WORSHIL SIR & SIRS

This comes by the Princess Mary Captain George Martin on whom we send you a supply of Packing Stuff as \$\P\$ Invoice & Bill of Lading inclosed.

We send you herewith Copy of this ship's Charterparty to be returned hither after her Dispatch; On comparing it with the inclosed Calculate of her Bengall Tonnage you will find there remains one hundred and four 104 Tons to be supplied in Bales at your Place; and if after her Charterparty Tonnage is compleated there is room in her hold & the Captain should request more Bales at half Freight you may let him have them taking his Agreement for the freight of them in Writing to be inclosed in Your Packet to England.

When She is loaded you must take Care to send proper persons on board to see that her Compliment of Men, Guns & other Warlike Stores are agreeable to Charterparty, and the Lists thereof signed by such Persons must go in your Packet.

You must also Demand of the Captain an Attested Account upon Oath of the particulars & Value of all the Goods shipped on board as his homeward bound adventure, and transmit the same to England, You are also to see that it is conformable to the Company's Indulgence to their Commanders, a printed Copy of which we here inclose for your present & future Guide.

When you begin to send Bales on board you must give the Captain a Caution against Fire and keeping the Boats long on board with Bales in them; A Copy of such Caution we send inclosed for your direction.

Our Honourable Masters have been pleased to permit their Commanders to pay into their Cash all, or any part of the Produce of their Outward bound adventure, and to direct that certificates be granted them for the Amount, on their severally making Oath that the Money so paid in is part of their Priviledge and the Profits thereon & that they neither have taken up nor will take up other Money in India to trade with in the room of it: should Captain Martin therefore offer to pay any Money into Your Cash on Such Account you will observe the foregoing directions: Inclosed is the Form of the Certificates we grant here. Honble Sir & Sirs

We had the Honour to receive the Letter you wrote us of the 7/18 of January relating to the News you had receiv'd from the Mallabar Coast of advices being Arrived at Bombay from Aleppo, that a War was near being declared between the Emperor, the Kings, of England & Portugal and the States of Holland on One side. and the Kings, of France & Spain on the other side, In answer to which we are to tell you that our Letters from Tellicherry. Advise us, they had no better authority for this News than the Report of an Officer who had deserted from Bombay and taken protection under the French at Mahee. Our Letters from Tellicherry add that they had receiv'd no such Advices from Bombay though One of our Company's Ships and two Galleys were Arrived directly from thence, and this Morning we receiv'd Letters from Surat dated the 11th. December, and they also are silent about any such News. Your Honour &ct. are best able to judge what Weight ought to be put upon the Letters from the Capuchin Fathers at Ispahaune, but for the advices which it is said were brought to Bombay from Aleppo, we have already told you how it came to Tellicherry, and therefore we suspend our beleif till we have it otherwise confirmed. If we receive any further advices we shall take the Liberty to communicate them to You, and we desire you will favour us with any which you receive. We have a ship now here that will sail in few days for Bengall, by which we shall forward the Packet you sent Us directed Minh. Sichterman.

November we receiv'd from Anjengo Two Packets for Your Honour &ct. which were brought to Bombay by the Nassau and Onslow, We also send another Packet directed only to the Honourable John Stackhouse Esqt. but We believe the Bombay Secretary omitted to direct it also to the Council, it being seald with the Publick seal, and we observed the same mistake in the Letter to this Place: That Letter with the Packet by the Nassau are inclosed in this Packet, and We send you Captain Cleave's Receipt for the Box containing the Packet by the Onslow. We also send you inclosed a Packet we receiv'd from the Governour and Council of Negapatam which we desire you will forward as Directed to Minh. Sichterman at Hughtly [sic] We believe it contains some Advices they receiv'd relating to a War in

Europe, of which that Your Honour &c'. may form a better judgement we send inclosed Copy of the Letter to Us from Negapatam, with our answer to which we must Add that last Night we receiv'd Letters from Surat Dated the 15th. Our Honble Masters ship the Princess Mary sail'd from Fort S'. David the 27th. of last month as the Godolphin did from this Place the 28th, as your Honour &ct. sent no Saltpetre to Bombay, we hope you have been able to send us sufficient by the sloops to Kintlage our next September ship. We would not press your Hon. &c. too much for this article, but if your stock in hand would admitt of it, It would be more ready if you could at the same time send us also sufficient to Kintlage the ship we may expect this season for the China Voyage.

We congratulate the Honble Thomas Braddyll Esqr. on his accession to the Government of Calcutta, as we compute the late President has by this time resigned it, and Wishing you all immaginable success in our Honble Masters affairs We are

WORSHLL SIR & SIRS

Our last was by the Galatea under date of the 7th. October Copy of which comes inclosed, and having since the Departure of that ship had more leasure to peruse Your Books & papers by the George we shall hereunder Add such further remarks as appear necessary to be made thereon.

FIRST, CONCERNING SHIPPING.

We now send the George to you and have given the Master of her Charge of the Hawk a small sloop of about thirteen Tons, built at Pegue to Assist in the service of your Coast: the Account of her Cost and the stores supplied her with, you will find in the Packet; the other larger sloop is not yet finished, but we expect her by the End of April, and We propose to Dispatch her to you in company with the new ship some time in Septem., do you return us the George as soon as she is unloaded, that she may be here in June and employ'd on our Coast or to Bengall as Occasion may serve, her late Arrival the last Year made even her passage to Vizagapatam dubious, the Master has therefore our strict Injunctions to make the best of his Way to Your Port, and to touch no where except by Necessity.

The Scarborough we are informed by a Letter from Captain Westcott to our President was near Achin the 4th of December and his Men sickly, we fear therefore she will be a late Ship home notwithstanding the preparations you have made to give that ship a Quick Dispatch on her Arrival with you. We observe you intended to send away the Queen Caroline the beginning of October which we believe our Honourable Masters will approve of, for the reasons you have given, and as they were disappointed of the Lyell last year.

We shall be pleased to find a due performance of your promise in the 5th. paragraph of your Letter of hiring no more Boats but such as are absolutely necessary to bring the Pepper over the Bars, or from such places where it may be impracticable to employ the Company's Vessels: You must remember they are a standing Charge and therefore if they are not earning something on their Accounts will not give Our Honble Masters the Satisfaction they may expect.

SECONDLY, GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FORT ST. GEORGE.

Concerning the Deficiency & Surpluss of stores mention'd in your Consultations of the 30th. June and 10th. July We say that had the directions sent you in our former Letters been duly put in Practice by the several persons acting in that employ, there would have been no Occasion for a reference to us of the Case, nor indeed did we expect it after having laid down Rules so plain for your Guidance. We find the deficiencies Amount to \$ 955.—.66 the Overplusses to \$ 253. 1. 6 besides which there are several Articles in Mr. Rigg's report to the Value of \$ 925.—.53 to be brought to the Credit of the account so that in Reality there is an Overplus, which irregular Accounts you Acquaint us have arisen from the Deaths and frequent removals of Persons in the Employ the delivery by wrong Names and the not making the usual Allowance for Waste, Rust and other Decay of stores and we are willing to beleive as you have represented it, and do therefore for this once allow Mr. Riggs statement and that he be not chargeable for them, but require you to be very observant in future of our orders for the regular taking and signing the Account remains on the Death or Change of any Person in their Employs.

And us to the Deficiency of stores at Moco Moco under Mr. Savage's Care, referred also to us, when that is better explain'd and he has due credit for what have been found there since his coming away, we shall give you our opinion and directions thereupon.

By this ship We send you such part of your Indent for Wares and Stores as was not comply'd with by the Scarbrough.

The Silver and other Things mention'd in the Invoice P George came out right.

THIRDLY, INVESTMENTS, FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

It's with great pleasure we observe the Crop is like to be plentifull and the Investment larger than the preceding Year. You did right in Appointing an European Surveyor of the Southern Plantations which part of the Country seems to require One; and we think it high time to call the planters of Koonkoy to an Account for their remissness and Neglect of their Gardens. We hope the reconciliation you have wrought between the Two Pangarans and their going Personally into the Country of Soongey Etam to encourage the planting of Pepper in that part and that not succeeding Coffee will have a good Effect.

If Seedee Ibrahim performs his promise of setting the People of the Eight Dussans to work in making Pepper plantations and not to conceal and Harbour the Company's and other slaves that run away, we believe Our Honourable Masters will not disapprove of the Allowing him Ten Dollars & Month, but We think no confidence ought to be put in him, as he is a Man notorious for villany and Treacherry and was the Chief promoter of the Troubles in 1719.

Since the Planters in Anacksoongey were uneasy from a Suspicion of the Old Turetoolis's wronging them in the Weight of their Pepper, we approve of your removing him and appointing another, as it is highly necessary those People should have all the satisfaction they require in that point, and be perfectly assurd that justice is done them, and you must do all in your Power to prevent any Impositions of such or the like nature whenever they are Attempted.

At those places where the pepper is taken by Measure you must enjoyn those who receive it to be particularly carefull the Planters do not mix the light or that which has been gather'd too soon, as the Company must be sufferers when it is garbled & Weigh'd off, when this was introduced, the Malays deliverd that which was Weighty and full grown, and on the Tryal then made the Company were Gainers by the Agreement, but if they fail in that you must not suffer it or any other Innovations to the Company's prejudice.

FIFTHLY, FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS AND REVENUES.

We observe you have fix'd on a spot to Erect the Fortification and Buildings at Moco Moco according to the Plan sent you, and we wish we could supply you with a number of usefull hands to carry on the Work, which you represent you are in great want of, but we cannot perswade any of our Artificers to go over; However in order to forward the Buildings as much as possible we now send you in the room of those destroy'd by Fire the same Number of Doors and Window Frames, and as we are upon this subject we think proper to give you a Caution not to permit such large Advances to Malay Men such as the Resident of Moco Moco made Bugginda Rajah for providing of Bricks & Chinam, we think a lesser sum than 500 Dollars might have Answer'd the purpose, and it is certainly neither safe or proper to make such Advances where there is so little security for the performance.

It appears to us a House and some Fence to secure the Company's Effects is very necessary to be immediately set about at Manna, which part of the Country we find produces now a large Quantity of Pepper, and as it happens the Bar is often unpassable that the Pepper lays there for several Months, On any sudden troubles the Company's Goods are liable to be plundered and destroy'd, the Distance from Fort Marlborough being too considerable to admit of an immediate Assistance on any such occasion and we would have you therefore lose no time in finishing what shall be judged proper for the purpose.

We acquainted our Honourable Masters last year of your want of a Number of Good Slaves to carry on your business, and it's probable you will receive a supply by the next expected shipping, If the Gentlemen of Bombay send us any for your Place we shall forward them by the first Opportunity but we believe they will be but few if any.

We approve of the Method you have taken to secure the Company's Godowns from Fire by removing the small adjoining Houses and Tiling the Roof, as we do of the Gratuity given the Arabs for their good behaviour when the Accident happened to the Buildings; and your purchasing the two Leases where the Ground was commidious [sic] for the Timber Shed. It was also right to buy at Outcry the spot of Ground called Hungerford to prevent any further disputes with Mr. Jedderee's Heirs especially as it could be done on so easy Terms as 25 Dollars.

SIXTHLY, COMPANY'S SERVANTS, MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

We are concerned at the Death of so many of the Company's servants and in particular for the murthers committed as mention'd in your Letter, In the case of Bangseradin we doubt not but you will take such measures as are consistent with prudence and Justice.

As you do not suspect any embezelment to have been made at Moco Moco of the stores during M^r. Gee's Residentship but that they were really Expended & Used for the Company thô not duly brought to account we permit you to Write them off to Profit and Loss.

If all the Demands on Mr. Benjamin Hawke's Estate are paid we would have you write off the Ballance to Account Current Fort St. George, You must also have the Original Will proved with you and send an attested Copy of that and the Probat over to Us.

Mr. Crawford has been paid here the amount of his Bill for Sundrys sent Mr. John Innis on the George, you must dispose of his Bengall and other Goods for the most they will fetch with you for we cannot answer the Risquing any part of his Estate at Sea.

We cannot at this time send you any Military having so few Europeans on our Rolls both here and at Fort S^t. David, and those we may expect this year from Europe will not be more than sufficient for the service of this Coast.

We now return you Five slaves who were sent Us some Years ago, and have been Employ'd under our Carpenters, Bricklayers and Smiths, also twelve Transports, you need Credit Us only for the Charge of the Passage of the Latter, but let their names be enter'd on the Paymaster's List and Work with the Company's slaves.

The Wife and Children of Lieutenant Horne being by the death of his Attorney left destitute of any provision for their subsistance we have thought fit to allow them eight Pagodas & Month from the first of this Month to reimburse which you must stop twelve Dollars & Month out of his pay.

Inclosed is a Packet from the Secret Committee to the Deputy Governour and was intended you by the Lyell but that ship's voyage being altered the President & Council of Fort William sent it hither by the Anne in April last. We are

By This Ship Princess Augusta We send you a further supply of twenty thousand Madrass pagodas and somewhat more than thirty thousand Arcot Rupees as W Invoice and Bill of Lading Inclosed.

We also send you twenty Candy of Iron and a further supply of packing stuff, and for so much of this last as may be more than you want for your own Use it must be sent to Ingeram, the Gunneys from all the Northern Settlements being much complain'd of from home as well as the Wrappers.

When We wrote you the 14th. May We intended this ship should first have taken in the Cloth at Ingeram and afterwards have come to You but having since resolved to send the Money on her, We have thought it more proper she should go directly to Vizagapatam, where you must keep her no longer than is necessary to take in what Cloth you have ready & then Dispatch her to Ingeram to take in the Cloth there but you should previous to that concert with M. Prince what place will be best for the ship to lye at, and for the Conveniency of shipping off the Bales, The Outsets from

the Rivers being very dangerous and troublesome at this season of the Year. Ultimo and two days ago sent you a supply of twenty thousand Pagodas for your Cash; We shall now reply to what you write us relating to Nanjan Chitty, his having taken Farm of the King of Misore for the coining of Fanams and making cloth at Salem and his Intentions of raising the price of both; Your advices agree perfectly with what we heard some time ago from some of our own Merchants, but we could give them no directions upon it furtherthan that they should act in concert with yours to oppose it, and to let us know before they complied with any such imposition; We think from the nature of the thing it cannot last long, the Weavers as well as the Merchant will be too uneasy under so great a Greivance, At Present our Merchants assure Us they confine themselves chiefly to Warriarpollam, and have not lately done any thing at Salem, but as Cloth comes in but slow from Warriarpollam they also are pressing us for Directions, how they are to act in Salem. We are sorry to read by yours that any others have complied with Nanjan Chitty's exactions, but as We have no reason either to hope or expect, that we shall get cloth cheaper than other European Nations, if you really find after Your best enquiry that they really have submitted to his terms we know no remedy but to submit to the necessity of the times, but as you are so much nearer to those parts than We are and many sudden turns may happen wherein it may be losing much time to wait for directions from hence, We have resolved to leave this affair to Y'. Conduct and have renewed the directions to our Merchants to act conformable to those which You may give Yours. We are

WORSHIL SIR & SIRS

A few days past we receiv'd yours of the 14th, and observe therein the Complaints made of two of our Merchants namely Ponapa Chitty and Gopall Chitty, particularly of the last, who is son of Custoora Chitty a Tritchanopoly Merchant, residing in Your Bounds, we have taken pains to enquire into the truth of said Complaints and for that purpose have had both those Merchants before us in Council: as to Ponapa Chitty he tells us, that his Gomastas bought some Cloth last year of Nanjan Chitty, but he declares positively that since then the said Nanjan Chitty has not provided any Cloth for him nor have his Gomastas bought any of him and indeed we have pretty good reason to beleive any thing he has done this year can have been of very little prejudice to any body. He shews us indeed a Letter from Nanjan Chitty inviting him to employ him in the purchase of cloth which there could have been no occasion for nor for the orders Nanjan Chitty sent to Ponapah Chitty's People not to Pay any more money to the Brokers for Cloth if Ponapa Chitty had before Yielded to his Exactions and settled with him to allow him 2 or 21 Pagodas P Corge.

As to Gopall Chitty he also shewed us a Letter which he received three days ago from Nanjan Chitty inviting him to employ him in providing cloth, but He assures Us he neither has, nor designs to comply with his request: That the five thousand Pagodas he sent to Salem was to his three Gomastas namely Raja Veraugo Chitty, Kistnama Chitty and Rangapa Chitty, and the directions he sent them with the money was to go hand in hand with the Gomastas of the Fort St. David Merchants; He adds that he will not answer for any thing that Sashachilum may have acquainted Nanjan Chitty with, but for himself he has no correspondence with Sashachilum, and having his own Gomastas at Salem he could have given them orders to have acquainted Nanjan Chitty with any thing he thought proper without being under the necessity of doing it by the means of Sashachilum, and as to what you write us of Sashachilum & your Merchants not knowing that he provided any Cloth at Salem it is to us very surprising, because Molinga Kistnama Chitty who is one of our Merchants and a Relation of Sashachilum has often had cloth from Salem, which was provided by Sashachilum's Gomastas. Gopall Chitty being examined further about his People being privy to the agreements made by your Merchants Agent with Rashapa at Warriarpollam for twenty Ox load of 8 Caul Cloth at 39 Pagodas & Corge and afterwards offering the same Broker 391 for it, he replied that he could not positively say it was not so, till he had wrote about it and received an answer, but he beleived it was of a Piece with the other Informations you had received as having given positive orders to all his People not to advance anything in the price above the Fort St. David Merchants nor to take in any Cloth which they refused: Upon the whole if what our Merchants tell us be true there is some reason to apprehend the stories which have been brought you proceed from some Disgust and Ill Blood between your Merchants and ours in which case there is nothing more easy than for Letters to be wrote and Peons sent express as from the Country when neither one nor other were ever out of your Bounds or both may be sent from the Country by directions first from Fort S'. David: We don't say this really is the Case, but is what you ought to guard against for you have some near Neighbours who will know how to take all advantages of any Divisions among our People and will not be wanting to foment it to the utmost of their Power: We should be very glad to Employ but one set of People in the providing cloth to the Southward and if your Merchants would have enter'd into larger Engagements we should have set down contented here with the little that is procurable in this part of the Country but the Company are very uneasy at the large Investment made by the French in your Parts and expect to come in at least for an equal share with them and We know no way to answer those Expectations, but by Agreeing with our Merchants here for so far as yours may be deficient: We agree entirely with you that if there be but one seller at Salem, it must of necessity occasion the Cloth to grow dearer or worse, but we don't apprehend it will be mended much by there being only one buyer, for our Company if at the same time there are many different buyers for the other European Nations, but however that be We cannot take upon us to direct your Merchants how or where to provide their Cloth, that is a matter which must and ought to be left to themselves and all we expect from them is to have it as good and cheap as our neighbours.

If your Merchants bring you any further Complaints of Gopall Chitty, as Custoora Chitty lives in your Bounds, you may enquire into those complaints by calling him before You, which will save You the trouble of writing up here about them.

During the present unsettled state of the Country we have given M². Hubbard our Directions to entertain as many Topasses and peons as he shall judge necessary to the Defence of your Bounds. We are

We are now to advise your Honour &c. that besides what Bales we shall have for the dispatch of the Duke of Lorrain, We hope to have Two thousand four hundred more to fill up such ships as you may send us in December. But in regard our Investment is subject to many Accidents and disappointments, We desire you will send us about One hundred Tons of Salt Petre to compleat their Tonnage in Case it should happen that we are not able to do it in Bales. We are also to desire your Honour &c. will Dispatch the ships early to Us in December that we may if possible get them away by the middle of January being very averse to keeping them later if it can be avoided. As the full moon falls this year on the 4th. December we hope there will be no danger in their coming out of the River as soon as that is over.

We have receiv'd your severals of the 3^d. 4th. & 5th. Instant and one of the 3^d from the Deputy Governour. The hopes you have that no occasion of complaints will happen for the future from the conduct of our Merchants, in the measures they take in providing cloth, makes it unnecessary for us to say any thing in reply to great part of the first Letter. We receiv'd by the Sloop Carolina the Musters you sent us of the French Fine Cloths and have compared them with our Musters here: The observations We make on them are that they are neither so well made nor so cheap as those sorts used to be, but we are sensible that is the fault of the times, and though our Merchants did last year bring us in better for the money, yet they lost so much by it, and could not be prevailed on to bring in near so much as they promised, and thô we are upon another footing this year we apprehend they will nevertheless bring in far short of our wants and therefore We would have you engage your Merchants to bring in as good and cheap as they can, all they can get between this & January of the Ten, twelve and fifteen Cauls cloth; The Company demand so little of the Eighteen Caul Cloth, that We think we shall be able to get the whole quantity here and We think also better and cheaper than your Muster.

The Deputy Governour having in his seperate Letter represented to Us the necessity of entertains, an hundred Topasses more, and that there is between the N. E. Bastion of Cuddalore, and the river side, a space of about two hundred and fifty Yards which lying entirely open it would be impossible to prevent a party of Horse from pushing into the Town, and which might be render'd of greater security by a Breastwork of Earth with palisades and a little Earthen Redoubt for three Guns near the River side, we have resolved in considerations of the Present state of affairs in the country to Consent thereto.

We intended this ship Princess Augusta to you much sconer, if she had not been detain'd to the Northward longer than we designed or expected, however as she has the Character of a Prime [Sailer] We hope she will arrive with you in time to be return'd to us again in Decr., when We design her to the West Coast, our intention in sending her to you now being to assist in bringing up the saltpetre, but if your stock on hand will not allow you to send Us more than what may be brought by the Europe ships We then desire this ship may be loaded with good Rice.

The Captain tells us she was not sheathed at Bombay, a Work that We believe will be necessary before she goes to the West Coast; Your Honour &ct. will be pleased to direct this matter to be considered and reported to you by some of the most able & experienced seafaring Men, and to order, therein as may be thought proper.

The Mercury & Fanny brought us y^r. favours of the 30th. July & 9th. August & We are sorry you had no news of the Resolution when the last came away. To supply the loss of the Red Wood on the St. Joan, We send you a further quantity on the Princess Augusta.

We have demanded of Captain Joy's Executor the Amount of the Bill on him for Current Rupees 207.12. We shall do our best to recover it but the Executor at present pleads the want of assets.

Herewith is Duplicate of what we wrote you by our Honourable Masters ship George and having since taken into consideration how to get the cloth up from the Northern Settlements in December We have agreed that the George shall bring up that from Ingeram for which purpose you must order her thither [again] after the 4th. Decem. as you can get her ready: Mr. Prince will have our directions to detain her there no longer than is necessary to take in the Bales as she must afterwards proceed from thence to Motopolee to take in some Chay Goods which will be ready there against her arrival: if Captain Taylor be unacquainted with that place and you have any good Syrang or Tandell with you that knows it we would have you send him on the ship. The Triton We believe will be big enough to bring hither the remainder of the Maddepollam Goods and the Owners have promised to order her in thither for that purpose, as for the Vizagapatam Cloth We think you cannot fail of some good conveyance for that out of your own River and the sooner you send it after the full Moon is over the better.

We shall give you credit for the six old Guns put on board the Princess Augusta and Debt you for those Six and their Carriages you receiv'd out of her when We know the Price of them from Bombay.

The Gomastahs of some of your Merchants who had some cloth turn'd out here have tender'd us between nine and ten thousand Rupees which they say is the balled due from their Masters upon your books, in consequence of their contracts with Mr. Davis and Mr. Sanderson; This Money they ought to have made good at Vizagapatus.

but as they have pleaded that they could not dispose of the turned out Cloth till it was too late in the season to send the Money to their Masters, We have for this once indulged them in receiving the remainder of their [ballances] here, and you must not fail in your next to send us up a state of their accounts from the ballance of the Books in April 1738.

You may permit Lieutenant Crompton to come hither in December next if he

desires it.

Rebecca and sloop Experience: The Cloth is but just landed so that we cannot yet advise you how it turns out in quality except that we are sorry to observe almost the whole parcell to have receiv'd damage on board the vessels.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Our last to your Honour &c^t. was the 29th. September, which We sent by three Conveyances, the Princess Augusta, the Fanny and the Mercury, and the 10th. Instant we receiv'd your favour of the 17th. Ultimo.

We observe your intentions to send us Bales instead of the hundred tons of Saltpetre We requested to compleat the Tonnage of the ships to be Dispatched from hence, and our Letter of the 10th. Ultimo will shew you that it is also agreable to our own sentiments.

We observe also your apprehensions that you will be in want of Cash to carry on your next years Investment, and We shall therefore by the returning ships in January supply you with all that We can possibly spare from hence, what We sent you the beginning of this Year reduced our Cash so low that We have been obliged to sell part of the silver receiv'd by the Europe ships to carry on our current Business; Our sole dependance is on what sums may be offer'd for Bills of Exchange but how much that may be We cannot yet say with any certainty and therefore We can only repeat our assurances, that We will assist you to the utmost of our power.

We shall now desire Your Hon. &c. sentiments upon an affair in which We think the Company's Interest a good deal concerned & wherein We believe they have for some Years been considerable sufferers, We mean in the Coinage of so much of [silver] into Madrass Rupees; If We have a true knowledge of the Grants from the Mogul, they ought to pass equal with siceaes, but the experience of many years is convincing that has not been regarded, and a late Letter from Y. Presidency desired that only one third of the Silver designed You might be coin'd into Madrass Rupees giving for reason that you apprehended some obstruction from the Government relating to their Circulation. An hundred ounces of standard silver coin'd in our Mint

produces to the Company Madrass Rupees 244. 15. 9 to which if we add a Batta of 10 P Cent it is Current Rupees 269. 7. 8½. The same quantity of silver coin'd in the Country Miuts produces Arcot Rupees 253. 12. if they [carry] a Batta of 8 Q Cent it is current Rupees 274. —. 9½ [Supposing the] computation of the Batta on both sorts to be true, the difference is Current Rupees 4. 9. 1 on an hundred ounces of standard silver, at which rate computing that We have coin'd 270758 ounces 12 penny weights this year, the difference to the Company [am] $o^{ts}$ . to Current Rupees 12,366. 5.  $8\frac{1}{2}$  a sum well worth the saving if it can be done without drawing any future Loss or Inconvenience upon them. It would be entering upon a needless and useless discussion to say how many of the Company's priviledges and Grants from the Mogul have been evaded by the arts of the Nabobs and Governing Moors, it is sufficient in the present case to observe that though they do not dispute our right to coin in our own Mints they have if We judge right render'd it rather a Loss than a benefit to the Company: It may indeed sometimes happen either by disturbances in the Country or from some other cause that it may be unsafe to trust our Bullion in the Country Mints, and in such case the priviledge of coining in our own Town may be of use and therefore necessary to keep up our right, but the coinage of fifty or an hundred thousand Rupees annually, may be sufficient to do that & for the rest we should be glad to receive your sentiments how far they concurr with ours on it's being more for the Company's Interest to Coin into Arcott than Madrass Rupees, though We are not as yet determined whether to do any thing therein till We receive the Company's Orders. But our Recruit[s] from Europe have been far short of what We had reason to expect, and notwithstanding all our ships are arriv'd [our] compliment of Europeans is but barely [compleat.] You consider therefore what use Topasses & [Peons] can be of [to you] and We do hereby permitt. you to entertain as many of such as you think may be necessary at this Juncture.
