declared by England & Holland against France, and altho the Articles signd in the time of Mr. Adams with Mons^r. D'Lorme &c. do imply we are not to meddle with the Settlements of each other, or the Ships in Sight of our Flags; at Sea yet Considering the Instability of those people, we ought in prudence to keep our Garrison well mann'd, lest the Force they expect to receive should Arrive, & they proceed to Attack us in Conjunction with Cotata, Cuny Nair & others they may gain over to the Party; One Hundred & Eighty of our best men are Judged immediately Necessary for the Garrisoning the Island, and taking a view of our free Guard at this time, allowing for the proper Complements at this place Moylan Putinha Mookhara & Codolee; with those that are Generally sick, we has [sic] not above Eighty Soldiers and Sixty Seepoys to spare, suppose we should determine to keep all our People on constant Duty & which would be Attended with this certain inconveniency, that we should not have a man left in case we send them on Durmapatam for the Succouring any place that may require it, & our People in general are so little to be depended on, that the Constant duty they would in such case undergo may incline many of them to desert us; therefore an attempt of this kind in our present state, may not only endanger the Common Safety of the whole, but perhaps prove a means of causing Cotata to listen the readier to any proposals the French may make for desqueting us, notwithstanding his taking our money, & seeming satisfied with our Admittance into that Island; but as Grove Island which Juts out from the foregoing Commands in a great measure the Entrance of the rivers Codollee & Trentapatam & may greatly Annoy the Canarees or any others in whatever designs they may have that way; our gaining the Moors Consent, who now hold it, for our being there is Judged to be eligible as it is Naturally strong, and with a Garrison of a Few men, with the addition of some works at a small expence may be rendered secure again[st] any attacks.

The Possessing Grove Island considered of.

AGREED therefore the Linguist repair to Cannonore as soon as the weather permits and he conve[niently] can for said purpose; & that we prepare with all expedition the Necessary Advices for Bombay of these matters to be sent by the boat on departure for Goa, & that duplicate be forwarded by a small Shybar Consignd to the Chief from Bombay, which he is desired to dispatch speedily notwithstanding her intended Cargo is not in readiness.

Notice is given us on which we presume we may depend, that the Canarees Actually intend to Levy Duties on the trade in General exported from the rivers Billiapatam & Agar, Judging themselves able to effect this by means of their Fort calld Madacarra at the Entrance of the Prementiond river, and the Fortress they seem to be about raising at Eddecaud Point, which in a great measure commands the Country of Randotarra from whence our Merchants brings a large share of the Pepper provided for this place, we are given to Understand the Imposition will be for the present about two Pagodas on every Candy of Pepper, & will probably be encreased farther if the same is submitted to, the boats on Private Account sent to Mangalore for rice we are Assured can no otherewise be permitted to lade it, then by paying the Duty of one & an half Pagoda on every Corge under the denomination of Adlamee though at the latter end of the last season, they only required half a Pagoda, The proprietors therefore of those boats have determined with our Permission, to order them back empty, provided the above additional Duty is insisted on.

The intended encroachments of the Canarees set forth in the preceeding, give us Just reason to Apprehend we shall soon be under a Necessity of opposing their Measures & if so, we may conclude they will not permit us to bring away any Rice from Mangalore; & as what we have by us will neither keep or serve longer than to the end of January, we must either provide a Quantity of Paddy, or be subject to difficulties which will be hardly possible for us to surmount.

On Enquiring the terms we may be provided with said Batty, we are told the present time is the most Seasonable for laying it in, as the Crop is Just gatherd, & that it may probably be had at 12½ to 13 fanams the Hundred Dungoys, which Considering the Price it has bore of late years, we esteem it very reasonable.

Directed the Linguist be employd in buying two Hundred & sixty Thousand Dungoys on our Honble Masters Account, which we Judge may be sufficient for the support of our Garrison eight months.

The Chief this Evening recieved a Letter from Gov^r. Pitt concerning private affairs without making any mention of the war, we have notice from the Captain of Cananore to have been declared against France, so that we may hope things are not in the state he advised.

This Evening returnd the boat we dispatchd to Goa the 19th Ult^o. with seven Hogsheads of Arrack which brings the Chief a Letter from the Viceroy dated the 11th Instant [*lacuna*] of his having despatchd the Pacquet by a light boat express to Bombay intimating how ready he shall always be to serve us in any of our Affairs, & that his endeavours have, & shall still be used for Obtaining the releasment of the William detain'd by the Rajah of Carwar, & that he does not doubt of our good inclination towards favouring his people in any undertaking he may enter upon for chastizing the Carnatick Rajah whose ingratitude & Baseness in the usage of his Factor & Fortification at Mangalore he loudly complains of, the Padre Procuradore to whom the above Pacquet was also recommended mentions its being dispatchd, & that the Duplicate thereof also sent him should be forwarded by the next opportunity.

In an Ola from Boyanore to the Chief he complains that the satisfaction promised by the Prince in the presence of us & his Ministers on the house of the Croop as taken notice of under the 11th Instant is not preformd, on the Contrary said Croop is preparing to oppose him, so that he is under a Necessity of Applying means for bringing him to Obedience hinting withall the Prince has Acted an underhand part in this Affair, which he is the rather Concern'd at, since the present state of the Country requires Union & resolution for Expelling the Common Enemy, & in which undertaking he had determin'd to give his utmost Assistance we learn by other means of said princes secretly countenancing the Premention'd Croop. & yet Boyanore is bent on distroying him, & to which end has assembled a Considerable body of men who are Joind with two Officers Soldiers Ammunition & Cannon from Mihie which we cannot but be concern'd at, as this may Contribute to bring about a good Understanding between the French & this Potentate, & encourage Cotata to rely the more on them.

Answerd Boynores Ola by setting forth that our endeavours in Accomodating the difference between him, & the Croop thro' means of the Prince were Actuated by the greatest sincerity, without ever imagining any complaints could Arise in a failure of those promises given in the Presence of his Ministers and us, & the rather as the Princes head Braminee had directions from him to put the same in execution, & that if any contrary underhand measures were taken, we were Actually ignorant of them and must have been taken after the Princes departure from us.

Wrote the Prince a Letter representing that his head Braminee return without executing the Instructions given him in the presence of Boyanores Ministers & us, & that it was Judged to be owing to some Counter Orders sent. That we cannot help complaining of this, as we are lyable to the Odious name of Decievers, & which we did not imag[ine] his highness would ever be so unfaithfull as to bring on us, especyally, as we did neither by importunitys or Council tempt persuading him, in what might be Opposite to his Inclination or Interest, & that we are fearfull in entring on his Affair with the Viceroy, after a Breach of Honour in a point of so little moment.

This morning our Linguist proceeded to the Heiress of Cananore in order to Obtain her consent for our Possessing Grove Island Agreeable to our resolution of the 15th. Instant.

The Chief recievd an Answer from the Prince to what wrote him the 20th Instant with Assurances he has been no ways concernd in embarrassing the dispute between Boyanore & the Croop, but on the Contrary was very desirous, it might be ended in the manner Agreed on, and he shall be sorry if it happens otherwise.

Notice is given us, that Boyanore after surrounding the Tenements of Cacada Croop in Conjunction with the French, the said Croop was by a stratagem of Cocart & Narrangole Nombiers decoyd out of his Fortress, & then compeld to Consent for the delivering up his house to be razed & twelve thousand Fanams to Boyanore for Satisfaction, so that this Affair has terminated very much to the reputation of the French, & must render them Acceptable to Boyanore, while the Prince seems therein to be totaly disregarded.

Linguist

Our Linguist now attends for the giving us account of his proceedings at Cananore where in discourse with the Heiress, he Actually learns the King of Cotata did some time since by an Instrument in writing, permit of the French's taking possession of the Island Durmapatam, whenever they might think proper, & the better to set forth the Circumstances of this Affair here follows verbatim what the Linguist took down in writing from her Mouth viz

“That a Person she might confide in & who was present told her, the King of Cotata had by writing from under his hand resignd the Island of Durmapatam to the French, for their possessing it whenever they might Judge proper, but as the Prince had pretensions thereto, whenever the French executed the same, the said King should write him an Ola, & the French another, importing their being

there was purely preserve it against the Canarees & hoped the same would be agreeable to him, though in case it should prove otherwise the above King engaged to Assist the French in defending it against him.

He being asked if the above is Genuine, declares he cannot do otherwise then esteem it so, as the Heiress mentiond it without the least Hesitation & tis conceivd she must have learnt it, through the Cardamum merchant Cunniseu of Cotata, who we presume was the only person attended the King at the time of it's delivery, & renderd thereby [our] former Enquirie about this Affair very uncertain, the Linguist Assures us, he made use of all the Arguments possible for Induceing the Heiress freely to give her consent for the admittance of our people on Grove Island, & that hers now there might be withdrawn, but as she is a person Naturally Jealous & render'd through her present difficultys more wary than Usual, he was not able to succeed otherwise then in procuring her permission for our sending twenty five of our men thither, to remain in Conjunction with hers, as will appear by the writing she sends the Chief enterd at the foot of this Consultation.

It is Impossible for us to know what use the French Intend to make of the above Grant, deliverd them by Cotata though we may reasonably suppose they esteem the Island of the highest Consequence in procuring them extraordinary advantage from the trade coming from the rivers thereabouts, & that in time, it may draw from us the greatest share of the Pepper; so a[s] that our Honble Masters may esteem this Settlement not worth their keeping & tis evident they have little regard who has a Legal property to the aforesaid Island meaning to act in this as they have in many other Cases, with Bullying & force, And it is our Unanimous Opinion they will not defer the Execution of their project longer then the Arrival of their Expected Ships with Supplies.

The French designs on Durmapatam remarkd.

The Chief asked the Board whither considering the risque our Honble Masters run from the designs of the French it will be most suitable for us to apply preventive means in fixing ourselves on Durmapatam, or wait for orders from our Superiours, & in the meantime pursue our resolution of entering on Grove Island.

Question put.

Debateing thereon the Board are of Opinion our Attempts in our Present Circumstances on Durmapatam may very probably bring us into an immediate war with Cotata, that we may expect disturbances from Cuny Nair thro' the French instigation (as he has not been with us to accept of the Proposals we made him) That we can have no dependance on any great Assistance from the Prince through his troubles with the Canarees, that neither the Nombiers or Boyanore are to be relyd on, especially the latter (since he will be under a Necessity of keeping fair with the French) that our Honble masters (as appears by their letter to Bombay of the 7 March 1732. ¶ Heathcote) seem averse to this Affair, & complain loudly of there Charges; that the Gov^r. & Council of Bombay in their Commands of the 4th April last direct us to be cautious, and no Otherwise Authorize us to hold it; than on a Supposition the Grant from the Prince to hoist there Colours may free us from any great incumbrances, and lastly, since the Wars at this place heretofore where highly disapproved of, & our present force no wise Sufficient to answer all contingencys, conclude ourselves Unqualified for the foregoing reasons, & many more which might be Offerd, from undertaking a matter of such vast Importance without farther Instructions which we may very speedily expect in Answer to our Letters to Bombay under the 17th August & whither we agree to write forthwith by a Shybar now at this place, bound up; However as our Possessing Grove Island, which Commands the entrance of Trentapatam may be easily performd, & not attended with any great Expence; RESOLVD we endeavour at procuring better Conditions on this head from the Heiress of Cannanore, than those she sent us for our Immediately holding that place, & which for another reason we esteem preferable to Lodging on Durmapatam & which is that as the same, is very Spacious, & not in our Power to Garrison it, so as may prevent the French from holding some part of it inland, they might be induced perhaps on percieving us their, to Join

Cotata for Fortifying on such spots as might not be in o[ur] Power to remove them from, thereby bringing us into an immediate Contest, for we do not apprehend that Nation will at all consider the Island being the Sovereignty of Colastre, but rather lead us into [an] endless dispute on the title given them by Cotata.

This Evening saild a Shybar for Bombay by her wrote the Hoñble President & Council a Letter of this date, advising of what Material has come to our knowledge since our last of the 19th Instant Duplicate whereof was also transmited them.

The Chief wrote the Heiress of Cananore in pursuance of our Consultation foregoing viz.

Our Design in placing our people on the little Island is for preventing that of Durmapatam falling into the hand's of those, who may in such case prejudice us, If you have any certainty there is no danger of it, we are content as we are, but as we presume you can give us no such Assurance, It is but reasonable we should be empowerd to abide there until we are free from the foregoing Apprehensions, I must therefore request you will authorize us, by another writing under your hand to remain thereon as long as we both Judge Necessary, If you have any doubts be pleased to Impart them, that I may on my part endeavour to remove them.

The preceeding Grant from the Heiress of Cananore being considerd of; It appears to us in some points defective; but as our Linguist Apprehends our Attempting to get another may prove ineffectual and raise in her Additional Jealousies, certainly tending to detard this Affair, we Judge there is a Necessity of Accepting

it and the Chief be Authorized to send her a Counter paper (as enterd hereafter) and means used for her speedily sending Orders to her people there, to recieve curs which we don[t] find she has yet done.

As it Seems consistent for us to Apply means for gaining Cotata to our Interest (tho we have little hopes of Success tis proposed the Prince may be sent for to discourse on the present Affair, & try if we cannot through him finish the demand the former seems to have on Durmapatam, which is AGREED too.

Att present Durmapatam is neither in your Possession or ours, but should it fall to your lott we shall be perfect[ly] satisfied as then we shall be exempt from any care about it should it be attained by us we shall readily comply with any request you may make us, in order to satisfye you, assuring you, it is our entire inclination to free you from any damage which you may think threaten you on our Account.

We have the Mortification to learn from Antonio Paies the person Appointed to Carry the Princes Ola to the Vice Roy of Goa, & our Packett for Bombay to be forwarded from thence that the Munch[ua] putting into Mulchy for water, struck on the bar, & was seized by the Canarees; but that he had torn our letters, and the Princes Ola, to prevent their falling into the hands of the Country People.

On discoursing with the Prince now here, touching the Right he hath to the Island Durmapatam & the properest means to be taken for our possessing thereof in a Peaceable manner, he declares the said Island is Absolutely Annexed to the sovereignty of Colastree, & never has been esteemd any wise depending on the King of Cotata, though he did Assist this Prince in taking it from the Moors some-time since, and on which Account, he esteems himself indebted to him Twenty

thousand fanams, for so much laid out by him, when it was reduced, there would also become due to him, Twenty five thousand more, provided the Moors should take it into possess[ion] as was talked on before the Canarees entered the Mallabar Territorys, the said sum being the Kings Moiety of what they had offerd to give for it, the Prince is of Opinion this King can have no legal dispute, in case he lays down the Twenty thousand fanams exprest above, & gives a writing to satisfye the other Sum, whenever the Moors may require the delivery of it Agreeable to the Proposals: However that a Period may be had to this Affair, he is desirous of sending his Head Braminee instantly to Cotata for the requiring the withdrawing his people, and letting him know the sum due to him, shall be paid and in case we find it inconvenient to Garrison it for the present he will appoint a Competent Number of his Nairs for defending it, leaving thereby the way open to us, to enter thereon, whenever we may Judge proper, but as his defraying this Expençe will not be of any immediate Utility to himself he expects our Hoñble Masters will pay the Men which may be so employd, as also the sum that may be agreed on for satisfying the demands of Cotata.

Taking the above into Consideration; the Methods proposed seem to us in all respects more suitable than any Others we can at present think on, since they promise peace & Tranquility for tis not to be presumed Cotata will Cavil, after resigning his pretentions & by this means, we may at leasure, when Orders from Bombay Arrive, proceed as Circumstances may then require; and since it's being secured Appears to us of the greatest Moment to the Interest of this Settlement in preventing the Canarees, or French from having footing there, it is therefore

AGREED, the Prince be desired to dispatch his Braminee forthwith, & that we do engage in behalf of our Hoñble Masters to defray the Expençe of keeping his people on this Island, & for the paying the sum that may be settled with Cotata.

A permission being given us by the Heiress of Cannanore (as before enterd) for our sending twenty five of our Men on Grove Island we had determind to put the same in Execution this night; but as our being there, may give extraordinary Jealousies to Cotata, & probably thereby render him averse to adjusting with the Prince; it is the latters Opinion we had better defer [it] till an Answer comes, & conceiving for the above reasons, It is most suitable for us so to do, it is accordingly so determind.

This Prince on mentioning the Canarees, seems to be entirely perswaded they will Actually make a bold push this Season, for fixing themselves in the Mastery of this Kingdom, for Otherwise it Appears to him impossible for them even to Maintain what they have Acquired; he is sensible their outward friendship to him is all a feint, & founded on the dependance they conclude requisite for gaining there ends, apprehending when those are effected, they will be tempted to use him treacherous and which he says he ought to guard against, yet haveing [Our] dependance on the Valour of his Nairs, and since our Interest [is] so immediately concernd in his preservation, he hopes we will spare him Fifty of our best Men to remain with him as his body Guard, but on being made acquainted the many Fortresses we have to maintain incapacitates us from a Compliance of this sort, he then earnestly entreated our procuring for him one Hundred and Fifty able Military men, to be paid by himself, in such a manner as may be Agreed with them, offering withal to satisfye the Expençe in bringing them hither from any distant part.

The Prince with his head Braminee sent to the king of Cotata comes to the Fort, and lets us know, that King seems inclinable to deliver up the Island of Durmapatam, provided the money expended by him in its Reduction be paid him, that an Annual gift of about Six hundred fanams be made good to the Pagoda Calld Malure scituate thereon, towards supporting its charge & that if we should possess it, we will engage no Moors belonging to his Country, or others his subjects, may be permitted to reside there, this he is very solicitous should be granted him, as otherwise he Apprehends a Considerable Number of his people may forsake him—the Braminee is of opinion that on the above terms he may be brought to resign this Island to the Prince, & the lat[ter] declares he has no other Intention in recieving it, than that it may be put into our Possession, whenever we may choose it, & [in] the meantime he will Garrison it, in the best manner he can with Nairs, we providing for the expence together with the Assignment of six Hundred fanams p^{a} Annum for the Pagoda premention[d] as well as for the sum due to this King.

The Prince his Head Braminee reports his Conference with the Cotata King about Durmapatam.

The Board hereupon acquainted the Prince, it would appear more consistent with his reputation to put the Hoñble Company in possession free from all future Incumbrances whatever, and assign what is demanded for the Pagoda in any other manner, on which he desired this Matter might be deferd till its final conclusion, promising he would Instantly write to this King for adjusting all points, send his Braminee very speedily to him, & impart to us what passes.

Debates with the Prince thereon.

Grove Island appearing to us for the reasons, set forth in our preceeding Consultation's to be of moment, & since as things stand with Cotata, there is no prospect of our being engaged in any difficulties through our immediate entrance there, in which Opinion the Prince also Assents.

Grove Island deemd necessary to be possess.

AGREED we send this night a Serjeant two Corporals Seven Soldiers & Fifteen Sepoys to remain there, with Ammunitions, Provisions, and other Necessaries, and that after seeing in what manner we may carry up our Guns, we order there two 9 Pounders & two 4 Pounders which we apprehend will be fully sufficient for the defence of the Place, & for Commanding the Entrance of the river Trentapatam, and that we give the Serjeant the Instructions enterd hereafter.

Our Callicut Linguist in his Letter now reciev'd represents, that though our Jungadoes have been at three several times at the Samorines Palace, waiting for answer to the Chiefs Letter long since sent, it has been impossible for them to Obtain one and it is there opinion, he is no ways inclinable to afford it, so that he thinks any further Application needless, the Linguist also sets forth, that one Talichenore the Custom Master of Tanore has wrote him for an Advance of Five Hundred fanams to be discounted out of the duty on the Pepper we are to export thence, that this person may be of use to us in Obliging the Merchants to comply with their contracts, & therefore proper to gratifie him.

Advices from our Callicut Linguist perused.

Directed he complys with the above Request, provided he conceives our Hoñble Masters will be secured of the Amount in the end.

You are hereby directed to proceed with Lieutenant Mendouza in the Tonys appointed to carry you with two Corporals Seven Soldiers & fifteen Seepoys including their Officers unto Grove Island, where you are to remain in defence thereof in Conjunction with the Moors belonging to Cananore.

— OCTOBER 1734 —

You are to take especial care in preventing any Misunderstanding, either by yourself or people with said Moors, & endeavour rather to Cultivate a good Harmony & understanding with them, as they are equally concernd in supporting the Place against all people whatever.

When you are on the Island you are to take a proper survey what works are Necessary to be raised for defending yourselves Against the shott that may be made from Durmapatam, & you must observe in what manner you are to place Cannon for rendering yourselves Masters of the Mouth of the rivers Trentapatam & Codolee which is a point of the greatest moment to us.

Should any Tony or Munchua which you may suspect attempt to enter the river Trentapatam, you are to call them to you and examine them and if they carry Gunpowder shott, or other, warlike stores you are to detain them, sending immediate advice thereof hither for our directions, we mean though said Munchuas or Tonys should belong to any other Person whatever.

In case any Persons whatever exclusive of those belonging to the Moors of Cannanore, should attempt to com[e] [to] Grove Island under pretence of seeing it you are in no wise to permit them, but let any such know your orders are directly Contrary.

In the Observance of these orders you are on all Occasions to Consult with the Head Moor in Command of those people there, and be exceeding carefull your people do not affront or ill treat them in any respect, & to prevent misunderstandings keep your men separte from them, yet we do not mean the head Moor is to make you desist pursuing our directions above given you, but mention this for your making him easie if possible.

We have orderd a small Tony to be constantly with you, to bring your Advices how things are with you & of what you may want, we also send now for your support the following things whose expence you are to give an Account of, taking care your People are well used, & suplied with the Provisions except the Seepoys who have their Allowance apart.

The List of Stores now sent are enterd apart and you are to let us know as soon as you can what will be required for the securing of the Place. We are

Apprehending the King of Cotata might entertain a Jealousy from our Taking possession of Grove Island, the Chief sent him a Letter a few days ago signifying our being there is in Order to prevent the Canarees settling on Durmapatam, & that it appears to us he has not a proper notion of the Consequences attending their near Neighbourhood, & that we shall be glad he weighs the proposals made to him by the Prince mentiond the 30th. Ult^o. and in time prevent the Mischiefs, which so immediately threaten us both: To this he made answer that as a Certain Pagoda is interested in the above said Durmapatam, he should repair to consult with the same, & in a short time come to Netture for a Conference on this head. To the same Purport he replyd, to the Ola sent him by the Braminee taken notice of the 5th Instant.

the King of Cotata's answer relating to Durmapatam taken under consideration.

By the above it appears to us this King is very Lukewarm and probably still means to deliver the Island to the French, we the rather suspect this as Mr. Tremesot is endeavouring to bring Boyanore to Mihie and has wrote to all the heads of this part of the Country to be present there the 16th Instant, intending as we presume to gain if possible the Approbation of all the Partys, for their being fixed thereon, and to encourage them may likely promise extraordinary things, as that they will take the Protection of this side of the Country on themselves against the Canarees and in lieu of which the trade ought to be assignd to them, and said Powers to assist in Opposing any Attempts that may be made against them by the King of Colastree.

Debated on wth. the French proceedings therein.

Our preceeding Consultations have been very full on the above point, & our Determination's settled, that in our present Condition, we cannot undertake the fixing thereon otherwise then with the King of Cotatas Approbation, to Obtain which no ways have been left untried & as they have been without success, & our Orders not yet arrived, we are still of Opinion we cannot proceed Otherwise than in securing o[ur] present footing on Grove Island, and for which purpose considering that place may be now call'd ours, & that we have a legal title to Durmapatam itself from the Lawfull Sovereign Colastre, as well as the sole Authority over the Pepper trade to the N^oward of it & that the French coming there is in Violation of all our priviledges, w^{ch}. Natural reason & Justice Authorize us to defend.

Further Debates.

It is therefore unanimously AGREED That we do from the Fortress at Codolee & Grove Island impede by Force the Entrance of any boats or Vessels whatsoever belonging to the French or others into the rivers which those places Command, & that we hoist our flag whensoever we may think it necessary on the latter, & that those of Mihie may not plead Ignorance of our Pretentions, The Chief write as from himself to Mr. Tremisot the Letter enterd hereafter.

Resolution.

It is debated whether the writing Cotata and Boyanore touching our pretensions to Durmapatam and the Sincere desire we have of keeping the Canarees from Molesting this part of the Country may not be eligible as it may probably render them wary in their Proceedings, but considering how base a people the Mallabars are, and how ready some of their Ministers might be in communicating all that we write to the French. It is Judged as best to remain quiet, untill we can gain the proper Intelligence of their Intentions, & we recieve our Instructions how far our Superiours are determined to support our Hon^{ble} Masters Priviledges in opposition to those Violencys which we conceive the French are desirous of using.

Whether to write Cotata & Boyanore be necessary this time Debated.

Notice is brought us by our spy that on the 16th the four Nombiers repaired to Mihie when the French endeavoured at reconciling their differences with each other & settling between them & Cuny Nair a firm friendship; This point not being attainable M^r. Tremisot then proceeded to represent how much their Company are interested in this part of the Country & how suitable a general union would be for preserving it against the attempts of the Canarees, that Cotata being at present the most exposed they ought to Approve of the Company's force being placed in such a part of that Kings Country, as may secure it against the Invaders, the Nombiers in Answer alleged the endeavouring to rout the Canarees by a Strict Union between the English, French, & Country was to be preferred to any other measures, & in which undertaking, they did not doubt of the Princes ready concurrence but the French hinted that was a point which rather related to the English in particular, as the Canarees are at present in possession of their trade & who with the abovementiond Prince Assisted in bringing them into the Country, so let them look to themselves, while they & the Powers hereabouts pursue the means for their Mutual Safety; This proposal was accepted by the Nombiers, who were dismissed with a Present of about ninety Rupees each, on promise of returning when the King of Cotata comes that way.

— OCTOBER 1734 —

It is evident to us the French are Aiming at being fixed on Durmapatam in Order to secure to themselves the Pepper trade of Cotata, Irrebanadu, and Cartanadu, supposing we shall be then excluded from any share therein, however as these Country people are only in all points Contriving to promote their own Interest, should we attempt at Frustrating the French measures, we shall be under a Necessity of Launching out considerable sums, engage to take on ourselves the keeping out the Canarees, and in the end through the Treachery and Villainy of these people by the French Bribery be exposed to have all our undertakings overset, and the Natives encouraged the more to play the game which they are very much enclined to, of making a bargain of us both; Therefore considering our want of orders, with the uncertainty of every Negotiation enterd into with these people, that we are or may be Masters of the Sea Coast and the Pepper must be Carried by land to Mihie, & that we may likely get it as well as they, provided we give as great a price for it, that after the French paying ever so much, we may employ the disunion of these people thro the means of presents, & assistance of our Prince to our advantage we conclude our appearing unconcernd at this time, till we see in a better manner the Disposition of Boyanore, and Cotata is most convenient, least through our over haste, we should make a false step equal to that we enterd into, in excluding the French from Accomodating between the Moors & Canarees in November last, for since we are assured, had we let them go on in their own way they had been engaged in Numerous Difficulties, and have reaped nothing in the End but shame & reproach.

Notice of the French preparations for settling on Durmapatam.

From the Preparation's the French of Mihie are makeing & the Current report in the Country we have great reason to suspect they have a design of fixing themselves on Durmapatam Island very speedily, but whether it proves so or not, we conceive through the want of Orders & the reasons set forth in our preceeding consultation's we cannot in prudence do more than cause the Entrance of the rivers Codolee, & Trentapatam to be well watchd and the utmost Annoyance given them from the former Fortress & Grove Island, with all that we send out our two Galevats with the Utmost Expedition for guarding the shore thereabouts & as two more Guns of 6 & 4 Pounders appear Necessary for said Island Directed they be sent thither forthwith & the works thereon compleated with all speed.

Message from the King of Cotata.

The King of Cotata by a messenger now sent gives us to understand he expects sixty one thousand fanams being paid down previous to his admitting us on Durmapatam, with a restriction that part of the lands there may remain as the property of some Moors who had formerly a title thereto, other places to be assignd the Pagoda with some salt Pans & half of the Customs of the rivers to be allowed him, with other things equally extravagant & unreasonable: however as the keeping him in suspence by Amuseing Arguments till we know what determination our Superiours may come to, seems the only method for us to take. AGREED we use such for the Present.

In pursuance of our Resolution taken the 29th Ultimo, endeavours have been used for the Amusing the King of Cotata in hopes of gaining time until the Arrival of the Expected Europe ship from Bombay, but said King is too wary & will not on any Account be put off, for he insist's on our giving him a positive Answer, if we are content to possess the Island Durmapatam & pay him Fifty thousand fanams for it, attended with a Present on Condition that from the moment we accept it, he enters into a faithfull Friendship with the Honible Company & allows them the full use and priviledge in carrying on the trade through his Country, signifying that the French are exceeding eager & offer him a much larger sum provided he will admit them thereon.

— NOVEMBER 1734 —

The great Influence this Island has on the trade of the Cotata Country, as well ^{Debated on.} as on Randotarra has been amply set forth to our Superiours and from the best advices we can get should any other European Nation hold it this Settlement will be of little use to our Honbl^e Masters, for to have the French North & South of it possessing Boyanores Country & that of Cotata, the Canarees Masters about Agar, as well as to the N^oward. It is even to be doubted if we should be able to provide a sufficient quantity of Pepper for the dispatch of the ships intended home this season, the conclusion from what Appears to us would be, that either the Company must endeavour to Rout them, be the Expence & trouble how great soever, or bid adieu to their future Interest at this place after spending such immense sums in Support of it the Case being thus & we under a Necessity of declaring one way or other to Cotata, with the hazard we infalibly run of his Introducing the French should we decline excepting [sic] his proposals, & that he may on the coming in of the new crop, assign the produce of his Country to them in Compliance with his promise reflecting withal that we have no orders to hold it, but on a Supposition it will cost Nothing, & the little inclination our Honbl^e Masters have shewn on this point, renders us exceedingly at a loss in what manner to direct our Conduct, Yet as we are on the spot, & consequently better Judges of times & circumstances than others at a distance and our Superiours at Bombay have been pleased in their Letters of the 3^d November 1733 & 4 April 1734 to place a Confidence in our Zeal & Integrity by permitting us on sudden Occasions to act in the most rational & most suitable Manner, as Contingencies may offer, we do esteem ourselves under the highest Obligation and duty, to prevent as well as we can those evils which a further delay in the present case may Occasion, and therefore as it appears to us by the best dictates of our reason, that the Island of Durmapatam can only preserve the trade to this settlement, & that if we do not embrace the present Occasion we may not meet with another for Obtaining it Otherwise then at the hazard of very great Expences, & an uncertain Issue, & depending on the Justice of our Honbl^e Masters & Superiours in weighing our Intentions right.

RESOLVED we accept of the Terms offerd us by this King forthwith, & the ^{Resolution.} person employd in the negotiation be empowerd to signifie the same to him, & that said King be prevaild on to come to the Fort in order to settle this Matter, as also for giving us a proper Writing in Testimony of his Friendship & Security for our enjoying in an extensive manner the trade of his Country.

Imported our Hoñble Masters Ship Middlesex from Bombay Captain William Studholm Commander by her recieved a Letter from the Hoñble President & Council dated the 14 Ult^o enclosing Invoice of treasure & stores amounting to rupees Fifty six thousand Four hundred & Seventy, & Eight raes with sundry Paragraphs of our Hoñble Masters Letter dated the 15th March 1733 ꝑ ship Wilmington relating to this Settlement & Copy of an Oath prescribd by them to be taken by all their Servants of the Age of twenty one years: they are pleased to direct our making a provision of seven to Eight Hundred Candys of Pepper for compleating the Tonnage of the four ships they purpose sending home this season, & ten thousand Pound weight of Cardamoms; they have permitted the Gentlemen at Anjengo to send us ten thousand rupees, with a Quantity of Fanams, and in January they intend Sending us a parcel of Gold which they are endeavouring to procure at Suratt, & such a farther supply as may be Necessary; but forbid our making use of the Order before sent us for taking treasure out of the Europe Ship, they direct our Loading on this ship Five Hundred Candys of Pepper, with the Timber indented for. In answer to our Letter of the 17th August relating to the Island Durmapatam they say, if we apprehend the French or Dutch are endeavouring to get it, and are well Assured that the Canarees or King of Cotata will give us no disturbance, should we possess it, and hoist the British flag thereon, and this can be done by laying down forty five thousand fanams to the King of Cotata, & twenty thousand more to his Ministers, they permit us to hold it, but on no other terms, & direct our being very plain & particular on this subject in our next advices for their coming to a final resolution thereon, they permit our writing off the books Chautoo Chittys debt of Fanams four Thousand ninety four.

Our Superiours at Bombay having been pleased in Answer to our representation under the 19. & 28 September, give us their directions in their Letter of the 5th Instant recieve[d] last night, relating to the Island Durmapatam, we shall her[e] insert the substance thereof, for the squaring our Measures as near as possible thereto, They say notwithstanding our Honble Masters do not seem to approve of their holding the above Island, Yet as it is of such Consequence by the Influence it has Over the trade of this Settlement, and it's falling into the Hands of the Canarees, or any Europe Nation, may render this Place of little Benefitt hereafter; and therefore they are come to the subsequent resolution's.

That if before the receipt of these Advices the French or Canarees have not settled themselves thereon we immediately endeavour for Possessing it in the name of our Honble Masters & Hoist the British Flag, first gaining if possible the Assent of the King of Cotata, and such other Mallabar Powers, as we think would otherwise Oppose us, and which we are to effect by Bribes or such other means as we shall Judge Eligible, allowing us to Launch out Money According to the Necessity we may be under for so doing: but if we find when this arrives either the French or Canarees to have Actually taken possession, we are by no means to Hazard an Attempt upon either, but return back the Forces we may Judge Supernumerary by the first Opportunity Yet should we prove Successfull in this Enterprize, that these Orders reach us in time, and we do gain footing on Durmapatam in the manner Above recommended, what Violence may be Offerd by the Canarees, French or others we are to Oppose in the most Vigorous manner we are Able; taking to our allyance in such case Those of the Mallabar powers, as are willing to Join us; though on the whole they remark we must not engage in this undertaking or put our Honble Masters to any expence without a rational view of Success, and which we are Maturely to weigh before we enter on a Matter of such Importance, & we are also to be Cautions not to pay down the Money to Cotata which may be Agreed on, for our holding it, untill we are in Actual possession Further as they apprehend our being on Grove Island will in no wise facilitate the present Enterprize, they direct our desisting from that undertaking.

Weighing the Above directions with all possible attention we observe our Conduct set forth in the preceeding Consultations quadrate very well with the present Instructions in the point we have been endeavouring at for gaining a quiet Admittance on that Island from the King of Cotata on paying him a sum for that purpose but since the French are very eager in obstructing our measures & seating themselves thereon, & which perhapes may be no otherwise able to prevent, than by making a pus[h] [in] secureing it forthwith, and run a risque of a war with Cotata, do not percieve our Orders speak so plainly to this point as [may] be wishd, nor have we a reply given by our Superiours to wh[at] we wrote them under the 28th September Exprest as follows, [the] French have extended Views even if possible by Artifices, a[nd] Hostilitys to wrest the trade from our Honble Masters, & we w[ish] the proper measures may be applied for preventing them, & [that] the Several Insolences they at times shewd us had been resent[ed] so as that they might have been deterd from renewing the[m] that we may not in the end be thought too tame in suffering them to proceed according to their wonted Manner, we desire to have your plain & positive Instructions, whether we are [to] hinder by force their Entering the rivers of Trentapatam & Cod[olee] from Grove Island, or by

Therefore on the foregoing heads we are left to the Guidance of our own Judgment, & for taking the Necessary Resolutions the Chief asks the board in the first p[lace] whether we may from the present danger that appears of the French designs, and the uncertainty of our Agreeing with Cotata, endeavour by ourselves & Prince, or only by means of him to secure this Island forthwith, by secretly entering a Competent number of men into its Fortresses, & drive away those belonging to the Prementiond King, or if secondly we oug[ht] to abide by our former Resolutions in endeavouring to Accomodate Amicably with Cotata for our Admittance, and in the meantime from Grove Island, Codolee and our Galevats hinde[r] all that in us lies the French or any others from entering the rivers which those places Command.

The Board after seriously weighing [the] case, and the Melancholy Consequences that must attend this settlement should the aforementioned place fall into the hands of the French do unanimously concur in Opinion, That since we have not given over all hopes of gaining the consent of the King of Cotata, we ought to pursue the means we are now using for that end, and in the Interim that we continue our Orders & Vigilance in preventing the Access of any boats or Vessels into the rivers of Trentapatam or Codolee, & the better to preserve our Claim to Durmapatam, we keep our Colours privately on one of the Fortresses facing the sea, & lying between Codolee & Grove Island now Garrisoned by the Nairs of Narranport in the service of our Prince giving directions for their being hoisted on the Appearance of any French Vessels about to enter the river, & that the same be done on Grove Island, And as our Hoñible Masters have obtained a Grant from the Prince Cunhi Homo to possess Durmapatam, whenever we may think proper, which Cotata through the Instigation of the French, seems Contrary to all Justice & reason, desirous of embarrassing, and as the shore thereabouts lies under our Guns, the trade likewise being granted us sometimes since, we think we may on such equitable Grounds use the means in our Power for resisting those violencies which may be attempted by the French. And it is RESOLVD Accordingly that we continue our Instructions to the officer on Grove Island (which are enterd hereafter) the Masters of the two Galevats, & Codolee for their opposing by force of Arms the Entrance of any Vessels belonging to the French as Aforesaid.

Haveing appointed you to take Charge of Grove Island we shall now proceed to give you such directions for your conduct there as Occurs to us at this time Necessary.

You are to preserve a perfect understanding with the Moors of Cannanore now with you & prevent what in you lies any abuse being committed by your people to any of them.

You are to keep a strict watch towards the Entrance of the river Trentapatam, and take especial care no Tony or Munchua go in, or come out thence without being examin[ed] by you; If any such should be found to have Powder ball Pepper

or Cardamums, you must detain them, & give us Notice thereof, but [if] they should carry anything else you are to lett them pass, but in case any Tony or Vessel belonging to the French or any other Euro[pean] Nation should Attempt entering the river you are in no wise [to] permit them, and if any such should persist after your Hal[ting] them, and firing a shott to bring them too, & they will not regard you are to sink them if possible though should they come to you let them civily know you cannot permit of their going in without Orders.

We sometime since Lodg'd a Flagg with the Serjeant and a staff is now placed to hoist it thereon, but you are not to let the same fly unless you percieve the French ship standing to the N^o ward, & coming near either your Island or between it & Codolee then you are immediately to hoist it, & Observe the same metho[ds] should you percieve any white flag on Durmapatam at what time soever.

In case you should find our People at Codolee fire shott att any Vessel about to enter that River, & you percieve, you are also capable of Annoying them; you are to do it in the best manner you can taking care your Guns are always in due readiness, as well as the wall pieces.

These our Orders you are to keep secret in such a Manner, that no one whatever is made acquainted with them & we depend on your diligence in the discharge of the trust reposed in you. We are

Cunhiseu who is the bearer of this Message (attended by one of her Scrivans) we are well Assured has been employd by the French on their behalf to gain the Moors Consent for their admittance and in the main seems to favour their Interest more then ours therefore it behoves us to be cautious that we do not demonstrate any inclination of Opposing the Moors in their point, lest they should side with the French, & who perhaps may be willing to embrace such proposals tending to serve the Moors, which we might not think convenient to do on our parts: Considering this therefore and that in all humane Appearance, we may in the end conclude this affair much to our Interest, & withall by gaining the [Moors] on our side Joind with the Prince, may render Cotata more wary then ever in admitting the French, which is a point we Judge very Momentuous at present, It is thought proper for the foregoing reason to try this Event Apprehending that should we not even take this Met[hod] they might underhand subject us to more embarrasments than ever.

The Princes head Braminee as well as our Messenger sent by us to the King of Cotata for finishing the depending Affair of Durmapatam do now return, letting us know this King on pret[ence] of his being under a Necessity of paying off a Considerable am[ount] to the French as part of what he owes them, continues still very Urgent for our lending him one Hundred thousand ffanams [as] otherwise he can think of no Methods whereby to satisfie the[m] but after those we sent had represented the unreasonableness, [as] well as impossibility of our complying with The Princes Head Braminee & our Messenger reports their Conference wth. the King of Cotata.

this request, he dismissed them on promise that he will in Three days endeavour to settle his Accounts at Mihie, & fix the time for paying his debts at certain periods, in order for his then taking immediate resolution in delivering to us the Island on the terms he has Accepted with us, which Appears in our Consultation of the 1st Ultimo.

The delays & Fickleness we find in the King of Cotata gives us to much reason to believe he has either still an intention of placing the French on Durmapatam, or has in View from the Anxiety he supposes us under for getting it, to Oblige us to launch out more money, than by his Agreement, he ought to expect, but it is the opinion of the Princes Braminee that nothing but the latter motive governs him, and which ou[r] Linguist absolutely concurs in founded on the improbability that this King should run the risque of breaking with the Prince us [and] the Moors on a point, wherein the former has all the reason and Argument of his side, And therefore it is there opinion the best policy will be to Appear lukewarm, without neglecting the secureing such places on the Island as are Garrisond wholly by Narranports Nairs in the pay of our Prince & us, & those in Conjunction with Cotata & the better to demonstrate the Princes resolution in not suffering his right to be wrested from him. It is proposed that thirty men be immediately appointed as an additional force on the largest Fortress thereon, to remain in our pay though in the Princes name, which tis presumed will be a necessary step for induceing this King to comply the sooner with his Engagements.

Resolution.

The board after duly pondering the present circumstances, & the Intelligence gaind from those in Confidence with the King, which seems to tend to our favour, do concur in Opinion of their being a much greater probability of our Succeeding in our design than the French in what they are pursuing, and as our Honible Masters always prefer Amicable means to the contrary, and since the expence of thirty men in the Manner set forth above cannot amount to much, It is AGREED for the present they be continued at our Expence, & all possible means used for fixing this King in the performance of his Engagements Apprehending should we give him hopes of more money, It might rather delay than hasten the matter, as he is a person remarkable for Avarice & cunning.

The Prince Cunhi Homo represents to us the great reason he has to fear the Canarees will very speedily reinforce their Army, and Assume to themselves the Government of the parts about Agar and Billiapatam, when probably it may be very little in his power to prevent the exactions of Tribute, Customs &c^a. Impositions he makes no doubt they will be inclinable to lay, and that the detriment thereby will equally effect our Hoñble Masters Interest at this Settlement, through the stoppage of the great Quantities of Pepper we usualy Export from the district of Randotarra, in which the said Agar is Scituated; to provide in time therefore against these Mischiefs, he askd us that if supposing the King of Cotata, Boyanore &c^a. Powers this way do engage in an attempt for routing the inconsiderable Number of Canarees now in the Country, whether we will engage in the Confederacy by Assisting with Rice Ammunition &c^a. and take upon us, as far as we are able to prevent the relieving their people by sea he providing for the Expence, and that we may be in Cash, he will previously lay down Three Hundred thousand Fanams, adding we ought not

to slight these proposals since it is not in his Power to offer better and longer delays may leave our Priviledges in the Utmost danger of being lost through the inability that may be in him even to support himself.

Our Superiours in their Several Instructions to us seem to have a Just Idea of the Mischiefs which threaten this Settlement from the Canaree Invasion, and we are sensible the remarks made by this Prince are well ground for we cannot suppose from the immense expence those people have been at, they will at once leave the Pepper Countrys (which are infinitely more valuable than their other acquisiti[on]) to continue in the possession of the Mallabars, nor can w[e] in prudence hope they will suffer us or the French to enjoy the present Liberties granted us, And therefore effectual mea[ns] must be employd in prevention of those many evils which must unavoidably attend us should these Conquerors fix themselves in this Country.

Question put
to him.

The Board however previous to the taking our resolutions ask the Prince how far we may depend on the French's Conjunction in the proposed design, or if we may rely on their remaining Neutar withal now we are to be supplied with money, after expending the Amount he proposes to Lodge with us, since the War may be prolongd thro sundry Accidents, and that an Attempt of this kind ought not to be undertaken without a becoming resolution in the Several Partys which may be engaged in it and a Sufficient Fund provided for it's Support.

His Answer.

The Prince in Answer to this says he has Cause to believe the French will be obliged to Join in the Common Interest Yet if they should not he will Manage it so with Cotata, Boyanore & the other Powers as that they may enter into Joint Articles for assisting him in treating the Settlement of Mihie as at Enmity with him for disregarding the Publick welfare; as for his depositing more money he says it is Impossible for him to do it, since his treasure is so low, but whenever they enter on Action it will be feazable for him to raise sufficient by Tribute, and taking from such Pagodas as are suplyd therewith; and when we consider his present Condition the danger he in particular will be exposed to, he hopes we will not be laying obstacles in his way tending to overthrow a design Immediately Calculated for our Interest as well as his.

Debates.

The Board from what has been lately experienced in the conduct of the Malla-bars, can have no great Opinion they will Appear Vigorous after being so long of the loosing side, nor can we be certain of meeting with the Approval of our Superiours thro our Accepting the sum of money the Prince offers to lay down Yet as we are verily persuaded the Continuance of the Canarees in this Country must Absolutely in time render this Settlement of little Utility to our Honble Masters, & that there is no way of removing this Evil but by a forcible Attempt & our seeming backward may not only disgust the Prince but also dishearten the Mallabars in General, It is AGREED we give him hopes of our Conjunction with him provided there Appears reasonable Grounds to hope for success, and that there be no failure in the Supplies Necessary for carrying on the War.

Resolution.

Notwithstanding the many promises given us by the King of Cotata for our holding the Island Durmapatam on paying him sixty one thousand Fanams, we are now told he will not comply therewith, untill the Canarees are removed on the other side of Billiapatam; Our Prince on this Occasion loudly Complains of our conduct in treating with this King on a Matter wherein he is no wise Concernd, and as it appears to him, his view is purely to Extort more money from us, as well as the French intending in the End to assign it to us, he purposes Instantly to proceed in person and take possession of all it's Fortresses, and then deliver the same to us in a quiet & peaceable Manner or if we do not Approve of this for the present we may waite a small time longer to try the Effects of our application with Cotata being persuaded he will not nor can he deliver it over to any other.

Our Merchant Chantoo Chitty now here is prest to send us in a Quantity of Pepper as soon as possible towards compleating the loading of the ships to be returnd home this season and is asked how much he shall be able to deliver us by the 10th February to which he says he has already begun to Collect what Pepper he can for its being weighd into our Warehouse as fast as it comes in, & he ventures to promise us five Hundred Candys of the growth of the present Season at the time aforementioned, provided we give him a further Advance of Sixteen thousand Rupees and one thousand Gubbers the latter to be reckond at Nineteen and a quarter fanams each, apprehending it will not be in his power to send in more than the above quantity.

It is observed that in times past & even when the Crop was not so promising as the present this Merchant was Capable of furnishing us with a larger quantity without expecting any Money in Advance, but the reasons why he has not the same

abilities now, are Agreed to be owing to the disunion of the Family and separation of their Capitals, Occasioned as we learn by the many bad debts contracted with those dealt with for this Commodity, we ought therefore to be wary in trusting him largely or if practicable engage another more substantial person to transact this affair; Though as there is no such to be found in these parts, and the Moors who in times past were employd made Several bad debts (as will appear by the old Accounts we Judge our Chitty as he has a Landed estate, and is a Person of great Integrity, and that if we do not Advance the money we shall faile of the Pepper, we have no other means of being supply'd than delivering him the Amount he has requested.

It is Accordingly AGREED the Treasury Issue it.

The Messenger is ask'd why the King points out only one or two places, instead of saying in an express manner that the said Island may remain as the property of our Honble Masters to which he answers, we are at Liberty to possess the whole forthwith.

It is very evident that neither the Ola now reciev'd, nor the preceeding is sufficient to free us from after disputes with this King as no conditions are sett

down, & he may probably yet demand the sum we agreed to give for it some time since, notwithstanding the danger it is now in of falling into the Canarees hands thereby Affording them an easy passage into his Country in many places, & rendering its recovery impossible.

The Above reasons being weighd by the board, It is however thought to be most eligible for us not to loose the present opportunity, least the Canarees should instantly attack the Fortresses and become Masters of the same which is a point to be well considerd, as the consequences may prove such as to render this Settlement of little Benefit to our Honble Masters, and since with the Assistance of Naranports Nairs and Tivees, Joind with the men we can spare, from this Garrison we may According to the Opinion of our Officers, resist any efforts the Canarees may at present make, It is therefore Unanimously AGREED, That we do at about eight in the morning March with all the Military we can send, together with Seepoys, Nairs. & Tivees, and take possession of the largest Fortress on Durmapatam, & such others as the Engineer, and the rest of the officers may Judge convenient, Hoist our Colours thereon, and then dispatch the Chiefs Letter to the Canaree General signifying our being on the Island by virtue of the Grant deliverd us by the King of Colastree sometime since, desiring him speedily to forsake the same. Recievd an Answer from the King of Cotata importing his Satisfaction at our hoisting our Colours on Durmapatam, and which news is spread abroad, and that he shall be glad, if in like Manner, through the influence of said Colours, the Canarees be Obligated to forsake their present Abode; his Predecessours never heretofore Suffer the Colours of any Europe Nation to be placed their Country, and his permitting it is on purpose to cement Our Friendship, depending we will not give occasion to those, who bear him and us ill will, to reproach him for it.

The notice we have from the Prince of the Repulse of the Canarees is Confirmed to us by their own people (and that the[ir] General has recievd a Slight wound) owing to the Strong resistance made by the King of Cotata, and his Allies, we are also well assured, the Country people throughout this way are strong[ly] possessd with a firm belief, that the March of the Canarees again[st] Cotata, is owing to our Contrivance, to facilitate our gaining Durmapatam, and which we reasonably suppose is encouragd by the French, as they are highly disgusted at their being disappointed in their design thereon, after making their Agreement with Cotata for it, in consideration of a very large sum of money, to be discounted out of what money they have lent him.

Dabsted on,

As these Country people are Naturally deceitfull it will be hardly possible on the foundation of our Innocence alone to remove their surmises, and therefore should they gain advantage over the Canarees by dislodging them with their own Force, from the place they now are, we may Justly expect the ire of the Mallabars

will be turnd against us, and with the assistance of the French, be induced to give us the utmost disturbance in their power to guard against which, It is proposed, we immediately Apply to the Prince for his Assembling Three or Four Thousand Nairs in Support of the Canarees, untill the King of Cotata, Boyanore & the Nombiers, make him proposals for joining in one Common League against the Invaders, which we may resonably pres[ume] they will be inclind to come into, rather than undergo the expence and fatigue they are now subject to, & the risque they run of being overcome. Resolution.

Directed the Linguist do from us, engage the Princes Braminee now here to prevaile on his Master, and that a Letter be sent by him accordingly; and since this Braminee has labourd very sincerly in Obtaining for us a quiet admittance on Durmapatam, and whose future Services may entitle him to a reward (which is the only Motive that governs such people) it is highly for our Honble Masters Interest that a Present be made him of fifty Venetians; which is Accordingly AGREED to. 50 venetians given the Princes [h]ead Braminee

The King of Cotata having sent to the Linguist for eleven Hundred & fifty Bales of rice; one Candy of Gunpowder and Five Maunds of Lead, he desires to know whether he may venture to supply him or not, Apprehending it will be in his power to recover the Amount, Yet as he can have No possitive certainty of it, nor no Interest to induce him to make this Loan at his own risque he hopes in case of a failure we will place it, to our Hoñble Masters Account. Cotata applies to the Linguist for Rice & Ammunition.

It is inculcated to us by our Superiours (agreable to the Orders of our Hoñble Masters) not to make any Loans to these people; but as we have a good prospect of recovering the Amount, and gain the Friendship of this King, exclude the French in their great expectation of grasping the Pepper Trade of his Country, & since his attachment to us may not only be of use in the Carrying on our Pepper trade, and facilitate our Security on Durmapatam, the making of this Loan seems unavoidable, especialy as the French notwithstanding the large sum in his hands before, do yet continue to supply him with the forementioned Articles, in great quantitys & which we are well assured of, as they dayly pass with their boats, by our permission through the river Codolee. Accordingly AGREED the Linguist furnish him with the above Articles and that we place them to our Hoñble Masters Account in case he should faile in recovering their value. Considerd on. Resolution,

By a messenger from the King of Cotata an Ola is brought from him desireing an immediate Supply of a quantity of Gunpowder, Arms, shott, Rice, great Guns, & men, offering to pay us the value & Charges thereof in a short time.

Considerd of.

The supplies we have hitherto afforded him by means of the Linguist, taken notice of in our Consultation of the 8th. Instant, was in order to avoid having any Accounts with him ourselves, conceiving he might easier Obtain their value, and at the same time make him look on himself as under some obligation to us, but since his demands come on so heavily, and he is a Notorious deceiver, we have Just reason to suspect he is aiming to get as much from us, under the denomination of a loan as we promised to give him some time since for a peaceable admittance & possession of Durmapatam, and since if our Title is not now Setled, we may be subject to great disputes with him, notwithstanding he ought to expect but a small matter from us, as our being there preservd it from the Canaree Attempts, and defends a great part of his Country; It is on the whole AGREED, we send back the Messenger Civily, letting him know, our unwillingness to wrangling & contesting with any person whatever, obliges us to desire he will instantly furnish us with an Authentick writing, that he has no further pretensions whatever to this Island, and then we shall be ready to do him what good Offices in our Power.

Resolution.

Our forbearing hitherto in Settling the Price of Pepper deliverd us by the Chitto Chitty, was with a View to lower the Price, and it has accordingly had the desired effect; but as the French expect a ship very speedily from Pondicherry with a Supply of Treasure, & some of the Merchants notwithstanding the unsettled State of the Country are engrossing it in hopes of an Advanced Price, it is Judged bes[t] for us to provide a Considerable quantity forthwith, accordingly Chato Chitty the merchant aforesaid is introduc'd & required to declare on what terms he will deliver it us he insists on seventy five Rupees, on pretence that he makes many bad debts, that it is improbable the price will continue as it now is, that the distractions in the Country will Subject him to Unusual Losses, and in fine he is not to be prevailed on to deliver us Two Thousand Candys (including what has been already recieved) for less than Seventy Rupees the Candy.

Chato Chitty applied to for a Quantity of Pepper.
2000 Candys Contracted for a 72 Rupees the Candy.

After debating on this affair, we are informd that Pepper is not now to be bought even by the maund in retail from the poorer sort of people at less than Seventeen fanams, making sixty eight rupees the Candy, and as this Merchant is exposed to have large sums of money Standing out, and to the demands the French may make for this Comodity, thereby enhancing its price that he cannot even buy ten Candys for less then Sixty nine or Seventy we Judge (all things considerd) our Acceptance of this Contract is most eligible, and accordingly it is AGREED we close the same at seventy two Rupees the Candy, on Two Thousand Candys to be weight off with all expedition, and that we furnish him at Present with Thirty Thousand Rupees & Five Hundred Venetians, & more at times as he may require.

30,000 Rupees & 500 Venetians Advanced him.

The Principal Fortress on Durmapatam now Garrisond by us, being in a very unsafe condition, through its slight walls, we have been dayly employd in Carry- ing stones in order to Secure it, and Consulting the Engineer thereupon, he repre- sents that it is absolutely necessary at present to make a strong wall withinside with stones cemented with Earth, and that afterwards they may be appropriated in forming a regular Fortification, and as the same seems to concord entirely with reason, AGREED it be set about with all expedition.

The Principal Fortress on Durmapatam orderd to be made Defensible.

The Constant duty, Officers, Gunner, and Soldiers are exposed to on the Island aforesaid, where it is Impossible for them to be Supplied with Necessarys, but from hence & as there is little or no conveniency for them at present to dress their Victuals, we apprehend our Superiours will approve of our furnishing them with the Necessary Provisions for the present, at our Hoñble Masters Expence, and withall agree to our Allowing the Engineer one Rupee $\frac{3}{4}$ day, while he Continues his const- ant Attendance there, conceiving he otherwise will not be able to Support himself in any tolerable Manner, and indeed his Diligence seems to give him a Title to it. Directed therefore the Paymaster conform thereto.

Allowance of the Engineer, Officers & Gunner settled.

Louet Second of Mihie.

Although the above is a very presumptuous Undertaking Yet the Experience we have had of the French leads us to imag[ine] they will not Stick at anything for Involving us in troubles & wresting our trade from us if possible, so that we ought not to despise what reported, but rather Aim at putting our affairs in such a posture as may disappoint their ill designs, & in order to which, fresh Solicitations have been made the Prince, pursuant to our Consultation of the 8th Instant & he is now come on the Confines of Durmapatam with a body of men desires we will meet him on that Island the 25th. Instant, signifying w[hy] all his treasures are so low, as to render him incapable of Supporting the Expence of his People & that he expects as our Interest is so Immediately concernd in this affair, we will defray part of the Charge.

Reflections

We are very sensible the Prince ought in mere re[gard] to his Reputation to continue a considerable Force with him in Supp[ort] of the Canarees, untill Cotata, Boyanores, & others apply to him in proper manner, for entering in one Common League Against the Invaders, but such is the Avarice of this Prince, that rather than launch out money in cases of Necessity he too often runs the risq[ue] of loosing his Power Dignity and if on the Present Occasion, Cotata &c^a, should without him Attack the Canaree Army, & prove Success[ful] we shall in all Humane Probability be subject to a war with them Assisted by the French, and as it is a point of such consequence, we think the means for preventing it, ought to be employd though i[t] may cost some money, rather than be subject to troubles which we cannot know how, or when may be ended.

Debating maturely thereon it is AGREED the Chief, attended with Mr. William Forbes do meet the Prince on Durmapatam at the time appointed for endeavouring to fix him in a proper resolution for supporting the Canarees at his own Expence; but in case they find, that cannot be otherwise Obtained than through our contributing in some measure to the Charge we think the expending some money is to be preferd to the risquing the Consequences above represented. Agreable to our preceeding consultation, the Chief & Mr Forbes met the Prince on Durmapatam and after discoursing with him on the present State of the Country, he declared, that since he has been often deciev'd by the King of Cotata, & the other Powers in the designs he has long had for exterpating the Canarees, is now dertermined either to bring them into an hearty concurrence with him, or otherwise render them Partakers of the Calamities he has long sustaind, and for this end, as well as to preserve the Canarees from being overcome by Cotata & others (which they seem to threaten) he will assemble a considerable body of Nairs, which may probably very speedily prove a means of bringing those Powers into his terms, & if not he is determin'd to Carry the Canaree Army into Cotatas Country, And as this resolution will be attended with great Benefit to us, as it opposes the designs these people have to disturb us if possible, he is in hopes the Honble Company will contribute somewhat to the Expence, after having used his best endeavours in providing for it himself.

The Honble Company not having as yet Obtaind other Grants for their Holding the Island Durmapatam, than [an] Ola deliverd Mr. Braddyl late Chief empowering our hoisting our Colours thereon, whensoever it might be thought proper, & as we are at large disbursements at this time here, whose continuance will be unavoidable; The Chief &c^a. did yesterday Solicite the Prince for an Absolute Grant of the said Island which was accordingly Obtaind after some difficulty, as he seemd to expect either the whole or a share of the Produce of the Grounds but on his being made sensible, we propose no other benefit in holding this place, than as it may secure our Trade from the Encroachments of any other Europe Nation, and in doing which we shall be subject to a considerable Annual expence in Maintaining the Garrisons making & repairing its Fortifications, He gave up the Point save that we allow to a Pagoda Scituate thereon, some small Spots of Ground said to belong to the same, and which is to be Settled hereafter, and also that we give him under our hands & Seal in behalf of the Company that his Customs be in time to come hon[...] paid on all Goods Imported & Exported to & from the Said Island [...] Ships & Vessels, provided the same be Subject to one Duty in the manner it has been settled here in a Writing deliver us by him in May last.

Translate of the abovementiond Grants is as follows, viz.

The Royal Writ of Prince Odeormen of the Palace of Paly [and] Heir of the King of Colastree we of our good will & pleasure, do give a Grant to the English Company the Island of Durmapatanam, with the Lands lying thereon surrounded by its bordering rivers, & the said Lands with the Bars & rivers thereunto belonging are accord[ing] granted by us the Prince Odeormen of the Palace of Paly in this wri[t] deliverd to the present English Chief Stephen Law in the month May 909 Mallabar (which answers to the Year of our Lord 1734) an[d] be it Known to our Heirs that this is in truth & realkty.

N.B. The above Instrument is dated in May last at our request, the better to Justifie our Allegations to the French & Canarees sometimes since made of its being the Honble Companys Property.

The Princes Braminee now here, by order of his Master solicites for a Supply of Rice, for supporting the body of Nairs [at] Present Assembled, alledging that on this occasion, It is absolutely necessary they continue where they are Assisting the Canaree[s] in case the King of Cotata & his Allies sho'd Attempt Attacking their Camp, and since the Tranquility of this Settlement is so immediately concernd in preventing the designs of the aforementioned Powers, he doubts not we will contribute towards part of the Charge, [as] he is hardly capable of defraying the whole himself.

That the French continue to send very large Supplies of Rice, Gunpowder, Lead, and shott to Cotata is very certain, & no less that they have in view to persuade their Allies if possible to rout the Canarees, & then to put them on us, And since the Canarees through the Smallness of their Number must depend on the Princes Assistance, & our Quiet so apparently concernd in their preservation, untill a proper League be Settled between our Prince & the other Malabar Powers, and least the Prince should neglect keeping his people together for want of wherewith to support them, It is Judged absolutly Necessary, that we send him Supplies of Rice from time to time, as our so doing seems to us infinitely preferable to risquing the Success of the French Scheme for if it should succeed we must unavoidably be brought into large Expences & great difficulties.

Directed the warehousekeeper send to the Prince for the Present Four Hundred bales Manjaseer Rice on our Honible Masters Account value two Thousand seven hundred Fanams.

Notice is brought us by our Spies and confirmd by the common report of the Country people that Cotata Boyanore & the French are Actually determind to Attack the Canaree Camp in two days at farthest & that the small Fortress calld Tachara on Durmapatam, & lying under the Guns of our Principal Fort is to be strengthend, so as it may be capable of secureing the Mallabars retreat in case they should be worsted, the above report seems to us somewhat inconsistant being contrary to what was talkd on the 10th Instant, but we are not to wonder at any alteration of measures among people of such variable Dispositions.

The little Fortress calld Tachara abovementiond might have been in our Possession, when we first took the Island had we been Apprizd in time of Cotata's haveing his people there, but when the Chief went on the Island the day following & viewd it, he could no Otherwise obtain it, than by force, & thereby risque a Breach with that King, which was thought best to be avoided & application made for his vacating the same Yet though this has been done at several times, we could never induce him to quit it, though he has often promisd to do it, & now we plainly percieve his drift has been entirely to keep his footing there to use it as it may best Serve his purposes against his Enemy's & to induce us to pay the sum we formerly promisd him for a quiet admittance thereon when it was in profound peace, This small Fortress is within Gunshott of ours & borders on the rivers opposite to his palace at Nettare, & perhaps we might hereafter be able to Master it, but as it is made of mud the Engineer is of opinion, It might give us trouble in effecting it, & possibly be frustrated at last, & if so we might be Subject to great inconveniencys with an Enemy on the Iland [sic] to the incommoding our communication between our places, & how know we as the French are a most presumptuous People, and entirely Attachd to Cotata, but they might give him there men to Garrison it, & hoist their Colours, thereby bringing us into a tedious & perplexd dispute without our being able to Judge of the Issue.

The above points being duly considered by the board, as well as that Cotata is no ways inclin'd to us, but on the Contrary believe we were the Instruments in bringing the Canarees on the Island, that their is hardly any hopes of his resigning it to us voluntarily, & that the Consequences of its remaining in his hands may prove exceeding prejudicial to us, & that in case they should send a body of people there, we shall be under a Necessity for our own Preservation, to impede them, thereby bringing us into an immediate Rupture, and as that part of the Island save this little spot is Secured to us, we are Unanimous in Opinion, It will be safer & better to possess it forthwith then waite for seeing the consequences of that Kings proceedings Accordingly AGREED, that we give Instructions [to] Lieutenant Mendouza, to watch a convenient Opportunity to thr[ust] a competent number of our people without using any Hostility to those of Cotata & in order to render, if we can this King Satisf[ied] with our so doing that we write him the Letter enterd hereafter.

Notwithstanding the eagerness of Boyanore & Cotata to Attack the Canarees as set forth in our preceeding consultation, we are now informd by Pattaree & Canachinombier Ministers of the above Powers, that their Masters are determined to Accept of the Conditions Mentiond in our Consultation of the 10th Instant for Joining in one Common League Against the Canarees towards expelling them their Conquest & enquire of us if we are fixt in our resolution's for engaging with them, as the French express a readiness to Join whenever the other partys are duly prepared.

We are creditably informd the Canaree Army diminishes dayly through the desertion of their people for want of pay, & that their Necessitys are such, That their General has been obliged to Paun his plate & Jewels, which amounts to so little, that tis Apprehended, it will be impossible for him to subsist much longer, unless supplies Arrive of which there is no certainty, and he now Solicites us to furnish him with one Thousand Bales of rice, promising to discharge its value very Speedily, this Notice may be deemd serviceable to us, provided the Mallabars Join in the present intended League, as we conceive it will not be very difficult Attacking people under such eminent disadvantages, be[...] should the Mallabars be as sensible as we are of the same, & act only on the defensive, they will in all probability be freed from their Enemy, without Striking a Stroke, and then at the Instigation of the French, left at Liber[ty] to Molest & distrub us for having as they suppose been the Instruments of bringing them to Attack their Country, when we are Assured notwithstanding our real Innocence, we shall be exposed to their utmost Malice & Rage.

The Board duly considering this, & that there is a probability of finishing the intended Scheme speedily in order to enter on Action, it is Judged infinitely better to support the Canarees by the Loan they request, than risque the Aforesaid Consequences, as the Expence of one thousand Bales of Rice (admitting it lost) bears no porportion to that we shall be Subject to, through the Canarees retireing for want of Sustenance; & though our making this loan may not perhaps be Agreeable to our Superiours, through their want of knowledge of the present Scituation of Affairs, yet in our Judgment it behoves us, to risque the loss of the same in preference of the other Extream.

One Mahmod Caun who served a Considerable time in our Factory at Carwar offers us as many Seepoys as we may be in want of at the Accustomary Pay of three Rupees & an half $\frac{3}{4}$ month, and their Diet, & their Officers according to their quality in like manner Assuring us they may be depended on both in regard to their Fidelity & Courage; we are Sensible we ought to avoid encreasing our expences, Considering how extravagant they are at this time, but having no less then ten Fortresses to Garrison (including those on Durmapatam, we have reason to believe our Numbers would be to few in times of Action, & as the Canarees are so near us, & the Country in so unsettled a condition, we esteem a timely provision against the worst as most consistant with prudence, especially as we shall be unable hereafter were we to refuse the present Opportunity) to Supply ourselves by any means whatever; Preferring therefore the Safety of the whole, to the Expence the Listing more people. AGREED we entertain as far as Fifty, including Officers, on the terms above mentiond.

Tremisot importing, that as he is given to understand we are willing to enter in the proposed design, & being himself out of order requests the Chief will meet him at Mihie, for discoursing with the above Ministers on the present point.

The experience we have had of the French, by no means leads us to have any dependance on them as they violated their last Articles in a direct manner, exclusive of treating us with abundance of equivocations, but as they may be of use in executing the proposed Scheme we Judge we cannot well avoid admitting them, as otherwise the Mallabars will be confirmd in their opinion we are not really Sincere in our professions for exterpating the Common enemy & any scruples therefore made by us may incline them to think we only want to embarrass.

That our Masters Interest is Immediately concernd as well as that of the Country in General, in forcing the retreat of the Canarees is very evident, yet however it behoves us to take due care, how we begin this Enterprize, least any of the Partyes, should faile in their Engagement & expose us and the Prince to exceeding difficultys; our main point is to be Satisfied, there will be no deficiency of money for conducting it, & in th[at] we apprehend we had better Confide in the French, for their Answering for Cotata & Boyanore, as to what relates to their Parts, than to trust the [other] as of the two, those Mallabars seem to be least to be depended on, though it is to be considerd, if we insist with the French on this point, they will have equal reason to demand our being Answerable in like manner in behalf of the Prince, & previous to our doing this we are to know how far we may depend on him; his Braminee being here is askd if Admitting we engage for him as before mentiond, we may depend on having a sum deposited sufficient for our Carrying on the expence, & that more money will be deliverd us afterwards as may be required without Subjecting our Honible Masters to advance by Loan or Otherwise; to which he replys, there will be no failure, & our Linguist also Assures us, the Prince Solemnly promised to him, he would provide in such manner as may free us from any Apprehensions of being deciev'd.

This Evening the Chief & Mr. Forbes with the Linguist return'd from Mihie, where they met the Ministers of Cotata & Boyanore, In whose presence the French declared their readiness to Join in the Confederacy for expelling the Canarees the Mallabar Country; but when the Main points were about to be Settled, they refused obliging themselves to furnish the Necessary Supplys in behalf of Boyanore & Cotata (as we Offerd to do in behalf of the Prince) Otherwise than in being Security for them, and as that expression might hereafter subject us to Sundry disputes, in the end tending to Overset the Affair & involve us & the Prince in exceeding Mischiefs, Our Gentlemen were the more eager for having it inserted in plain & positive terms, that they Oblige themselves to furnish the Supplies aforesaid leaving it to them to take such security of the Mallabars as they might think proper, & finding they could not be brought to Agree, they took their leave, after being well convinced the Ministers of Cotata & Boyanore highly resented the French having made any difficultys in performing what they had Absolutely promised to do.

We have always had a Just sence of the Evils that may Attend our Interest through the Continuance of the Canarees in this Country, and therefore have been continually contriving how to compass their remov[al] but as their seems no Harmony whatever Among the Mallabar Powers, on the Contrary, they appear rather to wish the distruction of each Other, or will they deposite even a Small sum of money for the supporting an Army, or from what does appear by an Attempt they made lately, will they behave with a becoming resolution, & therefore for us to engage with them in these Circumstances to the endangering bringing the whole Burthen on ourselves is what we apprehend our Honble Masters would in no wise Approve of; so that since we cannot on any reasonable Grounds attempt to remedy these evils, without risquing worse, we have only to remain as we are, & watch all convenient Opportunitys, for Accomplishing what we have so much at heart. The King of Cottata in an Ola to the Chief desires leave for carrying Four Guns (the French have promised to spare him) through the river of Codolee, & as our refusal might induce him to carry them by Land, as is very possible, lead him to complain as well as the Country, that we neither Assist him Ourselves, or will lett others, that it may even Occasion the stop of our Trade, Our Consenting therefore is Judged preferable to the disobliging him for the foregoing reasons.

On Perusal of our Letter now recievd from the Hoñble Presid^t. & Council of Bombay taken Notice of above we find that through their Apprehensions of our not being able to Invest all our Stock before the rains, they shall deferr a farther supply till October, as they cannot conveniently Afford it now. Letter from Bombay perused.

Our expectation of recieving money speedily and the Uncertainty we were, and are under of the pepper continuing at its present price, induced us to be the more eager for laying in as much as we Supposed the Hoñble Company might want, and Accordingly four Thousand & Six Candys as Appears by our Consultation of the 31st Ultimo is contracted for & expected, for the payment whereof, there will be a deficiency of near Thirty two Thousand Rupees, conformable to our Calculate forwarded to Bombay under the 18th Instant and allowing for our Charges 'till the end of October which are at present very large, we may probably require for that Article Forty Eight Thousand Rupees which Added to the foregoing, seems to render us in want of near Eighty Thousand Rupees, and to provide for this Contingency there are but two ways offer, Namely, either to dispose of part of the Pepper, [or] endeavour to raise a Competent sum at Interest. Our want of Money taken into Consideration.

Debating on this point, It is Apprehended that should we dispose of part of the Pepper, and Afterwards be required to buy more in [the] Month of October we may not be able to gett it on the present terms, [if] perhaps at all, as the French may be Supplyd overland with more on the Arrival of their ships from Europe, or have one here in August directly from France, to the rendering this Comodity exceeding scarce [as] well as dear, and as Allowing, for the Interest on part of the money [to] be applied for the payment of the Pepper Contracted for & expected, will [so] amount to above three & an half Rupees in a Candy, making the price a proportion thereof seventy five & an half Rupees, which is more Moderate than has been for some time. We do entirely concur in opi[nion] that the raising of Money at Interest for the Above purpose & defraying Charges, is much preferable to the disposing of the Pepper, and as this Country does not abound with moneyd men Consequently not to be raised on a short warning, It is Judged safer & best for us immediately to endeavour the raising about Seventy Thousand Rupees on the easiest terms possible, thó we cannot suppose it will be under Ten $\frac{7}{8}$ Cent $\frac{7}{8}$ Annum, the Accustomary Interest at this place. Dabates thereon.

Directed the Linguist be employd to raise the above sum from the Braminees of Paliacatacherry, or by what other means he can, taking care our wants be kept as Secret as possible. 70000 Rupees Agreed to be taken up at Interest.

Notice is given us that a Munchua belonging to our Merchant Chatoo Chitty that lately sailed from this place to Callicut, is detain'd by the Government of that place, under pretence of her belonging to the Canarees, as she had one of those people aboard her, but they must be Sensible of her being Actually the property of the aforesaid Chatoo Chitty & Navigating under the H^o. Company's Protection has their Pass & a Christian Soldier on Board her.

We have for sometime been but indifferently treated by Samorine & his Governour, for the former yet refuses to Answer the Chiefs Le[tter] in demand of his debt, althô our Jungados have attended him for that pu[rpose] at Several times, and the latter cease to treat our people with the Usual [Chari]tys as in times past, indeed from what appears, this King has entire[ly] forgot the many Instances of the Companys favours to him, & is resolv[ed] [to] detain their Money, & return ill usage in Other respects; however we Judge nothing more is in our Power at present, than to write him a Letter [of] Complaint for his detaining the above Munchua, & refusing to pay his [money] which is Accordingly AGREED to. Resolution.

The Just Sence we have of the Injury done the Island Durmapatam, by the Canarees, thrô their Cutting down the Trees for their own Use, and other damages induced us to try for effecting an Union [with] these Country Powers for Expelling them the Mallabar Territorys, as the so doing is the only Method that can be taken, to free our H^o. Master[’s] Trade and Priviledges from their Usurpation as well as relieve the above Island, but altho Sundry Attempts have been made with Boyanore & Cotata they seem no otherwise inclined to Join us, but by making us the Principals, tending thereby to expose us to greater difficultys, Charges than our Hoñble Masters can well Support, & we have reason to dread that if we were engaged Against the Canarees the whole bourth[en] May light on us, so that all things considered althô our Superiours [in] their Letter to us under the 9th of April do empower us to bear our own Charges in this undertaking, yet in the present Circumstances, we think our making the Attempt Unadviseable, & for the present it will be more eligible to bear the distruction of our Trees, than run ourselves into an Hazardous & most expensive undertaking. reflections on the Canarees & the Backwardness of the Mall^{rs}. in Joining against them. that it will be more eligible.

Our Superiours in their last Commands of the 9th & 11th April are pleased to remark that the small fortress we propose building Near the cent[re] of Durmapatam, on the most commanding hill, will be to little, Supposing it to be of the demensions we advised of Twenty four yards for the length of each Curtane, & the Bastions carrying five Guns, since it Cannot contain the proper Accomodations, admitting it should hereafter be thought proper to render that the Head settlement, they therefore recommend to us a Serious Consideration of this Affair, & withall let them know whether removing to Durmapatam will in the end, be preferable to the continuing here and in such case, to have only here a small work with the warehouses, as they now are, and another place at Codolee, that so a timely resolution may be taken, & when once the design is settled to stick to it, for the remaining doubtfull whether to remain here or remove thither will probably Occasion considerable Expencc without any Utility, & all things considerd, they recommend to us, to Build at once, the Principal Fort on Durmapatam large enough to contain all conveniencys of Lodging &c^a. as whether or no it may be Judged proper to remove thither at present, they are willing to provide against Any Accident that may happen, from the Uncertainty, under what power the Mallabar Country may at last be fixd, they should be glad to be more secure of footing therein, & a share of its trade than can be depended on from our present Scituation.

In order to settle our Judgment [sic] in the preceding Affair, we have endeavourd to make ourselves [sic] Master of the Nature of the Scituation of Durmapatam by viewing the same, at times with the utmost care, & consulting the Engineer thereon, tis our United Opinion, that the place on which we intended to build the Fortress beforementiond of Twenty four yards Curtane with four Bastions carrying five Guns each, as it will be Two & a quarter Miles distance from the Sea Westward; two Miles from the entrance of the river Trentapatam & the same from that of Codolee can be in no wise suitable for the Commanding those rivers, nor would it be prudent to intend it, for the Principal Fortress considering the several Hills & valleys about it to the seaward may enable a powerfull Enemy, to cut of its Communication & it will be highly inconvenient for the residence of the Companys servants, or Security of their Merchandize, for we conceive it ought to be a standing Maxim, with us to have our main place bordering on the sea, in such a manner as the Communication therefrom cannot be cut off, & since there is as Appears to us a convenient Hill calld Atarra, at the entrance of Trentapatam lying on a point opposite to Grove Island, & secured from any Anoyance by sea, through the Shoales & Rock's thereabouts, which place is likewise most convenient for shipping off Goods, the same will be undoubtedly more suitable in all respects than any other, on the Island for raising the Principal Fortress defending the Buzar Warehouses &c^a. but as the Hill near the Center of the Island aforesaid ought to be secured for Guarding the parts Adjacent, a small work there, whether of a round Tower or a redout is necessary to be erected, & may be Garrisond with a few men so that according to this Scheme provided due care be had in raising a regular & Convenient Fortification on the aforesaid Hill Atarra it will be very difficult to desposes us.

We are next to consider the conveniencys & inconveniencys likely to Attend the removing to Durmapatam leaving only a small work at Tellicherry & Codolee & we are likewise to weigh how far it may be expedient to leave the Warehouses here for preventing of building others.

And first as to the conveniencys in removing to Durmapatam, the Island by being made over to the H^o. Company by the Prince will admitting the Canarees removed thence become our immediate property, & under our own Government & from the lands thereon with time & pains, great Improvements may be made in

Cultivating Coconut Trees, Paddy, Pepper & Salt Pans, from Whence tis presumed a revenue may Arise in a few years of about Sixty Thousand fanams which will in some measure ease the Expence of Maintaining the Garrison.

By being Scituated in the Center of the Pepper Country surrounded with rivers, leading to Cotata, Bengat, & other places from whence this Comm[odity] is Usually brought may be a means of giving us a better Security thereof then we can have by holding Tellicherry.

Our Possessing this place prevents either the Dutch French or others from getting footing thereon, & will have an influence on Randotarra lying to the Northward of it, which Annually Supplys a large quantity of Pepper & the dependance Cotata will have on us, will probably contribute to the keeping him in a better disposition towards us than he has shown for some time past.

The inconveniencys that are likely to attend our removing to Durmapa[tam] The Incon-

Exclusive of the great sum that will be sunk thro' leaving Tellicherry a considerable charge must unavoidably Attend the razing the works, as they are so well Cemented, & tis to be Apprehended the Carrying the stone to Durmapatam will cost full as much as the Cutting others there, and another Charge must follow, in forming a Convenient small place, capable of being defended by a few men, at Tellicherry for preserving our Title to it, & preventing its being Seized by any other Europe Nation, besides what will be more heavy then all the raising new Works on Durmapatam.

Our non residence at Tellicherry may Occasion the Country of Irrebenadu to be more than heretofore under the Influence of the French & a small part of the Pepper to be carried away by them, Cuny Nair our old Antagonist, may also if due care is not taken recover his Lands, & by being Supported by the French may subdue Narranport Nair, to the Occasioning disturbances at Tellicherry, & which will be the severely felt, shoud Moylan be vacated, thro' on this point an Expedient will be proposed hereafter.

It Occurs to us that altho Tellicherry is more convenient for Landing & Shipping off Goods then Durmapatam yet the Continuing the Warehouses there, to be defended by a small number of men, will not be so safe, as their being at the head settlement, & as frequently the Companys Estate to a Considerable Amount is Lodged in them, we think the Utmost regard should be had to their preservation. For the providing Against the Mischiefs which we ought to Apprehend may Attend Tellicherry by vacating Moylan & giving Cuny Nair an opportunity of subdueing Narranport, & Occasion Troubles here, the Board are of opinion, that as the keeping of said Moylan will be too great an Expence for the Company It will be best resigning it to the Prince, allotting to him the benefit now Coming to us from Cuny Nairs Grounds, & for a better security that it may not be lost thro' his Neligence, 'tis conceived he will readily Agree for the paying us for such a Number of men, as we may think Necessary for defending it, by which means the place will be in Effect as one of our own, while we are exempt from any Charge about it, & then tis very probable Cuny Nair will make no Attempts in disturbing [sic] the district of Tellicherry, nor the French that place, while we continue to hoist our Colours which will always be in our power to do when we think proper tho at the same time the board are sensible The Heirs of the Prince may be less attachd to us, & we run a risque hereafter of Mischeifs on that Account, but as there is no doubt to be made of the Companys Willingness to continue the payment of the Customs, self Interest tis believed will be Byas enough to them in time to come.
