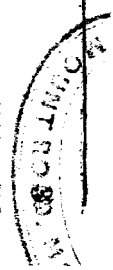

Cunhiseu, who for many Years has been the principal person employed for providing Cardamams, the Linguist was ordered some days past to write him, to come or send hither; to receive Money for that Commodity as usual & conformable to his Brother's promise at adjusting his Account in April last. Translate of his Answer thereto, into Portugueze the Chief now lays before the Board; in which he signifies that he does not care to take money before hand, because, when any Balance remains, he is obliged to deliver pepper for the Amount thereof. That his people are affronted & abused, at the Banksal, when they bring it. That, he supposes, we are Ignorant of the Friendship that passed between his Family & the former Chiefs. Till of late Years he delivered his Cardamams at Eringole; but on Account of the Friendship between him and the late Linguist, he had lately brought his Cardamams hither. That for three Years past he has heard & seen such Things as he never did before at this place. That he was indebted to the Honble Company through his being obliged to supply the King of Cotiote with a Sum of Money, but he wou'd pay it in pepper.

We being entirely ignorant of any Foundation for these Complaints; the First & Second Linguists are called in, & ordered to declare if they know of any cause for them, or that of any other person whatever: and are withal told that, it is their Duty to inform us of all murmurs & Complaints of the Merchants or others, in order that the Cause, if any, may be removed & such full satisfaction given as the Nature of them require.

The first & Second Linguists called in.

Both the Linguists declare they know of no Injustice or ill Treatment that has been given to any Man whatever now or heretofore. But this Merchant being very Rich & very haughty may possibly think himself affronted at his Brothers being stopt in the Buzar by some of our Military, at the Time Cota Marcar's Nephew killed a Serjeant in the Fort, but they do not know that this is the Cause of their Complaints, & having nothing further to offer they withdraw.

Their Declaration.

Cunhiseu's Brother being, here when Cota Marcar's Nephew killed One of the Serjeants, as mentioned in our Diary under the 15th. of March last, & the people belonging to the Boat running into the Buzar, a party of the Military were sent to prevent their doing of mischief to the Inhabitants and to seize them; when the said Brother (being a Moor & withal a Stranger) was stopped as were many others; but he was instantly let pass without the least abuse, one of the Nairs sent with the Military knowing him The Chief hearing of this persons being stopt, spoke to Domingo Rodriguez to represent to the Brother that, on such Occasions, of sudden Confusion, an innocent person may be stopt, & to send him away satisfied. And he was here afterwards, seemed well satisfied & made no Complaints — If there be other pretended Reasons they must be propagated with very unjust & base Views.

The Rise of Cunhiseu's complaint.

But that the Honble Companys Business may not suffer on any account, & Cunhiseu being the most proper person to provide Cardamums, It is ORDERED that the Linguist write an Ola to him, & acquaint him of his Answer it's being communicated to us; but that we know of no such Grievances as he mentions therein; however, if he does, to desire him to come or send hither when he shall receive the utmost Satisfaction & meet with the most civil Treatment.

Although we have not received Information from our Superiours of the Quantity of Tonnage arrived or intended for this Coast the ensuing Season; yet from certain private Advices we are assured it is very large, & the Quantity of pepper here & at Anjengo no ways adequate thereto. From the repeated Orders we have received, in regard to this most material Article, we know it is incumbent

on us to procure what we can, more especially in case of Failure of the produce here, which happened the last Season, of which produce we shall not have Twelve hundred Candys; And the French, who have had no Impediments as in the foregoing Year, will not have, at most, above half that Quantity, notwithstanding they have used all means to provide as much as they could. The ill Effect, our continuing to purchase at Callicut would have on the price here, we are too sensible of, & for which Reason the French will not except we do, but that at present is needless to consider of, as there is none nor can be till January next; & as the French have lately prevailed upon Boyonore, to put a stop to it's being carried thither by Land, it may reasonably be expected the Quantity in these parts will be greater, & the exorbitant price less than that of last Year.

The purchasing in the parts adjacent to penaney, in the Samorine's Dominions, will not be attended with those Inconveniences, especially if it can be done by a private hand, as hath been practised several times heretofore, by means of Swamy putterah, who is the head of a very rich Family in those parts, nor hath that method been disapproved of. But if the French perceive we send a servant thither for that purpose, they certainly will do the like & raise the price upon us, as they are under the like necessity for pepper as our selves.

In some former Contracts we perceive the said Putterah was to buy at the lowest prices he could (in which there can be no deceit) & advanced his own money, when he was allowed Thirteen Callicut Fanams $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy for his Trouble & Risque till the pepper was embarked; & when it was so shipt off it was on the Account & Risque of the Honble Company. At other times the same Puttarrah was advanced the Company's Money, when he was allowed but Ten Fan^s. $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy, & the Company stood to all bad Debts as well as other accidents till embarked.

Agreed to.

Having weighed & considered all Circumstances in Relation to this affair, the Chief proposes the sending Amboo Ambee, a Brahmin in the Honble Company's Service, with a proper Letter, on this Occasion, to Swamy Puttarah & bring his Answer: which is AGREED to, also that the Bramin be dispatched this Day & ORDERED not to pass through Callicut.

There being several small parcels of Pepper, as we are informed, at Mangalore & the parts adjacent; and an armed Munchua, belonging to this place, being ready to proceed thither, It is AGREED that, in order to Purchase the same, the Sum of Five thousand Rupees (5000) be sent on her to be lodged in the Portuguese Factor's hands, 'till it shall be ordered by us to be paid to whom we shall hereafter Direct as Occasions may require, & as we shall be informed of the price of pepper from thence.

ORDERED that a Boat with Four Topass Soldiers of this Garrison attend the said Munchua in her passage, to carry the Money a shore in case of meeting with any piratical Boats, although it is hoped they will not be out so early in the Season.

That the procuring of Cardamums may not solely depend upon the Caprice of Cunhiseu, whose Ola to the Linguist is taken notice of in Consultation of the 14th. Instant; and Ticandy Cunhi Ally, a Dealer in the Second sort of that Commodity, & of good Reputation, now attending is called in, & offering to procure what he can of the First sort at the most reasonable Rates they can be afforded, leaving the price to be adjusted 'till the Delivery of the same, a custom not hitherto to be amended. It is Agreed that he be advanced the Sum of One thousand Rupees & afterwards as shall be thought consistent.

Received a General Letter from the President & Council of Fort St. George, dated the 23^d. Ultimo, acknowledging the Receipt of our Letters of the 24th. of April & of the 7th. of June, & that they had given Bombay presidency credit for the amount of what had been disbursed here on the Boat Fort St. George. They were likewise pleased to advise of our Hoñble Masters Ships Houghton, Grantham, Walpole, Lynn & Marlborough their Arrival there from England. The Commander of the Latter touched at Johanna, where on the 15th. of June he left the Benjamin, when the Sommerset was standing in also that the Harrington went into Young Owl, on Madagascar, about the 30th. of May.

The Company only wrote them, on the 20th. of January, in respect to publick Affairs, that the War with Spain continued, but that there was then no war with France.

They were likewise pleased to enclose to us a List of the Hoñble Company's Ships, intended for India this Season.

The Weather, for some days past, having been bad, it was this Day before the Munchua could proceed towards Mangulore with the Five thousand Rupees (5000) Ordered thither as ¶ Consultation of the 17th. Instant.

Received a Letter from the Chief & Factors at Anjengo, dated the 19th. Instant, which was brought by Boat to Callicut, & transmitted hither from thence by Pattamars, the Weather being bad—The Occasion of their dispatching hither was with their packet for the Presidency, which accompanied their Letter to us; requesting of us to forward it thither by the first Conveyance—They likewise gave us the same Advices of Shipping as we received from Fort St. George.

That notwithstanding Mr. Signard had not thought proper to advise hither of his commencing to Fortifie upon the Hill of Balia Calay, still Mr. Wake hoped his so doing was in no wise contrary to the Agreement made between the two Settlements in the Month of December last. That according to his Letter of the 28th. of August N.S., the Contents of which he desired might be kept Secret, there was now no longer a pretence for continuing to keep their Banksall at Peringature; wherefore conformable to Mr. Labourdonnais promise & the Letter of the Articles, Mr. Wake desired it might be pulled down. Letter to

The French have a Fort at a Small distance from that which they are now erecting at Ballia or Grand Calay. The Situation of the Latter has a greater Command of Mahie, & is not inconsistent with the Articles of Agreement made in December last, being only for the preservation of their Settlem^t. nor is it any Impediment to the Freedom of Commerce in the Country: However it was not thought improper to take some notice of it. The Banksall (a Cajan house) at Peringature was to have been pulled down, when the Fort there was, but at Mr. Labourdonnais Request we consented, for the Reasons he gave, to let it remain 'till such time as we here thought proper, the part of the Article relating thereto it's being fully comply'd with.

The Linguist received on Ola from Cunhiseu, in Answer to One the former wrote him, by Order of Consultation on the 14th. Ultimo; the Contents of which are only, that he will send his Brother hither so soon as the time of his Mourning is over, & requests to be advanced the Sum of Two thousand Rupees (2000) for Cardamum in the usual manner. The Account of pepper delivered into the Hon^{ble} Company's Warehouse is likewise presented. All which being duly examined, they are agreed to be passed. ORDERED that Abstract of the Paymaster's account for last Month & the pepper Account be entered after this Consultation.

The Chief relates to the Board what is come to his knowledge, by means of the Linguist & others concerning an Agreement now making between prince Cunhi Homo & the Commanding Officer of the Canaree Forces at Maddy, for their

restoring to the Prince such part of his Country as was lately conquered by them; & which the Prince granted to them, by Treaty concluded, between them, by our Mediation & signed on the [*lacuna*].

The Substance of what the Chief is informed, concerning this present Negotiation, is, that the Prince is to pay the Canarees the Sum of Seven thousand Pagodas (7000) when they are to deliver the Fort of Madday to him, & evacuate the Country about it and upon his further payment of the Sum of One hundred thousand Pagodas (100000) they are to do the like by the other parts of the Country & Forts granted them by Treaty as abovementioned. And to levy this Sum upon his Subjects, the Canarees are to furnish the prince with two hundred Horse.

Agreement entered into between the Prince and Canarees.

This intended Agreement, it seems, is to be brought about by the Means of Pallarian, Chief of a Considerable District to the North of Madday; though neither the Prince or Canarees have taken any notice thereof to us, notwithstanding we were Mediators in the last peace abovementioned.

The Prince his Understanding is much impaired, & he will suffer none of his Ministers to transact in his Affairs who will not comply with his Avaricious Disposition, which, those that do make an Advantage of, having Inclinations of the same kind themselves; and therefore, this Levying of the Sum of One Hundred thousand Pagodas (100000) to pay the Canarees, they are apprehensive, we should frustrate, if we happened to be acquainted with his proceedings; so they perswade the Prince that the English want the Canarees to stay, for the more easy keeping of him in Subjection to the Honble Company; and the Canaree General readily propogates this Report, as he and his people will appropriate to their own use whatever part of the abovementioned Sum the Prince may pay: The whole he certianly will not, nor is it reasonable to beleive the Canarees will relinquish the whole of their Conquest, as the Northern parts thereof sutes their Conveniency & where from their own Country by River Carriage they can easily supply a small, but sufficient body of Men for keeping the Country in Subjection, which is very difficult to do at Madday.

Reflections thereon.

From such Insincerity in the proceedings of the Agreem^t. as well as from many other Circumstances, it is reasonable to suppose neither Party intend to perform their Engagements, whence Disorders may probably ensue; and as we mediated the last Peace, it is likewise probable both parties, in such Case, may complain to us, and expect we should engage in such Disputes as may happen, which are always attended with Expence to the Honble Company; to prevent which & all other Inconveniences, as much [a]s in us lies, it is Resolved that the Chief write a Letter to the King of Bednure & another to Prince Cunhi Homo signifying to each of them that we are well informed of their entering into a new Engagement or Treaty without acquainting us therewith, notwithstanding we were Mediators of the last Peace, made between the King of Bednure & Prince Cunhi Homo dated August the 26th. 1737 & That we will in no wise be answerable for the Events that may ensue therefrom.

ORDERED that the Linguister writes seperate Letters to the King of Bednure & to Prince Cunhi Homo conformable to the foregoing Resolution, for the Chief to sign, & that they be dispatched, the former to the Governour of Mangalore, for him to forward to his Master, & that a Copy thereof be enclosed to him in a short Letter on the Occasion.

That Pallarian having lately acquainted him that he could manage in such a Manner with the Canarees, as they would peaceably restore to him such Part of his Country as they were in possession of, to effect which he the Prince was using his Diligence, which he knew we should not take ill, but join our Endeavours to bring it to a Conclusion. He was very sensible that the Honble Company had been at a great Expencc of Men & Treasure for the preservation of his Country when attacked by the Canarees & Moors; & that, in future Occasions of the like nature, he hoped for a Continuation of their Friendship.

Reflections

Procuring all the Pepper we possibly can, so strenuously recommended to us in our Superiours Letter now under Consideration, & is, what we have already used our utmost Diligence to comply with not only here but at Cochin & other places to the Southward as also at Mangulore—By the Chief's private Advices from the first mentioned Place, our getting pepper from thence depends much upon the Governm^t, there, which will be changed in November or Decem^r. next; & in case Affairs there are carried on in the usual manner Two or three hundred candys may be expected at the Market Price, & at least as much or more from Swamy Putterah if he is permitted to purchase at Callicut, as mentioned in his Letter entered in the Diary under the 14th. Inst. which will be taken into Consideration on the Arrival here of his Son. What small Quantities can be procured at Mangulore & Manjaseer, provision has already been made for that purpose. But the Disputes between the Government & Merchants there, will not permit of buying or selling even any thing till they are accommodated.

Money is already advanced for Cardamums, but as Sandal Wood was scarce the last Season, & from there being Four Maccao Ships on the Coast, was so dear as some was sold at Callicut for One hundred & Fifteen Rupees (115) ₹ Candy, & as there is no returning Ship from China to Bombay, there may come as many the ensuing Season, when it will not Only be extravagently dear, but perhaps not procurable if we do not provide in time: therefore it is AGREED that the Linguist be now ordered to write to the Sandal Wood Merchants to come to the Fort, in order to make the best Terms with them we can for the Quantity Directed by our Superiours at Bombay to be provided for the Harrington's China Voyage.

The Samorine's Proposals, for paying of his very large Debt to the Hoñble Company, were transmitted to the Presidency, who, to comply with them or not, in a great measure leave it to us; but it being an Affair of such great Importance, It is AGREED that, the Sentiments of our Superiours there be first known before we come to any conclusion therein.

Ally Rajah's Ship being taken by Angria, such other proper opportunities, as may hereafter offer, must be taken for obtaining Satisfaction for the Debt of that Family to the Hoñble Company.

Having read all the Letters transmitted us that have passed between the Hoñble the Court of Directors & those of the Company of France, in relation to our Behaviour as the French pretend, in respect to their Servants at Mahie & their Wars with the Natives.

The Charge of the French Company may be comprised under three Heads Viz. First, That of our declaring we would openly assist their Enemies against them as appears by Four Letters said to be signed by Mr. Wake; Secondly of defrauding our Hoñble Masters in the price of Pepper; and Thirdly engaging in acts of Piracy.

As their Supervisor, Chief & Council of Mahie by their Letter to Mr. Wake dated January the 10th. N.S. have declared the Four Letters, mentioned in the 1st. Article, to be forged, no further notice need be taken of that by as, any more than that of our engaging in Acts of Piracy as contained in the last Article, it being a meer silly Invention without any shadow of Reason or Truth, trump up perhaps to serve some immediate ill Purpose in respect to their own Proceedings. But the 2^d. Article the French charge us with, of defrauding our Hoñble Employers, is what, it behoves us, to oblige them to declare their Reasons for such Assertion in the most explicit manner.

The Hoñble Company's Commands, in respect to these Affairs, being duly perused, It is RESOLVED that a Letter be wrote to the French Chief & Council of Mahie conformable thereto.

ORDERED that a Toney be dispatched to the Chief & Factors at Anjengo with the President & Council's Packet to them, advising them thereof with what is further necessary.

They are pleased to give us Directions in respect to the Lynn expected from Bengall, & the Harrington's China Voyage, for which last Ship we are ordered to provide Three Hundred Candys of Sandal Wood, withal acquainting us of the Hon^{ble} Company's Indulgence to their Servants in case they shall send a private Ship to Canton. That as Mr. Wake had been ordered by the Hon^{ble} Court of Directors to take upon him the Charge of the Government of Bombay, they should consider of the most proper methods for his proceeding thither as soon as possible.

From the present apparent Deficiency in Tonnage, after mentioning the Inconveniencies of purchasing pepper at Callicut, they are pleased to leave it to us to provide sufficient for the Ships intended home this Season, at all such places as we shall think necessary without Limitation in respect to price. They likewise leave it to us to take the most proper Methods in respect to the Samorine's Debt & for obtaining Reparation for the Insult of Cota Marcar, but should those methods prove such as may require their further Consideration, they shall, on Mr. Wake's Arrival at Bombay, accordingly do so.

ORDERED to send up what Poon Masts we can & to sell the Remainder as they may spoil by lying longer here. Likewise ORDERED that Mr. Jenkinson pays for the Casks in his Hands at the Rate of Four & a half Rupees ¶ Puncheon. Also that the Quantity of Cardamums to be provided be Ten thousand Pounds as usual: The packet for Anjengo to be sent by a Toney, as the Owner of the Express Boat is paid for going to this place only.

GENTLEMEN,

The Honble Directors of the East India Company of France have in several Letters, complained to those of England, whom we have the Honour to serve, of several unwarrantable Transactions that we, the underwritten have committed against your Settlement of Mahie, during Mr. Dirois presiding as Govern^r. there, which Complaints are chiefly comprised in the three following Articles.

First, that by Four Original Letters, written in the Mallabar Tongue, to several of the adjacent Princes, & alleged to be signed W. Wake, It appears that Mr. Wake had leave from his Superiours openly to assist your Enemies against you. Two of which Letters are in France, & the other two remain with You.

Secondly, That we broke the Agreement made between those of your Settlement & this, particularly in the Year 1740, for fixing the price of Pepper at Seventy Eight Rupees (78) $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy, being induced thereto by our own private Advantage, & with the same unfaithful View keeping up the price of Pepper at as high Rates as we can, to the great prejudice of both Companys.

Thirdly, That Mr. Wake & the other Gentlemen, in or about the Year 1740, actually engaged Two hundred & Fifty Moors of Burgara to go on board Eighteen Vessels, which Mr. Wake had fitted out himself at Tellicherry, to cruize in the Latitude of Mount Dilla, in order to take all the private French Vessels they could lay hold of.

All these Charges are indeed of the most Heinous & detestable kind—In respect to the First Article, we suppose the Honble the Court of Directors for our Company, will be satisfied with your Acknowledging in your Letter to us dated the 10th. of Jañry last N.S. (Copy of which we transmitted them) that the Four Letters therein mentioned were forged; & we are assured you must be willing to declare that our engaging in any act of Piracy, as specified in the third article, is equally False.

Likewise we beleive that, since you discovered the unfaithfulness of your late Chief Linguist Ignatious Thexaida, you are too fully convinced how the Agreement of Seventy Eight Rupees (78) ₹ Candy for pepper, as mentioned in the 2^d. Article came to be broke, to charge us with it. But what is further mentioned therein, of our keeping up the price of Pepper with a View of Gain to our selves & thereby defraud^d. our Company, we doubt not in the least but out of regard to that of your own, as it must be equally prejudiced thereby, you will either give us the Reasons you have for such Suspicions in us, or any of the Country Servants employ'd under us, or otherwise clear us of such an unfaithful Conduct in the most ample manner.

We must likewise observe to you, Gentlemen, that, the Honble the Court of Directors of our Company, have, in the most strict manner, recommended to us a good Harmony & Agreement with You, in the carrying of Commerce with the Natives for the mutual Benefit of both Companys, not doubting but you will Receive the like Orders from Yours.

This, indeed, is what we have always, on our Parts, endeavoured to maintain, & with great Satisfaction acknowledge to have experienced lately the same good Disposition in You, although former proceedings & the embroiled State the Country has been in for some Years dissepated the Hopes both you & our selves expected therefrom the last Season, in respect to lowering the Price of Pepper, but perseverance therein, we make no doubt, produce that desirable good Effect, expected by you and

SATURDAY 2^D. According to various Reports, we understand the King's Ministers infuse in him ill & false Opinions of us, more particularly that we use our Endeavours with the Canaree General not to depart with his Army, & that we want them to make war upon him, which, from the Depravity of his Understanding, he may be credulous enough to believe And as talking with him may be more efficacious than writing. Mr. Wake advised him this Day that, as he was ordered by the Company to proceed to Bombay very shortly, therefore if his Majesty's Business would permit of his coming to Tellecherry, he should be much obliged withal congratulating him upon the Canarees their Quitting Madday as he hoped they soon would all his Dominions.

DITTO DIE. Returned the Boat sent to Anjengo on the 18th. ultimo, by it we reced a Letter from the Chief & Factors there, dated the 23^d. ultimo. They had in Warehouse Eight thousand two hundred & twenty pieces Salampores & Eight Hundred & Twelve Candys of Pepper, which in cleaning they suppose may lose about Fifteen Candys. That they should be in want of Treasure before they could receive any from the Presidency, wherefore, as soon as the Weather broke up, they intended to send to us for Ten Thousand Rupees (10000).

MONDAY 4TH. Read & signed a general Letter of this Date to our Superiours at Bombay, in Answer to One reced from them on the 17th. Instant inserting the necessary Advices, which Letter was this Day dispatched by the Express Boat sent hither from the Presidency.

SATURDAY 9TH. Received an Ola from the Prince, in answer to what the Chief wrote him on the 4th. Instant. The Prince after making some Complements, writes that it is necessary he should come hither to relate to the Chief what has passed between him & the Canarees, & other matters in Respect to his Country. That he hath raised a Considerable Sum to pay them, for restoring such part of his Dominions as they had usurped & in five Days they would retire out of them. By the 20th. Inst. he hoped to have settled his Affairs to the Northward, when he intended to come to Tellecherry.

MONDAY 11TH. Received a Letter from Mr. Petre Fandel, command^r. Officer at Maddacarra, wherein he writes that a Boat Passing by on the opposite side of Madday River to the Fort, seemingly intending to pass out after calling several times to the People of her to come to the Fort. When the Prince of Mundarry lookt over the side of the Boat, wherein he was sat down & told the Officer that, because he knew that he, the prince, was in the Boat, he fired at him. The Officer reply'd to him that he knew not of his Highness his being in the Boat. nor could he as he had no Advice of his coming as usual, when he always reced all sutable Civility: After which the Prince proceeded in his Boat without saying any thing more; but One of his Nairs said that this Transaction should be wrote to Tellecherry.

TUESDAY 12TH. The Chief reced an Ola from the Prince of Mundary; in which he writes that, as he coming in a Toney from Madday, the Officer of Maddacarra Fort fire'd upon him, which he did not know if the Chief was acquainted with or not. That the Friendship that had hitherto subsisted between the Hon^{ble} Company & his Ancestors he sees is now broken of which he gave the Chief this Advice, that he might not hereafter plead Ignorance thereof—This Prince is Younger Brother of Prince Cunhi Homo, & in all probability will be appointed at his Death to succeed him in the Administration the Prince being extremely fond of him, although he is of a most rapacious & malicious Disposition—The forementioned Ola was delivered by a Bramin that was in the Boat, who related several Circumstances that were not true.

WEDNESDAY 13TH. Received a Letter from Mons^r. Duval De Leyrit signifying the Death of Mons^r. Signard, Chief of Mahie, to which Mr. Wake reply'd in a sutable manner.

The Chief received an Ola from Prince Cunhi Homo, in which he relates, that as the Young Prince was passing by Maddacarra in a Boat, the People of it were called to and asked who was in Her, & they answered the Young Prince of Cherrica; when immediately the Fort fired at the Toney & wounded the fellow in the Hand who steered her. Then they rowed out when the Fort fired a Second time, & began to haul & prepare the Great Guns in order to fire upon them, which those of the Toney perceiving & being frightned came to the Shore, when the Soldiers

immediately began to use indecent & foul Language. To treat the Young Prince in such manner, he is not sensible of having committed any Offence against the Hoñble Company nor the Present Chief.

The Bramin who brought the Young Prince's Ola on the 12th. declared to the Chief, the Boat was not called before it was fired upon, & said only that the Second Shot (of a Musket) fell in the Water near the Boat. The giving ill Language is equally a false assertion. The Officer, himself, only spoke to the young Prince in the Mallabar Language in a decent manner as also to those with him. Expecting to receive an Answer from the Prince to the Ola wrote him Yesterday, answering the above is deferred.

This Day unexpectedly Cunhiseu, who wrote an Ola of Complaint to the Linguist, as mentioned in the Diary under the 14th. August, came hither to take his Leave of the Chief, hearing he was speedily to proceed to Bombay; desiring the Company's favour, which he had hitherto always received, might be continued to him. That he had been made sensible the Affront his Brother met with in the Buzar by some of our Military, was not intended, they being sent to protect the Inhabitants. That he lookt upon himself much safer in the Company's Limits than in his own. The Chief reply'd to him in a sutable manner, assuring him of a Continuation of the Company's Favour, withal acquainting him (he being a Moor) that some of our people having been killed & wounded by some Moors of Cota or Others who pretended to be so, had occasioned the giving an order for their not passing the Limits with Arms; But if he, who had such great Interest among his Cast, could think of any more agreeable & proper Method, for the Security of the Inhabitants against the wicked attempts of such Ruffians, the Order should be countermanded. He reply'd that it was reasonable to take the most secure Methods for the preservation of the Inhabitants against the Attempts of those Rogues of Cota; but a more proper Method than had been taken for that purpose, required some Consideration. That he would call some of the Heads of the Cast together & advise hither accordingly. For the Moors not being permitted to carry their Arms, however necessary it was to prohibit it, was a great Disgrace to their Cast. After many Complements & professions of friendship, withal promising to provide a considerable Quantity of Pepper in Cotiote's Country, he took his Leave.

We have received the Letter you did us the Honour to write us the 29th. of Sept^r. O.S. by which you signifie to us that the Directors of the French Company had complained to the Directors of the English Company in Relation to several unjust Proceedings of M^r. Wake against the Settlement of Myhie during M^r. Dirois' administration here. These Complaints you reduce in your Letter to three Points, to which we now reply.

The first relates to M^r. Wake's four counterfeit Letters, whereby it would appear that he had permission from his Superiors to assist openly our Enemies against us. We shall no otherwise answer to this Article, than by referring ourselves to the Letter we wrote M^r. Wake the 10th. of Jañry last conjointly with M^r. De la Boardonnais, & with which you seem satisfied.

In Relation to the Encrease of the Price of Pepper, which is the subject of the Second Point, We never taxed your probity in the Breach of the Agreement made between M^r. Dirois & M^r. Wake for reducing Pepper to Seventy Eight Rupees (78) $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy. Perhaps it was owing to the Complaints of M^r. Dirois, whose good Faith might be abused by the false Informations of Ignatio Thexeida our late Linguist, that our Company were desirous of coming to some Explanation with yours on this subject. We are fully persuaded, Gentlemen that you have always served your Company with the same Integrity & Zeal with which we take a pride in serving ours.

As to the third Article, by which it appears that M^r. Wake assembled at Tellecherry two hundred & Fifty Moors of Burgorah for manning Eighteen Munchuas designed to cruize on our Vessels, We don't doubt a Moment but that it is of a peice with that concerning the Price of Pepper. The Infidelity of Ignatio Thexeida is known to you as well as us. We are much concerned that That Wretch should attempt to attack you in his Impostures.

We hope, Gentlemen, these Explanations will satisfy you: as to ourselves, the Desire we have of throwing into Oblivion the unhappy times you call to our Remembrance, prevents us from renew^g. any of our Complaints, however grounded they might have been, against your Conduct in certain Respects during the Wars we maintained with the People of the Country. Our only Aim at present is to cherish the good Intelligence, which for some time past has subsisted between us. We shall always remove carefully every thing that may impair it; & we flatter ourselves that not only the Tranquility of the Country will result from this union; but the Diminution of the Price of Pepper, which is an Object we wish no less earnestly than You, & which we may attain by acting sincerely & unanimously.

GENTLEMEN,

We have received your Letter dated the 3^d. November N.S. wherein you relate that two days before some of your people, on this side the River of Billiapatam, were opposed & prevented by Macquas & other Inhabitants thereabouts, in the securing two Topass soldiers who had deserted from your Garrison. That our Officer at Maddacarra sent some people to seize those belonging to You, & in Territories where you apprehend you have as good a Right as the Hoñble English East India Company. And lastly you demand full satisfaction, or otherwise you do protest against us. To which we reply.

That on the 21st. Instant in the Evening two Topass soldiers, who about Four Months past absented themselves from our Garrison of Maddacarra, surrendered themselves again voluntarily to the Commanding Officer there, & relate that, at their passing the River of Billiapatam, some of your Tivees abused & maltreated them, but the Natives prevented any further Mischief. If these be the two men you demand you will perceive it is not you, but we that have Reason to complain; for whatever Right you may pretend to have in this Country, We are certain you can have none to abuse any Person or Persons whatever that belongs to the Hoñble English East India Company; & if upon further enquiry into this matter we find the above Relation justly founded, we shall be obliged accordingly to demand suitable Satisfaction of You.

We must further observe to you that not a single Person belonging to our Hoñble Company, were engaged in the Scuffle you complain of, or so much as heard of it till our two Topasses related it to their Officer as abovementioned; & in case the Natives have abused any Person or Persons belonging to You, we shall not intermeddle therein.

The Chief wrote an Ola to Boyanore, setting forth, that he could not but be sensible the Money he owes the Hoñble Company, was lent him solely for his Benefit, & that they had no Interest therein, that he never imagined He would make the least Demur in the Payment of it or forget his great Obligations to them in this particular. But he was sorry to find himself deceived, not only by his Delay therein but cavilling at the Account though he might be assured the Hoñble Company would use proper Means for obliging him to comply with their just Demands, as he himself well knew, they had hereto fore done in Cases of the like Nature depending with several Kings & other powers. That his Debt amounted to sixty two thousand six hundred sixty two Fanams & Eight Vis, which if he paid forthwith it would be accepted But otherwise this Loan would be charged to him in like manner as a Failure in a Contract of Merchandize, & as such the Hoñble Company would take a proper Opportunity of recovering it from him.

Received an Ola from Prince Cunhi Homo in Answer to One the Chief wrote him the 13th. Instant, wherein he writes that he is fully acquainted with the Circumstances of what happened at Maddacarra, & highly pleased to hear the Chief is promoted to the Government of Bombay; but before his Departure would be glad of an Interview with him, having sundry matters to confer upon; & so soon as his Affairs will admit of it he shall not fail coming hither for that purpose; withal desiring he, the Chief, would forthwith send to his Assistance Fifty soldiers with some Ammunition towards enabling to subdue a Prince, who opposes his Interest.

Arrived the Neptune Smack from Anjengo, which brought us a Letter from the Chief & Factors there dated the 23^d. Instant, wherein they desire we would supply them by her with a Chest of Rupees, as they shall be in want of money for their pepper Contracts. But should the Porto Bello be here & is ordered to call at Anjengo, they presume we will send the Treasure on that Ship: They also request we will send them Ten Corge of Gunnys if procurable, & order the Master of the Smack to take in the Wax, at Callicut, formerly indented for. They enclosed a packet for the Presidency to be forwarded thither by the First Conveyance.

Received a Letter from our Linguist at Callicut, dated the 28th. Instant, acquainting us that he should embale the Pepper lying there with all possible Expedition, & send up forthwith such Articles as are ready provided for the Presidency. That the Fourth King was arrived, who has Orders to pay the Four thousand Fanams (4000) & adjust the account Customs, when he was to proceed for chastizing Cota Marcar. He the Linguist, now sends up Fifty Pieces of plank & six Chests of Candles for Bombay but it is impracticable to transmit an Accot. of the Cost & Charges of the plank, until the whole Quantity is sawed up.

Dispatched the Neptune Smack to Anjengo & by her wrote a Letter of this Date to the Chief & Factors there, owning the Receipt of theirs under the 23^d. Instant, with a packet for the Presidency, which we advised should be forwarded by the first Conveyance, & that agreeable to their request we had consigned them on the Smack One Chest of Treasure containing ten thousand Rupees, as we could not tell with Certainty when the Porto Bello would arrive and they might be in immediate want of the money. That we had wrote to the Callicut Linguist to send them ten Corge. of Gunnys if procurable; & the two Candys of Wax already provided the Master being ordered to call there for that purpose. The amount of the Invoice of Treasure now consigned them we should debt their Factory for together with the Charges of a Toney, & Necessarys supply'd their pattamars & Marcar, which we notify'd to them.

They acknowledge the Receipt of our Letter dated the 1st. July & acquaint us they had ordered Ships Harrington, Porto Bello & Salisbury to touch at Onore, where the Latter was to take in Eighty Seven Candies of Pepper Hur Commtiy had advised them would be in readiness. That the Ships stay there was limited to three Days, when they were to proceed hither. That they appointed Mr. Charles Crommelin to purchase what pepper possible at that place & Carwar, & had furnished him with Sixty thousand Rupees for that purpose; who is to render an Account of his Transactions to Mr. Wake. The Harrington & Salisbury are to take in here whatever Masts or any thing else may be in readiness, when that is compleated & Mr. Wake ready to embark these Ships are to be ordered to return to Onore or else where as required according to Mr. Crommelin's Notice, for taking on Board all the Pepper he may have provided, which being accomplished Mr. Wake is to give the Commanders Orders to make the best of their way in Concert to Bombay, & if he judges necessary to continue Mr. Crommelin at Onore for purchasing what is attainable, & they shall order the Somerset to touch there for receiving what may be ready in such Case a sufficiency of Treasure must be carried from hence for that purpose, which is however left to our Determination.

In a subsequent paragraph they mention to have directed the Harrington & Salisbury to stop at Mangulore for Forty Eight Hours to receive pepper or any other Goods that may lie there. They consign us by these Ships One Hundred & Forty thousand Rupees, which they judge to be pretty near the Sum we may want.

On a supposition that the Lynn may arrive from Bengall, so as to leave this place for Bombay by the 20th. December, they shall order a proper Force to attend the Somerset down which may consort the Lynn, otherwise our Honble Masters Orders relating to her must be literally complied with—They have directed the Chief & Factors at Anjengo to forward hither two Chests of silver lying there, which cannot be put off without Loss, & are to be Laden on the Harrington, when she is dispatched hence to China in April next.

They acquiesce with the Conditions of Mr. Jenkinson's Proposal for filling the Casks he has remaining with Arrack which we are to send up accordingly. In case Mr. Pugh Willis should offer to pay any Money into our Cash, we are to receive it & give him Bills on the Honble Company for the Amount—Enclosed Mr. Crommelin's Instructions, Calculate of Tonnage of ship Porto Bello, with an Indent for Coir Cordage &c^a.

They send to our Assistance Mr. St. Eloy Writer.

That it was the 24th. before he arrived at Onore, & the Day following Hur Commoty came from Mirjee & informed him there was no pepper ready at Onore, wherefore he dispatched the Ships judging it needless to detain them for any trifling Quantity he might have at Mirjee as it would be five days at least ere it could be brought down & weighed off. That Hur Commoty's Balance was nearest Eighty Eight Candys, which he promised to deliver, & has about two hundred

landies now at Mirjee which he will endeavour to purchase. That he is ordered to go so far as thirty Four Pagodas provided he can contract for four hundred Candys at that Rate. That he shall make enquiry if there be a certainty of procuring pepper at Carwar & advise hither accordingly; but having a very little prospect of getting a considerable Quantity he had only landed Two Chests of Treasure amounting to Twenty thousand Rupees, which he judg'd would pay for about two hundred Candys.

Advised the Chief & Factors at Anjengo that just as the Neptune Smack was on her Departure we received a Letter from the Commander of Ship Porto Bello, & a packet from the Honble President & Council of Bombay, who direct our consigning that Ship to them for compleating her Charter Party Tonnage of Two hundred seventy two Tons, after putting on board here five Tons of surplus pepper, but observing by their Advices they had sufficient in Warehouse to Answer these Purposes, we should after landing the Treasure & Stores for this settlement consign her to them for receiving the whole, that we had relanded the Treasure from the Neptune Smack, & should send it by the Porto Bello, in case she had not any on board for them.

GENTLEMEN,

In obedience to the Honble Companys Commands I am now to proceed to the Presidency, and have accordingly delivered over my charge as Chief of this Settlement to M^r. William Jeynson, who is to Preside as Provisional Chief, till such time as a Chief shall be appointed by the President & C^A. Council of Bombay, when M^r. William Jeynson is to resign his charge Over to him in such manner as shall be directed.

From the perfect Unanimity & Friendship which has always subsisted between us, I have not the least doubt but the like will be continued between you, which more especially becomes necessary, 'till a Superiour Arrives from the Presidency, And as you have all along been fully acquainted with all Transactions, and the Motives of them, I doubt not by your prudence they will be carried on and conducted in the best and most advantageous manner for the real Benefit of our Honble Employers during the time they are under your management, whence there remains little for me to give you Instructions. However the following hints or observations may not be altogether useless.

The Streights We are under for compleating the Tonnage to be dispatched this Season, renders it needless to recommend your obliging the Merchants to bring in what possibly they can of their outstanding Contracts for Old Pepper; and before the time comes for Contracting for the New Crop, in all probability a Chief will arrive here, but if it should accidentally happen otherwise, do not defer advancing mony longer than the End of December, or beginning of January, and as largely as you judge the Merchants can comply.

From the irregularity of the French Proceedings for some Years past, the price of Pepper cannot be reduced greatly at once, notwithstanding I think they will sincerely join with you for that End, and they have prevailed with Boyanore to prevent it's being carried out of that Country to Callicut.

The French at present are in want of money and should they not be supplied in time, they will certainly be for deferring to advance for Pepper 'till they are; under pretence of still getting Pepper at lower rates than you may be contented to Contract for, But such an opportunity you will not let slip, & the arguments used by them the last Year, Necessity, may justly now be used by you as well as that of not exasperating the Merchants by lowering the price too much, at once. Upon the whole I shall think you lucky if you can advance at or about Ninety Rupees ₹ Candy; However be as punctual, and Candid with the French in respect to the Agreement for Pepper, as your present Circumstances, & their Transactions will admit of.

I am of opinion Swamy Putterah must be secretly permitted to purchase at Callicut, but if a Company's Servant be sent for that purpose, it will rise to One hundred & Twenty or One hundred and Thirty Rupees ₹ Candy. When the Braminy has purchased all he can, you may then advise the French your necessities will oblige you to purchase a small Quantity of Pepper a Southern Merchant has brought thither, when you may order the Linguist to send it hither, or send one of the Gentlemen to Load it on Board One of the Honble Company's Ships there, as shall appear most convenient.

You are acquainted with Ezekiel Raby's promise for delivering a Quantity of Pepper to my order, in case the change of Government at Cochin will admit of it; I herewith deliver you my open Letter to him upon that Subject, which Mr. Jeynson may enclose to him at a proper time, and give the necessary directions for receiving it of him.

Prince Cunhi Homo's late Behaviour you are also fully acquainted with. I do not think he intends to break with the Honble Company, but the late Success of the Mallabars against the Dutch and French is frequently the subject of his discourse, and makes him think himself much more potent than he really is, Although from his bad Government he is much less than he might be, especially if he were to consider the Company's Interest is his own.

A Rupture with the Prince must be avoided as much as possible, but any Submission will certainly bring on immediate Insults, and other innumerable Inconveniencys. The French since their last Peace with Boyanore, have impolitically as, I think, paid the Regent One hundred and Twenty thousand Fanams, to perform it, but with some condescensions on the part of the French, which makes the Prince believe he may likewise get a Sum of money from us for his Friendship, but not so much as a single Fanam on any such occasion must ever be paid him, and in case he should ever pretend to make war upon the Honble Company, which their Servants will foresee, the Head of the Family of Caput must be plaid against him, who at present is Badalacor, and is the Third from the Crown, and who ought according to the Rules of the Country, share equally in the administration of the Government with Cunhi Homo, his not doing so was by management here, thinking Two bad Heads worse than one, but I hope any thing of this kind is far distant or will never happen.

It is to be hoped the present Expence of the Caliquiloners going the Limit Rounds in the Night will soon cease, as the Heads of the Moors are thinking of some other Expedient for the Security of the Inhabitants, that the Moors may have the liberty of passing with their Arms as heretofore, which you may accept of. if heir proposals are seemingly reasonable, the Order being intended to serve a present occasion, & to be dropped in a proper time and manner.

The Orders we have received from the Presidency in respect to the Current Business is needless to mention here, as I am sensible you will duly comply with them.

You are to permit Capt. Gibbs to repair to the Presidency, whenever he may request that liberty.

That the sending down the Britannia in company with the Somerset, was to expedite her departure to Great Britain,

Somner is to deliver in a Manifest of his Private Trade, having declared he had taken none on Board at Bombay, and this notice is to be given to the Gentlemen at Anjengo, should the Somerset proceed thither.

He acquaints us that Ships Britannia and Somerset arrived there the 23^d. Ultimo, wherein they advise that Invoice of this Ships Cargo, and all other necessary Papers are under cover to the Presidency at Bombay, which We are to open in case We are obliged to dispatch her directly from hence to Great Britain. By advices under the 15th. September from Fort St. George they learn, that our Hoñble Masters Ship Shaftsbury was arrived Five Leagues to the N^o.ward of Pullicat in a very distressed Condition which Ship was to be sent to them so soon as She was able to proceed, and that the Benjamin arrived at Fort St. George the 11th. September and was to be dispatched from thence with the Admiral Vernon to Great Britain in that Month. That they had dispatched Ship Tigris to Europe, the 30th. of October, and the Grantham would depart for Bencoolen in a few days, The Walpole and Wilmington would be sent to Madrass in December to fill up, and the Houghton, Marlborough and Shaftsbury they intend to dispatch to Europe as early in the Season as they can. That the Morattas were lately drove from the Island Cossimbuzar, but still continue to infest and plunder other Parts of the Province. They enclosed Cap^t. Gilberts Sailing Orders.

Our Merchants being likewise assembled here with the same design, they are called together and asked in presence of the French Gentlemen the lowest price they can Contract for Pepper of the New Crop, to which they with one Voice reply'd that as so small a Quantity of the New Pepper is yet Gathered, it is impossible at present to fix upon a price; that they must be allowed time 'till towards the 10th. of this Month to buy up small Quantities, and thereby inform themselves thoroughly of the price it bears in the inland Buzars before they can make their Contracts. No arguments were left untried to endeavour to quicken and bring them to an immediate Agreement, that so We might advance mony without further delay, Experience having shewn that delays only serve to encrease the price, but the repugnance of the Merchants was not to be overcome. The safest and speediest method of bringing up this Quantity, and of remitting to Ezekiel the abovementioned Sum is now taken into consideration, and the same being Debated, the Board are Unanimously of Opinion that this end will best be answered by means of the Britannia, whose stay here can be of no Service during the interval of her Dispatch to Europe. It is also observed that as it will be necessary in order to compleat that Ships Tonnage, to dispatch her to Anjengo for receiving the Pepper lying there in readiness, which We are advised would be about One hundred and Twenty eight Candys Anjengo or Forty Tonns, She may with small loss of time call at Cochin in her way thither, for Landing the said Treasure, and Embarking the Pepper Ezekiel may have provided. To compleat the Britannia's Tonnage no less than One thousand One hundred Seventy three & a Quarter Candys are now wanting, and admitting that her Proportion of the Lynn's Bengall Cargo, which as near as We can judge, may amount to One hundred and Fifty Tonns or Four hundred Forty six Candys, is sent down from Bombay, She will then be deficient Seven hundred Twenty seven and a Quarter Candys. Admitting further that She receives at Cochin and Anjengo Two hundred and Seventy Tellicherry Candys, which is the utmost of our expectations, She will still be short of her Tonnage Four hundred Fifty seven, & a Quarter Candys or thereabouts, which last Quantity We are sorry to observe there is not the least appearance of procuring here before the beginning or even towards the middle of next Month, And as there is no reason to doubt the Britannia's return from Anjengo in all this Month, which will be more than time enough to take in the remainder of her Tonnage; It is the opinion of the Board that the immediate dispatch of that Ship to Cochin & Anjengo will be the means of saving to our Hoñble Masters severall Days Demorage, which She must of necessity incurr were she to wait here for the abovesaid Quantity of Four hundred Fifty seven & a Quarter Candys, and afterwards be Ordered to Anjengo for completing her Tonnage and receiving her final Dispatches. For these reasons It is Resolved to dispatch the Britannia immediately to Cochin and Anjengo for bringing up what Pepper may be ready at those Places, and that the Sum of Twenty thousand Rupees be put on Board her to be delivered to Ezekiel Raby or his Son at Cochin, to whom Mr. Jeynson will write a private Letter on this occasion, requesting him to augment the Quantity as much as possible.

for which end they restricted us to no certain price, It is therefore proposed to the consideration of the Board whether it be not expedient to purchase at Callicut, and the rather as of late We have heard nothing from Suamy Putterah, the person to whom private application was made some time past for obtaining a Quantity in those Parts. This important point being now discussed, it appears to us Evident that the purchasing Pepper at Callicut at this Juncture before the price is opened here, would be productive of many and great Evils, more than would counter-balance the advantages We might receive from it. For it is beyond a doubt that as soon as We should commence our Purchases at Callicut, the Merchants and Proprietors of Pepper in these parts would at all hazards and events transport it thither, drawn by the hopes and We may say the certainty, of getting an higher price for it, which would not only augment the price, but likewise greatly diminish the Quantity in the Parts about us. Nor would the Evil stop here, for besides giving Umbrage to the French, who have hitherto forbore to purchase at Callicut, though their Necessities are no less urgent than ours, We should infallibly put them upon the same expedient, which would effectually drain these parts, where by all accounts there is but too great a Scarcity already. These reasons duly weighed and considered move us to determine that We ought to forbear purchasing openly at Callicut for the present; and that We renew our application to Suamy Putterah for obtaining by his means & in a private manner a Quantity of Pepper there and in the parts adjacent, a method We have no reason to apprehend will draw after it any of those ill Consequences abovementioned.

By a Calculate laid before the Board, it appears that over and above Five hundred Sixty four Candys, fifty Nine Decimals Laden on Board her at Cochin and Anjengo, and about Three hundred and fifty Candys which We have in Warehouse to this day, We have still to provide for completing her Tonnage about Two hundred and fifty Candys.

The Advancement of the Season, together with the great and uncommon Scarcity of Pepper in these Parts, which is the occasion of it's being brought in slower than We could wish, or had reason to expect, induces us to seek some other method of providing without loss of time the Quantity abovementioned. The only recourse We can at present have in this Emergency is to purchase at Callicut, of which the Hoñble President and Council of Bombay were aware, as appears by their Letter of the 24th. August last. From a consideration of the large Tonnage to be provided this Season, they were then pleased to allow us to purchase Pepper at Callicut, and even without any Limitation as to price. They were fully sensible that such a procedure might be attended with some Inconveniencys, and in particular afford Umbrage to the French, as being a Breach of that Agreement mutually entered into for the purchase of Pepper, from which We could no otherwise extricate ourselves than by a free and open communication of the Difficulties We labour under. We are the rather induced to turn our thoughts towards Callicut, since neither the Chief and Factors at Anjengo in their Letter of the 19th. Ultimo of Britannia, nor Ezekiel Raby at Cochin, give us any hopes of a further Quantity of Pepper, than what they had then Laden on Board that Ship. Nor have We reason at this juncture to apprehend from our purchasing at Callicut, all the Inconveniencies mentioned in our Consultation of the 8th. Ultimo, the principal of which were, that it would be a means of draining away the Pepper, and enhancing the price in these parts; But as the price it bears here is near equal to that at Callicut, neither of these Evils is so much to be dreaded.

THE CHIEF Assembles the Board to examine the Subedar of the Galevat taken by the Tiger, and the Prisoner being sent for is now confronted by Mr. Richards, who declares that yesterday afternoon about four a Clock he saw Four Galevats with Three Munchuas to the S^o.ward of Mangalore, to which he gave chace, and after exchanging some shott, he Boarded that which the Prisoner commanded (when the others instantly made off) and required his Passport, who said he had none, but that he belonged to Kempsaunt the Hoñble Companys Friend, and Mr. Richard's suspecting that he was one of those concerned in the taking some of the Vessels coming hither from Mangalore, he made him a Prisoner with his People, who were in number Forty—of which Twenty three were Armed Sepoys, and the remainder Lascars.

THE Marcars of the Three Munchuas retaken by the Tiger (which belong to the Canarees) likewise declare that they were seized by this Galevat in company with the others as above specified, who plundered their Vessells and Treated the People very inhumanely.

ANTONIO DE CRUS an Inhabitant of this place, upon Oath Declares, that the Prisoner Boarded a Munchua he was in belonging to Pedro Rangell one of our Inhabitants (which had our Certificate) in his way from Mangalore about forty days past, and took out of her Six Corge and Twenty four Bales of Rice, That he killed One Mucka, wounded Two others & Drowned a Portuguese.

THE MARCAR of the said Munchua confirms the Deposition of s^d. Antonio de Crus.

A MUNCHUA belonging to Mucatum Paqui one of our Pepper Merchants, who had our Pass and Colours having been taken about Two Months past, the Marcar of her is now called in, and positively affirms that the Prisoner was the Person who seized his Vessell and Cargo, and Threw him over Board.

The Resolutions of the Board thereon.

THE SUBEDAR having nothing to offer in his Defence; It is therefore RESOLVED that he with his People be close Confined and that they be sent with the Boat to Bombay.

ORDERED that Lieutenant Fandell, Mr. Isac Ainsworth Gunner and Mr. Richard Richards repair on Board, and take an exact Inventory of her Stores &c^a.

FRIDAY 18 The Chief received Olas from the Prince Cunhi Homo, First Second and Third Kings of Cotiote, Bovanore, Nombiers and Curringhoda Nair, wherein they express a desire of continuing in friendship with the Honble Company. The Third King of Cotiote also sends his Ministers with Eight thousand Fanams in part payment of his Debt, which are received into the Treasury and promises shortly to discharge what is further due from him.

Chief receives sundry Ola's from ye. Country Powers.

DITTO DIE. OUR Merchants still seeming very backward to come and fix a price for Pepper, the Chief wrote a Letter to the French Chief, acquainting him that he designed to morrow to call them together for that purpose, and desiring he would let us know when it suited his conveniency to do the same by his, as should We delay it any longer, We might not be able to bring them to any reasonable Terms.

Lre to the French Chief.

Answer. IN the Evening received an Answer from the French Chief, who says they are equally desirous with us to fix the price of Pepper, and proposed likewise calling their Merchants to morrow to sound their Inclinations. That he should in a day

or two pay his Visit to the Chief, when We might consult on some means to bring the Merchants to accept of a reasonable price, 'though he was apprehensive, We should meet with many difficulties.

The Third King of Cotiote having stopt a parcell of Cardamoms provided by Cunhiseu, on a dispute between s^d. Cunhiseu & his Heirs, the Chief wrote a Letter to him, acquainting him that the Cardamoms were the Company's Goods, for which they had a long time ago advanced the Mony, and that Cunhiseu's Heirs could have no just pretence to desire his Majesty to stop them, which We therefore desired he would immediately give leave for being sent away.

The Chief having this morning Summoned the Merchants and enquired of them at what price they had bought Pepper with the mony advanced them the 12th. of last Month, they answered, That it had cost them from One hundred and Ten to One hundred and Sixteen Rupees ₹ Candy. When being put in mind of their having been expressly forbid to exceed One hundred and Four Rupees, so long ago as the 3^d. Instant, (on complaint from the French of the extravagant price they were purchasing at,) they acknowledged it was true, the Gentlemen then did give them such Orders, but they at the same time acquainted them, that they had already invested all the mony at the high prizes abovementioned. This they unanimously affirm, and pretend that they cannot fix the price for what money already advanced at less than One hundred and fourteen Rupees the Candy without being considerable Sufferers. And as to fixing a price for the remaining part of the Year, they seem very averse, alledging their fears from the great Scarcity, of not being able to comply with their Contracts. Upon which the Chief dismissed them with Orders to bring in what Pepper is still outstanding for the mony advanced them as soon as possible, and that in a few days he should call on them again to settle the price.

This afternoon sent the Madagascar Slaves to Durmapatam, with orders to Serjeant Frazer, who has Rented some Ground of the Company, to set them to work for the present in the best manner he can, 'till We can get the Island Surveyed, & fix on a proper Spot to settle them.

Yesterday morning received a Letter of the 18th. by the Tyger Galevat from Mr. West at Callicut, advising that he had received the Sixteen thousand Rupees sent him by her, and had purchased Twenty five Candys of Pepper at One hundred and Fourteen Rupees ₹ Candy, as also contracted with the Merchants for all should come to that place within one Month at the same rate, desiring a further Supply of Twenty thousand Rupees. He advises that Two French Ships were arrived there from Pondicherry, and by the Galevat had sent Forty seven Coiles of Coir Cordage &c^a.

Yesterday in the Evening arrived Two French Ships at Mihie, from Pondicherry.

THIS MORNING had a Visit from the French Chief, who acquainted us he had the day before Assembled their Pepper Merchants, but could not prevail on them to fix a price, alledging that Pepper was so scarce & dear inland that they durst not venture to Contract at present, as our Merchants had already given One hundred & Sixteen Rupees ₹ Candy at Panure. He hinted likewise at our buying Pepper at Callicut, as being an infringement of the Agreement between us, 'though did not deny but he should do the same in the like case of necessity, & assured us of his Intentions to join in any Measures for the mutual Interest of both our Companys. As last We agreed to call our Merchants together three or four days hence, & insist on their fixing a price for the Pepper, as there is good reason to think that advancing them money with Orders to buy as Cheap as they could, has given them an opportunity of imposing on us by buying a small Quantity at a very high price, with a view of charging the whole at a great deal more than it cost them.

Instant forbid them to go beyond One hundred and Four Rupees, they alledged that they had then invested all the money advanced them. On recourse to the Diary of that Date, it is said there that the Merchants promised to comply, & no manner of notice taken of what they now alledge of having invested all their Money.

Mr. Jeynson & Mr. Brandling, who are the only Members now here, and then of Council, being asked how it came that no notice was then taken of it, the latter says that he was not acquainted with it, and Mr. Jeynson says, though he cannot positively charge his memory with it, he believes it is true that the Merchants did say so, & that it was through mistake omitted to be taken notice of.

On fully considering what the Merchants alledge, and regard being had to the Prizes up Country, which by the best Intelligence We can get has for this Season been from One hundred & Six Rupees to One hundred & Sixteen Rupees $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy, & some even at One hundred & Seventeen; We are come to a Resolution to fix the price for what Money already advanced them at One hundred & Ten Rupees $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy, which the Linguist is Ordered to acquaint them with, and that they attend on Friday the 25th. to Accept of that price, as likewise to settle a price for the remaining part of the Year.

Galevat, & returned the Munchuas taken with her to their proper Owners, and sent all his People to Bombay, where he might apply for Redress.

JUDGING by the generall Expressions & some hints in the French Chiefs Letter, that it is true they have been tampering with Boyanore to impede our purchasing Pepper in his Country; The Chief wrote one to Boyanore, setting forth how ungratefull his present proceeding is towards the Honble Company considering the Friendship which has always subsisted between them, and the Assistance they so lately gave him in his Necessity, that he must very soon have forgot who were his Friends, or did not know who were really such. That it was likewise very injurious Treatment, for had he any such design as to prohibit our Merchants from buying Pepper in his Country, he ought, in regard to the Friendship he pretends for the Honble Company, & the good Offices so lately done him, to have given us previous notice, that We might have taken our Measures accordingly, but that after We had advanced mony to our Merchants in full confidence that his Country was open as heretofore to our Commerce, to prohibit them bringing it away, was such Treatment as We hoped on second thoughts he would alter, and give our Merchants the same liberty and freedom of buying in his Country, and bringing it away without the least impediment, as had before been customary.

SIR,

French Chief
(Lre to).

I have received the Letter you honoured me with in answer to what I wrote you about Boyanores stopping our Pepper, which I told you he said he had done at your Instances. This you are pleased to pass over, and only hint at some ancient Treaties lately revived between you & him, & say that your Merchants have often complained against Colastree, with which Prince as you were sensible We had some ancient Treaties, you supposed it would be to no purpose to say any thing about them.

To which I beg leave to reply, that We have no Treaties neither ancient nor modern with the King of Colastree or any other Prince, but what I am always ready to satisfy you about, neither I presume can you be ignorant of the just Right We have to purchase Pepper in Boyanore's Country, & which I know of no Treaty that he can make with whosoever with any colour of Justice, to deprive us of. Whether the impediment I at present complain of, is the effect of any such, I am not yet acquainted, but be it so or no I must say, that after having Agreed with you on a price for Pepper not to be exceeded by our Merchants and advancing them money for that purpose in full confidence of their buying where it offered as usual, to have impediments thrown in their way in a Country where We have the Justest Right to purchase, and those impediments owing to your Instances under pretence of some hidden Treaty, is not at all a peice with the strong professions of Friendship you are pleased to conclude with, and notwithstanding no Body can be more willing to do all that is possible for the mutual agreement and Interest of both Settlements, yet should these impediments by your means be continued, our Friendship would want a bottom to rest on, and the only one that can preserve it, for without Sincerity on both sides, no Union or Friendship can be of long continuance. I count it needless to mention the ill consequences to the Interest of both our Companys from underhand practices to impede each others Business; and hope on duly considering them, such measures will never be practiced again. I desire therefore you will do me the honour to let me know plainly your present Intentions in this Affair, and am with the greatest Esteem.

De la Bourdenais made with that Prince. By that New Treaty the Old one's were renewed.

You say you are obliged to observe to me, that after having fixed the price of Pepper, & jointly advanced mony, it is not consistent with the Friendship I make professions of in my Letter, to hinder your Merchants from buying Pepper in a Country, where, as you say, you have pretensions. I answer it is no less contrary to the same Friendship to hinder us from buying Pepper equally in the Country of Cheral, where We were Established before you, & consequently have better pretentions than you have in the Country of Boyanore.

It is necessary that the advantages should be equal on both sides, otherwise one of our Settlements must suffer Loss, and it will be that our Union cannot last long; I shall take all the care in my power not to break it, but I have a great deal of room to fear that your manner of thinking is different to mine, since without any difficulty you revive disputes, which as they began, so to all appearances will never have an End but with the Two Settlements.

ENSIGN BILDERBECK advising from Madacarra that one Matheus a Servant of the Dutch Cap^t. at Cannanore is gone to Irrecure to buy Sandall Wood and Pepper, to carry by a Branch of the River that goes to Cacatt, a place within Three Miles of Cannanore. Wrote a Letter to the Prince to advise him of it, desiring he would take care, and put a Stop to those Goods being carried clandestinely that way, it being against his own Interest, and the Hoñble Company's Priviledges.

ON considering the Letter received from the French Chief the day before yesterday, by which it is plain there would be no End of disputing about the exclusive Priviledge of buying Pepper in Boyanores Country, and as Boyanore has already taken off the impediment complained of, and promised in his Letter received the 19th. Instant, that our Merchants shall have free Liberty to buy and export Pepper from his Country; it is judged better not to take any further notice of that matter, but only as the French Chief seems to hint as if We had a mind to revive old Quarrels, & break the good Intelligence lately settled between the Two Factorys, to write him in generall Terms to the following purport which the Chief did in Portuguese. Translate whereof as follows Viz^t.

WE have lately been sounding our Merchants separately about lowering the price of Pepper, but without any success, they severally alledging that it still bears the same High price inland, that it did when we Contracted last, & is likewise very scarce, nor to be purchased but in very small parcels and with a great deal of trouble and difficulty. As they have now very near delivered the whole Quantity for the Mony advanced them this Year, but there was about One hundred & Seventy seven Candys outstanding of last Years, they were ordered this day to attend and being called in are asked when they propose delivering in what is still outstanding, and about the present price of Pepper. MR. WEST in a Letter he now delivers in, says that on applying to the Samorine for the New Olas for discharging his Debt to the Hoñble Company, he did not get his final answer, untill the 13th. Instant which was, That he could not then spare his Secretary, but would send him as soon as he had settled some Affairs he had to Transact with a Neighbouring Prince, but desired that this Years Customs might be adjusted, and the amount be part of the Seventeen thousand Ninty Fanams & Five Vis he is to pay the Hoñble Company on passing the New Olas.

Mr. West report of the Samorines debt Read.

ON duly considering this matter, and that untill the New Olas are passed, this great Debt will not be in a course of payment, We are of opinion it is better to comply with the Samorines request than to defer any longer concluding his Agreement which has been so long depending. It is therefore AGREED that We write to the Callicut Linguist to settle the Account Customs and deduct the amount out of the Seventeen thousand Nine Fanams & Five Vis the Samorine was to pay on passing new Olas, that he receive the remainder, and take One Ola for Four hundred thousand Fanams to be made good in Eight Annual Payments; The first to be in April 1744 and that he take another Ola for Fifty thousand Fanams to be made good out of the Customs which is conformable to the Agreement made with him last Year Viz^t.

TAKING this into consideration We are of opinion it will be better for the Hoñble Company that Mr. Jenkinson furnish the Cask, and that the Arrack go to Bombay from hence in the same Casks We receive it from him; It is AGREED therefore that We Contract with him as directed in the Letter from the Presidency of the 10th. Ultimo by the Harrington for Four hundred Hogsheads of Beepore Arrack at Twenty five Rupees p Hogshead of Fifty Gallons, Half to be delivered by the last of Octobr next, and the rest as soon as possible, and to be of equal Goodness with the Muster sent. It is likewise AGREED to advance him Two thousand Rupees in part of this Contract on Mr. West's giving a Receipt for it, & the Secretary is ORDERED to draw out the Contract to be sent to Beepore by Pattamar for Mr. Jenkinson to Sign.

his Debt to the Hoñble Company, they said that they had no Orders in regard thereto, but would go immediately to the Second King, who is at Callicut, and bring me his answer thereto, when they took their leaves and did not return again, which obliged me Two or Three days afterwards to send the Linguist to him, when in his presence, they dispatched a Man to the Samorine, desiring of him that his Secretary might be sent up to write the Olas; But it was the 13th. in the Evening before the Messenger returned with the Samorine's answer, which was that he could not then spare his Secretary, but would send him as soon he had settled some Affairs he had to transact with a Neighbouring Prince, and desired that this Years Customs might be adjusted, and the amount be part of the Seventeen thousand Fanams he is to pay the Company on the passing of the New Olas, of all which he ORDERED me to acquaint the Chief for his approval.

HAVING deferred hitherto advancing our Pepper Merchants any more money, Money advanced for Pepper. in hopes, as mentioned in Consultation of the 6th. Instant, that We should lower the price, but they still assuring us that they cannot give it us cheaper, and finding by good Intelligence that notwithstanding their not having purchased any lately, it still Keeps up it's price in land, We this day met to come to some Resolution, and our Buzar Merchants attending were called in, but could not be prevailed on to Contract at less than One hundred and fourteen Rupees ₹ Candy, and being satisfied it would be in vain to wait any longer in hopes of getting it cheaper, We accepted of and AGREED to advance Mucatum Paqui & Cobem Allipy, the Two most Substantial & punctual of them, mony for Fifty Candys each, they having near delivered in what they have already been advanced mony for: But the other Three, Nelearate Tupy, Batila Paqui, & Baunibelti Cunhipy being still deficient upwards of One hundred & Thirty Candys of what they should have delivered in last year, and about Fourteen Candys for what mony advanced them this Year, We are of opinion it would be too great a risque to advance them any more mony, especially as they declare they cannot make good what they owe otherwise than by degrees and Annually, desiring We would give them Five years time to deliver in the Balance Outstanding of their present Account. This Proposal We entirely rejected, and told them if they expected We should advance them any more Mony they must first bring in a reasonable part of what they are already indebted, and then We would consider of supporting their CREDIT, and making the payment of the remainder easie to them And as We believe they are not able to make good the whole without allowing them time. AGREED that by first Conveyance, We advise the Honble the President & Council of the State of the Case for their Orders concerning it.

THE Honble the President having in his Instructions to the Gentlemen when he left this place, recommended to them, when they saw it no longer necessary, to dismiss the Guard of Caliquilone Moors who Patroled round the Limits in the Night ever since last July the 26th. for fear of any Attempts from that Cast of Moors, who had resolved to revenge the Death of Cunhi Ahmud, Cota Marcars Nephew; We are of opinion that at present We need be under no apprehensions of any future Mischief on that Account; it is therefore RESOLVED that Expencc be no longer continued, and the Guard dismissed from further Service.

but he not believing that, on the third day sent for the Secretary, who in discourse told him that the Samorine had wrote to the Second King to make out the New Olas, and likewise to settle the Account Customs, but told it him in a very negligent cool manner, that afterwards the Second King and the Secretary having consulted together, the Secretary then told him that the Samorine had not given him any such Orders, that he was not come about that Affair, but only to settle the Customs & some other Accounts & that without a positive order from the Samorine he could not make out the New Olas, at last that on his earnestly pressing him the Second King had wrote again to the Samorine to send the necessary Orders, and likewise an order to his Secretary to make out the New Olas. That hitherto he had not received an Answer, but had told the Second Secretary, who that day was going to the Samorine at Chemelangat, to lay the Matter fully before him, & to acquaint him that We had waited a long time for his final Answer to send it to Bombay, & could not wait any longer.

HE further advises that touching the Seventeen thousand Nineteen fanams and Five Vis, which they want to discount out of the Customs, he had told them it would not be consented to, and that the Samorine ought to have paid it last Year as he promised, which they confessed was true, but that now the Samorine was in great Streights for mony. That he would use his best endeavours to get it if possible, if not he would allow this Years Customs to be reckoned as part of it on getting the New Olas.

HE further advises that the Second King by order of the Samorine, seeking an occasion to take some Mony from a creditable Moor Man of Capattu, had laid an interdiction on his Effects, upon which some Quarrell happening between the King's Nairs, and a Nair of the Moor Man, who was his Jangado, the King made that a pretence for ordering his House to be plundered, which he did in mony and Toys to the amount of Two hundred thousand Fanams, and as the Moor Man is Rich, Fined him Ten thousand Fanams more.

On the 15th, he had dispatched Five Tonys with Five Teak Trees, but the Weather proving very Bad, they could not proceed further than Cody, whither he had sent People to take care of & Land them.

Mr. Jenkinson returns the Contract signed.

By same Conveyance received a Letter from Mr. Jenkinson at Beepore enclosing his Contract executed for Four hundred Hogsheads of Arrack he had received the Muster sent him & promises to keep up to it.

CACART TUPY one of our Old Pepper Merchants, who lives in the King of Cotiotes Country, being indebted Forty eight Candys Fourteen Maunds, Nine Pounds & an half, and has for some time past absconded, this day came to the Fort upon promise of not being detained. He alledges his inability to make it good this Year, by reason of the King's having lately exacted great Sums of Mony from him, but promises to do it in the following manner. To pay the whole in Five Years viz^t. for the first Four Years to pay Nine Candys & Three Quarters each Year, and the fifth Year to pay the remaining Nine Candys Fourteen Maunds Nine Pounds & an half, with the Penalty We usually lay on our Buzar Pepper Merchants of Three Rupees ꝑ Candy, when they are deficient in what they Contract for, and to deliver the Pepper always in the Month of January. As applying to the King of Cotiote would signifie little, and sending People after him into that Country may occasion some Quarrels between the Nairs We should send, and the Nairs of Cotiote, and besides if he is unable to pay now, be of no manner of Service, it is better to accept of his proposal, and he accordingly gave a New Ola of that Tenour.

The Persons guilty of this Murder, according to the Depositions taken this Morning on Oath before the Chief, are John Rodrigues Cochin, who is confined close Prisoner, and Joze de Silva who is fled. THURSDAY 2^D.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Dutch Cap^t. at Cannanore, desiring that as Four of their Soldiers had deserted some days ago, & were gone to Maddacarra, that We would return Two Bayonets & a Sword they had carried away with them. The Cheif took the opportunity to mention the Moors of Cota Colare to him, who as We were informed design to turn Pirates again, and were in hopes of Shelter in the River of Neleasaron, to this he replied that it was true, they had once been permitted to come there with their Prizes, but We might be assured that they should never be

suffered to do so again. On taking leave he hinted that it being the first time of seeing the Chief, it was usual on such occasions to be presented with a Fusee, which not to disgust him, was given him and he went away very well pleased.

IN the Evening We returned the Anjengo Pattamars with an Answer to the Letter received the day before yesterday from the Chief and Factors there, advising that We had sent Four thousand Rupees to our Linguist at Callicut with orders to buy Venetians with it, and forward them with all speed possible by proper Messengers, and that when We could trust the Sea We would send them Ten thousand Rupees more as they desired. Pattamar sent to Anjengo.

AT the same time sent Five Pattamars to Callicut with the abovementioned Four thousand Rupees, & Orders to Francisco Dias, and in answer to his Letter received the day before yesterday directed him on the arrival of the Second Secretary whom the Samorine wrote him he should send shortly to Callicut, to get the New Olas and finish that Business according to the Orders formerly sent him. Pattmars. sent to Callicut.

THIS afternoon the Brother of Cacart Nombier paid the Chief a visit, who asked him how affairs stood at present between the Nombiers and the French, He answered that at present all was easie, and promised that they should always value & cultivate their antient Friendship with the English. On taking leave he had the accustomed Present of One hundred and Twenty Fanams made him. SATURDAY

THIS Evening received a Letter from our Callicut Linguist dated the 23^d. advising that he could not get the Venetians We ordered him to buy with the Four thousand Rupees sent him for Anjengo, nor any Negapatam Pagodas. That the Samorine not having yet given him the New Olas was owing to a difference between him & the Second King, who was that day sending an Express to the Samorine, and he hoped the Affair would soon be concluded, when he would send away a Pattamar. YESTERDAY Evening died John Street, private Soldier of this Garrison of a Flux. MONDAY 4TH.

WE hear from Mihie that Two Ships arrived at Pondicherry from France the 4th. Ultimo, who brought advices that there was Peace in Europe, except between England, & Spain, that Cardinal Fleury was dead. Mons^r. Dirois late Chief at Mihie, and at present Directore of Chandernagur in Bengall is turned out of their Service & disgraced, their present Chief here Mons^r. Leyrit confirmed by their Company, and one Mons^r. Louet who was formerly of Council here and very troublesome in the time of the Canaree Wars is coming to be Second. TUESDAY 5TH.

THIS Evening received a Letter from the Callicut Linguist dated the 3^d. enclosing last Month's Cash account, and Account of Factory Expences amounting to Fanams Six hundred Ninety two. He advises that some Nairs of Beepore having killed a Nair at Callicut, the People of Callicut went thither and burnt upwards of Six hundred Houses, upon hearing which he went himself with about One hundred and Thirty Men Nairs and Sepoys to the Assistance of Mr. Jenkinson, the Master of the Tiger Galevat & the Salamander Bomb Ketch which are lying in that River, the King of Beepore sending him word that in case of any disturbances from the People of Callicut, he could not protect them, and talked himself of leaving the Country, which however he supposes he has no design of doing, & that no further mischief will happen. He further advises that he was about settling the Account Customs with the Samorines Ministers for last Year, and desires We wo'd out of hand send him word whether he might accept of Eight Olas for Fifty thousand Fanams each, which he understands the Samorine designs, or should insist on one Ola for the whole Four hundred thousand Fanams which Mr. West, when at Callicut had told him to get. Callicut Linguist Ltr from. DITTO DIE.

THE French have affixed a Writing to their Fort Gate, to give notice that any Person of what Quality soever in their Service, that is Married in France, the Company (if they desire it) will at their own Cost send out their Families. We are told they find it difficult, as a War was every day expected with England, to get Men to send abroad, and that the Two Ships arrived at Pondicherry brought only Thirty.

TUESDAY
12TH.

THE Chief wrote a Letter of compliment to the Heir of Comport Nombier deceased (as taken notice of the 9th.) and sent it by Amboo Namby who was received very civilly, and with assurances that he should entertain the same value for the Honble Company's Friendship, and on all occasions favour their Interest, as his Predecessour had done. There was at the same time a Messenger from the French on the like occasion, who carried a Present of about One hundred and Twenty Fanams, which We shall likewise give him on his first coming to the Factory.

SATURDAY
16TH.

THIS Evening by Pattamar received a Letter dated the 23^d. Ultimo from the President and Council of Fort St. George in answer to our Letters of April the 25th, and May the 2^d. by the Salisbury, advising that She arrived there on the 25th. of May, and that they would forward the Thirty Chests of Rupees sent by her for Bengall, as desired, as also the Two Chests of Treasure for Anjengo directly from thence, if any good Conveyance offered, if not would send them by the way of Bengall.

MONDAY
18TH.

They further advise that on the 13th. Ultimo arrived there our Honble Masters Ship the Duke Cap^t. Hindman, as did the Princess Amelia Cap^t. Martin the 20th the first having left England the 12th. of January and the other the 18th. of February, who parted with the Montfort off the Cape. They have advice by a French Ship arrived at Pondicherry, that the Admiral Vernon, Benjamin, Tigris, Somerset and Porto Bello were at the Cape of Good Hope the 7th. of March, and enclosed us List of the Ships arrived in England last Year, and of those taken up for India this [sic].

THIS Evening the Pattamar dispatched to Goa the 28th. of May with our Letters for Bombay returned; Padre Alexander to whose care they were recommended, advises that he forwarded them the 22^d. of last Month.

THURSDAY
21ST.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Callicut Linguist dated yesterday, advising that he had made up the Account Customs with the Samorines Ministers, which amounts to Nine thousand Two hundred Forty Fanams and Twelve Tars, discounting from which Six thousand Five hundred Seventy Nine, Four Tars & an half owing by the Samorine on said account, there remains, Two thousand Six hundred Sixty one Fanams Seven Tars & an half to be deducted out of the Seventeen thousand Ninety Fanams and Nine Tars to be paid on passing the New Olas, which reduces that sum to Fourteen thousand Four hundred Twenty nine, one Tar & an half. This he says the Second King is to pay, but cannot possibly do it before November next, However he will allow Interest on it from the 1st. of July, or make a Transfer of it to Three Creditable Merchants, who will pay it in November next with Interest as above from the 1st. of July; He desires We will send him an Anxer [sic] Express which We will chuse, as he only waits for that to finish this long depending Business with the Samorine.

FRIDAY
22^D.

— JULY 1743 —

SATURDAY 23^d. RETURNED an Answer to the Callicut Linguist with Orders in case he finds it in vain to insist any longer on ready money, to accept of a Transfer as mentioned above on the Merchants, and that he finish this Business with all expedition.

MONDAY 25th. Received an Ola from the Four Nombiers, signifying that Narranport Nair had applied to them to intercede for him that he might be restored to Favour again, which if it was agreeable to the CHIEF they would endeavour to make up matters for him, otherwise they should not interfere, concluding with assurances of their great regard for the Honble Company's Friendship, & the greatest Fidelity on all occasions.

To this the Chief returned for answer, that he thanked them for their good inclinations, but as to the Affair of Naranport it was unnecessary to give themselves any trouble, as he had for a long time given great cause of Complaint which in hopes of his behaving better, as he had often promised was passed over, but seeing no likelihood of it, We had only taken the necessary means that the Honble Companys Affairs should suffer no detriment of disappointment by his being wanting in his Duty, and that without the least damage or affront to said Naranport; But as to the Disgrace he was under with the Prince, if they were inclined to intercede for him there, We had nothing to object to it, and concluded with the usual Compliments.

OUR Linguist Pedro Rodrigues delivers in his Account of the Rents and Revenues of Durmapatam from the 1st. of August 1742 to this day, the Balance of which being Ten thousand Four hundred Eighteen Fanams & Ten Vis; Ten thousand Five Fanams & Fifteen Vis of it is this day paid into the Treasury, the Sum

of Four hundred Twelve Fanams & Eleven Vis being still outstanding and owing by Five Nairs & Tivys, who on account of the Damage they suffered by the heavy & unseasonable Rains last Season, are indulged untill the Month of October to pay this small Sum.

MANOEL RODRIGUES delivers in likewise his Account of Rents and Revenues of Tellicherry and Moylan, and pays the Balance being Seven thousand Two hundred Eighty one Fanams & Fourteen Vis into the Treasury; As does Antonio Paes the amount of the Duty on Goa Arrack retailed in our Limits being Three hundred Thirty seven Fanams & Eight Vis.

TAKING into consideration the State of Durmapatam Island, which by the Progress the Maddagascar Slaves [have] already & will make in Planting, will by and by yield a considerable Revenue, and as Pedro Rodrigues our Linguist has not leisure to attend that Service as it ought to be, and as We propose as [soon] as ever the Weather will permit to make a generall Survey of it and enquire particularly what Improvements have been made by the severall Persons at present residing there, & what further advantages may be made: We are of opinion it is better to make a Company's Servant Collector of the Rents & Revenues of Durmapatam, and accordingly do now appoint Mr. Brandl[ing] to take charge of the same with an Allowance of Thirty Rupees ₹ Month for his trouble, if approved of by the Honble the Presid[ent] and Council of Bombay, and ORDERED the above-mentioned Acc[ounts] of Rents and Revenues be entered after this Consultation.

ENSIGN JOHNSON and Serjeant Frazer having cleared and fenced in a parcel of Ground as mentioned in the Letters of August 22^d. 1741 and May the 31st. 1742 from hence to Bombay on condition of having a Lease for Twenty one Years at Four Rupees ₹ Acre which the Gunner has now Survey'd; The Secretary is ORDERED to draw out Leases accordingly; and AGREED that the same Leases be Granted to any other Persons that will Rent any Ground: Copy of the Lease granted Ensign Johnson is ORDERED to be entered after this Consultation, being the Form to be observed hereafter.

THERE being severall Debts on the Books of this Settlement of long Standing, and of which there is not any probability that they will ever be recovered, it is AGREED that they be wrote off under One Head of Desperate and Bad Debts, and List of them be entered after this Consultation; And as keeping the Books in Fanams occasions many mistakes in reducing them into Rupees, and our Investment is all made in Rupees, it is AGREED that the Balance from the present Books be brought on the New Books in Rupees Quarters and Raes, as they are kept at Bombay, & that they be kept for the future in the same manner.

THE Hall wanting to be new paved, as it is in a very Ruinous Condition, and having no paving Stones, We ordered the Gunner to make a Calculate, what would be the charge of Flooring it with Plank, which as it appears that it will be only half the Expence, besides being much more dur[able], it is AGREED that We Floor it with Plank and write to the Callicut Linguist to provide it as soon as possible.
