WORSHIPFULL SIR & SIRs

I beg leave to Acquaint you that of the Stone roof of the Fort Gate way of the Fort the stone that serves as an Architrave to the Others Over the inner entrance of it, has Given way and is Crackd through; on the first notice of this. I had a frame of Timbers put under it to prevent any immediate danger of its. Yelding any further which serves for the Present, That Mr. Baker the Gunner and myself having surveyd the work there we found a single stone Pillar for the only support on one side of the Architrave, which we did not think trustworthy for so great a Weight of stone slabs as that roof is composd of, for fear of its splintering on any side, by any shock as from firing the Guns on the adjoining curtain, or indeed by the Very Weight it seems but feeble for.

The best and Cheapest way we Conceive of securing the support of it, would be by turning an Arch of Brickwork under it and for a further security to the foundation of the Heavy roof of that Entry or Court of Guard, on one side all a long. (which though not enough to Appear, may have yeilded perhaps enough to crack that stone) It were very much to be wishd that an Open space of about 45 foot alongside it, and encompassd by a substantial Wall (already built) in a Line to Continue the range of Terrass'd Godowns along that Curtain, were Coverd from the Wet Weather, near that foundation, with a Terrass Continued at the same height with that of the Others, which has long lain Open an Eyesore to that Curtain, as well as for the Convenience such Godowns would be of, that would at the same time perfectly finish and Compleat that range of Terrassd Building as at first design'd.
