General Letter from Madrass read. Gen^l. Letter from the Hon^{ble}. President & Council of Fort St. George of the 19th January was now read, adviseing us of the arrival of Ships Compton, Greenwich & Marlbrô from Bengall, the two last were order'd to touch at Vizagapatam for Bales, from whence they are advis'd that the continued troubles in that part of the Country have so much hinder'd the Gentlemen there from making the usual Investment that the most they could procure don't exceed two hundred Bales, which has oblig'd the Hon^{ble}. President & Council to be very pressing with us to do the utmost we can to increase our Investment, and to use all expedition therein, that the ships may have an early dispatch.

Mr. Graham's leave to go up. Mr. Graham having ask'd leave to go to Madrass for a short time, they have granted his request.

Order'd that the Ramah Sloop be loaded with all the Bales we now have in our Warehouse, that she may be dispatch'd to Madrass.

Gen^l. Letter from Madrass of the 25th instant, acknowledging the Receipt of ^{General} the Several Letters, Books & papers, we sent them since the 2d. December, as ^{Letter from} Madrass read. also of the Bales sent upon Sloop Ramah & Margaret Anne.

They note with Pleasure the encrease of our Customs and the diminution of the Charges of this Garrison, & make no doubt, but that we will continue our best endeavours on both these important Articles to raise the one, and decrease the other, as opportunity offers.

They approve of our proposal of letting out the Arrack Farm for the most we can, for one year only, at which time they hope the Rent may be rais'd again.

They also approve of our discharging four of the Military here, they having serv'd their Contracted time, and we are to continue advising them from time to time of the arrival and of the dispatch of the French ships, and of their Cargos, as such advices will be always very necessary and acceptable to them.

Madrass read. A Gen^l. Letter from the Hon^{ble}. President & Council of Fort St. George of
the 30th instant was now read, wherein they inform us that their Merch^{ts}. not
having near complied with their Contract for the Investment the last year, they
have declined making a new one this, & that they cannot prevail on them to promise
more than one thousand Bales by the end of September, wherefore they press us
to do the utmost we can to procure a large quantity at our place that the Cadogan
may be dispatched by that time, and to give as much assistance as possible to the
expected Shipping. The Gentlemen at the Bay have wrote them that the difference-

with their Nabob on acco^t. of the Ostenders will very much impede their Investment, and therefore we are the more obliged to exert our diligence in encreasing on this side, and they depend upon us for doing our part towards it.

The Joint Stock Merchants being sent for, to know what we should say in answer to the above letter, they tell us it is true they made a Contract last year to bring a thousand Bales in six months, and they have been able in twelve months to get no more than 170 Bales. The reason of it is, that the Cotton has been so dear & that they spin the thread so thin, that the Cloth it makes is not fit for the Company's use, that the French give a greater price for the same Cloth they provide for their Company, that the Country is not settled since the late Famine, which has done a great deal of Mischief, that they have had near seven thousand Pagodas in the Country for these 8 or 9 months, for which they have received some Cloth, but it not being fit for our use, it has been sent back again, the reason of the Cloth's being so thin is, that Cotton is very dear, & Spinners cannot afford to spin a thick thread. That they cannot promise to get any Cloth equal to our Musters, except they be allow'd a better price, but they will do their endeavours to gett all the Bales they can, but cannot promise anything.

Edward Croke Accom^t. reads the Journal Parcels for the month of March last.

The report of Messrs. Croke, Berriman & Graham was now read & order'd to be enter'd after this Consultation, & the Complaint of the Pedanaigue being now taken into consideration, it appears to us that as to what is past, his loss proceeds from his own negligence in not collecting his Duty himself, the Bound Renters not being oblig'd to do it, but that for the future a Juncan equivalent to that duty, which is his due, be levied upon such things as will be least oppressive to the Inhabitants, & that Messrs. Croke, Berriman & Graham do report how it may be best done.

Agreeable to an order in Council we have met several times to examine and settle a difference between the Polligar & Bound Renters, as also a dispute between the Right and left hand Casts which we humbly offer as follows :

The Polligar we find had a fee of Juncan on certain goods that went out & came into the Bounds, which the Bound Renters collected with theirs, & at the year's end adjusted with the Polligar and discharg'd his usual Juncan, this continued till near five years ago, when the then Deputy Gov^r. Mr. Turner & Council sent for the Bound Renters & propos'd to them the taking off all Juncan entirely, at which time they pleaded the great loss they must sustain by striking off such a great part of their Juncan, and insisted that they must resign up their Cowle without they wou'd please to continue some part of the said Juncan, upon which a clause was incerted at the foot of their Cowle to collect Juncan on certain goods that went out of the Bounds only, and that no Dutvs should be paid for Churches. Choultrys. &c^a., whereupon the Renters plead that this was allow'd them in consideration of their Loss, and that the Polligar shou'd have pleaded for himself. The Polligar

acquaints us that at the time when the alteration was made about the Juncan he was absent at Worriarpollam having obtain'd the Deputy Gov^{rs}. permission to go there about the Woodiars business, & during his absence he deputed another in his station to officiate as Polligar, who neglected to stir or demand that part of the Juncan, now the Polligar insists that he ought to have his quarter of the Juncan from the time it was allow'd them, which we find by the Renters account amounts to Pag^s. 67 : 5 : 60 so that all that is to be considered is whether the Polligar has any just title to partake with them, or not. We must refer that to Your Worship &c^{as}. determination, which way the Polligar must be satisfied for his share in that Loss. We are humbly of opinion that the Renters have & are likely to suffer considerably by that alteration, and if we can beleive them they say that what they are allow'd for it is only as 200 is to 1000 Pag^s. Juncan.

The dispute between the Right & left hand Casts we have likewise enquir'd into, and Seer Cawn's Cowle produc'd by the latter has been carefully translated & will be sufficient to direct them in future, but as their Clamours are over and nobody appearing, it is our opinion to lodge said Cowle in the Secretary's Office in case they shou'd revive it again hereafter.

We should have represented these Affairs long ago if the Renters had examin'd and made up their Acco^{ts}. before, which as they alledge cou'd not be settled sooner.

The Renter further making a Demand for pag^s. 23 for the water mill, a thing of no service to me in my Business, notwithstanding He confin'd me prisoner in his House and forc'd me to Sign to an Oola & likewise has sent his Peon to prevent me in disposing of my Salt which I have by me—Your Petit^r. hopes you will take this his Case into your Serious Consideration, And your petitioner shall as in Duty bound ever Pray.

We have examin'd into the Complaint of Chin Tomby Padeachy against the Bound Renters that was refer'd to our Examination And we find that the Plaintiff has been greatly Abus'd by the Renters for the following reasons :

First That as Chin Tomby Padeachee upon the renting of the Salt pans Agreed to take it for 5 years for 175 Pag^s. per Ann. & had a person who was bound for him for the payment of that sum to whom he allow'd P. 15. per Ann. as an acknowledgment to him for what money he used to advance from time to time for the use of the Salt pans, but lately the Bound Renters have perswaded him to add that P. 15 to the Rent telling him they would be easie with him and that he had no occasion for any Security, but instead of the said Chin Tomby Paddeachee being favour'd in the payment of the Quarterly Rents the Bound Renters have been always very pressing for money when he had not wherewithall to pay, which deficiency proceeds from the said Chin Tomby Paddeachy being depriv'd of a proper person that us'd to supply him with money when he had occasion for it. Secondly that they have oblig'd the said Chin Tomby Padeachee (after having been confin'd 3 days without anything to eat or Drink in the Tobacco & Beetle Ground at Tevenapatam & at Cuddalore as one of their own Serv^{ts}. has assur'd us) to sign a Cajan wherein the said Chin Tomby Paddeachy has oblig'd himself to pay p. 23 per ann. for the use of the Water Mill, which Mill is of no manner of use to their Salt Pans. All which we take to be very great Impositions on the under Renters & therefore recommend their Case to your Consideration, being
