Srs.

We are resolv'd yester Night your very [advi]sable Letter of yo. 3d. Instant, advising the [a few words lost] quantity of bales you made up, we had [a few lines lost we have fitted the Kent, the Somers and ye. ffrederick we shall dispatch hence for your parts as Convoy the Kent on the 10th. Instant, you wou'd do well to employ your Servant for yo. embaleing of Long Cloth and Sallampores brown, in case there shou'd be a failure of bales enough of white Cloth, we foresee we must Send you hence what bales we can [to] fill up yo. Somers, the Frederick is to return to us, so soon as she may be thought out of dangers of the ffrench if att Pollicherry.

Your Invoice of Bills of Lading of the Somers must begin and run in the name of ye. Preside and Council of fort St. George.

We have sent you some Comfortable Supplies on yo. Somers.

We have this morning [. . .] son his dispatch for England [. . .] a well mixt Cargo amounting to [. . .] Pagod. 98786. 15. 1. God Send him [. . .] in safety at his desired port.

We are now [dispatch]ing y°. Somers to you to be full and timely Lad[en] with what Assistance we can give by Sending you hence what bales can be got ready on y°. Somers. We have Laden 53 bales which are of y°. Sorts [fol]lowing Vizt. L. Cloth ordinary brown 46 Bales [. . .] white one bale D°. Middling 1 bale D°. fine [. . .] Sallampores fine 2 bales Moorees ord 1. 1 b[ale . . .] fine 1 bale in all 50 bales to be Continued on boa[rd] for England.

[a few lines lost] you make any now one[...] the Colour of great Britain [...] parliament: the amount of wt.[...] to your Selves is as \$\P\$ Invoice [...] 24:5. It is y\*. Late Season of the [...] dispatching the Europe Ships that we [...] ates for sending home any brown Cloth on the Somers there having been so much Sent upon the Heathcote.

We have sent on the Somers and the ffrederick 25 of our Military and 5 of Gunroom Crew on each Ship with provission for 20 days for all of them who are to be contain'd on board each Ship, till the ffrench Ships are gone of ye. Coast or that ye. Somers is ready to Sail for England. We cannot but take notice to you that since ye D: Governour went hence on the 9 December Last to ffort St. David to ye. date hereof wee have recd. no more than two gen!! Letters from you [. . .] private and Pticular Letter come so frequently from your parts by [. . .] therefore we can now tell you [that two larger St. Malloes ships a] rriv'd the Sth. Inst. at Pondichery, pray be more frequent in your advises as relateing to ye. Compas. Affairs because we take no pleasure in finding fault. we are

He has Confirm'd by new grants the 5 Villages.

We were favour'd wth. your kind Letters of ye. 21st. Instant N. S. advising two great Ships having come to an Anchor att Metchlepatam, the 12th. Instant N.S. which Shipps past by us in ye. offen the 7/18 and next day arriv'd att Pondicherry which prove to be the two St. Malloes French Ships the Lesser Ship they Left att Junckerton tradeing amongst ye. Islands to dispose of the Cargo of a small Vessell they had taken and made prize of belonging to one Alexander Hamilton a North Britain, its believ'd it will be Late before ye. two great Ships at Pondichery can get of ye. Coast, because a great part of their Cargo is not yet got in from their Merchants and ye. Washers they are in great fears and [. . .] Dangers from yor. Ships, we [one line lost] their fears, we are with all respects

Pylate, since which he have rec<sup>d</sup>, yours by Cossids to Vizagapatam and thence forwarded to us by fresh Peons who arriv'd but the 10<sup>th</sup>. Instant, they are directed to the former Governour Pitt, and as so we judge them to be of a Stale date which are not yet open'd as being busied in y. dispatch of y. Kent which we have done this day full Loden wth, a Cargo Amts, too as P Invoice Pagod. 98786. 15. 1.

Our Letters from Vizagapatam which are accompanied your Packett are of your December last by which it seems your Cossids were a longtime by the way which is worth enquiring into.

The Somers we have to day sent to ffort S<sup>t</sup>. David to be Laden there for England whom we hope to dispatch by the end of this or beginning next month, but the Kent Left us no bales now, to Lend as the [R<sup>t</sup>. Honble] Comp<sup>t</sup>. have directed.

[. . .] pain what [. . .] is become of y°. Loy [all Cook y¹.] arriv'd with [. . .] probably some were [a few lines lost] April before the recovery (so long massing) arriv'd safely with you at Bengall, we wish since it is no better that y°. [. . .] may have no worse fate.

The two S<sup>c</sup>. Mallows ffrench Ships arriv'd att Pondicherry y<sup>c</sup>. 8<sup>th</sup>. Instant, these small Ship they left at Junkeilon trading amongst those Islands all y<sup>c</sup>. 3 ffrench Ships with their Dutch prize arriv'd at the aforesaid place, about y<sup>c</sup>. Latter end of Novemb<sup>c</sup>. last having lost their Passage to Morgy amongst those Islands, they mett Cap. Alexander Hamilton on a small Vessell whom they took and made prize, her Cargo they left with Cap<sup>c</sup>. of their small Ship to go a tradeing with amongst those Islands, as aforesaid they Sunk Capt. Hamiltons Small Vessell and told him their Dutch prize, for payment of w<sup>ch</sup>. he gave the ffrench Bills drawn on the President and Council of Fort S<sup>c</sup>. George alledgeing we were possess'd of y<sup>c</sup>. Estate of M<sup>c</sup>. Maxwell [. . .] who was a considerable Debt<sup>c</sup>. to him [a few words lost] ballance of acc<sup>cc</sup>. between them of w<sup>ch</sup>. [a few words lost] any, we never have penny [a few lines lost] should make the aforesaid demand of payment of you.

We have this ill news from M<sup>r</sup> Gassell, which ends in his own misfortune of having been cast away on one of the Easter most Islands of the Nicombarrs the 29<sup>th</sup>. of July last, whence he got to Junkcilon in an open Boat with 6 persons more the Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton and y<sup>c</sup>. Dutch prized y<sup>c</sup>. ffrench told him upon the Creditt of his Bill as has been laid, on which he took his passage to Dew's point on this Coast and thence upon an open Boat to Pullicatt, & thence here by Land and arriv'd Yesterday a sad spectacle a mere skelledton (sic), and a walking Chest and that is all that remains of him and that Voyage.

On the 12<sup>th</sup>. Novemb<sup>r</sup>. last we sent you overland the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>as</sup>.; Packett directed to you and now by the Hallifax we send you another of the same in which Packett from England we suppose you'l find a General Letter severally, [a few words lost] the old and new Company to all their servants in India ordering all acc<sup>10</sup>. Debts.

and Creditts of y°. Compa to be brought into the stock of the United trade and that all Debts owing by either Compas new and old as Separate shall be paid out of y°. United Stock.

We have Laden on the Halifax which goes consign'd to you a stock consisting of Lead, Bales of Broad Cloth and treasure to the amt. of as P Invoice Pagodas fas.

169846. 2. pray hasten her being unladen so soon as it pleases God to arrive here safely w<sup>th</sup>. you, so as she may be timely return'd to us with Salt petre 1200 baggs and filled up with good Sound Rice.

Pray advice us the price of Lead and Broad Cloth ord<sup>ry</sup>, with you, being we have no more Broad Cloth left in our Goedowns, We shall have ab<sup>t</sup>. Rup<sup>s</sup>. 300,000 Left which we intend to send if the Companies Affairs require it and that you meet w<sup>th</sup>. no trouble to hinder your investing the Same.

Capt. George Wooley an inhabitant of this place complaines to us that you have forced him to pay you Rupees 40 for Acct. Tonage of his small Vessell notwithstanding he produced to you the Late Governour Pitt's pass for his intended Voyage which begun here and that his said pass was to continue in full force till his return back hither again, pray state this case plainly between us, we apprehending not to be y. Companies meaning that any Ship belonging to this place shou'd be obliged to take two passes that his one here and another from you for one and the same Voyage, [pray. . .] Secretaries fees especially as to passes and what part the Secretary has.

Since writing the foregoing here are arriv'd advices from Pondicherry to the Trustees & a Humeys of y°. Late president Pitt as also Captain Hamiltons Letter to said President being a narrative of the manner how he was taken by the ffrench S'. Mallows Ships, and their civil and kind usage of him they have likewise set his severall bills of Exchange given them by the said Cap'. Hamilton on President Pitt only due and payable next August when Captain Hamilton believes President Pitt may have effect of Mr. Maxwell in his hands sufficient to pay said bills, when indeed it does not appear that Mr. Maxwell has dyed any otherwise than insolvend (sic).

The bills are three 3 or 4 bills, all of one tenor and date for Rupees 4400 for the Dutch prize Sold him which was Condemn'd before at Pondich[erry] and this is payable next August to their order.

There are two other bills each of Rupees 300 payable to each of the two ffrench Cap<sup>t</sup>. in all Rupees 5000.

Now [. . .] that president Pitt now being in the place th [two lines lost] Nation will pay the Said bills but then you must oblige Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton to make over his Said Dutch Ship with all her Store and appurtance to the Gentlemen that pay and discharge his bills, as you'l find in a Letter a part to your Selves, from y<sup>c</sup>. said Gentlemen, and Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton must not run to and again from Bengall to Mallacca and amongst the Islands on pretence of recovering some old Debts and thereby run y<sup>c</sup>. hazard of himself, Ship, and all as you'l hear from y<sup>c</sup>. Gentlem<sup>n</sup>. themselves, who will send you their orders accordingly and pray'd us and yo'. selves to assist them therein.

Batavia Arrack some time is Cheap will you as we believe it may be now there being so many Dutch Ships from Batavia at your Port we wish you would send us up some three or four Leagues for the use of y°. Garrison it being very dear here at present.

We send you Copie of a Letter rec<sup>d</sup>. last night overland from Anjengo which give us y<sup>e</sup>. good news of y<sup>e</sup>. Loyal Bliss having been as high as Carwarr on the 18<sup>th</sup>. November last departed thence for [. . .] Port &c Ships arriv'd on that Coast [. . .] Letter we referr.

We now return you upon the [a few words lost] Serjeants and 20 Soldiers we [two lines lost] for 30 days and have paid them to the p<sup>mo</sup>. month ffebru<sup>y</sup>. next we are.

In our last we omitting advising your bill of Exchange for paged. 6000 which we accepted and is hence paid Yesterday we rec<sup>d</sup>. yours the 14<sup>th</sup>. Currant and wonder much that in this fair Season & dry weather you have not more bales ready, nor do you advise what brown Cloth, bales you have secured and embaled since we gave you timely notice for so doing.

The \$\phi^{\colon}\sid^{\colon}\$. when he left yo^{\colon}\$, place on the 30th. Octob. last there remain'd then in your Goedowns 350 bales, which Mr. Farmer &c. increased to 470 and now your last advices makes no more than 569 bales thus for you seem'd to have the advantage of us here as that att y. time y. Presid. arriv'd here on y. 2d. Novemb. last the Heathcote had not left us so much as one bale of any Sort of white Cloth in our Goodowns and thô you have more washers in number then we have here yet we made it our endeavour to dispatch y. Kent a full Laden Ship thô we had the same hindrance as you Complain of as to y. Paines.

We shall dispatch to you to-morrow God willing a Boat belonging to Colloway Cheety called Borin Vyagio with 107 bales white and brown as also 3 bales of paintings all marked on ye. reverse side with Malla bair Letters, the Yandell's name of ye. said Boat is Mutandu we shall Send you the Warehousekeeprs. Conocople to give them ye. Companies marks and number according to their Severall sortes, and qualities, and

after her in 2 or 3 dayes more shall send you another Boat with as many bales as we can make up in the same manner as y. former, their respective bills of Lading and Invoice shall be sent you overland, we think by Mr. Raworth if not sooner who intends te set out hence for ffort St. David on the 20th. 21st. Currant for such reason [as] we shall impart to you in a Letter by him to whom wee wou'd have all due respect paid as a member of our Council here.

You must cooperate with us by all y°. ways and means possible to send home y°. Somers timely a full Laden Ship else it will be a Severe reflection on yours as well as our management and there will not be wanting such as will say y°. Companies affaires would be better done by other hands, lett your effectuall endeavours return back their mistakes.

There is one Henry Williams who came out upon the ffrederick, and is now y Governour Servant he makes his application to us that having supply'd Severall of y. Souldiers that came out upon y. Frederick in their great need and want with Clothes as P inclosed acct their Severall bills promising payment for the Same are left in the hands of M. Berriman att Cuddalore we wou'd have y. Paymaster with you deduct out of y. Souldiers pay as y. same shall become due according to y. Condition and tenor of their respective bills as aforesaid we are

Worsp<sup>1</sup>. Council for the affaires of y<sup>a</sup>. R<sup>a</sup>. Hon<sup>bla</sup>. United English East India Company in the Bay of Bengall whose ord<sup>1</sup>, you are to follow for you<sup>1</sup>, future disposall.

We would have you take care to avoid the Lands of Due point, and keep a good look out that you may not be surpriz'd there being one of yo. St. Mallows French Shipps not yet return'd to Pondicherry, we wish you a good Voyage and date this in ffort St. George yo. 13th. Janry. 1709/10.

Our last of y<sup>e</sup>. 18<sup>th</sup>. Currant wherein we advised and promised our utmost endeavours to assist you what we can in the since tis dispatch of y<sup>e</sup>. Somers a full Laden Ship which we hope may be done if Cap<sup>t</sup>. Peacock does not insit[s] precisly & exactly, as to the point of time he limits himself to, as by this paper deliverd us here in Consultation some days before he went hence, and we hope so good a man as we beleive Captain Peacock to be, will not stand upon such a nicety when he knows we here are doing our utmost, and we desire do no more of you but to follow us in what we prescribe here in which hitherto you have failed otherwise how comes it to pass that we have made more white Cloth bales here than you have att your place when you were so much before hand with us as adviced in our former, however we shall still continue to assist and send you by Boats all y<sup>e</sup>. bales we can, which pray acquaint Cap<sup>t</sup>. Peacock of the better to keep him in talet.

This comes by M<sup>r</sup>. Raworth who brings y<sup>o</sup>. our [charter] for establishing Don Simon D'Costa of y<sup>o</sup>. Theatin order [...] in both Churches of Cuddalore and Jeffnapatam, and removing the present Incumbant as \$\psi\$ our Consultation of Instant but if he is inclin'd to go to y<sup>o</sup>. West coast in the Spirit and Zeal he has for the Cure of Souls he may but if he does not we think he has neither.

Notwithstanding of what we have wrote you formerly as to the ffront or preamble of our Invoice of y. Somers, we wou'd have wrote in this manner following Vizt.

That all the Bengall goods as also all ye. Madrass goods be said to be Laden on board by ye. President and Council of Fort St. George which when all of both places are finished, then in ye. self same invoice you are to write to ffort St. Davids goods Laden on board Somers by the Governour &c Council there by ord. of ye. President and Council of Fort St. George, and you are likewise to observe ye. same method as to your bills of Landing for England.

Just now y°. President hath recd. a particular Letter from a certain \$\Psi\$'son of your board wch. asks our Leave for sorting and embaleing of Long Cloth brown, when indeed we order'd the same Severall dayes ago, as \$\Psi\$ ours to you of y°. 8th. Instant which you confess to have recd. as by your answer to us, it's strange that they should be done so carelessly as not to have either thought or reflection.

It was you so seldom writing made us beleive you were so intent in geting bales enough ready As that we were willing to excuse your silence on that acet, but it lead us into that fatal mistake of advising y. Company by the Kent of your having a Lading ready by that time y. Somers should be sent you.

Pray prize the last Contract made with your Merchants on the 19<sup>th</sup>. Octob<sup>r</sup>. last in w<sup>ch</sup>. they oblige themselves to bring in 25000 pagod<sup>s</sup>. in goods, by y<sup>c</sup>. last of Decemb<sup>r</sup>. and 15000 pagod<sup>s</sup>. in goods by the fifteenth Currant, nor can you plead your business was any wayes crampt through want of mony to pay your merch<sup>ts</sup>. since we readily pay'd all your bills drawn upon us as soon as they became due.

The case thus stated between you & us we desire to know what cause or reasons you can give for so great a dispointm<sup>t</sup>. as makes us repent the Sending you the Somers so early, we have the Calculate brought us by M<sup>r</sup>. Harrison y<sup>c</sup>. 19<sup>th</sup>. past which was a quantity of all sorts upwards of 800 bales since which your business

seems to have gone retrogarde rather than progressive, but we are quit a weary of this unpleasant Subject and Leave it, least you shou'd think we are not what we yet really (tho' disablig'd.

Lett. of the 5 Currant Copie of woh. comes herewith, the original was sent by the Mary Bowyer belonging to the Company purposely to advice us and assist them wth. wt. Millitary forces were can spare, but by Calmes, Currants, and Contrary Winds was forc'd to put in at Vizagapatam where the Cheif there thought it most advisable to send the Packett overland as aforesaid wherefore were wishes of any avail wee cou'd heartily wish upon the Extraordinary occasion that the Sommers were not yett dispatch'd, which if wee are yet so happy as that this may find him therewith [you], & tho' his time of staying in India be Expir'd this Day, yet wee wou'd have you concert matters with him so, as to prevail with him and ingage him upon the terms of a New Charterparty the better to Incourage his stay so long as still the next Season shall present for his going for England and wt. ever you shall do in this matter in concert with Mr. Raworth we shall approve of and confirm here which if done, you must immediately [one line lost] there because wee shall on the Coast of Chormandell Gingely Orisa and so to Batta[via] who intends to send his Deputies to all the Sea Port Towns on the Coast to Encourage Trade and Merchandize of all which wee belfeive Duan Mull can not but know before this time. Jany. by Hallifax wn. we advised you the needfull till then Since wee [. . .] at Pondicherry the lesser french Ship from Mergy wth. a lading of Rice a seasonable surply and releif to their necessities & there their Cargoes consisted of Salt Petre Pepper and Bales, bad weather full three Quartly. or half Laden, reports are various they wee incline to believe the latter.

But by the Manner of their acting and Secret [practice] of gaining intelligence as to the strength of the Somrs. their more curious inquiery as to that Ships sailing . .] or heavy the amot. of her Cargoe and time of her departure \textit{two lines} lost ill design in agitation against the Som". then Rideing at Anchor abreast of fort St. David as formerly advisd wee had sent her Copie of which comes here with these 3 french ships wn. Lading at Pondicherry gave great uneasiness to our friends at Fort St. David and to Capt. Peacock as much as any the ships in both Rods (sic) being but 15 Miles distant are easily seen by each other so that by their great apprehension of the fears and Dangers for the Som". made 'em all disconsulate, w". on the 30 past the Somers was full Loaden, on which Day in the agony of their mind they wrote us a Gen". Lett. Expressing their heaviness of mind the difficulties under which they Labour'd for the great concern they had for the seeming Dangers of the french Shipps. having a design to waite the [. . .] ons of the Som<sup>rs</sup>. and earnestly desiring our advice and orders on the matter w<sup>ch</sup>. Lett<sup>r</sup>. arriv'd us on the 31<sup>st</sup>. past and that afternoon wee return'd 'em our best thoughts for answer as coud occur to our Mind 'em [to] act by, so that on the 4th. Currant all three french Ships saild out of Pondicherry steering a N: St. Course but those Gentlemen at fort St. David with the content and oppinion of Capt. Peacock thought it best to stay at anchor 3 days after the departure of the french Ships which was well and prudently done on the 7th. Current as they write us they shoud dispatch the Scm18, with a well mixt Cargoe amot, to as P Invoice Pags. 145684. 20. 4. God grant her to arrive in safety at her desird Port.

On the 25th, past arrived from King Sha Allum's Camp the Peons Gov. Pitt sent hence on the 7th. July last with Letters to Zoodye Cawn and now by our said Peons return'd his answer translate of which comes herewith to which wee referr you, and cou'd wee be certain of [one line lost] Hugly the [seat] of his Governmt. in Bengall wee wou'd have wrote him our hearty thanks and acknowledgemt. of all favours for the troubles he has taken and the paines he has been at for and in behalf [of] the English which now wee must call the British Nation.

Wee desire you wou'd by all just and fair means possible ingratiate Yor. Selves in the favour and good opinion of Zoude Cawn now or by this time Suba of Hugly who is [also] by his Letters Patent admirall of all this Coast as far as Ballasore the great Esteem and respect he has for the English Nation was happyly begun between the late Gov. Pitt [and] him which wee earnestly desire you'l continue and pre[serve].

Prince Hazee Moden King Shaw Allums 2<sup>d</sup>. Son[. . .] Polar Star he steers by and by whose means the Kings fa[vour] Shine upon him as by the good Employ he now enjoys how long it may hold we can't tell, he being now a days in favour with any of the Prince Ministers at Court probably because application hath been first made him in appearing for and in behalf of the English Nation when they of the superiour and fret crd. might think their Bon. diginity and high places they hold Either [. . .]ted to neglected.

Wee shall according to Zoudee Cawne ordrs. send the Kings Prest, to Bengall so soon as wee may know of his being arrivd at Hugly with our congratulatory Letter the best of all the Prest. having been sent to Metchlepatam where hath lay in ever since Augt. last, but wt. we have do wth. the Elephants being six in Number that lye here upon our hands at a great Charge wee do not [know] unless wee had Zoudee Cawns leave to dispose of them and send their value in some Choice accept[able] [one line lost Rarities which wee leave you to manage for us and shall Expect Your Answer. Yors, of the 13th, last past wee recd, the 9 Currant since wch, of yours wee have No. 19 wrote you on the 27th, last Month, & likewise the Presdt. hath wrote his particular Lett. of the same date to the Gusbad. who as you say is very Clamorous and troublesome tho' he cannot pretend to so much Ignorance, but to have known that his so flong stay at Metchlepatam was occasion'd by our waiting and Expecting an answer from Zoudee Cawn to ours sent him hence on the July last Copie of his said Lett. as an answer wee send you inclos'd attested by the Cogee here which wee think may be enough to silence Your Gusbardar which Copie wee woud have you deliver him.

You shou'd have advis'd us the time the Ground rent becomes due and how much the same is Yearly that wee may compare it with our books here so that you may not [be put to a loss] which wee ord. you to pay to the Right Proprietors taking two receipts both of one te[...] and date one of won. to be sent us and the other to be kept by you. The French Ships you wrote of was advisd us by the Dutch to Pollicatt and from thence to us, they arriv'd at Pondicherry the 8th. of Jany. last, whence they sett sail on the 4th. of february for Europe but have been seen on the 5th. 6. & 7th. after they saild from Pondicherry as by our last advices from Fort St. David at [ye.] Port the Som<sup>1</sup>. lyes full Laden for England, but the Gentlemen there as well as Capt. Peacock have a shrew'd suspicion those french ships having some ill design on ye. Somrs.

In the 5th. Paragraph of your Letter you Enter the Lists again with the ... of Your Gusbard. where you say Isuph Cawn wee suppose you mean Suba of Golcondah sent his Letters to Duan Mull by Virtue of which the said Duan Mull sent the Phousdars Brother in Company with the Gusbard. the factor to demand of you the reason why the Present aw[...] and why wee detain'd the Gusbadar so long there with ordr. to send up the Present to Golcondah that Duan Mull shou'd be at the Charge and Expe[ct] of the same &c.

To all which Zoudee Cawns Letter to [us] will be sufficient to give a full answere to your Gusbadar as aforesaid because former ordrs. m[ust] give obedience to the Latt. and Zoudee Cawn (by ye time wee hope in Bengall) was the only person as our great friend that manag'd this great [affairs] [two lines lost] ffriendship between him and the late Gov. Pitt & therefore we shall steer our Course in y. Matter as Zoudee Cawn has directed which is to send the Prest to him, to Bengall as formerly advis'd both Yor. self and the Gusbadar as by our Lett's. of the 27th. last past to we'. wee refer.

As to w<sup>t</sup>. You wrote us of about our Passes to the Rashwar the Pres<sup>t</sup>. Gov<sup>r</sup>. of Maddapollam, we have considered and well weigh'd the conveniency with the inconveniency of the whole matter & have thereupon signed two Passes for both the Ships as beleiving one if not both of 'em may some time come into this road w<sup>n</sup>. wee may come up with him, if for the future he shou'd do anything unworthy of your favour.

As to w'. you write us of the Maddapollam Braminy if Yo'. information be true he is all together to blame and not be trusted but in this Case you ought not to guide y'. self by any private prejudice You may have against him that your impartiall judgem'. out to discerne between w'. the Braminy acts out of a Principle of Guilt and Knavery of himself or whether forcd and compell'd by the threats and Punishmen'. of the Rashwarr Gov'. an Instance of the Latter is manifestly Evident by w'. Kittee Narrain had seen w'h. his Eyes at the time he was last at Maddapollam for that the Braminy having refus'd to let the Rashwarr have any [one line lost] they were taken away by force and the Braminy ha[wld] out by the Heels and beat unmercifully this and some other mattrs. makes us doubt the information you have being all together true however it be the Presid'. hath wrote him a Lett'. to the End wee may know certain one way or other whether w'. you are inform'd be reall matter of Fact or on by meer allegations Seing You have not been there Your Self in Some Years for Some reasons either reall or suppos'd.

Yesterday the 12th. Inst. wee rec<sup>a</sup>. Yours of the 3<sup>d</sup>. Inst. much to the same purpose with yor, former w<sup>ch</sup>, this answers with your Said Letter wee rec<sup>d</sup>. Your Accot. disbursm<sup>1s</sup>, for the months of Novemb<sup>r</sup>. Decemb<sup>r</sup>, and January last w<sup>ch</sup>, are not in the ordinary right method of Deb<sup>t</sup>. &c., but you begin with all your disbursm<sup>1s</sup>, of the aforesaid 3 Months which ought to be the Creditt in Yor, accot, and the Cash in your hands Yor, accot, ought to be Deb<sup>r</sup> to and the fountain whence Yor. Credits by paym<sup>1s</sup>, ought to issue from, as for Instance Yor. Lett<sup>r</sup>, of the 12th. Nov. last w<sup>ch</sup>, wee rec<sup>d</sup>, the 28 that Month you drew a bill on us for Pag<sup>e</sup>, 675:34:3 payable to kittee Narrain w<sup>ch</sup>, if rec<sup>d</sup>, in Novem<sup>r</sup>, you ought to have debted Yor, self to Said Summe rec<sup>d</sup>, but wee shall say no more of this till wee have again perus'd Yor, accot, of the Months preceeding Nov<sup>r</sup>, last.

We have kept the Lett. open without finishing all Yesterday till this Morning that is the [17th.] purpossly to inquire of our Merch. Inhabitants if they had any money at Metchlepatam, who they were willing to have paid them here that to by your receiving of it of their Gomusto's there You were to give Bills drawn on us payable to their ord. but wee can find no man here qualify'd as aforesaid, which shows there's but little trade between both Ports of Yors, and this besides wee are at an uncertainty wt. to send you because you mention no Summs, however if you can meet with any Merchants there that will lend you to the amot, of about Pags, two hundred or 250 or if need require Pags, 300 give Such Persons Yor. Bill of Exchange on us which shall be paid to whom he or these shall ord, which wee think may be enough in regard the [bulk] of Yor. Expence has run out most on firewood and the Gusbed. wages whose inclination wee wish might bind him, rather than by any formall invitations of ours shou'd bring him hither because we wou'd have him go away satisfy'd without Grumbling to whom the Presid. hath now wrote him a perticular Lett. to keep him in good humour and temper. Wee are

Letter so as to render our answer the more perfect as to matter of fact which is briefly thus as follows Vizt:

One George Benfield had serv'd the Worship!. Gabriell Rob\*s. Esq\*. late Gov\*. of Fort St. David in the way and manner of a Butler for some Years with good applause, and then became a freeman to Sett up for himself and is the same Person Yor. letter mentions a free Merchant and as so went to the S.Wd. to doe his own business in the time of late great famine and in or about Negapatam one then Namd Rashia or Rashipah a Cooly Fellow sold himself to the aforesaid Benfield for Pag<sup>s</sup>. five, whence he came along with his new Master to Madrass soon after he show'd a great Inclination to become a Christian & got himself Qualify'd for the same by having learnd his Pater Noster &c" and accordingly with his Masters Consent was Christn'd in our Portegues Church by the Name of Pedro, some Small time after his Master where he lodg'd had occasion in that hot Season to wash his body and Sent his said Slave Pedro with the Key of his Chest to bring him some clean Cloths web, he accordingly did but at the Same time the [slave] open'd the Till of his Masters Chest and took thence upwards of Pags. 300 with which he fled and run away and was never heard of till now that your Hon. &ca. mentions him in Your Letter the Peons were sent out in search of him but they returnd back and declar'd he coud not be found, this Same Slave must undoubtedly be the same very Person Yor. Hon. &c. mentions tho by another Name whom wee request may not be punish'd with you but that he be return'd hither where he hath comitt'd the Crime, his aforesaid Master George Benfield havs. gon a Voyage to Pegu and expected here next Month hath left. Orders with his Land lord here concerning the said slave Pedro whose Charges hither weeshall oblige the party concernd to make good. Wee are with all respect and sincerely

Wee have now before us Yors. of the 14th. Decemt. last since web, are come to our Hands Yors. of the 9th. 15th., 16, 21, 22d., 27. January last that of ye. 9th. Jany. came by the Rising Sun Smack with Yor. Diarys Consultations &cs. Papers according to list the rest of that months date we recd. by yor. Peons on the 12 Inst. to all web. we shall now give answr. & first to Yors. of ye. 14 Decembr. where you Say you recd. the late Presidt. Addisons Pacquet on the 27 October last and there in his Lettr. to Fuckerlee Cawn relating to Mr. Holcombs date in web. you did not do well to detain Said Lettr. but to have sent it forth wib. as directed and the reasons you give in Excuse for wt. You did are very weak and will not stand firm against wt. you promised Fuckerlee Cawn to advise that whole matter to us as Yor. Gen'l. Lettr. of the 14 Decemt. last, by web. delays and want of answr. fuckerlee Cawn whom wee shall now call Nabob may justly think himself abus'd and Slighted, by this you have so incensed and provok'd him to the resentm's you now feel why Shou'd you have kept Said Lettr. either on the score of the late Gov. Addisons death or the further Orders of his Successor or cou'd you beleive (if you can but allow Yor. Selves time to think) that the Successor aiming at the same end wou'd have done any thing contrary or revers to wt. the late deceased Gov. had done in that matter.

You say the best way to lessen the Charges of Your Place is by making large Investm's, to the amove of 40 or 50000 Pags, in this You are so much in the right yt. we agree wth. you but wee doubt the performance because some of us do remembr. that in Gov. Higgonsons time at the Earnest desire of the then Chief and for the Reasons as you give there was a large Stock sent 'em, but they were so far from being able to perform wt. they premised yt. after it had lyen there for some months dead & unemploy'd, the ship Martha of y'. Compys. bound hence for Bengall was order'd to call in at Vizagapatam and take thence 10000 Pags. worth of Rups. and Carry to Bengli, wch, was accordingly done wch, put 'em to some hard strain'd Excuses for theire failure, but to bring the mattre. nearer the Case is still the same wth. You now as for Instance wee have Sent you in Money, and Paid in Bills from the po. Jany. 1709 for August last inclusive Pags. 18526: 31: for all weh. you have not made us any returns till the 9th of Jany last by ye, rising Sun Smack on whom you had Laden bals. 136 amo' to Page. 11818: 38: 2. wch is all you have done in so long a time as a whole twelve months, so yt. wt. has been sent you is Sunck to little more than the amo', of the rising Sun Smack Invoice by w', you say in Yo', said Lett', of Decem'. last y'. you will have left but barely w'. may pay y'. next following months Expen[ces] so that upon yo. whole we think (as matters are manag'd) that settlemt. will hardly beare yo. Charge of one factor and one writer much less of wt. you are so fond of the Post of a Chief, to whom we allow a Just respect to be due, but our Chiefest trust and relyance is in a choice and well composed Councill web. by Yor. Paucity You are not, because, in the multitude of Councillers there is Safty.

We though wee had Sent You on yo. rising Sum Smack Stationary ware Sufficient for so little writing work as you have, and so few hands as you are however we Shall Send you wo. wee can spare, with other necessary factors provissions thus much in answer to Yor. of the 14 Decem. as aforesaid.

The next to our view is Yor. of the 9th. Jan. last recd. Py. Rising Sun with yor. Diarys and Consultations &c. Papers as Plist as has been said, but you have not sent us your Diarys and Consultations for y. Month of Decem. which wee wond. at Seing those You sent us for y. Months of Septem. Octob. and Novemb. last are all compris'd in three Sheets of Pap. web. having Us'd & read 'em thorowly, they give us no manner of Satisfaction to Each Month you assigne only one Consultation and that same towards the Latter End of the m. October only Expected w. you held two, wherein we find little more than reading the acco. of Each in their Sever.

Employs, in these words read and past the Latter wee forbid for the future wee here contesting ourselves only with having no other entery made in Consultation than that such or such by name read the accot of his or their Employs for such and such a Month without the additionall word of being past for how can it be imagind in a time of Consultation in a Crowd of much business they can have time enough yn. nicely to Examine into Each mans accot yt being the proper province of you accountant, next under the Presidt to inspect those account by which some cunning men formerly have drawn such a consequence and formd to themselves a defensive argument (wn. in you wrong) yt their accountance.

In perusing Your Diarys, wee can no ways aprove of the Chiefs managem. in the doubtfull matter of both the Competitors Hamee Cawn, and Fuckerlee Cawn for the NabobShip, the former acting like a common rover or a freebooter by letting his People to rob and Spoyl your Poor Inhabitants, and that after you were so fond and hasty in making him a Prest. it had been Prudent in you to have Soothed 'em presently alike to as to have kept even and fair with both Parties especially w". you had but bare report for the former but better Credentially for the Latt. if you believe Yo. own diarys of ye. 22: 24: 25 Septem. last mentioned in the Letters Mr. Hastings recd. from the old Merch. Braminy at Comello and in a Consultation held on ye. 26 Septem. the Chief Seems to doubt we he formerly believ'd in fave. of Hamett Cawn as \$\frac{1}{2}\$ the former Day's Diarys and therefore delays Sending Hamett Cawn the Powder promised him until it be certainly known we of the Competitors is to be the Nabob.

Yet next Day being the 27 the Chief went to meet Hamett Cawn at the Mango garden and there presented him a box with 4 Pagodas as an acknowledgement of his being Nabob of the Country.

On the 28 Hamett Cawn's Duan visited the Chief in ord. to agree the Presents to the Nabob and Officers and the same Day Your Nabob pass'd by yo'. factory whom you Honour'd with the Salute of 21 Guns and the same number as he return'd.

On the 29 Septem. the Chief with the Nabobs Duan adjusted the Prest to the Value of Pag. 270 in broad Cloth &c. all web, were observe to have been done out of Consultation.

Wee have taken the more Paines to write these Yo'. Diarys to convince You that by making Yo'. Court and address and Yo'. Public testimonies & acknowledgem' to Hamett Cawn as the Nabob, by So much You have greatly disgusted Fuckerlee Cawn whom now you are oblig'd to believe to be the right Nabob whose friendship You have now lost by your fatal mistake as appeares by the Troubles you are now involv'd in and the Difficulties under which you labour this unhappy mistake of yours the Cunning Dutch have improv'd to their advantage and have gaind that freindship of the new Nabob which you have lost.

Jugapa the Braminy You say as your leave to come hither but it's in such a manner as shows Y'. loth to part Company when you advance his usefullness with such superlatives as we do not well like but he was one of those whose Pnicious Councills so far prevailed as made M'. Holcombe lend the severall large summs to the Rajahs which hath ever since his Death intailed so much trouble to his own Familly as likewise now of late to the Company for Jugapa seemd to have been the Bias of all Mr. Holcombs business and Affaires relating to the Country or inland trade but now once for all wee do possitively order his being sent hither Y'. Old Dubash thô Superannuated yet has Sons and Brothers well Qualify'd for that Imploy.

You write us that you have att the Wash[ers] so much coarse goods as will make up 40 Bales to be ready to send us by any the first and best Conveyance that shall offer wch. with the 136 Bales we recd. thro' the Rising Sun Smack makes 176 Bales and that all You have done in 13 Months time wch. is very inconsiderable to maintain the charges of that factory with a Cheife a Post you are so tender and fond off with all it's Pagentry.

We take notice that Yor. Pags. charges for no more than rupees 3½ Pags. wee now send you on the Rising Sun Madrass Rupees 10000 and as they take shall supply you with more as you shall have occasion by any opportunity that shall present hence mean time wee wou'd have You get in long Cloth ordinary & Sallampores ords. enough in proportion to the Betteles you have taken of the Merchants.

You mention a Scarcity of Grain web. You and Sure it must be worse now when you are hemmed in on every Side with the new Nabobs People wee Send you there for 200 Baggs containing in all 1350 Merckall of rice for the use of ye. Soldrs, wee now send you to be deducted out of their pay as the same becomes due, these Souldrs, wee wou'd have you return to us so soon as all Yor, troubles are over the charges of Yor. Place swallows up yor, little investmts, as to any proffit web, is none at all but a plain Loss.

Yor. of the 15 Janry. advices the new Nabobs people to be incamped upon the skirts round Yor. bounds & thereby stoping up all the avennes (sic) and passages to Yor. town, but with all, you believe [they] intend no acts of Hostility all wch. is rather a mattr. of great concern for us to remedy but is no surprize at all seing any one but of moderate scense might Easily have foreseen wt. hath since come to pass greatly evances (sic) Yor. cheif to have made a wrong step in making his Court so Early to Hamett Cawn, and ych. Event justifies our assertion and now Who must make good the mistake of Yor. Present of Pags. 275 given to the wrong hand is the question wee now send for yor. answer.

You say you have wrote to the Kings Officers at Checkracull complaining against Fuckerlee Cawn and that his People permitted their safe going w<sup>th</sup>. Yo<sup>r</sup>. [Leave] but you do not tell y<sup>e</sup>. constitution of y<sup>e</sup>. Governm<sup>t</sup>. at Check[racull] whether the Military or civill Power there, but in Generall terms you call 'em the Kings Officers w<sup>ch</sup>. in y<sup>e</sup>. sense [you] take it, shou'd be supperior to the new Nabob, you ought to have explain'd this to us, as you ought likewise to have the word Kistee in Yo<sup>r</sup>. Diaries, w<sup>ch</sup>. wee understand [not] here unless you mean thereby a 2<sup>d</sup>. Quarterly payme[nt] of any Debt or rent due.

Wee are come now to Yo'. Elaborate Lett'. of the 16 [January] to wch. wee say Yo'. Bales upon the rising Sun came no[t in] time enough to help out the filling up either the Ke[nt] or Somers the former was dispatched hence a full ship on the 11 last Month with a Cargo amo'. to Pags. 98786: 15: 1 & yc. Som'c, from hence but last from Fort S'. David full Laden there on the 28 last Month but did not sail thence (because of the French Ships then at Pondicherry) till yc. 9. Instant with a Well mixt Cargo amo'. to Pags. 145684; 25: 2 & wn. both those Ships arrived here on the 2d. Decem'. last wee had not any Bales of white Goods in our Godowns.

That Paragraph of the Dūtches Gen<sup>11</sup>. Letter relating to the revenues of yor. Place shall be sent you as you desire & tho' wee wish, but wishes are in vain yet wee can neither hope nor Expect any considerable increase of Revenue from Yor. Place, for the way to increase revenue is first to [in]crease People, and not to desert as they do at Vizagapatam which makes us think there is some fault in yor. managem<sup>t</sup>.

You say the amo', you pay the Governmt. for the Town and villiges is Rups. 4862 & the yearly town charges is about Rs. 1300 which together make the sum of Raps. 6162 for this you have the villages and priviledges of making & selling of Salt, arrack, Bettle, Tobacco and other Petty farms, with yo. Land and Sea Customes according to the Moors Establishmt. wn. the revenues was in their own hands, and that none of the English Cheifs have made any matterial alterations as finding by a carefull managemt. under the former heads the mony be raised to pay the Nabob thus for that Part of Your Letter.

But where is the Pformance of that Prudent Managem<sup>t</sup>. of Yo<sup>r</sup>. farms and Petty Customes which may pay the Nabobs rent for Yo<sup>r</sup>. Towns and Villages when by your Gen<sup>R</sup>. Books of Accounts so great a Loss appears to the Company w<sup>ch</sup>. put 'em Some Severall years ago upon a resolution of withdrawing that factory as useless & unprofitable to 'em, so that the then Cheif, by his Sollitary Letters to the Government here promising that what ever charges exceeded 600 Pag<sup>s</sup>. Pannum he would pay and defray out of his own Pocket this matter being represented hence to the Company

prevaild so far with 'em as to suspend executing their former resolution w<sup>ch</sup>. is a plain demonstration that yo'. place may be useless & unprofitable to yo'. Company, when at the same time it may be very advantageous to any in the Character of an English Cheif under the Umbrage and Patronage of the Company.

You say that Customes on Goods imported by sea is not any part of the revenues you farme but is allways paid to the Moors Governmt. but wee want to know whether the severall Branches of Yor. small revenues is either kept in Yor. own hands or let out and farm'd if the form, wee want to know who collects them in, if the latterwee want to know to whom lett out, and for how much pannum, & to whom and how paid whether Monthly, Quarterly or Yearly.

Your Notion of a Peer to make Yo'. Post Commodious for shipping is Just, and may be a great occasion to make Ships frequent and resort to Yo'. Place in bad weather only, but this does not always hold, it is the People therre (sic) resort and abode that makes the Place of trade as for Instance Millford Haven may Challenge preference to any Port or Harbour in all England, but is seldome frequented unless in stress of weather, & on the contrary Holland the Epitome of all Europe has scarce a good Port belonging to it, yet tho' there are not anything produc'd there to the Building of any ship but what is brought 'em yet is there no place where ships can be bought cheaper Your Place is poor and under a bad Governm'. and will always be the same so long as it is kept under from thriving unless as you say a Phirmaund cou'd be obtained from the King to make it a Perpetuall Inheritance to the Company.

If the Dutch as you say have been so long hankeering after Yo. Place you have given 'em a very advantagious occasion to improve if not comple[te] their design by your having so much disobligd the New Nabob, w. their more penetrating judgment took the right and better aim in paying their respects and applying their Presents which they have gained to 'emselves all the good friendship of Nabob Fuckerlee-Cawn, that you have lost.

Wee are now with that part of Yor. Lettr. wth. says in these words—that it hath been always practicable that for the benifitt ships receive[d] by the conveniency of Yor. Port they shou'd by Vertue of a Cowle from the Chief pay  $\frac{1}{4}$ ,  $\frac{1}{3}$  or  $\frac{1}{2}$  part of ythe usuall Customes and Port Charges [to] the Company wth. is agreed on more or less according to the Cargo and circumstances of the [Ton] age, from which method you say you have never deviated; till of late in the Case of Succa Rama &ct. which to us seems a contradiction to wt. you have said previous to this viz, that the Sea Customes are no part or branch of Yor. revenues that being allways paid to the Nabob for the time being but if it has been a practice you never deviated from till of Late, pray who had the benefitt, or received the same since no such thing appears in your Gen<sup>11</sup>. book of Acco<sup>12</sup>. to this wee require Yor. answer.

You say the English only are exempted from paying any Customes at Your-Port, tho' black Merch's. by their names and other indirect means have lately traded on the same terms which you say is a discouragm's. and a hardship on the R's. Hon's. Companys Serv's. in subordinate factories.

Wee say there have been English Gentlemen here that have consign'd their Effects and concerns to yor. Chief and continud the same, for some time to very little advantage, till they changed hands and have found 'emselves much better served by those very Persons You call black Merchants acting under the English Priviledge-which is no more yn. wt. was just and right as being the proper Effects of the English yt. employ'd 'em wee assert this for truth and matter of fact, which lett your Chief deny or prove the Contrary if he can.

It does not become Your Chief to arrogate to himself such a liberty of reflection as darts at any member of this Council that have done him no wrong, and he shou'd know that he lives at more ease and less expense than any of the Gentlemen here he reflects on.

Towards the conclusion of Yo'. Lett'. Your Chief expresses is great zeal to serve the Company with his utmost Endeavours, but conditionally if he has such encouragem'. as many support the Creditt and authority of his Post, in which Case he promises mighty undertakings, by all woh, superlative wee know not wt. he means or wou'd he be superiour to all the form'. Chiefs his predecessors or wt. had they that Your Present Chief has not.

You mention Your Correspondence by Letters frequently with Fuckerlee Cawn; but why all this while you have sent him the late Gov. Addisons Lett. is that to we, were want Your Better answer then the weak and Lame Excuse You have given us.

If we can understand Your Mulla right he says he never received his wages from yor. Debash but from the Chief himself, let all his wages due to him from the time he came thence be paid him to [the] full deducting or allowing for wt. you may have paid his family in his absence and continue him in the service he hath behav'd himself here very civil and quiett, for which he ought to have your Countenance.

Wee send you upon the rising sun a yo[ung] Writer Rich<sup>4</sup>. Smith to be assisting in writing work the Master of the Yatch wee wou'd have allow either Diet or Diett Money as he likes either during the time he stays on h[er].

The sold. wee send you are paid to Ma[y...] and the master is paid to the p°. of June next and all the La[ascars to] the p°. June [next] \$\P\$ the Pay Masters list inclosed.

Yor. of the 21 Janr, advises Yor. have. sent Yor. Vacceel to the New Nabob with the town rent Mony & the Chiefs Lett. of Complem, to congratulate Fuckerle Cawn into his Governm. (& why not then the late Gov. Addisons Letter alls[o]) but that Yor. Vacceel was sent back with the Nabobs greatest resentm. and that he had orderd a body of 100 Horse and five hundred foot to surround Yor. bounds next Day thus by your mismanagem. You have spoiled all notwithstanding the great encomiums you give of the Nabob in your former Lett. and now you apply Yor. selves to us for remedy by which Yor. ill conduct wee are put upon an after game.

Wee are glad Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton does so freely and heartily offer himself to serve you in this Yo<sup>t</sup>. extremity and you are in the right when you say [you] will act the defensive part only for that a [brea]ch is sooner made than reconcild.

Wee [nev<sup>r</sup>.] heard till now by [y<sup>rs</sup>.] of y<sup>o</sup>. 22<sup>d</sup>. Jan<sup>y</sup>. that the obligation M<sup>r</sup>. Holcombe gave Fouckerle Cawn for his Mony had the Companys Seal affixt to it, but that M<sup>r</sup>. Holcombe sign'd the same with his own Seal ring which makes us some w<sup>t</sup>. doubt, w<sup>t</sup>. your Vacceell says in that point.

Madam Holcombe confess her have, brought up with her all M. Holcombe her Husbands English books and Papers of accounts but with all declares she had no other [Jentue] accots, of any sort than w. She receiv'd from that Aracle Jugupa or any thing else but w. mention, in a Paper apart w. She declares she knows of relating to any bag seald or a Pallenkeen & the Presid. hath seen the originall Paper Fuckerle Cawnes serv. that brought the Money to M. Holcombs and left w. him mentions no more than the Summe of Pags. 44000 and if there be anything else of household moveables besides the Pallankeen w. the Widdow owns to have but that her Husband made it up and silverd the same himself w. if insisted on she is reddy to deliver up to any shall have a right to demand the same but if there be anything else Jugapa ought to mak it good.

Thus wee have discusted all Yor. Sevn. Lettre, and now for a remedy for all those evills and troubles wen, tho if you have not begun Yet You have aggravated 'em.

Wee have made up a Present for Fuckerle Cawn to the amot. as \$\varphi\$ Invoice to be sent and presented him from and in the Name of the Presidt. and Gov. of Fort St. George & his Lett. with Copie of that from the late Gov. Addison sent you but never deliverd as likewise a Copie of a Letter of the late Gov. Pitt dated the 17 July 1705 and also the Widdows own Lett. to Fuckerlee Cawn, and wth. 'em the accot. Currant between M. Holcombe & Fuckerle Cawn by wth. it doth appear there is little more than Pag. 6000 due to the Nabob with an accot. of Batty apart, as also Copie of

Amunduraz morgage (sic) of his Country [to] Mr. Holcombe as a security for the Money [...] likewise Rustumdill Cawn [one line lost] impowering him to Collect the rents in order to pay himself and a list of Debts of severall Persons due to the Estate of Mr. Holcombe, all of 'em translate into the Persian Language and attested by the Cogee here.

Wee thing (sic) it no ways adviseable for yo. Chief to visit the New Nabob under pretence of accompanying the Prest. nor indeed any of the Councill unless upon the Security of good Hostages and a safe conduct the Chiefs late ill managemt. having renderd him obnoxious to Fuckerle Cawn wee injoyn You to keep a perfect register of all Lett. you send and receive from the Governmt. or any other Persons and send us either Copies of their originalls or their translates as we practice here and send home yearly to the Company, but more especially send us those and all of 'em that have pass'd between the Chief, and the Present and late Nabob Hamett Cawn as likewise those received from the old Merchts. Braminy at[...Co]mely.

Yor. Journall Entries to which the Leidger refers for Explanation are entered so shorte as renders the whole unintelligible as not to be understood which is a fault pray mend it for the future Notwithstanding what wee have wrote you in some of the forgoing Paragraph of this Lett. concerning Jugupa the Braminys being sent hither wee now order and injoyn you to send the said Jugupa to the Nabob Fuckerle Cawn [in] order to state the accot. other [a few words lost] that hath been receiv'd from the Rajaes Amundaraza Pye Cruw towards paying their debt or w. part of the same was really paid by 'em to Jugupa or any other Person, to be paid Mr. Holcombes accot. wee order this that wee may be through that whole affaire the Presid. hath wrote to the Nabob advising him that Jugupa shall be sent with his accot to be stated before the aforesaid Rajaes We likewise ord. your Mulla to proceed directly with our Pacquet and Prest to the New Nabob whom you are to assist w. w. is necessary for his Journey w. when done and that Jugupa is returned back y. wee order and positively injoyn our former ord. for Jugupa's coming hither as also Concalingua Yor. Chief Merch. and Your Mulla to come hither of w. you must not fail. wee are

Gusbardar to whom I have now wrote another Lett. and told him wee are resolv'd now as at 1st. to send the Prest. to Bengall to meet Zoude Cawn at Hugly ye. Seat of his Governmt. with weh, ye. After so long a time as since the 22d. of July in the year 1702 when both Companies old and new were happyly united & incorporated into one body politque by the known name of the Court of Managers for Affairs of yo. United East India trade and y". they form'd a method & a new Scheme for the better regulating of their Affairs in all their severall places and Settlements in India by web. Bencoolen or York fort and all the other subfactories on the west Coast of Sumatria were orderd and made independent to Fort St. George & have continu'd so, ever since the year 1703 that those orders reachd'em at York Fort till by their Gen". Lett. by the Heathcote dated in London the 9th. February 1708—the Honble. Company have putt York Fort under the Controll of their Presidt and Councill here, and yt the West Coast of Sumatria, is now as formerly made subordinate to Fort S'. George, having premised thus much the next that falls under our consideration is to trace back by takeing clear inspection into all the severall strange and unwarrantable practices of those Settlem's. during the whole time of their being independant to Fort S'. George won. occasiond to great a mismanagemt. of Affairs in all those settlemts. so that all their transactions was foreign to us as not having seen any of their books of accom. as beleivs. 'emselves not accountable to us for any thing they did or shoud do, any otherwise than by their presumption of drawing so many heavy Bills of Exchange upon us for which they had no ordrs. nor we to accept 'em, but the powerfull motive that then prevaild for our accepting, and paying their Bills, was their urgent necessity for supplies hence, to enable em to buy up the Pepper Cropps (woh. were plentifull) and to maintain and pay the Garrison and other incidant Charges this was the face and out side of their pretences for drawing upon us, where under hand there was such a sympathy and correspondence between Fort St. George and York Fort, for the proffitt and benefitt of some perticular persons yt. those Gentlemen at Bencoolen bought up those Cargoes of coars bales goods sent hence with the advance of 30 \$\text{P}\$ Cent on the Fort St. George Invoice and their amount by a strange Metaphor was said to be those severall sums of Doll's. received into the Honble. Companies Cash at York Fort, which form'd and gave being to those Bulkey Bills they so frequently drew upon us payable to severall perticular persons here, till at last the Honbie. Company for once and for all positively forbid us accepting or paying any such Bills for the future as never having had their ord. for those severall Bills wee have had.

The last Gen<sup>11</sup>. Lett<sup>r</sup>. hence to York Fort was of the 10<sup>th</sup>. Aprill last by the Presid<sup>t</sup>. Charles Hopkins Master on whom wee laded a Cargoe amo<sup>t</sup> to Pag<sup>t</sup>. 5267: 31: 5. of which Pag<sup>t</sup>. 3208: 31. was in Long Cloth white ordinary, as \$\frac{1}{2}\$ Copie of that Ships Invoice herewith sent you, wee likewise send you Copie (if can be gott ready) at least abstract of all the severall Invoices of Cargoes that have been sent hence on the Companies acco<sup>t</sup> consignd to York Fort ever since those Settlem<sup>to</sup>. became independant to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George since our aforesaid Gen<sup>11</sup>. Letter by the Presid<sup>t</sup> wee have of Yors the follow<sup>t</sup> Viz<sup>t</sup> that of the 14<sup>th</sup> Aprill last sign'd by M<sup>t</sup>. Skingle and the since secluded Councill M<sup>t</sup>. Griffith, M<sup>t</sup> Daniel and M<sup>t</sup> Garrett the next after was of the 16 May last signed by M<sup>t</sup> Skingle and 3 more of a new sett of Councill, in which they mention not so much as one word of the secluded Councill nor any reason given for their having elected a new sett.

Wee likewise rec<sup>d</sup>. a Seperatte Lett. from the dismiss'd Councill Sign'd by M. Griffith M. Daniell and M. Garrett all which came to our hands on the 30th. September last P the Morning Starr Via Bengall.

Their next Lett<sup>rs</sup>. was of the 10<sup>th</sup>. & 14<sup>th</sup>. August last \$\tilde{\phi}\$ the Essex Via Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David, Capt Lampthorn.

By all which wee may be observed how all things are in confusion and out of order amongst you first as to yo'. Governm' by shuffling and turning out the old Councill, and electing and taking in others in their stead, which is a matter of Dangerous and pernitious consequence to the Companies affairs so far as such practices tend only to make the head absolute and arbitrary which is no ways consistant either with the Honble. Companies Interest or their ord's and now M'. Skingle came to take so much upon him shall be an Article for your further inquiry wee having seen nothing of M'. Skingles Pen or writing, so much to the Purpose and matter of fact as is that of the Seperate Lett' of the secluded Councill dated the 13th. May last aforesaid.

Your lavish and profuse Expenses and Charges hath been nothing else but a continued flux that hath draind and consumed all the Stores goods and Treasure that hath been sent you, to a very small reserve that hath been invested in Pepper, and that neither enough nor timely sent home by which the Demorage (that eating Canker in the Companies Estate) hath devoured and swallow'd up the whole Cargo, wittness the Nothumberland dispatchd the 6 of June or July last if wee remember right tho with 6 Ton of Pepper more yn. wt. lett out for as you say, your troubles and imbroyles with the Natives and Country Governmt. if of bad consequence, even tho' it be but amongst 'emselves their revenge being rather the burning of one anothers houses and destroying each other Pepper Plantation yn. in any blood or slaughter, wee desire to be perfectly and impartially inform'd of the orrignall Causes and first springs that gave being to 'em, and what you think may be the best and most proper remidies to put an End to those troubles seeing wee are in the dark as having been forreigne to all your affairs for so many years past, as you have been independant & thought Yor. selves not any way's accountable to Fort St. George by which there has been so much mismanagem. as has well nigh ruin'd all the Companies affairs in all their Settlemts. on the West Coast of Sumatria in so much as there has not been little more then the shadow of any modell or scheme of a true & right Governmt. in any of its parts whether Eeconomy Polliticall or Millitary, or hardly amongst some, but Practices brings that pure & holy Religeon wee profess into slight and contempt in the Eyes of the Genteels amongst whom wee live, whose better morals ('ts our shame be it spoken) many Christians come shorte of by all which you have so degenerated) y. Yor. whole constitution is all out of frame and of the Hinges.

Now for a remedy against all such Evils & the many Errors that have crept in amongst your Predecessors, which your Practice is a Copie of.

Wee have therefore constituted and appointed Jeremiah Harrison Esqr. one of our Councill to be Deputy Gov. of York Fort Supervisor and Cheif of all Affairs of the R. Honble. Compy both civill and military on the West Coast of Sumatria, to whom (w. he judges it for the Companies Interest) We have given Power with one or more of the Councill as he shall think fitt not only to change or alter the Station or Employs of any in the Companys Service but likewise to suspend, remove or dismiss out of the Councill or out of the Companys service all such as he or shall they see good Cause for their so doing, as may more fully appear by our commission bearing date at Fort St. George the 10 of March 1710 and tho wee have namd severall persons in his said Commission to be of Councill yett such only as he or they shall think fitt to make choice of shall be accounted the Establishd Councill, of York Fort &c. places and so to Continue untill the Rt. Honble. Companies order, or ours be further known according to the tenor of his said Commission, but than any Person or Persons that thinks himself any ways aggrieve by virtue of the Power granted to the Deputy Governour and Supervisor hath free liberty to make his own defence and clear himself if he can, of which wee ourselves will be the Judges or lett him or Them be sent to Fort St. George till when all such Persons as shall be removd, suspended or dimiss'd the Honble. Companies service as aforsaid shall stand good and Valid or anything Else that may most contribute to the well regulating & reforming the Extravagances of all those Factories on the West Coast.

Wee do positively ord. and injoyn that all Money paid out of Cash to any Person or on any acco. w.ever, be done in Consultation assigning the reasons of and for such payments taking each person receipt in the receipt book for all such payments as shall be issu'd out of Cash and the acco. Cash to be read monthly in Consultation.

The accountant should read his Journall Pcells Monthly.

The warehousekeeper is to keep an exact acco<sup>t</sup>, of all manner of Goods he receives in his possession and keeping and of whom or by whatship, with a just acco<sup>t</sup>, of what goods he is order'd to sell and dispose of with regard to the Day of the month on the left Side Mergin with the Quantitys and Quality, to whom sold and for what and this his acco<sup>t</sup>, to be read monthly in Consultation.

The like wee say of the Storekeeper that he buy not stores of any kind till first agreed & order'd in Consultation and to keep a true and just acco', of all w', so bought by him and of whom with their Cost which are to be read monthly in Consultation.

The like wee say of the Paymaster so far as he may be concerned in his Employ of buying in any stores for the Garrison, and that he be not impos'd on by any false muster Rolls the Cheif of Millitary officers wou'd Perswade him to.

Lett Copies of your Cash accots. and the Warehouse Storekeep, and pay master books of accots. Sent to Fort St. George as opportunity shall offer as well as their other Copies to be sent for England.

Wee would have a just true Register kept of the deaths and births of all your male and female Negroes and other Slaves.

Wee transport to you upon this Ship the ffrederick three condemnd Natives to be us'd by you as Slaves according to a Judgem<sup>t</sup>. past upon 'em here some time ago their names are Viz<sup>t</sup>. Terrivingulum, Vingatau, Mira.

Wee send you 10 English & 14 Topass Soldrs. who are advanc'd 2 Months pay as you'll see \$\Psi\$ the inclos'd List.

Wee send you upon the Fredercik Salt Petre, Red wood, white long Cloth ordinary and treasure to the amot. of Pagr. 19443: 6: 4 as P Invoice and bill of Lading, to inable you to the timely dispatching of a full Laden Ship for England, but we wou'd have you return to us back the Frederick whom wee hope God willing to dispatch next october for England, unless it shou'd happen that you have more pepper yn. Tonadge lying upon yor. hands which wee think is Seldome or never your Case.

The Company Complains much of your Pepper as being very faul and dusty w<sup>ch</sup>. is a great Loss to 'em because the dust makes both bulk and weight for w<sup>ch</sup>. they pay freight & Custome as if it were all Clean pepper whereas the Mallabar Pepper is all-ways very clean pray let this be remedyed for the future.

Wee have entertain'd as a factor in the Compas. Service to Serve at the west coast for the space and terme of three years Mr. Will: Touglass, likewise Daniell Evans the Companys covenanted Servi. from England came out a writer and now made a factor to whom wee have advanc'd Pag. 30 to be deducted out of his west Coast salary as the same shall become due.

Wee have also entertaind George Turvill a Writer to Serve the Company three Years on the West Coast at the usuall sallary paid there.

Wee do hereby ord. and appoint Capt. Rich. Phrip Second of Councill and next to the Deputy Gov. Harrison during the time he shall stay at York Fort notwithstanding of any thing in our Commission to the Country.

Wee have advanc'd Capt. Phip. (sic) Page. 100 in part for his dieting our Sold. at 4 fanams & Diem.

Those in the List of Soldrs. who are mark'd wth. a Cross thus X you are but to allow half pay, because the other half is to be paid to their wife and familys here wee commend you to the Almighty's good guidance, and remain

Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatria became independent to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George that wee shall have the less of our own to give you in Charge, their Hon<sup>m</sup>. ord<sup>rs</sup>, and directions being so well calculated to all circumstances that shall fall under your consideration as will render yo. Examination upon the whole very Easy notwithstanding of which wee shall in the use and exercise of our thoughts find Cause to give you in Charge and require of you that a Strict inquiry & examination be made into all the matters wee Shall lay before you which are the following Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Whereas Severall Cargoes of long Cloth belonging to Pticular Psons at Fort St. George hath been Sent and bought up at York fort at 30 Peent on the Madrass Invoice and carried into the Companys Godowns and then past under a strange transmutation of their Cost in Dollars and to have been recd. and paid into the Companys Cash of the Persons of whom bought the the species and Quallitys not chang'd and remaind Bales in their Godowns for which supposs'd and immaginary mony receiv'd into the Companys Cash they give the Sellers their Bills of Exchange drawn upon the Presidt and Council at Fort St. George payable to the Severall and respective concern'd here, by which it may be observ'd yt. those Goods so bought and paid for by the Company here became ipso facto the goods and reall property of the Honbie. Cent more to the Natives and in buying and bartering for those Nagro Salves and in paying their Coolys &c. by which means for their own private advantage they bought the Companys Cash allways indebted to 'emselves by so much as such Sales, barter, or payment made as aforesaid exceeded the first imaginary money bought into their Cash there, which was really in Effect useing the Companys Cash, and turning the same to their own private ungodly Gains a plain instance and proofs of this you'll find in the Secluded Councills Letter dated the 13 May last where they Say that of 24 Chests of Treasure which wee may call lb. 24000 no more then two Chests went to buy Pepper Copie of said Lett, wee deliver you with severall other Papers, for you Guidance and bett<sup>r</sup>. inquiry into the Labyrinth of the Practices of the former as well as the Present Gentlemen who have so much or almost [...] ruind all the Companies affairs by so gross a mismanagement of theirs.

Wee recommend to yor. Care to retrench all Extravagant charges and Expences and reduce the same to a just and necessary frugallity and that on Exact accor. of all Charges and Expences be kept a part so long a space of time as may keep even pace with the first buying and coming in of Yor. You will observe by our Invoice how our Mallay fanams are rated and how many tola Dollars you are to take notice how many they pass for a Dollar in buying and payments at the West Coast and w<sup>t</sup>. becomes of the benefitt of the Exchange made of them.

Wee would have you encourage the Chinees to the Planting of Indico and Sugar Canes the west Coast being much the Same good Soil as that of Java which produce the former little inferiour to that of Cahore and the Sugar nothing worse but equal and better to the best that comes from China.

Let there be always two Keys to the Companys Cash Chest one to be kept by the Dept. Governt for the time being and the other by the Second and lett the reall ballance of the Companys Cash be owned monthly as the time of the accot. Our last to this was of y°. 24th. last month by Essex Copie of w°h. comes herewith in the close of w°h. Letter we advisd the Swift Stakes from Port having been arriv'd at Trincombar on the 18th. last month, She brought us no generall Letter, so yt. wee have none of yors. upon our hands to answer that Ship was unfortunately drove a shore and broke to peices at Trincumbar in the great Storme that happen'd on the 2<sup>d</sup>. Instant about full moon and the Tonqueen Merchant by good providence very narrowly escap'd being lost, she arriv'd this Port on the 7th. Instant a very lame Ship having lost most of her Masts & y°. Morning Star being forc'd into 5 fathom water at Negapatam arrivd this Port the 5th. Instant a very maim'd Ship, the Swift [Stakes] men were all Sav'd but one Laskar that was drowned.

The Mores Ship that Cap<sup>†</sup>. Hart carry'd hence to Bengall last September having lost her passage to Persia was drove a Shore and broke to peices at Porto Novo all her Cargo and most of her people being lost, while wee here had not any Least Damage for which God be prais'd.

Wee have no news from the other si[de others] then what the Charlton brought you a [shore...] hence 4th. Instant for yor. Port by whom wee [sent] you a Packett from the Honbie. Court of Mannagers which came by the Godolbin Via Trincumbar.

We have resolv'd that the Psent designd for King Shallum which hath laid at Metchlepatam Since August last Shall be sent you, being in hopes it may meet Zoode Cawn there who will take care to forward it to Court, agreable to his own orders to us in that matter, but we shall find it hard for us to oblige any Country Ship hence bound for yo'. Port to touch in her way at Metchlepatam Especially if they have any concern of treasure upon 'em as most have, but we are in dayly Expectation of the President from the West Coust, after so long a Voyage as since the 14th. April last that she sail'd hence, she was well at Batavia in October last, and in a few Days was to Sail thence for Bencoolen a long and tedious Voyage.

It is a surprising pleasure to us, the good News wee have by Pvate and Pticular Lett. of yo. having dispatch'd Home the Loyall Bliss a full Laden Ship so soon after, She was arriv'd so late wth. you, but that she can have her passage is yt. wth. we very much doubt, wth. is yet rather possible than probable, but the measure of our Joy woud have bin compleat were the Hallifax arriv'd here.

There has arriv'd this Port about 6 or 7 weeks past a fair large Arab Ship of about 500 Tons the Noquedahs name is Sheik Abrahim an Inhabitant of Caung in Persia as appears by two Passes he hath produc'd to us, one from the Chief of the Portingall Nation residing of Caunge the oth. from the Dutch Chief or Director at Gombroon translate of the first wee send you, and the other wee got read to us, but cou'd not so conveniently get translated he hath desird our Pass for a longer Continuation of time w<sup>ch</sup>. we have excus'd giving on the score he is none of our Inhabitants he hath not brought any thing hither prosperity call'd a Cargo but a few remains of Dates, Almonds, Persia fruit and a little Rosewater he hath carrid himself civill and quiet here & paid the Establishd duties of the Port, he is known to some more Merchants of this place who respect him as a fair trading Merch. he is bound to yor. place with intention to Lade his Ship with a gross Cargo for Persia but we hope yor, wisdome and prudence will so ord. mattro. as that he may not be a rub or a block in ye, way to hind, any of our mastro. Ships getting a freight to Persia if any shoud hapen to be wth, you in the proper Season yt, you cou'd not otherwise bett. dispose of.

We formerly advise you our having agreed to let out to freight the Ship-Hallifax on a voyage to China for Pag. 8000 when wee requested yor. utmost endeavours to return her Early to us in we'h, we do not doubt but that you did yor. best, but our agreem'. being conditionally as to point of time, and the Hallifax not yet arriv'd here and the season begining to be late gives great anxiety to the freighters & may turn their thoughts to resolve making a new Contract for a Danes Ship either for China or Persia which may give some more scope to the H[allifax] if happily she arrives to Nick the time by [...] before the Danes ship sail, hence for China wee Endeav. to Pvail with the freighters to Davort y. [...] ship from Voyage to China in favour of the Hallifax but then we must in point of hon. & in faithfullness to our promise freight y. Danes Ship for Persia, but if it shoul'd so happen that the Hallifax arrive here after the Dans Ship is gone hence for China, we must return her down to you again with wt. bales we can spare in ordr. to be dispatch'd by y. for England thence proper season if possible or to be let out on freight to Persia, wen. last we think may be no hard matter for you to Effect when they have consider'd the ill fate of the Thoma lost and broke to peices at Porto Novo wth. a rich Cargo from Bengul. as aforesaid will make people wary or Cautious how they adventure on slight built Contry ships as that unfortunate ship was.

In yo'. Lett'. of Novemb'. last by the Kent & Som'. you advised the fall of Batty on the Madrass Rup'. we therefor now send y'. wrapt and seald up by the Hands of Cap'. Hart an Essay taken out of 10 sev'. Bags ten Rup'. out of Each bag indeferently and melted down into a Cake in the Psence of two of the Councill and both Essay Masters, woh. Cake so melted was brought into Consultation and there

broke before us in 3/3 we sent 1/3 to Engl<sup>4</sup>. by the Kent and 1/3 now to you the oth<sup>r</sup>. 1/3 wee keep here to the End it may be its own Evidence to prove their intrinciall Value.

Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hart whom we intented this was to have gone by, is not yet ready to go so soon as we first thought, we shall therefore keep this Lett<sup>r</sup>, open to the very last, as not knowing what a Day 2 or 3 may bring forth in matt<sup>rs</sup>. worth our advising you of.

May 8th.

This has lain by us so long till now, that wee can certify you that on the Pmo Inst. hath arriv'd here the Dolbin and the Elizabeth last from Bombay but make no Harmony of any good markett at Surat and at Noon the same day arriv'd here the Charlton from Bombay order'd thence for the West Coast wth. a stock of £6000 in Treasure, whom we shall dispatch hence in a few Days to prosecute his said Voyage we are advis'd by the Genll. on yt. side that the Godolphin was arriv'd at Bombay on the 26th March last & yt. yt. Dispatch ffrigot Capt. Cason was taken by the French of the North of Scotland.

On y<sup>e</sup>. 2<sup>d</sup>. Ins<sup>e</sup>. arriv'd here the Hallifax to our great satisfaction w<sup>th</sup>. yo<sup>e</sup>. Packet, to which we shall give answer by the next that offers hence. We are most respectfully

Kent not having touched at Vizagapatam in their way hither in Novemb<sup>r</sup>. last which you knew nothing of we are apt to believe might have bin the late Gov<sup>r</sup>. Pitts ord<sup>rs</sup>. in the respective dispatches of both said ships hence to your Port last Somer.

Yor. having taken Tonadge of Capt. Wooly is justly Grounded upon the Companies Establish'd order as by the Copie sent us, but then it is to be understood, that such ship or ships bound hence for yor. Port having once paid their Tonnadge for once and the self same Voyage is not Lyable to a second paymt. with yo. web take to be you Compan. plain meaning.

Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamiltons drawing upon the late Gov<sup>r</sup>. Pitt for Payment of the Dutch ship bought of the French was upon a supposition that Gov<sup>r</sup>. Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton w<sup>n</sup>. at Vizagapatam sold his Dutch Prize Ship, for Rup<sup>s</sup>. 15000 to an Armenian bound to Pegu, whether Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton is also gone upon a vessell belonging to M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings which he is to enlarge to rebuild there.

Cap<sup>t</sup>. Y'. latest rec<sup>d</sup>. by the Vizagapotam Mulla was of the 29<sup>th</sup>. April w<sup>ch</sup>. contains a rhopsody and broken English and worse sense, such as our black servants usually speak when they are Novices.

Upon the whole we observe how Vexatious the Gusberder continues to you by reason of his tyred out Patience and therefore to Ease you & our selves for once and all, wee have agreed wth. the owners of the Morning star bound hence from Bengall to touch and call in at Metchlepotam to receive and take a board all the severall ticulars of the present, the Tents only excepted which was intended to Lodge & accommodate the \$\P\$sons that were to accompany the \$\P\$sent by Land travelling as at \$\mathbb{I}^{\text{st}}\$ design'd, we have rec. yesterday fresh ord\*\*. from Zoody Cawn by Cassid from Patna positively by all manner & means [to] send him down the Kings \$\P\$sent to Hughly [where] he now is and let Duan mull or y\*. Gusbardar refuse or hinder y\*. same at their [risque if] they dare w\*oh. y\*o. are to lade [ . . . ] for w\*ch. y\*o. must oblige [ . . . ] of said ship to [ . . . ] one Tenor [ . . . . ] consignd to John Russell Esq\*. No. 46 Our last to you was of the 10th. April since weh, are come to our Hands yours of the 4th, 6th, and 15th, April and 4th, and 5 May last.

That of yo. 4th April last we take to be your Gen11. answer to ours of the 25th February by ye. Rising Sum Smack in which we observe by that as well as by severall former & subsequent Letters the Cheif Mr. Hastings takes a great deal of pains to urge Pswade all he can that the Company ought to pay that old Debt due from M. Holcome [&] Fuckerle Cawn, but gives no solid reason to [ind]emnify us if we shou'd [do] so any more than [.....] the Company might awail a more favoura ble opportunity to reimburs and pay 'emselves out [ . . . . . mutaraz, Countrys as the [ . . . ] me due this is putting the [ . . . ] game to retrieve y former, [ . . . ] to ourselves) wee needed not the help of one so ingenious and of so many Complicated parts as the Chief is master of [...] that whole matter wou'd be so Easy as only to [....] and to have as that any Braminy or Conicoply might effect, and we liable to reimburse the same into the Company's Cash for doing that [which] we had not their ordra, and then wou'd the Chief be so generous as to come in for a share of repaym. for his good Councill as being the only semedy he proposes, besides to pay our [selves] of the rents of Annamturaz in whose Coun[try] you say most of the Companies Cloths comes [from] seems to us a very wield (sic) extravagant Notion the Consequence of won. wou'd be a Constant Quarel[ing] with stoppadge of our Cloth without any [Cer]tain payme, and none before, nor since cou'd be more with those Rajaes than Mr. Holcombe and in the End became a Looser.

The Chief can't but know because we [wrote] it in ours to you of ye. 25 February last h[ow] little the Company Valued their keeping of [Viza]gapatam web brought 'em no proffitt, but [a] Certain Loss and dead Charge this was some y[ears] before Mr. Holcomes death, and Debt had in [...] so much trouble to the Companies [Servants] as it is more fully mention'd in the af[oresaid letter].

The Cheif seems to complain of some [ . . . . ] from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George but will not [ . . . . ] repition of those griva[nces] [ . . . . ] refers us to their Cons[ultation of the] and their Gen<sup>u</sup>. [Letter of the . . . ] both w<sup>ch</sup>. the Presi[dent . . . . ] impartiall [ . . . . ] any ways a derogation to the Credit & respect due to one in such a Post as represents his Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Mas<sup>tre</sup>. thô we think the Chief and Council jointly are the right representatives by whom all Publick Acts, Grants and Cowlys, or anything farm'd out are to be signd, by which the Chief means himself to be restrain'd from the sole and single Power of signing such grants and Cowlys by himself only, which is contrary to w<sup>t</sup>. we practice here, thô we may beleive, that the style of writing at that time might be somewhat harsh, yet the orders they injoyn'd were just, as appears by yo<sup>r</sup>. promise of obediance and Complyance in the aforesaid Consultation of no Date, all which to do the Chief right as he desires and refers us to, the Presid<sup>t</sup>. hath perus'd all the sev<sup>u</sup>. Gen<sup>u</sup>. Lett<sup>re</sup>. sent you hence last Som<sup>r</sup>. we observe by those Lett<sup>re</sup>. that the then Psident had order'd Jugapah the Braminy with some others to go up to Annumturaz to any

indeferent place that shou'd be assign'd and agreed upon to adjust the accots of Debts owing by the Rajaes to the widdow of the decease Mr. Holcombe which you promise but was never done to ys. Day, yor not delivering the Presides. Lettr. with a Gentue superscription and ys. same in English underneath sent in ys. Generall Packett ws. the Chief return'd hither [with] the Currant of Complaints against him [ . . . ] to act most matters in the Compss. [ . . . . ] single power these were to con [ . . . . ] wee presume made ys. Generall [ . . . ] run in so tart a style.

In Perusing your Letter of the 4<sup>th</sup> April last, we think it strange to meet with so many Contradictions [in] yo'. former Letters, as for Instance that of yo's. of the 9<sup>th</sup> January last, you say by the dearness of grain yo. m[en] are forc'd to sell their ornaments to buy 'emselves [...] at a time w'n. yo'. were not besieged, & how much must it have been w'n. yo'. were wo'n. made [...] that rice upon the Rising Sun Smack for a subsistance to our sold's. to be deducted out of their pay as yo'. same shou'd become due at Invoice Price and now you ask us w'. you must do with when yo'r. selves wrote us to send you all manner of stores.

Yours of the 21<sup>st</sup> January highly comme[nd] Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hamilton for y<sup>e</sup> ready assistance he promised but why did not you then advice us the terms and Conditions when we wou'd have spared incomiums of him w<sup>ch</sup>. you have so much en[tered] upon, which good service degenerate into [.....] of mercenary like the proverb no argent [no] swize, bet it wou'd better become yo<sup>r</sup>. Cheif write more plain and less haughty.

The Chief is fully in the right in desiring manifest be sent him from the English Gent[lemen] that Consign any Effects to the care of black Merchants which we shall observe & do accord for the reasons the Cheif gives that the Co[mpany] be not defrauded of their Customes by [ . . . ] their own goods under [ . . . ] Name.

The Chiefs ackno[wledgm<sup>t</sup>.] to the Gentlemen of this [ . . . . ] taken well and we promise all and every of us to be his friends if he will come up intirely into our Honble. Masters Interest for we take no pleasure in this way of pro and Con between us, but when you prevaricate and not only deviate but willfully disobey our positive orders as if it were on purpose to overset all our best designes here and to show you that this is no wrong assertion of ours we shall calmly lay the following before you either to deney or prove the contrary if you can.

Were not you order'd by the Gen<sup>11</sup>. Lett<sup>r</sup>. hence of the 3<sup>d</sup>. of June last to send up Jugapah y<sup>e</sup>. Braminy and some others to adjust acco<sup>ts</sup>. with annumuturaz and Pyerow relating to the debt they owe M<sup>r</sup>. Holcombe, and all this in a time of peace when Fuckerle Cawn was not in those parts but was this ever don or \$\psi\$ form by y<sup>o</sup>. or Jugupah sent hither as then and often since orderd.

Was it not at yo'. Earnest desire that both the late presidents wrote their Expostulating Lett's. to Fuckerle Cawn web, gain'd you some time and respit from those troubles you yo', and since have agoniz'd under because that Nabob eager in Expectation of those Letters which you recd but never sent coud not but hope greatly irritated Fuckerleawn to find himself frustrated but for this you form'd an Excuse ready at Hand and say that had you deliver'd those Letters it wou'd have put all in a flame which that Nabob wou'd [have] resented to the highest degree and utmost securities, but is the matter mended as the [...] hath prov'd, have you not bin highly [....] to chuse you one of three either to pay the Money leave the factory, or freight Fuckerle Cawn and at last beseig'd now we ask you cou'd it have bin worse if you had deliver'd those Letters you detain'd in your own hands this is a strange \$\varPerightarrow\text{var}[ica]ting, but to show your Master piece in this [.....] we offer you this Instance that at the time Mulla arriv'd with you on the Rising Sun Smack, the Nabob Fuckerla Cawn hearing he was come from Madrass sent his Chubda to inquir of the Chief of the Mulla had brought money with him to pay his old Debt the Chief told him he had at which time the Chief had [sent] away the Mulla with the Persian Packet to the Nabob but without either Juggapah or the \$\varPerightarrow\text{Psent as was order'd, and then the first thing the Nabob ask'd of the Malla was if he had brought money to

pay him, who answer'd he had not brought any more then a Packet and some choise-things as a \$\psi\ \text{sent}\$ for him and then to confront the Mulla, the Nabob sent for the Chubdah who avered to the Nabob before the Mulla's face that the Chief told that the Mulla had brought the money with him which put the Nabob in such a rage that he wou'd not receive the pack. put bid the Mulla begon, this was such a strange piece of under hand working as that shall leave it to any to give it such a na[me] as it deserves the rather because we sent you the English of all y. sev. papr. we sent the Nabob, [&] Presid. single Letter to him only excepted.

Besides w'. has bin said y'. never sent us what that certain Debt is owing to the Nabob any otherwise than undefinite, nor have we seen any accot. Currt from you how matters stand between the deceas'd Mr. Holcombe and annumuturaz and Pierow his Creditors so that we were forc'd to take all that paines here and send you woh. might have bin easier don by yo. upon yo. place Jugapan having all those accounts in Gentues.

And as to yo'. Gen". Letter to us of the 14 Septem'. last which you so much refer us to we have again perus'd where you say the mony sent was Pag'. 44000 and w'. remain'd to pay was Pag'. 20000 if you have not mistaken the Letter in Pagodas instead of rup's. because by y'. acco'. Curr'. we sent you by the Rising Sun Smack, the ballance due to the Nabob seems to be but a little less y''. 1/3 of that summ of Pag'. 20000 you say is due to the Nabob.

You were desir'd a long time ago to keep books of all such Lettre, you send and receive from the Governme, and to send us here one of such books to be yearly sent hence to the Company in which yo. have hitherto faild, we now require yor. Pformance.

To a circumspect wise and prudent Chief we wou'd be willing to allow a discretionary power even of him self in such matters where the nature and necessity of some things requir the same, but not otherwise than with the privity and Consent of the Council and then the Chief may have the Executive powe[r] to put in practice—what hath bin first concerted amongst 'em because it may be of ill consequence to Lodge [so] great a power in some single Pson, least the sa[me] shou'd seed out into that of arbitrary and dispotick and woud beget many Causes of Complaints and then the Chief wou'd be put to his shifts to [.....] by his own single Testimony of himself by the Name of false and malitious Informations.

You insist still that the Company ought to pay M<sup>r</sup>. Holcomb's Debt to Fuckerle Cawn, and they to await more favourable times to reimburs 'emselves out of the Rajaes rents, but this has not Coherance with w<sup>t</sup>. you say afterwards in the same Letter an d is a flat contradiction for their Rustumdill Cawn the greatest Nabob that ever was in those parts and after him Media Ca[wn] yet neither of 'em could get full paym'. of the kings rents from those rajas y<sup>e</sup>. former you say deluded M<sup>r</sup>. Holcombe to the lending of money by his fair promises, but the Latter Media Cawn cou'd not receive ½ part of the Kings rents and if it was so difficult to get in to the Kings m[...]. You say w<sup>t</sup>. dependence can be made on the Rajaes bonds to M<sup>r</sup>. Holcombe w<sup>ch</sup>. plainly [at]tests yo<sup>r</sup>. first orgum<sup>t</sup>. of a favourable opportunity for the Company to reimburse 'emselves.

That factory as matters now stand by [us ...] of yo'r great charges is more than ever an eating Canker in the Companies Estate and it were better for 'em to reduce it to the \$\Psi\end{arge}\) sent state and Condition of Metchlepatam, Maddapollam, because it is not safe to send you any stock of mony to Invest to alleviate in some measure yo'r great charges & Expences, nor can we think of any termes of accommodation with the Nabob, before he receives the \$\Psi\end{arge}\) sident's Lett'. and his answer thereto to know how much it is he would be at wch. to this day yo'r never told us by any acco'r yo'r ever sent hither wch. Juggapah might have don & not withstanding of all the large encomiums you give us of him yet he has hitherto approv'd himself as useless in those matt'r as a watch that does not go is to a Traveller.

We will try w<sup>t</sup> may or can be don with Isuph Cawn Subay of Golcundah to whose Governm<sup>t</sup>, those Countrys of the Rajaes belong and give him the plain state of the Case as to the Rajaes Debts to M<sup>r</sup>. Holcombe as likewise his Debt to Fuckerla Cawn & the Presid<sup>ts</sup>, former Lett<sup>r</sup>, to him we return you to wait a proper time to be sent him.

What more of yo' Lett's. y'. lye on our hands shall be answer'd by our next, and we assure you we have a great concern and a reall fellow feeling with you in all your suffering as being with all affection and sincerity

We are glad yor. Merchts. have now finish'd their investmt. weh. by that article of their contract they ought to have done by the 20 February last pray advise us what good temper they are in for agreeing to make another Contract and for how much they are willing to undertake.

With yor, said Lettr. came yor, stewards accor, and the list of Debts, but that of Mr. Ingrams relating to the lead has bin paid and brought into the Compas. Accor. cash w<sup>ch</sup>, the late Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. Roberts avers to be true.

We have paid yor. Bill drawn on us to Mess<sup>18</sup>. Cradock & Mullenux.

Yors. of the 11th, is indeed very surprising as to the Moors having seiz'd & carry'd away Capt. Hugonin & Ensign Reay to Walldour fort, and when you wrote to that Phousd. to know the reason of their so insolent affront in a time of all fair friendship between you and 'em, they answer you yt. those that rent the Walldor Countryes are about 25000, Chuckerums behind hand in paymt of their rents, so long time due & that they shelter 'emselves und'. yo'. umbrage & protection to avoid paym'. of all which they wrote you formerly but never recd, any satisfactory answer.

Some of us here that sign this Lettr. do well remember that those rentro. or any othre. that are concern'd in any mattre. wth. the Country Governmt. was by a speciall ord. from hence in our Pdecess. times forbid to have any share of any Contracts made wth. our merchts. for any Investmt. wt. ever, and wn. Sr. John Goldsborough then Commissary generall went hence in Anno 1693 to yor. place to suppervise affairs there he Enacted in Consultation as a perpetuall standing Ordrs. that none of the renters of the Countrys about you shou'd have any habitation or protection within the Verge of our bounds and Governmi.

This strange practice of prosecuting the Country Renters furnishes our neighbours & small friends at St. Thoma w[ithin] argument that they do but Copie after the English by giving their protection to severall indebted to this place.

And thô we wou'd not have you at this juncture deliver up those renters to fall a Victum to the late insults and triumphs of the Moors, yet we wou'd have secure 'em & write to the Governmt. to send to you any indifferent Psons but good accountants to adjust all matt's. in difference between both parties & then that just satisfaction be made to the party injur'd wch. wn. done you may in some time after get yor. selves perfectly rid of 'em the better to Pserve a firm good friendship between you and the Governm\*.

Yor next subsequent is of the 13th. web. wee reed. yesterday with the inclos'd Invoice & bill of lading for wt. bales yo. have laden on yo. Rebecca Capt. Holland Command' of which we can say nothing, none of yo'. Bales being yett come ashore, the Ship arriving late in yo. night was not come into the road till next Day, & this proving rainy (but otherwise moderate) nothing cou'd be done.

With this we send you the Presid\*s. Lettr. to be by you sent to the Phousdar of Walldore as supposing Capt. Hugonin & Ensign Reay are not yett released, & the same in English we send you for perusall, that you may see & know our mind.

Curr<sup>tt</sup>, by which we observe that matters are so far from mending that they are grown from evil to worse relateing to the Captives whom you Say are Sent from Walldore to Chingee and we are at a Stand what to do or direct any orders to you untill we first hear from the Phousdar of Walldore and have his answer to the Presidents Letter.

Meantime we enjoyn and ord. you possitively to secure and keep in safe Custody all the Relations of the said Renters severally and a part for whose sake with so much shame so great a disgrace hath befallen you as the Carring away your prime Millitary Officers their Captives in Triumph and it Signifies not so much to the purpose what the Arbitrators have done as to the making up the Acct. between the Renters ought to Show and produce the Originall Lease and Grant of all the Severall Villages Rented out to them and the amount of the whole & Annum and to Show discharge and acquittance or so much either of y. whole or in part as they have paid, of what farmed out for.

And it is too mean a thought of yours and very unworthy of such a Constitution as formes you into a Deputy Govern. & Council who are presume to be so prudent and wise to tell us you are inform'd that force the Captives releas'd first the Renters Relations would soon after pay the Debt but should they pay it now before our people are releas'd they would bring some unreasonable demands on them afterwards by which you or they mean that our People Should Continue so long Captives untill the insult seems and slights of Victors are Satiated and Pass'd.

When you imprison'd [ . . . . ] you may then soon come to know where [ . . . ] hands their effects are to be found.

Thus for we have wrote [ . . . ] Presid<sup>t</sup>. rec<sup>d</sup>. the Phousdar of Walldore [ . . . ] which being wrote in the Mirata La[nguage...] our People for that purpose then [ . . . ] way it was this forenoon the 29. before the Translate was brought us in Consultation Copie of which comes herewith for you to answer by which you'l observe it differs much in the way and manners as you have stated the Case to us.

Our Latest to this was of the 9th. March last by the Frederick Capt. Richd. Phrip Commander who sail'd hence for your Port, the 11th. that month and Carried our Packett with our Commission under the honble. Companies Larger seal for establishing the Councill att Bencoolen and appointing Jeremiah Harrison Esq. Depty. Govern. of York Fort and Supervisor & Cheif of all Affairs of the Honble. the United East India Company both England Millatary in all their Settlemts. on the West Coast at Sumatria to which we refer and in hopes that he hath survived that Voyage and is happily Long before now arriv'd with you we take Occasion to Congratulate his accession to the Governmt. of those [parts] in a [Post of so great a] Trust as we have intrusted & committ'd to his Charge and Care whom we pray God to prosper in so great an undertaking.

[H]aving promis'd thus much we are now to advise [you th]at the Loyal Bliss arriv'd Rouges River the 25th. January last and was full Laden and dispatch'd for England by the Latter end of Febry. but was forced to put back again as having Strain'd her Bow Sprit and lost some Anchors, where he must stay till next Season offers for prosecuting her Voyage the Council of Managers not variating from their former orders as having dispatch'd her within her Charterparty Limited time.

On the \$\foathbf{P}^\circ\$ May last the Carleton arriv'd this Port having been dispatch'd from Bombay about the 27th. March last bound for Bencoolen, but that Season not favouring his Voyage any otherwise than what might [be] expected by a Teedious long passage and other[.....] produced to us as the Consultations of his Off[ice att] Zelon whom we detain'd here some time Long[er than] intend'd, because the Country Governm' is some r[espects] unsettled Since Daud Cawn was call'd home in A[prill in the] Courts.

The Carleton brings you Sea Chest [ . . . ] from England and we have Laden upon him [ . . . ] 80 Tun and 20 Redwood which goes Consign'd to you as  $\mathfrak{P}^{\tau}$ . Invoice and Bill of Lading of the same.

Wee inclose you here a List of all the Severall old Bills drawn upon us that we have p<sup>d</sup> here since the Depty. Govern<sup>r</sup> went home with interest which you are to take notice of, and we wou'd have you enquire and examine impartially into the matter of Debt said to be due to [Mr.] Weo[ly] Deceas'd because the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>n</sup> make some objections to the paym<sup>t</sup> of his bills in England we wou'd have the Case Stated truly and fairly and send us, as well as to the Company an Acco<sup>tt</sup> of the Same.

We Suppose the Nathaniel may be arriv'd you ere Long this and that the Frederick is still with you and now the Carleton and that all of them may be more Tonage than you can fill up and dispatch'd thence for England in the proper season, we wou'd have you in such a Case retun to us here the Frederick (whom God willing) we shall dispatch hence a full Laden Ship for England in Septembr. or Octobr. next. We send you upon this Ship Padre Johannes Coyston Commis of the Theatin ordr. for the use and instructions of your Roman Catholick Soldrs. at the usual and establish'd allowance the Company give, but we cannot prevail with the Capt. to agree to 4 Fanams P Diem for the Padres Crave to eat att his Table but refuse himself wholly to what you shall think fitt which whatever it be you shall pay the Capt. for his Dyeting yt. Padree att his Table we wou'd have you deduct the same out of the Padres Sallary from the Company as the same shall become due that they may be Reimburs'd that expence.

We would likewise have you by all the best and most proper waves and methods you can think of to prevent that heavy Dead Charge of Demorage by keeping their Ships so long in the Country unemploy'd which is such Consuming moth in the Companies Estate as the worm is in the Owners Ship.

By a Ship now arriv'd from Siam but last from Batavia whence She sail'd the 11<sup>th</sup>. last month we have the news that the Nathaniell att your Port in Jan<sup>ry</sup>. last was laden with Pepper to be dispatched for England which if true we are very glad off.

Thus far we have wrote when Cap<sup>t</sup>. Jones Command<sup>r</sup>. of S.P. Ship is come ashore and brought us your Generall Letter of the 14<sup>th</sup>. March last which convinces us of the mistake previous to this Viz<sup>t</sup>. that it was the Westmoreland and not the Nathaniel you had dispatch'd on the 19<sup>th</sup>. Jan<sup>ry</sup>. last for England what you desir'd in your Said Letter shall be sent you for which reason we must detain y<sup>o</sup>. Carleton 8 or 9 days longer to Coine the Mallay fanams you are so much in want of which may occasion a Subsequent Letter and [there] fore shall end this att present.

By your next Subsequent Letter we are glad to understand that matter of Difference between the Renters & the Governm<sup>t</sup>. are like to be accommodated but be it as it will it cannot Compensate of so great an Act of Pridiousness in the Injuries and affronts they have done you by Seasing two of your Millatary Officers and having them Still Captives which deserves a due Resentm<sup>t</sup>, when time and Occasion Shall Serve.

On the 5<sup>th</sup>. Instant the King William Gally touch'd here in her way to Bengall on whom came the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Anthony Wellden, Constituted and appoint'd by Commission Presid<sup>t</sup>. of Bengall and Govern<sup>r</sup>. of Fort William for all Affairs of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. United E. India Company in the ports he stay'd here but 24 hours and proceeded his Voyage to Bengall.

On the 6<sup>th</sup>. Instant att night arrived from England the Susanna Cap<sup>t</sup>. Richard Pennell Command<sup>r</sup>. who came a shore next Morning and brought with him the Companies Packet Contain<sup>8</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. and Council, but we would not have you Strain so hard upon the Merch<sup>16</sup>. in your abatem<sup>16</sup>. as th[ey . . . ] that abatem<sup>1</sup>. by the Cloth they bring [ . . . ] so much under [ . . . ] which pray take care of.

We wonder that the Surrat Cotton in so Little a time should rise from Pagods. 17 or 17½ that it was bought for att your place to Pagods. 23 the Selling price now with you.

We Shall Send to you soon after this List of the Severall Sorts of goods we would have you provide for this years Investm<sup>t</sup>. and shall then gave answer to the 3000 Pagod<sup>s</sup>. Long Cloth Letter **W** your Merchants desire to bring in on the Same terms and Conditions with our Merchants of the Same sorts.

Let all Acc's. be ballance to the time Mr. Mountague Resigns and Mr. Farmer enters to Succeed the former, and draw upon us bills from time to time for what Mony you may have occasion for that all matters may Concur and the Council to Co-opperate to Strengthen the hands of the new D. Govern. that all things go on Cheerfully, and heartily & that there be no Complaining in your Streets.

We have accepted both your Bills as mentiond in your Last, and have sent you one Candy of Wax on Mallims Ship for which Comes one coil and Invoice.

We give our hearty thanks to M<sup>r</sup>. Mountague for all his good Services, to our Honourable Masters during of his managem<sup>t</sup>. of their Affairs there.

Anthony Welden Esqr. into so eminent a [position] and great trust, as is that of being President as [ . . . ] of Bengall to whose wise and prudent act of [ . . . ] and good Managemt. of all affairs we wish [you Happiness] and prosperity.

Former who lives some miles distance fro[m ...] which gives a great inconvenience to [ . . . . ] to begin a new Correspondence with Meerza [Mahdi] Jarbeague who keeps his Residence at Bessa[da] or Six leagues from Metchlepatam and Al[...] (tho otherwise a good man) will easilly [...] as being but a Deputy and Can't act firm [with<sup>t</sup>.] leave of his Superiour such delayes and [...] time does no wayes agree with so few a [ . . . . ] as wee shall limit you to for the dispatch [of] Ship wee intend to send you hence by whome [...] you again.

They belong to [ . . . ] Company the Stock they have [ . . . . . prev]iously reported but most [ . . . . ] letter & as it is said pay the [ . . . . ] for Permission [ . . . . ] the Shipps Cargo 46 Gunns the [ . . . ] and one of the [ . . . . ] Prime good [ . . . . ] Canvis they are endeavouring to Contract with there old merchants at Pondecherry and offer them 12 ? Current by which you advise that Sheva Naigue Redde is like to agree with Suroop Sing for the renting out to the former the Walldore & the Naumall Countries the same Sheva Naigue Redde (we take to be) if we are not mistaken the Person that deserted your bounds and so long absconded to avoid payment of what he was in arrearage to Soorop Sing which if so we are apt to believe he will Clear of his old Debt which occasion'd so much trouble as has been alledged for the said Renter having shelter'd himself & taken Protection in your bounds web, gave Soorop Sing the spacious Pretence of seasing those that are now his Captives but now the cause being like to be removed the Effect should cease that is the Captives ought to be sett att Liberty weh. is the good result of your having imprison'd the Relations of the afforesaid Sheva Naigue Redde and you may take it as a maxim never to gratify those Casts of People with any Present to gain their false friend [ship w]hen they are the first aggressors in wch. The Muddapolam Yaucht being now of no other use to you, now the ffrench Ships are gone we would have you send her to [us] Laden with bales so soon as the new Moo[n] is over & that you see the weather is sett [in] for that after so much Rain we expect some [days] of fair weather.

[We] well approve of what you have [ . . . ] to ensign Carter who[se . . . . ] his Commission Void & [ . . . app]oint Serjeant Brook [we . . . recomm]ended to be Ensign [ . . . . ] see by the Com[mission . . . . ] for that Purpose [ . . . . order her to proceed directly without touching any where by the way so that we
cannot send you any Ship or other Vessell to Carry away the present sooner then

The ffrench S<sup>t</sup>. Mallows Ships having return'd to Pondicherry on the 8<sup>th</sup>. of January we found the Coast Clear from Hallifax to proceed for Bengall & accordingly Dispatch'd her hence on the 17<sup>th</sup>. said month with a Cargoe amounting to Pag<sup>s</sup>. 169846 [. . .] to be return'd to us early again with Grain for the use of the Garrison & freight Goods rather then Come any Part empty.

The West Coast being once again put under & made subordinate to this Precedency we Sent thither on the 11th of March the Ship Frederick Capt. Phrip Commander with a Cargoe amounting to Pags 19443: 6: 40 Cash [\$\frac{1}{2}\$"] said Ship we sent Jeremiah Harrison Esqt of our Council with [our per] mission for Establishing the Council at Bencoolen and appointing Deputy Govern [at York] Fort & Supervisor of all Affairs [both in the Civil and Military. . .] in all the Honble. Com[pany's manage]ments on the West Coast of Sum[atra . . . . .] Qualified for so [ . . . .] from whose [ . . . .] . Here has arriv'd here of our Honble. Companies shipping Viz The King Will. Galley on the fourth July on whome Came the Honble. Anthony Welden Esqt. President of Bengall Stay'd here twenty four hours & then Proceeded to Bengall that Ship touch'd & call'd in att the Cape in May Last & brought us news of the Heathcotes haveing got well there on or about ye. 17th. or 18th. Jan. that the Late President Pitt had shifted his Ship & went on board a Danes Ship without staying to accompany the Dutch heavy Sailing fleet & yt. Capt. French Ships at Pondichery sail'd thence but whether gone is variously reported they being close & Secrett in all their affairs & therefore the more to be suspected thô most believe they are gone to Mergy to fitt & clean their Ships and then to go upon the Cruise & endeavour to pass the Streights of Mallacca to joyn two more Ships of their Consorts that are Cruising of and about the Streights of Sunday if so they will be off force enough to oppose any thing they can meet with in those Seat.

It is Likewise said they have orders to make proposalls for a Settlem<sup>t</sup>. for this new Company at mergy.

The 15th. Currant brought us at [ . . . . ] Generall Letters viz one from The Depty. [Governor of] Harrison and Councill att Bencoolen, dated the 5th. of [ . . . ] of advising there haveing wrote us a Generall letter of the 16th. Currant that at 6 at night the Sherburn Unfortunately Struck in nine foot water up a neck of sand call'd Molfey valley to the Southward of Tincomola on le [ft side] all the People Came safe ashore Some in [the] Pinnace & Some in the Yaull and the rest of the Ships Crew in rafts She had nothing on board her of the Companies Save 30 Pieces of old iron Ordenance brought from Benjarr to Bencoolen good for nothing we will not rashly say that Ship was willfully lost but we may say Obstinately she was as \$\frac{1}{2}\$ the Copy of Said letter of the third Instant which Comes herewith and to w<sup>ch</sup>, we referr.

Our next receiv'd letter from [D<sup>y</sup>. Gov<sup>r</sup>.] Harrison was of the [ . . . ] Instant from Jaffnepatam recounting [ . . . . ] he receiv'd from the Dutch Govern<sup>r</sup>. of [ . . . . ] of w<sup>ch</sup>. we likewise send you the [ . . . . ] us by the hands of one [ . . . . ] Sherburn a Packett [ . . . . ] of all the Officers of the [ . . . . ] & way of the fatall loss [ . . . . . ] justifies our former a [ . . . . ] to our Unfortunate friends & to assist them in what they Can to their returning hither & the like thanks we owe & acknowledge to the Govern<sup>r</sup>. of Jaffnepatam Promising our thankfull Paym<sup>t</sup>. to their order for what necessary Charges and Disbursments they be at on account of the unfortunate especially M<sup>r</sup>. Harrison the late Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. of Bencoolen & Superintendant of all our Honourable Companies Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatra.

Just now at 10 in the forenoon when writing the foregoing is brought to us by Dutch Peons a Letter of the 11 Currant from Mr. Harrison at Jaffnepatam of the Surpriseing newse of the Sherburn being got a float and brought to an anchor at Point Pedro by means of the Captain & the assistance of the Dutch and that she is not so much endamaged as at first she was reported to be she is to proceed to Bengall as Judging it Safer so then to adventure on this Coast in the season of the Year.

The loss (as we may now Suppose) of the Ship President & the just Apprehensions of our fears of the danger our China returning Ships may be in by reason of French Ships of so great force is but a very mellancholly Theame & we wish we Could Change the Scene to a better Subject we'h. we cannot do while the St. George is not yet arriv'd and if not with you by this time at Bengall we fear there is no room for any hopes of her being [ . . . ] this day of we'h. we Could wish ourselves.

The Deputy Govern. & Council [att] Fort St. David have Contracted with the [Mercha]nts there for an investment to the amt. [of Pags.] [10]0000 to be got in and finish'd by the [. . .] of Decembr. next, and we are endeavouring to do the Same with our merchants [here] to twice that amounts to the [ . . . .] the former contract made [ . . . .] years cloth is better & can have more for it [ . . .] severall other merchants on the Place but in this Case our Companies Present Sett of Merchants will not Contract with us for any Investment if they miss of haveing the broad cloth and they haveing Provided so much Cloth of Severall Species before hand they well know no other merchants can contract with us for an investment this year to the afforesaid amount to be got ready by the limited time this is the hank they have upon us but we shall Conclude finally with them or others so soon as the Europe is gone.

We have laden on the Europe and Consign'd to you on the Companies account seventy Chests of Treasure of Maddrass rupees & likewise a box with the Companies mark N°. 3 Containing as P Invoice intended as a Small [Cover] to Zoode Cawne the new Lord Admirall [who has] approv'd himself our faithfull Stanch [friend] att the Kings Court & Promises to Continue Still as we hear is noble & Generous without being avaritious or Griping a rare quallity and vertue to be found amongst the Moors.

By the Maremaid we sent you a translate of the Princes Nishan to the President & his humble answer to the Same in English we send you by this Ship likewise the translate of The Lord Zoode Cawns Pervanna to the President and his answer to the Same w'h, the desire you'l please to h[ave the]ir translate [in] the Persian Language [ . . . ] fied persons or two to the [ . . . . ] accompanied with the [ . . . . ] Present.

[ . . . . ] proceeded Directly & make the Best of his way for Bengall without Touching any where & what we have laden on board the Europe for Visagapatam you'l se by the inclos'd invoice a part.

But in regard the Captain has Sign'd bills of Ladeing to deliver the Said Goods at the Port of Visagapatam to the Chief & Councill theire we wish he may be the Ship or one of the Ships you intend to send us to fill up here about the Latter end of next novemb. to touch there the better to accomplish and Perform his said bills of ladeing to avoid any mistake that may happen upon traversing said good on board any other Ship you should order in her way hither to call in and touch at Vizagapatam.

Wee are now with yours of the 27<sup>th</sup>. July receiv'd here y<sup>e</sup>. 17<sup>th</sup>. of August after since when we have yours of the Sixth instant by the President arrived here on the 22<sup>d</sup>. of the Same to both w<sup>ch</sup>. we shall give the needfull answer.

As to the first part where you say you Continue & hold your oppinion [Still] that the Company ought to [settle] old debt due from M. Holcombe to Fuckerla Cawn with a Proviso if the Company intend [...]ing of that factory we shall not now Contract [ . . . . ] but take notice to you how unsafe [ . . . . ] any to have such a Chief as act arbitra[ry . . . . ] the Councill in all matters [ . . . . ] Parenthesis in writing [ . . . . ].

But it is a good thought of you and you are perfectly in the right when you say the keeping of that factory keeps out the Dutch, french & Danes and as to what you say where your Place reduced to the same State & Condition as Matchelapatam & Madapollam is yet you would be Lyable to the usuall Presents but as both places above mention'd are withdrawn to the keeping of one English man and two peons at the former & one Braminy and two Peons at the Latter we seldom or never give any Presents at either place & what you give so frequently at Vizagapatam (tho' Something you cant avoid) does not relish well with the Company as you may see by Copy of a Paragraph of their Generall letter by [this year's] shipping w<sup>ch</sup>. comes inclosed.

As to your not having delivered the former Presidents letters to whom directed and your excuses for the Same we have wrote you formerly to we, we referr because that baffled your excuses as the event Proved.

Wee are well pleased and fully Satisfied with the Chiefs having cleared himself of that vile aspertion cast upon him by the Nabobs Gusbadar but we may say that the understanding being misinform'd it necessarily follows an erroneous judgement must Proceed [and] sett the whole in as true light as matter [stands] we State it Thus.

Scarlet deceasd, and thô it be something too [much] for his standing, and so young in age, yet his merit [. . .] the former, and if he lives the latter, will gradually [. . .] encrease to more maturity.

We are advised the Susanna & the Sherborne in [. . .] the Des Bouverie will be sent us up hither [from] Bengall, the two former with Saltpetre and stores [. . .] with 250 Tons of goods proper for England.

Yours of the 30th last month by Mr. Henning on the parr we recd. the 10th Currt being Sunday, we take notice that our next former letter to this of the 29th. Septemb. last overland, was not come to your hands, we are therefore apt to believe they may have fallen into the clutches of Fuckerla Cawnes people, or some otherways miscarryd, for that we dispatched that packet to our people at Metchlepatam by their returning peons in hopes they might have found Cunsum Lingana who promise to stay there some dayes upon his own buisness, but in failure of him we orderd Mess. Faucet and Noden to forward them to you by fresh peons, that packet containd an originall letter of Fuckerla Cawnes to Mr. Holcombe with severall other papers as likewise bill of Exchange of Mr. Raworths drawn on Mr. Hastings on the Comp. accot. payable to the Chief & Council there copy of said letter with the severall inclosed papers comes [herewith] and wish them a better fate than the former.

You seem now to beleive because you [ . . . ] Mr. Holcombes own Seal and not the C[ompany...] obligation, tho' by your former letters you a[ . . . ] trary, which is agreeable to the message sent [ . . . . ] if true and sincere which leaves room for d[oubt . . . ] others that he only ask'd 2000 Pags. in [ . . . . ] he would show the bond with the Com[pany . . . ] you a month or six weeks for [be . . . . ] that money, and what argument [ . . . . ] used (to whom you are obligd) for pers [ . . . . ] Rajahs proposalls, yet 'twas no more th[an . . . . ] were so urgent with us to doe, by your [ . . . ] letters, and that at all hazards [ . . . . ] consideration, tho' all the matter [ . . . . ] between your selves and Fuckerla [Cawn . . ] accept [...] without any intent [ . . . . ] of friendly argument with that Depts. Nabob, and gaind you time untill you could be assurd of the real truth of that whole matter and tho' you doe not advise us yet we have it from other hands yt his demands are about Pags. 6500.

It's matter of wonder and amazement to us, that you having long agoe foreseen the troubles that are since come upon your place by Fuckerla Cawnes having laid close seige on the 8th past and the next day after begun acts of hostility, by firing his great guns upon your Factory, that you should not have provided yor, selves with stores of provisions, eatables being as essentially necessary to a Garrison as ammunition &c. warlike stores can be or that you have not wrote to the President & Council of Bengall to supply you with what you wanted, they being better able to doe it here than we hence against the monsoon.

Now you have time to make your sad reflections upon yor. own unwary actions is sparing your then covertly now yor open enemys, so much powder and lead as your Diary entrys mention which we have read with great astonishment, but in all your Consultations which are but few, not above one or two in a month no mention is made of yor. accor. Customs &ca. Revenues, which is [...] tho have had complaints brought us of great exactions [of] the people that frequent your Port, and now lately by the people of the parr that arrivd here the 10th. Currt. who say that [ha]ving 3 chests & one bale of paintings on board being Metchlepatam goods belonging to Aga Peera & Aga Mookeem two venerable Merchants of this place, and the parr bound [...] by wind and Currant drove to Vizagapatam at [.....] thô they made no sale of goods there because qsd[...] aforesaid respective Proprietors here, yet Juggapa sent the [pe]ople on board said to be by your order, and with them two [you] who broke open said chests to view and value the goods [...] them pay the [Custom of Pag'.] 32. 15. 60 on the whole [...] Pag'. 21. 2. 20 is [the Custom upon] the paintings, and we have no Certificate to show for the same, as we doe here between this place and Fort St. David [...] wrote you in our former matter be plainly and imp [artially . which make up the Cheif & Council you have two Paymasters, the Cheif paying the head Servants himself once in six months, and M. Horden the rest of the peons and menial Servants, we wonder the Cheif should goe out of the beaten plain path practisd here into little bye ways of his own invention.

We have wrote by the Europe to supply you with the quantity of powder and lead you want to be sent you from Bengall.

The President by this conveyance writes to Fuckerla Cawne to desire him to send us up here some true and trusty freind or servt. of his own, in the nature of a Vackeel to be fully instructed in the business in contest between you and him, and that he be fully qualifyd with power sufficient to agree & reconcile all differences to a just satisfaction as the case in right and equity shall require.

With this we send you two paragraphs of our Consultations of the 11<sup>th</sup>. & 15<sup>th</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. which by the power and Authority of the Constitution of this Board we positively order and command to be immediately obey'd even whether matters are, or are not accommodated with Fuckerla Cawne without any excuse or delay of putting said orders in full execution, notwithstanding his Cas[te].

We doe permitt and give leave to Cap[...] come hither if his occasions require the same.

Since ours of the 11<sup>th</sup>. last month sent you overland advising the S<sup>t</sup>. George to have been safe arrivd at Gallee, copy of which comes herewith since when we have rec<sup>d</sup>. yo<sup>th</sup>. of the 10<sup>th</sup>. & 25<sup>th</sup>. last month the former by the Gulston, the latter by the Sloop Adventure to the needfull of both shall now give answer.

Pray return to us all the lead you have that you cannot dispose of, with a reserve to yourselves of so much only as you shall have occasion for the use of the Garrison, the like we say of your Europe iron, which may be best done by some of the Compas. ships, that may happen to be at your Port, the better to avoid paying freight which we hope to dispose of here at time to some profit.

The ship Hallifax's short Tonnage and damage of her goods here from Bengall shall be adjusted with that Captain so soon as he shall arrive from China but pray send us no more salted provisions of either beef or pork from your place until we [write] for them, those last sent us upon the Hallifax proving [.....] good for little or nothing as having been ill cured [ . . . . ] which our Coopers here with all their art cannot re [ . . . . ].

[The] present for the king, is still kept [...] detaind in our [...] at Metchlepatam, by the Government notwithstanding [...] Zoudee Cawnes orders to the Officers and [...p]lace, but none so [...] greater stickler and more obstin[ate...] the present's going to Bengall then [ . . . . ] Gusbardar even thô we have sent them attested Copys of the Princes Nishân to the President with those of Zoudee Cawnes Perwanna to Do. we will see in a little time more how this matter may terminate as having sent Zoudee Cawnes perwanna to the Suba of Golcondah some time agoe to whom those of Metchlepatam are subordinate, whose answer we impatiently wait for, and thô we had leave and permission, as we have not yet the present monsoon doth not favour its being sent to Bengall sooner than next Feb<sup>ry</sup>.

You say the presents in some of its particulars are extravagantly dear, as is usuall in what ever is bought up for Kings & Princes that very name and occasion riseing their value, but wee think such of us, as were not then of this Board are no ways, Accountable for what done before their time, and those that were do say they were bought by the Approbation of the then President & Council the embroiderd Cap in box N°. 74 was taken out of said box to prevent its being tarnishd, and to have been wrapt up in a cloth & deliverd to the care of Seropah formerly our Cheif Merchant, when ye. [ . . . ] present was at first designed to have been sent to Court [ . . . . ] Golcondah, with which the said Seropah was to [ . . . ] and that same cap with two English [ . . . ] pictures [ . . . ] intended in part of a larger present of the [ . . . ] President Pitt to Zoudee Cawne.

What ever letters Cap<sup>t</sup>. Cornwall might have sent us when upon Zeloan yet we never rec<sup>d</sup>. here any one of them, thô' we have two of his from Bengall, and had he come here to this Port from Zeloan, we should not have putt him under any orders to us, but declare his ship to be out of the Companys Service, untill his ship had been first surveyd, fitted, and repaird, which we are sure could not be effected in this road, however if he comes here well repaird and the same attested we shall send him to the West Coast, if he has his compliment of men and thus much in answer to yours of the 10<sup>th</sup>. last month.

And to your subsequent of the [ . . . ] month we hope we shall not only attempt but make [ . . . ] and evidently appear we are no ways guilty of a [. . . . . . ] materiall to the Companys interest as you said [letters blame us] with, for our [not] having sent you more of our bales, and not advising you [of the to mage we could dispatch hence for England, to the former sent you upon the Des Bouvery & Susanna 300 bales was as much as we could spare you in consideration of the excessive and constant rains we have had in the months of April, May, June, July, August & September last contrary to the usuall hot dry seasons of said menths in so much that the rains has hinderd our cloth to be brought into Town as that we could not employ our washers, as having nothing for them to doe, the countrys all about us being all a flood of water for some months, which putt us in a great concern how to lade home the Frederick, whom we expected to arrive here in October last from the West Coast being one of our last years shipping and consequently longest upon Demorage, and for that reason ought to be first dispatch'd for Fugland, tho' she did not arrive here till the # ". inst. and hath ever since been much hinderd in lading her Charterparty petre & redwood by reason of the Surf that hath ever since for the most part run so high.

As to the other part of what you blame us for in not advising you what Tonnage we should be able to dispatch home this season.

We answer and say we did early on the 3<sup>d</sup>. of Jan<sup>ry</sup>. last [write to] the then Council of Bengall to advise us what Toñage they [thou]ght they could be able to dispatch home the next October following, and their answer of the 27<sup>th</sup>. of Feb<sup>ry</sup>. after told us they were in hopes to gett ready 12 or 1300 Toñs, which made us send you so much shipping and large stocks so that the Company having the last year limitted us to £60000 Two and this year to £80,000 for this place and Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David, we should think that yourselves having much the greater part of the last and this years Stock consignd to yo<sup>r</sup>. Presidency you should for that reason have first advisd us what Tonnage you could have sent home this season in performance of [wh]at the Council wrote us in their said letter of the 27<sup>th</sup>. of [. . .] last, and because we could not dispatch home the [. . . .] who arrived here from Bengall the 2<sup>d</sup>. of May last [. . . .] forced to use our utmost to jostle out a Danes ship [. . . . .] for by some free Merchants of [ . . . .] for a Voyage to China to make way for the Hallifax [ . . . .] some thousand Pag<sup>s</sup>. more freight to Countervail [ . . . . .] greater part of her Demorage at a time when [ . . . .] wayes dispose of her.

And now upon the premises we leave it to any indiffer[ent] to judge whether what you blame us for was not rather par[r . . .] just.

What we wrote to Zoudee Cawne as being too plain was no m[. . .] not so much as what himself wrote us in his Perwannas relating to the encouragement of Trade in generall.

Copys of our former Phirmaunds and grants from the Kings and Princes of the country shall be sent you by Sea Conveyance as judging that most safe, the Originalls formerly sent to Bombay having been robbal by the way and so for ever lost. We are
