Gen^{ll}. Letters from the Hon^{ble}. President & Council of Fort St. George of the 29th of January & of the 1st & 2d. instant were all now read, the first serving only to advise of a supply of ten thousand pagodas sent us over land which is since come to hand.

Several Gen^{ll}. Letters from Madras read advising of a supply of Cash & give leave for advancing the price of sallampores.

That of the 1st Feb^{ry}. approves of our advanceing the price of sallampores in order to bring them to the breadth of two & a quarter Covids, tho' they say at the same time it is a very dangerous precedent to advance the price of any of our Staple Manufactures & as for the Succatoons (they say) as they were provided before the contradictory orders came out, it would be very unreasonable to return them on the Merchants hands, they are pleas'd also to tell us that it is a great pleasure to them, & doubtless will be so to our Hon^{ble}. Masters to find the increase of our Revenues & our care in recovering bad debts & order the Persons that were confin'd by us in the Fort for debt to be releas'd if there be any probability of their being better able to pay their debts when releas'd than now, and approve of the reductions we have lately made in our expenses, in discharging twenty Peons, all the Country Musick, & some other Attendants. An Ensign's Commission is inclos'd in the above letter for John Taylor a Serjeant in the room of Ensign Eccles Deceased.

Order us to take in the Succatoons provided by the Merchants before contradictory orders came out & also order the Persons that were confin'd for debt to be released

A Gen^l. Letter read from the Hon^{ble}. The Petition of the Diers of the Right hand Cast was read complaining of an interruption of Narrain & Co^s. in their Procession call'd Surapadma, & Narrains Answer thereto, as enter'd after this Consultation.

Petition of the Diers of the Right hand Cast complaining of an interruption of Narrain & Co^s. in their Procession called Surapadma. Examined before the heads of the Right & Left hand Casts.

Order'd that the heads of Right and left hand Casts be call'd up, and likewise the accus'd.

The Diers being ask'd if that was their Petition, they did acknowledge it to be theirs.

Upon which the heads of all the Casts, Right & Left, were ask'd if the procession and the ceremonies were lawfull, & they did all declare they were, & practis'd in all these Countries, but it was never done here before because till lately the Image call'd Comrah was only of stone & fixt, but that they have now one of brass which entitles them to carry it in procession, being ask'd if there was harm in this Ceremony & if they were content it should continue, they all declar'd there was no harm in it & that it might continue. Narrain says in his defence that as the Banyans refus'd to pass the Procession thro' their street, he did so too, the reasons the Banyans give for so doing is, because it had not been done here before, tho' they as well as the accus'd doe acknowledge it to be lawfull, he calls the Weavers likewise as Witnesses that this was not practis'd before, but they likewise allow it to be lawfull & desire it may continue, being ask'd if that part of the Ceremony in the procession of takeing off an Images head is lawfull, Patcheapa Chittee & Irshapa Mestre saw the Ceremony performed at Porto Novo and declare that it is lawfull to use that ceremony and it is done before the Image of Surapadma. Another Patcheapa, who has seen this proceesion at Tranqubar, says that when there is no room to take off the Images head before Surapadma it is performed before the Danish Secretaries door. Upon enquiry if this head was taken off at a proper place, it is allow'd by all it was. Narrain urges that he had been inform'd by some people that some ill luck would attend the doing this Ceremony, because after Mr .Hastings Dubash had made a great feast of this kind at his Choultry without the Bounds neither he nor his Master were happy afterwards, but upon further enquiry if this was an universal Superstition among them all the Casts do declare not, and thô Narrain makes this as an Injury done to him, the Polligar thinks it none, and does declare it was perform'd nearer his door then Narrain's, but two Witnesses say it was something nearer Narrain's door.

The nature of the interruption Narrain &c. gave the ceremony enquired into.

We then proceeded to examine the nature of the interruption Narrain &c. gave this Ceremony, the Person who took off the Images head gave it into the hands of the Whyachapilla's Son, upon which Narrain fell upon him, beat off his Turband & told him as he took off the Images head he would serve him in the same manner, and at the same time beat him and Whyachapilla's Son, and Arnachelum a Peon abus'd and beat Whyachapilla's son, which Narrain denys to have done, upon which Complaint was made by the people to Ramah Choultry Dubash & to Kitchy, but they did not acquaint Mr. Harris of it, but Kitchy & Ramah when Narrain brought the fellow who took off the Images head to Mr. Harris & represented him as a person who had done an uncustomary thing, upon which he was confin'd till he could be examin'd next morning.

The Dyers & others also complain of other persons concerned in this affair.

It is further complan'd that Cudham Narrain Kitchey, Narrain the Sea & Land Customers Dubashes, and Raja Modelle force the people to give a Braham [sic] 1/16 of a measure in every Basket of Rice, & Witnesses being examin'd, we find that some gave it Voluntarily, and others against their inclination, and because one Nerso sent from Kitchey & the Land Customers Conicoply order'd them to do it.

Raja Modelee the Storekeepers Conicoply is only suspected to have a hand in the first Complaint, but did not appear in the riot and is only prov'd to perswade people to give Charity, but has not threatned them, or forc'd them to do it.

Deferr'd till next Consultation day.

HUMBLY SHEWETH,

Your Petitioners was a feasting in the Pagoda at Cuddalore five days, upon the sixth day when the Idol was Carried round the Street it was always Customary in all parts (as Madrass, Porto Novo, Trencombar, Nagapatam) to make an Image of a man and to set it upon a Stage purpose to snatch the head off afore the Idol opposite to the Pagoda, and when we was a doing the usual Custome Narrain would not let us do it by his house which accordingly we would not, but went and desir'd the Polligar to do our ceremonys by his house which he consented, and when our ceremonys was ended and the head was taken down off the Stage to be carryed away Narrain Kitchey and Raja Modellee these three order'd a Peon to pull down the Coley from the top of the Stage, and the said persons fell abeating of the Coley and another that was under the Stage, & that same time of night they made their Complaint to Mr. Harris & confin'd them, and to all this dispute the Choultry Dubash Ramah was there present at the same time & besides there was the Company's Merch^{ts}. the Polligar and several others free Merch^{ts}. was then Present which can inform Your Worship better.

Your Worship has order'd some time agoe that nobody should allow any Gratuity to the Pagoda nor to the Braminys as it was formerly, but Cuddam Narrain, Kitchy & Rawja Muddale forces the Inhabitants to allow a Bramany 1/16 of a measure for every Basket of Rice, & upon their Acco^t. we cannot Continue in this Bounds.

Your Petitioners humbly Implore Your Worship to take all this into Your Serious Consideration & See us Justice done, and as in Duty bound shall Ever Pray.

The Petition of Cuddam Narrain,

HUMBLY SHEWETH,

That Whereas a Complaint is Exhibited against Your Petitioner in relation to a Cast difference, Your Petitioner Humbly Craves Liberty to state the Case as it really has been for many years past, the better to lead Your Worship into the true Cause of Such Differences which are as follows :

In former [times] there were three Pagodas built and belonging to the Banyans, Permaul, Isfra, & Comrah, the two former Images were used to be brought out at the Festival times, the latter was a small Pagoda whose Image never used to appear, but the Ceremony always used in the Pagoda. Raja Muddale having made an Image of Brass wanted to put it there, but Peddy Chittee & other Merchants forbid it so that Raja Muddaley Carried it to Trepopilore Pagoda in order to be made use of there, but about ten months past Tondaveroy Pilla, Ranganada Pilla. Chelumbrum Chittee with some Dyers having Combin'd together order'd this old Pagoda Comrah to be rebuilt in order to keep the feast, and Sunca Narrain gave leave and 70 Pag^s. towards it and all the Cast gave something likewise and as it was formerly a Custom for the Image of Permaul Pagoda to appear about the town they have rejected that Image and taken away the musick and Dancing Wenches from it and though they were desir'd not to make any difference in the Pagodas but to make them all equal as Usual, and they Sign'd Articles to Settle that Affair, and that Agreement is in Chinapa the Town Conicoply's hands. Notwithstanding Your Petitioner was forc'd to send for the Dancing Wenches of Coteandee Pagoda, to make a feast at Permaul Pagoda. and at the feast Chelumbarum Chittee's son put Dung & Water upon one of the Dancing Wenches heads as an Affront to our Cast,

and they were design'd to Complain to your Worship, but Tondaveroy Pilla, Chelumbrum Chittee, Banganada Pilla & Narrain Pilla begging of us to desist, we accordingly did, & Since that about six days ago they made a feast, & brought their Image before Your Petitioners door who used it with the same regard as his own, and the day after the feast they Carried a Large Image about & attempted to Cutt off the head in the Banyans Street, but they would not Suffer them to do it there, & then afterwards they passed through Your Petitioners Street with the said Image, and wanted to cutt the head off just by Your Petitioners door, notwithstanding he had begg'd heartily that they would not, and they promis'd it should not be done there, but for all their promises they order'd it to be done at Your Petitioners door (it being reckon'd very ominous amongst us to suffer such a thing) I only seized the Executioner and Carried him to Mr. Harris, who kept him prisoner, and the next morning Your Worship sending for them to enquire into the Cause, the Coley reported he had been beat, but it was no such thing nor did not offer to strike him & a Peon one of our Cast Confin'd for beating Wyachapilla's Son they having anointed the Boy with Saffron to appear so; this same Peon Raja Muddaley & Kitchey being kept prisoners at the Fort made the rest of our Cast afraid to appear to make their Complaints. Tondaveroy Pilla with some of his Dyers were employ'd all last night in sending for the Banyans and Oylmen and with good words and threats they order'd them to accuse Your Petitioner for Extorting Rice which is always given voluntarily to the Braminys for their Sub-
sistance and beg'd for by themselves.

Your Petitioner understands they have directed the Petition to Your Worship in the name of the heads of all the Cast. Your Petitioner humbly presumes that many of them will not sign it and begs you will please to make such a tryall as to be satisfied in that point, and those that appeared were perfectly forced there, & Chiefly Consisted in Dyers and Beaters, Your Petitioner submits his Case to Your Judicious Judgement and Shall as in Duty bound Ever pray.

Tondaveroy Pilla & Shapermall were heard to say that if it Cost 1000 Pagodas they wou'd have Your Petitioner and 9 Peons more turn'd out of the Bounds and Your Petitioner humbly presumes there is no President for that Images procession Since the English possesst the place.

Cudham Narrain Kitchee & Arredas that were concerned in the Riot in Cuddalore to give good security for their future good behaviour.
