goodwin for Current Rupees 1150. so in this Mr. Jones is mistaken Current Rupees 850. Nor did I Receive from Mrs. Saunders more than Current Rupees 1150 and Pagodas 207, for which my Cash stands debted in January 1748, here is another mistake of Rupees 810. 12. 9. He has also debted and Credited me for Rupees 174 Paid Mr. Morse at Calcutta, when he ought only to have given me Credit for that sum. As the fact is thus, I Borrowed Pagodas 50 of Mrs. Morse at Tranquebar for which my Cash stands Debted; 30 of which I Paid Mr. Lenox on account of Mr. Charles Boddam who repaid me in 1748 and my Cash is debted for it, The rest was laid out in Expences at Tranquebar. He also Charges me with Receiving from Captain John Thorpe Rupees 80. 2. 3, but I declare I never did Receive it. Mr. Jones has also omitted to give me Credit for Rupees 92. 9. 9. I paid Mr. Goodwin on Account of Gram Bought of Mr. Stratton in Madrass as well as for Rupees 116 for a Gold Watch I bought in Calcutta and for Rupees about 200 I Expended for Linnen at Vizagapatam. Thus Gentlemen I hope it is plain to what Mr. Jones's Bengal Defficiencys are brought, and therefore it is humbly submitted to your Judgements, what Mr. Jones has been doing with the Accounts, and what Credit his Productions ought to meet with.

In answer to the 5th. Paragraph I am surprized that Mr. Jones should ever make use of the Word Desk, not only with Regard to our own Affairs, but, I cannot help mentioning it, those of a Worthy Gentleman before hinted at, not as they are further Relative to the Present dispute than to shew how he deals with others as well as me, for when he had accepted of a Trust under him, one who as before is Observed that had snatched him from Apperent Misery and want: I say how he has treated that Trust, not only India but England Rings of it, little to the Credit of Mr. Jones, but for Certain to the great distress not of that unfortunate Gentleman and his Family alone but of Widows & Orphans, and indeed it is Ludicrous enough to find Mr. Jones so Wantonly fond of mentioning his Desk; at the same time that all the World knows he never cared to sit to a Desk except he was sure the Ballance could be struck in his favour; And indeed he was then very alert but this being of a Piece with his known Effrontry, should Rather excite our mirth than raise our Indignation, if it be Remembred in what manner he was sent to this Desk; By a Certain Worthy young Gentleman now no more, in the memorable month of June 1748, before he would let or suffer Mr. Jones to set out for Tranquebar where he run for shelter from the Enemys of his Country as to an Asylum, yet though that method had in some measure the desired Effect, that is, to obtain accounts from him were they far from being satisfactory nor had those Concerned in a noted House in Bengall have had Occasion to write that his Accounts were enough to make a Man's hair stand on End, if he had

Applyed the time he did spend at his Desk to those just and upright Ends, that a Desk was intended for, and as to M. Jones's Charging me with loading him with malignant Wit and false Asperssions I have M. Jones's Letter and Papers by me, ready to Produce, if Required, they will shew what Language and Measures M. Jones took, and made use of to make me agree to his Accounts, But for my own part, I made use, of none towards him, but the Truth, and have been far short of Extending that to its full length. But before I quit this Paragraph I hope I shall not be thought tedious, or the matter foreign to the Purpose in laying before you a specimen or two of M. Jones's upright Just and Equitable dealings towards his Bosom Friend and Partner, The matter of Fact without the least Gloss is thus.

Some time in December 1748 M^r. Jones wrote to me that if I could take up 5000 Pagodas at Interest till August or Septem^r. he could send the money to the Malabar Coast, and in all Probability make 50 P Cent upon it, and that the money should be Returned in about three months to discharge my Note, I accordingly took up the money from Alexander Mac Pherson; and I was not only deceived in having the money returned but to distress me further did my Character all the Prejudice in him lay by speaking slightingly and untruely of me to several People; Now who would think that M^r. Jones, except it be those that know him, and his undermining, not to say Worse method of Acting, could be guilty of giving such private stabs. Indeed I had the satisfaction if it may be called so, though but a Poor Recompence to see the Author and his Intentions treated with their due demerits, I mean abhorr'd and detested by all Honest Men.

I think M^r . Jones's views are easily to be seen into, and I hope I shall not be thought to see them in an improper light, If I Conjecture that his aim is to Grasp every thing into his own hands, and then take advantage of my want of Money to Compell me to Comply with his unjust Accounts. But with submission I am armed, and he may depend with God's Assistance as my Cause is just that I will go through with it, Assuring him that I am not to be frightned with his Boasted Actions, to be Prosecuted against me for \mathcal{L}^s . 18000 Certain, and \mathcal{L} . 25000 uncertain, as firmly beleiving that he will not be able to get any Person of Credit in the Laws to grace his causes by his appearance, and what must be his fate by having others does not Concern me to enquire into.

In answer to the 6th. Paragraph I again repeat that I am not well versed in Accounts, which made my attempt to bring them into proper form my self in orderthat our disputes might not become Publick, prove Abortive, for when I found Mr. Jones took advantage of my unskilfullness, I had Recourse to the Assistance of two Gentlemen who digested such materials as I had in my Custody into proper order, which I have now by me and with Respect to Mr. Jones's saying that he had made many Proposals to have Accounts Amicably settled, I say that if such repeated offers were made they must be in a very Odd manner, and as to his appealing to Mr. Collins for the truth of his Assertion, I cannot help thinking he takes the advantage of that Gentlemen's Absence; but however, that the truth may one time or other appear, I also appeal to Mr. Collins whether Mr. Jones did ever offer more than once to settle matters amicably, and that was by a Letter to Mr. Collins concerning me wherein after a Boisterous, nay I cannot help saying bullying and threatning manner, to sue me in Westminister Hall, he tells Mr. Collins he was Ready to make it up. This I looked on as a Feint and so it proved. For on my being acquainted with the proposal I immediately wrote to Mr. Collins that I was not only ready but desirous to have all Affairs betwixt us amicably settled, But as I expected he on my acquiescing declined it, on this in the month of July I applyed to Mr. Morse desiring his friendly Interposition. He wrote to Mr. Jones, and did what in him lay to bring matters to a friendly Period, but his endeavours proved ineffectual, and as to Mr. Jones's saying he desired me to come to Madrass, was it only for an hour, and from thence would inferr, that this small Request was in order to settle Accounts between us, I deny it, and defye him to prove that any such Request was made on that head, for the subject was widely different, as the Letter to Mr. Collins, when produced, will plainly Shew, so with submission, to say more on this fact would be as useless towards attaining the desired end, at least on my part, as if I was to Answer every sentence he has

wrote, not less trifling or foreign to the Purpose than this. But to Proceed There are now here several Gentlemen who have heard Mr. Jones say, that he wished for nothing more, than my coming to settle in Madrass, and to have matters adjusted between us but this like his other Proposals was pretence only, for he at the same time sent me threatning Letters and Papers, as I believe to frighten and deter me from coming at all thither; and I do verily believe it was, at least at that time, Mr. Jones intention not to have accounts settled at all unless on his own Terms, as to his threats of suing me at Law, and that Westminister Hall is to be the Place where matters are to meet with their Determination I am of Opinion that there is a much more Proper Place to take Cognizance of such proceedings, and I cannot help thinking that Mr. Jones's Refusal of the Mediation of men of Credit by way of Arbitration, proceeds from a self Conviction that his Accounts will not bear Examination before a set of Gentlemen on the spot, who must be supposed to be able to come at the truth not only more easily but exactly by being on the spot, than any Court in West-minister Hall will I believe take upon them to do and what is Observable Mr. Jones does not take the least notice of the Cash accounts of the year 1747 sent him by me, which I Brought up with the Assistance of the two Gentlemen I before hinted at as my Assistants, and this I cannot help thinking is occasion'd through a Consciousness of the truth and Justice of it.

In Answer to the 7^{tn}. Paragraph wherein M^r. Jones demands me to give security for my appearance in England The Reasonableness of this is humbly submitted, as my leaving India at Present may not only be attended with the utmost ill consequence to my own affairs but to many others, and if I may be permitted to beg the Question, To do what in England Why to gratifye M^r. Jones by going to England to do a thing which may be done here with much more ease and exactness than it can in all probability be done there, and Consequently more for the benifit of all Parties Interested Matters with submission had the allmost Regard to in all Courts of Justice and the Eyes of all Just Men.

Now we are entered on the Topick of security, I Request that M^r. Jones may be compelled to give security not to depart out of India untill he has settled Accounts with every one wherein I am concerned, and to shew the Reasonableness of my Request, I beg leave out of many to lay the following instance before you.

When I went to Bengal in 1747 Mr. Jones gave me a Bond of Pagodas 2000 on Mr. Charles Lodwick ordering me to demand the money of him, on my arrival at Calcutta I tendered it to him, he say'd he was greatly surprized that Mr. Jones should make that Demand on him, when he Mr. Jones owed him upwards Rupees 13000 and sent me an Account Current wherein he shew'd how his demand arose, I took a Copy of it and at my return to the Coast shew'd it to Mr. Jones, he said the Demand was wrong, for the goods mentioned in the Account was lost in Madrass, about two months ago Mr. Charles Boddam at Fort St. David Received a Letter and an Account Current from M^r. Lodwick, in the Letter he Complained that he had several times wrote to Mr. Jones since the loss of Madrass but could get no answer, so Requested M^r. Boddam to Recover from M^r. Jones what was due to him; on this M^r. Boddam sent Mr. Lodwick's Letter & Account Current to Mr. Thomas Eyre at Madrass, desiring him to speak to Mr. Jones about it, which he did, Mr. Jones then Produced an account which he said was between Mr. Lodwick and Mr. Jones and me, wherein he made it appear that Mr. Lodwick was indebted to us about Rupees 200. This Occasioned Mr. Eyre to remark that it was something very Extraordinary, that not one figure in Mr. Lodwick's account Tallied with Mr. Jones.

This I humbly hope will be quite sufficient to shew how liable I may be in all probablity to suffer, through M^r. Jones's incorrectness or other matters wherein we are Jointly Concern'd, if he is Permitted to go to England without first settling accounts with those we have had dealings, For I declare I am greatly ignorant in many, and I fear, as in the foregoing, in some Affairs wholly at a loss to know what has been transacted on our Joint Accounts, so that M^r. Jones's absence before all Accounts adjusted, may render me lyable to great damage if not my utter Ruin so to prevent that, I dont care to go away in so Precipitate a manner as M^r. Jones seems to intend for he must to my knowledge have many Accounts to settle.

In Answer to the 8th. Paragraph wherein Mr. Jones talks of demanding of me other Accounts respecting the Joint Books, I have already given my Answer to the Governour and Council that I am ready to settle all accounts I mean wherein we are Jointly Concern'd without reserve Provided that if any disputes should arise it might be left to the determination of Arbitrators, and So our endeavours not to be come entierly fruitless; To Say more on this head would be needless was it not to let him know I Observe that When he Says he would most Joyfully and thankfully have accepted Such Proposals at Any time Since April and begg'd for the Same all along but in vain; carries with it a Tincture that I am loath to name Vizt. That it is a most notorious falshood, as I can make appear by Mr. Morse and Mr. Collins.

To the 9th. Paragraph wherein Mr. Jones Complains of my having kept him in Ignorance relating to the Consignments from England, and so consequently of using him ill &ca. I answer that I Sent him all the Letters as soon as I Received them, and when the time drew near for the dispatch of the Ships I desired Mr. Collins to write to him & request he would as usual answer the Joint Letters, in return to this he tells Mr. Collins that I had been trifling with him & did not give him any advice of the Silver being Landed, how it was disposed of, or could he tell what Purchases had been made for Returns: Then Says he pray what materials are furnished for Mr. Jones to write upon Therefore as he Mr. Jones has been kept so long and so totally Ignorant of all Joint Transactions in Trade doubtless Mr. Moses must be better qualified to Answer all the Gentlen. who have wrote to us Jointly this year and I Shall desire them to have reference to him Mr. Moses alone.

I have already Said that I had Sent him all the Letters, they could not avoid furnishing him with materials to write upon, for as to what relates to the Diamonds Sent home it is generally the last Paragraph of the Letter as on Such Ship you have Sent you Such a Bulse of Diamonds Contents as P Inclosed Invoice, or the like, and for my not giving him any advices of the Silver being Landed, that Surely was needless, as the Letters told him what quantity there was of it, and if any had been missing certainly I Should have adviced him of it, as the Contrary would have been a tacit acknowledgement of its Receipt, or in my opinion was it material that he was not, Just at that time informed how the Silver was disposed of, as according to common Practice those Sales are never Sent home 'till returns are made in full: so as M. Jones has Referr'd our Consigners to me alone, I have in part and will God willing Compleat the whole of their returns, and I doubt not to their Satisfaction.

As to the three last Paragraphs of M^r. Jones's Paper, I think they are in a great measure answer'd already but least they Should be thought to Carry Some thing with them more than I apprehend they do, shall not pass them by in entire Silence.

To the 10th, with respect to what happenned between us in the Presence of Mess¹⁸. Goodwin and Greenhaugh as much of it as respected business, may be Summed up on my Part, in that ofter repeated Expression, I am ready to Settle all accounts between us I think the Sentence is very plain but least it Should admit of any other meaning than I intended, I will endeavour to make it Plainer yet, I meant to have all accounts whatever Settled and Adjusted, wherein Mr. Jones and I were Concerned either between our two Selves or with any other Person, and not to adjust those of other People and leave our own undone, a method I believe unhear'd of amongst Merchants, in Partnership, before Mr. Jones proposed it, There was nothing else material that I now Recollect passed before those two Gentlemen, other than Mr. Jones's Charitable, Friendly and Christian like Speech, which I really cannot forget, and hope Shall be excused in Recording it here. He declared before those Gentlemen, that he ordered in his Will, that his Heirs Should not inherit his Estate unless they Sued me to destruction; a most Pious last Speech and Confession and as to the Security of the Consignments it is most humbly Submitted whether they may be thought to be more Safe in my hands or in Mr. Jones's, after what has passed, but as that is a matter wherein each may Perhaps have too great an Opinion of himself and too indifferent of the other it is humbly Submitted, I being ready to do any

thing Consistent with my Principals and my own Safety, and cannot help thinking that Mr. Jones has very little to do with them Since he wrote that he should Referr all our Consigners to me, and as to the Points of Circumstances and Capacity to manage Such a Charge or answer Such a loss, I cannot help thinking that every desinterested man must See that these Objections proceed from prejudice, for Surely as to Capacity it will not be denyed that I understand Buying and Selling, and for accounts there are many more than one Capable of that Employ, and as to Circumstances, I hope mine are not doubted, but laying that aside I believe every Consigner has as Great a Regard to the Honesty of the Person he entrusts as he has to all his other Abilities. But even was Mr. Jones's Objection allowed to have any weight at all, They must be Swallowed up in this one Consideration. What an unfortunate thing must it have been for these poor Principals, should Mr. Jones have happened to Dye, and of course all fell into my hands, They Surely are as Safe now as they would have been in that case, I therefore hope the Objections removed, and I may with Submission be Permitted to Stand on my own footing.

As to the 11th and 12 Paragraph I think they do not Respect any thing material other than accounts, so I can only repeat to them that I now am and always have been ready to adjust all accounts Provided it may be done by Persons of Credit well Skilled in Such affairs, and we lay'd under Sufficient Penalties to abide by their decision, a necessary thing in my Opinion, not only to Prevent the Trouble our friends may otherwise fruitlessly take therein, but for the good of our own fortunes, Peace and Quiet. Now I hope Mr. Jones will be deemed answered Sufficiently so hope I may be permitted to Say Something, that he has not asked for, wherein I will not only be concise but Just.

If Mr. Jones according to his repeated threats has any advantage to take of the breach of Covenants I request that that, matter may be exempt, from my desired Conclusion and left to Pursue his pretended one, in Westminister Hall, For to have affairs in India Properly adjusted is all I desire, as not being the least afraid of what his malice or ought else may Present, as my entire hope is in the Justice of the Laws and a known and feeling Equity I have in my Cause.

But Still to Set my Right in as Clear a view as may be I hope it will not be thought unreasonable to desire that M^r. Jones may be obliged under necessary Assurance, to deposite all Books, accounts and Papers whatsoever relating to our joint Concerns in the Hand or Hands of Such Person or Persons as may be thought fit, and for this especial Reason, was there nothing else it is humbly hoped to incite it that they are as much my Property as his, and I thereby have Reason to think that I may be let into a knowledge of our affairs, that I wish I was at Present better acquainted with But with Submission before it is Possible for me to Conclude, I hope I may Say with Justice to my Self, another Sence of M^r Jones's Production must be Recorded.

He and I were Joint Owners of a House in Madrass, and as our affairs were not likely to Subsist longer in A[mity] he wrote to M. Collins, as he was on the Spot (I mean Madrass) That he had an oppertunity to Sell it, desiring my Concurrence, I having no other Objection than the Safety of the money consented on this Terms, that its purchase should be deposited in the hands of M. Cornelius Goodwin for the Joint or Seperate benefit of those that should make the best future Right Appear, But M. Jones was too elect, for me here again by writing to the Yurchaser that he had my consent, a day before I wrote it, at Fort S. David, and by that means procured no less than 2500 Pagodas to be paid him in part of the purchase Money. To say more in this Paper I hope will be deemed needless though much might and is ready if Required to be produced. For it is well known that my Temper has not been inclined to wrangling as Sixteen years Experience in India will evince, by not having had disputes with any, at least a thing, during my knowledge of M. Jones, that he has been a little Capable of avoiding, as Supporting.

I hope there is nothing fell from my Pen either unworthy of my Introducing or your Reception, so shall beg leave, with due Regard to Conclude that I am

Jones call his accounts perfect difference of time makes it otherwise, was there nothing else as mine are not as yet Brought up in regular manner they only being by way of Cash Account and Accounts Current it is Impossible for me till they are brought up regularly to be quite exact So must now be content with making my remarks in the best manner I can and thereby I hopeplainly to Show that the debt M^r. Jones charges me with, as due to the Joint Stock, is merely fictitious and the Invention of his own Brain.

I believe when things come to be rightly Stated I may be indebted to the Joint Stock about 5000 Pagodas but verily believe that M^r. Jones owes as much if not more, But to Proceed.

Jones not beginning his Cash 'till February 1746/7, whereas mine began November 1746, how then can M^r. Jones call his Productions Accounts they with Submission rather deserve the name of a Confused heap invented to Puzzle rather than clear the matters that by Such management as they have undergone are too much so of themselves.

I Now shall begin with 1748. Mr. Jones in his Account Current mark'd No. 1 charges with Pagodas 124. 22. 69.

I have Observed in my Paper to the Governour and Council that when I arrived upon the Coast from Bengal I deliver'd M^r. Jones all Papers Relating to the Bengal Transactions which he enter'd and all was right nor did he say any thing about any Defficiency till about a Year and a Quarter those Papers he has Still by him and I Shall Demand them.

I now comes [sic] to what Mr. Jones calls [his] additional account Mark'd No. 2 of Same date wherein he debts me on Account Mr. Boddam Pagodas 1000, this proceeds from a wrong entry I made in my Cash and tho', Mr. Jones has been told of it by Mr. Boddam and another Gentleman and Mr. Jones owned it was wrong notwithstanding in all Subsequent Accounts he has given in, he has never once Corrected that Error nor has he any ways given me Credit for so material a Sum.

The 672 Pagodas I have taken notice of in first Account, I have also taken notice of Mr. Beawes money. What has been Sent to England on Account of Miss Ann Russell my Cash is debted for it.

I have gone through Mr. Jones's additional Account Mark'd No. 2.

Now I Come to the Paper M^r. Jones calls Tender morsel for a Gentleman's Eating mark'd N°. 9, he Also calls it a Statement of Expences by Moses and M^r. Jones, I must needs say I never saw any thing more vile and false than that Paper.

I must acquaint you that all Expences between M^r. Jones and me are Joint, which I can prove under his hand but when the quarrel about Defficiencys began he wrote me in June 1749 in the following mannar.

M^r. Moses is forbid (to avoid disputes) to Charge the Joint Cash with Expences after the 1st. of March, M^r. Jones will do the same, this plainly shows our Expences were Joint, nay the whole Paper plainly shows it till March when M^r. Jones forbid it, how can he debted me then Pagodas 1632. 30. 12 which he says I have Exceeded his, But before I go on I must make some Remarks, why M^r. Jones calls that Paper a Tender morsel.

When M^r. Jones saw I would not allow of his Accounts he wrote a very threating Letter to M^r. Collins that he would Ruin me and sue me to Distruction.

I in answer to that wrote M^r. Collins that M^r. Jones's threating would only frighten Coolys and not a Gentleman, and as for his saying I call him in my Letter of the 25th. July a Pittifull fellow, I declare it to be false, what I wrote M^r. Collins is as followeth.

M^r. Jones as he Expresses himself in the 8th. Paragraph of his Paper seems to be a true and sincere friend, this I can prove by the little Pittiful sums he has Charged to my sole Account, but to go on with my Remarks on that Paper, M^r. Jones charges me with Expences beginning in February 1747, for then his Cash begins and Ends in August same year 1092. 33. 28, Part of which M^r. Jones makes out in the following manner, to Wine and shipping off from Tranquebar ... 283. 21. 52.

I ask'd M^r. Boddam and Pybus who lived mostly with me also M^r. Henry Collins, I E[x]amined all my servants, none of them Remembers any more than three Chests containing about 100 Bottles each, nay all the Room I had could hardly Contain that Quantity, I sold best part of it to M^r. Mr. Cruttenden did Business for me to the Amount of Rupees 10000 and Charged me no Commission, his and for the great Civilitys he shew'd me during my stay. I made his Wife a Present of a Watch which I Bought of Mr. Ephraim Isaac for about Pagodas 70, not 140 as Mr. Jones Says.

It is very true I gave M^r. Salomons a Ring about 60 Pag^s. Value, did not M^r. Jones order me to give a Dutchman at Pullicatt a Diamond Sprigg of about 100 Pagodas for Civilitys shown him, I dont find that he has debted for it, Perhaps he still intends it.

I could make some Remarks on the Expences Anno 1748 and 1749 and believe could Reduce those Expences to 200 Pagodas less but am really ashamed to go through every Article and give you So much Trouble but shall make some Remarks by & by.

That I said M^r. Jones was like a Dutch Land lord, (who when he brings in his Bill and you Grumble at it he then Carry it out again and adds another figure to it) is very true for when Objected against any account M^r. Jones sent me, he always sent me a fresh one with additions to it.

Mr. Jones in his 3^d. Paragraph Dated 15th. October 1748 Charges that my Expences from March, till August being six months, amounts to Pagodas 751. 6. 19.

I have carefully Examined the Account of my Expences And find the Amount to but 537. 9. 9. As to the Paragraph of the 20th of Same month it is only this, that he is sorry with how little Temper I had reply'd with Regard to the Surat Affairs that he Expected nothing less in my next touching my monthly Expences, I believe I Expend between 11 and 1200 Pagodas Every Year that I can Afford it, I can Prove under Mr. Jones's own hands having a Moderate fortune of my own besides being in very good business.

Having gone through the Tendermorsel and M^r. Jones's Statement of Expences I come now to his last Account Mark'd N°. 11 and acknowledge to have Received from M^r. 

Moses or any other Gentleman, longer than it may suit his Inclinations nor does he allow neither will [he] do it since M'. Moses hath been pleased to give no better Language, and here again like a Dutch Landlord as Mr. Jones is Call'd he is determined to tack Pagodas 1632. 30. 12 to Mr. Moses's Bill, not so much because he did not like the first, but because he is foul Mouth'd, and a great deal too much for a Gentleman, and M. Jones Recomends the Reading of the 3d. Paragraph of his Letter to Mr. Moses, of the 5th. October, and the 2d. Paragraph in that of the 20th. of the same month, Touching this Article of Expences, and for fear the account of this should be like those which Mr. Moses knows, yea, and can prove are so well known in London, Mr. Jones incerts the Journal Entry.

After frequent Conferences with both Casts separately to acquaint ourselves how far Proceedings they might be willing to give up to each other in this Point, and Determine therein Dispute as musch [sic] as possible with their own Concession, We came to the following between the Casts Resolutions.

continued.

That as middle Gate is Shutt up and there is now no Way for the Left hand Cast to enter the White Town but by crossing the Ground where Right hand Streets had stood. And as the Right hand Cast seem chiefly to object at their having done thereon. it too near the Right hand Houses: To order at the foot of the Glacis a Road to be marked out of 40 feet broad, Common to both Parties, which Shall run quite from Choultry Gate to the Sea Side: That the Left hand Cast shall come straight from Permal Pagoda Street to this Road and then turning to the Right enter the White Town by Choultry Gate; or by turning to the Left proceed to Triplicane and else-That the Right hand Cast if inclined may use this Road for going from Choultry Gate to the Sea Side & so on.

Decision

That the Rest of the Ground lay'd open shall remain to it's old Proprietors, where right hand Streets Stood to the Right hand Cast, & where left hand Streets to the Left hand Cast: but to prevent Confusion & willfull Tresspass of one, on the other's Limitts, No Shews, or Processions shall be brought on this open Ground further than is necessary for turning out of one Street down into another for which a Space of One hundred and twenty feet broad will be allowed. That Stone Posts be put up at the Expence of both Casts to plan out these Dispositions.

That it be Particularly Remarked that our Regulations on this whole Article are only made in Consequence of Middle Gate's being shut up.

Then was taken into Consideration the Affair of Tellesinga Chitty's going to Cachalli Pagoda in his Pallankeen by a Right hand Street, agreable to the Assertion of the Right hand Cast, but which the Left hand Cast possitively maintain to be the Limits of their own Pagoda.

Their former Contracts enter'd in Consultation being referred to, We find that One in President Mackray's Time has particularly consider'd the Priviledges of this Pagoda and having weigh'd the Sense & Intention of this Contract, We came to the following Determination.

FORT ST. GEORGE, MARCH 1749-50-

That the Street in Dispute, commonly called Cachalli Pagoda Street is throughout a Right hand Street: That the Passage immediately opposite the Pagoda was particularly made for a Way for the Left hand Cast to their Pagoda, and that they were to use no other. That even this Passage was open'd for them in consideration only of the Right hand Cast's being permitted to Solemnize some particular Festivals in the Year at this Left hand Pagoda.

Each Cast being called in & Separately discoursed on this Article as before: We observe that the Right hand Cast allways have passed in Pallankeens along what is maintained by the Left hand to be the Limitts of their Pagoda, which is an undoubted Proof of its being ever reckoned the Right hand Property. Tellesinga Chitty repeating that he can bring Evidences of his Brother Tomby Chitty's going usually this way to the Pagoda, AGREED to hear them on Monday.

The Evidences consisting of Bramineys chiefly are called in, who Depose all to the Same Effect, Vizt. That Tomby Chitty used to go to the Pagoda & without Interruption the Same way that Tellesinga Chitty did, when the Right hand Cast attempted to Stop him.

The Right hand being desirous of opposing to these, Some Evidencies in their Behalf, were Gratified. But as they only affirmed that they never saw Tomby Chitty in his Pallanqueen this way, it had not great weight with us. On the whole it appears that Tomby Chitty had frequently passed this way to the Pagoda, and that therefore his Brother Tellesinga Chitty should be excused the Penalty of Twelve thousand Pagodas but that he had done this in violation of the aforementioned Contract and his being a powerfull Person in the Place was the only reason of it's being

We then proceeded to consider the Property of the Houses, in Dispute and the Right hand not producing any Contract to Shew they were originally intended for Bramineys, and the Dancing Girls having now inhabited them for upwards of Twenty Years, it is determined they remain as they do.

It was next debated in what manner the Damages committed on both sides should be repaired, & AGREED that as they are reciprocal & not easily to be estimated, That each Party should Submitt to it's own Losses, but to recommend it to the heads of both to make amends as much as possible to their poorer followers who have Suffer'd in this Outrage.

A Writing is order'd to be drawn up out of hand signifying the above Resolutions.

Whereas Disputes have arisen of late between the Right and Left hand Casts Inhabitants of Madrass in Relation to their different Rights and Priviledges and whereas they have severally brought their Complaints to the Council Board requesting the Decision of the Deputy Governor &c. thereon and have enter'd into a mutual and voluntary Engagement to abide thereby under Penalty of Ten thousand Pagodas to be paid to the Honble Company by such Cast as shall any way offend against or infringe the Said Decision Provided nevertheless that it be not contrary to the Regulations agreed and signed to by both Parties in the year 1708 and since in 1728.

WE RICHARD PRINCE Esqr. Deputy Governor of Fort St. George, Richard Starke, John Smith, William Smyth King and John Walsh of Council at the Same Place having thoroughly hear'd & consider'd the Complaints and Answers of both Casts, do give our final Judgement and Determination as follows, requiring due Obedience thereto by each Party on the aforesaid Penalty of Ten thousand Pagodas.

FIRST In Relation to that Part of the Black Town which was laid open by the French, The Right of the Ground shall continue to it's old Proprietors, Where Right hand Streets stood to the Right hand Cast and where left hand Streets stood to the Left hand Cast. But no Shews or Processions Shall be brought upon this open Ground farther than is necessary for turning out of One Street down into another, for which a

Space of 120 Feet broad will be allowed. And as Middle Gate by which the left hand Cast used to enter the White Town is Stop'd up, It is determined that they come Straight from Permal Pagoda Street to the Foot of the Glacis, where a Road of 40 Feet broad running from Opposite to Choultry Gate to the Sea Side shall be marked out, which Road shall be common to both Casts. The Left hand Cast by turning to the Right may Proceed thrô Choultry Gate into the White Town and by the Left to Triplicane and elsewhere: The Right hand Cast if inclined may likewise use this Road for going to the Sea Side & so on. For the more perfect knowledge and Observance of these Dispositions Stone Posts Shall be fixed at Proper Distances to plan them out at the Expence of both Casts, but it's particularly to be remarked that they are only made

in Consequence of Middle Gate's being shut up.

SECONDLY, Concerning Nella Moota Chitty's Street in Mootal Pettah, As it appears incontestable that Tomby Chitty had for several years and without Interruption gone in his Pallankeen that way to Cachalli Pagoda; we Pronounce that his Brother Tellisinga Chitty is therefore not liable to the Fine express'd in a Contract between the Contending Parties of the 28th. October 1728. But Conforming to the apparent Intention of this Contract We order in future that the Left hand Cast go to Chachalli Pagoda in State (as in Pallankeens, Hackrees, on Horesback, with Rondelles or Dooties) by no other Street than that opposite the Pagoda made by the Pulling down of Two Conicoplies Houses. They may cross the Pagoda Street but not turn to the Right or left it being in all Respects consider'd as a Right hand Street. Nothing herein contained extends to the Religious Procession of the Idol, which is precisely regulated in the formention'd Contract. As the Codum is a Particular Ceremony which there is a necessity of performing at Mootamar's Garden, The Left hand Cast have Liberty of Proceeding thither on this Occasion with the usual Pomp by Jugganaudum's Alley.

TRIBDLY, Concerning the Houses inhabitated by Dancing Girls, As they have been appropriated to this use for many years and no Contract is produced by the Right hand People to shew they were originally intended for Bramineys, it is determined that they remain to their present service.

FOURTHLY, Concerning the Ravages committed by each Party on it's Opposite, As they are reciprocal and impossible to be estimated, It is adjudged that each Cast do submit to it's own Losses, but we recommend at the Same time to the heads of Both to make amends as much as possible to such of their Poorer followers who have suffer'd in this Outrage.

Lett. to St. David. the meaning of them and occasioned us to require of Mr. Jones to deliver in his Accounts in Partnership to us, in Order that We might give them to Mr. Moses, which had he complied with, Mr. Moses would have done the Same: Here is so very small a Deviation from their Directions (even as they have since explained them) that we hope it will be easily excused by them and not be attended with any pernicious Consequences. As to Mr. Jones's other Allegations, they are totally void of Truth, and notwithstanding we have had frequent Experience of his crafty Misrepresentations, yet we cannot but be Surprized at his extraordinary Presumption in advancing such a bold Falsity to the Honble the President & Council as that of our having wrote him that they would deny him Permission of Passage by the Elizabeth, in Case he did not deliver Mr. Moses's Accounts Which our Answer to his Peremptory Demand inserted in Consultation of the 25th. PARAGRAPH OF M². MANOEL VICENTE ROZA'S LETTER TO ADRIAN FOURBECK, CONCERNING THE BRIGGANTINE ARRIV'D AT SADRASS FROM MANILLA COMMANDED BY JOSEPH COELHO.

Dated at Macao the 20th. January Reced here \P Ship S^{ta}. Catherina the 29th. March $\}$ 1750 N.S.

I Suppose you have heard of the great Loss I sustain'd when the Ship Piedade was stranded on the Coast last Year, being to the Amount of above Fourteen Thousand Tales, besides the Ship which I had given some years ago to my Nephew; Notwithstanding that loss, I am also disappointed by Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro who being Oppress'd by the late Governour here, and in fear of what might be the consequence, they retir'd with me to the Jesuits College; from whence I sent them to Manilla in a Sloop belonging to Capt. Jeronimo de Hitta Salazar with the greatest part of the Cargo which was return'd back to me on the Ship Santa Anna from her intended Manilla Voyage, as she was fore'd to bear away again to this Place by bad weather, I gave 'em those Goods at the Same prices as they cost me, and an order to them, that in Case they found the Galson missing at Manilla, and they on that Account not able to dispose of the said Goods with. loss, They might then give or Send them at Respondentia to New Spain on my Account and Risque, and to that purpose, I recommended the said Persons to my Attornies and Friends at Manilla. Three were the Persons I had sent to that Place in the above Sloop with Goods, and only One of them nam'd Joaquim Lopes da Silva took the Advantage of my order in applying to my Attorney Don Thomas Sanches Bernardo de Queiros who gave him 30 P Cent Advance on the Prime Cost and sent to the value of Nine Thousand Dollars to New Spain on my Account and Risque; of which the said Joaquim Lopes brought me Sufficient and Authentick proofs; But the other two Persons being at variance with One another namely Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro would not take the said method as Joaquim did, to get rid of the Goods in their hands; but came into a Scheme of buying a Vessel in Company with an Armenian nam'd Gregorio de Jacob; to which purpose, they sold the Goods at 15 or 20 P Cent Loss on the prime Cost, in order to get ready money; and they have accordingly purchas'd a Vessell and a Cargo of Cowries to proceed to the Coast without my permission to make such a risque; and I being informed of these Transactions, and at the same time the said Vessell was to depart from Manilla in October, I could not send my Letters to that place by way of Amoy in time so as to reach the said Vessell at Manilla; I have therefore now taken Authentick Copies of Joseph Coelho's Obligation, who goes Captain in the said Vessell from Manilla; also the Obligation of Miguel Pedro who goes on this Ship Santa Catherina; And as I have no other Person to request in this Affair, I must desire you'll accept the Power of Attorney I now send you inclos'd in this, as also Copies of their Obligations, and as soon as you have advice of the Arrival of said Vessell from Manilla in any Port on the Coast, I desire you' ill put an Arrest upon her and the Cargo she brought, and the Captain also, and demand and receive from the said Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro all such Sums as are mention'd in their Obligations with 20 77 Cent Respondentia, and 10 P Cent more from Manilla to the Coast, as the Risque thither I have now taken upon my Account, and when you receive the money, I desir, you will send it all on One of the English Ships bound to Canton upon freight with orders to deliver it there to Don Joseph de La Barre, but in Case you have not an Opportunity to send by an English Ship, You may then send One half of the money on the Santa Catherina and the other half on the Ship Nossa Senhora de Amparo. In Case either of the above persons can produce any sufficient written proofs of their having made any risque on my account to New Spain, you may then accept the same and carry to their Credit; Otherwise dont admit any reasons that they may Alledge; and all such papers as you receive from them, I desire you'll Transmitt them to Manilla to Capt. Joaquim Lopes da Silva who goes from hence to that place in a Galley call'd the S. Francis Xavier, and in his Absence to my first Attorney there Don Thomas Sanches Bernardo de Queiros, and in his Absence to my Second Attorney there, who is Don Joseph de Memije Bernardo de Queiros: I hope you'll use all dilligence to Recover my Money from them and Permitt it to me in the manner abovemention'd &c.

On our first receipt of Pay in this manner the loss was not very great which we imputed to the Mercenary Views of the Money Changers, and were at that time unacquainted with the Instructions from EUROPE. We have been Particularly ill treated also by a Gentleman who has persuaded some of the Inhabitants not to deal with us after he had refus'd our Money as not Current thô he has a Voice in determining the regulations to which we have hitherto comly'd (sic). THE UNDERMENTION'D IS THE EXPLICIT MEANING OF A PARAGRAPH CONTAIN'D IN THE MILITARY OFFICERS MEMORIAL OF MAY THE 29th. 1750.

That Mr. John Walsh (being of the Council who they thought had the regulating the Value of Money in which they were raid) did on the Officers sending to him for Arrack refuse their money as not Current and positively order'd Samuel Troutback not to Sell them any (so that the Officers were at that time destitute as he would not take their money or Suffer any other Person) which they concluded Mr. Walsh had done to oblige them to deal with him on his own terms. Upon a personal application to Mr. Walsh by Ensign Spear to know his reasons for such refusal, his answer was, he would not to take any Rupees and if he wanted any of his Arrack he must go to the Buzar and purchase Pagodas. As Mr. Walsh's order to Troutback appears to the Officers as an absolute infringement of their Priviledges they do in that point expect some Satisfaction.

GENTLEMEN

As Mess¹⁸. Charles Campbell, James Hockett, Peter Campbell and James Spear have thought proper to reflect upon me in their Memorial of yesterday I take the Liberty to offer the following in Answer.

First, In relation to my ordering Samuel Troutback not to Sell Arrack.

It has been judged necessary for preventing the Disorders which an unrestrained command of Arrack might occasion among the Military, to place the Sole Priviledge of retailing it in the Storekeeper (conformably to the Practice of the Presidency) in Execution of which Office I forbid Samuel Troutback & others, who were Suspected of having done it, to Sell any to the Military or to the Natives, by whose Means the Military might be Supplied: but that I ever forbid or prevented his furnishing Such Gentlemen of the Place as might be desirous of it, is an absolute Falsity; and that he has:fully & freely enjoyed this Priviledge, many can testify & it is extraordinary how the Memorialists themselves could be ignorat [sic] of it when others of their Corps knew it by Constant Experience.

Secondly, In Regard to the Exchange of Rupees.

That the Company's Servants in General receive their Pay at the Rate of 350 Rupees for One hundred Pagodas is true, but it is equally true that this did never influence the Price of Rupees among Individuals, and that even Rupees at all are never esteemed in Payments the Currency of this Place, but Pagodas, Fanams & Cash by Custom immemorial.

Having replyed to such Part of the Memorial as concerns me, I have now to request of you that you will declare your Sentiments of my Behaviour & then give me leave to lay down so invidious an Employ.

Complaint against the Deputy Govr's write **
& Dubash.

Mr. Walsh at whose Instance this Council was summoned, acquaints the Board that a Complaint was lodged with him yesterday, the Particulars of which he thinks deserving of an Examination in Council and therefore desires that the Parties may be called before us for that Purpose.

One of the Complainants being indisposed, and not able to attend Mr. Walsh repeats the Substance of his Complaint as made to him, Vizt. That being Captain of the Ship Gonjoar be brought Ten thousand Cocoanutts as his Priviledge on board the Said Ship and sold them to Francisco da Cruz, but that they have been detained for five days past at the Sea Side by Singanah the Deputy Governor's Dubash, notwithstanding three Severall Applications made to him by De Cruz's Servant for removing them: And moreover that an entire Interruption has been given to the Business of his Ship, by Preventing that part of her Cargoe already landed from being weighed off, and not Suffering Boats to go on board to bring the Rest ashore, all which has been done by Singanah in Order to force him to sell his Cocoanutts to the Deputy Governor's Writer Thomas Pelling.

The Supra Cargoe of the Ship attending complains that for Four days past Singanah has put an entire Stop to his Business at this Port: That four days ago while he was at the Scales and about weighing off his Betlenutt & Pepper to the Purchasers, Singanah's Servant Came & prevented him weighing it except Twenty five Bags of Betlenutt, for which leave was obtained with much Sollicitation: That the said Servant then told him his whole Business should be Stopt 'till he had finished the Cocoanutt Affair and it accordingly was, not being Suffer'd to weigh off the Goods he had already ashore or to have Boats go to his Ship for landing the Rest; and that it Continued in this Manner 'till he went and made his Complaint to Mr. Walsh, soon after which all Restrictions were taken off and he had again free use of Scales and Boats. He further adds that as it is pretended that he Sold the Captain's Ten thousand Cocoanutts at the same Time he did the Seventy five Thousand belonging to the Owners he desires the Choliar Man, who bought the Cocoanutts of him, may be sent for and asked about the Contract.

Examination of the witnesses.

The Chuliar Man attending declares he bought of the Supra Cargo Seventy five thousand Cocoanutts and no more, and that the Supra Cargo never mentioned to him any thing of the Captain's [Privo.]

The Supra Cargo further Says that [Four or] Five days ago he declared before the Deputy Governor and others pre[sent] that he never had been empower'd and never took upon him to Sell the Captain's Priviledge of Cocoanutts.

Sunca Vencaty Ramah Company's Merchant, and Nagoty Chitty, a Shroff, testify that they hear'd the Supra Cargo declare Four days ago before the Deputy Governor that he had not Sold the Captain's Cocoanutts with the Owner's, but however that they likewise hear'd the Chuliar Man say he had bought the whole Cargo of Cocoanutts.

Oracle a Dubash says he hear'd the Supra cargo mention at the Deputy Governor's that he would go and desire [the] Captain to Sell his Cocoanutts to Pelling; but nothing of his having Sold them.

Singanah brings four People who say the Contract was made for all the Cocoanutts in the Ship.

Determination of Messrs, King & Walsh in regard to the Contract, The Question being putt whether the Supra Cargo of the Ship had Sold the Captain's Property of Cocoanutts or not, Mess^{rs}, King & Walsh subscribe that it fully appears to them those Cocoanutts were not any ways included in the Contract and therefore ought not to have been refused to be passed.

That for five days past he has against the been prevented passing his Cocoanutts, weighing off the Ship's Cargo already ashore, Dubash. and desembarking the Rest, and that had he not met with these Impediments he Should have Sailed by this Time; And in regard to the Stoppage of the Cocoanutts he desires the Purchaser's Servant may be asked Concerning it, who being called in acquaints the Board that five days ago he went to the Sea Gate Conicoply to clear the Cocoanutts his Master had bought and then lying at the Sea Side, but that the Conicoply told him he must go & get Singanah's Order first; And that he accordingly made three Several Applications to Singanah for removing them but could not Succeed either Time.

The Captain further declares that all Obstructions were removed after making the Complaint to Mr. Walsh and Boats were immediately sent off to his Ship.

This bringing on an Enquiry into the Time those Boats went off to discover if [.. ..] Boats went off to his Ship that day past noon, the Time that Singanah was apprized False of the Affair from Mr. Walsh's Servant; And the Sea Gate Dubash being detected of Evidence false Evidence was order'd to be severely Whiped.

Punished.

The Supra Cargo mentions Three People now in the Room who were present on Examination of the witness his being interrupted from Weighing his Goods & Who Could testify the Truth es at the thereof.

One of them, being asked Concerning it, Says that Seven days ago Thirty five Candies of Pepper was weighed off to him and five days ago Twenty five Candies of Betlenut.

A Second says he saw the Twenty five Cands. of Betlenutt weighed off.

The other says that when the Supra Cargo was going to weigh off the Betlenutt Singanah's Conicoply told him that unless he would finish the Cocoanutt Affair he ought Not to weigh off the Betlenutt.

The Supra Cargo again declares that there were Two People, a Moor Peon & a Conicoply who Stoped the Scales when he was weighing the Betlenutt and told him he should not weigh it off 'till he had Concluded the Affair of the Cocoanutts, for that was the Governor's Business and must be first done.

The Conicoply declares he did desire the Supra Cargo to finish the Affair of the Cocoanutts before he weighed off his Betlenutt.

The Peon declares to the Same Purpose.

The Supra Cargo says they bid him sell them the Captain's Cocoanutts before he proceeded to any other Business.

Tach Member's Sentiments called for.

Both paties withdrawn, it is [moved that each] one's particular Sentiments of this Affair be deliver'd in writing to Mr. Prince who as usual is first Called upon for his Compliance.

Mr. Walsh's Opinion: On Summing up the most unquestionable Parts of this Enquiry, it fully appears to me that the Supra Cargo of the Ship did not dispose of the Captain's Privilege together with the owner's Cargo of Cocanuts, the very person who made the Contract with the Supra Cargo, positively asserting the Same, and the Captain being so far from having ever empowered the Supra Cargo to do it that he sold them himself to Francisco da Cruz.

It is also manifest that the Deputy Governor's Writer Thomas Pelling has unjustly insisted on having the Captains Cocanutts even after he was told so early as the 11th. Instant by the Supra Cargo in presence of the Deputy Governor & others that those Cocanutts were not included in the Contract.

It likewise too plainly appears to me that Singanah the Governor's Dubash has been guilty of great Violence & oppression in detaining the Cocanutts as he did not at the Sea Side, notwithstanding the above Declaration of the Supra Cargo and the three applications from da Cruz's Servant and moreover in having impeded the Supra Cargo in his lawful commerce by preventing the Disembarquement & Delivery of his Cargo & thereby unnecessarily prolonging his at this port.

Mr. King's Opinion: It appears to me from many circumstances in the Examina. tion of this affair that Singana has been extremely culpable in assuming a power of impeding the Traders at this Port by hindering their goods from being passed & weighed and what alone prevents me from noting for his being severely punished is that it remains very doubtful whether Choliar who sold the Cocanutts to Tom Pellings Broker not been guilty of deceit in telling them that he bargained for all the Cocanutts in the Ship which deceit may have led Singana to these Acts of Violence but as I do not think that even in that case that his behaviour can be by any means excused I therefore note that he may be publicly and severely reprimanded in order that the Merchants and others may know that he will not be upheld in such oppressions & that he is hereafter guilty of any act of the like bad tendency they may be assured upon application of being redressed & of Singana for ever being prevented from assuming such an unjust power.

The Deputy Governor does not declare his Sentiments but Singana having been noted guilty it was next moved to determine his punishment.

As Mr. King had already proposed the Method of Publicly reprimanding him Mr. Walsh subscribes to it.

Mr. Prince agrees that Singana be reprimanded.

As many of the Merchants & as could be got to '[gr.] being called in, Singana is reprimanded before them and to [ld] that he will not be upheld in such oppressions & that if he is hereafter guilty of any act of the like bad Tendency the Merch ants] may be assured of Redress upon application & of his being incapacitated ever after to usurp such an unjust power.

Disturbance among the Military.

The Deputy Governor acquaints the Board that the Garrison has of late been very disorderly, Complaining loudly of Deductions in their Pay; that on Saturday some disturbances arising amongst them, he had sent them Word that their Case should be represented to Mr. Saunders on his Arrival, but things growing yesterday to very great Extremities, in so much that a general Insurrection was apprehended, he had been obliged in order to pacify them to assure them that their Complaints should this day be enquired into & redress'd; he therefore desires that We will take the Affair under Consideration.

Particulars **exa**mined into.

Lieutenant Campbell who had the Main Guard yesterday at the Time of the disturbance, being sent for to relate the Particulars acquaints the Board that soon after publishing to the Military the Deputy Governor's Intentions to represent their Case to Mr. Saunders, about Forty Men of both Companies came to him and said that another New Governor might be to Come after him and then it would be delayed again; to which he answer'd that he could not redress them himself but beg'd they would be orderly and he would acquaint Captain Gingins of it; that on this they retired for the Time but much dissatisfied: Soon after a Serjeant Came to him and desired he would stand to his Arms, for that the Men in the Barracks were loading their pieces and had threaten'd to shoot him for asking the Reason; That he accordingly order'd his Guard to load & fix their Bayonetts, and at the same time sent a Serjeant & Four Men to bid the Mutineers lay down their Arms and give in their Reasons for behaving in such a Manner, but receiving no Satisfactory Answer he went to them himself with a part of his Guard and endeavouring to enter the Barracks

which were by this time quite dark, they pushed him back with the Butt Ends of their Firelocks and treated him with great Insolence: he then returned to his Guard and order'd the Drum to beat to Arms, in hopes there were some good Men among them to secure the Rest At which they readily fell in to their Ranks as usual, but being order'd to march when their Arms were grounded, not one of them would Stir: At this he threaten'd to make his Guard fire on them & accordingly gave them orders to make ready, which the Guard would not obey, and the Company which was drawn out opposite to the Guard immediately upon it took up their grounded Arms: That he then went to the Deputy Governor's and returning told them from him that their Grievances should be Consider'd and redressed, on which they gave Three Huzzas & retired to their Barracks carrying off their Arms with them.

Captains Gingins and Campbell attending are desired to inform themselves of the Nature of their Complaints and they having order'd one Man to be sent them out of each Company who might speak for the Rent [sic]. James Carr was deputed by Captain Gingins Company & Robert Kersey by Captain Campbell's who both alledged that on their enlisting into the Honble Company's service Major Lawrence

promised they should receive 21. 6. P Month in the Countrey Currency clear of all Substance of deductions, which sum they never have received; but have been baffled of a Part of Complaint. it by taking a Rupee for twelve fanams whereas they can get but Eleven for it and by that means they sustain a loss of Eight fanams a Month in their Subsistance.

Captains Gingins & Campbell being Consulted on the Affair it was judged Resolutions expedient in the present Exigency to Comply with the Complainants so far as to let them know that whatever Major Lawrence had promised them should be observed; that We never heard of any such Agreement being made with them as what they mention but should enquire into it, and in the mean time would give Orders for paying them Twelve Fanams for a Rupee, to begin from the first of this Month.

Agreed immediately to report the whole Circumstance to Fort St. David, desiring The affair their speedy Resolutions on the same for which a General Letter in [sic] drawn up & represented to St. David. signed.

## SHEWETH

Your Petitioners beg leave to represent to Your Worship &ca. That in Mr. Pitt's time the Honble Company sent orders to make a Village for the Weavers within the Jurisdiction of Fort St. George, in which time several Merchants took a great deal of trouble about it, but it was impossible for them to Accomplish it & when Mr. Benyon Came out the Company sent out the same orders again, & on his Arrivalhere he sent for Your Petitioners Fathers Narrain & Chintomby & promised them that if they would sic? take the trouble & find means to make a Village as aforesaid he wou'd allow them the same priviledges & libertys that their Grand Father Timana enjoyed & that he would [sic] also write to the Company for a reward for them, & further promised them that he wou'd allow them Dutys Customs &ca. free & that they shou'd have the sole Management of the Village, & for their better satisfaction the Governor & Council gave Your Petitioners Fathers a Cowle & Three thousand Pagodas to build Houses for the Weavers, Accordingly Your Petitioners Fathers made a Village & Called it Chindadry Petta after which they sent for a great Number of Weavers from several Countrys with about 600

Looms for the Manufacture of the Company's fine Goods after which they began to make the Companys Cloth, The Governour & Council used to Advance about 8 or 10 thousand Pagodas yearly on that Account afterwards they made a great Quantity of Cloth & Marked on them (Chindadry Petta) & sent them to Ingland; some time after Your Petitioners Fathers to make the place flourish spent about 18000 Pagodas & began to build Two Pagodas & prevail'd on the Merchants & Inhabitants of the Place to give them an Allowance yearly which amounted to 2000 Pagodas which was for the service of the said Pagodas & got a Parwana likewise from Nabob Subderally Cawn to get an Allowance of 1500 Pagodas from the Merchants & Inhabitants of the Adjacent Countrys which allowances Continued for some years; during which it happen'd that Narrain departed this life upon which Mr. Morse sent for Chintomby & told him that as Narrain's son was too Young to take Chindadry Petta & Cadapacaum into his possession & Management, & at the same time told him to take what Money was. necessary for the service of the Pagodas only out of the said Allowances, & the remainder together with the Proffits that arose from Cadapacaum to ray in the Company's Ballance that was in the Weavers, to which Chintomby told Mr. Morse if he wou'd advance a little more Money to the Weavers to keep up the Manufacturey, that in a short time he cou'd recover the whole together with the remainder of the Allowance Money he Could pay the Companys Ballance to which Mr. Morse agreed & desired Chintomby to advance the Weavers & that he wou'd pay him again, Accordingly Chintomby borrowed some Money & advanced the Weavers on Chints Moorees and Ginghams which Chintemby brought in to the Warehouse Chints Moorees 44 Corge & 8 ps. Amounting to Pagodas 1824 3/8 out of which Mr. Morse deducted 1000 Pagodas on Account of the Company's Ballance; besides which Chintomby left in the Warehouse 20 Corge & 1 ps. of Chints Moorees, 15 Corge & 12 ps. of Ginghams all Amounting to Pagodas 1254, which were plunder'd by the French at the taking of Madrass; & a Ballance of 240 Pagodas remained on the Weavers, & about 112. Pagodas worth of Cotton thread which remained in the Godown at Chindadry [Petta] was likewise plunder'd by the French, & 256 Pagodas which Chintomby laid out in making Tanks at Cadapacaum to Water the Paddy fields; Now Your Petitio ners] beg that Your Worship &ca. will take into Consideration the great losses their Fathers. sustained by the loss of Madrass (not only which) the French have plunder'd Chindadry Petta burnt several House & ruined the Pagodas, [which] Your Petitioners referr to Your Worship &c. Judgement And Your Pe[tioners] as in duty [bound shall ever pray.

N.B.—Deva Doyam Signifies the Share of Gods or Deity's, which are all the Perquisites, Allowances, Dutys and other Gifts that have been or may be Appropriated for the Uses and Maintainance [sic] of the Pagodas or Churches.

Bramma Doyam, Signifies the Share of Bramans, which are all the Perquisites, Allowances, Dutys & other Gifts that have been or may be Appropriated for the Maintainance of the Bramans or other Religious People.

DIMMATTEE or Strengthening Commission from Damarla Moodu Venkatapa Naik son of Damarla Chenama Naik, the Grand Visier of the aforesaid Sovereign & Lord General of Carnatica to the English Company for the Purpose beforementioned.

## ——FORT ST. GEORGE, SEPTEMBER 1750—

A Phirmaun or Grant for Triplicane given by Sultan Abul Hassan, King of Golconda to Caussa Verona the Company's Vakiel; The Conditions of the Grant was that the Town of Triplicane shou'd for ever be subordinate to the Pagoda there and that all the Proffits or revenues arising there, be also appropriated to the Use and Maintainance of the Pagoda but the place shall for ever be under the Care of the Eng[lish] Company of Chinapatam.

Governour of Chinapatam for the Company, that they may, (in reward for their Service in his Imperial Majesty's Affairs against the Zemidars of Gingy) Perpetually Enjoy them, as a free Gift and are exempted the Payment of any duties thereon Except that of Conugohee.

Perawana for Ditto from Nabob Ally Mardar Cawn the then Subah of the Province.

A Sunod or Grant for Coining Rupees, Pagodas, and Gold Mohars, in Chinapatam from Zulphakar Cawn (but I suppose it to have been Sealed by Assad Cawn's Seal,) to the Honble Thomas Pitt Esqr. Governour of Chinapatam for the Company.

Perawana for Ditto from Ally Mardar Cawn Soobah of the Province.

A Cowle from Harigy Rajah, One of the Moratta Sovereigns, for the Enjoyment of Chinapatam, & Coining Gold & Silver there.

Cowle from Phutta Sing & Raghojee Bosala, Generals of the Moratta Arm[y] Promissing that the English Settlements as well as their Trade Should never be Molested by them or their People, and Commanding all their People to Observe the same & pay due Obedience to it, both at that present time and for the time to come & I Suppose this was Obtained in the year 1741.

A Sunod or Grant from Nabob Subder Ally Cawn for the Villages of E[rnawore] Perambore, Vapary, Sadiangoopang & Poodupauk to Mr. Benyon Governour [of Chinapatam] for the Company, and Cadapauk to Audepa but as they Style him Dubash of Chinapatam it is Evident that the said Village was designed to be under the Government of Chinapatam and of Consequence is a part of the Honble Company's Priviledges, as the Gift of the said Village was intended as a recompence for Audepah's sending to the Nabob's Lady & her Minister's Famillys and others continual Presents of Greens, fruits, herbs & fish and as the Company were at the Expence of them & that Audepah was only employed in distributing them therefore a Nominal Donce to the Grant & the Company are Principals to it.

Conformable to your orders I here relate to you the Cause of my Coming in here, which is as follows. The 10th December our People being so bad with the Scurvey, & so many of them being render'd incapable of doing their duty that by the Surgeon's Report he had then Twenty Eight that was incapable of keeping their watch & a great many of them in so bad a way, that without Speedy Releif must Inavetably dy'd; & the Remainder of them that kept their Watch, all more or less had the same Symptoms, & very weak: and our Ship at the same time making so much water, that was oblig'd to keep Pumping every two hours. Consulted with my Officers, what was most prudent to do in that Extremity & we all agreed to make the best of our way to Madrass, thinking it the most advisable & most prudent way of proceeding, both for the Company's [Interest & the welfa]re of our People.
