POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Secretary of State for India to the Governor General of India, dated 18 July (No. 6) 1863.

I ENCLOSE herewith copy of a Return ordered by the House of Commons in the Session of 1861, but which I have not hitherto been able to furnish owing to the deficiency of necessary information on the records of this office; and I have to request that your Excellency's Government will forward to me a detailed statement of the annual amounts paid to the several persons indicated by the Return, and of any changes which may have taken place in the pecuniary provision made for them since they first became stipendiaries of the British Government.

Your Lordship, however, may perhaps be doubtful as to the particular class of persons indicated by the term "Native Princes." I am myself somewhat uncertain with respect to the precise intent of the motion; but it would appear from the context that the words "Native Princes" are intended to describe only such persons as have had, or whose ancestors have had, treaty engagements with the British Government, and whose pensions or allowances are granted to them in consideration of territorial rights ceded to or assumed by that Government.

As I am anxious to lay this Return before Parliament at the commencement of next Session, I have to request that your Excellency will furnish me with the desired information with the least possible delay.

These pensions were originally granted by the Commissioners for the settlement of the late Tippoo Sultan's dominions after the capture of Seringsapatam in May 1799 though there was no express provision to this effect, they were afterwards continued to the descendants of the original grantees until a few years ago, when the lapsed pensions reverted to Government in accordance with instructions from the late Court of Directors

The property of Tippoo Sultan was declared to be forfeited, the grant made to the families was without the forfeiture of the personal property of the grantees

nons - -

Tippoo Sultan, the ruler of Mysore, was killed, on the 4th May 1799, during the assault on Seringsapatam by the troops under the command of General Harris. Several members of Tippoo Sultan's family, of various degrees of affinity, are residing in Mysore, on the receipt of allowances or pensions from the British Government, chargeable to the Two Lakh Fund, owing to the downfall of the power of Tippoo Sultan, and the ruin of the principal Moolasman families connected with him; these stipends were granted under orders received from Lord Mornington

No increase of pension has ever been made in Mysore. The full amount of Rs 43,594 13 4 continued to be paid up to 1850. After this year, alterations caused by lapses reduced the amount to Rs 32,736 9 9, at which sum the stipend up to January 1863 stood. This reduction was in consequence of an order received from the Court of Directors, directing the discontinuance of the lapsed pensions to the heirs of the deceased pensioners.

It was customary on the demise of sons and daughters of the late Tippoo, to assign a certain portion of their lapsed stipends for the performance of the religious ceremonies and the keeping of their tombs in good repair
It was subsequently thought proper, in consequence of the increase of the Mysore Family, to fix a limit to the disbursement, and the present amount was considered sufficient for the purpose -

For the purpose mentioned in the concluding portion of the last column, an increase of Rs 51 14 5 per month was granted in 1857 -

No treaty was made with the descendants of the late Tippoo Sultan, they benefit under the Partition Treaty of Mysore concluded with Asop Jah Bahadoor.

Subsequently their family was also considered fit subjects for the exercise of the liberality of Government

In 1855 these stipends were raised to an uniform rate of 600 rupees. The assignments were life stipends, but the Government had powers, on the demise of each grandson, to grant suitable stipends to such relations and dependents of the deceased, as were supported by him.

Their children used to be separately provided for, &c, their sons, after their demise, were to receive 200 rupees per month each, and their daughters 100 rupees.

The amount total of increase granted to the grandsons in the year aforesaid was Rs 7,593.15 4 per month.

Under the arrangements sanctioned by Sir C Wood in his Despatch dated the 11th June 1860, the allowances of these grandsons have been raised to 1,000 rupees per month, out of which 500 rupees, as shown in this Statement, will be considered as personal stipends, terminable with the lives of the present recipients, and 500 rupees to be derived from interest of amount to be capitalised for them; Government Promissory Notes of 1,50,000 rupees of the 4 per cent loan for each of the grandsons being invested in the names of three family trustees, nominated by Sir C Wood, and enclosed in the name of the beneficial holder thereof.

These stocks, after the demise of the grandsons, will form a permanent provision for their family, under arrangements to be made by the trustees without the intervention of the Government of India.

Under the Despatch referred to the grandsons have received a grant of 15,000 rupees each for the liquidation of their debts, and it has been provided that they will further get a similar grant for the purchase of their permanent residences on removal from Russapuglah and its vicinity; the Government at the same time, if so desired, purchasing at the market value any property at Russapuglah they may feel disposed to sell.

The stipend assigned for the grown-up children of the grandsons (vide Statement No 6) has not been affected, but the grandsons will no longer get the funeral donation of 500 rupees, which they would have been entitled to under the old arrangements.

These two Sahibzadahs are the great-grandsons of the late Tippoo Sultan by the female side

In 1860 their cases having been referred to the favourable consideration of the Government of India by Sir C Wood, the present life stipends were granted to them

In 1857, the stipends of these great-grandsons were raised to a uniform rate of 200 rupees per mensem, the total monthly increase granted for the purpose being Rs 1,391. 6 2

These were life stipends, but on the demise of Sahibzadah Hyder Shekoh, the Government, on special considerations based on the helpless condition of his children, granted to them a charitable allowance of 100 rupees, being half the stipend enjoyed by their father.

In 1853, Sahibzadah Shums ood-deen having commuted his monthly stipend of 50 rupees for a payment of 3,000 rupees to him, that amount was deducted from his allowance on its assignment in 1859, this deduction has been continued ever since.

Under the De-patch of Sir C Wood, dated 11th June 1860, the incomes of these great-grandsons have been raised to 300 rupees per month, out of which 100 rupees, as shown in this statement, to be considered as a personal allowance terminable with the lives of the present recipients, and 200 rupees to be derived from interest of amount (60,000 rupees), to be capitalized for them, as in the case of the grandsons, the capital stocks after their demise forming a permanent provision for their family.

They have also received a grant of 5,000 rupees for the liquidation of their debts, and will get a further sum of 5,000 rupees on removal from Hussainpuglah, with provision as regards the purchase of their property, similar to the grandsons

The funeral donation of 200 rupees, which the great grandsons would have been entitled to under the old scheme, will no longer be paid to them.

These stipends were raised to the uniform rate of 100 rupees per month, as shown herein, in 1857, when an increase of Rs 545 1 7 per mensem was granted for that purpose

These are life stipends, which lapse absolutely and finally to the Government on the demise of the several recipients

This is a great grand-daughter of the late Tippoo Sultan, by the female side

This allowance was assigned in 1860, when her case was referred to the favourable consideration of the India Government by Sir Charles Wood

OR THEIR FAMILIES, IN RECEIPT OF PENSIONS FROM THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT.

B U R M A H

From Captain *H. Nilson Davies*, Secretary to Chief Commissioner of British Burmah, to *E. C. Bayley*, Esq., Officiating Secretary to Government of India, Foreign Department, Fort William.—(No. 287-4141, dated Rangoon, the 1st November 1863.)

I HAVE the honour, by direction of the Chief Commissioner, to acknowledge Mr. Assistant Secretary Wheeler's letter, No 423, of 21st September last, forwarding a roll of state prisoners to be filled up; this has been only partially done, because the headings of the form are in some respects not applicable to the present position of the Delhi state prisoners at Rangoon, a brief state of the case of these prisoners seems therefore necessary.

After the defeat of the Mahratta Army at Putpan-Gunge, near Delhi, by the British Force under General Lake, in 1803, the Mahratta Army having evacuated Delhi, the blind Emperor Shah Alum, who had been a mere state prisoner in the hands of the Mahrattas, sought the protection of the British General. Lord Lake entered Delhi on the 14th September 1803, and from that time till the mutiny of the Bengal Army in 1857 the Titular Emperors of Delhi have been pensioned subjects of the British Government. Shah Alum died in 1808, and was succeeded by his son, Akbar Shah, who died in 1837, when Mahomed Bahadoor Shah, son of Akbar Shah, mounted the throne. He identified himself with the cause of the mutineers in 1857. On the 54th anniversary of Lord Lake entering Delhi and releasing his grandfather from the custody of the Mahrattas, Delhi was wrested from the hands of the rebels, and on 27th day of January 1858 Bahadoor Shah was brought to trial on the following charges:—

- 1st.—For aiding and abetting the mutiny of British Troops.
- 2d.—Encouraging and assisting divers persons in waging war against the British Government.
- 3d.—Assuming the sovereignty of India, and
- 4th.—Causing, and being accessory to, the murder of Christians.

He was found guilty in all the charges, and was removed to Rangoon, where he arrived on 10th December 1858, and died, and was buried there on the 7th December 1862.

The stipend allowed by the British Government for the support of the Titular Kings of Delhi from Shah Alum's time down to Bahadoor Shah's was 12 lakhs of rupees, or 120,000 £ per annum, but besides this Bahadoor Shah was in receipt of ground rents and tenements in the city of Delhi, which yielded probably 3 lakhs, or 30,000 £ a year in addition to his pension; his general income, after providing for his personal expenses, was portioned out among his wives, relatives, and retainers, according to his pleasure. Bahadoor Shah had no power whatever beyond the precincts of his own palace, he had the power of conferring titles and dresses of honour upon his own immediate retainers, but was prohibited from exercising that power on any others. He and the heir apparent were exempted from the jurisdiction of the Company's Local Courts, but were under the orders of the Supreme Government.

Together with Bahadoor Shah were conveyed to Rangoon the following prisoners, besides attendants —

Prior to the breaking out of the rebellion in 1857 the monthly stipend of Juwan Bukt was 350 rupees a month, while his mother's allowance was 5,500 rupees, the mother of Shah Abbas received 45 rupees a month, and his grandmother 35 rupees, while he himself received 100 rupees

The mother of Shah Abbas is a Yunnah woman, named Mubaric Missor, the father of Zummanee (wife of Juwan Bukt) is one Mahomed Khan; his father's name was Ahmed Kuli Khan, whose father, "Abbas," for some service rendered to Government, received a pension of 400 rupees a month, but his son, Ahmed Kuli Khan, only received half that amount, and it appears to have ceased with him, for I understood Mahomed Khan (Zummanee's father) received no pension

The mother of Zummanee is named Nawab Begum, whose father was one Nawab Bahadoor Khan; he appears to have been a wealthy man; his own income is stated to have been one lakh of rupees a year, besides a jagheer of 32 villages. On his death it is stated Government commuted the revenue derived from these villages, and allowed his son, Wali Dad Khan, a pension of 2,000 rupees a month. Zummanee has three children, one boy and two girls.

Shah Abbas has recently married one "Aiesha," daughter of a native Mahomedan trader, originally from Bombay, and settled in Rangoon, named Mahomed Tyre, the mother of Aiesha is a pure Burmese.

The present state of the remaining state prisoners is this —They all live in one house, surrounded with a high palisade, situated close to the main guard, three Europeans sentries are constantly on guard inside the enclosure. The two Begums, Zenat Mahul and Zummanee, are allowed to take exercise in a gharric, and the two sons of Bahadoor Shah take exercise on foot, attended by an European sentry.

There is no fixed allowance for the state prisoners' food, and clothes are supplied to them and their attendants at the discretion of the officer in charge, but they receive no money allowance. The total expenditure of the state prisoners and their attendants for 1862-63 was 6,831 rupees.
