WORSH<sup>d</sup>. SIR & SIRS

The 22<sup>d</sup>. Instant We received Your Letter of the 11<sup>th</sup>. Ulti[mo] which was forwarded to Us from Tellicherry with a Copy of M<sup>r</sup>. Hinde's Letter of the 19<sup>th</sup>. Sept<sup>r</sup>: to the President, the Original where[of] came to Hand at the same time, and gave Us the like Unwelco[me] Advice We some little time before had receiv'd from Madrass of tha[t] Settlement's being in the Hands of the French, which gives Us the greatest Concern.

With this the Chief & Factors at Surat will forward You a Bill of Exchange on Arcot for Rupees forty thousand (40[000]) And You may rest Assur'd that Your Indents shou'd be Complie[d] with as Consistently as the Safety of this Settlement wou'd Permit the Hoñble Company's Interest being every where alike to be regarded; but the Season of the Year will not allow of sending Yo[u] the Assistance You request, at least so as to be with You befo[re] April, by which time it is expected that two of the Hoñble Compy[s] Ships under Convoy of the Princess Mary Commodore Griffin, and the Pearl Men of War bound to Madrass will be on Your Coast, [but] We are inform'd by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Misener who left England 9<sup>th</sup>. April & Arrived here in the Warwick the 19<sup>th</sup>. Instant, that He parted Company fr[om] the Princess Mary & the Madeira & Coast & Bay Ships about the [...] May off the Madeiras, at which Port the Pearl was to Join The[m] and from the Marlborough about the 12<sup>th</sup>. of July off the Cape bu[t] when Our latter Ships were to Sail or how many Men of War we[re] to Come out with Them We do not know.

And althô We do not know where the Men of War und[er] the Command of Cap<sup>t</sup>. Peyton are, yet as You heard of Them on You[r] Coast so late as the 23<sup>d</sup>. August, it may be suppos'd they are in the Bay still, and that in December or January, You may be Amply assisted by them (in Case of Need) and shou'd You be Attack'd in the Interim, We rest Assur'd the Place will be well defen[ded].

For Carrying on the Hoñble Company's Trade this Year they have built the Ship Dragon of 300 Tons Cap<sup>t</sup>. Henry Kent for Banjar, and taken up the Undermentioned Ships, Viz<sup>t</sup>:

We wrote You under Date 28<sup>th</sup>. Nov<sup>r</sup>. and inclosed comes Duplicate thereof. The President & Council of Bengal having thought Proper to Dispatch Our Hoñble Master's Ship Kent, who imported here a few Days Past for the Bales of this Place and Ingeram, & as We are inform'd the Men of War are not likely to leave the Bay before the latter End of January, which Prevents Our sending Them with Safety to the Southward, We think it for the Interest of Our Hoñb[le] Masters to follow their Directions, and do Accordingly Purpose to lade on board her all the Cloth We have, excepting what is at the Wash, which will be about 200 Bales, but We Apprehend that from Ingeram will not Arrive in Time.

Your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>'s. Letter of 21<sup>st</sup>. Nov<sup>r</sup>. came to hand the 18<sup>th</sup>. Instant, and We have this Day Dispatch[ed] a Vessel to the Gentlemen of Calcutta with the Contents thereof.

As We Observe there are 3 Ships still lying in Pondicherry Road, and none of Ours on the Coast. We think it wou'd not be safe to send up the People upon a Country Vessel, for which Reason We are resolv'd to Ship Them on board the Kent in order to be sent from the Bay upon the Men of War, as We doubt not but She will Arrive the[re] before they Sail.

By this Conveyance We have sent 110 Bags of [...] Salt Petre taken out of the Kent and hope it will Arri[ve] Safe. The Syrang has Orders to fall in with Porto Novo, and Advise Your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. of his Arrival there by Peons put on board Him for that Purpose.

No French Ship has Appear'd upon this Coast, since the Month of August, when any comes, We shall not fail of Advising You thereof, & relating to You all other Materia[1] Occurrences that may happen this Way. We believe the[re] will be no Occasion to Place Tappy Peons between Tellicherry & Fort St. David, as the Distance is only fifteen Days Journey, which One Pair of Patterahs can very well Perform without being much fatigued.

It is with Pleasure We hear of the Arrival in Bengal of Our Honble Masters Ships Marlborough, Montfort, & Salisbury, which News has also been Confirmed to Us by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Doucett in the Triton Snow, who left Calcutta the 3<sup>d</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. But His Maj<sup>ty</sup>'s. Ships under Commodore Griffin had not been heard of.

We expect from Bombay in a few Days th[e] Severn, Warwick, & Ilchester to load at this Place & Anjeng[o] for England. We have Pepper & Cardamoms enough to fi[ll] all three Ships.

We wish heartily a Speedy End to Your Troubles, & Success against all Our Enemies, that the Honible Compy[s] Affairs on Your side of India may again be carried on with the Usual Currency & Advantage. We are

We have receiv'd Your Letters of the 11<sup>th</sup>. & 29<sup>th</sup>. October last. The former came to hand the 16<sup>th</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. the latter the 27<sup>th</sup>. of the same Month.

We are extremely concern'd to Observe the bad Situation of Our Hoñble Masters Affairs on Your Coast, but by Extracts of Lres from Fort St. David, receiv'd Two Days ago from Mr. Prince at Vizagapatam, We are glad to hear that Your Settlement was Safe the 10<sup>th</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. and that You had Defeated an Attempt made on You by the Enemy.

Our President Receiv'd Letters from Mr. Hinde, of September Date, one of which came to his Hand the 2<sup>d</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. and the other later in that Month, & We then Determin'd to Send you Succours, agreeable to Your Desire, & had Appointed Our Hoñble Masters Ship Marlbrô for that Purpose & to be load[e]d with the Bales Mr. Hinde Advis'd Our President He shou'd have in Readiness, We design'd Her to Proceed to you under Convoy of the Men of War, as the only safe Method of getting to Your Port, but the Commodore thinking proper to stay till the Medway's Leaks were repair'd, that Service has been perform'd but lately & She is only now proceeding down the River to Join the Commodore at Ingelee. By this long Delay, We found they would arrive You too late for the Marlbro' to be loaded home this Season. We therefore alter'd Our Resolution, & have kept that Ship to be dispatch'd home from hence, otherwise a Cargo must have lain on hand, no other[s] of Our Hoñble Masters Outward-Bound Ships being Arrived. Therefore the Stores, Ammunition & Powder, design'd You by He[r] are laden on his Majesty's Ships, as by the Inclos'd Account, Invoices whereof come herewith, & Copies of such Receipts as the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships have Given.

As We found it impracticable to get Bills of Exchange on any Merchants, or Shroffs at Arcot, We now send You on his Majesty's Ship Princess Mary, Two Chests of Rupees, as by Invoice inclos'd, Amounting to Current Rupees Twenty Two Thousand One hundred & Thirty five, Eleven Anaes, Six Pice Should You have Occasion for more Money, Commodore Griffin has a large Sum of the King's Money with Him, and has Promis'd to Assist You should You be in Necessity.

On the Arrival first of His Majesty's Squadron [in] this River, We advis'd Madrass Presidency thereof, & the Cir[cum]stances of Affairs here; which Letter Mr. Prince Open'd & th[ou]ght improper to be forwarded, lest it should fall into

[the] Enemies Hands. We again address'd Madrass Presidency, un[der] Date of the 21<sup>st</sup>. October last, Copy whereof comes inclos'd for [Your] Perusal, as also Copies of the Manifests of Private Trade, Silver, Coral &c<sup>a</sup>. design'd for Madrass Settlement, so that if any of the Gentlemen to whom they are Consign'd be with You, Please Desire Them to give Orders about Them.

On the Arrival of Our Hoñble Masters here, that [were] Design'd for Fort St. George, We open'd the Packets, & took out [the] Necessary Papers, and have since landed Their Cargoes, wh[ich] shall be duely Accounted for to Our Hoñble Masters.

We now send the several Packets by Commodore Gri[ffin] to whom We have recommended the Care of Them.

We are now Preparing to Dispatch Our Hoñble Masters Ships, Kent, Marlborough, Montfort, & Salisbury, [for] Europe, with their full Loadings; & shall duly Advise The[m] the State of Affairs on Your Coast, as far as may come to Our Knowledge, as We have already done by the Tryal Snow dispa[tch'd] hence to England the 30<sup>th</sup>. Nov<sup>r</sup>, last.

On the Receipt of the News of the Melancholy S[itu]ation of Affairs on Your Coast, & Advices from Vizagapatam of there being about fifteen hundred Bales of Our Hoñble Masters Goods lying ready at that Place & Ingeram, We came to a Resolution of sending Our Hoñble Masters Sh[ip] Kent to that Port to fetch Them, in order to Preserve The[m] from the Enemy, should they make any Attempts on th[ose] Places. The Kent was Dispatch'd from hence the 30<sup>th</sup>. Nov[ember] & return'd to Us the 26<sup>th</sup>. January, with only Six Hundre[d] Bales of Cloth, that were then at Vizagapatam, of which 238 Bales are Brown, The Goods lying at Ingeram cou'd n[ot] be sent from thence in time for the Kent. Since which, Imported here the 27<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, Sloop Fortune, with 100 Bales of White, & 12 Bales of brown Cloth from thence, Par[t] of Them are Damag'd and gnawed by the Rats, of which We have advised the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam, tha[t] they may Recover from the Owners of the Sloop, for Our Hoñ[ble] Masters, what is Usual in such Cases. The White Cloth We Design home on the Ships now on their Dispatch. The Brown We shall reserve for whitening here.

The Gentlemen at Vizagapatam sent on the Kent Forty five Men to be forward-ed to You on His Majesty's Squadron. On that Ship's Coming into the River Commodore Griffin sent his Boats on board, and Imprest 44 of Them, out of her. But has Since promis'd, in Case You should have Occasion, He will not only lend them, but as many more as You may want for the Defence of your Settlement Thirty three of these Men have Sent Us in a Petition. Requesting Pay due to Them from the first of December last to the 18<sup>th</sup>. Jañry, As we are not Appriz'd from Vizagapatam of any being due to Them, We have thought Proper to Enclose a Copy of their Petition, & leave it to You to Adjust with the People, when they Arrive at Your Port.

The Refin'd Brimstone M<sup>r</sup>. Hinde desir'd might be Sent was not Procurable in time to be sent by the Squadron, but shall be forwarded to You with the Salt Petre requir'd, by a Country Ship now Preparing for Your Coast.

Supposing You might be in Want of Stationary Ware, as none of Our Hoñble Masters Ships touch'd at Your Por[t] We have now Sent You on his Majesty's Squadron, One Chest Mark'd Sta<sup>b</sup>. Ware N<sup>o</sup>. 1. Containing as ¶ Invoice Inclos'd.

Your Request, which We hope You have duely Received And when We get Your Answer to that Letter We shall be better able to Judge of what farther Supplies You stand in Need of, which You may Rest Assur'd We shall send You as soon as the Season will allow; & in such Manner as the Demands of this Presidency will best Admit.

We hear that the Britannia at Gallee having been drove about for the space of fourteen Days in great Distress, Occasion'd by a Number of Men lost by Death, & Disabled by Sickness; And the Gov<sup>r</sup>. of Columbo has wrote under the 16<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo N.S. that She shall no[w] want for Assistance; but no Letter has been Receiv'd from the Commander. From the Coast the Chief & Factors were Endeavouring to send her Lascars to Enable the Commander to Proceed on His Voyage We may reasonably Suppose that you hav[e] heard where this Ship is; but make no doubt You will receive this time enough to give the Necessary Orders Concerning her, as We hope You may to the Houghton, if the Commander thought proper to go to Ceylone rather than Batavia.

We are now Preparing to Dispatch the Severn, Warwick & Ilchester to Great Britain, And as We receive any Advices of Importance for You to know, You need not Doubt of Our Communicating the same to Yo[u] from time to time. We are

Ultimo with Duplicate of that under the 2[...] of December. The four French Ships You mention to [have] been in Pondicherry Road, We hear are now Arriv'd [upon] this Coast. They chas'd an Armenian Ship Cap<sup>t</sup>. Vas[...] He the Commander has wrote to Mr. Bouchier. An[d] the 12<sup>th</sup>. Instant Seven Sail of Ships suppos'd to be French were standing directly into Anjengo Roa[d]. Our Neighbours at Mahie are making great Pre[pa]rations to Supply them with Boats, Warlike Stores Provisions, and other Necessaries, & Confidently say [they] will be here in a few Days. We hope Commodore Gr[iffin] may have brought you sufficient Relief from Be[ngal] and that He will be able to follow the French Flee[t] this Coast, as otherwise We may be greatly Distres[sed] for the Malabar Princes generally join the strongest.

We shall acquaint the President & Coun[cil] at Bombay with what you desire concerning the [Bill] they sent You for 40,000 Rupees, & Your Request for Rice, But We are sorry to Acquaint You that the[re] is almost a Famine to the Northward this Year [for] Want of the latter Rain. We hope however some [Rice] may be Procur'd for you at Mangalore.

Yesterday imported from Bombay Our H[on] Masters Ships Severn, Warwick & Ilchester which W[e are] loading with Pepper in order to Dispatch them to Great Britain The Accompanying Packet for You was [brought] by those Ships from the President & Council.

We look daily for the Return of Our-Pattama[r] from Your Place, and shall be glad he brings Us News of Commodore Griffin's Arrival at Fort St. David.

I am quite Destitute of Cash; I shall retrench the Expences of the Factory as much as Possible. Mr. Prince not being able to Supply me, & imagining You might be in the same Condition, I have Applied to Bengal for 6000 Rupees.

Inclos'd is an Indent of what is wanting at this Place. My Journal Parcels & Cash Accounts are all ready, whenever Y[ou] think Proper I will transmit them to You. I am

Instant Enclosing one for Coja Meerza, which I deliver'd to Hi[m] Days ago, He acquaints me that He has never Receiv'd any [...] or Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. Hinde about Sending the Chay Goods up, that He cannot get a Vessel to put Them in, which is all [a] Joke, for the Goods are not a third of Them Wash'd yet, & now th[ey] Demand them. He refuses to Deliver them up to me, so th[at I] humbly beg You will be Pleas'd to give me Directions in [what] Manner to Act, for the Dutch Gentlemen Advise me to A[pply] to the Phousdar, which if I do, it must be attended with a [present] of about forty Pagodas.

As the Season of the Year is so far Advanc'd [it will] be impracticable to send the Bales that are lying at Mad[a]pollam upon a Country Vessel, therefore I beg to know that i[n] Case an Opportunity shou'd Offer for Bengal or Vizagapat[am] whether or no You wou'd be Pleas'd to have them sent.

The Nabob has sent three Dalhoits to the F[rench] at Maddapollam to Demand the Annual Present, & they [not] only remain upon high Batta, but insult me in a sha[meful] manner; The River People also stop my People as they [Pass] & repass, & take Juncan from them, so that I must humb[ly] entreat of Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to take this into Consideration, [other]ways I shall never be at Ease with Them.

I shall have due Regard to what You are P[leas'd] to write about the Expences of the Factory.

On the 27<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo Arriv'd at Mahie three of the French Fleet, & on the 1<sup>st</sup>. Instant two more. They have ever since Lain in Mahie Road, & the French Report they are in daily Expectation of being Join'd by some more Ships from the Islands with Mons<sup>r</sup>. La Bourdonnais, when they it is said intend to Attack Us, but we hear from other Hands, that they are preparing to Sail with all Expedition, thô We do not learn that they have take[n] on board either Pepper, or any thing else from Mahie. They have Landed there a Considerable Quantity of Treasure, blue Cloth, & Warlike Stores of all Sorts, And if they should Depart hence in a short time, We may reasonably Conclude, that th[e] Report of La Bourdonnais's coming this Way

from the Island is untrue. We have no News yet of Our Men of War, but hope soon to hear from You of their Arrival on the Cormandel Coast, & that they are bound hither to seek after the Enemy.

We cannot therefore upon Reflection charge Ourselves with having Neglected Your Settlement. Your Want of Supplies from Us sooner, have been solely Owing to the times & Accidents, And We easily excuse the Anxiety You express for the Unhappy Situation of Your Affairs.

As You write so pressingly for a large Quantity of Rice, the want of which You never Hinted to Us before, We have engag'd the Jenny, Fort St. George, & Prince of Orange to go directly to Your Port, & to deliver their Cargoes to You, which We have Purchas'd at the Rate of 100 Pagodas ꝯ Madrass Garse of 56 Bags, each Containing two Buzar Maunds; for which You are either to Pay them, or to Draw Bills for the Amount on Us. This will be a Supply of about 20,000 Mds & We hope will be Sufficient for You.

We send this ꝯ Ship Jenny, & Enclose Mr. Cradock's Contract for the Delivery of Her Lading of Rice also Invoice & a Bill of Lading for 3 Chests of Piasters & Zelottoes laden on Her, On Our Hoñble Masters Account, which We thought most Proper to Send You as having no other Species of Rupee[s] than Sicca, on which there wou'd Arise a Loss at Your Place. By the Fort St. George We shall send You a further Supply of about 10,000 Rupees more, which is full as much as We can Spare from Our own Occasions. The Gentlemen from Bombay Advise Us under Date the 19<sup>th</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. that they have remitted You the Money You wrote for to Them. On the Prince of Orange We shall send You some Lead, Iron, & Tarr.

The Bullion, Goods, Stores & Madeira Wine, that were Consign'd to Your Coast, were long ago landed here, & Dispos'd of Agreeable to Our Hoñble Masters Orders as they were Extreemly Necessary for Our Occasions here not One of [Our] Hoñble Masters Ships design'd for Us being yet Arrived.

The Owners of the Ship Queen of Hungary bo[und] to Negapatam have engag'd to Acquaint You of their A[rival] and that You shall have the Refusal of that Ship's Load[ing] of Rice, which will be about 7 or 8000 Maunds at the Mar[ket] Price however at the same time they desire You will lodg[e] Letters there for the Supra Cargoes & inform them whether [they] will Purchase it or not.

The Gentlemen from Bombay Advise that [the] Hoñble Company's Ship the Warwick imported there the [...] Nov<sup>r</sup>. as did the Severn from Mocha the 27<sup>th</sup>. following, & on [the] 9<sup>th</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. the Ilchester Arriv'd there directly from Great Br[itain] all which they say will be dispatch'd home in due ti[me].

By the Honble Company's Ship Sumatra & Snow [Brilli]ant We transmitted Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. Our Advices at large [of the] Date of the 15<sup>th</sup>. July last, thô the said Vessels did not Sail [till the] 18<sup>th</sup>. being detain'd by the hard Northerly Winds which Pre[vented] the Commanders from getting on board with their Necessaries [We] take the Liberty to Address Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. by Our Honble [Master's] Ship Houghton Cap<sup>t</sup>. Isaac Worth Commander who Saild from [hence] the 7<sup>th</sup>. May last in Company with the Salisbury Cap<sup>t</sup>. Chris[topher] Burrows both bound for Coast & Bay from which Vessel He w[as caught in] a Gale of Wind on the 17<sup>th</sup>. June in the Latitude of Four D[egrees] North, and has not seen any thing of her since.

Upon his Arrival on this Coast He endeavoured to [go to] the Northward, but finding it Impracticable with his sickly [Crews] Company, upwards of Sixty of whom were unable to stand the D[istress] being in want of Water, was Obliged to put in here on the 28<sup>th</sup>. Ul[time as] well for Refreshments, as to Recover his People, wherein We have given him all the Assistance in our Power.

Cap<sup>t</sup>. Worth reports that on the 16<sup>th</sup>. April the following Ships sail'd from England Viz<sup>t</sup>. the Sandwich Cap<sup>t</sup>. Petre, & the Tavistock Cap<sup>t</sup>. [Thomas] Coates, both for China, the Marlbrô Cap<sup>t</sup>. Smith mostly laden with King's Stores for Coast & Bay, The Montfort Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hanslapp for the Madeiras, & Coast & Bay, & the Warwick Cap<sup>t</sup>. Misener for Bombay The Shaftsbury Cap<sup>t</sup>. Bookey sail'd for China a single Ship the beginning of April, and just before the Houghton left Plymouth, Advice came that the Britannia Cap<sup>t</sup>. Somner, for Coast & Bay, & the Ilchester Cap<sup>t</sup>. Tedd for Bombay were both arriv'd at Portsmouth where they lay waiting for a Convoy, It was also said that more Ships were taken up for the different Parts of India.

The Somerset Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Tolson Commander Consign'd to St<sup>t</sup>. Helena and this Place arriv'd with Us the 7<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo We used all Expedition in Unloading & dispatching Her for the Northw[ard] and she Sail'd for Mocho Moco, the 2<sup>d</sup>. Instant by which Conveyance W[e] sent the Resident a large Supply of Chunam Stone & other Necessaries, the taking in of which and fifty Tons of Pepper protracted the time, or she wou'd have been sent away.

The said Ship receiv'd at Moco Moco Eighty five Tons of Pepper which is Considerably more than the last Season's Produce althô still short of Preceeding Years, and We have good Hopes to believ[e] that the Quantity will Yearly increase, for which End, We have wrote [many] very Pressing Letters to the Sultan. The Pepper of Bantal is also Shipp'd off, and by Our last Advices the Somerset was at Ippoe, from whence & the other Settlements, We hope She will meet wit[h] a Quick Dispatch.

In a Letter which We receiv'd a few Days ago from th[e] Resident of Moco Moco, We have the Pleasure to read that He has [had] an Assurance of an Encrease this Year at all the Places in the Sultan's Dominions, Which We beg leave to Assure Your Honou[rs] & c<sup>a</sup>. We shall endeavour to Encourage & Promote to the Utmost o[f] Our Power, & We are now Preparing to give the Somerset a time[ly] Dispatch for Europe.

That Ship's not bringing Us any Military or Store[s] from England has been a great Disappointment to Us, havin[g] Oblig'd Us to put a Stop to the Selling of Stores, those on Hand bein[g] but a Necessary Reserve for the Honble Company's Use. We therefore beg leave to trouble Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. with a Copy of Our las[t] Indent, whereto We have subjoin'd an Additional One for su[ch] further Articles as We find in immediate Demand.

We have also by this Ship wrote to Bengal; and [enc]los'd to the Gentlemen there, an Indent for such Particulars a[s] are Procurable at that Place, that in Case



Our Indent to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for Bay Goods shou'd not have Reach'd Them or there shou'd be any Conveyance immediately for this Coast, We might be sooner supplied. This Caution was the more Necessary as Our Stock of Rice is low, and We have been Oblig'd to reduce the Slaves, as usual upon these Occasions in their Allowance. The Market Price Continues much the same as by Our last Advices, and We are still Unwilling to Distress the Inha[bi]tants by making Purchases in the Country.

As the Honble Company's Limits are now extend[ed] and the Demand for Salt much larger than ever, Your Hon[ours] &c<sup>a</sup>. will Observe We have enlarged Our Request for that Profitable Article, as We are depriv'd of the usual Supplies from Jav[a] and humbly Recommend it to Your Compliance.

Our Honble Masters in the 29<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of their Commands to Us have Order'd the Rev<sup>d</sup>. Mr. Fordyce to Proceed to Madrass & Officiate as one of their Chaplains there. The following is the Paragraph, a Copy of which they have directed Us to transmit Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

“ We direct that the Rev<sup>d</sup>. Mr. Francis Fordyce take Passage to Fort St. George by the first Conveyance that Offers, in Order to Officiate as one of Our Chaplains at that Settlement We having Appointed him to the said Station, and “ You must Transmit thither An Attested Copy of this Paragraph along with Mr. Fordyce for Him to Produce to Our President & Council who on Sight thereof “ are hereby Order'd to Entertain him Accordin[g]ly on his first Arrival there.

Eight of the Lascars who went Home on the Winchelsea and were return'd Passengers on this Ship, being willing to remain here in the same Capacity, We have entertain'd Them as such, and they will be very usefull as some of Them are good Helmsmen.

We have only to mention to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the several Parts of the Coast Continue in a Peacefull Situation, especially Pooloo Pesang, which Settlement the Honble Company have in Answer to Our Representations upon that Head, dir[ec]ted Us to Protect and ma[i]ntain, esteeming the Pretensions which the Sultan of Bantam and the Dutch in His Favour Claim to that Part of the Coast as little Valid as His Title to Bencoolen.

Having so lately transmitted Our General Advices, We beg leave to Conclude.

Saunders, but not receiving any peremptory Answer from them, and there being no other River but Bengall where She could be accommodated I thought it most adviseable (Considering the Long Time she has Lain here, the Condition she was in, the Danger she was hourly Expos'd to in this road, and the hazard, she run of being picked up by any of the Enemy's Ships that might be bound to the Bay) to dispatch her there, with a Letter to the President and Council, She accordingly Sailed this Day, what further relates her I presume they will be inform'd of from

you, as she may be provided with a Cargoe where She is Gone, on Better Terms, than that She Landed here, part of which has been Wet, I wait your orders concerning it, whether you would have it Sold or not, (it bears a good price here at present) in the former Case, you will be pleas'd to order M<sup>r</sup>. Prince to send me Copy of the Invoice.

I took the Liberty to mention my want of money in a former Letter, Cotton is now Cheap, and if you Could Spare me a Supply of Rupees soon I might be able to do something before the year is out.

On the 14<sup>th</sup>. Instant came to hand your Letters of the 23<sup>rd</sup>. and 25<sup>th</sup>. April and on the 18<sup>th</sup>. that of the 18<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>.

The Severn Sailed hence fully Loaded the 2<sup>nd</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. for great Britain, And the Ilchester at the Same Time proceeded for Tellicherry in order to be filled up for Europe, Otherwise to be dispatch'd thence to your Settlement as the Season of the year and other Circumstances might Govern, of which We have wrote you fully in our abovemention'd Advices, but which We chuse to avoid repeating here as this is more liable to be Intercepted.

The Lynn imported here the 13<sup>th</sup>. April from Great Britain & Sail'd for China on the 11<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>.

Four of the French Ships that arriv'd from Mihie in February Last from your Coast, were at Goa on the 16<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>, where they are to Stay during the Wet Season, Their Prize Princess Mary sail'd from Mihie the 8<sup>th</sup>. April, as was Said, for Mauritius having taken in only some Provisions there. We Learn likewise by Advices from Surat that a French Ship arrived at Gogo in the beginning of this Month, She is said to be 700 Tons & has on board 300 Men, which is all We yet know of her.

What was necessary in regard to the Grabs has been wrote to your Settlement & the Sloop is not yet return'd from Bussorah, She is much wanted for the Service of Anjengo but if She is absolutely necessary for that of your Settlement acquaint us so in your next Advices & she shall be Sent to you.

We observe the Exeter is gone to Bengall, her Cargo according to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's orders to us was to Consist of Cotton Putchuck Pepper with such other articles as are proper for the China Market & the Stock to be made up with Foreign Silver to the amount of Rupees One hundred sixty Thousand (160,000) But as that Ship cannot proceed to China till the next Season We doubt not but you have Loaden the Sandall Wood, if receiv'd, on some other of the Company's Ships bound thither.

By our Honourable Master's Ship Lapwing we were favoured with your Worship & C<sup>ts</sup>. Letter of the 15<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. advising us of the Surrender of Madrass in a more particular manner than we had before rec'd that unhappy news, Captain Worth who had been here for refreshments in the Month of October last & sail'd for the Fort returned again the beginning of January being apprehensive of the safety of your Settlement, as he & his Officers were in Doubt where [*sic*] the Letter wrote by Mr. Hinde was genuine or not, upon his arrival we Endeavoured to send advice to our Honible Masters by dispatching a Sloop immediately to the Somersett then at Manna, but that Ship to our great Disappointment was Dispatch'd to Europe & had sail'd before the Sloop could reach her, after a few Days stay the Houghton proceeded again for Bengal, where we hope she is safely arrived.

It is a peculiar pleasure to us that Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David is still in Safety notwithstanding the Attempts the French have made & We hope the presence of his Majesties Squadron will keep them in awe till you have put yourselves in a good posture of Defence, On our parts we are fortifying ourselves as fast as our small number of Workmen will admit & have rais'd a platform near the North Bastion of Large Cannon, for the Defence of the small road & to prevent an Enemy's Landing at Marlborough, our west Bastion is almost finished except the Magazine the Arches of which are now on hand, & will be Completed as soon as possible, but it is our misfortune to have no person capable of Conducting the several other necessary works by which this Place might be render'd very defensible and which we propose to represent to our Honourable Masters by the Lapwing that Ship is now taking in her pepper for Europe.

This comes by our Master's Ship Bombay Castle Capt. Thomas Browne Commander bound for Bengal who put in here the 6<sup>th</sup>. Ins<sup>t</sup>. for advices and staid to receive some Copper brought out by the Norfolk for Madrass, which latter having heard of the Loss of our Presidency came directly hither in order to proceed unto Benjar, but the Situation of our affairs there, at which Place an entire stop is put to all Trade by the Dutch, who have now blockaded the Port with a Squadron of Ships & Declared that the Commander had orders to admit no Vessel whatever to Enter the road of Benjar obliged us to alter her Voyage & have accordingly consigned her to China with the Treasure & Lead intended for Madrass as the most advantageous Voyage for our Honourable Masters since these several unlucky Disappointments. We have therefore Transported the Copper aforementioned as  $\frac{7}{8}$  Copy of the Bill of Lading enclosed & consign'd the same with Twenty Barrels of Tar to the Gentlemen at Bengal not imagining that the Bombay Castle would have gone to your Place We had also prepar'd our several advices in this View, but Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne having just as We were signing them communicated the Contents of your Letter directed to the Commander of any Ship bound to the Coast and Bay & Desired our opinion we agreed to recommend his punctual Compliance with the said Letter as you represent the want of Stores &c<sup>t</sup>. and as we at present Esteem Fort St. David the securest port in India by the presence of the Squadron but Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne Declaring he could not answer going without an order from us, as his intended Consignment was to Bengal, We came to a resolution to give him such an order & have accordingly Dispatched him to your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>., We think it highly for the safety of this Ship & the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's Effects that he should Touch at Fort St. David if it were only for Intelligence as it is not impossible but the French may have their Cruizers hovering about Point Palmeiras or Ballasore.

We are much obliged to your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. for the articles sent us by the Lapping & the further assistance promis'd by the Sloop, but as we are ignorant what those Supplies may Consist of We have requested the Gentlemen of Bengal to Comply with our former Indent by the Houghton with a regard to their Advices from your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. our said paquet is Committed to Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne's Charge who has Directions to Deliver it to your Worship &c<sup>a</sup> in case you may judge it necessary to peruse the Contents in order to regulate our future Supplies.

The Bombay Castle brought out Twenty Soldiers for Fort St. George which our necessities obliged us to Detain having had no Recruits to Signify for several Seasons past and being Disappointed of seventeen which were Carried to China by the Onslow from Benjar, By the Norfolk indeed we received Thirty men which came very Seasonably for before we had barely sufficient to Do the necessary Duties of the Place much less to Defend it against an Enemy, the Garrisons of Moco Moco & Pooloo Pesang are in a very distressed Condition to which Settlements We must send reinforcements tho' We can ill Spare them, We are also much obliged to your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. for the recruit of Lascars.

When Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne Left the Cape, the Somersett from this place, the Pelham from Bengall, & the Essex from Fort St. David were arrived & ready to Sail for Europe, the Portfield for Mocha, with the Norfolk & Bombay Castle were Detained near three Months by two French men of War the Apollo and Anglesea which Came in just as they were on the point of Sailing & Continued all that Time cruising to Intercept our Shipping but We hope they have all Escaped them they had 1000 Men on board.

We are Sorry Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne Delayed making known the Contents of the aforesaid Letter so long as it has Deprived us from returning more ample answer to your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. advices, which we should gladly have Done, We must therefore wait a more favourable Occasio[n] which We hope will be by the return of the Sloop intended us. We have mention'd as your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. will please to observe in our Letter to Bengal that We shall have upon a Calculation about 600 Tons of Pepper ready for this Seasons Shipping Exclusive of what Sent home on the Lapping.

Inst. arrived with us the 21<sup>st</sup>. following whom we now send back to acquaint you we have come to a resolution to remit you if possible by Bills on Arcot to the amount of the Eight Chests of foreign Silver which you requested tho' if we are not able to procure them we have no view of hiring a Vessel at this place to Serve your occasions or can we Send the Seamen belonging to the Europe Ships unless a Conveyance offers accidentally in which Case you may depend on our Compliance.

On the 18<sup>th</sup>. Inst. a Sloop arrived at Mahie who had Six Europeans and a few Lascars in her, they gave out that she Came from Goa, but we are sure she Came from the Mauritius, Several of their people we Learn't died in their passage for want of water & Provisions.

On the 21<sup>st</sup>. Instant a snug Ship of Thirty Guns & about 120 Europeans arrived likewise there, who gave out she Came from Mocha but We imagine she Came from the Islands, and may be one of the Fleet of Twelve Ships which they give out they expect from thence she has as yet Landed nothing but a packet which was forwarded by them to Goa, being as we suppose Directions to the Commanders of the four men of war of their's now wintering there, who we hear have Lost a considerable part of their Men & are not in a good Condition for the Sea.



Enclosed you will receive a Letter For Commodore Griffin from the Viceroy of Goa which pray forward to him as soon as possible & return us this Pattamar with such Advices as you may have to Communicate as we are very anxious to Learn your Proceedings.

This Pattamar told us that he met the Seepoys we sent you in his way hither, within Two Days march of your Place.

July that we should give all necessary Encouragem<sup>t</sup>. for getting to you a Large supply of rice we have Contracted with the Owners of Ship Jenny for 3500 Bags more or Less & Enclos'd send you Copy of the Owners Contract by which you will observe the Terms which we were oblig'd to Come to with them with regard to unloading the Ship which if not perform'd in 12 Days after her arrival the rice rem<sup>g</sup>. on board to be on the Company's acct<sup>t</sup>.

On this Ship We have Laden 32 Bales of Gunnies on our Honible Master's acct<sup>t</sup>. Invoice & Bill of Lading for the same are enclos'd.

By our Honourable Master's Ship Bombay Castle We wrote your Worship & C<sup>t</sup>. a Letter in Acknowledgement of the several Supplies receiv'd by the Lapwing, & in Answer to your Letter by that Ship We have since been favour'd with your's of the 23<sup>rd</sup>. May by the Fanny Sloop Enclosing Duplicates of the Lapwing's Pacquet with Invoice and other papers mention'd in the List.

We are sorry to acquaint your Worship & C<sup>a</sup>. that the Rice by the said Sloop proves so very bad, that We beleive We shall find much Difficulty to make even our Slaves receive it A great part being rotten & Clotted together the Gue was also in a bad Condition & the Gunny Bags so much spoil'd & indifferent that they will be of little Service to us We Call'd upon the master of the Sloop to know how this Damage arose, who acquaints us that the rice rec'd no hurt on board the Sloop, that the Gue had water mixt with it which rotted the Bottoms of the Duppens, & occasion'd great Leakage, & that the Gunny Bags being stow'd upon the Oyl Jars under the Gue, rec'd the greatest part of their Damage from the said Leakage, tho' they were not new when put on board.

As a proof of the excessive badness of the rice We have sent your Worship & C<sup>t</sup>. a Bag taken promiscuously from among the whole Quantity which we beleive will sufficiently convince you that we do not Complain without reason, we also find upon Examination in the presence of the Master of the Sloop that above one half of the Duppens of Gue were gnaw'd by the rats & the holes stopt up with straw & Trash, which he Declares are in the very same Condition in which he received them. & for your further Satisfaction we have Enclos'd a Copy of the Storekeeper's Report.

The Rice by the Lapwing was very little better & upon the whole we cannot help concluding that the black fellows who had the Care of shipping these articles on board have greatly impos'd upon your Worship & C<sup>t</sup>. which We are the more inclinable to think as the Master of the Sloop acquaints us you intended us some of the best Rice that could be got.

We must therefore request that your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. will give orders to have all future Supplies well examin'd before they are sent off, for it is not only a great Disappointment to us but a manifest Loss to the Honourable Company, by bringing a Charge upon this Settlement for things that are not fit for use not to mention the Expences of freight & Boat hire.

We cannot yet advise your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. of the Outturn of the Salt, as we have not Godown room to measure it off, enclos'd you will please to receive an Indent for what further articles We shall stand in need of.

By the Houghton as your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. will observe in our Letter to Bengal by the Bombay Castle which We refer'd to your Perusal, We have indented pretty fully to the Gentlemen, especially for that material article rice, & as the uncertainty of affairs at that Juncture render'd even those Expectations doubtful, We empower'd Mr. John Massey, who was sent to Batavia in April last to purchase a Quantity to be brought hither by the Storeship or any other Conveyance that might offer which was a necessary precaution, as our Crops of paddy have lately prov'd but very indifferent, & it would distress the Mallays a good deal should we make any considerable purchases here.

The Loss of Madrass added to the uncertain Situation of Affairs in India & the anxiety we were under for the safety of Fort St. David's & Bengal having rec'd no advices from either Settlement, induc'd us to send Mr. Massey to Batavia for Intelligence, but as We had no news of his arrival when the Bombay Castle sail'd We began to be apprehensive that some Accident had befallen him.

A few days after that ship sail'd the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. rec'd a Letter from him by a China Prow wherein he makes no Mention of any French Ships in those Parts, Confirms what We wrote your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. relating to the Affairs of Benjar, but does not mention any other news of Importance, except that by a Dutch Ship lately arriv'd from the Cape he heard that the hoñble Company's Snow had touch'd there with advices for some of the Settlements.

As our chief Intentions in sending Mr. Massey to Batavia were to procure Intelligence, We directed him in our Instructions to Continue there till the Latter end of this Month, before which Time in all probability our Storeship may arrive & the outward bound China Ships have either touch'd there or pass'd by unless some Accident should intervene, in Case we may receive any extraordinary news from that Quarter hereafter We shall send your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. immediate advice of it, & in the mean Time shall take the first opportunity to forward your Letter to that Place recommended to the Care of Mr. Massey or some proper person to Deliver it to the Commander of any Ship bound your way.

The news of the Surrender of Madrass & the uncertainty We Labour'd under for want of Advices gave us some uneasiness for the safety of this Settlement. In our Enclos'd Letter we mention'd to your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. the weakness of our Garrison which could make but a very poor defence against a European Enemy, & our greatest dependance lays upon our hopes that the French will not think it worth their while to meddle with us, We are sure did they know our Circumstances they would not, because the Plunder they might Expect to get would be very trivial & they could never be induc'd to keep the place from any Expectations of a Trade with the Natives who are indigent lazy treacherous People, & it is with the greatest Difficulty even We who have resided so long among them can keep them to their buziness, The Quantity of Pepper in our Godowns at Fort Marlbro' is very small & collected with great Trouble, the most of the Produce being brought in at the several out Residencies along the Coast about the Time of the Europe Ship's arrival, and that Vessel sent to receive it in small Parcels which is attended with much Expence & Delay.

As to the Hoñble Company's Cash it is at present very low & most of the Inhabitants who have any Effects to Lose have taken the opportunity of a Dutch Vessel which brought us a small supply of Rice, Arrack & Salt to secure them at Batavia & elsewhere, so that the French would never find it answer their Ends, even were they to succeed in their attempt.

We are nevertheless making the best preparations we are able for our Defence, & as we cannot at this Juncture expect any Reinforcem<sup>t</sup>. from your Coast of Europeans We should be glad your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. could provide us with about two hundred good able Peons of the Gentoo Cast, who would be very serviceable at all

Times & much more trusty than our Bugguesses, who, though reported to be good Soldiers in a foreign Country when apart from the Mallays yet here soon contract their indolent Disposition, & little or no Dependance can be plac'd upon them, as they are by being Mahometans attach'd to the Mallays upon a religious acct.

We at present are in perfect Peace with the Country about us which We shall Endeavour to preserve to the utmost of our power.

The Lapwing was dispatch'd from hence the 5<sup>th</sup>. Inst. with fifty eight Tons of Pepper being all she Could take in, the Bombay Castle sail'd for Fort St. David the 2<sup>nd</sup>. & the Norfolk for China the 1<sup>st</sup>. of this Month.

Agreeable to your Worship &c<sup>ts</sup>. Inclinations, We have Directed the Master of this Sloop to proceed to Galle & to follow the Orders he may find lodged there for him, or in case he should miss that Place to go on to Trancomally, We have also taken the Opportunity to forward 50 Tons of the Iron brought out by the Norfolk for Madrass, amounting as  $\text{₹}$  Invoice & Bill of Lading. enclos'd to  $\text{₹}$  2870 being y<sup>e</sup>. whole.

Upon the Norfolk's arrival We open'd the Pacquet for Fort St. George, & observing by the general Letter, that the Honourable Company were inclinable to Encourage the Importation of ordinary Teas at Madrass, We in our Instructions to the Factors of the said Ship directed them to prevail with any Armenians or Macao Ships to import such Sortments either at Fort St. David or this Place upon the Terms mention'd therein imagining it would be equally acceptable to their Honours as Madrass is no longer in being We have therefore Enclos'd to your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. a Copy of the said Letter in case they should be able to make any such agreement.

We have rec'd of Mr. Hamilton the amount of his Respondentia Bond & given due Credit for the same.

Some time ago We wrote to the President & Council of Fort St. George for a parcel of Fanams single double & treble to Disperse among the Mallays which will be of acceptable Service as We cannot procure hardly any of the round Estimates, if your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. can therefore supply us with about four thousand Dollars enough of these Sorts, We request you will do it by the first Conveyance, as well as with about five hundred Dollars worth of Copper Cash, such as the Malabars & Moors call Bencoolen Cash.

The Reverend Mr. Ryder whom the honourable Court appointed one of the Chaplains of Fort St. George & came out by the Bombay Castle being desirous to Continue upon our Establishm<sup>t</sup>. till affairs are a little more settled, We have Entertain'd him, as we had no Gentlemen of that Cloth amongst us.

With regard to the vacant Lieutenant's Commission We had made no recommendation of any Person in our general Letter to Madrass as We expected the President & Council there would have made the appointm<sup>t</sup>. & as the Vacancy is also represented to the HONOURABLE COURT We Chuse to refer giving any Commission till the arrival of our Storeship when probably We may receive orders on that head.

The Attorneys of Robert Lenox Esq<sup>r</sup>. having some Money belonging to him in their hands desir'd we would receive the same & grant Certificates for the amount to your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. but We have Excus'd ourselves from it as you mention'd a want of money in your Letter communicated to us by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne, besides we did not judge it consistent with our Master's Intrest at this Juncture to grant Bills when we are in so uncertain a Situation & this partly induc'd the Inhabitants to send their little matters to Batavia as aforementioned, but if it is convenient to your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. to accept such Certificates upon the like occasion We request you will acquaint us by the next opportunity.

Our general packet to your Worship & c<sup>t</sup>. by the Sloop Fanny was dated the 16<sup>th</sup>. Inst. but the winds proving Northerly the whole Quantity of Iron did not get on board till the 17<sup>th</sup>. when she sail'd for Point Galle, & we were in hopes would have met with a very favourable Passage, the said Sloop to our great Surprize return'd the Evening of the 24<sup>th</sup>. in a very leaky Condition as your Worship & c<sup>a</sup>. will please to observe by the enclos'd Papers, & in no Capacity to perform the Voyage, We immediately upon her arrival sent a Pilot on board to Conduct her into Pooloo Bay, & an order to the Master of the honourable Company's Sloop Success to receive the Iron from her & to prepare to pursue the said Voyage, in Case the Fanny upon a Survey which We caus'd to be taken the next day was found incapable of proceeding, We were much concern'd at this accident, as the Season is now far advanc'd & as your Worship & c<sup>t</sup>. would be undoubtedly under much uneasiness, was any miscarriage to Deprive you of Advices from this Coast which is now even hazardous & might in all probability be the Case were we to have waited the repairing of the Fanny, the said Sloop's upper works are in a very bad Condition several of her Timbers rotten, her Sails not trust worthy & the Persons who survey'd her of opinion she could not be refitted in Less time than six Weeks as will appear by the Copy of their report under Cover, besides as the only place We have for refitting Vessels is Pooloo, & in want of proper Workmen We could lay no Dependance upon their Diligence.

For these Reasons We now Dispatch the Sloop Success which Vessel was lately purchas'd in the room of the Brilliant with our general packet to your Worship & c<sup>t</sup>. & 1200 Bars of Iron which is all she could conveniently take in the Command of her is given to Mr. Hamilton having first Exchang'd his Sloop's Crews with orders to follow punctually his former Directions.

The said Sloop is in very good order & but lately new sheath'd, We shall directly cause the Fanny to be repair'd in the best manner We possibly can & keep her ready to send your Worship & c<sup>t</sup>. if necessary, in the mean time she will be Employ'd in the Service of our Coast.

And that nothing might retard the Success's departure We have made no alterations in our former Pacquet. We are

We are in equal Expectation with you of the arrival of some of our honourable Master's outward bound Ships to supply us with money which at present is so scarce with us that we have not sufficient for our necessary Expences so that we

have no hopes of being able to Supply you as you Desire in August, but must repeat our Desire that if any of our hoñible Master's Ships fall in at your Settlem<sup>t</sup>. that you will send us all the money you can spare otherwise our Investment must suffer greatly, & let all the money you send be in Arcot Rupees if possible.

Agreeable to your Desire we shall supply the West Coast with the Stores they indent for by a Country Ship design'd to sail hence in Aug<sup>t</sup>.

We are sorry to Learn that you think your Garrison so weak notwithstanding the Supplies you have rec'd from Bombay & want no Incitem<sup>ts</sup>. to send you all the Assistance in our power, & have Come to a resolution of sending our Hoñible Master's Ship Princess of Wales with the Stores you have wrote for & as many of our Military as we can Engage to go willingly & for that Purpose have promis'd a Gratuity, for our Place is so open both to the Land & river that should we Attempt to force them they would certainly desert us as was found to be the Case, when we wanted to supply the Squadron till We promis'd that no force should be used & there the Deserters return'd however you may be assur'd We will send you all We can.

The Private Trade from the Phazee Salam has been landed here.

The Morattoes have built Barracks between Midnap[ore] and Ballasore & seem determin'd to pass the rains here which We fear will be a great Impedim<sup>t</sup>. to the Trade of the Country.

NOBLE SIR & SIRs

By your much esteem'd favour of the 14<sup>th</sup>. August O.S. We are acquainted with the Request of your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. for levelling the Factory house at Tevenepatam belonging to the United Company of Netherlands India, for the many Reasons & Motives specified in your said favour, in Answer to which We have the honour to Acquaint your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. that the same motives that Induce you to use all proper Measures for the preservation of Fort St. David oblige us to maintain our Right & Property in the said Factory which We can by no means give up without an especial Order from our Superiours at Batavia it being a matter of too great Importance for us to determine on, We cannot imagine or Beleive that the French will unjustly make use of the abovesaid Factory belonging to a Neutral power as a Means to Destroy your Fort, but should they Design such a thing We shall take all proper Cautions to prevent it, therefore we Desire that your. Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. will be pleas'd not to insist any farther, upon Levelling the Factory, for tho' as you say self preservation be the first Law of Nature, yet that cannot Extend to the property of another neither can you Encroach upon our Rights without Breach of Contract, & if your Worship &c<sup>t</sup>. do intend any thing in prejudice of the said Factory or it's Appurtenances We shall be obliged to protest against such a proceeding in the name of our high Superiours & the General & Council of the Netherlands India at Batavia, & hereby We do protest against it in all due form, as We cannot take upon us to be answerable for the Consequences that may attend such a proceeding.

Enclos'd you will receive a monthly acc<sup>t</sup>. of Provisions to be allow'd the Officers & Seepoys we sent you or otherwise please to Pay them conformable to the acc<sup>t</sup>. Diet money we Transmitted it being our Bargain with them & the easiest Terms we Could prevail on them to Accept, & altho' we are sensible their Demands were very Extravagant, yet from the Situation of our Honible Master's Affairs on your side, & the strenuous manner in which the Commodore & M<sup>r</sup>. Floyer wrote to us to send assistance & spare no Cost we Complied as punctually as we Could with your requests & will hereafter Endeavour to make up the number of Men you Desire.

The five French Ships are still at Goa & the Ship & Brigantine which were at Mahie when we wrote you last sail'd from thence a few days ago standing to the Southward but where they are bound we cannot Learn.

We shall do all that Lyes in us to preserve a good Understanding with the Country Government but We have such daily Instance of the mercenary Disposition both of the Moors & Gentues that the Friendship of either is but Little to be depend on.

Copies of the several papers taken out of the Ship Oxford's Packet (the originals of which were sent you overland) come herewith, We also Inclose Capt. Harry's bill of Lading for 12 Pipes of Madeira wine, as he had not Room for more, We thought proper to Land from the Ship Fort St. George 300 Bags of Rice, having been inform'd it was Contracted for on the Company's account and have put on board the said Ship 20 pipes more, this we hope you will approve of rather than to have had it remain here till Dec<sup>r</sup>. when We shall send up the Rice upon the first Conveyance that offers.

We have taken 4 pipes of the Madeira for which we shall be accountable as soon as you are pleas'd to inform us of the price & by the first opportunity we shall send the remaining four.

We have put on board this Ship Eight French Deserters also 20 Recruits that were Left by the Oxford, & enclos'd is a List of their names Eleven are sick in the Hospitall & four died in the passage which makes up the number mention'd in the List from England.

The Ship Success who was taken up at Fort St. David in February last on the hoñble Company's account, being now return'd from Bengal, & Mr. Saunders her Owner having at that Time appointed Mr. Hinde & myself to Negotiate her Affairs and since desir'd me to Continue it, I humbly beg Leave as his Agent herein to Lay before you that by the Contract made with the Council at Fort St. David she is still in the hoñble Company's Employ, & that having unfortunately sprung a Leak in her Passage to St. David's with the Cargo of Grain which you had put on board for the Honourable Company, she was forc'd to unlade it at Ganjam & go to refit at Bengal in order to return to Ganjam & reload it in August but Mr. Saunders' Attorneys there after having petition'd the President & Council of Fort William to no purpose to Load her for the hoñble Company thought it better to put some Grain on board for her Owners than to Let her proceed thus far empty, now these things & it's being late in the Season duely consider'd Encourage me humbly to propose for your Deliberation whether it will not be better to Let the said Ship Success proceed directly without Loss of time for St. David's with the Grain that is now on board upon the honourable Company's account rather than to Detain her here in unloading it & then to send her to Ganjam to take in the Company's Grain lying there, & this the rather because on the 31<sup>st</sup>. of last Month I receiv'd a Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. John Andrews Resident there dated the 26<sup>th</sup>. Aug<sup>t</sup>. wherein he says.

My reason for waiting your orders concerning my Accounts was that as soon as Fort St. David was out of Danger by the Repulse of the French & Expectation of our Squadron, I wrote Mr. Hinde that if he thought proper I would send them but receiv'd no Answer, & Mr. Prince informing me he had done the same but receiving no orders had not sent his, wherefore I have for several months sent mine to Vizagapatam & shall as soon as possible transmit them to you.

Prince that having receiv'd no Answer to the several Letters I had wrote you about the Success's Cargo, I was at a Loss what to do, that a Little of the Grain was rotten when it came ashore & a good part of it wet that I thought it was better to sell it, that as the price of Grain was here at that time I beleiv'd I could make the money for it, but when I receiv'd their Answer to do so, was greatly disappointed, the Invoice running much higher than I expected & Natchany & other small Grains coming in, having Lower'd the price here, nevertheless I have begun to sell it, as I am still of opinion it's the best way so to do, because if you don't approve of the amount of the Sales, the money will always put the same Quantity of new Grain in it's place in December.
