Nanjan Chitty having sent last month some Musters of cloth from Salem with notice that he had a considerable quantity of the same by him, the musters were Examined and the best of them found to be far inferiour to what that sort of Cloth used and ought to be, and as the General run of the Salem cloth of late had prov'd but very indifferent, especially the last parcel brought in though charged at 46: 6: 12 per Corge one with another, Including Brokerage, and as we are obliged to take what comes down to us, and had some reason to suspect the whole parcel would not answer even those Musters, it was thought proper to send a person up to look over the whole there before we engaged for it, who acquainting us that in his opinion not above a tenth part of it was fit for the Company's Investment, it was Considered whether it would be for our Honourable Masters Service to accept Nanjan Chitty's offer or not, with what answer to give him, and agreed in the Negative, as the only means to bring about an amendment of the Manufacture and to let him know that unless his People do so they must not expect a Vent for it to ours.

The Board thinking it proper to put the Merchants in mind again of what they had promised with regard to the Investment and to hear what they had to say, they were ordered to come in, and being asked what progress they had made since we last spoke to them, reply'd they found it impracticable to get good or cheap Cloth yet, that the old Cotton was now almost all worked up and the new Crop which at present seemed favourable was at this time in many places about to be gathered, that after a little time more allowed for breaking the price & Spinning the Thread they hoped to set the Weavers to work upon such as would be to our satisfaction, Being then ordered to withdraw the Board considered that too pressing a demand just at this juncture might frustrate the good effects of our forbearance hitherto by really raising the price of the new Cotton or at least giving the Country Brokers Merchants discoursed about the Investment.

a pretence for urging that as a reason for keeping up the price of the Cloth & yet continue in the low manufacture which was partly the Cause of the bad Investment of last year, and therefore Agreed to acquiesce at present with what the Merchants had said and only enjoyn them to watch stricktly over the management of the Country Brokers and to Caution them against entering into any Concern or Combination with them.

The Board expressing their surprize at the advance on the Chemanaickpollam and Worriarpollam Cloth above last year when they had reason from what the Merchants had often said of Cotton in the beginning of this to expect it much cheaper, were assured by the Merchants that these were the lowest prices Cloth could be got for now, and that they feared they should be able to get but little more that was tolerable good and such as we should take even at those prices, for that the people demanded 2½ pagodas per Corge more for the Chemanaickpollam and 1½ for the Worriarpollam or would go to work upon others Cloths, as many had already done. Demanding of them then, from whence and what were the causes of this sudden and extraordinary rise of Cloth. they reply'd the Camp at Trechinopoly, but being desirous to be Informed more particularly in what manner that could affect our business so, they said the large portion of Grain that had been swept away out of these Countries towards the subsistance of so numerous a Body of Men, had made it extremely dear, after so dry a season as the last, and that the Weaving Cooleys must be paid proportionably, and that the army lying between our Weaving Towns and the Countries where the Bulk of the Cotton is produced has prevented it being brought to the Markets as usual, the owners above not caring to run the risque of sending it down, nor these people of purchasing it there, for fear the Oxen, which the Camp are very much in want of, should be pressed for their service, and the Cotton left by the way, they said farther that at this same time Cotton was grown so scarce and dear from the cause above assigned, there had been a demand in the Chemanaickpollam Towns but chiefly at Worriarpollam for these two months past for near 10,000 Pagodas a month for the several sorts of small light Cloths for the use of the Army and its Departments, whereby everyone

concerned in that sort of Manufacture made much more advantage than by ours, and that therefore some had wholly turn'd their Hands to that Work, and all more or less as far as this demand would employ them, with many other inferiour circumstances relative hereto. The Board being sensible of the verity of the first Instance and the great probability of the others, Agreed to transmit Immediately the substance of what the Merchants had offer'd to the Honourable President and Council and to desire their Direction if we should advance the prices as demanded, or go on in our Investment at the rates we have begun, or endeavour to lower them by wholly discontinuing it, and that in the meantime the Merchants should be ordered not to advance anything more on the prices already given.

The Paymaster reporting to the Board that the Expence of the Fausse Bray had already somewhat exceeded the Calculation, and that much remain'd yet to be done. The Board appointed Messrs. Allen and Holt to survey that work with the Paymaster and report next Consultation what they find necessary still to be done to complete it. His report is enter'd hereafter.

Upon making up my Paymaster's Account of last Month and comparing the total Expence of the Fausse Bray with the Calculate made in 1741 I find the Amount thereof was then near Expended, and that the Charges of this month somewhat exceeds it; while with the greatest concern I must acquaint Your Worship & c<sup>a</sup>. that Several parts remain yet unfinished as of the Counterscarp 20 yards, of the Parapet Walls 360 yards, and the Bridges, besides digging the ditch to a proper depth, which was not provided for in the said Calculate and proves a very heavy piece of Work, for the last Season being such a dry one, the great Cooleys proper for that service, which the Bound Renters used to supply us with from the villages and procure us from the Country, have of late been all employed in Watering & Cultivating the Land.

I must beg leave to observe also that the quantity of Chunam allowed in the Calculate is far short of what has been expended and what is necessary for so Considerable a Work, and that scarce any has been to be got from the Country Since this work began, what little there does come from thence is appropriated to curing the Company's Cloth, and what is used in the works is brought from Mercaun which much enhances the price of it

Upon the whole I hope no Censure will fall upon me that the Expences of this work so much exceeds the Computation, for I do assure Your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. that since it has been under my charge I have kept a watchfull Eye over the workmen & taken all imaginable care to prevent any Embezelment of or surcharge on Materials, but I must beg you will be pleased to favour me with your orders whether the Business shall be discontinued or carried on daily as usual to Endeavour to get it done before the Rains.
