ballances of the last Contracte demand The Merchants attending are now calld on for the Ballances of their Contracts as promis'd in last Consultatⁿ; They Assure us that they except in a considerable Quantity of Cloth every hour and desire a few days more to make good their words: AGREED therefore that they be allow'd till Tuesday the 4^o. of March, at which time they are told it will be expected that the Cloth shall be all brought in And then the substance of the Hoñble President & Councils Letter of the 18th. Inst. was Observed to them, That as the Contracts of last year are now so near Compleated, It grows time to think of making some Proposals for an Investment for the ensuing Season; And withall, That though the much larger Quantity of the Cloth lately furnish'd Proved but of the lower Numbers, They must Now take care that the cloth be made good enough to yield a larger Proportion of the higher Numbers; To this, they Plead the difficulty of Keeping the Weaver's work up to that exactness in so general a Demand for Cloth of all sorts, But they will Consider among themselves of what can be done towards it, and give in their Proposals to the next Consultation.

A General Letter from the Hon^{ble}. the ePresid^t. and Council of the 8 Inst. read, Advising that on viewing the Bales No. 4 of Longcloth & Sallampores Ordry lately sent them to shew what Cloth it was, They find they can't admit of such Cloth to be taken in at any rate, And therefore return those Bales to us Complaining That the last parcel of cloth by the Rama proves in general very bad, and the Ordinary Longcloth & Sallampores Extreemly So, As may be seen by Pieces of those sorts taken out of several Bales and return'd here to shew with how much reason they complain of the bad Quality of the Cloth as well as of the washing of it, Insomuch that they have Order'd the whole Cargo to be rewash'd: That we must lessen the Quantity of Blue Cloth Propos'd to be provided, to 10,000 P^s, Agreeable to the Demand from Europe; Assure the Merchants we will not take in a No. 4 at all; Warn the sorters to be more Carefull in that Business, and Conclude a Contract for the Salem, Ordinary & Blue Cloths with all Expedition.

The Merchants are now Call'd in, the Complaint of the Cloth Communicated to them, And what might be the Causes of it, Particularly enquir'd into; And therein they Answer That the Salem Cloth brought in by them is of the same sort wth. Andiappa's, bought at the same place, & at the same prizes his was, as will appear on the Opening & Comparing a few Bales of His with Theirs; That upon a Calculate of the Prizes of the several Numbers it will be found that their cloth does not exceed the Price given for Andiappa's after deducting the 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ % C^t. Customs Dustore; That Andiappa delivers in his Cloth Brown which after it is Measur'd he has nothing more to do with But They are oblig'd to deliver their's Wash'd & the Washing has this last Year cost them about 14 Madrass fan^s: a Corge more than the Company allow them for it, That a great deal of the cloth has been Torn at the Washers and [...] stolen, large Quantitys return'd for being Ill Wash'd & the Rewashing has cost them above a Pagoda a Corge. That about f[or]ty Bales of the Salem Cloth [have] been sorted to Ordinary & Some Quite Turn'd out And That they are oblig'd to Advance Mony to the Washers who are in their Debt above 200 Pagodas which they shall never be able to Recover of them. For the Longcloth Ordinary They say they have found it very difficult to procure this sort of Cloth, That the Dutch at Porto Novo Pay Pag^o. 38 : 16 % Corge for worse cloth; That they have deliver'd in only seventy four Bales of which 40 were taken out of the Salem cloth and thirty four are all that are made up out of the Quantity of 60 or 70 Bales they have brought in & the rest being turn'd out occasions a considerable Loss to them; And being told y^t. the Sallampores brought in latterly were particularly bad They can say little in excuse of it but that much the Greater part has been turn'd out and but little taken in to No. 2. They are Answer'd.

Reply'd to

That for this last Article of their Remonstrance as well as that of the Quantitys of the Salem cloth sorted to Ordinary. It was owing entirely to their own Deficiency in making the cloth so much worse than Muster, And that they have had all possible favour shewn them in the sortings; And to the same deficiency alone, and Carelessness of Their's, they must Impute also the Damage sustain'd in the Cloth Torn, & the Charge of rewashing that which was not well Cured before; And For the Cloth stolen the Polygar Stood engag'd to make that good to them when they make a regular Demand for it: That These are but Idle Pretences & will not bear in Excuse of their Engagements to the Company, wherein none of them are provided for, & therefore they must not expect they will be allow'd of any Validity therein. But take all care immediately to prevent any such further causes of Complaint.

A General Letter read, from the Hon^{ble} the President & Council of the 19th. Inst Observing on the Merchts Excuses for the late parcel of Bad Cloth laid down in our Letter of the 15th: That though the prizes of our Merchts Salem Cloth are the same as Andiapa's, Yet they find Andiapa's to be better, More of it sorted to the higher Numbers & consequently cheaper: That the Polygar stands Accountable to them for the Cloth stolen, And That, For what is Torn, they have found many Pieces so in the Bales deliver'd to be rewash'd, and some even rotten, which easily Accounts for so much of it being torn in the Washing That their Complaint of the cloth return'd on their hands for bad Washing proceeds from their own Negligence in not seeing that the Washers cure it Perfectly: That for the Difficulties Started by the Merchants when they should have sign'd their Contracts; They are sorry to Observe themselves reduc'd to the Necessity of submitting to whatever their Merchants endeavour to Impose on them or else be told by them, That they will have no more to do with them; And that we should give them so much Countenance as to Report Such their Pretensions, without at the same time Representing in what manner we shew'd our Dislike of their Behaviour, And that the President & Council would not be treated in that manner. The said Letter also incloses Bill of Lading for the Muster Bale of Longcl^o. & Sallampores Ordinary N^o. 4 Return'd us as Unfit to be receiv'd.

The Merchants are hereupon call'd in and acquainted that many Pieces of their Cloth lately sent up were found to be Torn & some rotten; For Answer They Declare that the Cloth when deliver'd the Washers was Sound, to the best of their Knowledge, and that the Damage must have happen'd the while it was in their Hands, For that they do Constantly Inspect the Cloth at the Washers, and all that they could Perceive Damaged or Torn, they put aside, & have now a considerable parcel of it by them: To This they are told, It is plain that they have not taken sufficient care in it And that, If they do not Oversee and examine it more strictly, the Company will not be the Sufferers but They themselves; And they Promise to take care accordingly, as far as possible.

At which rate it comes to but 828 Pag^o. ¶ Annum Your Petitioners then Inform'd Your Worship & c^a. that If they should Engage themselves in that Farm they must sustain a Great Loss thereby; Then your Worship & c^a. told your Petitioners that as we were the Bound & Tobacco Farm^{rs}. You would have Us be the Arrack Farmers likewise At which time the Grain was pretty Plenty, Upon which your Petition^{rs}. were willing to oblige Your Worship & c^a. & being also Desireous to Serve the Company took the said Rent for Two Years only, And Your Petitioners were then in Hopes that the Military would take their Allowances according to the Cowle th^o they found since Not above Half the Military would Drink because they were scarcely Able to Maintain themselves & Familys in that time of Famine which Consequently made several Others to Drink the less, On which Account your Petition^{rs}. lost by this Farm in these two Years, seven hundred Pagodas; Which Your Petitioners submit to your Worship & c^{as}. Consideration That they are in Mean Circumstances And that their taking this Farm was more to Oblige your Worship & c^a. and serve the Company than any Expectation they had of Profit by it to themselves And Your Petitioners as in Duty bound

Inst from the Hon Governour & Council of Fort St. George whereby they desire to know whether I had an Order of Consultation to deliver the Broadcloth to the late Paymaster Mr. Robert Berriman Decd: In Answer thereto, Your Worship & c^a. know that I receiv'd No such Order, Neither I presume has it been Customary to have any such Order given, For I have trac'd back the Consultations for these 15 years last past & I find No Precedent at all for an Order of Consultation to the Warehousekeeper for the Delivery of the Broadcl^o. to the Paymaster; Therefore I hope I am not Accountable for it: But before I Indented for the Broadcl^o. this Year I intimated to our Deputy Govern^r. that it was wanted for the Military; And Our General Letter of the 16th. of August Notifies that the Broadcloth was for that Purpose; I have still further to Urge, that the said Seven Bales of Broadcloth Amounting to Pag^o. 670. 24. 60 deliver'd the said Mr. Berriman in August last to Cloath the Military as Usual once in two years, is not Customary to be brought to Account till the mony is Receivd which is always Some months after the delivery of the Broadcloth And likewise of the Coats & Caps to the soldiers This is one Reason I have not as yet Enter'd that Account in our Books, besides /the Military being at this present time under stoppage for their Cloathing/ As it cannot be supposd that Mr. Berriman, were he Alive Could have paid the Money before he Receiv'd it so I humbly Conceive it Cannot be Imagind that I could bring the same to Account before it was paid me.

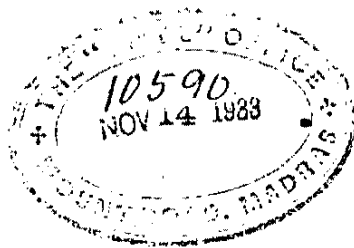
