The Consultation and Diary Book of Charles Floyer Esqr. President & Governour &c. Council of Fort St. David Containing Their Proceedings & Transactions in the Affairs of The United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies Relating to the Fresidency on the Coast of Choromandell Began The First of January 1747/8.

2 Arriv'd his Majesty's Ship Harwich Captain Philip Carteret Commander from the Southward.

Sail'd Ship Essex David Robertson for Porto Novo.

Receiv'd by Pattamars from Anjengo a General Letter of the 16th. Ultimo. Arriv'd the Escape Ketch John Scott from Bengall.

Arriv'd Ship Danbury George Goring & the Sea Horse Schooner Lewis both from Bengall & Vizagapatam by the former receiv'd two General Letters, (Vizt.) One from the President and Council of Bengall of the 17th. Ultimo and the other from Mr. Thomas Saunders at Ingeram of the 16.

Sail'd the Honourable Company's Swift Snow John Bell [to] the Southward. Sail'd the George Snow Thomas Wadham to the Northward.

About 9 this Morning anchor'd in Pondicherry Road Ship with French Colours who saluted the Fort w[ith] 9 Guns to which they return'd Seven.

Arriv'd his Majesty's Ship Princess Mary Commodore Griffin with the following Ships, (Vizt.) Winch [es]ter, Pearl, Bombay Castle & Sloop Bonetta.

Arriv'd a Dutch Ship from Japan & Malacca bound for Negapatam.

that they had come to a Resolution to send hither our Honble Masters Ship Warwick fully laden for Europe by the latter end of this Month in order to proceed with such Convoy as the Commodore can give Her & desiring We would get ready what Advice we may have to send by Her, that they had drawn on Us a Bill of Exchange for 7349 Curr<sup>t</sup>. Rupees in favour of Charles Floyer Esq<sup>r</sup>. & M<sup>r</sup>. Alex<sup>r</sup>. Wynch on account the Estate of John Hinde Esq<sup>r</sup>. deceas'd. Order Ed that Payment be made of the said Bill of Exchange where it becomes due & that the Secretary do Notify that all Papers & Accounts be got ready for the Warwick by the 15<sup>th</sup>. Instant.

[Letter from] Ingeram. No. 3 From Mr. Thomas Saunders at Ingeram acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 28th. October advising that He shall reduce the Expences of the Factory as low as possible, that He has sent the Cost of the Rice for Us to settle that Account, and that He has 200 Bales ready packed, that He shall send [. . .] Us by the first Opportunity a Copy of his Books & inclosing an Indent for Wares & Stores wanting at that Settlement. Ordered that Mr. Saunders's Indents be complied [with].

[Cou]neil of War held.

It having been rumoured about by the black People that the Enemy had a Design to attack this Place which Report increasing the 25th. Ultimo The Governour represents to the Board that He call'd a Council of War that Day of the Chief Officers in the Garrison, Lieutenant Morgan being sick and Lieutenant Andrews at his Post at the Company's Gardens, for their Opinions how to behave in case of an Attack. The said Council of War is now laid before the Board for their Perusal and Ordered to be entered in the Book set apart for that Purpose.

The Enemy from that time have been backwards and forwards to Areocopang with design as We then thought to forward the cutting their Grain, and to secure it Home afterwards; and as they often went in and out no certain Intelligence could be had as to their Numbers, and some Spys being lately taken by Them and severely punish'd it deter'd Others from going near Them on the 4th. it was reported the Enemy had march'd from Areocopang inland & on the [...] came to a Choultry about halfway to this Place, in the Afternoon they incamp'd to the N.Wt. about seven Miles from the Fort, where they remain'd till the next Morning when Commodore Griffin appeard in Sight with the Winchester, Pearl, & Bombay Castle and by the best Advices We can get the Enemy beg[an] to decamp between 9 & 10 that Morning and [gained] Areocopang about 8 at Night.

It is confidently rep[orted that] Mr. Dupliex was with Them & the best A[count we] can learn of their Strength is as follows.

30 Palankeens besides Camels and a great Number of Oxen loaded with Provision & Ammunition in case the Commodore had not arriv'd; They were preparing to have attack'd Us that Morning with part of their Forces at Cuddalore & with the rest at Tevenepatam; it is believ'd They came with their whole Force having withdrawn great part of their Garrison from Madrass and 80 Men White & Black from Carricall. They arriv'd at Porto Novo the 4<sup>th</sup>. with a Design to [join] the Main Body from Pondicherry, but the Ships arriving prevented Them & We believe They are now marc[hed] back again.

As the Enemy were at least seven Miles from the Fort at the time of the Ships Arrival, it was thought impracticable to molest Them in their Retreat, They being at least treble the Number to any Body of Europeans We could send against Them.

General Letters From Bengall. No. 7 & 8. both From the President and Council of Fort William the first dated the 26th. December with a Postscript of the 29th, advising that their Necessity's were so great that they could not furnish Us with any more Money, and desire that We will send Them a large Supply of Treasure when the expected Shipping arrive that they had received the Sundry's sent Them Pahip Warwick but that the Copper laden by the Gentlemen at Fort Marlborough on the Bombay Castle was very difficient of which they inclose Us an account that We may demand the same of the Commander. That it is not in their Power to get the Brown Cloth Whiten'd as We requested their Washermen being fully Employed about what they receiv'd last Year from Vizagapatam. That the several Bills of Exchange in favour of Mr. John Haman & the Owners of the Prince of Orange with what We drew on them the 30 September had been all duely accepted. That they had receiv'd the Broad Cloth and Perpets sent Them Pahip Ship Jenny part of which was found to be damaged and

they apprehended could not have happen'd on board that Ship as her Passage down was very quick and several Pieces were quite rotten An Account of which they had sent Us as also of the Sale thereof in order to it's being transmitted to our Honourable Masters. That they had sent Us a Supply of Rice and Stores on board the Exeter and Oxford. Having complied with our Indents as near as possible though not so fully as they intended. Mr. Ham[an] the Agent Victualler of His Majesty's Squadron having applied to Them for a large Quantity of the former with which They had supplied Him it being so essential to the General Service. That they had sent the Honourable Companys Ship Houghton to take in the Bales that were ready at Vizagapatam and Ingeram, & that it is not in their Power to send the Supply of Money We designed for the former of those Places, they request We will do it as Opportunity offers. That they had demanded of Captain Harry to account for the several Deficiencys We mentioned to Them which He had desired might be referr'd home and there Adjusted between the Honourable Company and his Owners requesting We would send Them a further Quantity of Redwood as they had before wrote for and acquainting Us that Mr. Frankland would dispatch the Ship to Us the Postscript of the 29th, advising that after having clos'd their Letter of the 26th, they had receiv'd Advice of the arrival of five of the Honourable Company's Ships in Ballasore Road, under Convoy of three Men of War, that as three of the former had Stores on board for the Squadron they had resolved to send Them up immediately to Us with a Supply of Twenty five Chests of Bullion which They hope will be sufficient for our present Expences as their own Necessitys are so great as not to permit Them to spare Us any more at present, tho' if We should be greatly pressed & the latter Ships not arrive soon with Us They will furnish Us with a further Supply. The last dated the 1st. of January in which they inclose a Letter for the President and Council of Bombay and desire it may be dispatch'd with all Expedition.

No. 9 From Mr. Frankland at Kedgeree of the 4th. Instant advising of his having General dispatched to Us the Honourable Company's Ship Ox[ford] and of her draught of Water and inclosing the General Letters & other Papers from the President and Frankland Council of Fort William.

We can no further account for this than if those Bales [...] Bengall Presidency had seem'd damaged the Captain of the Jenny or Officers would have objected Them therefore as they were carefully survey'd here and if according to the Letter receiv'd from the Presidency there was no outward Appearance of Damage and several Pieces appearing rotten supposed from a long Damage. We must suppose the Cloth was packed up in that Condition and what corroborates us in our Opinion is that of the good Bales 100 were sold to Linga Chitty who in opening some that seem'd good on the out side were found very bad in so much We were obliged to receive them again. But to our Surprize, soon after found Ourselves by Northerly Winds & strong So.erly currents drove on the Coast of Zeloan near Trancemallay Bay, which by Consultation was found for His Majesty's Service to go in thither.

I do not apprehend I was dismissed His Majesty's Service, the Commodore not mentioning any Thing of it, which undoubtedly He wou'd had it been the Case, his Order being only for Me to come into Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David's and to follow your directions, which (if I was inform'd right) was to take in 3 or 4 Cables that lay on the Beach for the use of the Fleet.

You'll please likewise to remember that Capt. Harry was then Obliged to cut and go to Sea as by his own Account when spoke to Him off of Zeloan bound to Bengall.

That on the 12th, they received information of the arrival of our Honble Masters Ships, Porto Bello, Prince William, and True Briton at Gallee, where they were waiting our Orders for their further Proceeding, so that they doubt not of their being arrived here. and that the St. Lewis is still at Mahie. The latter dated the 1st. Instant, acquainting Us that His Majesty's Ships Exeter and Winchester attacked the St. Lewis the 30th. Ultimo as She was at anchor in Mahie Road who defended herself for sometime very vigorously, but in about two Hours after the beginning of the Engagement, She was obliged to cut her Cable and by the Help of such little Sail as She had left ran under Mahie Guns, her Topmasts being all carried away but the Engagement did not cease till Sun Sett, and several Shot were fired by the Enemy from the Fort, which killed only two of our People, but they hear the Enemy have lost upwards of forty, among which the Captain and two Officers. That Boats were employed all Night on the 30th in taking out her Cargo, which chiefly consisted of Pepper and the next morning She was haul'd close under the Fort Guns, where our Ships must have gone to have done any Execution, however by the information they have, She has received so much damage that it will be impossible for her to get out this Season and that the Exeter and Winchester came into their Road the day before where they were then at Anchor.

That in the Month of August 1746 Your Petitioner received Orders from the Honble the President and Council of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George to supply the Military Gunners & Seamen then & in that Place with Provisions & to lay in a Quantity of Cattle for that purpose which Your Petitioner willingly undertook, and accordingly performed punctually as will appear by the Account which Your Petitioner now delivers in.

Forasmuch as no Advances were made by the Governour and Council to Your Petitioner more than three hundred Pagodas Your Petitioner was obliged to disburse His own Money, in hopes of obtaining Payment, so soon as Affairs should be restored to some degree of Quiet, But 'tis your Petitioners great Misfortune to have his Debt unpaid, & being in most miserable Circumstances, having pawn'd and Sold all His Wifes Jewells and House Furniture to maintain Himself and Family, together with his having been out of all manner of Employ since the Loss of Madrass, He humbly hopes your Honour &ca. will order Him the Ballance of His Account with Interest thereon from the Commencement thereof, Your Petitioner begs Leave also to inform Your Honour &ca. that He undertook this Service with no other View than to recommend Himself to the Notice of the Gentlemen in Madrass, and in Compassion to the distress'd Military Gunners and Prisoners of War, for the Persons of whom they had their Monthly Diet had left the Place to a man & Your Petitioners supplying Them did not tend a little towards preserving Them in Peace.

Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will please also to consider that had your Petitioner not advanced his own Money He could have subsisted comfortably on it, whereas now he is in an almost Starving Condition and as such humbly Entreats Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to have Compassion on him and as in Duty bound.

But to my very great Disappointment Received for Answer that it was only your Pleasure to register my Account to be transmitted to the Court of Directors. And that no Payment cou'd be Obtain'd. untill their Orders thereon; Answers Thereto shou'd arrive from England.

I am now most Humbly to request Your Honour &ca. wou'd permit Me to lay my Case before You and that you wou'd be pleased once more to take it into Your Serious Consideration. No. 40 From the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Marlbrough dated From Fort Marlborough. 15th. October last acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 2nd. September by the Princess Augusta and acquainting Us that they had taken out the Bales We sent them by that Ship which they had put on board our Honble Masters Ship Grantham and should continue Them on board as part of Her homeward bound That they had deliver'd to Capt. Jacob four thousand Dollars, to purchase the Timber &ca. at Batavia & that the Sloop Fanny, having been found incapable of being repair'd She has been Condemned, therefore request We will return Them the Sloop Success or some other Vessell in her Stead as they have only two small Vessells to perform the Service of their Coast, advising Us that the Honble Company's Ship Grantham arriv'd there the 11th. September and was a going to receive the Pepper at the Northern Ports and would be dispatch'd home in proper time and the Revd. Mr. Rider who came out for Fort St. George on the Bombay Castle takes Passage on this Ship. That at Captain Jacob's request they had advanced Him Eight Hundred Spanish Dollars for which they inclose his Receipt and they have laden on this Ship the remainder of the Iron that came out by the Norfolk Requesting We would comply with their Indent by the first Opportunity, as also send Them to the amount of about four thousand 4000 Dollars in fanams and Cash.

No. 41. From Mr. Roger Carter at Fort Marlbrough dated the 17th. October Genl. Letter last, acquainting Us that as the Creditors of Capt. Ultimo advising that they have acquainted their Merchants with our Orders relating to the Investment and are sorry to tell Us that they have but small Hopes of bringing them to an abatement in the Prices of the Cloth, as the Dutch have advanced large Sums of Money in the Country & give a greater Price than We ever did for Cloth of a much worse manufacture, however they assure Us nothing shall be wanting on their Parts to get the better of Them in this Point if possible but as the Exchange of Madrass Pagodas at Uppana is now at 4 and  $4\frac{1}{4}$  Rupees Pagoda and as their Merchants absolutely refuse to take Rupees at  $3\frac{1}{2}$  Pagoda; till We send Them a Supply of Madrass Pagodas or till We acquaint Them at what rate We will permit Them to advance the Rupees they can do no Business there. That they shall take all imaginable Care in curing their Cloth, but as it is impracticable at this time to get a new Set of Washers, they are afraid it will not be in their Power to remedy the Complaint made by our Honble Masters in the List of Investment further acquainting Us that as the Rent of their Farms expir'd the 30th, of April, the beginning of last month they were put up at Publick Outcry and bought in at an advance Price of One thousand and forty nine Rupees, twelve Annaes (1049. 12) and that as two Pipes of the Honble Company's Madeira Wine ran twenty five Gallons less than any of the others, one of which was returned from the Princess of Wales on Account of it's deficiency, they have taken the Liberty to deduct two Pagodas from the Price of each Pipe which They hope will not be thought unreasonable Requesting We will Supply Them with the Quantity of Pitch and Tar they indented for the 16th. Early this morning received Advice that the Enemy march'd out of Pondicherry last night to the number of about two thousand Men Blacks and Whites. and about 8 A.M. received further information that they were marching to the South West. At noon they were due West of Us, and about four Miles distant from our Limits, when some Deserters came in, from whom We learnt they had two thousand Men of which about nine hundred were Europeans and that their Design was against Cuddalore. At four in the afternoon they marched further Southward and by the close of the Evening came pretty near our Bounds, to the Southward of Cuddalore, upon which a Party of Seapoys were ordered by Major Lawrence into that Place and soon after He went there Himself. At a quarter past nine this night, the Enemy made a furious Attack upon the South Side of Cuddalore with their Small Arms. But met with so warm a Reception, that they soon slackened their Fire and by ten o Clock march'd away in great disorder.

18TH.

At Break of Day none of the Enemy were to be seen, and soon after Advice was brought in that they were West of our Bounds and at about five miles Distant, where they halted till noon when they muster'd their Men and found a deficiency of Seven Hundred as We are informed from one of their Serjeants, who was there at that time and deserted to Us in the Evening. And this Night the Enemy returned to Pondicherry. Of the Enemy We have taken Prisoners two Europeans

nineteen Seapoys One Portugueze and Three Coffrees.

Besides which nine Europeans have deserted to Us and not one of our People receiv'd the least Hurt, or deserted from Us. By the Advices We have received, We learn that about thirty of their Europeans were killed and fifty Blacks & that their Dead & Wounded of the former were carried of. Many Dead Bodys have been seen in the Woods by the Country People, and it is judg'd their whole Loss amounted to at least two hundred Men.

The Honble the Court of Directors having been pleased to appoint Captain Alexander De la Vaux their Engineer and Captain of their Train of Artillery at this Place, I pursuant to an Order from the President, Resign'd the Office of one, and Commission for Commanding the other to Him the Tenth Instant; These two Lists being thus filled by a Gentleman of Mr. De la Vaux's Abilities together with my not being mention'd by the Court of Directors to have, or hold any Employ under Them, makes He conclude they either do not want any further Service from Me, or I do not deserve any from them, Therefore I shall turn my Thoughts wholly to my own Affairs, and after they are finished bend my Course for Europe; Your Honour &ca. can bear Me Testimony that I both Voluntarily and Chearfully Enter'd upon the Office of Engineer and Command of the Train with no other motive then to render the Company such Service as were within the reach of my Abilities; which I have done these last fifteen Months in a disinterested manner having received neither Pay or appointments during the whole time.

After the Capture of Madrass of which Community I was an unhappy and unfortunate member; I went to Palliacatt being at that Season of the year a Windward Port, and where many Persons of all degrees resorted also; Mr. Hinde then Govern'r, of this Fort sent repeated Orders to entertain all such Persons as could be Serviceable to the Garrison, to keep a good Look out for and convey Advices to all English Shipping coming from the Northward; In all which I laboured and in many parts I succeeded; untill the first day of January when a French Squadron appeared, and then I set out from thence with all Speed for this Place, and arrived here the 7th. in the morning bringing with Me Mess<sup>18</sup>. Burman and Gray, whose Capacity in their several ways Your Honour &ca. have since been convinced of.

These Things were attended with an unavoidable Expence and rather than the Service should suffer I borrowed Five hundred Pagodas from Mr. Solomon Salomons as P the accompanying Note of Hand which I gave Him for the Money; and which He has since obliged me to repay Him, The Particulars of the Disbursements were put into a Chest on board a Dutch Sloop at Palliacatt bound to Negapatam which made it impossible for me to produce the account to Governour Hinde for I did not receive the Chest from thence untill the May following; I wrote over the Bill of Charges and some time ago delivered the same into Mr. Secretary Bourchier upon his giving notice that all Claims on the Company were to be made by a Certain Day; which I should have done much sooner but I confess it had escap'd my memory through the hurry of Business of one kind and another which I underwent for many months together, The amount of the Charge is Pagodas ... 544 29 76-& Interest thereon from the 1st. of January 1747 ... ... 63 20 24

I must own that I little Expected any Demur would have been made to the Payment, untill the Govern. was pleased to inform Me of it which has obliged meto trouble Your Honour &c. with this Address to request You would please to order me the amount of the Principal and Interest, according to the Account as it now stands stated.

There is I will grant, an uncommon Rate put upon the Travelling Charges, but at that time no Cooleys could be had upon any Cheaper Terms; The French Squadron was pass'd Palliacatte and We were all of Opinion it required Speed to bring Us hither in time to be Serviceable, not knowing how soon the Enemy might make an attack upon this Place.

Your Honour &c<sup>2</sup>. will I hope take this into Your Consideration and giveyour Orders accordingly, be them of what kind soever I shall acquiesce, but let me intreat You not to make this turn out to me a piece of Costly Zeal as I can but ill afford it.

My Business will require me to leave Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David in a few days therefore shall now take my Leave which I cannot do without wishing the Honourable Company all manner of Prosperity, and Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. uninterrupted Success in the administration of their Affairs and to restore them to that flourishing Condition they have been in heretofore;

Genl. Letter From Fort Marlborough.

No. 53 From the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Marlbrough of the 3d. January, acknowledging the Receipt of our Letters of the 19th. August and 5th. October acquainting Us that they should dispatch our Honble Masters Ship Grantham in few days for Europe without incurring any Demorage and that they have agreeable to the Permission they received from Us granted the Attorneys of Robert Lennox Esqr. Certificates for four thousand five hundred Spanish Dollars, payable to himself Having received that Sum into the Honble Company's Cash there. That they are entirely of Opinion it will be greatly conducive to the Honble Company's Interest, to send a Person properly qualified to reside at Batavia, therefore have appointed M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Combes the youngest of their Council to that Station with orders to send to the Coast and their Settlement by every safe Conveyance the Earliest Intelligence as to the motions of the Enemy. That the fanams We sent Them not being of the right Sort, they now return Them to Us with a Muster of such as they stand in need of, of which they request the amount of Six or Eight thousand Dollars may be sent Them as also Copper Cash of the same Stamp to the Amount of four or five hundred Dollars, of which four hundred make one Dollar, further advising that Mr. Charles Hampton is arrived safely there and that by this Vessell they have sent Us four Chests of Ophium which they receiv'd from Bengall, But it proving so extreamly bad And the Farmer of that Commodity absolutely refusing to take it is the reason of their returning it, as they had some remaining in the Place of a good Sort the Farmer chose rather to take it at an advanced Price otherwise the Honble Company would have been in danger of losing that Branch of their Revenue. And Inclosing Capt. Byers's Receipt for three hundred Spanish Dollars they advanced Him for the use of the Brilliant as also their Storekeeper's Account of necessarys deliver'd him there for the use of the said Vessell.

Genl. Letter From Capt. Jacob at Fort Marlbro. No. 54. From Capt. Edward Jacob dated at Fort Marlbrough the 17th. Last Night I got the News and on the 22<sup>d</sup>. Courant about 12 o Clock at noon, Eight Sail of Ships came from Mascareen to Madrass and brought up their in the greatest Hurry. and Carried on shore all the Money Chest & Chests that was on board, and the Chest and Chests amount 1800 and are very heavy and rich, and farther the same Night 7 of the Ships made Sail, and the Talk is they are gone to Mascareen, and remains in the Road a Ship that was taken from the English before called the Princess Amelia and a Sloop belonging to our Company, that is called Cornelia Magdalena that was taken by Them about Ceyloan.

And nothing farther particular but that out of the Sloop, came ashore to Madrass Two Women. Mother and Daughter the Daughter was married at Tranquenomalle to an Ensign belonging their too.

Farther was told and said that Monsieur De La Bourdonnais with all his Riches that he brought from Madrass has made his Escape from Mascareen into Portugall, and that his Brother Monsieur Label bacque has brought one of the Ships to Madrass, & they have detained him in such a manner that He can't go out of the Place, but for what Reason I know not which is all that I have to let You know at Present.

When You have seriously weighed the Representations we have now the honour to lay before You, We intreat the Favour of You to communicate to the Governour the result of your Councils upon this Subject, that he may determine upon such Measures as may best ward the Blow our Enemies may intend against Us.

We observe the Informations of Mr. Spitts, but think no great Reliance can be had upon Them.

We return You our thanks for your Congratulations upon our late Success at Cuddalore and We very sincerely wish You the same in all Your Undertakings.

Opportunitys of Trying their Courage it is thereupon agreed that the Company present the Military that were then in Cuddalore two Shirts Each to the Heads of the Seapoys a few Yards of Broad Cloth and to their People the Value of one Rupee each to be laid out in a Turband or a piece of Cloth and the Paymaster is ordered to make the Shirts with Expedition as also to pay to the Seapoys &ca. as above.

The 25<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of the Honble Compy's Letter received \$\text{P}\$ Ship Scarborough relating to Priests and Popish Inhabitants They having suffer'd greatly by Them at Madrass, who acted a very Treacherous part in that Place, especially when it was attackt. Therefore the Honble Company strictly forbid our Suffering any Romish Church within our Bounds, or any of their Priests to dwell among Us, or that Religion to be openly profess'd and in Case any Papists have Crept into Places of Trust They must be immediately Dismist.

The Muster Rolls of the Four Companys of Military also that of the Train are now laid before the Board, and those of the Romish Religion in the Garrison are found to exceed much the Number of Protestants.

It is well known to every one in India who has the least knowledge of these sort of People that they will remain in no Place without They have a Priest or two, according to their Numbers, to reside among Them and it would be impossible to keep Them here without giving Them Liberty to have the free Exercise of their Religion, and We must further remark that the greatest part of the Topasses have Families here and have liv'd in the Place from their Infancy and are We think wholly devoted to the Interest and Safety of this Place and wh[o] gives Us the greater Reason to think so is that they have in every Engagement against the Enemy behav'd Themselves very well and not a Man deserted from Us at such times when they had so great an Opportunity for it and Major Laurence reports to the Board That in the late Action at Cuddalore They behav'd Themselves extreamly well.

We have two Romish Priests in the Bounds that are poor mean Wretches and one Church which is at Cuddalore therefore are Unanimously of Opinion That the turning the Priests out of our Limits at this time may prove of the utmost ill Consequence, as not one Topass would remain with Us, but would go over to the Enemy who would give Them all the Encouragement They could wish for the When We are provided with a sufficient number of Europeans We will immediately put this Order in Execution, in the mean time all imaginable care shall be taken that the Company do not suffer by their remaining here.

We have not on Papist in any Place of Trust in this Garrison in Case We had They should have been immediately remov'd agreeable to the Honble Company's Directions relating thereto.

General Letter No. 56. from Mr. John Andrews at Ganjam of the 17th. May read, acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 21st. April, and advising that He had had a fine Prospect for making an Investment and wrote to Mr. Prince for some Money with which He had been Supplied, But upon receiving Advices of the Nabob's coming that way, which was very unusual at that Season of the Year and having met with very severe Usage from the late Nabob He thought he could not act too cautious whilst the present one was at variance with the Rajahs therefore had return'd all but two thousand Rupees, 'till He is satisfied He can employ it with Security. That he had acquainted the President and Council of Fort St. George of the troubles that had been there in the Year 1746 and afterwards Mr. Hinde as also of the usuage He received from the Nabob and of the Money that had been forced from him, the greatest part of which he has now hopes may be Recovered. But that We may have a clearer Light into the Affair He has requested Mr. Morse to lay before Us Copys of what he has wrote Him on that Subject. That they have a Report, that the present Nabob is going away and is to be Succeeded by a Grand Son of Annawardee Cawns which will prove a happy Exchange for the Country, and as soon as He finds things so settled as to enable Him to go on with his Investment with Security He shall lose no time in conforming to our Instructions, further acquainting Us that as there is no Washers near Him nor Water for curing the Cloth without making a Tank on purpose, He cannot therefore comply with our Orders in that Respect.

Kings Hospital order'd to be repair'd.

The Paymaster acquaints the Board that Mr. Belsches having represented to Him that the Kings Hospital was in a very bad Condition in so much that when it rain'd it leak'd in upon the People, He therefore had calculated, the Expence it would take to repair the same, by Thatching it, (as at present the Bricklayers could not be spared from the Works to do it more Substantial) which amounting to about three hundred Pagodas, Its AGREED and ORDERED that the same be set about immediately.

Your favour of Yesterday I have receiv'd in which I find myself charged with breach of Contract and though a plain denial upon Oath is sufficient to refute a bare Assertion, yet as I am desirous to give Your Honour &ca. all possible Satisfaction in this matter I herewith Enclose a Copy [of] a Promissary Note given to me by the Worshipfull Joseph Hurlock Esqr. and his Council, also a Copy of my Letter to them from Batavia which will show with how little Justice I can be said to be guilty of breach of Contract.

Give me leave to add that at the time of this Transaction of Batavia, I was Sick and had only one Mate. That Mr. Combes not Complaining to Your Honour &ca. when he wrote by the Brilliant Snow, Shews he thought his Protest only matter of form.

That the very Nature of their Note proves the Latter part of my Batavia Letter, That the bad Weather at Batavia, my Sickness, and the Sloops being ready to go to Bencoolen when I declined it, are facts I am ready to prove. That last June I went to Fort Marlborough and gave the Gentlemen there full Satisfaction, Mr. Hurlock's desiring very Earnestly that this Complaint might pass Unregarded. That I have since paid the Honble. Company near five thousand Rupees Customs at Surat

which they must have lost had I gone with Rice to Bencoolen, that what I wrote from Batavia and do now write is strictly true and what I am ready to swear to, and Lastly as I would not willingly lye under the imputation of breaking a Contract with the meanest Person much less with the Worshipfull Deputy Governour &c. Council of Fort Marlborough (for whom I have very sincere regard) I humbly beg permission to clear up before your Honour &c. any Obscurities that may remain in this Business (if there are any) after which I flatter myself from your Honour &c. Natural Love of Justice and Equity to be honourably Acquitted and proper Measures taken to prevent my having any further Trouble on this Account, the whole Complaint having really proceeded from a Disgust taken at a private Business.

I must likewise beg your Honour &c. to excuse any improprieties in this or my Batavia Letter, the one being wrote when very much out of order and the other in extream hurry and Embarresment [sic]. I am

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRS

After my leaving Bencoolen I met so many Light and Contrary Winds that it was January the 16th before I reach'd this Place, I immediately Ordered Boats to unload my Ballast (because here all Ballast must be Landed under a Severe Penalty) and in a few days had made good Progress in it when the Wind Veering to the North West came on with such Violence that several Ships broke their Cables, the Sea ran so high that no flat bottom clumsy Boats (and such are all here) could go off, and this Continued till the middle of February, and then broke up, but this was much too late for me to get ashore the Remainder of my Ballast Lade with Rice &c. go to Bencoolen and come back again, for all I had reason at Marlborough to propose reaching Batavia by the 10th of January, to leave it the 10th or 15th of February to Reach Bencoolen the 20th or 25th March and leave it the latter end of April. I could not now expect to be less then a Month of five Weeks Later in each place which would Occasion the Loss of my Passage to Batavia in May, and be of the most Ruiness [sic] Consequence to the Voyage for which (and other Reasons) I found it necessary to desire Mr. Combes to send his Rice &c. by any other Conveyance, it being utterly inconsistant with my Owners Interest for me to carry it as was formerly proposed.

This I did in Writing February 13th in the Morning (when the bad Weather was to all appearance as Likely to last as ever) and next day he was pleased to give me a Protest in behalf of the Honble. Company, alledging that my receiving the Promissary Note from your Worship &c. was Contracting to return with Rice and Arrack, Whereas in my humble Opinion it no more obliged me to return then my Receiving

a Note for Money or any Indifferent thing obliged one to Return. However that I might not be mistaken, I show'd the Note to the General of Batavia (whose Understanding in these Matters is indisputable) and He was exactly of my Opinion, I then shewed it to Mr. Harrison, Capt. Pelly, the other Supra Cargoes, Mr. Scot &cs. when Mr. Combes was present and Urg'd what He could to prove it a Contract, when Mr. Combes was present and Urg'd what He could to prove it a Contract, but they were Unanimously of Opinion that it was no Contract on my Part, nor in the least binding to Me adding that had even such a Contract been made as was

pretended it would be ungenerous and Even unfair for any Gentlemen to insist on it's being perform'd when the Performance must be attended with a Loss of 25,000 Rupees on one Side, without any of the least Advantage on the other, for Admitting the Rice to be the Company's (which they did not think it appeared to be by the Note) yet their Interest was quite out of the Question, because the' freighting the Rice &c. might Cost them two or three hundred Dollars more than if I had carried it (Especially counting the Risque 3 or 4 P Cent, Yet they would be Repaid tenfold by my Surat Customs, that the pretence of distressing the Settlement for want of Rice was equally Groundless, because the very day that I wrote to Mr. Combes a Sloop was offered to Him for fifteen Hundred Rix Dollars Freight) And since hired for 1300 that could carry more Rice than the Dutch would permit to go, and as Sloops can lye nearer the Wind, and go nearer the Shore than a Ship, She was the fitter Vessell especially as She would be under the direction of a Batavia Navigator, Who having been that way before must be Supposed better acquainted then I who was a Stranger.

To these Reasonings of theirs I shall add very little of my own, as the Thing is Recent and in every ones Memory, Give Me Leave however to observe that Mr. Comley having drawn out a firm Contract to be Signed by all the Parties, after mature Consideration, I absolutely refused to Sign or make any such positive Contract, declaring that many Accidents (some of which I mentioned) might hinder me from Coming back, that my Interest being deeply concerned both as Owner & Supra Cargoe was Sufficient to induce Me to return if it was practicable, and proper, but as it might become improper by Sickness, bad Weather, long Passage &ca. or Impracticable by Loss of Masts, Privateers &ca. I could not make any Contract, or even Promise to return, All which Your Worship &ca. thought so reasonable, that the Promisory [sic] Note was ordered to be wrote for Me, in which Everything like a Contract on my Part was omitted, and I left entirely at Liberty to Return or not as was most Convenient for Me, Let Me therefore beg the Favour of Your Worship &ca. either to pay no Regard to Mr. Combes Protest or some way or other render it Invalid; for the I never made, nor intended any Contract, Yet it was Necessity and not Choice that hindered my Returning as was proposed, and a Necessity by which I am 1500 Spanish Dollars out of Pocket, So once more begging this Affair may be Entertained Favourably, I Remain,

That I am Satisfied nothing has be [en] wanting which was in your Powers to forward the said Exped[it]ion and think myself obliged for the readiness that has been show[n] to comply with whatever I have requested of You;

That as to the Expence which the Company have been at herein, I ever understood that they had wrote out to their several Settlements for preparation to be made for the Execution of the Plan they had laid down for my Operations in this Country; and were to bear the Expence of all things necessary thereto, except what could be Supply'd from the Stores brought out in the Ships under my Command; and had not I done this, I must have appointed proper Officers to make those Disbursements, and keep the Accounts in such Method as would be agreeable to the Form of the several Offices they were to pass.

That this was founded in great measure upon Reason; as if We had Succeeded in our Attempts, such Conquests would be to the Company and though We have failed in our Wishes at Pondicherry, yet I perswade myself, Gentlemen, You are convinced I did every Thing on my Part, that I was able, to obtain them; and have on all Occasions shown Myself extreamly ready to promote the Interest of [the] Company; And lastly,
